The President Represented to the Board that the ships being now all gone home, it was a proper Time to consider of the Investment for the ensuing Year, that accordingly He had for some time Turned his thoughts to the Northern Settlements, and was of opinion that so long as Vizagapatam and Ingerum were Independent on each other there would always be a Competition between the Two places, by means whereof both Places might possibly be disappointed of their goods,

and that it was indisputable that the Fabrick would be the worse for such Competition, wherefore He proposed that Mr. Blunt shou'd be appointed Second of Vizagapatam and Reside at Ingerum as He has for some time done, to assist and further the Investment to the utmost of his power, and that for his encouragement He be appointed to Succeed Mr. Symonds when He leaves Vizagapatam, to come up hither. These Proposals being readily Agreed to, Mr. Blunt was called in and acquainted with the Resolves of the Board, and He with Mr. Symonds both promisd their utmost endeavours to give us a large supply of good cloth the ensuing Season.

The Northern Investment being thus Settled, our own Merchants were called Proposal in and a proposal made to them as follows:

Merchants [new] Con-tract to be made.

That they shall engage in a contract at Fort St. George for two thousand Bales of cloth, to be delivered one half in August, & the Remainder by the last of January next.

That they shall Take all the Broad cloth at the usual advance to be kept under Two Keys, one of which to be left with themselves and the other with the Warehousekeeper, that before they Take any out of the warehouses It shall be paid for in Ready money, and that the whole amount shall be paid off by the First of April 1727. In Consideration of which the Board (they were told) would abate the penalty to be Inflicted for breach of the last contract to Ten thousand Pagodas, but if they would not do this, they must Expect to Pay the whole amount of the Penalty.

Upon the Hearing these proposals the Merchants Immediately declared they could which Ternas not engage by any means either to Take the Broadcloth, or contract for above eight agree to Hundred Bales; and to this they adhered for a Considerable Time, but at last after near two hours debate, finding the Board determined to exact the whole Penalty if they did not agree to the Terms proposed, and being excused from any Contract at Fort St. David they Consented: having first obtained a promise of the Board that if they complied within Three hund. Bales, no penalty should be exacted.

After which the Board considered upon the Penalty; and AGREED that for as much the Penalty as the Madrass contract for last year had been much better Complied with than that at Fort St. David that our Merchants had Contracted for so large a quantity as Five last fix'd to thousand Bales here, and had also bought the Broadcloth; these Ten thousand pagodas pagods shou'd be Levied on Fort St. David, where the Contracts do indeed mostly Run in Sunca Rama and Tomby Chitt[ee's] names, but are divided with other people. PRESIDENT AND GOVERNOUR OF FORT ST. GEORGE &CT. COUNCILL.

Horele Sir & Sirs

Having Received Instructions from the Honble. President to give in a Report to this Honoble. Board of the state of affairs at Vizagapatam I shall as briefly as possible offer this to your Hon. &ct. consideration.

First as to the Garrison consisting of eighty five men Including the Gunner's crew which is as few as is absolutely necessary to man the Fort and maintain the Outworks web. cover the Town, the securing of which is of almost as much consequence as the Fort itself consisting of Three guards [wh.] constantly Take Half of our Military and when the Nabob [or] any Camp Lies near us, are Reinforced from the Fort.

As to Fortifications and Repairs I Hope there will be no necessity of putting the Company to any extraordinary expense for some Time since a moderate charge will Keep the Buildings in the condition they are now in.

The Revenue arising from the Customs, Import & Export Beetle Tobacco and Arrack Farms with two villages within the Companys district I Hope with good management may be brot in a Year or two to discharge the Rent which is Annually paid the Nabob. It has been upon the encrease these four or five years notwithstanding we have almost lost the Salt manufacture weh, formerly used to Bring in a hundred and fifty pagodas P Annum.

I Believe the Sea and Land Custom might be considerably Improved were they Farmed out under some Restrictions but whether that be agreeable to the Honoble. Company's orders is what I Humbly submit to Your Hon. &c.

Presents given to every new Nabob upon his Entrance into the government have by Custom and prescription so far prevailed that they are esteemed now rather a due debt than any thing else and not to be denied without coming to an open Quarrel with the Government.

Your Hon &ct. having Lately made such a disposition for carrying on the Investment as is necessary I have no occasion to say any thing upon that Head.

The getting the cloth washed at Vizagapatam being a matter of the greatest Consequence I have sent Washers from hence to Instruct ours and shall carry Stones and all other materials necessary to bring that work to some Perfection.

It would doubtless be of Great Service to send the cloth purchased at Quotapatam and thereabouts to be washed at Ingerum and shipped off from thence. It lies only liable to this Exception the danger of having so much of the Honble Compas. estate Lodged in a place where there is no Fortification or forces to Protect it and of this we have an example it being not lo[ng] since a neighbouring Rajah seized to the value of six thousand pagodas in Cloth belonging to the British for which they have [not] Yet Received the least satisfaction I do not see wt. be[tter] Security we have at Ingerum should that Rajah's nece[ssity] force him upon such unjust measures, as for Cash it's [not] Conveyed out of the way and any man upon an exigenc[y] can secure that and his person when He cannot conce[al] Effects of any sort more Bulky.

Your Hon. &c. have so often Repeated to us yo. ord[er] in Relation to our lessening Expences especially in the Branch of it Peons and Servants wages that I cannot do [more] than assure you that as soon as I arrive there it shall be Reduced at least a quarter part, at the same time I [Beg] Leave to lay before this Honoble Board such Inconve[nience] as may aise from so doing.

What Peons we turn out of the Service must w[ith] their families remove to some other place to seek a Livelihood and should we at any time have any difference with the Country government we should be hard put to it for peo[ns] to attend us at least such as are Trustworthy nor can any be deemed so except such as have their wifes and Families upon the spott as a Security for their good Behaviour, on the other hand it is more than probable these very people must be employed against us who being well Acquainted with our strength (which is more imaginary than Real) and y. Avenu[es] to the Town may enable the enemy to do us a great deal of mischief, there is another Consideration thô not of so much weight as to continue an extraordinary charge on that accordination at least a Third part of the pay these people receive Returns again through th[at] Channell into the Company's Cash.

of which He had lodged a Chest of Coral in my hands, that that chest of Coral was unjustly detained from him in Bengal by my Attorney notwithstanding the Plaintiff had fulfilled his Bond. He charges me moreover with hav^e. Seized his goods which came from Bengal for the payment of his Resp^e, and that I had Sold the same to his great Loss and Detriment selling them but for twenty one hundred when they were-really worth Five and twenty hundred pagodas.

This I Take to be the substance of this extraordinary Charge w^{ch}. could y^e. Plaintiff make good in any one part I sho^d. deem myself very ungratefull and unworthy of that Intimacy w^{ch}. Shake Hubdarganeene urges has been a long while betwixt us.

It will be needless to Take up much of your Hon. &ct. Time In answering a matter that has much more of Romance In it than the least colour of Truth and looks as if the man had rather dreamed that I had used him thus than that being in his wits He shod. have yt. Assurance to deliver so bold a Falshood before this Honble Board.

I Beg Leave to lay before you the Plaintiffs bond to me w^{ch}. will at oncedetermine the Injustice of his first Assertion viz^t. of my Attorneys having detained
the Chest of Coral from the Plaintiff's Correspondent In Bengal when it was his
right to have the Same d^d. to him. This is so far from being True that by his Bond
He had no manner of Right to it without lodging at the same time goods in my

I had a bill of Lading & So Regularly Came into my hands So that of Course there was no Occasion of Seizing them and for the matter of disposing of Them I had there I profess So little a hand that I Scarce Saw his goods but that on yo. Contrary as soon as they were cleared at the Seagate at the Plaintiff's Request and at his procuring Sumadru for his Security He had forthwith the goods delivered to him nor have I Ever had any Thing to do with Them nor do I know whether a Piece of 'em is yet Sold or not, but what equally Surprizes me is yt. ye. Plaintiff never has Complained to me of all this but on the Contrary has Sollicited my Friendship as much as ever and within these few days has entreated my Assistance and Credit to Accomodate a difference between him and a Creditor of his, had I been ye least Rigid with him even though the Tenour of his bond might have Justified me therein He might have been angry at my punctuality and accused me of Severity but in this I profess I proceeded with all ve. In pursuance of an order of Council of the 30th. June We lay before your Hon^r. &c^a. what orders have been Received from the Honble Court of Directors relating to the Receiving into The Company's cash money from the Jesuits Missionaries in China at Interest, together with an Account of the Several Sums that have been hitherto Received into Cash for their Account & what has been writ by this Board to the Honble Court of Directors on that Subject.

We find that the sum of Ten Thousand pagodas was Received into Cash for their account the 31st. August 1720 but no Interest to be paid Them thereupon till the Company's order should be had for that Effect.

The Honble Court of Directors in paragraph 38 (of their General Letter \$\P\$ the Heathcote dated 26th April 1721) Say as follows:

"We have had Application made us by Mons". L'abbe Agent for the French Jesuit Missionaries in China to Receive Ten thousand pagodas of Their's into our cash at Fort St. George that President Hastings had Received the money conditionally to await our orders (thô he had no occasion for any having a Flowing Cash and the General Letter Tells us the Same) that sd. Agent desires the money may Remain in our cash as his letter mentions and the Proprietors to be for ever Dispossest of the property thereof on the Company's yearly allowing Them a Reasonable Interest we have considered of the whole & in Regard we sometimes have and at other Times have not occasion to Borrow money at Fort St. George Therefore we are willing to allow them a Certain Interest of Six & Cent tho it is one more than we pay here, & Annum, & hope it will be to their Satisfaction.

In consequence of which a Bond was Executed by the Govern', and Council and delivered to the Agent of the sd. Missionaries to pay them Interest Six hundred pagodas & Annum upon the Sum of Ten thousand pagodas Received.

The 25th. Febry 1723/24 their Agent paid into Cash y^o. further Sum of Two Thousand pagodas and the same day the Govern^r, and Council delivered him a Bond for Six P Cent Interest P Annum upon it.

The Receipt of this Sum was advised to England upon the Walpole in February 1723/24 to which the Honble Court Answered as follows in paragraph 122 of Their letter dated 2^d. February 1724/25.

"Your letter of the [19]th. February last advises that the Jesuits in China have by their Attorney offered to deposite in our cash with you a Sum of money which you Intend to Receive and Give Bond to pay Six & Cent & Annum for it. Padre de Goville Lately Returned to Europe has by writing Requested of us to Receive

'ten Thousand pagodas into our Cash and to pay the Missionaries for it six hundred pagodas a year which we have agreed to whether This is included in what you advise does not Appear.

The 1st. Febry 1724/25 the Agent to the s^a. Missionaries offered to pay into The Company's Cash a further Sum of money upon the Same terms with the Former which this Board adviced In their letter of the 11th, of that month \$\psi\$ the Macclesfield paragra. 23 as Follows.

"The 1st. Instant the China Jesuit's Attorney offered us a Sum of money to be paid into your Cash on the same Terms as Formerly but as we have Received no orders about the Two Thousand pagodas last Taken In we wou'd not Absolutely Accept It till we shou'd have an account from your Honours however we have permitted the money to be lodged in your cash till then, and have agreed to desire directions from your Hons, whether we shall Take in all that they shall Offer or how much as likewise whether you will not Think fitt to Alter y. Interest at least for any that may be presented in Future.

April 16th. 1725 the Agent of the Missionaries paid into Cash Three thousand three hundred Twenty nine pagodas and Thirty Three Fanams which It was agreed should be lodged there untill the Company's Answer could be Received in Relation to this Sum and the preceeding Two Thousand pagodas.

In paragraph 83 of the General Letter dated 1st. Decembr. last the Honble Court of Directors write us as Follows.

"Our last year's letter will inform you that we had consented to Receive of the China Missionaries or for their Accot pagodas ten Thousand and to allow them Six hundred pagodas a year for it which we apprehend will Include what was offered you in February last: If it be more let us know and how much.

Upon the whole, we Apprehend the Honble Company's meaning is that besides the Ten Thousand pagodas Received Into their Cash near Six years ago for Acco. of yo. said Missionaries we may Receive into Cash for their Account to the Amount of the further Sum of Ten Thousand pagodas.

To the Honble James Macrae Esqu.

SIR

Soon after the Grantham's departure arrived Mr. Wheatley from whom I Received the Two letters you was pleased to write me 25th. September and 20th. December last, the former a Copy of what you wrote by the Loretto which is not yet arrived here. I am afraid She's lost unless they have gone directly for Timore as has been surmised by our Padree's here who have some acquaintance on Board her.

The continuing me in my present Station notwithstanding Mr. Tempests being Appointed for it was the more agreeable to me in Regard it was an assurance I had not quite lost your esteem but I am yet more obliged by yor. kind Enquiries into my Affairs with Mr. Walsh and the Cautions I have Received concerning my private conduct nor can I Reflect on the Concern you express for me therein without being very Sensibly affected by it and Since all the Return yo. desire of me is to do my Duty to the Company if I Neglect it I am without excuse to them but much more to yo. whether my Behaviour here has been Regulated by these Sentiments I must Leave your Honour to judge.

I have enclosed Captain Tye's Receit for a Box Containing Mr. William Dunster's proportion of the Dividend made of the Estate of Thomas Dunster Esqr. deceased being Dollars 465—2—61.

I have also enclosed such a paper as you desire Relating to the demand Mr. Joseph Paice makes on the Company & am Sorry there is no more light to be had in that Business you have been misinformed as to our having the Books of those Times for excepting old Letter Books of which There is a pretty Compleat Sett and some Consultations before & during Mr. Collets management (and but very Few of Them) we have not a Scrape of a pen before Mr. Pyke's Arrival and even all his Consultations and some of the Accounts in his Time, are wanting, and have been ever since my Coming here.

I am glad the Gentlemen in Direction at home are sensible of the good Service you did the Company in this place It adds to the pleasure of doing one's duty to have it kindly Taken notice of and a Well Done, is a due from ev'ry Superior to a good and Faithfull Servant. I hope our Accounts since your departure will Satisfie Them, that the Reduction you made of the Charges here was indeed a very Valuable Service and a few years more yeild them large Quantities of pepper which may in Time Reimburse the sums that have been wasted by their Servants here. I have Received a very kind letter from Mr. Drummond, he tells me some part of my obligations to you which I knew not before & promises to Comply with your desire in assisting me with his Interest unless I Render myself unworthy of It. I wrote him a Letter by the way of Batavia and sent it in the packet we dispatched by Wheatley.

The Reasons given in the general letter for detaining the George Brigantine are Really True and if so I believe you will allow them to be good. I can't say so much for detaining the Grantham I Think she staid too long here which I did my best to prevent and if I had not been at Death's door as I then was She would have been dispatch'd Sooner. the True Reason of her Stay was giving the Captain Time to do his private Business and waiting till our Acots & Consultations were Finished and till Mr. Walsh could fill the Cash of which I was Impatient to send an Account by that Ship, for I had little Hope of Living to write yo. another Letter there was no likelyhood of getting so much Pepper as to fill her up in any Reasonable Time, We Believe here that you have Loaded her home and indeed I wish it may be so. It will hinder any other Ship lying here for the Future.

You will now Receive our Consultations & Accounts since the Grantham's departure and I have enclosed a General Abstract of the Cash & paymaster's accounts from the 1st. May 1725 to the 1st. May 1726. I Think no Disbursement has been made except what was really Necessary save a few presents to the Mallays the Sultan of Bantal's charges &c^a. which you will See under the head of Charges extraordinary I Think some of Them might have been Saved but as M^r. Walsh is of the Contrary opinion and that I know He has even disbursed of his own money on these occasions besides what is charged the Company I agreed to Them.

I can say no more about the new plantations in ye. Country than I wrote in my last, every Mallay that I talk with on the Subject assures me the people have made and are daily maks. a Great many and that in all probability we shall have much more pepper in a few years than ever these Settlements were known to produce. it will not be Long before we order a Survey at which I design God willing, to be present & to write you what I may observe in my next. the Chinkareen Trees planted last year by Mr. Walsh thrive but indifferently, mine are tolerably good and the Dupatty's garden is the best of the Three. We have Found the cause of their going Back I mean the Chinkareens which was planting Sticks and some of Them too long Cutt before they were Sett whereas those who have used the Seeds of the Chinkareen tree have hardly lost a Tree in a Thousand, one of Them has engaged to procure me Seed and I design to use it for the Future, we shall all plant Pepper in October next. I have got James Jedderee to oversee mine, and a Mallayman to assist him who was recommended to me for his Skill in planting and Taking care of Pepper Trees and shall spare no pains or cost I can Bear to Carry on the work in which I have been Deserted by Jedderee who loves to play a Sure game. I have now Three Quarters and Nangleone and our Charges Slaves and Cattle amount to near Two Thousand Dollars.

I have now got some of the Slaves Taught to mould Bricks but they are not yet Burnt it is my opinion that the Company need be at very little charge about Building in this place excepting for wood and Iron, their Slaves (allows, them Time) may make all the Bricks and Chinam they use without any Further charge than Building Sheds & Kilns for the purpose which need not cost them Dollars 500 thô they had Thrice as many buildings to make this I Thought myself obliged to write you that in case There are directions given for Building you make the proper Restrictions, which I think will be needfull. Though the grant of the Arrack and Ophium Licenses be in my name Its a Joint concern between Mr. Walsh and my self:

I engaged him to it because without That, we must either have allowed the Lieutenants to Farm Them or else they would have sold for much less Mr. Walsh farm'd the Arrack license last year at Dollars 180 P mensem and now he affirmd it was worth no more than dollars 100 we had the Opium a 134 by which we got about dollars 300 in fourteen months in short we can only Save our selves and do a Service to y. Company by It (the Salt License is worth 80 P mensem & if there's Fair play it will yeild That, the Arrack licence depends on the number of Souldiers the Company's vessels & other Accidents. It has Sometimes been worth Four Times as much as now.

Mr. Walsh continues to enjoy a perfect health and has lately got an addition to his Family of a Son he had like to have lost his wife but she is now entirely Recovered and all that Family in good health. though I was so near death it has pleased God I am perfectly Recovered and I think better than ever I was on this Coast we have lost Wheake Smith and Venables at the desire of the Two first I took on me the Care of their Affairs and Mr. Venables Appointed me his Trustee without my knowledge. Captain Nangle is joined with me in Mr. Wheake's business, I shall have much trouble with their Accounts & Mr. Walsh's He's indebted to them all. Mr. Smith's death in my Opinion was a great loss to the Company and the Greater in that there is no body here Qualified to take the charge of that Settlement in the present conjuncture thô there is none of our Subordinates but Thinks himslef Injured by not being Appointed to it. It Requires a great deal of prudence and diligence in ye. Residi. There to keep up the people to their Engagements with ye. Compa. and so to manage the Sultan and Rajah Gondom that Their private quarrels which are not to be Reconciled do not keep them from minding their plantations so much as they ought & the Company's Interest Requires they should do. Mr. Welsh is much too Rash and for Mr. Greenslate neither his understanding nor his Capacity for Business are such as might be expected from the Imployments he has had in India. Mr. Savage is now well qualified for the Accountant's office as to what Regards the writing part or the knowledge of Accounts to which I have contributed all I could and I must own Mr. Walsh not a little as he is the eldest Factor here so I think him every way the Fittest person here for our Council Mr. Fotheringham has improved much in his writing and is very Fitt for an Assistant but not for his present post, our principal Dependance there is on the Dattoo Bugguese who has behaved himself extreamly well. Mr. Gunn assists me in the Accountant's Office he behaves himself very diligently And I have promised him to write you so. Mr. Rigg seems a lad of good Sense, and I doubt not but in Time he will be an usefull Servant; Mr. Drummond Recommended him to me & he now lives with me.

It is a long Time since M^r. Walsh and his old Favourite have been at variance the Latter has been much to blame in his Behaviour towards him especially in what has passed about Those goods brought him by Wheatley to which he certainly disown^d, any Claim in Consultation for the Reasons there Assigned whether M^r. Wheatley Refused to Trust him at M^r. Walsh's desire I know not, he will probably write you the Story himself and Therefore I shall Say no more about It than that 1f M^r. Walsh had not Resigned his Claim I sho^d, no more than he have deem'd those goods unlicenced tho as I told him I believe the liberty Granted him was only for Investing his own money and Refused to make use of his Right to land the goods thô he Offered to Resign It to me as soon as M^r. Weatley Refused to Trust him with 'em. Thus Sir, I have done my Duty in writing you my Opinion of y^e. Company's Servants here, y^e, know Them & If y^e, have a better opinion of Their Qualifications I doubt not you will Shew It to their advantage.

There is one Lewis Perrey who has lived me ever Since yo'. departure and I have had many occasions to see his integrity for which I dare Answer He speaks and writes the Malay Language well, understands Arithmetick and writes a good hand and if yo. Think Such a one can be usefull to the Company as a Writer I Believe Yo. will Lay an obligation on a Thankfull and an honest man and give the Company a good Servant by ordering him in the Service.

As to my Affairs with Mr. Walsh it was a desire of Living in a good agreement with him that Lead me into his partnership with that view I Refused being Concerned a Third as he offered because I believed it proceeded from the Necessity of his Affairs and Accepted one Fourth of his Trade and He seem'd Sensible of the obligation we Signed an indenture of Partnership for three Years from the 25°. March 1725 wherein it was agreed y't neither should Sell saparately on the penalty of two Thousand dollars that If any Differences happened they shou'd be decided at Fort St. George by Arbitration in a limited Time that in case of death or departure the Survivor or Remaining Partner shod. Take the Stock on hand at the price they Stood on the Books & pay for one half in Twelve months and the other half in Two years after the Receiving Them with Five & Cent Interest in Fort St. George, at fifteen dollars & Ten pagodas—that our Cash should be divided and our Accounts ballaned yearly that Mr. Walsh shod keep the Cash and obligations of Debtors and the Accounts. In consequence of this agreement I paid him all I cou'd in part of my Fourth of his goods and gave him my Bonds in Twelve and Eighteen months at Five # Cent Interest for the Remainder, one of Them I have been enabled by this year's divd. to discharge & I hope to be able to pay the other when it's due we have Ballanced once and there Appears a profit of about Twelve Thousand dollars, that he might have as little as possible to Divert his application from the Company's Affairs and minding the Mallay Plantations I have Taken upon me almost the whole fatigue of the business and Lewis Perrey whom I mentioned before has been Serviceable to me as a Warehousekeeper. I have in Every other Respect endeavourd to gain his Confidence because without It my Counsel would have been of Little Service either to him or the Company & It's but a sad Condition a Man is in when all the good he can do is to oppose wrong measures; Therefore I have Sought to gain Mr. Walsh that I might assist and Encourage him to pursue such as I thought Right. 'tis in pursuit of this design that I have Assured him of doing whatever is in my power to extricate him from his present Difficulties in Fort S^t. George he now makes you a proposal of paying his debts There which He assures me do not Exceed Twenty Six Thousand dollars. He sends Five thousand in Specie which with the produce of the Sloop Goshawke's Cargo if safe with you and of the goods sent by this Vessell will if he be Sincere bring them under Ten Thousand Dollars yo. will Easily inform yourself of his Engagements at your place and I send you Enclosed a list of his debts here and I am Sure They are not more; I Send also an Accot. of his Effects here and that I may keep my word with him if you are enclined to Accept of his proposal and Think my Joining in obligation with him will Strengthen your Security I am willing to engage myself In a Joint Bond for whatever Sum his Necessity may Require not exceeding Twelve Thousand pagodas to be raid by Equal portions in Two years from the date of our obligations one in Twelve months the other in two years and have given directions to Mr. John Lauder my Attorney that on yor. intimation he may sign such bonds for me and also pay you the balla he is due me on Mr. Walsh's Account.

Sir you know M^r. Walsh perfectly well you will now be the best Judge whether it be practicable and Convenient for you to serve him on this occasion and therefore I Leave the part I am to act in it entirely in your hands I shall be Sincerely glad to Contribute to his Relief that both you & he may be convinced I have all the Inclination I ought to live in a Friendly Correspondence with him on the other hand if you find his affairs in such a bad condition as to decline medling with Them I must beg you will be so good as advise me of It how to behave myself towards him for the Future and what method I shall take to shun being further engaged with him what money he has or may Receive of mine before next January will only pay my debt to him but after that he will be daily Receiving money on my Account I know he will be unwilling to part with it & how to oblige him to it I know not and now if I have tired you with a long Story y°. must pardon me since you desired It. I have wrote you a letter jointly with M^r. Walsh desiring some goods at Respondentia if y°. engage in his affairs I Suppose you will send Them if not I desire you woud not Require the money due to me from M^r. Lauder which in that case I have ordered him to invest for me in a part of them goods we want. thô it will be a

loss not to have the whole I dare not as you to Lend me any money singly because whatever goods I Receive must be in partnership with Mr. Walsh and his affairs may possibly be in greater disorder than I Imagine.

Althô Jibb's project goes but Slowly on I have a good opinion of It's Succeeding and that if he Lives a few years he will be able to pay the Company but we have no person here Capable to Carry on that work in case of his death to prevent such a heavy Loss as the Ruin of the Sugarworks & all the money paid Jibb would be; I think it would be adviseable for y°. Company to make proposals to some man Skilld in that Trade for Coming over here; mean Time I hope y°. will send us some Potters for I dont expect we shall have any from Batavia.

If you would Send over one or two men that understood laying Terrasses They would be of Great Service and if you order us to Build we can't do without Them.

I have begun the General Accounts in Mr. Pyke's Time and hope to Compleat Them as also those under the management of Mess^{rs}. Hubbard and Dunster, to be sent by the next Conveyance.

I wish yo. all happiness, for I am very Sincerely

Since your departure I have made it my business to obey what you enjoyned me as to a Friendly agreement with M^r. Walsh under the Limitations you gave it from w^{ch}. I have not departed till now.

I am possibly going to write what may destroy me in your esteem but I owe you too much to be disingenuous with you or to conceal anything of moment from you. whatever the Consequence may be I have acted what to me seem'd best in the Circumstances I am in; but you are my Judge.

I know you have so much Friendship for the Deputy Govern'r. that you would be Sorry if any mischief Happen to him from the Imprudence of his past Conduct if he takes no wrong measures for the Future, upon this Account I am now put to my last Shift what to Resolve or how to Act his Bills on Madrass are sent me protested to the amount of Five thousand pagodas his bond of Seven thousand Five hundred dollars to the Company on Mr. Deane's Account is due he has not yet paid the Three thousand Four hundred dollars he owes Accot. the Ballances at your departure and to Satisfie all this has not Two Thousand dollars in money all oweing to his former imprudence in Buying up a Quantity of Goods so much Above his Stock & Credit what to do in this Case perplexes me extreamly If we proceed Regularly the Nonpayment of that bond must be Entered in Consultation and advised to Fort St. George, his protested Bills must be also Returned thither where his Creditors no doubt will Cry to you for justice if it be so how will you avoid coming to a Resolution Fatal to his Fortune or Reflect upon your self and then all the blame will be thrown upon me. I shall be Called the incendiary that made a Difference between you and Ruined Mr. Walsh and his Family to advance myself & you perhaps Reflected on for Raising your Countrymen on the Ruins of much Better Men, and to prevent all this there's but one Remedy web. I fear you will Think worse than ye disease be that as it will I Resolve to venture it and Submit to what ye shall Think I deserve for so doing; I will allow Mr. Walsh to enter in the Cash Book and Consultation book that his bond is paid and to Take two chests of money out of the Companys Treasure to save his Credit and keep him from Ruin. well know this is disobeying the Company's positive orders in a Thing of the Greatest Consequence to them web. I shod never have consented to but in the present Case & I hope your pardon for it since your Friendship for Mr. Walsh was ye. sole

Cause of my Acting in this manner for I need not Tell yo. Sir, that I never had any obligations to him to engage me to Run such hazards on his Account. I have Taken his bond for my Security that in case of his death the Cash shall be made good out of his estate and I am very sure without an Extraordinary loss by Fire he will be able to make all good in Twelve months' Time and that he may do it the sooner I have Resolved to Forbear all trade on my own account to gather in what I have as fast as I can & lend it him to pay into Cash & Take a share of his goods for Two years from the 1st Janry next thô I am very sure it will be to my loss.

Thus Sir, I have laid open the Case to you & shall willingly Submit to your determination. I only desire that Mr. Macrae may be my Judge and not the Governour of Madrass.

According to an order of Consult^a. the 21st of Last month we have been to Survey the Silver mint and Find it gone so much to decay that we Think it absolutely necessary to pull it down It is founded upon a large spot of ground & Scituate as much to Leeward of the English Town as possible to be within y^e. walls being in the very eye of the South East wind; a Rough plan we Lay before your Hon^r. &c^a and humbly offer our proposals as follow.

First to part off a peice of the Southermost ground to build the Essaymaster's Lodgings to consist of a small hall a lodging Room and a Closet to render which the more wholesome for him and usefull to the Mint we propose Two Storys; the first about Ten foot high which will serve for weighing and keeping metals and what other uses shall be thought fitt & for the Stairs to go up to the Lodgings the Cheapest way will be to Carry them up without side with Bricks laid edgeways in Chinam w^{ch}. will last many years the Rest of the ground will be Sufficient & Convenient for the Melters, Refiners, Coiners &c^a.

We are of opinion should we attempt pulling down the old Buildings at once what with the vast heaps of Filth now & Rubbish that must be the ground will be so pestered that it must not only Impede the Mint business for a Considerable Time but perhaps give opportunity for embezzlement of some of the old materials and be Imposed on by the Labourers we Therefore Believe 'twill be much Better as the one is Raising to pull down the other Gradually always making use of such of those materials as can be applied to the New work.

There are two old Godowns which the Essaymaster at present Calls their Treasury covered with palmeras and Terrassed &c^a near the place where his lodgings are designed which We believe the Top part must be all new done he Representing they Cannot be without Them or such like places adding they will be more Secure as being near his lodgings the Rest of the ground will be Sufficient for all their Tiled Sheds Fire places and what other Conveniencies they Require.

The Townwall which bounds this ground to the River likewise wants Repairs which may be done when the work is Finishing.

We Believe if Time and weather will permit 'twill be proper to Lay the Foundations and carry them above the Surface of the Earth before the Rains sett in but it will be impracticable to proceed further till February or March next.

Our Honble Masters in the paragraph of their Gen! Letter this year relating to the Silver mint seem unwilling to have more done than what premised and to do it with all Frugality

The Ground at present being Irregular and much incumber'd we can't at present compute the Cost though we are of opinion that with the help of the old materials it may be Done for fifteen hundred pagodas or thereabouts. Mr. James Hubbard whose Lodgings are near it and the Essaymaster promise their Eye upon

the works and the Paymaster promises the Same care as his own so we have not at present further to offer than that we are with all Imaginable Respect

President's Request and brought to town three days ago, he had for securing [him] from escaping again, ordered him into prison: the sd. petition and of the said declaration are as entered hereunder.

The next day after ordered I caused an advertisement to be Affixed at the Seagate giving notice to all Merchants and others that they might treat with M^r. Emmerson for their passage or freight of goods upon the George Brigantine to Pegue upon the usual terms.

Mr. Secretary Pyot acquainting me that your Hon, &c. Council in pursuance to the Company's orders sent him to demand of me the Ballance of the Junk's Accot, which was paid by me to the Barcalong of Siam for his junk Taken by Captain John Jones in the Ship Anne at the port of Amoy in China.

In answer to which I make this Remonstrance to Yo'. Hon'. &c''. when I was Leaving this port in the year 1719 bound for the port of Siam Govern'. Collett &c''. Council sent for me & told [me] They had made an order of Council for me to Satisfie y''. Barcalong of Siam and pay him for his junk but not to exceed four thousand pagodas; accordingly I did and made it up for und'. Three Thousand pagodas and paid him out of the Owner's of the Ship Brittania's money and at my return home the money was repaid by the Gov''. and Council.

Therefore I hope your Hon. &c. will Consider I was [but] the Govern. and Council's Factor and had no interest in this affair and followed but the Govern. and Council's orders and as I am an Inhabitant of this place, should I not have Complied with the orders of Government Govern. Collet would not have Scrupled to have Sent me to England; and by complying with those orders I hope your Hon. &c. Council will not Let me be a Sufferer, or order me to pay any Thing so much in my wrong. A Copy of the orders d. me by the Secretary I herewith deliver.

M^r. Richard Benyon being well Acquainted with this affair when he made the last dividend of the Tea by order of Edward Harrison Esq^r. took care to deduct each person's Share that was in India on accot of the Pag^s. 1250—which amounts to pagodas 542-8-46 as your Hon^r. &c^a. will See as & Acc^o. Taken out of M^r. Benyon's Dividend Book (the Copy herewith delivered) So that there Remains but Pag^s. 707-27-34 which M^r. Edw^d. Harrison can give an Account of; he being the principal owner of [Ship] Anne. Therefore I hope your Hon^r. &c^a. Council will Relate that Affair to the Honble Company.

An Extract of a Consultation held by the Honble Joseph Collett Esq. President and Govern R , &c. Council of Fort S^{T} . George the 12^{TH} . June 1719.

"The president Represents that whereas Twelve hundred pagodas were formerly paid out of the Honble Company's Cash on Acco. the China Junk to "Captain Powney in order to pay the said Sum (being what the said Junk sold for here) "to the Barcalong of Siam to whom She belonged, the sd. Barcalong Refused to Accept "y". sd. 1200 pagodas, alledging that the junk stood him in about Four Thousand pagodas and that as he had not given occasion for that Capture he insisted upon "full Satisfaction. the President adds that Capta. Powney being now bound to Siam it will be proper for him to make up that affair upon the best terms he can for the owners of ye. Ship Anne which took the sd. Junk. Agreed yt. Capt. Powney have "liberty to make up that affair with the Barcalong of Siam & to give him satisfaction for the Junk not Exceeding 4000 pagodas.

Setting one of their Pariars half way in the ground where he kept him Three hours and fined him.

Another Pariar he chabuckd twenty five blows, Put him Into the Stocks and kept him there an hour.

He tied one of their Shepherds Neck and heels for four or five days an hour each day and beat him very much & fin'd him.

He broke a talliar's Back and Turned him out of ye. Village.

He tied a Shopkeeper of the village neck and heels putting an heavy Stone on his back and kept him so an hour and then fined him.

He served another Shopkeeper in the same manner.

He has done too many other barbarous actions to your Petitioners to give your Hon, in writing an Account of. therefore they humbly Implore your Hon, to take their case into Consideration and order them Satisfaction. They Can't go on with their Business if he be Continued the Renter.

Your Petitioner being obliged to pay Ancona's money humbly begs your Hon. &c. will please to order the said Tommana Chittee's house and Shops & Arnagery's house and jewels to be sold at public outcry and the produce paid into your Petitioner's hands; then he will pay Ancona the principal and Interest of his money and if Tommana Chittee or Arnagery shall hereafter make any claim your petitioner will be answerable to Them and Ancona has nothing more to do with Them.

Your Petitioner humbly hopes for your Honrs. &ca. favour herein, and as in Duty bound, he shall Ever pray.

THE REPRESENTATION OF RAWSON HART IN HIS OWN BEHALF AND IN BEHALF OF CAPTAIN HERON HART.

That being at Surat in the month of April 1721 and the Europe ship Cadogan being then ordered from that port to Bussorah, we shipped upon her Thirty one bales of Bengal peice goods for our own accounts and four bales of white gurrahs for account of Mr. Robert Frankland that the Honourable Company might have the Benefit of the Freight consigned to Mess's George Petty, Lewis Gray, James Nevill and John Durley with instructions to dispose of said goods for our and Mr. Robert Frankland's account the first good Opportunity.

The Cadogan being arrived at Bussorah these Gentlemen demanded our Bales according to Bill of Lading but were Refused them by Isaac Houssaye Esqr. Chief &ca. Council there who had taken them into their Custody though there were then daily opportunities of disposing Some part or other of Them.

Whereupon Mess^{rs}. Gray, Nevill and Durley made a Demand for said Bales in writing the 30th. of October 1725 to which they received answer from Mess^{rs}. Isaac Houssaye, William May and Martin French in writing likewise that they owned the Recept of the Bales and of a Cittamee for them Signed by M^r. Benjamin Francia yet that because they the Supra Cargoes had refused to comply with an order of the Honourable Presidency of Bombay for paying two & Cent Consulage upon their cargoes from Bengal they would not deliver the bales unless Mess^{rs}. Gray, Nevill and Durley would previously oblige themselves to pay the s^d. Consulage on the goods Demanded.

Mess¹⁸. Gray, Nevill and Durley being surprized at this answer as having a Bill of Lading for the Bales knowing they paid all duties at Surat and no instructions about the consulage insisted upon to be paid protested Severally against Mess¹⁸. Houssaye, May and French for all damages they or their Owners might Sustain by their being so detained which has hitherto had no Effect. our goods are still in their possession to the amount of Twenty one thousand eight hundred and Seventy Rupees six annaes and Seven pice as P invoice herewith delivered together with Authentic Copies of all papers abovementioned for confirmation of the facts, I take the liberty to Represent to your Hon¹. &c¹⁸. Council to which I beg leave to add the following Remarks.

The aforesaid thirty five Bales were Regularly entered from Surat, had paid all Dutys and demands there and freighted upon a Company's ship which I flatter myself will vindicate us to the Honourable Company from any Intention or design to elude or dispute their orders. We have traded Several years under their protection and paid them their duties and Customs in this case we was not Acquainted with their orders for paying consulage at Bussorah and consequently could give no instructions about it. This Conduct of Messieurs Houssaye, May and French will not I hope Honourable Sir and Sirs in any construction Excuse them the damages we actually Sustain by their having Detained so great a part of our estates in this Manner.

Beside the use of Twenty one thousand eight hundred and Seventy Rupees Six annaes and Seven Pice and the Disadvantage it is for us to be without it at this Time I beg Leave to lay one more paper before the Honourable Board Signed by Mess¹⁵. Gray, Nevill and Durley by which it appears we have Lost a very good market for our goods and that there is reason to apprehend from the importation of Large Quantities of the Same Sortments since that we shall not find such another Especially considered that Great Quantitys of the same sort of goods are prepard to send to Bussorah this year, all which will Likewise Turn the exchange of money to our disadvantage by all Appearance.

Mess^{rs}. Houssaye and Council knew these Bales belonged chiefly to me and my Brother and that we are inhabitants of Fort S^t. George and once every year within the power of the Three Presidencies with our Effects so that the Honourable Company could Run no Risque of the two \$\P\$ Cent consulage upon our goods whenever it should be demanded.

Wherefore we earnestly Request your Hon. &c. to Take our case into your consideration and Lay it before the Honourable Court of Directors from whose Equity and justice we humbly expect Redress and that they will order Satisfaction to be made us by Messieurs Houssaye &c. Council of the damages we Sustain by the Detention of so large a part of our small Fortunes as hereabove Narrated.

I humbly presume to offer that if [these cables] were not Imported the Coire they are made of must come to this place and pay Equal Customs to the Company, besides these Cables sold to ships in this place if damaged or not well made, may pass for Madrass Cables and bring an ill Repute on the cables and cordage of this place which has hitherto the Repute of Laying cables the best of any Port in India of all which I most humbly Request your Honr. &ca. Consideration.

Your Petitioner has now Brought an Attestation signed by many Great Gentlemen at Arcott witnessing that your Petition. is the next heir to the said Deceased Nundiram which your Petitioner hopes is a Sufficient authority for receiving the said money and that your Hon. would please to give such orders Therein as Your Hon. shall Think meet & Yor. Petition.

The undersubscribers have at the request and desire of me Hirdaram son of Nelicant Braminy late Inhabitant of Arcott Set their hands and Seals to this Attestation signifying that I did to them Severally Declare that my brother Nundaram having a desire to return to his native country Bengal did set out from Arcot accordingly and took a Bill of exchange from Oppajee Nelicant and Suncaramah Merchants of said place upon Vencatachelum Son of Suncarama for two Thousand six hundred fifty six Rupees Payable in Madrass, which Bill was duly honoured that the said Nundiram afterward paid the money Into the hands of the then Governour of Madrass and having Allowed him a Praemium for the same took another Bill of exchange from him upon his Correspondents in Bengal for two thousand seven hundred Seventy three rupees Payable there, as will further Appear by a letter he wrote to Goolah Brauhi to the same Effect, that I have frequently sent letters to Bengal to enquire after him but not being able ever to learn any news of him it is most probable he must have been Cutt off in the way by the Robbers about Indostan, that I then procured a Perwanah from the Nabob to the Governour of Madrass concerning this matter and that the Governour of Madrass told me he was ready to pay the money if I could Prove by Certificate from the Codgee of Arcot that I was the True heir to Nundaram Deceased. In confirmation of which and that I am Brother to Nundaram deceased and the rightfull heir to his estate they have Set their hands and seals as above Specified in Arcot this tenth day of February 1722 to this Instrument to be produced for my justification when occasion shall offer.
