The Commanders were calld in & their opinion ask'd concern^g. the daing^t, they are in of meet^g, wth, the Pyrates who reply'd that their going together would be for their mutual Security and that If we could spare them a few European Soldiers who wth, their fire arms would be of great service in case they should be attack'd by them when the Sailors might be employ'd in managing the great Guns.

The Military officers deliver in their report of the condition of the Garrison. The said Command¹⁸, being dismiss'd & the afores^d, proposalls duly considerd wth, respect to the weakness of the Garrison thrô sickness & other accidents. We presumed then to remind your Hon. of the ill state of the Garrison in respect to Europeans both as to the smallness of their number, the continual sickness and mortality without any recruiting them.

Your Hon. then propos'd sending half Europeans and half Topazes but we hear the Cap. had much rather have none than Topazes whose sight they say will rather encourage an Enemy than not.

Therefore we presume to lay before your Hon. the impossibility of sparing any number of Europe Soldiers that can be of much service when distributed into four ships.

Besides my Ship having been fourteen months off the Ground by which her decks are render'd very leaky and her Upper Works, Sails, Rigging, & Water Casks so much out of Repair which I cant propose to finish in less than twenty days & that will be the soonest I shall be able to begin to take in my Lading for Europe your Hon. &ct. will by this be judges of yo. time I can possibly be ready to receive my dispatches and of the unlikelyhood there is of saving my Passage round the Cape my ship sailing so very heavy upon a Wind, that if the Westerly winds should blow so very strong as they usually do at that time of the year, & if my people who have been very sick thrô the tediousness of the Voyage should relapse I must then be forc'd to bear away for some of the adjacent Islands or else return hither the Consequence of which I submit to yr. honr. &cto. consideration & Remain with all deference

scarcely be restrain'd from murdering themselves as well as the Woman, the Cast or tribe to which they belong being so nicely strict in their rules wth. reguard to matters that Concern their honour that they chuse much rather to suffer death than Ignominy or reproach. Dev'roy being brôt before the board and examin'd upon y's. occasion he reply'd that Vinketrauze came abt. ten days ago to him and told him that his sister had return'd from the place to wen. he sent her up in the Country but that he could not find her, Devroy added that thereupon he sent to one Eyarnoi-Villevochum a Washermans wife and bid her look for the Girl, and when she had found her, she told her yt. her Brother desir'd she might be carry'd to Ueverroy's house, Devroy added that when the Girl was brôt thither t'was very late and that therefore he ask'd the Washerwoman why she brôt her at that unseasonable time of night and bid her go away but yt, they desir'd to lodge in the house that night for fear of being taken up by y°. Rounds, that in y°. morning just before he went to the Fort he enquir'd w°. was y° Rashboot Woman who wh[en] she saw him desir'd his Protection from her friends wh[o she] said would use her ill whenever she returnd to them, [He] affirm'd that he bid her go a second time but she re[ply'd] she was afraid and could not go and then the Washerwoman told him that if he did not keep her from her relats. she would suffer very much whereupon he came to the Fort. Devroy further declar'd that he could not deny but yt. Vinketrauze came to his house the next day and demanded his Sister as having heard that she was there and that he reply'd that twas not in his power to deliver her up, but that he might go to his Master, that the Third day the Sd. Vinketrauze met him in the Street and demanded his Sister again and yt. he reply'd that he had been hard at Work in the Fort and was very much fatiegued but that he would talk wth. him in the morning when the said Vinketrauze went and made his Complaint to the Governour.

Vinketrauze the Complainant being call'd in and ask'd concerning the matter in Vinketerauze dispute he declar'd that about four months since having heard that his sister fre-ask'd con-ask'd conquently went to the aforemention'd Washerwomans house who bore no very reputable erning the Character he began to be apprehensive least his Sister should be seduc'd by her if he dispute. did not timely prevent it and that therefore he sent her up in the Country to some relations there but that lately returning again very privately (web. however came to his knowledge) he sent to the afores. Washerwomans to inquire where she was. Washerwoman at first reply'd that she knew not but afterwards assur'd him she was in the house of Deveroy whither he accordingly went and meeting him at home intreated him to deliver up his Sister in order to prevent that Shame and Infamy from falling upon their whole family web. the Detention of his sister & consequently the debauching her would unavoidably occasion. The said Vinketrauze further declares that the defendant Deveroy then return'd him for answer that She was not in his house but some where in the street, that thereupon being exasperated he persisted in his demands of the Girl telling him withall that if he was resolv'd himself and family Should kill themselves or leave the bounds, they would do either of the two, to web. Deveroy reply'd they might do what they would but that he could not make up the matter in Less than eight or ten days time when the Ships were gone for Europe.

The Washerwoman being call'd in and ask'd concerning this matter, She The Washer-Declar'd that the Plaintiff Vinketrauze did go to Deveroy and demand his Sister and in and that thereupon She herself was sent for by him, who bid her look amongst the Cooley interrogated Washerwomen for the Girl weh. she did accordingly, found her, and brôt her to the affair. Deveroy's house who bid her go away; that they reply'd it was late and that they were afraid of being taken up by the rounds for wen reason they desir'd to lye there that night. This Deponent further alledged that then Deveroy permitted them to stay but order'd her to take care of the Girl and lye wth. her. In the morning they ask'd Deveroy what they should do wth. her who reply'd she might go. The Deponent added that she told Deveroy that if the Girl return'd to her relations they would murther her, Whereupon Deveroy gave 'em leave to continue in his house for 3 days two of weh. this Depont. adds she remain'd wth. the Girl but confesses that the third day she was absent.

The Severall Casts pursuant to agreement in last Consultation now deliver in their report of the affair in dispute between Deveroy and Vinketrauze ([as]enterd after this) woh, being read and duly consider'd, The President propos'd to the board to come to some determinate, concerning it but some of the Members differing in Opinion from the rest a Debate arose Whereupon it was put to the vote whether Deveroy did not appear to be Guilty of the severall facts with woh, he stood charged and whether he ought not to be severely Punish'd for the same both woh, were resolv'd in the affirmative for the following reasons.

FORT ST. GEORGE, FEBRUARY 1720-21-

First Because all the circumstances mention'd in the accot. wch. Deveroy himself gives of the matter and also by those enumerated in the depositions given in by the Plaintiff and the evidences, it doth appear & seem feasible that the said Deveroy hath willfully & knowingly decoy'd, inveighled and Seduc'd by the assistance of the aforemention'd Washerwoman the true and Lawfull Wife of Condamrauze and Sister of Vinketrauze the Complainant.

SECONDLY that by some of the allegations in said Depositions It doth Appear that he hath debauch'd her and forcibly detain'd her from her Husband and Brother althô dem^{ded}. severall times by them.

THIRDLY that we the rather think him Guilty because the heads of the severall Casts have upon examination into the matter & upon very mature Deliberatⁿ, deliver'd in their Verdict agreable to the Judgement of this board.

FOURTHLY that we think he ought to suffer because the Crime is in it self of a very heinous nature and no less than the invading another mans right and property as well as the possessing and detaining it from him weh. is in Effect a Robbery and is always punish'd wth. severity by the Laws of our Country.

FIFTHLY that there is an absolute necessity to proceed wth. rigour in the Punishment of the Person convicted in order to deterr others from being guilty of the like, because the complainants are so very clamarous & importunate for Justice and because they belong to a Cast of People by whose Laws & Customs both the Offenders would suffer death.

Sixthly That we are the more convinc'd that the aforesd. Devroy is actually Guilty of the sev11. ffacts wth. wch. he now stands charg'd on accot. of the Scandalous Character web. he bears amongst the People of his Own cast for leading a Debauch'd and Infamous Life and because it is well known for some misdeameanours of the like kind he was by them some time ago abandon'd, thô since upon his Promise of good behaviour he has been readmitted.

SEVENTHLY that we think ourselves under an indispensible Obligation to make a very Publick example of the sd. Deveroy as being employ'd in the Honble. Companys Service as the Warehouse Conicoply wch. is a pretty eminent Station for a black Servant, that by such an open peice of Justice the Inhabitants may be convine'd that we will not Suffer such persons to be thereby screen'd and protected from having due punishment inflicted on them when they commit unwarrentable actions.

Messrs. Turner, Benyon & Emmerson thought fit to dissent on ys. occasion and Messrs. Turdesir'd the liberty to deliver in their reasons seperately for the same the next Consultatn. wch. was granted.

They were then order'd to withdraw while the other Members of the board should proceed to give sentance against Deveroy wen, they did accordingly.

The board then consisting of the Presidt. Mess's. Horden, Cooke, Fowke, Draper & Wright deliberated very maturely on some proper punishment to be inflicted on Deveroy for the aforemention'd Crime and at length it was resolv'd unanimously that he should be dismiss'd from the Honble. The Presid^t. represents to the board that since the last Consultation was held he has reperus'd Mess^{rs}. Turner, Benyon & Emmerson's papers of dissent to the Affair of Devroy and that he thinks it proper to make the following Remarks thereupon by way of recapitulation.

Mr. Turner's

Mr. Turner in his paper (said to be the reasons for dissenting to the aforemention'd affair) seems to extenuate Pevroys Crime by urging yt. the Rashwar woman was reputed a person of a loose Character some time since from whence he inferrs he cannot be of opinion that she was ravished by him for wch. reason he refuses to consent. to the Punishment of the man, But by the former part of the last Consultatⁿ. (weh. is already sign'd) it appears that Deveroy is not to suffer for being guilty of a rape but for seducing, debauching and forcibly detaining the afores^d. woman from her husband when demanded by him, and therefore M^r. Turner is not an Oppon^t. but a Neutral Person in this case. In another part of his said Paper he urges that Devroy[s] Negative Oath should be esteem'd of more weight than the woman's affirmative one, but that is very well known to be contrary to the comon rules of Justice in England where the Woman is often times allow'd to be a substantive evidence against the man in such a case altho a party concern'd. Mr. Turner further urges that Devroys Oath ought not only to be preferr'd to the womans but that his weighty charge of Warehouse Conicoply should add weight enuff to it to clear his innocence thổ that Argument is of no manner of force because his Vile scandalous Character wth. respect to his way of life (so well known to most people thô but lately discover'd to the President and acknowledg'd by Mr. Turner himself to be true) is a Substan[tive] reason for dismissing him from that Office as none [such] ought to be continued in the Honble. Companys Service.

Mr. Benyon's

Mr. Benyon in the long preamble to his Paper of dissent on the same occasion takes a great deal of pains to insinuate that the board is always disgusted when he differs from them in opinion which is little better than telling them that they are disgusted with him for Complying with the Companys Directions. In the body of the

said paper he alledges that Devroy never had a fair opportunity to clear himself as he ought to have and that he should have had the liberty of delivering in his ans. in writing but the Choultry Dubash who was yo. Interpreter on yt. occasion being sent for and ask'd if he did not call upon Dev'roy more than once or twice for the same, he declar'd in the affirmative & most of the persons at the board remember'd that such a liberty was granted him verbally tho not Judg'd of importance eno to be minuted. As to Mr. Benyons insinuat". wth. respect to the Casts being influenc'd in relat". to the signing their Paper of Arbitration against Devroy, The board cannot but think it a very unbecoming one and ought not to be even suggested unless due proof could be made but the President supposes that Mr. Benyons suspicion thereof arises from an order woh. he gave the Choultry Dubash and other black servants to keep the People of the Sevil. Casts together that night least they should disperse themselves so as not to be able to meet again to effect the business wth.in the time limitted. Mr. Benyon adds that he beleives they sign'd the Paper wth.out examining. the Persons on one side or other and speaks it by way of reflection against them wch. the board are very much surpriz'd at, because the most impartial way in Such cases is to examine Persons of neither one side nor the other but such as are altogether Neutral, he further intimates that the Plaintiff defendt. and Evidences sho'd have been brot before them and severally examin'd, Whereas the board are of opinion that the Substance of the Depositions on all Sides having been communicated to them by the Honble. Companys Sworn Servants was sufficient for them to Judge by together wth. the reports wch. they had heard from other hands concerns. the matter because the admission of a formal tryal and hearing of the Sevil. partys before the said Casts would have been in a manner forming them into a Court of Judicature Superiour to ourselves as they were to Judge of a matter wth. wch. they then might reasonably suppose they were better acquainted than our selves and the Intent of the board at that time was only to ask their opinions concerns. a very great nicety [much] observ'd amongst a perticular Sect of them in order to make all partys perfectly easie wth. respect to the Sentence wch. we should afterwards pass upon the Defendt. and this is a Practice web. has often been recommended to us by our Honble. Masters.

As to Mr. Penyons Suspicion that the low Circumstances of the Complainants might prompt them to be Guilty of lying as well as Perju[ry] for the sake of a Reward tis a Daingerous, unchari[table] and a wrong suggestion and more perticularly the latter because they are well known to be of a Cast who profess the Strictest honour and Integrity and wou'd sooner forfeit their lives than be Guilty of so base an action.

Mr. Emmerson in his Paper of Dissent acknowledges that Dev'roy (as is alledgd) on Mr. did forcibly detain the Raswar woman in his house but beleives it was not done wth. a design to debauch her and as that is his Principal reason for his sd. dissent from the Sentence passed upon Dev'roy the board think it proper to make only this Remark thereupon, that he has dissented for one of the same reasons for won, we assented to his Punishment namely the forcibly detaining the Woman from her Husband.

HUMBLY SHEWETH

That your Petitioners Cheif Mate & Gunner named Charles Wankford and John Dalzell being both subject[s] to King George were wickedly and inhumanly murder'd at Syrian in Pegu by the means and instigation of one nam'd Zechary as may appear by the Copys of the depositions of sundry Wittnesses examin'd & taken before the Prince of Syrian aforesaid and John Underwood who is at present in this place is in a manner a Wittness rais'd from the dead demanding Justice in the name of God and the Nation and to redress your Petitioner against all those who have been accessary in this Action for all damages that now are or hereafter may ensue thereon and your Petitioner

SHALL EVER PRAY.

An Account of our Voyage to Pegue and transactions there by Stephen ()rme.

Left Fort S^t. George June the 19th. 1720 in the morning and made the Island of Andemans the 29th. from thence we steerd for the Pegu Coast and on July the 2^d. fell in about 20 Leagues to the Westward of Syrian River, on the 3^d. made the river in the evening, next morning got in but was obliged to slip our Cable and on the 6th. arrived at Syrian.

The first thing we did was going to the Rondu to give an accot. who we were, what Goods we brought, what burthen our Ship, how many Men and Guns we carry'd and that we had a present for the King; Then we waited on the Prince requesting his favour letting him know at the same time we had a particular present for himself, he seem'd pleas'd promising us his protection & having treated us with [a Beetle we] took our [leave] and went to Capt. Heron's where we lodg'd.

July the 7th. we took the fittest Dock for our purpose we could get and apply'd our selves to make it fit to receive our ship, it wanting Length, Breadth & Depth.

August the 12th. M. Tornery went to Prone for Plank and Timber and met with better fortune then he expected for the King being mightily pleas'd with his present sent orders to the Government at Prone to seize all plank and Timbers for the Great Ship, likewise he order'd 6000 baskets of rice to be deliverd us at the Curr^t. price which Accots, we are to make up with an Armenian the King owes money to.

September the 6th. got the Ship into the Dock and by Mr. Blyth's advice pull'd to peices her upper works to the main whale taking out every thing we found bad. We likewise cut two streaks fore and aft below the main whale that we might be sure her futtock Timbers were good weh. prov'd so. Within her we cut the ceiling fore and aft where the Timbers joyn'd but found every one good except in the run of her abaft where was 19 bad which Mr. Blyth order'd to be cut out.

September the 26th. M^r. Tornery return'd from Prone & brot. some plank and on the 29th. went to Pegu.

October the 1st. arrived the greatest part of our top Timbers which I had sent severall People different ways to procure, it being what we most wanted and now stay for nothing but begin to make new.

October the 8th. our [Las] cars with those belonging to two other ships deserted and kept in a body with Colours flying arm'd with Bamboos &c. their Complaint was they wanted six Tecull P month with Salt, Oyl &c. and unless they might have every thing they demanded they would dye before they would surrender.

FORT ST. GEORGE, APRIL 1721

I immediately went to Cap^t. Heron & told him the Story asking if his were gone too, he told me no, I ask'd him if he would go to the Prince, he answer'd no, upon which I left him and went my self (not empty handed), my reception was such that the Prince sent out his soldiers & brought every Lascar belonging to the three Ships to me, those belonging to us he deliver'd up to do as I thought fit with them, the rest he [let go] where they would.

One of our Lascars being cut in two or three places in [the] head I wrote a note to Cap^t. Martin intreating he would assist him but rec^d an answer Cap^t. Heron would not let him and from that time he gave orders to his People that none should dare come near us, if they did they should not come again into his house, his resentments did not [stop] here, but hurry'd him to the Prince where to our great diversion he prov'd himself a most obstinate, malicious, Senseless Fool by unsaying every thing he had said to him before, For at his arrivall he told the Government the Compa, would send a great Ship to him and upon her arrival[1] promis'd them severall things expecting she would be [con]sign'd to him & so to have it in his power to make himself great at the Expence of others, But now we did belong to the Company and to make short the story every thing his fruitfull imagination with a long experience in mischeif could suggest was too good for us. The l'rince himself sent for us and told us the above story adding [he] saw we minded our own affairs and troubled our selves with no body else, that we not only took care our selves to do nothing contrary to the Laws of the Country, but our People also. Therefore we might depend upon his friendship, he advis'd us to take care of Cap^t. Heron for he [was] our Inveterate enemy.

The occasion of Cap^t. Heron's anger we conjecture spru[ng] from the following Acco^{te}. we never having had any word with him, neither did we know he was angry.

At our arrivall he wanted to make Presents for us to [the] King, Prince & Governours but bringing those Presents with us disappointed him

He likewise had promis'd to the Prince that the King should have some of our Ships Guns which we told the Prince we had not power to part with.

Also we did not agree with him in his advice to pay the same Customs for the Sloop as for the Ship but thou[ght] it better to make her pass for the Ships Boat which he said we could not do but we did.

We likewise did not entertain his Cheif Mate as Overseer in repairing our Ship at twenty Pagodas & month because we could not think his way and upon our Lascarrs [run]ning away althô he [deny'd going] to the Prince with, he was sure it could [not be made] up with them but [by] him as he said [to] severall Persons but when he found his mistake he was [still] more mistaken by imagining his honour could be touch'd and resenting it as above.

October the 28th. being the time of the Moors Feast, 'Hossen' Jossen our Serang Tandell and Lascarrs complain'd they could not pass in the Street without being affronted by Capt. Heron's Lascarrs and Seignt. Zecharys but they hop'd they might have Liberty to resent it wth. we positively forbid ordering them not to mind any thing they said for if we knew they struck any body without they were beat first they should be made examples of, This Complaint gave us occasion to advise Capt. Heron of it by a Note assuring him our Lascars had positive orders not to hurt any of his but we reed no other answer than what he said to our Servant that carry'd the Note That the Ship was great but the People had little Wir. Mr. Tornery (who was arriv'd from Pegu) went to Zechary and advis'd him the same; In the evening when they left off work as usuall our People went to the Feast some to celebrate it, others to look on.

About eleven a clock at night we were rais'd from our Cots with an Accot. that Zechary and his People were killing our Cheif Mate and Gunner, upon which Mr. Tornery, my self ard one Englishman took arms & went towards the Place where we were told the bodys lay; some of our Lascarrs joyning us in the way. In our March we met a large Company of Zecharys and Capt. Heron's People with colours flying and Lanthorns coming from the same place who fled as soon as they saw us, we went

on & found the report too true, we saw our cheif Mate and Gunner laying in their blood barbarously murder'd, being beat in severall Places of their bodys and beat all over with clubs, Our third Mate we met almost dead and return'd with him home. In the way we met a Lascar who said he belong'd to Zechary which we made a prisoner, also another who call'd himself Cap^t. Heron's Tandell and who severall of our People knew was one that first began to quarrell.

October the 29th. early in the morning we went to the Prince for justice who told us we should have justice and advis'd us to bury our dead, then get our Wittnesses ready against the next day and come to the rondu (or place of Justice) where the whole affair should be strictly exa[mined, for there] never was such a piece of barbarity acted before in Pegu, We took our leave, bury'd the dead & employ'd the rest of our time to find out such Persons who were Eye Wittnesses to the murder & not belonging to our sh[ip] having enow of them already.

October the 30th, the English in Generall went to the Ron du carrying the Wittnesses with us, severall was examined and some that were impeach'd to have been accessary to the murder were secured, then they deferr'd a further examination till the next Sitting; before we came to the rondu Mr. Torne[ry] and my self told Capt. Heron that this was a melancholly | &] unfit time to be angry with one another, therefore intreated him to lay aside all Animositys & unanimously joyn with us in prosecuting the murderers of our Country men, Th[at] if we had done any thing we would ask his Pardon or give any satisfaction if he would be pleas'd to let us know wh[at] it was that affronted him, but his answer was he knew enough. In the rondu while the Wittnesses were examining and every one of us attentive to what they said, he could not keep his temper but instead of prosecuting the Murtherers he fell a railing at us. We again told him we would satisfy him in every thing and wait upon him at his house, as soon as we had done begging he would think on yo. blood spilt & revenge that first then he might take what satisfaction he thought fit of us. We added that the Prince and Governours must entertain a very mean opinion of the English to see us quarrelling with each other at such a time, That the reputation of us all lay at stake & if we did not get justice twas high time for the English to quit Pegu to the Armenians, That all private quarrels ought to be laid aside to serve a publick cause, especially he had no excuse for not doing it when we were ready to wait upon him & ask pardon as soon as he would let us know in what we were faulty. But his answer was not to come to his house. Then as we were going out of the rondu bid us deliver up his Tande[11], we told him we had proof of his being one of the first that began the fray & had very great reason to believe him guilty of the murder as we were sure his Serang was and since he would beleive nothing against his People we could not deliver him but would to Justice, sometime after we were going to his house accompany'd with Capt. Blyth & Cornelious but were stopt by Capt. Martin who was order'd not to let us come in and we went home; a little after news was brought that he had seiz'd our Tandell & Nockeedesob & put them in the Stocks upon which all our people came in a body] desiring leave to go and release their Comrades crying out Capt. Heron took the Armenians part and Valued not yo. blood of the English. However we pacify'd them by saying the Govr. of Madrass would do us justice on Capt. Heron & that it was absolutely necessary for us to be quiet that the Government might do us justice on the Murtherers which we could not get if we took our own satisfaction, therefore desired them to mind their work that the Ship might be got out of the Dock then we need fear nothing and in the mean time we would keep a strict watch that we might not be surpriz'd & massacred as our poor Country men were, from which time we took it by turns & watch all night continually going the rounds of our Compound. When all was quiet we enquir'd after more Wittnesses and got severall, we also examin'd the two Prisoners we had and found he that call'd himself Zecharys Lascar belong'd to Capt. Heron & not having any positive proof that he was in the Fray we sent him with a Note to Capt. Heron advising the same, he would not read the note but order'd the Fellow to carry it back again.

-FORT ST. GEORGE, APRIL 1721

November the 1st. all the English went to the Rondu except Capt. Heron and his Family, severall Wittnesses were examined & the rest were deferred to the next day & most of those impeached as accessary to the Murder were seized.

Novemb' the 2^d we again went to the Rondu where met Capt Heron, severall Wittnesses were examin'd who impeach'd Capt Heron's Serang and some others upon which Capt Heron flew in a passion, got up & went home threatning us after a most unmanly way, but was laught at by the Government, The Murderers were secured and a further examination put off till the next day.

November the 3d. we went to the rondu but Capt. Heron did not come. The Govern's told us twas needless to examine any more of our Wittnesses but they draw a Confession from those impeach'd by Torture, accordingly an Armenian was first brot out and tortur'd with some more, upon what was drawn from them ten of Zecharys boatmen were seiz'd being all armed & with him at the murder. Then they said twas needless to examine further, so got up and went to the Prince deferring sentence till the next day, yet told us twas evident Zechary was guilty as well as the rest Accused and that we should have justice the next day. We return'd home and in yet evening the Linguists came to us from the Prince & Governours assureing us we should have justice for they had resolved to secure Zechary the next sitting, advising us to insist upon it with earnestness. This Message we did not like nor their dilatory way of proceedings, we foresaw twas to make Zechary open his [purse] and We knew Capt. Heron had private conferences with Aga Noore which gave us the greatest Suspicion we should not get justice, however we were resolved to do what we could.

November the 4th. Early in the morning we waited on the Prince but Capt. Heron being there we took a little walk till he was gone, then return'd, we told him that since the Govern's. in the Rondu had examin'd as many Wittnesses as they thought necessary & confess'd twas evident Zechary and his Followers were guilty of the murder and that it was to no purpose to examine any further, we could not help wondering why he was not secured, that we came to beg his Security first, then that he would do us justice on all that had a hand in the murder, he told us to go to the Rondu and there we should have justice advising all the English to go together, he told us Capt. Heron had been with him and promisd to go with us, twas best for all the English to meet & consult before we went to the Rondu. We told him we had no more to say then to demand justice, therefore it was needless to consult but we would go altogether as he advis'd, so took our leave, This discourse increas'd our suspicions especially one Question he ask'd if in England murder could not be made up with money, we answ[er'd] him No. the Law of God & England commanded blood We went directly to Capt. Heron whom we expected would treat us roughly and as we came in at one door Aga Noore went out of the other slily, but we were disappointed being recd. smiling, he told us he had been with the Prince & that the Prince said he would deliver Zechary to be carry'd to Madrass but he answer'd he wanted just ce here for that the Armenians were very strong in Madrass and we could do nothing there, he also told us the Prince said he could not put Zechary in Prison without the Kings order and advis'd us not to insist upon securing Zechary, we answer'd if Zechary was not secur'd we had no reason to expect justice but to beleive the whole Government brib'd and that the Accot of the murder would not be fairly represented to the King. Therefore we must insist upon it in Publick, he seem'd to acquiesce & went altogether to the Rondu but there he only demanded a fair Accot. might be sent to the King of what had passed and that he might also write, but no sooner did we hear what he said but we desir'd to be heard and every Englishman except Capt. Heron and those belonging to him demanded justice on the Murtherers and if the Government had not power to do justice without the Kings order that they would immediately seize Zechary and the rest that were not yet secured that had a hand in the murder. That if this was not granted twas evident we could not have justice. This made Governours at a stand, they ask'd Capt. Heron if he joyn'd with us in the same demand which forc'd him to answer Yes. They immediately

got up and went to the Prince desiring us to stay in the rondu for an answer, a little after Cap. Heron was sent for and return'd soon with this answer that the Governmt. could not secure him but would be bound for his appearance and that whatever the Kings order was should be executed, we parted and taking the Linguists with us went to the Prince and told him that since Zechary was not secured we must expect the same treatment our poor Countrymen recd. from his hands and Followers without any colour of an Affront given them, however since we had so fair a warning we would be ready and not be butcher'd as they were, he excused his not securing Zechary for want of power, we said if he had not power to secure him he was greater than the Prince and before any orders could come from the King might do any mischief he pleas'd, for our part we had done all we could, he himself was convinc'd who the Murtherers were and knew who was and who was not secur'd and on him alone laid the whole affair and should any fatal consequences ensue t'wou'd be owing to Zechary's Liberty, he sent for Zechary and told him that if any harm happen'd to our People and the Authors not found it should be imputed to him. This is all we got, so took our Leave, the Linguists coming away with us we ask'd them the meaning of this change, we enquir'd what Capt. Heron had said to the Prince in the morning they told us Capt. Heron wou'd not take them with him But carry'd a strange Linguist so they could not tell but by what the Prince told him when he was sent for from the Rondu they had been consulting in Zecharys favour, for the Prince ask'd him why he went from what he said in the morning and he answer'd he could not hinder us from speaking but ye. Prince being netled said he was like a drop of water which [a man] might pour as They told us they were confounded at the alteration since last night and nothing cou'd occasion it but bribery, they knew Aga Nooree had ben with Capi. Heron often during the tryall, they also knew the Prince and Government had been offered money which they refused but Capt. Heron's being there so early with a strange Linguist and so great an alteration in the whole Government immediately upon it, convinc'd them it was so.

Reflecting on all that had pass'd Mr. Tornery & myself concluded it best to wait on Capt. Heron in hopes to see a little further in this last affair so seem'd satisfy'd as if we beleived the King would certainly do justice] He told us he would write about it and we should see his Letter how earnest he would be with the King that we might be convinced how much he wanted Murtherers to be punished and assured us he had not been Idle but solicited ye. Prince and Government when we did not know it, we answer'd we beleiv'd so and after a little while we went home, the next day he sent his Letter to us to read in Portugueeze after which it was translated into the Language of the Country and deliver'd to the Government to be sent to the King with the accot. of all that had pass'd in the Rondu, [All] this seem'd to us deceit, however we thought the freer [we] were with Capt. Heron we should know the more, therefore sent him his Tandell and in a note told him we hoped he would secure him that he might be brought to justice at Madrass but the next evening about seven a clock we repented that we had let him go for he came to our. Compound arm'd with a knife, our Tandell seeing him | bid | him be gone asking what he wanted and the Fellow being afraid of being seiz'd went away swearing he'd kill our Serang, we immediately advis'd Capt. Heron by a note that his Tandell had been in our Compound arm'd with a knife, Twas unaccountable after so much blood spilt that there was still danger of more, his Serang already was prov'd guilty which ought to be a sufficient reason to have [an] eye over the rest, he'd always been advis'd as was now, therefore if after this any of his People were seen in [our] Compound after Sunset they wou'd run a hazard of being shot. The answer to this was that he was at home and had not been in our Compound.

November the 14th. Zechary was at Capt. Heron's house and on the 16 Capt. Heron got his Serangs Liberty which is undeniable Proof how earnest he was in prosecuting the Murtherers.

At this time we got advice that a Vessell Cap^t. Blyth [was] building for Zechary which Cap^t. Heron had often wanted to buy but the other would not sell was now deliver'd to Cap^t. Heron which convinced us he had not been Idle but solicited the Prince & Government when we did not know it. At this time Zechary following the example of Cap^t. Heron got his two Serangs & Nockedesobs Liberty pleading Cap^t. Heron had got his.

November the 23d, we waited on the Prince desiring he would grant us the Liberty to take a copy of all that y'. Wittnesses affirm'd in the Bondu, he answer'd we might & told us he was advis'd that Cojee Simon, Aga Nuree & Zechary had been consulting with Cap'. Heron [in his] house & ask'd us if we knew it.

THE DECLARATIONS OF SEVERAL WITTNESSES IN THE RONDA OF STRIAN CONCERNING THE MUEDER OF Mr. CHARLES WANKFORD CHEIF MATE & JOHN DALZELL GUNNER OF THE LUSITANIA.

FAGELL a Lascar belonging to the Lusitania declares he saw Zechary come on horse back and beat every body he could reach, he saw the Chief Mate go to him and take hold of the Bridle telling him our people was in no fault but Zechary call'd him names and bid his people beat him.

JOSEPH a Lascar Ditto declares he saw the Gunner bro'. to Zechary and he heard Zechary cry to his People kill him, kill him, at which time he fell and he run away.

Ismael a Lascar Ditto declares as he was standing by a Moormans house he saw the Gunner strive to run away two or three times but was taken again by Capt. Heron's Serang whom he knew & some Lascars he did not know, he saw them beat him, but one of Zechary's Lascars named Fagell came to him & struck him which made him run, he also declares when Zechary came first he saw the serang of the Lusitania tell Zechary there was no harm done & every body was quiet, but some of Zecharys People cry'd out their People had been beat upon which Zechary gave orders to kill & that Zecharys Son was by him.

JOHNSER a Lascar Ditto declares he saw the Gunner run away and Zecharys two Serangs and Cap¹. Heron's Serang with some more pursued him and brought him back where he was kill'd, as soon as they had done, seeing him cry'd out he belong'd to the great Ship and fell upon him, he run but they took him and beat him saying they would carry him to Seign². Zechary but finding fall left him for dead.

CLARA AND Took two country women declare they went to see the Moors Feast & saw Zechary come on horse back crying out beat them, beat them, kill them, kill them. They saw the Gunner run twice but was bro'. back again to Zechary who cry'd out kill him, and that Zechary took a light and look'd at him to see if he was dead or no & that they saw Zechary's Son at a little distance from the Gunner with a sword and stick in his hand.

JANCHE a Christian belonging to the Moor Ship declares [a line lost] Lascars and that Zecharys Nockedesob and Aviat an Armenian kill'd him.

Manuel a Lascar belonging to Trivangarum declares that he went to see the Moors Feast when happening to be some disturbances between Zecharys Lascars and those of the great Ship but t'was soon over, he saw Zechary come a horseback and the Cheif Mate of the great Ship go to him and speak to him laying his hand on the Bridle, he heard Zechary order his People to beat and kill, at the same time Zechary struck the Mate with a Launce and the rest of his people murder'd him, he also saw the Gunner endeavouring to make his escape and he heard Zechary order his People to follow him who after they had brot him back murther'd him.

Aviat an Armenian Servant to Zechary confess d Zechary went out on horse back with his Lasears arm d and three Barmas nam'd Umza, Chunden, and Umrat, he had also his Cook with him who he saw kill'd the Cheif Mate will a short sword but he says he did not hear Zechary order him to do it.

M. Underwood third Mate of the Lusitania Declares That he with four or five more went to the Moors Feast, following the Lusitania's Lascarrs at some distancewho were dancing as they went along, as soon as they enter'd ye. Moors Street Capt. Heron's Serang, Tandell and some others issued out of a house upon them stoping the way, however they kept still dancing till one of Capt. Heron's Serangs Company took a long Bamboo lighted at both ends and push'd it in the others Faces, then began some blows but twas soon over and they fell a dancing again till they came to a large Fire whe [re] was severall others they joyn'd and danc'd altogether round the fire and nothing like quarrelling, when on a sudden they were interrupted by a shower of stones & immediately appeard Zechary at the head of great many People on horseback whipping every one he could reach & crying out beat them, kill them. Mr. Wankford went to him and held by the bridle of the horse telling him there was no harm done nor any thing like quarrelling, begging him to be quiet, but he repeated his orders to beat and kill riding thrô the people three times laying about him with a good Will, he saw him and horse fall down and went towards him to assist him but Zechary laid hold of him by ye. breast ordering his People to beat him and an Armenian close by Zechary gave him the first blow, then all the rest follow'd till they thought him dead, so returnd to Zechary who was got a little from him. [M^r.] Wankford the moment Came to him asking who is this, Underwood? & he answer'd he was almost dead. But some of Zecharys People seeing him rush'd on him, Zechary crying out to them beat him, kill him, which they did. A very little while after two men who he did not know movd him close by Mr. Wankford whose blood sav'd him for Zechary's Son with a sword in his hand & severall others came back again to see if they were dead and finding them very bloody thought them so and went away cursing them.

M². FRY Second Mate of the Lusitania declares he went to see the Moors Feast with the rest, that he saw Cap^t. Heron's Serang, Tandell &c^t. issue out of a house [up] on the Lusitania's Lascars & when they run a lighted Bamboo in the faces of some of the Lusitania's People there pass'd a few blows but twas immediately over & they march'd cn dancing to the Fire, likewise round it, he saw Zechary come on horse back with a great number of People following him beating all in his way & crying out to his People (what he said he did not understand) upon which all his followers fell on the Lusitania's People especially the White Men who had nothing in their hands to defend themselves & he receiving some blows fled.

THOMAS MOOR Boatswain of the Lusitania declares the same with Mr. Fry.

Thomas Pritchard Steward of the Lusitania declares he was close by M^r. Wankford when Zechary came on horse back with a great many followers throwing Stones among the Lusitania's People and others that were dancing round the fire, he saw M^r. Wankford go to him & tell him our People were in no fault, the others began, but that now all was over and every one quiet desiring him to be easy but he whip'd his horse & rode among the Lusitania's People up and down beating them, he saw his horse and him fall, M^r. Underwood knock'd down, also M^r. Wankford attack'd & himself, Zechary crying out to his people (but what he said he did not understand) seeing himself beset he snatch'd a Bamboo out of a Fellow's hand next him and defended himself till the Bamboo broke, then fled and outrunning the the rest got clear.

There is many more Wittnesses ready to declare the same [with] the above examination and to [swear to the truth] on't but what's already related is sufficient.

Mr. Troughton was at Pegu during the whole affair.

THE DECLARATION OF THOMAS PRITCHARD.

I Thomas Pritchard declare that on the 28th day of Octr. last I went to see the Moors Feast with five more Europeans, coming into the Moors Street I saw the Lusitania's People [all] dancing round a Fire after the manner of the Feast, then they went towards Church, as they were agoing there came out of two houses Capt. Heron's Serang and Tandell & Lascars with Lanthorns upon Sticks and met the

Lusitania's people and would not let them pass along the Street, there was one Fellow with a long Pole with a lighted torch at the end of it pushing into the Lusitania's People Faces till at last they fell to blows but it was soon over, afterwards [they] went to another Fire and danced, by and by comes Zechary on horse back with a great many followers throwing of stones which made all the People that were dancing run away. Mr. Wankford & I were standing together under y°. Eves of the house, step'd up to Zechary and Mr. Wankford told him and desired him to be easy for our People were not in the fault for Capt. Heron's and his people were in the Fault but now all was over and no harm done, but Zechary not minding what he said throwing his hands about and whipping all before him calling out to his Followers but what he said I could not rightly understand but to the best of my remembrance it was Mar Mata, Mar Mata, as he was riding to and again I saw him and his horse [fall] but he got up presently and run upon his Feet beating and crying out to his People, presently I saw John Underwood down and Mr. Wankford close by him holding both his hands up over his head to save the Blows & striving to get away. I seeing my self in danger reach'd a bamboo out of a fellow's hand and defended my self till it broke, then I fled and out running them got clear, the truth hereof I am ready to swear, Fort St. George Aprill 20th. 1721.

THE CERTIFICATE AND DECLARATION OF JOHN UNDERWOOD.

I JOHN UNDERWOOD do hereby declare that on the 28th. day of Octr. last there were five Europeans & my self went to see the Moors Feast at Syrian in Pegue and when we came into the Moors Street we saw no body coming near us only (as usuall at their Feast) the People were dancing round a fire, as we were going to their Church Capt. Heron's & Zecharys Lascarrs came privately into the Road way & stopd our Lascars from going to the Church and one of Zecharys or Capt. Heron's Lascarrs having a large Bamboo with a Torch at each end swung it up and down so that the Fire fell amongst ye. Lascars whereupon they fell to blows and the Lascars of the Lusitania beat them and went to the Church & when they went there they danced and sung as usuall at such time and the whole disturbance seem'd to be at an end, but presently after Zechary came on horse back and whipp'd ye. People as they pass'd and turn'd back again and did the same, the third time riding thrô again he and his horse fell down and I went to assist him but he took me by the Collar and at the same time an Armenian broke my head. I ask'd Zechary what he design'd to do with me, he made me no answer but said to his Lascars (in their Language) La Mar Banchut and they knock'd me down twice and after that the third time, they knock'd me down again & kept me down till they thought I was dead, whilst they beat me I begg'd & desired them to leave off both in y". Moors & Portugueeze Languages but it was in vain for they abused me so long that they thought I was dead & when they thought I was dead one Man call'd out Basta Basta Churda and then they began to leave me but as they pass'd they struck me, at last there was no more than two left who stood by me, at which time Mr. Wankford happening to pass by me and ask'd whose that, Underwood? I told him there was all that was left of me for I was almost dead. The two fellows that stood by me cry'd out & calld Duserer Mollom hy; Duserer Mollom hy; then they collected themselves together & fell beating of Mr. Wankford, he all the time crying out Mutt MARR, MUTT MARR. But they did not regard his entreatys but continued beating him,

at that time Zechary cry'd out Mar Morter, Mar Morter and Mr. Wankford was kill'd in half a minutes time, so soon as they had dispatch'd him (the Gunner and M^r. Orme's Steward running along) they left M^r. Wankford and follow'd M^r. Ormes Gunner and Steward crying out La Mar Banchute. At that time there was a man came to me and bid me get up, but I told I could not, neither was I able, so he and another carry'd me to the same Place where Mr. Wankford lay which was four or five yds. from me & then they left me. I saw the Gunner the second time come running being pursued by the Lascars, in the mean while I rolld my self in Mr. Wankford's blood to make my cloaths bloody but the Lascars came and felt of my Cloaths to see if I was bloody and went into the moon light and look'd at their fingers so that they pass'd me calling me names, at last Zecharys Son with six or seven Lascarrs came to me holding the point of his crease or dagger close to me & look'd me in the Face and calling me many names he left me, after he was gone a Portugueeze & one of the Country People & carry'd me to Mr. Orme's house And I do hereby declare what I have here writ is true and to the truth of which I am ready to swear, Wittness my hand this twenty second day of Decr. anno Domini 1720.

Your Petitioner therefore humbly prays yr. Honr. &c. to take all the necessary and most effectuall methods to enquire into the said murder & bring the Actors in it to condign Punishment.

And your Petitioner as in duty bound shall ever pray.

I the underwritten [Mano]el De Monte Inhabitant & marry'd in this city of Madrass do hereby declare that I being in Syrian in the time that the Moors made ye. Feast, We the Lascarrs belonging to the Friggot call'd the Lusitania, Trevangadums Ship and some Moors Ships joyn'd at night and were going to the place where the Feast was kept & when we came to the street wherein lives y'. Moors [Calassis] We met the Lascarrs of Zechary & Capt. Heron, the streets being very narrow we could not pass by them in a body and the Pilot of the Frigot (who was in our Company) went and desired them friendly to go forward or grant us Liberty to pass them. Instead of hearing his Petition one of the Moors insulted him & gave him many blows, we seeing that we all arose against them and made them presently run away and so continued our March to the place where the Feast was kept, a littlewhile after came Cojee Zechary on horse back with a Launce in his hand (made after the Country Fashion) and after him his Lascars & some of the Natives all arm'd. with Sticks & Stones. The Pilot of the Frigot perceiving Zechary he went to him & took the reins of his bridle in his hand & beg'd of Zechary not to take notice of what had happen'd, Zechary gave him no answer & shaking his head he went round the Fire crying Logau Betty Chute, that is to say beat the incestuous dogs, and immediately the Quarrell began which grew so great that our people all run away except the Pilot and Gunner of the Frigot. Zechary spying them he order'd his people to beat them & he went himself to assist them & with the Launce that he carry'd in his hand he wounded the Pilot of which wound the Pilot fell on the ground. Zechary perceiving that & y'. the Gunner was yet safe & running away he orderd his [Lascars] to run [after] him and bring him back which they did & [beat] him in the presence of Zechary till the Gunner fell [down] web. Zechary perceiving & it being near the Fire round weh, the Moors celebrated the ceremony of their Feast [he] orderd to bring a light & looking on and examining the two corps & finding they were dead he retir'd to his house, [to] the truth of wear being acted in my presence, I standing all the while in a house near the place where all this was acted, I do hereby declare & certify & take my oath on the holy Evangelist in Madrass, this 8th. day of [May] 1721 N.S.

The Hon^{ble}. President having order'd [the] Secretary to deliver me a Copy of severall papers presented to the Board by M^r. Stephen Orme I think it necessary by way of answer to give your Hon^r. &c^t. a concise Ac[count] of the rise of those disturbances that afterwards [prov'd] so fatall to the Persons mention'd therein. I shall like [wise] endeavour to show that I acted in the prosecution [of] the Murderers with the strictest regard to the Hon[our] of the English Nation of which I was always este [emed] a Representative at the Kingdom of Pegu This I [hope] will be sufficient without troubling your Hon^r. &c^t. [as] a reply to the many absurditys those Papers are [stuffed] with so notoriously false and of a peice with the [rest] of that Gentlemans Conduct.

Mr. Orme with the Lusitania arrived in Syrian the 4th. of July last upon which as usuall I went to the Prince and Government & acquainted [ym.] that She was under the protection of the Honble. East India Company & begg'd as such they would show them their Accustom'd favour the first mark of which was (upon my intercession) their sending the King [Galley] to assist them when they had run ashore upon a [sand] and in severall other respects they were used with much civility & Friendship.

I had no sooner talk'd with Mr. Orme but I found a coldness joyn'd with a disrespective behaviour towards my self, twas what I did not expect, nor could I then imagine the Cause but soon found that he never intended to joyn with me in the

Common Interest, to take my advice in any thing, notwithstanding [I] had and told him I would still continue doing him all the good offices I could. But to be obliged did not agree with his haughty Temper; he answer'd he sh[ould] act as he thought fit, that he did not know who [could] give me a power to preside in a Free Port, where [all] would be treated alike & so in short he set up for [him]self and acted directly contrary to what all y". English had done before him, the Government were soon troubled with his management for in Octr. he refused his Lascars their Wages, they all deserted him & [were] not brot. in but by force of Arms and I dare affirm he would never have got them again had I not privately wrote in his favour to the Government, his going singly to the Prince about this affair and what he then said to him soon convine'd the Prince I had deceiv'd him in pretending the ship under the Company's protection, he told me that he plainly saw they acted in a separate Interest and desired that I would give him a fair Accot. twas now too late to trifle & I inform'd him that She belong'd to severall Gentlemen whose names I knew not, he seem'd displeas'd & I retir'd & twas with no little difficulty I afterwards pacify'd him, this was my reward for the services I intended Mr Orme & what he mentions with so much pleasure in his Paper to your Hon. &ct. I cant forbear repeating his Words. Talking of me he says "His Resentments did not stop here "but hurry'd him on to the Prince where to our great diversion he prov'd himself a " most obstinate, malicious, senseless Fool by unsaying every thing he had said before " for at his Arrivall he told the Government the Company would send a great Ship 46 &ca, "

Soon after this happen'd the Moors Feast, Hossen Jossen, a feast that is always celebrated with the fighting one another & thô at first tis only play twas never ended without quarrels in earnest for which reason so often as I have been there I never permitted an Englishman to go near them & very often hinderd the Lascars & positively forbid earrying English Colours and I must own they was always observant of my orders. Twas at this time Mr. Orme sent 62 of his Men, Moors & Christians with 20 Men out of the Crown & Trevangadum into the Street where the Moors Mosquete stood. They went in procession with English Colours flying before them arm'd with sticks &c. they were no sooner arriv'd at the Place where the ceremony is performed but they fell foul of seven of our Lascars & 30 odd belonging to Zechary who was at y°. Feast & observing y°. Quarrell he dismounted his horse and persuaded them to be Friends, they continued so a good while & all being Quiet Zechary went home, but they had not been long there before some of Zecharys Lascars came and told him that some of Mr. Orme's people had begun again to fight und. their English Colours & that they were likely to be overpower'd upon which Zechary came [out] with a Whip in his hand & finding words have no effect he lash'd them as he rode along, Twas then the unhappy fate of Mr. Wankford and Mr. Dalzell & 3 more English [men] to be there lookers on, Mr. Wankford went up to Zechary and taking hold of the Bridle of his horse told him [they] had done quarrelling but as he was speaking the Word some of Mr. Orme's Lascarrs knock'd Zechary off his hor se. This enrag'd him so much that tis said he gave Mr. Wankford a Mortal wound in the body & cry'd out Kill him, Kill him, Kill him, at which the Gunner was murdered, the rest escap'd by flight or were carry'd off, [Twas] now that M. Orme came to me and begg'd I would forgive past offences & he would make me any satisfaction [and] desired me to joyn in prosecuting the Murtherers which I promised him to do in the most strenuous manner & accordingly went often to the Ronda at y°. Examination of the Wittnesses & wrote a very pressing Letter to y°: [King] a copy of which I lay before your Hon. &ct. this Letter was shown to M. Orme & he knows I caused all the transactions in the Ronda to be transmitted the King but in his Narrative he terms all this deceit & would insinuate that I had been brib'd by Zechary by taking his Vessell when I had contracted for the same two months before this accident as will appear by the Translate of the Contract. The King on the rect. of the aforementioned Papers sent down an ordr. for Zechary to be punished according to their Laws in cases of the like nature & he underwent the punishment decreed him so that it was not in my power to get farther Satisfaction.

Having said what is necessary on this melancholy affair I must now beg your Hon. &ct. to do me justice [on] Mr. Orme who has insulted the Character I have maintained in India these 50 years of being an honest man & that in the most open manner before this Honble. Board, I think I need not say any thing to prove I deserve that Title & to be tax'd with Bribery in perhaps the last public action of my Life is not to be tamely bore with but I will depend upon the Honour of the Board to cause [me] ample satisfaction.

HIGH. MIGHTY & AUGUST KING & LORD,

Capt. George Heron Cheif for Affairs of the Company at Syrian who has long been a Servant of your Majestys and reed, many great and generous favours at your hands prostrate at your Majestys Feet, beggs justice & satisfaction for the unjust Murther of two Europeans belonging to ye. Company, One of them the Cheif Mate and the other Gunner of one of our Ships which was Committed by Zechary in the Feast of Jamse which the Moors celebrate annually. Among many others were these two Englishmen, when the Moors as usuall began to quarrell but were again appear'd after which Zechary went out arm'd on horse back with a great number of people armed as well of Lascars as Servants and beat every body that came in his way when meeting the abovemention'd English mate he desir'd him to let him alone & not do him any mischeif. But Zechary on horseback as said above gave him a Mortall blow & cry'd out to his people ordering them to kill all the English at the same time calling us names & grossly abusing us, the two Men dy'd that night and in the Morning I with all the English went to the great Prince, the little Prince and other Governours to demand justice which they immediately granted & heard the Evidence about the death of those two Men with justice & Exactness & gave them to us to present to your Royall Majesty with this Letter: May it please your Royall Majesty to cast your Royall Compassionate eyes on those innocent Men slain by Zechary since tis just the Company should have the satisfaction of death for death in the same place in which Zechary with so much insolence and boldness committed the Fact, otherwise they will fearlessly kill whom they please of the Company's people. Capt. George Heron & the Capts. of the other ships & all the other people here belonging to the Company devoted to the service of your Majesty & prostrate at your benign feet, beg of your Royall Majesty that you will look on our just Complaints with your l'oyall & mercifull Eyes & give us quick justice in this affair as we are confident we shall receive from so great, high & powerfull a king true justice. We remain easy & will not relate the more trifling parts of this affair because the Prince who [is] so wise & kind to all strangers & particularly those belonging to the Company whom he particularly favours write to your Royall Majesty whose life God long preserve & augment your large & powerfull Kingdom.

COPY OF A CONTRACT BETWEEN CAFT. GEORGE HERON AND COJEE ZECHARY, ARMENIAN MERCHANT.

The Villages of Egmore, [Persiawalk] [one line lost] of Grain which amounts to about sixty Garse, half to the Honble. Company and half to the Inhabitants, besides about twenty Garse which they claim as priviledges belonging to them (as under specify'd) but not having your Hon. &cts. orders to make up Accots. with them in this manner & not understanding how those priviledges first became their right I have secured the Paddy untill I have your Hon. &cts. orders about it.

There are also severall fruit Gardens now grown up to perfection and some are sowed with Grain, the people now in possession having no right only say they have had them many years without paying any thing for them but are now willing to pay something yearly to the Honble Company if your Hon &c. will give them a grant for their enjoyment of the same.

Kisna the Beetle and Tobacco Farmers Lease for a small beetle Garden in Tonderwood rented at Pagodas thirty ## annum being expired desires your Hon. &c. to grant him a new one for ten years at the same rate, he also desires another Lease for the Salt Ponds belonging to Tonderwood with a small spot of Ground laying by them for which he is willing to pay twenty Pagodas ## annum for the term of ten years.

All the Tanks were out of repair this year having not been minded in the time of the drought especially the great Tank at Persiawalk which for want of repairs was not above half full which renders half that Ground useless to the Planters and is computed to be a yearly loss of Pagodas two hundred to the Honble. Company, it has lain a long time in this Condition & will be now about Pags. 500. — charges to repair it, afterwards the Inhabitants will keep it up without any further Charge to the Honble. Company.

[One line lost] up under charge of the Talliars. I now desire your Hon. &cts. orders what to do with it having dispo[sed] of none but to the Inhabitants for seed & hope your Hon. &cn. will think the produce very well when you consider the former part of this last year was fruitless for want of Rain, the Tauks in a bad condition, the Inhabitants had neither Servants, money nor Cattle & had not your Hon. &ct. assisted them [with] money to hire people & buy cattle most of the Land had layd untill'd this year & notwithstanding they are much increas'd with Labourers and Cattle, Still they are not sufficient to plant all the Ground [as] it ought to be and should your Hon. &ct. call in that money I fear it will be some hindrance to next years Crops which at present I hope will be very advantagious, we are now began cutting & hope monthly to gain a considerable Quantity of Grain.

Some Chittys and Weavers having a mind to come into the Honble Companys bounds to settle at Persiawalk desire your Hon. &c. leave & protection from any

insults or Obstructions they may meet with from the Shop Keepers of Madraes (also a Cowle to that purpose) they assure me of about twenty familys within a month and a great many more will joyn them in a little time and make a Cloth Market-within the Bounds.

Honble. Sr. & Srs.

Cap^t. Heron in his answer to my Papers presented the Board in his first Paragraph promises a concise Acco^t of the rise of those disturbances that afterwards prov'd so fatall, also to make plainly appear his Zeal in prosecuting the Murtherers with the strictest regard to y°. Hon^r of the English Nation and then desires to be excus'd a reply to them by pretending in Generall they are stu[ff^d] with notorious Falsehoods and of a peice with the rest of my Conduct. This obliges me to make this reply that it may appear who is blameable, him or I.

As to what he alledges of my haughty Temper & disrespectfull behaviour I hope if he does not bring some better proof of it than his bare word those appellations do not belong to me, when I appeal to all y°. English that liv'd with him what my Carryage was from my arrivall on the 7th. July to the 5th. Octr. which was the time our Lascars deserted and I cannot comprehend why at that time he should be so disgusted when we never had so much as a warm dispute before & yet pretend I had affronted him all Along.

Capt. Heron affirms the reasons of our Lascarrs deserting was my denying them their Wages. I humbly request he may be obliged to prove it being of the greatest consequence to my credit & the present time most proper, there being sevil Persons here that were at Syrian & know the reason was they wanted their Wages to be augmented to six Tecull # month with some other demands, as to their being deliver'd us by force of Arms is true and argues the Prince thought us in the right & proved how ready he was to serve us because such a case had happen'd once before & he would have nothing to say to it even tho Capt. Heron was there & the Event at that time was raising the Lascars Wages. It is true also that I went singly but t'was because Capt. Heron would not go with me, which obliged me to act separately Or submit to the Extravagant demands of the Lascars. And that the Prince took notice of it appears by his sending for Mr. Tornery & me, advising us to be aware of Capt. Heron for he was our Inveterate enemy & had told him we did not belong to the Company. This proceedure of the Prince in advising and promising us his Friendship was the reverse to what Capt. Heron affirms that he could not pacify him without a great deal of difficulty.

As to his intended & secret Services I know them not, therefore have no other way of judging but by outward appearance, neither do I understand what he means by saying he could no longer trifle with the Prince unless he plainly let them know we were not under the Company's protection as the Prince more than once told us he did, if so I cannot help inferring his fifty years of honesty will stand him in little Stead for no man can imagine Cap^t. Heron so ignorant as not to know the Company protects all they are pleased to grant a pass to.

I am now come to what he calls a concise Acco^t. of the rise of those disturbances &c^t. in which he makes me the Cheif Cause, he affirms I sent out 62 Men, Moors and Christians, with 20 Men out of other Ships into the Street where the Moors Mosque stood. I humbly request your Hon^r &c^a. Council will particularly take this into your Consideration and if Cap^t. Heron does not prove what he so positively affirms that I may be publickly righted.

He then goes on in giving a quite contrary Acco^t. to that taken in Syrian by the Government from those Wittnesses that were present, also from the Wittnesses examin'd by your Hon^r. & Council, he also by this Acco^t. contradicts his own Letter to the King.

He then confesses I came to him & ask'd pardon desiring him to forgive past offences & offering any satisfaction intreating he would joyn in prosecuting the Murtherers. I cannot help observing this was the first time I had met him for since the affair of our Lascarrs he would not see me nor allow any of his people to come near

our Compound so that I made use of the first opportunity to desire him to let me know why I had offended him & to offer any satisfaction which is a proof my haughty Temper was not Superlative but this Submission could not procure either forgiveness or a knowledge of my offence.

As to his going to the Ronda & being present at the examination of the Wittnesses my Diary presented to the Board gives a full Acco. by which your Hon. &c. will see in what manner he attended the Prosecution, it being too long to recite every particular I shall only mention one Instance, when his Serang was impeach'd he got up in a passion & went out of the Ronda abusing me with most reproachfull Language.

That he wrote a Letter to the King & sent it to us to read is true but that I know he caused all ye. Transactions in the Ronda to be sent the King I cant allow, I have only his Word for it & the Consequence prove it otherwise we'h. excuses me in thinking all Deceit.

As to his Complaint about the Brigantine he rec^d. from Zechary and his pretence of proving the Translation of a Contract dated two months before this accident sufficient to show he bought her then I conceive to be of no Validity. Contracts may be sign'd as the Partys please and with submission I think the Certificates M. Tornery, Cap^t. Blyth & my self are sufficient to prove Zechary would by no means part with that Vessell before the Murder.

Cap^t. Heron also affirms Zechary underwent the punishment decreed him by the King which all Persons that are come from Pegu know to be false.

I have now gone thrô Capt. Heron's answer, but he having omitted severall particulars Essential to this affair I think it necessary to insert them.

November the 4th. we sent Cap^t. Heron his Tandell desiring him in a Note to secure him that he might be brought to justice in Madrass but the next night he was seen in our Compound arm'd with a Knife & being challe[n]g'd he went away threatning to kill our Serang. We wrote to Cap^t. Heron advising him of it but his Answer was he was not there & since the Tandell is fled.

Novembr. yo. 16th. Capt. Heron got his Serang's Liberty after he was prov'd guilty of the Murther which is an evident proof he did not consult the honour of the English nor prosecute the Murtherers and a day or two after Zechary following the Example of Capt. Heron got his two Serangs & Knockedesobs Liberty pleading Cap. Heron had got his.

The King of Avah's orders upon the News of the Murder arrived at Syrian Dec. y. 7th. & were as follows. That Zechary should lye in the Sun 3 days, be bored thrô his Cheeks & cut in the neck & back 7 times, also pay 100 Viss of Silver and that each of the other Concern'd should have 100 blows, Providing what was related was true & Capt. Heron being cheif for the Company's affairs must know the whole story, therefore he must be ask'd in y. publick Ronda if the relation of the Murther was true or no, if he said yes Zechary &c. must suffer as P ord., Capt. Heron was asked and his answer was, he was asleep when the murder happen'd & knew nothing of the matter. I humbly conceive ys. order of the King's is plain proof he did not receive Capt. Heron's letter nor an exact accot. of the examination in the Ronda, also Capt. Heron's answer in the Ronda downright contradicts his letter to the King, who undoubtedly will entertain an indifferent opinion of him who demands justice in a case he knows nothing of, as appears by his answer in publick when justice was to be inflicted. I am sorry and asham'd to find myself oblig'd to point out these contradictions so much to the dishonour of the nation, on which will forbear drawing inferences leaving them to your Hon. & Council.

I cannot help thinking the King's order is a plain answer to the letter M^r. Tornery and I wrote and sent overland by three different conveyances, a copy of which I now present the Board and the King's order the second time notwithstanding Cap^t. Heron's answer was to punish Zechary &c^a. w^{ch}. makes it still plainer.

But as the greatest proof of Cap^t. Heron's unfair dealing in this affair I humbly offer his contradicting himself before your Hon^r. and Council he confess'd he wrote to the King demanding justice and immediately after said he knew nothing of the matter, then pleaded for his Serang that he was not guilty and now in this his paper gives as he pretends a particular account of the whole affair. These contradictions I hope show that ungentlemanly appellations of Lyer Cap^t. Heron was pleas'd to bestow on me before the Board was wrong plac'd and his insisting on it in his pretended answer by saying my papers are stuffed with notorious falsehoods and then evading proofs I am afraid will give great reason to suspect not only his conduct but honesty.

If in the prosecution of this affair I have at any time express'd myself with too much warmth I hope your Honour &c*. will be pleased to excuse me I can only alleage in favour of myself that whenever I think on this affair, methinks I see the blood of my poor murder'd Countrymen gushing out of their many wounds crying for Vengeance as it seem'd to do that fatall night and next day.—A sight! which had Cap*. Heron seen surely he could not have deny'd his peoples paying the last duty to these poor men by attending them to the grave, nor could he have admitted Zechary the author to pay him visits and he to return them.

I hope the Facts I have laid before your Hon. & Council are so evident that I shall not have occasion to be further troublesome and entirely relying on the Board

The barbarous murder of two of our Countrymen by Zechary and his followers compells us to beg justice of Your Majesty.

We have prosecuted the murderers in the Ronda and brought many witnesses against them, some of which have been examined but the rest not examin'd, the Government telling us there was proof enough to cause them to be put to death, yet when we demanded justice they delay'd granting it saying they could do nothing till they had advised Your Majesty and rec^d. your order what to do neither can the English prevail with the Government to grant them so reasonable a justice as to imprison Zechary till they know your Majesty's pleasure so that we are obliged to sit down bewailing the blood of our Countrymen and every moment in danger of meeting the same fate unless your Majestys justice prevent it, which we do not doubt providing the whole affair is facily laid before your Majesty.

We depend on your Majesty whom we think the Viceregent of that great God who governs the whole world on earth to do justice among men and we humbly implore it for this blood that is spilt.

I humbly presume to represent the designs and reasons of my petition to stop Zecharys money.

First to deprive him of the means to frustrate your Hon. and Council's designs of Justice in a Country where money has so great influence.

Secondly for security and to be a bridle to him that he may not act any further mischief against the ship Lusitania till she be clear of the river.

Thirdly it being agreeable to the Law of God as appears Exodus chap. 22, v. 5, 6. For it is no great difficulty to prove that the loss of our Passage depended on twenty days more time which time we should not have missed had not ou[r] Officers being murder'd & we left destitute of People to oversee the Workmen and to load the ship.

AGREED that as those People are the usefullest people We can have amongst us, & as their sett[ling] here may in time he of great advant. to the Company [in] having most of their Cloth made wth. in their bounds We grant their request & order That they have all manner of encouragemt. given them and that Mr. Newcome presents to the board a List of their names in order to the Cowles being drawn out accordingly.

The Chitty Shopkeepers of this place deliver in a petition representing that the Weavers and Pullemolle Merchants have acted Contrary to Custom and Agreem^t, in retailing their Cloth to their great detriment; and y^t, if those Weavers be permitted to come to make their Cloth within the Hon^{bla}. Companys bounds and afterw^{ds}, retail it, it will be still a greater prejudice to them & their Familys as likewise a loss to the Hon^{bla}. Company of a considerable amo^t, in their Choultry Customs.

The said Petition being duly debated & Consider'd Mr. Newcome was call'd in & acquainted wth. the Complaint of the Cloth Merchants relating to the Weavers and other people retailing their Cloth contrary to agreemt. and wth out paying the Choultry Custom, who reply'd that those Weavers who are willing to come & reside here have agreed to discharge the Custom as soon as ythe Cloth is out of the Loom wth. is the same to the Company as if t'was brought to the Choultry. The Board then conceded to their request and rejected the Petition of the Cloth Merchts. as frivolous & malicious.

Collastre & Venketty Chitty &c. Farmers of Egmore Villages appear before the board and pay in the whole ballance of that acco. being Pag. 1785:—:—. Upon web, they desire the board will represent the hardship of their Case to the Honble. Company by first ship who rather than undergo the Scandal (as it is look'd upon amongst them) of taking an Oath they submit to pay the whole Sum when every body knows that by reason of the Famine and want of rain they did not receive half; We therefore Agree to lay this affair before our Honble. Masters by first opportunity in hopes that when they know the truth they will consider the hardships the poor people have undergone and order them a reasonable allowance for the damages they have sustain'd.

Lieutenant John Gough delivers in a Petition (as enter'd hereafter) desiring Liberty to lay down the Companys service, in order to take the most Effectual means for the recovery of his health web. is AGREED to.

The President thereupon recommended Ensign David Willson as the most capable person to supply the vacancy made by Cap^t. Goughs Laying down. His Petition was then read (as enter'd after this Consultation) setting forth his having serv'd as Lieutenant on y^e. West Coast to the satisfaction of his Superiours there and promising to behave himself with all possible dilligence & care as that Post If the board thinks him worthy of it.

AGREED & ORDER'D that David Willson be constituted Lieutenant of the third Comp^a. of Soldiers in this Garrison and y^t. his Commission be got ready accordingly.

Court of Directors, the former advising that the their Fleet could not come up with y°. Pirates so as to be able to Attack them, they have nevertheless drove them off y°. Coast; One from the Cheif & Council of Callicut without date advising y°. misfortune of their People at Anjango being cutt off. One from y°. Cheif & Council of Vizagapatam dated the 8th. Inst. adviseing y°. Exerbitant prizes which the French give for goods to y°. Southerd and that y°. Country round about them is in perfect peace & quietness.

Cap^t. William Warden Command^r. of the Hon^{ble}. Companys Ship King George delivers in a representation concerning the manner of his Accession to that Station, as also Six Originall Papers to inforce the Same whereby it Appearing that y^e. said Cap^t. William Warden was appointed Commander of the said Ship by his Father Cap^t. Charles Warden a little before his death upon his dismissing M^r. Shewen the Cheif Mate from that Imploy On Acco^t. of his Ill behaviour & that upon his said Fathers decease he did regularly succeed to y^e. Command of the Ship, It is unanimusly AGREED to Confirm him therein.

Orders that Cap^t. Wardens representation with all the papers relating thereto be enterd after this Consultation.

Capt. Warden likewise desires our permission to discharge his Second Matenam'd Joshua Bagshaw which is also AGREED to, for his incorrigible Sottishness.

Mess^{rs}. English & Tempest Supra Cargoes of Ship King George deliver in their Books of Acco^{ts}. relating to their Benjar Voyage w^{ch}. are deliverd y^c. Accomptant in ord^r. to be examind & reported.

Mr. Thos. Wright a Member of this Board desires. leave to go to Fort St. David about some business, It is granted, & Mr. Draper offers to Act as Secry. till his return.

The Presid^t. acquaints the Board that a dispute having Arisen between himself and M^r. Benyon about his private trade, in Conjunction with him and M^r. Elwick he is desirous of putting a Speedy end to it & is therefore willing to Submitt it to y^c. dicission of this Board to be determind by us as by a Court of Equity.

The Case is as follows.

That finding in the whole course of his trade and business which he transacted Joyntly with Mess¹⁸. Benyon & Elwick, he has been perpetually vexed and disquieted with so much needless & frivolous opposition, Cavill & dispute, that he has form'd a resolution never to be concernd with them any more, if possible to be avoided, in that way; that in pursuance of Such his resolution he did upon the arrival

of the Ships Sunderland, Windsor, and King George (who are lately returnd to this Port from Surat & in whom he is a tolerable share, for a Private man, concernd) declared to Mr. Benyon his disposition to have those Ships Sold at Publick Outcry for y°. Apparent benifitt of himself and all others Concern'd as well as in ordr. to disengage himself from being any further concernd with them therein, because it was very probable that they would yelld much more at Outcry where every man was freely admitted to bid then perchance They would be valued at were their outsetts to be managed this Year as they were the last.

The President adds That M^r. Benyon upon Such his diclaration to him, did Absolutely refuse to comply with his proposition aforesaid and instead of deeming it a method fair & just did surggest it was a premeditated design to exclude himself and his copartners from all further benifitt of Trade, whereas it must be evident to all mankind that the thing in it Self is directly contrary however it may be intended because M^r. Benyon himself or any other of his aforesaid coherents may & will undoubtedly have y^e. liberty of purchaseing those Ships at Outcry & thereby of Securing to themselves a large proportion of the Trade.

The President proceeds to Say that all the Arguments of this kind which he could use to Mr. Benyon were of very little effect and that instead of conceding to his very reasonable proposition he trumpt up Jure marittimo upon him & talked of as much of y°. Laws of England as he knew In Turrorem against it. That nevertheless he was so well Satisfied within, himself of the justness of y°. thing which he proposed & that notwithstanding it might be something different from y°. customs of Countrys forreign to this yet he was perfectly well Assured that his proposition was strictly Agreeable to y°. Customs of this place and as Law in Gen¹¹. was founded & Established upon Custome that such his proposition was strictly agreeable to the Laws of this place as well as of England and consequently that y°. execution thereof would be strictly leagall, however that he might not be thought to depend Solely upon his own Judgment in this case he desires the Opinion of the Board concerning it.

Accordingly the Majority after some expostulation with Mr. Benyon upon ye. Subject and with those that sided with him on ye. Occasion concluded that what ye. Presid'. had preferrd was expressly agreeable to their reall Sentiments & that he might Execute with safety what he had propos'd.

Mess^{rs}. Turner, Benyon & Emmerson thereupon dissented & M^r. Benyon promised to deliver in his reasons for so doing in Writing Agreeable to the Hon^{ble}. Companys Orders the next Consultation.

Mr. Cooke then finding Mr. Turner Joyn wth. 

Cap^t. Simon Hill late Comm^r. of a Ship call'd the Brittania Galley that was seized at Batavia some time ago being bro^t before the Board was examin'd concerning that affair and order'd to deliver a full acco^t. of it the next Consultation.

The Governour acquaints the Board that he has lately rec^d. a particular Letter from Gov^r. Boone giving him a full Acco^t. of the unhappy Quarrells and divisions that have arisen in that Place occasion'd cheifly by Mess^{rs}. Parker and Braddyll who are both under Suspension and that he has been obliged in order to prevent any ill consequences that might attend their Factious mutinous behaviour to send them both off the Island.

The Governour thereupon took occasion to acquaint the Board that he could not forbear thinking Govern. Boon's Case with respect to the Commotions and disturbances that have been rais'd by seditious People there in order to create him uneasiness in his Government very parallel to his own although he has not proceeded to such rigorous methods.

ORDER'D that the aforesaid Letter be entred after this Consultation.

The Governour likewise lays before the Board a Letter which he rec^d. from M^r. Jennings Deputy Govern^r. of Fort S^t. David upon the subject of the disposall of the ships at Outcry mentioned in last Consultation, whereby it appears that M^r. Pursuant to an order of Consultation of the [lazuna] ulto, we have viewed the grain about the villages of Egmore, Persiawaack which we find in good condition and have enquired into the priviledges the Inhabitants of those Villages had when they were formerly in the hands of the Honble. Company, and find that they were allow'd fifty five per cent upon the produce of grain for their Tillage and the Honble. Company had forty five clear of all charges so that about eight garse of the twenty mentioned in Mr. Newcome's report is an innovation of the Inhabitants and therefore we leave it to be determin'd by your Honr. &ct.

As to the great Tank which M^r. Newcome mentions will cost about Pag^s. five hundred in repairing we do not find that ever the Hon^{ble}. Company were at any charge in such repairs that being always bore by the Inhabitants. Its true the Famine has reduc'd them very low so that if your Hon^r. &c^t. think fit to build them a few sluices to the Tank we think they ought to throw the Banks up at their own charge.

Honble, Sa. &c.

Several false reports having been spread in relation to my coming to India I think it necessary to acquaint your Hon. &c. with the occasion of my first setting out in the ship Brittania Gally & of the success we met with in our intended voyage.

About the latter end of August 1719 Capt. Lane sent for me in London and told me he could help me to the command of a ship and a voyage which he believ'd was to the Cape for to take in a Cargo proper for Amsterdam. I told him that I was engag'd to go with Capt. Gordon to China, but he reply'd T'would be much more to advantage to be a Captain than continue Mate to India where I had made so many voyages without hope of preferment, reflecting on this I went to Mr. Bryan Johnson who he said was one of the owners and enquiring of him he told me that himself, some Gentlemen at Amsterdam, and some at Antwerp design'd the ship for the Cape that perhaps she might be order'd to touch at some part of Brazill, but that that was uncertain however, I must ship the men for Brazill that it might not be known she was bound to the Cape. Thinking this voyage would be an advantage to my family I accepted of it and accordingly in October sail'd for Holland where I waited on Mr. Johnson and he order'd a cargo on board which I very well knew was proper only for Cape Bona Esperanza.

A little before I was ready to sail Mr. Johnson gave me the instructions and told me that he did not doubt of my meeting with good usage at the Cape, but if it should happen otherwise I must proceed for Batavia and act according to the Instructions in such case. I was surprized to hear of Batavia and made answer that I could by no means undertake such a voyage, but he continually pressing me to proceed with fair promises and assurances of my great success, and considering I could not recede without great loss to myself, I set sail in November and arrived at the Cape 27th February 1719-20, where I met with very unexpected treatment, for instead of assistance and free trade I was order'd out of the Road. All my recommendatory Letters signify'd nothing, for they would not let me land the least part of my Cargo.

Finding ourselves at this Pass according to my orders I put for Batavia and arriv'd there 28th May, where I found that Mr. Jacob Torrant to whom I was consign'd was out of post and under the displeasure of the Government. He told me it was not in his power to do me any manner of service and that he wonder'd at the project, in short I had not been there seven or eight days but our whole scheme was known at Batavia, the ship seiz'd upon and the Cargo sold at publick outcry. The men the Dutch promised to send home upon their ships as likewise myself, but after so great a loss I chose rather to try my fortune in these parts.

If your Hon. &ca. will please to give me any incouragement I shall be proud of serving you in any station you allot me, being with the greatest respect

Honele. Sr. &c.

Agreeable to your Hon^r. &c^{as}. orders of the last month I have examin'd the Acco^{ts}. deliver'd in by the Supra Cargoes of the King George from Benjar and shall now lay before you what I think necessary to remark thereon, having compar'd them with the Acco^{ts}. of the Princess Amelia's voyage thither, which is the only ship besides this that has come from thence to this place.

I observe they give $5\frac{1}{2}$ Dollars a pecul for pepper, which is half a Dollar more than the other ship gave, the reasons that oblig'd them to buy at so high a price are express'd at large in their Diary, to which your Hon. &c. will please to be referr'd. I further take notice that the Dotchin they weigh'd by wanted 6 Catty in a pecul, so that their whole quantity of pepper as they bought it was 6 per cent less than their Acco¹⁸. make it, afterwards it was garbled, by which it must necessarily lose something in weight, notwithstanding which they have deliver'd in no Acco¹⁸. of the deficiencys arising either from the short weight or garblage, and it stands in their Books just as they first weighed it, so that it is not possible to know how much they have on board.

Their Factory Expences are higher than those by the Princess Amelia, the latter amounting in 7 mos. 15 days to p⁸. 8/8 1109: 2: 30 and theirs in 5 mos. 4 days to pieces of eight 1282: 3: 1. including the wine brought from England, which cheifly happens in the money laid out for provisions and diet at Batavia, being by this ship p⁸. 8/8 457. and by the Amelia's p⁸. 267: 2. It is impossible to trace all the particulars that occasion this difference, I shall therefore only remark one or two of the chief. One is that they buy five pecull of Sugar and one of Sugarcandy amounting to Rix Dollars 38: 4. whereas there is not quite 1½ pecull of Sugarcandy and no sugar at all in the Amelia's Accots they charge Dollars 36 for Soosies for Curtains and two Dollars a day for diet. By the other ship there is nothing like the first article, and in the latter they charge no more than one Dollar per day each.

The Presents and anchorage are a small matter cheaper by this ship than they were by the Amelia.

A TRANSLATE OF A MALABAR LETTER FROM THE QUEEN OF ANTANQUALL NAM'D AMUTUMBARAN TO THE HONBLE. GOVE. OF FORT ST. GEORGE.

At first when I invited Merchants to trade here amongst the rest was the English to whom I gave a large spot of ground to build a Fort on and also gave them assurances of not being molested. Notwithstanding which the English shelter'd one Comadevormur who had acted contrary to their Cast, after the arrivall of Mr. Gifford at Anjengo the Inhabitants of the Villages round the Fort rose in arms against the English and some of them was kill'd in the Villages. The beginning of this trouble was in August 1720 which occasion'd the Pepper trade to stand still. In January last there arriv'd four ships from Cochin with soldiers, which so terrify'd the Inhabitants that they quitted the place and came to me. I then sent my head man named Vanga Mutapilla to make up the differences between the English and the Inhabitants, and order'd them to return and live there as usuall, and on the 6th. of Aprill last I sent for Codervompilla, who is one of the head men, with some more Inhabitants and order'd them to make peace with the English and make satisfaction for all damages done them which they accordingly did. On the 14th Aprill the Governour with severall other Gentlemen came with 150 soldiers to see me, when they arriv'd at my house the above nam'd Codervompilla with some Inhabitants combin'd together and fell upon them and cut them all off, which was unknown to me or any of my attendants. As soon as I heard what a treacherous thing the Inhabitants had been guilty of to the English especially at such a time, I with my Family and my Chief man Venga Mutapilla fled into another's dominions and have since wrote the Inhabitants that if the English will come and live there as usuall I would return, otherwise continue where I was. I therefore desire you will send some people with forces with all speed and when you arrive I will come with my force and give you all the assistance I can and comply with anything that you shall require, and desire you'll consider it well and send me an answer per the Bearer Kisna Braminy with all speed.

The President represents to the Board that having waited a long time for advices from the West Coast concerning the posture of the Honbir. Company's Affairs in that Part & Having recd. none from Mr. Pyke & Council since the arrivall of the George Brigantine from thence in January last, he suspects their design is to keep us in the dark thereby to cover some fraudulent purposes, That our honble. Masters having advis'd us of their sending their Ships Addison, Dartmouth and Good Fellow to supply them with Soldiers, Ammunition and Stores for the resetling Fort Marlbrô, that after the delivery of that Supply, the Addison was to be dispatch'd for Bengall and ye. Dartmo. and Good Fellow for this Place, the two former to be sent to England & the latter to remain in the Country. The President adds that he has been ascertain'd by the Dover of the Dartmouths and Good Fellow's arrivall at Bencoolen, that the Metchlepatam and Young Derby are still remaining upon their hands and that besides those five Ships (the Addison being in all probability arrived there also) there is the Perry Brigantine belonging to Mr. Pyke and althô its utterly impracticable to employ all those Vessells upon the West Coast yet they have not thought fit to dispatch one of them hither to give us advice of their proceedings, the President therefore proposes to the Board the sending the George Brigant, thither with all convenient Speed, and on her a Supra Visor & Council with other necessary Persons to examine into the management of Mr. Pyke and his Council & to report the Same to this Board.

The President's Representation being very maturely consider'd and his Propositions approvd and agreed to for the reasons by him given, the Board resolvd to puthem in execution as soon as possible and thought proper to defer the choice of a Supravisor till the next Consultation.

The President further represents to the Board that to morrow being the 29th. September won, is the day appointed for the Election of a new Mayor, he judges it: proper to lay before the Board an ill convenience which he has been inform'd did. arise from the present method of choosing the Mayor and Aldermen the last and former years, which is as follows. The manner of electing the Aldermen is by writing: down the Candidates names upon yo. side of a Sheet of Paper with a Black Lines drawn from each of those names to the other side and thereupon every Burgess makes a cross Line or small Stroke upon the long line which is drawn from the names of those Candidates for whom he is inclin'd to vote, and the one half of those Candidates who appear to have the greatest number of cross Lines or Strokes are esteemd to have ye. majority of Votes and are accordingly elected Aldermen. Now the ill convenience that arises from that method appears to be this, the Attorneys and servants who attend the Court always carry the voting Paper abovemention'd round to the Burgesses. as they are seated; severall of those Burgesses are of the French, Portugueeze and other foreign Nations & not understands. who the Candidates are for want of being able to read the English Language are consequently ignorant whom to give their voices for or whose names to affix a Dash to and so have frequently been known to be altogether influenc'd and directed by the Attorneys and Officers of yo. Court attending upon them to vote for such of the Candidates as they were mostly affected to. The Voting Paper aforementioned is generally observ'd to be carry'd round in a very great hurry in so much that People have hardly time to think of what they are going about, and this is thot to be done with a design to put People into confusion and to cover an Artifice which some of the Attorneys are said to have been guilty of in giving five or ten dashes to the names of any Candidates in whom they are particularly interested.

The manner of Electing the Mayor is as follows.

The Attorneys and officers attending the Court do carry round to the Burgesses a parcell of little Slips or bits of Blank Paper and thereupon each Person is to write down the name of such one of the Aldermen as he is most inclin'd to have chosen Mayor: those Slips of Paper are afterwards examin'd and any one of the Aldermen who appears to have the most of them with his name inscrib'd thereon is thereby .chosen Mayor, Now the ill Convenience that attends this method is as follows. The Officers attending the Court have here a greater Latitude for fraudulent practices than in the choice of Aldermen having it in their power to Slide in a number of little Papers with votes already writen upon them in favour of any one of ye. Aldermen to whom they are more particularly affected; This is supposed by some People to have been done the last year in favour of Mr. Benyon and is well known by Mr. Thomas Cooke to have been practic'd some years ago by Messrs. Josiah Cooke and Abell Langelier in favour of himself althô without his previous knowledge or It is alledg'd by Mr. Michael Willson one of the Attorneys of ye. Court at present that Mr. John Laurence his Predecessor now decd. did at the last Election of Mayor make use of some Clandestine practices of this kind in favour of Mr. Benyon and actually wrote down for above twenty of the Burgesses who were of the French and Portugueeze Nation his name as electing him for Mayor and by that means procur'd him such a number of Votes which carry'd the Election in his favour.

The President therefore to prevent the like fraudulent practices proposes to the Board that the method of Polling which is open, fair and just should be made use of for the future at the Mayors Court in their Election of a New Mayor and Aldermen.

Hereupon arose a debate but the Presidents representation together with the many reasons given by him in favour of the Same being very deliberately weigh'd & Consider'd they were entirely approv'd. Accordingly it was AGREED AND RESOLV'D

that the Presidents proposition should be put in execution with respect to the method of Polling to be used in the Mayor's Court, and that the Secretary should deliver to their Register the following order in writing signd by himself.

ORDERD that the method of Polling be used for the future by the Burgesses in the Mayors Court at the Election of their Mayor & Aldermen.

M'. Benyon thereupon dissented to the method of Polling alledging it would influence the Election, but it is to be noted that he acquainted the Gov'. yesterday he intended to stand for Mayor the ensuing year also.

M^r. Joshua Draper Secretary acquaints the Board that pursuant to order of last Consultation he deliverd to the register of the Mayor's Court the order we had made for them to proceed to the election of a New Mayor and Aldermen by the method of polling but that being present there as a Burgess he found they did not comply with that order.

Mr. Richard Horden then acquainted the Board that being present also at the Mayors Court that day as a Burgess, he observ'd (as the Secry. before represented) that the Bench did not comply with our order for polling, nor proceed to any election, either of Aldermen or Mayor, by any method whatsoever; altho they had a great deal of seeming debate amongst themselves concerns. the matter, But came to no direct determination: that Mr. Richard Benyon (then Mayor) ask'd him, if he appeard at the Court as a Burgess, or not, and that he reply'd, he was summon'd there as such, and did appear in that manner; But that if he had any affairs to discourse with him upon in any other Capacity, he would retire to the Fort, where he was substituted by the honble. Gov. to act in his Character for that day, he being so extreamly ill as not to be able to attend in Town to perform all the ceremonialls, usually pass'd upon the Choice of a new Mayor. Mr. Horden proceeded to say, the Bench then made some demurr, and soon after Mr. Benyon made the following speech to the Burgesses, which being compard with what is enter'd upon the Court Register (now produc'd) appears to be Authentick.

"WHEREAS it does not appear by the Charter that the President or the President & Council of Fort S^t. George have power or Liberty to alter any of the Customs of this Court or Corporation in their method of Elections and the method of Polling being contrary to all usage and Custom since the grant of the Charter which Custom and usage I am of opinion is a Law of prescription woh, to break into may be attended with many ill Consequences and as I think it also a breach and Violation of my oath to introduce any innovations, I therefore am of opinion the said order

"cannot be comply'd with by me while I am under the tye of my present oath all "woh. circumstances being Consider'd and because I would not act contrary to any "ord". of Government, I have no method left but to deliver up the Charter.

Mr. Horden adds, that when Mr. Benyon had clos'd yo. foregoing speech, he made a motion to deliver up the Charter to him in the Town Hall, but that he refus'd to accept it there, alledging he was no more than a Burgess in the Court; but that he would immediately go to the Fort (if he desir'd it) and receive the Charter from him there, Provided he would engage for himself and the whole Bench, that the Court should not be adjourn'd till another Mayor was appointed in the room of him, It being not at all proper that the city should be left destitute of a Person to act in that office. Mr. Horden proceeded to say, that finding Mr. Benyon give him no direct answer to such his Proposall and that he still insisted on flinging up the Charter in the open Court and offer'd to quit the Bench, he acquainted him and the rest of the Aldermen that since they would not choose a Mayor for themselves, there was one Already chosen for them; and thereupon produc'd the following order which he deliver'd to the Bench.

TO THE WORSPIL. THE MAYOR & ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF MADRASS FOR THE TIME BEING.

GENTLEMEN

"By Virtue of the power deriv'd to us from the Honble. Company in your Charter, we do here[by] constitute and appoint M. Joshua Draper to be "Mayor of this Corporation in as full and ample manner as if he had been elected by "the Choice of Burgesses.

"Given under our hands and the Seal of the Honble. Company in Fort St. George this 28th. Sepr. 1721.

Mr. Horden further says. Mr. Horden proceeded to say, that upon ye. foregoing order being publickly read in the Court, as well as that par[t] of the Charter whereto it pointed, Mr. Benyon acquainted him he was sorry that power was not sooner produc'd, because it would have sav'd him a great deal of trouble to which he reply'd that power was lodg'd with him to be deliver'd, only in case their Proceedings should be such, as he then found them.

Mr. Joshua Draper proceeds to acquaint the Board of what passed in Court after his taking possession of the Chair. M^r. Joshua Draper (the new Mayor) then made his Acknowledgments to the hon^{ble}. Govern^r. & Mess^{rg}. Horden, Cooke and Fowke for the honour they had done him in appointing him to that office, and proceeded to acquaint the Board, that by virtue of the aforementioned power he immediately took possession of the Chair, That thereupon M^r. Benyon offer'd to leave y^e. Bench, that being ask'd to tender the Accustomary oath to him he absolutely refus'd to do it, and went out of the Court in a very abrupt manner follow'd by M^r. George Sitwell (one of the Aldermen) and about one fifth part of the Burgesses; M^r. Draper added that he was then sworn by M^r. Thomas Way (the next Alderman in Course) and immediately proceeded to the Election of three Aldermen to supply the three vacancys at the Bench by the method of Polling (conformable to our ord^r.) which M^r. Benyon would not comply with; after which he made the following speech to the Court.

GENTLEMEN

"I am sorry that I could not be introduc'd to the Office of Mayer of this Mr. Draper's "Corporation in the regular way of Election, since it was you desire of the honble Burgesses. "Governour, and severall of the Gentlemen (here present) that I should undertake "it, & I should then have been satisfy'd, that it was your inclination also, but as "I have nothing to condemn you in, for the Obstruction which I have met with in "that respect, I shall proceed to the execution of the Trust reposed in me, and "endeavour to discharge it with so much justice, and integrity as I hope will make you as well satisfy'd with the Honble. Gov'. & 3 of the Council's choice, as if "it was your own; and I do assure you, y'. if I was convinc'd of the Contrary, "I would immediate[ly] resign my Post, thô given me by a superiour power.

THE PRESIDENT then demanded of Mr. Richard Benyon his reasons for not obeying The President the order of this Board with respect to Polling; to which he reply'd that he had Mr. Benyon's express'd them fully in the speech which he made to the Burgesses (as enter'd in reasons for the former part of this Consultation), whereupon he was order'd to withdraw, that ing with the the matter might be debated: the Charter of the Mayor's Court was then produc'd order for not consultation. and severall Clauses in it read, by which it fully appear'd, that the President and is ordered to three of the Council of this Place have full power to place, or displace any Mayor, while the Alderman, Register, or other officers, belonging to that Court, & to prescribe Laws matter is and by Laws to them, whereby both we, [&] they are undoubtedly to understand such rules, orders, methods and regulations, as we shall think fit to make for their better guidance; the Book of the Honble. Whereupon it was

ORDER's that Capt. Powney & Capt. Crossing be sent for and their opinions ask'd touching ye. Passage to Bengall at this time of the year, they being Person very well acquainted therewith.

Capts. Powney & Crossing attend the Board and being ask'd in how long time a Ship could get her passage to the Bay at this Season, both Agreed that if She be dispatch'd by the end of October She may get thither by Christmass day but as to the weather [it] is generally the worst in all the year and she may probably wait at Ballasore a considerable time for a Pilot to carry her up the River.

Upon this answer the Board took [into] consideration the reasons for and agains sending her thi[ther] and it was upon the whole AGREED that the want of an early Supply of Cash in the Bay must undoubtedly have prevented their making a considerable Investment there, neither can we think the Supply of Silver that we have now ready to send them can be of much service whether it be in December of Febry that it arrives there (both those months being so late in the Season) towards the lading of this years Shipping which the Gentlemen in Bengall seem'd so sensible of themselves that on the 15th. of Augst. M^r. ffeake thought fit in a private Letter to one of our Board to desire he would endeavour to prevent their being overburthen'd with Tonnage. The Monmouth if She comes from the Bay 1/3d. Laden in January.

The Dartmouth who we expect from the West Coast. Also

The Francis whom may probably arrive here from China about the latter end of January in February.

The Board then took into consideration how desirous our Honble. Masters are of having their Ships arrive in time for the September Sale and that if we should dispatch the Heathcote to the Bay, she cannot be in a readiness to sail in less than eight days, thô She should carry the Lead and Iron now on board her thither which would be loosing about forty & Cent in the Sale thereof, that being the difference of price in those Commoditys between this market and the Bay, and should the Lead and Iron be taken out We apprehend it would be about ten days longer before the Ship could be shifted and new ballasted, the weather at this time of the year not being at all to be depended on for Lading or unlading of Goods &ct. so that in all probability it must be so late before she could get thither that She must be too late to be dispatch'd agreeable to the Company's orders, or else we must send the Lead and Iron upon her, and sending those Goods to the Bay where there would be so great a loss upon them The Board cannot think our Honble. In Obedience to your Hon. &c. commands We have acquainted Mr. Hastings that the Board had perused the Invoices & Instructions relating to the List of Voyages &c. and having made their observations thereon, order'd us to acquaint him that by his Instructions to the Supracargoes of the Hastings they find that one third of the produce of that Stock was not to be return'd hither being otherwise orderd, they likewise order'd us to acquaint him that it had been intimated to them that there were some concerns to the amount of about 6000 Pagodas under him not deducted in the List of Voyages &c. which with one third part of the Hasting's Stock reduc'd y. Security propos'd to near 13000 Pag. short of double the amount of his debt, upon which we told him we were order'd to demand a further Security; To which he reply'd that those orders to the Supra Cargoes of the Hastings to deliver 1/3d. of the produce of the Cargo to Mr. Wright were only conditionall in case Gold could be bought at a reasonable price and that he did not know but the whole might

be return'd hither, nevertheless he was willing to assign over to us that part y^t. M^r. Wright may receive in China that we might transmit that assignment home to the Court of Directors who would thereby have a power to receive it of M^r. Wright or any other Person.



In obedience to your commands we here lay before you the State of the Military web. consists of 545 Men, Officers included, out of web. number please to observe 245 are Europeans of whom we do with Concern assure you that a great part are infirm and 22 Topasses at Europe Centinell's pay for their former good services at Fort St. David and else where, besides 278 other Topasses most of whom we were obliged to take in thô good for little because our Honble. Masters did not think fit to send out recruits and no better to be had.

The next thing we are to represent to you is the number of our Guards which are in all 18, eight of which are without the Walls and if our Garrison of 545 Men were all able good Men they would be by much insufficient even without any relief at all according to Military discipline considering the distance of our Guards one from the other, the many infirmitys Europeans are liable to in the hot Country and that our Men are always direct by some of themselves and consequently excused duty.

Should our Honble. Masters urge that we now have on our Muster Rolls near as many as formerly we humbly presume that the Consideration of eight Guards more to be maintain'd by the same number may sufficiently answer the objection.

By this state we hope your Hon. will see the necessity of sending for Europeans when we assure you we have nothing else in view than the preservation of the happy establish'd Government and Garrison, We are with the greatest respect

Thomas Cooke late Exp^t. Warehousek^r. being sent for to the Board reads his Acco^t. to the 15th. of last month Ballance due to him Pag^s. 1907. 28. 48 which is orderd to be paid him.

Thomas Cooke Imp^t. Warehousk^r. his Acco^t. to the 15th. of last month read Ballance due from him Pag^s. 77148. 2. 30 of which he pays into Cash 4061. 8. 25 so that there remains due from him on Acco^t. of Silver sold Pag^s. 73086. 30. 5 for which he has given y^e. Board security.

M^{rs}. Diana Robson relict of Thomas Robson late Surgeon of this place offers the Board 8000 Pag^s. for which she desires an Interest Bond at 8 \$\pi\$ Cent \$\pi\$ annum, Which is accepted and it is order'd that a Bond be drawn out accordingly.

M^r. Joseph Walsh pays into Cash Pag^s. 7000 for our 1st. 2^d. & 3^d. Bill of Exchange on the Hon^{ble}. Court of Directors of this days date payable to John Gore Esq^r. or his order.

The President pays in Pag^s. 4000 for our 1st. 2^d. & 3^d. Bill of Exchange of this days date on the Hon^{ble}. Court of Directors payable to M^r. John Elwick or his order Acco^t. M^r. James Elwick.

The President pays into Cash Pag⁸. 5000 for our 1st. 2^d. & 3^d. Bill of Exchange of this days date on the Hon^{ble}. Court of Directors payable to M^{rs}. Eliz: Payne Executrix of Cap^t. Samuel Payne dec^d. or her order.

Ensign Oliver pays into Cash Pag⁵. 44. 16 for his discharge from the Military. Order'd that 20,000 Pagodas be Sent to Fort S⁵. David overland by Peons for paying their Merchants & to defray their Charges Garrison.

ORDER'D that 700 Pags. be advanc'd the Warehouseks. to pay the Painters and Pags. 2000 for payment of the Dyers.

Petition of Joseph Walsh (as enter'd after this Consultation) being read,

Order'd that he be paid 67. 10. 16 being due to him for 3. 19 Salary from the time of his Suspension on the West Coast as Second at £s. 100 P annum to the time of arrivall here, As to his gratuity which he requests, the Board cannot comply therewith but agree to refer it to the Honble. Company.

The Import Warehousekeep' reports that he has but 4093 bags of Salt Petre, The Dartm' being arrived from the West Coast, Its observ'd by her Charter party that her whole Kentilage is to be in Salt Petre, the remainder will be barely sufficient to furnish Ships Heathcote, Marlbro and Dartmouth with what the Cap's may request.

AGREED that after the Dartmouth be supply'd with her Charterparty Kentilage of Salt Petre the remainder be divided between Ships Heathcote, Marlbro and Dartmouth agreeable to their sev¹¹, requests And as it is necessary to have a further supply from the Bay,

AGREED that we write to the President & Council of Bengall to send us up by the first Conveyance 4000 bags.

ORDER'D that 20,000 Pagodas be paid Suncha Ramah &c. Fort St. David Merchants on Accot. their running Contract.

In consideration that our Cash is very low at present We do therefore order that the Warehouse keeper do dispose of twenty Chests of Treasure for the most he can get not exceeding 14½ Dollers \$\P\$ 10 Pagodas.

Mess's. Emmerson, Fowke, Hubbard and Dunster according to order of last Consultation deliver in their report (as enter'd hereafter) of the examination of Mr. Pyke's paymaster's and Cash Accot. as also their remarks upon his management of the Honbie. Compas. affairs on the West Coast whereupon it was debated whether by the said report it does not plainly appear that Mr. Pyke has broke the Company's orders & been very profuse and lavish in his Charges on the West Coast.

AGREED that by the said report it is very apparent that Mr. Pyke has in many instances acted directly contrary to the Honbie. Company's positive orders and scandalously squander'd away their money and therefore it must be consider'd what method to take for security of the Company's West Coast Settlement.

AGREED that Mr. Pyke's Commission for Deputy Governour be revok'd, that he be suspended the Honble. Company's Service and that the same be signify'd to him in a Generall Letter with orders for him to return hither to answer to such Charge as shall be deliver'd him by this Board.

In Consultation of the 27th. Ulto. Mr. Thomas Dunster was appointed Supravisor, but the Dartmouth's arrivall since that time has given us so plain a View of Mr. Pyke's ill management and so much reason to believe he will oppose any one sent from us, It is judg'd highly necessary to send Mr. James Hubbard who is one of this Board thither he having been formerly there and well acquainted with the nature of the place and agreeable to the People by which means should they use any opposition he is more likely to surmount such difficultys than one who is an entire Stranger there.

AGREED therefore that M^r. Jam^s. Hubbard do go Supravisor but as he was pretty much indispos'd when there before and is somewhat fearfull of not enjoying a better State of health now; We give him leave to return as soon as he has put the place in any tolerable order And that M^r. Dunster do go with him and succeed as Dep^{ty}. Gov^r. when M^r. Hubbard leaves the place, he being the only Person we can think upon fit for that post either here or there who can undertake it.

In obedience to your Hon^r. &c^{as}. order of Consultation of the 2^d. of Nov^r. we have inspected the Books and Papers rec^d. from M^r. Pyke by the George Brigantine and Dartmouth; We shall first acquaint your Hon^r. &c^t. what acco^{ts}. we have to go upon and then make observations on them for your Hon^r. &c^t. Consideration.

By the George Brig. which arrived in Jan: last was rec^d. a short Letter dated 26th. Dec^r. 1720 with a book of Consultations commencing the 11th. October and ending the 26th. Dec^r. in those Consultations we find the following Acco^{ts}. read in Council of the 20th. Dec^r. but no mention when those Acco^{ts}. begin or end except the Cash Acco^t. beginning Nov^r. the 10th. 1720.

By the Dartm^o. a letter from M^r. Pyke & Council dat^d. 24th. Sep^r. 1721, a book of Consultations commencing P^{mo}. Febry. and ending the 17th. Sep^r. his Paymasters Acco^{ts}. from the 1st. Janry to the last of June and the Cash Acco^{ts}. from Febry. to Ult^o. June, these are all the Acco^{ts}. rec^d. fro. him; We think it necessary here to observe that the Ballances mentioned in the Consultations rec^d. by y^e. George Brigant. both of the Cash and other Acco^{ts}. are not bro^t. forward and that the months of Janry. Febry. & March in the Paymasters Acco^t. are lump'd in one, the same also is done with the two first months in the Cash Acco^t. We take notice likewise that no Consultations are held from 26th. Dec^r. 1720 to the 1st. Febry. 1720/1, after hav^g. premised thus much we now proceed to our remarks on the Acco^{ts}. & begin first with the Paymasters.

CHARGES GARRISON.

Under this head in the Accot. for Janry. Febry. & March we find Buggueze Guard for Bencoolen amounts to \$ 1536 woh. is 512 \$\frac{1}{49}\$ mensem in the year 1718 with which Accots, we have compared them, that Charge was about 271 Dollars a month, at Sillebar the Buggueeze Guard us'd to amount to about 66 \$s. a mouth and in those Accots. is charged at \$ 102 besides which he charges \$ 83 \$\$ mo. for Buggueeze at Oojang Carrang & King Cliff both which places are within the Bounds of Bencoolen, at Cattown he charges 74 \$\P\$ mensem which used to be no more than 53. In Aprill his Acco's. swell higher, the Buggueeze Guard at Bencoolen amounting to \$ 638: at Soonga Lama to 174, Oojang Carrang 223, Sillebar 202 and at Cattown to 74, making in all 1371 web. Guards (as beforementioned) amounted to no more than 370 in the year 1718. In May the Buggueeze Guard at Bencoolen amounted 503, at Kings Cliff and the Carrang 212, at Sillebar 203, at Cattown 74 and at Sunga Lama 98, making in all 1150 and here it is to be observ'd that the recruits from England were then arriv'd making with what were before in the Place above 200 Europe Centinells. It must be further noted that the Sums above charged were for Buggeeze kept in constant pay because on extraordinary Occasions of sending a party to the N°. ward they charge \$ 229 more for that expedition; In June the Charge is lessen'd, the whole Buggueeze Guard amounting to no more than \$819 besides a Party sent to Cattown which amounts to \$242. We find in this month five Gunners Mates, at \$10 each and two Gunners at 20 each, whereas there used to be but one Gunner at 20 \$ and his Mate at \$ 10, An Engineer whose name he does not think

proper to incert is paid \$ 120 for service from Pmo. Janry. to Ulto. June, we know of none sent either from England or this place and therefore it ought not to have been charg'd. We find a monthly charge of 3 Juretulis & 1 Juretasse amois. to \$ 32 besides what paid to Mr. Bayley as Linguist whereas formerly there never was more than one Juretulis if there was an English Linguist, otherwise but two; The Company's Letter from England mentions no more than one Lieutenant and one has been sent from this Place, yet Mr. Pyke in the months of May and June pays 4 & we have reason to beleive Mr. Cartwright the Gunner receives pay at Moco Moco as Lieutent. since we find him set down as such in the sick List, We shall add but one remark more on this head weh, is that the pay of the Buggueeze in Gen! is encreased, the Serjeants are now allowd 8 Dollars a month, the Corporall 6 and the Centinells 5, whereas in all the Fort Marlborough Acco. we have seen we find no more than 7 for the first, 5 for the second & 4 for the third, we cant deny but we find the like charge as Mr. Pyke's in the Moco Moco Acco. but must leave it to your. Honr. &c. determination whether it be reasonable.

CHARGES DIET.

This head in generall is very extravagant and therefore for a clearer view of it we have transcrib'd the allowances for the month of Aprill w^{ch}. are continued thrô all the Accot.

he charges likewise 9 \$ a month for table Linnen so that in this article alone he Spends monthly \$ 253. 2. more than the Company allow wth. is \$\psi\$ annum \$ 3042: he also allows the Europe Capt. each 30 a month whereas the 150 a month which the Company gives the Dept. Governour over and above his 40 Dollars a month was purely to enable him to keep a table for the Capt. and other better sort of Strangers as \$\psi\$ their Letter by the Good Fellow (which he then recd.) will appear. It must be observed in Mr. Pyke's favour that he does not allow the Lieutenants diet mony & have. no Storek. Accot. we know not what Quantity of Liquors or whether any at all be allowed; your Hon. &ct. will remark that Mr. Shelley receives diet money for him self and his wife and that because Mr. Cartwright is Gunner and Master of Arms he is therefore allowed Diet for both

CHARGES MERCHANDIZE.

We find 6 Dollars a Tombongon charg'd throughout the Accots. for unloading the Ships, the Company complain greatly of this when they lay out of the road and Mr. Pyke & Council in his Letter to your Honr. &ct. acquaints you that he has brought all the Ships [&] Vessells except the two great ones into the Carang or Bay wch. is not \(\frac{1}{4} \text{th} \) of the distance & gives the saving expences in this heavy article to the Honble. Company among the reasons which induc'd them to it.

CHARGES EXTRAORDINARY.

We find this article amount in Janry. Feb: & March to 3689. 7. 90 of which 604. 3 is paid Mr. Chatalier for his expences at Bencoolen before the Govrs. arrivall wch. seems to be very extravagant & what we can make no judgment of as we do not know for how long time he had been there but suppose it to be purposely conceal'd. Another part of that Charge was for \$ 2351 given away in presents, the greatest part of the things given are valued at excessive prices, particularly Damask at \$ 30 Dollars a piece & Ginghams without specifying of what sort at \$8 \$\pi\$ piece, Surat Chints at 4, Attlass at 40, Embroyder'd Sattin at 80, Gold Chints at 30 & Chints by the other distinction appearing to be of the common Sort 10 Dollars a piece with Syrashes at 4, upon which we must observe that \$ 700 is the most we can find to have been given away on a new Govrs. arrivall, the Something more may be allowd on this extraordinary occasion. In the month of Aprill is charged \$ 175 under this head w^{ch}. appears not very extraordinary except 24 paid for the maintenance of 10 Military Men who came on the Good Fellow & \$40 advanc'd Cap^t. Luckey & his Men for rice, these as well as the Military men being in the Company's pay ought not to have been allow'd anything extraordinary. In the month of May Charges extraordinary amounts to 820. 1, of which Sum 386 are paid for the maintenance of 138 Men for 14 days at 12° \$\psi\$ day who came on the Addison & Dartmouth. In the month of June this head amounts to 452. 2, of which 170. 2 were paid Capt. Hicks & Capt. Carter for expences on Accot. the Soldiers at the Cape.

CHARGES SLAVES.

We find charg'd in the three first months for cloathing 62 Slaves \$ 245, the greatest part of which is of Cambays at 50 Dollars a Corge. In Sep^r. 1718, 346 Slaves were cloath'd for 372. 3. 61 so that had M^r. Pyke cloath'd the like number it would have amounted at his rate to about 1367 Doll^{rs}.

CARPENTERS & SMITHS.

He charges under this head in Jan. Feb. & March \$ 2659 for workmen among web, are 4 head at 2 Sucas a day & 240 und. Jukans at 1. 50 a day whereas there never used to be above one jukan at 2 Sucas a day and not above 506 under ones Su. Ca. at 1. 50 A day, In Aprill this head amounts to \$ 1251. 2, in May to 1241 & in June to 597. 2, in all web, months he has not given the particular number of head workmen or Cooleys but there appears a much greater Sum paid to the head workmen than was ever known in proportion to the under workmen & occasions a great part of the encrease under this head.

MATERIALS FOR BUILDING.

We find most of the particulars under this head charg'd at a much higher rate than they were in 1715 and Shall give your Hon. &c. an Instance of it in the following

not brought in before that we can find by those Books we have to compare with, he charges for cleaning & bringing brick to the Carrang 3 Dollars a thousand, we are inform'd they are those that belong'd to York Fort pull'd down & clean'd in Mr. Cooke 's time & it was then agreed they should be brought from thence to Marlbrô ready cleaned for three Dollars a thousand, ye. charge of pulling down & cleaning was then a Dollar & a half a thousand & the other Dollar & half designd for carryage so that this charge being only for carryage we think very extravagant.

PERRY BRIGANTINE.

We find in the Paymasters Acco¹⁸. for Jan: Feb: & March 1200 Dollars charged for freight & Demorage & 400 Dollars a month continued in Aprill, May or June, and have reason to believe it is still kept on; She sail'd from hence the 31st. Oct². and carried Stores to the amo^t. of Pag⁸. 2042. 7. 24 which were of sorts that could not half fill her & is all the Service She has done except one trip to Batavia, his reasons for sending her there are express'd in the Consultation of the 18th. Aprill & that your Hon². &c⁴. may judge of what force those reasons are we here incert them.

"The Honble. Company having order'd in their Gen!! Letter by the Good Fellow to get Teak Timbers fro Java and this Place being in want of severall necessarys procurable at Batavia we judge it highly necessary to send a Vessell hither to purchase said things and the Good Fellow being not yet unloaded for want of proper room to take in her Stores, the Metchlepatam at Sillebar taking in Pepper & the Derby at Moco Moco to bring away Timbers & Slaves from thence,

"Order'n that the Perry Brigantine be continued in the Service and that "Mr. Chatalier be appointed to go and purchase her Cargo of such things as the "Company have already order'd and besides a large Quantity of rice with some "Arrack.

On her return She brought in Stores according to her Invoice to the amount of \$4886.—.66 upon w^{ch}. we think it necessary to make the following remarks. Arrack fifty five Leaguers charg'd at thirty Rix Dollars a Leaguer is a dearer price than we have ever heard it was at Batavia, Teak Timbers, rice, which is y^c. pretence alleadg'd for sending thither, she brings of the former but 20 pieces and 100 Plank and not a bag of the latter, Other Articles of the Invoice are Viz^t. House Furniture amounting to \$307. 2. 46 consisting cheifly of Plate for the Dep^{ty} Governour's use, a Coach with Package charg'd at \$452. 3. 20, Tea to the amount of 790. 3. 40

cost most of it 1 ½ rix dollars and 2 rix dollar a Catty and Commission of five \$\ \text{Cent is drawn by M*. Chatalier on the foot of the Invoice whilst at the same time all his Allowances at Bencoolen are continued.

We find in the Moco Moco Consultation of the 16th. December 1720 severall Stores bought for the use of the Garrison amounting to \$5502 in severall of which no quantitys at all are set down and all of them charg'd at extravagant rates, the List as follows.

In the same Consultation they order \$ 116. 2 to be paid to Cap^t. Charlton for 4 Chests of Syrash and other Provisions spent in their voyage to Moco Moco tho M^r. Pyke was advanc'd Pag^s. 250 for liquors and fresh provisions for himself and the Gentlemen who went with him, the Warehousek^r. likewise delivers a list of Presents which is order'd to be paid amounting to \$ 522: in which Taffitys are charg'd, the first Sort at \$ 10 \$\psi\$ p^s. and the second Sort at \$ 8 \$\psi\$ piece and the other Goods at extravagant prices, the Company have taken notice of some of these Species when they were not charg'd so high and have expressly forbid them in severall of their Letters, particularly in that by the Craggs Frigot of which M^r. Pyke could not be ignorant.

In his Cash Acco^t. of the 20th. July [1720 he] charges £^s. 300 a year Salary as Deputy Governour computing it from the 8th. of October 1719 the time [he] arriv'd at Batavia in the Craggs & \$33. 1. 33 monthly in the Paymaster's Accots as Captain of the Military wth. makes another £100 a year whereas the Hon^{ble}. Company allow no more than £100 \$\pi\$ annum as Deputy Govern., 100 as Cap^t. & 100£ they reserve to give him as a Gratuity if they approve his management.

We cant help observing what M^r . Pyke says towards the end of his letter that the Expence [at] Marlbro and Moco Moco is about 9000 Dollars Ψ m°. that all the English Soldiers & Buggueeze Officers are paid in money, the Buggueeze in half Cloth, half money Salary Wages & Allowances in money, some few of the Materials and Cheif Malay Workmen in mony and the rest in Cloth, making as he computes $\frac{3}{4}$ of the Expence in money & $\frac{1}{4}$ part in Cloth, the 9000 Dollars monthly charges of the Coast, in his reckoning (thô in reality it will appear to much more) makes 108000 Dollars Ψ annum of which $\frac{1}{4}$ part amounting to \$ 27000, is paid in

Cloth, how little of this Cloth was the Company's may be judg'd in that there was sent from hence no more last year than 12 bales amounting to Pagodas 519. 30 and that the rest were brought there and paid away at those excessive prices the Company so much complain of appears plainly from the only Warehousekeeper's Acco. Current we have where we find cloth deliver'd out no doubt to the Paymaster at the following price.

Helena of the same date to inclose Invoice & Bill of Lading for Sundry Wares & Stores laden on the King George for the use of said Island amots. to Pag. 196. 22. 50. Cap. William Warden's dispatches were likewise read and sign'd.

The Accomptant having cast up the bills of Exchange drawn on us by the Dep^{ty}. Govern^r. & Council of the West Coast, & Ship Dartmouth accepted the 2^d. Ins^t. and now due are order'd to be paid, The Bills are as follow.

The Cap^t. of the King George having yesterday in [y^e.] afternoon rec^d. his Dispatches was this morning to take his leave of the Presid^t. who went with him to the Sea Gate to see him off; But the Surf running very high he could not get over but hop'd for meeting with an opportunity in the Afternoon but the Wind & Weather increas'd rather than abated and growing very thick to the NE as the evening approach'd rain came [on] and Wind in greater abundance which prevented [him] from going off that night.

14TH.

All last night and this day the Wind and rain continued with more violence than yesterday & increas'd towards noon to a great Storm, the rapidity of the waters out of the Country was so great that it broke two of our bridges, that next to the Fort and the other on the road towards Triplicane, [At] the former of these there was at least 2 foot fall which must be a prodigious strain to so small a bridge and as to the other it was hardly dry so consequently the more liable to this disaster, the whole Island was overflow'd & nothing all round us to be seen but Water, Tops of hedges and trees, the rains & floods have carried away most of the Macquaw & Poor People's houses in the Suburbs of Madrass. The weather at one a clock in the Afternoon was so thick & hazey that we could not see a stones cast round us and notwithstanding we are extreemly alarm'd at frequent firings from the Ships [in] the road all this afternoon, yet we cannot do any thing for the security either of our Honbie. Masters Goods, Ships or Treasure, the Surf flying quite up to the Gates & impossible for almost any thing to live upon the Sea.

15TH .

This morning the Wind began to abate & the weather to clear up, but on our looking out into the road We could perceive only one Ship remaining weh. in the Afternoon [we] heard was the Heathcote, The Cheif Mate writes ashore that the Brigantine he had not seen all yesterday nor the King George or Dartmouth since that day at noon. As for the Marlbrô she drove about 5 in the Afternoon & he judg'd that Ship which was then at an Anchor within half a mile of the Surf off St. Thoma to be her, Capts. Elliston, Warden, Crossing and Mr. Bates Cheif Mate of the Marlbro desired Horses to go down & see her, & look if any more were to be seen to the Southward but after all that they could do, t'was impossible for them to get over the river so they were oblig'd to return, We endeavour'd immediately after that to send off Anchors and Cables to the Marlbrô who made frequent signalls of Distress but the Boat we put the Cable into (& in woh. the Cheif Mate was going) fill'd and split to pieces, however we with much ado got off a Cable that Afternoon & the Cheif Mate went aboard, as soon as he was there he hoisted his Ensign in the fore Shrouds, the signall agreed upon in case of another Ship in distress below them, but notwithstands, all that we could do we were obliged to defer sending an Anchor till the next morning.

We also order'd 3 Boats to be got ready & 7 soldiers to go in each boat. Cap¹⁸. Warden, Elliston and Crossing whose Ships & Brigantine were missing went one in each of them but an Accident prevented that (wherein Cap¹. Warden was) from proceeding which was her oversetting by which misfortune a Serjeant and three men were drowned.

The Honble. President in the morning perceiving the Ships were missing dispatch'd 100 Peons to the Southward along the Sea side to see if any Wrecks came ashore but the rivers being so very deep and rappid & the Country und. water that the Peons could not pass so that had not any intelligence till the 17th in the afternoon from the Cheif of Covelon; however t'was judg'd necessary to have an Accot. of the abovementioned signall in order to send the men as before related, Capt. Crossing who was in the first Boat that went off that evening when he got aboard the Marlbrô fir'd one Gun which was agreed to be done if the Signall on the fore Shrouds in the evening was not a mistake.

A Letter from Cap'. Tolson's cheif Mate to him of this days date giving an Acco'. of the Storm is here under enter'd—

HEATHCOTE NOV". 15TH. 1721.

CAPT. TOLSON.

SE.

These are to inform you that the Ship has met with no further misfortune than the loss of the Long Boat and the parting of our small Bower Cable thô I must confess it is less than expected. It is impossible to relate the extremity of Weather we had, as to the Ships I cant tell further of them then that Ship to the Southward of St. Thoma I take to be yc. Marlbrô, the Dartmo. I see drive yesterday in the afternoon, the Weather coming on so thick saw no more of her, the King George I saw yesterday noon, the Brigantine we saw nothing of which impute to the thickness of the weather at that time but heartily wish they may be well which I much doubt, the King George she being a very pester'd Ship or indeed the rest I cannot see what they could do by going to Sea with the wind at N E & N E B E and such a grown sea.

The Honble. President recd. a Letter from Capt. Ellis[ton] on board the Marlbrô acquainting us She rode in [...] fathom water and that since 8 a Clock Tuesday morning [she] had seen neither of the other Ships but she had lost [4 an]chors & had only their Sheet Anchor left, but that they [h]ad one of the Companys stock't & desired Timber to stock a[no]ther and a large Cattamaran to carry their Anchors [out] to warp further off shore, The Presidt. forthwith sent them an Anchor of 25 weight ready stock't on a large Cattamaran according to their desire & they immediately got out in deeper water & now she is very safe.

Capt. Tolson also communicated to us a Letter that he recd. from his Mate as enterd hereafter, importing th[at] the Ship labour'd prodigiously during all that Hurricane which has forc'd all the Okham out of her upper works, that they rode almost under water which had damaged very much their Provisions, that their Sheet Cable & best bower were both rubb'd very much and the outward Cable to the best bower Anchor very bad, that she had workt down all the Cabins in the Steerage and the bulk head & broke all their hen coops to pieces.

Late at night the President rec^d. a Letter from Cap^{ts}. Elliston and Crossing 2 miles off Covelon importing they had met nothing like a Wreck in their way but a long Boat & David w^{ch}. they beleiv'd belong'd either to the Marlbrô or Heathcote.

Two letters from Cap^t. Tolsons cheif Mate to him of this days date are enterd hereafter.

This is to let you know the damage we have rec^d. more than what wrote you before, the Ship in the Gale labourd very much insomuch that she has spew'd all the Okham out of her Seams from the Water way to the toes of the Standard, as we rode almost und. water have had a great deal gone done below which has damag'd some bread and most part of the Stock fish have been forc'd to heave over board. We have also a very bad rub in the Sheet Cable about 10 fathom from the Splice and the like in the best bower w^{ch}. will be convenient to cut off if you think fit, being not fit to trust the Ship by if should meet with more bad weather (w^{ch}. God forbid the like again), the outward best bower looks very ragged & indifferent, the Ship has work't

A Letter from Cap^t. Elliston from Ship Marlbrô dated the 16th. Ins^t. in the morning read as enter'd in a particular book apart for this affair, also a Letter from Cap^{ts}. Edward Elliston and William Crossing dated at 3 a clock yesterday in the afternoon and rec^d. about 12, wth. is also enter'd in said book.

The President acquaints the Board that by Peons sent from hence he rec^d. advice about noon from the Cheif of Covelon that a Ship is drove ashore about 8 miles to the southward of said Place and y^t. 5 Chests and 20 Europeans are come ashore & seiz'd by the Moors but what Ship is stranded the Peons could not tell the name of.

AGREED that the Heathcote be forthwith order'd under sail to the wreck, that 20 Europeans and Cap^t. Sutherland be sent upon her to protect the wreck with 10 Lascars and ammunition as also 60 Spare Arms for the Ships Company with all other necessarys and as many Mussoolas as can be Spar'd together with such as we can borrow from S^t. Thoma. 14 Europeans are already at Covelon under command of Cap^{ts}. Elliston and Crossing, as also 20 Lascars.

AGREED that the President do from time to time dispatch assistance and give such orders as he shall find necessary to the Wreck without calling a Council which might delay time when the exigency of affairs will not allow it.

AGREED that Mr. John Lauder do go upon the Heathcote and keep an exact Accot. of what Goods may be sav'd belonging to the Company, that Capts. Tolson,

Elliston, Warden, Mr. John Lauder, Capt. Crossing & Lieutenant Sutherland do consider and debate from time to time the most necessary transactions for the security of the wreck and the Company's Effects advising us frequently thereof.

Cap^t. Joseph Tolson being sent for and acquainting the Board his Ship could not possibly get ready to sail before sunday morning it was then agreed y^t to Stay so long and not send further Assistance of Military force to Cap^{ts}. Elliston and Crossing to protect themselves and the wreck from any insults w^{ch} might be offer'd by the Moors might be of very ill consequence in relation to the Security of our People and the Wreck, wherefore the Board Resolv'd forthwith to send away four Mussoolas to their aid, Viz. one Mussoola wth. Lascars and the other three with Ensign Francis Rush, a Serjeant and 12 Europeans which together with what Cap^t. Elliston had before and what is order'd with Cap^t. Sutherland on the Heathcote we judge will be sufficient force to cover the Wrecks as the Heathcote will be of great countenance to them.

The Warehousek'. reports that He cannot open and examine the forty Chests of Treasure come on shore from the Dartmouth (twenty five of which are mark'd wth. the Companys mark & fifteen with the Bencoolen mark) for want of one of the Keys of the Warehouse which he had deliver'd to Capt. Elliston as customary till the Treasure is examin'd.

Concerning the twenty Chests of Treasure which remain'd in the Dartmouth the Board think fit to add, That Ship arriving the 2^d. Ins^t. at noon the next day 12 Boats with Gunners Buoys & Buoy ropes were sent for the Treasure, five of which return'd with 25 Chests, of the other 7 boats some could not reach the Ship and the rest so late they were return'd empty. From that day the Surf was too dangerous to send for the Treasure and the Boatmen refus'd to go till the 10th. when the Boats were overset in the surf. But the 11th. 7 boats were sent off to bring ashore the remainder, 3 return'd wth. 15 Chests, the other four did not reach the Ship before late at night and were therefore return'd empty. The 12th. & 13th. no Boats could be sent off, the Surf being too high and the Current without too strong, the 14th. was the Storm.

Rec^d. a letter from the Cheif of the Flemings at Covelon advising that an English Ship was stranded at Maubeliveram and that the People that we sent down were arr^d, there, that the Moors at his intercession treated them very well, let them have 2 Palanqueens & a horse to go to the Wreck & enquire news of the other that were missing, that they had secured all y^e. Sailors but upon the Cap^{ts}, request had releas'd them again & he assures us that the Moors will not in the least hinder but rather be assisting to us in this affair.

Soon after we rec^d one from Cap^t. Elliston dated the 16th at Covelon confirming the above Acco^t and acquainting us that it is the Dartmouth but that he has had no news of any ship else, he also mentions the civilitys rec^d from the Moors Governour.

One Letter from Cap^t. Tolson's cheif Mate about getting the Ship in a readiness to sail is as follows—

I recd. yours by the Cattamaran and will use all possible endeavours to get the Ship in order for sailing by two or three a Clock in the afternoon, the late Gale of Wind we have had has disorder'd & put most part of our rigging out of order which makes me something more tedious in the dispatch, I shall strike down all the Guns betwixt decks and in the Wast if not those in the Steerage.

Recd. a Letter from Capt. Elliston dated 8 a Clock yesterday morning a league 1824. to the Northward of Sadrass acquainting us that all he can see of the wreck is dry ashore but that nothing appears as yet of any consequence, he further tells us that there are about 100 Men down making enquirys about the Treasure & that some bags which the People brot ashore are seiz'd by the Phousdar of Covelon in order as he says to be secured for the Company, he further says he is apprehensive of the King George being lost for that he saw severall Pieces of Wreck drove ashore and White Men drowned and that he hears there's a Vessell ashore at Sadrass & that the Govern't there is taking care of Bale Goods, he desires severall tools and more

hands to break up the Ship.

About four a clock this morning the Heathcote set sail.

Recd. a Letter from Capt. Elliston advising of the arrivall of the Divers, Soldiers &c. that he feard the King George was lost having seen sevⁿ. Pieces of a Wreck ashore in his way down and that he hears there is a Wreck to the Southward of Sadrass which he beleives to be the George Brigantine, Capt. Crossing is gone down to see what it is and further hears that the Moors seem inclinable to mischeif but beleiv'd he was sufficiently provided for them.

At the same time the President recd. a Letter fro our Tappys in Jentues advising the Brigantine's being safe & a ship in distress a little below Sadrass.

At 7 this night recd. a Letter from Capt. Crossing advising that the King George was broke to pieces, their Masts, Yards and some Goods driven ashore and that in his way down he saw 4 white Men dead, That the Gov. of Sadrass had about 3 bales in his Custody & great quantitys of rattans & Canes were floating about. He further adds that the George Brigantine was safe 4 Leagues to the Southward of Sadrass but has damag'd all her Goods, lost her Mainmast and 6 Guns.

He desires a supply of Cordage and Masts upon web. he was order'd to Fort St. David, it being impossible to reach Madrass with Jury Masts at this time of ye. year.

At 9 answer'd Capt. Crossing's Letter ordering him to apply himself to Capt. Tolson for Cordage & Capt. Ellis ton for masts &ct. and to proceed to Fort St. David forthwith.

Wrote Mr. Willford to go along ashore and see what Goods were cast up by the Sea & to make all enquiry possible whether the Moors had carried any Goods in y. Country & to take all the care he could, in recovering any thing he might find belonging to the Company.

Wrote Capt. Joseph Tolson ordering him to furnish Capt. Crossing wth. Cordage & acquaint Capt. Elliston to supply him wth. Masts & Yards, and further order'd him to send 2 boats with 8 or 10 Soldiers to prevent Insults.

Rec^d. a letter from Cap^t. Elliston advising that the Brigantine was safe & the King George beat to pieces & also that M^t. Dunster &c^t. were arrived. We also

rec^d one from M^r. Dunster advising his arrivall and giving us hopes of saving some of the Goods provided he had Supplys in time, the Heathcote wth the 20 Military will we believe fully supply any such Necessitys that he may have occasion for and we cannot spare more from hence without too much weak^s the Garrison, he advises that the Moors have carry'd 11 Men & some bales up the Country, as to this we believe we have taken sufficient care having wrote to the Moors Government, advising them of this disaster & letting them know that we will certainly make reprizalls if they offer to Stop any of the Comp²⁵. Goods.

At 5 this evening rec^d. 3 Letters th[e] 1st. from Cap^t. Elliston advising the arrivall of the Heathcote & some Divers of whom they had not as yet made any use, dated the 19th. at 4 in the Afternoon.

The 2^d from Cap^t. Warden dated the same day at 6 a Clock advising of 11 People being sav^d out of the King George & sev¹¹. Bales woh, were all carried up the Country by the Moors but that with Assistance, he beleiv'd they could save what remain'd on the Strand.

The 3^d dated 2 hours after from M^r. Dunster confirming his former and advising that the Moors are removeing the Men and bales higher into the Country that one of the 11 Men is since dead and that two others were slaves that were design'd for S^t. Helena, he adds that he has wrote to the Gentlemen of Council at the Dartmouth's Wreck for assistance.

At 7 this evening rec^d. a Letter dated the 19th. Ins^t. 7 at night from the Gentlemen of Council at the Dartmouth's Wreck advising the arrivall of the Heathcote there, that Cap^{ts}. Tolson & Elliston went to view the Wreck & by what they can perceive they are in hopes her bottom is come ashore and they say they doubt not of giving us a good Acco^t. of some of the Treasure.

They also confirm the Acco^t, before rec^d. of the Loss of the King George and safety of the Brigantine.

This day at noon rec^d. a Letter from Cap^t. Tolson, M^r. Lauder & Lieuten^t. Sutherland inclosing copy of M^r. Dunster's letter to them, desiring a supply of Men w^{ch}. they write they had comply'd with, hav^s sent an Ensign, Serj^t. & 15 Men to his Assistance, they desire also ballast Shovells, baskets and more Provisions complaining that those put aboard by the Steward were but indifferent.

They confirm what before wrote of hoping to give a good Accot. of part of the Treasure & tell us that the Moors now seem inclinable to be easy & assisting but that they will be on their Guard for fear of a surprize.

Also rec^d. a letter from the Ostend Cheif at Covelon with complaints of the English gone down to the Wreck, that one of them ill us'd his black Servant.

At 7 in the evening recd. a letter from Mea Saheb ye. Moors Governour at Covelon advising the receipt of the Presides. Letter & that he will lend all the Assistance he can for the preservation of the Companys effects & that the Silver taken from the Sailors is seal'd up and secured till we have done our business at the Wreck & that then it should be deliver'd to our President's order.

At 8 this evening rec^d. a Letter from the Gentlemen at the Dartmos. Wreck dat^d. the 20th. Inst. at 5 in the evening adviseing that they had dispatch'd Ensign Francis Rush, a Corporall & 15 Men with 30 Peons in order to save all they could of the King George's Cargo and that they have sent down Capt. Crossing the Cordage wrote for, for the George Brigant, they desire more Tools having employ'd as many hands about the Wreck as they have instruments for and are still in hopes of saving something.

This morning at 8 a Clock we rec^d. a Letter from M^r. Willford dated the 20th. Ins^t. advising that he was then going to the Wreck to take care that nothing of the Comp^a. effects be embezled.

One from M^r. Dunster of the same date advising his having paid M^r. Willford 50 Pag^s. for his expences at the King George's Wreck mentioning the assistance

rec^d. from the Dartmouth & that Cap^t. Warden and M^r. Blackall are gone down with them to the Wreck, he adds that he designs to proceed with Cap^t. Crossing to Fort S^t. David to look after the damag'd Goods aboard the Brigantine.

Rec^d. a letter from Cap^t. Crossing dated the 20th. Ins^t. advising that he would immediately proceed to Fort S^t. David, that he has rec^d. some rigging from Cap^t. Tolson but wants a 5½ inch hawser, he hears she lost in the Storm one Suit of Sails, two topmasts & left her small bower Anchor in this road and that he has sent to Cap^t. Elliston for Masts & Yards, he adds that Ensign Rush with 15 Men from the Da[r]t-mouth's Wreck was arr^d. M^r. Willford, Cap^t. Warden & M^r. Blackall with 20 Peons from the President were gone to the King George's Wreck w^{ch}. he beleiv'd was sufficient to put a stop to the Moors Proceedings who had a Camp of near 400 Men that were daily sending Goods into the Country.

Att the same time rec^d. one from M^r. Boel the Duch Cheif at Sadrass advising that not above 100 Pag^s, value came ashore within their Territorys, that he had buried 11 Men that were cast dead upon the Shore & promises to do all in his power for the Service of the Hon^{ble}. Company.

At Noon we rec^d, a letter from Cap^t. Tolson &c^t. Gentlemen at the Dartm^{os}. Wreck dated yesterday 9 in the morning advising their having rec^d. a letter from Cap^t. Crossing informing them that Cap^t. Warden, M^r. Blackall and the Military were gone to the King George's Wreck and M^r. Willford would soon follow them and that he is going to Fort S^t. David, that the Moors have about 400 men at the Wreck and are daily carrying Goods into the Country but that they hope when our Peons get there the Moors will Stop their proceedings.

They repeat their request for Ballast shovells, & baskets in order to proceed on their work & desire a supply of Provisions, acknowledge the civility of the Cheif at Sadrass, but say that he cannot furnish them with what they want.

They have buried five Men that were found dead on shore & say there are more between Covelon and S^t. Thoma but the People they sent on this design could not pass the Bar, they further mention that one of the Mussoolas was stav'd as she was carrying Peons off to the Wreck.

Rec^d. a letter from Mier Saheb the Moors Govern^r. at Covelon promising all the assistance possible, acquainting that the Boat ferry'd the Europeans safe over the river, the Peons oversett but were all saved.

Also a letter from Alexander Sutherland advising Lieut. Fullerton of the posting his men, advantage of y. ground and form of the Camp before the Wreck of y. Dartmouth, also what Guns &c. he had and how disposed of, what personall assistance from Capt. Tolson, the health of his men & the civilitys of the Moors notwithstanding which he is strictly upon his guard being thoroughly acquainted with the latters treachery.

The Hon^{blo}. Presid^t. rec^d. a letter from Cap^t. Tolson &c^t. advising they had dispatch'd Ensign Rush with a Party to M^r. Willford, Cap^t. Warden &c^t. they sent them 2 Boats & they since desire more, also men, Tents and Guns w^{ch}. cannot be spared assuring the President they keep hard at work, they desire 4 horses, & renew their request of Ballast shovells & baskets, that they are employ'd in getting Masts &c^t. for the George Brigantine which they will make a raft of & send to Fort S^t. David.

Also a letter from M^r. Willford &c^t. advising of Ensign Rush's arrivall with 15 Men, that they saw some pieces of the King George's Wreck but no bales, the Moors hoisted a flag which they advaned towards, the Moors fled, the Gov^r. there sent to tell them he had 8 Sailors and if they would send Peons he wou'd deliver them.

At two a Clock this afternoon the Presid^t. sent an answer to the above Letters complying as near as possible with Cap^t. Tolson &c^{ts}. Demands & inclosing a Letter for their perusall to M^r. Willford &c^t. ordering them to return to the Dartm^{os}. wreck there being none of the Companys bales to be seen thereabout.

Honble, Sr. &c.

That I may clear my self from being answerable for the Goods belonging to Mr. James Morris for which judgment has been given against me in the Mayor's Court, I beg leave to lay before you the following orders rec^d. from the Gov^r. & Council of Fort S^t. George relating thereto and the proceedings of my self then Deputy Gov^r. and the Council of Fort Marlbrô in obedience to those orders, from whence I hope your Hon^r. &c^t. will be of opinion that the Hon^{ho}. Company can only be answerable for the unhappy Consequences that have Since attended our putting those orders in execution.

You will find that both M^r. Farmer and M^r. Morris were confin'd & their effects seiz'd upon by order of the Gov^r. & Council as & Extract of Fort S^t. George Consultation dated 50th. July 1718 sign'd by Joseph Collet, William Jennings, Richard Horden, John Legg, Randall Fowke, Nathaniel Turner & Richard Benyon which is at large recited in the first Paragraph of Fort S^t. George Generall Letter to Fort Marlbrô dated 21st. Oct^r. 1718, sign'd by Joseph Collet, William Jennings, Richard Horden, John Legg, Randall Fowke, Richard Benyon & John Emmerson with their Severall reasons for so doing which are too large to be incerted here wherefore I desire your Hon^r. &c^t. will be referr'd to said Consultation.

The second Paragraph of the Same Letter contains the following order.

"According to our agreement in the last Paragraph of the above recited Consultation We do hereby order you to confine Mess". Farmer and Morris for conspiracy agst. the Government of Fort St. George till you have an opportunity of sending them hither, We further order you to seize all their effects & to take them into the Honbie. Compy's. possession till their Accots. can be examin'd and [full] satisfaction be made to the Honbie. Company and to private Persons for Injurys done them.

In complyance with the aforesaid order it appears by Fort Marlbrô Consultations Dat^a. Nov^r. 17th. 171[5]

"That Mess¹⁵. Richard Farmer and James Morris be confined in proper 4 Apartments in the Fort & that Mess¹⁵. Newcome and Kington do see the Doors and 4 Windows of their Houses seal'd with the Company's Seal & lock'd till they have 4 time to take an Inventory of their effects.

In the same Consultations Nov. 2d. 1718 it is order'd

"That Mess". Newcome and Kington do immediately go to his house (Viz. the house of M^r. Morris) and in his presence take an Inventory of all his effects and that what loose things or perishable Goods he may have by him be sold at publick Outcry for the most they will yeild and that their produce be paid into the Honble. Company's Cash so that we may be able to send an Accot. thereof to Fort St. George P Ship Queen.

In the same Consultations Novr. 25th. 1718 It is enter'd

"Mess". Newcome and Kington having taken an Inventory of Mr. Morris "Effects &ct." But if that Inventory thrô the neglect of others has been omitted to be enter'd in the Consultation Book or to be sent hither I hope I shall not be judg'd to be answerable for those effects, thrô the omission of them whose proper business it was to do it, very probably the occasion of this omission might be the order for selling his effects at Outcry, which Outcry Account was remitted here, and contain'd his whole Inventory except the Chest of Cloth and some Books and Papers, mentioned therein, but since Mr. Morris has given me this trouble I have found the Originall Inventory wrote by Mr. Thomas Bayley who was then Mr. Kington's Assistant, which I herewith deliver for your perusall wherein is included, the particulars of this Chest of Cloth in which is remarkable there is two pieces less then Mr. Morris demanded, and I hope this may be esteem'd a Sufficient Accot. of said Goods thô: thrô hurry of business or the neglect of others it has been omitted to be sent hither with the other Accot. of Mr. Morris's Effects.

The Honble Company were advised of these our proceedings in our Letter of the 10th. January 1718/19 \$\P\$ Ship Benjamin & in the 26th. Parag of their Letter to Fort Marlbrô \$\P\$ Ship Hartford in answer to what wrote by the Benjamin they are so far from disapproving of the seizure that they order the Goods to be sold at Outcry or to allow the ()wners 3() \$\P\$ Cent on what already taken on their Acco*. but the place was unfortunately lost before the receipt of that Letter.

By what I have already offer'd it appears that I have acted only pursuant to the orders rec^d. from this Place and therefore hope your Hon. &c. will clear me from this Suit, that chest of Cloth being deliver'd into the Company's Wareh. where they remain'd when the Place was burnt, as by the acknowledgment of Mr. Stephen Newcome our then Warehousekeeper.

I now add some other proofs to invalidate the reason on which the Mayor's Court have grounded their judgment which is express'd as follows.

"Mr. Stephen Newcome one of the Bench & of Council with Mr. Cooke at the West Coast declares that the said Goods were brot to the place of publick Sale & sent back into the Warehouse by Mr. Cook's order that they might not prejudice the Sale of his own (as may very reasonably be Supposed) for it was not customary for any piece Goods to be sold but by the Gov. of this place who had then a quantity of the Same sort by him.

M^r. Newcome has since often told me that he did not make any such declaration or had he any Such meaning in what he said, but that his words were taken in a wrong Sense & that he did not know in what manner the order was worded, if he had he should have objected against it as he will declare to your Hon^r. &c^t. if sent for, (and without reflecting on the Court) it may as reasonably be Supposed that M^r. George Tullie Register, who was employ'd as Attorney against me did form that order to my greatest Prejudice.

In the latter part of the 9th. Paragraph of Fort Marlbros. Letter to Fort St. George dated 29th. Nov. 1718 P Ship Queen it will appear that other reasons are given for not selling those Goods at Outery wherein Tis said "That t'woul'd be very prejudiciall to the Company's affairs to dispose of them at Outery, about which we wait their orders" which Letter Mr. Newcome has sign'd being then of Council.

In the latter part of the 26th. Paragraph of Fort Marlbrô Letter to the Honble. Company dat. 10 Jan: 17[18/19] \$\overline{P}\$ Ship Benjamin the Same reasons are given wherein tis said, "That twould be a great prejudice to their trade to have them sold at Outery" which Letter is also sign'd by Mr. Newcome.

I desire you will likewise take notice that in our Consultation of the 22^d. Nov^r. 1718 It is order'd, "That only Mr. Morris's loose things and perishable Goods [be sold] at Outcry, which his piece Goods were not allow'd to be and were therefore sent back to the Company's Warehouse to be kept there.

I doubt not these reasons will appear Suffi[c^t.] & further I am ready to give upon oath if required that [I] never prevented the Sale of M^r. Morris's Goods at Outcry out of any private Interest of my own or would they have been any prejudice to the Sale of mine had they been s[old] there, but on the contrary I should have thought the Sa[le] of them an injustice done M^r. Morris and beleive all [im]—partiall judges would have been of the same opinion.

I therefore desire your Hon. &c. will take the premises into your serious Consideration, annull the Court judgment, and please to order M. Morris to repay me the excessive Charges he has put me to in prosecuting this affair in which you'll very much oblige

Generall Letter from the Dep^{ty}. Governour & Council of Fort S^t. David dated the 30th. Ult^c. rec^d. the 8th. Ins^t. read, acknowledging the receipt of ours dated the 16th. past wth. their Cash Acco^t. for last month, the Merchants Acco^{ts}. 3 Sets of Generall Books R. S. T. &c^t. papers which comes out right according to the List of the Pacquet and are deliver'd to the Accomptant to examine.

Generall Letter from the Presid^t. & Council of Bengall dated the 15th. Nov^r. (with a Pacquet for this Presidency which came to their hands \$\overline{P}\$ Ship Addison) read advising of Ships Stretham, Addison & Monmouth's arrivall at Rogue's river and that they design to send us the Monmouth, the beginning of this month with 300 bales, 2000 bags of Salt Petre &c^t. Stores for this Presidency, likewise that they will dispatch the Stretham & Addison directly from thence to England.

Kittee Timapa Son of Narrapa Narran his petition read in relation to a Cowle granted him by Gov^r. Pitt &c^a. Council in 1700, which was produced and read in Consultation and AGREED that he enjoy the Liberty therein granted conformable to the 35th. Paragraph of the Honble Company's Letter \$\psi\$ the Marlbrough, the said Petition is enter'd hereafter.

Nathaniel Elwick Esq^r. Mintmaster his Acco^t. for last month read, Ballance due from him Pag^s. 28. 13. 30 which he pays in.

The Accomptant reads the Journall Parcells for the month of October.

The Honble. Company having in their 36th. Parã of their Letter Ψ Heathcote order'd us to receive the Ballance of Mr. Henry Davy's Estate, into their Cash,

ORDER'D that the Secretary do acquaint Mr. Hastings Executor to the said Mr. Henry Davy therewith and demand the money and Accots. from him.

Our Honble. Masters having orderd that Mr. Draper late Secretary should repay the 5 \oplus Cent Commission charg'd by him on the estate of Mr. William Palmer Decd.

AGREED that the Secry. do demand it of him and pay it into Cash.

Mr. Francis Hastings late President desires leave to go home on the Marlbrô (as Phis Petition enterd after this Consultation) which is granted beleiving the Security we have on the Honble. Compas. Accot. more than Sufficient to answer their demands, the very ill State of health he is in and the little likelyhood of his life if

he continues here being sufficient motives thereto. We have also permitted his Servant Thomas Newton to go with him, he being as Mr. Hastings says a very usefull Servant to him and has long since serv'd his time to the Hon^{ble}. Company.

M^r. Draper having been acquainted with the Company's orders for his going home, desires leave to take his Passage on the Marlbrô which is granted.

Mr. Morris having been acquainted wth. Mr. Thomas Cooke's petition of Appeal and permitted to overlook it, delivers in a reply thereto, which is enterd after this Consultation, and a pretty long debate arising after our perusall thereof it was at last,

AGREED that it was a case not determinable in the Mayor's Court, but that Mr. Thomas Cooke acted in that affair by a proper authority and is not accountable to any but the Honble. Company for his proceedings therein, It is also further AGREED that Mr. Morris have credit given him (for the bale of Goods lost with the advance allow'd by the Honble. Company) in the Gen¹¹. Books.

M^r. Cooke being ask't if he had any books or Papers belonging to M^r. Morris, reply'd that he had a bag of old Westcoast Papers but does not know that any of them belong'd to M^r. Morris, which papers he is order'd to deliver to the Secretary who is to deliver to M^r. Morris what should be found amongst them belonging to him.

Mess¹⁵. Thomas Cooke, Randall Fowke and Joshua Draper pay into Cash the Ballance of M². Thomas Jenkinson's Estate, in their hands being Pag⁵. 1042. 9. 78.

Mr. Thomas Cooke late Paymaster pays into Cash the neat proceed of Nicholas Goodwin's Estate being Pag. 80. 10. 30 as also the neat proceed of John Blagg's P. fa. Ca.

Estate 6. 7. 60 he likewise delivers in the Accot. Sales of the said Estate.

Mess¹³. Cooke, Fowke and Draper deliver in the Books and papers belonging to the Estate of M¹. Thomas Jenkinson which M¹. George Drake last of Council is appointed to take care of and recover any thing that may be s[ta]nding out.

Rausum Paupa Braminy being call'd in and the Paddy Feilds Cowle produced which he accepted of and it was AGREED in Consideration for his taking the said Farm at so great a rent, that he be allow'd to wear a roundell, at the Same time his Indentures as Cheif Dubash and Braminy were interchangeably sign'd.

The President acquaints the Board that M^r. Jennings has desired a fourth Bill of Exchange for and on Acco^t. of the three thousand Pagodas for which he had first second & third Bills of Exchange deliver'd him by M^r. Hastings &c^t. Council dated the 2^d. of Oct^r. payable to Edward Harrison Esq^r. or order, one of the said three bills being lost upon the King George.

AGREED that M^r. Jennings's request be granted and a fourth Bill be drawn out and sign'd by this Board and that our Hon^{ble}. Masters be advis'd thereof in the Generall Letter.

Order'd that the Warehousekeeper do send one hundred Tons of redwood to the Bay when opportunity admits agreeable to their desire.

The Sec^{ry}. acquaints the Board that pursuant to the President & Council's ord^r. the 27th. Ulto. he wth. M^r. Walsh examin'd the Chest of Bencoolen Papers wth. was cast ashore from the K. Geo: Wreck's. & found nothing therein belongs. to the Hon^{blo}. Company but one pair of old Westcoast Gen¹¹. Books for the year 1712 wth. he sent to the Accomp^{ts}. Office & some Papers of M^r. Walsh's which he deliver'd him.

Comp. Yor. Petitioner's Father enjoy'd the Same to the time of his death but Governour Collet forbad your Petitioner's hav. the Liberty in his time which being contrary to the meaning of the said Cowle he humbly hopes your Hon. &c. will permit him the priviledge therein design'd and your Petitioner as in duty bound

HONBLE. SR. &CT.

Having thrô the goodness & justice of the Hon^{ble}. Presid^t. the liberty of inspecting M^r. Cooke's declaration given in answer to the Courts judgment the last Consultation (which with the greatest respect & thankfullness I shall always Acknowledge) I make bold to offer a few particulars in answer thereto being in duty bound to endeavour in some measure to vindicate the proceedings of the Worspil. Mayor & Aldermen, in the signall piece of Justice they were pleased to do me against the sd. M^r. Thos. Cooke, as likewise to lay before this Hon^{ble}. Board the invalidity of M^r. Cooke's arguing whereby your Hon^r. & Council may be apprized of no more then real Fact and thereby come the nearer to the truth to pass judgment thereon Viz.

I cannot but wonder Mr. Cooke should trouble your Honr. &ct. with so many citations of paragraphs of orders & Consultations with the Gentlemens names at length that sign'd them, since I never questioned the authority or extent of his power but always thought it as full as possible and only sought justice in the usual course of Law for my Goods which he had not brought to Acco. after Mr. Cooke's refusall of accomodating the matter otherwise as I acquainted the Honble. Preside. by showing the Letter I wrote him (a Copy of which accompany's this) neither do I beleive (thô it seems to be levell'd that way) that it can have any effect or byass with this Honble. Board in the execution of justice [of whose] integrity and Goodness I am so thoroughly convinc'd that I earnestly wish my whole affair was brought as near a period, that an end might be put to almost four years misery and affliction in wch. Mr. Cooke has been the cheif instrument of my Sufferings by the forceable extention of that authority, neither do I know that his orders were ever questioned in Court excepting that I told him once I beleiv'd he could not produce any order for taking my Goods away without bringing them to Accot. for weh. reason I humbly conceive they might as well have been let alone being foreighn from the present matter, without the intention was by the multiplicity of words to cover the truth. However as Mr. Cooke has been pleased to rub an old sore I cant help saying that there is hardly any particular he can touch on that I have not been a Sufferer by, and his 2d. Paragraph particularly reminds me that before the receipt of that order made in Consultation the 30th. July 17[18] & recd. the 21st. Octr. following I was imprison'd 53 hours almost in the dark thô at that time very ill, my papers all search'd even to my private Letters & most of them taken away and when I complain'd of such usage the Ensign was order'd to search the inside of my Breeches weh, was done in a very indifferent rude manner. Mess's. Richard Farmer, Lewis Deane, George Willey (thô his Arm was broke), James Rawlins & I think Henry Bailey were likewise confin'd and their Papers search'd, as being suspected for being my friends & all this undr. the pretence of searching for a letter Book thô at the same time it was dd. up (to the truth of this I am ready to take my oath if required), now as I look'd on this as a Company's Affair I did not bring it in accusation against Mr. Cooke in Court for damage, referring it to another time, but since he so strenuously insists on the aforesaid orders to set aside the just determination of the Worspin. Mayor & Aldermen I make my humble and earnest request to your Hon. & the rest of the worthy members of this Board that Mr. Cooke may be obliged to produce his orders from this place for those unwarrantable & unjust proceedings, for I hope it will not be esteem'd a sufficient reason for such illegality that Mr. Cooke order'd it should be so, wherefore if Mr. Cooke cannot produce such an order to indemnify him he must be accountable as being you prime Agent, & as I doubt not to meet with ample satisfaction from this happy change of Affairs I hope to see the same measure dealt to him as he gave to others by the searching whose papers I doubt not to recover my Joint Books wth. Ellill & Rawlins as well as severall other material Papers which are still wanting as likewise that the sd. Mr. Cooke by your Honr. &ces. determination may be oblig'd to make me such satisfaction as the Law allows for false imprisonment & the like abuses.

By the 6th Parag. Mr. Cooke seems desirous to throw the crime on other persons whom he does not think fit to name, but one may reasonably beleive whom he aims at that it can be nothing less than a dead Person that he would lay it on who is non capacitated to answer for himself. I think my self particularly obliged to Mr. Cooke for refreshing his memory after so wonderfull a manner for when this business was first brot in question, he knew nothing of the matter, but now thanks be prais'd he acknowledges I had a Chest of Cloth, but Secry. Palmer who thrô his neglect dy'd in [de]bt, must be answerable because it was not enter'd in Consultation, I humbly ask your Honrs. &ct. Gentlemen's pardon herein that I think this such a wonderfull discovery that can't help believing it to be the product of more heads than one, to fix the fault on a dead man deficient in all respects to make satisfaction, I doubt not your Honr. &ct. will see thrô these thin disguises & not allow them to draw of the due demerits from the just offender, I am very certain Mr. Cooke knew Mr. Palmer to be a person unqualify'd for any trust as appear'd after his arrivall here whereby Mr. Cooke was doubly to blame, if he trusted to his making up the Consultations and is not all excusable thereby, for I Should be glad to know what Mr. Cooke's station required of him if it was to see the Honble. Company's affairs transacted in a just & regular method as well as order the doing it. I remember in the Honble. Company's Letter & Ship Benjamin, "They say it is not sufficient for "the Depty. Govern. & Council to discharge their duty faithfully but they are obliged "to see that all others under them do the same" (or words to that effect) we intirely cuts of Mr. Cooke's Excuse, for if the Secry. did not do his duty whose fault was it, why was he intrusted when known incapable & why not better look'd after, I know Gov. Collet never trusted him with any thing but what was continually under his own Inspection, & if the Honble. Company approv'd my Suspension and the Sale of my Goods they never could of selling them at under rates, as 50 \$\psi\$ Cent less than prime cost, instead of 30 \$\pi\$ Cent advance thereon as some of mine were sold (Capt. Lestleys Sale is an Instance), besides all this is nothing to the purpose, for Mr. Cooke acknowledges there was such goods & that they were not sold but put in the Honble. Companys Warehouse for such a reason as he has given that it would be a prejudice to the Honble. Company's affairs to sell one and a half corge of fine Goods we'h. ye. Compa. had none of by Outcry web. is the weakest as well as ye. falsest evasion imaginable, that so small a quantity of Goods in case the Company deal't in such sorts (wen. I know they did not) should prejudice their affairs, was not Mr. Cooke & his Council there to buy them for the Company web. would have hinder'd them from falling into the hands of the Malays to hinder ye. Compas. Sales. But as it is plain that could not be ye. reason for as the Warehousekrs. Accot. for Mr. Cooke's time will shew the great Sale there was made of the Compas. Wares for ready money, weh. (I humbly beg of your &c*. may be produc'd & examin'd) it will be found this is no more then a pretence instead of a reason & if Mr. Newcome thrô inadvertency stumbled into the truth, as he rea[lly] did before sufficient Wittness I cant see why. he shou'd be [bl]am'd & as Mr. Cooke acknowledges the Goods were in the Compas. Warehouse when they left the Place (or else they could not be burnt) why did he not secure them as well as his own, he could send off 15 bales & Bundles of his own Goods 2 or 3 days before under the pretence of a consignment to Bentall as well as 3000 Dollar Worth of Plate, money, & Apparell (as he wrote Mr. Hubbard), this particular I humbly beg your Hon. &ct. will be pleased to inquire into, for setting the former evasions and excuses of Mr. Cooke's aside, & allowing that he had made these Goods the Compas. why did he not use the Same care & precaution, in saving them as his own, I think it very plain & I doubt not your Hon. &c. will think it equally feazible & therefore Mr. Cooke must be answerable alone for it is very reasonable to ask why they were not sav'd as so many other things (it may be of less value) having 3 days time for so doing before it was thought fit to go off, if the truth was to appear barefac'd I don't beleive it wou'd be found unreasonable to beleive or improbable that those Goods might not be safe tho they never came the I doubt not thro your Hon. &cts. inspection into this affair you length of Madrass. will find such reasons for this which it is the earnest endeavour as well as the

Interest of some Persons to conceal w^{ch}. will wholly unravell this business, else what should be the meaning of that mysterious term (under a pretence of a consignment to Bentall) 2 or 3 days before leaving the Place, what occasion was there of a pretence if there was not an intention depending, however I leave that to your Hon^r. &c^{as}. enquiry & only make bold humbly to recommend these things to y^r. goodness and consideration as well as to determine whether fine piece Goods such as Morees and Beteelas are not more perishable & liable to damage than the major part of the Goods that were sold at Outcry a copy of w^{ch}. Acco^t. comes accompanying.

Before I conclude I shall make bold to say something in respect to the transactions in Court in answer to Mr. Cooke's reflection, for it does not wholly light on Mr. Tullie but slants on all the Gentlemen therein concern'd, for Mr. Cooke must either accuse them of injustice or indiscretion to pass an indiscreet judgment without due examination, & consideration, but if Mr. Cooke will give himself leave to recollect the severall passages without passion or self Interest he must remember with how much care & just caution that Gentleman who so worthily fills the [Cha_ir examin'd into the merits of the cause even in ye. nicest particulars before he came to a determination (which whi[le] honest Men live will still redound to his reputation) notwithstanding the malicious blasts of Persons whose being and Support in a manner depends on perverting justice & deferring what they so much dread weh. I am sorry I can't help saying I believe to be M'. Cooke's case who is desirous as much as possible after acting so much injustice to put the evill day as far from him as he can. Wherefore I shall conclude wth. asking your Hon. &ct. Gentlemen's pardon for all freedom I have been forc'd to make use of on this Accot and humbly submit the whole to y'. Hon'. &c's. Consideration, justice & Goodness & humbly hope as I have made no other demand on M'. Cooke then what by his own confession is just & right (it being allow'd by him I had such Goods & that they were not brot. to Accot.) & the Worsp¹¹. Mayor & Aldermen havs. after all due examination wth. the greatest care, caution & justice pronouc'd judgment thereon as aforesaid, that y'. Hon'. &c'. Gentlemen will be pleas'd to confirm the Court judgment and likewise consider me as to allowing me land Interest on y°. same for the time I have been out of said money being allow'd but 25 \$\psi\$ Ct. & the H. Comp°. directing 30 to be paid for such Goods (as \$\psi\$ 7th. Para of Mr. Cooke's declaration aforesd.) & on non complyance therewth. to grant me execution thereon as well as for y^e, damage I charge him wth. for severe imprisonment before orders arr^d, for so doing w^{ch}, will not only be of the utmost consequence to your injur'd Complainant but I hope will likewise carry an eternall reward of happyness wth. it, both here & hereafter as the Ministers of Justice that have not bor'n the Sword in vain but administred justice & assistance to the afflicted & oppressed & particularly to

Poncala Kisna Tobacco Farmer pays into Cash Pag^s. 583. 12 for last month's rent of that Farm and Pag^s. 136. 24 for two month's rent of the measuring duty end^s. the 20th. Instant.

James Hubbard Storekeeper being appointed Supravisor for the West Coast delivers over his Storekeeper's Accot. Remains to Mr. Fowke (he being order'd Provisionall Storekeeper, and to take charge thereof in his absence) copy of which is enter'd in a Book kept by the Accomptant for that purpose and interchangeably sign'd.

Capt. Edward Elliston, George Saunders and David Murray pursuant to order of last Consultation deliver in their report of the condition they find the Ship Marlbrô upon taking a Survey of her which is enter'd after this Consultation.

ORDER'D that the Warehousekeep^r. begin to lade Bales as soon as possible and that the Cap^t. be acquainted therewith.

ORDER'D that 15000 Pags. be paid Suncha Ramah's Sett of Merchants Acco. the running Contract, and that 10000 Pags. be paid Gongaram & Tombee Chitty's Set of Merchants Acco. their running Contract.

ORDER'D that the Warehousek^r. do deliver Suncha Ramah for Meah Sahib four Dolrs. Chests of Silver at the rate of $14\frac{1}{4}$ \circlearrowleft 10 Pagodas he promising payment of the Same.

ORDER'D that the 20,000 Pagodas w^{ch}. were formerly design'd to be sent overland to Fort S^t. David be sent upon the Martha Brigantine Ignacio Pacheco Mas[t^r.] which is AGRERD to be freighted for the sum of fifty Pagodas and that M^r. James Hubbard &c^t. Gentlemen design'd for the West Coast do go upon her, as also the four Chests of Mexico Dollars order'd in last Consultation for the use of the West Coast which are to be shipp'd on the George Brigantine now at Fort S^t. David and on which M^r. Hubbard with the rest of the Gentlemen are to embarque for the West Coast.

A CHARGE against M². PYKE read & approv'd a copy whereof is order'd to be sent to the West Coast as enter'd after this Consultation.

M^R. Cooke's Petition for leave to go to England read, enter'd and granted accordingly.

All gentle means having fail'd for the recovery of the Men and Bales from the King George's Wreck we were oblig'd to order Mr. Lauder & Lieutenant Sutherland to use force if the Moors would not comply with our demand. The Heathcote, it being late in the Season, we order'd to make the best of her way for Madrass and sent the Lusitania a Ship of about nine hundred Tons to the Dartmouth's Wreck in order to take in the Men, and Stores and fall down to the Southward where the King George was lost and there land them. In pursuance of which order they march'd against Chyore and on Wednesday morning last we reed, a Letter from the Camp acquainting us that they had been necessitated to attack Dindar Cawn and that He with severall others were burn'd in a house where all the Bales were, but that they had deliver'd the People belonging to the King George and finding the Town deserted they set it on fire and march'd for Sadrass having taken ten prisoners and 6 Horses which they were bringing with them. On this advice we thot proper to order Lieut. Wilson with 50 Men to march in order to Support Lieut. Sutherland in case the Moors from Chyore shou'd rally or any others in the Country should rise upon them, the two Partys joyn'd on Wednesday night at Ball Chittys Choultry a place about 18 miles from hence and proposd to be here in the Evening.

ORDERD that Suncha Ramah be pd. 1307 23. 65 ballance of his Fort St. David contract dated March 30th. 1720 wch. Accot. was reported the 11th. Sepr. last but the money omitted to be paid.

Company for security of my debt, Besides which Assignment you have a note und^r, his hand that he will be accountable for all the silver sold w^{ch}, note alone renders his whole Estate answerable for the Same and as a further security you will have the overplus of his Assignment to you for his deficiency in the Cash, my debt is very considerably lessen'd already and in all probability y^c. Security will become five times the amount of the remainder of the debt in less than two months more, if the Shipping arrive as are daily expected and your Hon^r, &c^t having granted M^r. Hastings himself (before his decease) Liberty to go for England, I hope you will not detain me here on Account of my debt to the Company for which you have so large a Security; I likewise desire your Hon^r. &c^t will order your Accomptant (after this debt is discharg'd) to give a Certificate to my Attorneys that I do not stand indebted to the Hon^{ble}. Company on their Generall Books; In which you will very much oblige

ARTICLES OF CHARGE EXHIBITED BY THE HONOURABLE NATHANIEL ELWICK ESQ².

PRESIDENT & GOVERNOUR OF FORT S². GEORGE & FORT S³. DAVID & THE WEST COAST OF SUMATRA &0. COUNCIL AGAINST ISAAC PYKE ESQ³. DEPUTY GOVERNOUR FOR THE HON^{BLE}. COMPANY'S AFFAIRS ON THE WEST COAST FOR BREACH OF ORDERS AND OTHER INDIRECT MANAGEMENT.

1. That the said Isaac Pyke has unwarrantably enter'd upon a design of flinging off all subordinacy to this Presidency & has assum'd to himself a power of acting at the West Coast in defiance & contempt of our authority and contrary to the orders he hath recd. from the Honble. Company this very year in their Letter by the Goodfellow, that he has gloss'd over & evaded the meaning of the orders therein and the better to do this he has alter'd y°. words of the Letter from the Honble. Court of

Directors in the Copy he Sent us of it in his Consultation Book, that in pursuance of this design he has by Letters to his Subordinates endeavoured to Spirit them up and engage them in the same evill intentions with himself & severely & unjustly dealt with those who offer'd to oppose him in his unjustifiable proceedings & that in further pursuance of this design he has assum'd to himself a power of admitting people to the Service without the least Liberty granted him for so doing.

This article is fully prov'd in that he writes to Moco Moco (Copy of web. Letter is enter'd in his Consultation of the 22d, of May last) that the Company have appointed him Gov. & that if any should be sent over him from hence they shou'd be sent back again, whereas the Company only say that if Mr. Pyke be at the West Coast & any one should have been sent over him they should return back web. could not be with any justice interpreted to mean those who should hereafter be sent thither which he himself seems sensible of and has therefore in the copy of the Good fellow's Letter in his Consultation Book sent us alter'd the words "should have been" to "should be" thereby as t'is reasonable to suppose endeavours, to prevent our sending any one to inspect into his management, his ill usage of those who oppos'd him is plain from Mr. Shelley's Letter to the late Presidt. wherein he complains of the ill usage he has met with & that whenever he offers to Speak about the Company's affairs he is insulted & abus'd with scandalous Language and his taking People into the Service appears from Mr. Chattaliers being admitted to Council and from the 9th. Paragraph of his Letter where it is said he offer'd two young Gentlemen belonging to the Shipping to make them Factors but that they refus'd to accept it on Accot. of the sicklyness of the Place.

- 2^d. That he detain'd the Addison three months & the Dartmouth four months at the West Coast without any the least occasion for them & for no other reason but to conceal his actions from us the longer & then dispatch'd the latter to us in the very worst time of the year whereas had she been dispatch'd thence in July she might have been here time enough to go for Europe before her demorage commenc'd.
- 3d. That in pursuance of the same design of concealing his Actions from us he detain'd the Metchlepatam, Young Derby and Goodfellow as Guard Ships thô as he himself confesses t'was then a time of full peace & consequently he could have no need of them.
- Ath. That notwithstanding he had these three Vessells there he sent the Perry Brigantine belonging to himself on a Voyage to Batavia to purchase Stores on the Compas. Accot and paid out of their Cash 400 Dollars promoth for her freight demorage which Stores they could not be so much in need of as not to wait the return of the Derby from Moco Moco or the Metchlepatam from Sillebar which last Place is but four or five Leagues off or if those two Vessels could not be Spard they might have waited till the Good fellow was unladen & these are all the reasons given in his Consultation of the 18th. May for entertaining her or rather continuing her in the Service he having before paid 1200 Dollars for Jan: Feb: & Mar: the we cannot find that She did any Service for it.
- 5th. That he hath extravagantly squander'd away the Honble. Compas. money in Salary, diet & allowances more than were ever before made & exceeding those approv'd of & appointed by the Company.
- 1st. This appears from his continuing all Mr. Chataliers allowances for diet &ct. when on the Voyage to Batavia notwithstanding he charg'd 5 \$\overline{C}\$ Ct. Commission on the Investment besides 223.24 for charges Merchandize under which we may reasonably believe his Expences on Shore were included.
- 20th. July, 300 £s. # annum as Depty. Govern. & in the Paymasters Accot. monthly 33. 1. 33 as Capt. of the Military web. makes 100 £s. more # an. whereas the Comp. allow but 100 £s. as Depty. Gov. & 100 £s. as Capt. of the Military.
- 3^{dly}. He allow'd M^r. Shelley 30 Dollars \$\Psi\$ m^o. & his wife 15 for diet whereas the establishment approv'd by the Comp^s. is but 25.

4^{thly}. He charges for his own diet 300 Dollars \$\Psi\$ m°. wch. allow'd by the Company is but 190.

5^{thly}. That he allows the Europe Cap^{ts}. 30 Dollars & m°. diet thô he insists on the 300 himself because he is oblig'd to keep a table for them and the better sort of Strangers.

6^{thly}. He charges 9 Dollars \$\vec{P}\$ m°. for table linnen w^{ch}. ought not to be allow'd as he receives diet money.

Besides many other things too large here to enumerate.

These & some other extravagant allowances for diet are continued in the Paymaster's Accots. for May and June thô the Compss. Letter by the Goodfellow was recd. wherein the Sums to be allowed every one are particularly express'd.

6. That he has increased the number of Military Officers to a much higher degree than ever were known before by which means the Company's expences are very considerably augmented.

This appears by the Paymasters Acco^{ts}. for May and June where we find charg'd 4 Lieutenants & we have reason to believe there is one more at Moco Moco since we find M^r. Cartwright set down in the Sick list as a Lieuten^t. thô by the Comp^{as}. Letter it does not appear than any more than one Viz. Lieut^t. Jeddere was sent from England & only Lieut^t. Nangle from hence, in the Paymasters Acco^{ts}. for June he charges 120 Dollars for 5 months pay for an Engineer without naming him when there was none sent either from hence or England in that Station.

Another Instance of the truth of this allegation is y^t, in the same Paymaster's Acco^t, he charges two Gunners at 20 Dollars each & 5 Gunners Mates at 10 Dollars whereas there never us'd to be more than 1 Gunner at 20 and 1 Mate at ten.

7. That he in direct Contradiction to the Comp^{as}. orders has paid the Buggueze Soldiers & Cooleys & for Materials for Buildings with Cloth at very extravagant rates by w^{ch}. means the Comp^a. expence is very much increas'd.

That he hath been very lavish in his Presents to the Country People & the Goods so presented are excessively overrated whereas the Company order no presents shall be made but in their own Goods & if they have none by them the Presents shall be deferr'd till Supplys come from Fort S^t. George.

The same overate appears in his cloathing the Slaves with his own Goods w^{ch}. the Comp^a. have in all their Letters for these 3 or four years particularly forbid.

The truth of the allegation in the first part of this Article is plainly seen by his own Letter to us \$\psi\$ Dartm. The second relating to presents to the Country People & overcharges of the Goods by the Paymasters Accots. for January, February & March where he gives away to the amount of 2351 Dollars besides 522 before given away in the month of Decr. Damasks are charg'd at 30 Dollrs. Ginghams at 8, Surat Chints at 4, embroider'd Sattin at 80 \$\psi\$ piece, Taffitys Bengall 1st. Sort at 10, 2d. Sort at 8, Gold Chints 30, these are all at double what they could cost and the other articles are in proportion.

As to the third particular he charges as Paymast¹⁸. Acco¹⁸. for Jan: Feb: & March 245 Dollars for cloathing of 62 Slaves most of which is Cambays at 50 Dollars Pag¹⁸. Corge whereas those sent from hence by the Metchlepatam are invoic'd at but Pag¹⁸. 7. 13. 40. which is about one fifth part of what he has charg'd.

That notwithstanding the Company have often forbid the buying Stores out of Country Ships at extravagant rates yet the said Isaac Pyke has severall times been guilty of that fault, in particular in the month of December 1720 he bought a parcell of Stores to the amount of 5502 Dollars of which 3707 are for Stores &ct. out of the Perry and Derby wherein he charges for 28 Casks of pork 1680 Dollrs. which 28 Casks we are very well inform'd did not cost him 500 rupees in Bengall, so that on

this he gains above 650 \$\P\$ Cent, Gue 14 Jars 210 Dollars, which in Bengall seldom costs more than 9 rupees \$\P\$ jar, Fine rice 200 bags at 3 Dollars \$\P\$ bag the Curr*. price whereof is generally about one rupee Madrass \$\P\$ bag which is about 500 \$\P\$ c*. advance, Wheat 75 bags at 5 Dollars which generally stands in Bengall at about \$1\frac{1}{2}\$ rup*. a bag, Fine Wax Candles at 30 Dollars \$\P\$ maund without saying whether Madrass or Bengall Maunds, if the former he makes about 400 \$\P\$ Cent, if the latter about 100, Gunnys 25 Corge at 3 Dollars \$\P\$ Corge which cannot cost him above 5 Doll*. \$\P\$ 100 in Bengall so that he by this gets 200 \$\P\$ Cent.

The just reason I have to hope for redress of my [Sufferings] thrô the happy turn of Affairs have met wish in the change of Governmt. by the Care Providence has shown in putting it into such hands whose goodness & justice I am so well assured of, occasions my laying the following particulars before you wherein I have been so great a sufferer thrô the oppression of M'. Cooke who contrary to all justice seiz'd my Person & Goods [before] any orders could arrive for so doing from hence to the amount of Dollars 5385 on pretence of making a fresh dividend of my Goods between Mr Shyllinge and my self, alledging that [I] had taken most of the course Goods to my own use and gi ven Mr. Shyllinge most of the fine for web. I then told Mr. Cooke I had Done no more than what was agreeable to our Contract of p[artn]ership that whoever made the first breach in said Cov[enants] should forfeit y. Sum of 4000 Dollars and on a dividend of the Goods the party wrong'd should take those Sorts he brot into joynt Stock, Now as my Goods that I brot from Fort S'. George were most [of] them course & fit for the Market and Mr. Shylli nge's most of] them fine & not vendible having lain in the [Godowns] there for many years, I humbly hope your Hon. [&ct. will] esteem my case to be very hard to be

oblig'd contrary to the agreement to take his old fine Goods for my new Course [goods] web, were a great deal better for the market and as I trusted the whole management of this joint affair to him till his Suspension, I then found he had wrong'd me in a considerable Sum which besides my self can be prov'd by M^r. Deane who kept my Acco¹⁸, and M^r. Bayley who are now at yⁿ. West Coast, by this means M^r. Shyllinge broke the agreement & as I have sent his Bonds to England to presecute, him there at Law for the Same I shall not trouble your Hon^r. &c¹, therewith.

On the 17th. Nov. 1718 Mr. Cooke orderd a seizure of all my Goods & Effects of every kind that was remaining which was put in execution soon after my household Goods were put to Outery where most of the things were sold at an under rate, especially my Marble tables with gilded and lacquer'd frames, my Chair or Sedan which when I went to the West Coast, cost me Pagodas 15 to Mr. Oadham and afterwards making 3 [Glass sashes] with lacquering and gilding stood [me] in about 50 Dollars which Sum Mrs. Ballett offer'd to give me before t'was put to Outcry but not having the Liberty to dispose of it she orderd Mr. Busfeild or Mr. Bayley to bid to that Sum but alledging that Mr. Cooke bid for it they dard not advance upon him, so he bought it for 15 Dollars, my house call'd the Hermitage for weh. I gave Mr. Shyllinge 800 Dollars was s ld for 450, the difference thereon being 320 Dollars I presume he ought to be answerable for the Same, I likewise Sustain'd a very great loss by leakage of severall Casks of Arrack by Mr. Cooke's sealing up my Godowns for which I was forc'd to make satisfaction to the Chinaman. I had also 5 Chests of Palm Wine about which Mr. Cooke Sent me word in case I would dispose of them to him for Dollars 7 P Dozn. and let Capt. Martin Commr. of the Queen have all my Arrack at prime Cost, which was Dollars 32 \$\psi\$ Leaguer for above 40 Leaguers both should not be enter'd in the Inventory of [my] Goods which I was necessitated to do, not having wherewithall to pay my debts, tho: Mr. Cooke took from [me] in ready money and what he recd. before my com[ing] away near 5000 Dollars but not one would he allow [me], this I humbly conceive shows the unjustness of Mr. Cookes proceedings for If I merited to have my Goods [&ct. seiz'd] on for the Company's Acco. why should these particulars be more excusable than the rest, but is plain Mr. Cooke was to be a gainer by them wch. was sufficient at that time for any injustice, therefore I humbly hope yr. Honr. &c. will take the just demerits of this fact under your Consideration and order the just delinquent to receive his due reward.

When Mr. Cooke was making my Outery he sent Mr. Newcome to me to demand a parcell of Garden seeds web. Capt. Browne sent me from the Cape. I told Mr. Newcome that I desired to be excus'd the delivery of them by reason I was then a dividing of them and that I design'd a share of them as to each sort for Mr. Cooke and the rest to be divided among the Italian Padrees & others that I had promised, but Mr. Newcome soon return'd with severall Coffree Slaves to bring them away by

force which was done accordingly and the Seeds sold at Outery for 2. 2 on Mr. Newcome's telling Mr. Cooke that I did not care to deliver the Garden Seeds when sent for, he was heard by severall to say in an insulting manner that he had orders to seize on all my estate and as the seeds were part of it, so he would not be obliged to me for them but seize on them by force according to his Will and pleasure, there are many more such like Instances which I could enumerate in Sundry barbarous disgraces & treatment[s] relating to my confinement as well as fixing Papers at the Severall Gates of Fort Marlbrô against me & searching & taking away the most inateriall Papers I had by me which are not returnd (nor like to be) to this very day, but fearing to be esteem'd troublesome I shall at present say no more on those Subjects but intirely leave them to be determin'd in another Place.

Sometime before my Goods were seiz'd on Mr Cooke came to my house at the Hermitage alone by himself where he stay'd pretty late, among other discourse that happen'd he then offer'd to buy my piece Goods of me if I would sell them for 12 or 14 P Cent, profit or thereabouts but that being too low a price for what I could sell them we came to no agreement, which I beleive to be the true reason that he afterwards set so low a value on them which in some particulars were above 700 P Ct. and in others from above 100 to 70: 60 & 50 P Cent less than prime Cost, this

oppression I humbly hope your Hon. &c. will please to consider me in and grant me justice against said M. Thomas Cooke whom I hope will be esteem'd the Person answerable for said under Charge for tis plain would I have sold them to him it would not have been so and had I had the Liberty of selling them to the Malays they would have yeilded a great deal more as \$\varphi\$ the accompanying Account.

About the middle of October 1719, Mr. Jennings brought me an account current, as also Mr. Cooke's account of my goods, with their prices & quantitys, which are very erroneous in both, 'tis probable this might happen thrô the neglect of Mr. Cooke, by thinking I had no account of my own goods, but he will find to the Contrary by the accounts now produc'd, all which are submitted to the determination of the Hon^{ble}. President &c. humbly desiring that Mr. Cooke may be oblig'd to produce his account of my goods that the said affair may be settled in the best manner that it possible after the Confusion which he has made in said account & hope he will be made accountable for any damage that may accrue thereon.

In Mr. Cooke's account of my debts (whether by design or not I cannot tell) he has omitted to give me credit for 315 Dollars being for $1\frac{1}{2}$ Chest of Oppium sold by me to Cap^t Misenor at Dollars 210 per Chest, which Oppium was part of what Cap^t. Irving and I had in partnership. Mr. Cooke may well remember that he order'l Cap^t. Misenor not to pay the produce of said Oppium to me, but to himself, notwith-standing which Cap^t. Misenor knowing he could not answer the payment of said money to Mr. Cooke refused it without I gave him an order under my hand so to do, which at that time (thrô the Constraint I was under) I was obliged to acquiesce & submitt to on any terms. This is such a remarkable instance & took up so much time before it could be concluded that I am obliged to say it looks more like design then mistake, & I am surpriz'd that Mr. Cooke should want something to rub up his memory on this subject, whereas it has on other occasions, less materiall, prov'd quick & volatile.

In my acco^t. curr^t. of M^r. Cooke's making up at random, he specifies 1906 Dollars as bad debts & irrecoverable, whereas if I had not been sent off the shore by force, or if M^r. Cooke had not so unhandsomely deserted the Settlements on the West Coast by which means according to the example set them severall persons fled to Batavia, Java &c². I am well assured that I could have recovered those debts, but as the preventing it is wholly thrô M^r Cooke's management, he is intirely answerable for the same, & therefore beg justice against him accordingly.

Mr. Cooke in excuse for his severe usage & unjust proceedings against myself & others, pretends that what he transacted therein was by authority from hence, thô I am thoroughly persuaded whatever pow'r was given to him there never was anything else intended thereby then that Mr. Cooke should take my goods &ca. on the Company's account and to render a fair & just acct thereof of Fort St George & in all other respects to act according to justice & equity, & if Mr. Cooke has deviated from these orders, then the blame thereof lyes at his door. & he is responsible for breach of orders, by assuming an Authority to himself repugnant to the power given him which still makes him the more liable to make good any damages that may have accru'd thrô such proceedings, & I humbly hope your Hon. &ca. will make said Mr. Cooke answer for them to deterr others from attempting the like. Thus Gentlemen I have in some measure endeavour'd to lay before you the grievances I have in part sustain'd by Mr. Cooke's undervaluation of my goods, & not giving me due credit for what he recd. on my account, thô 'tis impossible to relate a great part of my sufferings by imprisonment at Fort Marlbrô, by seizing most of my materiall papers & acco. by a fixing papers at the severall Gates of Fort Marlbrô to disgrace me, by transporting me a prisoner to Fort St. George on the George Brigantine & by Confinement at Fort St. George for near a year, besides sundry pawns sold at an under rate in Fort St. George, & the undervaluation of my house called The Hermitage, the severall accost relating to these Affairs with Mr. Thomas Cooke are now most humbly submitted to your Hon. &cas. Consideration & Justice. I remain.
