Letter from Tellicherry read.

No ember was read acquainting that a contagious distemper had spread itself amongst them & reduc'd their Garrison to the last degree & being apprehensive of Insults from the Natives instigated by the Dutch & despairing of a supply of Military from Bombay request it hence. The President acquaints the board that he receiv'd this Letter sometime past but having no opportunity before of releiving that settlement & their Circumstances being so melancholly, that if it had been known, he feared he should not have been able to get men to assist them with and therefore did not communicate it sooner but that having an Opportunity by the Elizabeth he had ordered an Ensign, two Serjeants, two Corporals, a drummer & thirty one Ceutinels to be sent them & a further supply of Eighteen men from Fort S. David, with provisions &c. for their passage which is approv'd of.

Allowance for diett money to Mr. Macrae continued to the time of his departure. M^r. Macrae having had his diet allowance hitherto paid him, and We beleiving it the Intention of the Honble Company that he should be allow'd it to the departure of the first ship though limited to six Months, AGREED that it be continued not doubting but M^r. Macrae will repay the surplus if disallow'd by the Company.

FORT ST. GEORGE, JANUARY 1730-31 --

The President acquaints the board that a very surprising accident having happen'd this morning which by a false representation might be used very much to the detriment of his Character he thinks it incumbent on him to clear that by giving them the preside, and a bliamond mercht.

Account of a Transaction between the Preside, and a bliamond mercht. entrusted with the Sale of diamonds had for some Months amused him with the notice of having in his custody a diamond of the most extraordinary size that had been known which made the President very desirous to treat with him about the purchase of it, which the man seem'd inclin'd to, & promised to bring the diamond to the President, but with a number of trifling Excuses he delay'd & shifted it off from one time to another till last Wednesday, when Gruapa came to him in Company with Poncala Kistna & Permaul & told him he had brought the diamond he promised but could not then let him see it the said owner not being in the way and then deliver'd him a large Bulse seal'd with three seals which he said were the owners who would wait on the President in a few days & strike the bargain. The President observ'd to him that the stamp of one of the three seals was imperfect which he immediately offered to correct with his own Seal, but the President being very desirous to see the diamond told him. if he had power to alter the seal, he had power to open the bulse, on which [he] recollected himself, & tearing off a piece of his Clout carefully wrapp'd that about the bulse and fixed a seal thereon which was a small Cornelian stone he took from his Turband & so left the bulse, having at several times receiv'd before thirteen hundred pagodas, which he said the Owner was in immediate want of : the next morning the President went to the Mount & carried the Bulse with him thinking it more secure with himself than any where else, but before he had been at the mount many hours, he was surpriz'd with the News of Gruapa's being dead, that he died suddenly in the Morning without discovering any previous Symptoms of Illness. Mr. John Roach and Mr. Rawson Hart were present with him when he receiv'd this news, which he was very sorry for and immediately told those Gentlemen of his having received a very large diamond from the deceas'd & shewd them the bulse, and further told them It had been possible to secret such an affair but he assur'd them though he had not agreed for the sum he was resolv'd the Man's family should have full as much as he could afford to have given had the man been alive. After the President's return from the Mount he was acquainted that the same Gruapa had been with Mr. Macrae & offered to lodge with him a large diamond upon receiving ten thousand pagodas but he refusing to let Mr. Macrae see the diamond, they came to no agreement. story gave some suspicion to the President who being willing to be satisfied & not knowing who the owner was he sent for Mr. Roach & Mr. Hart who had before seen the bulse & shewing them the seal & satisfying them the Bulse was in the same condition he receiv'd it did in their presence cut it open without defacing the seals and all that was found therein was a large sandy stone which he Delivers to the board to view. Mr. Roach & Mr. Hart being present at this Narration declare upon oath, that the parts where they are mentioned to be present, are true. Captain Eckman who had been very conversant with this man for a long time being examined & shewn the outer seal, declares upon Oath that he remembers it very well and knows it to be a seal that the deceased Gruapa had in his Custody and that the Inscription thereon is the word Raganaculoo, and gives this further testimony concerning it that Gruapa once offered to give him that Cornelian before it was cut but not caring to accept of it his dubash desired Gruapa would cause it to be cut for him but not being done to his liking he return'd it to Gruapa. Captain Eckman's dubash was called for and asked his Name; he says it is Raganaculoo, and being examined concerning the seal he declares he knows it very well and gives the same account of it that Captain Eckman had done.

MESSIEURS Hubbard, Peers & Morse have not assented to that part of the Letter which recommends the restraint to be made occasionally on the trade on this Coast and beg leave in discharge of their duty to say that in the general & unlimited manner as there mention'd they esteem it an affair of the utmost Consequence to a place where the Merchants belonging to it have been invited to & allow'd a free Liberty of trade ever since it's Establishment and they cannot but be of opinion that it is cheifly owing to this that this place has arriv'd to any figure at all and that the Honble Company's Revenues are so considerable By this scheme no Company's servant, Free Merchant or other Inhabitant can set on foot any Voyage or carry on any trade that may be thought to interfere with that carried on by subscription. All Subscriptions are voluntary & at the pleasure of the party & though it is pretty general now here from the Confidence they repose in the present management yet time & other measures may reduce them in future to a narrower Compass, when the person who may not judge it for his Interest to subscribe must suffer in his fortune by not being permitted to employ it in the manner he thinks best. The Free Merchant who is not in the Service of the persons who subscribe must continue on shore without an opportunity of advancing it and any other Inhabitant or person debarred the usual priviledge may be led to think of retiring (or instead of coming here, going) where he may pursue his designs with equal advantage to himself which this settlement may feel the bad Effects of as the French will with open arms receive any persons of substance and with concern they cannot but observe the rising Greatness of that Settlement of Pondicherry. Upon the whole they think this method of Restraint in it's Consequences does directly tend to bring the whole trade and business of the place whether by sea or land into a few hands which they conceive will greatly prejudice the Company's Revenues & the trade of this place. For all which reasons They have thought themselves obliged to differ in Opinion from the rest of the Board.

WE the underwritten in replication to the dissent of Messieurs Hubbard, Peers & Morse to part of para 47 recommending a restraint to be laid occasionally on persons who shall set on foot Voyages to the prejudice of the general Interest of the place think it as much our duty to set forth the necessity of it lest the almost unhop'd for spirit with which all the principal Inhabitants except Mr. Hubbard have shewn in the late subscriptions to restore the languid trade should want a support against such as would justify a separate Liberty tending to undermine the Interest of the publick which the annexed List of Names will demonstrate to Your Honours to deserve a more extensive Epithet than pretty General. These Gentlemen at the request of the President meeting immediately after the Change of that Government which was cry'd out upon for it's Monopoly, agreed upon the present Scheme of trade to which there could be no Cement or security without a restraint but that not to be laid on unless the Majority of the Joint concerned requested it of the Board who were then to consider the reasonableness of it and use it's Authority accordingly. This the dissenting Members would insinuate to be hurtfull in it's Consequences to the place though the inhabitants of it have it in their option whether they will complain or not, and it's strange to imagine they will do ought that may prejudice their freedom of trade except a well digested Regulation of their own agreing to can be called fatal to their own Interest. That the Revenues are come to the growth they are at present before this scheme was propos'd is very true but had it been thought of formerly and put in practice probably those Revenues had been more considerable by how much more extensive a trade carried on by the Collective Body is likely to be than the narrow

fortunes and Conceptions of a few can ever bring it to. Time and other measures (as urg'd) may indeed corrupt the best designs but if nothing is to be attempted but what is unalterably good the revenues must sink for want of Infallibility of those whose conduct the now happy reconciled Interest of the people which thô not consonant to a swarm of Supracargoes will always employ such free Merchants as belong to the settlement and do not intrude upon us without the Honble Company's permission and such of that body who have fortunes to stay ashore enjoy the same privileges in Commerce as the Governour himself which is a treatment at least as good as they will find in contributing to the rising Greatness of Pondicherry whose improvement is principally owing to this very regulation of restraining those who act more on selfish than publick Views an instance of which has happened but lately in a ship design'd for Mocha, and it had not been amiss before these Gentlemen had given this glaring example that their knowledge of that settlement had been more improv'd and their Concern would have been less. Wherefore we are of opinion the Jealousy conceiv'd by these Gentlemen that this restraint tends to bringing the whole trade and business of the place by sea and land into a few hands is groundless and that the Liberty they argue for must in a little time throw that power again into the power of one or a very few, for it cannot be thought if this regulation is set aside but those who bear the greatest sway will resume to themselves as much as they can of the trade and the offered equality degenerate again into a monopoly. We shall detain Your Honours no longer than to acquaint you that Mr. Hubbard was one of the members of the board when Mr. Elwick presided who once thought proper to restrain a ship bound to Manilha because it was prejudicial to the Commerce thô then the pulick were not so much affected by it as it would be now, and Your Honours approv'd of what was done in your Letter dated 1st December 1725 paragrã. 51 for all which reasons we think ourselves oblig'd to stand by our resolution till Your Honours pleasure is known.

We now beg leave to represent to your Hon. &ct. that in a storm that vessel met with at sea in Octobr. last near a month before she was stranded at Cuddalore, they had been oblig'd to have overboard above a third part of her Bale Goods & most of the remainder were so much damag'd & the Gunnys rotted by the Water that the marks could not be distinguish'd so that it was impossible to know which belong'd to the owners or which to any body else, all that were damag'd have been rewash'd at Fort St. David & since brought up hither & are now in our possession, among the few goods that escaped damage in the storm, we find only one bale of the same Mark as mention'd in the Invoice sent up to Your Honour &ct. that is R. B. No. 8 which we believe to be one of the 11 laden by the Broker. We have lately receiv'd orders from the owners to sell every thing that was saved out of the abovesd. Vessell as soon as possible & the freighters here press us to do the same in order that a dividend may be made of the produce of the Goods sav'd in proportion to the respective Invoices. We therefore propose to put up all at outcry in a few days & as soon as we receive the particular accounts of all laden on board from the bay to make a dividend to the persons concern'd & will accot. with your Hon. &ct. for Cuntoo's proportion unless you shall think fit to direct otherwise with regard to his Goods. Ensign Peele being called in declared that he was alarm'd by a very great noise in the street & going to see what was the Matter saw three persons in one palankeen which breaking just at the Guard occasion'd the noise to increase on which endeavouring to persuade them to be quiet he was insulted by them, that Mr. Peers threatened him, Mr. Salomon said he was drunk & Mr. Foxley held up his fist at him this account was confirm'd by the Serjeant & Corporal of the said Guard as also by Captain Eckman Commander of the Main Guard, who on Mr. Peers's Complaint sent for the Ensign & examined him & he gave him the same account of the Matter as did also the Serjeant & Corporal and further declared that Mr. Peers commanded him to confine the Ensign in very peremptory terms averring he was drunk & had insulted him, whereas he the said Captain was satisfy'd he was perfectly sober, all these depositions are entered after Consultation.

ROBT. CANNAWAY.

Ensign Prece declareth That he being Commander of the Choultry Guard [lacuna] heard a very great noise in the street, he called to the serjeant & Corporal to know the meaning who could not inform him, but suspected it to be the uproar of some drunken sailors, whereon he ordered a part of the Guard to be in readiness to sieze & suppress them. When they had advanc'd just opposite to the Choultry Guard he perceivid there was three persons in one palankeen who proved to be Mr. Peers, Mr. Foxley & Mr. Salomons which being so loaded broke down with them & on this disaster the Clamour was louder than before on which he went to them & said, Gentlemen. I beg you will consider what time of night it is, that you will depart about your occasions & not disturb the Garrison, on this Mr. Peers came up to him in a very particular manner & cry'd Who are you Sir? He answer'd I am commander of this Guard, it is my duty to preserve the peace & I hope you won't disturb it; Sir, said Mr. Peers we know who you are very well & shall deal with you accordingly. Mr. Henry Salomons came up & said the Ensign is drunk, what signifies talking to such a drunken fellow, speak to the Serjeant, I know him to be a sober man. He reply'd, Gentlemen if you had drank no more than I there would have been none of this disturbance to night, And Mr. Paul Foxley coming near with his hands behind him, thrust one of them almost in his face which made him, who had his sword in his hand, but not drawn, point it to him & order him to keep his distance & not dare to insult him in such a manner in the face of his Guard. Mr. Foxley said, You, Sir what do you pretend to, don't you see who is in our Company, & that after some vollies of oaths & threats they retired to the Main Guard, All which I attest to be true.

CAPTAIN ECKMAN being sent for & question'd what passed on his Guard on Saturday night last with respect to Mr. Peers & some others in his Company Answers That he being Commander of the Main Guard on Saturday last was alarm'd with a violent knocking at the Fort Gate about two in the morning, that the Serjeant coming to him & acquainting him that Mr. Peers & some others desired to speak with him, he went down to them, when Mr. Peers told him the Ensign of the Choultry Gate was drunk & had insulted him & commanded him to confine the Ensign immediately. That he told Mr. Peers he could not take an officer off his guard without putting another in his stead and at that time he had not one to relieve him, but he sent for the Ensign & examined him on Mr. Peers's Complaint & the Ensign who appeared to him to be perfectly sober gave him the following account of the Matter. That hearing a very great Noise in the street he call'd to the Serjeant & Corporal to know the meaning who could not inform him but suspected it to be the uproar of some drunken sailors whereon he ordered a part of the Guard to be in readiness to seize & suppress them. When they had advanc'd just opposite to the Choultry Guard he perceiv'd there was three persons in one palankeen who prov'd to be Mr. Peers, Mr. Foxley & Mr. Salomons which being so loaded broke down with them & on this disaster the Clamour was louder than before on which he went to them & said, Gentlemen, I beg you will consider what time of night it is, that you will depart about your occasions & not disturb the Garrison, on this Mr. Peers came up to him in a very particular manner & cry'd, Who are you Sir? The Ensign answered, I am Commander of this Guard, it is my duty to preserve the peace & I hope you won't disturb it. Sir, said Mr. Peers, we know who you are very well & shall deal with you accordingly.

Mr. Henry Salomons came up & said, the Ensign is drunk, what signifies talking to such a drunken fellow, speak to the Serjeant, I know him to be an honest man. The Ensign replied, Gentlemen if you had drank no more than I there would have been none of this disturbance to night & Mr. Paul Foxley coming near with his hands behind him suddenly thrust one them almost in his face which made the Ensign who had his sword in his hand but not drawn point it to him & order him to keep his distance & not dare to insult him in such a manner in the face of his Guard. Mr. Foxley said, you Sir what do you pretend to, don't you see who is in our Company & that after some Vollies of oaths & Threats they retired to the Main Guard. Captain Eckman declares that after the Ensign was return'd he sent to be further satisfied for the Serjeant & Corporal who related the same story exactly & averr'd the Ensign was perfectly sober. Notwithstanding which Mr. Peers insisted the Ensign should be confin'd & commanded him positively to do it, To sooth him he told Mr. Peers he would secure the Ensign & take care he should be forthcoming in the morning to answer any Complaint.

For that Complaint hath been made by Ensign John Peel that you Charles Peers with other disorderly Companions namely Mr. Paul Foxley & Mr. Henry Salomons did on Saturday night last between the hours of one & two approach the Choultry Guard with a great noise & disturbance & being come very near to the Guard you did in a most unseemly & unwarrantable manner insult & threaten the said Ensign who was Commander there, That not being contented with the abuse & Insult to his face you went to the Main Guard which having alarm'd with repeated noise & knocking demanded to speak with the Captain, That when he came you unjustifiably assum'd to command and peremptorily require him to obey your Orders & confine the aforesaid Ensign & this you positively insisted on notwithstanding all the soft persuasions to the contrary & the representations of the Injustice and Irregularity of such a proceeding.

Mess^{rs}. Peers & Morse think it for the Company's Interest that all the Cloth be sold before more arrives but are of opinion that Sunca Rama should be allow'd a Month's Credit on the terms proposed. Mr. Hubbard also thinks he ought to be allow'd sometime but that a week is sufficient.

Tomby Chittee being thus decreed to have half the whole Quantity of the Broad cloth now delivered him pays the amount to the Import Warehousekeeper who accordingly pays into Cash twenty seven thousand 27,000 Pagodas on that account.

Having receiv'd orders from the Honble President I had provided Coats & Caps for fifty Sentinels & three Serjeants a party to be rais'd to recruit Tellicherry for which I was paid & Bombay Presidency charg'd Pags. 179. 12. -, It happen'd for reasons known to this board that the Men sent were of those belonging to this Garrison, who had paid almost in full for their Cloaths & by a mistake of those who had the management (I being at that time sick) that the Cloaths provided were not sent, only 14 Coats & Caps, which Captain West (as the Ensign commanding that party informs me) having receiv'd no directions how to dispose of them has carried with him to Mocha, wherefore to prevent the trouble this mistake may occasion I desire Your Honour &ca's leave to pay back what I receiv'd on that account & that Bombay Presidency may be credited therewith; What difference there may be due to me I shall take upon myself & am with the greatest respect

Wates & Stores for Fort Marlbrô to be sent on Ship George. And the George being to return to Fort Marlbro as soon as possible the Warehousekeepers & Storekeeper are directed to put on board her the Wares & Stores indented for as near as possible & to purchase what are not on hand.

Augustus Burton Storekeeper presents an account of Proffit & Loss being for stores worn out, wasted, dried, lost by rust, broke &ct. during the last twelve Months amounting in the whole to one hundred sixty one Pagodas fourteen fanams & seventy one Cash 161. 14. 71 which he desires may be wrote off & which upon examining the several Items appearing to be unavoidable it is permitted; at the same time he reports that there are three Candy & ten Maund 3.10 gain'd in the weight of the Gunpowder Country which he brings to account. The particulars hereof are entered after this Consultation.

Mr. Peers being then call'd upon for his answer to the charge exhibited against Mr. Peers delivers in him, replied that he had not receiv'd any charge as he apprehended but only a paper his answer, said to be a Copy of one without it's being certified that the President & Council had approv'd thereof. But the Board telling him they had approv'd thereof he then gave in his answer to it as entered after this Consultation, wherein he demands a hearing face to face with the persons who have complain'd against him. He next proceeds to give an account of the affair, affirming that what noise they made was only laughing at the breaking of the Palankeen thô perhaps the palankeen boys might be noisy: That the Ensign thereupon treated them haughtily instead of their insulting the Ensign; that they went to the Mainguard to complain of him & denies that he used any haughty language to the Captain or assumed any Command over him. His answer therefore contains in it an account of the proceedings of that night set in a different light than by the Charge and a demand to have a hearing before the board, as at large in the answer; he likewise takes notice that the thing happened on a thursday night whereas the charge lays it on the Saturday.

To the Honble George Morton Pitt Esq. B.

President & Governour of Fort St. George &ct. Council. Honble Sir & Sirs

I receiv'd on the 28th of April at noon a paper entituled Copy of a Charge exhibited by the President & Council of Fort St. George against Mr. Charles Peers one of the members of the said Council and attested at the bottom to be a true Copy by Mr. Joseph Walsh Secretary in which I am required to deliver an answer by this day, to a Complaint said to be made against me by Mr. John Peal Ensign.

Accordingly to shew all possible deference to the Commands of this Honble Board I now give in this as an answer thereto saving to myself all advantages of Exception hereafter to be made altho the manner of proceeding against me if it be not chargeable with several bad Consequences is at best very uncustomary for you have never signified such your resolution to me personally nor is it any where notified therein that the same hath passed your approval or was drawn up by your order & direction neither are there any proofs whatever brought of the Facts there alledg'd.

But I must first observe to you Gentlemen that I lye under very considerable difficulties in the doing this, because for want of having had an opportunity hitherto of knowing what has been urged in the Case & so far it can support so heavy a Charge or of confronting my accusers (for by the Nature of it there must be more than one in number) I cannot but be very much at a loss how to act, so that I will again offer to your Notice that it is very hard measure to have a Complaint laid against me in so loose & general terms, that at the same time carries with it many greivous reflections on my Conduct & must affect even my well being. Therefore before you proceed to any determination of the Matter I do with all respect insist upon & demand as my

undoubted right & priviledge, a free hearing & to face any who shall have a Complaint to prefer against me and all that is left for me to do here is to recapitulate the passages which happen'd on this occasion.

After leaving Mr. Salomon's house we pass'd by the Choultry Guard in our way home but just as we had turn'd the Corner in order to go up the street towards the fort the Bamboo of the palankeen broke upon which we got out of it laughing at the accident only, though it's very likely the Palankeen fellows might make some noise among themselves on it's happening as indeed it is generally usual with them; but at this Instant the Ensign (as it proved) for on his first appearance being undress'd & in his Banyan Coat I did not know him, came from off his Cott & in a very haughty manner cry'd out, "None of your disturbance Gentlemen, go along if you don't, I'll confine you on the Guard; I said for what? That we had made no disturbance but he might confine us if he thought proper, upon which he told us "so he would if we continued to make a disturbance, that he really thought by our Noise that the town was on fire "and I reply'd, "He could scarcely judge so by any we had made, but that he might do as he pleas'd". It's not impossible but finding myself insulted without cause I might talk pretty loud to him, but I did not treat him with any Illmanners & by this time having pretty well recovered himself he found I was one of the Company upon which he said "He was sorry to find Mr. Peers was there". I answered he had no Occasion to be so for that I did not know we had Comitted a fault, nevertheless if he thought convenient to confine us he might, when I beleiv'd he would find who had really committed a disturbance "thinking he had used me ill Whereupon I left him & said I would go to the Main Guard & without just reason. acquaint the Captain with what had happened", during our discourse with the Ensign here Mr. Foxley said, "He thought it was impertinent in him to use one of the Council as he had done & told him he did not appear on his Guard in a proper Garb, as an officer & Mr. Henry Salomons said he was but just risen from off his Cott & could not well judge bidding him ask the serjeant & Corporal of the Guard if we had made any disturbance; being come to the Main Guard Gate which was shut I knocked there & desired to speak with the Captain who after a small time came down from his room to me on the parade, I inform'd him of what had passed at the Choultry, whereupon he ordered the Ensign to be call'd up, but immediately afterwards I said, Captain Eckman can you send for the Ensign off his Guard? to which he answered "Yes Sir I have sent for him". I replied, "You be pleas'd then to send sombody to take care of the Guard, here seems to be a good sober serjeant or two here, & he said again, "I'll see the Guard taken care of". After the Ensign was come up Captain Eckman asked him why he had stopp'd the Gentlemen as they were passing by? who told him because we made a very great Noise & disturbance. I assured Mr. Peal hereupon That there was no noise other than what might be from the breaking of the Bamboo, and as we had not made any disturbance if he would only say so it would be sufficient & I wou'd have nothing more to say to it", but he answered "No sire I can't say so" and upon this I said to Captain Eckman "Then Sir you'l please to relieve the Ensign & keep him here till the morning till you can acquaint the Governour with what has happen'd which he promis'd to do telling us it was usual to report to him every morning from the Guards". In talking with Captain Eckman, but whether before or after the Ensign was come up I cannot positively recollect, I did tell him If he did not care to concern himself about it I would go & acquaint M'. Fowke & further "That as we or the Ensign must be in the wrong, to put either us or him on the Guard" to which he gave for answer "I'le take care of him" & so ordered the Gates to be opened to let us out of the town.

These are the most material passages that I can recollect, which I have faithfully set down to the best of my remembrance, and where any Expressions are made use of, because the stress of the argument lyes there, I have been particularly careful to keep to the very words that were spoken as near as my memory can at this distance of time suggest to me, for I was not solicitous enough about the Consequence as to commit them to paper forthwith having no manner of suspicion that it would have run to any length, much less have taken so extraordinary a turn.

This account then being expressly contradictory to the allegations in the Charge I will take the Liberty to remind this Honble board that it will be but just to examine proper Witnesses & Testimonies concerning the general Character that M. Peel bears, in Competition with ours on which I dare depend so far that we shall not be found to deserve the Imputation cast upon us of being disorderly persons, all of us have been many years upon the spot & for myself I will challenge any man to charge me with having ever given any proofs of my being disposed that way.

It was on Thursday the 22^d of April at night or rather between the hours of twelve & two (the twenty third) in the morning that this accident happen'd & not on the Saturday night following as is set forth by the Charge, what should occasion so wide a mistake in so necessary a point of the time I will not take upon me to determine but it is apparently so, & I hope I shall be indulged in taking the advantage of it.

I desire it may be considered that we had passed one Guard (at the Middle Gate) in coming from M^r. Salomons house without any Interruption which may be accepted as some proof that we did not advance to or approach the Choultry Guard with great noise & disturbance, but in examining to this point you will please to observe the necessary distinction to be made in the Circumstance of our being loud or (as M^r. Peel terms it) noisy, whether it was before or at the time of our being engaged in discourse with him.

Again, If the Ensign thought he had reason to be apprehensive of so much danger as he express'd or indeed of any, how can he stand excused for being so far unprovided against it, as to lye unconcern'dly upon his Cott (to take no notice of his being undressed) whilst we passed his Guard which he had actually done some paces before the Bamboo of the palankeen broke.

I am charg'd with having hereupon in a most unseemly & unwarrantable manner insulted & threaten'd the said Ensign. I hope you will consider this particular as it seems to be the most material one with all the attention it deserves. As to my behaviour then which is aggravated into an Insult & the Expressions I used which are misconstrued into menaces I can only refer you to the preceding account of the whole transaction because I have not been permitted yet to look my accuser in the face, but as I believe he will not be able to prove more or other words upon me than I have already acknowledged I hope the Interpretation of them will not be strained to such a degree considering with all that besides it being natural for any man to be provoked at an Injury, my station might engage me to resent this the more, from a person to whose promotion I had contributed, by my assent to the giving him his Commission.

You cannot but observe likewise that the very inconsiderable Circumstance of knocking at the Main Guard Gate in order to make our Complaint known to the Commander, is nevertheless worked up into a matter of so much Consequence as to have given a General alarum to the whole Guard, & that I am said to have Demanded to speak with the Captain in as peremptory a manner as if I would have made him come down otherwise by Compulsion. I need not say that such prejudiced representations of things will always serve to render a cause suspected.

I will confess to you freely Gentlemen that I am pretty much a stranger to the exact Rules of Garrison discipline so that very possibly I may have committed an Error in using any Instances with the Lieutenant in Command to confine the Ensign, or perhaps in making application to him at all. If it be so I am ready to acknowledge it to you in the amplest manner, however the Lieutenant seems then to be the most blameworthy of the two. for he should better have known his duty than to have complied, & he is the Less excusable on this score if as the Charge sets forth he took so much pains to convince me that it was not only an irregular but an unjust proceeding. But after all I beleive you will find upon Enquiry that the Ensign was return'd to his guard & not put under Confinement.

It is the Intention which distinguishes the Action & by which it ought to be judged. So whereas to insult Military Officers upon duty does certainly tend to the subversion of Government, surely it cannot fall under that Censure to be unluckily betray'd into an unlook'd for difference without carrying it on to any Overt Acts of violence for I am confident it will appear absurd to you to imagine in the least that we had any designs in View against the peace & welfare of the Garrison.

I must account it a very great misfortune to lye under the odium of a Charge but as I am free on that account to urge anything in my own behalf I would in the next place recommend to you to consider that the subject Matter of Complaint is not for any Infidelity to our Honble Masters or Breach of trust committed, so that whilst I have not in violation of our common Oath of Fidelity to them or our Covenants been unfaithfull to their Interest in committing any Enormities they particularly provide against such as of abusing the trust they repose in us by vexing & distressing the Inhabitants, whether by Extortion under the specious pretext of perquisites not allowed by them or by any other means, wilfull mismanagement or misapplication of their Revenues, Embezzlement of their Goods, Corruption & acts of Violence, Waste of their money or overcharges in the prices of Goods bought with it & the like. while I have not only kept my hands clear of all these Crimes & my Character free from the Imputation of any of them, but have done the Company some services too which have been approv'd I will not fear so hard a fate as to fall for one single I may call it slight indiscretion which has not been attended with any ill Consequences nor are any likely to follow it.

Suffer me to add to this that as we are all accountable to our Employers for our actions whilst we continue under their protection, so they have given us stated rules which they call their Standing orders for our Government in all points that have fallen occasionally under their Notice, And because Common Justice and our Laws which are founded upon it requires that every thing should be taken in the most favourable Construction they do positively direct by their said Orders that no member of their Council shall suffer suspension or be expell'd from their Service otherwise than for plain Infidelity in the particular cases enumerated above or for other such flagrant crimes. For this please to be referr'd more immediately to the 109th. Paragraph of their Letter dated 3d. February 1719.

I shall only trouble you further to acquaint you that I had address'd myself to the Governour upon this occasion & it never entered into my thoughts that it should have been brought so publickly upon the stage, nevertheless since it has been improv'd so greatly to my prejudice & so much will depend on your determination upon the matter, I doubt not but you will consider coolly & hope you will be inclin'd to judge favourably of the premises. I am

PRESIDENT & GOVERNOUR OF FORT ST. GEORGE &CA. COUNCIL.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We have in obedience to your orders examined the several papers & accompts receiv'd from Fort Marlbrough & Ship George & now offer what remarks we have made thereon.

We observe the Mountague in her passage from S^t. Helena touch'd at Batavia & the reasons Captain Keat gave were that he had sprung his Main mast which is usual to demand in writing & to have them enter'd on the Consultations when a ship makes any deviation in her Voyage.

In Consultation of the 12th of September we find they had determined to send the Mountague hither with what pepper they should have ready, but on the arrival of the George with the Letters from hence to them advising the Cadogan's laying the year round & of there being a larger Tonage in India than was likely to be provided for, they agreed in Consultation of the 26th. October it would be more for the Company's Interest to dispatch her for Europe althô she might want somewhat of her Tonnage, but they have succeeded so well as to be able to compleat her loading which will be very satisfactory to our Honble Masters; however it must be a standing rule to them the Orders in the General Letters from Europe to send the ships over to this port when they have not the best grounded assurances of sending them from thence in the season which will save demorage & prevent what happened to the Princess Anne Anno. 1727.

We observe the frame that was design'd for the long boat prov'd rotten that is some of the ribs, for the Keel & several of the ribs were of Teak wood & sound when laid & could not possibly decay in so short a time, it was set on foot for the tryal of the Carpenter & the charges are very inconsiderable, the Teak wood having been got at Pulo Tecus out of a wreck'd prow & cost the Company nothing; The two small Sloops Expedition & Experiment had a thorough repair and were thought to be made serviceable for a long time, but the former sunk at her moorings in the Carang occasion'd as they believe by the holes they found bored in her bottom which they suppose to have been done by the pyrates to prevent her being sent after them and

upon a survey of her by Captain Keat & his officers it was found she would cost more to repair than she was worth, upon which she was order'd to be sold at outcry together with the Wreck of the other sloop the Experiment which was broke to pieces on the bar of Sillebar river the 2d. of September last, so that now the Company have no boat & Mr. Newcome proposes to Your Hon. &ct. to ship the Company's Goods according to their rate of Tonnage at one dollar # Ton from Marlbrough & one & a half from Sillebar which by their calculation of what it has cost the Company since these sloops were built would lessen the Charge considerably, but we are of opinion that charge had not run so high if those sloops had been built as they ought to have been and not made out of old prows which was the occasion of their always being leaky on the least shake or knock they often have had a long side of the ships or on the Bars for such vessels cannot be rightly caulk'd & secured as the planks are put together in such a manner as not to admit of it; besides it is to be further considered that the Patroons & Lascars were serviceable in the Gunroom & lessen'd that Expence. Your Hon. &c. having now frames of boats to send over thither which were built for the use of that settlement & proper you will please to determine whether you will please to accept of Mr. Newcome's proposal or have these boats set up & employ'd in the Company's service by their people, we compute that the Company will pay annually for six hundred Tons of Goods laden & unladen aboard & from their ships & vessels in that service which according to Mr. Newcome's proposal the Company are to pay Vizt.

This is as near a Computation as we can make of what the Company must pay for boathire annually & we are of opinion there ought to be always two good Boats ready for the business & two persons who understand working them, & a proper Compliment of men put on board for we cannot be of opinion with the Deputy Governour there that one European & four Lascars are sufficient for the business, because in case of sickness of the person or any disaster to one boat the other may be employ'd or else the ships must wait a considerable time for their Cargoes as we have given Y. Hon. &c. an account of what M. Newcome proposes as to the Charge of Boathire & our opinion thereon we shall now proceed to lay before you an account of the Expence in case these boats are mann'd by the Company's people Vizt.

to go towards the cost & charge of repairing the boats & these people will be all serviceable in the Gunroom when they are not in the boats & part may be employ'd in M'. Newcome's trading Vessels, in his pay at those seasons & hereby the Companys: Effects will be very secure as their boats will be well mann'd & always ready for their business.

The salt sent them they represent to be not sufficient for the Consumption of the Inhabitants and the supplies from Java have fail'd thô the Java Noquedah's had all possible Encouragement given them wherefore they propose the sending over the Europe ship in order to be return'd them with salt & other necessaries, which if they could be certain of a full loading of pepper for her on her return might answer the design very well; but as that ship in such case must leave the West Coast by the first of August at furthest they will scarce be able at that time to fully know if they shall have sufficient to compleat her lading on her return & in case of failure she will not be able in all likelihood to come over here again & save her season for Europe & then she must continue on demorage the George must be kept on the Coast to take in the pepper at Anacksoongey, and her four Months charges together with the delivery of the pepper at Marlbrô & afterwards regarbling it & sending it aboard will be a considerable Expence. Y'. Hon'. &c'. will therefore be pleased on our having stated the case to give such directions as you shall esteem most proper.

As to the sugar & arrack Plantation we find they have not been able to make any great progress in, as Jibb left the ground but thin & the number of persons so few together with the difficulty of contracting with the Mallays to fence & clear the ground which are the reasons that they could not comply with the directions Mr. Morse left for setting a good number of Canes they have entertain'd some Mallay debtors to assist in the business, but if some Nias or Coffry Slaves could be sent them it would certainly contribute to set that work much forwarder, because the stay of Mallay debtors is very uncertain, the purchase of them hazardous & not much to be expected from their Labour; the sugar now receiv'd is much the same as what has been usually sent & the sugar Candy with a little more Improvement would sell well and as it is dear at present we beleive this parcel will sell at Sixteen to Eighteen Pagodas & Candy, however they will be able to judge on the sales here whether the sugar or that made into Candy will answer best & take measures accordingly; the arrack they have sent no musters of, but if it is kept up to it's right strength & Goodness we think the Quantity made will be satisfactory considering the Circumstances they are under, for want of a large number of Canes, it will be necessary for them therefore to increase the number of Toddy trees in order to have a larger supply of that Liquor in future, and to endeavour if possible to hire persons to clear the Ground for planting of sugar Canes which will be much cheaper than keeping a number of slaves for that work, Y'. Hon'. &c^t. will observe what they write concerning Jibb & your determination concerning him is desired; his debt after having valued his stock at the plantation & sales of his. other Effects amounts to six thousand six hundred & Eighty six Dollars three sucas & twenty seven Cash which they are of opinion is desperate, we esteem it to be preferr'd his leaving that place rather than continuing there and we have no opinion of his being serviceable at the plantation notwithstanding his promises, for tho his present. Circumstances put him upon making these offers yet it is not to be expected that he that could not manage well for himself, will do it now for the Company, and he has too much sense not to know what sort of behaviour that will discover, wherefore we beleive it will be best he should be sent hither where his Industry may get. him a livelihood.

The building the house at Laye & sending for the pepper from thence has had the Effect desired & given great satisfaction to the people & the continuance of the same will no doubt engage them to greater Industry as they will now enjoy the fruits of their Labour in a larger degree than what they were a long time accustom'd to; the sending them salt or using any methods that may encourage them in their business is always to be done and a strict watch must be kept over such as shall any ways endeavour to prevent the putting in practice the orders that have been sent

from hence and establish'd there to this purpose for the greatest hopes of a large Quantity of pepper entirely depend upon it & therefore such as dare to oppose so good a design calculated for the Interest of the Natives as well as the Company ought to be shewn a just displeasure be they Leading men or any others. We don't observe that there are as yet any shedds built to the so. ward according to what was wrote from thence & Marlbro in January last, & the orders from hence & George, but suppose they will be undertaken before this time as that at Laye has succeeded so well.

We think it will be very necessary the orders should be put in Execution for frequently taking Surveys not that there is occasion to take the account of the Number of trees every time, but to see that the plantations are kept in good order, & what new ones are set about; the Gentlemen there having by this means a know-ledge of what is doing may issue out proper orders & spurr on the Tardy for every one who has been on that Coast must know there is little dependance to be had on the Pangarans & Dupattys in respect to their inciting their people to Industry they being far more ready to set them to gaming & cockfighting than planting & the little authority they even have is seldom made use of either to the advantage of the Company or their dependants. It will be happy if they can by any means be brought to a better Consideration or to deserve even the Gratuity they have now.

The Company have long since been advis'd of Manna & its being capable of producing a large Quantity of pepper and their orders are to give all encouragement to such as bring them pepper but to be at the charge of a Residency & keeping a party of men there sufficient to quell any differences that may happen amongst them would in all likelihood make the Expence so high as not to answer the design. For some years past we find there has been Buggueses of the Marlbrô party residing there which it may be proper to continue and the having an European there some part of the year may be found to be serviceable, to whom directions may be given for the Improvement of the Country & it will not require any great Expence to build a house & shedd for the person who is to reside there & the pepper that may be brought.

As the Title of Pangaran was usurp'd by Pangaran Neore & neither father nor son having shewn themselves worthy of any favour We think the Deputy Govern. & Council in the right to give the son only the title of Raja Calippa which is what belongs justly to him and nothing greater at least till he has by a proper length of time given convincing proofs that he has had the Company's Interest at heart & has promoted it in the Country of which he is head.

It is absolutely necessary to keep a watchfull Eye over Side Ibrahim; the eight Dusans are certainly a nest of Villains and he has them at his beck, but as he has desired & obtain'd a pardon for his former Crimes & put himself under the Company's protection & engaged to be dutifull & obedient in case he should continue such practices as plundering the people on the frontiers, an opportunity may be taken to tell him that his behaviour is contrary to his Engagements; the Gentlemen certainly ought to be cautious of involving the Company's affairs in troubles & if they think the force they have not sufficient to prevent his going upon such Enterprizes, they ought to represent it to the board, for 'tis most probable that when he finds he can carry on his designs under the Eye of the Government without controul he may in time proceed to arm himself against them & the Evil spread so far as not to be easily removed. The turning out of the bounds the Impostor (as he is call'd) was very proper & the death of him may be fortunate. This may prevent the sowing of sedition amongst the people & the designs of such as were endeavouring to create disturbances.

Dupatty Abdull Momen has agreed to make a Coffee plantation & the Gentlemen have allow'd him thirty Dollars & Bahar of five hundred Sixty six pounds & one Dollar & Bahar Gratuity as & Consultation of 6 November last. Such contracts should be always in writing the Copy entered after Consultation and the Counterpart signd by the person lodged in the office, to which recourse may be always had & especially if the party is found neglecting or tardy in his performances which is always

to be expected from the Mallays, the price fix'd with the Dupatty may be proper at first in order to set an Example to persons to make plantations; but we believe it will be found to be too great to be given when there is any Quantity as the Dutch Company have such large parcels yearly now in Java which by report is sold at six

Rix Dollars & Pecul of 132 so that they will be able to send it to Europe at more than 34 & Cent cheaper than ours, the French have likewise large Quantities at their Southern Islands of Mauritius & Don Mascarine.

Wherefore we are of opinion that thirty one Spanish Dollars & Bahar be only engag'd for during the term of five years commencing from the agreement with the Dupatty which for that time may be a stated rate to be given to him & others who shall set forward that business and this will according to their accounts allow a proper time for it's Growth & coming to perfection & the having it sent to Europe for a trial of the Market & the Honble Company's further pleasure be known concerning it, when they may enter again on new Contracts & agreements as shall be directed. In the mean time we believe it will be for the Company's Interest that no money should be advanc'd & that no Mallay should under this pretence neglect the planting of pepper but every house keep up to their agreements.

It will no doubt be very satisfactory to our Honble Masters to hear the Sultan of Anacksoongey has complied with his promises & Engagements & increas'd the pepper plantations in his Country & that he continues hearty in their Interest as it will be also to find that the several parts of the Country round Marlbro have by the care that has been taken some years past to keep the Natives in peace & at their business furnish'd a full Lading for a ship to Europe in the season.

The row of buildings along the North East Curtain is near compleated, the want of Carracoys & good Jagary to strengthen the Chinam has prevented the entire finishing them, which they now desire may be sent them, the Conveniencys in the Gunroom & Storehouse are very necessary as is the prison for Criminals & stairs at the Corps du Guard, likewise the building the Smith's shop out of the Old Cookroom & the platform at the seaside all which we think have been well done & with frugality & M^r. Newcome's care therein deserves commendation.

As to the making of the Causeway we don't know how far it may contribute towards the strength of the Fort but as it is represented to be of benefit to their Healths & to supply their Garrison with fish our Honble Masters we presume will not think much of laying out one hundred Dollars to such purposes.

If the making the West point secure & defensible can be done with a small Charge it will be well, otherwise we can't but think it more for the Company's Interest that the Bastion should be built that so the Fort might be compleated whilst Mr. Newcome is there whose Experience in such business will be of service as likewise the hospital which appears to be a very necessary work.

The lowness of the Fort Walls have been a long time complain'd of & the digging the Intrenchment will serve to give it a better aspect & add to it's security, but care must be taken that those Intrenchments do in no degree prejudice the foundation Walls, least that which was design'd for it's benefit should prove otherwise.

The rebuilding the Timber shedd was very proper as there were materials on hand which must have a place to preserve them from decay & the Weather. It will be of service if Joseph Coles can succeed in making good Tiles as they are much more secure from Fire than Attops Coolycoys or any covering in that Country.

They propose when the shipping were gone to make an end of the Terrass work & go on the foundation of the lodgings for the Company's servants & hospital, they represent the Deputy Governour's house to be rotten in the foundation & a failing in the roof of the pepper Godown which last they propose the immediate repair of for the security of the pepper. The top is of wood & ill contriv'd in the fixing of the Windows.

The Resident of Moco Moco has agreable to the directions Mr. Morse left, made some small repairs in the Paggar & is raising the points with the help of the slaves. Their giving him leave to write off & sell the things mention'd in Consultation of the 28 May, we don't see anything could be objected against as part were decayed & useless. The West building being entirely decay'd & fallen down & the materials applied to the repairs of other buildings and nothing now remaining may also be wrote off.

The Gentlemen there are apprehensive the Arrack & Ophium licence will not let in future for as much as the present farmer has given, & the reason they urge is that the Farmer alledges there are not so many Buggueses in the Company's service as formerly, there has been no reduction of them lately, so that we don't know whether this is not a pretence of his in order to get the farm cheaper. The Deputy Governour & Council will no doubt cherish & support the Company's Revenues as it is their duty & as it will be acceptable to their Employers and therefore they should be fully persuaded of the matter of Fact, before they permit a report to have any weight with them and if it proves so as the farmer represents It must be submitted to, for the Farmer must certainly propose & obtain some advantage for the trouble & pains taken in the business.

The Arrack License at Moco Moco is in our opinion a grievous hardship to the poor military there who are the persons that cheifly take off that Liquor of the Farmer & are oblig'd to pay near ten shillings \$\psi\$ Gallon & being afflicted with agues in that climate & it being damp & moist somewhat extraordinary is requir'd there for their support of Life, but the dearness of the Liquor which they will have takes away all their money & does not leave them sufficient for warm & good Cloathing & necessary provisions by which many die & is a great Loss to the Company. The Opium & Arrack Farm join'd together produces no more than fifty five dollars presem. Wherefore we are of opinion that it would be better that what arrack is sold there be delivered out of the Company's Godown at a certain price whereby the Military would be cheaper supplied & proper Quantities be given them & the Company would be near as much gainers as when let to farm & greater if the Loss of their military is considered. As for the Ophium Licence the dearer the Natives pay for it the better, those who take it being idle & worthless people & are usefull in no other way but in supporting this revenue.

The salt continues under the same regulations which Mr. Morse left it & is not let to farm for want of the supplies from Java & we believe it will be best to continue it in the same way only to try if the Natives will not be willing to pay half money & the other half Exchange for Grain whereby the Garrison & slaves will always have a supply of rice & there will be none on hand to spoil if the other half is paid in ready money, & the business be managed to the Company's advantage by disposing of it to each part of the Country in equal distributions in proportion to the number of Inhabitants.

The Expences of the settlements on that Coast from April 1729 to May 1730 amount to twenty eight thousand sixty nine dollars & fifty two Cash, whereof eight months were in Mr. Morse's time & four in Mr. Newcome's & is lessen'd one thousand five hundred & forty dollars three sucas & ninety four Cash, which is in the Article of Moco Moco Residency Garrison &c. incident charges, & we believe can scarcely be reduced much farther & there appears to be a due care & frugality in them.

An order having passed in Consultation of the 3^d. Instant for the suspension of M^r. Charles Peers from the Honourable Company's service till their determination should be known We desir'd leave to dissent & to give our reasons which are

That though Mr. Peers desired & insisted upon the persons being called before the board & there to declare in his presence what they had to alledge against him yet that request (so just and reasonable in our opinion) was denied him which we know not any Instance of it's being done before in cases of the like Nature where all the party's have been present & Mr. Peers might thereby be prevented from disproving several things in the accusation & as his charge was laid in such general terms it did more particularly require to have all that they had to say on the occasion declared before him, & he heard in what he had to offer in his own vindication.

That on reading & duely considering the charge together with the answer to it the Character he bears in the place & what declared by Mr. Wentworth at the board we are of opinion that charge is not fully made out against him, nor do we find he has insulted the officer on Guard or made any other Noise than what he mentions; That as he therein declares his willingness to make the most ample acknowledgements to the board for what he said to the Captain in order to the Confinement of the Ensign (who however was not confin'd) that we think such an acknowledgement might be accepted for the very reason he urges of his not being so well acquainted with the rules of Garrison in this case, and because We think with Mr. Peers the manner of the Officer's treating him at first not altogether so decent as might be expected to Gentlemen of his station in the Company's service which seems to us to be the cause of his shewing such a resentment & the rise of the dispute. On the whole we beg leave to say that we think Mr. Peers's Behaviour in a private way has been regular & well & with Credit and in the Company's service as he has recited in his answer that he has been diligent & faithfull in every respect. In consideration of all which & what now laid to his charge We cannot be of opinion he in any manner deserves to be suspended and therefore we have thought ourselves oblig'd to enter our dissent that it may appear to our Honourable Masters we have not given our Consent to the removal from their business a person for such a matter attended with no ill Consequence nor done with any ill design, who hath always acted with the greatest diligence, Fidelity & Integrity in it. The List of Investment from Europe being taken into consideration the President remarked to the board the ill performance of the Contracts lately made & added that he was of opinion That the two sets of Merchants being united all Emulation was at an end, that therefore they grew careless & indifferent in their business & so shamefully neglected the provision of Cloth that we had been obligd even to fill up one of the last year's ships with saltpetre & other goods for want thereof & that therefore he was of opinion it would be better that they should contract separately which opinion the Board joining in they were called in & a contract for one thousand Bales each being proposed to them Sunca Rama told the Board he would contract on no terms unless he had first that fourth of the Broad cloth return'd him which had been given to Tomby Chittee, which the board did not think fit to comply with having already come to a resolution on that affair.

A Contract concluded wth. Tombe Chitte only.

Tomby Chittee having first agreed to a Contract for one thousand Bales hearing Sunca Rama refuse to contract & it being proposed to him by the board undertook for the whole Quantity if the terms could be agreed on; accordingly after some arguments It was at last fixed on the following Terms.

As she may sometimes be employ'd to fetch pepper from the Northern settlements to Marlbrô I propose she be credited 2 Dollars for every Bahar so brought up & if they shall have at any time occasion to send any upon her hither she may then be allow'd 4 Dollars \$\psi\$ Bahar for freight which I beleive is about equal to what is paid on that Commodity whenever freighted from the Malabar Coast to this place.

In my passage I met with bad weather which has occasion'd the loss of 11 bags & damag'd 14 more that happen'd by the Vessel's lying under water for several hours & not through carelessness or any other accident.

I had a great deal of reason to believe there was more damage which made me at my arrival in this port protest against the seas Wind &c*.

The following is advices from the several parts where our Gomastahs are providing cloth viz^t.

From Warriapollom.

The People we sent here write us that according to Our Orders they offerd $\frac{1}{8}$ of a pagoda more in each peice than last Year, at that Price they procured and sent us one hundred and Sixty peices Long Cloth woh. we found very bad and Order them to advance still $\frac{1}{8}$ th, pagoda on each peice, before the arrival of that order Comache Mooten, Chittamoodall and Nachenen head Weavers had sent us a Letter acquainting us that the People at Negapatam, Tranquebarr and Porto Novo paid for cloth from five to six Caul of sixty eight Covids Long and two and one eight Broad after the Rate of one Pagodas and a half \mathfrak{P} peice and that those for the Mocha Ships have lately for this Sort of Cloth offerd $\frac{1}{8}$ th, more \mathfrak{P} peice, the price of thread there is seven Pound for a Pagoda so that the English sort of Cloth can not be made under two Pagodas and one Sixteenth \mathfrak{P} peice, the cloth of nine caul provided for the French last year at one pagoda & a Quarter \mathfrak{P} peice is now Demanded at the rate of two pagodas and one Sixteenth \mathfrak{P} ps. and not to be Gott, We have here advanced Six thousand pagodas.

From Tinvanem Vieravande.

We sent four People here to Purchase Cloth, they wrote us that by the Famine and Great Price of Cotton thread great part of the Inhabitants were Dead and many left the Place, that those that remain were very poor and not to be trusted with money, they sent our money Back.

We formerly have purchased here two thousand pagodas worth of Sallampores in a month and there is not now One hundred to be Gott.

ACHERAVACUM AND MUDARANDARUM.

There was formerly Six hundred weavers here now but two hundred, we sent our people here who according to our Orders Advanced 1th. pagoda on a ps. of Long Cloth and 1sth. one [sic] a ps. of Sallampores which when it arrived here we found very bad but they sent us only seventy peices of Long Cloth and forty three peices of Sallampores and that after two moths. We sent other four People up here and they have advanced money to one hundred and twenty Weavers but for want of thread they have not begun to Work as yet; We have here advanced 1850 pagodas.

We sent our People here with money & orders to advance on every peice of Long Cloth & Pagoda and on Sallampores of more than the former price, they found the Country in a very miserable Condition by the late Famine and not above twenty Weavers were formerly was hundred, those that Remain Said the[y] could not get thread for Long cloth but they would weave Sallampores and seventy of them are advanced money but no Cloth is Yet arrived occationd by the great Want of thread and the French having offerd two pagodas & Ps. for nine caull Cloth we'h. last Year they bought at one pagoda three Quarters. We have here advanced 1030 Pags.

MAUNAM PADDI CHUMPAUCUM.

In this Place was formerly four hundred Weavers now but one hundred, they used in a Months time to make two thousand pagodas worth of Long Cloth. We sent our People here but they will not make any thing but Coarse Sallampores on the advance price of 15th, pagoda peice, fifty People are advanced money two months past but no Cloth yet arrived. We have he [re] advanced 1000 pagodas.

CAULEA PETTAH.

In this Place was formerly two hundred Weavers now but sixty only thirty of w^{ch}. would Receive money w^{ch}. has been advanced them two months; there is sixty peices finishd which will be here the 10th. this month. We have here advanced four hundred and forty Pagodas.

CONJEVARAM.

We sent our People here with money and orders to advance the price as at other Places for ordinary and Midling Long Cloth and Sallampores but the Weavers refused to agree because thread was very Dear being at seven pound & a half #pagoda; if it came cheaper they would see if they would agree; but at present there is here about four hundred Weavers. We could prevail on none excepting the People of Sheveram, Yeacombrum Petta and Shadicauloo about thirty persons who are advanced to Weave all Sallampores Midling but are not able to gett thread yett for that sort of Cloth. the people from Poncherry have been here five Months and have offerd three pagodas #P peice for their Long Cloth Fine but they have not been able to gett any for all the Weavers Work upon is Buzar Cloth for the Consumption of the Country. We have here advanced 990 Pagodas.

ANCAVOOR TREVATOOR.

We sent our People here but Could not persuade the Weavers to Receive any money for they said they Could not gett any thread to make the Midling Long Cloth which is the sort they are used to, they were offerd and advance[d] price as at other places but promised if thread Could be Got they would Receive some money and the same answer they have given the Merch^{ts}. of Pondechery, here is advanced seven hundred and sixty pagodas.

POONAPAUC.

We sent Our People here but the Weavers would not come to any agreement because thread was not to be Gott. We offerd them the advance price and Our People still remains there.

PUDAPU CONATOOR.

We sent our People here with money and offerd the Weavers 3th, pags more in a ps. of fine Long Cloth than the price of Last Year; they answerd that by the French Long Cloths of 15 and 18 Caull they were able to gett their Cooley but by the English sort at the present price of thread they could not gett that. Last year 400 Weavers of this Place work'd for us but now we have not been able to prevail on more than 30 Persons, here is advanced 1150 Pags.

The[y] used to make for us here sallampores Fine. We sent our People and offerd them 3 pagoda More in a peice than last years price, they said they expected some thread from the northward to arrive at S^t. NAIRANAPORUM.

There was formerly 200 Weavers here who Used to make for us Sallampores Fine. We sent our People here and offerd them the advance price as at other Places, but we could not prevail on more than 30 people to take our money by Reason thread was very Scarse, here is advanced 320 Pag³.

PURANGALOOR PIACATTEE.

A[t] this Place there always used to be employed on Midleing Long Cloth 4 or 500 Weavers, we offerd them the advance price of \(\frac{1}{3} \) pagoda \(\psi \) ps. but they said they could not engage, because thread was not to be gott, if they could here after gett any they would work for us, only 50 people accepted of our money & that on promise to send y. thread from Lalah Petta which we have sent money for. A great number of the Weavers of this place are dead or Gone away, advanced Pag. 730.

WOOTANDOOR WOLLA CHALLUM.

We sent our People here but have not yett Receivd any answer, advanced here 300.

GREAT SHAULUM.

We advanced money here last year, for woh, if the Goods are but just now Returnd and those very bad We sent our People up but are advised the French have sent six people now four months past and have offerd Pag'. 2 P'. of Midleing long Cloth but they have not yett been able to gett one peice, thread being very Dear and a Great many buyers of almost any cloth thô it be no more than 67 or 68 cov*. long and 2½ broad, here is advanced here Pagodas 2000.

The whole sum advanced at the several places is Sixteen thousand nine hundred and Seventy Pagodas 16970.
