Now that the war is over it becomes more and more urgent that Russia's aims in the post-war world should be more clearly understood. Edgar Snow, author of *People on Our Side* (or *Glory and Bondage*), *Red Star Over China* and *Battle for Asia*, here interprets the actualities and the aspirations of Soviet Russia's role in Europe and the world. In terse, brilliant and evocative language, he outlines the reasons for Russia's insistence upon secure European and Asiatic borders. He reports, from first-hand observation, the programme the Soviets have formulated in Poland, the Balkans, Germany and on their Mongolian frontier. He describes the Russian plan for de-Hitlerizing Nazi Germany and the measures taken to prevent the creation of an antagonistic Poland. He discusses the relationship between the Soviet Union and the Kuomintang Government of Chiang Kai-shek, particularly in view of Russia's participation in the war against Japan. His chapters on the personalities of the political leaders of Russia are among the most revealing in his book.

Indisputably one of the best informed of U. S. foreign correspondents, Edgar Snow provides in *The Pattern of Soviet Power* a direct reply to the casual critics of a country and a people that stemmed the tide of Fascism. His long residence in the Soviet Union has given him a point of view that is both sympathetic and critical. *The Pattern of Soviet Power* is a timely and an important contribution to one of the most vital problems of our time.

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EDGAR SNOW was born in Kansas City, Missouri, in 1905. Since his graduation from college, he has spent most of his life in China as correspondent for American and British newspapers and magazines and as a teacher in a Chinese university. He was the first foreign correspondent to visit the Chinese Soviet in North-western China. Out of that experience came *Red Star Over China*—1938—which has been translated into several Asiatic and European languages. *Battle for Asia*—1941—was written while he was visiting major battle fronts in the Far East. He wrote *People on Our Side (or Glory and Bondage)* after the conclusion of a 60,000-mile, fourteen-month trip covering seventeen countries. He was in Stalingrad when the Germans were halted at the point of their deepest penetration into Russia. He visited areas liberated by the Red Army, including Poland and the Eastern front. From the first-hand observations of this visit grew *The Pattern of Soviet Power*, begun in Moscow and finished in Madison, Connecticut.

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
