The Consultations and Diary Book of Nicholas Morse Esqr. President and Governour &c. Council of Fort St. George Containing Their Proceedings and Transactions in the Affairs of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies Relating to the Presidency on the Coast of Choromandel Began 1st. January 1744-5.

The President produces to the Board a Letter which being opened and read was found to be from the Secret Committee bearing date the 18th. April last: Advising of some of His Majesty's Ships of War being intended for these Parts, ordering Us to Supply the Captains with what Moneys they may want for Stores and Provisions, and directing the Rate of the Exchange.

The President then told the Board that the said Letter was forwarded to him from Tranquebar and came inclosed in one from Captain Edward Peyton Commander of his Majestys Ship the Medway wherein he Advised him of his leaving Madagascar in October in Company with Commodore Barnet in the Deptford and the Preston, and that on his Arrival at Acheen the 23^d. November in Company with the Dolphin, he found lying there the Favoretta a French Companys Ship of Fifty Guns of which he made Prize; That on their leaving Acheen the 14th. December they had taken the Ship with them on their Cruize with the French Captain, his Son and the Purser but that they had released the rest of the Ships Company being about One hundred and Sixty Men on their Parole not to bear Arms against the King of Great Britain or his Subjects for Six months, and that the said Men were come over on the Danes Ship to Tranquebar.

That we may not be unprepared to comply with the Commands of the Secret Committee in Case of any of His Majestys Ships coming to this Port it's agreed and Ordered that the Paymaster Set about procuring a Quantity of Oxen and Hogs and to request of the Gentlemen of Bombay to Supply us with about Eight hundred or a thousand Bags of Jamboosier Wheat, which we beleive will be a more acceptable and proper food for their Men than Rice.

AGREED also to Advise to Tellicherry of the Arrival of the English Men of War in India and of what has passed between Us and Pondicherry on the Proposal made Us from the last.

It being also considered that it will be much more convenient to have Some place ready for the reception of the Sick Men that may come ashore from His Majesty's Ships than to mix them with those of the Garrison, besides that the Accommodations of our Hospital are too Confined even for our own People. It's agreed and Ordered that the Paymaster accompanied by the Surgeons do Survey the Granary on the Island and report to the Board whether it may not be made to Serve that purpose; ORDERED also that the Paymaster get provided a Quantity of Hospital Cloathing with Cots and other things necessary for the Sick Men.

General Letters read Viz^t.

N^o. 1 from the President and Council of Bombay dated the 30th. November advising of the dispatch of the King William for England that the Amsterdam Gazettes lately received *viā* Persia mention four of the Honourable Company's Ships leaving England for India in June and four Men of War Sail'd in May for protecting the Company's Trade in these Parts; That the Vessels we desired, shall be Sent us, And inclosing a List of Warlike Stores they purpose to Send Us in compliance with our request of the 24th. September.

N^o. 2 from the Chief and Council of Tellicherry of the 15th. December inclosing the foregoing, mentioning the Same Europe News and Advising that the Chermant, the Fleury and another small Ship from this side were lying at Mahie; The first of which would soon be filled up with Pepper for Europe.

N^o. 3, A Translate of a Letter from the Governour and Council of Pondicherry dated the 11th. Instant N.S. telling us that in compliance with the Commands of their Superiours they are obliged to reclaim their Company's Ship the Favory with all belonging to her taken by the Medway and Dolphin, and desiring we will give them a positive Answer whether not only that Ship but all such as shall have been taken before they became Aggressors against Us shall not be restored.

For that part of the foregoing Letter wherein the Gentlemen of Pondicherry reclaim the Favoretta it's agreed in Answer thereto to referr them to the Commodore of the British Squadron in the Indies, And in Answer to their Quære to tell them, That without Orders first obtained for that purpose it is not in our power to restore any ship that may be taken at any time during the Course of the War.

—FORT ST. GEORGE, JANUARY 1744-45—

The President acquaints the Board that he has this Morning received Advice from the Country, that an Army of Morattas consisting of Seventy thousand Horse were Advanced within Four days March of the Kistna and that the King of Sittarra refusing the Offers hitherto made by Nizam and the Several Nabobs, demanded also Tritchanopoly to be restored to him, besides the usual Choutai; The former of which having been refused them it is Apprehended they will endeavour to possess themselves of it by force of Arms.

As it is not unlikely the Morattas will take their Rout through this Province, it's agreed to caution the Gentlemen at S^t. David's to be Sparing in their advances to their Merchants, 'till we can learn with more certainty that matters are likely to be accommodated; It's agreed also to Advise them to be on their Guard, as the Capture of the Favory at Acheen may possibly put their Pondicherry Neighbours upon Some Enterprize against them.

The Paymaster acquaints the Board that pursuant to order of last Consultation he has been with the Surgeons to Survey the Grainery on the Island which they find may be made fit for the reception of the Men of War's Sick People by opening a few Windows for the Benefit of Air, and some other Small Alterations which he computes will not Cost above Two hundred Pagodas, ORDERED that he set about them forthwith.

The President reads the Cash Account for last month, ballance remaining now compared with the Chest, Twenty Two thousand eight hundred twenty five Current Pagodas ten fanams and two Cash 22825. 10. 2 & Thirteen hundred fifty eight 1358 Madrass Pagodas.

AGREED that Two thousand 2000 Pagodas be Advanced the Paymaster towards the disbursements of the month.

N^o. 4, from M^r. John Andrews at Ganjam of the 17th. Ultimo, Advising of his Arrival, giving us hopes of his being able to make an Investment there, having obtained the necessary Phirmaunds and Dustocks, and desiring a supply of Money and Packing Stuff.

N^o. 5, from M^r. Hallyburton at Madepollam dated the 26th. Ultimo giving Us hopes that the Advances we have Allowed on the Ordinary Cloths will have a good Effect on his Investment: Inclosing His monthly Papers for November, An Indent for Wares and Stores wanting there and the Accounts of that Investment for the last Year to be transmitted to England.

The Paymaster delivers in as entered hereafter the particulars of the Cost of the Alterations made at the Island Powder House pursuant to our Order of the 10th. Ultimo, amounting to Five hundred & forty Pagodas fourteen fanams & forty five Cash 540. 14. 45.

The Import Warehousekeeper pays in One thousand 1000 Pagodas in further part for Rupees Sold.

AGREED that the following Advances be made out of Cash on Account of the Investment Viz^t.

Four thousand 4000 Pagodas to Sunca Vencaty Rama & Ambaltau dy.

Three thousand 3000, to Tellinginga Chitty & Nellamoota Comrapa Chitty &

Two thousand 2000, to Gundaveddy Vencata Rama & Nella Chitty.

The President acquaints the Board that by Some of the Gentlemen arrived on the Penha from Malacca he is informed, That the Hardwicke Captain Hallet bound for China made the Ladrone Islands the 25th. July, where a fisher Boat put him on board with two Letters Signed BRITANNIOUS giving him an Account that there were lying among the Islands Four Spanish Ships fitted out from Manilha to intercept all English Shipping bound into Canton, One of sixty four Guns, One of Fifty, another of Twenty six, and a fourth of Fourteen, and that their Compliments were Said to be in all Fifteen hundred Men: Upon which Captain Hallet went to Amoy, the ill treatment he received there obliged him to leave the port and return to Malacca, where he arrived the 17th. November after a very hazardous Passage: He Sail'd from thence the 2^d. December, and it was said intended to lye 'till next Season at Batavia; The President added, He was also informed that those Advices proceeded from Mess^{rs}. Hall, Lauder and Vincenti, who were endeavouring the means of giving the same Intelligence to all English Ships bound that way, whereby it is to be hoped the rest of the Company's and the Private Shipping bound for China will have the good fortune to escape the danger though with the loss of a Season.

As it may be of great Consequence to Our Honourable Masters to have the earliest Advice of this matter it's agreed to transmit it to the Gentlemen of Bombay proposing to them to forward it by express overland, As we did yesterday to go by a Danes Ship from Tranquebar.

On the hopes Mr. Andrews gives of his being able to do some Business for the Company at Ganjam, it's agreed to order the Gentlemen at Vizagapat^m. to Send him a present Supply of Ten thousand Rupees and to recommend to him to be particularly careful of the Quality of the Cloth he receives at first, As also if he can, to Send his Goods up Cured and marked only with Gentue Characters.

A Letter from Mr. Stratton read as entered hereafter, on the Subject of the Ship Jaggernaut Persand. AGREED to refer the remarks we may find proper to make thereon to the General Letter to England.

PRESIDENT AND GOVERNOUR &c^r. COUNCIL OF FORT ST. GEORGE.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Mr. Savage your Secretary having Signified to me That its your desire I should give you some Account of my Proceedings and the Orders I gave Mr. Thomas Pitt when I was Chief of Vizagapatam Relating to the Ship Jaggernaut Persand that was Wrecked near that Settlement and also shewn me the Several Passages in your Consultations & Letters relating thereto, In Obedience I am to Inform your Honour &c^{sa}. That Sometime in the Month of September 1742, I Received a Letter from Mr. Thomas Pitt who was then at Upparra Advising the Loss of a Ship near that Place

belonging to Mr. Coteworth's Banyan and that his Master was part Concerned therein Upon Receipt whereof I dispatched Peons with Directions to Secure every thing that might be driven Ashore from that Ship for the Benefit of the Concerned And that no ill Consequence might hap'n to My Honourable Masters Affairs on this Account I dispatched other Peons with Letters One to Alley Cooley Cawn, the Nabob of the Province, Advising him of the Accident & to Request his best Assistance therein, and Enclosed Said Letter to Mustey Cooley Cawn He being personally Acquainted with Mr. Coteworth during the Time the Cuttack Country was under his Government for the delivery thereof. That on Return of my Peons I received an Answer to said Letters particularly by One from the Nabob Assuring me that he was Extreemly well pleased it Lay in his Power to be of Service to the English for that he had Always a very great regard for the People of that Nation And therefore Enclosed his Phirmaund to me for Mr. Pitt to take into his Possession what might be Driven Ashore belonging to the People of the Aforementioned Ship ; And I am also to Acquaint this Honble Board That the Chief Reason which Induced me to Engage in this Affair was my having no room to doubt from Mr. Pitts representation of the matter but that the ship belonged to the English on that they were Concerned in her & a Circumstance of the like Nature that hapned in the Time of my Prodecessor Mr. Charles Simpson who hearing of the Loss of a Ship near Penticott belonging to the some persons Residing at Bengall, made Application to the Rajah of that district, Upon which he sent his Peons and secured every thing for the Benefit of the Unfortunate.

And I flatter my self It will Appear by the Letters now Lying before this Honble Board that I had no Sinister Veivs in the Transactions Aforementioned, Hereby declaring that my Chief Motive for Interfering in this Affair was to Render my Fellow servants By my station All the Service in my Power, not Suspecting in the Lest that my Honble Masters would in my Respect have Suffered by Endeavouring to Secure the property of those who I Apprehended had a right to Claim my best Assistance, What Letters Mr. Pitt wrote to the Gentlemen of Bengal Concerning the Loss of this Ship were without my Privity or Knowledge so that if any Errors have been Committed in the Advices Transmitted to that Place I hope I shall not be Charged with Mismanagement on that Account as most of the Transactions in that Affair Subsequent to my first Application to the Country Government, have happened Since my leaving Vizagapatam.

The Sloop Waltier being about to return to Vizagapatam, it's agreed to send on her Such [of] the Wares and Stores indented for from thence as we can Spare ; And that [Ste]phen de Stutter do also go thither on her to make a draught of their present Fortifications & the Additions lately proposed from thence, whereby M^r. Smith may be better able to judge of their propriety and Usefulness & to give Us his opinion thereon.

The President acquaints the Board that on M^r. Hallyburton's representing to him as well as in his General Letter of the 1st. September last his Apprehension that the New Phousdar of Metchlepatam would not allow the Chay Goods he had provided, to be shipped off, He had wrote the said Phousdar on the occasion, who had in Answer promised they should be permitted to be carried away when ever they were Sent for. But that he had since been informed he had altered his mind, and had again given Orders for their being detain'd, he had thought it proper therefore to dispatch an Armenian Merchant now here, named Coja Mirzan, but belonging to that place and acquainted with the Phousdar there, to endeavour to prevail on him to give Licence for the Goods to be sent away, or to demand his Reasons for such a Conduct

One from Bengal Presidency; One from England by the Godolphin; Two from the West Coast by the Princess Augusta and Godolphin; A Letter from the Resident at Moco Moco; Another from the Companys Agents at Bussorah, And another from M^r. Macket off Ingellee. Captain Stevens withdrawing the several Packets were opened & found to agree with their respective Lists. Then were read

Our Honourable Masters Commands by the Godolphin under date the 21st. March last: A Letter from the Secret Committee by the Same Conveyance dated the 23^d. of that month and Copy of a Letter from the Duke of New Castle to the Chairman Notifying the French Kings having declared War against England, which with Several News Papers came inclosed in the Letter.

General Letters read viz^t.

From the President and Council of Fort William by the Beaufort of the 15th. Ultimo which being a Copy of what was before received and entered under N^o. 9, The List of the Packet ~~of~~ Beaufort only is copied in our Letters Received after N^o. 10.

N^o. 11 from M^r. Macket off Ingellee dated the 3^d. instant advising of the dispatch of the Beaufort hither & her draught of Water.

N^o. 12, and 13 both from Fort Marlborough, The First dated the 31st. July with a Supplement of the 7th. August, and Signed by M^r. Rigg &c^t. Council containing an Account of their Transactions in the Honourable Company's Affairs on that Coast 'till the departure of the Princess Augusta: Inclosing an Indent for Wares and Stores and Several Books and Papers particularized in the List entered after the said Letter. The other dated the 6th. Septem^r. and Signed by M^r. Greenslate &c^t. Council giving an Acco^t. of Occurrences in the Honourable Company's Affairs there from the departure of the Princess Augusta, to that of the Godolphin; Inclosing an Additional Indent for Stores and Several other Papers particularised in the List of their Packet by the last of those Ships, entered after the said Letter. Among these last were Copies of Two Letters from the General and Council of Batavia to Fort Marlborough dated the 20th. June and 15th. August N.S. and of One prepared by the Council at Fort Marlborough to Send to Batavia in Answer thereto sometime in September, concerning the Seizing the Company's Sloop Mary with two of their Servants at Batavia and a Claim made by those Gentlemen on some of Our Honourable Masters possessions on the West Coast, all which being read, this Board think it of So great consequence that Our Honourable Masters Should not fail of being acquainted with the Subjects they treat of: That it's agreed and Ordered that those also be entered in Our Letters Received after the Letter last read, lest by any Accident they should be disappointed of those Advices by the Cæsar and Lapwing.

N^o. 14 from M^r. Greenslate Resident at Moco Moco dated the 10th. July last acknowledging the Receipt of the Letter we wrote him by the Brilliant.

N^o. 15, from Mess^{rs}. Dorrill and Graves dated Bussorah the 2^d. July last containing Advices of War being declared between England and France, inclosing Copy of his Britanick Majesty's Declaration and several Extracts of Letters confirming the Same, Advising also that they were given to expect a Second Siege.

N^o. 16, from the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort S^t. The Board then debating on the best Method of getting the Cloth lying ready at S^t. David's up hither towards the dispatch of the Durrington and Beaufort for Europe, those Ships bringing Advice that the Neptune belonging to the French Company of thirty or Forty Guns lay ready at the Rivers Mouth to proceed to Pondicherry and the French giving out that they have besides large Ships of War coming into India, which if true some of them may possibly come on this Coast before those Goods reach Us, It was at length agreed to dispatch those Ships to fetch the Bales, and the Benjamin in Company with them, and for the greater Security of the Ships and the Honourable Company's Estate they will have on board, to Send a Party of Soldiers on each Ship viz^t.

The whole party to be under the Command of Lieutenant Southby, to whom it's agreed that our Orders shall be To Assist to the Utmost of his power, in the defence of the said Ships if Attacked by an Enemy.

AGREED to Advise the Gentlemen at S^t. Davids of our resolution to send these Ships thither as soon as they can be got ready that they may be prepared to give them the quickest dispatch, directing them to divide the Goods they have ready equally between the Durrington and Beaufort.

Having reason to beleive the Commanders of these Ships will enlist what Men they can on the Coast and as the present State of Our own or the S^t. David Garrison can but ill spare any, it's agreed by way of Caution to transmit the Gentlemen at Fort S^t. David the Substance of what Our Honourable Masters are pleased to say on that Subject in the 17th. and 64th. Paragraphs of their Letter of the 21st. March last, and as an encouragement to their Men whose times are out, to Reenter, to permit them to make the term of Relisting three years instead of Five, which it's agreed to make the Experiment of here.

AGREED also to direct that Our Hon^{ble} Masters Commands respecting M^r. Croke in the 71st. par^a of the same Letter be complied with, And to Send thither on the Durrington such as we can Spare of the Wares and Stores indented for from thence.

Robert Oldham Soldier and Thomas Nicholls one of the Gunroom Crew petition for their discharges which are granted, they having Served out their Contracted times.

An Order to Captain Stevens of the Beaufort Signed to Send ashore the Packing Stores put on board him for Us in Bengal.

After which the Board proceeded to take into consideration what Our Honourable Masters had recommended to Us in the 34th. paragraph of their Com^{md}. of the 21st. March 1743, for the Sale of their Broad Cloth at Out Cry, in which we should be very ready to Shew an exact Compliance, if on the other Hand the Merchants plea offer'd

in Consultation of the 10th. December for delivering part to them did not demand our Serious Attention as Affecting nearly the Interest of the Honourable Company at this Juncture, for contrary to their expectation in the 46th. paragraph of said Letter the Ballances of Tomby Chitty Molinga Kistna and Ponapah Chitty are not yet cleared as they seem to have imagined might have been by this Time, and that part of those Debts will be irrecoverable without some Indulgence of this Nature is beyond dispute, at the same time that we can have no dependance on the present Set of Merchants continuing to render us any Valuable Service without some Assistance, especially at a time when the Morattas are on the Frontiers and the Country yet in a very distracted State, when they all need Some incitement to stand their Ground amidst the continual Alarms of their Approach, that as it is to be hoped Our Honourable Masters will soon become almost the Sole Importers into Europe of Goods from this Coast It is of the Greatest importance to their Interest to Spirit up the Merchants to bring in a large Quantity of Goods and to make their Advances in the Weaving Towns in order to improve the Advantage which the incapacity of the French may give them. That we must beleive Tellesinga Chitty's sincere in declaring his Sense of the Matter to have been that the Broad Cloth should be Annually delivered 'till his Brother's Debt was paid off, at the same time his present request must be acknowledg'd to be well supported by it's having been delivered to them ever since 1739, Though we were even to pay no regard to the Merit of an exact Compliance with his Stipulations in this respect. We hope therefore if We admit the Arguments Tellinginga uses in behalf of his Brother and self, they will Appear also to Our Honourable Masters so equitable that they may think us on Our Guard against being imposed upon by mere pretences, and solicitous to Clear Accounts so far as the exigency of Cases leaves room to Act, that the Debt of Tomby Chitty and his Partners in 1739 was Thirty five thousand Pagodas which has been reduced Annually ever since Five thousand, and is now Thirteen thousand and with the Payment offered by Tellinginga will then be no more than Eight thousand in the Account now to be sent home.

Our New Merchants declaration on Entering into the Investment this Year is withall to be considered whereby they plainly gave Us to Understand that they would not hold themselves obliged to provide Goods another Year on the bare Terms of Brokerage.

Our Sentiments are further confirmed by the following reasons which Occur in debating this Affair namely that Our Honourable Masters have not been Averse to grant them some Support, that besides lowering Tomby Chittys Debt it may be the means to save the Family from utter ruin, who we cannot but esteem entitled to all reasonable indulgence as they have for a long Series of Time been engaged in the Service of the Honourable Company, and who have been in the Number of the Principal Inhabitants of the Place. It will reconcile the Minds of Tellinginga & Nella Moota, who might otherwise be greatly Chagrined to find their hopes of extricating their Family out of their troubles entirely frustrated, for which alone they have undertaken the Business for Several Years, ran the risque of their Fortunes and devoted their time and trouble without the least Advantage accruing to themselves, that we may yet engage them to go on briskly with the business as they have done this Year, the Outstanding Debts of Molinga Kistna and Ponapa will be reduced and Sunca Rama and Gundaveddy Vencaty Rama prevail'd on to continue with willingness without raising the Brokerage which We would Avoid if possible for the present; In fine by distributing the Broad Cloth amongst the General Sett of Merchants the Honourable Company will be recovering their ballances and We shall hereby secure for them a Set of Men capable of executing our purpose to Satisfaction, Whereas if these should break of, we shall be quite at a loss where to get others on whom we can depend to serve them with the like punctuality, as these have in their Ten Months Service brought in Upwards of Sixteen hundred Bales.

All which Circumstances being maturely Weighed the Board are Unanemous in Opinion that if the Merchants will undertake the Investment this Year, and engage to go on with Vigour, that it will answer the purposes abovementioned, be doing the Honourable Company good Service and for their true Interest to grant them for this

Year the Broad Cloth on hand, and therefore 'tis agreed to send for them next Consultation in order to be fully satisfied herein, and that we may be abler to give Our Honourable Masters an Account thereof by the Ships now under Dispatch.

As we shall soon be in want of Cash for the business of the Investment, and as the difficulty of disposing of Silver just at the time our Occasions require, may be of bad consequence besides that we have no room to expect a rise in it's price; It's agreed to dispose of the Benjamins, and the President and Warehousekeeper are desired to look out for Purchasers.

April last, whereby the Expences of the Coast for that Year appear to have exceeded those of the preceeding Two thousand four hundred Sixty eight Pagodas six fanams and Eighteen Cash 2468. 6. 18, and the Revenues to have decreased in that time Seven thousand five hundred Seventy one Pagodas Eleven fanams and fourteen Cash 7571. 11. 14; And as therein are set forth the particulars of the Increase of the Expence and Decrease of the Revenues at each respective Settlem^t. with the Causes thereof, We think they will Appear So clear to our Honourable Masters and that neither of them have proceeded from any want of Attention in their Servants on the Coast, that We judge it unnecessary to Add any further remarks on them in this place and at this Season.

The Sea and Land Customer deliver in at the Same time the States of those Revenues as Severally Collected by them at the Sea Gate and Choultry from Primo January 1743/44, to Ultimo December 1744.

The former Shewing a Small increase on the Custom on Goods, but a decrease on the whole of the Revenue Collected by him in that time of Three thousand Six hundred twenty two Pagodas four fanams & thirty one Cash 3622. 4. 31.

The Merchants Attending according to Order of last Consultation and being Asked if they would engage with Us for this Year's Investment, Answered that if the Board were pleased to indulge them in what they requested, they Should endeavour to do their utmost for the Honourable Company otherwise that they must expect to be Sufferers in the Business upon which the Board came to a Resolution to let them have the Broad Cloth in the following Proportions,

One third to Tellisinga and Nella Moota Comrapa Chitty on the above condition of their going on with the business, And the payment of Five thousand Pagodas into Cash on Account of Tomby Chitty and Partners before these Ships Sail for Europe.

One third to Molinga Kistna and Ponapa Chitty on condition that all Advantages arising therefrom as well on the Sale of Broad Cloth, as the Brokerage on the Calicoes they bring in shall be made good to the Company in discharge of their Ballance, And

The remainder to be equally divided between Sunca Vencaty Rama & Ambaltauady, And Gundaveddy Vencaty Rama & Nella Chitty, On their engaging to continue in the Business & their best Attention to the Investment.

The Nabob's Minister not chusing to Send the Money here for the Rupees but proposing to give Orders to the Officers who are Collectors of the Revenues in the Province to send the Produce of the Rents when received to make good the payments for the Rupees which he wants to have delivered him immediately. It's agreed to acquaint him that our method of Business will not permit Us to engage with him on any other Terms than those before offered him.

The President reads to the Board as entered hereafter a Letter dated the 2^d. January, received from M^r. Sconemille the Chief for the Ostend Affairs in Bengal, in which he mentions his having Sent up his Lady to this Place on the Augusta in Order for her Residing here And of his intention to proceed to Pegue, and making some Offers of Service for Setling Affairs there for the Advantage of the English Nation.

As this Gentlemen is in open War with the Moors and reported to be going out with a Fleet from Bengal with a design to take their Ships as he has already done three belonging to the Merchants of Metchlepatam a Port on this Coast, And that the Moors may take Umbrage at our giving protection to any belonging to him, & as it may produce some ill consequences, to the English Affairs It's agreed that the Lady be told it will not be convenient for Us to comply with the Request of M^r. Schonamille for her being here, though in never so private a Manner as it cannot escape the knowledge of the Moors, & that she be desired to withdraw to any Place she chuses out of the English Government.

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

The foregoing is a State of the Customs collected at the Choultry for the Years 1743 & 1744, in the latter of which there is a Decrease of no less than Pag^a. 913. 4. 36; and as they fell considerably Short in the Year 1743 of what they were the preceeding Year Your Honour & c^t. as well as our Honourable Masters will expect that I should Account for their being So very low as they are at present; which is Occasioned (as I shall particularly Specify at the bottom of this) in the first place by a so much smaller Quantity of Lampasses, Chints, Handkerchiefs, Allejars, Palampores, Syrases and other Manilha Goods cleared at the Choultry the last than the former Year as sinks the Customs about 330 Pagodas, which You will not be Surprized at, as there was no Ship sent to Manilha the last year, Whereas the Year before there were two; and as a farther Consequence of this, the Quantity of Moorees the last year, brought in chiefly to be painted for the Manilha Trade, is So much less than that of the preceeding, as Occasions a Decrease of the Customs upon that Article, the Sum of 320 Pagodas more. The Trade to Pegu has been long at a low Ebb; but as the last year there went thither only one Small Vessel, and in the year 1743 two Ships, a Brigantine & a Sloop, there is a farther Decrease in the Customs on Pegue Goods, to which I will add those for the Eastward in general, of near 280 Pagodas. Your Honour & c^t. will not, I presume, Require me to be Minute in the Difference on the Several smaller Species of Goods, which are always fluctuating, and of which there is upon Some an Increase, and on others a Decrease, though on the most Material of them a Decrease of above 100 Pagodas; but then the Custom on those which pay only 2½ % Cent, which are chiefly for home Use, and are the Wear and Consumption of the poorer Sort of People is risen the last Year 135 Pag^a. above what it Amounted to in 1743. This I Suppose will be Sufficient to explain what has occasioned so great a Decrease in the Customs the last year, and Your Hon^r. & c^t. must be Sensible I have no great Reason to hope, that by the utmost Care and Diligence I shall be able to raise them this, though my Endeavours shall not be wanting to that purpose.

I have desired my Wife to continue in Madrass incognito, which I hope will meet with Your Honours approbation, which favour shall ever be esteemed by

FROM NABOB ANWARADEAN CAWN BHAUDER, SOOBAN OF THE PROVINCE, AT
MADEGIRY NEAR BASSAWAPATAM RECEIVED MARCH THE 2^d. 1744/5.

I am informed that there has been Warr declared between the Kings of England & France, by which means Your honour & the Governour of Pondichery are likely to have disturbances with each other. But as the Sea Port Towns belong to the Great Mogull, it is by no means proper that you & the French should Quarrel & have disputes together there, There have been lately some disturbances in Bengall on Account of the Germans but it is very improper to have Commotions raised in the Sea Ports of Indostan which belong to his Most Sovereign Majesty the Great Mogull & where Nothing of this nature has ever been Suffered ; I must now advise You therefore that it will upon all Accounts be best for both Nations to live in peace and Friendship with each other and when Your Europe Ships arrive near the Sea Ports to act hostilities, You will lay Your Possitive Orders on them not to fight there ; for the End of these things will not be good.

By God Almighty's Grace, Bauboo Naik has been Entirely defeated by the Mahometan Army & run away out of their sight, But our Army is in pursuit of the Enemy, & by the blessing of God, Matters will be Accomodated in a short time.

I take the Liberty of laying before Your Honour & c^t. the reasons why I could not proceed to Madrass on the Honourable Companys Ship Princess Augusta from which I am prevented by a most terrible Fit of Illness that has hung on me ever since my Arrival at this Port and the Doctors now advise me that my Undertaking this Voyage may be fatal to me.

As I had the Misfortune of loosing my Passage from Bencoolen to Your Port I must beg leave to Assure Your Honour & c^t. that it was by no means any Neglect of mine but Occasioned by a Current Setting unusually Strong to the Eastward Insomuch that on my making Land I found myself upwards of Six degrees to the Eastward of what I made in the Year 1741 in the same Month as will Appear by my Journals both of which I have sent up by M^r. Hill for your Perusal if it should be required. That it could be by no other means we lost our Passage is pretty plain from the Account of Captain Stevens & Cap^t. Froggnall who both met with the same Easterly Currents for Captain Stevens fell in with the Southend of Sumatra instead of Atcheen head and Cap^t. Froggnall with Atcheen Head instead of Point Palmiras.

I hope therefore that Your Honour & c^t. will take into consideration the State of my Unfortunate Case and not let my being Afflicted with the Distemper I still labour under remove me from my Honourable Masters Employ as I hope I shall be able to take that charge on me, Again by the time the Ship may return which I shall impatiently wait.

I shall not intrude further on your Patience but conclude being with the Utmost Respect.

As we think ourselves under a necessity to receive the Fine Cloths providing for this year at Madepolam in a larger proportion than We directed, M^r. Hallyburton having engaged with his Merchants on those terms before the receipt of our Orders of the 27th. February, it's agreed to forewarn him that We shall expect his Merchants after this year to go on upon the same terms with those at the other Factories, as We look on the Additional Allowance We lately made on the Ordinary Cloths and our taking even the Quantity of Fine We last ordered, as a Sufficient Encouragement; The Fine Cloths made in these parts being of a better Manufacture and Cheaper, and not exposed to the Sea Risque, the other is liable to this War time; Besides that Cotton is now cheaper in those parts.

Being Still of Opinion that the small, if any, Loss Our Honourable Masters may suffer by the Timbers imposed on the Gentlemen to the Northward is not to be put in competition with a disappointment in our Investment under it's present Circumstances, it's agreed to let M^r. Hallyburton know that We would have him comply with His Nabob's present demand but that we referr the manner of his doing it to himself.

The Accountant reads the Journal Parcels for the Month of January.

He also produces as entered hereafter the Acco^t. Salary for the last Six Months due this day amounting to Sixteen hundred fifteen Pagodas thirty three Fanams & seventy eight Cash 1615. 33. 78, which is Ordered to be paid.

The President lays before the Board a Letter he received Yesterday from Nabob Anawardeen Cawn, in which he mentions that having heard of the War's breaking out in Europe between the English and French Nations, which might occasion some interruption to the Trade of the Moguls Subjects, he had therefore thought fit to grant the Moguls Colours & his Passes to the Native Subjects, as also to Strangers, Strictly forbidding any Molcstation to be offered to Ships with such Passports and Colours, otherwise that the Aggressors must be Answerable for any Loss Sustain'd.

Upon which the Board observed that the French had since the Capture of the Favory been endeavouring to Amuse the Nabob and his Officers, that it had been their desire to promote pacifick Measures, And on the other side to represent us as the disturbers of the Tranquility in India. That the Ship they sent to Mocha in January, had the Nabob's Pass and Colours, Obtain'd as we may suppose with a design to embarrass Us with the Government, in Case of her being taken by the Men of War: Since they must know they could not be a protection to that Ship. That it appears to Us the Nabob is unacquainted with the Laws and Customs of European Nations in such Cases, or he must have judged it of little Purpose to send Orders of this nature for restraining the Shipping of Our Nation from Acting Offensively in the Seas he mentions, notwithstanding the Pass & Colours granted by the Moors. Which therefore we think proper to represent to him, that he may not take it ill when any Accidents of this kind happen, And that he may be Assured our Ships are only Acting Conformable to what the Laws & Customs of European Nations have made a Rule for their Conduct on such occasions.

AGREED that an Answer be drawn up to the Abovemention'd purpose to be sent the Nabob and that Hodjee Addy be desired to explain to him more fully these Matters, the better to Satisfy him in this point & to prevent any designs of the French to our prejudice; Persons in his Post, being generally too Apt to expect an implicit Obedience to their Orders, which the Nature of this Case will not Admit.

Schonamille in consequence of his declaring War against the Moors had taken and plunderd some Ships & Vessels belonging to them, but as generally reported and beleived that he and his People (among whom there are said to be upwards of An hundred British Subjects) were gone over to Pegue

to repair their Vessels in order to their future Cruizes, of which when the dissolute Nature of those People is consider'd all other Europeans in India as well as the Moors may have reason to be under some Apprehensions. That long before this Vessel arrived it was generally received that she actually belonged to M^r. Schonamille (though patronized by some English Inhabitants of Calcutta) and was coming to this Coast to provide Military and Naval Stores to carry over to him at Pegue, which if true, made it clearly our duty to put a stop to her going thither or carrying any Such Assistance from hence, and even though such Report should be false, As Norton Asserts, yet it might be difficult to convince the Moors it was so, who when the Affairs of the Mogul Empire give them more leisure, may perhaps charge us with Aiding and abetting Norton and the Ostenders in such their designs against them, and make it a pretence for seeking reparation of the English at the hazard of the Company's Investment at this & their other Settlements in India. The Chief Objections that offered to our hindring the Vessel from proceeding were That the President and Council of Fort William having thought proper to grant Norton a Pass might perhaps construe our Stopping his Vessel into an Invasion of their Priveledges, And the hardship it might be both to Norton & his Owners should his Asseverations be true that M^r. Schonamille has no manner of concern in the Vessel, and that he is under no Engagements with him either directly or indirectly; Besides that it was to be hoped the report of His Majesty's Squadron being in India & intending for this Coast might restrain that licentiousness on which the Apprehension of danger from them was founded. To these objections it was replied, That had the Gentlemen in Bengal foreseen the ill Consequences that have been mentioned, it's probable Norton would not have obtain'd a Pass and his Vessel been Stopped there. That as Our Honble Masters have made the English Trade to Pegue immediately Subordinate to this Presidency, and the Evils from which Such bad Consequences are to be fear'd have arisen since this Vessel left Bengal, besides that, the Pass makes no particular mention of Pegue, the preventing this Sloop from going to that Port only cannot reasonably give any umbrage to Bengal Presidency; as to the influence the report of the English Men of War coming this way may have on the Ostenders it's but uncertain that any besides the English amongst them may think themselves affected or restrain'd by that event, or that the Men of War may have any opportunity on this Side of interfering with them, nor is the damage it's supposed the Master and Owners may suffer by being forbid Pegue alone of all the Ports to the Eastward, to be put in competition with the exposing Our Honble Masters Interests to any risque. And Norton declared that he does not fix the hopes of his Voyage on that Port only; Upon the whole the Board being willing to avoid any Instances of severity, and the season of the Year permitting, it's agreed to suspend our further resolution on this Matter 'till about the middle of next month, when a Vessel is expected from thence, by which We may probably receive some Advices of the State of Affairs in Pegue that may guide us in our determination.

AGREED to send a supply of Five thousand Pagodas overland to Fort S^t. David this Evening.

As we hear nothing yet of His Majesty's Squadron coming this way, and it's beleived that two of the Sloops will be sufficient to keep here for any purpose it's agreed to return the Porto Bello and Bombay, The latter directly to the Bay with what Treasure we can spare the other to call at Vizagapatam to land some Treasure and Stores for that place and Ingeram. And the Warehousekeeper is ordered to send Twenty Tons of Red Wood on board each of them for the Bay.

The President acquaints the Board that in discoursing M^r. Smith concerning Our Fortifications and what Works he thought most proper & necessary for the Security of the Town to the Westward, He found him not yet determined what to recommend to Us as most useful, but that he was preparing two Plans to lay before the Board, the one of a Horn Work to be placed at the end of the Bridge on the Island, The other of a Wall carried from Charles Point to Mint Point & strengthen'd with two New Bastions; But which soever of those designs We should best approve, it was

judged by him, as absolutely necessary to deepen the River to the Westward of the Town, now almost every where fordable, And that this Work be set about with all expedition that it may be finished if possible before the fall of the Rains we may expect in June or July and the Paymaster is ordered to set about deepening the River as fast as possible, the Workmen to be under M^r. Smith's direction.

The President and Warehousekeeper acquaint the Board that with their best endeavours they have not been able since our resolution of the 28th. Ultimo to bargain for the Sale of above Thirty thousand Pagodas worth of Rupees, that mostly by small parcels and at several prices the medium of which came out at somewhat less than Three hundred thirty Six and a quarter for One hundred Pagodas though they are not all yet taken out of the Warehouse which being better than the present Market price is Approved, And the Warehousekeeper pays in Seven thousand five hundred 7500 Pagodas on that Account and Seven thousand five hundred 7500 Pagodas more on Account of Silver Sold.

Andrew's to make Some of those small presents he represents as necessary, having a proper regard to the greedy and encroaching dispositions of the Under Officers in these Governments, and to recommend to him not to call upon Vizagapatam for more Money than he has an immediate Use for, and in Case of any danger (as we hear the Morattas are Marching that way) to Ship the Company's Effects on board some vessel & send them to Vizagapatam.

The Porto Bello Sloop being near ready to sail for Vizagapatam it's agreed to send on her some Wares & Stores & ten thousand 10000 Madrass Pagodas as a present Supply for that Settlement, & Eight thousand 8000 Pagodas for the Service of Ingeram.

David of the 3^d. instant, advising that they had with difficulty obtain'd of Andeapa to engage for the provision of Two thousand Bales for the running year, but could not prevail on him to promise any Abatement in the prices of the last, And recommending to Us some proposals made them by Two other Merchants, Namely, Narrain Chitty and Devenaigue Chitty for the provision of Two thousand one hundred Bales of Chemanaickpol^m. Cloth and Salampores at lower prices and on a less Advance to lye in their Hands, Advising also that by a Dutch Sloop from Columbo. it is reported that Five large English Ships of War were Cruizing between that place and Gallee which they Suppose to be His Majesty's Squadron.

The Subject of the Said Letter being considered it was with much Satisfaction the Board observed that Andeapa had been brought to engage for a larger Number of Bales, and We are inclined to beleive from the Common Repute of his Cautiousness and what the Gentlemen at S^t. David's wrote us the 12th. of last month that his talking of only One thousand Bales was owing to his apprehensions of interruption from the Morattas but however it's agreed to intimate to the Deputy Governour and Council that when it's considered there is but little Fine in his List We cannot but think an Advance of Thirty thousand Pagodas to lye in his Hands fully Sufficient. When we consider of what Service it may be that we can supply a larger Tonnage in Case the Investment in Bengal should suffer any disappointment from the Invasions of the Morattas or other Accidents we cannot but be glad of such an Addition of Bales as Narrain Chitty & Devenaigue Chitty offer to provide, and therefore have no objection to Admitting them into the Service if the Gentlemen at S^t. Davids (who must be better Judges in that matter) are well assured of the Abilities and responsibleness of the Men: But with regard to the Advance they ask of Twenty five thousand Pagodas, We should look on it as an additional Security that Some other Persons of Substance were joind with, and that part of that Advance be not paid them 'till the Advices of the Morattas being retired out of the Province are more Certain. The Gentlemen at S^t. Davids desiring Us if any other Method of dividing the Investment occur'd to Us to communicate it to them, It's agreed to give it them as Our Opinion, that it may be a means to preserve the Fabrick of the Chemanaickpollam Cloth, and to comply the better with Our Honble Masters directions signified this year respecting the Manufacture of that Country if it could be so managed with the Two Sets of Merchants,

I have reason to apprehend that by the Warrs lately happened between the French & English in Europe, the Ships belonging to the Great Mogulls Subjects in the Indian Sea are likely to meet with troubles & Molestation. Pray Observe this as a strict Taukeed and Perform the Contents of this Letter & in

I received Your Excellency's Perwanah in which you are pleased to mention that as there is War Commenced Between the English and French Nation that you had in order to prevent any Molestation happening to the Ships belonging to the Subjects of his Most Excellent Majesty the Great Mogull Empowered Hodjee Abdul Hadee Phousdar of Mylapore to deliver out Passes in your Name to the Subjects of his said Majesty as well as to Strangers and also to wear the Moors Colours in their Voyages to & fro in the Several Ports in India, by Virtue of which you are pleased to direct that they are not to be interrupted in their Voyages & if they shou'd be that the Persons so Offending will be liable to your displeasure, to which with all respect I beg leave to Say that the Amity that Subsists between the high & Mighty Emperor the Great Mogull & his Majesty of England will not permit the English Subjects to Offer any Violence or acts of Hostility to the Ships belonging to the Subjects of the Great Mogull. May it please Your Excellency that sometimes Differences arise between the Several Princes in Europe as particularly there is now between the English & French, in which case if the French make use in their Trade of the Moors Colours & Passes pretending thereby that they belong to the Subjects of the Great Mogull, the English Commanders will notwithstanding make prizes of Such Ships as will the French do the Same to the English on the like Occasions Should they also have the Moors Passes or Colours, Your Excellency will be Assured that in these Matters each Nation Acts Agreeable to their Laws & Customs and in Obedience to the Orders of their respective Sovereigns. What can I say more.

As these Issues will reduce the Cash to about Eleven thousand Pagodas, and the remainder of the Rupees when taken out of the Warehouse will add to it but about Twenty Eight thousand Pagodas, and we may Moderately compute the calls of the Fort S^t. David and our own Merchants and other disbursements at not less than Fifty

thousand 50000 Ψ Month the necessity of raising Supplies appeared too Visibly, but the means of doing it were found to Center in the only expedient of taking up money if procurable at Interest. The Cheif objection that offered to this was the Novelty of our Honourable Masters paying Interest at this Presidency, but that it is thought will have but little weight with them when they are pleased to consider the bad consequences that may Attend our not being able to keep the Merchants Supplied and it's to be hoped the Arrival of the Wager or the expected Shipping of this year will Soon enable us to repay the Money so taken up and the small amount of Interest they will be liable to be deemed by them in no Competition with our Stopping the Investment at this Juncture. It's therefore agreed to receive any Sums that may be offered as far as One hundred or One hundred & fifty thousand Pagodas and to give Bonds for them.

The President acquaints the Board he has received intelligence that the French at Pondicherry are making great preparations to act offensively as well as defensively, and that they expect a Number of Men from the Islands which may put them upon some Enterprize. That their Neighbourhood to Fort S^t. David and the uncertainty of His Majesty's Squadron coming on the Coast to give us any Assistance for some time being considered as also that the Success of the latter to the Eastward may probably excite the Enemy's Resentment, & Fort S^t. David from it's nearness and the Quantity of Cloth lying there Embaled not improbably become their first object. He therefore proposes to the Consideration of the Board whether it may not be a means to abate the Enemys hopes and render them less forward to undertake anything against Fort S^t. David to get all the Cloth away from thence we can; That M^r. Hinde had also represented to him the want of Godowns to put the Bales in, and as they were at this time obliged to have provisions of all kinds, Firewood &c^t. within the Fort, the Number of Bales became thereby very inconvenient to them. And if we are of opinion to have them brought away, he has obtain'd of the Owners of the Success Galley to let her go on that Service she being a prime Sailer and the only Vessel in the Road fit for it. The Board being of Opinion with the President that the getting the Cloth from S^t. David's may check the Enemys designs if they have formed any against that place, it's agreed to take up the Success Galley for that Service, to order the Mermaid to accompany her & for the greater Security of the Vessels and the Hon^{ble} Company's Effects they may have on board to send a party of One hundred Men on them under the Command of Lieutenant Hollond with the same Orders We gave the Party sent thither on the Durrington, Beaufort and Benjamin in January last & to referr it to the Gentlemen at S^t. David's to act as they shall judge most for the Company's Security either by keeping the Bales there or sending them hither.

M^r. Hinde having also represented to the President his want of some able Person to Advise with on the present State of the Fortifications at S^t. Davids, it's agreed to send M^r. Smith thither on the Galley for that purpose with directions that he return to us on her.

ORDERED that the Paymaster & Storekeeper send on board the Success Galley and Mermaid the Provisions and other things necessary for the Party of Military with all possible Expedition.

In consequence of what we wrote Our Hon^{ble} Masters by the Ships lately dispatched to Europe, that We should take it into consideration how in the best manner to comply with the directions they have been pleased to give Us regarding the fortifying the West Side of the White Town so as to make it both convenient and defensive, to which purpose M^r. Smith has been employed several Months in examining the Ground & the proper Space for the several Works, and to prepare a Plan to lay before the Board: And he now attending delivers in Two Plans, One of a Horn Work to be Erected at the end of the Bridge; The other of Two Bastions & to take in the Circumference on the Island so as to Answer in a Line of Defence from the Mint Point to Charles Point; Adding thereby all the Space within to the White Town; And the Large Plan sent to the Company was also called for. Accordingly the several Plans being Examined and duely considered of, and after having discoursed with M^r. Smith

a long time in order to be Satisfied which of the Three might be best to fix our choice on. It appeared to Us the Second was the most preferable for the following reasons.

That from Charles's Bastion to the Water Gate Bridge as it now Stands, the Compound Walls of all the Dwelling Houses join in a Line with the Face of the Bastion which prevents the Fire of that Flank defending the Passage of the River & that if the First Plan with the Horn Work is accepted, there must be a Rampart joining the Flanks to the Bridge which must be laid in the River on Wells and in bad Ground 970 Feet, as must likewise the Rampart be carried on from the Bridge to the inner part of the Mint Bastion 752 Feet in the River likewise on Wells by which means part of the Silver Mint would be taken away and render it Useless for the Working in And the Inhabitants would also expect a Compensation for the damage done to their Houses and Compounds which would be pretty considerable besides which there would be no enlargement of the Town for the building Storehouses Granarys &c^t. which are greatly wanting And that whatsoever New Works are thought proper the very bad condition of both Charles and Mint Points render them so Unfit for Service that there is an absolute necessity of rebuilding them.

As to the large Plan it is judged much too extensive considering the Number of Men Allowed for this Garrison and the Expencc would be very large in erecting so many Bastions and such a length of Rampart with the Ditch.

The advantages of the other are that it will allow a very good Space for the necessary Buildings for the Service of the Garrison, as well as to erect many others & be a very considerable Addition to the Town: That it will be compact & Seperate from the Black Town, and thereby much Stronger and more defensible than when joined to the other, as must have been in the large Plan. That this will Cost little more than even the Horn Work, and though the Ground on the Island cannot be said to be good yet it's better than that in the River, And in the whole that the Town will in this method be exceedingly well Secured on that side, be much enlarged and very commodious, and the only building in the way is the Charity School, but as the Materials of that are fresh and good they will Sell for near as much as their first Cost since the Prices are risen so considerably since the erecting of that Building and the number of Children being reduced to twenty for many Years past, And the present Stock not more than sufficient to provide for them, a Smaller House will very well do for the purpose, so that their removal will not be attended with any inconveniency.

The Board for the above reasons and also as it is agreeable to the opinion of M^r. Smith that this Second Plan will Answer best in every respect do therefore from the liberty Our Honourable Masters are pleased to give Us determine on that for the Fortifying the West Side of the White Town, and as the State of the Country and other Circumstances make it highly requisite they should be completed as soon as possible, that the Paymaster do forthwith set about them as soon as M^r. Smith has lined out the Works according to the said Plan.

The deepening the River ordered in Consultation of the 19th. April being carried on from Queen's Point to Mint Point it's agreed to Stop that Work, M^r. Smith thinking it better to begin the New Works from the Southward.

N^o. 96, dated the 6th. instant acknowledging the Receipt of the Money sent them the 1st. and N^o. 97 dated the 10th. instant advising of Two hundred seventy five Bales sent us on the Success Galley & that the Mermaid was not then in Sight.

The President then told the Board that having the day after the Success Sail'd received information from Pondicherry that M^r. Dupleix was Marched out to Arreacopang the Extremity of their Bounds to the Southward and there encamped with Two hundred European Soldiers and a good number of Peons and Lascars with great Quantities of Grenadoes and Scaling Ladders besides which there were Several Boats lying up a River by Aroecopang in readiness to put off at the Shortest warning, it came into his mind that M^r. Dupleix could hardly expect to Succeed in an Attempt upon Fort S^t. David with that Force, and he therefore imagined it might

be only a Stratagem to make Us send a Reinforcement of Men thither and that whilst they should be on their way and our Garrison weaken'd by such a draught he might with the Recruits hourly expected there from the Islands endeavour to surprise Us, or that as there are several Ships in our Road now taking aboard their Cargoes and ready to Sail, particularly our China and Persia Ships they might have some design upon them under favour of the Southerly Winds which would soon bring them hither. He the President Sent his thoughts upon the matter to M^r. Hinde and desired him to return the Success and her Men hither immediately on the receipt of his Letter, that she might have an opportunity of intercepting those Boats and destroying them before they could be here in Case they should have put out. M^r. Hinde's compliance with which was the reason the Success brought away no more Bales, but as it is now generally beleived that those preparations at Pondicherry were designed for the Assistance of their Settlement at Caracal, It was agreed to send back the Success for the remaining Bales, Her Owners consenting thereto & that She be dispatched tomorrow.

Our Apprehensions of the designs of the French against this place or Fort S^t. David being somewhat abated though we have yet no certain intelligence of what they are doing, it's agreed that the party now to be sent on the Success for the greater Security of the Ship & our Hon^{ble} Masters Effects consist of only two Serjeants, two Corporals, one Drum & forty four private Men under the Command of Ensign Jn^o. KNOW ALL MEN, That in the Year 1743 October the 16th. & January the 14th. 1743/44 I drew two Bills of Exchange on my Husband Sultan David for twenty thousand eight hundred Rupees of the Hoñble English East India Company's Money, received by me from M^r. Charles Savage payable by my said husband Sultan David eleven days after sight ; But the said Bills not being paid at Madrass and returned hither with a Protest, & I not being able to pay them, have drawn other Bills for value received from M^r. John Peirson Viz^t. Two Bills of the same Tenour for Seventeen thousand four hundred & forty Rupees, And two Bills of the Same Tenour for Seven thousand & Seventy Rupees payable at Madrass eleven days after Sight by Sultan David ; I drew also two other Bills of the Same Tenour in June the 8th. 1744 for four thousand Rupees received of Jacob Jan & Monsieur Ermete, and in the month of September the 28th. 1744, I drew two other Bills of the same Tenour for two thousand Six hundred Rupees, which Sum I received of M^r. John Peirson payable to M^r. Rawson Hart, also two Bills of the Same Tenour the 2^d. March 1744/45 for Six thousand Rupees payable to the Honourable Governour and Council of Madrass for Value received also of M^r. John Peirson ; The Amount of the said five Bills being thirty seven thousand One hundred & ten Rupees & a quarter, which said sum in Case the said Sultan David shall refuse to pay, I do by virtue of the Will of Nazar Jacob Jan (an attested Copy of which I send herewith) whereby it will appear that I and my husband are heirs to the Estate of the said Nazar Jacob Jan, make the hoñble Gov^r. & Council of Fort St. George my Attorneys for receiving the said sum & the Amount of the Costs of recovering the Same, Who after the receipt thereof are to endorse the same on the back of this my Power of Attorney which with the Bills of Exchange they must then deliver unto my said husband Sultan David.

He also pays in Ten thousand 10,000 Pagodas on Account of Broad Cloth delivered the Merchants.

AGREED that three thousand 3000 Pagodas be Advanced the Pay Master towards the disbursements of the month, And to send Five thousand 5000 Pagodas overland to S^t. David's this Evening.

As the Arrival of Commodore Barnett's Squadron in the Neighbourhood will probably deterr the French from the thoughts of any Enterprize it's Agreed to discontinue the Expençe of the Poligar Peons we thought proper to entertain the tenth of last month.

Coja Sultan David attending delivers in several Papers which being read as enter'd hereafter are found to consist of

N^o. 1, A Representation of his Case with respect to the Persia Bills drawn on him now & before containing his reasons for his Non Acceptance and Suffering them to be protested & desiring us to State the Matter to the Gentlemen at Bombay

N^o. 2, An Extract of Coja Nazar Jacob Jan's Will, whereby after the Decease of his Wife, His Estate devolves to His Sister Annam & her Husband Sultan David, under the Sole direction of the latter.

N^o. 3, 4 and 5 Shew that the disputes between Coja Nazar and His Principal in Persia were referred to Arbitration. The Award thereupon, and a discharge given to Coja Nazar in consequence thereof by Coja Tarcan Canhan in behalf of Himself and the other Sons of the Deceased Coja Canhan Coja Nazar's Principal, dated in Bengal in August 1722, and Attested by the then President & Council of Calcutta.

N^o. 6, Another Discharge from Avitick De Canhan to Coja Nazar on Account of His Factorage Bond to Old Canhan, given at Madrass in October 1735.

N^o. 7, A Letter from Avetick De Canhan and Minass de Tar Cawn to several Persons in Persia acknowledging their having discharged Coja Nazar from all future demands concerning His Factorage Bond.

N^o. 8, A Paper referred to in N^o. 1, as a Revocation of Coja Nazar's Will, extorted by force from Sultan's Wife & Son at Julpha in June 1742.

N^o. 9, A Letter from Coja Sultan to the Honible Company's Agents at Ispahan, shewing the means he had taken that his Wife and Family should not want a handsome Subsistance.

These Several Papers sufficiently supporting what Coja Sultan represents and it being the Opinion of the Board upon the Face of the whole Matter that he is very unjustly dealt by, and that the Power of Attorney from his Wife to Us to Use compulsive Measures with him is of no Validity. Nor would it otherwise be proper this Board should accept of such a Power, As our acting upon it would make Us Parties,

& thereby incapacitate Us to judge of the matter on an Appeal from the Mayor's Court. It's therefore agreed to return the Bills with their Protests to Bombay with Copies of the Several Papers above-recited under N^{os}. 1, 2, 5, 6, 7, 9, and in compliance with Sultan's request to transmit our Sentiments of the Affair to the Governour and Council there and to desire of them to send the proper directions upon it to their Subordinates in Persia to be cautious in future of engaging the Hon^{ble} Company's Name or their Servants here in Such foreign and contested points, lest their Affairs and Interest should suffer thereby.

AGREED to dispatch a Patamar to Bombay on Thursday next with the Tellicherry and Anjengo Packets and the Advices we have received concerning Commodore Bernet's Squadron and of our Honourable Masters Ships King William, Prince of Wales and Cæsar being Safe at the Cape homeward bound, and that the Swift Snow passed by the 16th. HO^NBLE SIR & SIRS

The Orders I received from this Hoⁿble Board the last time it sate to deliver in my reasons for not accepting the Bills of Exchange drawn upon me at Ispahan, why I Sufferd those Bills to be protested, and also to lay before you a Statement of my case in respect to these Bills and those of the preceding Years, I will now endeavour to obey, and Hope thereby to Convince Your Honour & c^a. that the whole of this affair is a gross imposition on the Hoⁿble Companys Agents at Ispahan by a Set of wicked and fraudulent Men that are Creditors to the Estate of Coja Canhan. N^o. 1.

It will not be amiss to inform Your Honour & c^a. that this Canhan was the person who first Sent Coja Nazar into India by furnishing him with a Stock of 460 Tomans on Factorage Terms usual amongst Armenians, Nazar Succeeded so well in his Trade by the year 1719 as to have encreased Canhans proportion of the Stock to 45000 Rupees, and 'twas in that year Accounts were settled between the Principal and Factor at Calcutta, Canhan taking Nazars Bonds for the Money till the Factorage Bond was deliver'd up to him, this Bond lay at Julpha to which place Canhan wrote his Correspondents that he had Settled affairs with Nazar and directed them to deliver his Factorage Bond to his Order, 'twas Canhans misfortune at that time to be indebted to almost every Church and Charity Friend there, the Archbishop, many of the Clergy and most of the principal Inhabitants, were his Creditors, and were not willing to let Nazars bond be given up till they had reaped the fruits of what he had laboured for Account Canhan; Canhan dyed the year following and as I said before in debt to almost the whole Body of People at Julpha, nothing could be done with them for many years they hoping from time to time to have Nazar Once in their power; and to pay themselves with the spoils of his Estate; in this they were disappointed; and the Factorage Bond was Outstanding against him till Some Short time before his death, when twas given up to me upon my becoming Security for the payment of the 45000 Rupees; there remain'd yet one impediment in getting Nazar released which was the two Bonds he had given Canhan for the Money, and these were in the hands of Coja Avatique, Canhan's Son I sent for him from Arcot and offer'd to pay him the money upon Conditions that he would deliver me the Bonds; he replied his Brother Tarcon had them, he dyed in Bengall and therefore he not Could tell what might have befallen them nor how they were to be got at; though at that very time to my knowledge both those Bonds were Pawn'd by Avatick to Coja Joannes Coja Maull for so trifling a Sum as 500 Rupees, this may seem odd to your Honour & c^a. that any Men

should pawn Bonds to the Value of 45000 Rupees for 500 when the Amount thereof was tenderd to him, but when your Honour &c^e. shall understand that Avatiques Circumstances at Madrass were much the same with his fathers at Julpha, and had he received the money, in two hours time he would have been Stripped of every Rupee by his Creditors; so that in effect he gaind 500 Rupees by Pawning the Bonds; this obstruction could not be removed, Nazar died Still in debt to Canhans Creditors, his wife Soon following him; and I by his Appointment became the Sole Manager of his Estate, tis true Anam my Wife is named in the will to enjoy it with me but the Management during my life is wholly in me, as tis expressly said by Nazar that I may act as I please; when I became possessor of Nazar's Estate I was willing to Shew myself an Honest Man and the first Step I took was to discharge the Debt to Canhan and directed my Son Shamir to Invest a parcell of Bengall Goods and Proceed with them to Persia, my Factor at Surat provided Some and I did the same on this Coast & Consigned them to my son with directions to Settle Matters with Canhans Creditors upon reasonable terms & in an Amicable manner and then to return to me; The Calanter of Julpha had notice of my Sons Coming and he was Seized by the Calantars Servants three days Journey distance from Julpha & by them Carried prisoner to his house, they Secured my Wife at the same time, and both were Confined for three days and beaten inhumanly, till they had given their Consent to let Nazars will become revoked, A paper of this kind was exhorted from them a Translation whereof I now present to Your Honour &c^e. which the Calantar calls According to Law he and I are both natives of the Same place and tis the first time that I ever knew or heard that the Inhabitants Armenians of Julpha had any but such as all the Subjects of Persia are Govern'd by: and 'tis notoriously known that we amongst ourselves have no Such thing as Law but wherever we Settle the Laws of that place are our guide; This is not all for my Son was no Sooner at liberty than they plundered him not only of the Goods that were designed to pay Canhans Creditors but of every thing else they could lay their hands on, nor to this day can either my son nor myself tell how or in what manner they were distributed and all the Satisfaction I have had was to hear that justice had overtaken the Calantar, he had his Ears cut off, his house Seized upon by the Persian Magistrate and that he dyed a Miserable death; but neither Mine, my wife nor Sons troubles dyed with him. Canhans Creditors it seems must swallow Nazars Estate and tis they that persecute my wife and son, tis they that extort these Bills of Exchange from her; and tis they that Consequently Create Your Honour &c^e. So much trouble;

Your Honour &c^e. will do me the justice to think that I have left no means untryd to do the honest part by Canhan; and will I hope acquit me from making more overtures or paying more money to his Creditors I have been Robb'd once of, more than would have paid double the Debt and they would deprive me of all I have left were I to Answer their draughts, my Wife a Weak Woman is the Instrument they work with, they will not only Continue unsatisfied but unrevenged till they Effect the Total destruction of Nazars family partly owing to his having dyed Rich and partly to his having forbid his Wife to deal with Armenians, this latter has given great offence to those here and Consequently inflamed his Julpha Enemies.

I must Humbly Entreat your Honour &c^e. to represent my case to the Gentlemen at Bombay that they may give Orders to their Factors at Ispahan to Accept of no more Bills of this kind for extortion has no bounds, and doubtless this trouble to your Honour &c^e. will be repeated Yearly without such directions are given; and I hope your Honour &c^e. will not hold me Obliged to Satisfy Such demands that are so Apparently fraudulent; and as I have becoming the care of both Husband & father made so handsome provision for my family they Cannot possibly be Induced to take up money for their Subsistence; and for other Occasions they can need none,

FROM NABOB ANWARADEAN CAWN BAHAUDER
SUBAH AT ARCOT RECEIVED JULY 14th. 1745.

I am informed that Since the War broke out between the English & French in Europe, they are preparing to Committ hostilities against each other in all the places upon the Coasts of Indostan, where those Nations are Settled, & that they also expect Ships of Warr from Europe for that Purpose which greatly alarms those of his Majestys Subjects, who live in Chinapatam & Pondichery, as there is a Considerable Trade carried on there with what is yearly imported from Europe, and on that Account a great part of the Effects of Most of the Subjects of these parts always lies there, and as all the Sea port Towns are the Great Mogulls & some of them only were entrusted to the care of the Europeans, in Expectation that they would Behave themselves peaceably & Quietly in Indostan, you will Consider of it throughly & Seriously & take care not to raise any disturbance on shore; for you shall be called to an Account for it hereafter in case you do. Pray Observe this as a Strict Taukeed.

Mahamud Sultan trooper will deliver you this Parawana & I desire You will Observe the Contents & send me an Answer to it as soon as possible.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY NABOB ANWARADEAN CAWN BAHAUDER
SUBAH OF ARCOT JULY 16th. 1745.

I have received your Excellencys Peruwanah by Your trooper Mahamud Sultan, in which You are pleased to mention that Understanding the English & French were making Preparations to Attack each others Settlements, that it was your pleasure, they should refrain therefrom since it might prove of ill Consequence to the Welfare of the Province. Your Excellency must be sensible from your long Experience in Affairs of Warr; that all Precaution is not only prudent but necessary in such times and to be no less prepared to act than one's Enemy. However Since it is not your pleasure that any Hostilities Should be Committed on the Land, as you immagine they may be the cause of disturbance to the Peace of your Government, I beg leave to Say that for my self I shall not be the first to disobey your Commands in this Respect, provided there is the Same deference paid to them by the French. Otherwise I may presume it is not your Excellency's design to put any restraint upon me in particular to my Deservice & to the Advantage of the Enemy.

As I have already Acquainted your Excellency that the Commanders of his Majesty's Ships are not under my Direction, I cannot oblige myself to Answer for their Conduct.

THAT we think an Admonition to their Merchants and proper directions from them to the Weavers would soon restore the Fabrick to which a proper Attention in the Sorters of the Brown Cloths and returning Some of the Turned Out on the Weavers might in some Measure contribute as well as to convince them that we expect a better Manufacture.

3000, Three thousand to Gundaveddy Vencaty Rama & Nella Chitty, on Account of the Investment.

AGREED to send a Supply of Five thousand 5000 Pagodas overland to St. David's this Evening and Five thousand 5000 more on Saturday the 10th. instant.

Seven thousand 7000 Madrass Pagodas being offer'd to the Board at Nine, 9, 7 Cent Batta it's agreed to purchase them.

AGREED to dispatch the Mermaid Brigantine this Evening with a further Supply of Provisions for His Majesty's Ships, and to order her that Service performed, to go to Fort St. David to bring away more Bales from thence.

Mr. Alexander Baird purposing to proceed to Fort St. David on the Mermaid, the Pay Master is ordered to Advance him Ten, 10, Pagodas for his Charges.

Mr. Smith being Sent for and asked if he had prepared his remarks on Stephen De Stutter's Plan of the Vizagapatam Fortifications, told the Board he had not yet been able to examine them thoroughly, but that in his opinion their Building the Battery to the Sea Side and erecting a Small One near the Bar as proposed in the Plan as well as in the Letters from Vizagapatam of the 21st. April and 14th. October last are necessary Works.

The Gentlemen at Vizagapatam having wrote Us that the Expence of these Works will not be very considerable it's agreed to order them to be set about as well as the repairing their New House and Building a Godown for their Stores, the want of which had put them to the inconveniences of keeping them at too great a distance from the Fort.

The President acquaints the Board that on Our not having received near the Quantity of Packing Stuff, We indented for to Bengal and as We shall be greatly in want of those Articles for our own and the St. David's Bales he had made a request to Mr. Braddyll in his Private Advices if possible to Send us a Supply by a Sloop to Vizagapatam, from whence We can easily get it hither, and by the Sloops coming only to Vizagap̄tm she might very soon return to the Bay; In consequence hereof it's agreed to order the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam if those of Bengal should have complied with the President's request not to fail of sending us the Goods for Packing on the Sumatra reserving only sufficient for Four hundred Bales for the Use of Mr. Saunders at Ingeram.

As the Sumatra will be ready for Sailing in Three or four days it's now agreed to send on her to Vizagapatam a Supply of Fifty thousand 50000 Arcot Rupees of which Twenty thousand to be sent from thence to Ganjam, and a further Supply of Seven thousand 7000 Madrass Pagodas to be forwarded from thence to Ingeram.

It having been represented to the Board that some Europe Copper may find a Market at Ganjam, it's agreed to send Mr. Andrews Five, 5, Candies on the Sumatra by way of Experiment, directing him to inform us if any and what Quantity may be vended there yearly.

AGREED to order the Sumatra to be dispatched to Ganjam as soon as she has landed the Treasure at Vizagapatam and that no time be lost at Ganjam in Shipping off the Bales that are ready there & returning her to Vizagapatam.

Coja Sultan David proposing in few days to lend the Board Twenty thousand 20000 Arcot Rupees & Coja Miguel De Gregorio making the same offer of Five thousand 5000 Pagodas, it's agreed to accept those Sums, giving Bonds for them when paid in.

AGREED and ORDER'D that the Warehousekeep^r. dispose of the Rupees that will remain after the departure of the Sumatra, and what more may come in on Bond to Supply the Cash.

The President acquaints the Board that he has intelligence given him that the French at Pondicherry are frequently sending Letters to the Nabob and employing their Agents at Arcot to complain against the English for having taken a Ship under Moors Colours and Pass & for being the Destroyers of the Trade of the Mogul's Subjects on this Coast, and that Our Ships of War keep all their Ships from coming

to their Ports whereby the Surcar is deprived of many Advantages, particularly of the Profits on their Investment, with many other things too tedious and of too little importance to mention here that thereupon he had thought it proper to write to Hodjee Addee now at Arcot fully concerning these Matters that he might lay a true State of the Case before His Excellency, and the French be thereby prevented in their designs of Spiriting up the Nabob against Us, which they are Aiming at in hopes to recover their Money: To make it an Excuse for their not paying the large Sums they are indebted to several Persons concerned with the Surcar and to impede us in carrying on our Investment, Our Success in which under their present Circumstances they cannot see but with the greatest concern, and therefore spare no pains or leave no Artifice Untried to carry their Point against Us.

N^o. 134 and 135 from the Deputy Gov^r. & Council of Fort St. David, the first dated the 10th. acknowledging the receipt of the Money sent them the 5th. instant, the other of the 12th. instant in Answer to our remarks on their Cloth sent them the 19th. Ultimo Advising of His Majesty's Squadron having been all there & supplied with Water and Provisions, and that there were many of their People Sick ashore besides French Prisoners, Advising also that the French had just then sent the Nabob a Present, and that the Mermaid passing through their Road had put M^r. Baird ashore.

The President acquaints the Board that since last Consultation he had discoursed with Hodjee Addy on the Nabob's last Letter; and the Message he brought from him, Upon which he has occasion to observe to them, that what the Nabob expects from the English seems to be very unreasonable, and entirely out of our Power to comply with, it being no less than that there should be no Hostilitys Committed by the Men of War in the Road of Pondicherry, The Ports belonging to the Great

Mogul, or along the Coast, although in his former Letter he had only insisted on the Land Upon which the President had told Hodjee Addy, in order for him to lay the same before the Nabob that this was dictating to us in a manner it is impossible for us to Submit to, that he had been already told the Men of War were under Separate and particular Orders, that we could not Answer for their Conduct any further than that it would be no otherwise than Conformable to the Rules of War and Custom of Nations, and that there was no intention in the English to disturb the Peace of his Government; Our Differences were with the French in consequence of the War declared by them in Europe which must of course continue 'till it was the pleasure of our respective Sovereigns to put an end to it, after which the President read a Letter designed as an Answer to the Nabob's which is approved, and both are as entered hereafter.

The Nabob having some days ago Solemnized the Marriage of his Daughter with Keradeen Cawn, sent the President on the occasion a Horse and Seerpaw, as he had done the same to the Governour of Pondicherry, who had made him a Present to the Amount of Three thousand Pagodas as also one to the Duan, which Appears to be the more extraordinary as this is the First instance of a Nabob's complimenting the European Governours on the Marriage of their Daughters, and therefore we are inclined to think the French have some other view in making so large a one at this time, and their daily Solicitations at the Durbar for his Protection may be considered as the first and grand Motive which not being our Case at present, there is the less call on Us to be so very liberal in an Affair which Appears without precedent; However we cannot think it prudent not to make him some acknowledgment, and therefore agree to the sending him some Gold Mohurs and a piece of Silver Plate which are proper to be presented on such Occasions, to the amount of about 350 Pagodas.

The President having some time since intimated to M^r. Barnett that there would be Three Ships expected from the Northward, and two or three from Bengal, the former with the Honourable Company's Bales, and the getting them up in safety no small part of our Care, the Commodore had thereupon sent the Dolphin being the only Ship he could Spare for the Service, to Cruize between this Place and Vizagapatam, but as a considerable Number of their Men were ashore Sick at S^t. David's and that they had Mann'd the Medway's Prize which together had considerably lessen'd the number of their People aboard the other Ships, That a Party of our Military was judged by him to be very necessary for the greater Security of the Shipping which 'tis agreed to send aboard her as soon as we can be satisfied with the reasons for the Nabob's Journey to S^t. Thomé, where he is soon expected, Reports concerning this being various.

I have been lately informed that some English Ships are arrived in the road of Tevenapataia with design to inflame your Differences with the French & that they are waiting there for their Ships. I have therefore Ordered Hodjee Abdul Hadee to deliver you my Taukeed to put an End to the Dispute between you & desire you will, agreeable to what he will propose to you, avoid making any Disturbance in these parts, Otherwise You will be called upon to Answer for it hereafter. I have also laid my Taukeed upon the French about this Businsss, & by their Letters I understand that they are inclined to peace.

What can I say more.

TO NABOB ANWARADHAN CAWN BHAUDER.

I have received your Excellency's Letter in which you are pleased to mention to me that the arrival of the English Ships of War at Tevenapatam had Occasioned Some alarm, and that you had therefore sent Hodjee Abdul Hadee to me to deliver Your Taukeed to put an End to the Disputes between the English & French, I observe by this that Your Excellency is no Stranger to the Motives for their Assiduous application to you at this time, But I was in hopes what I have had the honour to Say to your Excellency in my former Letters on this Subject would have been fully Satisfactory, to those I beg leave to refer as they contain all that is in my Power to Engage for, other Points Your Excellency will readily Judge, must be determined by the good Pleasure of our Respective Sovereigns. In the Meantime, give me leave to ask the favour of your Excellency that you will not Suffer our Enemys to Amuse You with any false insinuations to our Prejudice, thereby to create a Misunderstanding between Arcot & Chinapatam, I may with the greater reason desire this as the French Nation have from time, immemorial never Scrupled to obtain their Ends by false Colouring & Artifice when force proved defective on their Side. By their Intrigues and breach of Treatys they have set all Europe in a Flame and they would be willing Some of the Sparks Should take in these Parts, but by Your Excellencys Penetration I am perswaded they will be disappointed in Such Designs and that it will End in their Confusion.

An Order to Captain Pigot Signed to send ashore the Treasure he has on board for this Presidency.

AGREED that Mess^{rs}. Monson and Johnson examine the Dolphin's Treasure when it comes ashore in the presence of the Captain.

Captain Pigot's Instructions Shewing Us that he has some Soldiers on board for this Place, it's agreed to order them ashore.

AGREED that the Dolphin's Treasure be disposed of to Supply the Cash under the direction of the President and Warehousekeeper.

Captains Charles Hopkins and Michael Collins deliver in their report of the Benjamin as now read and entered hereafter setting forth that they think her in a proper condition to take in the Hon^{ble} Company's Goods.

ORDERED that the Warehousekeeper begin to load her & that the Secretary give Captain Way a Copy of the Usual Caution against Fire and Keeping the Boats long on board with Bales in them.

As it may be of great Importance that the Gentlemen in Bengal should receive their Advices by the Dolphin as early as possible, and one M^r. John Jackson being about to proceed thither on the Dutch Europe Ship the Marquette that will Sail for the Bay tomorrow or next day, the Mermaid's return from the Southward being uncertain, and no other Conveyance to be depended on, it's agreed to forward the Dolphin's Bengal Packet under his Charge giving him with it an Order to the Master or Pilot of any of the Honourable Company's Sloops he may meet with in Balasore Road or the River of Bengal to receive it of him and proceed with it directly to Calcutta.

—FORT ST. GEORGE, AUGUST 1745—

AGREED to Dispatch a Patamar to Bombay this Week with the Advices brought us by the Dolphin & with Copies of the 14th. 15th. 16th. and 17th. Paragraphs of our Honourable Masters Orders under the 21st. December last, and of the 7th. Paragraph of the 4th. January respecting their Ship Essex and their Ordering another of their Ships thither from Bengal.

AGREED that Ensign William De Morgan have the Command of the party of Soldiers to be sent on board His Majesty's Ship Dolphin when she is ready for Sailing & that he be Ordered to act with them under the direction of Captain Stephens.

The Secretary delivers in as entered hereafter a List he received from Captain Pigot of the Names of the Thirteen Soldiers he received on board the Dolphin in England & of which he has delivered Ten here, the other three being dead or deserted.

The President mentions to the Board his having received a Letter from Calcutta of the 3^d. of last month in which 'tis said there was a report of Mustapha Cawn being Cut-off by a Party of the Nabob's People, and that Business began to revive, the Morattas being also retired to the Punjack Country.

Whilst the Board were sitting notice was given by Signals from S^t. Thomá of the Nabob's Arrival, whereupon he was Saluted with Sixty one Guns, and before they rose the Chief Dubash and Mullah returned from thence & acquainted the President that the Nabob had received his Compliments in a very kind manner, and on his Arrival at S^t. Thomá had dismissed them with his in return to the President.

It being usual on these occasions for two of the Council to wait on the Nabob from the President, Mess^{rs}. Eyre and Fowke were accordingly desired to go on that Service and to be ready to proceed to S^t. Thomá at three this afternoon.

The Nabob having with him his Son Abdull Vahaib Cawn, and Sampetrow his Daun, to all whom we are by Custom obliged to make Presents: The President & Warehousek^r. are desired to provide such things as they are informed will be most acceptable and are to be met with in Town to the amount of about Two thousand Pagodas in the whole including what small Matters must necessarily be given to the Under Officers & Servants.

As we shall shortly be in want of Madrass Pagodas to send to the Northern Settlements the President is desired to purchase if procurable as far as Twenty thousand.

The President acquaints the Board that in consequence of our Resolution at last meeting he has Contracted with a Shroff for twenty thousand 20000, Madrass Pagodas at Nine and a half ₹ Cent Batta to be delivered us the 1st. or 2^d. of next month.

Domingo de Crux a Topass who has served upwards of Fifteen years, being deprived of Sight & incapable of further Duty; ORDERED that he be put on the Pensioners Roll at One Pagoda ₹ month.

Being in great want of Stationary Ware for the Several Offices here and at the Subordinate Settlements and uncertain when our Supplies may Arrive, & the Dolphin's Manifest shewing that one of her Officers has some in his adventure, ORDERED that the Storekeeper buy such of it as is proper for our Occasions.

AGREED to dispatch Patamars tomorrow to Tellicherry and Anjengo, with advice of the Arrival here of our Hoñble Masters Ship Dolphin from England.

Commodore Barnett having mentioned to Our President that he should want a Conveyance to carry Some Orders to Lord Northesk; It's agreed to keep the Mermaid in readiness for that Service, and that in her way She call at Vizagapatam to deliver some Madrass Pagodas for the Use of the other Northern Settlements.

It being then debated what it might be best for us to do with the Dolphin, Her Voyage to China this year being impracticable, It was considered that as She has only a Parcel of Copper on board for the Bay, a heavy Article there, and we cannot spare any Treasure to Send on her, Her going thither can serve no Useful purpose: That Wages and Expences in this War time run high. That there is no probability of any of the other Ships arriving in time to be Dispatched at this Season, that We shall have upwards of Three thousand five hundred Bales ready by the end of next month of which the Benjamin will not take above Fifteen hundred, and the rest must lye in our Warehouse 'till January. That if it should happen to be Peace in Europe, and this Ship receive intelligence thereof, it may be of great Service to Our Honourable Masters to have her Additional Number of Bales at the Market and no opportunity offering of employing her advantageously in the Country till the next proper Season for China, it was Unanimously agreed to be most for the Company's Interest and therefore resolved to load her now for Europe.

The President reads the Cash Account for last month, ballance remaining now compared with the Chest Thirty thousand two hundred and one Current Pagodas twenty Seven Fanams and Sixty five Cash 30201. 27. 65, and Eight hundred forty one 841 Madrass Pagodas.

The Import Warehousekeeper pays in Eleven thousand Pagodas viz^t.

On Account of Rupees Sold	P. 4000	} P. 11000.
On Account of Silver Sold	7000	

Diddee Gruapa, Farmer of the Butteca Rent & Shroff Duty pay in one hundred and 102 [*sic*] Pagodas, Eighteen 18 fanams for three Months rent due the 30th. April last.

The twenty thousand 20000 Madrass Pagodas agreed for at last meeting being now delivered in, the amount of them at Nine and a half ₹ Cent Batta being Twenty one thousand nine hundred 21900 Pagodas Current, is now paid for them.

AGREED to send Five thousand 5000 Pagodas overland to S^t. Davids tomorrow, and Five thousand 5000, more on Monday next.

Commodore Barnett having Signified to the President his purpose of Sending the Medway's Prize with His Orders to The Lord Northesk, It's agreed to dispatch the Mermaid to Vizagapatam with twenty thousand Madrass Pagodas for the use of that and the other Northern Settlements: That is, Eight thousand for Vizagapatam: Six thousand to be forwarded from thence to Ingeram, And Six thousand in like manner to Maddepollam, and orders to the Chief and Council to return her to Us immediately.

M^r. Stratton representing to us the necessity of his presence at Vizagapatam, for the recovering some Mony due to him there, and desiring our permission to proceed thither on the Mermaid. It's agreed to grant his request, and to direct the Chief and Council to give him all possible assistance therein.

Having reason to apprehend our being in want of Packing Stuff for our own and the Bales of the Subordinate Settlements, an Indent to the Bay for those Articles & some Oil and Paper is now formed to be forwarded by the way of Vizagapatam, which it's agreed to request may be sent us compleat. Any of the Articles which may be now on their way hither not being accounted as part of this Indent.

—FORT ST. GEORGE, SEPTEMBER 1745—

The Storekeeper desiring the directions of the Board about the method of Computing the Cost of the Provisions Supplied the Men of War, from Bengal, and on this Coast in conformity to the Commands of the Secret Committee under the 18th. April 1744, He is ordered to bring the Cost of the Bengal Provisions into Pagodas at 350 Current Rupees for 100 Pagodas, and the Pagodas into Weighty Dollars at 14 $\frac{3}{4}$ Dollar Weight (the Price now in Town) for 10 Pagodas, reducing the Dollars into Sterling at Six Shillings and Six Pence, as ordered in the said Letter.

A Letter from Captain Pigot of the Dolphin read as entered hereafter, setting forth that not having occasion for the Chest of Treasure sent out with him for Disbursements on his Ship, and having also several Articles of Stores Specified in a List annexed to his Said Letter, more than are necessary to his Voyage home, he is desirous to deliver them ashore here. ORDERED that the Warehousekeeper and Storekeeper give Captain Pigot Receipts for the Said Treasure and Stores.

The Storekeeper reminding the Board of Some parcels of Old Gun Barrels lying here which the Commanders of the Charterparty Ships are very backward to take on board but on Freight, it's agreed to send them on the Company's own Ship the Dolphin.

The President then told the Board that being informed the orders from Our Honourable Masters to Bengal concerning the Provision to be made for the Commanders of His Majesty's Squadron in India, who might go thither, were, To receive and treat the Commodore with the honours paid to a President and the other Captains as Seconds, and that preparations were accordingly made there for entertaining them in a handsome manner. He (the President) had caused the Garden House to be fitted up; Two Palankeens to be new Mounted; Servants to be in readiness; Live Provisions to be laid in, and Several other preparations to be made necessary to the lodging & Boarding the Commodore, and such other Captains of His Squadron as may come hither. Being guided in this by what had passed when M^r. Matthews was here; But that Since the receipt of Our Honourable Masters Orders of the 21st. December last, "To Supply the Captains with Madera Wine for their own Table at prime Cost", he has been under some doubt whether the Commands of the Secret Committee under the 18th. April 1744, "To Shew them all due Civility and Respect", would Warrant so extensive a Construction as the providing for them at the Company's Charge, besides which it has been hinted to him, That Commodore Barnett has since his arrival drop'd Some intimation of his being told in England, it was to be so, And expressed some uneasiness at his not having been made certain in that respect. He (the President) therefore desired the thoughts of the Board how it will be most becoming to Act on the Occasion.

A Reference being thereupon had to the Paymaster's Accounts, Consultations, and Letters of 1722 & 1723, there Appeared several Items of Disbursements on Account of Commodore Matthews and Captain Maine, which indeed we dont find any Order from England to warrant, nor on the other hand any disapproval of it from thence, when done, And are therefore induced to beleive it was at that time intended in England that M^r. Matthews and the Captains with him should have their Expences ashore in the Companys Settlements defrayed at their Charge, And though we are not the proper Judges of the Merit of the Services this Squadron has already done to Our Honourable Masters Affairs in India, yet we cannot help thinking those Services & the Zeal the Commodore expresses for the promoting their Interest will be seen by them in so favourable a Light as to justify our putting that construction on their Orders, "To Shew the Captains all due Civility and Respect", And upon the whole are Unanimously of opinion that when they are pleased to consider that a regard to their Reputation and Credit is the only motive by which we are biassed in it, they will not be displeased at our taking that Charge upon them; It's therefore agreed to do it and the President is desired as he sees occasion, to satisfy the Commodore in any doubts he may discover him to entertain on that score.

As the Gentlemen at S^t. David's may passibly [*sic*] be under a necessity of making some small Present to the Nabob if he passes near them, It's agreed [to] send thither some Broad Cloth and other things proper for such a purpose.

—FORT ST. GEORGE, SEPTEMBER 1745—

AGREED to permit the repairing & Rebuilding the Godowns at Bandepollam and Tevenepatam washing Places upon the representation made Us from S^t. David's of the necessity of those Works, and that they will Cost but about Four hundred Pagodas.

The Agent Victualer of His Majesty's Squadron having asked for the Accounts of what has been disbursed for them at S^t. David's, It's agreed to order them to be sent us up immediately.

The Medway's Prize being to Sail for the Bay about the latter end of the Week, It's agreed by that opportunity to repeat our request to the Gentlemen there that in Case the Shipping of this year should arrive first with them they will reserve a part of the Bullion they bring for us as we have no prospect of being able to carry on our business by any other means, and that they will also Send Us the Wares, Stores and Military that may be Consigned us on them.

The Durrington and Beaufort having been detain'd last year in the Bay by the late Arrival of the Salt Petre, It's agreed to advise thither that we shall have about Three thousand Five hundred Bags of Salt Petre remaining in our Godowns after the Dispatch of the Benjamin and Dolphin, And that should their Salt petre not come down in proper time we can supply the Ships sent hither for the January Dispatch with that Quantity.

AGREED also by that Conveyance to intimate to the Gentlemen in the Bay that though we have hopes of a larger Number, yet the uncertainty of Affairs in the Mogul Empire being considered we cannot venture to ask for more Tonnage in December than for Three thousand Bales.

As the London may possibly pass this Port and proceed to the Bay, It's agreed to propose thither unless She brings any other particular Orders, the employing her in some voyage in the Country so as that she may be here in the Season for China, but if no such Opportunity offers with a prospect of more Advantage than her coming hither that they will in such Case send her to Us with a Loading of good Rice in December.

Another Letter from Captain Pigot of the Dolphin read as entered hereafter, setting forth that from the Sharpness of the Built of his Ship her Charterparty proportion of Saltpetre is not sufficient Kintlage for her & therefore he requests Five hundred 500 Bags more than that quantity. ORDERED that the Warehousekeeper comply with Captain Pigot's request.

The Board then adjourned to the Sea Gate to attend the Sale of the Farms & the damaged Woolen Goods.

N^o. 142, from the Cheif and Council of Vizagapatam of the 21st. Ultimo, Advising the Arrival there of the Sumatra with the Treasure for that Place, Ingeram & Ganjam and that She proceeded directly for the last, and inclosing their Monthly Papers for July.

N^o. 143 and 144 both from the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort St. David of first dated the 7th. Instant, promising their Endeavours to make their Merchants bring in good Cloth: And to Send up their disbursements on His Majesty's Squadron; Advising their having been obliged to make Presents to the Nabob and his Officers as he passed them, and referring to an enclosed Report of M^r. Smith for the necessity of enlarging the South West Bastion of the Fort continuing the Ditch to the River at that Corner in the same manner as is done at the South East, And also of making a Plat Form on the south side toward the River with Flanks, Adding a Computation of the Cost of each of those Works, and acquainting us with M^r. Holt's request to come up hither for a few days. The other of the 8th. Instant acknowledging the Receipt of the Money sent them the 3^d.

N^o. 145 and 146, both from the President and Council of Fort William: The first dated the 11th. Ultimo Advising of Packing Stores and Peas on board the Mercury for Us and Commodore Barnett. Desiring us to ease them if We can in the Articles of Lead and Ordinary Green Broad Cloth coming out to them, and to pay the Danish Missionaries some Money on Account of the two Chests of Bullion sent out for them on the Wager; And Advising of their purpose to dispatch a Sloop either to this Place or Vizagapatam with a further Supply of Packing Stuff for us and of Peas for the Commodore. The other of the 19th. Ultimo acknowledging the receipt of Ours of the 1st. of that Month, Advising the Mercury's being Burn^t. Of a Packet for England: Ours from thence by the Wager & some of the Iron Guns and Broad Cloth Consigned us on that Ship, & of Four hundred thirty seven Bags more of Peas for the Commd^{re}. sent hither on the Tryall Sloop, both Letters repeating their request for all the Treasure we can spare them: Advising also of their being disappointed of the Gunneys they expected to have sent us on the Tryall Sloop, and that they had not received the Invoice of the Peas from Patna.

The Wager's Packet for this Presidency being then opened, was found to contain all the Papers particularized in it's List except those under N^o. 3, 4, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 17, which have been taken out in Bengal, and of all which copies have been sent us, except the Copy of that Ship's Charterparty & the Patterns of the Broad Cloth and Flannels N^o. 6 and 17, The Letters therein being Copies of what we have before received & acknowledg'd those from the Honble Court of Directors bearing date the 11th. January and 21st. March 1743, That from the Secret Committee the 23^d. of March 1743; With these came to hand also a Letter from M^r. Secretary Mole of the 2^d. April 1744, now read & inclosing several of His Majesty's Declarations of War against the French King.

Draught of a Letter to Our Honble Masters to be forwarded by a Danes Ship intended to sail from Tranquebar about the latter end of this month, read & approved.

Captains Charles Hopkins & James Barton deliver in their Report of our Honble Masters Ship Dolphin as now read and entered hereafter, setting forth that they find her in a proper condition to take in her Cargo for Europe.

—FORT ST. GEORGE, SEPTEMBER 1745—

ORDERED that the Warehousekeeper begin to Load her, guiding himself therein by a Coast & Bay Charter party, and that the Secretary send Captain Pigot a Copy of the Caution against Fire and keeping the Boats long on board with Bales in them.

The Import Warehousekeeper pays in Eight thousand 8000 Pagodas on Account of Silver sold.

He also delivers in as entered hereafter the Account Sale of the damaged Woolen put up at Outery the 2^d. instant, amounting to Two thousand one hundred Seventy five Pagodas eighteen Fanams, 2175. 18.

The Honble Company's Farms put up at Outery at the same time not producing near the prices they are at present let for, were bought in on their Account, the Board having reason to expect better Terms.

The Fort St. David Letter of the 7th. instant being again read, the Board found occasion to differ in Opinion with the Gentlemen there, who say, "That as the Warriapollam and Chemanaickpollam Cloths are so near of a Price & Fineness they Apprehend it to be of little consequence to the Company which of them their Investment consists of." Which We think liable to this remark, That as those Sorts are Manufactured in different parts of the Country, If their Merchants purchase only one of those Sorts the Investment will be lessen'd by all that might be provided of the other Sort : And therefore as the Warriapollam when good has always been acceptable in Europe, It's agreed to recommend to them the procuring all they can of the Warriapollam sort as well as of the other.

The Neighbourhood of Pondicherry & the defects in the Fort at St. David's set forth in the said Letter and Mr. Smith's report being considered, we think ourselves obliged to permit the rebuilding of the Southwest Bastion continuing the Ditch with a Drawbridge & removing the Range of Buildings along the Southside as therein described but to Suspend 'till Our Honble Masters Pleasure shall be known the raising the proposed Platform, which though it may give a considerable Addition of Strength, does not appear to us so immediately necessary as those other Works.

AGREED that Mr. Holt's request to come up hither for few days be granted.

AGREED also to send to Fort St. David on the Ketch of that Name, such of the Stores Indented for from thence as our present Stock will permit. And also to send thither overland this Evening a supply of Five thousand, 5000, Pagodas.

SIR

I herewith send you an Account of one Months Pay for the Sloop Tryall & likewise an Account for one Month's Provisions & an Account of Pease received & delivered on Board the Tryall with the Receipts for those delivered on board his Majesty's Ships.

As to those that's damaged I am very sorry for it, & was partly owing to the Badness of the Dunnage, which was laid & 300 Bags on board before I came on board of her, or either of them that's with me now, & She is but badly overhauled in her Upper Works, for when I got to the Southward of the Point that she came to lay along & beat against ahead Sea She made Water, that before We knew of it She had Seventeen Inches; We set the Pump to work directly, but Such Quantity of Pease came up that choaked the Pumps, so that We was forced to draw the Pumps every Quarter of an Hour, and was near 7 or 8 Hours before I could get her out, after that We always kept her so as to have never above 56 or 7 at most but the Quantity of Pease being between Timbers rotted & choaked the Limbers that the Water could not get to the Pumps but lay there with the Motion of the Sloop continually washing up. Now Sir, as I had not the looking after, nor the Management of any thing that occasioned this Damage, I hope the Gentlemen will not be so hard upon me as to think of making me be accountable for it which is all at present from

The President acquaints the Board that the ill Success of the late Betle and Tobacco Farmers though in great Measure to be Ascribed to the bad management of the late Renters, had raised so general [*sic*] an Apprehension of Suffering by that Cowle that very few Offers have been made him for it and those not exceeding the Price bid for it at the Sea Gate; But that Linga Chitty and Bundla Mootal having discovered some Inclination towards it, he had since the Expiration of that Cowle Empower'd them to Collect that Revenue in the Company's Name in order for a trial, as he had for the same reason Appointed Permall Kellaway and Pittour Vencata Kistna two others of Our Inhabitants generally reputed Men of Substance to receive those of the Measuring Duty and Town Brokerage in consequence of which and a good deal of persuasion on his part he had brought the two first to offer the former Rent of Ten thousand 10000 Pagodas ₹ Annum for the Beetle Farm, and the other two to offer One thousand 1000 Pagodas ₹ Annum the price last given for the Measuring Duty & Eight hundred 800 for the Town Brokerage the Price bid for it at the Sea Gate, and one hundred 100 Pagodas ₹ Annum more than the last rent, And seeing no probability of obtaining better terms he had ordered the several Persons to Attend this morning for the Board's Resolution upon their Proposals.

They were accordingly called in and after having asked the favour and Countenance of the Board thereby to Assist them in preventing, as far as may be, the running of Beetle and Tobacco into the Town, which the Moors and others have for some Year's practiced to the great Loss and damage of the Farmer's, they agreed to the taking The three Farms at the Rates mentioned in the foregoing Paragraph, which the Board were readily inclined to accept, as they had little expectation of being able to obtain that Sum for the Beetle and Tobacco Farm under the disadvantageous Character it has borne some time past.

The President then told the Board that he could not meet with any Body that would give more than Forty five 45, Pagodas ₹ Annum for the Farm of Fishing in the River and none appeared forward to take it even at that price, and though it is far from agreeable to him to contribute to the diminution of any of the Com^{py}'s Revenues whilst he has the Honour to preside over their Affairs, yet when it is considered how small an Addition that will make and that it is a Tax on only our Soldiery and the poorest of the Inhabitants, who are supplied with the Fish taken in the River, he is

inclined to beleive that Our Honourable Masters, knowing that Circumstance will not be displeas'd at our discontinuing to Farm it out till their further Orders, the Board being of the same Opinion and the Decrease of the Revenues by that Farm being more than compensated by the increase in the Rent of the Town Brokerage, it's agreed not to let the Fishing Farm till we know our Hon'ble Masters pleasure concerning it.

The Sumatra having almost all her Red Wood on board, it's agreed to dispatch her tomorrow & to desire the Gentlemen in the Bay to return her to us at the earliest of the Season with some Packing Stuff which we shall be greatly in want of for Embalging our Goods and that they will fill up her, or any other Vessels they may have occasion to Consign us with good Rice if procurable, as the want of the Supplies we used to have from Pegue and other places gives reason to fear that if our Monsoon should not prove favourable our Inhabitants may be in great distress.

AGREED also to request that the Princess Augusta if she should have passed this Port and arrive in the Bay may be returned us as early as possible.

The Success being near ready to Return to Ingeram and we not being able to spare any Goods for Packing, The Warehousekeeper, is ordered to return M^r. Saunders the Covers of the Bales last received from him which he may make use of for the Cloth he sends us in December when having received our expected Supplies we may repack them here.

M^r. Shelmedine who brought the Advice Snow hither and the Lascars who came on her purposing to return to Bombay on the Success Galley, the Storekeeper is Ordered to put on board two Months provisions for them.

Draught of a Letter to Bombay to go by the Success Galley read, Advising of what has Occurred on this Side respecting his Majesty's, Our Hon'ble Masters and the French Shipping.

The Board being satisfied of the necessity of preventing the bad Consequences of such a practice, it's ordered that the Paymaster get a Seal made for the Use of the Sheriffs and their Officers & that the Device of it be The Maces crossed on the Sword in a Mashle, with Shiriff of Madrasspatnam in a Circle round it, and that publick Notice be given by Beat of Tom Tom That any person detected in breaking off the Seals affixed by the Sheriff or his Officers shall be punished at the discretion of this Board.

That we may not lose this Season of most leisure to prepare the necessary directions to be sent to the West Coast, the President proposes the Appointing a Committee of the Board to examine the Books and papers received from thence, & as none of the present Members have resided on that Coast except the President he promises his Assistance therein to Mess^{rs}. Johnson & Fowke who offer themselves for that Service.

As it may be of the highest Importance to Our Honourable Masters to be advised of the successfull state of this Year's Investment both in Bengal and here, and how necessary it will be that both the Presidencies should be Speedily and largely Supplied with Money, it's agreed to advise thereof Overland by the way of Bussora, desiring the Gentlemen of Bombay to forward our Letter thither.

The Export Warehousekeeper acquaints the Board that the Seventy Bales of Salampores received from Ganjam having been all opened and Counted there are found wanting Seventy five Pieces which we suppose M^r. Andrews will recover of the Boat fellows.

As we have not received any of our expected Supplies of Packing Stuff from the Bay it's agreed to direct the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam, Ingeram & Madepollam to Supply themselves in the best manner they can in the Country about them. The President hereupon told the Board that he sometime since Sent M^r. Andrews a Muster of a good sort of Gunneys to try whether the People about Ganjam would undertake the making them, to which M^r. Andrews having Answered him in the Affirmative he proposed & it was agreed to order him to provide three or four thousand Pieces.

The Paymaster acquaints the Board that having called upon Peter Dencker and James Calvineer to discharge their Bond, they had in Answer delivered him a Petition which he now produces and is read as entered hereafter Setting forth that the demand of His Majesty's Ships for Provisions at this Port having been far less than they had reason to expect they had Supplied them only to the Amount of Two hundred thirty Pagodas fourteen fanams and thirty Cash 230. 14. 30 which they pray may be accepted in part discharge of their Bond and that the Board will grant them a further time for payment of the remainder: The Board being Satisfied of the Truth of what they alledge, ORDERED the Paymaster to examine the Vouchers they offer of the Provisions Supplied by them to His Majesty's Ships and if he find them Authentick, that the Amount be endorsed off their Bond & that they be allowed till the first of March next for the discharging the remainder.

David Merchants in motion and Spirit, making it necessary to manage our present Stock with the best husbandry it's agreed to recommend to our Gentlemen at Vizagapatam, Ingeram and Madepollam to use the most prudent Methods of carrying on their business with the Moneys now in their hands, reserving Sufficient for their necessary Expences till we are able to send them some Supplies.

The Cowles for the Beetle and Tobacco Farm, Measuring Duty and Town Brokerage dated the 7th. instant and drawn conformable to our Consultation of that date, read, approved and Signed and delivered to the respective Farmers now attending by Appointment.

Agreecable to Your Orders we have peruted [*sic*] & examined the Several Books and Papers received from the West Coast by the Ships Sumatra, Benjamin and Princess Augusta, on which we beg leave to offer the following Remarks.

The bad Weather and Interruptions that the Cæsar met with in taking in the Pepper to the Northward Obliged the Gentlemen to Alter their first Design of Sending her to Manna to fill up, and as it happened, that Determination proved very fortunate, for by the many Disasters to the Boats, that Ship must have run a great Risque of losing her Passage to Europe, had She been sent instead of the Sumatra: This leads us to take Notice, that as this often proves the Case, it might prevent an Accident of that kind, if the Pepper from the Southern Settlements was brought to Marlborough, and lodged in the Godowns there, ready for Exportation; which, As they have the Brilliant and Several Small Sloops, might without Difficulty be performed, and thereby the Shipping for Europe have an early Dispatch.

As the Sum disbursed by Captain Gay at Batavia Appears considerable, and as several of the Charges are esteemed by the Gentlemen at Marlborough to be very large, for which reason they have chose to refer them to this place we have therefore for Your Honour & c^s Satisfaction extracted & Annexed hereto the several Particulars of the Disbursements under different Heads; that you might be the better enabled to judge how far M^r. Gay's Estate ought to be Answerable for any Over Charges inserted in his Account; to this we shall add Such Remarks as have Occurred to us in the Examination of the said Papers.

There is no other Voucher come than the Dutch Bill, that it is impossible for us to discover where the Purchase was made; therefore we cannot pretend to say whether M ^r . Under these Disbursements we find Three Hundred Dollars charged for Coach Hire, and Nine Hundred Twenty four for Seven Months Fifteen Days Diet at Four Rix Dollars Ɔ Day, in Casting up of which there is a Mistake of Eight Dollars. We know not what has been customary to allow the Captains of these Vessels, any further than that we find Cap^t. Goring in his Acco^t. Curr^t. entered after the West Coast Consultation of the 3^d. August 1744 charged, and was paid the Same which we may Suppose M^r. Gay looked on as a Precedent; but we Observe M^r. Massey's is no more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ Spanish Dollar Ɔ Day. As to the Presents and other Charges, they may be looked upon as unavoidable at Batavia; and as to the Coach Hire, Some Part of that Expen^{ce} may have been necessary, as M^r. Gay was sent in a publick Character.

Thus we have given Your Honour &c^t. an Account of the Several Articles that make up this Sum of 14769. 70 which indeed Appears a large Sum; but as we have explained how it has Arisen, we beleive You will think with us that the Part M^r. Gay has acted is less deserving of Blame than it was at first imagined. His Letter to the Deputy Governour & Council from Batavia fully sets forth the Reason for his long stay, and by a Reference to the Instructions Sent with him we cannot find he has disobeyed those Commands. The Repairing the Vessel was particularly recommended to him, and which we find he executed as far as he was able; the Vessel being reported by Mess^{rs}. Way an[d] Milne to have returned in good Condition, with the Alterations and Repairs as mentioned by them After a Survey on her.

Since the Dispatch of the Benjamin from the West Coast, when the Gentlemen there represented that the Season had been very favourable to the Crops of Corn, whence they had Reason to hope they should want no further Supplies of Rice from this place or Bengall, they had been informed from Several Parts of the Country that the Inclemency of the Weather had done much Damage to the Paddy Plantations; wherefore they judged it proper to have One Thousand Bags in Store, which they desire may be sent to them, as well as a large Quantity of Salt.

The sending the Silver which was not Current, and the Care taken to replenish the Cash, was no doubt highly proper, for fear of any Accident Attending the Outward bound Ship, especially as on that Coast there is no Money to be borrowed upon any Emergency.

We observe that the Coast last Year produced Something above seven Hundred Ton of Pepper, but that there is Reason to believe this Year's will be Something less. The Plantations in several Parts to the Southward of Marlborough are represented by the last Surveys to be in a ruinous Condition, which they are endeavouring to

restore, This is fully Set forth in the General Letters, wherein the Reasons are Assigned for this Misfortune, namely the long Famine, and the Obstinacy of the People as to the receiving the Milled Money, both which have proved extremely Unfortunate to the Welfare of that Coast, and from whence it is to be fear'd there will be a Decrease in the Quantity of Pepper for Some Years to come.

The Accounts of Several of the Settlements are not past regularly in Consultation, Some having been delayed from Six to Eight months; the Reason urged is, that there were mistakes in them, which perhaps will not be thought a Sufficient Excuse either to the Honble Company, or to Your Honour &c^a. The General Books not having been ballanced in time to be sent by the Princess Augusta, we cannot now Speak any further of the Accounts."

AGREED to permit the Deputy Governour and Council to accept the said Loan and to send them our Interest Bond for it payable to Mahomud Allibeck the Person mentioned by the Deputy Governour to the President as tendering the Money, and under blank date to be filled at S^t. David's with the time when it is paid.

ORDERED that on the receipt of the said Money being Advised hither Mahomud Allibeck be Credited therewith in our Cash Account and that Fort S^t. David be debted for it as a Remittance from hence.

The President acquainting the Board that Lieutenant John De Morgan of Fort S^t. David had signified to him his being desirous to pay Twelve hundred 1200 Pagodas into the Company's Cash here at Interest, it's agreed to receive and give Bond for the same when tendered.

The President reads the Cash Account for last month ballance remaining now compared with the Chest Thirty nine thousand and thirty one Current Pagodas twelve Fanams and four Cash 39031. 12. 4, and fifteen hundred Sixteen 1516 Madrass Pagodas.

He also acquaints the Board that having an Opportunity of purchasing four hundred Eighty four 484 Madrass Pagodas at ten 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ Cent Batta he had bought them.

The President delivers to the Secretary to be read the following Extract of a Letter he received last Night from M^r. Hinde of the 26th. Instant.

—“Since the foregoing I have had all the People almost in Cuddalore with me who have just received advice that M^r. Dupleix has prepared Sixty Mussoolas and is determined to Attack Cuddalore; Nothing but his being Mad can make this Scheme feasible, but however, as despair may make him so, and as too much Security is often Attended with ill Consequences, I take the liberty to give it as my Opinion that this place ought to be reinforced immediately, especially as it can be done by Sea so commodiously at this Season, and as it must be by Sea if he makes any attack on Cuddalore”.

The President told the Board that he last Night communicated the Contents of the said Letter to Commodore Barnett, who very readily offered to send the Deptford if it was thought necessary to lye off Cuddalore and to carry any reinforcement of Men we might determine to send thither and He had now called us together to take our Opinions on the matter.

Though the Board were backward to beleive that M^r. Dupleix will attempt any thing against Fort S^t. David or Cuddalore, whilst we have such Assistance as at present in our Road & to Windward of him; Yet as our accepting the Commodore's

offer & sending a party of Men to S^c. David's may quiet the Minds of the People in Cuddalore & our rejecting it, in Case of any Accident Subject us to deserved Blame. It's therefore agreed to accept it, and to Send on board the Deptford immediately a party of Fifty Men under the Command of Lieutenant Gingsins, Subject to the Orders of the Deputy Governour & Council, to whom it's agreed to Signify that if they are not absolutely necessary ashore we would have them sent on board the Admiral Vernon when she arrives there and to continue on board whilst she is taking in her Cargo for Europe.

ORDERED that the said party be drafted & Sent on board with the necessary provisions as soon as possible.

It then falling under debate whether on the Gentlemen of Bengal having wrote us under the 3^d. instant that they had detained the Edgebaston from proceeding to the Malabar Coast to be filled up for Europe and that they shall not after that Ship and the Wager are dispatched, be able to load above two of the expected Ships should they arrive there in time, we ought not to send one of the three Ships now in the Road intended for the Bay with some Saltpetre & Red Wood to the Malabar Coast to Supply the place of the Edgebaston as we have no reason to doubt of the Gentlemen on that side being prepared for such a Ship or that she will not arrive there in time for a seasonable dispatch, whereby there must probably be a considerable Saving of Demorage, it was unanimously agreed in the Affirmative and that the Kent be sent thither with all possible Expedition, as the Scarborough and Royal George, being quite full for the Bay, will either of them require more time to Shift and by that means possibly not arrive in time on the Malabar Coast. AGREED to acquaint Captain Robson with this our Resolution, to order him to prepare his Ship accordingly and to deliver as they shall be sent for, his Packets & what Stores were put on board him for Bengal Presidency in England, as well as those transported from the Admiral Vernon & Lincoln, & that such our Notification and order be Copied hereafter.

Having reason from the looks of the Weather soon to expect the Wind to shift to the Southward: It's agreed to send on board the Scarborough & Royal George all the Rupees we can get Coined against they are ready for Sailing, as we apprehend their early arrival in the Bay to be of far greater consideration than the Addition we can make to our remittance by only a few days detention.

As the Admiral Vernon and Lincoln will probably take away the Saltpetre we have by us and we may possibly be able to dispatch more than one Ship for England in September next it's agreed to take this early Opportunity by the Scarborough & Royal George to desire the Gentlemen in the Bay to supply us pretty largely with that Article.

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

Having received your order of the 29th. Instant, to prepare the Ship Kent with all Expedition, to proceed to the Malabar Coast, in order to fill up for Europe, I cannot Avoid representing to your Honour & c^s. that at the first of the Voyage, we perceived we had a Leak, on which Account we went into Hamoaze where having lightned the Ship, and had the Assistance and Opinion of Several Carpenters, and Caulkers as well from the Kings Yard, as the other Ships, when all possible means were us'd, we proceeded to Sea, but soon found we had Still a Leak, which Increased Upon us in any bad Weather, in the Voyage, and which we have not Yet been able to find out, and at which, The Ships Company are under very great uneasyness, and Disquit [*sic*]. This I thought it, needless to take Notice of to this board, whilst I was in Expectation of proceeding to the Bay, where I positively knew So Effectual A Search might be made, that the Leak might be Absolutely Stop'd, for we have many Sufficient reasons to beleive it is only Some perticular neglect of the Yard, and not a General Defect, But as that Oppertunity cannot possibly be had at Tellicherry, or Anjengo, and the Consequences of our going about the Cape, with Such a Leak, A Salt Petre Ballast, or Kentledge, and So late in the Year as we probably must, may be very detrimental both to the Honble Company, and may [*sic*] Owners, and my Silence on this Occasion Subject me to their just Censure.
