## INTRODUCTION

In this volume are printed the proceedings of the President and Council of Fort St George for the year 1705 comprised in the manuscript series 34 and 35 of the 'Diary and Consultation Books 'The manuscript volumes have been mended in this office and are in a fair state of preservation

1705 was the 7<sup>th</sup> year of the Governorship of Thomas Pitt well known as the Great President The volume before us contains a few items of interest which are mentioned below —

Daud Khan, the Nawab of the Carnatic, married during the year and the Company gave him on the occasion a present of two baskets of oranges, thirty bottles of liquor and a chest of rosewater (page 6) The Nawab returned after a-personal interview with the King to govern the country with additional powers and honous The Governor congratulated him on this occasion in a letter and sent him a suitable present (page 72)

John Beard, the President of the old East India Company in Bengal, arrived in Fort St George with his family to incoup his health and he was then given a suitable inception (page 6)

Owing to the war in Europe, silver was scarce in England and the English Parliament prohibited the general export of bullion (page 16)

Pascaol de Grasa, a Portuguese, died during the year and his estate was divided according to the Portuguese law, among his relatives The six persons who petitioned as relations of his wife were given each an equal share of the property His three illegitimate children were also given an equal share with them It was to be paid to them by the Fathers of the Portuguese Church as they should think fit for their subsistence and it was also settled that the house that they then lived in was to remain in their possession for ever (page 71)

There was a great neglect in the keeping up of general books for many years past It was resolved that in future the accounts of the preceding month had to be entered in the journals before the middle of the month following and they were to be read every month before the Governor in Consultation (page 73)

As the country had not only a Nawab to govern it but several Rajabs, each having a distinct interest, who often made the government not only hazardous but troublesome, instructions were given to officers to keep night and day extraordinary strict guard and to have sufficient provisions in the Foit to hold out a monsoon (page 78) Great emphasis was laid in the instructions issued to officers on their prudence, diligence ability, and more than all their integrity (page 77)

Montion is made of a great and glorious victory of the English over the French and Bavarians during the year (page 79)

Mathew Empson, a servant of the Company who had resigned his place on a former occasion on his transfer to Fort St Divid was reinstated in his former post as a sea customer (page 83) John Raworth who had been elevated to be a member of the Council reverted to his old place as a land customer and store keeper (page 83) John Meverille, a member of the Fort St George Council, was transferred as Second in Council to Fort St David He preferred to resign his place rather than go to Fort St David, as he had served in Fort St George for more than eighteen years and as he would then be far more remote from the diamond trade in which he was brought up which would mean to him an irreparable loss and utter ruin (page 118) Heveningham, suffering from distemper, desired to go on a beavoyage for a change and requested the Company to spare his services (page 111)

There were great complaints for over two years of ships losing anchor and the road being very foul Therefore it wis ordered that all people were free to sweep the road and to take up anchors or anything of value for their labour without paying the half salvage due to the Company To this effect a notice was put up by the Secretary in all languages at the Sea Gate (page 110)

#### INTRODUCTION

The President proposed the hedging and ditching of the island iound the Fort in order to improve it for pasture to cattle, which may be of great use for the garrison at all times, especially in times of trouble from the country, (page 104)

Five hundred pagodas were advanced by the Governor in Council towards the construction of the B'ack Town wall and works (page 127) All castes were summoned to consider the ways and means to raise the money and they agreed to pay their own quota (page 131) After the work was over, Mr Smart, the Collector, produced a list of several persons wholdid not pay the promised sum Some complained of their poverty, others of the excessive nature of the assess ment The accounts were laid before them and they were asked to point out reasonable objections, if any It was ordered that the heads of the various castes should meet immédiately at the temple to consider the ways of reimbursing the Company for what they had spent on the works and report the same immediately to the Governor in Council (page 132)

That your Petitioners being informed that your Hon<sup>r</sup> &c do here represent the Right Hon<sup>ble</sup> New Company, as well as the R<sup>t</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup> old, and are appointed for the mannagement of both their Affaires [we] are come here humbly to represent, That your Petition[ers] and their Fathers have for more then forty yeares made Contract with and provided Goods for the said Honoble Companys, during all which time they have constantly acquitted themselves with Honesty

and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Cheifs and others of the Companys servants by whom they were Employed, That about five Yeares since the  $\operatorname{Hon}^{b_1}$  John Pitt Esq Consul for the King of England, and President for Affairs of the R' Hon<sup>bi</sup> English East India Company ca[me] to Metchlepatam and did there and at Maddapollam settle Factorys for the Trade of the said Company have severall other Persons their Servants for his Council and Assistants

Your Petitioners farther humbly shew that some months after the arrival of the said Consull they your Petitioners did at his desire and request make a Cont-[ract] for the providing of Goods to the Amount of Fifty Thousand Pagod for the Account of the said Right Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company, which they did accordingly, duly honestly perform

Your Petitioners do farther humbly shew that in y year following they likewise made another Contract [with] the said Consul and his Council to provide Goods to y<sup>o</sup> Amount of One Hundred Twenty five Thousand Pag<sup>s</sup> for the Account of the said R<sup>t</sup> Hon<sup>blo</sup> Company w<sup>h</sup> contract your Petitioners did also perform and compleat in every particular, and do acknowledge and declare that the [said] Consul, and his Council did on their Parts likewise ma[ke] full Payment of all sums due on both the aforementiond Contracts, so that there is not any demands on either side remaining to be made on the same

Your Petitioners do faither humbly shew that the following year the said Consul did for the Account of the said Right Honble Company make with yo Petitioners one other Contract by the which your Petitioners were obliged to provide Goods to the Amount of Iwo hundred & Fifty thousand Pagodas, and did at that time deliver to your Petitioners Fourteen thousand Pag advanced in part of Payment, and did afterwards [at] severall times pay to your Petitioners the further sum of Eighty seven Thousand five hundred fifty nine Pagodas, and also did deliver to your Petitioners in severall sorts of Europe Goods to the Amount of tw[enty] two Thousand Pagodas for all which sum's your Petitioners did deliver Goods as required by their Contract but afterwards when your Petitioners did demand the remaining sums of money to be paid to them for su[ch] part of the Goods as was yet unprovided the said Consull and his Council did acquaint your Petitioners that they had not any at present, but did most earnestly request of your Petitioners to bring in Goods which they extreamly wanted for the Loading of two Ships then at Metchlepatam and did assure your Petition[ers] that they should in a very short time receive supply from England, and then would duly pay your Petitioners what should be owing to them with Interest at the rate of Ten # Cent # Annum, upon which your Petitioners being very desireous to testifie their Zeal or the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Service, and having an In [tire] confidence in the honesty, and fair Intentions of the said Consull and his Council, did borrow money to enable them to provide such Goods as still remained upon the sa d Contract, which your Petitioners [did] accordingly in due time bring in so as the said Consull and his Council Loaded the same on the Ships Stretham and Rising Sun, which by that meanes were dispatch d for England

Your Petitioners farther shew, That the said Consul & his Council soon after did make up accounts with yo<sup>r</sup> said Petitioners, and that there did then appear on y<sup>e</sup> Ballance to be due to your Petitioners for the Goods provided by them on the said Contract the sum of One Hundred Twenty six thousand Nine hundred and fifteen Pagodas sixteen fanams, for the which the said Consul and his Council did give to your Petitioners severall Bonds sealed with the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company s Seal, and signed by themselves declaring that the Interest of Ten  $\mathcal{P}$  Cent for the same for certain times therein mentioned was to be paid also to y<sup>r</sup> Petitioners

Your Petitioners farther shew that at the request of the said Consul and his Council they did likewise with their own money (the Company at that time not having any) procure for the said Hon<sup>bl</sup> Company a parcell of Redwood Amounting

to One Thousand six hundred thirty Pagodas, which they delivered [to] the said Consul and his Council, and by them was sent to England on the Stretham

Your Petitioners farther shew, that the following year the said Consull and his Council did earnestly p[ress] your Petitioners to make a New Contract for the providing of Goods for Ship Katharine then in [readiness] and for the speedy loading of such other ships as the said Consul and his Council did affirm to [ ] were suddainly expected, and would be [ ] to pay your Petitioners all that was already owing to them, and what should be farther due on such New Contract, in complyance to which request your said Petitioners still desireous to manifest their good inclinations [for] the Companys service did accordingly enter into a Contract with the said Consul and his Council, by which they were to provide for the said Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company G[oods] to the Amount of One Hundred sixty Thousand P[agodas] and did at that time in part of Payment receive of the Consul Twenty thousand Pagodas, which he told your Petitioners he had borrowed of Mr Abendana on the Companys Account for that purpose Your Petitioners did also receive of the said Consul the farther sum of Twenty Thousand three hundred forty three Pagodas upon the Account of the said Contract, Eleven thousand five hundred of which was paid by Mr Affleck in the Place upon Bills drawn on him by the said Consul and delivered to your Petitioners, at which time your Petitioners had brought in such a proportion of Goods as compleated the Katherines Cargo, so that she was dispatched for England

Your Petitioners do farther shew that some time [after] when they had provided the Greatest part of the Goods remaining on the said Contract, the said Consul, and his Council to the great surprise, and unspeakable grief of your Petitioners did possitively refuse to a[ssist] them declaring to your Petitioners that they during [\_\_\_\_\_] Venture to receive any more Goods till the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company should send out effects to pay for them, and discharge what they already owed, and earnestly intreated your Petitioners to have patience, and to lett the Goods remain assuring them that so soon as they were able to pay, they would immediatly receive them

Your Petitioners humbly begg leave to shew, That they quietly submitted to his hard usage and that notwithstanding it threatned the certain ruin of them and their familyes, yet they nevel sought redress from the Mogull officers or made any Publick complaints, so Zealous were your Petitioners to approve them selves true to the English Interest, and so avoid any proceeding that might bring the least disreputation upon it, still haveing an Intire confidence in the Honour and Justice of the Company, and in the Honesty and fair intentions of the Consul and his Council

Your Petitioners farther shew that soon after the said Consul made up Accounts with your Petitioners at which time it did appear on the Ballance that there remaind due to your Petitioners on the said Contract for Goods received, and for Redwood by them provided and Loaded on the Katharine the sum of six thousand Eight hundred Twenty four Pagodas, for the which M Tillard (after the Consuls death) gave a Bill payable with Interest at the rate of Ten P Cent P Annum

Your Petitioners farther shew that notwithstanding the Vast sum the Company were Indebted to them [yet] M Tillard being reduced to very great streights for want of money, and not able to procure so much as riquisite for the subsistance of him, and the rest of the Hon<sup>bi</sup> Companys Servants at his earnest request did with great difficulty supply him for the said [Hon<sup>bio</sup>] Companys Account with severall Sum s of money [for] the necessary Expences of the Factory, The whole Amounting to Two thousand Nine hundred eighty Pagodas twenty eight fanams for the which the said of Tillard did give Bills payable with Interest at Ten P cent P Annum

Your Petitioners farther shew that they have not any time or from any Person received either in Goods or money in Payment of the said severall sums due to any more then Ten Thousand six hundred fifty seven Pagodas and Nine fauams Interest, and that y greatest part in Goods taken at such high rates that Your Petitioners can plainly make it appear they lost considerably by them, so that at this day there remain due to your Petitioners One Hundred twenty eight thousand Two hundred and fifty one Pagodas three faname Principle, and I wenty two Thousand two hundred and <code>Fight Pagodas</code> twenty Nine Fanams Interest on [y] same to the last of December

Your Petitioners farther shew that they have [Invested] [likewise] to the Amount of Eighty Thousand Pagodas [in] Goods provided by Contract for the said Hou<sup>ble</sup> Company which have lay n by them as dead stock for more then I wo yeares, and are now much fallen from the Prizes your Petitioners bought them, and were to deliver them at

Your Petitioners farther humbly shew that they are indebted to severall Persons of great Power and consideration, as also to divers others in and about Metchlepatam and Maddapollam the greatest part of the Amount due to them from the said Hon<sup>bi</sup> Comp for the which they pay the least Eighteen  $\mathcal{P}$  Cent  $\mathcal{P}$  Annum Interest, and for a considerable part Twenty four by which your Petitioners yearly suffer a certain Loss of many Thousand Pagodas, the said Creditors farther obliging your Petitioners according to the Custom there at the end of every Year to give new Bonds and make the Interest Principall which is yet so farr from satisfying their clamours that severall of your Petitioners particularly the Cheif Merchant have had many times their Cloths tore off their Bodyes publickly in the streets of Metchlepatam as yo<sup>r</sup> Hon<sup>rn</sup> servant Nargain can testifie, and to avoid greater evils are forced now to fly to your Hon<sup>r</sup> for <sup>P</sup>rotection

Your Petitioners do farther shew that M Tillard did inform your Petition ers about six months agoe that the said Comp had sent Effects but to pay your Petitioners, but the Ship on which they came was unfortunately Lost on the Coas<sup>+</sup> of Malabarr, however there was hopes that the greatest part of the Treasure would be saved, and therefore desired your Petitioners to consent that he might come to Madrass to concert measures for the preserving it, [assuring] your Petitioners that he would there find meanes to [give]them satisfaction, upon which promise your Petition[ers] did not only Agree to his leaving Metchle patam[but] did effectually prevail with your Petitioners Creditors not to molest the said M Tillard or any way's of his departure

Now your Petitioners most humbly implore your  $[Hon^{r}]$  & to compassionate their misery, and to take their miserable case into serious consideration so that they [may] find some immediate releaf to preserve them and Familys, Your Petitioners humbly pray that Your Honour & will be pleased to cause  $M^{r}$  Tillard [ap]pear with your Petitioners before your Hon<sup>r</sup> & that he may there declare whether your Petitioners have exhibited on demand or sett forth any circumstances in their case which is not punctuall truth, your Peti[tioners]being well assured that he being an Honest, and go[out person] will be a strong and effectual evidence and Inter[cede] on their benalf according to his promise so as that your Hon & will be prevaild upon to pay your Petitioners [what] is honestly due to them, without which your Petitioners must be for ever banish d from their Country, and with [their] Wives and Children will certainly perish which if yo<sup>r</sup> & will prevent

Received & Pattamar a Generall Letter from Commodore Brabourne &c<sup>a</sup>. Council at Anjengo dated [1,<sup>th</sup>] December advising that the flour French Ships were seen off Cape Commarcen the latter end of November last, they also advise the condition of Ship Neptunes wreck which gives but small hopes of recovering any thing, the Natives having fortifyed themselves to defend the wreck whilst their men worke upon it, who had got three or four Chests of Silver & some Lead &c

Received P Pattamar a Generall Letter from the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort S<sup>t</sup> David dated 30<sup>th</sup> past month

Sloop Gangees l'homas Morrice Master arrived in this Road from Atcheen by whom received a Letter from Mess Griffith, and Bugden there dated 16<sup>th</sup>. Decem<sup>r</sup> last

The Annapurna belonging to Arrabs arrived in this road from Bengall Ketch Hope arrived in this load from Vizagapatam

The following order was signed by the Governour & Council Vizt

The Nabob 18 now at Arcott, and 'tis doubtfull whether he goes to Gulcondah as reported, The Duan lately marryed, I believe 'twould not be amiss to send between them two baskets of Oranges, Thirty bottles of Liquor and a Chest of Rosewater to which desire your opinion

This day the Governour received advices from Fort S<sup>t</sup> David that there was Four French Ships standing [near] Pollicherry from the Southward, and another Ship [of y<sup>\*</sup>] Company but no Colours which is supposed to [be a Ship of] prize

Chambers Friggat Cap' South Commander arrived in this road from Bengall, by whom received a Generall Letter from the United Council there dated [ ] December, as also a Generall Letter from the Cheif and Council of Vizagapatam dated 29<sup>th</sup> December

This evening the Governour received advices that [the] Four French Ships who were upon the Malabarr [Coast] are arrived in Pollicherry Road, and twenty two [sailed] off Porto Novo Seaward they mett with a Dutch Ship of Fifty Guns and upwards of two hundred Europe men, bound from Bengall to Negapatam on which was their Commosary for this Coast after fireing [salutes and a] few broad Sides they tooke, who is Said to be very Rich

The Hon<sup>ble</sup> John Beard Esq President for affairs of the R<sup>t</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup> old East India Company in Bengall [arri]ved here on Ship Chambers Frigat with his Family who are all come here for their healths, and this [morn]ing came a Shore, who was received sutable to [the] Character he bears







In the year 170<sup>2</sup> the last Contract your Petitioners were obliged to bring in Goods at the two Sea Ports to y<sup>e</sup> Amount of 160000 Pagod under penalty of forfeiting twenty five ? Cent if they did not compleat the Contract according to Limitation all which Goods they brought in, but the Company tooke no more then 44000 Pag<sup>s</sup> of said Goods alleadging there was no Ship, and so the rest remaind upon their hands, which y Petitioners were forced to carry from Port to Port on their own risque and selling them for half their Cost, not being proper Goods for this ( ountry, of which you cannot be unsensible and your Petitioners have still by them to the amount of about 30 or 40000 Pagod of the said Goods and the loss thereon your Petitioners do expect to be made good to em by the Company
