To the Hon^{ble}. Jam[es Macrab Esq^{*}.] President & Go[v^R. of Fort] S^r. George &0⁷. Cot[noill].

HONBLE, SE. & SES.

By the Marlbrö I received your Letter of the [. . .]ber containing private orders and Instructions to [me in re]lation [to the] affairs of the Anacksoongey Cou[ntry and the nomination of a] Successor to Rajah [. . .]tan, as it was a matter [of] Importance [I e]ndeavour'd to defer that Point [until I] received your directions but in our Genera[i letter by] the James and Mary your Hon. &et. wil[l be acquain]ted that the Sultan and People had [decided to appo]int his sister to that office and dignity [. .] to the former Sultan and the nearest [. . .] to the present [one] what occasion'd [. .] are apt to believe proceeded from the [. . .] Sultan who imagin'd we shou[ld] propose the late Sultan's So[n] and he finding Mr. Gollop had no orders to treat about such an affair gave him further Cause of suspicion that we either sooner or later might [. . .] since Mr. Gollop came away they have not ap[plied] to us for our Concession nor have we granted a[ny] the Matter lyes [thus] at present and as I do n[ot] think it is against the Interest of the Honble Company at this [jun]eture I have not stirrd [up.] She receives her [prop]ortion of the Customs as [Queen] and Bandaharra [and] is acknowledg'd as such over the Kingdom. [The] Sultan is a mild prud[ent] Man and generally belov'd by his People and a Proposal in [favour] of any other Person would [be] received by him with the utmost uneasiness and in all likelyhood mako him less attentive to the carrying on the Pepper Plantations which he seems fully resolv'd on, besides in such Case his Posterity being depriv'd of succeeding to the Dignity, he would be the less careful of his Country & People and esteem himself under not so great Obligations.

O[. .] Sultan Tookadooraallah is [. . .]er your Hon^r. & t^{*}. are Sen-[. .] rights to the Crown, the su[. .] some influence in it but several [. .] has violated the Laws of his Country in [taking arms] against the Company besides which the [. .] he incited his Father in some measure [and had] he not fled for succour he had certainly [been] murderd and would even now meet with [that] Fate, if he was to go into the [Anack]soongey] Country, he has been very earnest wth.[. . .] may have leave to return in a [short Time which] I did not think lay in my Power to answ[er] [th]erefore I have referr'd him to yo^{*}. Hon^{*}. & c^{*}.

[The Sul]tan has marryd a wife lately by the [advice of] the Mantrees and if he has Issue by h[er they will] be his heirs, the Country is in Pea[ce and the] People seem highly satisfy'd with the [present] Government and if the Face of [affairs do somewbat] change by any unforeseen accident I beg leave to humbly offer my opinion that to endeavour to make any alteration might prove of ill Consequence to my Honble Masters in that Kingdom and this Young Fellow will never be esteemd by any that are in the present Sultan's Interest who are the Leading Men and whilst your Hon^{*}. &c^{*}. shall think fit to grant the Sultan the Protection [Co untenance and Support of the Honble Company I believe you will find him faithfull and serviceable to them and his Family will no doub[t foll]ow his example.

I have given Cap^t. Montgomery private orders to let the Sultan's Tookadooraallah's son not go ash[ore] at any Place he may touch on the Coast for wa[ter] or Provisions but to safely deliver him to your Hon^r. &c^t. Having been very much out of order of late I am oblig'd to request your Hon". &c'. permissions to return to Madrass to my station this year, I shall in the mean if I have health and life do my utmost to serve my Honble Masters and endeavour to answer the design of my coming in approving my self faithfull and diligent in my Trust, the severe Sickness I left Madrass with has weakned my Constitution [very] much and this last indisposition still more [and] this Country I find requires a large stock of health even to bear the different Temperatures of the air if your Hon". &c'. shall so approve of it, I shall do my endeavours to get the ship away for Europe before I leave the Coast but if there is not Pepper enough and you are p[leased] to order her to Madrass to save demorage, I intreat I may take my Passage on her.

HONBLE, SE. & SES.

The Marlborough being disp[atched] for Madrass with Orders to touch here I gl[adly] embrace the Occasion to Pay [my respects to and] apprize your Honour &c. [what occur]rences have bappen'd since [my last which] went by the James & Mary who [sai]l'd from hence the 20th. of October when I address'd my self to your Honour &c. Duplicate of that Letter comes herewith.

I have at last though with a great deal of Difficulty for want of Boats got the Ippue Pepper sent up to Marlborough which I presume your Honour &c^{*}. are advised of from thence, I have been very Dilligent in getting Tombonyons made since my arrival there [. . .] at that time [. . .] in the whole Kingdom there is now at this Place three, T[wo] at Bental & another at Triamong & wi[11] continue to encourage the People to [build more] notwithstanding I am allready pretty [well] supplied because the [. . .] this place Bental & Ippue [are in very bad & very] seldom [. . .] strikeing.

The People are gone the survey[ing] which they have already [done] about these [three weeks and upwards] [. .] before [a few words lost] rainy Wea[ther] in that year [. .] your Ho[nour]&c^a. what Quantity of Pepper may be expected from out of this Kingdom the [ensuing] season till the surveys are finished wh[ich] I hope will be in about a month's time & that the late wars have not been a Prejudice to the Plantations [the Proateens have been here & received their Pepper Customs & say that all the Plantations [. .] & in a good Condition which is a good [. .] but however your Honour &c^a. well know [they are] a people B

not to be depended on I have [now] on hand 20 : 600 of Pepper.

The Country is in Peace & wish it may continue so [I do] assure your Honours &c. I shall use my utmost endeavours to preserve it.

The Buildings here are in a very bad Condition & almost quite decayed great part of the West Buildings came down in the lat[e] rains out of the best of those Materials, I have erected a Pepper Godown near the Waterside [for the] Conveniency of shipping off the Pepper & within sight of the Main Guard; as there was no place before where the Pepper could be kept dry. It is [in] Length 35. Breadth 29 Foot & highth 27 and have [therefore] been obliged to [shoar] up the Lodgings in [the late] Buildings.

Since [this] Ship was dispatched from Marlborough I received a Packet advising the [arrival] of a [Prow] from Porto Naias the 28th. Ultimo the Noquedah of which Prow bro'. [them the report of a] Brigantine with British [Colours having been cast off near] Barroos, which [has since been retaken] by the Dutch enclosing a Letter from the Deputy Gover[nour &] Council to the Chief and Council of Padang to [order] them that they would deliver the Vessel & [e]ffects to Capⁿ. Montgomery which Letter [I] delivered him, Having nothing further to [write] I am with esteem & respect.

The 9th. Inst. We received Dupli[cate] of your Hon^r. & c^{ms}. Letter of the 1st. Ultimo, with [an] addition under the 20th; Ordering us to advise what sum will be necessary for this Years Investment: in answer to which we are sorry to inform your Hon^r. & c^m. that the troubles to t[he] Southward give us but small hopes as yet of doing much that way: and we dare not venture to promise a greater Quantity of Bales than were sent last Year; so that if your Hon^r. & c^m. will please to send us seventeen thousand Pagodas, and twenty four thousand Runees: that sum will be sufficient (with t[he] five thousand Pagodas Rec'd by the Morton Brigantine) for this Years Investment, and our Garrison Charges; and we shall strict[ly] observe the Caution Your Hon^r. & c^m. give us that all the sortments are agreable to [Musters].

The 13th. Ins^t arrived the Mor[eton] Brigantine with your Hon^r. &c^m: Letter of the [. . .] Inclosing Invoice, and Bill of Loading for Wares, & Stores, which came out accordingly.

We [now] send our Diarys, Consultations, Ca[sh &] Paymasters Accounts to the Ultimo [March].

Our last to you was by our Honble. Masters Buoyer, this goes by their Sloop William on whom we have Laden the Remainder of the Petre, Oyle, &c*. Stores you Indented for, as P Enclosed Invoice & Bill of Loading Amounting to Rupees three thousand nine hundred & nine, twelve Annaes, three Pice.

The Walpole and Stretham received their Dispatches at Ingeley the 6th. Instant & were Clear of: Pilots Water the 9th. I'he 19th. we sent down the Aislabies Dispatches and on the 24th. we shall send the Heathcott away, As we are now in a very great Hurry we cannot enlarge but shall write you the needfull by an overland Conveyance. HONBLE, SR. & SES.

The accompanying Letter is what [wrote] your Hon'. &c^a. by the William Sloop, who [was] dispatch'd hence for yo'. Port the 22^d. February, & [retur]n'd to this place again (having lost her [passa]ge the 30th. last month, The Master acquainted] us [tha]t he was in the Lat. of 11.50, M Distance from Point Palmaras 24 45 w. Estimation, from the [lan]d 4 Fast, when he mett wth. Calmes and a [strong] Current setting to the northward, web. he found by Dayly observation sett him from [Eighteen] to forty eight miles, till he was [drove] into the Latitude of 18 North at which time they had fresh Gales from S to SBE web. obligd him to bear back for this place, the Master of the Vessell, has been Master of an English Man of Warr, & Esteem'd an able and Experienced Man, but not being well acquainted wth. the track at that time of the [Year], we beleive was the Occasion of Loosing his Passage And we are now to acquaint you that on the 6th. Inst. we reed. Letters from Cap'. Tolson from Ballasore road, where he arrived the 1st. Inst*. having beat the sea 26 Days before he bore back for this place, he writes us that he had the winds from S.S.E. to S.W., almost all the time, & for ten Days together

found [...] sett to the northward by Currants [... Forty] miles a Day he also says it was impossible for the Aislabie to [...] he beleives she is somew[hat . ..] We know not how our Hon^{ble}. [Masters] will judge of this when they[...] have saved their Passage [...] Places, (who are Esteem'd ver[y stron]g [Boats] in]sailing) & we cannot but [say] that we are of opinion that he had some other Views. other Views.

The Shroff [for] this two or three Years past having very much impos'd on us in the Price of our Silver, we must desire yo^{*}. Hon^{*}. &c^a. will please to Coiu full two thirds of the Quota of Bullion w^{ch}. may be sent us on the Expected Shipping design'd for this Place, & we farther request for our selves & other Private Traders, that yo^{*}. Hon^{*}. &c^a. will permit the Coinage of what silver Imported from Judda & Bussora in yo^{*}. Mint, The shroffs having beat down the Price of Zellottaes from Ninety nine one quarter, to ninety two & a half, & the rest of the species in Proportion So that we shall be great sufferers in our Trade if we cannot find redress by having our silver Coind wth. you.

By our Hon^{blo}. Masters Mary Buoyer we have ree^d. yo^r Hon^{r's}. &c^{n's}. fav^r. of the 29th. Ult^o. Enclosing yo^r. Acco^t. Currant wth. this Presidency, & the Acco^t. of Errors w^{eh}. shall be rectified. In your Acc^t. Currant this Presidency is Debted for [one hundred sixty four thousand] five hundred Eighty nine [Rupees] eight Annaes sent [us] on the Heathcott which is but one hund[red s]ixty two thousand seven hundred eighty Seven Rupees eight Annaes nine Pice according to yo^r. Invoices sent us, we are also Debted for one thous^d. three hundred eighty rupees for Salt Petre wanting \mathfrak{P} Hartford w^{ch}. as it is not sett forth in yo^r. Letter or List of Errors we Imagine it a mistake; This Presidency is Credited by [s]ilver taken out of the Aislabie only one hund^d. [. . .] thous^d. one hun^d: twenty three [. . .] five Pice wh^{ch}. should have [. . .] Invoice Price of five [. . .] Pence \mathfrak{P} Ounce, one hundred [. . .]en thousand six hundred fifty three [. .] five Annaes, three Pice; As also the Iron taken out of the George w^{ch}. is brought to our Credit three thous^d. seven hundred one Rupees, four Annaes six Pice w^{ch}. should have been no more than three thous^d. six hundred & eight Rupees, all w^{ch}.

We desire yo^r. Hon^r. &c^a. will give us timely advice what number of Bales you shall be able to provide for the Expected shipping, we are now Contracting for six thousand seven hundred & fifty Bales, and as we may reasonably expect to have a large Tonnage on our hands this Year shall agree for about one thousand more our Merchants very seldom Complying entirely and fully with their Contracts which was the misfortune We labour'd under this [last year].

HONOURABLE SIR & SIRS

The 6th. Instant I was obliged with [Your] Honours &ca. favour of the 21 Ultimo.

From January to this time the Dubbs has been gradually Riseing in Vallue, from One hundred & sixty t[on] o more now then one hundred forty foure & Pagoda, and the Cotton Yarn Continueing to bare as heigh a Price [as it] did any time the last Year; for these Reasons at [. . .] not one Peice of Ordinary Cloth has been seen, nor will any come to agreement for that Cloth till they see what alterations there will be in the Price of Dubbs after the [Weddings] are all over, if they prove to fall to the medium Price of last Year I hope to make a shift to go on pretty well, but should they prove otherwise; with humble submission except Your Honour &c^a. should take it into considevation for allow^s. (if not to be avoided) an Addition to the Price of the Ord^g. Cloth I am afraid little can be done, but as I request only a Provisional Leave, so I hope shall be able to do without.

The 16 Instant Early in the morning the Two Rebell Rajahs Rammer[auz and] Subba[na passed] through Timmerauze his country [with] with about Three [Thous⁴.] Men; [to] a Moors Town caled Dac[hero]on, a[bout eight or] nine miles of; They committed [. . .] in any part of 'Timmerauze his Country, and had their march been a little more expeditious, they might abeen Reward with a good Booty; but the Town having notice time enough before; Those that was most wealthy left their houses & came into this Town with what was most Valluable; The Rebells stayd but Two Days at Dacheroon, & it is said carry'd away between fourteen & fifteen Thousand Pagodas in money & Jewels besides other Plunder; They got Six hondred Pagodas in Ready money from the Dutch, And Two hundred more in other things. My Vessell was going into [the] main River with all necessarys on Board [in order to] take in the Hon^{ule}. Companys Effects, where [I . . .] at an Anchor very secure from any attempts they could a made espeshally in another Rajahs country, who woud asoone sent after them had they committed any acts of hostility in his country.

There can be no other method of sending me money this year but what is equall as dangerous as sending to Vizagapatam, except a [ve]ssell was to call at the barr and I had notice given me These Rajahs with their Armey leys near the Hills between this and Vizagapatam but out of the Road.

Herewith I take leave of sending your Honour &c^a. copy of the Books to the Ultimo April, And at [the foot] hereof is the Account of Cloth at the Washers [I] am with due Respect

We have met with so many & frequent disappointments, when we were upon the Conclusion of a Contract agreeable to your orders, that we have not been able till now to accomplish it.

Tondroy with Virago Chittee, Arnatchelum Chittee & China Tombe Chittee have undertaken to procure five hundred Bales, & Sha Permall with Dermacheva Chittee & Tricom Chittee, promise five hundred more we wou'd have had them kept in a body but it is impossible to remove their prejudices, wherefore we judg'd it best to profit by their Emulation, the mony the Comp^y. advances, is to be divided between the two Setts, & each to be answerable for their own miscarriage, we have agreeable to the liberty you have given, cancell'd the old Contract, which favour is what animates them, to push on the investment with all imaginable Vigour.

We shall be glad you will please to let us know what Species in the new list of Investment, we must incert in our Contract, that it may be Sign'd with all expedition.

To THE HONBLE. JAMES MACRAE ESQ^R. PRESID^T. & GOV^R. & COUNCIL OF FORT S^T. GEORGE.

HONBLE. SE. &CRA.

Your Letter of the 21st. Ultimo came to hand the 7th. Ins^t. inclosing an Extract of a List of Goods to be provided at Vizagapatam this year, but it is no small concern to us that We can't possibly comply with the Article of Ord^{ry}. Long Cloth, and begg leave to lay before your Hon^r. & c^m the following reasons why it is not in our Power.

The Dutch to the Northw^d. have raised the price of their Long Cloth Ordinary this Year to Pag^{*}. 35 \oplus Corge which Your Hon^{*}. & c^m. will easily see is too great a difference for us to meddle with it, and We hope you'll think it a sufficient reason why we can't possibly get any of that sortment from those parts. Our dependance therefore must be on Quotapatam to the Southward where we shall do all that is in our power but We are apprehensive likewise of being disapointed there, as we cannot allow the weavers any proportion of Fine Long Cloth, & but so very small a quantity of Fine Sallampores, & they do not care to be employed intirely on Course Goods.

In Our Letter of the 29th. April (not being then apprehensive that the disturbances in the Country wou'd long continue) We ventur'd to promise Your Hon^r. &c^{ra}. the same Number of bales we sent last year; near 100 of which we imagin'd would be fine Cloth; Of Sallampores Ordinary from the Northw^d. we expected 300 Bales, and the rest to be made up of Course Cloth from Quotapatam; But Subbana and Ram Rauze 2 Rajahs that way, kept the Country in such confusion by plundring the towns thereabouts, that We have as yet been able to get little or no Cloth from thence, most of the Inhabitants being drove away and several of them came as farr as this place for protection besides these disapointments the Weavers insist upon some advance this Year upon all the Cloth giving it for a reason that as Copper Cash are so excessive dear, and they are Obliged to buy all their thread in the Markets by small Quantitys with that Coin, they cannot possibly afford the Cloth for the Last years price, and because We are very desirous to keep our Hon^{ble}. Ultimo, The former inclosed me a List for the Investment, It woud be a vast deal of pleasure to me, could I give Your Honour &c^a: the Least hope of complying to the proportion of Ordinary Cloth, The unheard of hardships that this country lay under the Last Year, Your Hon^r. &c^{ra}: has been Acquainted with, but I take leave to informe You, that this proves much worse, The Cotton yarn is full as Dear as any time then and Dubbs fourteen in a Pagoda less, then the medium Price of this Last year, from April, to December; and in all probability may be much Dearer before this year is at an end; to add, the whole country has been in commotion ever since Subbana and Rammerauze Robbed Duchercon, as to the last Article, since the Rains are begun to come upon us, People are less fearf¹. and begins to settle at their own Homes.

I Return your bon". &c": many thanks for your favour of permission of makeing One Thousand Peices of Fine Long cloth, instead of Five hundred Peices Fine Sallampores, You say provided that the Cloth is equal [in] goodness with that last year sent you, otherwise the loss will ley on my hands, as I [do not f]ind that a hard [tas]ke to make good, so it gives me no concern, but the [Ord]inary Cloth Thare leys the greatest difficulty, for that notwithstanding I give Thirty one Pagodas & Corge for that Cloth, the overplus is so small, when the Yarn is paid for, that the Weaver has not Incouragement to set to work, and no consideration for the Trouble and Risque to any one elce with submission further, The Gentlemen at Vizagapatam have Two countrys to provide Ordinary Cloth in, & this only for their Fine, so that they can allow a Large proportion of Fine, to the quantity of Ordinary provided in this Country, And If I cannot some measure give the same Incouragement for fine as another it is most certain none will work for [me]. The People I imploy offers, if Your Hon^r. &cⁿ. will please of giveing a permission of allowing one proportion Fine to Two of Ordinary they will do their indeavours, & provide as much as possible for the time, I once more take Leave to say this Factory leys under all the misfortunes imaginable a certain Expence, and an uncertain Trade Dubbs, w^{ch}, is the chief dependance that the Trade of this country has; was never known to be so heigh in value, and no hopes of its being otherwise; cotton upwards of Thirty Pagodas & Candy; a country that is farr from being settled in quiet, A Large Armey always in it, woh, was never known so much before, and what takes of a great deal of the Callicoe Manufactory with greater incouragement for the Weavers, then what is allowed by our Honble. Masters.

I shall be glad to be found Servisable in Collecting [those debts] that are known to be oweing to Mr. Blunt and of making Discoverys of such as may be thought to be oweing, in whom Your honour &c*. emagins Cunshum Lingana to be considerably more indebted, then what he acknowledged, I have enquired of Grurauze, who is supposed to keep the Factory Acco^{ts}. but he denies to have kept any other then the Accot of Cloth chop'd, and sent to the Washers; that Watson kept the Account of the Factory Expence, and paid the People their monthly Wages, And for what money was at any time Advanced, that was done by M'. Blunt himself, and that Account kept by no one elce, Cunshum Lingana does affirm that Account he gave Watson & Grurauze to be a very True one, from the time that it may be properly said he Ballanced last with M^{*}. Blunt, but that a few Days before M^{*}. Davis Arrived here, and M^{*}. Blunt intended to go [sic] Fort S. George Watson took Linganas Account The said Lingana says further the Reasons for his not taking any acquitances from Mr. Blunt was because he had given him no Rec". for money but that generaly once a year before Mr. Blunt went up to Fort St. George, [or] after he had Dispatched the ship a way they made accounts up and that those Accot. he used to throw in his scrittore. I have wrote to the gentlemen of Vizagapatam for an account of what moneys they [have] Received and what are still standing out for the Rajashs Debt of Three hundred Pagodas I have some months ago forwarded the Account (as Vencatach the security gave) to Mess". Fowke [& . . .] I could say nothing

to it my self, because I have no accounts [that would] give me any insight of the Reasonableness of those charges, but I believe they must be admitted for good, nothing better being to be had, I am sorry to say so much as to the Reasons of the deficencey of the Companys cash, but Those People that were here in M^s. Blunt's time, tell me, he had made use of it for his private Trade, That he lived heigh, & was careless in his accounts.

As to the Repairs of Nella Pillee House, there is no setting about it now the Rains are begun to set in.

Enclosed We send your Hon^t. &c^h. an Acco^t. of forty four Rupees wanting, in Chests N^o. 1. 2. 7. 8. 14. In Chest N^o. [4] in one Bag, there was noless than nineteen wanting; and in Chest N^o. 14, in one Bag, fourteen want^t. As the Chests and Bags appeared to be Whole, this Mistake must happen in your Warehouse. The thirty five Chests of Bullion received by this Ship from England have been weighed, and come out exactly right. We cannot but take Notice that your Honour &c. have Invoiced the Madera at fifty Pagodas the Pipe; at which Price you had better have disposed of it with You, than sent it down hiher, for We do not expect so much for it.

Yor. Honour &c. will please to send us four hundred Candy of Red Wood by the Europe Shipping.

As our Hon^{blo}. Masters have sent us out a very large Tonnage, We desire your Honour &c. will inform us in Time what Number of Bales you shall be able to provide, and whether you design to dispatch an October Ship. And althô We have contracted for a large Quantity of Goods, our present Intention is to keep two of these Ships in the Country; being resolved (conformable to our Hon^{blo}. Masters-Directions) not to send any Goods home, but what are good in their kind.

Her Colours are a black Eagle in a Red Field.

It is certain there is very near Ten \mathcal{P} Cent Difference in the medium Price of Dubbs the last year, and the Price present; and the Cotton Yarn full as Dear Once for all I take Leave to assure Your hon^r. & oⁿ. no time shall be Lost by me, by giveing all emaginable Incouragement for makeing the Investment as Large as Possible.

The Gentlemen at Vizagapatam, [have] Transmitted an Account of what summs they have Received, and what appears still standing out relating to M^r . Blunts Estate, as by what they can geather from those scraps of Accounts and memorandums they could find. By what observations I can make of the said Account, That of Cunshum Lingana's when the Cloth he Deliverd M^r . Simpson is Credited for will stand indebted about one Thousand, and between five & six hund⁴. Pagodas in which thare is articles for one Thousand one hundred & Eighty Pagodas Twenty seven fanams charged to his Account, more paid to him, then what he acknowledge to have Received The others are Differance of a Ballance and same [sic] Disburstments made by Lingana, which Account had not been taken by M^r . Blunt. The Washers Acknowledge a Debt of Forty eight Pagodas Twenty eight Fanams & fifty Three Cash but being so Poor by having little or no Business upon their hands for going on now of Three years that they are almost ready to starve. So soon as I had compleated it, I sent the Packet over land to Fort S^t. George recommended to the care of Y^t. Honour & c^a, requesting you will Condescend to forward it to them by the first Ship bound to Great Brittain from your Port.

The kind mediation of your Hon^r. &c^a. in the Affair of Sunca Ramah & us has been of Singular Service to the Honble Company's Affairs in Trevencore, where We at present carry on our Investment without any molestation.

Our monsoon set in this year in a very tempestuous manner, that I am affraid has done great damage I wish our returning shipps from Surat and the N°.ward bound to Madrass and Bengal have not felt the Effects of it. A Dutch Ship from Persia founder'd off Chittoa (a little to the N°.ward of Cochin) a Suratter belonging to Monsiur Martin also off Panany, she was bound to Pondicherry & Bengal, which is all the ill news of consequence I have heard of with respect of shipping. The [B]alls Gally Sail'd from this Port (M^r. Will¹⁶. Cowan Supracargce) for China a few Days before, as did the Harford directly for Bengal (ou w^{ch}. ship M^r. Orme our late Chief took his passage) and the Nancy for Porto Nova & Fort Sⁱ. George all her Cargo not being disposed of.

We have at last come to an Agreement of Friendship with the Queen of Attingah, who has been fully established in her Dominions through the assist^{ce}. of her kinsman that Governs Travencore, who has Vanquished the Poolas & all her rebellious subjects. And Articles of a firm Peace was enterchanged very lately 'twixt the said Queen & Company, it being my lot to go up Country to carry her usual Presents on such occasions.
