Govern. & Councill of Fort St. David dated the 14th inst. was read acknowledging the receipt of our fifty bales sent down and that they had laden them aboard the Averilla, that they had been forced to turn out fourty bales of brown Cloth when they came to sort it and that above twenty more bales being had been damaged in bringing from Porto Novo in Mussulas, so that they must be damg'd would consion the sent to the washers and that the disappointment of these sixty bales will occasion Averellas stay them to detain the snip three or four days longer than expected.

They want grain and other provisions at ffort

They add further that they are under great necessity's for want of grain and other provisions subsisting at present upon one hundred and seventy head of Cattle taken from the enemy and that they have still hopes of dispatching the Avarilla the 15th.

George Wahup died 12th instant at ffort St. David.

They conclude with the death of Mr. George Wahup a writer on the 12th inst.

The affairs of ye investmt again under debate, & if these Merchants do not undertake it, there is no dependance on any other.

The debate concerning an Investment being reassumed, AGREED that if the present Joint Stock Merchts. do not undertake it there is no other man or sett of men in this place that we can depend upon with any certainty.

The manner of the attack.

A Generall letter from the Dep^{ty}. Govern^r. and Councill dated the 20th. inst^t. was read acquainting us that they had made an attack upon an intrenchment of the Enemys at a place call'd Crimumbaucum about half way between that place and Pondicherry in the following manner.

Mr. Raworth being advis'd that a party of about three hundred Moors foot detacht from their intrenchment at Crimumbaucum us'd in their rounds to pass between Coniquile and our hedge, Order'd Capt. Courtney and Capt. Howson with sixty Granadiers to lay ambuscade for them ye. 19th. in a place that was thought the most convenient, and if possible cut them of accordingly at nine they went to the place appointed when they waited till one a Clock, when perceiving none of the enemy appear'd they march'd directly to their Intrenchment web. was immediately allarm'd, about fourty of them being without the door who repairing in with a great deall of precipitation on their approach excluded about twenty two of their Comrades all wen, were immediately put to the sword and then they order'd Serjant Aulin with two file of men to mount the wall on the opposite side weh. he did with a great deall of Bravery and forc't them to retreat where the two Captains were with the main body of the party, who immediately upon it orderd fourty granadoes to be flung in which did wonderfull execution, and while they were in this Consternation the granadoes flying in peices amongst them, and you Serjant on the other side firing upon them with swan shott they forc't open the door and entred sword in hand where they mett with a good stout repulse but the execution done upon them before had so dispirited 'em that in the end every man began to shift for himself some making for the door and others flinging themselves over the wall into the ditch in order to make their escape, till what with those that gott away and fell they had in a short time free possession of the place without any molestation when they had an opportunity to view the slain which amounted to more than one hundred, besides which, they say the ground was all strewed with peices of skulls, hands & legs woh. to be sure was effects of the granadoe shells.

That Wotchowons father built the sd. house from the ground upon a spott alotted him by Timapa's father who was at that time entrusted by the Agent and Councill as principall Inhabitant of the place to parcell out the ground in the Black Towne to such persons who were willing to reside and build in it which is all the title y' Timapa can any ways pretend to the aforesaid house and ground.

Colloway Chitte one of the Joint Stock merchants particularly declares that the house he now lives in and enjoys was built by his father in the same manner on a peice of ground [given] him by Timapas Ancestors and says [that he may] be permitted to pretend a title to such a house built upon ground alotted by his father and most of the best houses in Town will fall to Timapa by the same title.

Upon full examination of the matter we do not find that Timapas Ancestors had any titles to this ground in dispute but was only entrusted by the Agent and Council to dispose of it as aforesd.

It appears likewise that Timapa by false wittnesses & severall other subtle practices did impose upon the Justices of the Choultry so farr as to gett their-consent to turn the poor fellow out of his habitation and to make a bill of sale for the disposall of it to another person which he did for fifty pagodas.

Wherefore in consideration of the foregoing premises we think ourselves in justice obliged to come to the following resolutions.

No Grounds to rest in Timapau's disposall nor any person else without

The Declaration of Mr. Matthew Weld concerning the difference that happen'd between Capt. Hercules Courtney & Ensign Joseph Padle [Sun]day last in the Afternoon at Mr. Welds lodgings be[ing] the 20th of Janry. 1712 as allso, of their fighting Yesterday the 22d in the lodgeings abovesaid.

Being present when the difference arose between Capt. Hercules Courtney & Ensign Joseph Padle at my lodgeings Sunday the 20th of Janry. 1711 [as] allso when they fought the 22d in the afternoon in the same place & being required by the Worship¹¹ [Robert] Raworth Esq^r. Dep^{ty}. Govern^r. &c.^{2s} Councill to give a true accot of the matter, I therefore here give the [best] account I can of it web. is as follows.

Sunday the 20th in the afternoon Capt. Hercules Courtney & Ensign Joseph Padle being at my lodgeings where allso was Mr. Henry Cottrell when Capt. Courtney asked Ensign Padle to give one Richard Pain (a Centinell on the main guard a drunken abusive fellow) liberty to go out of the ffort for two or three hours in a day about some buisness he had for him to which Ensign Padle reply'd he could not, thereat Capt. Courtney paused a little and then flew into a passion saying what do you mean Ensign Padle Damn me [I'le] have him with asking you, to that Ensign Padle said if he is a man belonging to your Company you may have him but as he's upon this guard I must have another in his room to do his duty, hereat Capt. Courtney grew very abusive to Mr. Padle the Ensign of the guard giving him the lye calling him an impudent saucey fellow & threatned to beat him &. thrust his Cane down his throat w^{ch}. he shook at him in a menacing manner uttering many other abusive expressions, to all w^{ch}. said Ensign Joseph Padle made civill replys, and mild and gave his reason why he cou'd not permit said Pain to go out of the ffort, he being so frequently guilty of misdemean^{re}. when at his liberty that he fear'd he shoul'd be blamed if he suffer'd him abroad desiring Cap'. Courtney not to treat him so scurv[ily] & that he wou'd not strike him for he wou'd not [do] it when their difference grew to this hight I des[ired] them both to forbear quarrelling in my house where at they then gave over & I thought all wou'd have been past by.

But Tuesday the 22d of January [at] about three in the afternoon Capt. Hercules Courtney came into my lodgeings where Mr. Joseph Padle Ensign of the guard was with me at a table smoking a pipe of tobacco and after taking some few turns in my room seemingly in a passion stood by me and demanded of Ensign Padle how he came [to] write so saucey & impudently to him in the [particular] note, telling him that his superiors used him with more respect than barely to conclude after the wo[rds] with his name only, to this Ensign Padle replyed he wrote it in hast & design'd no affront by it & hoped he would not make this omission occasion of quarrelling with him on account their late difference about said Richard Pain adding that Capt. Courtney had then very grossly abused him, who answer'd he had not, but he very

much deserved it, and immediately flew into a passion and said he was a saucey impudent fellow and wou'd make him know his distance, & lett him see he did not make such as him his companion with severall such like scornfull expressions, to w^{ch}. M^r. Padle replyed in a very calm manner S^r. I bear a comission so well as [you] and then desired he wou'd curb his passion for he cou'd not bear such abuses.

Upon that Capt Courtney flew into a more violent passion and stepping [by] into the middle of the room immediately drew his sword whereat Ensign Padle (whose sword lay with the belt and scabbard about two steps on one side of him upon two Chairs) gott up and took hold of [it] but before he had compleatly drawn and putting himself into a posture of defence whilst the point of his sword was scarcely out of the sheath and [point]ing downward Capt. Courtney who drew first & was in a readiness advanced on him & struck a forceable blow on Ensign Padles sword web. beat it up back ward & so struck it out of his hand pushd Ensign Padle, into the belly who notwithstanding readily gott hold of his sword again, but in the very instee. as he stoop'd to recover it Capt. Courtney closed in with him & shuff'd him down into the window when Capt. Courtney had him under, with his left hand on Ensign Padles sword aim and his own sword pointed at Ensign Padles breast bidding him deliver his sword and begg his life, upon this I left them, and made what hast I cou'd to call a guard and on my return found Capt. Courtney wth both swords in his hand, & Ensign Padle asking for his sword weh. Capt. Courtney return'd, after this a dispute arose about the difference when Ensign Padle told Capt. Courtney that he used him very scurvily in drawing on him in the ffort and at unawares, but that now he was so good a man as himself wth. that Capt. Courtney said Damn me Sirrah what after I have given you your life & sword, you have the impudence to prate & immediately run furiously upon him & catching hold of Ensign Padles sword broke [it into] two peices & then they fell to cuffing but [were prevented] by Serjant Hanton & soon after came [three] of the guard, in whose presence Capt Courtney continued to abuse Ensign Padle in very scurrilous [lan]guage calling him Skip-kennell sorry fellow just come from waiting at a table & treated him w[ith] abundance of such like insufferable expressions [and] at the same time Ensign Padle desired him to [shake] hands & be freinds to weh. Capt. Courtney replyed [he] would not concern himself with any such fellow as he is.

MATTHEW WELD.

On Sunday the 20th of Janry being in Mr. Welds room Capt. Courtney requested Ensign Padle to lett Richard Pain have liberty for three or four hours in a day to go about said Capte buisness [in] such hours as he thought convenient, weh, the Ensign said he could not grant and order'd said Pain to return to his guard, upon which Capt. Courtney said Damme where's your manners to send the fellow away I sent to speak with and at the same time bid Pain stay, upon weh, the Ensign told him he might have him if he would give him another man for him or gett Capt. Hugonins leave for it, which so exasperated Capt. Courtney that he told him if he talked soe to him he would run his Cane down his throat and that he would have the fellow or any else he pleas'd giving him at the same time opprobious language as [Ras]call and scoundrell, and amongst the rest gave him the lye and starting up shook his Cane at him upon which the Ensign stept to the Couch and laid his hand upon a sword but never offer'd to draw it, requesting the Capt. not to fall into a passion, nor give him such language weh, he could not bear, and that if he shou'd lett Pain go out he would immediately gett drunk and be uncapable of serving either the Captain or him, weh, at present is all I can call to mind. Courtney did write a petition with his own hand and gave it to Ensign Brooks to have it copyed over who gave it to Delan to copy it at Petersons house, and when it was copyed the said Ensign Brooks burnt the Originall and gave Peterson the copy to gett sign'd, and the said Peterson & I went to Trepopilore together to gett what names we could to it, but the said Peterson carrying it in his breast, it was very [soiled;] so at Tripopilore it was wrote over again by [Rich]mond Chambers whereto we procured severall [signatures] and is the same petition I deliver'd the Gov^r. to the truth of all which I now make oath and in Confirmation of the same have hereunto [sett] my hand in ffort S^t. Received a Generall Letter from the Depty. Govern & Council of Fort St. David dated the 23d instt.

The Council mett and read a Generall Letter from the Depty. Gov. and Council of Fort St David dated the 23d ulto. containing an Accot. of a Generall attack made by the enemy upon our [boat] in severall places at the same time, at all which they were bravely repuls'd with considerable loss, as by the following accot. abstracted from said Letter.

A Generall Letter to the Depty. Govern. & Council of Fort St. [David] read, approv'd, and sign'd.

As Mr. Raworth was going the rounds yesterday with Le[ivetenant] Roach & Hugonin in Compa, from the first our mud poi[nt] that was east up he discern'd within two miles distant from it, the whole body of the enemys horse and foot in Penar river passing to the soward, on which he order'd two shot to be discharg'd from the Culverin, and in a short time they disappear'd but when he came to Trepopilore from the new point there he descry'd a large body of them again marching very hastily into the woods, and then recd. information that Chilla [Naigue] Guard where we kept a Sergeant and twenty men, had at five in the morning been attack'd by a thousand foot, who had compelld them to retreat within the walls, we had rais'd [there] for his Security, where he defended himself till Ensign H[obbs.] sent a Detachment of twenty four Granadeers, under the command of Sergt. Handlon, to his releif, who forthwith attackd them with such resolution, that he not only drove them out of the bounds with good slaughter, but compell'd them to run very confusedly up the hills again, about half an hour after six, they were observed to be reinforc'd by a large body of [foot] and about fifty horse, when they commenc'd their attack again whereupon Leiut. Roach march'd down to their releif, with the most part of the Trepopilore party, when began a very [hot] Skirmish, and it continued from that time very obstinately till near three in the afternoon, before they could compleatly gett rid of the enemy, thô they flung near twenty Cohorn shells amongst them, and kept a continuall fire, with good Success and Execution.

Whilst we were thus attack'd on that part Mobut Cawne with the main body of horse appeared in two divisions to the N°. ward of us, near two hundred of which were posted before Wichmere and the rest at Uppalawaddee were they continued diverting those two places, during the whole time their foot was engagd on

the other side, but no execution was done on neither, and the same time he likewise sent a small party of [horse and] three hundred foot to attack us at Trepopilore [where wee had] the fortune to repell them with good Execu[tion and by] the time they made their retreat from [thence wee] observe the motion, and did so from the other, so that by four a clock wee had a clear feild to range in.

Wee bless God wee lost all the while (thô the enemy fir'd very brisk) no more than one Soldier, and only four more, with as many peons were wounded, but none desperately but what the enemys loss was wee cant pretend to compute, nor doe beleive wee shall have a true accot, thô are sure it must be very considerable.

We were in hopes that they would have been contented with the reception they mett with yesterday, and not have given us any more trouble for some time, but on the contrary about four this evening they appeard just in the same manner again, but wee beleive have mett with more loss than yesterday, for rather than suffer our people to be constantly harrast, which must in the end wear them out, wee thought it better to attack them, and accordingly Capt. Roach form'd his party into three bodys, under the command of himself, Hobbs & Kirkbridge, and when their whole body was gott together attack'd them in three severall places, which so intimidated them that they soon fled with the utmost precipitation, and wee had the good fortune likewise from one of our Culverins, to heave five shott into the main body of horse which appeard to the No.ward, so that they soon troop'd off in the manner their foot did, and wee are at present pretty easy, but how long shall continue so, God knows.

Since this action we have very near finishd our point, and in the face of them (for they dare not come down from the hills to oppose us) cut down and burnt every shrub and tree within half a mile of that Post, so that it's not possible for a single man to appear without being discern'd by us, and if a body of them comes, we can slaughter them at discretion from our Cannon, and not expose one of our men to their shotts, so that we dont doubt now they have made their last efforts against us without success, and we have since strengthend our bounds with a new Redoubt, but that 'twill be an easy matter for yo'. Hon' &c. to bring them to hearken to proposals of peace.

1. You are very well acquainted with what has pass'd at this Board relating to the unhappy warr at Fort S^t. David since your arrivall as also with what was done in the last Treaty, when we endeavourd all in our power to have made a peace upon any

reasonable terms, but the demands of the enemy were so extravagant, and they fell so often from their words, when we thought we were near attaining our ends, that at last we were disappointed, and oblig'd to renew the warr in our own defence, you have likewise by your journey to Fort S^t. David had an opportunity to see the condition of the place, the circumstances our Masters affairs are in, the manner of carrying on the warr, and the misfortunes that attend it, and whereas the Chevalier Hebert Govern. of Pondichery has kindly offerd his service to mediate a peace, and in order thereto has obtaind a Cessation of arms, we have determind to send you to reside with him during the Treaty to inform him particularly of all that has pass'd on our side during the warr, and to give him all manner of assistance for expediting and concluding this affair.

- 2. The Treaty is to be carry'd on by M^r. Raworth, whom we have advis'd of your coming down, and therefore you must give him early notice of your arrivall, the Gentleman you have to deal with is precise and loves a great deal of respect, you know the world too well to let him want it upon this occasion.
- 3. In your discourse with M^r. Hebert, fail not to lay before him, that this is a case which affects all Europeans as well as ourselves, & if we are forc'd to part with a considerable sum of money, it will be a very bad precedent, and he who has his dependancys under the Chingee Government, may one day or other be a sharer in the bad consequences of it, this was the reason that induc'd us when Trincombarr was beseig'd to send them speedy and effectuall supplys of men and what else they wanted, and thô we have never met with the same generous assistance from our neighbour Europeans, we do not repent of what we did because we know it was right in point of prudence and policy, and whenever M^r. Hebert is in trouble we shall not scruple to assist him for the same reasons.
- 4. We should have been glad to end this affair without his assistance to any body's else, but the Enemy having determind to hearken to no other method, our sufferings and damages by the warr are so considerable, that we think we could not in prudence refuse Mr. Heberts offers, or any other honble method to procure a peace.
- 5. The Enemy will no doubt long before your arrivall have made their demands, asserting the injuries we have done them, and loading us with abundance of false accusations and calumnies, most of w^{ch}. you are very well able to answer, and disprove by undeniable testimony, we have given you all the useful papers from hence for that purpose, of which you have a List, and you must demand other Originalls from M^r. Raworth, as you find you have occasion for them.
- 6. We send Kittee Narran with you a very usefull person, well skilld in the customs of the Country, who has formerly been employ'd in such affairs as these with very good success, and we hope will prove as serviceable to you in this, we likewise send some small matters for presents as \$\psi\$ List inclosed, to be sprinkled amongst Serope Sings Officers, as you find occasion, for the furtherance of your buisness.
- 7. Narran is to insinuate himself into the acquaintance and conversation of the persons employ'd by Serope Sing, and to expatiate upon the inconveniencys & detriment that this warr has already occasiond to their Masters Country, and that they will daily increase if it continues, we are well assur'd that Serope Sing is impos'd upon by the Buxee, and others that he employs, who told him we were weak, and that they would engage to carry us all to Chingee, if he would let them continue the warr, Narran has a large feild to employ his Talent on this subject, and with the vehicle of a few small presents we do not doubt but his arguments will prevail.
- 8. We do not suppose this unhappy warr can ever be ended, without some mony given on our side, thô we have some reason to hope by the encouragement the Gentlemen of Fort S^t. David gave us in their Generall Letter, that we may come off cheaper, than what we once offer'd them during the last Treaty, which the enemies broke off upon their receiving a new reinforcement from Chingee, and since that

time they have made their utmost efforts by attacking our bounds on all sides, for severall days successively, but have always been repuls'd with considerable loss, which gives us reason to believe that they are heartily weary of the warr, and will be more tractable than they were in the former Treaty.

- 9. The great prejudice this warr does to our Investment, the obstruction it is to Trade in Generall, the entire loss of our revenues, the scarcity and dearness of grain, the desertion of our Inhabitants, and the insupportable Expences we are at, to fortify and defend our great Extent of bounds, are the reasons that induce us to seek peace, to which we must add one more, the daily dread we are in, lest more of our soldiers should follow the ill Examples of those vile wretches that have already deserted to the Enemy, for what can be expected from a warr, wherein men of such base principles are of necessity to be trusted with our lives and fortunes.
- 10. We cannot pretend to limit you to any sum, not having yet reed an according the enemys demands, but you must be sure to insist upon free passage for our Tappy peons, by which means you will always have an answer to what you write us in three days.
- 11. Whatever sum we part with at last, we expect some Villages near our bounds, or priviledges, that will reimburse our Masters in few years, we know very well that thô they may be of no great value to them, we can when in our hands, by frugality and good management, make them turn to accot.
- 12. If you find a lucky opportunity to close the Treaty upon pretty good terms, and are of opinion that delaying to hear from us may be dangerous, upon communicating the matter to M^r. Raworth, and obtaining his consent, we permitt you to conclude.
- 13. Mr. Hebert has often in his Letters to the Governr. insisted upon a full power to decide this affair as it were by Arbitration, at the same time protesting that he would doe nothing without our consent, but we have not thought fit for many weighty reasons to put the matter so intirely into his power, one of which is, that we are not thoroughly satisfy'd of his being hearty to our interest, and another, that it looks very strange, a man should press for a full power, and at the same time pretend he never intends to use it, matters of this nature are left to be transacted between the Governr. & him, and herewith you have such a power as we can consent to give, signd by the Governr., which you must deliver to Mr. Hebert upon yor. Arrivall.
- 14. You are so fully informed in all points relating to this weighty affair by the frequent debates we have had upon the subject, and by yor. Conversation with Mr. Raworth at Fort St. David, that we need say no more, but leave the rest to yor. prudence, desiring you will frequently advise us of all occurrences, & take yor measures joyntly with Mr. Raworth, on whose capacity and integrity we have great reliance, & God Almighty grant that you may bring this troublesome affair to a speedy and happy conclusion, which will be an acceptable peice of service to our Honble Employers, & in a most particular manner to.

Remarks on ye Paymrs acots.

First in the Stewards acco. of Expences, there is an article of Firewood laid in for the whole season, which amounts to Three hundred & fourteen Pagodas, eight fanams, likewise stores sent to Fort St. David & Charges Extraordinary for prisoners to the amount of thirty one Pags., which sums being deducted from the whole months Expence, reduces it to Five hundred twenty nine Pags., twenty three fanams, and sixty cash, from which sum deducting for Liquors expended, which the Compa. us'd to have of their own in store, and allowing for the difference in number of covenanted &ca Servants, and for the Extraordinary dearness of grain at present, the Expence will appear to be full as reasonable as in the time of Gov. Pitt.

The article of Fortifications and repairs appears to be very Extravagant since the New hospitall & New Guard house are charg'd in articles apart but upon examining every particular thoroughly, we find that many things are charged into that sum which ought more properly to be carry'd to other accor, or else 'tis impossible either for us here, or our Masters Accomptants in England, ever to understand how or for what so much money is Expended, wherefore we have thought fit to come to the following resolutions, for reforming the method of keeping the Paymasters accom.

Resolutions come to there npon yt no buildings or repairs be begun with-out an of Connail.

That no buildings or repairs whatsoever be undertaken or begun, without an order of this Board.

yt an accot. of every particular building or repair be kept apart

That an Accot be kept apart of every particular building or repair that the whole charge may appear at once to the view both of this Board, and of whomsoever shall be appointed to inspect the accor. in England.

yt ye Accom-ptt. do prepare for th Paymr.

That the Accomptant do forthwith prepare a scheme for the Paymaster, in what pare a scheme manner the foregoing order may be best comply'd with for his ease in the Generall Books.

the Secry. if the copys of his Paymasters accors. were ready to be sent home in the packet, to which Kingsley answerd, that he had pass'd his Accots. regularly in Consultation, and could very easily have had copys ready if he had known the order in time, however he would immediately set about it, and having been but five months in the Employ, he did not doubt but to get them done by the next day in the evening, and accordingly he immediately went upon them, this was on the Saturday, and Sunday morning ten a clock Mr. Ettricke sends for him, and demanded if he had got the copys of his Accot. ready, to which he reply'd that he had been hard at work ever since the message sent him, that he had gone a great way therein, and should be able to finish them by five a clock in the Evening, upon which Mr. Ettricke flew into a violent passion, using him very scurrillously, and immediately call'd a Consultation wherein Kingsley was suspended, without so much as giving him a hearing, under pretence of an order made in the time of Mr. Jeremiah Harrison, that whosoever did not get the copys of their accots. ready should be suspended.

The Gentlemen were not content to rest here, but in the month of Aprill follow- with won ye ing, upon pretence of not hearing from Fort St. George which was impossible to be not content done in double that time (if thay had advis'd us of the matter, as they did not) they but took away Kingsleys Diet money, thô they knew very well he had not wherewithall mony also. to subsist himself and family.

After an intervall of ten months between the time of Kingsley's commencing 10 mos after Paymaster and the 13th of August 1711, the Accomptant reports that in ballancing his comenoing the Generall books, he finds Mr. Thomas Kingsley in his Paymasters accot. Currt. for Accompt the month of October 1710, debts himself for no more than a thousand Dollars, reports yt he whereas by the Consultations, by the Cash book, and by two receipts it appeard he himself 1000. recd. Two Thousand Dollars Vizt the 3d & 26th of said month.

It seems very strange to us, that this matter which pass'd in October 1710, seems very should have lain so long dormant as to August 1711, and the more because M^r Kingsley passes his paymasters acco^t. for the month of October, the 13th of Novembr. in Consultation as usuall, at which time undoubtedly the Cash book & Receipt book were look'd into, according to custom to check the Paymasters acct. Govern^r. that shall be sent hence to the West Coast, for a retrospection, with our animadversions thereupon, that the party's aggreiv'd may have justice done

Samuell Stotherd was again call'd in, and ask'd what he had to say in answer to the charge against him, for so much saltpetre wanting in the Warehouse, to which he reply'd as before, that all his papers having been taken from him, he was never suffer'd to have the use of them for his justification, that he had been in the Warehousekeeprs. Employ no longer than about six months, in which time 'twas impossible to embezzle so large a quantity, that he beleives the mistake must be in the casting up, for after he had given Mr. Ettricke in the accor. of the weight, which he took himself, he would never let him see it again, That those who sus-

pended him, and charg'd him with this deficiency, knew very well it could not happen in his time. That saltpetre was never vendible anywhere upon the West Coast, nor was there a possibility of a bag's being shipp'd off without coming to the Govern's knowledge, much less such a quantity as they pretend to be wanting, That he desird often to be admitted in Consultation to clear himself of the charge, but was always refusd.

Pursuant to your order of Council dated the 24th instant I have perus'd the severall accots. recd. from York Fort in relation to the charge against Messrs. Kingsley & Stotherd, and now referr you to the following report.

The deficiency of one thousand Dollars charg'd them in their Paymasters Accots appears to be the effect of willfull ignorance or malice in the Book keeper, for if he had taken the least pains imaginable he might have seen he had no reason to charge them as he does, and it will thus appear in their Consultation of the 15th Augst. 1710 it is thus enterd; Mr. Anthony Ettricke Paymaster reads his Accots for the month of July, ballance remaining in his hands ps. 8/8 174:11—which he delivers up to Mr Samuell Stotherd now Paymaster.

Now M^r. Stotherd in his Paymasters Acc^t. commencing in Augst. debts himself to Cash rec^d. of Anthony Ettricke Esq^r. Doll^{rs} 2174: 11 whereas the Hon^{blo}. Comp^{as}. Cash book debts M^r. Stotherd only for Doll^{rs} 1000 rec^d. y^o. 17th, so that it appears plain he has debted himself Doll^{rs}. 1000 more than he rec^d: in that month, had he truly enterd what he received the overplus should [have] been carry'd to the month of September and then the Paymasters acco^t. Cash would have quadrated with the Comp^{as}. Acco^t. Cash for that month, which charges them with Two Thousand received, when M^r. Kingsley enters no more than One Thousand.

As to the other charge against M^r. Kingsley for Rialls 30[9] 6.—Rylls fa. Ca.: I observe the ball of his Accot. in Jan^{ry}. to be . . . 505:1:9

to which he thus answers that being Paymaster part of the month of Febry. as appears by the Consultation of the 11th do. when Mr. Daniell is made Paymaster, he did pay to Mr. William Dorrill then steward as by two receipts he produces under his hand. one for Ryales 8/8 213 and the other for Rylls. 8/8 100, both amot. to Rylls: 313-, upon the delivering up of his Employ to Mr. Daniell, he intreated him as customary to allow the same in Accot., but he would not, & in his months accot. only charges what he himself had expended upon accot. Charges Diet amote to Rylls. 213-, whereas the Compas. ought to be charg'd with both sums, and it is to be observ'd by the Paymasters accots. that the Compus. acct. Charges Diet, comes to about Rylls. 400 one month with another, and they charg'd in the month of Febry only Rylls. 213-, so that in my opinion the Rylls. 313—Mr. Kingsley did pay Mr. Dorrill steward ought to be allow'd him, but then it will appear that months Expences allowing both Accoramots. to Dollrs. 526-which is upwards of 100 more than usuall, upon enquiry into this I note Mr. Daniell charges Diet mony paid to severall persons Doll's. 110-,concerning which Mr. Kingsley declares to remember, when his Dyet money, part of that charge, was sent him, he declin'd taking it unless it was for the mouth of March, he having before rec^d. for the month of Feb^{ry} of M^r. Dorrill, and which mistake might happen by M^r. [[Dorri]lls] being carry'd away by a Portugueze ship, and M^r. [Daniell] not knowing what he had pay'd.

The charge against Mr. Samuell Stother'd according to the Accot remains he took appears to be true and I cannot see by the accot sent, but that he is justly charg'd with a deficiency in the salt petre, but therein is a small error vizt.—

The second is the 18th Decemb. 1710 Viz. Orderd that all monthly Accots be transmitted to the Accomptants Office, and perus'd by the Accomptant before they are brought into Consultation, and if agree with the Generall books he is to certify the same.

I am very much of opinion by the barbarous treatment these Gentlemen mett with in the article of the Thousand Dollars, that the last has not been truly examind, for upon enquiry I find that salt petre is not vendible at Bencoolen, and it is morally impossible for M. Stotherd to have mov'd it out of the Warehouse without being discoverd.

It is observable in their Paymasters Accots thence, they do not set down the true day of the month they receive money out of the Cash, and that when any person delivers up his Employ to another, the former transferrs his ball to the latter, whereas it's better every persons cleard his Accots apart, according to the method of Fort St. George I am

It is now some months agoe since Govern. Harrison wrote to Govern. Bernard by way of Pullicat what news he had concerning the French ships then on the Malabarr Coast, but he has not to this day been favour'd with any answer.

Yor. Hon. & the Council cannot but know the long & expensive warr we have been engag'd in to defend our rights and priviledges against the forces of Chingee, in which it has pleas'd God Almighty so farr to bless our just cause with success, that the enemy have been often repuls'd in their attacks upon our bounds with considerable Loss.

We might have hop'd considering the strict and firm Alliance between our two Nations in Europe that you would rather have assisted us in so just a cause as this, wherein indeed all Europeans, are more or less concern'd, but to our great amazement we find that severall of our soldiers who have deserted us in time of our necessity have been detaind in Porto Novo, and refus'd to be deliverd up on pretence that they are subjects to the states of Holland, or servants to the Netherlands Company, if they could be prov'd to be ye Compas servants we should have little to say, but that we were utterly ignorant of their being, or of their ever having been in your service, but of the last seven who deserted us the 19th of March, we are very well assur'd six of them are not Hollanders, and therefore we hope you will do us so much justice as to return them to Fort St. David, from whence they deserted, as we have done, and shall always doe in such like cases, on the usuall terms, that have been practiced upon this Coast for many years.

We insist the more on this matter because if all the Foreigners in our service should be encouraged by the protection you give these Deserters, to follow their Example, in hopes they shall also be protected because they are not English, we may be reduced to great Extremitys by the enemy, and shall be obliged for our own justification to represent the hardship of our case to Europe, (thô with great unwillingness) because at a time that our lives & fortunes are mutually engaged for the Liberty of Europe, we would gladly do all in our power to preserve a perfect good understanding in these parts, to show our love and zeal for the common cause.

You will please to excuse what may be amiss in the stile of this Letter, which we write in Dutch as well as we can, because you formerly desird it, as having nobody skilld in the English or French Languages; we hope you will not deny our reasonable request, and we have all the inclination in the world to continue.

Gentlemen, I think they have acted somewhat unreasonably, for if after Capt. Hugonins confinement, I by my industry got more than ever he told me of, I humbly conceive that such gains belongs wholly to me, Honble Sr. &ca Gentlemen of Council, this is my present case which obliges me at this time to trouble you, for being sure of your integrity and justice, and your readyness to help the oppress'd whenever they make their application to you, emboldens me to desire your permission to recover my goods and monys lying at Fort S^t David, and that Cap^t. Hugonin may have no further demands upon me, after I have paid him the twelve Pagodas aforementioned, this is my present request which I hope yo' Hon' &c' will be pleas'd to grant, and the favour shall ever be thankfully acknowledge by.

With humble submission I crave leave to inform yor Honr &ca Council that three days before I was suspended the Depty. Govern of York Fort orderd me to copy over my Warehousekeepr and Mr. Douglass his storekeepers accot to be sent to England & the Mead Friggat, I acquainted him that my Warehousekeepr accot were ready, as for the storekeeper the two months that I officiated in that Employ (during the aforesaid Mr. William Douglass his absence) should have them ready against the limited time, but thought it very hard that he should require me to do other peoples buisness and my own, and not the least of writing assistance allow'd me, however for that and no other reason I was suspended from officiating in said Employs, and all books and papers of accot. together with the keys of the Warehouse and storehouse seiz'd upon, and a list of them taken by Mr. Henry Griffith the Accomptant, Mr. Henry White in Company at the same time.

With humble submission to yo'. Hon'. &ca. Council, the present Gent'n of Bencoolen in my opinion ought to have sent the list taken as before mentiond for yo'. Hon'. &ca. Councils perusall.

Sometime after I was suspended the Dep^{ty}. Govern^r & Council sent for me into the Consultation room, where was present M^r. Henry Griffith they acquainted me there was a deficiency of Salt petre 205:—I told them that it was impossible there could be such a large quantity of Salt petre wanting, and I not know any thing of it, I humbly offer to yo^r. Hon^r. &c^a. Council that the want of Salt petre must arise from some mistake in Acco^{ts}., the which had not liberty granted me to Examine, which did request in Consultation but was deny'd it, the Dep^{ty}. Gov^r. saying in a great passion why do not you bring in the Comp^{as} money for the saltpetre, threatning to confine me, and was soon after confind to the Fort for three months, as likewise my goods and effects seizd on, for it's evident I could no ways imbezzle the same, there being no vent for it on the West Coast of Sumatra, and none ever issued out from the Godowns without the knowledge of the Dep^{ty}. Govern^r & Council, what was done from the time of my suspension and the taking of the keys from me, to the time of the taking the Acco^t. Remains, which was five days after I cannot tell.

Soon after M^r. Harrison & Cap^t. Phrip's leaving the West Coast, I deliverd out to some Malays in goods and mony to the amount of seven hundred Dollars to make a large kiln of Chinam, which was to contain One hundred Quoine according to agreement, a little while before the kiln was to be sett on fire, I was confind to the Fort, so that the Chinam was wholly neglected thrô the occasion of my being confin'd, so was a loser above half what was advanc'd.

During the time of my suspension there was an error found in the Storekeeprs. accots. of an overcharge, that was corrected by Mr. Henry Griffith the Accompts., the Depts. Govern & Council of York Fort when they came to pay the Accot. Salary, stop'd ten pounds of my salary for the Accomptants correcting the aforementiond error.

The night after Pangran Jangalloo, & Dupatty Jangalloo his brother were taken prisoners I was walking in the Fort in Company with the Dep^{ty}. Govern^r, M^r. Henry Griffith, M^r. Thomas Lloyd, & Cap^t. Charles Atkins, M^r. John Hunter came and whisperd me in the ear, and said he wanted to speak with me, I told him yes with all my heart, so went with him to his house, as soon as I enterd the door and sat down he lock'd the door upon me, but said nothing to me about any buisness, he kept me there for the space of two hours, there was M^r. Henry White lying upon a Couch in the same room where I was, with a sword in his hand and a pair of pistols by him, whilst I was thus confind the aforementiond M^r. Hunter went out of the house, and lock'd the door after him, he soon returnd and told me I might go out of his house if I pleasd, but gave me no reason why I had been detaind, or rather imprisond there.

This is part of the hard usage I have mett with from the Gentⁿ. at York Fort (for I am unwilling to repeat all the hardships I have mett with there) which I think I have reason to complain of, after having serv'd my R^t. Hon^{ble}. Masters to the best of my ability (and I trust I may say faithfully and truly for seven years) & having given the Gentlemen at Bencoolen no just occasion to use me as they have done, it is now fourteen months that I have been suspended, in all which time I have neither received Salary nor Diet mony, and how hard it hath gone with me in all that time to maintain myself and family, having no great matter of my own, and being refus'd even common civility from the Gentlemen there, I leave yo^r. Hon^r. &c^a. Council to Judge. I remain with due respect.

Mr Joseph Collet's answers to severall interrogatorys relating to this affair, accordingly he was call'd in and each question distinctly ask'd him by the President, as interrogatorya put to him.

Qu 1st. When Capt. Austen or any of his Officers first talkd of going to Brazile, . & when did you first suspect it.

Ans^r. I suspected it before we parted from the Darby which was betⁿ 4° & 5° N° Latt^{de} some such thing being whisperd in the ship, and I beleive it might come from M^r. Wingfeild the second mate, but the first certain knowledge I had of their intentions was on the 30th. of July in the Latt^{de}. of 18° S°., and by computation 12° W^t. Meridian distance from S^t Jago, when the Cap^t ask'd me to go into the Round house, where the Cheif mate Mr Burgess read a paper, which had been drawn up before, intimating the necessity of their putting into Brazile.

Qu: 2d. What were the Capt. pretences for going to Brazile.

Ans^r. That his men were touchd with the scurvy, that he should want a supply of water and provisions, and that by cleaning his ships bottom she would sail so much the better as to regain the loss of time.

Qu. 3d. Did you use any arguments to perswade them against going in.

Ans^r. I told them they were the best judges of the ships condition, and if they agreed it to be absolutely necessary, I should not oppose them.

Qu: 4th. Was any Consultation regularly call'd, or your advice ask'd concerning the ships going in.

Ans. No, nor did they think any of us worthy advising with, only the Cheif mate after having read his paper, ask'd me if I had anything to say against it, to which I returnd answer as before.

Qu: 5th. How came the Jane to part, with the Darby, and if Cap^t. Wooton did not use his endeavours to keep her Company, and promisd Cap^t Austin to supply him with anything he could spare.

Ans^r. That there was all the reason in the world to suspect that the Jane left the Darby purposely in the night, which they had attempted to do severall times before, that Cap^t. Wooton had often shortend sail in order to keep with the Jane & that he really thinks he did hear Cap^t Wooton offer Cap^t Austen any assistance in his power.

Qu. 6th. Do you not think the ship might have done very well without going to Brazile, and especially if she had staid with the Darby

Ansr. Yes undoubtedly, and according to the winds we met after we put for Brazile tis highly probable we might have reachd the Cape, within very few days as soon as we did Rio Janeiro.

Qu. 7th. What sick men had you aboard, and how many dead when you went into Brazile.

Ans. I do not remember we had bury'd any of our ships Complement, and there were not above three sick at most, none of which in any danger.

Qn: 8th. What water and beer did the ship carry into Brazile to the best of your knowledge.

Ans. The Capt himself told me the very day we went in, that he had nine tun of water & four of ship beer.

Qu. 9th. Why did you not protest against the ships going to Brazile.

Ans^r. I was not seaman enough to judge of the necessitys they pretended, especially as to the mens health, and the Doctor had sign'd a Certificate that it was absolutely necessary, I was fearfull least if any ill accident shou'd happen, it might be laid to my door, and indeed I was not acquainted with the usuall methods of protesting, nor did I know it to be a duty incumbent on me, besides I did believe there was a scarcity of water in the ship when we bore away because on the 27th of June, the Cap^t. had reduc'd the men to a quart of water a man a day.

Qu. 10th. What day did you arrive at Rio Janeiro, and what day did the news arrive from England, that a French squadron might be daily expected.

Ans. We arrive you 18th Augst. and on the 22d, we recd, news of a French squadron commanded by Mons. De Guaye, that might be daily expected.

Qus. 11th. Why did not the Capt. get away immediately to sea upon this advice. Ansr. The English Consul did indeed press him very much to be gone, and so did I, accordingly he promis'd to sail next day, and in order thereto I sent all my necessarys aboard, but when the time came he alterd his mind, pretending that his casks were ashore, and he could not get them off, but I really beloive the greatest occasion was, he had not dispos'd of those things which brought him so farr out of his way.

Qu: 12th What day did the French arrive.

Ansr. the 1st of Septembr.

Qu: 13th Why did you not immediately land the Treasure and endeavour to save it by carrying up into the Country, or by burying it under ground.

Ansr. I did propose the landing of it to the Capt offering to accompany it, but he utterly refus'd it, alledging that he could no ways answer it by his Charterparty agreement, because of any accident happend by imbezzlement or otherwise, he was liable to make it good.

Qu: 14th Did the Capt. save his own money or any part of it.

Ansr. Yes he sav'd an intire chest, which the Consul securd for him in the Country, and gave him bills to England for it's amount.

Qu: 15 In what manner did you ransom the ship, how much mony did you pay, and on whom did you draw your bills.

Ansr. To the foregoing question Mr. Collet produces the following copy of a Letter Mr Collet wrote the Honble. Court of Directors from Rio Janeiro, wherein his proceedings in of a Letter this affair are set down at large.

Directrs. from Brazile.

TO THE HONBLE YE COURT OF DIRECTORS

OF THE UNITED COMPA. OF ENGLISH MERCHTS

TRADEING TO THE EAST INDIES

HONBLE SES

I hopd before this time to have advis'd yor. Honrs. of our safe arrivall at the Cape of Good hope, but am now oblig'd to give a more unacceptable accor. of our affairs, on the 30th of July we were in 18° of So Lattde and by computation 12° Meridian distance Wt of St Jago, when Capt Austin and his Cheif mate told me, they found it necessary on accot of the length of the Voyage, and for the refreshment of their men to put into this Port, I replyd they were best judges of the ships Circumstances, and that if they found it necessary either for a supply of provisions, or refreshment of their men I should not oppose it, on the 18th of Augst. we arriv'd at this Port, on the 4th or 5th day after we were all alarm'd with a report, that a French squadron was on the Coast design'd for this place, Cap^t. Austin propos'd to sail the next day, and I sent my baggage on board that I might be ready at an hours warning, the next day the Cap^t told me he would stay to get in some wood, water, and other provisions, and at length determind to sail the 2^d or 3^d of Septemb^r but was prevented by Mons'. De Guaye who with fifteen sail of men of warr and friggats, and two bomb vessells enter'd this Harbour on the 1st of Septembr, here were four Portugueze men of warr, three of which burnt themselves, the fourth run on shore and bilg'd, in three days the French were intire Masters of the Town, and all the Forts which had been deserted by the Portugueze the night afore, the enemy enterd the harbour with so strong a gale, and advanc'd so fast, that I was obligd to pass thrô their fire to get on board the Jane, which was by this time under sail up the harbour, in hopes to get out of the way of the French guns, when I came on board after a little discourse with Capt Austin I found him determind not to land the Treasure, nor to

destroy the ship, but to surrender on the first summons, it being impossible to defend her, however he thought fit to send a chest of Treasure of his own up into the Country, as for myself & Mr Yarborough we were unwilling to fall into the enemys hands, till the Fate of the Town was decided, having some hopes that in case the enemy were oblig'd to return without being Masters of the Town, that we might procure some passage to the Cape of Good Hope, and so proceed to India, which we thought of importance for yor Honrs service, we therefore quitted the ship & retir'd into the Country, expecting the event, when I heard that the French were in full possession of the Town and all the Forts, I apprehended a greater probability of proceeding by their assistance, than by remaining among the Portugueze, Mr. Yarborough agreeing with me, we took boat and came down the river designing to surrender our selves to the French Generall, in our passage down, we saw the Jane riding with her English colours still flying, we went on board and found they had not yet been summond but that Capt. Austin had determind to send his Mate to surrender the ship to Mons' De Guaye, in hopes as he said of ransoming her upon easy terms, we staid on board two nights, and then went in the boat which brought us out of the Country, and surrenderd ourselves to Mons' De Guaye, the Cheif mate follow'd immediately in the ships boat and surrenderd the ship also, some days after I propos'd to the French to buy a small Briggantine, or other small vessell, in order to proceed on my Voyage, they told me there was none in the harbour in which I could safely undertake such a Voyage, but that they would sell me the Jane, I positively refus'd to treat about her, because I would not interfere with the Capt. but went to view severall vessells in the Port, which I found answerd the character, I then concluding my return to Europe unavoidable, till about a fortnight after when I receivd a Letter from Capt. Austin, acquainting me that the French would not sell the Jane without her loading, and if I would I might buy both, I went immediately to him, and ask'd if he would treat for both, he reply'd he would not, I then first enter'd on a Treaty for her, the French had taken the Treasure out excepting one chest of your Honrs. and a small chest of Mr. Finks, which Capt. Austin informd me had been stolen by some of the ships crew, and carry'd in the pinnace, besides which they Excepted some Corrall that was on board, and for the ship and remaining part of the Loading we at length agreed for Three Thousand Five hundred pounds, which I esteem the full value in England, reckoning the goods included in yor Honrs. bill of Loading at Fifteen hundred pounds, the ship at the same, and my own goods with other peoples aboard at Five hundred, the reasons that induc'd me to give so large a price, after I found they would not sell it at a lower rate, were because I knew the Compas goods consisting cheifly of Navall & Garrison stores were probably of great importance to the place design'd, and that therefore it was worth while to give the prime cost in England here, especially being by a seven months pass secur'd from any further apprehensns of an enemy, besides that I hope the speedy arrivall of my self and Mr. Yarborough at Bencoolen will be very much for yor. Honrs. interest there, as also that I propose to make of the ship, and the seperate [pass] of the Cargo on my arrivall in India as much as will be sufficient to make good in the Compas. Cash at Bencoolen, the overplus of the purchase above the prime cost of the goods consign'd by yor. Honrs. to Madrass & Bencoolen, urg'd by these considerations I have taken the liberty to draw on yor. Honrs. the sum of Three Thousand Five hundred pounds, payable to Mons. De Guaye Trovin or order in St Malo's, three months after the arrivall of the squadron comanded by him in France, at the then Currt. Exchange, with web. I humbly request yor. Honrs. complyance, having sent my son & my servant Mr Edmd. Bunting as hostages for performance, and that there be no hazard of loss by conferring this obligation, I request that Two Thousand pound may be insurd from hence to Madrass and Bencoolen, and the charge plac'd to my acct, which will be done on easy terms considering our seven months pass, and the season of the year for passing the Cape, I wrote to yor. Honre in Compa with Mr. Yarborough by the Florida on the 18th of May being off of Porto San[cto] when we advis'd the death of Mr. Lee Garrett, which happen'd a week after our departure from Torbay, I cannot send a copy, having destroy'd it with all papers of importance, particularly yor. Honro. packet, before our surrender to the French.

As I have in the whole of this affair acted with the utmost sincerity, what I thought most conducive to yor. Honrs. interest so I hope it will be accepted at the

Qu. 3d. Did not you and your Officers conclude to the best of your judgments that they left you purposely.

Ansr. We all concluded they might have kept us Company if they pleas'd, because we went with an easy sail, and there was so little wind that if the Jane had not stood one way, and we another, 'twas impossible she could have been out of sight

Qu. 4th. Did not you unrigg yor. Top gallant yards in order to keep her Compa, and did not you promise them water, and all manner of assistance.

Qu. 5th. How did you meet with the winds after they parted with you, and how long was you in getting to the Cape.

Ansr. I found the winds to the Westward of the So., and stood to the So E. ward we arrive at the Cape the 6th of August.

It appears to us very plainly by the testimony of the aforemention'd Gentlemen, that Capt. Austin & his Mates had all along a design to touch at Brazile, and finding that if they kept Company with the Darby who very rightly stretch'd to the Et.-Ward, he would lead them out of their intended way, they stole away from him in the night by standing to the Westward, and afterwards were at liberty to pursue their project, and 'tis observable that by standing to the Westward they met a months calms, and contrary winds, which the Darby escaped by standing the other way.

This deviation to Brazile appears to us very unnecessary and inexcusable, and is much aggravated by their staying in that Port, from the 23^d. Augst that the news of the French squadron came from England, to the 1st of Septemb^r when the said squadron arrivd.

Upon perusall of M^r. Joseph Collet's Letter to the Hon^{ble}. the Court of Directors, we find that he has drawn his bills of Exchange upon them for his ransom, that the ship is valued in the French bill of sale at Fifteen hundred pound Sterl., the Comp^{as}. goods on board, which he affirms to have bought for their acc^t. Fifteen hundred pound Sterl. and the private goods belonging to himself and other persons Five hundred pound Sterl., amounting altogether to Three Thousand Five hundred, pound Sterl., but all the Invoices & Letters being thrown overboard and sunk, and no copys of them here, we know not the value of what was laden by the Comp^a on board this ship.

ORDER'D that Mr. Richard Horden & Mr. Richard Conell do immediately go on board the Jane, and remain there till she is unladen, taking an accot of every thing that goes out of the ship, with the marks and numbers.

ORDERD that the Warehousekeep^r. do receive every thing which comes from aboard the Jane into his Custody, keeping them in a Godown by themselves, till such time as the ship is wholly unladen, & they have been view'd by a Committee appointed from this Board.

The President acquaints M^r. Joseph Collet that we expect a sufficient security for making good the sum drawn on the Hon^{ble}. Council of Directors, which he very readily consents to, and the matter is referred to further consideration.

Upon debating this matter thô we are unacquainted how the sea Laws would determine in such a case, as this, yet it appears to us that the Capt. of the Jane more than once refus'd to ransom her for the Proprietors, upon which Mr. Joseph Collet fairly purchasd the ship, and what effects she had on board of the enemy, after she had been above a month in their possession and was fairly condemnd by the Officers of the squadron, among whom we find one of the Kings Superintendants of the Marines, so that we think this is to be call'd rather a Purchase than a ransom, besides it further appears very plain to us, that Mr. Collets only view in purchasing the ship was to transport himself, and the rest of the Passengers intended for the West Coast service hither without further loss of time, as beleiving it for the benefit of the Companys affairs, accordingly he would only have bought the ship without the goods, but that the enemy wou'd not agree to it, and oblig'd him to take one with the other, at such a price that by what we can hitherto see he will rather lose then gain, and Mr. Collet having drawn bills of Exchange upon the Court of Directors for the intire sum he paid the French for this ship and Cargo, we think our selves oblig'd to secure the whole in the Compas. Cash till we know their pleasure, and cannot be of opinion that any other person can have a property remaining either in the ship or Cargoe, accordingly Mr. Theobald was made acquainted with the result of this Debate.

Pursuant to an order of Consultation of the 4th. instt. we have in presence of the Govern'. thoroughly examind the accot of Rupees and Silver wanting, as deliverd in by the Accompt^t carefully comparing every individual article with the Warehousekeep¹⁸. & Mintmast¹⁸. monthly acco¹⁸. and find the whole matter to stand as follows.

First, we observe that the Accomptant begins his enquiry from the ballance of the books ending April 1708, because at that time there was a very small ballance of Rupees remaining in the Warehouse Vizt. One Thousand Seven hundred & Forty one  $\frac{13}{16}$ 

From the opening of the new books May yo 1st 1708 to the last of Decr. following Messrs. Martin & Raworth were joynt Warehousekeeprs., thô Mr. Raworth only acted, and then he came to be sole Warehousekeep' and had a ballance of Rupees remaining in the Warehouse Six Thousand & Sixty Five_-.

Mr. Raworth continued sole Warehousekeepr. to the 1st. of Octobr 1709, and then Mr. Martin recd. the Warehouse from him with only Rups. Ten thousand Seven Hundred & Eighty two &  $\frac{1}{4}$  as appears by a list of goods and silver remaining in the said Warehouse, taken y  $^{\circ}$   $^{\circ}$   $^{\circ}$  of Octob. 1709 by Mess. Rudge & Bennett under Warehousekeeprs, thô at the same time the ballance of Rupees remaining in the Warehouse should have been Twenty Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Eight & two anas, according to the Warehousekeeprs & Mintmastrs. monthly Accots.

Mr. Martin continued Warehousekeep Octob & Novemb following, during which time he receives into the Warehouse Vizt.

On the 1st. of Decembr following Mr. Raworth again recd, the Warehouse from Mr. Martin with the ballance of Rupees as beforementiond Three Hundred & Fifty Thousand Five hundred & Thirty seven, as appears by the Warehouse Conicoplys Cajan acco. of remains taken when the Warehouse was deliverd over, but no acco. of remains can be found wrote in English, signd by either of the Warehousekeeprs. thô Mr. Martin affirms that he did deliver one signd to Mr. Raworth.

However it appears by the Books & Invoices that most of the Rupees recd. by Mr. Martin in the two months beforemention'd, were delivered out by Mr. Raworth in Jan^{ry}. following, because he ships off at once upon the Hallifax bound to Bengall Five hundred & Four Thousand, thô he has recd. no more from the Mint to that time than One hundred Sixty Eight Thousand, so that the other Three hundred & Thirty Six Thousand undeniably appears to be part of Mr. Martins ballance, which inclines us to beleive that Cajan acct. of the Conicoplys may be right, and we are obligd to declare that they seem to have been wrote at the time the Warehouse was deliverd up, thô it were to be wish'd that so much confidence had not been repos'd in the Conicoplys, but that the acco. of remains had been drawn up in English and signd interchangeably by the Warehousekeeprs. as usual.

Mr. Raworth continued Warehousekeepr. from the 1st of Decembr 1709 to the last of Augst. 1710, when Mr. Martin again recd. the Warehouse from him with a ballance of Six hundred & Forty Rupees only, as appears by an acct. of remains sign'd Robert Raworth, thô at that time there ought to have been One hundred Thirty Two Thousand Three hundred Fifty Three & 3/16, according to the Generall books & the Mintmast^{rs}. monthly Acco^{ts}, which have been regularly pass'd, thô the Warehouse acco^{ts} are defective in severall considerable articles, and particularly in April 1709 there is no mention made of Two hundred & Fifty Nine Thousand Rupees receiv'd into the Warehouse from the Mint.

Of this large quantity of Rupees wanting Vizt. One hundred Thirty Two Thousand Three hundred & Fifty Three & 3/16, there are only Fourteen Thousand Five hundred & Thirty Seven of which there can be the least doubt, all the rest indisputably appears to be wanting in Mr. Raworths time, and the Fourteen Thousand Five hundred and Thirty Seven also, if the Warehouse Cajans are allow'd to be trusted to, which is submitted to yor. Honr. &cas. consideration.

As for the Six hundred Eighty seven lb, two ozs., nine dwt., & fifteen grains of silver wanting, it plainly appears to have happend in Mr. Raworths time, when he had the Warehouse under his charge, because when Mr. Martin took the Warehouse from Mr. Raworth the last of Augst. 1710 he received no more than Eleven Thousand Eight Hundred & Eleven Pound, eight oz & eighteen dw ., thô the ballance then remaining should have been Twelve Thousand Four hundred and Ninety Eight lbs. eleven ozs, seven dwts & fifteen grains, and we find upon examination that the said Eleven Thousand Eight hundred & Eleven lbs, eight oz, & eighteen dwts, receivd by Mr. Martin with what has been deliverd into the Warehouse since the last of August 1710 is very justly accounted for as plainly appears by comparing the thorô accot. of remains now taken, with the Generall Books.

Capt. Nevills depositions. Cap^t. John Nevill being duely sworn declard as follows, that he the said Nevill was Cheif mate of the ship Shaalem in the service of the Pegue joynt stock, and present at Pegue when the foresaid note was given to Allanson.

That to his certain knowledge Allanson having been sent up into the Country by Stokes to procure Elephants teeth, brought down with him a parcell for his own Accot, which the said Stokes would not permit him to send to Madrass, but forcibly detaind them, alledging that neither he the said Stokes, nor any body else employ'd in that service, had liberty to trade in Elephants teeth, which were reserv'd for the joynt stock only.

That Allanson severall times desird Stokes to make up his Acco'. for the foresaid teeth, which were ship'd on board the Shaalem bound hither among a large parcel

belonging to the joynt stock, and that Stokes did at last settle the accot and gave Allanson the abovemention'd note of his hand for Three hundred Sixty Six Pagodas twenty one fanams. .

That he is very well assur'd the teeth which Stokes took from Allanson went in the Shaalem to Bengall, the said Ship not being able to gain her passage hither, and that he beleives they were sold among the rest to Mr. Josiah Chitty.

The said Nevill further declares that Stokes took away a parcell of tin and some teeth from him in the same manner, affirming that no person in the service of the joynt stock had liberty to export those Commoditys on their own Accots.

Addison decd. who was Cheif Proprietor in the Pegue joynt stock, being ask'd what & Benyon's reasons they have to refuse payment of the foresaid note given by Stokes to Allanson, and for the value of the Elephants teeth taken from him, returnd the following Answer.

That no notice being taken of the joynt stock in the said note, nor any proof appearing that the Elephants teeth belonging to Allanson, were sold among those belonging to the Stock in Bengall, but on the contrary part of those Invoicd for accot. of the joynt stock by ship Shaalem were found to be wanting, they conceive the Proprietors of the Joynt Stock are not liable to pay the said note, especially since there is a probability that Stokes might sell these teeth of Allansons apart, and it do's not appear that he has brought any sum to the joynt stock's credit for the produce of them.

After having undergone a twelve months fatigue, when I thought I might have expected some repose, yor Honr. &cn. may easily believe it is a great mortification I labour under, to be involved in fresh troubles, which I fear will prove an almost irreparable prejudice to my fortune, however I shall endeavour to go thrô these difficultys wth. all imaginable patience, it being a great satisfaction to me to know from my own Experience that I am in the hands of men of Honr., who will give me their utmost assistance towards procuring me reparation from the person, who by putting too much confidence in him, has most notoriously abus'd me.

Yo^r. Hon^r. &c^a. may call to mind that on the arrivall of the Hon^{blo}. President from England, the necessity of affairs requiring it, I was immediately orderd away for Fort S^t. David, and consequently obligd to leave all my buisness in the utmost hurry and confusion.

Tonnapa the Warehouse Conicoply having been formerly put into that employ by the Govern^r & Council, and serv'd severall years before my intring upon the Warehouse, and having been intrusted by Gov^r. Pitt in all his private buisness, occasiond me to put a more than ord^{ry}. confidence in him on all occasions.

This man came to me immediately before my departure for Fort S^t. David and told me there were a parcell of Rupees & Silver wanting to ballance the Warehouse acco^{ts}., at which I was very much surprizd, & immediately made as good an enquiry into the matter as the shortness of my time would permit, and finding some considerable errors in the acco^{ts}., desir'd my freind M^r Francis Cooke since deceas'd to settle them with Tonnapa & pay in what was due, promising that my Attorney should reimburse him and indeed I thought this had been comply'd with, when to my very great surprize yo^r Hon^r. &cⁿ. sent me word that I was indebted to the Warehouse

132353 Rupees, and for 687: 2:9:15 of Silver, I can solemnly declare with a most safe conscience that a great part of this mony is due from Tonnapa, who has most notoriously abus'd the trust I repos'd in him, & no doubt but he kept back the

acco^{ts}. purposely to conceal his own Villainy which has in a great measure occasion'd this misfortune.

As for the ballance that stands out against M^r. Martin and myself it lies also in Tonnapas hands, being mony which he received for Outcrys, and never paid in either to M^r Martin or to me nor in Consultation as usual which appears very plain by the acco¹⁸. I settled with him in Jan^{ry}. last, and thô taken from his own Cajans make him indebted Ten Thousand Pagodas.

I sent for this man very often and pressingly urg'd him to let me know the particulars of the Warehouse Ballance standing out, but he always trifled with me and put me off from time to time, upon pretence of the mony not heing collected in, and in few days all would be adjusted, so that this Accot remaind open at the time of my Removall, when he brought me a List of severall persons indebted, which I deliverd to my Attorney, and the mony has been since recoverd, thô it has been a work of much time and trouble.

This is the true state of my case, and I must confess my misfortunes are cheifly owing to the vast confidence I put in this wicked man, who as I said before was put in by the Govern' & Council, has continued so many years in the Employ, and had so much trust repos'd in him by my predecessors, how farr this may excuse me from being liable to make good his roguerys I intirely leave to yo' Hon' &c., and if you think I ought in Justice to be responsible I shall very readily submit & forthwith pay in the greatest part of the sum, hoping you will allow me a convenient time to get in the rest, and afford me the utmost assistance to procure reparation upon Tonnapas estate wheresoever to be found for the vast damage I am like to sustain by him; I shall not detain you longer, thô I could fill some sheets on this Subject, then to subscribe [my]self

Sunca Ramas son one of our joynt stock Merch^{ts}. having rec^d. a Thousand Rupees the 1st of May as mention'd in the foregoing list was examind whether he received the said Rupees or not, and upon what acco^t., to which he readily answerd that Tonnapa being indebted to him between Two & Three hundred Pagodas did deliver him One Thousand Rupees in payment, out of the Warehouse on the day aforsaid, and that he did not then doubt but he had paid the Company for them.

Arne Moodu another Merchant mentiond in the List to have rec^d. Seventeen Thousand two hundred Rupees at two severall times, was called in and askd whether he did receive two such sums at the times mention'd & upon what acco^d, to which he reply'd that he did receive the said two sums amounting together to seventeen Thousand Two hundred Rupees out of the Warehouse, for which he paid Tonapa in Pag^s, at the then Curr^t, price.

Yelliah Muddalaree another person mentiond in the List to have rec^d. Five Thousand Five hundred Rup^s, at three severall times, could not be found at present & M^r. S^r. John Bennett being abroad upon a voyage to Surat, the truth of those articles relating to him cannot be prov'd.

Tonnapa being examin'd as to the Fourteen Thousand Rupees received by himself at two severall times confesses the receipt of them, and being further ask'd how he durst presume to employ the Company's Treasure to his own use, reply'd with a great deal of impudence that he did it by M^r. Raworth's consent and that he paid the whole quantity in again in Rupees within two months after he took them out.

M^r. Raworth solemnly declares and offers to take his oath that he never gave Tonnapa any such permission, and adds that 'twas impossible he could have paid the Rupees in again, without the knowledge of the Mint Braminys that had their key upon the Warehouse.

And the Mint braminys declare that he never did pay in any Rups. again that yo Mint Braminys they know of.

Upon the whole evidence it appears very plainly to us that Thirty Nine Thousand whole it Nine hundred & seventy seven Rupees were taken out of the Warehouse by Tonapa between the 29th of March & the 16th June 1710, which were apply'd to his own use and indeed he does not deny it, but pretends to have returnd them in again, which seems to us a very ridiculous excuse, 1st because the same Mint braminys that were witnesses to the taking of them out of the Warehouse, because they had a key upon the door, must have been likewise privy to his bringing them in again, which they offer to take their oaths they know nothing of, & 2^{dly} if he had paid them in again, how come they to be wanting in the ballance of the Warehouse, and why did he not seems very speak of this matter before we found it out from other hands?

ORDERD that the Paymast^r. do pay him Europeans pay in the Gunroom in consideration of his good service.

The President acquaints the Board that Reuben Smith Sergt. has been some time confind close prisoner for loathsome practices with a black fellow & that it would be a scandal to the Garrison if he should be sufferd to live longer in it.

ORDERD that the said Reuben Smith be sent home upon the next ship.

Lieut. Edmund Howson being sent up hither from Fort St. David in the month of May last for severall complaints made against him by his men, most of which upon examination we find to be ill grounded, and to proceed cheifly from their being exasperated by his severe treatment, and the said Howson making his humble submission to this Board, and particularly to the Depty. Governt, whom he had personally offended, promising to be guilty of no irregularitys for the future, and not to punish his men without first acquainting the Depty. Governt, we have at the request of Mt. Raworth and in consideration that the said Howson is a very expert Officer, and has seen a great deal of service in Europe, consented to release him from his confinement and send him once more to Fort St. David upon his good behaviour, and accordingly the said Howson was calld in, and made acquainted with the resolution of the Board, and the terms on which he is again employ'd.

The murthers and irregularitys that have been committed at Fort S^t. David, since M^r. Raworth came away being taken into consideration and debated we cannot but be of opinion that they have happend in great measure from the distance of the out guards which have not been so frequently visited as formerly so that our people have had liberty to debauch themselves with drink even to the loss of their senses, and upon enquiring into the characters of the Officers in generall M^r. Raworth gives the following Acco^t.

That Lieut. Hugonin who is upwards of sixty years of age has sufferd so much by the cruel treatment he receiv'd when prisoner at Chingee, that he is much impaird and fears he will never recover it so as to be able to do the drudgery of his Employ.

That the other Lieut. Wallace having receiv'd a fall from his horse in visiting the out guards by which his skull was broken and oblig'd to be trepan'd 'ts much to be fear'd he can never recover so farr as to be able to do his duty.

That the Ensigns are young men whom we have promoted in consideration of their distinguish'd bravery against the enemy, but are not yet to be trusted with more than the single command of a Guard, wherefore we find it absolutely necessary to send Lieut. John Roach down again for the present to be the Cheif Comand. of the Military under the Depty. Govern. & Council of whose good services we have had sufficient experience during the late troubles.

ORDERD that Four Thousand Two hundred Ninety Eight Pagodas twelve fanams be advanc'd Edward Bulkley Paymast^r. to defray Charges Garrison.

I have perusd the copy of the paper deliverd in by M^r. Martin the 25th. ulto the cheifest matter containd therein being to desire of yor. Honr. that you'd be pleas'd to compell me to pay the ballance of an accot standing out when he & I had jointly the charge of the Warehouse, insinuating that thô he was first nam'd and signd all accots that he was only nominall, but not really concernd in that buisness.

How farr his arguments may influence yo' Hon'. &c's. to grant his request I can't tell, but from the justice lately received from you, I've a great deal of reason to hope for more favourable usage, and do assure you that it was very much against my inclination I then acted in that Employ, but when I was engag'd in it, & found M'. Martin take so little care of the concern under him I then thought it my duty to take the burthen upon me, so farr as making up the monthly accots. & to see all things landed and safe put into the Godowns we'n when I had done I apprehended it M' Martins duty to collect and receive the amount of all sales, which he neglecting to do is the cause of the present dispute between us, and tho' he is pleas'd to say he often requested of Gov'. Pitt to discharge him from that Employ as not having the keys brought to him every night, I can't remember any such thing, and suppose that after his frequent importunitys if he had been deny'd his request he would then have made his Address to the Board, which I dare say he never did thô he had no occasion to put himself to that trouble, for on the first hint I would have immediately gratifyd him and rid myself of a very profitless fatigue, instead of which without any manner of reluctancy he sign'd all accots. whatever, and seem'd very well pleas'd to have the satisfaction of living at ease.

Were my circumstances as good as any mans in the world, I hope no body will beleive it could ever enter into my thoughts to dispose of so large a sum as Seven Thousand Pagodas to a person I am so little oblig'd to, and to be sure I would much less promise him such a sum at this juncture it is very true that he once discoursd me on this Subject, and talkd as extravagantly of it, as he has lately wrote to yor. Honr. &c., when I told him (to the best of my remembrance) that I would endeavour to make him easy as farr as reason & justice would allow me & I think if I make good my moiety I gratify him more than I can answer to my self; for thô it is a very great vexation to me to be impos'd upon (as I've very lately been) by a Conicoply, yet I can support my self under the affliction, because he was a man of capacity & (before he was detected) might have deceived the most carefull man living, but it would break my heart tamely to suffer so great a loss by Mr. Martin, & thô he is pleas'd to mention the Conicoply abovementioned as an Evidence in his own behalf, that he paid me upwards of Six Thousand Pags. of the ballance due yet I solemnly declare I never recd. a Paga. of him, as I made very plainly appear, when I last adjusted accots. with him.

This is all I have to say to M^r Martin's paper, & shall trouble yo^r. Hon^r. &c^a. no further, than to assure you that whatever my thoughts are at present upon the occasion, I shall very readily submit to yo^r. determination & am

William Martin delivers in his reasons in writing as Enterd after this Consultation, why he thinks he ought not to be answerable for the ballance of his Warehouse his reasons accots, and the said reasons being debated, we find he lays the stress upon Tonapa's why he cannot being put in by the Govern. & Council, That he was in great trust with Gov. Pitt and severall others, & recommended for great ability and integrity & That he can't of his Whise accuse him of any thing when he was Warehousekeep before, wherefore he did not suspect him till a little before Govern Harrison arrivd, and that he thinks Tonapas the matter-security ought to make good the debt if he is not able to do it himself, to all which it was argued.

Mr . Martin

That when Tonapa was put into the Warehouse by Gov^r. Pitt & Council Mr. Thomas Wright then Warehousekeepr. did make severall objections against him.

That his abilitys are allow'd of, but as for his integrity those that have trusted to it and have been deceiv'd ought to be accountable.

That Govern' Pitt never trusted him nor any black Merch's. months & years & bis reasons and. without calling them to a strict accot.

That Mr. Martin owning to have suspected Tonapa a little before the Governrs. arrivall, was a very good reason why he should have complaind to the Board, as soon as the Govern was arriv'd, and not have deferred it till the Jan v. following.

That Mr William Martin when he took charge of the Warehouse was so farr from excepting against Tonapa, that he confesses to have put an intire confidence in him, and consequently he himself, was his security and whereas in the close of his paper he thinks Tonapa's security ought to make good the debt, he should make appear to the Board that substantial security was given for Tonapa, or else by his own words he condemns himself to pay the money.

Upon the close of this debate the following Questions were put.

Whether this case of Mr. Martins is not exactly the same with Mr. Raworths, who has already been condemn'd to pay the mony and consented thereto.

Your Hon. having demanded security of me to abide by what the Company shall award in relation to Tonapas debt, I take the liberty to lay before yo. Hon. &c. the many reasons I have to urge against so severe a judgment, and what inclines me to believe myself not so liable to make good the said debt.

By the Consultation of Decemb^r, the 17th 1702 which referrs to an order from the Company importing that Conicoplys who are intrusted with their Estates shall give security for their integrity, it appears the Comp^a, do understand themselves to be subject to what losses may happen by the frauds and breaches of trust of the Conicoplys of the Warehouse [s] the election of one by Govern^r. Pitt & Council being yⁿ the occasion of said Consultation, this the Board not long since acquise'd in, by being of opinion that M^r. Empsons ballance should be charged to Tonapa's acco^t. thô M^r. Empson had not by much so sufficient proof as my self in my case, that said Tonapa had actually receiv'd that ballance and not himself.

Cojah Johannes's bond to Mr. Frederick for customs seems likewise [to] me to have a similitude to my note from Tonapa he lying under not [a] great necessity to intrust him for the Customs as I did to Tonapa to receive the amot of Outcrys and selling of fanams, it not being possible for the Warehousekeep' to receive all the said sums himself therefore hard would be his fate if he be oblig'd to trust the Conicoply in receiving the amot of Outcrys &c. on the Campas accot when the risque & hazard of the Conicoplys nonpayment must be on the Warehousekeep' own [accot] as to Mr. Raworths paying in his ballance I cannot conceive it to [be] any argument for me to follow his Example, because it's evident he wants that demonstrative proof, that Tonapa is indebted to the Warehouse in relation to the Rupees as I (by a note under his hand) [man] ifestly have, because there cannot be the same occasion to trust a Conicoply to take out of the Warehouse a great quantity of Rupees, as there unavoidably is in receiving the amount of goods sold at Outcry and selling of fanams, thô the former at that time he actually [did] without my order after all if it he a judgment (which will be very severe) that his case is parallel to mine (for mine I am assur'd can never [be] parallel to his) I cannot think it reasonable that his voluntary paying the Company what they could not in justice demand, can be any ways an obligation on me to do the same Mr. Raworth's easie consent to the payment of the said Rupees, seeming to be the naturall effect of a doubtfullness within himself, whether he might not have had the benefit of them.

At the Consultation of the 11th it pass'd that having trusted the Conicoply for so considerable a sum from before the Govern's arrivall, in July to Jan'y. following without complaining to the Board, when I confess'd I suspected his honesty before July, I ought to be answerable for said sum with interest, in answer to which I do declare, that I did not know the fellow was so much indebted, till I could get him to make a finall ballance and furthermore I think it extreamly hard, that the principall and indeed only reason (in the above recited Consultation) for the payment of the mony is only grounded on my neglect in not complaining to the Board sooner, which I could not do till I knew where it lay, besides 'tis impossible I should be liable to the payment of another mans debt, for no other reason but because I could not for some time give this Board information of it, occasion'd by the multiplicity of other affairs of the Companys.

What I have above urgd is with submission to the Board, if yor former opinion still prevails I desire an appeal to the Honble. Court of Directors, without being oblig'd to give any other security for the payment of the mony on their future decision, than Mr. Raworth gave on his return to Fort St. David, which I think is no other than his promises, your judgment then proceeding no doubt from what is

highly rationall, that former securitys in England are sufficient to answer for all mismanagements &ca. under which denomination I hope yet your Hon. &ca. will not think my case to fall. I am

> In the 2^d paragraph of the said Remonstrance he asserts that the Consultation of Decembry e 17th: 1702 referring to an order from the Hon[ble] Company, importing that Conicoplys intrusted with their Estates shall give security for their integrity, makes appear that the Compa unders [tand] themselves to be liable for all frauds in the Conicoply, the election of one by Govern'. Pitt & Council being the occasion of the said Consultation &c.

> This appears to us an ill grounded assertion for thô in one sense the Company may be said to be liable for all breaches of trust, and frauds committed by any of their servants whatsoever, because the loss unavoidably falls upon them, if those employ'd in their service & their security are insolvent, yet the very taking of security itself sufficiently evidences that they intend to have a reprisall both upon the Warehousekeep. and the Conicoply or their securitys, according to the merits of the cause

And further the foregoing assertion of Mr. Martin's was well grounded, yet it is no way applicable to the case before us, for if we could admit the whole paragraph to be true in fact, as we now undeniably make appear to himself that it is not, yet the meaning of it could only be construed to extend to cases of fraud or robbery, and not to this case where it is plainly manifest that the mony had not been lost, had the Conicoply been duely call'd to accot. and the letting it [lie] so long in his hands, might encourage him to send it abroad, in hopes some other adventures would drop in before he should be calld upon to pay the mony.

But to overthrow all pretences that M^r. Martin can have to imagine that the Company by ordering security to be taken do understand themselves to be subject to all losses &c^a. we referr him to the 13th para of their Generall Letter dated the 26th of Augst. 1698 which is as follows:

"Whether Mr. Vicessimus Griffith and others in the like cases ought to pay for mony recd. by their under Officers is no hard question to decide, all men that are charg'd with mony in all offices are here and in all places in Europe answerable for what their under Officers receive, but in such cases they are permitted to choose their own under Officers, being such as you approve, as in the case of all our ships, the Owners propose the Commander, we approve, but the ship that is the Owners must be answerable for the miscarriages of the Commander.

And in another Generall Letter dated the 8th of Jan^{ry}. 1700 it is expressly orderd, speaking of this very case of Conicoplys, and their security, that all Conicoplys should frequently be calld to acco^t and then the less security would serve, which is a most undeniable truth, for a very small security indeed would serve, when the person at the head of the affair is able and willing to do the duty of his Employ.

By the way it was observ'd upon this debate that notwithstanding the forementiond Consultation of Decembr. ye 17th 1702, mentions Tonapa to be taken into the Warehouse upon his offering good security, yet it no where appears that ever any security was given, which we suppose was omitted because as the said Consultation expresses it, Govern Pitt had great experience of his ability and integrity, so that whilst he was in the Government Tonapa was well lookd after and needed no security being frequently calld upon for the mony, but since his departure all these mismanagements have happend, and Mr. Martin was so farr from excepting against Tonapa when he came to be Warehousekeep. that he confesses in a former paper he put an entire confidence in him, we'h was the reason he did not recommend another for the Board to approve according to the Letter of the Companys orders beforementiond.

As for the last part of M^r. Martins assertion in the 2^d paragraph that this Board not long since were of the same opinion, in agreeing that M^r. Empson's ballance should be charg'd to Tonapa's Account we utterly deny that ever there was any such agreement.

In the third paragraph the paralell drawn between Cojah Johannis's bond to Mr. Frederick for customs, and Tonapas note to Mr. Martin to make good the ballance of the Warehouse is not just, because Cojah Johannis was a trading man then in repute, and had liberty to clear his goods upon credit according to the custom of the Port, thô he afterwards faild and is not able to pay, but Tonapa's note is for mony recd. on accod. of goods sold, and for goods which he was sufferd to buy himself at Outcry, and must have paid the mony if he had been calld upon in time, before he had sent it to sea.

M^r. Martin adds further, hard would be his fate if he be oblig'd to trust the Conicoply in receiving the amount of Outcrys &cⁿ on the Companys acco^t, when the risques and hazards of the Conicoplys non-payment must be on the Warehousekeep^{rs}, own acco^t.

It [ . . . absol]ute necessity of [ . . . . ] the amotof Outcrys much [ . ] necessity of letting the mony continue in his hands [ . . . . ] and we may say very hard would be the Companys f [ate] if their estates were to suffer by the Warehousekeeprs putting an unreasonable and unnecessary confidence in the Conicoply.

In the next place Mr. Martin cannot conceive that Mr. Raworths paying in his ballance is any argument for him to follow his example because it's evident he wants that demonstrative proof &ca.

This seems very strange to us after the plain proof made in Consultation of the 2d inst. concerning the Rupees, to which Mr. Martin acqu[iesced] and sett his hand, and indeed there was no room for him to refuse it and as for the other part of Tonapa's debt to Mt. Raworth, it appears by the report of Mcssts. Frederick, Davenport & Benyon, who were appointed to inspect the Warehouse accoust, that it was for mony gatherd in on accot. of goods sold at Outcry, which by Mr. Raworths rem[issness] Tonapa evaded paying in, so that we think the two cases are exactly alike leaving the Rupees out of the question and to conclud[e] we think Mr. Raworths paying in his ballance is an underiable reason why Mr. Martin should follow his example, because as we said before the cases appear to us the same, and because Mr Martin so readily gave his consent and sign'd the Consultation wherein Mr. Raworth was call'd upon to pay the mony.

The last paragraph but one is hardly worth our notice, for thô we allow most part of it to be true in fact, yet we wou'd ask Mr. Martin why he did not force Tonapa to a ballance sooner, and then he would have known where the mony lay, for there is no Warehousekeeprs. accot. that is kept up as it ought to be, but may at any time be ballane'd in two days time, nor can Mr. Martin justly complain of multiplicity of other affairs of the Compas from July to Jan'y. in which time he was Sea Customer, which thô a place of great trust, has the least business to do of any man at the Board.

In the month of June in the Cash accot, he's credited Vizt-Paid in for silver sold . .Pags. 3000:--:-Paid in for what he reed. in part for damag'd goods & silver wanting from Capt. Goodman 1140 : --- : -15: 9: 4 And in his own accot. for servants wages

now as he has credit for Eleven hundred & forty Pags. in his months accot. which was paid him by Capt. Goodman, so he ought to be debted to said Owners, as well as creditted by the mony receive of them.

And that he has credited himself by their mony and not debted himself to them for it is demonstrated by his own months acco. for in the same he debts himself to the amount of Thirty Six Thousand Nine hundred & Fifteen Pagodas six fanams for goods and Treasure sold indifferently wherein he enters nothing to have been sold that can be charged against the Owners of ship St. George as sometimes it has been practisd by Warehouskeeprs. to debt themselves for goods damag'd and deliverd to the Captains on accot their ships Owners thereby debting themselves as if the goods were sold, and creditting themselves by what receiv'd on that accot, but nothing of this appears.

Yet he credits in the accot. of what deliverd out, severall accots as Goods and Treasure to Capt. Goodman which the Owners of ship St. George are debted for, but then this will no ways help his accot. by reason as he at first received all the ships Cargo in and debted himself for the same and then credits himself for that part deliverd out, when he receive the mony and never debts himself for it, yet he has the credit from the Owners of said ship by the delivery of the goods and stands indebted for the Cash received, so that in my opinion unless Mr. Martin can show something more material than he has yet done he is liable to answer the same.

To accot. this as mony received by Tonapa's Conicoply as lately practiced I cannot see there is reason for it, nor don't well know which way he made up the accot with him, the sum no way agreeing with the books but beleive he might be mistaken in his ballance carrying on from the month of June Pags. 49428: 25: 2 whereas if he had debted himself for the sum in dispute Pags. 1140: 22: 3 the ballance ought to have been Pags. 50569: 11: 5. I have not further to lay before your Hon. &ca. on this affiair, but referr the whole to your better judgment and am.
