N^o. 2 from the Resident at Maddepollam of the 5th. Instant, acknowledging his having received the Money remitted him by Bill of Exchange and inclosing his Journal Parcels and Cash Accounts for October, November & December.

N^o. 3 & 4 both Duplicates from the Presid^t. and Council of Fort William, the first dated the 22^d. December, advising the receipt of several from us, and of the Treasure & Redwood sent them by several Ships; That the Stills We sent them being Old will not sell for more than the price of the Metal; That none of the latter Ships from Europe were Arrived there; That they had heard nothing of the Calcutta Grab since what We wrote about her; Giving us their sentiments of our proposal for sending them a larger proportion of Arcot Rupees; directing the proportion they would have the supplies of Treasure sent them in, and desiring us to send them all we can Spare; Advising us what they had sent to the West Coast on the London, and that they could not send any Military on her, or any Bales of Piece Goods for Europe; That the dyed and Culjeed [*sic*] Flannels sold so well there that they should not send them up here, nor could they Spare Us any Fine or Superfine Scarlet Broad Cloth; That they cannot yet send the rest of the Sanoes and Baftaes; That the Country about them was again in disturbance: The ladings they had put on board the Wager and King William for Europe; That the Bedford, Prince of Orange & Beaufort were dispatch'd for England, and the Nassau would soon follow; That beleiving some of the Europe Ships that were not Arrived there might have put in here, they had sent us some Bales on the Wager and should send us more on the Princess Augusta and their Sloops, to load such Ship for Europe; That they had permitted Mess^{rs}. Halsey & Margas to come hither for the recovery of their Healths; Desiring Us to send them some Household furniture, and not above Five thousand 5000 Maunds of Redwood for this season, The other dated the 23^d. Ultimo advising that their Nabob had gain'd a Victory over his Enemies.

Letters read from Madapollam. The Money remitted thither by Bill paid. Monthly Papers. Bengall. Treasure & Redwood arrive there. The West Coast Stills will sell only for the price of the Metal. The latter Ships not arriv'd there. No News of the Calcutta Grab. The proportions of the Treasure to be sent thither. Request for all we can spare. Advice of wt. sent on the London to the W^t. Coast. They could not send any Military or Bale Goods. The Flannels sold well. They cannot spare any fine & Superfine Broad Cloth, nor send the rest of the Sanoes & Baftaes. The Country again in disturbance. Advice respecting the Wager, King William, Bedford, Prince of Orange, Beaufort & Nassau. Request to take under our directions any of the latter Ships that may arrive here, Loadings coming up for them. Halsey & Margas come hither for their healths. Request for household furniture & only 5000 Mds. of Redwood. Their Nabob gains a Victory.

Letter from Mr. Bellamy relating to the dispatch of the Wager. a protest against the Captain.

N^o. 5 from Mr. Bellamy dated on board the Wager off Ingellee the 28th. Ultimo, relating to that Ship's dispatch and her drought of Water and inclosing Copy of a protest against the Captain for not taking in his full Tonnage, as entered after the said Letter.

The Admiral Vernon to be dispatch'd for England. Her Bengal Packet & Cargo ordered ashoar.

AGREED that Notice in writing be sent Captain Webster, of our resolution to take the Admiral Vernon under our Directions, and our intention to Dispatch her to England, and that he be therein Order'd to send on shoar the Packet and what Cargo he has on board Consigned to the President and Council of Fort William.

AGREED to write the Deputy Govern^r. and Council about the Turned out Chemanaickpollam cloth being taken in as N^o. 4 Ordinary, That as they have not mentioned the price of it we suppose if it be equal to a higher Number they will put it to it, That if it equal only to a N^o. 4 Ordinary and is cheaper in it's price we can have no objection, but if it be not equal to that Number and Invoiced higher, the abatement in the Price will not be proportionable to the quality.

Letters read from Fort St. David about the George's arrival, The French stopping the advances to their merchants, providing Salampores Blue cloth & Romalls, The sloop Carolina, The 16 Regulation respecting the Military. The accounts of Stacey's Effects, Messrs. Munro & Josph. Fowke, Cloth & Fanams sent hither on the George & a Bale left there by Capt. Raymond.

General letters read viz^t.

N^o. 21, 22, 23 all from the Deputy Gov^r. and Council of Fort St. David; The first dated the 20th. ultimo advising the George's arrival there, promising to make the best use of the French stopping their advances to their merchants, to endeavour to provide Salampores for the Company, to observe our directions concerning the Blue cloth and Romalls and to take the best care of the Carolina, adding their reason for not complying with the 16th. Regulation received from England respecting the Military, explaining a mistake in the account of Borlace Stacey's Effects, and advising M^r. Munro and M^r. Joseph Fowke's setting out for this place, the second dated the 22^d. ultimo covering Invoice and Bill of Lading for cloth and fanams sent us on the George, & also a Bill of Lading for a Bale left ashore there by Captain Raymond, The other of the same date covering duplicate of the last.

Bengal. The Scarbröugh & Kent arrive there. Bales coming hither on the Princess Augusta & sloops remanded back. Letter from England to Scarbröugh & Kent read.

N^o. 24 from the President and Council of Fort William dated the 21st. January advising the arrival there of the Scarborough and Kent upon which they had order'd back the Bales they were sending hither by the Princess Augusta and two Sloops, Inclosing the General letter from England by those ships for this Presidency dated the 24th. April 1741, which is now read with the List of Investment & copies of the Manifests and other papers by those ships.

Bales ord^d. ashoar again from the Adml. Vernon.

There being now no prospect of Dispatching the Admiral Vernon to England till September next and the southerly Monsoon approaching, it's agreed to order the Bales on board her ashore again.

Tellesinga Chitty & Nellamutta Comrapa Chitty repay into cash two thousand nine hundred Allumparra Pagodas being so much of that species w^{ch}. remain'd in their & the Brokers hands when they were cried down in the Country and will not therefore now pass without being recoined; ORDERED that they be deposited for the present in the cash chest and that two thousand nine hundred Star Pagodas be paid them in their stead.

Captain Taylor arriving from Fort S^t. The Company's Merchants having brought in but little cloth lately, were this day sent for and examined concerning the same, and were particularly told that as they now sent our new Money up into the country instead of the Allumparra Money, we hoped it would have had an effect, to enable them to bring in cloth not only cheaper, but also in greater Quantities. To which they replied that so long as the Nabob received the Rents of the country in the old Money, it served to keep up the Credit of that considerably above it's intrinsick value, though at the same time they confessed the paying that Money might be one reason last year why the cotton & cotton yarn brought from the distant provinces was dearer and why such small quantities of both were brought to Market and though they did now pay our New Money, the Nabob also receives his Rents in the same specie and though the paying the same also for the cotton and cotton yarn may be one reason why those articles should be cheaper, yet it is certain and well known that neither are so, and that very little of either is brought to Market, the reason of which, as they are told, is That large Plantations of the Cotton shrub were destroyed by the March of the Morattas through the country, and for those Plantations which had escaped the crop this last season is but indifferent besides there has been a very large demand for it to the Northward where it sells from Eighty five to ninety Rupees the Candy. Upon the whole they said That though they now pay the Weavers the new Money for the cloth, they did not observe it was anything better and yet was consequently dearer than last year by the difference of the money, That nevertheless the Weavers got so little by it that many of them chose rather to work in Tillage, That we knew best whether the Company could afford to raise the prices, but for themselves they should not advise it while there is so great a scarcity of cotton and cotton yarn, as they did not think it would have any great Effect in increasing the Quantity of Cloth and it had not fallen within their experience that when the Price of cloth was raised it had ever fallen again, how great a difference soever there has been in the price of cotton.

To this the Board replied That we could not think of raising the Prices, because the Company got little or nothing at the Prices we now give and so much the less, as much the greater part of the cloth which they (the Merchants) brought in would sort only to N^o. 3 & 4, very little to N^o. 2 & hardly any to N^o. 1, for which reason We had it often in our thoughts to reject the N^o. 4 entirely and to limit the Proportion of the N^o. 3, to which the Merchants replied that they were very sensible of the badness of the Manufacture & that the Major part of the cloth was no better than N^o. 3 & N^o. 4, which however was not their fault, but owing to other Nations taking the same sorts & if We did not do so too, we must go without any.

The Board's reply.

The Board having considered all that the Merchants had said, thought they could only recommend to them to increase the Quantity of Cloth as much as they could, & if it were possible also to get it better and Cheaper, and having promised their Endeavours for that purpose they withdrew.

The Merchants promise.

It being thought proper in Consultaon the 22^d. December last that the two Company's shroffs Tonduah Chitty and Comrapa should give security to the amount of Five thousand 5000 Pagodas for their due and faithfull performance of the Trust reposed in them, and Linga Chitty having offer'd to be bound with them in that sum, a Bond is now signed and executed, the copy of which is entered hereafter, and the Original lodged in the cash chest.

Since then another assay has been made which M^r. Foss Westcott Under Warehousekeeper was directed to attend of Fifteen slabs taken as they arose from the Pile. These lost by melting 8. 117249, and one slab imported anno 1740, lost by the like Tryal 2. 310231 $\frac{2}{3}$ cent.

Many of the said slabs are cover'd so artfully as very much deceives the sight, that we judge it impossible to know how base it is, but by Melting the whole. We are

Then the President acquainted the Board that together with the Tygris came in another ship without colours which prov'd to be the Jerusalem belonging to Chandanagore, and that the Noquedah or Captain of the said ship named Melcomb de Jacob came on shore with Captain Petre, and acquainted him (the President) that Captain Petre in the Tygris coming up with him in the Latitude of 9ⁿ. North, had thought fit to take possession of the said ship Jerusalem declaring she was a good Prize, and had taken twenty eight chests of Money out of her, and carried the same on board the Tygris, but as he, the said Coja Melcomb did not comprehend the reason of the said Captain Petre's proceeding therefore desired the same might be inquired into, and that his ship with her cargo & the treasure taken out of her might be again restored to him.

Proceedings
on the affair
of the

Upon which Captain Petre being sent for and Coja Melcomb also attending, Captain Petre's reasons were demanded for his seizing the said ship Jerusalem, taking out the treasure, and bringing that together with the ship here, upon which Captain Petre gave us the following account.

That he the said Captain Petre being Commander of the ship Tygris in the service of the East India Company and bound for Anjengo, but falling to the Eastward of Ceilone, and finding the Westerly Monsoon set in strong, he was making the best of his way for this Port, that in his passage hither, early in the morn^g. the 29th. April last he descried a sail to the Westward, and as he had not then made any Land, he was very eager to speak with her, which he effected about 4 o'clock in the afternoon the same day. That he fired a Gun to Leeward, and hoisted his Colours, she in return hoisted her's and brought to, (Her colours were White with a Red cross in the Middle), that he sent his Boat on board which brought the Captain, whose name in the French pass was Melcomb an Armenian and the Chief Mate whose name was Ignatius Redden an Irishman. The ship was called the Jerusalem and came from Manilha one of the Phillipine Islands belonging to the King of Spain, and was bound, as they said, first for Pondicherry, then for Madrass, and afterwards for Bengall. Her cargo consisting of sugar, cowries, Gold and silver, all taken in at the said port of Manilha to be deliver'd as they said (no Manifest appearing) at the abovemention'd Ports; That he perused the Pass which was French, and found that the Chief Mate mentioned in it was a Frenchman, his name Ducasse, though the said Ignatius Redden declared he was chief Mate & received pay as such.

These reasons and her colours & pass not agreeing together with the various and contradictory Reports touching who were the real Owners of her and also coming from a Spanish Port, and for that reason believing 'twas very probable whoever the ship belonged to she might have some Spanish Effects on board, and having a Letter of Marque which empower'd him to seize the ships, Goods & effects belonging to any of the subjects of the King of Spain, it was the opinion of himself and his officers that they might and ought to bring her to Madrass, that the real property of the ship and what she had on board her might be enquired into, and for that purpose they sent M^r. Forster their third Mate on board together with some of their people to make her keep company with them, and to assist in bringing her safe here, which was accordingly done and believing also that the Treasure would be more safe on board the Tygris they agreed and did accordingly take it out of the Jerusalem; but three Armenians came on board with it whom they accommodated on board the Tygris in the best manner they could.

Captain Petre, having given this account of his proceeding, was told by us that we were so well acquainted who were the owners of the Jerusalem that We could venture to assure him no Spaniard had any share of her, and it was so unlikely that any Spanish Effects were on board her, that he would do well to send the Treasure on board her again, that he had taken out of her and deliver that with the ship and cargo up to the Noquedah as soon as possible; To which Cap^t. Petre replied that as we took upon us to know who were the Owners, He would immediately sign an Order to the Mate on board her to deliver the ship and the cargo to the Noquedah, but for the treasure which was on board the Tygris, he said he had some reason to suspect, or at least hoped, that it might appear some part of it was Spanish Effects. Upon which it being proposed that it should be landed and lodged in the Company's warehouse till a reasonable time was elapsed for Captain Petre to make what enquiry he thought proper, and Coja Melcomb consenting to the same, Captain Petre did now before the Board sign an Order to his Mate to deliver the said ship Jerusalem and cargo to Coja Melcomb and another order for sending on shore the treasure.

Captain Petre having acquainted us that there are twelve soldiers on board the Tygris It's agreed to order them on shore tomorrow.

As we have no hopes of having a sufficient number of Bales to load home the Tygris as well as the Admiral Vernon in September, It's Agreed to send the Tygris to the Bay, but upon considering what our Honourable Masters write Us in the 7th. paragraph of their Letter dated the 29th. July last, and that by a Clause in her Charterparty she cannot be Dispatched directly to England from the Bay before the 1st. December next, considering also that she is a good sailor & therefore we believe may very easily make her passage up hither in August as well as our Country ships, and being but of a small burthen there is reason to hope she may get safe down the river, AGREED to propose to the Gentlemen in the Bay to return her to us in August with so much of her Europe cargo on board as to leave room only for two hundred 200 bales to be taken in here.

Reasons for it & proposal to the Gentlemen in Bengal concerning her.

Coja Melcomb the Noquedah of the Jerusalem attending delivers the Board a Petition as enter'd hereafter containing a sort of protest against Captain John Petre Commander of the Tygris, which being read, the said Coja Melcomb was told that there was no proper Court to judge of the matter here, but that if he really thought himself aggriev'd and could justly make out any damage he must either by himself or his Attorney make his application to the proper Courts in England. He said that was a great way off, but being told we could do no more here he withdrew.

Noquedah of the Jerusalem's protest against Capt. Petre of the Tygris.

Then the Board being informed that the Heads of the Right and Left Hand Casts were attending they were called in, and acquainted the Board That as we had refused the offer they made the 18th. January last to excuse the late Shroff Vishvinada from being sent to the West Coast and apprehending that we intended to send him thither on the Princess Augusta which was shortly to sail thither, they were come again to interceed in his behalf, and urged that the sending him to the West Coast would be sending him to certain Death, and though they had no reason to have any consideration for him, yet a Compassion for his Family which was very numerous had prevail'd with them to sollicite us again, and having before they came consider'd of what proposals to make to us they took leave to represent to us That the streets in the Black Town were in so bad a condition that it was become a great nuisance to the Inhabitants in general, and to put them in proper order would cost a great deal of Money, and to Levy it by any Tax upon the Inhabitants might Create great uneasiness, and therefore they had agreed upon condition that what we had seized of the Shroffs should be deliver'd up to them, and the said Shroff excused from going to the West Coast, to offer us three thousand five hundred 3500 Pagodas and proposed withal that the said sum should be applied towards putting the streets of the Black Town in proper order, repairing the Bridges, and such other necessary Publick Works as the Board should think fit.

The Casts offer a Fine of 3500 Pag^{as}. to excuse the late shroff Vishvinada from going to the West Coast to be applied towards cleaning the streets, which is accepted.

The Casts being withdrawn the Board took into consideration their proposal, and having found upon Enquiry that his House was Mortgaged and what things were found in it were of little or no value, That the sum of Five hundred sixty six Pagodas paid in Consultation the 18th. January last was only a deposite belonging to another Branch of the Family, and only promised to be relinquish'd in case it might be of Service towards getting the Shroff excused, so that if we should send him to the West Coast, We ought in Equity to return that.

Then upon considering what the Casts proposed relating to the application of the Money, It was observed that the sum of Two thousand five hundred Pagodas which the Bazar Shroffs had been Fined, and Five hundred and forty two Pagodas thirty five fanams and ten cash, the produce of Gold which had been confiscated Belonging to the Shroff Rangum had been applied towards making good the Loss the

Company had sustain'd by the bad Money, also that more than ample amends would be made the Company by the Duty arising from the coinage of the new Money and that no satisfaction had yet been made the Inhabitants for what they had suffered, but considering that the sum now offer'd is as we compute far short of what they lost by the bad Money though it may be difficult to get at any particular account of what each Person suffered to be depended upon so far as to make a just & equal dividend among them, considering also that since the Moors have been in Town, the streets are become exceeding Dirty and Filthy, and that the Bridges are much worn and out of Repair by the Number of Hackaries and other carriages which are continually passing over them, That the Scavenger's Duty & the surplus of the Town Duty is not sufficient to keep them in proper order, much less to be at any Extraordinary Expence, and as We can think of no other means to give the sufferers any satisfaction, and we flatter ourselves they will be so contented with this as to prevent any reflection upon the Company or us, It is agreed to comply with the proposal of the Casts who being called in, were acquainted therewith, and having promised to pay the Money in two Months they withdrew.

MELCHIOR D'S^t. YAGO ARMENIAN NATIVE, CAPTAIN AND SUPRA CARGO OF SHIP JERUSALEM AND LOADED AT HUGHLY BOUND TO MANILHA IN MARCH 1741, LEFT THAT PORT THE 4th. DAY OF THE SAID MONTH, IMPOWER'D TO CARRY THE ARMENIAN COLOURS BY A COMMISSION AND PASSPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF CHALNAGOR

HUMBLY SHEWETH

THAT whereas on his return from Manilha he was met by a ship belonging to the British Company called the Tygris commanded by Cap^t. John Petre in the Latitude of Nine Degrees Northward of the Line, the said Captain Petre sent a boat to know of what place we was, and where going, and from whence we came, which questions we answer'd, viz^t.

THAT the Commander of our ship was an Armenian and Armenian ship and loaded at Hughly in the Ganges, and came from thence under Armenian colours by Grant and consent of the Council of Chalnagor and going to Pondicherry a French Settlement in order to dispose of our Treasure and cargo, AND WHEREAS Cap^t. Petre without any regard for such Declaration or to the Commission aforesaid, and without any other reason but Superiority of Force, did with an Ill intent, arrest the said ship Jerusalem the 29th. of April last and forcibly took from thence all the Treasure then on board the said ship, being the produce of her outward cargo, and what Freight she brought for Madrass, belonging to the Armenian Passengers upon her, and has also possessed himself of the said ship's Passport & Books of Accounts and has Conveyed the said ship to this Port of Madrass where he arrived the 5th. of May 1742.

WHEREFORE the said Commander of the said ship Jerusalem doth Protest against the said Captain Petre, and doth Humbly request of this Hoñoble Board that the said Captain Petre be order'd to pay all Losses and Damages sustain'd by the said arrest, For by his most diligent search nothing has been discover'd to falsify what was at first declared by the said Commander to the said Captain Petre, which is manifest by the release of the Effects of the said ship and by approbation of this Honourable Board.

MOREOVER the said Commander of the said ship Jerusalem Protests in his own name & in the names of his owners against the said Cap^t. Petre and humbly requests that he be made liable to answer the difference that may arise on the sale of her cargo of sugar, the market price of which was in Pondicherry at Twenty Pagodas the candy, when the said ship arrived here, & further that the said Captain Petre be liable to pay one and a half P cent difference between the Customs paid at Madrass and Pondicherry on the whole cargo, and that he be order'd to pay unto the owners of the said ship Jerusalem, Ten thousand Pagodas for Damage and Interest sustain'd by being retain'd and hindred from fulfilling their owners orders, and that the said Captain Petre may be answerable to the owners of the said ship Jerusalem for all the cargo from hence to Hughly and that the Dangers of the seas do run on his account thither in consideration of being wrongfully retain'd till the proper season is lost, whereby the said ship may in all likelyhood fail of Entering the Ganges, & be exposed to greater Risques. Macao Captain to be confined in the Fort till the matter could be enquired into this Morning, but it being now too late to proceed upon such enquiry, It's proposed & agreed to meet again at Five in the afternoon.

Captain was asked what he had to say for himself, who replied That he had no intention in what he had done to offer any Insult or Cast any reflection on the Justice or Government of the Place, but that being informed the Persons he had employed to look about the Country for the Mate had secured him and were bringing him to S^t. Thomé, He went thither to receive him from them, That it having been repeatedly affirm'd to him (the Captain) by many of the People belonging to the ship that the said Mate (Theodosio Martins) had lost the ship on purpose in combination with other Persons on board, and at the Instigation of some of his (the Captain's) Enemies at Macao, in resentment of the Injuries he had suffered thereby (having lost his all) and of the Trouble & charge he had been at, about the said Mate, upon his meeting him near S^t. Thomé on the shore between one part of the town and the sea, he had order'd his Coffrees to cut the Mates Ears, nor did he design any thing more by ordering him to be whipped than to make him confess upon what Inducement or at whose Instigation he run the ship ashore.

The Captain having finished what he had to say, was remanded back to his Lodgings in the Fort and then the Board adjourned.

Francisco Peixoto were now delivered in and sworn to before the Board, & Translates of the same being read as entered hereafter, and the Witnesses and others withdrawn, The Board took into consideration how to proceed in this affair and there being a doubt whether the Mate's Ears were cut at S^t. Thomé, and there is no proof that they were not (The Coffrees who executed the Captain's orders being fled, or not to be found), It was made a question Whether, notwithstanding the Charter gives us power to try all Crimes and Offences committed within our Town, or within Ten Miles of the same, yet if this fact was perpetrated in the Territories & under the Jurisdiction of another Prince, & the Offender as well as the Offended being subjects of the King of Portugal, it was not Ground for an objection to our authority & might be the occasion of some complaint in Europe, another doubt was whether if the Fact had been committed or was cognizable here it was properly Maihem, If it was? We recollect no Trial upon the Statute of the 22^d. & 23^d. of Charles the Second, except that of Coke and Woodburne, which was a very particular and extraordinary case. Besides that some of our Law Books say That cutting off the Ear is no Maihem, *quia latens*, and for that offence an Indictment may lye at the Sessions, but besides what has been said before if we should keep the Captain here to try him for the assault & in consequence thereof the Court should think fit to Fine him, 'tis uncertain how long he would remain in Prison before he would be able to pay it, having been supported by Charity ever since his being here. It was agreed upon the whole to transmit the affidavits with a state of the case to the Governour of Macao and that the President be desired to procure the said Captain a Passage on the Sancta Catharina that is shortly bound thither and to detain him in Custody till he goes off.

Mate declared that he having relied on some Persons at Ginge, who promised to help him with means to get away from this coast, The Deponent resolved thereupon to come to S^t. Thome & brought in his Company another Man named Estevaõ and being come at a village on the other side of S^t. Thomé called Trivanboore, The said Estevaõ left him and went to an arrack shop, and that he the said Mate remained there waiting for him. In the meanwhile arrived one named Paulo, together with whom he proceeded a little distance on their way towards a choultry in order to shelter themselves from the Rain. There were some Malabars together with one that had a Military coat & Granad^r. cap on. Then was taken into consideration what to write the Gentlemen in the Bay about the number of Bales we can depend upon here by January and it was computed that after the Dispatch of the Admiral Vernon and Tygris we may reckon upon Eighteen hundred or two thousand Bales, of which the Benjamin, if she comes here to fill up, will take about Eight hundred, there will then remain about a thousand or twelve hundred Bales for the ships that come hither to fill up in December; In this Computation we think we ought not to make any reserve for the Defence, as we apprehend the troubles in Bengall may lay the Gentlemen there under a Difficulty to send home all their Tonnage, and should the Defence come here, her Demorage on lying here will be less than on any ship that may stay behind in the Bay, as she can be sooner dispatched hence for Europe.

It is a great concern to me to observe by an Extract of the 53 Paragraph of the General Letter from England dated the 20th. January last, that the Honible Company should have the least shadow of reason to suspect that I have been any way negligent in my duty towards them, for I do assure your Honour & c^t. that I have at all times used my utmost care and deligence as much as in me lay to keep the Minters to their Weight and Standard in all the Moneys that have been coin'd since my time, and that I never discover'd any attempt to adulterate the coin but in the affair of Rangum, with which I took care to acquaint this Honourable Board.

The method of coinage in the Tower of London differs much from what is used here, It being impossible to adulterate the Gold and silver there after the Assaymaster has tried them being cast into Barrs before the assays are taken. Those Bars afterwards run through Flatting Mills, The Money cut out with an Engine, Mill'd and Stamp, But no more Melted. The constant method here has been First to-melt the Gold or Silver and break it into small Grains or Powder, The Muster is then taken by the Assaymaster, after which (if of the proper Standard) the Grains or Powder is distributed among a great number of cooleys into several Workhouses or Godowns, who weigh every Rupee and Pagoda separate, and afterwards deliver them to other cooleys to Melt; Different Persons receive them to Flatt and others to Stamp; By which method of Working yo^r. Honour & c^t. must be very sensible that if it was not for some confidence which must be put in the undertakers, and the fear of punishment in such as should be detected, My utmost care & vigilence could not prevent some adulterations. The only check upon them & what I frequently make use of after the first Tryal, is to take Musters of their Moneys in their presence to assay, after it is finished, to let them see I have a watchfull Eye over them.

It being then taken into consideration whether we should send any Money to the Bay on the Shaftesbury or not, it was resolved in the Negative, not only for that it is so late in the Season as to render her gaining her Passage precarious & encrease the risque, but that our cash is but low and it may be difficult in the unsettled State of the Country to raise a sufficiency of Money for our own occasions, & besides that We have no prospect of any large Sums being paid in for Bills.

Some disorderly soldiers sent thither on her.

Some of the Military having been guilty of such disorders and Irregularities as make it proper to change their Quarters, it's Agreed to send them on the Shaftesbury to the Bay where they may perhaps behave better.

Sale of part of the Shaftesbury's Madera Wine ordered.

AGREED to sell a part of the Honble Company's Madera Wine at Outcry on Wednesday the 13th. Instant and that the Warehousekeeper affix notice thereof at the Sea Gate.

The freight on the Tygris's Woolen goods to Persia agreed for with the owners of the Augusta.

The ship Augusta now lying in the Road being bound to Bouchier and Bussorah, It was judged a good opportunity to send the Woollen Goods received by the Tygris on her to Gombroon as the President & Council at Bombay had in their Letter of the 26th. June acquainted us with the difficulties they might lye under of forwarding them from thence & recommending it to us if a conveyance offer'd for Persia: Accordingly the Owners of that ship were asked on what Terms they would carry them to which they reply'd that the usual Freight from Bengall and this place was twelve Arcot Rupees for every Bengall Maund, and that the Armenian Freighters were to pay the same: This we knew to be true, and had therefore directed the Warehousekeeper to Weigh three or four Bales of each sort of cloth, a cal[c]ulate of which he now delivers to the Board as enter'd hereafter, and it appears thereby that

This being a large sum, It was esteemed too high a rate to Freight them on, especially as 207 Ba^s. were Long Ells and low priced cloth. After sometime spent in talking with them it was at length agreed at seven ₹ c^t. on the Invoice valuation, which is a very considerable deduction from the customary Freight and thought to be very reasonable.

They are ord^d. on board & the freight to be paid.

ORDERED that the Warehousekeeper do lade on board the Augusta for Gombroon the 419 Bales of cloth received by the Tygris, and that he do pay the owners of that ship the Freight according to the foremention'd Terms.

Advice of the Murder of Nabob Subderally Cawn in Velloor Fort.

The President acquaints the Board that he was waked at two O'Clock yesterday morning by an Express from the Havildar of Pullamalee advising that the Nabob had been Murder'd in Velloor Fort by the Killedar Moortas Ally Cawn who had also imprison'd Meer Assad & Boocunjee Coshedos, the first his Chief Minister, the other his Shroff, and as it might be apprehended such an event would be followed by great commotions in the Country, and that the Troops might disperse themselves about the Province and plunder it: As soon as it was day light he (the President) had given orders to double the Guards and all our People to be upon Duty and particularly that no Moors Horse should enter the Town or pass the Mettals without particular leave. These orders alarmed the Nabob's Family who sent several messages to enquire the reason of them and if any Advices were come in from the Country, but nobody cared to tell them the News till about twelve at noon, when they were advised of it by Letters from the Duan of Velloor, about the same time Kissnajee Puntaloo received a Letter from Mahomud Cawn Jalouze a Commander of Two thousand Horse at Arcot, who only wrote that the Nabob had been killed by Moortas Ally Cawn. This last

The Board having again taken into consideration M^r. Croke's report deliver'd in Council at Fort S^t. David, wherein M^r. Burton is charged with altering the Warehouse Journal & Journal Parcels after they had been passed and read in Council & charging the Cloth at 45 & 48. 12 q corge that had been brought in by the Merchants in M^r. Hubbard's time at 39 $\frac{1}{2}$ & 42 $\frac{1}{2}$ q corge, and having again perused & consider'd the several Papers relating thereto, think fit to enter altogether here a summary of their proceedings & Remarks in this affair for so far as they have been carried on to this time.

A summary of the affair of M^r. Burton & the Boards remarks & proceedings thereon to the 18th. Octor.,

After the receipt of the General Letter from Fort S^t. David of the 20th. September & M^r. Croke's report that accompanied the same, the President acquainted the Board that this matter had been communicated to him by M^r. Croke in a Letter dated the 16th. July last, who at the same time expressed great regret and reluctance at being obliged to inform against a Gentleman in so high a Station there, & one with whom he had lived in long Intimacy & Friendship, but the Company's Interest, his own Credit & the Welfare of his Family being at stake, he thought he could not avoid acquainting him (the President) with it, for, if it should be discover'd by any other means, he fear'd it would be looked upon as a Criminal Concealment in him, and indeed he had just reason for his Fears both as Warehousekeeper & Accountant, for, when their General Books should be sent up, the Cloth upon inspection would appear there to be charged at higher prices than they wrote us was the cost in their Letters last year. The President added That he had then two reasons for not taking Publick notice of it. One was that as M^r. Burton had both in his Publick and Private Letters expressed the greatest Zeal for, and attachment to the Interest of the Company He (the President) was willing to hope M^r. Croke might somehow be mistaken, at least he was desirous to get some further light into it: For he considered if it was a mistake and M^r. Burton should prove himself innocent, it would have been misfortune enough to have been accused, for however he might be acquitted by Us, yet as the proceedings must go to England perhaps some there might have imagined there had been partiality in the Examination. On the other side if M^r. Burton was

really guilty, he considered the Station he was in might give him an opportunity to quash several of the Proofs if any publick notice was taken of it, before We had got into our hands the proper & necessary Papers.

It was with a view to examine into the Truth of Mr. Croke's Charge that the several Accounts mentioned in our Letter of the 6th. August were wrote for, and that no fictitious Accounts might be sent us, but only such as were produced and examined before the Council at Fort S^t. David, it was particularly directed that they should be signed by the Warehousek^r. and the Merchants.

But the Accounts that were most wanted as most likely to discover whether the Company had been over charged were omitted to be sent, namely the Accounts of the cost of the cloth which the Merchants delivered with the cloth when they brought it in.

Instead thereof we received only the Merch^{ts}. Account Current extracted from the General Books from the 1st. May to the last of December 1741, and from the 1st. January to the 31st. July last, mentioned in their Letter of the 14th. Aug^t. signed indeed by the Warehousekeeper & the Merchants as copied hereafter under N^o. 1 & 2, but the same day Mr. Croke advised the President that though he was both Warehousek^r. and Accountant, he had no directions about drawing them out, but found them lying upon the Table ready for signing when he came to the Board, and though he beleived those We wanted were the Accounts of the cloths as given in by the Merchants when brought in and deliver'd to the Washers, yet he thought fit to sign those Accounts which were produced by Mr. Burton to avoid coming to an open Breach with him before it was necessary. As for the Merchants signing those Accounts, Mr. Croke the 25th. of last month sent the President an Attestation signed by Thomas Duff, and Sharub Rauze, That Nella Tomby, Irshapa Chitty & Shacup Tomby acknowledged to Mr. Croke that their reason for signing the first Accounts sent us was a dependance upon Gruarauze, one of the Wareh^o. Conicoplys, who had assured them the Accounts were the same in the main as their own, only differed in transporting the cloths to different Months as occasion offered, but as Mr. Burton was Governour and in Authority they were willing to oblige him in that respect, not knowing of the Alterations mention'd in Mr. Croke's report &c^t. as mentioned in the said Attestation, which is now produced & read at the Board N^o. 3.

Further as to the two Accounts Current sent us in the Letter of the 14th. August between the Company and the Merchants, supposed to be extracted from the General Books it was remarked when they arrived that they were wrote by Mr. Sloper the Deputy Governour's Private Secretary, as it was also, that though the Prices at so much £ charge were particularly mentioned in the acc^t. from the 1st. January to the 31st. July last N^o. 2, In the account from the 1st. May to the 31st. December 1741, N^o. 1, the particulars of the prices are entirely omitted, and only the cost of the whole carried out; This might have been accidental and passed without observation, if there had not otherwise been reason to suspect there was some design in it. The Deputy Governour, if he knew himself guilty of what he has been since publickly charged with, was doubtless upon his guard, but, as he was not then certain that any information had been sent hither against him, perhaps he flatter'd himself that we only sent for those Accounts to see the State of the Merchants Debts, & if only for that purpose, the omission of incerting the particular Prices might not have been taken notice of, but he doubtless remembered what he wrote us the 19th. September and 4th. October last year relating to the Prices at which the Merchants had brought in the cloth from the Month of April to the Month of August, and, if he thought we should have remembered it too, He could not but suppose we should immediately take Notice of it's being charged at 48'12, in the Account, when in the prementioned Letter of the 19th. September he had wrote us it cost but 42 $\frac{1}{2}$ and that such Notice would in consequence have drawn on the present Enquiry.

The 23^d. August last, though we had sufficiently Explained ourselves before, we wrote again to Fort S^t. David for the Copies of the Monthly Accounts which the Merchants delivered the Warehousekeeper when they brought in the cloth and when the same was measured and delivered to the Wash, but unwilling still to understand

us they sent us only two different Accounts of the Quantity of cloth brought in by the Merchants, one signed by M^r. Croke, the other by the Merch^{ts}. For these last either influenced by the Deputy Governour, or depending upon Gruarauze's Account who said it Agreed in the Main with the Warehousekeeper's and only differed in transporting it to different Months, they, the Merchants, did then declare that they knew nothing of M^r. Croke's Account, but as neither of the Two Accounts had any prices fixed to them they were of no use to us for the purpose of our Enquiry and therefore that they might not pretend to mistake us any longer, We sent them the 8th. September an Account which M^r. Burton deliver'd the President when he came from Fort S^t. David in the year 1739, Copy of which is entered hereafter N^o. 4, and which was given M^r. Burton by the late Deputy Governour M^r. Hubbard, as a specimen of the method in which they kept their Accounts there; we added indeed in our Letter of the 8th. September that it was of consequence to have the difference explained between M^r. Croke's and the Merchants Accounts, and that produced the report delivered by M^r. Croke at Fort S^t. David the 18th. September. The sum of the Charge exhibited therein is particularly set forth in our Letter of the 30th. Ultimo and we are now to examine what M^r. Burton says in Answer thereto.

M^r. Burton in the General Letter of the 20th. Sept^r. tells us That understanding by the Paper inclosed to them what Accounts they were that we wanted, the same had been kept up by him, without any material difference that he knew of, in the same manner as they were in M^r. Hubbards time: That they sent us the Book containing those Accounts from the first beginning of the Investment being carried on by Brokerage "and a copy of that which has been kept since the Arrival of the "Present Deputy Governour".

M^r. Croke in his Letter to us dated the 19th. Sept^r. tells us that upon reading his Report in Consultation the 18th. September, M^r. Burton denied that any Alteration had been made in the Books, and insisted that the Quantities & Prices therein entered, were the same and agreed with the Entries in the Book kept in M^r. Hubbard's time, and in which M^r. Burton had continued to keep his account since M^r. Hubbard's decease. M^r. Croke desiring to see that Book to compare with the Warehouse Journal, and the Alterations or Scratches in the last being visible and M^r. Sloper the Deputy Governour's Writer being examined concerning the same, confessed before the Board that he had made the Alteration. That one Account might tally with the other, M^r. Croke tells us that the Leaf which contain'd the Account of the Cloth brought in by the Merchants in the Months of May, June and July was taken out of M^r. Hubbard's Book, and another Account entered in it's stead conformable to the Alterations in the Warehouse Journal, and indeed when the Book came up it appeared to us upon inspection that the account of the cloth brought in, in the months of May, June and July had been fresh wrote and at one and the same time; Neither does it tally with the Contra Folio, which seems to be the Debtor side of the Merchants Account Current, & uppon further Inspection there is reason to believe four Leaves have been torn out; The Copy thereof is hereafter N^o. 5.

If it be true that M^r. Burton denied before the Council at Fort S^t. David that there had been any alteration in the Warehouse Books he has thought fit to own those Alterations since, and as he has owned them there cannot be a stronger circumstance of his having taken out of M^r. Hubbard's Book the Entries of the Cloth brought in, in his time. M^r. Burton had no doubt resolved at first to deny any alteration in the Warehouse Books, and in order to prove that there had been no alteration in those, he took out the Entries in M^r. Hubbard's Book and directed other Entries to be transcribed in the same book conformable to the Alterations in the Warehouse Journal, and produced that Book to support his assertion that the Quantities and prices entered in the Warehouse Journal agreed with the Entries in the Book kept in M^r. Hubbard's time. It has been mentioned in the preceeding paragraph what passed upon that occasion before the Council at Fort S^t. David; But M^r. Burton not fully resolved then what sort of Defence to make only tells us in the General Letter of the 20th. September That as He found in M^r. Croke's Charge several Articles incerted which could not either be proved or disproved by Words only, He proposed

that a Committee should be appointed to examine into the matter, this was doubtless to gain more time to consider of his Defence, but perhaps intending then to insist upon his assertion that there had been no Alteration in the Warehouse Books, He sent us up M^r. Hubbard's Book, and in truth after it had been inspected by the Council at Fort S^t. David it would have been to no purpose to have altered it again to what it was before. Besides as there had been some motion that Ensign Morgan (who had wrote) should be examined concerning the alteration, M^r. Burton might think it best to send the Book out of the way to prevent it.

M^r. Burton, as has been said, has thought fit since to own the alterations in the Warehouse Books and as he phrases it, consented to the Dashing out the corge 72.17 out of the corge 107.11, out of the Month of June's account, which made remaining but corge 34.14, he gives a reason for it indeed, which whether true or false is not material to the Fact we are upon: That which is the proper remark here is, That the Original Entry in the Warehouse Journal was corge 107.11, and there can be no doubt but that it was taken from, and stood the same in M^r. Hubbard's Book, and as M^r. Burton thought fit afterwards to alter the Warehouse Journal, he also altered M^r. Hubbard's Book conformable thereto for the reason before mentioned; what has been said of the Alteration in this one Article proves equally the alteration in the others. We are next to consider the reason he gives for such alteration or dashing out in the Warehouse Journal.

M^r. Burton says in answer to the first Article of his Charge That the reason for altering the Entry of corge 107.11 of Chemanaickpollam Cloth, to corge 34.14 was That corge 72.17 were no better than Ordinary and for that reason the Entry of it was deferred till December and then brought to Acco^t. with some other Parcels, and denies that he charged it at more than the first cost, namely, forty one 41 Pagodas ₹ corge, & for proof thereof refers to the Account particulars sent us the 20th. September. That account is hereafter N^o. 6, and because We shall presently have more occasions than one to speak of it, we must premise that this account is a COPY OF THAT WHICH M^r. BURTON SAYS HAD BEEN KEPT BY HIM SINCE HIS ARRIVAL IN THE SAME MANNER AS IT WAS KEPT BY M^r. HUBBARD, WITHOUT ANY MATERIAL DIFFERENCE THAT HE KNEW OF: M^r. Burton ought not to have said this, because the contrary appears evidently by comparing this Account with that kept in M^r. Hubbard's time N^o. 5: add besides, that M^r. Burton declared to the Council at Fort S^t. David That he kept his Account in the same Book that M^r. Hubbard did, but upon looking over that Book, We find no traces of this Account in it, and there is too much reason to beleive That it is fictitious, and drawn out after the receipt of our Letter of the 8th. September. It is what M^r. Croke writes was never shewn or produced to the Council & though the mention of it in their Letter of the 20th. Septem^r. slipt their Observation, yet if it had been produced to them it was hardly possible but that they must have taken notice of the high prices the cloths were charged at in the Months of September and October, far exceeding what they told us the cloth cost in their Letters in those months, Prices which seem to be fixed to the Cloth with a sole view to make good his plea That by the alteration he had made in the Books it was only charged at the Medium price as the Whole cost which was brought in from the Month of August to the last of December.

In this Account to which M^r. Burton refers, We find indeed the corge 72.17 is charged at no more than 41 Pag^a. ₹ corge, but then to make up the sum at which he has charged it in the Books, he has exceedingly overrated the corge 41.9, which makes up the corge 114.6, in which the corge 72.17 is included.

M^r. Burton gives the same reason for altering the Price of the 110 corge Chema-naickpollam cloth brought in, in the month of August, from $42\frac{1}{2}$ Pag^a. to 48.12., That is, He says It was the Medium Price of all that was brought in from August to December, and therefore he refers again to the Account sent us the 20th. September for proof that it was not really charged to y^e. Company at more than $42\frac{1}{2}$ where indeed this 110 corge is charged at that price, but then as has been remarked before he has

greatly overrated the cloth brought in, in the subsequent months, Prices which he could not but know far exceeded what he wrote us last year was the cost of it in those months, and therefore it is the more surprizing that he should have recourse to that sort of defence. Doubtless he saw the weakness of it after the receipt of what we wrote him the 30th. September, namely, That Mr. Croke's Charge was supported by the Letters received from them last year, and though it was certainly necessary for him to reply to that, & assign a reason for the difference of the Prices, he chose to be altogether silent, for he knew we had the Account already before us and therefore it was too late to retract that Plea, & perhaps when he sent it, he had either forgot himself or hoped that We had, what he wrote us last year.

Mr. Burton need not have been so shy of owning the Alteration in the Price of the corge 105.3 of the Chemanaickp^m. cloth from 42½ to 48.12; Without it was charged at the last price the Books would not agree with the fictitious Account he sent us in the Letter of the 20th. September: For Example the Quantity of Chemanaickpollam cloth brought in by that account is corge 406.14, and Charged with Brokerage and Godown Rent at . . . Pag^s. 20110. 11. 9.

Tis pretty difficult to understand what it is Mr. Burton means in what he says relating to the Cor. 26 of Ordinary Cloth charged by Mr. Croke to have been brought in, in August at 39½ and charged by Mr. Burton to the Compy as Warriarpollam at 45. Mr. Burton says he all along intended to distinguish this sort of cloth from the ordinary taken out of the Chemanaickpollam. Whatever the Goodness of the cloth might be it was brought in by the Merchants at 39½ ₹ corge, and though it might sort to Worriarpollam afterwards, yet it was no reason for charging it to the Company in the first Instance at 45. He says indeed that Gruarauze told him it cost so much, but would not the Previous Question have naturally arose how it came before to be charged in the Books at 39½? Besides this cloth was brought in, in the Month of August when the Credit of the Allumparra Pagodas was higher than it was some months after, and Andiapa brought in no Worriarpollam cloth till the month of October and then it was priced no higher than at 44.

But we have already dwelt longer upon these particulars than is really necessary, the Account given in by the Merchants and inclosed in Mr. Croke's Letter of the 9th. Instant as Copied hereafter N^o. 7, plainly shews the overcharges by Mr. Burton and the reasons of them. In the Merchants account the Prices are particularly set down as the Cloth was brought in Monthly and which agree with the Prices mentioned in their Letters to us last year; It is this account of the Merchants that unravells the whole Mystery, [therein] they give themselves credit for Pag^s. 5397. 28. 64, being, [as they say] the amount of Goods which Mr. Burton had taken for his Private Account, and which sum he promised to pay into the Company's Cash, and give them credit for the same in part of their Ballance, but in the Company's Accounts he has given them credit for no more than Pag^s. 3307, the remainder being Pag^s. 2090.28.64 (if this account of the Merchants be true) he chose to appropriate to his own Profit, & in order that the ball^{ce}. of the one acco^t. should agree with the other he gave them Credit for the Cloth in the Company's Books at so much higher prices than what they

had charged it at in their Account as would amount in the whole to the said sum of Pag^s. 2090.28.64. That is, Mr. Burton Credits the Merchants in their Account with the Company N^o. 1 sent us the 14th. August for viz^t.

FROM THE VAKIEL IN THE CAMP, REC^d. 18th. OCTOBER 1742.

ON Friday the 15th. Instant about 9 o'clock in the morning Nabob Gulam Murtajah Alley Cawn set out from Velore in a Pallankeen accompany'd by Nabob Herauset Cawn & other Great Men. They first encamped at Herasut Pore, a place

very near Arcot in the way from Velore, where after they had rested themselves a little time, they mounted their Elephants; Nabob Mutajah Alley Cawn and Nabob Hussain Cawn Tahir, Son of Ahumud Tahir, both sat together in one castle upon an Elephant. Herasut Cawn, Jienadeen Alley Cawn & Hassan Jaman Cawn the brother-in-Law of Murtajah Alley Cawn sat themselves upon another, and in like manner each Nobleman of the Province, as Cauder Hussain Cawn, Hyder Yaur Cawn, Ameeradean Cawn, Sadatmud Cawn &c^t., rode upon an Elephant and followed Murtajah Alley Cawn into the City of Arcot with a Great army & the Beat of Noubat; They first went to a Mosque commonly called Teeboo Saheb's Tomb where when they had finished their Prayers, they went directly with great Ceremony into the Great House of State, commonly called here the King's Palace, where they placed Murtajah Alley Cawn upon the Masnad, which is a square Place in the Hall richly adorned, where the Subah of the Province always sits & then Herasut Cawn, Hussain Cawn Tahir, Cauder Hussain Cawn, Jienadeen Ally Cawn, Buda Sahib of Covelong, Hyder Yaur Cawn, Sadutmund Cawn, Ameeradean Cawn, Hassan Jaman Cawn, Hyder Dil Cawn, and several other Cawns, Kelledars, Mansubdars, Jamadars and other Officers of State paid their Compliments to him and presented to him Gold Rupees with the accustomed Ceremony observed to the Nabob, when Noubatt was beat three several times and Murtajah Alley Cawn proclaimed Subah and Nabob of the Province. The Fort Guns were then fired and the Artillery and other small Arms discharged upon that occasion. The Nabob gave all the abovementioned Gentlemen Betlenut and Rosewater & sent them to their respective Lodgings. A little while after this Great Ceremony was finished which was about five o'clock that afternoon Mahomud Cawn Kelledar of Timery came to Arcot, and went to Hussain Cawn Tahir who introduced him to the Nabob, to whom he paid his compliments, made him the accustomed Present of Gold Rupees, received Rosewater and Betle Nutt from him and return'd to his place Timery immediately.

Meer Assad is still under confinement in Velore.

The Nabob before he came out of Velore, appointed Bauker Sahib and Sidee Siheb [*sic*] to take care of the Fort as his Deputies.

It is reported here that Moorari Roy, Vice [R]oy of Tritchonopoly, upon hearing the Death of Nabob Subdar Alley Cawn, sent a part of his Army towards Wallingondaporum, who plundered and destroyed a great many Towns and Villages between that Place and Tiagagud and carried great store of Booty from hence.

Boma Rajah and all the Polligars about Velore, Aurony, &c^a., sent a part of their Foot under the Command of some of their Officers to attend the Nabob from Velore to Arcot and they were accordingly in his Train.

Alley Nakey Cawn, son of Takiah Saheb or the Nephew of the deceased Nabob, who was wounded when they Murdered his uncle has got the Liberty to go to Chinapatam and is now in the Way thither. They say that Buda Sahib will also get Liberty in a day or two to go to Chinapatam.

HONBLE SIR

Since Writing the accompanying Letter, Nella Tombe sent me word he with the rest of that set of Merchants would come if I pleased to speak with me, accordingly they came and thô Nella Tombee himself understands and speaks good English yet I had Sharub Rauze to be interpreter who attests the following Discourse. I told them in few words if they wanted any Discourse with me, they must speak the truth, for that would stand by them & would prevent them a great deal of trouble & scandal if they should be found out, they then told me they designed no other, for as for the alterations that had been made they knew nothing of them till now of late, that M^r. Burton, or his order made them without their knowledge, that they wonder'd that as Gruarauze had been Wareh^o. conicoply so long that he should not think of the Monthly papers which I had by me and that as for the Long cloth Chinnamanaickpollam corges 107.11 pieces brought in by them in M^r. Hubbards time, it was good cloth and far better then the Long cloth Chinnamanaickpollam corges 110 brought in August, so that if M^r. Burton reduced Long Cloth Chinnamanaickpollam 72.17 pieces to Long cloth Ordinary, they were certain it could not be from June, but must be from the 110 corge brought in August, further they told me as they must confess my Vouchers, the monthly Papers were true, nothing should perswade them to say contrary upon Examination, That as for their having signed the first accounts sent up, They depended upon Grua Rauze who had assured them the acco^{ts}. was the same in the main as the Merch^{ts}., only differ'd in transporting the cloths to different months, as occasion offer'd, they further assure your Hon^r. that as M^r. Burton was Gov^r. & in Authority they were willing to oblige him in that respect, not knowing of these alterations, in reducing M^r. Hubbards 107. 11 brought in at P^s. 41 P corge to ^{cor. p^s} 34. 14, & carrying the remaining 72.17 to August at Pag^s. 48.12 P corge, nor of the rest of the alterations mentioned in my reasons, of the differences, for they say they know full well what shame and trouble must be the consequent of it, as well as incurring your Hon^{rs}. displeasure, therefore they hope as they have made an ingenious, true confession, that your Honour will take it into your consideration, to protect them & a great deal more to this purpose, which for brevity sake I shall omit, but thought it proper to have this paper read, & interpreted to them before I send it to your Honour, & as aforesaid to have it attested by Sharubrauze, which I beleive it will let your Hon^r. see what a vast prejudice M^r. Burton has done our Hon^{ble} Masters, Notwithstanding his great boast of Hon^r. in the last General Letter: I am with the utmost gratitude & respect.

Instant, which are entered after last Consultation under N^o. 1, 2 & 7 and urging the Deputy Governour's backwardness to hold a Consultation & refusing to sign a Letter to transmitt the said paper as their reason for doing it without him.

Petition of the Merchants & other Inhabitants of Madrass whose Houses & Grounds were pulled down & levelled on the approach of the Morrattas, read as entered hereafter praying some releif for the same, upon which the Committee appointed to examine the Titles of the several Claimants report to the Board that they had gone through near four hundred which were all that had yet been brought before them & which they had entered in a Register together with the Length & Breadth of each & the Place or street where these Houses did stand, and the Number of Bricks taken from them, that they observed the Petition set forth that the Grounds had cost them 2 $\frac{1}{2}$, 2 & 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ Pagodas for the foot, that they had endeavoured to get the best Information they could of what those Grounds had sold for of late & found that except in particular cases the General Sales were,

When the Board issued out their orders for the pulling down the Houses, Directions were given that the owners should have all the materials delivered them except the Bricks which were wanted for the immediate service of the Fortifications & were expended on them, at the same time they had assurances given them that they should receive some satisfaction for the Ground, Bricks & other damages, as it was well known many if not the greatest part belonged to persons who were necessitous & had little else to depend on & it would be taking their all to deprive them of their Habitations, & what they were incapable of supporting themselves under but with the utmost misery.

The Board having taken the Petition into consideration together with the report of the Committee thereupon are of opinion that the Persons have very much overated the value of the Grounds as well as of the Bricks which in the times these Houses were built were at 1500 for a Pagoda, & after some time spent in debating on what to allow them for the damages sustained in the materials that have been broken, lost or rendered useless & in the Terrassed Houses the manner of that work not admitting the saving any part for further service, It was at length AGREED

That your Petitioner being appointed Executrix to the last Will and Testament of her late husband in conjunction with the other Executors John Savage and William Percival did, for the better and more Secure collecting in the Effects belonging to the said Estate at Vizagapatam, request the Joint Assistance of John Stratton Esq^r. at present Chief there, Mr. Thomas Saunders Second & Lieutenant John Crompton to that end, which request those Gentlemen were pleased to comply with, and in consequence have negotiated several matters respecting the said Estate.

Your Petitioner further shews that among other Debtors to the said Estate was one Mallim Pullah, a Servant to her late Husband, and of whose fidelity & attachment to the Interests of her said husband and all that belonged thereto your Petitioner has had repeated proofs, and of whose capacity to pay his own as well as to have collected in many other Outstanding debts to the Estate She is well perswaded. Sometime in June or July last this Mallim Pullah came hither, much to your Petitioner's surprize, and gave for reason, That, while he was in the Country endeavouring to collect in the Outstanding debts of the Estate and some of his own to enable him to pay off his also,

Mr. Stratton had set Peons not only over his House and Family, but also over his Person, who attended him wherever he went, by which he was so much obstructed in his purpose that he determined to throw himself upon your Petitioner and the other Executors here, as the Persons acting for the Estate in the first instance, for relief. Soon after the Walpole furnishing the said Pullah with an Oppertunity [*sic*] of returning to Vizagapatam, not only your Petitioner & the beforenamed Executors wrote to Mr. Stratton and the other Gentlemen there intimating their desire that he might not be molested in his person and Family and requesting their kind Assistance to him, but your Petitioner also applied to the Hoñble Richard Benyon Esq^r. to interest himself with Mr. Stratton in favour of the said Pullah and the affairs of her late Husband's Estate and has strong grounds to believe He was so kind as to write both to Mr. Stratton & Vizeramrauze, the Rajah of that Country, in his behalf.

When the advices came in here of the Walpole's Arrival at Vizagapatam your Petitioner was under no small concern that no Answer was return'd to any of the said Letters concerning Pullah and to hear it reported that Pullah was imprisoned immediately upon his Landing, but her Concern and Surprize were much aggravated soon after by the receipt of a Letter from Pullah, by Peons secretly procured and dispatched by him, Purporting, That, instead of the progress he hoped and doubted not to have made in serveing the Estate under the influence of the Letters he carried with him from hence, he had no sooner delivered those to Mr. Stratton than he ordered him to the Choultry where he was kept under a very severe confinement; Upon this your Petitioner and the other Executors, after what they had before wrote believing that the crimes Pullah had committed to deserve such Punishment must be of a more Capital nature than any thing he could have done to the Damage of your Petitioner's late Husband's Estate thought it sufficient for them to declare in Writing to Mr. Stratton & c^a. the 2^d. Instant, that, if Pullah's crimes were such as respected the Estate only, they were far from concurring in or approveing of any such severities as seemed to promise so little success to the Affairs of the Estate. Your Petitioner would, with the other Executors here, have contented herself with waiting for an answer to their said Declaration, e'er they pursued any other measures which a faithfull discharge of their Trust might make necessary, but that four or five days ago she received credible information [that] Mr. Stratton, having got intelligence that Pullah had dispatched Peons hither privately to complain of his confinement & sufferings, in resentment thereof (though from what motives proceeding your Petitioner is at a loss to know) has ordered the said Pullah into closer confinement in a little Prison in the Fort, where he is not only hindred from transmitting his Complaints up hither, but from the knowledge she has of the place of his confinement, she fears his Life also is in much danger.

Wherefore, as from the little regard Mr. Stratton has been pleased to shew to the Instances that were first made on behalf of the said Pullah your Petitioner has small reason to hope he will listen to those that have been made since, and as, should the said Pullah chance to die under his confinement, the Estate of her late Husband may receive much damage, your Petitioner finds herself reduced to the imediate necessity of Praying the interposition of this Honourable Board in behalf of the said Pullah, herself, and her Fatherless son-in-Law Charles Simpson now in England. Instant is very evasive and insufficient, and though the Commissary & Council very justly remarked the same to him in another Paper dated the 20th. and insisted on a more particular & explicate Answer, M^r. Burton in a Letter dated the 23^d. November tells them he had nothing more to say than what he had set forth in his former Papers, which this Board looking upon as an absolute refusal to settle a fair Account with the Company, besides which, considering the Transaction with Andiapah's Conicoply relating to the Three thousand Pagodas and also that by his own confession in a paper dated the 17th. Instant, if it was not a Confession to cover a worse purpose, he has been extremely negligent and remiss in a most essential part of his duty, and having duely consider'd the whole state of the Case, We think ourselves obliged in compliance with the Rules and orders received from our Hoñble Masters to Suspend him their Service, and it is accordingly agreed to Suspend him; To advise the Commiss^y. and Council thereof and to direct them to acquaint M^r. Burton with the same.

Mr. Burton suspended the Company's service.

Further measures to be taken with him agreed on.

Then the Board took into consideration in what Method to proceed in order to obtain redress for the Company if they have been injured by M^r. Burton, and agreed that the only proper means is by a Bill of Complaint to the Mayor's Court, and therefore Ordered that the Company's Solicitor do draw up a Bill of Complaint to be filed against M^r. Burton next Court day, but considering the distance M^r. Burton is at and that if only a Summons is issued out for him to Answer, and that if the Company must wait for the return of the Summons before they can apply to the Court for Bail, that M^r. Burton has an opportunity in the mean time, if he be so minded, to go to Pondicherry or some other European Settlement, AGREED that the Solicitor do move the Court, that considering the circumstances of the Case, they will order a Summons returnable immediately and afterwards grant a Warrant of Attachment that the same

may be sent to Fort S^t. David & served upon M^r. Burton, at the same time that he is acquainted with his Suspension.

The difference in Andiapah's Account being of the same Nature as that of Nella Tomby's and that Set of Merchants, and being but a small matter as well as the difference upon the Wrappers the inserting whereof in the Bill will make it a greater length than We have time to draw up before the Court adjourn for a long term as is usual at this Season of the year, and not doubting but M^r. Burton will settle those differences with us in an Amicable manner after the principal Cause is decided, or otherwise that we may hereafter have an Opportunity to file another Bill against him AGREED at present only to Sue for the difference in Nella Tomby & c^t. Merchants Accounts, and that We defer writing to Fort S^t. David upon this matter till the Bill has been read in Court.

That when the Morattos first infested this Province, your Petitioners being at work on the Company's Cloth, about 10 o'clock one Night Chinna Tombe Modelare Warehous Conicoply sent five Peons with an Order from Your Honour &c^a. to bring to the Company's Warehouse all the Paintings whether finished or not; Whereupon your Petitioners went to the said Chinna Tombe Modelare & told him, that as some of the Cloth was soaking in Corachi, some painted with Wax & some not finished, it would be impossible to take the same away in that condition without evident danger of being spoiled. Chinna Tombe Modelare made answer, that the Order was positive for all the Long Cloth to be brought in, together with the Paintings belonging to the Company & that if your Petitioners did not comply therewith, they must answer it at their peril. Your Petitioners thereupon sent the whole; & about one month afterwards Chinna Tombe Modelare delivered the same back to your Petitioners. But when your Petitioners were employed in working again on the same & had made considerable advances therein, they found it torn in several places; the further they proceeded, the more damage they found, & so on, when it was returned from the Washermen: which your Petitioners are fully persuaded was wholly occasioned by lying in the Aforesaid condition in the Warehouse. Your Petitioners have done their utmost endeavours to get the same mended & have been at some expences therein. Your Petitioners are poor; their Dependance is upon the Honourable
