Another and that no small Cause of the Decrease of our sea Customes is that great Part of the Elephants Teeth, Wax, Tinn &c^a. which used to be Bro^t. hither from Pegue and from hence ussed to be sent to Bengal and Suratt &c^a. now goes Directly to Bengal.

That the Land Custom this Year Exclusive of what paid by the Companys Merch^{ts}. are risen again to what they were the Year ending April 1729 from w^{ch}. they Last Year fell as was then advised our Hon^{ble}. Mast^r.

As to the Revenue of the mint the non Arrival of the China ship will in great Part Account for the fall in that Article the Rest of it is Owing to the Extraordinary advantage made by Coining in the Mints about us which so Long as the Arcot Rupee is Current in Bengall will allways prevent our Coining any Quantity of Silver here.

There being now in Cash upwards of one thousand six hundred Pagodas under the head of the Town Conicoplys Duty it was proposed by the President and unaniously Approved of to make a Coverd Walk from the Sea Gate to the Back Gate of the Fort with four Rows of stone Pillars as being a thing that would Conduce very much to the Beauty of the Town, the Purpose for which the Hon^{ble}. Company have been pleas'd to appropriate this Duty as well as to the Ease and Conveniency of the Inhabitants who have hitherto on any hurry of business found the Sea Gate very troublesome and inconvenient from the Crowds of People there at such Times.

The board then taking into Consideration the Dispatch of the Dawson it was thought more for the Companys Interest to send her away as soon as possible than to keep her to go in Company with any of the other ships and it was Accordingly so Resolved and the Warehousekeeper is Directed to putt half what is Wanting to compleat to her Tonnage on board her in peice Goods and the other half in Salt Petre by which means we hope we shall be able to putt on board each ship an equal proportion of Bales.

As to the Presents, our Town Lying in the high Road they increase or Decrease According as the Nabob and other Great men pass oftener or seldomer by us.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Our books being brought up for this last year I now lay before you the Account Current of Bengal Presidency, in which there are one or two Articles liable to the same dispute as the Gentlemen in the Bay raised against the Account sent them last year in their letter of the 21st. December last, I shall take notice to Your Honour &c^s. of their Objections and offer my reasons why the Account should stand as drawn up here, and not to be altered as they propose.

They first find fault that we charge them for the Bill of exchange paid in August 1730 for Maderas Rupees 6042 . 14 the Sum of Current Rupees 7049 . 12 . 10 when they say the Batta of 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ C^t. only ought to have been added and they debted them Current Rupees 6646 : 15 : 3 but this Bill being paid in pagodas at the rate of 300 Madras Rupees $\frac{1}{2}$ 100 pagodas it amounted to Pagodas 2014 . 8 . 20 which at 350 the Constant method of reducing them into Rupees makes the abovementioned sum of Rupees 7049 . 12 . 10 the difference of 402 . 13 . 7 being a loss in the Exchange should I think more reasonably be bore by them, than by this Presidency, as the bill was drawn

by them, in this Account for this year there is one bill for Rupees 9621. 9. 6 drawn by them and paid here, but it being paid in Rupees, it will Occasion no difference in this Acco^t.

They object against our charging them for 151503 Madrass Rupees sent them by the Cadogan at the rate of 303 ₹ 100 pagodas and then reducing the amount of Pagodas into Rupees at 350 and say we should only debt them for those Madrass Rupees at 350 which makes a difference of Rupees 23500. 3. 2 those Rupees were the produce of silver bought at Pondicherry and stand this Presidency in the Sum of Pagodas charged in the Invoice and that this loss, should be charged to this Presidency, when the Silver was bought for the Service of theirs, doth not seem reasonable.

In the Account for this year there are two Sums one of 182250. 10 Madrass Rupees sent them ₹ ship George and another of 240000 sent them by the Duke of Cumberland, which are Charged them at the rate of 301 $\frac{1}{2}$ ₹ 100 which being the produce of Silver bought at Pondicherry is charged as near as possible it could be as that Silver came out in the Mint and amounts at that rate to P^s. 140049. 34. 40 which sum they are accordingly debted for at the rate of 350 Rupees ₹ 100 Pagodas, making Rup^s. 490174. 15. 8 but should they bring this to our Credit in the manner they did last year, by reckoning only the Madras Rupees they received at 350 the loss to this Presidency will be Rup^s. 67924. 5. 8 or P^s. 19406. 34. 40. I cannot help Observing to your Honour &c^a. that hitherto that Presidency hath been debted for all Madrass Rupees sent them which were Coined out of the Silver Consigned us from England at the rate of 350 Madras ₹ 100 pagodas and at the same time they have been Credited for the Amount of all Invoices from thence at the rate of 350 Current ₹ 100 pagodas, which makes a profit to them of ten ₹ Cent upon a very large Sum. How this came at first to be Settled in that manner I cannot find out and I think it but Just they should be debted and Credited at the same fixed rate for Rupees, I therefore beg leave to propose to your Honour &c^a. that in all Invoices for the future where Rupees are sent them that ten ₹ Cent be added to the Madras Rupees, and then the Current Rupees charged them at 350 and as they will cause an addition of a Considerable profit to this Presidency where I think it ought to be, all Losses by bills of Exchange or Silver bought and Coined for them by falling short of 350 Current Rupees ₹ 100 pagodas, may be then carried to profit and Loss in our books, and our Account with them both with regard to what sent and received from them, kept at the Constant rate of 350 Current Rupees ₹ 100 pagodas but if at any time as it hath sometimes happened, any silver Consigned them should be taken out of the ships here to Coin into Rupees That Presidency may be Credited for the produce as it comes out in the Mint adding the Batta of Ten ₹ Cent and be debted in the same manner when sent them down, by which means they will be debted and Credited the same sum and the Profits thereon left where it ought to be to that Presidency.

GEORGE MERCHANT HAVING PETITIONED THE BOARD FOR LEAVE TO CLEAR HIMSELF OF A CHARGE WHICH HE SAYS IS LAID AGAINST HIM IN ENGLAND FOR CLANDESTINELY BRINGING TO THIS PORT FROM CHINA, GOLD AND OTHER EFFECTS BELONGING TO HIS BROTHER M^r. JAMES NAISH, WAS SWORN ON INTERRAGATORIES, AND DEPOSED AS FOLLOWS:

That on his arrival at Canton after being Cast away in the Prince George, He met his said Brother M^r. James Naish, at Canton President for the Company; who assisted him in the Affairs of the Canton Merchant, a ship belonging to this Port, & of which this Deponent was one of the Supra Cargoes, but the same ship being fallen to Leeward so as that she could not reach Canton in the Season, this Deponent after obtaining a promise from his said Brother to Assist Captain Tullie in the Management of that Ships Affairs, returned to Madrass on the King George Galley Captain Richard Boulton.

That he brought with him on the said Galley, fifty barrs of Gold belonging to Suqua a Merchant in Canton which produced in the Madrass Mint five thousand seven hundred and seventy Pagodas and ten fanams, for which he is yet Accountable to the said Suqua he also brought fifty barrs more, for which he not having money to pay that his brother M^r. James Naish was Security to Suqua and that this Deponent on his return to Canton, did repay his Brother the said sum in Account, he having transacted all his this Deponents private Affairs in his absence.

That he this Deponent further brought another small parcel of Gold for Account of M^r. Thomas Cooke of this place, which he delivered to M^r. Cooke, and another parcel belonging to M^r. Addams of Bengal, which was delivered to the said M^r. Addams here, And these four parcels were all the Gold which this Deponent brought on that Galley.

This Deponent further saith that he brought on the said Galley seventy eight Pecull and forty two Catty weight of Camphire, that the next year came on the Canton Merchant eighty eight Pecull and one hundred and eighteen pounds more, Consigned to the Governour who sold the same for five thousand five hundred and twenty Pagodas, eight fanams and forty Cash, and paid the produce to this deponent, Another parcel this Deponent himself brought on the Richmond, being sixty Seven Chests and Eleven Tubs, and another being eighty Chests was by him sent on the Catharine Brigantine to Bengal. All which four parcells of Camphire, this Deponent Averrs his said Brother M^r. FROM HUSSEN CAWN TO M^r. JOHN SANDERSON CHIEF OF INGERAM.

One Meer Abdul Rasaack a Merchant has Complained to me that he and some Others borrowed and took up of one Shakefarazula in Persia some sums of Money on their seperate Bonds to pay after their arrival in Madrass at the Expiration of two Months, that the Captain of the ship acquainted you and did not acquaint them, of his design to sail, and proceed to Madrass without them. And the Captain delivered all their Goods according to the Bill of Loading to Shakefarazulas Gomaster and after that, the owners thereof came to Madrass, and by a false Bill of Loading on pretence of a Mortgage they kept the Goods and would not deliver them till a fresh quantity arrived there, that the price fell very much and a great quantity was wanting in weight, of all which the Governour was well Informed but would not examine it, and to please some Armenians and other Merchants it was sold to favour Shakefarazulas and the produce of it was all paid to Shakefarazula on Account of his Debt, though there was more than his debt by 1000 Pagodas which was taken for Interest and Durbar Charges as he pretends, and sent Abulrazack away empty on this account and to testifie the truth of it he has a paper under the seal of Your Court and signed by the Mayor, upon this he went to Arcot and made his Complaint and Procured an Order to the Phouzdar and others at Porto Novo to make his demand and recover his money when the Register or Writer of the Court Came there and gave him a great deal of trouble and stop'd his business by Occasioning Pharazala to be released and he after sent Peons there and perswaded him to run away and procured him protection, this is not a Just proceeding, Your Actions through all your settlements are of this Nature therefor I requair you to send for Shakafarazalah from Madrass and send him to me or else you shall Answer according to their bonds for 3000 Pagodas and in Case he is gone from Madrass to any other Port You shall answer for that money.

HADJEE HUSSAIN

M^r. Sanderson writes me that he has received a Letter from you relating to Abdull Rezack's dispute with Shack Farazulla which was desided in Madrass I am surpris'd to find you should give ear to him after he had been twice cast in this place and after he had applied to the Governour of Porto Novo also, and thereby his Cause came to be known to the Nabob Sadahilla Cawn Bahauder who was so sensible of the Justice of my determination in this Cause that he forbad the Governour of Porto Novo to interfere therein. I need not lay before you the great trouble that will arise from hearing such Complaints for if what I determine in this place is set aside at your place the same may be done here to what you determine and both our Orders may be set aside in a third Place, so there will be no end of law suits which Consideration I hope will prevent your giving Ear to Abdull Razack but least it should be otherwise I have sent you a Copy in the Persian Language of the Decree of our Court whereby you will perceive that it was very plain that besides the seperate bonds given by every Merchant there was another Bond signed by the Hodjee Mudafar Hussain and Meer Abdull Razack declaring that they were the heads of the Partnership and that they would be Security for the whole. If it were not so how came the whole quantity of the Thing to be put in one Bill of Lading and to have but one Mark which if it had

not been one Joint Concern would have had every Merchants own Mark on his own particular Goods Nobody ever kept the Goods but they were put into the Companys Godown for the Customs and lay there till this Cause was determined and then they were sold by Order of the Court after it was made very plain that Abdull Rezack and Hodjee Mudafar Hussain had Mortgaged them, and if the price fell while they refused to pay their debt nobody is to be blamed but them. Abdull Rezack had no Paper signed by the Mayor with the Court seal to any such purpose as he tells you the only one that was given him is what I now send you a Copy of in Persians and if he has any other it is forged by him or else procured by him to be forged by somebody here and I beg the favour of you to send it to me that I may enquire about it. I send you my Letter to Nabob Sadahilla Cawn Bahauder on account this man and his ill Actions at Portonovo and the Nabobs answer whereby you will find it was not the Register that stoped his business but that the Nabob being sensible he had no Injustice done him forbad the Phousdar to proceed therein.

I have always depended very much on your freindship for the assisting Mr. Sanderson in his business and therefore cannot perswade myself that a person of your figure and Character who should protect Merchants in their trade and dealings will ever think of Obliging Mr. Sanderson to make good any Money on this account in which he is no way Concern'd.

I received your letter relating to Meer Abdul Razacks Cause and Observed the Contents, he has no other thing but a Cowl, that you should stop his Goods on Account of Custome is not right nor Sallabad what is due for Customs in all Ports is taken out and the rest Deliver'd to the Owner and not stopt that thereby he may receive no damage on the sale, You write me also that those Goods were Mortgaged on a Respondentia Bond, it was not so, I have examin'd his bonds and find it runs only to repay the Money not for Respondentia and therefore I have sent the Bond to you to examine it again, and as for the Agreement between them that Hodje Muzaffarr Hussain and Meer Abdul Razack should be answerable for the whole but that can't stand good because Shake Pharazula also signs the same with these words (this is void) and therefore can be of no further force and as for the Discharge given Shake Farazula it is false because Hodje Muzaffarr Hussain and Meer Abdul Razack can both write and they should have sign'd and sealed the same and Deliverd it to him in the Presence of the Court officers, We Understand the Purport of it and say it is false, as for the Paper given by Your Register from the Court Books to Meer Abdul Razack you must have got a Copy of it to keep but now it seems they have not Sign'd such a Discharge nor have you in Court the Copy I mention; we understand here that Shake Farazula gave fifty Pagodas to one Mahomud Razack Servant of Meer Abdul Razack by which he prevailed on him to Steal his Masters Seal and Deliver it to him, Immediatly the Poligar of Madrass was informed of it and caught the thief and saw that he had broke open the Chest and stole the seals, he thereupon Confind him some time which the Justice of the Choultry, named Major knows very well and so does Coja Petrose and several others, what Confidence can be put in such People or any thing that they say, Coja Petrose is a man of a good Character enquire of him, but I find your Officers deside things according to their own Customs and Laws and therefore Order'd as they have and not according to our Cast which if you had regard'd there would have been no further Demands nor troubles between them but as it is the Cause is not decided, the Just manner of deciding is that which satisfies both Partys, since this Complaint is made to me the defendant ought to come here that it may be decided without any trouble or future disputes, therefore it is reasonable to dispatch him hither Immediatly to finish the dispute according to Justice such Disputes should not remain unfinished for if the man escapes Your People ought to make it Good, because you are one that I esteem Therefore I have wrote you twice and I desire you will send that Arab here under Charge of Your People it's not well to delay it.
