# Report on the Census of Non-Natives, Kenya Colony, 1921.

In July, 1920, a notification was received from the Colonial Office that it had been decided to take a Census in the United Kingdom on the 24th April, 1921, and that it was considered desirable that a census should be taken in all parts of the British Empire on the same date.

It was decided by the local Government that a census of natives in Kenya Colony was impracticable at the present time, and that statistics should be collected with regard to non-natives only.

The only previous Census taken in Kenya was in April, 1911, which, as in 1921, comprised non-natives only. No legislation was adopted in 1911 to make compulsory the rendering of the information required, which, especially as regards Asiatics, was not extensive.

Legislation to provide for the taking of a Census on 24th April, 1921, and making it compulsory for all non-natives to render the required particulars, was introduced in the Legislative Council, and became law on the 15th February, 1921, as Ordinance No. VIII. of 1921 (vide Appendix "A").

Appendix A.

Mr. C. E. Spencer, Senior Assistant Secretary, was seconded from the Secretariat and appointed Superintendent of Census, and began the organisation on 1st March, 1921.

A form of Householder's Sc edule was drawn up and printed in English, in Gujerati, and in Swahili (English Characters) (vide Appendix "B").

Appendix B.

On 3rd March, 1921, a circular was issued (Appendix "C") to all District Commissioners and Resident Commissioners inviting their co-operation. Much credit is due to District Officers and their staffs for the efficient and very economical manner in which the work of distribution and collection of census schedules was carried out, over very large scattered areas.

Assistance was rendered also by the Police, the Railway authorities, the Indian Associations, and in Nairobi by the Boy Scouts. The Indian Associations in Nairobi, Mombasa, and Kisumu, gave willing and valuable help, especially at Nairobi, where members of the Social Service Volunteer Corps acted as enumerators, and themselves filled up in English the householders' schedules issued to the Indian community, the majority of whom are illiterate.

By the middle of May the completed census schedules had been received from nearly all districts, the exceptions being Lamu, Tana River, and t'e remoter districts of Jubaland and the Northern Frontier District. Returns from the military garrison in Turkana did not arrive until the end of July and no returns were received from the small military garrison at Serenli in Jubaland.

On receipt of the schedules work was commenced on the sorting, translation of Gujerati and Arabic forms, and binding into volumes of the returns, and the despatching of numerous letters to householders who had omitted one or more of the particulars required. This preliminary work, and the compilation of a general summary of the population was completed early in June, and the first general result of the census was published in the local press during that month.

The classification of the census returns was performed by the Superintendent, assisted by a staff of two European, one Goan, and one Indian clerks, temporarily engaged for the purpose, and was completed by the 13th August.

In 1911 a sum of £2,000 was provided in the Estimates for expenses of the Census, but in 1921, £500 only was allowed. Thanks to the assistance rendered by District Commissioners, most of whom utilised t'eir staffs on census work practically free of expense, it was possible to keep within this figure, the total expenditure being as follows:—

This statement of expenditure does not include the salaries of the Superintendent 'ensus, seconded from the Secretariat for 5½ months, and a Goan Clerk, seconded ' x 4½ months from the Provincial Administration, nor the cost of printing the householders' schedules in English and Swahili, and other forms, which work was done by the Government Press.

#### I.-Population

The total number of persons enumerated in Kenya on the 24th April 1921 was 45,633, exclusive of natives, as compared with 15,061 persons enumerated at the census of 1911. The racial and sex distribution was as follows:—

From this it appears that the rate of increase during the decennial period was almost identical both for Europeans and Asiatics, over 200 per cent. In reality, however, the increase in the Asiatic population was much less, for the reason that in the 1921 census 10,102 persons describing themselves as Arabs were enumerated in this category, whereas few, if any, Arabs were included in the 1911 census. Excluding the 10,102 Arabs, the total number of Asiatics enumerated in 1921 amounted to 25,880, showing an increase since 1911 of 118 per cent. only, as compared with 204 per cent. in the case of Europeans.

Table I. (see Appendix) shows the non-native population in each administrative district of the Colony, under the headings Europeans, Indians, Goans, Arab., and Table I. Others, distinguishing the sexes, and adults from children under 16 years of age.

#### II.-Sexes, Ages, and Condition as to Marriage.

(TABLE II. and DIAGRAMS 1 to 5).

As might be expected in a country of comparatively recent foreign occupation, males considerably outnumber females, but the disparity tends to decrease, especially amongst Europeans, as conditions become more settled. This is illustrated by the Diagram 1 (see appendix). following figures, and by Diagram 1 (see appendix).

Table II. (see appendix) gives, for Europeans and Asiatics separately, the ages of the non-native population in quinquennial periods, in combination with information regarding condition as to marriage. The age distribution of the population is illustrated in Diagram 2 (see appendix), which shows the proportional numbers per 1,000 at each age period, both sexes combined. The dip in the curve at age periods 10 to 19 is probably attributable to the exodus of children (mainly European) between those ages, for education in England; and the compensating rise in the curve in respect of age periods from 20 to 34, culminating at age period 25 to 29, is no doubt due to immigration of persons (mostly males) between those ages. In the case of Europeans the largest number of persons is found in the age period 30 to 34, whilst amongst Asiatics the preponderance occurs earlier, in the age period 25 to 29.

The Kenya age period curve differs considerably, in this respect, from that observed in England and other European countries, and approximates in some degree to that obtaining in 1911 in New Zealand, Australia, and Canada.

Diagram 3. (Europeass). Diagram 3 illustrates the change that has occurred since the last census in the age distribution of Europeans in Kenya. It will be observed that, with the exception of the period 5 to 9 years, there has been a reduction in the proportion per 1000 of the population in all age periods up to 40, with a corresponding increase in the latter age periods. In 1911, in every 1000 Europeans 810 were under 40, whereas in 1921 the number was 756 in every 1000. Still, there are practically no very aged Europeans in the Colony, there being only 37 persons over 70, and one of 80.

Diagram 4. (Europeans).

The percentages of unmarried, married and widowed or divorced amongst Europeans are illustrated in Diagram 4, which shows that during the last decade the percentage of married Europeans (both sexes) has risen from 37 to 42 per cent., the percentage of widowed or divorced also rising by 1 per cent. The proportion of unmarried has, correspondingly, decreased by 6 per cent., since 1911, to 54.7 per cent. of the total European population of all ages and both sexes.

Taking Europeans of both sexes of marriageable ages, i.e., 20 years and upwards, the following proportions of unmarried, married, and widowed or divorced per 1000 are found, and may be compared with the proportions obtaining in England at the 1911 census, viz:—

From which table it will be observed that whereas the proportion of bachelors is much higher in Kenya than in England, the proportion of spinsters is lower.

Amongst Asiatics, the proportion of children and young people of both sexes is much higher than amongst Europeans, as also of persons over 70. This latter fact appears to be due to the number of Arabs describing themselves as octogenarians. It seems probable that they may have overstated their ages in some cases. Longevity is not a feature of life in Kenya.

In every 1000 Asiatics 833 are under 40, as against 756 per 1000 amongst Europeans.

The percentage of married persons amongst Asiatics is ligher than is the case with the European population, as the following table shows:—

From the above it will be seen that, of the adult European population, 63 per cent, were born in the United Kingdom, 27 per cent, in British Colonies (mainly South Africa), and 9 per cent, in Foreign Countries. Amongst children of both sexes under 16 years of age, 52 per cent, were born in Kenyu Colony, 19 per cent, in the United Kingdom, 23 per cent, in British Colonies (mainly South Africa) and 3 per cent, only in Foreign Countries.

It appears that the returns by Arabs are of doubtful accuracy, both as regards the total numbers claiming to be of Arab race, and as to the large proportion stated to have been born in Arabia. It is probable that a considerable number of the so-called Arab women are of African race, and there is little doubt that the number of Arab children alleged to have been born in Arabia is exaggerated. There has been considerable immigration of Arabs during the last few years, but it seems doubtful whether this has been sufficient to account for the numbers, especially of children, alleged to have been born in Arabia.

The order of numerical precedence is the same as in 1911, wit't he exception that whereas in 1911 Germans headed the list with 25 per cent. of the total foreign population, in 1921 persons of German nationality represented only a fraction of 1 per cent.

#### (2) Asiatics, including Coloured on Mixed Races.

Table V. (see appendix) shows the nationality or race of the 35,982 Asiatics and Table V. Others enumerated. As regards Indians, natives of Bruish India and their families have been classed as British Indians, and those bern in Native States in India have been shown, with their families, under the heading British Protected Indians. With one or two exceptions, all the Goans are Roman Catholics, and all the Arabs Mohammedans.

Amongst Others, 50 per cent. are Roman Cat'tolics and 30 per cent. Church of England.

In Table VIII. (see appendix) are shown the occupations of the non-native population, males and females. Of the 30,142 males, 22,367 or 74 per cent, describe themselves as having some occupation or other. Of these, 482 are boys, and 8 girls, under 16 years of age. Adult males without occupation or occupation not stated number 950, of whom 157 are Europeans, 512 Indians, 211 Arabs and 70 Gcans and Others.

Local Govt.

Under the first heading...Local Government, Railway Servants are stown separately from Civil Servants (European) and Government Servants (non-European), and 49 Municipal employees have been included.

Military.

Under military are shown not only Military Officers serving in Kenya, but Military Clerks and employees also; and, repurately, Officers of Home Forces visiting or residing in Kenya who show no other occupation. In addition to these, there are many military reservists or ex-military men under the heading Settlers, Planters and Farmers, who have described themselves as such.

Settlers, Farmers, etc.

Head III., Settlers, Farmers, and Planters, includes landowners, farmers, stock-farmers, planters and producers, and their employees (except mechanics and graftsmen who are classed under Industrial). Women and children are not included, except in the few cases where they have shown farming as their occupation.

Under Heading V., Commercial, are included Bankers, Merchants, Shopkeepers, Commercial, Agents, Accountants, Auctioneers, Transport Agents, etc., and their Clerks and assistants. For lack of a more appropriate heading, 3 foreign consuls have been included in this category.

Industrial, Head VI., includes Mechanics, Engineers, Carpenters, Masons, Black-Industrial, smiths, Wheelwrights, Watchmakers, Printers and Stationers, Sawyers, Millers, Electric Suppliers, Saddlers, Contractors, Tailors, etc., and their employees. Many persons of this category are employed on farms and plantations.

Under Personal Service, Head VII., are included Hotelkeepers, Domestic Personal Service. Servante, Laundrymen, Hairdressers, Club Staff, and their Clerks and assistants.

The number of male European Missionaries under Head VIII. is considerably Missionaries. reduced owing to the fact that ordained ministers of religions have been included under Head IV., Professional, Clergy. The majority of the Clergy are, however, also missionaries, and roughly speaking there are 150 missionaries of either sex in Kenya, or 300 in all as compared with 240 missionaries enumerated in 1911. As no definite denomination has been stated in many cases, it has not been possible to give numbers of each missionary society having branches in Kenya. The bulk of the female missionaries belong to the Roman Catholic missions in the Kikuyu Province.

The 528 male persons under Head IX., are all Arabs, principally seamen on dhows Sailors and Fishermen. in coast ports on the census day, together with a number of fishermen along the coast.

Head X., Unspecified, includes all persons whose occupations are indefinite, or Unspecified, insufficiently described to enable them to be classified. The bulk are Indian males who give their occupation as "Service." In many cases, from the addresses given, it has been possible to deduce that this means service with the Uganda Railway, but where there is no such indication it has been necessary to include them under "Unspecified."

Head XI., Unoccupied or Non-Productive includes women with no specified occupa- Unoccupied. tion or household duties only, school children and infants, persons who have retired from the civil service, professions or business, and persons of private means. There is also included under this heading a small number of persons confined in prisons or lunatic asylums.

In Table IX., the occupations of the non-native population of Kenya are shown Table IX. under the main divisions of Europeans, Indians, Goans, Arabs and Others.

It will be observed that of some 2,400 non-natives engaged in agricultural pursuits. Settlers and Farmers. four-fifths of the total are Europeans. Of the remaining 500, Arabs on plantations at the coast account for 370, whilst Ind an agriculturists number 120 only, mainly in the Kisumu and Mombasa Districts. Since 1911 the number of European Settlers, Planters and Farmers has increased from 428 to 1,893 persons.

Of the comparatively few Europeans shown under Personal Service, the majority Personal Servants. of the men are Hotelkeepers or Club Staff, whilst the women are principally children's nurses.

The large number of Arabs under this heading are mainly lamalis and porters. General. water carriers and sellers, eating-house proprietors, etc. at the coast.

Information was sought on the census forms as to the numbers of employers and employed, but as this was not given in so many instances, no attempt has been made to classify the results.

### VII.-GENERAL.

# TABLES X, XI AND XII.

Table X. (see appendix) gives comparative figures for 1901, 1911 and 1921 of the area and population (estimated so far as natives are concerned) of Kenya. The increase in area and population between 1901 and 1911 was due to the transfer from Uganda of the Nyanza and Naivasha Provinces.

TABLE XI. (see appendix) shows, for 1911 and 1921, the population (excluding Natives) of the four principal Towns in the Colony.

TABLE XII. (see appendix) is an amplification of Table X, and shows the density of population per square mile.

The apparent reduction in the Native population between 1911 and 1921 is attributed to an over estimate in 1911, which has been corrected by improved methods of computation adopted in recent years.

#### APPENDIX A.

### Colony and Protectorate of Kenya.

#### AN ORDINANCE.

No. 8 of 1921.

Assented to in His Majesty's name this 15th day of February, 1921.

#### EDWARD NORTHEY,

Governor.

#### An Ordinance to Take a Census of the Non-Native Population of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya.

BE it enacted by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof:-

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Census Ordinance, Short title. 1921."
- 2. In this Ordinance the expression "Non-Native" shall Interpretation, mean and include all persons who on the 24th day of April, 1921, are within the boundaries of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya except any person who by birth or adoption belongs to any of the aboriginal races or tribes of Africa or is a Somali or Swahili.

- 3. A census for the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya Cens shall be taken in the year 1021 and the census day shall be 1921. Sunday the 24th day of April in that year.
  - Census to be taken in
- 4 (1) The Governor shall direct the taking of the census and shall appoint an officer to be Superintendent of the census.

- (2) The Superintendent shall, subject to the approval of the Governor, prepare and issue such forms and instructions as he deems necessary for the taking of the census.
- (3) All expenses incurred, with the approval of the Governor for the purposes of the census shall be paid out of the General Revenue of the Colony and Protectorate.
- 5. For the purposes of the census every district shall be subdivided into Enumeration Districts and the Governor shall formed. appoint an Enumerator or Enumerators for each Enumeration

6. Schedules shall be prepared by or under directions of the Superintendent for the purpose of being filled in by or on behalf of all Non-Native occupiers of dwellings with the following particulars :-

The name, sex, age, occupation, condition as to marriage, relation to head of family, birth place, race, nationality, and religious persuasion of every Non-Native living person who abode in every house on the night of the census day.

7. Every Enumerator shall prior to the end of the week Distribution of onding with the Saturday next before the census day leave at the schedules. dwelling of every Non-Native within his Enumeration District one or more of the said schedules; and on every schedule shall be plainly expressed that it is to be filled up by the occupier for whom it is left and that the Enumerator will collect all such schedules on the Monday following or on a day as near thereafter as shall be possible.

Occupiers to fill up schedules.

8. Every occupier for whom any such schedule has been so left shall fill up or cause to be filled up the schedule to the best of his knowledge and belief so far as relates to all persons dwelling in the house occupied by him and shall sign his name thereto and shall deliver the schedule so filled up and signed to the Enumerator when required to do so by him.

Collection of schedules after census day.

9. Every dwelling shall be visited in every Enumeration District by an Enumerator so soon as may be possible after the census day and all schedules shall then be collected by him.

Travellers.

10. The Superintendent shall obtain returns of the particulars required by this Ordinance with respect to persons who during the night of the census day were travelling or on ship board, or for any reason were not abiding that night in any house of which account is to be taken by the Enumerators, and shall include these returns in t'e reporte to be made under this Ordinance.

Superintendent to report.

11. The Superintendent shall prepare a report on the census returns so obtained and such report shall be printed and laid before the Legislative Council in due course.

Declaration by

12. Every Enumerator shall make a declaration to the effect that the returns furnished by him in pursuance of this Ordinance or any instructions issued thereunder have been truly and fait's fully taken and that to the best of his knowledge they are correct as far as may be known and such declaration shall be made before a Magistrate.

Penalty for default.

13. (1) If any person employed for the purposes of this Ordinance makes wilful default in the performance of any of his duties under this Ordinance or makes any wilfully false declaration he commits an offence and shall be liable for each offence to a fine not exceeding £5.

Penalty for refusal or neglect to make return or false declaration.

- (2) If any person for whom a schedule is left as hereinbefore provided:—
  - (c) Refuses to answer or wilfully gives a false answer, to fill up or cause to be filled up the schedule to the best of his knowledge and belief or to sign and deliver it as in this Ordinance required; or
  - (b) Wilfully makes signs or delivers or causes to be made signed or delivered any false return of any matter specified in the schedule; or
  - (c) Refuses to answer or wilfully gives a false answer, to any question necessary for obtaining the information required to be obtained under this Ordinance;

he commits an offence and shall for each offence be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding £5.

Penalty for communicating confidential information.

(3) If any person employed for the purposes of this Ordinance communicates, without lawful authority, any information acquired in the course of his employment he shall be guilty of an offence and shall be punishable on conviction with imprisonment of either description for three months or with a fine not exceeding £100 or with both such fine and imprisonment.

1. The Head, or person acting as Head, of a private Household is required by law to make a return in this Form, stating the particulars asked for in respect of all persons forming part of the Household for Census purposes. See the heading to Column (a) within.
N.B.—Any one or more persons separately occupying separate lodgings in a house, or a separate part of a house, are to be regarded as forming a separate household, but boarders are to be regarded as part of the household with which they board.
2. The Manager or other person in charge of a Hotel, Boarding House, Club, Common Lodging House or similar establishment, is required by law to make a return in this Form with respect to all persons falling to be included as immates of the establishment for Census purposes. See the heading to Column (a) within.
3. Each of the persons thus forming part of a household or establishment is required by law to give to the Head of the household or Manager of the establishment such information as may be necessary to enable the return to be made.
4. The Schedule will be called for on Monday, April 25th, or as soon thereafter as may be practicable, by the appointed enumerator; in order that he may not be delayed it must be ready with the answers written in the proper columns early on the morning of that day. If the answers are incomplete or inaccurate, the enumerator must ask any questions necessary to enable him to correct the Schedule.
5. The Head of the household or other person responsible for making the return may, if unable to deliver the Schedule to the enumerator personally, arrange for some other person to do so on his behalf. If desired, the Schedule may be handed to the enumerator under cover.
6. If any person whose duty it is to give information refuses to do so or wilfully gives false information, he will be liable to a fine not exceeding five pounds

#### CENSUS OF NON-NATIVES 1921.

Attention is drawn to Ordinance No. 8 of 1921, published in the Official Gazette of 23rd February, 1921, which enacts that a census of non-natives shall be taken on the 24th proximo. The co-operation of all district officers in this matter is invited. Notice of the appointment of a Superintendent of Census appears in the Official Gazette of the 2nd instant. Government Notice No. 70.

- 2. Forms of Householder's Schedule for the rendering of the information required by Section 6 of the Ordinance are now being printed, specimen attached. It is understood that as regards Nairobi Town, it will not be necessary to have forms issued in any language but English, and that arrangements can be made to have all schedules, for Asiatics as well as for Europeans, filled up in English. If similar arrangements can be made in all districts, the necessity for printing forms in Urdu and Gujerati will be obviated and much labour in translating returns will be saved. On this point an expression of opinion is invited, and also an estimate of the number of schedules that will be required for your district, both for Europeans and for Asiatics.
- 3. As regards Section 5 of the Ordinance, I shall be glad if you will inform me how many enumeration areas will be required in your district, and how many enumerators, both for European and for Asiatic areas, will be needed. The Commissioner of Police is being requested to assist with the loan of the services of European Police Constables in settled areas, and it is hoped that, in native areas, clerical staff and hut counters may be available to act as enumerators. In some districts, however, it may be neccessary to appoint enumerators specially for the work of distribution and collection of schedules at some rate of remuneration to be decided upon. I shall be grateful for information as to any arrangements you propose in this connection. A sum of £500 has been provided in the 1921 Estimates for expenses of the Census, but this will not suffice if large payments to enumerators have to be met.
- 4. The duties of Enumerators are set forth in Sections 7, 9 and 12 of the Ordinance. Detailed instructions to Enumerators will be embodied in a circular to be issued later.





