Tondroy Pilla and Wollogapa Chitty praying that the three and thirty Bales of their white Long Cloth Ordinary may be valued, It was proposed to make them abate two pagodas per Corge on the Nos. 2 and 3 of the Pag^a. 43 $\frac{3}{4}$ price of their Muster, but they offering oath that it cost them one hundred and eighty pagodas more on the whole, Agreed that one pagoda only be deducted on those numbers as being but a quarter of a pagoda less than the usual deduction on the numbers of the ordinary Cloth, which they tell us, to avoid longer inconvenience and dispute, they will consent to give up the difference, and at the same time that they will very thankfully accept the return of it, and pay us Interest on the Company's Ballance.

General Letter from the Hon^{ble} the President and Council of the 8th inst. read, advising of the ten thousand Pagodas receiv'd for our supply of Cash, and complaining of the badness and dearness of the Cloth last sent them, and that they must expect an abatement in the prices of it, whereupon the Merchants attending are all called in, acquainted with it, and Interrogated to the several Articles of the Invoice, to which they say they can't consent to any further abatement, for that they are already losers at the prices their charged, as by their several Accounts Cost of the parcels delivered us, when produc'd will appear, And this, (if we will take in all the Cloth one with another as they bought it) they offer to prove by the several oaths of themselves and the Hands that wrought it, under Penalty of forfeiting the whole quantity brought in.

Ordered that the Merchants prepare the Accounts Cost and Charges of the Cloth by them severally brought in, to be produced here as soon as possible—And

That a General Letter be wrote to Express our Concern on the Complaint and explain the several Articles of the Invoice, In what sortments belonged to each Merchant, and the several abatements made from their Muster prices, and what other observations may be drawn from the Occasions of this Investment.

Hampton and Coales (who were for that purpose appointed by the Governour & Council of Bengal) till March the 3rd in the afternoon. We sail'd the next Morning about 3 a Clock from Injeele and the Winds being Sotherly did not get clear of our Pilot till the 7th in 8½ fathom water, Calm, after which the little Winds we had proving still Sotherly, on the 1st of April in a Consultation between us and our Officers, it was Unanimously Agreed to push for Mauritius, we kept so for 2^o. 30^m. to the Eastward of Point Palmeiras, which we thought was as far as we with prudence could stand lest the Currents should heave us among the Islands. When in the Latitude of 10^o. N^o. tried the Current and found it sett a Mile and a half per Hour N N W then were oblig'd to use our Endeavours for some Port on the Coast fearing if we kept out longer we should [have] been hardly able to fetch here, but should have been drove back to Ballasore.

The three Setts of Merchants are now all call'd upon for the long Cloth of the Courser Muster and the Blew Cloth and being apprized that they have but one month more left to compleat their Contracts in, they all assure us they will do it in time, and Tomby Chitty's Merchants promise to have it done by the 15th January.

Order'd that the Paymaster be advnc'd one thousand five hundred pagodas for to pay the Garrison and other Disbursements.

Mr. Croke represents that a Chitty and a Talliar have made Complaint to him that our Polygar had inflicted on them such Cruel and unlawful punishments as was never suffer'd in an English Government: And that he had of late practised this on Persons Suspected of any Robberies to extort Confession from 'em, and so clear himself from the damages he shou'd otherwise make good. The Polygar appearing to it endeavours to vindicate himself by an order he says he had from the Company's Cloth, and, (on occasion of their having lost some Cloth) a promise to bear him harmless in any means he shou'd use to obtain satisfaction for their losses. The Merchants question'd why they assum'd to themselves such an authority, all absolutely deny they ever did, and the Polygar cou'd show no evidence to prove the Contrary. Hereupon the Gentlemen attending the Weekly Choultrys for adjusting the little debts, and reconciling differences among the poor inhabitants, represent the daily complaints they hear from them of frequent robberys and no discovery or atonements made by the Polygar, or so very seldom as gives cause to suspect his own Talliards to be the Rogues or accessory to the thefts, which when he sometimes Compounds is always for a small share of the damage sustain'd. That he has never on Guard a fourth part of the Talliards usual to watch the Town, insomuch that several parcels of Cloth have been lately stolen out of the very Choultrys. These things being charg'd on him as Public Grievances and what render'd the Dutys they paid him for protection an oppression to the poor, he cou'd only answer, that he was very poor himself and gives little or no hopes of amendment.

Agreed therefore that it be propos'd to the Presidency to give leave that we write these Complaints to his Master our Head Watchman the Worriar of Worriapollam desiring he will supply us with a more diligent and substantial Man to support his Office.

The Paymaster, agreeable to order of last Meeting, delivers in a List of the Married Soldiers who having serv'd above their contracted times pray for the Gratuity to continue, which being examin'd is order'd to be paid 'em.
