WORSHIPEL SIR AND SIRS

This replies to Yours of the 13th, past. The directions from hence for sending up with Your Book's a report of your annual Charges and Revenues is Conformable to our Method here, that is the Increase or decrease in the Charges are remarked to the Close of the Book's with the reasons for the same, the increase and Decrease in the Revenues are also remarked to the same time, but without any reasons; Those are annexed to the other Account of the revenues which is alway's drawn out to the end of Decr. Our Paymaster does also when [he] Passes his Month's Accot. deliver us a particular of all Extraordinary Disbursements over and above the fixed and Standing Expence which is Entered upon our Consultations and that is a Method we Would have practis'd with You and a Copy thereof sent us up hither together with the Copy of the Paymasters Account.

We observe the reasons you give for debting the Several build. for the Repairs and though we do not find any Such Instance in your Last Books Yet we have no Objection thereto, provided due Care be taken allways before the Close of the Books to write them off to the Head of Fortifications and Repairs.

Neither of the Europe Ships are Yet arrived from Bengall and having this Morning Taken into Consideration their dispatch from the Coast We have resolved to send them both from hence and to Send the George and Madrass Galley to take in What Bales You may have ready. We would have the George returned us first because we shall want her up hither to send to the West Coast before the Month is out. We are

The 31st. past we received Your favour of the 28th. Nov. by the George and Yesterday that of the 13th. Decr. by the Ship Grantham with the Several Papers Inclosed agreable to the List of the Packet.

We shall give your Presidency Credit for the Amount of the Invoice of what Laden on the Compton for the Use of the West Coast and also for the Amount of the Ship Georges fitting and Impress in the Bay.

By a Ship now going to Pegue we Shall give directions for building the two Sloops you wrote for and hope they may be ready to Send over to You in Aug<sup>st</sup>. but of that we Shall know more in April and if they can be got ready so Soon Shall send over Persons from hence to Navigate them, but if they Cannot be compleated before December or Jan<sup>17</sup>. next we reckon You will have an Opportunity to send their Crews from the Bay at a Much less Expence. But of this we Shall write You with More certainty in due time.

So soon as we have any advices from China and we know that the Normanton will not Come hither we shall send you such part of the Treasure designed for her as we Can spare, if our advices from China should be Late Your directions may reach us in time, Whether you would have what we send You in Bullion or Rupees.

We are obliged to Your Hon. &c. that you have sent us so Large a Proportion of Bales and a Quantity of Salt Petre to fill up in case of Need. We cannot Yet say whether we shall have Bales sufficient to Compleat the Tonnage of the ships, but however that be without You can send us 1000 or 1200 Bags in March we shall be prevented in sending a Ship from hence to the Com. in Sep. next, that We ought not to Disappoint them of if Possible to be avoided because of several advantages they are

pleased to write us they receive by the Arrival of a ship in time for the March Sale We doubt not you will supply us with as much as You Can spare, and We desire You Will Let us know by the first Conveyance what we are Depend upon.

SIR

We are desired by the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Coun<sup>1</sup>. of Calcutta, to give Directions to Pegus for Building two Sloops there on the Honble Company's Acco<sup>t</sup>. They have sent us a Draught of one of them w<sup>ch</sup>. we Send Under the Care of Cap<sup>n</sup>. Lutton and Direct sha

be built as near the Directions and Dimensions as Possible, we have no Directions abt. the other only that she be flatt floored not to draw above seven foot Water and abt. seventy Tons burthen to go over Ballasore Barr without Danger, we have thought fitt to Order that Henry Stringfellow be employed to build both the Sloops as a person of better understanding in that Way than any of the others who have set up for Builders. Before the Timbers and Plank are bot, for these Sloops a Survey must be taken of them whether they be good and fitt for the Purpose, after they are squared " and cutt out a Survey must be made before they are put to the Vessells and after their Hulls are compleated another survey must be made to see whether they are well and sufficiently performed, and all the several Surveys must be Signed by the Persons at them, and sent over to us, Particular Care must be taken in Caulking the Vessells. and if any of the Builders understood the Method practiced in England of Watering them, it Would be a great Means to Prevent such frequent Complaints of the Leakyness of the Vessells built in Pegue. By this Ship Galetea We send over all such stores as are judged Necessary for both the Sloops and Great Care must be taken of them that they receive no Damage, and When they are Wanted an Exact Account must be taken for Which Sloop they are used and Particular and Distinct accounts. must be kept of All other Charges and Disbursements on both the Sloops that We may know the Exact Cost of Each of them, Let us know if You have any Persons with You who are Capable to Navigate the Sloops over to Bengall in Augst. next by Which time we suppose they may be both ready to sail, if otherwise we Shall send you a Couple of Masters from hence in the little Monsoon together with as many Lascars as will be sufficient to sail them.

If You should be of opinion that they will not be finished and fitted before December or Jan . next the Gentlemen in Bengall will have an opportunity to send You from thence their own Masters and such other Hands as May be necessary at a Much Less Expence than from hence.

When the Sloops are finished You must put on board each such a Quantity of Iron as may be sufficient to Kintlage them, and the rest of their Loads. Consists of Crooked Timbers fitt for sloops of 70 to 80 Tons.

As the Timber & Iron must be purchased with ready Money, and that is alsowanted to pay the Workmen we send You on the Galetea Two Chests of Treasure web. we hope may be sufficient to answer all Occasions, if otherwise You may Draw Bills on us for wt. More may be wanted.

### Honble Sir and Sirs

The Ship Decker Cap<sup>n</sup>. Edward Williamson Left the Downs the 5<sup>th</sup>. July, the Cape the 17<sup>th</sup>. Oct<sup>r</sup>, and arrived at Anjengo the 11<sup>th</sup>. Jan<sup>r</sup>. from thence the first Ins<sup>t</sup>, we received the Inclosed Packett directed to Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>, with Orders from our Honble Masters to hasten it to you with all Expedition, that if Possible it might arrive with You before you Contract for this Years Investment, had it arrived a few hours sooner we shou'd have sent it by the Brigantine William that sailed the first in the Morn<sup>s</sup>., we are now obliged to send the Madrass Galley on purpose to Carry it to You & we think there is no fear of her Reach<sup>s</sup>, you in time, she did not arrive from Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David before the 4<sup>th</sup>, in the Evening or we should have dispatched her sooner.

Your Hon. &c. are Doubtless advised by the Comp. that the Decker is ordered round this way with a full Loading of Pepper, one half for this place, the other for the Bay to be shot Loose in the homeward bound Ships, The Decker is to return to Bombay with three Hundred Tons of Salt Petre and 84 Tons of Redwood, this Last We are Ordered to get ready here, but we shall omit it as You have wrote us that You have already sufficient on Hand for a Bombay & West Coast Ship.

We wrote Your Hon. &c. the 8th past desiring a further supply of Petre for the Kintlage of our next Sep. Ship, for want of Bales we have been obliged to put 600 Bags of Petre on board the Shaftesbury to Compleat her Tonnage and we have now but 600 Bags left in store so that we shall want at Least 600 more to compleat the Charterparty Quantity for a Ship in Sep. next the Dispatch of we. the Comp. have again very earnestly press'd. We are besides to Acquaint You the Compandesign one of the ships from hence to China and back again in time to be dispatch't home in Jan. next. We ought to have her Petre up here by the August or Sep. Ships that it may be ready to Shift her in Decem.

If the Madrass Galley be fit for Your River you may please to keep her for that use, we do not Mean to put her upon You at the great Price she stands upon our Books but Value her as You think she may be worth, she is of no use to us for the West Coast Service, & therefore desire You not to send her back to Us but to sell her if she can be of no use to You on the Company's Account for in our Service she will never earn her Expences.

We have rec<sup>d</sup>. Y<sup>r</sup>. Letters of the 8th. Dec<sup>r</sup>. 1735 P Madrass Galley and the third of August Last by the George to which we shall now give answer under the Usual heads.

#### FIRST SHIPPING.

The Dispatch of the Duke of Cumberland for Europe so early after her arrival will be acceptable to our Honble Masters and we perswade ourselves you have used the Same diligence in hastning to them the Duke of Lorrain and Compton the Ships of this Season designed You, the former we suppose arrived with You some time in August or Sep\*. and gave You their Orders in Relation to the Compleating their Tonnage for Europe, the Compton was Accordingly dispatch'd from Bengall to you the 28th. Oct\*. with the necessary Salt Petre for the Kintlage of her and the Duke of Lorrain, but You sent us on the George 60 Tons of Pepper in expectation as we Judge of having but one ship Consigned you, we intimated to the President and Council of Bengall our fears of Your falling short of the full Tonnage for both ships as that Quantity of Pepper was sent away and desired them to put aboard equal thereto in Bale Goods for Europe for which we are advised they have done and therefore we hope you will be able to give both Ships their full Ladings. Should you have dispatched the Duke of Lorrain before the Compton's Arrival there will be a surplus of Petre which You must keep for the next ships as in all probability you will have two sent this next season.

We have wrote to Pegue to build a sloop of ten Tons as You desire w<sup>ch</sup>. shall be sent You in Jan<sup>ry</sup>. next. We hope you have Compleated the Sloop that was on the Stocks, and recommend to You to Employ her & the other you have & hire as few Boats as Possible.

Having taken into Consideration the sending the George to Manna web, we find took up a Long time so that her Wages and Expences were much more Considerable than her Earnings that the Barr is often so bad that no Boats Can go over which

was the Occasion of the George's stay and ill Success, We are led to think that service may be better Perform'd by Small Sloops, who may be Sent thither at the Seasons of the Year when the Bar is favourable for the Passage of the Boats to them and should they be disappointed the Charges dont fall so heavy, we therefore direct that in future You do not send the George thither unless upon any Extraordinary Occasion and You are well assured she will have a Quicker Dispatch.

The Madrass Galley we intend to send to Bengall and Dispose of there and shalf hereafter only keep the George for the Service of Your Coast judging there is now nowant of two, as You are supply'd with Stores from Europe which made the other necessary before, You must return the George to us as soon as she is unladen and if You have a Quantity of Rice in Your Godowns that You can spare send on board what she can take in Grain being very scarse and dear occasion'd by the failure of Rain in these parts.

In consideration that the deficiency in Mr. Rigg's Paymasters Remain's is very small we have for this time consented to Clear him of it but we must tell You that we Expect the Orders we sent You Last Year for the better regulation of all such Affairs be duely put in Execution, otherwise they who neglect them must take the consequence of which we give you this fair warning and all of You therefore will do well to observe them with attention.

The Compton has carried you such part of Your Indent as is the Manufacture of Bengall with a Large supply of Gunney Bags, the Remainder of the Things that we Could get in time are now sent you.

We would have you as much as Possible discourage the importation of all Peice Goods from Java and the Dutch Settlements on that Coast as those sorts can be made here and in regard to the benefit that will accrue to the Company thereby in their Customs which is 5 \$\diftarrow\$ Cent here and two with You we are sensible that Trade is carried on only by Malays and Chinese to the Company's Prejudice & Your own and ought not therefore to be tollerated nor can the Natives be any way's disatisfied when they are furnish'd with the same sorts and on cheaper terms.

## THIRDLY INVESTMENT, FOURTHLY COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

On Your representation of what You judged a fair and equitable allowance for the Defeciency of M<sup>r</sup>. Gees Pepper at Moco Moco, we have debted his Estate Doll<sup>rs</sup>. 141. 3 for  $10\frac{1}{2}$  Bahar and have paid his Trustees the Ball<sup>noo</sup>. being Doll<sup>rs</sup>. 200. 2 out of the Money for w<sup>ch</sup>. you had given a Certificate and we shall accordingly pass the same to the Account of your Settlement.

We observe there was a Committee of the Board appointed to Examine the Surveys of the Pepper Plantations agreeable to our Orders, and we shall expect they proceed in Examination of them with due care and where you find the Plantations are not well Looked after or that the People have failed in setting a right Number of Vines do you immediately call them before You and oblige them to perform their Agreements.

We are glad to find that the Troubles at Lay are at an end particularly as it is a part of the Country that produces a large Quantity of Pepper and is Yearly improving we think, You did well in preserving the Pangarans authority over those People tho it was at some Expence, however we must Caution You that if any thing of the Like nature should happen again by no means to suffer such Demands to have any weight with You, Lest from your Submitting to them in Order to Calm their differences they be tempted to Create new Troubles for the sole view of obtaining a bounty of the Company when otherwise if they had no such expectation they would remain in peace and Quietness.

As the People at Laye were promised the price of their Pepper should be at ten-Doll. P Bahar when their Country produced 100 P Annum we approve of Your complying with it and there being now a house at Laye to receive it of them (w<sup>ch</sup>. we are willing to consent to for the reasons given us) we shall be glad to hear that it answers those ends, and that the Natives by this indulgence are encouraged to set heartily to work, and we shall depend on Your promise that the person Resident there does frequently oversee the Plantations in that part of the Country and advise You of the state of it.

The troubles at Cooncoy and Salomah we hope are Long since accommodated, by Your Mediation between the two Party's which is the Method we should alway's preferr rather than to make use of Force but we Cannot suffer so Large a part of the Country to be Neglected meerly for the Thirst of Revenge & Obstinacy of a few People whilst the Plantations are running to ruin to the Great Loss of the Company and we Expect therefore You will or have taken proper measures to restore that Country to Peace.

You have given us no account of w<sup>t</sup>. Success you are like to have in the Growth of Coffee w<sup>ch</sup>. do not fail to send us on the return of this ship.

The Sugar and Arrack Plantations we observe to have been a Less Charge to the Company than in former Years, yet the Loss is Doll. 633. 2. 52. You will we suppose have full order from Europe this Year Concerning it, in the mean time we recommend to You to put the Company to as Little Charge as Possible and if you have a Carefull Man there we think the allowance of Doll. 10 to the Resident of Sillebar as Overseer may be spared, in this we Leave to You to act as You shall judge best.

By every Ship dispatch'd hither send us an Acco<sup>t</sup>. of the Pepper You have in the Godowns and what More You Expect in the Year for the Tonnage of the Ships that may be Consigned You, the Company we Observe by their Letters to us design what Pepper You have shall be sent them directly and will provide accordingly and You must therefore send none hither without their Orders in future should Direct you so to do.

#### FIFTHLY FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS REPAIRS AND REVENUES.

We send you by this Ship 12 Doors and 20 Windows all made of Teak and designed for the house at Moco Moco which we directed to be made of Brick and we Observe that the Resid\*. had your Orders to prepare materials for Laying the foundation and had contracted for Chunam, the Depty. Gov', in his Letter to Our Preside. acquaints him that he is apprehensive the scituation of Moco Moco is so low and Swampy that a Brick foundation cannot well be Laid the Water rising on digging 2 feet. This has Led us to consider what could be done in this case for to erect builds. of wood would be only wasting the Compy's. money as Experience has shown us in those of Moco Moco web. Cost them a Considerable Sum and in 15 Years entirely decayed, it has been mentioned to us that Bentall weh. stands High and has now a better barr than Moco Moco would be much the more convenient Place for a Settlement and answer every Purpose as well, and that Brick Buildings there might be made with great facility, this we have now offer'd to the Consideration of our Honble Masters and we would have you therefore on receipt of this put a stop to all designs of building at Moco Moco and give us Your opinion at Large of the two Places wen. you think may be most advantageous for the Company, as the whole Pile of Building is so farr decayed at Moco Moco that it must be entirely rebuilt the Loss cannot be much in removing and if only Wooden Buildings can be set up there they will in the term of a few Years be under a necessity of Laying out a Large Sum, besides the Constant Charge of keeping them in repair, whereas when once the Brick Buildings at Bentall are finished they will Last many Years and save them a large Sum, it has also the advantage of a better Air and is more healthy for the People and nearer the center of the Country, the Sultan may perhaps chuse that the Company should continue a Residency at Moco Moco as he Lives there himself and has his People ab. him but We think he might easily be prevailed on to go to Bentall if there should be a necessity for his Dwelling in the same Place where the Company have a Factory

Since you represent a want of a storehouse we give you Leave to erect a brick. one. Let care be taken that it be made substantial & of Good Materials.

And having also taken into Consideration what You mention Concerning a Godown at Manna Which part of the Country we now observe produces a Large Quantity of Pepper we also permit you to build one in Manner you propose that is a brick Foundation and Boards, in case you cannot with convenience make the Walls of Brick & we would also have two rooms built for Lodgings for the Companys Servis. and People who are sent to weigh of the Company's Pepper and Ship it for Marlbrô and as this often takes them up some time it is highly necessary they should have some Proper Place to Live in during their stay their, the want of wah. might occasion that Place to be fatal to many of their servis.

Having observed a Grant of several Leases to persons for Ground some whereof are near the Fort we think fitt to Caution you not to give Leases for any Ground ab'the Fort or in the Valley for the future as the Company may hereafter have occasion for the Ground to erect such buildings as may be necessary for their business though at Present there may not appear a want off any, woh, may prevent the Obliging People to remove woh, is alway's done with uneasiness to the Party's after Grants have been Obtained.

#### SIXTHLY COMPANY'S SERVANTS MILITARY AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

In Your Consultation of the 20th. Sep<sup>2</sup>. 1735 it was agreed (M<sup>2</sup>. Rigg excepted) to allow M<sup>2</sup>. Jos<sup>2</sup>. Hurlock 9 Months of his Writership, and to Let him commence Factor, as this affair is referred to the Company, we shall say no more here than only to tell you that such proceedings are irregular and Possitively against the Company's stand<sup>3</sup>. Orders, & must not be repeated it being what they are pleased always to reserve to themselves.

And here we must take notice of an Extraordinary Petition of Mr. David Pugh for an advance of Pay and an Allowance on what he had Just before, contracted with the Company for, this we Can by no means allow & do order it to be discontinued from the Receipt of this Letter, the Sallary & allowance he engaged with the Company for are equal to what many of their Covenanted Servants have and we see no reason to gratify him in an allowance Superiour to them.

There being several Servants sent you from Europe we would have all the Monthly Writers discharged except the two Young men that were sent from hence some years ago, we would have one of the Company's servants sent to Moco Moco to assist Mr. Savage.

We have given leave to Padre Joam Ugoanny to take his Passage on this ship for yr. Settlement.

Inclosed we send a Commission appoint. Robt. Lennox Esq. Depty. Gov. & the Council as they are there mentioned and having given this mark of our confidence in him we perswade ourselves from his Knowledge and Experience on the Coast that he will very much improve it for the Company's benefit, by encreasing the Number of Plantations and encourageing the Natives to set heartily abt. them, that they be fairly and Justly pt. in Money for their Pepper; and no one suffered to injure them in any manner and preserving of Peace in the Country and keeping the expence within due Bounds all wt. will render his Service very acceptable to our Honble Masters.

#### SEVENTHLY ACCOUNTS.

We observe that You have at Len[g]th adjusted the head of Adventure to Lay in your Books and that Daniel Coles is found to be Chargeable with Doll\* 234. 2.50, which You must take care to receive of him, if he has not already Paid the same, had not Mr. Savage Cleared up the Affair it appears that the Loss would have fallen upon the Company for want of a Proper Care to Settle those Acco. in time and we hope to see no Instances of the like neglect in Future.

The Freight of the Madrass Galley amounts. to Doll. 289. 2. 48 is carried by Mistake to the Credit of Charges Merchandize instead of Acco. Curr. Fort S. George which you must rectifie and adjust the several Articles of the Accounts which are now

sent You by our Account. that Your books may agree with ours. Send us by every Ship Y. Cash Acco. to the time of her departure, this was an omission by the Madrass Galley. We have paid the amount of the several Certificates Drawn on us.

We send on this ship Five persons who have been Guilty of Crimes here and are to remain on Y. Coast Seven Years, there Names are, Assaram, Vellan, Corrapan, Vellataunan, Permanaundah.

Inclosed are Invoice and Bills of Lad. for what sent on this ship amounts, to Pag. 2886. 34. 40 as also the Register of Licensed Goods.

We send inclosed in the Packet Copy of the Invoice of w<sup>t</sup>. the Gentlemen in Bengall send You on the Compton, it am<sup>ts</sup> to Curr<sup>t</sup>. Rup<sup>t</sup> 4569. 12, we are debted for it in Fort W<sup>m</sup>. Books and You must give us Credit for the same reducing the rupees at 350 Rupees & 100 Pag<sup>t</sup> and 15 D<sup>11s</sup> & 10 Pag<sup>t</sup> the Redwood Salt Petre and the rest of the Bale Goods we suppose the Gentlemen in Bengall have Debted Account Curr<sup>t</sup>. London for as they have not sent us any Acco<sup>t</sup>. Thereof.

HONBLE SIR AND SIRS

The foregoing was designed you by the Madrass Gally but the Winds having been Northerly for these three day's past brot in Yesterday Morning the sloop Grace Christopher Nicolson Master who having often been the Passage between this place and Bengall and being also a Pilot in the River we have thought it a better Conveyance to send the Company's Packett by him and more Likely to be soonest with You, for the same Reason we have resolved to send upon this sloop twelve Chests of Bullion which You write for in Your Letter 1<sup>st</sup>. Jan<sup>ty</sup>, the season of the year being so fair and easy as makes it safe for any Vessell that is Light, and we know not that soon there will offer any better Conveyance. We have sent the Madrass Gally again to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David to bring up a few more bales to Compleat the Shaftesbury's Lading and we continue our intentions, to send her to Y<sup>t</sup>. Hon<sup>t</sup>. &c<sup>s</sup>. in September for the reason mentioned in our Last: The Grantham we dispatch'd for England the 29<sup>th</sup>. Last Month and we hope to send away the Shaftesbury in a Week or 10 Day's at farthest. And by her we shall send your Packett that came w<sup>th</sup>. Your Letter 31<sup>st</sup>. December.

Yesterday also came in the Jane Rob. Milne Master by whom we recd. y. Letter of the 12 Jan. we have not heard that M. Barker is or has been in these Parts and the Master of the Jane tells us before he Left Bengall it was certainly known that M. Barker was gone from thence on a french Ship.

We observe what You say in Y<sup>r</sup>. Letter of the 21<sup>st</sup>. Jan<sup>ry</sup>. relating to the Difficulty's your Merchants Complained of in the Investment but we Can't help remarking that many of them might have been avoided, or at least not so sensibly felt if they had done their duty and not deferr'd bringing in the Cloth 'till towards the latter end of the Year. Neither Fanams Cotten or Grain were so dear in the beginning of the Year as they have been since. The price of the first may be somewhat effected by the badness of the Curr'. Pag'. but not so much from that reason as is pretended as we do not Compute they are above 2½ to 3 \$\psi\$ Cent at most worse than they were the Year before.

Your Merchte. had but last Year an Extraordinary allowance for the Washing the Cloth they have full as much as ours have, and we think they will not pretend that Paddy is dearer with you than it is here but however that be the Loss upon that Accot. is owing to their own Indolence and carelessness first in not bringing in the · Cloth before when Paddy was Cheaper and then when it was cheap that they would not advance so small a sum as would have been sufficient to lay in the Quantity wanted for Conjeeing the Cloth, had they also been provident and Lain in a further · Quantity for the Washers probably they would have had no occasion to Complain that the Money they advanced the Washers will be a dead Loss to them. However we are glad to observe you are of opinion the Merch's. do certainly exaggerate their Losses more than the Truth, & thô we should allow that they have been sufferers in the prices of the Goods brot. in on their Last Contracts yet we have great reason to Complain of their Conduct in deceivs. us with promises of a Larger Number of Bales than ever they intended to Comply with web fixed a necessity upon us to send Forty Tons of Petre on whole Freight by the Shaftesbury, Besides the Cloth by the Galley was very faulty and under different Circumstances, we should have thought ourselves obliged to reject great part of it and woh. since we have Passed it has oceasion'd great uneasiness at Least Complaints from our own Mercht. who think it hard that we should be so strict in the sorting here, when we so easily pass such Cloth from the Fort St. David Merchants. The Bales you sent us on the George we travers'd on board the Grantham, not Having time to bring them on shoar and open them. We shall give you our opinion of those by the Galleys Last trip in our next but whatever our remarks may be on them, together with what else we have said in this Letter is designed Cheifly for yt. own observation and Government leaving it to You to discourse Your Merchants in such a manner as You think best but we Expect You will ask them in plain Terms how long we are to stay before they Compleat their last Contracts and whether we are to depend upon their engaging for a further Quantity . and upon what Terms and also whether we may depend upon any better performances of their Promises than Last Year.

We are surprised you should meet with so much Difficulty in procuring the Sallampores considering the great price you give for them and Considering also that the best we have seen here is a very ill wrought Cloth, nineteen Pag. is the price of Y. Number one and we observe by the sales at home it does not sell better than ours that Costs but sixteen and seven eighths, we shall say no more now least we should Check the hopes You have of Encreasing the Quantity which this Year at least we Choose to avoid for several Reasons.

We observe the Madrass Galley brot, you Sixteen Garse of Paddy from Trimle-wass and You must Give us Credit for the Customary freight, you should also have advised the Quantity you had Laid in or design'd to buy for the Company's use Account and at what Rate.

We Cannot consent to M<sup>r</sup>. Floyers Renting of the Arrack Farm it being against the Comp<sup>r's</sup>. Orders Establish't for very good reasons, if You cannot get some other Person to take it you must still keep it on the Comp<sup>r's</sup>. Account.

We have no objection to Y<sup>r</sup>. Coining such a number of fanams as may be sufficient for the Circulation in Y<sup>r</sup>. Settlement that we believe they will never be easy under if the Investm. fails as in that Case it will be of no use to them and but a dead Charge. We must therefore press it upon you to exert Y. selves at this time and thô the Troubles in the Country togather with the scarcity and Dearness of Grain and Cotten and other Accidents may occasion Cloth to be Dearer than Last Year and not to be got in any Quantity without some difficulty and Risque yet we are Confident that with money some may be got and do therefore very earnestly recommend it to You that You think of some means to procure such a Quantity as may Compensate for the Charge of the Settlement and at the same time Convince Y. Last Contract Merch. that how great soever our necessity's are at present they are not of such Consequence to us that we must either submit to their Terms or have no Cloth.

We wrote you in our last that the Cloth by the Galleys first Trip was very faulty, we have since mett in the Warehouse to view that by her Last trip but are sorry to say we find it much worse than that by the first, and if we believe what Y. Sorters say we must suppose there was some want of Care in the Packing and that the Coneycoplys have been to much Trusted, we Cannot otherwise Accot. for the Condition off this Last Parcells web. is so exceedingly mixed in the Bales good and bad together that if we had not found notes in the Bales we shou'd have doubted whether it had been sorted at all. That by the Galley's first trip had too much of the same fault but you were told in our Last why we were obliged to take that, we should have no Excuse if we pass'd this Parcel without a resorting and thô we had rather return it that both you & the Merch's together might be Convinced we do not find fault wth, out reason, yet if they rather choose to have it resorted here they must send up their Gomastas to be by.

The two Bales invoiced Long Cloth Fine were too dear at fifty five Pagodas & Corge, they were Certainly not worth more than fifty and at that price we have given you Credit for them.

The Sallampores both Ingeram & Maddapollam were wretched stuff and so ill sorted that we were obliged to do that work over again here.

These are the Remarks we made upon Y. Last Years Investment and having in our Letter of the öth. Dect. Last told you that You should know our resolution upon Y. Merchants Petition after we had seen your Bales and the Quality thereof we are now to add that we do not think it reasonable they should be allowed the extraordinary one Pagoda & Corge on the Long Cloths provided Last Year as those could not be effected by the Price of Cotten Thread and Grain which were very reasonable then and did not rise till Dect. Last, we are very sensible all three have risen considerably since & for that reason do Permitt you to make your Merchants that allowance upon the Long Cloths this year but upon condition also they encrease the Quantity and endeavour to improve the Fabrick, For as the Batty on Mads. Pagodas is risen to six & eight & Cent web. added to the additional Allowance will make your Cloth at the best come out now very dear.

In Y<sup>r</sup>. Letter of the 28th past we received a List for Broad Cloth, Perpets and Velvets which shall be sent you when any Conveyance offers, you tell us what was sent before was sold but that is to Concise, you should have told us also at what Rate that we might judge whether the price was considerable enough to run the Risque of sending it from hence.

It is of Consequence to us at present to be informed of the state of the Country Government in Yr. Parts, and therefore you must not give us any further Occasion to Complain of the Neglect of our Orders to you the 19th. August last.

The Phousdar of Maddapollam having sent us many Invitations to resettle the Factory there we have appointed Mr. Joseph Goddard to go and reside there and to , endeavour to make an Investment in those Parts, we would have you deliver him the Inclosed Packett and as he is directed to proceed to Maddapollam as soon as he . Conveniently Can we would have you supply him out of yr. Wares & Stores with such things as are necessary to be carried with him and the Musters of the Maddapollam Cloths, we have directed the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam to supply him with what Money may be wanted to carry on his Investment. We shall now reply to Yr. Severals of the 7th. & 8th. Inst.

When we mentioned to You the Great expense the Comps. are at a year in maintaining Your Settlement it was not from Any Observation, we had made of any exceedings in the stated Charge or from any Doubt that you would be wanting in Yr. Endeavours to lessen the expences as opportunity's Offer'd but when you wrote us in Yours of the 12th. March that Your Merchants where not to be pravailed on to enter upon any new Contract except upon terms (which it Could not be supposed) we Could consent to and even that upon those Terms they did not propose to bring in any Quantity it Immediately occurr'd to us wt. our Honble Masters were pleased to write us in the 26th. Parth. of their Letter dated 10th. Nov. 1732 wherein they Say "Fort St. David's Quota of Cloth has been so inconsiderable of Late that we are apt "to think our People there forget the main design of keeping Garrisons & having "Settlements in India which Cant be maintained unless they produce a tolerable "Quantity of Goods for Europe". It was therefore only to prevent any such further Remarks on the Conduct of their Servants at Fort St. David which enduced us so earnestly to recommend it to you, that you should think of some means to procure such a Quantity of Cloth as might compensate for the Charge of the Settlement but in whatever sense you have understood us we are glad it has had the Effect we proposed for since you write us in Yrs. of the 7th. that yr. Merchants decline making any Contract, except upon the Terms they had before proposed we not only approve but are also well pleased that You have received and accepted the Proposals from Nella Tomby & Shacup Tomby, it will lye upon you to employ Persons of Good Judgem<sup>t</sup>. to sort the Cloth as it Comes in brown, because as we understand you after it has undergone that sortment it is to be and to remain on the Companys Account however it sorts afterwards when it is Cured, you should therefore give Particular directions, that those who sort it brown take in None that they think will not at least be equal to No. 3 when Cured because we shall be unwilling to Load the Company with any Quantity of No. 4 and shall be puzzled to know what to do with any which may happen to be worse, this Method of providing Cloth for the Company will Occasion some Trouble in proportioning the prices of the several Numbers after it is Cured to the prises given for it when brown, but the Depty. Gov. is so well wersed in Figures that he will be able to put you in a Method how to keep your Accounts clear.

We are not at all satisfyed with Yr. Reasons for the ill Sortment of the Cloth by the Galley's Last trip, your Letter of the 7th. Inst. tells us she arrived with you the 28th ffebry. but Yr. Letter of the 10th of that Month told us she Arrived the Morns, before web. was the 9th, and we know it was not sooner, You go on to say that You had in a former Letter advised that you Should not be ready to send up your Cloth before the 20th. ffeb., and Great stress is Laid on the Presidents Letter by the Galley which you say had Obliged you to hurry the Washers and Beaters who had not time to get the Cloth Cured so that you were Obliged to sort it under a great disadvantage. It is certainly true you told us in Y'. Letter of the 2d. ffebry. you hoped you should be able to send us one hundred Bales by the 20th of that Month but for that very reason we thought we might Expect you would have fifty or near it by the 10th, and how much soever you might hurry Yr. Washers and Beaters we are inclined to think from wt. ours are able to do here twelve to fifteen Bales is the most they Could bring in, in 24 hours and the Galley did not stay with You Much above thirty besides it appears by Yr. Own showing that part, (& we believe a great Part) was embaled upon a Resortment of the Turned out Cloth, which must have been Cured Long before and indeed it appears by the List of Cloth Annexed to Yr. Letter of the 17th Transfer of the 17th of the 17th. Janry. that You had then on Hand 44 Bales of Turned out Cloth web. in Yr. Letter of the 21st. was encreased to 51, after that it disappeared and we heard no more of it in Yr. Letters till now in Yr. Letters of the 7th. Inst. before us.) You tell

us that You were sorting the Turned out Salem to Ordry. and not have. the Liberty of a No. 4, the No. 3 must of Consequence be a little mixed, this is not a right way of reasoning, you tell us you had not liberty for a No. 4 and Yet you take in that sort of Cloth to N°. 3 and Charge it as such, you say the Presidents Letter directed the sends. up all the Cloth. You had ready at least Fifty Bales and if You had not that Quantity ready and were streighten'd to make it up without taking in a N°. 4 certainly it would have been more justifyable to have done so and we should not have hesitated to have approved thereof upon Such an Emergency rather than to have taken it all into a N°. 3, the reason is Plain but it is not only the Sortment of the N°. 3 we Complain of, the N°. 1 & 2 have much of the same Fault & altogether fixed a Necessity upon us to have it resorted that Justice may be done the Company a Method that is consistent with the Company's directions and the Practice of our Predecessors and therefore we are surprized at the reply of our Merchants, it is talking to us in a Manner which is entirely new and we shall not suffer it to be made a Precedent of now: You tell us they reply that having by Contract agreed for the delivery with you and Y'. having accepted thereof they think themselves no ways obliged to receive any back that may be turned out in resorting, It is surprising to us that You should countenance them in such a frivoulous pretence, could none of you recollect that by the same Contract they Were Obliged to bring in the Whole quantity long before they did and in case of failure what Penalty they incurr'd thereby? What would they say if we should insist upon that Penalty? We suppose we should be told in Answer of their Great Losses and sufferings by the Quantities they have brought in but if they expect any favour from the Company on that Account they must merit it by a Behav i our different from the Present.

In fine the resortment of the Cloth whenever we have reason to think you have not been sufficiently Carefull is consistent both with reason and Equity and we shall Accordingly resort this Parcell without entering into any further debate about it and Charge You with the Difference that you may receive it of Your Merchants, we do not indeed believe there will be much difference in the Value when it is resorted because the principal Fault is the unequalness of the sortment as we before hinted when we told you that had we not found Notes in the Bales we should have immagin'd the Cloth had not been sorted at all. There are in the N°. 1 many Peices fitt only for-N°. 2 and not a few that ought to be put to N°. 3 as in the other Numbers there some N°. 1°. in the N°. 2°. and N°. 2° in the N°. 3°, so that what difference we shall make will be Cheifly in what will be flung out as Inferiour to that Number.

Notwithstanding we think it necessary to act in this manner with regard to this Cloth if hereafter there shall appear to be any weight in what Your Merch. alledge of their Losses by the Last Contract we shall not be averse to represent their case to the Company but at present they must submitt to these our directions.

With this we return you the Musters of Y<sup>r</sup>. Sallampores which we have Compared with the five Bales received by the Galley's Last Trip. The Bale N°. I has some Peices in it worse than Muster which might proceed from the Want of a Sufficient Quantity to Compleat the Bale, two Bales of the N°. 2 are pretty near the Muster and the Bale mark'd N°. 3 was full as good as those, but then the other Bale of N°. 2 was but an Indifferent N°. 3, as we supposed this proceeded from some Mistake in Y<sup>r</sup>. Warehouse, we have Changed the Bale Notes and Package here and so have Passed all the five-Bales according to Y<sup>r</sup>. Invoice.

Inst. the first inclosing only some of Your Monthly Accounts and with the Last we received six Peices of Long Cloth, We are not certain by Your Letter whether they are taken promiscuously out of the 200 Peices or out of the remains. 128 Peices after the 72 Peices had been taken in by your Sorters but however that be we have examined these very perticularly and taken the opinion of our best Judges along with us. We suppose the Chemanauge Cloth is designed in Immitation of the Salem Cloth and we have marked every peice according to the Numbers we reckon it might be sorted to, if due care had been taken in manufacturing the peices, the same throughout as has been observed in some parts of them.

One Peice No. 1 Order.

But there are several remarkable Defects in some of the Peices particularly hold Folds of a Course Gouty Thread very different from the rest of the Peice and in some Peices large Threads run almost the Whole Length of them. We are Sensible it is almost impossible to get a Peice of Cloth especially the Ord, sorts, from the Weavers without some defects of the kind, we find in these Peices but we must recommend it to you to be pressing with Your Merchants that they look more Narrowly over the Weavers and we are apt to think if they could be brought to sort the Thread before they sett ab. Weaving the Cloth Many of the Faults complained of would be avoided.

As you write us nobody offer'd more for the Farms of your Bound rent and Weighing and Measuring Duty than the former Renters, who were willing to take them again upon the Old Terms, we have no Objection against your renewing their Cowles.

HONBLE SIR AND SIRS

Our Last to You was the 14th. of Aprill by the Sloop Margery and Ship Mercury, the Sloop Margery after she had put on shear the Treasure we sent on her to Vizaga<sup>m</sup>. proceeded on her Voyage the 21th, and we doubt not she and the Mercury are safe arrived wth. you.

The Narcissus brought us your Severals of the 19th. Febrs. and 10th. March. We are Obliged to Your Hon. &c. for the Supply of Salt Petre you have Sent us this season web, we Compute will be sufficient for the Charterparty [Kint]lige of one ship in Sepr. and the Royall G[u]ardian in Jan. but we cannot supply them with any more if the Captains should request any on half Freight.

As the Company have Ordered fifteen hund<sup>d</sup>. or two Thous<sup>d</sup>. Pecul of Tex to be laden on the Royall G[u]ardian in China as part of her Cargoe for Europe we shall desire Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>t</sup>. to send us a Ship in Dec<sup>r</sup>. to take in our Surplus Bales, what Number we may have then we shall better be able to advise you when we know whether we shall have the Mountague from Mocha to fill up here and after we have advices from our Northe[r]n Settlements what Quantity of Cloth we may Expect from thence.

The Ship You Send us in Dec. we reckon will be able to bring us what further Quantity of Salt Petre will be wanted to Kintlage a ship in Sep. next year and for our Garrison use of which we Shall send you a perticular Indent by some of the following Ships as well as for what Packing stuff and other Wares and Stores may be wanting for the use of this Settlement.

We have in a former Letter advised you that we had given Orders to the Resident at Syrian to build two sloops there according to the dimentions & Directions you sent us, at the same time we sent over thither what stores we were inform'd were necessary to fitt and Rigg them. The Resident writes us the 8th March he made no doubt they would be Compleated and ready to sail from Pegus by the beginning of Sept. with a Loads of Iron and Sloops Timbers but there was not any body there capable to Navigate them nor any Lascars, as to the last we would (tho with difficulty) supply them from hence but we cannot engage any Good Men to go over to Pilot them to Bengall for as it is supposed when the Sloops arrive with you the Charge of them will be deliver'd to the River Pilots, those who carry them over will be to seek for some other Employ. We must therefore leave it to Yr. Hon. &ct. to send a small Vessel to Syrian with proper persons to bring them over and a sufficient Number of Lascars and Concerning these last, it will be proper they be such as have familys

residing in Y<sup>r</sup>. Bounds or else that they give good Security they will not run away in Pegue which otherwise they are very apt to do w<sup>ch</sup>. all the care of the Resident will not be able to prevent, as the Vessel you send over Need not leave Bengall before the beginning of August, the Voyage will be but short and we reckon will be Less Charge to the Company than if we were to send their Crew's now from hence upon full Pay so many Months before they are wanted, the Expence will be still Less if the Resid<sup>t</sup> is able to get any Iron and Sloops Timbers to Load the Vessell back, if You have in store any deal Sparrs fitt for sloops Booms the builder desires they may be sent over as being more light and handy than Teak.

Inclosed in Y<sup>r</sup>. Letter of the 19th. ffeb<sup>ry</sup>. we received copy of the 74th. Parag<sup>th</sup>. of the Company's Letter to Y<sup>r</sup>. Presidency dated 15th. ffeb<sup>ry</sup>. 1715 ordering a Duty of a seer and a half \$\psi\$ M<sup>d</sup>. to be received on all Grain Exported from Calcutta by the English to any Place whatsoever and for such part as is traded for to this Place upon the proper certificates being Given of the said duty's being paid in Bengall the same was to be deducted out of the 5 \$\psi\$ C<sup>t</sup>. payable here. Upon looking over our records we find due Notice had been Given of this Paragraph in the General Letter from Bengall dated 27th. of November 1716, but we do not find it had any Answer from hence nor was there then or Since any Deduction out of the Customs paid here for what had been p<sup>d</sup>. in Bengall. What might be the reason why so little notice was taken of an Order wherein the Interest of both Settlement was so much concern'd, we cannot as yet find out, We have Order'd the [Letter from] England to be Look'd over to see if there be any mention thereof in them and in the mean time have only agreed to give Certificates to all Your Ships that have paid the full Duty here.

We send inclosed Invoice and bill of Lading for Treasure, Copper, and Redwood on this ship Bedford, with Copy of her Charterparty and an Account of what has been Landed here from her and also of what was put ashore here from the Newcastle.

Own Investment as requires Madrass Pagodas of wth should there be any difficiency we hope you will be able to Negotiate your Paym. in Rupees and we believe you will not Complain of any want of those. However as we would not put you under a difficulty of any sort if we can get any more Pagodas and a conveyance to carry them they shall be sent you, in the mean time we would have you after you have rec<sup>d</sup>. this Money send us an Estimate of the State of Yr. Cash both in Pagodas and Rupees and what Draughts will be made upon it before we have an Opportunity to send [you] more wth. may not be before the Middle of Janr. next except by Peons overland that we shall not care for without a great necessity and it Cannot otherwise be avoided.

By this ship Decker we also send you as much Stationary Ware as we can spare together with all such other stores as you had indented for before and wen, we had no opportunity to send you till now.

Joab Roberts and Joseph Robbinson the two Deserters from this Garrison must be sent hither by the first Sea Conveyance.

We find little brick Choultry's so necessary in our Washing Towns here that we permitt you to build the Three you desire in yours thereby to prevent the danger from Fire and White Aunts [sic] which you apprehend in the Cajan Sheds and since you represent the New Powder House to be a necessary Work we do for this Once approve of it's having been sett about by Mr. Harrison without our Previous Consent but for the future it must be a standing Rule with you never to sett abt. a[ny] new Buildings without first sending us an Estimate of the Charge and receiving our Consent to begin it and the same we say for any repairs won, may be necessary where the Charge will exceed ten Pagodas.

The Anchors and Grapnols are invoiced at the London Price but we sell the Anchors here for Five Pag\*. the Hundred w\*. and the Grapnols at Six, this Last you Should not sell under Six and a half and the Anchors at five and a Quarter the hundred w\*., which we think a very reasonable advance for the Charge and Risque of sending them to You.

You must Credit us in Your Books ten Pagodas, being so much paid Mr. Denny for his Charges Going from hence to Vizagapatam.

You must also Debt the Estate of John Blunt upon Your Books Sixty Pagodas being so much we had over Credited you upon a Supposition that the Freight on the Bales sent from Ingeram to Vizagapatam and brot hither by the London had not been Charged on the Goods, but that appearing since to have been a Mistake you must now bring it back to our Credit.

It appears upon our Books here that in 1733, Eleven Maunds twenty one Pounds of Lead was sent on the Sloop George, John Hunter Master and put ashoar among other things at Ingeram from whence it was afterwards sent by Mr. Saunderson to Vizagapatam which you have not yet given us Credit for.

We have received Yrs. of the 8th. March advising that the two Sloops for-Bengall would be ready to sail thither the beginning of Sepr., of this we have Given due Notice to the Gov. and Council of Calcutta and desired they would send you from thence a sufficient Number of Lascars and proper Persons to Navigate them, as well as some deal Sparrs for Booms if they have any, In all Probability they will dispatch a Small Vessell from the Bay the latter end of July or beginning of Augst, and it will be Proper that You have also a little Cargo of Iron and Sloops Timbers to Load her back with the other two, The small Sloop that is a building for the service of the West coast we do not design should come over 'till Decem'. next and therefore it is not Necessary to send any body over from hence to take Charge of her 'till the Dispatch [of] the August Ships from the Coast.

We are informed that several of the Kings Subjects do annually steal over to Pegue without Licence from hence and during their Residence [there live in a] Riotous and Disorderly manner and further that many of them hire themselves out to Navigate the Ships belonging to the Moors and other Indians which if not prevented may be of Great Prejudice to the English Trade, To put a stop therefore to the Mischeifs we'h. may arise from such Practices We direct in the first Place that You admonish All Persons in the English Service that they live Soberly and without Giv. offence to the Governm. or Natives of Pegue Least they should endanger the Priviledges we enjoy there at Present And to prevent the Prejudice to the English Navigation we'h. may arise from any of his Majesty's Subjects Sailing in the Indian Ships, We send you inclosed several Printed Proclamations by his Present Majesty forbidding all his subjects trading to or being in the East Indies contrary to the Priviledges granted to the Comp, which proclamations you must fix up in the

Factory and if any of the English or others his Majesty's Subjects shall notwith-standing enter into any Forreign Service you must do your best to secure their: Persons and send them over to us.

We have received yours of the 30th. June and as to the five Hundred Pagodas 500 taken from two of Y<sup>r</sup>. Merchants Peons, we shall use our best endeavours to recoverit and do not as yet despair of succeeding, w<sup>ch</sup>. is all we Can Say to that Matter at Present.

We have had Tomby Chitty before us concerning the Ballnes. of his Account upon your Books, he was, or at least effected to be greatly surprised that his People had not made it good, but wherever the fault has Layn hitherto, he has now sent such Orders to his Gomastas that he assures us will be effectual to put you into the Money before this month is out.

Since it is your opinion that Y'. new Merchants ought to have twenty thousand. Pag'. constantly in their hands in order to their bringing in a Considerable quantity of Cloth, and that you do not apprehend any Danger to our Honble Masters in advancing such a sum you have our Consent thereto but as your scituation is so near the Cloth Country's such a sum as that may be often return'd from thence in a Year, and therefore we shall expect a good [quan] tity of Cloth in Proportion to the Money that is advanced, as to Y'. Merch's. Request that whenever it may be thought Proper to Call the Ballances due from them out of their hands they may be allowed Six Month's to Pay them in, we think it so reasonable that you may not only Promise them that, but also that it shall be at their Option to make good such Ballances either in Money or Cloth provided however that you have no reason to Apprehend there is any danger of a bad debt for in such case you must take the most early and Effectual means to secure the Company.

As to your Merch<sup>to</sup>, other Request that should any loss happen by their People being robb'd in the Country by carrying money thither or bringing Cloth from thence, such loss might not be theirs, you were certainly in the right when you told them the Company never took that Risque upon themselves and we shall not saddle them with any such thing now, when accidents of that sort happen they are generally attended with circumstances that are very dark and intricate and we may often receive Complaints of Robbery's that it may be impossible for us to discover whether they are real or pretended. All we Can promise is that when any such thing really happens we shall make use of the most pressing Instances with the Country Government to obtain satisfaction.

We take notice of your List of Cloth upon Hand web, is very little, however we are Glad to read that your Merch<sup>ta</sup>, begin to bring it in pretty fast and hope they will perform their promise in using their utmost diligence in the Investment, we shall very.

soon be Obliged to write the Gentlemen in Bengall how much Tonnage we can provide for this Year and therefore we [. . .] know from you how many bales you will have ready [. . .] Sep<sup>r</sup>. Ship and how many more you Can [. . .] hops that you will have ready Cured and Embaled [. . .] the last of Jan<sup>r</sup>.

We wrote you the 1°. July by the Devonshire and Lyell and another short Letter dated the 2<sup>d</sup>. July by the Princess Louisa, the 26<sup>th</sup>. July arrived our Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Masters Ship the Duke of Dorset from Madeira, we reckon she will be ready to sail by the last of this Month and we propose to send you by her 50 Chests of Rupees, and what Redwood she can take in.

The 26th. July also arriv'd here the Prince of Orange from Judah last from Mocha. We have no Letters from the Chief at Mocha but Capt. Baillee tells us the Wilmington and Mountague fell to Leward of Aden and despairing of getting up to Mocha bore away for Bombay abt. the 17th. June, that Mr. Waters had bought a Quantity of Coffee sufficient to Load the Mountague for England and had hir'd a Moors ship to Carry it to Bombay, We believe therefore the Mountague will not Call upon us here for any of our Bales, and having since our last recd. advices from Fort St. David, Vizagapat. and the Northern Settlements what Number of Bales they hope to send us for the dispatch of the ships in Jan. we are will. to flatter ourselves that over and above what we reserve and suppose the Royall G[u]ardian will take in

we shall have 1200 Bales more for Such Ship or Ships as you may send hither to take them in Dec. next but as our dependance on that Number is very uncertain owing to the Great & Terrible Draught [sic] [and famine] that has been and still Continues in all the Cloth Countrys we [desire] you will without fail send us 60 or 100 Tons of [Salt Petre] to fill up in Case of a disappointment besides [what] may be necessary to Kintlage our next Sep. Ship [what] other wares and Stores will be wanting here we send the indent] for in this Packet.

Our Honble Masters are pleas'd to tell us our Method of curing your Sanoes here had answer'd their Purpose and therefore direct us to write to you for some more, but as they are not pleased to say how many we suppose the usual Quantity will be sufficient. We desire they may come upon the first ship because for these two years past it was as much as we Could do to get them ready for the last ship we dispatch'd home.

Inclos'd in this Packet is a Letter to Y'. Hon. &c'. from the Gov. & Council of St. Helena web, we recd. from the West Coast by the George. The Duke of Lorrain was Dispatch'd from Fort Marlborough early in Jan. and the Compton was full Laden and within a day of Sailing when she unfortunately took Fire, and the Whole ship & Cargo so intirely burnt that what was saved did not Exceed the Value of Five Hundred Dollars and that what thrown upon the Rocks when the ship blew up by our advices from the West Coast and the Directions the Comp. have sent for the dispatch of two ships design'd thither this Year we have no Occasion to desire Your Honour &ct. to send any Goods as part of their Lading for Europe more than the Quantity of Salt Petre & Redwood you were advised of in our last.

If Your Hon. &c. have not already provided the Quantity of Oyl & Gunney Bags we indented for in our last for the use of the West Coast, or if provided you can dispose of them otherwise we believe 20 Jarrs of Oyl and one thousand Bags will be as many as you need send [on] the Lyell.

It was the 16th, at night before we recd. yours of the 7°. July the Peons being stop'd twenty day's by the Overflowing of y's. Kistna.

We are Concern'd for the Impediments you have mett with in your Investment-but as the Troubles in the Country whereof no Long Continuance we shall still hope that you will be able to get the Expected Quantity of Cloth from Tooney & Upparra.

We receiv'd your Cash Acco'. for the Month of June, and as You write us the ball". would be more than sufficient for your Present Occasions we shall not think of sending you any more Madrass Pags. till Janry. besides that otherwise we Could not get any now to send you by this ship.

You tell us you have got another sett of Washers from Cacanata who will want the same Conveniency's as the other setts, if so usefull a sett of People will stay with You and you Can find employment for them we shall not be against their having all things that are necessary but Y. Last list of Cloth does not show us that y. former-Setts have as yet perform'd any great matter.

We observe what You say of a Brick building for the Guard by the Sea side and when You send us an Estimate of the Charge you shall have our answer.

Concerning the deficiency in the Weight of the Powder & Lead sent you for any thing that Appears by your Letter to the Contrary the Fraud may be among your Coneycoply's for you do not tell us if any others were Concern'd in receive, it but however that be, the Powder Barrels are always tarr'd here before they are filled and then weigh'd and Mark'd by Our Gunner or his Mate, we know Powder rather Gain's than loses in weight, and we have had no Complaints of it's falling short from others, The Deficiency in that as well as the Lead may possibly proceed from Your Weights being heavyer than they Should be that You will do well to enquire into, and see that they are truely adjusted.

The Account that you give of the 11 Md. 3 Pounds of Lead is very different from what we wrote you in ours of 16th. June. It appear'd to us [then] that the Quantity was Eleven Maund 21 Pounds that was sent on the Sloop George John Hunter-Master and put on shore at Ingeram and from thence sent to Vizagapatam, We are

now told that the Quantity was 11. 3 and that you took it out of the Cossimbuzar Sloop at Ingeram in lieu of what it is said Mr. Davis must have recd. by the Mary if it was so Certainly some of the People about you might tell what became of it; We Cannot at this distance of time and Place clear this Matter up here, and if you Cannot find it out with you it must be wrote off by Proffitt and Loss.

The George imported with us the 23<sup>d</sup> of last Month with your general letter of the 22<sup>d</sup>. June and the several Books and Papers mention'd in your list to all w<sup>ch</sup> we shall send answers by the return of that ship to you which we propose shall be in Jan<sup>r</sup>, this goes by way of Bengall and is design'd to give you some directions relating to several Matters mention'd in your letter now before us.

In your 3d. Paragraph You tell us that on the dispatch of the Duke of Lorrain for Europe You had acquainted Capt. Crompton the Commander, that his owners were to receive no more than the Low Freight on the Surplus Tonnage, the bare telling him so is not sufficient & may Occasion disputes between the Company and Owners, Our usual method is to let the Capt. Petition for what is laden on board more than his Charterparty Tonnage & to sign to an agreement in behalf of his owners to take no more than the low Freight, for which part also of the Cargo, we take a seperate bill of Lading expressing the same, We send herewith Copy of such an agreement for your Guidance in Future, which must be sign'd by the Capt. & sent Home in the Packett by the same ship togather with his Original Petition or liequest: We have consider'd the Reasons you give us for Continuing the settlement at Moco Moco, the Principal whereof are that the Bar is Generally better than at Bentall, [& that there is a] place found on which a Brick Foundation may be laid on [with security] & that it would Give great uneasiness to the present [Sultan] to Remove from thence. we wrote you on this Subject we had Cheifly in view the erecting of Brick [buildings] which we had been told could not be done at Moco Moco, the necessity whereof we could not but be sensible of from the heavy Charges and Quick decay of all such as have been made of wood of this, that settlement is a remarkable Instance and our Honble. Masters having suffered so much thereby, we could not but in Justice to them 1737-13

endeavour to prevent it in Future but as that can now be put in Execution at Moco Moco the main point is obtain'd, and there is no other Motive of weight enough to induce us to Change for Bentall wherefore we would have you as soon as Possible lay the new Foundation of your Brick Buildings, and we will supply you with Teak Timbers for the Beams and Rafters, as we are of Opinion it will save a great expence to send you such that the Country Timbers may not be made use of, which always decay in a few Years and we would have the Top Cover'd with Tyles, which we are inform'd are now made with you in very good Perfection or if not can be brought from Batavia for we observe the Terrass work is always Complain'd of, and cannot be well perform'd on your Coast.

In the 33d. & 34th. Paragraph of the Company's Gen'. letter & George to your Place we observe they have given you Liberty to lay aside the Sugar and Arrack Plantations if upon duely weighing all Circumstances you shall judge it for their Interest and they direct in that Case the Materials & Utensils should be sold at outcry, we believe the Stills and Worms will hardly meet with a sale with you at Least not to so much advantage as at this Place and if you are of the same Opinion

you will act accordingly.

As M<sup>r</sup>. W<sup>m</sup>. Coles is the Eldest factor and has behav'd with deligence and integrity we appoint him last of Council to supply the Vacancy at your board by the Death of M<sup>r</sup>. Hawkes and we have appointed Lieutenant Amyand to Command your Second Comp<sup>r</sup>. of soldiers whose Commission Comes in the Packett to be deliver'd him on his arrival, he takes Passage on the Lyell.

M<sup>r</sup>. Thomas Mawson your late Gunner is arriv'd with us, and having enter'd into the Sea Service here you must appoint some other capable Person to that Employ.

Our Honble Masters having confirm'd M. Pughs additional allowance you must pay him for the several month's that have been stop'd.

Observing the Country of Anack Soongey to produce a larger Quantity of Pepper than formerly we have laden on the Duke of Dorsett for Bengall in order to be Ship'd on the Lyell twenty Bales of White Long Cloth for the Exchange of Pepper and recommend to you, to take Care the people of that Country are supply'd according to the Terms of their agreement.

That ship will also bring you part of your Indent for which & the Long Cloth you will receive Invoice and bill of Lading from the President and Council of Fort William, what Remains of y'. Indent to be Comply'd with shall be sent you on the George.

You must Levy the same Customs on all Peice Goods Imported by the Europe Commanders, as is done on those Licens'd from this Side.

Inclos'd is a manifest of some Goods for Robert Lennox Esq<sup>r</sup>. on which he must pay the usual Freight, as must also Cap<sup>t</sup>. Amyand for those manifested on his Account.

We have rec<sup>d</sup>. here out of the Nottingham a parcell of Copper which Captain Winter tells us belongs to the Company, we have no Inv<sup>e</sup>. or any advice of it from them but supposing it was design'd for your Presidency and that you have an Account of it in the Nottinghams Packett which we sent you by the Princess Louisa, we now shipped it on the Duke of Dorset as you will find by the Inclos'd bill of lading, the Cask in which some of it Came out of England was so bad that it would not bear taking out of the Ship So that we have been obliged to make part of it new here and more Iron Hoops for the rest, the Cost [being] Charged in the Invoice.

In our Last Letter from the Company we are directed that what silver we received from them and afterwards send to you uncoin'd we are to Charge it [not other]wise than as it is Invoiced to us in Pounds Sterling and not in Pagodas Debting Account Current London for the same but for such silver as is coined into Rupees we are to Charge you for them according to the Current value in Pagodas as that may happen

to be from time to time, accordingly we have Charged the Rupees by this Ship at 303 \$\frac{1}{2}\$ 100 Pag. which is near equal to 14 Dollars \$\frac{1}{2}\$ 10 Pagodas the price of Silver here, but that we may keep our Accounts clear and not clash about the Exchange we propose to keep two distinct accounts upon our books one of what we send to your presidency and another of what we receive from it, and if your Hon. &c. shall please to observe the same Method both of us may settle the Exchange upon our books as we find it Convenient.

Mr. William Fytche who came out as a Writer in the Company's Service and arrived here the 21st. July 1734 Our Honble Masters write us they have entertain'd him in the same station at Your Place and therefore he now takes his Passage on this ship, he has been a very diligent and usefull hand in our Office and as we doubt not he will prove the same with You, we recommend him to Your favour.

In this Packett we send you a seperate Invoice and bill of Lading for such Goods as we have Laden on the Duke of Dorset design'd for the West Coast and which we desire you will send thither on the Lyell together with our Packett directed to the Deputy Govern. and Council there.

We have appointed Mr. Edward Amyand a Lieutenant for the West Coast to supply the Vacancy there. We desire you will give Cap<sup>n</sup>. Acton an order to receive him on board the Lyell with his necessarys and Effects but what Goods or Merchandize he carrys over he must manifest with your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>n</sup> and so should Captain Acton and all others, but no Goods should be permitted to go but what are for Account of those who go on the ship, or who are residing upon the West Coast, the Copy of the Manifest you will please to inclose to the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup> and Council of Fort Marlborough.

We must desire your Hon. &c. to send us at least one hundred Tons of Salt Petre over and above what may be Necessary to Kintlage our next Septem. ship having since our Last received other Letters from the Northern Settlements which Gives us reason to apprehend they will fall Considerably short of the Quantity we expected from thence.

We send upon this Ship as much Redwood as the Captain tells us he can stow away, the rest we shall send you by the next Conveyance.

Since writing the above the attorney's of Mess<sup>ra</sup>. Lennox and Amyand have register'd here the Goods sent from hence on their Accounts for the West Coast, as we inclose the manifest in our Packett to the Depty. Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Council of Fort Mariborough we have Order'd Certificates to be given them thereof to be tendered to your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. for your Permission to ship them on the Lyell.

Inclosed is an Account of what has been landed here from this ship.

We are directed from home to reserve a Quantity of silver to return the produce of the Harrison's Cargoe in Case she should Come hither from Limpo, we do not apprehend we shall want any for that Purpose but however we keep here thirty Chests & if the Harrison does not come here in Jan<sup>ry</sup>. it will be ready to send to you then if your Occasions require it concerning which we desire your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>a</sup>. will please to be perticular, for as we are uncertain how the state of our Cash may be in that Month, if we should be in want of Money then and you are not we ought to sell this silver here but if you are in want of it we shall very easily find other means to be supplied with what Money we may have Occasion for without any Charge of interest. Honble Sir and Sirs

The first Instant in the Evening we were favour'd with your severals of the 25th and 27th. July by the London, the next morning the Duke of Dorset left us, And inclos'd you have Duplicate of what we wrote you by that ship.

As we are in great doubt whether we can be sure of a Conveyance for the Company's Bales from Vizagapat. in December next we desire you will Order one of the Europe ships to call in there for about three or four hundred Bales, the Salt Petre and Packing stuff will not be there Tonnage, but they may put out some of the Packing stuff there if that should have filled them.

We are concerned y'. we should have any Occasion to remind your Hon. &c. of the orders the Comp'. wrote us they had sent you two years ago, and which they are pleased to tell us were possitive that no English Ships should import at the Moors or other ports on this Coast, but should Land their Cargoes here, your Hon. &c. cannot but know there have been several Instances within these two years of the Bengall Ships having acted contrary to those orders, and if we have not Troubled you with any Complaints thereof, it was because we knew they had sold their Cargoes for Less than they might have done here, and hop'd that would have been sufficient to check their fondness for Foreign Ports, But that which exceedingly surprizes us, and at present much Concerns us is that a ship Laden with Rice belonging to Bengall Wm. West Master is arrived at Pulliacat & where the said Master gives out he was bound by Orders from his Owners and that more are bound there and to other Ports on the Coast, What may be the reason of such Orders your Honour &c. will very likely better know than we, but at a time when so Considerable a Settlement of the Company's as ours is labouring under the Greatest Difficulties from the Scarcity of Grain and many of our people Dye Dayly for meer want we cannot help thinking it strange and even Cruel, not to say ungratefull that English ships trading under the Companys protection should be Order'd to Contribute to the Releif of a Dutch Settlement and other foreign Ports rather than one of the Companies, we are sure it Could not be from the hopes of a better price for so soon as Cap<sup>18</sup>. West landed it was his Bargain that he should be paid the Madrass price for his Cargoe, and as little can we give Credit to the pretence that it being late in the season and a great Number of ships bound here he expected a difficulty in being unloaded. We shall confess to your Hon. &c'. that a want of a sufficient Number of Boats is a misfortune we sometimes Labour under, but that is cheifly from the Middle of March to the Middle of June when our Road is full of Ships and many also are in St. Thomê Road but at other times we can always have the assistance of the St. Thome Boats and as we expected [sic] a great Importation from Bengall this Month we have not only kept all our own Boates in Repair, but the Havildaar of St. Thome had at our Request kept all his Boates likewise ready to assist us upon this Occasion, We are misinform'd if there be more than Six boates belonging to Pulliacatt and beleive your Hon. &c. will find the three ships which arrived here at the same time Capt. West did at Pulliacatt have met with a much Quicker dispatch, We doubt not your Hon. &c. will call upon him as well as all others who have not had their Clearance from hence for the Customs they ought to have paid here and as we are very apprehensive the Famine here will not be soon over we desire your Honour &c<sup>2</sup>. will lay your Injunctions upon all English Vessels bound to the Coast to import here only, we are in Dayly hopes of seeing some further importation from the Bay for at present what is already arrived is so far short of our Consumption that if we have not more it will not easily be Described the misery the People must suffer between this and December.

Mr. Augustus Burton one of our Council having had an ill state of Health Lately and hoping the change of Air may be of service to him he has our Consent to go to Calcutta for a few Months and takes his Passage on the Trivitore.

We have received yours of the 19th. Instant in answer to what we wrote your under date 13th, this month, after having Long consider'd and debated the purpo rit of it we think proper to reply as follows.

With your letter of the 7th. May you sent us six Musters of Cloth taken out of 128 Peices remains 200 brought in by your Merchants from Chemanackpollam telling us at the same time that but few Peices of the seventy two you had picked out of that Parcell would sort better than a N°. 3 and that the whole Parcel cost about 44 Pagod. & Corge, on Looking over this Cloth we found five Peices which we approv'd and Marked N°. 1, 2, 3 and as you say what you had Picked out would not much of it prove better than N°. 3 we think if we allow that Parcel to be of equal Goodness with the five Musters we shall not at all undervalue it and we then suppose the sortment would stand thus

which according to the above proportions will bring the whole out at the following rates allowing 1. 9 difference between each No.

and we then told you that had some faults there enumerated been mended what we Number'd 1, 2, 3 would be equal to the Numbers of Salem Cloth, but as you wrote us back those Faults could not be amended we added in our next that you must look upon these as only N°. 2, 3, 4 so that for a N°. 1 if any such should be found the price would be 47. 22. 40 without Including the Land Cust<sup>m</sup>. and Dustore and

with that added to it the No. 1 Chemanackpollm. will Come up at 48. 25. 20 which a in a Corge more than we pay for the No. 1 Salem, this we say on a suspicion the Cloth continued equal to the first Parcel but as you write us it Grows Considerably worse it will still come out Dearer so that we think we ought not to submit to receive any Cloth at Chemanackpollam which is worse than what we formerly permitted you to receive as such but if your Merchants will Consent to your receiving what is turned out from that as Order. we have no objection thereto; and as there is something more than 2½ Pagodas difference between the No. 1 Ordinary and the last Number of Chemanackpollam as we have estimated them, you may make a sortment between those two Calling it Ordinary No. 1 Bs. and this we think you might have understood to be our meaning when we referr'd you to the Paragraph of the Company's Letter concerning endulging the Merchants in a No. 4, there words are these, ".We would by no means labour under discouragements by turning out "their Cloth while they bring in good fabricks but on the Contrary by taking it in at -" PROPORTIONABLE PRICES according to the Intrinsick Goodness, we are perswaded the "Investment will be augmented thereby". Now altho this Direction was given in answer to our excuses for having sent home a No. 4 yet it holds perfectly with regard to all Fabricks and we suppose if your Merchants brought in ordinary cloth calling it fine you would reject it as the one though you might think it proper to receive it as the other, and o with Regard to this Cloth Your Merchants produc'd a parcell of Cloth for which they asked 44 Pagodas and You consent to give 44, for that parcell and all they bring in like it, if afterwards they will bring in what is not worth 35 we apprehend the Company's instructions reach so far as to tell you, You may take in the Cloth at 35 which is it's reall value thô not at the rate your Merchants would impose it. We have spoke only of the Chemanackpollam Cloth, our sentiments are the same with regard to your other sortments.

Thus much in Answer to the Directions you desir'd from us, as to the Arguments used by your Merchants mentioned in this and your last letter we answer, that we are informed the French are as Carefull to sort by their Musters as we are and if they take in the Cloth we turn out it is in pursuance of Directions of the same kind with the Paragraphs we refer'd you to Viz. to take in Cloth of any Denomination fit for Europe at proportionable prices, we do not deny but they may, and we are Assured they do give more in proportion for some sorts than we do and that they also make a Greater Number of Sortments. The latter of these is provided for by the Aforesaid Paragraph of the Company's Letter, and to the former we say if we Can get Cloth enough at our prices we make a better bargain for our Honble Masters than the french agents do for theirs and it is well worth all the Trouble we are at in doing it if we can prove successfull.

As to the price of Cotton thread which your Merchants tell us is so much enhanced within these two Month's, our Merch's make no Complaints thereof nor have they desir'd any advance on that Account yet they bring in Cloth as fast as usual and we must therefore suspect your Merchants accounts of the extravagant rice of that Commodity, The rain's that have fallen lately will make the Carriage easier and must Influence the price of what little Grain remain'd in store since it promises a better season than the Last so that we are in hopes the difficulties they talk of are only designed to Give themselves a figure and to perswade you they are more diligent then usual.

We take it you will look upon what abovesaid to be an explicit and full answer to your Questian [sic] whether you are to submitt to the badness of the times and take in Cloth in the best manner you can get it, if by this you mean whether you are to take in any sort of Cloth proper for Europe at a proportionable price regard being had to the Goodness and price of the musters and parcels produc'd to you when you first came to an agreement with your Merch<sup>ts</sup>. we answer yes but if your meaning is to ask whether you shall take in whatever y. Merchants bring your allowing their prices for it we Can never consent thereto.

Your caution to your Mercht\*. upon Occasion of the Portuguese ships arrival at Porto Novo was not improper and for the rest of your last Letter as well as such

ether parts of your former Letters which have not already been answer'd we shall give you our Sentiments after the Dispatch of the Nottingham.

Since our last of the 24th. Sept. we have received three of yours of the 27th. Sep. and one of the 4th. Instant two of the first incloseing the prices of the Cloth recd. from your new Merchants with Invoice of 82 Bales received by the Mary Brigantine, upon comparing the Cloth with the prices we Observed that the Salem Cloth was very good, we think much better than the Chemanackpollam thô this last is Invoic'd dearer and therefore we recommend it to you as a very acceptable service to our Honble Masters that you Increase the Investment at Salem as much as possible and if need be you may give some further encouragement to your Merchants for that purpose, as to the Chemanackpollam Cloth we have already said that thô it is dearer it is not near so good as the Salem Cloth & therefore without you have reason to apprehend you shall be disappointed of a quantity of Cloth from Salem we are not willing to give any further encouragement to the Chemanackpollam Cloth but are rather inclined to give an advanc'd price for that Cloth which is good than run into a bad Manufacture, which we have had many occasions to observe has been attended with very ill effects & that sooner or later we are Obliged to give as much for that Cloth which is bad as we did before for that which was Good. However as you explain yourselves in y. Last letter we would not that you should be so very exact, but that you may take in some peices in a Parcell though worse than the Muster Marked No. 3 & not very bad, rather than that there should be an entire stop to the Country peoples bringing in Cloth, and now that we understand you more Clearly, we think the Question was not of that Consequence that so much time should have been Lost in debateing it, in matters where the Difference can be but small, and any delay's for want of Orders from hence may be of Ill Consequence, we shall very easily approve of what you think fitt to do upon good reasons not doubting in matters of Greater Concernment you will give us timely notice, but one thing we must particularly recommend to you & that is a Greater exactness in the sorting for thô you buy it of the Merchants one wth. another, it ought not to be sorted so, the Bales sorted by Edw<sup>d</sup>. Harris are remarkable faulty for this Respect many peices being sorted to N°. I that are no better than N°. 2 and perhaps as many Peices of the N°. I are mixed with the N°. 2, this Great carelessness in sorting has been the principal cause of all the complaints from hence & thô it has been understood the resorting here would greatly effect the Merch<sup>ts</sup>. yet the Inclosed acco<sup>ts</sup>. will Convince you their was little occasion for their being under those terrible apprehensions that it would be attended with their Ruin. M<sup>r</sup>. Allen's sorting appears to us to be with the most Judgem', or he has taken most care & if M<sup>r</sup>. Harris will not mend his hand, we shall supply his place with somebody else.

You may indulge your Merch. with the like liberty as last Year of exporting their turn'd out Cloth at  $2\frac{1}{2}$  P Ct. Custom.

Sepr. from what you wrote us in the first that the Cloth came in pretty fast and answer'd better than formerly we hoped we should have had reason to be pleased with your Investment this year but we are Sorry to acquaint you that the Cloth by the Enterprize is not only the dearest but some of the worst we have ever seen from your settlement, as to the price we observe it is Charged 16 Mad. Pag. & a quarter P Corge to which if you add 27 fan\*. P Corge Freight and 6 P C'. Batty amounts to full 18 Pag\*. P Corge one with another but as little of it sorts to any thing better than No. 3 it makes. that Number in particular come out extravagantly dear, in our Letter 14th. March 1734/5 you were told that we could not any more take your Cloth one with another but should thereafter prize it by Numbers. In our letter of the 10th. Nov. 1735 we took notice to you that notwithstand. our former Order you had still Invoiced the Cloth at the same Price one with another and we told you wt. would be the Consequence, however we submitted to it then in Consideration of the other difficulties you had to strugle with at that time, but when you were up here and we gave you liberty to advance the prices, you gave us reason to beleive we should have no more reason to repeat our former Orders but notwithstanding the Price is encreased, we still find it invoic'd one with another and the Consequence is plain by the Great Quantity that is sorted to No. 3. This Evil we have found Grows. upon your Investment. more & more every Year & therefore we say once more that for the future we will have all your Cloth taken in & prized only accords, to the Numbrs. This is the Method at Ingeram where the Salampores are invoiced full Measure No. 1, 15. 18. (No. 2, 15 &

N°. 3,  $14\frac{1}{2}$ .) The O Chop N°. 1 (a) 15, N°. 2 (a)  $14\frac{1}{2}$  & N°. 3 (a) 14 Corge, the Cloth is also better than y<sup>m</sup>. and we must know from you why Salampores cannot be got as Good and as Cheap at Vizagapatam.

The Continual Rains we have had for some time past have prevented our washing and sorting all your Cloth but for so much as we Could sort in two days it turn'd out as follows.

Upon the intimation we had from you here that Arcot Rupees would pass as Currt. at Vizagapat<sup>m</sup>. as Madrass Rupees we sent a parcel of the first to you on the Margery but we have not yet been advis'd whether your Mercht. receive them both alike, do not omitt to let us know whether they have any Objections to them that we may supply your settlement for the next year with that sort that will be most for the Company's Interest.
