The Out Points & Guard Houses most of them want Chunaming the Windows and Doors much Decay'd Flag Staff & Ladders Rotten, The Washers Choultry at Bandipollam much decay'd by white Ants, and a Pavement without the Choultrys to keep the Cloth on Much wanted,

The Fortifications in Cuddalore want Chunaming the Walls & mending some decay'd Parts with Brick, Plank & Timber the Curtain Wall & filling up between Metchlepatam and Golcunda Point about 250 Yards very necessary to Secure the wall & Communicating from Point to Point Paveing of Dieu Point finishes That and a part of the Wall towards Golcunda Point wants finishing at top, The foot Banks to Fire over the Wall are not finished and takes a good deal of Chenam & Bricks, the Guard at Condapa on the North side of Penna River Much decay'd, & Considering there is little to secure there, tis hardly worth the Repair and is accordingly Computed, An Hospital being much wanted for the Sick People may be built on the Old Hospital Ground, or rather on a Spot joining the Carpenters Yard for conveniency of a Guard from the Fort to Secure the People at Night, It is propos'd to inclose a Compound with a Brickwall, & make a Hall of 24 foot long & 12 broad and each end room 12 Square, A Viranda of 12 broad & each end room 12 long All Terrass'd, Other necessary places of Palmeiras & Tyles to make it Comodious we Presume may be thought a Necessary peice of Work.

THE HUMBLE PETITION OF THE COMPANYS MERCHANTS, WEAVERS, PAINTERS, AND THE INHABITANTS, IN OR ABOUT FORT ST. DAVID.

SHEWETH,

That your Petitioners beg leave to lay before your Hon. A proposal which they apprehend will be a motive to preserve them within the Companys Limits as well as a means to draw in several People who have deserted this place and there great many more are Ready to follow them, Purely by the many Hardships they have undergone. Which they do not meet with in any other part of the Country. Your Petitioners doubt not but your Hon. will grant them the several Articles of their Request here undermention'd, then they will publish the same in the Country, every where about, which will certainly have the desired effect, and the Companys Bounds will thereby be repeopled Vizt.

ALL Goods that are Imported and Experted, your Petitioners desire they may be immediately Cleard as they come into the Banksalls or Choultry.

ALL Goods made in the Companys Bounds and Exported to Pay to more than $2\frac{1}{2}$? Cent duty instead of 5 ? Cent the same as the Blue Coths, and the Paintings Usually does.

All manner of Grain coming into the Bounds used to pay Duty 20 Cash POxen but Mr. Turner order'd all to be Valued, and to Pay Custome thereon @ 2½ P Cent, which your Petitioners desire may be brought again to 20 Cash POxen as Usual.

THE POORER Sort of People may have the Liberty to bring in all manner of Grain Custom free to the value of 4 fans. until such time the place begins to flourish When your Hon. may gradually advance the Custome thereon as you will then see most convenient.

When your Hon. was here no Fees was paid to the Sea [Customers] [Blew] Cloths & Paintings, which only paid the Choultry Fees, and the Land Custome of 21 F Cent, but since you left the place the Sea Customers Impose on them 1 Mill which your Petitioners have been obliged to Pay rather than suffer the Goods to lay at the Banksalls for a Considerable time. This they desire may be Remedied as it was in your Honours time. They are willing to pay the Usual fees for Certifficates on all Goods Exported And likewise your Petitioners desire the Deputy Gov. may set a Conicoply on purpose to give him an Account of this Affair They being apprehensive that some trick may otherwise be play'd them.

THE POLLIGAR Receives his usual Dutys from all the Inhabitants in the place, but he will not be answerable for any Thefts committed which he ought to do according to his Cowle they desire your Hon. to settle this matter as you think proper.

IF there happens at any time any manner of small Desputes and Quarrels Your Petitioners begs it may be decided by their own Castes, but if the Desputes and quarrels are of a larger nature they desire may be decided by the Deputy Gov^r.

ALL DEBTS likewise may be decided by their own Casts and if any of the Debts be on a Different Cast they desire the Deputy Gov^r. to order each Party to Chuse their Arbitrators of their own Casts, and a forfeiture Bond may be made before him on what Penalty he judges proper and If any such Desputes be delayd by the Arbitrators, or the Casts, or the People will not abide to the Judgment of the Several Casts then they desire the Deputy Gov^r. to Chuse some other People in each of their Cast to decide it.

THE TOBACCO and Betle Farm, they Pray may be taken off, which will be a means to bring the People again into the Companys Bounds it was Cheifly upon that Account that most of the Inhabitants left the Place, and the Remainder of them are ready to go away.

THE WEIGHING DUTY on Cloth, and Cotton thread they beg may be taken off which has been Imposed on the People, since your Hon. left the place by the [present] Renters, and likewise that no Person may purchase Cotton thread from the People that makes it but the Weavers, because they can then give directions to have the Thread made Suitable to the Cloth the Company shall have occasion for And also the Weavers not to be Suffer'd to carry out of the Bounds any Cotton thread but only the Cotton may be sold and Bought as usual Paying no Dutys thereon except it is exported, when they are willing to pay the 5 \$\mathscr{P}\$ Cent Custome.

Your Petitioners have Consider'd of Ways & Means to bring into the Bounds vast Number of Weavers, which they will endeavour at to the utmost of their power, in order to it they have made a subscription a Copy of which is herewith annex'd of a Joint Stock among the Companys and the head Inhabitants of the place Amounting to Two Thousand Pagodas which will make 400 Houses, they will accordingly Collect this Money and put it into the hands of the Depty. Gov^r. They desire that some of the Companys Merchants and 4 of the head Weavers may be permitted to Carry such Weavers as come into the Companys Bounds to the Deputy Gov^r. and then take Money from him out of the Subscription to Build them Houses accordingly. And your Petitioners prays that your Honour will appoint such of the Companys Merchants and 4 of the head Weavers to Act as proper Persons in this Affair.

A Letter from Shevanaigue Reddie to the Redde of the Town of Tevenepatam to be Presented by him to his Gov^r. Dated Wednesday November the 7. 1733.

That formerly when my Father Woodganaigue Reddee lived in the Town of Tevenepatam he used to make Merchandize for the Company or as their Merchts for their Investment. And About 25 Years ago my Father took the Rent of Valdoor Country from SurrupSing King of the Chinjee Country at that time SurrupSing was inform'd by his Enemys some falsitys against my Father & Relations which he afterwards seekt means to bring my Father into troubles, who was Obliged for his own Security to Complain to the then Gov. of Fort St. David who said, that he had nothing to do with SurrupSing or his Country Government but he bid my Father do and Act as he thought proper, in a Short time after my Father Died at Tevenepatam when myself & Brother being Young and our Mother being a Woman who could not understand any Business took leave of the Gov^r: and went into the Country with all her Familly and Lived there, About that time a ship run ashore between Fort St. David & Porto Novo, when SurrupSings People Stop'd the Goods belonging to the said Ship, then the Govr. of Fort St. David sent his People and brought away all the Goods by force which induced SurrupSing to Seize on two Gentlemen belonging to Fort St. David which was the occasion of a Warr between them and then the Govr. of Fort St. David had made a Seizure on all my Effects and Money left behind at Fort St. David 8000 Pagodas from Gunnapa Chitty and about 5000 more from sundry People, ever since that time I have kept myself in the Country, and have been afraid to Returne to Fort St David, now since your Honr I hear is come there in order to make Some Alterations in the Government, & Encouraging the People to come and live under you I am very willing therefore to come and live under the Protection of so generous a Govr. and do Propose to bring in a short time One Hundred & Fifty Weavers and so soon as I Effect that I do not doubt but to bring into your Limitts vast Number more. therefore I Desire your Honr. to Send me a Cowle that no harm shall happen to me, and after you have granted me this favour I will propose to your Hon. some other way of making Merchandize for the Companys benefit And the Inhabitants may likewise have a livelyhood thereby And then they will be pleas'd with their Habitation.

P.S. He sent word here to Acquaint your Hon. that he may Signifie in the Cowle that the Company shall have no Demand on him When he comes under their Protection.

Le Noire Advising that he had intercepted one from some of our English Prisoners to the Captain of the Sweede Ship and had sent it forward to Mr. Pitt; That thereupon he immediately sent for All the Servants attending the Prisoners and with ado, he at last on promise of Pardon brought Mootue Mr. Thomson's Servant to confess, That one Worogap[pa] a Peon belonging to a Porto Novo Merchant came to him to convey a Letter wrap'd Round a Pencil to his Master; Which he did & receiv'd a Letter from his Master to Return to Porto Novo, but being then become sencible of a Crime in conveying the former Letter, he did not design to send This but gave it to his Mother to keep it conceal'd, & prevent further Mischief, which being all he knows Submits himself to the Clemency that was promis'd, and is accordingly Granted him.

Vencatty a Peon then on Guard being Privey to this Affair, and hearing the Deputy Governour had enquired for the said Letter, Made no Discovery, but on the Contrary Advis'd Mootues Mother for to burn it, is next Examin'd, the Accusation Provd and he Order'd to be Whipp'd. But notwithstanding This the Deputy Governour by an Expeditious Search on the first Intimation has found & Seiz'd the said Letter which being produced Appear'd under Mr. Thomsons own hand to a Sweede at Porto Novo, and the said Letter as Enter'd after this Consultation mak-[...] ing mention of some others the Deputy Governour Says he his [sic] trying by all means to discover some of them, and Particularly, That said to be to Will who was Mr. Barringtons Servant, Accordingly William Major being sent for Acknowledges he receiv'd a Letter from his Master Barrington but That it is not now in being That he sent it by a Soldier to Mr. Thomson but does not know the Man he gave it to, And being then Charg'd with some Matters his Master Proposd to him to Attempt, and to declare what they were; he denied that he ever receiv'd any such Poposals, and thô told, we were certain of the Contrary from Mr. Thomsons Letter, and that if he would not declare we should be Obliged to use him more hardly in his Confinement, But he still Persisting in the Denyal is accordingly Order'd to close Confinement & on Rice & Water hoping That in a Little time may bring the Truth from him.
