

HONBLE. SE. &CA.

I have had the perusal of Mr. Isaac Pykes Paper to your Hon^r. &c^a. touching Bencoolen Affairs, and find therein an Article that tends to my discredit in my paymasters employ, which induces me to answer it in such a manner as I hope will clear me of the Aspersion both to your Hon^r. &c^a. and the Hon^{ble}. Company.

Mr. Pyke alledges that the 9 Inch Timbers were but 7 inches thick of the thinnest side and $8\frac{1}{2}$ wide at the end, and the other Timbers in the same proportion brought in by me, and some of them were but 17 foot long, and several pieces of white wood amongst them, being contrary to the Companys orders. In answer to which I shall only say that I measured every individual piece and they held out equal in lengths and breadths to what agreed for in Consultation of the 2d March, they were brought

by the most part by sea and lay by the water side where they were measured and surveyed by the Council and then sent to the Fort and mix'd with the other Timbers, so if Mr. Pyke measur'd at the Water side those he said were deficient, it is likely they were such as we refus'd, and if afterwards, 'tis as likely they were some of his own. however, let him pretend what he will, I am very positive what I brought in were of full measure and I hope your Hon^r. & c^a. will believe my assertion to be as valid as his, being here no other means to prove it one way or another. It is very true we had forty five rafters a little crooked, those Mr. Pyke might have seen, but we having an immediate occasion and the workmen approving them we took them in, and Mr. Pyke says again that he could buy of the Dupatty Carriage Plank for half the amount we paid for them. I should say he talks idly and conformable to his Action when he might have done the Company that piece of service before our arrival since they were procurable and much in want, otherwise I would purchase on my own account after the same rate any Quantity whatever as the Supravisor can testify.

I shall not enlarge on Mr. Pykes allegation since he has wholly inserted his proceedings in Bencoolen to be orthodox, which I leave him to prove, except his bare saying so, therefore I think it will not admit of a Dispute and I do most submissively desire your Hon^r. &c^a. to be further satisfy'd therein.

Recourse being then had to our Letter Book we found no such Bond, and it was Agreed that the President do return for Answer that we rec^d. those Villages by grant from King Furrickseer himself, and that we cannot shew so great a neglect of his present Majesty as to part with any Grant rec^d. from his Predecessors, it being reasonable for him to suppose we would do the same by him in the like case, and that therefore we hope his Excellency will not commit any Act of Hostility but will preserve inviolate the friendship so long maintained between us, and that this Message be couch'd in very positive terms.

INSTRUCTIONS GIVEN TO PAUPA THE 14TH APRIL AND SPOKEN BY HIM DITTO DIE TO LALLAH DUCKNEROY.

I am order'd by the Governour of Madrass to tell you that as to what you say relating to Mr. Collett's Letter, he hath look't into it and finds Mr. Collett wrote his Excellency that provided he would give him an answer to let him know how he approv'd of his writing to Sied Hussenally Cawn for a Sunnod under his Seal relating to the Villages he would do it; to this he rec^d no answer, but three Months after a Letter from the Nabob to enquire what he had done in the Affair and at the same time pressing the delivery of the Villages, to which Mr. Collett reply'd that they were granted the English by his Majestys Royal Phirmaund, that he was intrusted by the Company to maintain their right, and never would deliver up that part of them without their orders. Those Letters are dated the 29th April and 6th of July 1718. The Present Governour bid me tell you, he is now in the place of Mr. Collett intrusted in like manner by the Company to defend their Right and cannot recede from the Resolutions of his Predecessors.

You are pleas'd to say the Present of twelve Lack of Rupees to the King is nothing to you, though all the World must believe it was the Motive that induced His Majesty to do those Honours to the English Nation.

I am further to tell you it is evident that the Profits arising from the English Settlement has been very great, not only in the Dutys paid to your Mettas, but even by the large Coinage that has been lately at Covelon and St. Thomé, though you seem to make light thereof and say that they have reap'd the benefit of it.

As to your saying they are your subjects, I am positievly bid to tell you they are Subjects to none but the King of England, govern'd by his Laws and protected by his Flag, nor will they own obedience to any other.

As to the Callicoes, it is very evident that they employ great part of the poor of this Country by the quantity of Cloth exported for England, and what profits they make thereby is their only Encouragement for so doing, and to that gain you may justly attribute the maintenance of your Poor.

Chicklys Cawn Perwannah his Hon^r, bid me tell you he would pay the greatest deference to, but when it contradicts His Royal Majestys Phirmaund he cannot help thinking it invalidated, and therefore must waive his Obedience to his Orders now.

By what I have said you will find his Hon'. resolv'd not to deliver up the Villages, his orders from England he bid me tell you are positive to the same Effect, and therefore he hopes His Excellency will not proceed to extremities, if he does, Himself, not any Master must be chargeable with the Consequences.

FROM PAUPA BRAMINY AND THE MULLA DATED & REC^D. THE 14TH APRIL, 1723.

This Morning we went to Duckneroy's Tent, to whom we sent word we were there to wait upon him, he sent an Answer he was not well but Order'd us to come at four a Clock, which we Accordingly did, and in the presence of Auga Mogheen, Valleh Mohomud, Suncha Pareek, Moodu Ramah Chitty, Chinna Ramah Chitty, Sunca Vencatachilum and several Munsubdars presented to him Your Hon¹⁸. service, Duckneroy then order'd the Munsubdars to leave the Tent, when they were gone, he ask'd us what we had to say. We then, after a great many Compliments had pass'd, shew'd him our Instructions, when he had read them ask'd us in a passion whether that was an answer fit to be sent him ? We reply'd it was an answer to his demands, he then said that themselves and the English got considerably by one another, then turn-ing to Auga Mogheen and Sunca Vencatachilum said this is the Answer to the Bond which the Governour of Madrass gave me, which you are bound to see perform'd. Auga Mogheen reply'd that it was truth, Lallah then told us that we should continue here to night and be answerable for the deaths of his people who were kill'd at the Metta, saying that he would go to the Nabob to morrow morning and then give us his Answer, therefore we are oblig'd to continue here this Night. We left Lallah in the

When Assen Cawn was made sensible of this he dropt that part of his demands & then told the President that the Nabob expected two Councillors to meet him with a Present, after which he would discourse of the Villages.

AGREED that we send no Present, nor trust any European near him, for that since he had once infring'd the Law of Nations by detaining our Messenger, it is more than probable should he get any English into his power he would make ill use of it and extort from us a Present for the releasement of them. It was further

AGREED that the President do send word by Assen Cawn, that if Lalla Duckneroy wants to treat he shall be wellcome hither, and at the same time do absolutely refuse any Present, till the Nabob shall entirely fling up all Pretentions to the Villages and that he do this so as not to lay us under an Obligation even should the Nabob resign, but to keep them in suspence that should we give anything it may appear voluntary, and not their due.



They are under the protection of my guns & if you will endeavour to take them from me you alone are accountable for the Consequences whatever they may be. I think myself well able to maintain them and I believe a Rupture between us will be more pernicious to Your Excellency than to me, I am notwithstanding willing to live in friendship, what can I say more?

I have always hitherto done my utmost to assist the Company of which you are (to be sure) very sensible.

I observe by your mistaking my meaning You are led to say your Effects are under the Protection of your Guns. I do not want them, and your mentioning the Guns does not look well. There were Guns and ammunition enough in Viziapour Galcondah &c^a. and yet His Majesty overcame them which all the World knows. I do not desire a War (God forbid there should be one) nor to break our friendship. On the Contrary I think it will be much better to continue it. I therefore desire you will not be uneasy. I have now sent by the Doctor my Proposals to You of which he will inform you. By them you may govern yourselves without any suspicion of me. Your doing what I desire will preserve and increase our friendship.

I am come hither & it is not reasonable to go away empty handed.

One from Mrs. Katherine Gyfford from Fort St. David, dated the 5th Instant, wherein she desires us to deliver up to Mr. George Tullie the money, papers, &c^{*}. receiv'd from him belonging to her late husband Wm. Gyfford Esq^r. Chief of Anjengo.

One from the Chief and Council of Tellicherry dated the 13th July inclosing a packet for the Hon^{blo}. Company, desiring Advices about the preparations making by the French to assist Boyanore, and that we will send them a seal.

AGREED that our Secretary do write Mrs. Gyfford in Answer to her letter, That we demanded & receiv'd the papers, Olas, &c^a. which she mentions, in behalf of our Hon^{ble}. Masters, and in Compliance with letters receiv'd from Bombay and Anjengo which desir'd us so to do, because the said Mrs. Gyfford was greatly indebted to the Company, and that we cannot deliver them without an Acco^t. from those places that Mr. Gyfford's debt is discharg'd.

AGREED that Mr. John Blunt do go down Resident to Ingeram in the room of Mr. Faucett lately deceas'd, and proceed in making an investment there, and that we send 5000 pagodas with him.

The Board then proceeded on the West Coast Affair and thought fit to appoint Mr. Joseph Walsh Deputy Governour there in the room of Tho^s. Dunster Esq^r. deceas'd, he being the Eldest Servant on that Establishment now remaining, as is set forth in his request deliver'd into the Board and enter'd hereafter.

Observing that they are in great want of writing Assistants at Bencoolen, it is agreed to admit Mr. John Savage a factor for that place, according to his petition enter'd hereafter, and that Mr. Bodkin, whom they now employ as a monthly writer, be also taken into the service.

Our Hon^{ble}. Masters having in paragraph 92 of the Letter per Bridgewater order'd us to send fifty Chests of Treasure to the Bay. It was propos'd to comply therewith and put them on board the Mary. Upon which a Debate arose and the impossibility of so doing was argued from the large number of shipping which are to be dispatch'd from this place, and the very small stock that we have to do it with. That being this year forbid to draw Bills on the Company at more than 8s. per pagoda, no money can be expected by that method, which used to be a great assistance to us. And that it is equally improbable that we should be able to borrow Money at Interest on their Acco'. because no set of People or private ones can lend any large sum except the Companys Merchants, who always are oblig'd to advance Money for the Cloth they provide, and now the investment is so vastly increas'd are under a necessity of keeping their whole Cash up the Country and Consequently cannot supply us as they formerly did with Money at Interest.

It was further urg'd, that of the 80 Chests brought out by Ships Heathcote and Marlbrô Our Hon^{ble}. Masters had order'd us to send 30 down to the Bay and about 120 of those consign'd us by the next years shipping, whereas we had sent 188 Chests thither and had also eas'd that settlement by not sending the Heathcote down, by which means they were not under any necessity of laying out money for a cargo for her, but were enabled to pay of their debts with what we sent, of which our Honourable Masters when they wrote this Letter had not receiv'd Advices, and that it was reasonable to believe this Order for the fifty Chests was given on a supposition that we had done no more than what we were directed by them to do, and that when they had read our Letters by the last years ships they would think we had Complied already with their Orders and that we are not under so absolute a necessity of doing it now.

Continued.

It was likewise urg'd that we had sent down a very large supply of Lead, Tuthenague, &c^a. this Season, and on the arrival of the now expected China ships should send them a great deal more of the latter of those Commodities, which is the same thing as Bullion to them. Whereas should we streighten ourselves and for want

Reasons offered by the merchants.

They then told us that it was impossible for them to pretend to furnish 4000. Bales of Cloth which should all exactly answer musters, and that the utmost they can do is to keep their weavers as near as possible to them, But that the very large demand lately made has occasion'd the running the Cloth off the Loom so fast 'tis not practicable to keep them justly to the goodness of the muster. That they can always provide the quantity and much more, but that when they do so they cannot pretend to engage for the Goodness, Since it is certain that the People working in a hurry must be more careless and negligent than when they have more time; so that when this place provided 1000 Bales per annum it was very easy to keep them up to the Musters, but that now the demand is encreas'd to four times that quantity it is not reasonable to expect it should be equal in goodness. They further added that they were oblig'd to advance money for all the Cloth they provided, and that they must take what the weavers would give them for it or loose what they had so advanc'd them. Nor could they abate in the prices, labour being now dearer in the Country than formerly occasion'd by the larger demand for Goods and the Companys price being as low or rather lower than what they can sell even the turn'd out Cloth for, to the Manilla and other ships which go from this port.

These reasons being judged to have some weight in them, the Sorters were directed to be as easy as they could with justice, and our reason for giving such Directions is, that if we strictly sort to the Muster we shall not send home one ship a year Since thô the Country will provide much larger quantities of Cloth than our Demand yet 'tis with great difficulty we find Washers to cure even what is now brought in, and were we to turn out every piece short of Muster, there would be a necessity of washing vastly more than now; which is impossible and Consequently we should not find. freight for the Tonnage sent us.



First you are to take care there be no Complaints from the Markets, Merchants or others for want of sufficient number of people to do the business.

Secondly for every garse of Rice, Paddy, &c^a. Grain or seeds you shall measure, you shall receive of the seller of it, if it be at the Banksall or Sea side, nine fanams, but if it hath been before measured at either of those places and be remeasured by you, you are to receive only two fanams for every garse so remeasured.

This Cowle we will allow you the benefit of for five years provided you strictly observe the rules abovementioned, and in Consideration of your paying the Hon^{ble}. United English East India Company the sum of eight hundred and twenty pagodas per annum at six equal payments, the first whereof to become due the 20th of December next. But if you fail in observing the above rules, or that we have any Complaints of either neglect or injustice in the discharge of your Trust, or that you do not take care to make the payments duely to the Hon^{ble} Company, We then reserve to ourselves and successors power to revoke and annul this Cowle and you yourselves shall be liable to be fined of us or our said successors

Lastly we do hereby strictly forbid any Person or Persons whatsoever to be Measurers in this City, but such as shall be appointed by you, and if any other person shall presume to act contrary to this Cowle he shall be fined and punish'd at the Pleasure of the Governour and Council. Kistna was asked what was the design of his signing the abovesaid paper said Kistna asked to be an Agreement, between him & Suramannar, to which he replys he was under signing the Confinement and by that means not able to make up Accots. and clear his Debts with above read his Creditors, who were very numerous & press'd him for their money, & that there- paper. fore several of them coming to him perswaded him to appoint Suramannar to act for him, which he accordingly did, but that 'twas upon Condition, that his partner & Uta Irsapah and his Conycoplys should be always present at the time of his Acting there, and further that as the said Suramannar had before deliver'd out several Parcells of goods to do which he had no power, they were likewise to be brought back and then the whole to be sold in presence of his Creditors & divided amongst them.

Kistna urges by his Attorney that he was in prison and that he was forced into signing the said paper by the Clamour of his Creditors, that he had formerly borrow'd of Juggo 2000 Pagodas & deliver'd over a Godown of Goods to him for security, that afterwards he paid that Money & receiv'd back the Key but that afterwards when he the said Kistna was confin'd Suramannar took the Key away by stealth & deliver'd it to Juggo who in Consort with the said Suramannar did afterwards take out Goods to the amount of 6,000 Pagodas, and that he hoped the paper so sign'd by him being as he deem'd in itself invalid from the Circumstance of place would not be made use of against him, and further that it was not in his power since Muta Irsapa had $\frac{1}{4}$ concern in the said Suramannar having not comply'd with the Conditions of thesaid Agreement, which was so unwillingly obtain'd from him, the said Markistna, he hopes it will appear plain that Juggo's actions in Concert with the said Suramannar will be deem'd illegal.

Juggo then produced to the Board an Agreement made between Muta Irsapa & Suramannar, wherein the said Muta Irsapa did acknowledge that Suramannar had the direction of Kistna's shop, and that he was contented it should be so, and being ask'd why it was not produc'd in Court, Answer'd that the said Agreement was drawn simply and on that account lodged in the hands of a third person, one Chenava Chitty, who in court avoided delivering it under pretence that his Brother was in the Country, and had got the paper in his possession.

The other objection in Markistna's defence that the said paper was sign'd in prison, was overrul'd, both because the said paper was not the power itself, but an acknowledgment of a power formerly lodged in Suramannar to act for the said Kistna, and that it appeared by Muta Irsapa's agreement with Suramannar dated before the paper now in debate that he knew of Markistna's having given such power to Suramannar. A further reason for over ruling the said plea was that it is not the custom of this place to prevent a man's paying his debts while he is in prison, and that it appears the design of Markistna in lodging the said power was for Suramannar to pay his debts, for proof of which Suramannar urges that he had paid several sums upon the credit of the power so lodged in him by Markistna, but not having sufficient authority under the hand of the said Markistna, he refus'd paying any more till he had got an acknowledgment under his hand in presence of substantial people, that he had power vested in him to sell those Goods and act for the said Markistna.

Muta Irsapa, one of Markistna's partners, declares that a servant of his put a padlock on Markistna's Godown, which Juggo's Coneycoply, by name Andeapa, with Suramannar took away. That it was after the payment of the 2000 Pagodas due from Markistna to Juggo, that Suramannar told Markistna he had paid Juggo's money and as he hears 'twas Suramannar gave the Key of the Godown to Juggo he declares the lock was took by force which was put on that no Goods should be taken out, and that after the payment of the 2000 Pagodas Suramannar and Andeapa took out by force from the Godown Raw Silk to the amount of 700 Pagodas, which they carried to Sommadrues Godown, that at another time Juggo himself was there, who in company with Andeapa and Surmannar took out of the Godown Broadcloth, Camphire, &c^{*}. to the value of about 600 Pagodas, he does not know whether it was by Markistna's permission, but that when he told Markistna of it he made Answer, they must answer for it.

• Jona, Company's peon, declares that Suramannar, Juggo and Andeapa came to Markistna's Godown, that the Chief Peon sent him there to bid them make up Accompts, that he brought two of Markistna's people to them and that then Juggo &c^a. open'd the Godown and Markistna's people asked them what they wanted, who bid them look over their accounts and come again. That about two days after Suramannar and Andeapa took out of the Godown some Goods (Chests of Vermilion he thinks) but to what amount knows not, and then Kistna's Coneycoply seeing them stop'd them. ---- FORT ST. GEORGE, DECEMBER, 1723 -----

Narsia Coneycoply declares that he knows Juggo &c^a. took away Vermilion, Raw Silk, Broad Cloth &c^a. to the Amount of above six thousand pagodas by force, which he saw them do and shove Markistna's servant away.

Gopaulia Coneycoply declares that Juggo &c^a. took by force the Keys of Markistna's Godown and that he went and told Markistna of the same and that in his (*sic*) they forcibly took Goods out of the said Godown to the Amount of 6000 Pagodas.

In September following Your Petitioner having an opportunity of selling the Goods sent for Suramannar & paid into his hands the sum of one thousand pagodas desiring him at the same time to lend him the remainder to pay off Juggo's debt, which he comply'd with & promis'd to fetch his Mortgaged Bond, & the Key of his Godown where the Goods were, Accordingly the said Suramannar went to the said Juggo & paid him the full amount of your Petitioners debt and receiv'd from Juggo the Key of the Godown, the said key he deliver'd Your Petitioner, but the Mortgage Bond he detain'd till we had settled our Accompts, all which your Petitioner agreed to, but on the 15th October Your Petitioner being Confin'd Suramannar did treacherously take the keys of the Godown and deliver'd them to the aforenam'd Juggo ; upon which he sent for Juggo and ask'd him the reason why he kept the key since y^{*}. Petitioner had discharg'd the debt, he reply'd 'twas false and that he had not receiv'd his money. Your Petitioner not being able at that time to clear the matter did agree that Muta Irsapa and his servants jointly with Juggo should have

the keys of the Godown, but afterwards apprehending ill usage from Juggo Your Petitioner put a separate padlock on the Godown, which soon after the said Juggo took away and plunder'd the said Godown of Goods to the amount of six thousand five hundred pagodas, which your Petitioner can fully make appear. Therefore humbly hopes this Worspⁿ. Court will oblige the said Juggo to make full satisfaction for what he has so unjustly taken from him.

And your Petitioner as in duty bound Shall ever pray.

That this Defendant saving and reserving to himself now and at all times hereafter all benefit of exception unto the incertaintys, insufficiencys and imperfections in the said petition of Complaint contain'd, for a full perfect and direct Answer unto all and every the matters, Allegations & things which are in the said petition of complaint contain'd in any sort or wise material or Effectual in Law for the Defendant to Answer unto, saith That he utterly denys the whole Charge Exhibited against him by the Plaintiff in every respect and will aver the assertions contain'd in the said petition to be malicious and notoriously false, as he shall hereafter make appear to this Worsp¹¹. Court, and in justification of himself craves leave he may appeal to Suramannar whether or no the said Goods specified in the said petition were not made over to him by the plaintiff long before he the said Suramannar deliver'd them up to Mr. Hugonin, this Defendants Master, as a pledge or security for two thousand pagodas he the said Suramannar had on his own Acco⁴. borrow'd & taken up of him.

This defendant doth further aver that he was no more than once at the said Godown when there were present Tanja Chitty, Chinua Chitty, Muta Irsapa and several other people.

That some time ago there arose a dispute of the like nature (which is now depending before the Worsp¹¹. Court) between Muta Irsapa Chitty, his partner the plaintiff and Suramannar, and that they were before the Governour who advis'd them to go to Arbitration, but whether they proceeded or not, this Defendant cannot tell, but very well remembers that they enter'd into a penalty Bond in Order thereto; and that he hath been since inform'd that the Affair is still depending in Arbitration & not yet decided.

All which matters and things he this Defendant is & will be ready to aver, main[t]ain & prove as this Worsp¹¹. Court shal award, and humbly prays to be hence dismiss'd with Costs and Damage in this behalf wrongfully sustain'd.

TRANSLATE OF AN AGREEMENT GIVEN BY MARKISTNA TO SURAMANNAR, DATED THE 22D JANUARY 1721-2.

THE REPRESENTATION OF THE CASE OF JUGGO HUMBLY SETS FORTH.

That your appealant did lend Suramannar the 30th August 1721 two thousand pagodas, and for security of the said sum did accept the key of a Godown wherein were sundry Goods, a part of which were deliver'd by Suramannar and put into another Godown under two keys, one kept by the Appealant, the other by Suramannar, who when he thought fit to dispose of the said Goods Your Appealant might have an opportunity to be repaid the sum lent and your Appealant did believe the same were a good and sufficient security as he understood the said Goods were assign'd over by Markistna to Suramannar, the more so because Your Appealant was inform'd and does believe the said sum of two thousand pagodas lent to Suramannar was appropriated to discharge some debts due from Muta Irsapa & Markistna. Your Appealant is not certain but admits it may be true that the Acco^t. of Goods sworn by Markistna to have been in the Godown might be right as to the quantity, as to the value it will appear by the produce, which produce your Appeal and does believe that Markistna has full Credit in his Accompts with the said Suramannar the Ballance of which he is inform'd is considerably in Suramannars favour, and your Appealant does humbly hope Your Hon^r. & c^a. Council will cause it to be examin'd as he esteems it very material in this Case. Your Appealant in justification of himself did produce an Agreement sign'd by Markistna to Suramannar which he humbly presumes upon a reasonable interpretation will be understood to be as it was really intended and design'd a full and sufficient assignment of the said Markistna's right in the said Goods, but the said Assignment had not the Effect Your Appealant did believe it would have had upon Markistna's pretending he was forced to sign it, whether it was really so Your Hon^r. &c^a. can no doubt be fully inform'd, but Your Appealant does believe he cannot fairly prove he was so forced from the strong circumstances that for the Assignment he had a valuable consideration, That Suramannar was to and did discharge several debts, besides the testimony of the person who drew up the said Agreement, and those others in whose presence it was sign'd. The Evidence produced in the Worspⁿ. Court against the Appealant endeavour'd to prove that the said Goods were taken out of the Godown in a forcible manner and that those who took them out were guilty of robbery. Your Appealant did never endeavour to disprove that several Goods were taken out of the Godown, but after the manner Your Appealant has many Witnesses to the Contrary when your Hon^r. &c^{*}. shall be at leasure to hear them. Your Hon^r. &c^{*}. will judge of the oath taken by Paum Venkitty Putty where he swears that Markistna's Bond was receiv'd back & Muta Irsapa in his oath mentions the same with this addition that it was for 2000 Pagodas. Your Appealant does own that he lent to Muta Irsapa the 16th of May 1721, which was repaid the 27th Sept. and the 8th of October following, but does utterly deny that he ever lent Markistna that sum, and is very sure it can never fairly be made appear that he did, such mistakes as these are too Considerable to be made, by such who are upon their oath and do humbly conceive that Your Hon^r. &c^a. will find another name for them.

Muta Irsapa further swears that part of the Goods were taken out by Suramannar, Andeapa ; and Gopaulia deposes that your Appealant did forcibly take out of the said Godown Goods to the Amount of above 6000 pagodas, which is said to be the value of the whole, wherefore Your Appealant does humbly conceive that one or other of these oaths can't be true, besides that, Muta Irsapa says that Suramannar gave me the key & Narsia & Gopaulia swear that I forcibly took it, but that nothing may be wanting to make the oaths of Narsia and Gopaulia compleat to &c^a. are clapt in, which Your Hon^r. &c^a. are well able to judge of. Your Appealant is the more surpriz'd at Muta Irsapa's oath and leaves it to his conscience how he can answer it either to God or man the great deal he has sworn against Your Appealant, because he the said Muta Irsapa did buy part of the said Goods said to be forcibly taken out and has given your Appealant a note to pay the amount which he is ready to produce, & Your Appealant does further say that another part of the Goods said to be forcibly taken out, were deliver'd by Muta Irsapa himself to Concla Kitsai who was order'd by Muta Irsapa to pay the Amount to Your Appealant, who does further assert that the said Muta Irsapa, by an Agreement dated December 8th 1721, did allow and esteem Suramannar to be owner and proprietor of Markistna's three fourths of the said Godown or Shop wherein he the said Muta Irsapa was another quarter.

Your Appealant does humbly crave Your Hon^r. &c^{ns}. patience a little longer to represent that some time ago there happen'd a dispute between Markistna, Suramannar & Muta Irsapa in relation to the said Goods, the latter enter'd his Action against Suramannar for 10,000 pagodas & did not prosecute but withdrew his Action & agreed to go to Arbitration for the proof of which I humbly refer Your Hon^{*}. &c^{*}. to a Penalty Bond enter'd into which lies in the [lacuna] of Paupa Braminy neither was it ever mention'd in all their disputes that there had been any Goods stolen out of the said Godown, and as to the quantity of Goods which were therein, Suramannar is the only person that can give a true account thereof, as they were deliver'd over to him, & as to my transactions for security of the money lent to Suramannar they are particularly set down in the Acco". given by Andeapa which are so remarkable that several merchants whose names are mention'd in the said Acco^{ts}. if particularly examin'd will evidently disclose the injustice of the Charge exhibited against me, as well as the Depositions sworn to by Muta Irsapa, Narsia, & Gopaulia who were consenting and active in the delivery of the said Goods, which I can make appear by substantial Merchants who bought some of the Goods at the outcry and others who were present at the delivery of them.

Your Appealant most humbly begs Your Hon^r. &c^a. will excuse the trouble he has given you which he should have been far very far from doing if he did not hope and believe he could make his innocence fully appear and thereby have relief from the Consequence of a Judgment so very heavy, which if he should be so unfortunate to have it confirm'd here can only be attended with the ruin of himself and family. Your Appealant therefore submits himself to Your Hon^r. &c^a. judgment and as in duty bound shall

The above Merchants being call'd in were ask'd what they knew of the Affair, to which they all reply'd that they had been with Kistna to be paid several debts, who told them that Suramannar would pay them, but that when they apply'd to him, he refus'd, saying he had paid a good deal of money and had only a verbal power and that till he had some further Authority he would not venture to pay anything more, upon which they went to Markistna who without the least hesitation voluntarily gave him the paper now before the Board, and declar'd by that paper he mean't a full and sufficient power to act for him not only in his Shop here but those at Nagore, Lalla Patta, Fort St. David, &c. Tomby Chitty further added that upon this Suramannar did make over to him several Goods of Markistna's at the above said shops of Nagore, &c^{*}. in part of Kistna's debt to him the said Tomby Chitty.

Having receiv[d] information since my Arrival here that the Worspⁿ. Lewis Dean Esqr. Deputy Governour &c*. Council of Fort Marlbrô on the West Coast of Sumatra has made an Attachment in the hands of my Attorney Mr. David Carnegie of ps. eight 892. 1. on account of a Deficiency of the Honble. Companys pepper, which was committed to my care as pepper Godown keeper, from the resetling of Bencoolen in February, 1721, to the end of June, 1722, which they refer to Your Hon^{rs}. &c^{as}. determination.

They have also protested against my Bills &ca. Council of Moco Moco for the Ballance of the Cash Acco^{*}. Curr^{*}. of that place amounting to ps. eight 2135. 3. 59 for reasons (as I have been inform'd) they say best known to themselves, the whole amount being ps. eight 3028. -. 59 which sum if detain'd from me will infallibly prove greatly to my detriment, being determin'd (with the Blessing of God) to proceed for England by the first opportunity in hopes to recover an ill state of health that I have long labour'd under, and was the only reason that caused me to lay down the Honble. Companys service, for which I ever had and shall alway[s] retain a great esteem.

FIRST CONCERNING A DEFICIENCY IN THE PEPPER.

That it would turn out short of what weigh'd from the Malays I always expected (for reason) at my first coming to Bencoolen there was no Godown to deposite the pepper in, for above two months and then to the very last such wretched places and 1723-37

so little hopes of safety that no reasonable man could judge otherwise than there might not only be pilferage but large quantitys of such Goods as was there deposited stolen away. The Godown by Bencoolen River being the only one I had till July 1721, which had often been broken open and whole Chests of Ironmonger's ware stolen away, but as the pepper was shot loose I could not give a judgment what quantity of that commodity might be lost, & when Mr. Pyke had made a Godown at Marlbrô, the work was so slight & insufficient (being built of split Bamboos) that only the force of the pepper contain'd therein has more than once burst out the sides of the Godown, and beg leave to refer Your Hon^r. & c^a. to my letter dated in August, 1721, to Francis Hastings Esq^r. late President of this place, my representation to James Hubbard Esq^r., late Supravisor & c^a. I really can have nothing more to say but that I have undergone the hardship of paying my attorney $2\frac{1}{2}$ ps. eight for his receiving and paying such money, which in all was upwards of 5,000 Dollars, and beg leave to refer Your Hon^{rs}. &c^a. to three of their General Letters bearing date the 22d February 1722-3, the 24th March 1722-3, and the last that ever they wrote me of the 16 April 1723, wherein they gave me repeated Orders to draw on them for the Ballance of the Moco Moco Acco¹⁸. which I am ready to produce when ever Your Hon^{rs}. &c^a. are pleased to require them, and doubt not but on perusing said Letters, with other papers as abovementioned, you will be sufficiently convinc'd of my integrity in the Hon^{ble}. Companys Affairs, and that you'll please to order the repayment of my money so attach'd and Bills protested by them which will lay a lasting obligation on Hon^{ble}. Sir &c^a.
