As for the Conjee Rice We have paid $\frac{1}{4}$ Pagoda Ɔ Corge more than the Company Pays.

We have paid the Washers and Beaters Considerable more than the Company Allow, besides there has been several quantities of Cloth taken by them to the value of Sixty Pagodas.

On the Blue Cloth We have paid the Dyers three Pagodas Ɔ Corge more than the Company allow, so that We have been Likewise great sufferers thereby.

Your Petitioners have also spent a Vast deal of money upon Servants for the Companys Service.

It is most Evident that your Petitioners have been great Sufferers in their Late Contract Pag^s. 2420. All which they entirely leave to your Consideration, desiring no other Decision thereof, than what shall appear most equitable & just, who as in Duty Bound.

THE HUMBLE PETITION OF SADASHAVAROW.

SHEWETH,

That Whereas your Petitioner held the Bound Rent of the Honble Company for three years, including also the Windmill Rent at Pag^s. 160 Ɔ Annum, upon terms that your Petitioner should be supply'd with as much Water, as will be sufficient to Water all the Paddy feilds, since that your Petitioner had no manner of use with that by reason y^t. the Water does not flow to their Paddy feilds, and all their corn is wither'd for want of Water, and your Petition^r. has not the Benefit of Pag^s. 10 Ɔ Anñ by it, he was oblig'd to Borrow Pag^s. 160 Last year for to Pay the Company,

and the Comp^y. have also been at the Charge of a great deal of money, for keeping it in Repair, more than that farm will come to and your Petitioner is not able to Pay that Rent for the Remaining two years, because of the Loss sustain'd thereby, besides this there has been Several Ballances remaining upon the Bound Inhabitants, And your Petitioner could not collect it because of the famine.

In this unlucky Circumstance of Credit your Petitioner refers it to your Worships most serious Consideratⁿ. so far as to Quit him that farm, because Your Petitioner has been a great Sufferer thereby, Who as in Duty Bound.

Shall ever Pray.

According to the Deputy Governours order I have examin'd the Windmill, and to the best of my Judgement, find what the Manager of that Machine requires to put it into the order it Ought to be, is necessary, but I believe will exceed the Charges he hath Calculated it at, besides mens Labour of drawing Water is so cheap here, and their way so expeditious, that a Mill never so well made, will not perform [*sic*] the Work so cheap, for I have seen Six Men with three Baskets, fling out the Water faster, than the Mill could supply a Receiver, made for a Tryal of its Performance.

PHILLIP BAKER.

- First. There requires a Bank to be rais'd round the Mill about six foot high, that the Sails may be handled without a Ladder,
- Secondly. The four Vains are made too flat and thereby receiving the Wind too full, doth not discharge it Quick enough out again, which prevents them moving swiftly round, Whereas if the Vains were slooped a Little more, the Wind would play quicker out & in, and drive them faster round.
- Thirdly. The Main Axle tree will be too short, by reason two Weels [*sic*] and the Water Roll &c. must be mov'd Lower down, for the Water is Convey'd ten foot above the ground, which is not only needless, but Loads the Water Roll, with more Weight than is Convenient, and makes it move more slowly round, But Note the old axle tree will serve for a Beam of which there are only five, whereas there ought to be Six.
- Fourthly. The Least of the Weels [*sic*] require a new Axletree, the Old one being much shorter than the Diameter of the said Weel, [*sic*] which makes it jump out of its place, and always unsteady.
- Fifthly. The Main Axletree Neck on which the Vains are fastned, is made so thin that a great Blast of Wind would endanger its Breaking, But if the stool which supports it, was shifted nearer the Vains, the Neck would be thereby shorter and so much the more stronger.
- Sixthly. The Cistern or Receiver of the Water, standing within the Water Roll, could not be made bigger than the Circumference of the said Water Roll would admit of, whereby being too small, it always Looses much Water, for when the Mill goes fast round, the Buckets are swiftly conveyed over the Cistern, before they can Discharge the Water into it, or if the Mill goes slow, they begin to Empty themselves, before they arrive at the Receiver, But if the said Cistern be remov'd under the Water Roll, it may be made big enough, to receive all the spray of the Water without Spilling, to do which there must be made a new Axletree to the Water Roll.

By these Alterations 'tis believed the Mill may be kept in due order, and always Discharge double the Quantity of Water it did at first, The Expence of which is Computed to cost about two hundred Pagodas, Little more or Less.
