Read two Gen<sup>II</sup>. Letters from the Hon<sup>blo</sup>. President &ca. Council dated the 31st of Jan<sup>ry</sup>. 1710-11 & 2d instant, in the former 'tis ordered that the present be encreas'd to two hundred Pagodas. Inclosed came Invoice & Bill of Lading for 500 Gunnys sent on a Country boat, & in said Gen<sup>II</sup>. Mr. Baker is permitted to go up to Madrass. In the Gen<sup>II</sup>. of the 2d instant 'tis ordered that 3 or 4 hundred Bales be sent upon any good ship or vessell that may be here & that the Marks & Numbers of what Bales we send up be taken off, & all the English Notes taken out of the several Bales & Gentue Marks & Notes be put in their stead, & that the Invoice be in one of the Chief Merchants name & Consigned to Narran or any eminent Merchant at Madrass, & that a trusty Conicoply be sent on said ship to the end he may give every several Bale the respective Notes, 'tis also ordered that care be taken to dispatch the ship that carrys the Bales, so as to pass Pull<sup>ry</sup>. in the night & that they hoist no other colours then Gentue, also no Englishman, Letters or writing be permitted to goe on said vessell, they advise that a Tandell & Lascars shall be sent from Madrass, 'tis ordered that the Bales sent up be proportioned according to what Bales we have embaled.

Conformable to the order in the aforesaid General the Warehousekeeper is ordered to Load a Proportionable part of every sort of Bales, enough to fitt the Necessity, and that the present Gunnys with the Comp<sup>as</sup>. marks be taken off & others put on (with Gentue marks) so soon as the boat arrives with Gunnys from Madrass.

Mr. John Berlu brought in the Sea & Land Customrs. acco. of Tevenapatam for the month of January & pays in the ballance being Pags. 18. 12. 3., which was read & past & is as entered next after this Consultation.

Mr. John Berlu brought in the accot. Betle & Tobacco of Cuddalore for the month of January & pays in the Ballance being 67. 27. 4., both which Summs was paid the Paymaster.

Mr. Matthew Weld Paymaster brought in his accots. for the month of September, October, November, & December, which was read & past, Errors Excepted, & are as next entered after this Consultation.

Messrs. Berlu & Harrison haveing rented the Ferry boat & town Conicoplys places of Tevenapatam, Trepopolore, Manjecopang &ca. for one year, the former at Pags. 37 per annum, Commenceing the prmo. Decr. last, dureing which time there being some Complaints of hardship, on the Merchants & Inhabitants of the place thô Mr. Berlu & Mr. Harrison affirm that there has nothing in said Employs been Transacted but what has been customary by other renters, to remedy which for the future (Messrs. Berlu & Harrison first consenting thereto) it is agreed & ordered that said Employs be taken into the Companys hands.

Pedro de Rosiro Novo offering to serve the R<sup>t</sup>. Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>a</sup>. is entertain'd at the usual pay of a Topass.

Read a General Letter from the Honble. President &ca. Council dated the 8th instant, in which they advise their Merchants have failed them shamefully by specious promises, so that instead of 3 or 400 Bales they wanted they now order us to send up all the Bales we possibly can.

In said General 'tis ordered that if Mr. Boone has bought one of the four French ships at Pondicherry & in case he has obtained a free passport for said ship to pass & repass free for some time without seizure or Molestation, that then the Honble. President &ca. Council should think it a good Opportunity for to lade all the Bales on said ship without disguizing them by any Gentue or Mallabar Mark.

But haveing only transiently heard the French design to sell their smallest ship & not certainly knowing that Mr. Boone has bought the aforesaid ship, 'tis therefore agreed that the Necessity be dispatch'd at Night, the Warehousekeeper acquainting us that she'll be full laden this Evening, having 245 Bales, according to the order of Consultation the 5th instant & conformable to the Honble. Presidents &ca. Councils order in their General of the 2d instant.

And there being a large boat offering for Madrass, agreed & ordered that the Warehousekeeper lade as many Bales on her as she can take in.

In said General Doctor Morton is permitted to lay down the Compas. Service according to his request.

Gunner Hugonin was called in & acquainted with what ordered in said General Letter, & afterwards it was agreed to send out the Spys to learn what People of Credit may be in any of the near Villages & to acquaint the Depty. Gov. thereof in order to take such methods as may be thought most convenient for to seize any such Persons.

Doctor Morton sent in his Bill of Medicines bought for the use of the Garrison for the mos. of September, October, November, December & January, which were read & past, Errors Excepted, which amount to Pags. 43. 1.—, the Paymaster is ordered to discharge.

Gunner Hugonin doe march out with an hundred men & fifty Peons to seize such Persons of Note belonging to Suroop Sing, as they shall find there or elsewhere in their march, as directed in the underwritten order.

To GUNNER HUGONIN

Sir

Whereas we have rec<sup>d</sup> advices from Shadashaveraw that there is a Person of Note belonging to Chingie at Pandashola Neloor, these are therefore to order your immediate repaire to said place with one hundred Soldiers & fifty Peons under your Command to apprehend & seize on said Person that he may be brought a Prisoner to this Garrison, which is conformable to an order from the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. President & Council of Fort St. George dated the 10th instant whereby this method is ordered by way of reprizal for our Captives at Chingie, but if it should so happen that you cannot secure the aforesaid Person, & least it should be censured that you went out in vaine, we think it requisite that you make your returns through the Walldore Country's & to seize all such persons as you think most proper, which is left to your discretion, we would have you to avoid all acts of hostility in any place belonging to the Trividee Country, but in your march through the Walldore Country, if you should meet with Mohabut Caun or any other forces we would have you if possible to avoid Bloodshed, but if any should come to oppose you then to repell force by force. This morning about six a clock came in the party that who went to Allaganuttum where Chitteram the Mokasdar defended himself from the party a long time, but hapning to give one John Hards a cut over his right arme which almost cut his arme off, he presented & fired into said Chitteram's breast, upon which 'tis said be dyed, & since Hards came to the Fort he also dyed of his wound.

The Party that went out to Rammaporram have brought in Mohan Sing, who is ordered to be kept a Prisoner.

Hearing there's a party of Horse Skulking near the edge of the bounds at Trepopolore & fearing they may cut off Gunner Hugonins returning to the Fort, 'tis therefore agreed, that Capt. Courtney do march out with 40 men & a 100 Peons to secure said Gunners retreat in case Mohabut Caun should sally out of Walldore Fort & fall on our People, therefore the following orders are agreed to be delivered him:

#### \_\_\_ FEBRUARY 1710-11 ---

To CAPT. HERCULES COURTNEY

SIR,

You are hereby ordered to march out with 40 men & 100 Peons to Joine Gunner Hugonin, who is march'd out with a party to seize some noted Persons that we are advised are in the town of Pandashola Neloor, & the Honble. President &ca. Council having ordered that the said Gunner Hugonin shall command the Party you are therefore ordered to follow his advice & to be sure to avoid any manner of dispute with the Gunner who hath orders from us how to act. Dated in Fort St. David this 24th of Febry. 1710–11.

About Eleven a clock Gunner Hugonin returned & gives the following account of his Proceedings.

#### THE REPORT OF GUNNER HUGONIN.

By the edge of the bounds I divided my men in the order following, 16 Soldiers & a Serjeant for the advance Guard to march one musquet shot before, & the rest were divided into three divisions, which for ease of their march were ordered to keep a good distance with all the Silence & readiness possible & to Joyn upon a Signal made known.

Afterwards sent Peons two & two together to the right & left to march at such distance that they could just discover me, so as to apprehend any Lurking People or bring me word if they should discover a quantity.

Passing by the Village where there was a Moor man, after information of the Guide, I detached four files of men & a Serjeant to apprehend said Moorman with Positive orders not to fire unless it was necessary for the safety of their Lives, & to follow me after the execution of their designs & to march softly to the Village to give me time to intercept anybody to carry news.

After a march of a short distance a report was brought to me of 3 Musquets being heard, I enquired of the guide whether I could remaine half an hour for my People, to which he answer'd that it was late, & should not reach the place before dark, upon which sent two Peons to the Serjeant to enquire of his Transactions, & in case of a Prise to send it to the Fort with a sufficient guard & to follow me immediately.

When I came to the Village appointed I made a Hault & sent the guide with my Peon to know whether the Moors people were there still & take an exact Notice of the Place & enquire of thier Strength, upon their favourable report that there was but five men in a Choultry, I ordered a march & with positive orders for no one to fire, which order went through all the Ranks, I did also order the Choultry to be Surrounded to prevent any Peon running away.

I was constrained to march through a Tobacco Field wherein there was abundance of people drawing water, which induced me to march fast even to running to anticipate their carrying any news, & the Peons overtook one man which was running to the Village, which being brought to me after a haisty examination forced him to show me the way to the Choultry where I found the Moors awake in a yard before the Choultry.

Advanceing at the front of my People one of the Moormen with undaunted courage came with sword & target to attack me before I was in said yard, with whome I inclosed immediately to give my People Example to do the sameby the other, but far from it, contrary to my expectation they fired their pieces & killed the man in my Arms with whome I was strugling & two more, by which unparrallel action all my cares was brought to an unhappy end.

Afterwards thinking myself oblig'd to come to the Village where I left the Serjeant to enquire after him & being informed of his retirement to the Fort, I marched through the Waldore Country.

Govr. ordered them both out againe to Intercept them as they came from the Hills, which they accordingly did & retook our Cattle kild a Peon of theirs & brought a Shroff & another Peon to this Garrison as also about 180 head of Cattle they seized in their way. Ensigne Kerr marched with 20 men after those three Horse & Foot that seized the Cattle, but they made the best of their way to the woods where were 200 Foot to assist them, who all fled not dareing to withstand him.

This morning early Cap<sup>t</sup>. Davis went in a Chellenga to Pullichery after 3 D'eans & one of the Gunroom Crew which made their escape from this Garrison.

Mr. Richard Harrison, Warehousekeeper, reads his Warehouse Acco<sup>t</sup>. for the month of July and pays into Cash 320 pagodas on that accompt.

Order'd that 1520 pagodas be advanced Mr. Matthew Weld, paymaster, to defray Charges Garrison.

Joint Stock Merchants, Cuddalore and Tevenapatam, was sent for, to whom we proposed makeing a contract, were represented to 'em what the Honble. Compa. wrote out of England, relating to the badness and dearness of the Cloth, and that were expected a very considerable abatement, they on the contrary urg'd that their Cloth is full as good as that of Fort St. George, and their Charges upon it is 1½ per cent more, and that Cotton is very dear and our Settlement embroil'd in a Warr for which they expected we should advance upon the old prices, at least 10 per cent, wee still urg'd that from our own experience the Cloth was not soe good as that at Madrass by 15 per cent, and that the troubles wee are embroil'd in did not effect the Country where they made the Cloth, and if they persisted on those terms, wee coul'd discourse noe longer with 'em about a Contract, which they desired time to consider of till next Consultation day, and soe withdrew

Shadashavarrow and Chinna Woodanague haveing been Configned for some time in expectation the Renters that run away, being their Relations would returne, but the Stratagem not being like to have the desired Effect, and they being very much indisposed, its agreed they have permission to live at their houses, giveing sufficient Bail to appear before us when requir'd.

The principall Merchants of this place appear'd before us and [said] that Paddy was soe very scarce that the poor Inhabitants must be forct to leave the bounds unless a speedy remidy was thought off, and propos'd to take of the Custom on Grain, which they assur'd us wou'd be an Inducement to the Merchants to bring in a great deal. Agreed the Honble. Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Councill of Fort St. George be acquainted with it, and that their request be granted till wee hear their answer, in the mean time its order'd that the Maddapollam Yatch be forthwith Rig'd and sent to the Northward to procure what Grain possible.

Last Night a party of the Enemys enter'd our Bounds and took possession of the Walls of Whichimeer which had been uncover'd for fear the Enemy shou'd sett fire of the Towne, and from behind 'em made severall shotts at our Peons and Souldiers, upon which wee sent out a parcell of Cooleys this morning to demolish them, ordering Capt. Roach at the same time with his party to march out and cover 'em while they are at work, which he did, and took 200 of our Peons along with him, the Cooleys continued their work very quietly till Eleven a clock at noon, at which time some of the Enemys foot appearing without the Edge of the Bounds, our Peons which lin'd the Hedge and they exchanged severall Shotts and

continued skirmishing in that manner till towards one at which time advices being brought Capt. Roach that Mowbert Cawne with all the forces of Chingee were within a mile of him, he divided his party, which consisted of 64 private Souldiers and officers, posting Lieutenant Coventry and Ensigne Somerville with 40 of 'em in a Cove in the Hedge, close by the passage they were to enter at, and himself with the remainder stay'd at the Towne to cover the Workmen. They had not been long in this posture before Mowbut Caune with all the forces aforementioned appear'd upon which (what induc'd him wee can't tell) Coventry drew his handfull of men from their secure hold the Hedge into an open plain, and there stood to receive that vast Number, by that time they were three score yards distance from 'em, they discharg'd three volleys with tollerable good success, but that not daunting 'em and they continuing still to advance, soe intimidated Ensigne Robert Somerville that first he endeavour'd to prevail with Lieutenant Coventry to runn, but not being able to work on him, he then swore that if he was such a fool to stand and be cutt to pieces in the service of his Masters he wou'd not, and that very moment putt his Doctrine in practice, flinging downe his Arms att the rear of the Party and soe with the utmost precipitation made the best of his way towards the Fort. This trechirous and Rascally example of an officer soe dispirited the men, that they immediately follow'd it, breaking their Ranks, and everyone makeing the best shift for himself, none of 'em haveing the Courage to stand by Lieutenant Coventry (Serjant Kirkbred and one Sentinell excepted) this animated the Moors to that degree, that with a great shout presently fell upon Coventry and launched him soe deep under the left Eye that he immediately fell, and at the same time launched the Serjant through the Body, notwithstanding he behav'd himself soe well that with his Brace of Pistolls shott two Horsemen that were assaulting him and stuck a third into the Breast with his Halbert, which by that time he was too weak to pull out again, soe he was forc't to quitt his hold and have a recourse to his Sword, when receiving another Lanch in his arm he was forc't to drop that likewise, at which time they Ridd over him, leaving him upon the ground for dead, and soe in a full Body fell upon Capt. Roach, who seeing Coventry's disorder was comeing to his assistance; Their former success putt 'em besides all doubt that they should have the same over him, and as if they were apprehensive of noe danger they charg'd our Files soe close that some of 'em were wounded with the Launches, and severall of the Enemy's horse were stuck with the Byonetts att the Muzzel of our pieces, notwithstanding which Lieutenant Roach behav'd himself soe like a man of true Courage and experienc'd a soldier, keeping his men in soe close order that they cou'd not make the least Impression on his party, and soe he continued skirmishing with 'em with that handfull of men, retreating for an hour and half till he reach'd the Walls of Whichimeer, nor did he leave one man behind him notwithstanding there were twelve of 'em desperately wounded, but join'd sixteen of the runnaways, who animated by his example behaved themselves then very well.

Coventry after the Moors left him recover'd again, and very fortunately fell in with Capt. Roach, who press'd him to stay between him and the rear rank, but being perfectly distracted with the pain the wound he had recd. under his Eye had Created, which undoubtedly had touch'd his Brains, he could not be prevail'd upon, and without any weapon left him and fell amongst the Enemy, where he mett with the most inhumane treatment that cou'd bee, his Body being twice Lanch'd through and once shott through, besides a shott in his thigh and a deep wound in his neck which had half struck it off.

Ensigne Somervile might have join'd Cap<sup>t</sup>. Roach, but he was soe possess'd with fear, that he wou'd not hear him thô he pass'd within twenty yards of his party, notwithstanding which he mett his fate at last, being taken by four horse-keepers, which first tyed him to a tree and with a Crooked knife cutt of his head, the Cowardly wretch makeing such submissions for the preservation of his Life, that will ever be a Scandall to our Englishman, for he not only us'd submissive expressions, but likewise fell down upon his face eating the Grass that the mean

fellows trod on, which is amongst these Country people as much as to say I am your Slave and will be for the future as submissive as your Dog, or any other Beast that belongs to you. Wee lost ninteen men, officers and souldiers in this Action, but most of 'em fugitives, and twelve wounded, but none wee believe without hopes of recovering, the Enemys Foot were soe dexterous in pulling away their Horsemen as they fell, that its impossible for us to know what they have suffer'd, but believe their loss to bee pritty severe, for there was not less then sixty horses without Riders running about the field of Battle; after Capt. Roach had gain'd the Walls the Enemy thought best to withdraw, and then Lieutenant Courtney with fifty men, and Ensigne Hobbs with thirty had join'd him, who were order'd to his assistance as soon as wee heard they were Engaged.

Roach, he had his horse shott under him, and his Pallankeen (which he carried abroad in case any accident shou'd happen to any of his men) likewise carry'd away by the Moors, this day presented a petition to us, representing that the Horse cost him one hundred fifty five Pagodas and his Pallankeen fifty, requesting since they were both lost in the service of the Rt. Honble. Company. that wee wou'd not lett him be soe great a sufferer by it, Agreed and order'd in Consideration of his behaveing himself soe very bravely as he did in saveing most of his party from being cutt off, that his request be granted, and that the Paymaster reimburse him the value of both Pallankeen and horse, Coppy of which petition is enter'd after this Consultation.

Upon the late alterations the Govern. and Councill of Fort St. George has made at this board, Wee this day appointed the Councill their stations, which are as follows:

Mr. Matthew Weld, late paymaster, reads that Accot. for the month of August.

The 20th ulto notice being given by fixing notes att all the Gates in Towne, that the License for selling arrack last year was expired, and wou'd be putt up att Outcry. This day appear'd before us severall competitors for the same, who did bid for a considerable time one upon another, but at last relinquish'd it to Coota and Serapau, who offer'd us two thousand three hundred Chuckroons.

When wee consider how it impairs our Souldiers healths and what fatal consequences dayly attend, they being dayly intoxicated in that Liquor, a very sevear instance of which happen'd yesterday by the Murder of Thomas Parsons by a Dutchman, wee wish it was in our power totally to abollish this Branch of the Companys Revenues, but not being invested in that power, its agreed it be lett out to the above mention'd persons for the Summ they offer, but that wee may as much as in us lyes prevent the bad effects which attend drinking this Liquor, before wee acquainted them of our Resolution, wee brought them to the following Limitations: 1st. That they doe not give dyett nor trust to any of the Souldiers, for that its upon their Risgoe if they doe, for there shall not (as was practiced in Mr. Roberts's time) a fanam be stopt att the pay table on that Acco<sup>†</sup>.

2dly. To prevent as much as possibly wee can the Souldiers frequenting their houses, they agree that if a single souldier or a parcell of 'em in a Conjunction have an inclination to buy a quarter Cask, or a greater quantity of Battavia, Goa, or Columbo arrack for their own use they shan't fall under the penalty of their Cowle, if they buy it, provided they retail none to their Brother Souldiers.

3dly. That they keep noe Botteceks or sell any arrack to our out Guards, who are planted there to prevent our Enemys entering our Bounds, for they have been most of 'em soe Beastly drunk in Numbers, that the worst of Consequences might have attended them.

The Deputy Govern, acquaints the Councill that yesterday in the afternoon Thomas Parsons, a Serjant, and Jacob Vanbushasen, a Centinell, being in a Parriar Arrack house together with severall others, the said Vanbushasen drew his sword upon Parsons and stab'd him soe deep in the Boddy that he dyed of the wound this morning, upon which the murtherer was sent for up before us, together with John Buck, John Kirk, and Abraham Clerk, who were then present, wee ask'd him why his life should not make satisfaction for his Brother Souldiers, he own'd himself guilty of the Fact and that he did not deserve our mercy, and only desir'd the favour of us that he may be shott, not hang'd for it was the effects of drink, not his inclination to murther him, Agreed he be forthwith putt in Irons in a Close Cock house till the Govern, and Councill of Fort St. George pleasure be known about him.

Coppy of the Depositions of John Kirk, John Buck and Abraham Clark, giving an Accot. of the murther, is enter'd after this Consultation.

An Acco<sup>†</sup>. Of the Murther of Thomas Parsons, Serjant, by Jacob Venbuushashen, Centinell, (one of the Bengall men) butt att present belonging to Cap<sup>‡</sup>. Roaches Party.

John Buck, John Kirk and Abraham Clark, belonging to Capt. Vivers Company att Cuddalore, by his permission came to the Fort to visit some of their Comrades, particularly Thomas Parsons, who had the command of the party at Tevenapatam tate, on meeting him they went in Company to a Punch house near the said Gate, where they found severall more of their vocation drinking, but being none of their acquaintance past by them saluteing them with their usuall Ceremony, good morrow to you Brother, and soe went into another yard, where they stayed no longer than to drink a dram each man, and then were returning, when Jacob Vanbushasen, a Dutchman, without any manner of provocation given, attact said Sarjant, Thomas Parsons, with his naked sword and struck him severall Blows on the head, which without giveing him time to defend himself from, second'd it immediately with a thrust into his Boddy, on which he immediately fell, John Kirk above-mentioned was the person next to the Sarjant, who the said Vanbushasen attack'd in the same manner he did Parsons, but seeing the Fate attended him, he defended himself soe well with his Sword (which was not drawn) that he Cutt his Scabbard in severall places and made severall thrusts at him, yett he received noe harm, but had certainly been murder'd had not John Buck stept into his assistance, who immediately collar'd Jacob Vanbushasen and seiz'd his Sword, which notwithstanding he drew through his hand, and Gave him some stroakes over his head, and at last made a thrust at him, which just touching his thigh, for safety of his life he was obliged to quitt his hold, and the said Jacob Vanbushasen still pursued him, and to save his life haveing noe weapon was forc'd to dodge him round some pillars that were in the yard till he found an opportunity to goe out of the door—but as he was goeing over the Threshhold was prevented by Derrick Johnson, who pull'd him back by the Coat, and likewise knockt John Kerk downe. By this time the Guard from Tevenapatam came and made the two Dutchmen Prisoners, tho' they resisted some time with sword in hand before they would surrender and the Murder was soe very desperate (for feare of Condigne punishment) that had he not been bound, he would have open breasted runn upon the Boyonetts on the Muzle of the Guards peices.

Jacob Vanbushasen says nothing more in the defence of himself, then that he was drunk and knew not what he did, and that he had noe mallice att all against the Serjant, and repented sincerely of the Fact, notwithstanding as he had imbrew'd his hands in a fellow Souldiers Blood, he thought he deserv'd to dye, but begg'd if wee cou'd not be mercifull, as had good friends (thô he was now noe more then a Centinell) that he might not dye the death of a Rouge, but a Souldier, and be shott to death by a file or two of men of the party he belonged too.

Derick Johnson, who is with him, is a fellon that has been publicly Scourg'd att Battavia, and weres now the cross on his back, he denyes he was accessary to this murder, and that he only interfear'd when he knockt Kirk downe to part the persons engaged, butt all Circumstances make the contrary appear, and Shows his inclinations good, but it was not in his power to Committ as hanious a Crime as his Companion.

Thomas Parsons was brought speechless into the fort, but at that juncture more occasion by Liquor then his Wound, the Doctor had some hopes at first, but in six hours they ended the fellows life. Upon opening his body wee found the wound very nigh direct downe and that the Sword had penetrated his Midrife and wounded severall of his Gutts.

SIR,

Whereas wee have wrote severall letters to Surop Sing and the rest of the Officers at Chinjee, besides sending our Egib to demand the persons of Captain Hugonin and Ensign Reay, who were treacherously seiz'd on and Carry'd prisoners

to Chinjee, where they have been unjustly detain'd ever since the 10th of June last, but receiveing noe answers from 'em, to our satisfaction, it evidently appears that they doe not intend to release the unfortunate Captives, who are in misery and in irons, and make Continuall Complaints of hardship and very barbarous usage they receive att Chinjee under the Chawbuck and being forc't to stand in the sunn till they are almost faint and dead, and not allow'd a little water to refresh them, and since all fair means hitherto has proved ineffectuall, its certain that nothing but force will obtain their enlargement, and reinstate the English to the good opinions of the Natives, for which reason these are therefore to order you with your party of men brought from Fort St. George, and 200 peons, to march into the Waldore Country to seize any Inhabitants or persons of Note that belong to Surop Sing, as alsoe to use all manner of hostility in that Country and against any that shall dare to oppose you. Captain Courtney goes with you with a party of about 100 men, who is hereby enjoin'd to follow your orders. Gunner Hugonin goes with you as Volunteer, who with Captain Courtney, Captain Coventry and the rest of the Commission Officers, which wee judge convenient to Consult with dureing this Expedition, wee earnestly recommend you to continue in Amity, and wishing you good success, Date this in Fort St. David, March 21st 1711.

Mowbut Caune haveing given out (as is reported) that the English dare not make another attempt by marching out into the Countrys belonging to Surop Sing, these are therefore to desire and order you and your party to march towards a place called Yembolum, being a Village belonging to Mowbut Caune, which the Guide Alleboy will show you, there, as well as in any place of the Chinjee Country, to use all hostility aginst the Common Enemy, which is left to your discretion and the rest of the Officers with you. Captain Courtney goes with you with a party of 100 men, who with Captain Coventry, Ensign Somervile, and Ensign Books may be consulted with on any urgent occasion. Gunner Hugonin goes alsoe as a Volunteer in this Expedition, believeing it very necessary adviseing with him, as any oppertunity shall present, there will be with you about 250 or 300 peons to follow such orders as shall be given them. I wish you all good success to the Shame and Confusion of the Enemy I am

Padre Cupang and Colloway Nullum and their part of the six villages which lyes half wth. in our bounds, and half wth. cut, which as he was informed wou'd bring into the Honble. Compas. Cash five thousand Chuckroms per annum, besides presents to the amount of one thousand pagodas, a renounciation for ever of all demands in our bounds, and a Totall assignment of the Renters debt to us, but that he had as yett refus'd these Offers, and positively told 'em wee cou'd doe noe more then endeavour to procur 'em Justice on the Renters Debt, that Animojee, the Braminy, was return'd to the Camp to acquaint Laula what his answer was, and that he expected to see him to morrow, and hopt that he wou'd then hearken to more moderate terms.

Whilst wee were in Consultation Surapau sent in a Messing<sup>r</sup>. to desire wee wou'd admitt him to speak with us, for he had a favour to ask; accordingly after wee had dispatch'd what wee thought of greater importance, wee sent for him in, when he began to make a long arrang on the pains he had took to bring our differences to a happy and Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Issue, and that was with more difficulty then he could tell how to express they were brought to the easy terms they now are, but that still the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. wou'd noe more hearken to 'em then when they demanded twice as much, soe that finding his Labours were likely to be render'd fruitless, he desir'd wee wou'd permitt him to returne to Madrass, to attend his Family and own particular affairs there.

As he has been concern'd in this negotiation from the beginning, wee know very well some ill Consequences wou'd attend his departure, soe told him wee cou'd not grant his request, and that wee wou'd represent his good Service to the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Councill of Fort St. George now the Warr was brought soe near an end if he woud stay to see the finishing of it, which he neither consented too nor deny'd, and in that humour went out.

## MEMORANDUMS TO SURAPAU.

You telling me upon further discorseing Anemojee Puntulo, last night on his arrival from the Camp, that you have hopes of reduceing his Extraordinary Exhorbitant demands of thirty thousand Chuckroms to twenty five thousand, and likewise to secure to us the Mole of Trevindaporum, and ten fatham of ground on each side all the way, which you say will be more value to us then what appertains Trevindaporum, which they can't part with for the sake of the Pagoda, and likewise to secure us Tashereifs, to the value of one thousand pagodes, which wee may take in horses and vests as wee think Convenient, or deduct out of the money wee are to pay, I readily (with the approbation of my Councill) consent to your goeing, and strenuously recommend to you if possible to procure the following additions:

Thô its possible the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Council of Fort St. George may consent to give the sum above mentioned, yett I enjoine you to procure what farther deduction you possible can.

That they make over Strevenaigue Reddees &ca. Renters Debt to us, and give us as much assistance to recover it with their persons as if they were actually their Debtors.

That they permitt it to be enter'd in the Articles (whenever wee come to sign any) that all Villages, &ca. in our bounds solely belong to the Honble. Company, and that they never had a lawfull Claim to 'em, nor will they or [their] Successors for the future demand 'em from us, that he make appear his Lawfull Title to the Towns above mentioned, and after once made over he secure 'em firm to us, that wee never hereafter meet any trouble whatsoever from himselfe, Successors or any of the Mogulls officers on their Acco<sup>ts</sup>.

That the roads be open for passage of all people and goods belonging to the English, according to Sallabad, free from all Juncan, and that if the Juncanneers who live at Boomapollam, Avashevauke, or any place whatsoever in his Dominions give 'em the least Molestation, wee have the liberty to send for 'em, and punish 'em at our Discretion, it shall not be esteem'd a breach of Peace.

That you procure (if possible) all the original letters which past between Mr. Roberts and the Widdow on this occasion, as well as those sent to Surop Sing and his Officers by him. and that you likewise procure (which I fervently recommend to you) the original of all Letters wrote by Mr. Helbert, Ninapau Dubash, or any body else at Pondecherry relating to our troubles, that it be mention'd in the agreement (whenever wee come to sign any) that the Summ wee give him is not in Consideration of wthdrawing his forces into Garrison, but the Towns &ca. he has given, and the Renters Debt, which they being our Inhabitants, wee have conceeded to show how just wee are to make good to 'em.

And if he agrees to these Articles he must allow us time to send 'em to Fort

St. George for their amendment and Ratification.

These are the terms I strictly enjoin you to insist on, and not in the least to swerve from, but as you are an experienced man in these Affairs I leave it to you to make what addition you think will be for the benefitt of my Masters Affairs in these parts.

I must acquaint you as I am inform'd that a Syde is at the Camp strenuously solliciting for his Employ, and that the Pearles, &c<sup>a</sup>. formerly spoke to you to procure at Madrass are not as reported for his own use, but only to prevent in proper places to frustrate the Designs of the Syde, which report desire you to enquire strictly into the truth of, for if he is remov'd from his Government a present to him is just soe much thrown away. I wish you success in your undertaking, and am

Mr. Richard Farmer, Tobacco and Beetle Collector of Cuddalore, reads that account for the month of October and pays into the Honble Compas. Cash the sum of Pags. 89. 29. 2. on that Accot.

Mr. Henry Cottrell, Land Customer Cuedalore, reads that Accot. for the month of October.

Order'd that Pagodes 2000 be advanc'd Mr. Phillip Baker, paymaster, to-defray Charges Garrison.

Thomas Gray, Tobacco and Beetle Collector at Tevenapatam, reads that Acco<sup>t</sup>. for the month of October, and pays into the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>as</sup>. Cash Pag<sup>s</sup>. 52. 21. on that Account.

Mr. Richard Harrison, Sea Customer at Cuddalore, reads that Acco<sup>t</sup>. for the month of October, and pays into the Hon<sup>ble</sup>. Comp<sup>as</sup>. Cash the summ of Pag<sup>s</sup>. 81. 11. 2. on that Account.

Mr Philip Baker, late Sea Customer of Cuddalore, pays into the Honble. Compas. Cash the summ of pagodas 198, being part of the ballance due from him on that Account.

Our Merchants being oblig'd by their Contract to bring in two thirds of the Callicoes they agreed with us for the 7th of September last by the 25th of December, but as yett not haveing brought in above one hundred and fifty Bales, which is farr short of their obligation, and the Honble. Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Councill of Fort St. George adviseing us they design the Averilla to be dispatch'd from hence by the middle of December, wee sent for 'em before us, and put 'em in mind the time slipt away very fast, and theirs was allmost expired, soe desired to know what was the reason they were not more forward in their business, they unanimously answer'd, that they were farr from being backward in it, haveing at this juncture to the amount of what they agreed to bring in by the 25th December ready made in the Country, and lying in the Weavers houses, the truth of which wee might easily be satisfy'd off, if wee wou'd write to or send anybody there, but that they cou'd not (though they had Consulted the ablest heads in the place) find out an expedient to bring it into our bounds whilst wee were surrounded with an Enemy, but that if wee wou'd propose to 'em a method which had the least glimpse of possibility, they wou'd forthwith send for it, and demonstrate to us wee had noe reason to suspect their punctuall Complyance with their Contract.

We must needs Confess they have given us a very just reason for their backwardness, nor can wee advise 'em to attempt such a hazardous enterprize, being sensible the seizure will be their utter ruin, nor shou'd wee be at all the forwarder by such ill fortune attending 'em, to give the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Councill of Fort St. George the assistance they expect in dispatching the Averilla.

The Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. now acquaints us that uppon Fryday last in the Evening Animojee Puntulo return'd to the Camp, to discours Laula (as he said) fully about our business, with a promise to return the next day, but that he was not see good

as his word, nor had he soe much as wrote him, or Surapau, till last night, when he sent him a very unwellcome letter, adviseing him notwithstanding the specious promise he had made before of severall villages and other immunitys, that now Laula was resolute to grant us nothing, and was soe unreasonable notwithstanding to expect fifty thousand rupees, to which he had answer'd, that if they wou'd perform their promise and grant us all wee ask't, wee then wou'd conceed to give them twenty five thousand Chuckroms, the Summ they first requir'd, and that he was positively bent not to deviate in any particular from that resolution. Coppys of which letters he now lays before the Board.

Wee are very sorry to find our hopes of peace frustrated, and that theres a prospect of our Continueing some time longer in a Warr, soe very destructive to our Honble. Masters interest there, however, wee approve of the answer the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. made to their letter, being sensible wee ought to endeavour to bring them to the lowest terms possible, thô wee are at last forct to give 'em the summ they desire without any Equivalent.

As agreed yesterday wee mett this day in Consultation, when the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. lay before the board Translates of three letters received last night from the Camp to Surapau from Laula Beezer, Animojee Puntulo, and Vinkatachalum our Vokeel, which were fill'd with the highest expressions possible of the Friendship and Affection they bore to him, assureing him there was nothing in reason tht he shou'd ask, and was in their power, but they wou'd grant, upon which wee call'd him in and demanded of him upon what terms he really thought they wou'd come to an accommodation, who told us that if there was any faith in 'em, they wou'd most certainly concede to the following particulars:

That they wou'd give us the Mole and Ditch from Trevindaporum to our bounds.

The six half Villages wee formerly mention'd to the President, &ca., with the ground appertaining to 'em, which will extend our bounds half a mile breadth, and eleven in Circumference.

They will intirely resign the Renters debt over to us, and be obliged to trouble them nor us any more on that account.

They will renounce all claim to our bounds, permitt it to be enter'd in the Articles they sign that they never had a just one, nor will ever make any demands on 'em again.

They will give us Horses and Cloths to the value of one thousand pagodas.

And in Consideration of the three Villages Padree Cupaung, Trevindaporum, and Colloway Nulla, they formerly promised us, they'l give us a Town called Mulliputt, which lyes close to the seaside, a little to the northward of our bounds, and is as everybody tells us of more value then the other three, and they stick at nothing wee ask, unless the punishing the Juncanneers at our discretion, which they think a little unreasonable as being their Servants, but promise upon the least Complaint from us without any examination to punish 'em as wee shall judge Convenient.

And in Consideration of all these grants they demand fifty thousand rupees, which if paid in pagodas are to be Computed at 350 rupees for 100 pagodas, we will be about eleven hundred and twenty nine pagodas more then the twenty five thousand Chuckroms they formerly demanded.

Which after haveing duly considerred in Consideration whilst they lye as they doe round our bounds, it wou'd be impossible for our Merchants to Comply with their Contract, and Consequently wee can't give the Gentlemen at Madrass that assistance they expect from us in loading the ships for Europe, which wee fear may be the cause of one or more lyeing (as the Des Bouverie did last year for seven months) on demorage, that all our revenues are intirely lost for the want of a free trade in Land, that wee are att three thousand pagodas a month extraordinary Expence for maintaining forces to carry on the Warr, and besides what they give us, we think to be an Equivalent Summ to what they are to receive, wee are of opinion it wou'd be highly for the Compas. interest that wee accept what now offer'd, but not knowing how the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Councill of Fort St. George (to whom wee are Subordinate) may resent our doeing it out of hand, without a positive order from

'em, which as yett wee never have receiv'd, it's agreed wee forthwith remitt their proposals to 'em, and that wee wait their answer before wee come to a positive resolution in the Affair.

MR. MATTHEW WELD sick.

The Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. acquainted the Councill the cause of his calling 'em together at this unseasonable time was to lett 'em know that notwithstanding the Specious pretences the Enemy had made of their inclination to a peace and the offers of a large quantity of ground, and other immunitys in consideration of the large Summ wee were to give 'em, had this morning by break of Day attackt Trepopulore, where there was two Vigirous Volleys discharg'd upon Captain Courtneys party, and that they did not presently retire, but stay'd till he had discharged the Cannon he had there at them on which they retired near half a mile from his quarters and then continued skirmishing with our peons till twelve a Clock, at which time they withdrew, which he had resented noe farther then to order Surapau to wrote a letter to know what they meant by committing Acts of Hostility while [wee] were in treaty with 'em; he likewise lay before the Board a letter of the 9th instant received from the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Councill of Fort St. George, which he was order'd to communicate to 'em, wherein they said they had much rather they shoud make the first rupture, but in case they persist in makeing unreasonable demands upon us, that then wee shou'd make 'em one offer more of a resolution before wee broke the truce, he then told 'em that Surapau, by his order, had yesterday made 'em such an offer, to which they return'd the most imperious answer that ever was wrote, wherein they not only demanded fifty thousand rupees of us, and refus'd to give us an Equivolent, which they before promis'd likewise demanded Cuddalore of us, Trepopulore and all our bounds, Tevenapatam Excepted, and Threatned if wee refus'd peaceably to deliver 'em up, Forceably to enter our bounds and take 'em away from us, and lett us know the wait of their hands, this wee think too insolent to be borne from such mean Fellows as they are, who ever since wee have been in a treaty always deceeded from, faster then wee cou'd make advance to an accommodation, and by the action this morning believe they have a reale design to putt their threats in execution, and their number being five times greater than ours, the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. proposed our attacking their Camp by night, by which means he hop't, if 'twas secretly and well carry'd on, to doe such Execution upon 'em. their horses especially, wou'd soe dispirit 'em as to make 'em banish all thoughts for such an Expedition for the future.

This Subject was very closely debated on for near an hour, after which week came to an unanimous resolution, that wou'd be highly for the honour of the nation and interest of the Company to attack their Camp by night, and that it might be carry'd on with Secrecy, on which alone depended the Success, it's agreed the sole management be left to the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. alone, as for the time and method for carrying it on. Coppy of Serapaus Letter and their answer are enter'd after this Consultation.

SERAPAU TO LAULA BEERZA.

It's now a great while since you undertook the trouble of mediateing a peace, for which I hope God will reward you. I doe assure you have not been in the least difficult to Comply with what after soe many debates promis'd you, you insisting very urgently on fifty thousand rupees, which at last was unanimously agreed too, upon proviso you'd stand to your promise (and make it firmly over to the English) to say, the 6 ps. of ground, Towns of Curraway Nuttun, Padre Copang and Trevindaporum, since when you decline your word, and wont give Trevendaporum for the sake of the Pagoda, but that you wou'd give Curraway Nuttun, Padre Capang and the 6 pieces of ground and to enlarge our bounds soe as to inclose said ground all round as farr as their presincts will allow, renounceing all right and Claim of the Renters debt, you may depend on what promis'd you but if you receede from your agreement and use such preposterous Equivocations, you cannot be angry if wee refuse your Articles, but if you stand firmly to your word and make over honourably and fair by Covenant signed, to say, Monaputt the Six pieces of Ground afforcit'd, the title of the Renters debt, three horses and four Seerpaws, the Mole at Trevindaporum with ten fatham of ground of each side, and the Memorandums given Animojee and our Vokeel, that then you shall have able Security for payment of the money to your Shroff, you a very ingenious man, and a person deserveing the favour and honour you receive from Serup Sing soe hope you'l send me your positive answer (haveing wrote Animojee twice) and if you don't think fitt to Conclude after soe much trouble and fair proposalls, desire I may not be employ'd any more, nor anything else, but Definitely and at once break of the Truce, not being capable of doeing anything farther, which thought convenient to advise you that wee mayn't deterr you, or give ourselves the trouble of writeing to noe purpose, pray lett me have your ultimate answer, because I shan't gett leave to write you again any more soe need not enlarge.

FROM ANIMOJEE PUNTULO, TO SERAPAU.

I receiv'd your Letter and show'd it to Laula, who says it's the Custom of these Country people to be troublesome with repetitions, and that he knows not what to say, upon which he summon'd the Buxee, and after Consulting, order'd me to write as follows:

Since your arrivall at Tevenapatam you wrote us severall Letters, upon which propos'd to Surup Sing makeing an accommodation of these troubles, Created by the former Gov<sup>r</sup>. of that place, which occasion'd a great deal of pains and Earnest Solicitations, to treat with you about a peace, which at last he conceeded too, and you promis'd wee shou'd be dispatch'd again in Eight days time, and forty are already Elaps'd and our forces has been this way now five months, which has Created vast Charges, notwithstanding by the instigation of some ill advisers you are

now for breaking of the Truce, it can't be thought you or the Gov<sup>r</sup>. are Culpable after soe much pains, soe that wee cannot continue idle. The Mogulls Dominions reach from Ramesharum to Europe, and Serup Sing under soe great a prince Commands to the amount of twelve Lack of Pagodas, Early, and absolute Gov<sup>r</sup>. of Chinjee, granted by the Mogulls Phirmaund, which includes Cuddalore, Trepopulore, Mangee Cupang, &ca. Towns, which intitleing us to a propriety of Claim, wee therefore, according to our Lawfull Title, are come to demand and discourse about 'em, soe that if you can produce any writeings Authuntick that nominates your Title, desire you'l produce 'em, and wee shall act accordingly, but can't show us any such writeings, you have settled yourselves at Tevenapatam and secur'd yourselves all the Towns under it by your Craft and Bribery hitherto, makeing your-selves Masters of bounds and to the time enjoying the product, but wee can't any longer suffer such doeings, and now make our demands on your bounds, conformable to our grant from the Great Mogull, wee are assur'd you have noe Lawfull Title, and by your Subtilty have infring'd and imposed (as an Enemy) on the Great King. Your revenues amount to twelve thousand Chuckroms per Annum, and doe farther declare that whosoever opposes our takeing possession of Cuddalore and Tevenapatam are Enemys to the Great Mogull, and for every horse that may be lost on such occasion, must be answerable ten thousand Pagodas, to which I call the following Evidence, and take their Attestations to forward the Great Mogull, demonstrating the impositions you have been guilty off, to say Caune Guoy Deskemouke Darroga Mooshareeff Buxee Busaude, 'tis well known the Mogull Labour'd twelve years and at an immense Charge to Conquer Chingee Country to install Surop Sing, and your purchase was in the time of the Morrattas trouble, and by firing your Gunn extended your bounds as Cuddalore to the Southward and Whichemeer to the Northward, and the Town of Trepopulore you gott by Bribery, which is worth two thousand Chuckroms per annum, and your being there seems puropsely to encroach on the Kings Countrey, which will involve all your Sea Ports in irreparable trouble, your proper place is only Tevenapatam, but you have for these twelve years enjoy'd forceably ten Towns, besides thats worth twelve thousand Chuckroms yearly, which wee shall now demand by Virtue of the Kings Phirmaund on our heads, when you'l know better and can only compare you to the Fuckeers of the Country, who make a Trade of begging and are generally the greatest Theives immaginable, soe you in the name of Merchants are Destroying and turning utter Enemys to the Mogull, but as wee eat the Kings salt you shall find how we'll serve you now, in the Waldore Country you have destroy'd forty Towns and fifty thousand Chuckroms of Paddy, and Yembolum Pandar, a man unarm'd and praying to God, with thirty men was kill'd, and plunder'd to the amount of ten thousand Pagodas, there People went to the Duans Brother with the Complaint and he wrote to Surop Sing to gett 'em the money again, and you plunder'd Laula Deepsa, whose horses and money you are posses'd off, and want to know in what manner you can acquitt yourselves of this, and because wee came to demand our due of twelve thousand Chuckroms yearly on your bounds, you runn into our Country and burn and plunder above one hundred thousand, the occasion of our enlargeing soe is upon the Accot. of your inviteing us in a friendly manner, and keeping us forty days, thought was oblig'd to write, ought to have been done before, therefore send your answer what you think proper. This is the Mogulls affair and allthough you may think to fee and acquire an accommodation by other means, you may depend it will never doe, and whoever may undertake being a Mediator will allways have reverence to our just pretences, which are in writeing, and be only a great expence to you, soe that if you'l quietly resign to us, or lett us peaceably take possession of Cuddalore and Trepopulore &ca. what you plunder'd in the Waldore Country, Damage to Yembolam Pandar, Shevenaigue Reddoes Debt of Eight thousand Chuckroms and its interest, and on our delivering Veraugoo Redde to Armittu Pillu, (who is the security for six thousand Chuckroms) you must make him pay the money and interest as alsoe the Charges of our Camp and then wee shall be very peaceable, otherwise shall remain here, being come on purpose to visitt you, soe wou'd advise you to keep your forces in usuall good order. All which Laula order'd me to write you, and desires you'l seriously consider

the purport, you wrote me very reflecting, Complaining of my letters, I think it pretty well agrees with your treatment because you undertake being a Mediator and are partiall alltogether, which ought not to be, under a pretence of Concludeing a peace with us, you in the interim have made your Contract, and gott your Road Clear'd, and your prisoners enlarg'd, and supply'd with provisions, Sent for Laula, and in forty days time you appear'd twice, and then break of a truce as if you were ignorant, not considering Serup Sing's friendship, you now feign unexperience, you promis'd when I was at Chinjee the Renters shou'd pay their debt, and since I came and discourst you, you Promis'd the Company wou'd pay it, and in three days after their Bramminy came to some of your people and perswaded you to make the Company pay their debt and take it upon 'em, besides all this, the business between Armutta Pilla and Veraugoo Reddes severall of your Merchants knows how 'twas decided, which Summ you likewise exclude us from. You often repeat to me about Six peices of ground and a Town &ca. if you can satisfye Laula by agreement and dispatch him, you want any Town then you may ask him (which is what allways told and wrote you) and now you insist upon a Town in the Waldore Country, Wee came here to make our just demands for our Jaggeer and not to sell you any Towns or ground, which you know can't be done, and is only a device to break off the peace, and sett at your ease Merchantlike you often complain of me and excuse yourself, this being the last time induc'd me to enlarge knowing the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and you are willing to make an end, and God will punish the Instigators of breaking of such peace, and after three or four days after wee have mett and try'd hand to hand you'l find the ill consequence, soe you must not be angry it's not our fault. I must take leave of yoù as the last time about this Business.

The Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. acquainted the Councill that the Captain of the Guard last night about ten a Clock inform'd him that Jn<sup>o</sup>. Hughs, the Cook, was found dead between the Fort and his house, which stands in the Colloway, and that by the Acco<sup>t</sup>. of Andrew Middleton, who was along with him he expir'd, George Brand our Gentleman of Arms gave him his deaths Wound, that he immediately upon notice of it imprison'd the said George Brand, and that if they approved of it, he was ready to be brought from Goal to be examin'd before 'em.

The Gentlemen approveing of it he was sent for, and appearing before us was told that there was a man found murder'd in the Highway, and that by all Acco<sup>ts</sup>. and Circumstances, he must be the person who committed soe horrible a Fact.

He answer'd that he cou'd not deny, but he was the unfortunate person, but said he did it in his own defence, that the said Hughs had publickly in all Comp<sup>as</sup>. used his utmost Endeavours to defame him, more particularly the day before he committed the Fact, when he not only abus'd him very grosly to his face within his own Territorys, the Armory, but likewise in other Conversation, which he bore very patiently, and that induc'd the said Hughs to proceed farther and endeavour to insinuate to severall Gentlemen as well as his Comrades, that he wanted Courage, however,

he past that by too and thought noe more of it, till at Eight a Clock last night he was invited by the pleasure of the evening to take a walk out of the Fort as farr as the Colloway, and returning to itt again mett him, the said Hughs, who immediately ask'd him, who comes there, that he answer'd, 'twas he the said George Brand nameing his Name, and approaching nearer, the late injuries he had done him comeing fresh into his memory, he ask't him the reason why he had spoken soe Scandalously of him, and that the said Hughs in return deny'd ever to have asperst him, which he the said Brand thought sufficient Satisfaction, it being said in the presence of Andrew Middleton, and without saying more continued his way to the Fort, when Hughs again giveing him all the provoking Language immaginable, upon which returning to him he found an ammunition sword drawn in his hand and was assaulted by him, when and not before he drew his own, and putting himself in a posture of defence the other advanc'd soe briskly upon him, that he gave him a Cutt over the head, and runn himselfe upon the point of his sword, when he supposes he received his Mortall wound, this is all he cou'd say in his Vindication, and only added that as he took the others life away for the preservation of his own, he hop'd wee wou'd be mercifull to him.

Andrew Middleton, who was in company, was likewise sent for and Examin'd before us, Coppy of whose declaration upon Oath, as likewise the Doctors opinion of the Wound are as enter'd after this Consultation.

Agreed George Brand be putt in Irons and Closely imprison'd, and that the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Councill of Fort St. George be forthwith inform'd of what he has done.

Order'd that one thousand pagodas be advanc'd Mr. Phillip Baker, paymaster, to defray Charges Garrison.

THE DECLARATION OF ANDREW MIDDLETON RELATEING TO THE MURDER OF JOHN HUGHS BY GEORGE BRAND, DECEMBER 3<sup>D</sup>., BETWEEN NINE AND TEN A CLOCK ATT NIGHT, 1711

Being Corporall of the Mainguard in Fort St. David I was walking there when John Hughs came to me about nine a Clock, and told me he was going to his house in the Colloway, but was very fearful of his life by the way, requesting me to lend him my Sword, which I readily did, then he told me he shou'd be very much obliged to me if I wou'd accompany him, promiseing me a bowle of punch as a gratuity for my trouble, which tempted me to gratifye his Second request likewise, soe wee sett out for his house, and past without any molestation till wee came to the Portugeze Church standing in the Colloway, when meeting George Brand I challeng'd him saying who comes there, who answer'd a friend, and soe advanced up to us, and addressing himselfe to John Hughs, he told him he had not acted like a Gentleman in abuseing him in the Grose manner he had done before all people in the place, upon which John Hughs deny'd ever to have brought the said Brands name in Question on any Accot. whatever, which Brand not being satisfy'd with he immediately ask'd satisfaction, but Hughs refus'd to give him any then, saying another time wou'd doe as well, for that he was then a goeing to his family, but Brand still insisting for haveing immediate satisfaction, Hughs askt him what satisfaction he wou'd have, Brand bid him draw his sword, but Hughs told him that was a Weapon he did not understand, but he wou'd cudgell or box with him, but in Conclusion they both drew,

and made severall passes one at another, and Brand retreating and Hughs advanceing upon him, att last I heard Hughs cry out I am murder'd and immediately fell, when Brand rann away, and I immediately came to the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. to give an Acco<sup>t</sup>. of what I knew of the Action. This I declare upon the holy Evangelist to be the truth and nothing but the truth of what I know relateing to the Murder of John Hugh<sup>s</sup>. Fort St. David Dec<sup>s</sup>. 5<sup>th</sup>. An<sup>o</sup>. 1711.

JURAT CORAM ME THE MARK X OF ANDREW MIDDLETON ROBERT RAWORTH DEPUTAS.

A REPORT GIVEN TO GOV<sup>R</sup>. RAWORTH AND HIS COUNCILL, THE 4TH DEC<sup>R</sup>. 1711.

I Francis Jolly Chirurgeon Major for the Honble. English Company at Fort St. David on the Coast of Coromandell in the East Indies, Certifye that the 3d. of this month, between nine and ten at night, was brought to the Hospitall of this Fort John Hughs, the Cook, on a Bed without any sign of life, on whom I observ'd three Wounds, vizt. one on the Superiour and externall part of the left thigh, another on the finger of the left hand of which the Indicatour was Cutt wth. a blow of a sword, the third and superiour near the left Breast, which Wounds were bleeding and a great quantity of blood came from the mouth and nose when the Corps were stirr'd.

Upon which Mr. Robert Raworth and his Councill sent for me and order'd me to open the corps that I might give a judgement of the wounds which were received by John Hughs.

Upon which I immediately went to the Hospitall where found the Body in the same Condition as left the night before.

And upon strict examination, according to their orders, I observ'd that the incision on the fore finger of the left hand and about two fingers length cutting the Tendour of the muzle indicature, the Wound in the thigh three inches deep in the upper part (Latarall Externe Senestre) the point of the Sword was stopt at the great Trocant<sup>r</sup>., which has occasion'd the bending of said Sword.

As to that in the Breast, nine inches deep, made by a small sword, after haveing lift'd up the Stirnum for to discover the course of my Probe I observ'd that the stroke was right up and down, the which past between the third and fourth of the true Ribbs on the left side, after having procur'd Latugemen, the Muzells both small and great pecturall the intercustos run on the left lobe of the lights about 4 inches length, after which it enter'd into said lobe, the depth of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches, and open'd one of the brances of the Pulmonary Vain, the blood of which was partly discharg'd in the breast, and the rest was expended by breathing in the Trieach Artere, which occasion'd the blood through the mouth and Nose, and I certifye that wound was the true cause of his death, on which Accot. I sign this present report, after the order received from the Gov<sup>r</sup>.

Mr. Henry Cottrell, Land Customer Cuddalore, reads that Acco<sup>t</sup>. for the month of November and pays into Cash the Summ of Pag<sup>s</sup>. 12. 35. 4. on that Acco<sup>t</sup>.

In a Generall Letter from Fort St. George of the 10th inst. the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Council there referr'd to two Letters dated the 24th and 27th Ulto. wrote the Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. in particular which he now lays before the Board.

Mr. Phillip Baker, paymaster, reads that Accot. for the month of October.

Order'd that Pagodas 2500 be advanc'd Mr. Phillip Baker, Paymaster, to defray Charges Garrison.

Mr. Thomas Gray, Secretary, now reports that Mr. Richard Harrison, Attorney to Mr. John Landon, had deliver'd him the Books sold by the said John Landon to the Honble. Company in England.

Mr. Richd. Harrison pays into Cash Pags. 140 on Accot. Paddy sold at the Banksall.

Thomas Gray, Collector of the Tobacco and Beetle of Tevenapatam, reads that Acco<sup>t</sup>. for the month of Nov<sup>r</sup>. and pays into Cash pag<sup>s</sup>. 35. 32. 5. being the ballance of said Account.

The Deputy Gov<sup>r</sup>. acquaints the Councill that notwithstanding this day importuning the Merchants to bring in Goods according to their agreement with us, they had not brought in an eighth part of what they shou'd, which is not only a Disappointment to us, but likewise the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Councill of Fort St. George, who depend upon us to fill up the Averilla soe early that she may save the Dutch Fleet, upon which wee sent for 'em in, and acquainted 'em, as wee have already done, that the consequence of their neglects wou'd be our sueing 'em for the Penalty of their Bond, they urg'd their old Arguments in opposition of what was told 'em, that their Cloth was ready in the Country, and it was only our unhappy Warrs that prevented its not being in our Godowns now, however, assured us that within fifteen days after the date of this Consultation wee shou'd have five hundred Bales ready to Embarque upon any ship wee shall think Convenient.

Mr. Rich<sup>d</sup>. Harrison who marry'd the Relluckt of M<sup>r</sup>. Trever Games, deceas'd, requests wee wou'd grant him Letters of Administration, that he may [have] full Authority to act in the Affairs of said Games for the benefitt of his Son William. Agreed his request be granted, and the Secretary forthwith draws 'em out to be sign'd by us.

Antonio D. Rozairo and Allmanzo Clement, Topasses, are entertain'd souldiers in this Garrison at the usuall pay.
