General Letter Per Prince William of the 7th instant from the President and Council read, informing us that they have sent us as many Wares and Stores as they cou'd spare, but they cannot let us have any Gunners and Lascars: accompanying likewise a Supply of 27000 Pagodas, and 3000 Pagodas in fanams. In answer to our Question, Whether it wou'd be proper to withdraw the Out-Guards, they tell us to withdraw them, if we apprehend the Generals have a design to attack the Place with a force that we think the Out-Guards cannot withstand. They give us also some Directions and inclose some papers relating to her Dispatch.

TRANSLATE of a Letter from Ragoajee Bonsla, Cheif General of the Morattas to Governour Hubbard at Tevenepatam—recd. the 13th January 1740/1.

I am in perfect health and hope you enjoy the same. After our arrival in this province I sent you a Letter or two, and likewise a Detachment of my forces, but you, as it appears to me, neither complied with the purport thereof, nor sent me an answer to it, wherein you were very ungratefull. I had then thoughts of sending a second Detachment, but in the mean while Oppajee Vittal Son of Vittal Naginauth, an old and faithfull Servant to our Great King, arriv'd here from your Parts, and discours'd with me concerning your Affairs which gave me great Joy; Our great King formerly settled you in your place, since which, as I understood at first, some unkindnesses had been done by you, but after Oppajee Vittal had acquainted me of your dispositions and intentions I approv'd of your Gratefullness, and was sensible you wou'd never do wrong, And I am inform'd you now maintain Vittal Nagenauth, I have in regard to him resolv'd not to send the above detachment and Jammedars. Oppajee Vittal is told what further we have to say, and he will write you thereupon, which you may take into your Consideration, and get ready and send; you may use likewise your Endeavours to confirm our Friendship. I have now sent you one Ragoa Narrain about this matter, and you must send back your Vakeel along with him to make an end of your Affairs. I have order'd 100 Pags: to be given the abovesaid Braminy for his Charges which Sum must be paid. What can I say more?

General from the President and Council of the 17th instant read, wherein they dictate to us the answer they wou'd have made to Ragoajee Bonsla's Letter to the Deputy Govr. and give us their reasons why they wou'd not have any Vakeel sent to the Moratta Camp: Acquainting us likewise that they also have receiv'd a Letter from Ragoajee Bonsla and another from Futta Sing both making demands of Money, which they have not thought fit to comply with. They imagine these Letters proceed from the Intrigues of Oppajee Vittal.

The Predt. & Co. dictate an answer to Ragoajee Bonsla's Letter, which with one they have read, they imagine proceeds from the Intrigues of Oppajee Vittal.

Order'd that a Letter be drawn out to Ragoajee Bonsla agreeable to the President and Councils Directions.

Finding by all the Enquiry we can make that there has not been that Slaughter made that might reasonably be expected from the number of Cannon discharged at the Morattas on the 18th which may be very well attributed to the sad inexperience of our Gunners, Agreed therefore to write for some others that are more skillfull, and upon whose Services we may more safely depend: Also for a further Supply of 100 Barrels of Europe Powder, some good Flints and a Supply of Rice.

Bad Gunners the occasion of little Mischief done the Morattas. Some more skillfull wrote for.

The Secretary is directed to give Captain Langworth of the Prince William an order to send twenty of his People ashore for the better defence of this Garrison.

Twenty of the Prince William's Crew sent for ashore.

Order'd that all Papers that are to go in the Prince William's Packet be got ready for her dispatch.

Papers to go by her be got ready.

Order'd that the Paymaster go on board Prince William and muster her Men, and that he with the Gunner survey her Warlike Stores, and make Report thereof to the Board the next Consultation.

Survey of Prince William's Men & Warlike Stores order'd.

Order'd that the Steward provide all the Salt Fish and Pork that can be got, it being thought proper to lay in a Store of Provisions, as it is a thing uncertain whether the Morattas may not lay Siege to us.

Steward ordered to lay in Salt Provisions for the Garrison.

The Paymaster produces Notes to the value of 100 Pagodas for Trees cut down about Tevenepatam for the Security of that place, which being examin'd is order'd to be paid.

Agreed to answer the above Letter in Substance as follows: That presently after the receipt thereof we had a general Attack upon our out-Guards by about 5000 Morattas which has so far retarded the Loading of the Prince William that she cannot be ready before tuesday next, which also depends upon our being left quiet. That there is also a Body of about 7 or 8000 more marching this way from the Southward That there is a strong northerly Wind which may continue for some time. All which Considerations we hope will excuse our detaining the Prince William here till their further Orders; especially as the Ship will not be retarded two days longer thereby, before we can hear their further Sentiments, and the face of Affairs are much alter'd from what they knew at the time of writing the above order, as they will plainly perceive upon the receipt of this and Ours of the 18th.

an Effect that by all Accounts we did considerably more Mischief in the second Action and at a much smaller Expencc of Ammunition. We cannot however with all our Enquiry learn with an Exactness the number slain of the Enemy, as it is the Custom of the Morattas to carry off their dead though at the imminent hazard of their Lives. In this last Expedition they plunder'd Trepopilore from whence we believe they cou'd not carry off a very great Booty. That we shall observe their Commands by Mr. Secry. Savage under the 26th. instant advising of the Supply of Paddy sent us, and that we clos'd our Packet for England by the Prince William the 28th. that she might be ready to go up to Madrass upon further Orders.

The Town of Tevenepatam being entirely open and defenceless, and it being thought necessary to render it defensible against the attempts of any plundering Parties of the Morattas, Agreed that a little Mud Breast-Work planted with Stakes be rais'd on the North and West Sides, and two Mud Batteries at the North End, and another cas'd with Brick at the West Side at Tevenepatam Gate to flank and defend those works. For the same reason it is agreed to raise the like works on the East side of Cuddalore, which, when finish'd we hope will render that place secure against all Attempts. Little Batteries order'd to be raised to defend the Town of Tevenepm.

I enjoy perfect health and hope you do the same. I receiv'd your Letter and understand the Contents. Naganauthia is arriv'd with me from you, and has told me something concerning your friendship which has given me Joy, and which I desire may increase as I am well assured of your being observant of your word, and of your regard to my Country-Men from a long time past. You expect our friendship and are wishing to cultivate it, but at the same time are scrupulous of sending a proper Vakeel to me for that purpose which surprizes me. You may safely lay aside your Suspicions and send one to me. You say that I wrote you Oppajee Vittal wou'd send you a Letter, but that you have received none from him. He wou'd have wrote to you but was prevented by hearing of the Confinement of his Family and People by Monsr. Dumas the Governour of Pondicherry without any Colour of reason. Oppajee Vittal has been an old Servant in my Country, and the French likewise are in perfect Friendship with my Country-men. He has been a long time under the protection of them, but since he has come hither they have through Malice offer'd some indignities to his People. Are not the Europeans a just and upright People and steady to their Promises? They ought not to forfeit that Character; You may therefore advise the French to release the abovesaid Braminy's Family and Children. Don't fail in this particular. Though Oppajee Vittal was in the wrong, still he is under my protection, and therefore the French wou'd do well not to bring a Discredit upon them. With respect to other Matters, You are a very ingenious and sensible Man. We came into this Province to settle every thing in a fair Condition on which account we are now before Tritchanopoly. I expected you wou'd have us'd your Endeavours to assist me in every thing but have as yet seen no instance of your kindness to me, which is not right, and gives me room to blame you; However as our friendship is renew'd, you may be assur'd I will prevent any one from giving you any Molestation. What else I have to say to you Nagaudia will inform you. What can I say more?

Conformable to your order for Surveying the Honble. Company's Sloop Carolina and report the Condition we find her in and what fitting to be done to her, We are of Opinion tho' she hath lain upon the sand she first grounded on at her coming in to the River, above this Nine months, yet with some Difficulty and charge she may [be] got to a place about 500 yards from where she now is, and be either Careend or hall'd a Shore and repair'd in order to get out of the River soon after the next Deepning of it and the Barr, by a fresh now near the Season to be expected.

The Manner we propose to do it is, by four large Chillingas about 7 Ton each, being lash'd to a Swifter round her so low as conveniently we can at low Water, and to keep the Swifter from rising four or more lashings pass'd under the Keel, and fastned to the said Swifter and Gunwall, and besides these 4 Timbers of about 30 foot in Length fastend to the Swifter running out before and behind the Sloop, and two Transverse Beams lash'd to the ends of those by her side and resting on that part of the Top of the Chilingas that extends before and behind the Sloop, by this means we hope to raise her so as at high water to get her into deeper Water and then to Place upon for refitting her, there to remaing [sic] till the River and Barr Deepens Sufficient for getting her out of the River, in which there's a Considerable Risque if the Season prove Dryer than usual, and if there shou'd not be more than 6 or 7 foot water on the Barr, for so much at least she'l require, and is not fifty built for the Rivers on this Coast being mostly Top and little Bottom.

Pursuant to an order from Your Worship &ca. On Occasion of the Work on the Fausse bray Wall round the Fort, and the Paymasters Observations on it, That the late Govr. had thought it proper to Direct that it should be Carried up an Entire new Wall Letting the Old Wall remain within it to make the work the more Substantial, and to make an Estimate of the Cost of Carrying on the Work in the Manner it has been hitherto, which, being of a much larger Extent than at first Design'd, We must have recourse to That, to shew where the Exceeding will arise. Accordingly Your Worship &ca. may observe from report of it of the 3d. June 1740, That there it was only propos'd the laying an outer Foundation on Wells and raising on it an Aditonal Base to the old Fross [sic] bray Wall to taper off to it at about 5 foot high. Instead of which the late Deputy Govr. finding the Foundation of the old Wall very bad and that by the sinking the Wells the Water Orsing through it made it Settle and open in Several Cracks above as the Wells were Sinking Especially in parts where it was much swoln out before, which so renderd it Still too weak, or not Trust worthy to Sustain the Shock of the heavy Guns upon it as well as from those on the Curtains above and this we understand was the occasion of the late Deputy Governours Directions to have the Wall on the new Foundation Carried quite up 15 foot above the Wells Entirely new and Substantial, which was at first designd only as an aditonal Base to the old Wall, and to let that Stand as it was without further Disturbance.

This Work as hitherto thus Carry'd on will also be considerably larger than at first Designd by the Carrying out the Faces of the Bastions much further than our former Calculate, by the base of the old Wall, which runs out no further than paralel to the flatness of the Bastions within, and this the late Deputy Governour Directed to make them the more Defensible and Capable of the advantage of being Scour'd from the Flanks of the Bastions above, This also, with the Widening of the Ditch, as he Design'd from about 45 to 60 foot broad runs out the Counter Scarp proportionably Extensive, We were so sensible that these alterations would make a very Considerable Increase of what propos'd by calculate for the Cost of this Work, and were not wanting in our Duty frequently to Apprize Mr. Hubbard of it, But we found by his answer, That twere Pity a Work of such Cost and Consequence should not at once be done Perfectly, or not Securely Strong enough for want of some Aditonal Expence as in the Performance was found Necessary, to make it as regular and durable as coud be, and by repeated Instances of this kind he seemd to have the thing at heart to make it so, and we believe (though thus Appriz'd of it) he did not think those alterations would make so Considerable a Defference in the Cost as appears by a Calculate in remeasuring the Work so as above Enlarg'd and Extended, which with a Coppy of the former Estimate and Report We here present for your Worship &ca. perusal, for what already done in this Work the new Fross [sic] bray wall is built quite up along the West Side of the Fort and about

2/3d of that on the North side (faced 4 foot above the Wills [sic] with Iron Stone) to the Surface of the Parade at the Cost of near about Pagodas 3000. — and Measures 990 feet, from which, as Experimentaly Nearest to the Truth we choose to Calculate what remains to be done, and at that rate the Total Charge of the Foss [sic] bray Wall will amount to about Pagodas 5706. —.

The Counter Scarp of this Work is not yet begun, That we must reckon from the remeasurage projecting proportionable to the new Foss bray Wall, and so Exceeding the former Measure will bring it in the whole to amount of Pagodas 2234. —.

As the old Bridge a Cross the Ditch was built by two Walls filld up with Earth without any Draw Bridge to Stop an open Enterance on the Foss [sic] Bray; Mr. Hubbard in the late Troubles Order'd an Opening to be cut down a Cross it for that purpose and a draw bridge to be made, of which the Timbers and Iron work are ready done for it, and as the old Bridge lay a Dead Wall a cross in the way of all the Flank Guns he order'd also a Standing Plank bridge leading to the draw bridge, to be laid upon Peers of Brick Work, at a proper Distance for opening away the Partridge Shot from the Flanks to Clear the Ditch, This we humbly apprehend to be very Essential to the other Work and that it may be done well and Substantial for near about the Sum of Pags. 25. — which in the whole amounting to about Pags. 8190. — is Submitted to your Worship &ca. Consideration as the most Impartial account we can give of so heavy a work, If Carried on so much beyond what at first proposed and in a maner so Substantial as hither to it has been.

General Letter from the Honble. President and Council of the 14th instant read, relating to Sloop Carolina, which having been already answer'd in our Letter to them of the same date; We have only to add that we shall use our utmost Endeavours to get the said Vessel to Sea again the first fair opportunity.

The price of the Cloth having risen very considerably lately, insomuch that in April last it cost 39 Pags. Per Corge; the two next months it rose to 41 Pagodas, and in July and August to $42\frac{1}{2}$: The Company's Brokers were therefore call'd in, and ask'd the reason for this hasty increase. They replied they were many, but principally these: The great debasement of the Country Pagoda, which is fallen from 75 to 62 touch, so that where it formerly exchanged for $17\frac{1}{2}$ Gold fanams, it now exchanges for $14\frac{1}{2}$: The dearness of Cotton; and lastly the late troubles in the Country, which have occasion'd terrible Rents in the Government, that affect every branch of Trade whatever. This was the Substance of what the Brokers said in their defence, which we told them we cou'd only transmit to our Superiours; but that however it was impossible for us to go on providing Cloth at this rate, and that therefore they must think of exerting a little more diligence in the Employ that was entrusted to them. In answer to which they press'd again the Argument of the Bad Pagodas, which, without mentioning other reasons, they said was a very good One why it was impossible for them to keep the price of the Cloth down. The Country Pagoda, continued they, has no certain Standard, and, what is worse, it is always falling, and there is no knowing at what degree of baseness it will fix; So that in short the same peice of Cloth which is purchased to day with One Pagoda, must be purchas'd to morrow with two, as the variation of the Coin of any Country must occasion a variation in every thing else. In order therefore that they might act with more Certainty, they desird their future advances might be in Star Pagodas only, for they were assured None other wou'd soon pass in the Investment as was already the Case at Salem, and no doubt of it wou'd shortly be the case every

where. The Board told them, There cou'd be no such thing thought of yet a while, while so large a Ballance stood out and that therefore they cou'd not recommend their Proposal, but upon their warmest Assurances to bring in Cloth to the amount of their ballances at the rate of 42½, which after a great deal of Conversation with them they at length consented to.

The Brokers next acquainted the Board that it was absolutely impossible to provide a peice of Cloth more at Salem, unless they were advanc'd Star Pagodas for that the 6000 Allumbrum Pagodas we advanc'd them the other day they must be obliged now to return; But We being desirous that no Wheel stand still which may help to increase the Investment, It is agreed to let the above money remain in their hands, to be employed at Chemanaikpollam. And it is also further agreed to request a Supply of 10000 Star Pagodas to be employed at Salem, the Honble. Company having this part of their Investment much at heart. The Brokers were acquainted with this our Resolution and then withdrew.

Star Pagoda requested for Salem.

The Deputy Governour then inform'd the Board that the Honble. Company had often wrote very pressingly to get Andiapa entertain'd again in their Service; and cou'd such a thing be brought about he believ'd it wou'd be esteem'd a very agreeable Step in us by our Honourable Masters. Whereupon It was unanimously agreed to send for Andiapa, who being called in, and asked whether he was willing to provide Cloth for the Company, he seem'd at first very averse to the Proposal; but knowing his great Capacity and Industry, we press'd the same thing again to him, and made use of all the Arguments we cou'd possibly think of to conquer his Shyness, which at length prevail'd with him, and he promised to be an Inhabitant of Cuddalore; But that with regard to the Investment, it being late in the Season, he said he cou'd not take above 2000 Pags. which it is now agreed be advanc'd him: If an opportunity offers of employing more he engages his most faithful Services to the Company.

Having with some difficulty got the Sloop Carolina into Water sufficient to float her, and the Place she now is in indifferently convenient to careen her, though none fit to haul her ashore upon, we propose first to get her upper Works caulk'd, to fit her for heaving down, in order to give her the best repair we can; What she needs as to her Bottom we shall be able to acquaint Your Worship &ca. with as soon as we can get a fair View of it.

The place she now is in we think the most convenient Birth we can find for her to fit her, and then if the Bar break out in the old Place where usual she'll be in readiness to get out by the first deepening of the Bar and if the Bar continues in the place it now is, then our best Endeavours must be, if any Sands shou'd be thrown up between her and it, to float her over them, by the assistance of two Pars, one on each side of her. As to the Charges we can't make a just Estimate of that till we see her Bottom. In the mean time this is the needfull Report at present to offer to Your Worship's &ca. Consideration by

Genl. Letter from the Honble. President and Council of the 12th instant directing us to enquire whether Porto Novo River will receive Sloop Carolina, and ordering us for the future never to send any bales up between the 20th September and 20th December without particular Orders. They acknowledge the receipt of the 3353 bad Pagodas we sent them, and testify again their dislike of the Merchants Proposals for Star Pagodas, and expect further that they shou'd not raise the price of their Cloth till their whole ballance of the late Current Pagodas are out. They then proceed to consider the State of the Coin, and next tell us they allow us to advance Star Pagodas for Salem, but remark that at 41½ Per Corge the Cloth is 3¾ Per Ct. dearer than we advis'd them the 24th Octr. last year and order us to enquire into the value of the different Sorts of money at Salem. We are order'd also not to make use of the Company's Stationary Ware in our private Business, and Mr. Graham is appointed third and Mr. Holt, youngest of Council here. They conclude with directing us to send some persons to fathom the depth of Porto Novo River Bar.

The Brokers were then sent in for and acquainted with what the President and Council said in regard to their ballances of the late Current Pags., to which they replied that they thought it very just that they shou'd pay them in the same sort of Pagodas they receiv'd, but they cou'd not allow them to be of more than 80 Touch, because they objected against their being so much at the time they receiv'd them, and the Order we publish'd here the 19th May last confirm'd what they said. They added, That with respect to not rising upon the price of the Cloth till their ballances were out, they thought it extremely hard to insist upon, after they had us'd their utmost Endeavours to clear the Company's Cash of all the bad Pagodas. By the same rule they said, if 100,000 Pagodas had been advanc'd them one day to employ for the Company to the best advantage, and they had sunk their value the next day, they must have been obliged to pay the same back again in Pagodas of more than 80 Touch, or in Cloth at the same rate they brought in before the Coin sunk in it's value, notwithstanding they receiv'd Pags. of 70 and 75 Touch. They begg'd we wou'd state their case in private Business: For continued they, If any Correspondent shou'd send to his Factor a parcel of bad Pagodas passing them much above their value, and before this Factor shou'd be able to provide all the Goods demanded they shou'd sink, Cou'd it be expected that he shou'd purchase the remainder at the same rate. Many other things they mention'd in their defence, but we told them we shou'd not decide upon their Cause one way or the other, but only convey their Arguments to the Govr. and Council. They replied that they wou'd not pretend to carry on the Investment upon such terms; That they were only Brokers, and as such obliged only to give us the cloth as cheap as it costs them to get it upon the cheapest terms possible, and receive their Commission for their trouble, which their Losses often run away with: and if we cou'd prove that they did not act up strictly to their trust, they wou'd very willingly submit to any Penalties whatever. The Board then acquainted them and Andiapa of the badness of the Cloth they had brought in for the Allumpara Money @ 44 Ps. Per Corge, which they confess'd was true, but added that if we wou'd screw them to a price, they cou'd only get the best for that price, but that if we wou'd tell them to get good Cloth of 9 Cauls they wou'd endeavour to get it as cheap as possible, which they believ'd might amount to 49 Allumpara Ps. Per Corge. We replied that the Govr. and Council wou'd think it very dear at 44 Ps. Per Corge, and that therefore they must wait for their directions. They then acquainted

us that with respect to the Salem Cloth it was very difficult to judge how it wou'd turn out, while Nanjan Chitty reign'd with so absolute a Power there, which made it very difficult to manage him: One instance of which is in exchanging the Star Pagodas, which he obliges them to exchange with him at 23½ fanams Per Pagoda when the Townsmen are allowed at the same time to exchange it in the Buzzaar @ 25 or 26 fanams. This they said was so publickly known that all the World knew it. The Brokers said much more correspondent to what we learn'd from other hands upon this Subject in proof of what they alledged, which it is agreed be made a part of a General Letter to Madrass. The Merchants then withdrew.

The Board then took into Consideration the State of the Investment, and compared the present prices of the Cloth with what sent home these three or four years past, and after examining into every thing that might affect our Honble. Masters Interest this way, a General Letter was ordered to be drawn out agreeably to the tenour of their discourse.

THAT the Governour make his constant Residence at the Fort, or the Garden House, that he may have the Military more immediately under his Eye, and that he may be the better able to judge of the Conduct and Capacity of the Officers and Soldiers it not being intended by this to restrain him from being absent in the Customary Visits or Tours into the Country for Health or diversion.
2. THAT the Cheif Officer of each Company be named, appointed and receive his Commission sign'd by the Governour and Council, but that all Officers of what Rank soever under him be named and appointed by the Govr. only.
3. THAT no Officer of what Rank so ever below the Cheif Officer of each Company be broke or degraded but by the Governour only, and that no Cheif Officer be broke or degraded but by the Governour and Council.
4. THAT no other Man shall be discharged from the Military before his [sic] out, but by order of the Governour and Council and that those who have serv'd their full time be discharged unless they contract for a further time.
5. THAT the Captains or other Officers of the Companies, or any other person for them shall not on pain of being dismiss'd the Service, receive or demand any Present Fee or Reward from any person whatsoever on the Promotion of any Man in his or their Company.
6. THAT the Captains or other Officers shall not excuse one another from doing their duty or excuse the private Men from doing theirs without first acquainting the Governour or in his absence the next in Council therewith, and having his Consent thereto, in which case another Man of equal Rank who is not otherwise to be on duty at that time shall with his own Consent be appointed in his room, and be paid for such Service according to his Rank by the Person excus'd, but if any Present be made on that occasion to any one else the Person receiving it to be dismiss'd the Service.
7. THAT no Man among the Military be allowed to keep a Publick House for the retailing Strong Liquors or to retail them in any manner whatsoever. But if the Governour and Council think fit to permit any Military Man on his Request to keep a Publick House or to get his Living by his trade or profession they shall discharge such Person from the Military on condition that he remain on the place till his time is expir'd, and that he be ready to take up Arms when order'd by the Governour to assist in the defence of the place, or to go on any Expedition, during which time He shall be allowed Pay but not otherwise.
8. THAT no Military Man put under an Arrest or confinement, and continued so above Six hours shall be discharg'd but by the Governour's Order, and any Officer detaining a Person under an Arrest or Confinement more than Six hours without making a Report of it in writing to the Governour or in his absence to the next in Council present shall be broke, unless such Person be taken into Arrest or confin'd in the Night time, in which Case Report thereof shall be made as above early in the Morning.
9. THE Governour at releiving the Guard shall have a report made him immediately in writing by the Officer of the Guard releiv'd of all Occurrences that pass'd during his Guard.
10. THE Governour shall appoint from among the Officers an experienced and capable Person to act as his Adjutant, whose Business it shall be to take notice of all Irregularities and accidents that may happen among the Military, whether at the Barracks or other Quarters, or in or about the Town or other places. He shall visit the Hospital once a day, or oftner,

and shall be watchfull that no abuses happen there or among the Companys. He shall from time to time when order'd by the Governour visit the Out Posts, and shall receive all Complaints the Soldiers may have to make against their Officers, or that the Officers may have against the Soldiers or against one another, of all which he shall every morning make a report in writing to the Governour. As also of all Detachments sent abroad or return'd specifying the names of the Officers and Soldiers; likewise the Names of the Sick Men in the Hospital, Barracks or other Quarters, and the Governour shall give what Commands he has for the Military by himself, or the Adjutant, who shall receive 15 Pagodas Per Month, and have no other Employment during the time of his being Adjutant.

11. THAT the Governour or Second shall make a General Review and Muster of the Military, and see them exercis'd once a month or oftner.
12. THE MUSTER ROLLS of each Company shall be sign'd by the Captains and certified by the Governour or Second, which ever of them shall have made the Review according to the foregoing, and then they shall be laid before the Council for their Approbation before Payment.
13. THE GOVERNOUR shall appoint one of the Company's Servants to be Military Paymaster, who shall pay to every Man his own pay in person, without suffering any Money to be stopp'd at the Pay Table, on any Pretence whatsoever without an order of Council except for Diet money, Mountings and Apparel bought at Outcry, and for these no more than what may become due from Pay Day to Pay day, and that Publick Notice be given thereof.
14. THE Paymaster shall take Care on the Death of any of the Military to secure his Effects in order to pay his Funeral Charges and his Debts there, and if there be any Overplus he shall pay it into the Company's Cash, except in Cases where the Deceased hath an Heir at Law on the place, or hath by Will appointed an Executor.
15. THE Adjutant shall give immediate Notice to the Paymaster of the inlisting or discharging any soldier and of their promoting or degrading any one in the Military, as also of their death or desertion that their account of Pay may be settled accordingly and the Paymaster shall send home in the Company's Packet yearly Duplicates of his Monthly Accounts.
16. THAT a Seperate List be sent home yearly in the Company's Packet of the Military sent from hence, who have been landed at Fort St. George, and of all others that are enlisted there specifying the times of their Arrival or entering into the Service, and when discharged, died or deserted.
17. THE GOVERNOUR shall take Care that the Captains do justice to the Soldiers in their cloathing that they be new cloath'd once in two years with English Cloth bought out of the Company's Warehouse, and that they nor the Subaltern Officers do not oppress them, and that the Soldiers be kept to a strict Discipline and Subordination. But that upon inflicting Punishment on any European Soldier it be done by Europeans only.

EAST INDIA HOUSE.
THE 2D. APRIL 1740.

EXTRACT of a Consultation held at FORT ST. GEORGE the 1st of June 1741.

Then were read the Regulations made by our Honble. Masters for the Military under this Presidency receiv'd by the Caesar, the consideration of which was then postpon'd upon account of the troubles in the Country, but were now debated and considered Article by Article.

As to the first regulation, directing the Governour to reside at the Fort or Garden House that is known to be strictly complied with, and whoever is Governour here will find he has but little leisure for Tours in the Country.

In compliance with the Second, the Secretary is order'd to draw out Commissions for the three Lieutenants of this Garrison to be sign'd by the Governour and Council next Consultation.

The 3d. 5th. 8th. and 9th. together with the other Regulations are order'd to be copied out and given to the Lieutenants for constant Observation except for [sic] so far as we have taken upon us to make any Alteration.

With regard to the 4th no Military Man is discharged but by order of this Board. To those who will contract for a further time we give a Gratuity of five Pagodas. Others will not contract to serve any certain time, but however remain here some years after their time is out, and we are very glad to continue them in pay, as the Charge of fresh Recruits is for so long saved.

The 6th we suppose alludes to a practice in Europe, but having no more than three Lieutenants here and till last year only two, and so few private Men, neither one or the other can be excus'd from their Duty except in case of Sickness or some other extraordinary occasion, when the Officers mount for one another, but we beleive without any Pay or Present, and if a Private Man wants to go off his Guard for a few hours and has good reason for it, it is very rare that he is refused by his Officer.

The 7th directs that no Military Man be allowed to keep a publick House for retailing Strong Liquors &ca. but it has been observ'd in former times when they were permitted to keep publick Houses and were discharged the Military, many of them were extremely troublesome in the Town, particularly when no Europe Ships were in the Road when they were put to get their Livelyhood, and were guilty of many Irregularities. But as some publick Houses are necessary to entertain the Sailors when the Europe Ships are in the Road, so many of the Military are permitted to keep such houses as are wanted for that purpose during such time, but however are obliged to appear when their Companys are exercis'd, and to return to constant Duty when the Europe Ships are gone by which means they are always kept fit for Service under a due Subordination to their Officers, and liable to be punish'd for any Irregularities which otherwise cou'd not be avoided, and wou'd occasion very great trouble to the Justices. As to such as have been brought up to any particular Trade or Profession in England we beleive if they had not been addicted to Liquor or Laziness they wou'd not have been under a necessity of coming out Soldiers to the Indies; at least the Instances are very rare that any of them have got their Bread here.

The 10th directs the Governour to appoint from among the Officers an experienced and capable person to act as his Adjutant &ca. without determining upon the difficulty of making such Choice especially as such Person is to be allowed only fifteen Pagodas Per Month, and have no other Employment during his being Adjutant. We take Leave to remark that as the highest Officers under the Governour have only Lieutenants Commissions, the appointing an Adjutant wou'd in a manner be appointing a Superiour Officer to them which wou'd at least be a Slight upon Men who have hitherto behaved well in their Stations, and upon whom we must principally depend in case of Action, but we fear also it may otherwise be attended with very ugly Effects, for the temper and disposition of the Military Men, which are sent out being considered, and that a very strict discipline is necessary to keep them in order, we apprehend that if an Adjutant was appointed to hear their Complaints against their Lieutenants it wou'd lessen the dependance of the Men upon their Officers, destroy in a great measure that Subordination which is necessary, and in the end be attended with frequent Mutinies. In fine as the Military are all

station'd so close under our Eyes, if the Officers are guilty of too great Severity or give their Men any just reason of Complaint, we must soon know it, and shall certainly rectify any Abuses. For all which reasons we hope our Honble. Masters will not disapprove our Non-Compliance with their 10th Regulation till their future Orders.

The Officer of the Guard visits the Hospital once a day to see that no abuses happen there; The Surgeons have hitherto reported to the President the number of Men enter'd in and discharged from the Hospital, and how many remain'd there every month, but from henceforth they shall also give a List of their Names.

Our present Method being consider'd we believe it will fully answer all the Ends propos'd by the 11th. 12th. and 13th Regulations. The Duty perform'd in the Garrison a Copy of which is enter'd hereafter, will shew how frequently the Men are exercis'd. The number and Names of the Military are monthly laid before the Council, Muster Rolls are drawn up and sign'd by the Officers and deliver'd to the Paymaster who sees every Man paid; and as the Paymaster is one of the Council we take him to be a more proper Person, and more to be depended on to prevent any abuses at the Pay Table, than an inferiour Servant.

It is recommended to the Paymaster to pay due regard to the 14th. Regulation, and as to the 15th It is our practice here when any Recruits arrive from England to pay them 12 fanams call'd refreshing Money, and they are enter'd upon the Roll in order to receive what pay is due to them from the day of their arrival to the end of the month. If any are discharged or die, it has likewise been the practice hitherto to allow the months pay they are discharged or die in, and if any are promoted or degraded their pay commences from the first of the next month according to their Rank then.

Seperate Lists shall be sent home according to the Directions in the 16th Regulation and the Governour promises his Care to see the 17th complied with except that whereas the Soldiers are directed to be new cloath'd once in two years, they are so constantly upon Duty here that we find it necessary to new cloath them every year.

WORSHIPFULL SIR AND SIRS,

Pursuant to your Orders I have here set down the manner of our Discipline and daily Duty as here practic'd by the Military Officers Subaltern and Soldiers in this Garrison of Fort St. David Anno 1741.

As your Worship &ca. are very well acquainted with the Situation of this place and the many Out-Guards; the great distances they are from the Fort, it cannot be expected they shuo'd be releiv'd every day as in other Garrisons where the Guards are more contracted, which occasions that difference in their Duty, which may appear to those that are unacquainted with the place, that the Officers do not releive one another. And as there is no mounting or dismounting Officer but what are upon constant duty, the usual Ceremony upon the Parade of delivering the Reports or Extraordinary Orders which might have been given out by the Deputy Governour are not practic'd here as in other places, because they are all quarter'd on their several Guards as follow. The Lieutenant and Ensign in the Fort, the other Ensign at the Company's Garden Guard; The Soldiers also on the several Guards excepting that a number of them in proportion to the number of Men quarter'd upon the Guards are allow'd their free Guard in their Turns.

The Cheif Officer in the Fort orders the Troop to beat every morning by Six a Clock to prepare the Men to be ready by seven to mount the Guard, and at Seven to beat to Arms. The Men are drawn up on the Parade; the Roll call'd over in presence of the Ensign to see that every Body is under Arms; The Serjeants and Corporals and Soldiers that are to dismount are drawn up fronting the Main Guard; The dismounting Serjeants and Corporals deliver what Orders they might have receiv'd from their Cheif Officer to the mounting Serjeant and Corporals that takes Charge of the Guard; The Corporal that is to releive the Centries calls out his men, and in company with the dismounting Corporal goes round to releive the Centrys upon the several Bastions and Gates &c. The mounting Corporal is to take Care that the Bastions and other places, where he post his Centrys are kept clean, That no Handspikes Shot or Leaden Aprons are wanting; if any deficient to make his Report to the Cheif-Officer in order to call the dismounting Corporal to an account that he may find out the Centry in whose time it was imbezzled. He is also to see that the Centry that is releiv'd delivers his Orders to the Centry that releives him; while this is doing the Ensign and sometimes the Lieutenant looks over the Mens Arms that they are kept clean and in good Order; their Flints good; their Cartouch Boxes also, and their Number of Cartridges compleat; when the Corporals come back from releiving the Centinels, if nothing extraordinary they place themselves in their proper places, the Free Guard Men are troop'd in and order'd to post their Arms and dismiss'd and the Main Guard in the Corps the [de?] Guard where they place their Arms.

The same Rules are also observ'd at all the several Out Guards by the Commanding Officer or Serjeant &ca. The Roll is call'd every night by nine a Clock in the Fort as it is also at the several Out Guards: If any of the free Guard Men are absent the Cheif Officer is acquainted with it the next morning. The Fort Gates are shut at half an hour after Ten; At the Out-Guards the Bridge is drawn, and the Gate shut by nine a Clock, and none suffer'd to go off the Guard after the Roll is call'd; the Keys of the Fort Gate are carried up to the Deputy Governour if in the Fort; at other times to the Cheif Officer; at five a Clock in the Morning after the Gun is fir'd and the Reveille has done beating the Serjeant comes for the Keys, and the Ensign sees the Men stand to their Arms; their Arms rested while the Gates are open'd.

After the Guards are releiv'd the Reports of all the Out-Guards belonging to the Fort are brought to the Cheif Officer by the Serjeant or one of the Corporals of the Several Out Guards, if any thing extraordinary, the Deputy Governor is acquainted with it.

The Cheif Officer waits on the Deputy Governour every day to make his report and receive his orders at the usual hours or oftner if necessary.

The Cheif Officer visits the Out-Guards every day or every other day if possible.

He also goes the Bounds in the Fort after the Gates are shut to see the Gates are well lock'd and the Centries do their duty. The Ensign in the Fort and the Serjeant also at the proper hours.

The Cheif Officer and Ensign visit the Hospital now and then, but the Orderly Serjeant and Corporal twice every day; one in the morning and the other in the Evening, and make their Report to the Cheif Officer.

If any Disorder committed by the Military or Natives in the Buzzaar or elsewhere the Serjeant or Corporal of the nearest Guard (if a Guard is call'd for) is to take a file of Men and secures the Person or Persons that Committed any Disturbances carries him or them to the Fort where he is kept under Arrest till the next morning, (if they are brought over night) when the Chief Officers examines both Parties if any thing of Consequence, he continues him or them in Arrest if a Soldier; if a Native he sends him or them to the Justices of which he acquaints the Deputy Governour as soon as possible but if both Parties are satisfied, and no Hurt done on either side they are discharged.

The Serjeant of Tevnepatam Gate Guard and Patcharee Point goes the Patrol every night, and if he meets with any disorderly Person in the Streets or any Military Man after nine a Clock he is order'd to secure them upon his Guard till the next morning when he is to report the same to his Chief Officer by whom they are examin'd if Military; if Natives they are carried to the Choultry under the Charge of the Taliars, and the Justices acquainted therewith the next morning.

If any of the Military dies or deserts the Deputy Governour is immediately acquainted with it.

The Company is order'd up to the Fort once or twice a month to be exercis'd, (excepting when there are disturbances near us in the Country, when no Man is suffer'd to be absent at the Out-Guards) by the Ensign or sometimes by the Chief Officer; they are also exercis'd every other day upon their Several Guards by the Serjeant or Corporal, but the Recruits or those that do not handle their Arms well are exercis'd every day and sometimes twice till they know their Exercise.

Every commanding Commission Officer or Subaltern at the Out-Guards has his Orders in writing sign'd by his Cheif Officer; He is to suffer no Armed Men to enter the Honble. Company's Bounds without the Deputy Governour's Permission. If any great numbers of Horse or Foot appear he is to hoist his Flag and fire two Guns for a Signal, but if a small body, only to hoist his Flag and fire one Gun which is answerd from the Northwest Bastion at the Fort and of course he is to keep his Men ready for Defence if attack'd.

I hope that the Discipline and daily Duty as practis'd by the Officers of this Garrison Subaltern and Soldiers as here laid down will be agreeable to Your Worship &ca., but if any thing shou'd be thought deficient, I am ready to submit, to such Alterations as Your Worship &ca. shall think fit to make for the good of the Service.
