The Consultations and Diary Book of Richard Benyon Esqr. President and Governour &ct. Council of Fort St. George containing their Proceedings and Transactions in the Affairs of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, Relating to the Presidency on the Coast of Choromandel. Began 1st. January 1743/44.

Your Petitioner also shews that the said Hollard being a near Relation they entered into joint Engagements with some Merchants & others in England for Wines & other things they brought out with them a joint Adventure by which means the said Hollard became indebted to your petitioner on ballance of an Account herewith offered to your Honour &c. in the Sum of Forty one Pounds Eighteen Shillings & six pence half penny.

Your Petitioner further sets forth that when the said Hollard was about to leave England the Honble Court of Directors being informed that he had some knowledge in the business of an Engineer & that he might be usefull abroad here in that way gave orders for providing & sending out with him such Mathematical Instruments as he thought proper; in Obedience to those Orders such instruments were bespoke of & made by an Instrument Maker in Fleet Street & by him as Your Petitioner is Assured sent to M. Crab at the East Iudia house from whence he verily believes by some Accident or other they were not sent on board the Wilmington, as the Strictest Enquiry & Search were made after them when that Ship was shifted in Bengal without Effect.

Your Petitioner an (sic) enquiring after the Effects of the said Hollard is informed that there are five Months pay due to him from the Honble Company which Your Petitioner would have applied himself to this Board for some time since but that he was given to understand his request could not be granted till those Instruments were produced or Accounted for being said to have been put under the said Hollard's Charge.

Wherefore your petitioner humbly prays that if Your Honour &c. shall not think proper to order that money to be now paid him, you will do him the favour to represent his Case to the Honourable Court of Directors from whom he hopes that indulgence, in part of the ballance due to him from the said Hollard as well as that he has been directed by the Mayor's Court at Calcutta to act as his Executor.

The President then said that upon enquiring into the cause of the unexpected fall of the Madrass Pagodas now, when several of the Northern Grain Vessels are arrived, he was told it proceeded partly from the Merchants not having yet sold their Grain & partly from a large Quantity of Gold Fanams brought into Town within these few days from the Misore Country to be Coined in our Mint, and if his intelligence did not fail him the Batta would tall still lower by a large demand for Rupees (it was expected) some Exegencies of the Government above would shortly occasion, in which Case those who have bought up the Madrass Pagodas would probably be induced to Exchange them at a small loss in hopes of a greater Advantage from the Rupees; If this should happen to be the Case and an Opportunity offer of purchasing the remainder of what we want at or under Nine & cent he proposed to the rest of the Board to empower him to buy, lest by any sudden Turn such an opportunity might be lost before he could meet them which was readily agreed to. Request from Mr. Parkes to stay here for the Recovery

This has very much alarmed the Country, and occasioned all the Inhabitants at Arcot and the Towns adjacent to leave them. And great numbers of Peons and Oxen are come in here with Money and Effects. In a few days it was expected they would come to some Action or Treaty; But it is thought the latter, as it is more agreable to Nazam's general method of proceeding, and as the Army of the Morattas is said to be Superiour to his.

PRESIDENT AND GOVERNOUR &C'. COUNCIL OF FORT S'. GEORGE. HOÑBLE SIR & SIRS,

In obedience to your directions, communicated to me by Mr. Secretary Savage, I now lay before Your Honour &ct. a Journal of my last Voyage to Fort Marlborough, and to make reference thereto the more ready, together with a desire I have of justifying my Conduct to your Honour &ct. which I read with concern has been so much complain'd of by the Deputy Governour and Council there; I must beg leave to take up more of your time than I willingly would at this juncture.

I received Your Honour & dispatches for Bencoolen the 9th. October 1742, but being obliged to take the Sloop in Tow, which you were pleased to require my care of, and meeting with contrary Winds it was the 26th. of November in the evening before I arrived off Barroos, which being much later than I had reason to expect when I sail'd hence, made me apprehensive of falling short of a sufficient quantity of Wood & Water, should I meet with as ill success in the remainder of my Passage: I therefore thought it but prudent to supply myself at that Place, and those supplies were of great service to me as I did not arrive at Moco Moco till the 29th. of December: The Resident there was pleased to order me to deliver the Salt I had on board which detained me till the 5th. Janry. when I proceeded for Fort Marlborough, with him Passenger.

Your Honour &ct. will please to observe my only stay was at Barroos; and that, less than four days, I indeed was very sensible the Gentlemen to whom I was consigned are at all times displeased at the Ships touching on the Coast, and in consequence of that, had it not been so very necessary, I should not have chose to have run the risque of disobliging. But I did not in the least apprehend it could be at all detrimental to my Honourable Masters, or should I even now, had not those Gentlemen been pleased to write so; For though I arrived at Marlborough the 7th of January, which was but ten days after the Grantham, they did not think proper to order me to the Assistance of that Ship's dispatch 'till the 24th February.

I have before acquainted Your Hon. &c. of my only Stay on the Coast, and as the length of my Passage proceeded entirely from other Causes I could noways prevent; I flatter myself your Honour &c. will be pleased to think more favourably, of my conduct than it has been represented to You, and as such recommend it to my Honourable Employers.

Upon my Arrival at Bombay from Mocha, I obtained Governour Wake's leave to Proceed on the Success Galley bound for Bengal, in order to come round to Madrass against the time of the departure of the Europe Shipping; but by the loss of her Passage, and Unusual length of the Sumatra's from Vizagapatam, I could not Reach hither till 27th. Ulto. and now finding myself very much indisposed through a Consumptive disorder which the Fatigues of the Sea have helped to Confirm, I make it my humble Request to this Honble Board that you will dispense with my not returning thus suddenly on the Heathcote for England, and permit me to stay behind for the Recovery of my Health.

We find her upper Works in a very bad condition, being quite open for want of Knees and Standards to strengthen her Quarters, and imagine it will be unsafe for her to go any long Voyage where there may be a likelyhood of Bad Weather.

We also find she makes about Eight Inches Water an hour, and will doubtless make much more when she comes to lay her upper Works in the Water. The Captain informs us the most material Leak is in the Scarfe of the Stem, but as she is full there We could not come to see it.

Proceedings about appointing a Superiour in the Roman Church in this town.

The President acquaints the Board that notwithstanding Father Severini since the demise of Father Thomas in April 1742, has acted as Superiour of the Roman Catholick Church in this Town by the Consent of this Board (who then thought it unnecessary to Authorize him by any particular Instrument) and has conducted himself to the general Satisfaction. He learns a paper under the Hand of the Provincial of the Convent of Tauris and the Seal of his Office called a Decree and said to be sent out of France by the way of China appeared in town about the 5th instant whereby Padre Renatus (a Frenchman by birth, and a junior Brother who has hitherto acted under Severini) is appointed Apostolic Missionary and Vice Guardian of the Missions in the Indies and Persia, a Title, though not exactly the same with that Severini is known by of Superiour and Chief Pastor of the Church of St. Andrew in this Town, yet the influence it carries with it will render it so like in its Effects, that he looks on it only as an Artfull Attempt to invade the Honble Company's Right of Appointing who shall be Superiour in Ecclesiastical Matters over the Great Number of our Inhabitants of the Roman Catholick profession; a Priviledge necessary to the Company's Honour and Interests and the Welfare and Good Government of the Town and as occasions offered so zealously maintained by our Predicessours, and as often approved by our Honourable Masters, that he therefore recommends to the Board to consider of the Steps proper to be taken on this Affair.

Our Records being thereupon referred to, so many precedents appeared of the Prerogative mentioned by the English Government in Cases of this Nature, confirmed from England and confessed by the Fathers of this Roman Church that the Board having fully considered the Nature and Tendency of this matter Resolved & Ordered that an Instrument be drawn out Appointing Padre Severini, Superiour and Chief Paster of the Church of St. Andrew in this Town, on the model of that given on a like occasion by the President and Council in February 1707.

That the same be translated into Latin to be signed by the Board, and that an order also in Latin be delivered by the Secretary to Padre Severini, directing him to read or cause the said Instrument of our Induction to be read publickly in his Church on Sunday next the Secretary being present.

The Board were but too sensible of the truth of what the Merchants had alledged to the President and observed with concern how little it was in our power to offer a New set any terms that would be esteemed a sufficient Encouragement for them to engage with us, That to raise the Prices of the Cloth at this time besides, that we think it will not be agreeable to Our Honourable Masters, might be of bad consequence, as it is Seldom if ever found practicable to reduce them again, That the Broad Cloth which yields a profit some years, is now appropriated to Tomby Chitty, Ponnapa Chitty and Molinga Kistna to support them and ease their ballances and therefore we are greatly at a loss to know how to make such proposals to them as they will care to accept and yet the importance of the case will not permit us to be indifferent or to slacken our Endeavours for the accomplishing it. It was thereupon moved to send for those persons to see if we could prevail with them who accordingly came and were asked if they would take a part of the Company's Investment and on what terms, repeated what they had said to the President and desired the Board to be persuaded that they should not have any reluctance to undertake the part of the Investment for this year that might be allotted them, could they even be certain their fortunes would not be injured, that if we proposed the Method lately made use of, Brokerage, it would barely pay the necessary Servants and other Expences, that a proportion of the Broad Cloth would give them but a small advantage, and that therefore they expected some allowance to be made them equal to the trouble and attendance required, and the risque they must run in the Advancements. They were then told it was not in our

power at present to offer them more than the Brokerage, that it was true the Merchants had for a long course of time had the Broad Cloth allowed them, but that was already engaged and that as to the other it could not be granted without liberty first obtained from Home. That the Brokerage only was we must confess less advantageous terms than what the other Merchants had, that nevertheless if they would accept of it and shew a readiness to serve Us at this time, we would recommend them to the Company, to whom we did not doubt, such a behaviour would be very satisfactory, and that they should not fail of having all the Assistance we could possibly give them for the carrying on their business. These Merchants having desired to withdraw to consider of what the Board had said, after sometime came in and delivered themselves to the following purport.

That it had formerly been esteemed an Honour to be the Company's Merchants and that many had heretofore reaped advantages from the credit of it, however unhappy some had been of late: That to these the greatest Indulgence had been shewn even beyond the highest expectations, that the generosity and benevolence of the Company had made great Impressions on the Minds of the Inhabitants in general and that therefore they had the utmost confidence in the Company and were well satisfied that they should have all fair and kind treatment from the Gentlemen who now sit at the Board and being willing to shew their regard to the Company, and our promise of recommending them as well as to oblige us they would take parts of the Investment for this take a part year and endeavour to Answer the expectations we might have of their contributing of this to the enlarging it as far as may be but that they could not hold themselves bound to this year. continue in the business on such unequal terms.

P Mensum each will be a Sufficient Number to be Employed in bringing them thither, either by Cattamarans or Land Carriages besides the Service they will Yield between while in Raising the Work.

It is also my Opinion that a Battery is very Necessary to be Erected at the Black Rock to project into the River, as the Gunns from thence will be of great Use in securing that Part of the Mangoe Garden which lies behind a Riseing Ground called the Sand Hill which Over looks the Town and what the Country Government constantly Possess themselves of upon the least Dispute with Us and the only Place from whence they can do any Mischief to the Garrison The Stones for the Building this Battery lie within twenty Yards of the Place, so that the Charges will Amount but to a Trifle, It is my belief 500 Rupees will be the Utmost, besides the Advantage there will arise from Deepening that part of the River by filling up the Body of the Battery with the sand You take out of it.

The Magazine is in a very improper Place because it is Situated so Close to the River & at so great a Distance from the Fort, That it may be easily Surprized and taken possession of by persons Crossing it in the Night time and before any relief could be sent from the Garrison; This Magazine therefore, That it may not be rendered wholly Useless, may very easily be made into a Guard House with breaking out another Door to the Westward, two Windows to the Southward and a Virando before it And as a New One will be absolutely necessary. I think Mr. Tornery the Properest Person to be consulted as to the place where it ought to be Built.

A Brick Parapet is wanting to Benyon's Battery as well as round Middle point to Flag Staff Hill but what Number of Bricks will be Sufficient for that purpose I am really at [a] loss to inform Your Honour &c. so cannot Judge of the Cost.

There is not at present so much as One Godown w[here] any of the Honble Company's Stores can be laid up with any security.

It's true there are the Walls of an Old Godown standing near the River side the roof of which has been fallen in for some years past. To the best of my Memory It is about 120 feet in Length & 24 in Breadth; If your Honour &c\*. shall think it Necessary to have it Tarrassed, it may be done at a small Expence with the Timbers lying at Ingeram, us they may be brought from thence on Paddy boats on easy Terms and if they should prove too short for the purpose, the Inconvenience may be Easily Remedied by raising a few Pillars all along the Middle of it. The Upper Terrass of the Fort House, being not of a sufficient Thickness, is very subject to Leak in the Rainy Season, which may be Remedied if your Honour &c\*. think proper by Beating off the Chinam and adding another Row of Terrass Bricks which will fully secure it in Future The Guard House is much in the same Condition and will therefore require the same Repair, About 2 Years ago The Terrass of the Armoury fell in, which, as it is a place very much wanted, I don't doubt you will think Deserves an equall Repair with the Rest. And lastly I must likewise Observe to your Honour &c\*. That the Timbers lying at Ingeram will be more than sufficient both for the Beams and plank that may be wanted for the above mention'd or any other Repairs which may be thought Necessary for the Service of the Garrison.

Thus having given your Honour &ct. my Sentiments of what I think is Absolutely Necessary both for the Security as well as Defence of Our Honourable Masters Garrison & Effects at Vizagapatam I am to beg leave to Referr the whole to your Consideration and Remain with Respect

The Board having taken the same into Consideration are of opinion that we ought by all means to avoid the taking the Goods into our Custody in order to send them on to Surat, Since if any accident should happen to them in the Passage and the Court be disappointed of them they who are not conversant with Sea Affairs, & the Casualties of those Conveyances, might look upon the Honble Company as obliged to make good the loss which might be rated at their pleasure and occasion a large demand, & thereby involve this or some other of the Company's Settlements in Disputes with the Mogul's Officers, who would be under the absolute orders of their Sovereign and obliged to the Execution of them: though of a nature how unjust so-

I have received his Excellency's Letter and Present by Hodjee Noorbeg, and Shaike Abdul Nabey, in which he has done me great honour, and I have now made my acknowledgments to him for them; I have acquainted him that the Cloth he designed for Surat to be forwarded from thence to the Moguls Court is under the Care of your Servants and that I should give them my best assistance in sending it thither, but I must represent to you the risque that always attends the transporting of Goods by Sea from many accidents of Storms Fire Enemies and such like, besides damage, and as I Suppose his Excellency may have advised the Court of their being Sent to Chinnapatam to be forwarded in Case any Accident should happen there might be a demand made & might involve us in some trouble with the Court if the Goods are not produced, which cannot be provided any Accident should happen, nor can I say if any Ship will go for Surat from hence directly this year: Wherefore I beg leave to desire you will take it into Consideration, and endeavour to find out some Method that the Goods may be sent under the Care of some of his Excellency's Servants and that I may have nothing further to do than to assist them when a Conveyance offers and that no Blame may fall upon me on any Account, should any unforeseen Accident happen. The President acquaints the Board that a few days since Captain Watts of the Lapwing representing to him that there were on board his Ship two men of very turbulent and mutinous dispositions & the inconveniencies he apprehended might grow from their continuing on board, he, the President, had thought proper to direct the Captain to send for them ashore in order to their being put on board some of the larger Europe Ships where they may better be kept in order and where their bad example may not have such ill Effects; That on his being acquainted the said two Men by name Archibald Douglass and David Shepherd were desirous of justifying themselves before us, he had directed Captain Watts to be in attendance here to day with such of his Officers as are ashore, and six of the Foremast Men which the said

They desire to have a hearing before the board.

Douglas and Shepherd had desired might be sent for.

They, with! Capt. Watts &ct. attend the board.

The said Douglass and Shepherd Captain Watts and the others attending accordingly they were all called in; when Captain Watts delivered to the Board a Paper as entered hereafter, containing the matter of his complaint against the said Douglass and Shepherd, which being read in their hearing, and they called upon for what they had to say in their justification they offered only their own negative Assertions in opposition to the Facts charged on them supported by the general Testimony of the Officers and Foremastmen present which last (though sent for at their desire) were not only far from offering any thing in their vindication but one and all affirmed that the said two men were the sole cause of all the disturbances and uneasiness that had happen'd in the Ship. The Board having consider'd of the matter and the ill consequences that such a mutinous disposition spreading itself further on board such a vessel as the Lapwing might be attended with, agreed to keep them ashore here till opportunity offers of their going on board some of the Company's larger Ships.

PRESIDENT AND GOVERNOUR &CA. COUNCIL OF FORT ST. GEORGE.

Honble Sir & Sirs

I find myself under the necessity, of represents to your Honour &ct that there are on board the Lapwing, two Qr. Masters of such turbulent dispositions, that as I believe your Honour &ct will not judge it proper to continue them on Board, so I am to request Your Orders concerning them.

One of them Archibald Douglas, after many attempts to raise a Mutiny in the Ship continued to give so many proofs of His seditious Temper; particularly, on the 30th. November 1743 that to prevent the Ill consequences of such practices it was thought necessary to confine Him in Irons; from which, however he was released the next Day, on His promise of Good Behaviour for the Future, A promise, that he has so ill kept, that on the 23th of this Month being in sight of Zeloan, without any complaint made to the Capt. or Superior Officer on Deck He flung his Mess Allowance overboard, on pretence of its being Bad, and endeavoured all that in him lay to excite the Ships company to Mutiny, whereupon, I called a consultation of my Officers; a copy of which, is hereunto annexed, to show Your Honour &ct. the reasons, upon which it was agreed, that He should receive Thirty Nine Lashes at the Main Geers.

In consequence of this Resolution, the command to make him fast fell on David Shipherd, whos (sic) proper Business it was, but he regardless of his Duty, refused to Obey the command; for which, he ought also to have been punished, (but when I and my Officers, considered should his Mutinous Disposition be more General, and the Men by surprize, or other Accident, happen to become Masters of the Ship, and prosecute any Peratical designs in Her, they might be capable of doing much Mischief in these parts, where there is hardly any Shipping that could come up with Her) it was thought proper only to confine Shepherd with the other in Irons till we Arrived here, and had this Opportunity of referring to your Honour &c. to order, what you shall think further necessary to be done on the Occasion.

WHEREAS, Archibald Douglas Quarter Master on board the Honble East India Company Ship Lapwing on the 23<sup>d</sup>. April Anno 1744 Having without any complaint to the Captain or Superior Officers on Deck under the pretence of his provision being Bad Flung overboard his Mess Allow. making great grumbling amongst the People in order as much as lay in His power, to raise a Mutiny amongst the Ships Company; which he has several times before Attempted, particularly on the 30<sup>th</sup>.

### -FORT ST. GEORGE, MAY 1744--

November 1743, for which he was confined in Irons, but on promise of Good Behaviour for the Future (was released the Day afterwards) which he has very badly complyed with.

We the under written Commander & Officers on board the Lapwing, knowing the dangerous Consequences that often Attend Mutinys of this sort for the security of our persons, & Charge intrusted to us, as likewise to deter others from Committing the like Fauls (sic) judge it proper that He receive at the Main Geers Forty Lashes lacking one.

Worse than Standard, as they have hitherto done, and that he finds them when Assay'd Singly and in Parcels to come out 15 Penny weight worse than Standard.

They are delivered the Minters at that rate.

AGREED that the Dutch Dollars be accounted for with the Minters at the rate of fifteen Penny Weight worse than Standard, since we cannot expect they will go on with the business on such disadvantageous terms as certified to Us by the Assaymaster to be the Case, in regard to the difference of what have hitherto been taken at in the Mint and their real Value.

That thereupon he had ordered the Merchants to send immediately some Persons they could confide in to know the Truth and what the French Agents were about That if they found any Attempts were making to engage the Weavers in their business in prejudice of our Company they should do their utmost to prevent it, which he thinks might be done with the less difficulty (unless the French should Advance on the prices) as these Weavers had been entirely employed by our Merchants for Several Years. And he supposes the French coming into these parts for the Ordinary Sortments to proceed from their being disappointed at Salem, from whence and from Worriapollam and Chemanaickpollam they have been supplied hitherto & never before attempted any but Fine Cloths in these Parts.

The Nabob not having yet fixed the standard of the Arcot Rupee, no Silver can be disposed of at present.

The Nabob having as yet come to no determination about fixing the Standard of the Arcot Rupees the Shroffs are not willing to purchase any Quantity of Silver at present only carrying on some little business with the former Rupees, so that no Silver can yet be disposed of.

Instant the Son of Our late Nabob Subder Ally Cawn, named Saib Judda, was murdered there with Some others of his Relations and Family by Edel Cawn a Patan, at the Instigation of Mortas Ally Cawn, the Same Person who had killed the Father in October 1742, That he had promised this Patan and some others a Lack of Rupees to destroy the Nabob, and another Lack for doing the same to Saib Judda and four more. And by putting these Persons out of the way he expected to have had it in his Power to Seize the Government and by Sums of Money to get it Confirmed to him. The Mosque was the place pitched on to put their design in Execution against the Nabob: They had waited Eleven days in Expectation of Seeing him there, But an indisposition had kept him from going, And the 22d. which was Friday when they perform Service at the Mosque he purposed to have gone, but having ordered our People to Attend him that morning with the Present, he was [so] curious as to open and look on every Article which took up two Hours, and after our People were dismissed he[sent] to know if the Service of the Mosque was over and [word] being brought that it was, he retired, to his Chambers providentially escaped from the Wicked design formed against his Life. The Patan and Eleven of his Company were cut off immediately and two more executed One of [them] confessed the whole Affair and had the obligation above Signed and Sealed by Mortas Ally Cawn for the payment of the Two Lack on their performing the above Condition.

There not being Pagodas enough [...] Cash, exclusive of the Fanams to pay the Town rent, [and] Cawngohee Duty, and make good the foregoing Advance to the Paymaster and Warehousekeeper the President [Lends] the Cash two thousand Pagodas more.

A Letter from Captain Pelly of the Prince of Wales read as entered hereafter requesting Eight hundred Bags of Surplus Salt Petre.

AGREED and ordered That Eight hundred Bags more Salt petre be sent on board the Prince of Wales and that the Warehousekeeper acquaint Captain Pelly that the Board will reserve to themselves the liberty of declaring hereafter if any part of this indulged Salt Petre Shall be accounted into his Charter Party Tonnage or not.

No Shroffs having made any further proposals to us about a further exchange of Silver for Madrass Pagodas: Linga Chitty was Sent for and asked if he could not procure us some more Madrass Pagodas for Silver. He urged the Scarcity of Gold at present and that it would require some time to do it: He was asked what time? He replied two months, being told that was a Term we could not possibly allow, but that if it could be done in One Month or Forty days, it might Answer our purpose of being in time for the Shipping: He at length agreed to deliver in forty days or sooner if possible to the Amount of Four more Chests of Silver, the price to be 14\frac{3}{4} and the Batta on the Pagodas 9\frac{1}{2} P Cent, being pressed to take Silver for the remainder of what Pagodas we shall want, he desired to be excused and that this parcel and that before contracted for were as much as he could possibly comply with his engagement to us.

David of the 3<sup>d</sup> instant read inclosing Monthly Papers, advising that their Merchants promise their endeavours to provide the Additional Blue Cloth and to comply as near as possible with the directions contain'd in the Extract of the List of Investment transmitted thither the 7<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo, and also what they say concerning the quantity of Cloth they expect to procure for this year's Investment: And requesting a Supply of Twenty thousand Pagodas.

Captain Crabb of the Durrington purposing to sail this Evening for the Bay and the Rupees being gone on board: A Letter to accompany them is now read and Signed: desiring also the Gentlemen in the Bay not to send us any more Arrack, as what we have already here will not fetch Invoice Price, and that they will send us on the Sumatra the Guns and Medicines that may be on board the Duke of Dorset for this Presidency should that Ship proceed directly thither without touching here.

The Import Warehousekeeper pays in Seven thousand nine hundred twenty three Pagodas and a half on Account of Silver Sold, And One thousand Pagodas on his running Account.

AGREED that Two thousand 2000 Pagodas be Advanced Sunca Vencata Rama & Ambaltaudy on Account of the Investment.

ORDERED that Three Chests of Silver be Coined into Rupees for Vizagapatam.

It being then debated how to get the Cloths hither from Ingeram and Vizaga-patam in September, for which Service we have hitherto depended on the Princess Augusta's Arrival from the West Coast, and it being considered that should she not come in before the 20th or 25th of the month, the time it will take to Shift her may make it so late before we can send her to the Northward as to endanger our being disappointed of those Goods in time. It was resolved if the Princess Augusta does not come in by the 25th to accept the offer now made us by the Owners of the Galatea to hold that Ship in readiness to undertake that Service by the 1st or 2d of next Month.

ORDERED that the Wares and Stores indented for from Vizagapatam and Ingeram be got ready to Send thither on either of the abovementioned Vessels.

The Prospect of the Investment at this place and Fort St. David, being then taken into consideration with regard to the having a Sum in Cash to Answer the several demands that may be made by our and their Merchants which together may be computed for near Three thousand Bales unless Some unforeseen Accident Should happen: The Silver we have hitherto been able to Sell off will go but little way to serve this purpose, wherefore there is a necessity of disposing of a considerable Quantity for the carrying on the Investment.

The great demand for Gold Mohurs at Bengall has almost drained our place of what Gold there was and has of late been brought in, which have been exchanged for the Arcot Rupees of the former Coinage, these remain in Town and occasion Silver to be in little demand and so Scarce have Pagodas been of late from the melting them down for the Gold Mohurs that the Shroffs have not yet been in a capacity to take out the Silver from our Warehouse which they agreed for last month; Even the Shop of Boocunjee Cossidos who is Shroff to the Surcar and the most eminent in his

business in the Province: which demonstrates the great difficulty there is in Money Affairs at this time, and that whilst it continues it must very much Affect that of Silver.

It was agreed that as this is an Affair of great importance, we must endeavour by all Methods possible to raise a Sufficient Sum of Pagodas to furnish the Merchants, as no other Coin will pass in the Country for the Investment; That the Sale of Silver is what we must chiefly depend on, Since all others may possibly fail us, and that we must on no Account Suffer the Investment to languish for want of a proper Supply. That therefore it be recommended to the President and Warehousekeeper to make Sale of at least Forty Chests of Silver on the best terms they can, so as not to exceed fifteen Dollars for Ten Pagodas, and to allow One or Two Months Trust, provided it be not taken out of the Wareho. 'till paid for. This being our only hopes to engage the Shroffs, who by Such a Credit may be enabled to Collect Money from their Several Shops in the Province to Answer the Payments: That if possible the Sale of the Silver be finished by the end of this month, when the Judda Ship may be expected with a large Quantity & be a further impediment in our way, especially if part of the Silver by that Ship should be exchanged for Gold Mohurs, of which there is a likelyhood from the adva[nce] arising by the Exchange. That the Mocha and Bussora Ships in August will bring more, and from that time to December there is seldom any demand for it; for all which reasons the disposing of it as soon as possible is not only necessary but has all the Appearance of being Advantageous to the Honble Company, notwithstanding from the present Circumstances of the Place the terms may be somewhat less favourable than in former Years.

William Monson Import Warehousekeeper delivers in Fourteen thousand 14000 Madrass Pagodas being So much received of Linga Chitty in part Compliance with the Agreements he made with us for Eight Chests of Silver the 26th. June and 2d. instant.

The President then acquainted the Board that Two of the Town Shroffs expecting to be possessed of about Ten thousand Madrass Pagodas in few days, had made him an offer of them at 8% Cent Batta: Which being considerably cheaper than they have been for some time, or than we had any reason to expect, And we not having yet got the Sum we want for the Northern Settlements the President is desired to agree for them.

The consequences of our not receiving the Northern Cloths in time for a September Dispatch being considered, and also that if the Princess Augusta should arrive even within these two or three days, it may not be possible for us to get her away to the Northward so Soon as the Galatea, that will be ready by the time we expect to get in the Madrass Pagodas we purpose to Send on her. It's agreed that we cannot depend any longer on the Princess Augusta's coming in and that the Galatea be got ready with all expedition to go on that Service.

And as at this Season of the Year some time may be Saved by ordering her to take in the Ingeram Cloth first, and then to proceed to Vizagapatam, it's agreed to give Orders accordingly; To send on her Ten thousand Madrass Pagodas for Ingeram, Ten thousand more Madrass Pagodas for Vizagapatam, And such Wares and Stores as have been indented for from both those places.

Agreed to dispatch Peons to Vizagapatam and Ingeram with Advice of these our resolutions, That the Gentlemen at those places may hold themselves in readiness to give the Galatea the quickest dispatch.

Agreed also to order M<sup>r</sup>. Hallyburton at Maddepollam to send away the Vessel that brings his Goods with what Cloth & Chay Goods may be ready by the 25<sup>th</sup>. of August.

AGREED to grant Mr. Andrews's request to come up hither from Maddepollam for a few days.

And to advise to Anjengo of our having forwarded their Second Packet to Bombay.

A Letter from M<sup>r</sup>. John Stratton read as entered hereafter on the Subject of the third Paragraph of the General Letter from England P Hardwicke, dated the 8<sup>th</sup>. June 1743, concerning his being reported to be in Debt, offering us any proof we shall require that his Circumstances have been misrepresented in England, & praying of us to give Our Honourable Masters our thoughts of that matter in our Next Letter. The Board beleiving it unnecessary to put M<sup>r</sup>. Stratton to any Such Proof, agreed to comply with his request in the close of his Said Letter.

The Price of the Copper also after the Sale of One hundred and fifty Candy, falling under Eighty six 86 Pagodas & Candy, the price of Sale we limited, it's agreed to Send all the Prince of Wales's to the Bay & the remainder of the York's except one hundred Candies which there is reason to expect may fetch as good a price here in January next as in the Bay: Besides that it may perhaps enable us to send larger Supplies of Money thither Early in the Year and the lessening the Quantity to be disposed of there may render the sale of it less difficult, especially if the Advices lately arrived at Arcot are to be depended on That a Numererous Army of Morattas are set out from Sittarra under their Generals Ragojee Bosallah and Futta Sing to take satisfaction of the Nabob of Cossimbazar for his Treachery to their former Generals.

AGREED that Five thousand 5000 Pagodas be Advanced Telesinga Chitty and Nellamoota Comrapa Chitty on Account of the Investment.

The State of the Investment on this Coast with regard to the Dispatch of a Second September Ship to Europe being then taken into consideration, it was found that if the Northern Cloths arrive Safe and in time, and the Merchants here and at S'. David's bring in the Goods they have promised, there will with the Pepper be pretty near Bales sufficient for Such a Ship as the Duke of Dorset of 460 Tons; But the unusual rains we have had for Six Weeks past having kept the Washers so backward in their business, that instead of being ready to receive the Northern Bales they will not be able to finish those provided here should the Weather even continue fair 'till the beginning of October which cannot be expected or depended on, as September generaly proves a Rainy Month and therefore there Appears no probability of our being able to get so large a Quantity as Seven hundred Bales cured in a

proper manner and in time to compleat the Lading of a Second Ship, owing to this Accident not in our Power to hinder; The Washers having been kept most closely to work whenever the Weather would permit.

AGREED therefore to dispatch the Duke of Dorset to the Bay as soon as she has delivered what she has on board for this Place and taken in her Red Wood.

AGREED to send the Prince of Wales's & the remainder of the York's Copper on board the Beaufort for the Bay & to dispatch her thither as soon as we have got Madrass Pagodas enough for another Supply for the Northern Settlements, which its agreed to order to land at Vizagapatam.

As the Northern Cloths may be wanted to compleat our January Tonnage for Europe, and our Washers at that season may be so full of Work as not to be able to Cure them, it's agreed to order the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam & Ingeram to whiten all their Cloths that come in after the dispatch of the Galatea.

The Export Warehousekeeper delivers in his Indent to Bengal for Packing Stuff & Oil, in order to its being forwarded thither in our next General Letter: Wherein he desires it may be requested that the Rope and Twine may be sent us by the first Conveyance.

The Board then proceeded to consider what to write to the Bay respecting the Tonnage to be sent us in December to fill up for Europe, and after some time spent therein, and in computing what Number of Bales we may almost, certainly depend on here, and from the Subordinates without Some Accident intervening not now to be foreseen; It was agreed to write for Room for Two thousand five hundred 2500 Bales besides One hundred and forty Tons of Pepper and to desire the President and Council to fill up the Tonnage of the Ships they send us with good Rice on the Honble Company's Account: But for as much as the great Quantity of Tonnage the Gentlemen in the Bay will have to provide for this year and the disturbed State of the Country about them may probably lay them under a necessity of putting on board the Ships they send us more than their Charterparty Proportions of SaltPetre; It's agreed to desire in Such Case they will Consign Such Surplus Petre to us by a Separate Bill of Lading, That, should we be so fortunate as to encrease our Number of Bales beyond what we at present reckon upon we may have it in our Power to take out that Saltpetre and put Bales on board in it's stead.

AGREED to desire of the Gentlemen in the Bay to supply us with Saltpetre for our Store as usual and the Ships they send hither in December, with what the Commanders design to carry home at the low freight and also to remind these last that they compleat their Ships Companies in the Bay as they will not be able to Supply themselves with Men here.

The other of the 3d. August advising the Arrival of the Winchester, Mountague & Durrington; That they cannot get any good Patcharee Rice to send us on the Sumatra, which Ship they were then dispatching to Us; In answer to what we wrote them about the Mountague's Pepper, advising that they had resolved to send two of the Company's Ships to Tellicherry, To be loaded there with Pepper for Europe, inclosing a Packet to be forwarded to Tellicherry and accompanying another Packet for England to be forwarded by the Prince of Wales, Advising also of a stop put to their business by their Nabob who had made a very Exorbitant Demand on them as well as on the French and Dutch.

General Letter N°. 87 from the President and Council of Fort William of the 7th. Ultimo read, inclosing Invoice and Bill of Lading for Rice and Brown Jugdea Baftaes sent us on the Sumatra and the Accounts of disbursements on and Stores supplied that Ship Amounting to Thirteen thousand two hundred thirty eight Rupees fifteen anaes and two Pice, as \$\Phi\$ Abstract thereof entered hereafter.

As the Rice on board the Sumatra is of a sort that will not do at the West Coast, but in Case of Absolute necessity, its agreed to take it on shore here except One thousand Bags, which will serve their occasions 'till the Arrival of the Lapwing by which Vessel it's hoped the Gentlemen of Bengal will be able to send them a Supply of Patcharee Sort.

The Present Situation of Affairs on this Coast being considered, and that it may be proper to have some Vessel in the road to send about with advices upon any extraordinary Motions at Pondicherry (where there are two Europe Ships now lying) It's agreed to suspend the Dispatch of the Sumatra to the West Coast 'till the beginning of next month, and that the President give the Master Orders, in Case of any French Ships appears. in the Offing to bring her as near in shore as he can with safety.

The Import Wareho.kr. pays in Six thousand, 6000 Pagodas on Account of Silver Sold.

Sercary Veraugo, Nella Tomby Chitty & Jeneguda Tagapa Farmers of the Banksal Duties make their first payment of Two hundred 200 Pagodas, for Six months rent of that Cowle due the 1st. of July last.

Mr Monson Export Warehousekeeper delivers in a Paper as now read and entered hereafter setting forth the great trouble he has taken with the Washers, to make them bring in the Cloth faster: And representing that unless some measures are taken to-quicken that business, much of the Cloth now on hand, with what may be expected brown from the Northward will not be Cured in time for the next dispatch for Europe.

ORDERED that the Head Washers attend the Board on Wednesday next to Answer for their delatoriness.

The Board then taking into consideration by what methods to oppose the difficulties in the Investment complain'd of from Vizagapatam & Ingeram, the grounds of which we are Sensible are but too well founded, and the precarious Situation of the Investment in Bengal rendering it incumbent on Us to exert our utmost endeavours to prevent any disappointment in our own, it was at length Agreed not to increase the Quantity of Fine Cloths as proposed by the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam, but to allow the Merchants there & at Ingeram two Pagodas more & Corge on the Ordinary Long Cloths, & one pagoda on the Ordinary Sallampores: Which though not equal to the Advances made by the French will we hope encourage their Merchants to bring in more of the Ordinary sorts.

AGREED to advise the Gentlemen at the Three Northern Settlements, of War being declared with France, to caution them to be upon their Guard & to take the most effectual means for Securing the Honble Company's Effects in Case of any Attempts from the Enemy.

For the more ready communicating any Advices between Us & Bengal during the war, it's agreed to place Tappy Peons at the distance of about three Geutue Miles between this Place & Metchlepatam, to order Mr. Hallyburton to do the same from thence to Maddepollam, as Mr. Saunders from Maddepollam to Ingeram, & the

Gentlemen at Vizagapatam from thence to Ingeram Southward and to Ganjam Northward; To which last place it's agreed to desire the Gentlemen in Bengal to place others, as we are informed was practiced in the last War.

There having no Goods been brought in from the Pettah towards the September Dispatch: It's agreed to enquire into the Cause of it; And that the Managers the Ordered to attend the Board next Consultation for that purpose.

Honele Sir & Sirs

I think it my Duty to acquaint Your Honour &c. of the Difficulties I meet with in getting the Honble Company's Callicoes cured; The Washers on various Pretences have not brought in above 6 Bales a day at any time this year even in the fairest Season though I have frequently punished them for their default and as our Investment is happily so much encreased this year, and to be hoped will continue so to encrease, it will require (with the Northern Cloth that Annually comes to Us brown) Twelve or at least ten Bales to be brought in dayly from the Washers to have our Cloth on hand ready for the Ships, allowing for such Days as may be presumed will not be favourable for the Service; I humbly referr this matter to the Consideration of Your Honour &c. that some measures may be taken to expedite this Important Business since all in my Power have proved ineffectual.

Last Consultation read & Signed.

Captain John Taylor of the Sumatra having departed this Life on Sunday last, it's agreed that Mr. Charles Milne be appointed to the Command of that Ship in his Stead.

AGREED that Five hundred 500 Pagodas be advanced the Storekeeper for disbursements on the Sumatra and on other Accounts.

And that Five thousand 5000 Pagodas be sent overland to St. David's on. Friday next.

The Head Washers attending pursuant to order of last Consultation, and the Board demanding the reasons of their Slowness in Curing the Honble Company's Cloths, they delivered in a Petition as read & entered hereafter urging in their excuse the great increase in the prices of several of the Materials necessary to their business and that without some Addition to the prices at present Allow'd them, they cannot support their Families by their labour & pay a sufficient Number of Cooleys for carrying on their Work, praying therefore an increase of Ten fanams & Corge on the Ordinary & Middling Long Cloths & in proportion on the Salampores. To the said Petition they also Annexed a state of prices at present allowed them on the several Sorts of Goods they Wash for the Company with a Computation of the difference between the Actual Cost of Washing a Corgo of Ordry Long Cloth formerly and at present by which last it appears that they are really Sufferers by washing the Ordinary Long Cloths.

The Board having considered the matter of the Washers petition & being convinced of the truth of what they alledge about the encrease in the prices of their Materials: Considering also of what consequence it is at this juncture to get as much Cloth as possible cured for the Ships expected from the Bay in December and that if the remains of these People are not enabled to Support themselves by their labour at this business they must betake themselves to Tillage or some other employ, as many of them have already done; It was at length agreed not to make any Alteration in the present rates for the Finer Sorts of Goods; But to allow them One Pagoda twenty seven fanams & Corge, for the Ordinary and Middling Long Cloths and thirty fanams. P Corge for the Ordinary & Middling Salampores, with which, though so small an Advance they Appearing pretty well Satisfied, promised their closest application to their business and withdrew.

The Betsey Scooner being bound into the Streights of Malacca, it's agreed to take that opportunity of Advising the Governour and Council there of the War being declared between the Crowns of England and France, and to desire their Care of a Letter, containing the like Advices for the York should she return hither from China.

Mr. Joseph Smith being sent for and attending, was desired to give the Board his Sentiments on the State of our Fortifications and to let us know what he judged most immediately wanting and necessary to the better defence of the place in case of any Attempt from an Enemy; He told us the short time he had been here would not admit of His digesting his particular remarks into proper Order to lay before Us; But that he judged it absolutely necessary immediately to build a Bomb proof Magazine in some convenient part of the White Town, for holding our general Store of Powder, That upon the Island being too far off on any Emergency and not properly Commanded by Our Guns, and the Smaller Magazines in Town at present used for keeping the Powder when brought in from the Island, besides their being so damp as to damage the Powder if kept long in them, were rendered very insecure and liable to Accidents from the insufficient thickness of their Walls, and the Quantity of Ironwork about their Doors, which he proposed as we are obliged to make Use of those Magazines 'till another can be built to have render'd somewhat more safe by making New Doors to them and using Brass or Copper where necessary instead of Iron as at present.

He observed further that the Guns on Our Walls and Bastions are Mounted on Ship Carriages, which we should find very inconvenient in case of any call to Action as some of them being large Ten or Twelve Men would not be able to work them so briskly as three or four could if Mounted on Field Carriages: And how great a difference that would make where the present Establishment of our Gunroom is hardly a Man to a Gun Mounted, He thought it needless to say, He remark'd also that we are very barely Stored with Some Sorts of Warlike Stores and have none of Some others which would be of great Use; Of which he would deliver us a List, and with which he beleived we might be supplied in part from the other Side of India, before we could receive them from England; He recommended also the bringing into Town a good Quantity of Bricks and Chinam, to be in readiness in Case of any Breaches being made in our Walls.

Before Mr. Smith withdrew he told the Board that should they think proper to alter the Gun Carriages he could not find upon enquiry that there were any Timbers to be had in Town fit for the purpose upon which and several other occasions in Case of an Attack it would be found of great use to have a Stock of Timbers & Planks on hand, & he believed we might be furnished with what is wanting from the Malabar Coast; Where upon the Board desired of him & he promised, with the abovementioned List of Stores to deliver in also a List of such Timbers & their Dimentions as he thought most proper for such occasions.

The Board being convinced from what M<sup>r</sup>. Smith said of the necessity of such a Magazine as he proposed directed M<sup>r</sup>. Monson and the Paymaster accompanied by M<sup>r</sup>. Smith to chuse out the most proper part of the Town for erecting such a Magazine, and to lay before the Board a Calculate of it's cost formed from the Dimensions M<sup>r</sup>. Smith should propose.

ORDERED that the Paymaster bring into Town all the Bricks and Chinam he can procure before the Rains set in and that He set about making more as soon as; the Season will permit.

Pandaram &c. Managers of Chindadree Pettah Attending pursuant to Order of last Consultation and the reasons being demanded why they had not brought in any Goods for the September Dispatch, They represent to the Board that the Sums which have been Advanced them, and for which they now stand Indebted to the Honourable Company have been at times paid into the Hands of the Weavers, from whom they have endeavour'd to recover all that was possible: But that several of those Manufacturers had left the place in the last Three or Four Years having sought' relief in the Petta during the time of Scarcity and returned to their Habitations'

when that ceased; that some were dead and many others in such Circumstances as to be unable to lessen any part of their Debts at present which in the whole are Pag\*. 9705. 2. 50, and that they the Managers being by the Death of Audiapa Narrain deprived of the Assistance and Support he gave to this Undertaking are incapable of carrying on the Cloth Manufactory, without a further Advance of Money: With that and the Assistance of the Board they might be able to procure some Cloth, and in a few Years they hoped to discharge their ballance due to the Company: To accomplish which they should use their utmost endeavours.

To this they added that Audiapa Narrain the first promoter and encourager of this Undertaking had laid out considerable Sums in order to encourage the Weavers and other Manufacturers to fix their Residence there, to which purpose he had Erected a Mahometan Mosque and two Pagan Temples which appears by his Accounts to have Cost near Sixteen thousand 16000 Pagodas, & which they mention as an instance how much he had the Welfare of the Pettah at heart: That by the loss of him the Pettah must greatly suffer unless it meets with some Support from the Board, the more so as the Estate of Audiapa is looked upon as insolvent, & his Family, if so render'd incapable of Contributing any more to its benefit and Service.

It was then observed to them that there had been also an Advance of Three thousand Pagodas which was to have been repaid some time ago but had not. To which Chintomby who join'd with Audiapa in this Affair replied that the Board had been pleased to grant them that indulgence for reasons which had been formerly offered, and were at the time deem'd satisfactory: That the building of Houses, Shops and a Choultry had Cost Four thousand Six hundred & ten Pagodas eight fanams and forty five Cash; That the Weavers had not yet been able to pay for their Houses, & therefore he hoped the Board would be pleased still to grant him some further time to comply with that Engagement.

The Several Matters before recited being taken into Consideration, The Board are of Opinion that as to the first part the performances of these People in the Pettah have given so little satisfaction for some time past, That were there any advances to be made them, there are small expectations of their being duely accounted for unless. some Substantial Person would undertake the Employment of the Weavers there, in such case some of the sorts of Cloth might be made there as before, and as the Juncans & carriage would be saved they might do it on reasonable terms, & in case of Troubles in the Country the having these People near us might be of service; But. 'till such a person can be found, we think it best to hold our Hands, as we can now be supplied with these Sorts of Goods from the Country & are under no necessity of running any extraordinary Risque for the procuring of them: That 'till such offers are made Us, the Weavers may find Work from the Town Merchants, who may have opportunities of looking more narrowly after them than it's possible for us to do: However that we do grant the Managers any other Assistance in our Power that this design may not, if possible to be prevented, fail of the end first proposed: since in Case of any disturbances in the Country the Pettah would not want for Manufacturers and might thereby become useful to the Company in their Investment, when other means might fail. That as the present Managers declare their inability at present to pay in their Ballance due to the Company on Account of the Sums due from the Weavers that their Case be referred home, and in the mean time that we endeavour to recover all we possibly can from them, and to that end that it be recommended to them to dispose of what turned out Cloth is now on their Hands unfit for the Europe Market, and that y'. Amount thereof be paid into Cash, And that as to the First Advance of Three thousand Pagodas, The Board for the reasons mentioned by Chintomby are induced to grant him some further time, and also because those Houses, Shops &ct. remain as a Security for that Debt together with the Ground and Gardens, as indeed will every thing else belonging to the Pettah 'till both Accounts are clear'd and as such large Sums have been Advanced for this Account we presume the

THE HUMBLE PETITION OF THE HEAD WASHERMEN.

#### SHEWETH

That it is the greatest Misfortune to your Petrs. to have incurr'd Your Honour &c. displeasure for not bringing in the Company's Cloth faster but your petitioners beg leave to set forth the Reasons from the hardships we labour under:

First, When Paddy was sold at 16 Mercalls for a Pagoda only 3½ Mercals \$\pi\$ Corge were placed to your Petitioners Account for Congee, but Governour Benyon was pleas'd to Order 4 Mercals to be used on a Corge of Long Cloth Ordinary and on the rest in Proportion, but Allow'd your Petitioners no advance pay, thô Paddy at that time was at 13 & 14 Mercals Pagoda, this difference is so Considerable as about 3 fan. P Corge, yet our Loss by Firewood is Still greater for this Article is the Principal in our Expences & this Your Hon. &c. and all the Inhabitants are but too Sensible has been rising by Little & little for many Years in so much that what is requir'd to boil a Corge of Long Cloth now cost 20 fan. which only cost 15 when the present rate of our pay was established; shell Chinam also is so difficult to be got that what Cost then 2 fan. is now 5; and a sort of Clay Necessary for Us that comes from Nagore is risen 1 Fanam & Corge, Soap Limes, Blew &c'. small Articles used on the fine Cloths are likewise much risen, but our Consumption of them is too small to trouble Your Hon. &c. with the particulars but shall compute the difference together at 1 Fan<sup>m</sup>. P Corge. Another grievance we beg leave to mention to your Honour &c'. that lyes heavy upon Us, is that since the Honble Company delivers & pay for Washing the Brown Cloth, we are charged for all damage by Stones, white Ants, Rats or in Boiling, which was not so white the Merchants Accounted with Us for Washing as they can inform Your Hon. &c. Your Petitioners some time ago acquainted the late Governour with this, who order'd your Petitioners to mend what was damaged & promised to Speak to Chintomby to pay the Cooley, which we have not yet received the benefit, but entreat your Hon. &c. will please to confirm; Upon the Whole we beg leave to Assure Your Hon. &c. that Materials of every kind necessary for our Business are so much risen that we can no longer Support our Families by it and allow Wages sufficient to Cooleys to Work for Us, what little we get by the fine Cloths being sunk in the Ordinary, We therefore depend wholly on your Honour &ct. that you will please to consider our Circumstances & encrease our pay half fanam a Piece on the Ordinary and Midling Long Cloths & in proportion for the Salampores, and we shall for ever remember Your Honour &ct. goodness and demonstrate our Acknowledgements by our Pain & Deligence in the Honble Company's Service.

AGREED to send Five thousand Pagodas over land to St. Davids this Evening.

William Monson Import Wareho.kr. pays in Seven thousand Pagodas on Account of Silver Sold.

AGREED that Five thousand Pagodas be advanced Gundaveddy Vencaty Rama & Nella Chitty, on Account of the Investment.

The President acquaints the Board that he has received Advice the Fleury is to be sent from Pondicherry to protect the Trade on the Malabar Coast, & that the Chermant another Ship they expect from France is to be sent to Mahee to load with Pepper for Europe.

AGREED to communicate this Advice to Tellicherry and Anjengo as well as that of War being declared with France, least by any Accident the Intelligence the President Dispatched express to Mess's. Geekie and Bourchier on the Arrival of the Swift Snow should have miscarried.

As it is probable the Season being So far Advanced that the Princess Augusta may proceed directly to the Bay, though perhaps not Arrive there 'till after the dispatch of the Lapwing: It's agreed to referr to the Gentlemen there, if on opening the Advices by her to Us from the West Coast they find the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Council of Marlborough are in want of any immediate Supplies, whether in such Case it may not be proper to return the Princess Augusta with them directly, but to desire if the Lapwing is not Sail'd when the other Arrives, that they will then send the latter to Us with Rice or what else they may think proper, and that they will send twenty or Thirty Barrels of Gun Powder to the West Coast on the Lapwing.

AGREED also to desire of the Gentlemen in the Bay that should the Wager and Godolphin arrive there having any Military or Stores on board for this place, they will send them to us by the first Conveyance.

Mr. Monson and the Paymaster having been with Mr. Smith to look out the most proper place in Town for building a Bomb proof Magazine on, acquaint the Board that the latter had made choice of part of the open space between the Portuguese Church & the North Wall of the inner Fort as the driest situation, & the only Spot where there is room sufficient without the inconvenience of it's adjoining to some of the Houses or their Cookrooms Besides being near the Centre of the Town, and most open to publick View, it is less exposed to any Mischievous Attempts, that he proposed it should contain One thousand Barrels of Powder, for which the following dimensions are required Viz.

Length, within .. Feet 50 Fifty. 20 Twenty. Breadth, within Depth of the Foundation from the Surface 12 Twelve. 12 Twelve. 10 Ten. Breadth of the Foundation below the Surface . . . . Breadth of the Wall, above the Surface
Height of the Wall, above the Surface
Height of the Arch, from the Wall to the Crown • • . . 9 Nine 20 Twenty. 10 Ten. • • Thickness of the Arch

All to be laid in Chinam and inclosed with a Wall at about Twenty Feet distance of Twelve Feet heigh and two Feet thick. The Cost of all which, it's computed will Amount to somewhat less than Four thousand one hundred Pagodas, as by a particular Calculate thereof now delivered in by the Paymaster and entered hereafter.

The Board concurring with Mr. Smith as well in the Choice of the Situation as the necessity of the Work Ordered the Paymaster to set about it immediately that the Foundation may be brought up to the Surface of the Ground before the Rains Set in by which means it will be well settled before the Superstructure is Carried on after the Monsoon.

The President observes to the Board that as there are Tappies now laid on the road as far as Ganjam for the Carrying Advices to and from Bengal, it will be highly necessary to have some person to reside at that place as there are frequent stoppages of the Cossids in those parts, occasioned by disputes between the Moors and Gentues, that by a proper Application to the respective Governments on such Occasions means may be found to obtain a passage for the Peons who are charged with the Letters, so as to prevent their being detaind on the Road: Besides which there is another Affair of some Importance which may also require a Person's being fixed there for some time, which we shall take the liberty to mention on another Occasion; It is therefore Agreed to Nominate Mr. Andrews for that Service, and that he proceed thither as soon as he can with Convenience and as we are informed there is near that place a very large City named Brampore, where there are a great Number of Weavers some said to now want Employ, that he make it his Eusiness to enquire particularly into the State & condition of that City and People, and inform himself if the Ordinary Sallampores of the Companys Musters can be manufactured in that place: Which if to be done we hope may prove of service to Our Honourable Masters, since We have of late Years been furnished with very few Sallampores from Vizagapatam & the Northern Settlements: And the late Advices from those parts giving us more reason to fear a Decrease of those Investments than the carrying them on in a Successful manner.

AGREED to send with Mr. Andrews [...] Five hundred Rupees to defray his Expences on the Ro[ad] and at Ganjam, and also some Broad Cloth and other things proper for the presents he may think it necessary to make if he finds he is likely to do anything there.

No. 119 from the Governour & Council of Pondicherry dated the 17th. instant N.S. which and the Papers it inclosed are read as entered in their Translates in our Letters Received the latter being Copies of some Articles of Agreement concluded between the Settlements of Mahee and Tellicherry in the Years 1728 and 1742, and of a proposal said to be since offered by Mr. Geekie for confirming the same, and also to extend the Conditions with regard to the Vessels on that Coast from Anjengo to Goa subject however to the Approbation of Bombay and Pondicherry. In the letter the Gentlemen of Pondicherry express a desire of including forty Leagues from the Land between those Ports; and that the Agreement should extend within those Limits to all Ships under the Colours of each Nation except Kings Ships which only they say are not under their Authority; To such an Agreement they invite us, and desire to know how far we are Authorized to co-operate with them on the occasion.

The Board having yet received no information from Tellicherry concerning this proposal or the design of it, and room being thereby left us to doubt whether it may not be a Scheme contrived by M<sup>r</sup>. Geekie for the better execution of some purpose respecting the Company's business at Tellicherry and to Gain time to get in the Pepper that may yet remain to be transported from the Adjacent places, in which Case it may be proper to Answer the Pondicherry Letter in such a Manner as may not disconcert any Measures M<sup>r</sup>. Geekie may find it necessary to pursue at this Juncture: A caution that may not be the less necessary on Account of two Ships of Force that went lately for Mahie from Pondicherry: It is therefore judged most prudent not to appear averse to receiving any proposals of such a Nature though we do not hold ourselves Authorized to Concurr in them, but to Affect a Seeming Inclination to Accide to such as may be termed For the common benefit, which may perhaps amuse them till the Gentlemen of Bombay have determined on what is referred to them from Tellicherry which we presume they will do in such a manner as

will ease us of any further Correspondence about it For that part of the Letter wherein the Gentlemen of Pondicherry seem somewhat Anxious to know how far our Authority extends over the Commanders of our Companys Ships it's agreed for many reasons that may make it improper to satisfy them in that point, to evade giving them a direct Answer by telling them it seldom or never falls under our province to dispatch our Company's Ships to the Malabar Coast.

AGREED to transmit a Copy of the Translate of the abovementioned Pondicherry Letter to Bombay with a Copy of our Answer thereto.

The Sale of the last Silver not supplying our Cash equal to the demands of our own and the S<sup>t</sup>. Davids Merch<sup>ts</sup>. it's agreed and ordered that the Warehousekeeper endeavour to dispose of some of the Rupees we have by Us.

The President addressing himself to the Board told us he was in hopes the Correspondence we were forced into by the Gentlemen of Pondicherry had been put an End to by our Letter of the 13th. instant, or that it would at least have lain dormant 'till the Arrival of some of our Shipping yet expected from Europe, by which we may possibly receive some Orders that may warrant us in continuing it but that contrary to Such his hopes they had sent us another Letter dated the 2d. December N:S: on the subject of which he had desired this meeting as soon as he could get it Translated: The same being accordingly read in its Translate, as entered under No. 121, it was found to import that in compliance with a Letter from their Company bearing date Paris the 14th. April 1744, advising of War being declared between the Crowns of England and France, and signifying their Inclinations for maintaining an Harmony & good Intelligence with the English as one of the Trading Nations in the Indies, they, (the Gentlemen of Pondicherry) propose to Us as they have done to our Presidency in Bengal, and now do in an inclosed Letter they desire Us to forward to that of Bombay, the entering into an Engagement for establishing respectively a Tranquility from this side of the Cape of Good Hope as far as China & beyond it, & to that end that we would give directions to our Several Subordinates as well as to both the Company's and our private Shipping not to be Aggressors in any Shape whatever against those of the French Nation, as they had done on their parts.

AGREED to return for Answer to the above Letter that we have not as yet received any Powers from Our Company to enter into such an Agreement, but that so authorized We should not be backward to embrace the offers they make us.

Other General Letters read Vizi.

No. 122 from the President and Council of Fort William of the 29th. September in Answer to what we wrote them the 23th of that month by the Beaufort & Duke of Dorset about the Copper we sold here, Our Indent for Packing Stuff, & the Europe Captains Supplying themselves in the Bay with the Saltpetre at the low Freight and the Men they may want of their Compliments; Advising of their having made up matters with their Nabob, though at a great expence: That they had Reports of two large Armies of Morattas marching to invade that province, and of the Arrival of the Swift Snow & Princess Augusta with Mr. Lennox on board the latter from Fort Marlborough, whither they should send by the first opportunity some Rice and Gunny bags, and that they purpose to send the Princess Augusta directly hither with Rice; Advising also of some Occurrences respecting Our Honourable Masters Ships Colchester, Severn, Duke of Lorrain, Neptune, Grantham, Stafford and Caesar.

No. 123 and 124, both from the Chief & Council of Vizagapatam and dated the 8th instant, The first advising of some disturbances between the Nabob & Rajahs which they expected soon to be accommodated when they hoped for better performances from the Upparra Merchants & in Answer to the directions we sent them about getting their Cloths hither in December; The other serving only to accompany the foregoing Packet from Bengal.

# BY THE MAYOR'S COURT OF MADRASSPATNAM.

Whereas many Suits for Several Years past have been Commenced by and against the Natives and others, within the Jurisdiction of this Court, on claims of very long Standing, To the great disquiet of the Inhabitants of the Place; The Issue of many of which have been, That the Court have laid under a necessity to determine the same on presumptive and Circumstantial proofs, when earlier Applications would have set the Matters in Clearer lights, and consequently enabled them to Judge thereof with

much greater certainty. And Whereas it is the Opinion of this Court That such Causes as draw their Originals from so Obsolete times, are often by the Complaints rather prosecuted from a Spirit of prejudice or Revenge than a just Right: and Probably, nay it's feared, have and may be attended with ill Consequences to Young Branches of Families among the Natives; Who have been, and now are frequently sued for Debts and Contracts entered into by their Ancestors, even before any of the Defendants were born, and when all the Witnesses that were privy to the Transactions are Dead. Wherefore as This Court is empowered by the Royal Charter to Frame such Rules of Practice, and to do all such other things as shall be found necessary for the Administration of Justice, and the due Execution of all or any of the Powers given them by the said Charter and as by Act of Parliament all Actions on Specialties are limited to twenty years, and Simple Contracts to six years, from the time the Cause of Action commenced (except as therein and hereinafter is Excepted) And as this Court cannot determine whether the Cadjans and papers, made use of by the Natives, commonly Called Bonds, ought to be deemed Specialties or Simple Contracts, as they are without any Certain Form: And as it is Apprehended the Restraining them to a Medium Term for the Prosecution of their Actions, rather than either of those prescribed by the Statute of Limitations will be more beneficial and better Adapted to the Constitution of the Place. This Court doth therefore Order and direct That no Suit, Action, Bill or Plaint shall be commenced or received in this Court from and after the Twentieth day of November which shall be in the Year of our Lord 1746 Unless the same shall be prosecuted within Ten Years from and after the Cause of Such Suit or Action has Arisen or shall Arise. Provided Nevertheless That nothing herein contained shall be Deemed Construed Accepted or taken to Debar any Infant under the Age of Twenty one Years, Persons of unsound Mind, imprisoned, or beyond the Seas, from their Actions, so as they do take the same, within the time before limited, after their being of full Age, of sound memory, at Large, and returned from beyond the Seas, as other Persons, having no Such Impediment should have

Nairo Cashava Chintomby and Anda Kistnama Chitty Old Farmers of the Ruby Brokerage pay in Two hundred and Fifty 250 Pagodas in full for Six Months rent due the 10th. June last, when that last Cowle expired.

AGREED that Four thousand 4000 Pagodas be Advanced Gundaveddy Vencata Ramah and Nella Chitty & One thousand 1000, to Tremungalom Comrapa on Account of the Investment & 2500 to Molinga Kistna on Acc<sup>t</sup>. of Goods brought in by him.

The President acquaints the Board he has received Advice from the Country that upon the repeated reports of the Design of the Morattas to invade this and the adjacent provinces, our Nabob set out some days past to join his Forces with those of the other Subahs of Corrapa and Cundanore to oppose the Morattas and that they are to be further Assisted by a detachment from Nizam's Army which was already set out under the Command of Sied Laskar Cawn to meet the others at the Passes; But the same Advices imported also that Messengers have been dispatched from the United Subahs to offer the Morattas a pretty large Sum of Money, which it was judged by most people would be preferred by the King of Sittarrah to the uncertain chance of a Battle with the combined Forces of those Subahs.

AGREED to communicate these Advices to the Gentlemen at St. Davids.

M'. Joseph Smith attending represents that some Alterations are wanting at the Island Powder House where the Powder is made to render it capable of two Stamps more and that for it's greater Security Brass or Copper ought to be made use of for the Bands, Nails, Rivets &c'. instead of Iron as at present. Ordered that the Paymaster make such alterations there as M'. Smith has described, and under his direction to the Workmen.

The President acquaints the Board that this being the usual time of the Year for Tomby Chitty, and his Partners to pay in the Five thousand Pagodas towards the discharge of their ballance he had sent to him to put him in Mind thereof and to demand the same, but that he had received for Answer that they could not possibly make that Payment good at this time, they having received no part of the Broad Cloth that had been sent from Europe this Season; That as the time drawing nigh for the making up the Merchants Accounts in order to their being transmitted to Europe makes it necessary to come to some determination with regard to this demand he had therefore directed Tomby Chitty and his Partners with Telesinga Chitty and Nellamoota Comrapa Chitty to be in Attendance here this day.

The said Merchants being called in the Board demanded of Tomby Chitty and his Partners the reasons of their not complying with the Agreement they made in August 1739 to pay in Five thousand Pagodas annually in discharge of their ballance and received the same Answer from them as the President repeated, to which they added that they could not urge any thing against the justness of the Debt, and were sensible they were obliged to pay it but that the low Circumstances we knew they were reduced to by the losses they sustain'd in the service of the Honourable Company of which this Board as well as the Company have hitherto shewn so generous a Compassion render'd it impossible for them to pay that annual Five thousand Pagodas without the indulgence of a share of the Broad Cloth was continued to them, and which they could not help thinking was engaged to them by the Board in 1739 'till their Debt should be cleared.

The Merchants being directed to withdraw, that the Board might more freely consider of and debate on their Plea, and a reference being thereupon had to several Passages relative thereto in the Consultations of 1739 and the Subsequent Letters on the Subject to and from England, It appeared that the Chittys then applied for the Broad Cloth as a means to enable them to pay their Ballance, yet we find no more is therein promised them than the Two hundred Bales, but that it has been allowed them since that time to 1743, after which they were called in and it was remarked to them that it was not clear by the passage of the Consultation of the 21st August 1739 then read to them, that the Board were obliged further than for a Share of the Broad Cioth that Year: Upon which Telesinga Chitty said he could not tell how that passage might be worded on our Consultations but he knew his own intention at the time the Agreement was made, that it had been delivered them ever since 'till this year, and he had always understood that such a share of the Broad Cloth was engaged to them thereby 'till the Debt of his Brother and Partners was clear'd, and 'twas fully in that opinion that he undertook what he then did, and the Board and all other reasonable Men must know, it was not the Profits on the two Hundred Bales granted them in 1739, or on what they had received since that could enable his Brother & Partners to pay of a Debt of 38000 Pagodas: And with some little Warmth added that he had always esteemed the indulgence of the Broad Cloth as a very great obligation, on Himself & Family; That a grateful Sense of that obligation, and a concern for His Brothers reduced Circumstances were the only Motives which influenced him to engage in the Investment in hopes therby [sic] in time to extricate his Brother and Partners out of the difficulties they laboured under, and that the Company might be paid their due: That those hopes were all the advantage he reaped by engaging in a business to which he has sacrefised [sic] his whole time & Attention and in which he has exposed his fortune to very great risques, that the Brokerage as well as the profits on the Broad Cloth that had been delivered them were all thrown into the Payments, besides a Sum annualy [sic] collected amongst the Family, by

those helps alone his Brother had hitherto been able to make the Payments and reduce the Debt to about 13000 Pagodas: That if the Board thought fit to let them have the Broad Cloth he would engage that the Five thousand Pagodas now demanded shall be paid before the Ships sail for England, and by that indulgence being continued another Year and his Assistance he did not doubt but his Brothers ballance would be very near if not quite clear'd; But if the Honourable Company or we resolved to discontinue that indulgence he should see it in such a light as might serve to check in some measure his Assiduity to a business by which he risqued his fortune & got nothing but the satisfaction of rendering himself serviceable to the Honble Company and his unfortunate Relations: That he Appeal'd to the Board if he had not done every thing on his part that he had engaged for, having Invested for the Company near 200000 Pagodas since his entrance into this Business and therefore he hoped he had some title to a favourable regard and that it might also be extended to his unhappy Brother, Concluding with a desire, that what he had here offered might not be taken amiss in regard to any expressions he had made use of, since it was on an Affair which had given him the greatest concern of Mind.

The Board having again ordered the Merchants to withdraw spent some time in debating on what Measures might be proper to take in this Affair, and at length agreed to wait the Arrival of the Shipping from Bengal, by whom we may expect to know more fully our Honble Masters Pleasure in these matters, before We proceed to extremities with them, with which they were again called in & acquainted and then dismissed.

Four for Mr. Foxal Four for Mr. Starke and

One for Captain Tullie; Whereupon the Court had ordered him to wait on Us, and desire our Opinion how they were to Act and whether the Mayor had a Casting Vote in such a Case, or whether they were to proceed to another Ballot. The Charter and Instructions being silent in this Instance and no Precedent occurring paralel [sic] thereto, though it was remember'd that in Mr. Hastings's time our Honourable Masters did not allow their President a Casting Vote: The Board directed the Register to give it the Court as our Opinion that there is no Casting Vote in the Mayor, unless it had been so directed by the Charter, and that therefore the Court ought to proceed to another Election. The Register in a short time returning acquainted the Board that on another Ballot the Choice had fallen on Mr. Sidney Foxal, who Attending with the other Members of the Court takes the Oaths of Allegiance and Office as did also Mr. John Savage Chosen Sheriff for the ensuing Year.

Before the Register withdrew, he paid in by order of the Court Fifty Pagodas for a Fine levied by them on Henry De Veil, one of their Attorneys.
