The Consultation and Diary book of James Macrae Esqr. President and Governour &ct. Council of Fort St. George, containing their proceedings and transactions in the affairs of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, relating to the Presidency of the Coast of Choromandell, began this second day of January, one thousand seven hundred twenty eight.

The Second and the rest of the Gentlemen of the Council, the Mint Master, Secretary, Doctors and two Officers have as few attendance as can possibly be expected, considering the Charges they have upon their hands, and the Constant business They are obliged to go through.

FORT ST. GEORGE, FEBRUARY 1728-29

We proceed now to offer to your Hon. &ct. Consideration the number of Peons appointed to watch at the Batteries and Mettahs, most of whom we suppose are kept there to prevent clandestine importations of goods but the Land Customer assures us that upon taking his rounds he has seldom found them upon duty, and when the reason was demanded, They answered that the Chief Peon had drawn them off to attend upon the Governour which we are sure he need not have done had he Constantly so many in pay as he brings to the Muster Table.

We cannot Conceive what necessity there is of seven Peons at Egmore Fort, and one at the Washing Town, when four are Sufficient, and the Warehousekeeper is allowed Peons for that Purpose.

We Cannot but Think that eighteen Peons at the nine gates are necessary, but at the same time we must represent them rather as a nuisance than any thing else Since They Think it as much their right to Take Toll upon all Greens, Bratty, wood and fish, as much as if there was really a legal Tax Laid upon provisions, and This lies very heavy upon the poorer Sort of people.

Upon the List We find four Peons to look after the Governour's Lodgings in the Fort which seems utterly Unnecessary, considering that there is a Sentry posted at the Stair's foot

What reasons there is for keeping Two peons at Chepauck, we cannot Learn any better than that the Chief Peon Tells us it was also so.

We likewise find Twelve peons placed as a Guard to the White Town, but whether there is any necessity for that, we Submit, to your Hon. &ct. Consideration.

As reducing expences is so much recommended, the Company's Merchants may dispense with two Peons allowed to each of them.

the Chubdars, Moldars, Drummers; Pipers, &ct. State attendance are so absolutely necessary to support the dignity of the Governour and honour of the Company among these Country people that the number cannot be diminished without apparent detriment.

Your Honour &c^t, are so well acquainted with the reasons for my not producing these Accounts more early that I presume I need not here repeat them.

The rigorous methods that have been us'd for the receiving this part of the Company's revenue have reduced the bad debts so often complained of, almost to noth. vizt. on acco. Quit rent, eight pagodas four fanams & ten Cash and on acco. of Scavinger's duty three pagodas & twenty two fanams and seventy Cash, of which six pagodas twenty four fanams is the Company's Indulgence to some Soldiers and Gunners the residue, five pagodas and three fanams falls on four and twenty shops and sheds, which have perishd and been washed away by the rains; thus the whole is no more than eleven pagodas and twenty seven fanams. I cou'd wish my Concern to prevent the Honble Company's complaints has not overlooked many real objects of their Charity. I think I have taken no less than a hundred and fifty four doors from the houses, several apparel, bedding, and the like from those who were otherwise unable to pay the Tax imposed on them by the Committee appointed for that purpose how far this may answer our Honble Master's design or suit the Company's Interest I must leave to your Hon. &ct. determination; but This must be the case if They will have what They call, no bad debts.

I also pay into the Honble Company's Cash Two hundred ninety nine pagodas and twenty seven fanams, being the amount of the empty grounds and houses forfeited, and sold by order of Consultation for the payment of the Tax Set by the former Rentrolls.

I also present a new rentroll for the last year wherein the quit rent amounts to Two Thousand six hundred & three pagodas and three fanams 2603. 3. — and the Scavinger's duty eleven hundred and sixteen pagodas and twenty fanams. 1116. 20.—the whole being Three thousand seven hundred and nineteen pagodas and twenty three fanams. 3719. 23.—which I hope will meet with your Approbation.

Maria Elveira to remain with her till your Petitioner's return, as your Petitioner hath often done when going on the like voyages, being now returned again your Petitioner received the melancholy

notice that the aforesaid Child was missing from the said house on Friday the 14th. Febry. last new Stile, at past Twelve at night, and for her there was ready at the Seaside a Palanqueen and several Peons, which Conducted the Same to this City, as was found in about eight days after this Insult done, whereupon the Reva. Padre Thomas went to the house of Major John Roach as one of the Justice of Peace in this City and represented to him the said Insult and Dishonour done to the People in general, and craved that for his Sake and credit he would cause enquiry to be made where the said Child was & who 'twas that had done this Injustice to which the sa. Major Roach Answered there was no occasion for So much trouble, that he knew where she was, and If he pleased could produce her and further said that the said Child was not the Daughter of Your Petitioner but of Mr. Robert Raworth and that She is now under his protection, and that he will give her five or six hundred pagodas in marriage and that it appertaineth unto him to do that Justice for that he hath a power of Attorney to that purpose from Mr. John Raworth and that also the Child requested it of him and further told the said Padre Thomas that he might Acquaint the Gentlemen of St. Thome with this answer that it now belong to him to Take care of and maintain the said Child, and that he would have them pretend no further in this Affair.

To Consider the foregoing particulars It will appear that Major Roach was the Inducer and Cause of Taking away the said Child from the house wherein your Petitioner had placed her, and the following reasons will prove that the said Child is not the Daughter of M'. Robert Raworth for that the Mother of the said Child left this City and went to S'. Thome more than fifteen months before her delivery of this Child, the said Mr. Raworth left India for France in the year 1714 and the sd. Child was then aged five years, and to this time what care did the Said Mr. Robert Raworth ever take of the said Child, did he ever demand her, did he ever give her any subsistance, or what charge hath he been at for her maintenance, which he might well have done in the posts and power he bore in India, the said Robert Raworth's brother John Raworth also arrived from Europe and Staid in India some years, what did he ever do for the Child, or did he once demand her, as neither of the Brothers ever did in any manner Lay claim to the Child, nor do any thing for her when so young, and They in these parts, it seems very unlikely that at this Distance there should now come a power & Letter of Attorney as is alleged by Major Roach to this end, and if it was so, before what Justice did he present or shew such Letter or power as he ought to have done, and not have been a judge in his own cause, well might said Major Roach say to the Reverend Padre Thomas that he knew where the st. Child was, and that he could produce her, for it is notorious that he received her at his house when she came at that time of [night] from St. Thome & seems rather that he was the taker of her, for how is it possible that a Child brought up in the close manner as is Customary to bring up Children of ye. Portuguese in India without any acquaintance or knowledge of the world with So much resolution and courage to go out at that time of night, and directly to get a Palanquin and Peons to conduct her to Madras. It is plain and evident to be seen that Some person must have seduced her by Flattery or other means to pass such an excess of shame and Scandal, neither is it to be believed that the Child on her own head should so leave the house and go directly to Major Roach as a Justice of Peace to Complain of oppression received, neither, at those hours does it seem good for any Justice of Peace so much to prejudice the Honour of a Maiden as to receive her in his house but rather for a good example and to preserve her honour would have Sent her to Some creditable house till the morning or till he could have had an opportunity to acquaint the Governour of the Affair who as Chief Justice, ought to have been So Acquainted, instead of which Major Roach kept and still doth continue to keep the said Child in his house to her great Scandal and dishonour, and without the fear of any Man under pretence of being under his protection and that he will give her in marriage, all which makes it appear plainly that Major Roach had induced the Girl to leave the house where she was placed by your Petitioner, and what man that hath any regard to his honour and not Lost to shame will marry a woman after this Scandal to her reputation never to be Taken off, lastly to what Major Roach says that the Child is not your Petitioner's daughter, It is a thing

not in the power of any Man to prove, though so many years as She is old she has been known to all people as the Child of your Petitioner, and though if She actually denies that she is your Petitioner's Child, and accompanies such denial with other Scandalous and injurious Language, who will believe a young woman lost in error, in fear of her reputation, and Incited by others, will she not say it, and will she not throw Such scandal and yet far greater on those that gave her being and if she was asked if she ever heard her Mother say that your Petitioner was not the Father of her or of her Brothers or Sisters, Your Petitioner beleives She will even say that too, but that cannot hide it from all the inhabitants of Madras and St. Thomé for as your Petitioner's Children They were baptized and educated and if she and They were not the Children of your Petitioner he would Scarce have brought them up with So much care and love, and at these years to pass so much fatigue and trouble and risque of Life to get them fortunes to Set them forward in the world and to give them in Marriage, and as your Petitioner is an Inhabitant of this City & is Subject to the Laws thereof, so it is but reasonable to hope for and expect their protection and in what more than for our Children.

Your Petitioner therefore prays your Honour &ct. to examine of this great injustice done by Major Roach to your Petitioner and dishonour to your Petitioner's Child, for as the said Major Roach is a justice of the peace of this City of Council for affairs of the Honble Company, and Commander of the Military he ought to Suppress Such proceedings, and not himself to be the actour and cause of Scandal and dishonour to the discredit of his nation and of his Colony, no government in the world sure will suffer Such usage, thereby to give occasion for the like proceedings in others, to be the destruction of the Republic, and as you are or all may be Fathers, your Petitioner again prays you will Take this affair in due consideration, and reflect how severe a stroke this must be to a parent and also the Scandal that will attend the Place where such usage is Suffered,

for which, Your Petitioner as in duty bound, Shall ever pray &ct.

The few inhabitants of the Ruined and poor City of S^t. Thomé send this their most just Complaint on occasion of the scandalous affair of Sebastian Texeira de Britto's daughter, who privately in the night went out of an honest house standing in S^t. Thome where her father according to his constant custom, had left her, and the same night she was conducted to Major Roach's house, where she has now been for a month past, those Cautions, not being Sufficient (which were Such as a Father could use when according to the Custom of the Portuguese in India he leaves the shore) in order to secure his Child, It is Supposed that promises were the means that brokedown the walls of her retreat and modesty, an example which these Inhabitants though poor, never met with from the Moors themselves who rule and govern here without controul, and in reality injurious to the Community for in future there will be no house secure, however honest it may be, This excess having opened a way to many others, as if there was not Justice to be found to punish actions so pernicious to the good and Quiet of the public.

Wherefore we request of the Honble Governour and his Council that They will find out some remedy for what is past and to prevent such enormities in future, and also that an Authentic copy of this Complaint and of the determination which shall be made thereon may be transmitted to the Supreme Court of the Honble Company, of which the said Inhabitants of S^t. Thomé where this Injury was offered, will send another Copy to be delivered them by the Envoy of Portugal in England, to the end that the said Court may be informed of the Conclusion of this Affair and Confirm the same, in order to prevent the like accidents in future.

"In answer to this charge I shall endeavour to convince this Honble Court that neither the words herein before recited or any other part of the said answer what-soever are in the least reflects on the Character or Conduct of the said Mr. Burton which allegations I doubt not to make good to this Honble Court by demonstrative Proofs of the same.

"to go on regularly in my answer to this charge it is necessary here to inform this Honble Court that upon the humble application of Quoindal Ragana this Court was pleased to indulge him with a certain day to answer the complaint of Narran as abovementioned, whereupon the said Quoindal Ragana applied himself to me to draw up an answer to the bill of Complaint, which conformable to my duty I did, and after having stated the case in the best manner I could, I go on in these words—"but during the absence of this Defendant, the Complainant moved the Court and obtained an order for sale of the said house and ground under pretence of this Defendants not having Answered the said bill & in pursuance of such order hath sold the said house and ground for sixty pagodas or thereabouts, although the same was actually worth one hundred and twenty pagodas or thereabouts, which proceedings of the Complainant, this Defendant humbly apprehends are Illegal and unjust, and that the sale of the said house is in itself void and unwarrantable, being expresly contrary to the Customs of this Honble Court an oppty being taken for the sale when neither this Defendant his Attorney or any for him were present to bid, and but very few If any black people did bid for the same whereby the said house was disposed of for much less than the value."

"Upon this Answer, Mr. Burton hath founded his Complaint and saith that "therein I have reflected on his conduct in the sale of the said house, and that my "alledging the proceedings of the Plaintiff to be Illegal, and praying that the said sale "may be set aside—is highly Injurious to the character of him the said Mr. Burton "which I conceive I am no wise guilty of for the following reasons-first, for that "whatever hath been done by the said Mr. Burton in relation to the sale of the said house was in pursuance of an Authority given him by this Honble Court as "Sheriff of Fort St. George &ct. and agreeable to the tenour of a precept to him directed for that purpose, grounded on a Decree of the same Court, which decree having been obtained by an imposition on this Honble Court by the said Narran (whose proceedings herein only are arraigned & said in the said answer to be Illegal and unjust, and not the said Mr. Burton's) I therefore think it a natural Inference that if the decree is ill grounded, all future proceedings by virtue of such decree are consequently illegal and unjust. Secondly, for that it appears by the replication put in by the said Narran to the aforesaid answer and to which I beg leave to refer, that the said Narran to the aforesaid answer and to which I beg leave to refer, that the said Narran to the sum of ninety pagodas upon the mortgage of fifty pagodas with the Interest due thereon, whereas upon an Account Current to be Taken, I am well assured there is not due to him above forty pagodas or thereabouts interest

included, and that the said Narran should have sued upon the ballance of accounts evidently appears from his acknowledging in the said replication that the said first mortgage bond of fifty pagodas was actually included in the Latter mortgage of two hundred & so of course discharged-all which I apprehend to be a substantial reason for alledging the proceedings of the said Narran to be illegal and unjust and that I could no way design thereby to call in question the Character or conduct of the said Mr. Burton.

I come now to speak to the second allegation in Mr. Burton's charge, where he mentions these words, set forth in the said answer of Quoindal Ragana "sale of the said house shall be set aside and the pretended sale thereof shall be declared void" but I apprehend Mr. Burton hath greatly mistaken those words, because the others wch. immediately precede them quite alter the sense of the Thing as will appear by the answer itself which says thus "and therefore this Defendant hopes that the said Order for sale of the said house may be set aside and that the pretended sale thereof shall be declared void "-this part of the charge as well as the foregoing has immediate reference to the proceedings in general of the Complainant and cannot in the least reflect upon the proceedings of Mr. Burton Sheriff who only acted therein by such precept as is before set forth, and therefore consequently could be no ways concerned in the Illegal methods by which that precept was obtained.

however waving what I have before said to vindicate myself in the matters I am charged with, I shall proceed and make it appear that the Things in the said answer alledged, are no more than the common form of Bills Answers &ct. regulated by the Instructions sent to this Honble Court by the United East India Company, and allowed & Approved by the practice of the Court of Chancery.

to prove this assertion, I beg leave to quote the Instructions themselves which have reference in several parts thereof to the printed books sent out the same year and as I Conceive to recommend the precedents and rules therein laid down as the best and surest method for our practice in this Honble Court, to these books it is I refer and more Especially to two volumes entituled Praxis Alma Curia Cancellaria wherein variety of rules, precedents and cases in most suits of Equity are Stated, and particularly in the first volume thereof in the 160 page in the fifth line of the third paragraph, are these remarkable words (in a case wherein an appeal was Lodged to his Majesty in Council to reverse a decree in the Court of Chancery) "the Appellant is thereby damnified about Two Thousand pounds and is advised that the said decree is unjust and ought to be reversed" whereby the Judgment of that High Court is arraigned in very express terms. I infer from hence, that such like allegations being words of course and meer matter of form, naturally arising and very necessary to come to the truth of the cause in question, cannot be detrimental to the character of any one, being Common assertions in all such cases and incerted, as the merit of the Dispute requires and therefore I humbly Conceive that as Such rules are the practical method of these Courts I can be no ways guilty of reflecting on Mr. Burton's conduct in the premises by following the Instructions and rules in those books I have referred to.

The Merchants were hereupon Called in and the above proposals offered them, which They refused, alledging that the great droughth in the Country and dearness of Cotton made it very difficult to provide Cloth and that Therefore They could not Comply therewith.

I must account it a very great misfortune to find myself appointed a second time to the West Coast, after you appeared to have been so fully satisfied with the reasons I before gave for declining to go thither.

and it gives me the greater concern to perceive that I am now stationed in a lower degree, since I cannot charge myself with having acted anything in the mean time which should subject me to your displeasure, nor do I think otherwise than that I am obliged in Justice to myself to represent to your Honour &ct. that it is an hardship to be postponed to Mr. Lennox &ct. to whom my standing in the Honble Company's service certainly gives me a precedence, and more especially as this seems to be agreeable to the sense of the Honble Company's Letters received this Year.

but besides this, I beg your honour &c. will take into consideration the regard which our Honble Masters have expressed in the 87th. paragraph of their Letter of 21th. February & Eyles for the Interest and preservation of such of their servants who being engaged in trade might be ruined in their affairs by being sent away, which I hope may be extended to my benefit, as I believe most of the Board are sensible I have for these several years been largely engaged in trade, and as I have at present Large concerns abroad which must take a Considerable time to Get in, I must Suffer an irreparable damage by being absent. I hope to be the more readily favoured in

I am very sorry to find the reasons I offered in my paper of 25th. August, are not of force enough to engage you to alter your resolutions of sending me to the West Coast, and that my refusal will be attended with the very severe and yet unprecedented penalty of being dismissed from the Honble Company's Service and immediately sent home as Signified to me by your Secretary the same day, these are very hard terms & Your Honour &ct. must believe I have considered the case thoroughly, yet I Cannot but abide by the reasons I then Gave you for declining to go thither, which I do with all deference still Insist upon as my natural right and agreeable to the Equitable indulgence given in common to their servants by our Honble Masters.

to explain this, I beg leave to observe that in the very Case now depending, They have thought fit in the 123^d. paragraph of their Letter Aurengezeb of 3^d. Jaury. 1709/10 to direct a milder punishment to be imposed, and that is suspension only till their pleasure shall be known, and which your selves have confirmed to be a Standing order in your Consultation of 8th. April 1728 in M^r. Lauder's case, and therefore I hope I shall not be the first to fall by a Law to be made by you, ex post Facto.

If these reasons will not avail with your Honour &c. to prevent my dismission, I still hope to be so far indulged and earnestly beg to be permitted to stay in India at least till I can Gather in my Effects of which I have much more abroad than I can call my own, and therefore surely it is a very reasonable request, and the refusing such a liberty appears to be so far from the Intentions of the Company, that in the 66th paragraph of their Letter of 21th. February 1728/9 & Eyles they say "they approve of your indulgence in giving time even to such as are residing in India without their License to Gather in their Effects", how much more then might I Expect to be favoured in this respect, who not only have been encouraged to Carry on an extensive trade under the security of their Covenants which is the most valuable Encouragement in their service, but have otherwise served them near eight years to the best of my Capacity.

Upon the whole, I recommend the premises to your serious consideration, which are of very great Consequence, as thereon depends in a great measure the welfare of

Honble S. and Sirs

Pursuant to an order of Consultation dated 21th. May, appointing us to inspect the West Coast books and papers and report to this Board what is therein Contained relating to the state and condition of that Settlement, we come now to acquaint your Honour &ct. that the care the Supravisor has taken to rectifie the oversights mentioned in our last Letter wrote them \$\Phi\$ the Marlbrough, and the regular method into which he has brought the accounts and affairs there leaves us but little room for particular remarks, we shall however touch upon some material occurrences as have happend between the dispatch of the James and Mary and the date of this their last Letter of the 27th. January 1728/9.

the difficulty the Gentlemen at Fort Marlbrough do and have always Laboured under for want of Good and sufficient boats to load and unload their ships is so apparent that no pains or Expence should be wanting to remedy that evil and the method proposed by them of having flat bottomed boats built at Pegue would probably answer the Intent, was the danger and trouble of transporting such boats thither to be surmounted, we humbly conceive such boats could be built there could we supply them with Teak from hence or that Prows could be hired to fetch it from Javah, the disposition that is made with the Sultan for shipping the pepper in the Anacksoongey Country must in a few years save the Company a great deal of money, due care therefore ought to be taken to keep the Sultan Gondom to his agreement and to supply him with materials for that service.

We observe & Consult. of the 13th. Janry. 1728/9 there is a defficiency of 7 Coyan and 227 bamboos of salt and ten pound of brimstone sent over by the Marlbrough which is much more in proportion to the quantity wanting in the former Cargo & the same ship, at the same time the Gentlemen there Believe Captain Montgomery to have Taken all the care imaginable to prevent any waste or Embezzlement, it must therefore follow that the ship was not in so good condition as the former Voyage, or some deceit has been practised in the measurage to prevent which the Captain should employ his Syrang or some other person, to see it measured here and deliver it at the designed port, and as the Captain has cleared himself it is but reasonable that 3 Coyan and 627 bamboos be wrote off our books.

The reasons given for the indolence of the meaner sort of people among the Malays and their backwardness to cultivate the pepper plantations are so manifest that till the interest of money is reduced and that abominable Custom of making their Debtors, slaves, be abolished, It is not to be imagined that any great Quantity of pepper can be procured; towards accomplishing of which the paying for Pepper with ready money and Taking Care that an Equal distribution be made of the same will very much contribute.

The condition of See Jibb seems to be desperate and so long as such a weight of Debt hangs upon him It is not to be supposed he will use any great Efforts to extricate himself, or that any one else will join with him in Carrying on the sugar and arrack manufacture till it shall be put on such a footing as shall give him some hopes of working himself clear, and that those who join with him be not involved in his bad Circumstances.

The muster of Sugar sent over by the Marlbrough sold at outcry for P^* . $8\frac{1}{4} \not P$ Candy, which was a tolerable good price considering its courseness and Colour.

If the reasons given by M^r. Fotheringham in his letter of the 22th. July to the Deputy Governour & Council are true, of which They can be the only Capable judges we see no reason why the Estate of the deceased M^r. Fotheringham should be answerable for the deficiency which happened to that parcel of Pepper, though it was more than had happened upon any the like occasion, we find likewise that Gentleman's Character cleared in relation to his management of affairs at MocoMoco by Captain

Charles Gough and M^r. Samuel Green and afterwards upon the return of M^r. Gollop from thence, the troubles which happened in the Anacksoongey Country seem to Take their rise from the rash management of Sultan Tookhaderoo Allah, who has received the just reward of his Tyranny and oppression.

Sultan Gondom appears to be a peaceable well meaning Man of a Malay, and great care ought to be taken to preserve his friendship, towards which the removal of Sultan Tookhaderoo Allah's son was a necessary step to make him easy in his Government and engage him to be faithful to the Honble Company especially when they have in their possession a person Capable of giving him some Jealousie if he should ever swerve from his duty and obligations-the Complementing him with the deceased Sultan's slaves was Good policy especially as he promises they should be Employed in the Pepper plantations, of the same service may be the obliging the Mantrees and Proateens if rightly applied as we doubt not but it will be, as likewise a proper encouragement given to the Souldiers and Bugguesses according to their merit.

If the disorders committed so frequently at Bencoolen can be remedied at so small a Charge as Continuing upon pay the six Bugguese soldiers formerly a Guard to the hospital though six more be added to them it is a Charge that may be well allowed especially when part of the Fines arising from the breach of the peace and the like trespasses be appropriated towards that Expence.

We can say no more to the new buildings and the disposition that has been made for the Conveniency of Lodging the Military, Gunners, and other stores with such fortifications as are absolutely necessary but that we have reason to believe that Supra-Visor will take care that those expences be managed with the greatest frugality.

Considering the service that the Arab Lascars are to the Company, and that it is with some difficultly the Gentlemen at Fort Marlbrough have persuaded those now there, to stay some time longer, the sending some Lascars and Caulkers by this conveyance ought not to be neglected.

The Deputy Governour and Council in the sixth paragraph of their Letter under the head of Factors, Officers &c^t. Inform that They have sufficient in the Company's Cash to answer all deficiencies of l'epper laid to M^r. Fotheringham's charge, and urge some reasons for excuse for allowing him so long a time.

though we cannot Think the selling of the Slave Stephen referred to in their General Letter, was regular, yet as he by his Ill life has rendered himself useless, it was prudently done to let his new Master make the most of his bargain.

The Complaint of the Bugguese Soldiers of an Irregular sale of the Effects of the Dattoo Bugguese deceased vanishes upon the representation the Deputy Governour and Council give of that Affair.

Under the head of Accounts we find the deceased Philip Heigham Wheake charged with deficiencies at Mocomoco amounting to \$482. 2. 5— the greatest part of which seems to be tolerably well accounted for, only \$66. 1. 49, most or all of the articles of which this latter sum is composed, seem to be appropriated to his own use and for which he ought to be accountable, the rest may as the Provisional Accomptant observes, be consumed by age, rust, lost or stole in so long a time, and some made use of on the Company's Account & not regularly Charged, wherefore we cannot think Mr. Wheake's Estate answerable for the whole sum of \$482. 2. 5 as may plainly appear by the Accomptant's report entered after Consultation of the 13th. January 1728/9 and as there was formerly a Linguist allowed at eight dollars \$\varphi\$ month, it is not unreasonable if he was Capable of supplying the want of one, though he has not charged it in his Account, some allowance should be made him, and though such allowance were but one half of the Customary pay for the time he was at Mocomoco yet that half pay may be equal to the \$66. 1. 49 he is charged for the deficiencies, but of that the Gentlemen of the West Coast are the best Judges.

I now take the Liberty allowed me by the Honble Company to deliver in my reasons for dissenting to the orders of this Board made the first Instant for dismissing Mess^{rs}. Barrington and Hammond from the Company's service and sending them to England on the first Ships in consequence of their declining to Go to the West Coast They are, that the Honble Company speaking of sending servants thither say in the 123^d. raragraph of their letter Pr. Aurengzebe, "If any Person you shall pitch upon "refuse do you suspend him and give us the reasons and await our further orders" which plainly Implies that we are to wait till we can hear from them concerning those who refuse to Go thither, and that we shall not send such persons from hence till They advise us so to do.

by the 35th, paragraph of the Court of Directors Letter dated the 27th. October 1714 They do not even in cases of refractoriness Give leave for any thing more than suspension. If they have expressed themselves so tenderly after They have directed Cautions & reproofs to be made use of, I can't perceive how they will approve of Dismissing and sending home immediately before it is possible for people to Gather in their effects and in the 77th, paragraph of the same letter They are pleased further to say "we lay it down as a Standing permanent order what we have before herein written as to your power of Suspending any who will not obey Your orders" from whence it may be inferred That they do not allow of any thing more than suspension.

As it is Evident Mr. Barrington has traded Considerably since in the Company's service and has now as it is reasonable to believe large Concerns at Sea, which cannot at this season of the Year be collected in, and as Mr. Hammond sets forth in his paper that he labours under the same inconveniency, They beg the liberty of staying here till their Hoūble Master's Determination shall be known. I am of opinion that the Company considering these Circumstances will think it but reasonable to Grant such permission for they by the 66th. Paragraph of their Letter P Eyles this year, are so favourable to say "We approve of your indulgence in giving time to such as are residing in India without our leave to gather in their Effects" and if They are so Good to allow this indulgence to People who come out without their license I presume They will judge it an hardship for those who come abroad in their service and have not behaved themselves unjustly, to be sent from hence when their Effects are at sea and their Accounts unadjusted, as it may in great measure tend to their ruin.

I beg leave to add further that when Mr. Elwick was accused of having been Guilty of Crimes of a very high nature, as appears & Consultation of 8th. August 1720 Yet the then President and Council after they had Examined the Honble Company's orders did not Think that They could inflict any thing more on him than suspension which was judged by them to be the greatest punishment that was permitted by the Honble Company.

For that he the said Charles Barrington was permitted by the Court of Directors of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies upon certain Covenants contained in a pair of Indentures executed between the said United Company and the said Charles Barrington, on the part of him the said Charles Barrington to be performed by virtue of which permission he the said Charles Barrington did come to Madras, and during his residence there under the protection of the said Company, he was Chosen an Alderman of Madraspatnam, but after the said Election that he the said Charles Barrington forgetting his obligation to the said Company and falsely imagining and pretending that he is not under a necessity of complying with the terms in the said pair of Indentures contained, hath absolutely refused to go to Fort Marlbrough on the West Coast of Sumatra, where his service was necessary for the good of the said Company, in direct breach of his said Covenants and that he the said Charles Barrington having thereby forfeited all right to a Residence in India, and any other priviledge whatsoever either as a Company's servant or Free Merchant, and being disobedient to the orders and rules of the said United Company, and thereby Giving a bad Example to others, is unworthy to sit in a Court of Justice erected at the Instance and request of the said Company and for their benefit, and the good and orderly Government of their settlement-all which his Conduct tends manifestly to destroy and subvert.

I am now sitting on the King's Service on the Grand Jury for this Town nevertheless I am ready to appear on my Defence before you, and if you require my attendance now please to signifie it to me and I will wait upon you.

THE DEMURRER OF CHARLES BARRINGTON, Inhabitant & Alderman of Madras-patnam to the charge exhibited against him by James Macrae Esq^r. President & Govern^r. &c^t. Council of Fort S^t. George for the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies and signed by George Torriano their Secretary.

This Defendant observes upon perusal of the sd. charge that the same alledges nothing directly against him as an Alderman of this Corporation, but contains only an Accusation of breach of Covenants with the said Company as one of their servants.

This Dependent hopes and believes he can maintain that no breach of covenants can be proved against him, or allowing him to be chargeable therewith that the matter is not cognisable by this board of President and Council being Representatives for a Company of Merchants, as the party Aggrieved may have their remedy at Law according to the Tenour of those Covenants.

This Dependent conceives that until such time as the same be duly and legally maintained and proved and Verdict given thereon according to Law, the open declaring and charging him guilty of a breach of Covenants is highly reflecting on and injurious to the Credit and reputation of him the said Defendant and against Law and Equity.

This Defendant also Conceives that a breach of Covenants with the said Company can in no ways disqualifie him for the King's service it being a matter of a private nature and altogether foreign to the administration of Civil Affairs, and therefore, he humbly Conceives himself *Rectus in Curiâ* and nevertheless Qualified.

This Defendant can produce Authorities sufficient to maintain his franchises and Liberties until such time as a reasonable cause shall be given in charge against him, and that the Laws of Great Brittain have particularly Determined what shall be such reasonable cause, namely the Committing some offence against Oath and to the prejudice of the body into which he is Incorporated.

This Defendant conceives that the President and Council here as Representatives of the said Company of Merchants have no authority to hear and determine a Cause wherein his Majesty's power granted to this Corporation, and the liberties and the franchises of the Subject are so nearly concerned and that in the clause in his Majesty's Charter which Empowers the said President and Council to remove any of the Aldermen upon reasonable cause exhibited against him in writing, It is meant that such Alderman having by a misdemeanour rendered himself liable to the Camplaint of any person or persons, the said President and Council as a King's Court of Record are qualified to sit, hear and determine thereupon, and not otherwise, for that it seems inconsistent that They as a Board of Merchants and Company's Officers can interfere with a Special Commission from the King & so a private sett of men judge a Court of record.

This Defendant thinks himself obliged to declare that the said President and Council have made themselves Parties and accusers in this Charge exhibited against him & can produce Authorities to maintain that it is contrary to the maxims of all Laws for the Accusers to sit as Judges in their own cause and in this moreover the said President and Council have already in an extrajudicial way of proceeding actually prejudged him, for proof of which,

This Dependent in order to make manifest the prejudice of the said Judges, who have made themselves parties Accusers and thereby to strengthen his Exceptions against the Authority They assume of judging in this cause, thinks it necessary to observe that They the said President and Council by their Secretary did on the Twenty fifth day of September last send a written message to the Mayor's Court here, wherein They declared that this Defendant had no further priviledges either as a Company's servant or Free Merchant and thereupon recommended to the Bench to remove this Defendant and Chuse another Alderman in his place and stead, which was before any charge had been Exhibited against him and although it proved Ineffectual yet it thereby plainly appears that They persecuted him with a Spirit of

resentment which gives him but little hopes of success in maintaining his Cause before them now and he thinks it necessary in this place to add further that this their said message and advice tending to alienate the good affections and regards of his Brethren on the Bench towards him, and byass their Voices to disfranchise him which by that means would have become an act of their own was Contrary to Law and unwarrantable, highly tending to the Corruption and subversion of the Constitution of the said Court of justice, against the true intent & meaning of his Majesty's Royal Charter, and a great indignity to the Mayor and Aldermen then sitting—and he offers in further proof that the said President and Council have in a late Letter to the said Company dated the twelfth of October, said peremptorily that they would send him to England in January, which was eight days before the said Charge was delivered this Defendant.

This Defendant conceives that the heavy accusation of being unworthy to sit in a Court of justice degradeth him to the condition of perjured person, Villein or outlaw who only are excepted by our laws from such service of their Country & therefore he cannot but Think it behaves the said President & Council well to Consider whether they can support so grievous a charge by virtue of any thing Contained in the said Complaint against him.

This Dependent conceives from all and every the foregoing premises that the summoning him to appear before this Board is ill grounded and contrary to the several Laws made for the preservation of the Subjects birthrights, Liberties and franchises for which causes and for divers other Defects and Insufficiencies in the said charge appearing, the said Defend^t doth Demurr unto and upon the said charge and the matter therein contained, and prays the due Consideration of this Board whether he shall be bound to make any other or further Answer otherwise than as aforesaid, and further prays to be hence dismissed in Statu Quo, with his reasonable Costs and charges in that behalf wrongfully sustained.

The said Charge, and of not being prejudiced by any words or want of Form in this his Answer, and also saving to himself all advantages of Exceptions mentioned in his Demurrer, and also saving to himself all rights and priviledges belonging to him as one of the Aldermen of Madraspatnam and Judge of the Mayor's Court there for answer unto the said Charge, saith

that he doth acknowledge that he did enter into certain Covenants with the United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East Indies contained in a pair of indentures bearing date the twentieth day of January 1720 mutually to be observed between them, and not by one partly only as the said charge seems to set forth, by virtue and in Confidence of which he did accordingly come and reside in Madraspatnam in their service,

that during his residence there He was on the twenty first day of July last Elected by the Honble the Mayor's Court of Madraspatnam into the Office of an Alderman and judge of the s^d. Court, and was the same day by the President in Council sworn thereinto, but whether in their said Choice of him any other regard was had than to his natural Capacity & Abilities for that Office, he conceives the persons only who did make that Choice can determine.

that on the Eighteenth day of August following he was by the President and Council appointed to Go on a short notice to Fort Marlbrough on the West Coast of Sumatra in the station of Youngest of Council there to continue for the space of three years which he judging a Grievous hardship, and it being impracticable for him on several accounts to comply therewith he did thereupon on the twenty fifth day of August and first of September following deliver into them two remonstrances setting forth the particular circumstances of his Case, wherein he principally urged that having under security of the Covenants aforesaid engaged in an Extensive trade here, he had several very large concerns abroad which must take up a considerable time to Get in and he must suffer an irreparable damage by being absent, as recourse thereto being had will more fully appear; and although They failed of the desired Effect he found himself still under an indispensable necessity to decline going thither, and not out of a spirit of obstinacy and disobedience as forgetting his obligations to the said Company or falsely imagining or pretending that he was not under a necessity of Complying with the terms in the sd. Covenants contained as this Charge sets forth which imputations he disavows with the highest resentment having for near the space of Eight Years in several employs assigned him, served the said Company here faithfully and to the best of his Capacity.

and he thinks there is good reason to believe that it was no ways the necessity of his Service there for the good of the sd. Company that induced them the said President and Council to pitch upon him to Go thither as very little service could be expected from him in that place from the unfitness of his constitution to that dangerous and unhealthy climate, which very reason They had the last year accepted, and excused him from going thither on that Account then, and that there was as much want of Assistants to perform the said Company's business here but rather that it proceeded from the prejudice and resentment of the President against him for matters of trade and he cannot but remark that their order for his going to the West Coast, which They must know he could not possibly comply with and was the only way They had to distress him, was made on the very day that They read in Council an appeal which Mr. Peers and he jointly had lodged from a judgment of theirs to the King in Council and whether that proceeding had any influence or not with them to Take those very severe and unprecedented measures against him, he leaves to any man to judge from the following paragra, which They have wrote in a Later letter to the said Company which is dated the twelfth instant, after the resolution They took on the seventh instant to exhibit the said Charge against him.

"We are very sorry to inform your Honours that the Charter which hath cost you so great expence and trouble to obtain it, and was so well calculated for the benefit ease and good regulation of your Settlements is like to have quite other Effects than ever your Honours could Expect, which we shall take care to prevent as much as possible, but the case is this there being an expression in the Charter which says that an Alderman duely Elected and sworn in shall remain during Life, it has raised such a spirit of obstinacy & disobedience in your servants that They will not go to any of your Subordinate Settlements and fancy it is out of your power to remove them from Madras upon account of their being Aldermen and we are very sorry to tell you that many of them have associated themselves on that head as is in particular the case of Mr. Barrington who values himself much upon being an Alderman, and there is nothing in their mouths at present but appeals to the King in Council, we are Apprehensive if a speedy stop be not put to this Disobedience in your servants it will be of the last ill Consequence which is the Chief reason that we have ordered Messieurs Barrington & Hammond home, whom we should otherwise have only suspended till your further orders; but as this Spirit is so very Prevalent, we Thought it absolutely necessary for your service and don't at all doubt but Your Honours will vindicate us herein in Case of any appeals to the King in Council.

And he does not Conceive that the President & Council here can charge his refusal to go to the West Coast against him as a direct breach of his said indentures, because the said Company have reserved to themselves the consideration of the case, and only

allowed them in the mean time to suspend such of their servants who being ordered thither, might refuse to Go, and directed them to await their further orders, whereby the said Company seem to express an unwillingness to have such a force put upon their serv^{ta}, against their Inclinations, we have always hitherto been Estee ned here upon a different establishment, which seems to be confirmed by the particular regard they also express in recommending to the said President & Council not to send away such persons as are engaged in trade lest They may be ruined in their affairs thereby, besides he Thinks that while he is charged with an obligation by his Indentures to follow all such orders as the said Company or any Authorized by them shall Think fitt, it will be but Equitable at the same time to allow all indulgences such as he has now pleaded, to be extended to his benefit so that he Thinks a breach of Indentures will rather lie at their doors than with him, by their unwarrantably Depriving him of those reasonable indulgence, & sending him off the Shore for England on so short a warning.

As to his having thereby forfeited all right to a residence in India and any other priviledges whatsoever either as a Company's servant or a Free Merchant, He again pleads the said Company's indulgence to remain here under a state of suspension untill their orders about him with respect to their service shall be known and thinks that according to right reason and the very necessary indulgence granted by the said Company for that purpose to all in India indifferently, he ought and can demand and does accordingly insist to be permitted to reside here as a free Man for such time longer at least, as shall be necessary to Gather in his Effects.

He Conceives the Royal Charter constituted the Mayor's Court here at the instance and request of the said Company indeed, and for the good & orderly Government of their Settlement but not for their benefit solely although it be highly so in that every single inhabitant is entituled to and participates of its gracious influence towards a due & impartial distribution of Equity and justice and he cannot conceive that what is termed in his said charge Disobedience to the orders and Rules of the said Company which appears only to have a regard to his refusal to go to the West Coast, can render him unworthy to sit in a Court of justice, it being a matter of a private nature and altogether foreign to the administration of Civil Affairs and therefore he cannot be charged that his conduct hath manifestly tended to destroy and Subvert the same.

The said Charles Barrington hath thought fit thus far to answer particularly to the said charge, thereby to Express his willingness to Give all possible Satisfaction touching the premises and to clear his private character, from those aspersions but he excepts in general to the whole of the said Charge for that it is exhibited against him as an Alderman of the Town of Madraspatnam but does not contain any allegation of Misdemeanours said to be committed by him having any ways a relation to his acting in the said office in his execution of which trust all the Deliberate malice of his Enemies cannot find any thing faulty and till he shall be convicted of having perpetrated something contrary to his oath or to the prejudice of the body into which he is incorporated; he insists and can prove he cannot otherwise upon any pretence whatsoever be legally removed from his said office, but is Entituled to and accordingly claims the priviledge Granted him by our most Gracious Sovereign to Continue to act therein during the term of his natural Life and if he should in other respects be Guilty of any thing prejudicial to the Good and orderly Government of the place, he is Liable to all penalties of the Law, Equally with other Men.

and whereas the said Charge further insinuates that They having put him the said Charles Barrington out of the said Company's service, all further right to a residence in India is forfeited to him, and so he must consequently cease to Act in his said Office of Alderman, he doth plead that the Royal Charter constituting that Court seems to have no regard to such persons as shall become members of it, whether They be in the said Company's service or not or reside here with or without their licence, so They be Inhabitants of the Town of Madraspatnam and he is well informed that several of the modern Aldermen first nominated in the said Royal Charter were persons

who came not regularly by permission to reside in India but were discharged or Left behind when the Ships sailed back for Europe and that the two First Mayors by name John Powney and Francis Rous are hitherto without any regular licence from the said Company to reside here, so that no objection to his Continuing here as an Alderman and in the same free state, can be inferred from thence.

As to his having no further priviledges here whatsoever he cannot but remark that since the Exhibition of the said Charge against him, the Sheriff who is one of that board has called him and the rest of the Board who sat as judges at the Quarter Sessions held for this Town have sworn him in upon the Grand Jury, whereby They seem flatly to have contradicted themselves in this point, and he leaves it to them to reconcile it to that positive assertion.

and he leaves it also to them to Consider whether after having served out that time expressly stipulated in his Indentures being Five years and three years more which were upon reciprocal Courtesy, he be holden or not to undertake an Enterprize of Three years service still to come, especially considering the Circumstances of being removed from the seat of business where he hath been Engaged for so long a time, and that so short a notice must unavoidably occasion a Perplexity in his Affairs that may be fatal.

Upon the whole he the said Charles Barrington insisteth and will maintain in any Court of Judicature whatsoever, that he hath not been Guilty of breach of Covenants with the said Company, and that if he had, It is no ways a reasonable and Lawful cause to remove him the said Charles Barrington from acting in the said Office of an Alderman and Judge of the Mayor's Court of Madraspatnam.

Council will be pleased to examine this matter

Consideration M^r. Joseph Walsh's petition and Account hereunto annexed exhibited to the Honble Court of Directors when the said M^r. Walsh was last in England, and by them referred to the Consideration of this Honourable Board.

To set this affair in a proper light we must beg leave to observe there are two material articles that immediately offer themselves to our view, viz^t. Salary and Diet allowance, each of which being attended with various Circumstances in relation to Time, Place and other Occurrences, we have made the Subject of two different queries, of moneys that have been refunded and moneys unpaid, and what Letters, Consultations &c^t. have herein been referred to, are extracted from the originals, and added by way of appendix to the observations we have made thereon, that our Honble Masters and this Honble Board may see on what grounds we proceed.

ARTICLE FIRST—SALARY REFUNDED & UNPAID.

[°] Extract No. 2

The salary refunded was from 27. August 1723 to the 29th. September 1724 at one hundred pounds & Annum or as it is Customarily paid in dollars four to the pound, four hundred dollars & Annum, amounting to dollars 435. 3. 10.

* Extract No. 4 To this, we observe the special covenants entered into by the said Joseph Walsh with the Honble President and Council of this place in the year 1723 entituled him

to £200 P Annum, salary with all other perquisities emoluments and benefits usually enjoyed by other Deputy Governours of Fort Marlbrough.

The President and Council of Fort S^t. George in their Letter to Bencoolen dated 4th. October 1724 interpreted the £ 200 mentioned in the indenture to be part salary as Deputy Governour and the other half as Captain of the Military, & being unwilling to allow the Deputy Governour £ 200 as Salary and at the same time £ 100 more as

an emolument he being Captain of the Soldiers, They therefore ordered what had been received over and above the £ 200 should be refunded, conceiving the £ 200 to include the whole that was due to his Covenants, and from hence arises this Question

whether Mr. Walsh's indentures will bear this explanation, or in other words whether the allowance as Captain of the Soldiers shall be Esteemed as an emolument or benefit usually enjoyed by other Deputy Governours of the West Coast.

To clear up this, it may be usefull to observe the Honble Company in their letter to this place dated January 3^d. 1710, paragraph 119 have particularly destinguished these two allowances, where having first settled the salary they then add and the Deputy Governour shall have £100 more as Captain of the Soldiers, and the same has always been Charged on the Military list not on the Civil, which distinction may very well entitle the £ 100 more as Capta. to the denomination of an Emolument or benefit, wherefore we humbly Conceive the Construction of Mr. Walsh's Indentures will run for salary and benefits vizt. Salary determinatively mentioned in the Covenants £200 and the benefit of £ 100 more as Captain of the Soldiers.

nor is this Construction very different from the Intention of our Honble Masters for admitting Mr. Walsh to receive £ 200 salary and £ 100 as Captain of yo. Soldiers is no more than the Company have in other words granted to the Deputy Governour Extract No. 6. in 1710, when They granted £ 300 under the denomination of Salary Gratuity and Captain, and gave a liberty in para 120 to admit any Successour appointed in future upon the same encouragement. It is true Govern. Elwick and his Council pushed the Liberty given them, encouraging for Mr. Walsh when They peremptorily admitted the Salary & Gratuity under one denomination, and Covenanted for £ 200 Salary without restriction or regard to his future behaviour and merits for the Gratuity but the Gentlemen who entered into those Covenants in 1723, ought to be Accountable for their freedom taken and not afterwards excuse their Oversight if it was such at the Expence of the person with whom They Contracted by a forced construction contrary to the Common rules of practice.

We observed further this is the Construction our President Mr. Macrae made, who while he was Supra Visor made a Standing order that the Deputy Governrs. in future should have but £ 100 \$\psi\$ Annum Salary, but perusing and considering Mr. Walsh's indentures he in the West Coast Consultation of 25th. March 1724 expresly excepts Mr. Walsh from the observance of that order, and allowed him to Continue at ${f \pounds}$ 200 ${f \oplus}$ Annum according to his Agreement with the Honble President and Council at Fort St. George, *and the tenour of Mr. Walsh's Indentures were for so far approv'd See Extraot of by the Honble Company the 2^d. Febry 1724-5 as well Intended.

To the Second part of the first Article vizt. Sallary Unpaid the same Reasons will Demand a relief to Mr. Walsh according to the Condition of his Covenants by which we must be guided in obedience of the last Orders of the Honble Company.

ARTICLE 2^D. DIET ALLOWANCE REFUNDED AND UNPAID.

The Diet Allowance was from the 1st October 1723 to the 28 Febry 1723-4 At Dollars 150 per Month Amounts to Dollars 750.

In our search after this particular we find in the West Coast Consultation of the 6th of March 1723-4 the Supra Vizor demanding by what Authority the Deputy Governour had receiv'd 150 Dollars per Mensem for his Table over and above the accustomary allowances; After which is Enter'd Mr. Walsh's reply wherein he did insist upon the reasonableness of this Allowance as Grounded upon the Terms of his Covenant And the constant Allowance to his Predicessors Messrs. Cooke, Pyke, Hubbard and Dunster, And moreover that he did apprehend the same was Granted by an express Order from the Honble Company either by the Hertford or the Addison but that Letter being Mislaid or carried away by Mr. Hubbard the late Supra Vizor,

Upon this reference the same was taken into consideration at Fort St. George the 16th September 1724 where was produc'd a Letter from the Honble Company by Ship Hertford dated 9th March 1719 par. 71 wherein they allow'd of the 150 Dollars per Mensem to answer the surplus expence which the Deputy Governour must needs be at in providing for the better sort of Strangers who usually have recourse to his Table upon which discovery it was propos'd to repay what Mr. Walsh had as above refunded, but as it was then thought the said Mr. Walsh and others his Predicessors had taken several allowances without paying for them the Board thought fit to refer the decision of this Affair to the Honble Court of Directors who in reply thereto in their Letter dated 1st December 1725 would not determine anything till they should hear whether Mr. Walsh was deserving of the Commendations this Board had then given him so that we observe the Affair has never been decided either at the West Coast, here or in England.

Our Honble Masters having been so kind as to reinstate Mr. Walsh in their Service & having sent us Copys of what relates to him Commanding us to examine the grievances he complains of and to afford him such relief as in Justice and Equity this Board find him Entitled to by his Covenants & their Orders We think it usefull to retrospect on the occasion of the Refund, & finding by the Consultation as well as a Letter from Mr. Macrae then Supravizor to Mr. Walsh the only reason for demanding a refund was through want of producing the above Letter And that upon a Motion made at Fort St. George for a reimbursement of that Refund Mr. Macrae did not oppose it giving for reason the allowance had been approv'd from Europe, and that he had not found Mr. Walsh unworthy of the Honble Company's Bounty We also join in his opinion And in regard to Mr. Walsh's known Benevolence to Strangers & others during his residency at Bencoolen We cannot conceive any Objection why the Allowance towards a surplus expence of the Deputy Governour's Table was not according to the use and intent of the Honble Company & in justice and Equity due to Mr. Walsh, as we find Mr. Cook demanded and receiv'd 900 Dollars on the like

In Answer to the Second part of this Article vizt. Allowance of Diet Unpaid We conclude from the same reasoning that the Allowance should be continued to Mr. Walsh unless he had acted unworthy of this Bounty by a discontinuance of his Table to Strangers & others according to the first intentions: But this we cannot find to be the Case for on the Contrary by what we have heard Mr. Walsh has always endeavour'd to support the Honour of the Settlement by obliging Strangers & other Gentlemen who used to resort to his House & Table.

The last Mention made of this Affair that we can find is in the Answer

Account by an express Order from this Board the 30th March 1721.

Mr. Walsh gave to a Charge exhibited against him by Mr. George Torriano & his Council at the West Coast Wherein Mr. Walsh demands payment of his Sallary & Diet Allowance as here before cited, To which demand Mr. Torriano & Council reply'd That they were a little surpriz'd at his Demanding of them any Sum of Money to be repaid him on Account of Diet and Sallary after he had himself Signed the Consultations wherein those things were given up. Which appear'd to us to be a good reason for preventing any further Enquiry into this Matter: But having Interrogated Mr. Walsh upon this Point he desir'd us to look back upon the Consultations wherein it was thought he had so given them up which are dated 6th & 25th March 1723-4 And therein observ'd the words of the Agreement to run thus vizt. Agreed That Mr. Walsh and Mr. Dunster repay into Cash what they have receiv'd on this Account untill the Matter can be determin'd by the Honble the

Governour & Council of Fort St. George. And in the next Consultation it is AGREED

that the Allowance of Wine Arrack &ca. be entirely taken off and the whole Charge of Diet be settled in the following manner vizt. the Deputy Governour 100 Dollars per Mensem &ca. &ca.

And hereupon Mr. Walsh did observe that the Agreement for an Allowance of 100 Dollars per Mensem being immediately after his Claim to the 150 per mensem was disputed and then stood referr'd to Fort St. George he only submitted to the 100 Dollars per mensem in lieu of the Ordinary Allowances of Wine &c*. stores 60 Dollars with his 40 Dollars for provisions allow'd by the Old Establishment, And still reserved to himself the Benefit of the Bounty formerly given to his Predicessors as a Surplus Allowance which he did not doubt would be confirm'd to him from Fort St. George upon discovery of the Hertford's Letter then not produceable And he hoped as his Right to the Bounty was as yet undetermin'd the Committee would take this plea into consideration that the Committee would overlook the want of Forms in making his Claim & put the Issue upon the foot of Equity and Justice according to the Tenour of his Covenants which could not be abolished or abrogated during his possession of them by virtue of which he for a considerable time after presided and acted as Deputy Governour for and by leave of the Honble Company.

As we cannot entirely confute his reasons so we in some measure allow of them And as in this Article the whole Question as mention'd by Mr. Macrae arose for want. of the Company's letter which was only Mislaid, so we conceive had Mr. Walsh been so fortunate as to have found the letter per Hertford the Allowance had never been question'd but admitted by the Supra Vizor; Wherefore upon the whole do think his acquiescence to be no more than a suspension from receiving that allowance till his Right could be examin'd into. And since the Honble Company have by their last Letter put the question upon the Issue of the Tenour of his Covenants, We think ourselves obliged to say his Covenants entitle him to all Benefits and Emoluments his predicessors enjoy'd.

We have before observ'd that upon the discovery of the Letter per Hertford in Consultation September 1724, the Refund had then been paid, but that for reason there mention'd Mr. Walsh and others his Predicessors had taken several allowances which those Gentlemen conceiv'd the Company had order'd to be paid for at 20 per No. 10. Cent Advance Although they are Calculated into the 6041 Dollars Settled by Mr. Cooke.

We have therefore examin'd into this Objection and find that Mr. Cooke in his West Coast Consultation of the 30th September 1718 settled a certain quantity of Wine & Arrack to be allow'd to each of the Company's Servants besides their Diet Money which all together would then amount to no more than $604\frac{1}{2}$ Dollars per Month, But as this Allowance was as near as the Matter would admit of Mr. Cooke added some further Privilidges to the Company's Servants Vizt. That they should buy of the Company's Farmers at the Buzar price, That they joining in Messes should have one of the Company's slaves to attend each Mess and further in Case the Servants should want more than their Allowances that the Storekeeper should dispose of all dieting stores or House utensils under his charge to the Company's Servants for the use of their own Table at 20 per Cent Advance. This paragraph we presume has given occasion for the Gentlemen in Consultation September 1724 to conceive that Mr. Cooke's allowances of Wine & Arrack were to be bought by the Company's Servants at 20 per Cent Advance and paid for out of their Diet money. Mr. Cooke did intend the Allowances of Wine & Arrack should be deliver'd gratis over & above their Diet money, as does appear by his adding up the Cost of those Liquors to the Diet money whereby the Monthly Expence for 28 persons he said would come to Dollars $604\frac{1}{2}$ & so he plainly says in a Para, of his Letter to this Presidency dated 29th November 1718 wherein he observing the Company in their Letter by the Queen thought those who had an allowance of Diet money would account it sufficient both for Food & Liquors, he says that Provisions were so excessive dear in that place that it was impossible for the Gentlemen to subsist on their Diet money without a proportionable allowance of Liquors, And therefore advised this Presidency

that he would continue to deliver out Liquors &c. over & above the Diet money & our President Mr. Macrae did admit the same when he was supravizor there who did not abolish the Allowance of Liquors and Stores, but approv'd of them, only appointing that 60 Dollars per Month should be given the Deputy Governour in lieu of them, & this besides the 40 Dollars per Month Diet money, all which has been approv'd from England, Nor can we find Mr. Walsh has receiv'd any allowance more than settled by Mr. Cooke & Mr. Hubbard except that for five months he receiv'd sugar and Sugar Candy and both Wax and Wax Candles, which we don't find authoriz'd by any former Establishment & therefore he is Debted for the same in his Account Current herewith deliver'd.

Thus we have endeavour'd to sift into the bottom of this Affair, and We hope the pains we have taken to prevent any further Misunderstanding will excuse the Length of our Narrative, which is humbly submitted to the Consideration of this Honble Board

EXTRACTS REFERR'D TO BY THE COMMITTEE IN THEIR REPORT ON THE MERITS OF MR. JOSEPH WALSH'S PETITION TO THE HONBLE COURT OF DIRECTORS AND BY THEM REFERR'D TO THE GOVERNOUR AND COUNCIL OF FORT ST. GEORGE.

To the Honble the Court of Directors of the United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East Indies.

THE PETITION OF JOSEPH WALSH

HUMBLY SHEWETH

That in the year 1723 your Petitioner had the Honour to be appointed Deputy Governour of Fort Marlbrough and thereon Enter'd into special Covenants with the President and Council of Fort St. George on behalf of your Hon's. wherein was stipulated & Agreed that your Petitioner should be allow'd two hundred pounds Sallary, and such other perquisites, Emoluments and Benefits as have been customarily allow'd by the Company to their Deputy Governours of Fort Marlbrough.

That the said Sallary of two hundred pounds per Annum was Confirmed and Continued by Mr. Macrae when Supravizor there as Enter'd in his Consultation of the 25th March 1724.

That your Honrs. in your Letter to the West Coast dated 9th March 1719, did direct that one hundred and ninety Dollars per Mensem should be allow'd to your. Deputy Governour of said place besides a certain quantity of Wine Arrack & other necessarys for his Table which being valued at 80 Dollars made the whole of your said Order for Diet to amount to two hundred and seventy Dollars per Mensem.

That your Petitioners Predicessors have been constantly paid at that rate from the date of the said Letter and your petitioner for some time enjoy'd the same.

That notwithstanding your Honrs. positive Orders for said allowance the constant complyance therewith for several years and the express conditions in the Covenants aforesaid, your petitioner has not been paid since November 1724 any more than one hundred pounds per annum as Sallary and only one hundred Dollars per Mensem towards defraying the Charge of his Table and what he had receiv'd before that time pursuant to the said Orders and Agreements he has been obliged to repay into the Company's Cash.

Wherefore your Petitioner humbly prays that the Honble Court of Directors will be pleased to take these Matters into their serious Consideration and afford him such redress as in their Mature Judgment they shall think him justly entitled to.

And your petitioner shall ever pray &c a.

In a Letter from England dated 21st February 1728-9 par. 64, are these words:

No. 3.

64. Mr. Joseph Walsh return'd on the Stanhope and having made application to us to be reinstated in our Service we have therefore permitted him to return to Fort St. George there to be Employ'd in such station as you shall judge he may be most serviceable to the Company, and Enclosed in the Packet we send you Copy of Mr. Walsh's Petition to us relating to several hardships he alledges to have suffer'd on adjustment of his Accounts contrary to the Covenants enter'd into with the Governour and Council of Fort St. George respecting his Sallary, Diet money &c. as by the several Extracts of Consultations, Letters and an Account of what he claims as due to him thereto Annex'd. We would have you examine the Grievances he complains of and afford him such relief as in Justice and Equity you find him entitled to by his Covenants and our Orders.

In Mr. Walsh's Indentures are these words:

No. 4. It's likewise further Agreed by & between the said Parties to these presents that in Consideration of the said Joseph Walsh his performance of all and every the Agreements, Covenants and Articles herein specified Stipulated & Agreed that he shall receive the Sallary of two hundred pounds sterling and such other perquisites, Emoluments & Benefits as have been heretofore customarily granted and allowed by the said Company to their Deputy Governours of Fort Marlbrough.

In a Letter from Madrass to Bencoolen dated 4th October 1724 are these words:

In Mr. Walsh's Covenants he is appointed the Sallary of two hundred pounds per Annum which he understood as all he was to receive, so that we were very much surpriz'd to find he Charg'd £ 200 as Deputy Governour and one hundred as Captain of the Soldiers, his own Covenants would have told him he was to enjoy what other Deputy Governours had done which was £100 as Deputy Governour & £100 as Captain of the Soldiers And so that £ 200 mention'd in them were design'd, wherefore we direct that on receipt hereof he pay into Cash what he has so receiv'd more than intended by Us and more than he is warranted by his Indentures.

In a Letter from England to Fort St. George dated 3d January 1710 par: 119 & 120 are these words:

No. 6.

119. We hope to be able to get the Jane out with, or speedily after this Ship, but if she should miscarry which God forbid and you have certain advice of it, then do you take particular care of sending honest able persons thither And give him who is appointed Deputy Governour an assurance as we have done here to Mr. Collet whom we have chosen Deputy Governour that he shall have one hundred pounds a year sallary, one hundred more as Captain of the Soldiers and one hundred pounds further as a Gratuity to be paid him here if he shall be found to deserve it. That he be a Nominal lowest of Council of Fort St. George on his going thither And that he Continue four years thereafter which time he be at liberty to return to Fort St. George and be of the Council according to his standing whether as youngest or higher if there has happen'd any vacancys in his absence and at the Sallary of the place.

120. That if he misbehave himself you shall have liberty to displace him and put another in his stead on the same terms of Encouragement And so from time to time till our further Order.

In the West Coast Consultation dated 25th March 1724 are these words:

No. 7. It being the Honble Company's positive Orders in the 29th & 30th paragraphs of their Letter per Mead Frigat dated the 9th January 1719 That the Sallary should be appointed in the following manner Vizt:

And if there be any more of Council they shall have but thirty pounds a year It being Factor's sallary.

ORDER'D, that the above standing Rule be observed for the future excepting for the present Deputy Governour Walsh who is to be continued at two hundred Pounds per Annum according to his Agreement with the Honble President & Council of Fort St. George.

In a letter from England dated 2d February 1724-5 Par 92 are these words:

We have perused Mr. Walsh's Covenants and find they were well intended but the Company's Title should be express in our Common Printed ones without any addition thereto which serves only to give the Lawyer a handle for objection And the Clauses therein about Accounts should be in the words of our Common Covenants especially of those last sent which have heen sealed by Council.

In West Coast Consultation dated 6th March 1723-4 are these words:

The Supravisor observes that Mr. Dunster and Mr. Deane & the present Deputy Governour Mr. Walsh have receiv'd one hundred & fifty Dollars per Mensem for Diet more than appears to be allow'd by the Establishment made by Mr. Hubbard in a Consultation dated 2d March 1721-2 which was Grounded (as near as Mr. Hubbard &c'. could recollect) on what settled by Mr. Cooke and approved by the Company and therefore he thinks it ought to be Return'd. Mr. Deane says he receiv'd it because it was paid to Messrs. Hubbard and Dunster, Mr. Walsh says that when he was appointed Deputy Governour of this place by the Honble the President & Council of Fort St. George he covenanted with them to be allow'd all the Perquisites, Emoluments and Benefits that had been customaryily granted & allow'd by the Honble Company to their Deputy Governours of Fort Marlbrough. That Messrs. Cooke, Pyke & Hubbard &c''. were allow'd and paid it and that he apprehends it was by Order of the Honble Company in their General Letter he believes either by the Hertford or the Addison, These letters being Mislaid or carried away by the late Supravizor And no Orders appearing for this allowance the Supravizor insists upon having the whole Return'd. Agreed that Mr. Walsh & Mr. Dunster repay into Cash what they have receiv'd on this Account till the Matter can be determin'd by the Honble the Governour and Council of Fort St. George.

In a Consultation in Madrass dated 16th September 1724, are these words:

The next was the Money refunded by Messrs., Dunster Deane & Walsh on Account of the one hundred & fifty Dollars per Month taken off their Table. The General Letter to the West Coast per Hertford was read when the Honble Company allowed it. Upon which it was proposed to allow that Money to be Repaid but it appearing that the said Gentlemen had taken several allowances without paying for them which the Company had order'd should be paid for and a further Debate Arising the Consideration hereof was deferr'd till Mr. Hubbard should have Extracted all Orders from England and this place And resolutions in Council at Bencoolen about this Affair; only it was Resolv'd that however we should agree with respect to Messrs. Dunster and Walsh yet that Mr. Deane having been a very unfaithfull Servant to the Company & besides having no way Answer'd the intentions of our Honble Masters in the allowance which was to keep up the Grandeur and Dignity of a Deputy Governour should not have anything repaid him on this Account.

In a Consultation [dated] September 22d 1724, Are these words:

Mr. Hubbard delivers in a report as Enter'd after this Consultation about the West Coast Diet Allowances to the Deputy Governour, which being Consider'd It was Resolved to refer the Matter to the Company for their Decision, But that till we had their Orders It should rest as it is.

In a Letter from England per Hertford dated 9th March 1719 Paragraph 71 are these words:

We have consider'd the 28th & other Paragraphs of your Letter per the Benjamin, as also the Consultation of the 30th September all relating to the allowance of Diet Money at Fort Marlbrough and in the Consultation the Method it was settled at

as to allowance of Money for Diet, and quantity or value of Europe Liquors, And the quantity of Arrack And do allow the proportion therein mention'd And in regard the Deputy Governour will be at an extraordinary Expence because of the better sort of Strangers having Recourse to his Table We do allow him one hundred & fifty Dollars a Month besides the forty Dollars allow'd him to Answer that Surplus Expence, which we hope will fully reimburse him, for though at some times it may be too little when several Ships are in the Road, yet at other times there will be few or none neither need he keep open House all the year Round.

In a Letter from England, dated 1st December 1725, are these words:

In Answer to what you write touching the one hundred & fifty Dollars per No. 13. Month for Provisions formerly Granted to the Deputy Governour which the Supravizor would not allow of, Mr. Deane was so ill a Servant that he should have no part of it, As to Mr. Dunster, It is plain he was deficient in his Cash at the time of his Death in a great sum perhaps part of it might be Embezzled as you write And if he had according to our Orders produced his Cash monthly to the Council there could scarce have happen'd any but what might have been easily discover'd, yet it is highly probable he had his Hand in the Chest too, so that we have no reason to consent to any allowance to him. As for Mr. Walsh we shall not determine anything till we hear whether the commendations you give him deserve a Favour of this kind by his perseverance in well doing, though by what the Supravizor writes it is plain that Grant was obtain'd by wrong Representations, and if not, yet the Circumstances of Affairs are much alter'd since, And as he says the present allowance of one hundred Dollars a month is sufficient for a Deputy Governour's reasonable expences. Add to this the Indulgence of Trade hereby allow'd and Mr. Walsh will have no cause to Complain if we proceed no farther.

> In a Letter from Mr. Macrae to Mr. Walsh dated in Fort St. George October 3d 1724, Are these words:

No. 14. In relation to the Money you have refunded I find there is a Letter here from the Honble Court that did then approve of the Establishment of 150 Dollars per mensem to the Deputy Governour of Fort Marlbrough, but no such Letter could be produced while I was there, nor no authority for said Establishment from this Board, which was the reason for ordering the said refund because that allowance was not in any Establishment extant. It was moved here to Represent that Matter to England in order the Reimbursement of that Refund, I did not oppose it in what relates to you and the late Mr. Dunster's estate and give for reason that as the thing had been approved from Europe and neither you nor he had acted unworthy the Honble Company's Bounty I could not see any Objection, but that as to Mr. Deane his Table never deserv'd it nor his Actions.

In the West Coast Consultations dated 25th August 1726, are these words:

No. 15 That we are a little surprized at this demanding of Us any Surplus of money to be repaid him on Account of Diet and Sallary after he had himself sign'd the Consultation wherein these things were given up.

In the West Coast Consultation of 25th March 1724, are these words:

No. 16. AGREED that the Allowance of Wine & Arrack &c. be entirely taken off and the whole Charge of Diet settled in the following manner and only allowed to the following Persons, vizt.

And also that the Storekeeper do dispose of all Dieting Stores or House No. 18. utensils under his Charge to the Company's Servants for the use of their own Table at 20 per cent advance on Invoice, And as we suppose the Gentlemen will divide themselves into particular Messes, Order'd that each Mess Consisting of four Persons be allow'd one of the Company's slaves for their attendance.

In West Coast Letter to Fort St. George dated 29th November 1718, are these words:

We hope your Honr. &ca. will not think the Allowances in any respect unreasonable, Provisions being so excessive dear in this place that it is impossible for the Gentlemen to subsist on their Diet Money without proportionable Allowance of Liquors though our Honble Masters do say in their 61 Paragraph of their Letter per Queen that those who have Diet Money, that must be accounted as their allowance of Food & Liquors, yet we can't believe that they themselves will think it too much when they are sensible how much Money is monthly saved in their Cash thereby. I have perused the Petition which was deliver'd into this Board the 9th Instant by the Right and Left hand Casts "In behalf of themselves and all the Inhabitants of the City of Madrass" Complaining of several Matters therein set forth & as the tendency of that Paper seems chiefly to effect the Stated Laws of our Land and appears to be an ungratefull Return for His Majesty's Special Favour in Granting and the Honourable Company's Goodness in obtaining the Royal Charter which was Calculated to be the Standard of their Libertys, I am of opinion it behoves this Honourable Board to Enquire whether the said Petition was preferr'd through Ignorance or at the Instigation of 111 designing Men, so that if it appears to be the former the Persons who signed it may receive a reprimand, or if the latter be punish'd in such manner as His Majesty's Justices shall think convenient.
