Symonds to their board & that they have receiv'd our Books & papers copy of which they design to send home by their Ships, that they also design to send the Jenny Galley to bring what Bales we have ready to enable them to give the Lynn an early dispatch for Europe.

No. 1 sorted by Peter Tahourdin, which were only ten peices fitt to be sorted to that Number, ten peices barely to No. 2, & ten peices fitt for no number. They afterwards opened a bale sorted by Aug^s. Burton & Peter Tahourdin of longcloth Ordinary No. 2, which was pretty good of the sort & better than Tahourdin's bale of No. 1, this Carelessness has obliged them to desire the Deputy Gov^r. to reprimand Mr. Tahourdin in Council for his great negligence & to recommend more care to the Sorters.

They approve of the Musters of Succatoons sent them by the Deputy Governour, they say it is very good cloth and well worth the money, but as we may probably find some other Musters in our neighbourhood that will come nearer the Cambrick fabrick, to send them the soonest we can taking care to have the thread even spun and harder and not strike the Cloth so close the Weavers may in good measure answer the Musters of Cambrick sent us.

Masters if we could by any Manufacture of this Country bring Cambricks in disuse in England, or at least send them a Cloth that wou'd reduce the Extravagant demand for it in Britain, besides the particular benefit & reputation it wou'd add to the Companys trade as it would prove an universal Advantage, for which reasons they are using all their endeavours there & expect with impatience the peice of Cloth our weavers are about making by the Cambrick Musters.

They find the ten peices of Succatoons much inferiour in Goodness, the best of them to the peice formerly sent them by the Deputy Gov^r. at Pag^s. 7. there is no proportion between the difference of the prices of the finenesses & they have all judged the Peice of Pag^s. 9. a good deal worse than said peice formerly sent them at Pagodas 7. as we will likewise find, they say, by comparing them, they return us the peice of Pag^s. 9. & half peice of Pag^s. 7., which half peice is to be our Muster & we are to provide as far as one hundred peices of the same.

Gov^r. projected a Wind Mill for the watering of the High Grounds between Horsetail Point & Trepopilore river, which I propose shall throw up at least 40 Tonn of water in an Hours time, the Expence of the Mill (exclusive of the tank necessary for the receiver) I compute will amount to between three or four hundred pagodas.

I likewise have examin'd the Garden House but cannot advise the repair of it. Covering it is an expence to no purpose the timbers of the floors being as much eaten by the white ants as those that support the roof. It is also sunk considerably in the front which makes me apprehensive of its falling by reason that the place where the house stands is so low that the Water from all parts of the Garden settles there and must sap the foundation, the Windows nor doors are not arch'd at top but support the Wall with peices of plank which are so rotten that they Crumble

That John Townshend did live with Mr. Berlu at the time of his death, & some time before & always pass'd for an honest man. He farther says that he did never hear that Francis Carter liv'd with Mr. Berlu neither before or at the time of his death that the said Mr. Tahourdin was conversant in Mr. Berlus family & never saw him there but Townshend frequently, the said Mr. Tahourdin never heard or does beleive Mr. Berlu had 8 thousand Dollars or a Ring of 6 or 700 Rupees in his house at the time of his death he knows that Francis Carter has often been punisht for theft but how often or for what thefts he does not remember. He farther says John Ribere was a long time in the Gunroom & had a good character. That one Tobbins wrote for Mr. Hastings but no such man as Robuson & the said Tobbins went from hence with Mr. Hastings to Madarass.

PETER TAHOURDIN.

MR. BURTON deposes

That Fran^s. Carter came frequently to his house since the death of Mr. Berlu to borrow 2 or 3 pag^s. to make a feast at his wedding that he does beleive Mr. Berlu was possess'd of 8000 Dollars at the time of his Death before or that Francis Carter ever liv'd with Mr. Berlu & has heard from several people that Serj^t. Townshend was a diligent sober man. He never saw Mr. Berlu wear any other ring upon his fingers except a Seal ring of his arms cut on a Cornelian Stone & three or four Gold Rings.

AUG^s. BURTON.

MR. BERRIMAN deposes

That Fran^s. Carter was recommended by Lieutenant. Hanlee to his Care & that he liv'd for some time with him, he had been Guilty of several misdemean^{rs}. & he sev^l. times miss'd money out of his Scrutore & having taxt said Carter with it he has Confess'd to have stolen a Pagoda or two at a time & one time more particularly he got through the wooden barrs of his Closet windows & finding the key of his large Scrutore he open'd the same but by the weight of the Door & his leaning upon it the said Scrutore oversett & all the Draws mony & papers were scatter'd about the Chamber & by a flask of Ink which was upon said Scrutore he as well as the papers were so well mark'd that he could not Conceal the fact & being askt by him he Confesst it whereupon he deliver'd him over to the Military where he was inroll'd & since that he has been severall times punisht for severall petty

thefts, & further that the said Berriman being appointed Executor to John Townshends Estate & he dying in June last by his Acco^{ts}. it appears that he has left about 50 pag^s. in Money & Debts Clear of incumbrances. The man was accounted a sober Carefull person & not addicted to any vice that render'd him Odious or deserving an ill Character.

R. BERRIMAN.

Mr. BROOKES [*sic*] deposes

He knows that Fran^s. Carter liv'd with Mr. Berriman & that Mr. Berriman has told him he dismissed him for the Cause Mr. Berriman does alledge in this paper. That he does not believe he liv'd with Mr. Berlu, & that he was frequently at Mr. Berlus house but never saw Fran^s. Carter. He does not believe Mr. Berlu died possess'd of such a quantity or any Dollars, he knows nothing of any Ring Mr. Berlu had of that value or ever heard of any Secretary or Serv^t. of Mr. Hastings nam'd Robuson.

R. BROOKE.

Mr. GILMAN deposes

That he knows of Fran^s. Carter's running the Gauntlet for theft but knows not the nature of that theft that he was frequently at Mr. Berlus house but never saw the said Carter there, nor does beleive he liv'd there. He knows nothing of any Piastres belonging to Mr. Berlu or does believe he was possess'd of any at his death & never saw any Ring of that value.

RICH^d. GILMAN.

Mr. Ross Ensign deposes

That Fran^s. Carter was a soldier under his Command at Chemundulum for 2 years, he was turn'd out of the Fort Guard & heard he was sent thither after being punisht with the Gauntlet for robbing Serj^t. Karr but during the time he was with him he never heard of any theft Committed by him. At the time of Mr. Berlus death he was at the said Guard, that a year & a half before Mr. Berlus death the said Fran^s. Carter wrote for Mr. Berlu during 10 or 12 days. He farther deposes that at Mrs. Berlus request he went immediately upon the Death of her husband to her & that he laft [*sic*] Francis Carter at his Guard that when he came to the house he lookt over the Effects of Mr. Berlu at the desire of the Widdow but that among them there was no ring of 6 or 700 rupees value on his bed or fingers or any Piastres. That he stay'd a fortnight afterwards in the House but never saw Fran^s. Carter during that time but that he saw Serj^t. Townshend there he farther deposes that the said Townshend was suspected of makeing away severall of Mr. Berlus Effects upon the discovery of a Slave call'd Nondy & that he heard one John Gray say that the said Nondy being in prison at Madarass sent a note of the said Townshends payable to Nondy for 30 Pag^s. to demand the Mony, & that some time afterwards Nondy came from Madarass to demand payment himself but that instead of paying the Note Serj^t. Townshend abus'd & beat him, that Townshend was Serj^t. at the same Guard where Carter was but was remov'd to Mr. Berlus house 2 or 3 months before his death. The said deponent did not observe while they were together under his Command any extraordinary familiarity between them. He farther says that Serj^t. Townshend did tempt his slave wench to steal Liquors from her Master to give him.

SERGEANT KARR deposes

That Fran^s. Carter open'd the window of his room & then open'd a box with

a padlock on it & stole from thence 1 : 7 : that there was in the box 10 fa^s. more

but he did not take them. That he did not suffer the Gauntlet for this Crime but for going into Mr. Berlus lodgings at the Fort thro' the window & stealing a bottle of wine. That since Mr. Berlus death Townshend liv'd 6 or 7 months with the deponent but could observe no harm in him, or that he liv'd at a more expensive rate than usual or had any familiarity with Fran^s. Carter.

WILLIAM KARR.

JOHN GRAY deposes

That about 5 or 6 months after Mr. Berlus Death that he saw in the hands of some soldiers upon the Guard at the Fort a paper which they told him was a Note of Serj^t. Townshends payable to Nandy a slave of Mr. Berlus which he heard some people say was for 30 & others for 50 pagodas.

JOHN GRAY.

Serj^t. Townshend departed this life the 27 of June 1726.
