Received a Letter from the Chief and Factors of Onore dated the 15th. July in Answer to ours of the 19th. June and 26th. d^o. advising they forwarded the Two Pacquets for Bombay the 9th. of July, and as we wrote them about a Defficiency in the Munchuas Cargo which their Merchants Galvets took last Season they do allow there was Seventy nine Bales Rice detained for defraying the Charges which we might have when we would But desire for the Future the boats from these Ports may have Some distinction that they may know them from the Mallabarr Pyrats who frequently Cruice their way, they last Season took Severall of their boats and Foods to the Vallue of One thousand three hundred Icarree Pagodas & for which they request our assistance for the obtaining Sattisfaction. TUESDAY
1ST.

Dispatcht the Pattamarr for Onore with our Bombay Packet desiring the Chief and Factors there to forward it as soon as possible we Acknowledged the receipt of their Letter of the 15th. of July and desired that the Rice which was detained might be disposed of and the Amount kept by their Chief to be brought to the Credit of Robert Adams Esq^r. who would make it good here. As to the Munchua's Sailing from these parts we would endeavour to oblige their taking Passes, so that what had such they should not offer to Molest or detain. The Mallabarr Pyrats we feared would not give any Sattisfaction without using Force, to do which we had no Power from the Hon^oble President & Councill of Bombay, but if they would obtaine their Orders we would use our endeavours. In the Packett to Bombay we Inclosed the following Pappers and gave the needfull advices Viz^t. Copy of last Letter, the Samorine's Account Curant, the Chief's Ola to D^o. & his answer, Translate of two Letters to & from the French, our Acco^t. Curr^t. wth. SATURDAY
5TH. Received a Letter from Anjengo Dated the 15th. July owning their having our two Letters under the 16th. & 31st. of May with the two Pacquets from The Honorable President & Council of Bombay and Desire our forwarding another for said place now come to hand with all expedition.

MONDAY
7TH. Dispatcht to Onore by a Pattamarr Express the Anjengo Pacquet desiring the Chief &c^a. to forward it with ours sent under the 3^d. Instant but if that should be gone to dispatch it by an Express.

SATURDAY
12TH. Our Prince came to the Fort and informed us that he had Discoursed Slightly with Curringhoda relating to an Accomodation with us, and on his return after the Ona he believed he should be able to bring him Over, He assured us of using his endeavours for The Honorable Company's Interest in every thing to the utmost of his Power and was sorry the frequent Indignitys from Ally Rajah should not only prove hurtfull to himself but even have an Effect on the Honorable Company's Affairs, for as he cannot Support his own Credit undoubtedly his Capacity is less to Serve them, but he hopes he should meet with some Success in his present undertakings especially if we would afford him assistance. We assured him of whatever we could do for him except^d. the engaging in Loans, and gave him his Usual present of Twelve rupees, and to another Prince who came in Company Sixteen rupees at their departure promising us to be here again in a short time.

MONDAY
14TH. This morning our Centinell saw a great Fire at Mihie which lasted from two to five of the Clock, and we are since informed the Houses in the French Fort, were the greatest part destroyed as well as near five hundred Arms, some Gunpowder. Cloth and Necessarys belonging to the Officers amounting in the whole to a Considerable Vallue.

The weather at present Seeming fair, & as we may Speedily expect some Vessells from Bombay to clear our Warehouses of Pepper, the Chief proposes Sending forthwth. to Chatoo Chittie to bring away the four hundred Candys Contracted for, and as his Pepper lyes in his Godowns in good Order, the Question is, if it be best to send people to weigh it there, or let him, as is usual bring it here & then weigh it, but we Considering the uncertainty of the weather & how lyable it will be to be wett, either by Rain or Salt water, do think it most elligible to send bags from hence & there weigh it off, which will be no expence to us more than the use of the baggs, & Coir to bind them, and as it frequently happens that the shipping especially those bound home shoot the Pepper, We agree to buy 1200 bags for three hundred rupees which will serve to send it on board in, and thereby save to our Honorable Masters the Charge of Matts which are dear, and can be used but once, and the Warehousekeeper is directed to take the same under his Care, and to send the Bags and proper persons on Monday the 28th. Instant to weigh and send hither the Pepper from Chatoo Chittie. The Chief demanding of us fanams four hundred Sixty nine & fourteen Vis for five Mango Trees which were brought here Sawed into plank Anno 1725 for the use of the Battery on the Rocks the same was ORDERED to be examined if the Vallue had been at any time Charged, and as it is not, and he having Actually made good said amount to Chatoo Chittie the person that sent them, We do think it reasonable it be repaid him, as well as fanams three hundred thirty Eight & thirteen Vis to the Paymaster for Eight hundred forty seven Covits of Plank used to floor the Bastions

making of Doors windows &c^a. at Putinha which do now remain there; and have not been Charged, the person of whom it was bought not making any Demand untill now, and therefore was forgott. AGREED therefore the aforesaid Sumes be discharged.

The Country about us of late have greatly feared an Extraordinary Scarcity of Rice, and to prevent as much as possible our felling that dreadfull effect here the Chief has for some time past given Strict Orders for not Carrying any Quantity out of our Limits, by which means we have preserved the people about us from Suffering and were encouraged to hope for a Supply from Mangalore would Continue us in the same manner, but last night the Chief had Certain Notice from a person sent thither to provide Rice that we must not expect one Grain, the Country in Generall not affording it, and there is so great a want that Parents sell their Children to obtain support for themselves, and the King has possitively forbid any Rice being Carryed out of any of the Ports of his Country and his orders have been so Strictly observed that notwithstanding Mr. Taylor had embarkt some rice of Mulliky they obliged the people to land it again, and the want is so great at Onore that a Bale sells for twenty fanams, This Mellancholy prospect puts us under a Necessity of providing for this Garrison, and upon Examining throughout the place we cannot find a farther provission than for the next month and even that but barely. We agree therefore as the only remedy to Collect all the Paddy we can from the parts about us, and as 'tis Usuall to lay in some Store of Rice at Anjengo that We write forthwith by boat Express to the Chief and Factors there to Press them imediately to send us all they can possibly spare and on return of the Vessells we can send them part of their Timber which lyes at Callicutt, by the help of which supply We hope to preserve ourselves 'till the new Crop comes in at Mangalore in Decem^r. & January.

The Chief lays before us an Account of Nineteen small Guns which have been used at the Severall Forts for a Considerable time past & Consequently are become by stands. on the works not so fitt for Sale, he therefore desires we will write the Honorable President & Council of Bombay that an equivalent number of new Guns & of like weight be delivered him instead thereof, upon examining the Same We find that in the late Warrs & when the Forts of Moohana &c^a. were raised these were Applied for their defence as well as for this Settlement which was not so well provided formerly as 'tis now, & by the best information Some of us can gett Severall of these Guns have been in use upwards of 15 years, therefore We think it Very reasonable his Demand be Complied with, and do accordingly agree to write to Bombay Concerning it the weight of said nineteen Guns amounts to q^{rs} . 1b. 88 3 1.

The Honorable President & Council of Bombay having been pleased last Season to Send us a Number of Coats & Caps for the Soldiers, We proposed Delivering them out last month to the Officers & from that time to Stop from each man as Usual, but Considering the present Vallue & Scarcity of Rice & how hard it would be with the Topasses in particular, We agree to keep them by us 'till by a more Plenty of Provisions they can be better able to allow of the Stopages for said Apparell.

The Pay Masters Account for Month of August being delivered in, and the Chiefs Account of the Treasury, they were both Examined and past, and the amount of the former directed to be paid off Extract of which and Copy of the Latter are Entered hereafter.

The time being past for the King of Punitures coming as he promised last Season we wrote to our Callicutt Linguist to send two of the Factory Nayrs to put him in mind thereof he assured them 'twas a present Indisposition prevented him, but he would without fail be at Callicutt the 12th. of October and give us the utmost Satisfaction in his power for discharging his debt to our Honorable Masters.

Boyanore sent two persons to talk with us & Consult the most proper means for driving the French out of his Country who, he made Peace with on meere Necessity and as he finds them base and Deceitfull, he would willingly Grasp any Occasion to prejudice them and earnestly desires we would influence Curringhoda to break with them, he is Very thoughtfull of his Debt & intends Very Speedily to discharge the whole in money & Goods, We assured him of our ready Inclination to serve him, & the only way to Encourage our Superiours to engage for him must be by Discharging his Debt.

On the 31st. of last month we came to a Resolution to send an Express boat to Anjengo to desire an imediate Supply of Rice to preserve our Garrison from Famine which is now felt by a great part of the Country in so much that people are dayly at our Gates beging for Support and as we have no Certainty that they are in a Capacity of relieving us from Anjengo we think it proper to try all other means, and although it is Extreame Scarce at Mangalore, yet we have Notice that M^r. Taylor has obtained leave from the King for four thousand bales, and that the French are in a likelihood also of getting some by sending up a present to him. The Chief therefore proposes our dispatching a Munchua this night that will Carry about 1200 bales with proper people to try if possible to procure that Quantity, and at the same time to write M^r. Taylor & c^a. to assist us, provided we cannot otherways gett it, which being agreed to and the Account of the Treasury Examined in Order to take from thence This thousand five Hundred rupees for the above purpose, We find that on discharg^s. the amount of Sallary for the year, there will not be Sufficient left for the defraying the Expences of this month without giving out the Fifths which.

Should we do, our people would greatly feel the want of them, and as there is upwards of three thousand Rupees lying at Callicutt we agree to Transferr hither Two thousand the better to enable our defraying the Charges of this month.

By Ally Rajah's Ship this day Arrived at Cannanore from Juddah we are assured that the Turks there in the month of June last did Barbarously Murther the SupraCargoes &c. of Ship Prince George belonging to Bengall and the Margarett of this place as they were altogether in the House hired for the Service of Ship Prince George the particulars of which are as follows.

MONDAY
11TH.

September the 11th. 1727.— A Relation given by the people of Ally Rajah's Ship who arrived at Cannanore this Evening in forty two days from Juddah leaving it the 30th. of July 1727.

On their arrivall at Juddah the 7th. of Aprill, they found there Ship Margarett belonging to Robert Adams Esq^r. and in Twenty days after Arrived the Prince George from Bengall. The Margarett had done all her business the beginning of June Embarkt such Goods as were not Saleable and all the money

The Ship went a little way out and was in a readiness to Saile M^r. Hill &c. on an invitation from Mess^{rs}. Dalgleish & Frankland went ashore purposing to take his leave of them, at about noon the time of Dining there run a report that two Lascarrs had been Murthered on board the Ships and were found floating. Another such like Accusation had been Spread some days before of our killing the Lascarrs, and on Complaint made to the Governour and Codgee they said they wanted proof to do Justice, and when the aforesaid Lascarrs were carried to the Codgee, the Governour Sent to him to examine strictly how this happened and let him know what ought to be done, the former therefore sent for all the Gentlemen who being at Dinner did not go, and the person told the Codgee they slighted the Message and refused coming to him, of this he gave imediate Notice to the Governour, declaring as his Opinion that Death deserved Death, and Orders were directly given to execute it, which the Turks did in the most Cruell manner on the Gentlemen as they were altogether in the House of Cap^t. Dalgleish to the number of Six or Seven white and two black plundering all they found. Benjamin Adams Concealed himself for about two hours and then run naked into the Street, where a Turk stopt him gave him his own Coat and sent him on board the Ship. The Governour of Juddah after Comitting these Barbaritys and having Secured the Ships with three or four hundred Turks, gave Notice thereof to the principall man at Mecha, who repaired forthwith to the Govern^r. blamed his proceedings, and it appearing that above forty thousand Dollars had been taken from the House, he Ordered full Restitution to be made, an Account taken in the presence of the three Surat Nocquedahs with Ally Rajah's the Governours people and some of the Merchants from the Shore and then delivered everything in full to the persons of each ship Respectively, taking receipts of their having the whole and then withdrew the Turks after being aboard about eight days, but forbid our people to Stirr 'till the Grand Seignieur's pleasure was known to whom he had wrote for Orders the money of each ship was kept on board and the Chests sealed by the Governour's people 'tis said the Prince George had about 180000 Dollars and the Margaret 80000 D^o. exclusive of some Goods not disposed of, the Lascarrs went all away so that the Prince George has not above thirty Men and the Margaret 16 a small time after a Long boat from the latter being observed to sound the Port, the Governour suspecting they might attempt going away, brought all their Sails ashore to prevent them and forbid any boats going to each other, but they might go ashore

and come off as they pleased, Mahmud Ally in his return from the Hodge endeavoured to gett the Ships released, but the Principall man from Mecha assured him he could not answer it, as he had wrote to the Grand Seignior, nor indeed was he Certain (as the Principall men were destroyed) if those remaining had Skill or honesty enough to carry them to their Owners, and if they miscarried the blame would be laid on him for which he might be lyable to Suffer Death.

The above is the best Account we can gett having no Letters from any of the people at Juddah, 'tis probable it may not be exact in every Circumstance but the Tragical part we think cannot be doubted.

Septemb^r. the 15th. 1727. The Serwan of Ally Rajah's Juddah Ship coming here gives the following relation of what hapned to the ships Prince George & Margarett and of the Murthering the Gentlemen belong^s. thereto Viz^t.

That the Barbarity was Comitted on Tuesday the 6th. of June about Noon by the Mob and Seriffs people that were in the Town of Juddah without Orders of any one, for the Codgee having sent for the English, and they refusing to come at his Summons, he was heard to say what shall I do with these people, who kill and do as they please and will not come to me when sent for, upon which they run to the House and told our people they must either turn their Religion or dye, and then begun their Cruelty of which the Bashaw or Governour having Notice came in person to the House, dispersed the Mob, Ordered people on board to take Care of the Ships & published Orders that every thing should be restored, or he would punish those who should detain & Accordingly did Chastize Severall and Intended to have Sent the Ships away, but the Seriff of Mecha came within Eight or Ten days, who has half the Customs of the Port, and advised the Bashaw not to suffer the Ships to Sail 'till they had both wrote the Grand Seignior to know his pleasure, he not having power to Stop and Release at his will without [hazard]ing his head; and 'twas reported the Bashaw intended to write the Governours of Bombay & Bengall of what had hapened, that they might appoint proper people to receive the Ships.

By the Relation given by Ally Rajah's people of his Juddah Ship entered under the 11th. Instant, it appears that Cap^t. Thomas Hill is one of those unhappy persons that were Cruelly Murther'd by the Turks; Therefore the Chief produced his Will and desired we would Certifie under our hands as follows to which we agree Viz^t.

Robert Adams Esq^r. having Summond us the Council of Tellicherry, produced before us the Will & Testament of Thomas Hill Deceased bearing Date Madras the 10th. of June 1724 Signed & Sealed by himself in the Presence of Stephen Worlidge, Samuel Fowler, Francis Ting as witnesses and in which Will Robert Adams Esq^r. is declared sole Executor in the following words.

The Chief and Factors of Anjengo in their Letter to us of the 8th. Instant received yesterday, promise to Supply us with the Rice we desire, provided we will send down one or two Munchuas to Carry it having none there which are in Repairs, the Chief therefore asks our Opinion whether we shall dispatch boats for it directly, or if we think we may be able to gett Supplys from Mangalore &c^a. which being debated and as there appears a probabillity of our Munchuas being Laded wth. we sent under the 8th. Instaut, We agree not to send for any to Anjengo, Since what they have must be old Rice of Bengall which is in no Esteem here and undoubtedly will come out extream dear, even at a greater Rate than we can buy at, but least they should keep it by them in expectation we may want it, we agree to write them by an express Tony to the above Tenour. On the 11th. May we Agreed that Mess^{rs}. Johnson, Law, & Forbes should go to Cannanore to make up an old Account depending with Ally Rajah, but the Setting in of the weather then prevented which now being over, We agree that the aforesaid go on Wednesday the 20th. and that the Chief writes him a proper ola for the above purpose.

Boyanore being sent to on the 14th. Instant to discharge the Hoñoble Company's debt as he promised to do in this month, he has this day Sent one of his people with an Ola to the Chief Signifying the Merchants his Debtors not paying him as he expected, he is unable at present to give us any money, but in Aprill next will not faile of Discharging the whole, which seems to us so trifling and backward, that we agree to write him the following Ola by two of our Nayrs Viz^t.

“ That in May 1726 when he passed the River to proceed to his Country, he promised to make entire payment of his debt and since at severall times he engaged most Certainly to do it in September last which we all Consented to, and now for him to put us off farther till next Aprill is w^t. we cannot agree to. As the Hoñoble Company readily assisted him in the time of his great Necessitys, so he ought now in reason to Comply with our wants, if he regards the Friendship between us, when he Considers this we cannot doubt but he will without delay send his people wth.

The Serjeant in Command at Putinha yesterday advised that a great many Nayrs belonging to Curringhoda were hunting Close under Ponella, he sent our Tibbees to desire them to be gone, but they made no Account of them, and said the Ground was theirs and they would hunt there, they placed two Centrys upon Ponella and came nearer than Usual upon which the Serjeant gott his Men in readiness on the Works afterwards they went away over the Verges. MONDAY 25th.

Received an Ola from Boyanore to the Chief in answer to what he wrote th^o 18th. Instant Viz^t. D^o. DIE

“ I wrote you desiring your Stay some time yet for the money I owe you, to which you Care not to agree as being in great want of it, 'tis Certain I borrowed it in my Necessitys and am sorry I cannot now pay you, as probably in Future I may be again in want, but in January I will discharge the whole without faile, which Pondari and Mamy will assure you of and I hope no Alteration will happen in our Friendship.

The Chief answered the above Ola of Boyanores as follows.

Received by a Pattamarr from Onore a Letter from the Chief and Factors there under the 19th. Septemb^r. Inclosing another from The Hon^{ble} President & Council of Bombay dated the 10th. last month, which Acknowledges that of ours of the 19th. June reached them the 31st. August; "They observe the amount of the Samorines Debt, and the Objections made by his Ministers in not allowing Interest after the Sums are doubled, and as we gave our Opinions that on making up his Accounts by Charging Interest on Such Sums as are become doubled & Stating the others with Interest to a time fixt so as to make one Total to be paid at Severall annuall discharges, that the Samorine will agree to it, they do therefore impower us to Settle it in that manner, so as not to Exceed four Annuall Payments, and they hope he will Convince us of his Sincerity therein by imediately making the first and as we advise them the Ministers must be won over rather than abating a part on his paying the Ballance of his Accounts in a less time than we propose, they are of Opinion it will be most effectuall to present such of them as can be assisting in recovering the Same, and do give us Liberty to do so, not exceeding Ten $\frac{1}{2}$ Cent on the Sums paid at each time, but if the Samorine cannot be brought to them Terms We are Ordered to discharge all Nayrs and Servants in pay at Callicutt and totally withdraw thence giving the Samorine a Remonstrance in Demand of his debt, as also one of the like Nature to the Commonallity, which Consequence may incline them to believe will be attended with our enforcing the Demand, if not Amicably Acceeded to, and untill this be adjusted to Sattisfaction they forbid our repairing the Houses of Callicutt and Tannore which we had before orders Concerning. As to Curringhoda, we may resign the Ground lying without Moylon to him or use any other means we Judge reasonable to come to a reconciliation with him. Ally Rajah's Success against Codala Fort they believe will not be attended with any great hurt to us, Since we can take Sattisfaction a Float for what Injurys he may do us ashore. We are to keep a good Correspondence with him, and not Interfere in the quarrell More than by Supplying our Prince with Such Warlike Stores he may want for his defence on his paying for their Vallue; they Judge it needless to have any Force at Agarr to secure the Pepper Trade, a Banksall will be Sufficient where we must keep no Goods longer than till we can send them to Tellicherry. The reason for our having Orders to purchase so as to have One thousand Candys of Pepper ready was grounded on their expectation of two Ships coming out, but as only one is to come of which we had Notice in May we ought to have proportioned the Provision accordingly and leisurly bought at the Cheapest rates without being under a Necessity of Contracting for four Hundred Candys at the high Price of 17 Venetians. The Payment for which the Order now sent to take three Chests from the Duke of Cumberland will Supply us for that purpose and what is necessary for the Season shall come Speedily by their Cruizers, We must forbear buying any more Pepper 'till we have Orders otherwise, but to be mindfull if Cardamums are good & not unreasonably dear to purchase the Quantity before directed. They will also Supply us with Stores and Medicines as is Judged Necessary from the Indents sent the rates of the latter have been by Computation there for the Hon^{ble} Company Lump the Vallue and it matters not if they have been under or

Received a Letter from our Callicutt Linguist dated the 5th. advising us that he forwarded the Chief's Letters to the Samorine & King of Puniture by our own Nayros the 2^d. Inst^t. He has Laded on the Anjengo Munchua which brought their Rice 122 Planks of 1 Inch and 18 of 2 Inches amounting in all to 140 planks sawed out of the 7 Trees which has lain some time at Callicutt the Charges of Embarking amounts to 8 fanams. He sent us an Account Sale of the Rice brought by said Munchua as follows

which Sum Muta Chettim the person Sent in the Munchua is Collecting who was present at the Sale & paid all the Charges himself.

Yesterday in the Evening received a Letter from the Honorable President & Council of Bombay dated the 1st. Instant forwarded to us from Callicutt by the Linguist which acknowledges their having ours of the 3^d. August the 20th. Novemb^r. and that of the 11th. D^o. the 29th. By that we advised under the 15th. March they Judged we had Accomodated with Curringhoda and thereby reduced our Charges and we should not then need the out Posts, but since We have not, and urging the Necessity of keeping them, they will acquiesse in such points as are reasonable, but in the whole expect We will do our Duty in every thing which regards the Companys Interest. They observe our Generall plea in not Complying with the Directions in reducing the pay on pretence should we do it, the people will not Serve which seems Very Extraordinary to them, and the more so, that they Should insist on greater pay with us, than what they are assured is given them any where else. Keeping Garrisons clean is generally provided for without an extraordinary expence and 'tis unusuall to allow for Carrying Provisions to those who do Duty at the out places, the Topasses at Bombay provide for it themselves and for bringing Water, and therefore we must gett rid of those who will not be Subject to such reasonable discipline as We are able to Supply ourselves with others that will, for there cannot be a want of Christians along the Mallabar Coast many of which not having rice to Eat. They admitt of the Pay to the Topasses who have distinguished themselves and are attacht to the Service the other also must be allowed the extraordinary pay, till the extirpation of the time they agreed to Serve for, Then others are to be entertained in Lieu of them as they can be gott, at the pay they have stated. All European Centinells Subjects of Great Brittain are to have no more than 41 fanams ¶ Month, if they are not Contented with it, we must not discharge them, but Send them up, all other Foreigners unwill^s. to serve at that rate We are to discharge when we can be otherwise supplied or do without them, and in Generall discharge Such as we have Opportunity to gett others on easier Terms unless they have Meritted. They make some distinction in Portugueze and others, and the former are well pleased to Serve at Six rupees ¶ Month with them. They forbid the entertaining for a Constancy, any Invalids or Pentioners of any kind; if any suffer in the Service by Loss of Life or Limb We are to allow of Smart money so farr as one Hundred fan^s. to the Widdow of any man Killed in the Service and 40 fanams for the Loss of a Limb. The three Boys born in the place & training up for Soldiers, when they are Capable of Service May be paid and not before, therefore they are to be struck of. The Expence of Putinha and Tirimalla must cease whenever we Accomodate with Curringhoda and as they expected we had done so, they did not provide for their maintenance in their Calculate.

It is Prince Cunhi Ommo's business to protect his own Territorys and our Trade therein as we pay him Customs, and altho the Scituation of Tellicherry so ill answers the purpose of Fortifying it was never meant we should thereby engage ourselves by taking part with any of the Country Govements in the Quarrells among themselves, as to Ally Rajah in regard to his disputes with our Prince We may Supply

the latter with what he may require for defending himself and recovering from the other at his own expence—and M^r. Adams has Liberty to Accomodate between them letting Ally Rajah know if The Hon^{ble}. Company suffer from him in these troubles we shall take Satisfaction on his Trade at Sea The Supplys the French brag off, they believe will not answer their expectations, and they have reason to think th^o their expence be not so Considerable as what made by our Honoble Masters for Seven years past, they are as little inclinable to Continue it; they are fully sensible our Honoble Masters are weary thereof from the Discretionall power they have given to quit the Settlement, provided it cannot be maintain'd at such a reasonable expence as the Trade will bear. They have heard M^r. Adams should say if the Company was inclinable to sell the Fort of Moylan, he could dispose of it for as much or more than it Cost them, could the same be done and the like for Tellicherry Fort after drawing off the Artillery or even at a much Less Vallue it would be Inviting to part with them, in case they are not to be brought nearer to an Equivoilent for the Charge of Maintaining them. We have had such discretionall orders as they think necessary for adjusting with the Samorine and even Compounding for that Large debt which they hope will enable M^r. Adame to bring the same to a Speedy Issue. They will by the first Secure Conveyance send us twelve thousand rupees in fifts as we desire. The Enclosed Letter from the President to the French Generall at Ponticherry We must recommend to the Gentlemen of Mihie to forward thither. The Fame and Bomb Ketch may carry us to the Samorine and protect us from the Dutch while the Victoria Stays at Anjengo, or to imploy them in any other manner We may think proper to Countenance our affairs, but they expect them to be dispatcht by the time Limited. They do not rightly apprehend how the Debts due from Ally Rajah's family came to be struck off the Books, since the Chief and the Linguist are sattisfied in the Justness of them, and as there seems not room for their being disputed, they direct We insist on the payment thereof. They direct our press^s. the payment of the King of Puniture's debt, and to Accept of Boyanores Pepper on the best Terms we can hoping it will come under 17 Venetians p Candy. The President on Notice of the Massacre at Juddah took the first opportunity to write the Ambassador at Constantinople desiring his good Offices in that Affair; and he will also write the Bashaw in Demand of the Ships and effects by the Moorships bound thither this Season which is the only step can yet be taken. On the present Scarcity of Grain they permitt our delivering out the rice from Mangallore so as the Honoble Company are no sufferers, Our expences in Entertaining the French Chief &c^s. would be more acceptable if less, and the Article of Gunpowder seems Very extravagant which they take Notice of not to have Such expencive Vissits brought into Custom.

They wonder the Chief should so long delay advising of the 19 Guns lent the Honoble Company, but if they have had the Quantity from him, they think it reasonable he be paid and they will deliver of the like Nature to his Order if they have them. The Hoⁿorable President and Councill of Bombay giving us Sundry Directions in their Letter of the 1st. Instant received the 11th. the Chief Summons this Meeting to Consider thereof. 'Twas the Expectation they had of our Accomodating with Curringhoda which induced them to make no allowance for Severall Articles of Expencc Contained in the Calculate sent us and they do Direct us to settle with him on a lasting footing as soon as possible. We are truly Sensible the Chief has used his utmost endeavour to Effect this but the French afford him such helps, as renders him deaf to any reasonable propositions so that we are under a Necessity of Continuing as we are 'till a favourable Conjuncture offers. They are assured the Allowance to the Soldiery from the Hoⁿorable Company exceeds what is given by any others, and therefore wonder we should say the people will not Serve, if regulated in the manner prescribed the French being very adjacent and entertaining all our Deserters, We

are to Consider what they give in order to make a Judgement why our Men forsake us, as they are Continually doing, and then examining Severall that have run from their Service, We are possitively told their Soldiery are paid as follows.

By which it is Very Evident that all their Men excepting the Europeans have greater pay than is or has been given by us which is a Sufficient reason for their forsaking our Service when they are certain of being entertained by them.

They will not allow any expence for Sweeping the Forts carrying provissions nor more than 41 fanams p month to any Subject of Great Britain which are to be sent up, if unwilling to Serve at that, and other Europeans must be reduced to it or struck off, if we can gett others in Lieu or be without them. No invalids or Pentioners of any kind are to be paid for a Constancy, and in Case of any one Suffering by loss of life the Widdow is to have one Hundred fanams, and Forty for the loss of a Limb. The three boys trained for Soldiers are not to be paid, 'till they are fitt for Service, nor no Topass to be kept at the present pay longer than 'till we can gett others. All these things fall under our Consideration, and debating largely thereon, It is really our unanimous resolutions, that as the sweeping the Forts are absolutely necessary we cannot strike it off without being Nauseated which surely the Hon^{ble} President & Council do not require. The carrying provissions to Mooharra is directed to Cease and the Charge to fall on the Gunners since the Soldiers in Generall allow for it themselves all the Europeans exclusive of the English are under an agreem^t. to Serve us a number of years at 44 fanams p month, and should We Violate that they would forthwith forsake us, and We thereby become extreamly weakened so that it cannot be done with safety, while they have such encouragement from the French. and as our number is so small We cannot spare the English at present, nor can We abate any part of their pay without puting them on a worse footing with others, which will reasonably give them a great discontent and Certainly induce them to leave us, as Severall already have done without any Motive, so that we must write The Hon^{ble}. President and Council accordingly. Our present number of Invalids and Pentioners are Very few being only two of the former at 24 fanams p month and three of the latter at Ten each amounting in all to 54 fanams p month. The Invalids are by a Long Service become old & decayed not in any Capacity to provide for themselves, and the others are the Widdows of Soldiers that bravely lost their Lives in the Service for the defence of the Settlement, and it would be Cruell to take so Small a support from them especially as they have no means of living otherwise, and indeed should such a President be given, we are Very Certain the whole Soldiery Would be disheartned and on every Occasion of troubles desert us, when we most stand in need of them, or what is as bad, turn their backs on the Enemy, by which the Natives would become bold and daring and we unable to withstand their Numbers, our own Experience is a sufficient Witness of the readiness of a Mallabarr Enemy to Grasp at any Advantages, and really when they see any such it puts them in mind of giving disturbance, when otherwise they would not have entertained any thoughts towards it, and as so many Petty Powers lye round us ready to Injure us, requires the greater regard in us for the main Security, therefore We shall give these reasons as before.

The three boys born in the place are now in a Capacity to bear arms and therefore entituled to the pay allowed them. The Topasses at the advanced pay have meritted it by their bravery and a Constant good Behaviour and the same

reason holds for Continuing it as was for the first bestowing it on them being a reward for the Services done, the other at 22 fanams cannot be reduced, the Consequence of such a proceeding would assuredly induce them to leave us without our being able to List others, and even as it is good Cochin Topasses are unwilling to serve at this pay, the French entertain all that come & by their giving greater encouragm^t. We have lately lost upwards of Sixteen, Was we to gett Mallabarr Christians as the Hoñoble President and Council recommend a long time would be spent in teaching them the use of their Arms, and as they are descended from the Lowest sort of the Natives and Slaves to the Nayrs tis not to be expected they will ever behave themselves bravely on any Occasion, and how then can we with a small & feeble Garrison defend the Settlement in Opposition to so many thousands as there is of the Natives. In regard to Putinha & Tirimalla the former must be provided for while the French hold a footing so near us & Curringhoda does not Accomodate, as to the Latter We shall endeavour if Possible to throw the whole Charge on the Prince when he comes to us, which will be as soon as his affairs will permitt. He seems at present resolved on humbling Ally Rajah. If either should desire an Accomodation the Chief will Mediate it in the best manner he can for the benefit of the Hoñoble Company. As to the Samorines affair We did in a foregoing Consultation resolve on going down with the Fame & Bomb Ketch to Vissit him, but as he declined it we could do nothing more than writing him at large as may be seen by the Translate of the Ola under the 29th. of Novemb^r. to which as yet no answer is come, and therefore we are disabled at present from taking farther steps.

The Chief & Linguist are Very Certain the former Ally Rajah acknowledged they were indebted to the Hoñoble Company but did not mention the Sume, As he is at present Closely engaged with the Prince, We cannot conclude with him or argue farther, so we must waite 'till things are quieted, the Debts of that Family were not t'ought desperate but wrote off the Books because there was no particular Account of them & no one here knew how they were transacted which therefore caused the Chief &c^a. to write for the Accounts from Bombay on coming of which a proper Occasion was waited for to make the Demand Chusing to decline disputing while we were here in troubles and he in a Capacity to inflame them to our prejudice, these Debts for the reasons aforesaid being brought from Book to Book as well as many others, the Accountant Laurence Parker Esq^r. in his Letter under the 29th. December 1718 reced the 23^d. Aprill 1719 ordered to avoid swelling the Books to write them all off, keeping a List apart to have them in Memory in Case any of them might be recovered which sufficiently warrants the writing them off. Boyanore has given no rply to our offers of 17 Venetians & Candy for the Pepper, and as the time for his Paying was agreed by us to be in January We must waite 'till then to renew our Demand, The King of Puniture has been wrote to, and he as may be seen by his answer waites the Seeing of the Chief, Copy of what was wrote we shall send to Bombay, and Use all Possible means for recovering his Debt.

The Rice procured here for the Soldiers is given them out as it Cost and the Paymaster will take Care no Loss arrives therefrom to the Hoñoble Company.

The first Vissit of the French &c^a. being a point of Ceremony We were obliged to fire the Gunpowder We did in Salutes, but as that is Over when they come hereafter less Notice will be taken. M^r. William Jeynson According to order is admitted into Council.

President and Council of Bombay, but through Severall delays of him the Samorine We could not possibly embrace the Occasion of going by the Fame &c^a. now as he offers as may be Observed by his Ola under the 15th. to meet him at Penany and pay off all that he can of his Debt in February the Chief proposes writing him forthwith, that he may fix on a time Certain of his being there, that he may go down which he is resolved to do on the Previous Notice given—this being agreed to, the Chief wrote an Ola Accordingly which follows this Consultation, as also another to the King of Puniture.

The three Chests of Treasure taken out of the Duke of Cumberland being examined We find each Contains 3896 nett Dollars in all amounting to 11688 and we have two Interest Bonds to discharge to the Chief one of 3000 Rupees taken up the 30th. September and one for 4000 rupees from the 1st. of November for payment of which sums he offers to take Dollars at 10½ fanams each, as they will not yield any thing more, upon which the question was put whether to pay them at that rate, or endeavour to Exchange them in hopes of obtaining something more for them, or to pay away part or all the rupees now by us Amounting to about 5100, upon Examining the first we find there is no probability of getting more for the Dollars at Callicutt than nine & a half fanams and 4½ fan^a. the rupee which exactly answers the rate offered by the Chief, and if we should pay away our rupees we shall be in want of them for the defraying our Charges especially for the Military, AGREED therefore we pay the Amount of the Bonds in Dollars with the Interest arising to the last of this month, which the Chief Demands urging that he has borrowed this money of severall people in the Country who will not be Satisfied otherwise and as he raised it on his Credit purely for the Companys Service he cannot Consent to Loose thereby, the Bonds were Accordingly delivered up & Cancelled and the amount paid as follows.

The Present Demand of the Chief and Factors at Anjengo for Soldiers and rice We are to Consider of and after taking a Survey of the Men we have in Garrison and the number of places we have to defend with them, We find it is not in our power to spare them any, but as there are Several Straglers to be Listed here and at the adjacent places We agree to detain the Munchua two or three days to gett as many as we can to send by her, and to Embark as much good rice, as she can Conveniently take in which is not to be procured under Eleven fanams the Mangalore Bale, and to send a number of Coffie plants in Chests.

The Hoñoble President and Council of Bombay having been wrote to, in regard to Ally Rajah's Debt, they are pleased to direct that We recover it of him, since the Chief and Linguist can be Witnesses it was formerly acknowledged and as Ally Rajah seems resolved to go speedily to Mecca and our Chief to leave this place in April, We are to use our utmost endeavours before they go to bring this to a Conclusion and in order thereto agree to write him an Ola which follows this Consultation.

“ I have wrote you Several times and sent to you the Gentlemen of Council
 “ here with the Linguist, to adjust with you the debt Contracted by your Ancestors
 “ with the Honoble Company, of which you have taken no farther notice, then that
 “ you would come to Durmapatam & you, and We to settle this affair there, but you
 “ have not yet Complied with that promise. There is now a Currant report you
 “ intend to Vissit Mecca, and therefore I am to press you will before you go Settle
 “ the Accounts and pay the Debt, and so prevent the prejudice which otherwise may
 “ attend it, and in Order to it, I expect you will come, or send your people to pay
 “ the Debt.

Sailed the Balls Galley for Bombay by whom we wrote the Hoñoble President & Council advising the apprehensions they are in of Warrs at Anjengo, and that they have desired our sending them Men and rice, which we should Comply with to the best of our Power, We also informed them of our having wrote to Ally Rajah for the Debt of our Hoñoble Masters & sent Copy of our last under the 15th. “ I have received yours Concerning an Old Account which you sent the Gentle-
“ men of your Councill & Linguist about a small time Since, and then I shewed them
“ a paper of discharge which was to their Sattisfaction. These Accounts are of near
“ Fifty or Sixty years standing and never spoke of to my Ancestors, I my self have
“ had Severall dealings wth. you, and yet this never was mentioned, I can impute the
“ Present to nothing but my ill fortune, I have turned over all my old Accounts
“ already but can find no explanation of it, and for me to examine farther is not now
“ possible in so short a time. Whatever has happened with the King of Cherrica
“ you are perfectly apprized of, I hope you will Consider the Interest of my family
“ and bring the troubles to a Conclusion having us at heart as if it was your own
“ Cause, I am also to beg your Kindness to my Country and family in Generall
“ which every one knows you have a good will to, and for the Continuane of it
“ I hope and desire.

Yesterday the French Chief Mons^r. Tremisott Engeneer Mons^r. Dedier and
Mons^r. Louet one of their Councill came from Mihie and brought a Letter from the
Supra Vizor to the Chief here, Translate whereof is Entered hereafter, They made
three propositions in order to Settle on means for the Mutuall Tranquillity of each
other Viz^t.

1st. That We agree on the Price of Pepper now to be given, that the Merchants of
the Country may not make their usuall advantage of Pretending one gives more than
the other, and thereby Continue keeping up the Price, which they Judged was our
Interest as well as theirs to Lower.

2^d. That We agree to deliver up Deserters According to the manner Used with
Madras and Pondicherry & so prevent that Continuall evill.

3^d. That as it is Necessary we should preserve a good Understanding with each
other to avoid giving the Natives an Occasion of Tampering with both, they pro-
posed that Curringhoda should stand Neuter; and We to grant him such of the
Lands kept from him, which we make no use of or advantage, and then the Necessity
of keeping so many out Posts would Cease, Since they on their part would promise
to give him, nor no one of the Country the least Advise or Assistance in any wise
against us but as the Hill bordering on Mihie river & Looks into their Fort is
Necessary for their Security they must keep that in the manner it is without meaning
it shall be of any prejudice to our Free & open Communication with Curringhoda's
Country which we may enjoy fully.

We shewed the utmost readiness to Concord with them in every thing tending
to preserve Peace and Future quiet, as to the Pepper We told them that Fifteen
Venetians Φ Candy was as much as could be at present given, and more We should
not Offer, unless it should happen that it may not be procured at that price, in Such
Case We promised Mutually to advise each other, before more was offered. In
regard to Deserters We Acknowledged the Usefullness & advantage it would be of,
and we would readily enter into any agreement Accordingly, but it was likewise
proper to Settle on the other part relating to Curringhoda whose Country has been
made over to our Honorable Masters in Articles Signed by his uncle Anno 1719 which
does mean and imply that no Europe Nation shall Traffick or frequent his Country
the Sole Right and priveledge of doing which being Vested in us, and is so under-
stood by our Superiors who we believe will not permitt us to give it up, and We could
not think if we were hearty and sincere to each other that said Curringhoda or any
one else could use the Hill to their disadvantage provided it was Vacated. They
insisted strongly on the Necessity of their keeping it, and as We could not at present
Accord in it they proposed Very Speedily to have another Conference to try if
Possible to Accomodate in the severall particulars which we Accordingly agreed to,
and they went away this Morning the Chief answering the Supra Vizors Letter which
is Entered hereafter.

Yesterday was favoured with your Esteemed Letter of the same date by Mess^{rs}. Tremisot, Dedier and Louet wth. the Sattisfaction due, and nothing could have been more to my desire had I been Hon^d. with your presence, but as our Masters Affairs are of that Nature, that will not always allow us to have the pleasure We propose in the enjoyment of each others Company, We must Submit and what We cannot do personally must make up with writing.

The above Gentlemen proposed three things Commerces Fugitives, and the Lands of Curringhoda, to the two first believe there will be no great difficulty to agree in, but the third find they are not Sufficiently impowered to give us that ease, which in Justice and right appertains to our Hon^{ble} Masters, by Ancient agreement and Compact made with the Late Curringhoda and Signed by him in the Presence of his King & the present Curringhodas father & severall others.

Sir you may be assured that what is for the Mutuall benefit of both our Masters, and their Servants in these parts shall readily be Embraced & Cherrished by us, and if it be as I understand you are, of our Sentiments a Hill or a Small Force on this side the river Mihie, I hope will be no obstacle to our Tranquillity & frequent Conversation, Do not question but after the Gentlemen have reported what We Conversed of here, and you have perused this, but you will readily Concord with us, that We ought not to give up our Hon^{ble} Masters just rights and pretensions to Cunhi Nayrs Country at least that nothing should be in it, that may Cause us any Jealousy or obstruct our free passage in his Country, for so soon as we can agree, and settle as behoves us all apprehensions of what Cunhi Nayro, Nombiers, or any other can do to Mollest or interrupt our Harmony and good Correspondence, will Cease and We shall thereby be enabled to Ease our Masters Expences & Charges and live in greater Security, for so Soon as the Country people see us Unanimous and a free Conversation Settled between us, they will not dare to raise Idle surmices to their own advantage and our Cost.

What wrote above hope will meet with your favourable Constructions, and if you have any thing more to propose We shall readily hear it and in all things that are agreeable to our Hon^{ble}. Masters Interest and our ease shall willingly Consent to,

"I have repeatedly wrote you to discharge what you are Indebted to the Honorable Company and your last answer was that you would do it this Month which is now near expired, and no one as yet appears from you with the Money, which therefore Causes my Sending you this to desire you will in all haste pay of your Account and thereby preserve your Friendship with the Honorable Company.

Yesterday the Chief &c. went to Mihie to return the Vissit made here the 18th. Decemb^r. by Mons^r. Delorme the French Supra Vizer where 'twas agreed that on Monday next being the 29th. Instant a Conference should be held at Moylan in Order to Accomodate the Affairs of our two Companys in these parts, the Chief was Civilly entertained and was Hon^d. with two Salutes. SATURDAY
27TH.

Yesterday Imported the Whynot Ketch Bagnoll Wallis Cap^t. and Samuell Lutton Supra Cargo from Bengall. MONDAY
29TH.

Agreeable to what was settled at Mihie on Friday the 26th. by the Chief &c. yesterday morning the French Supra Vizer & M^r. Dedier their Engineer mett Robert Adams Esq^r. Stephen Law, William Forbes & Hugh Howard at Moylan and after the Complem^t. Salute past We satt down in order to proceed on settling the main difference about Curringhoda's Country, but as there was but two persons deputed from the French Mess^{rs}. Forbes & Howard withdrew and then they produced their power given by the Councill of Puddicherry to Accomodate and agree with us for the Mutuall Benefitt of our Companys asking if we had also a power, or if we were informed of what Governour Phipps wrote to Ponticherry, We told them We knew the Substance but had no Copys. They desired to decline meddling with the old Contest about our Rights and pretentions in Curringhoda's Country, in which they were inclined to hold no more places then that fronting their Fort of Mihie, which Military Pollicy obliges them to keep for their Safety, without designing thereby to give any Mollestation or hinderance to either the Country or us, and they think Considering our present Scituation that our only way to preserve Peace is for us to give up to Curringhoda the Lands unmanured and then we to Engage Mutually to aid & assist each other at all times, should he offer to give disturbance to either party by which they believe there would be no farther Occasion to keep so many out Posts which they were inclined to Vacate excepting the aforesaid fronting Mihie hoping we would do the same, by such as then would be of no use to us; We exprest a sincere readiness to enter into any Measures which may tend to procure tranquillity & Consequently lessen our Expences, as to the land of Curringhoda We offered to go with them to take a Survey of it, in order for our agreeing what we should Grant him, Accordingly in the Evening We Viewed all the Waste ground lying to the S^o. ward of Punella and Putinha and so up to the Eastward inland offering to permitt his Manureing it & employing it to his use, this they thought too little and wanted some more to the N^o. ward, We represented the inconveniency and ill Consequences our giving him any there as it would bring his people to intermext with those under our subjections, and be an Occasion of Continuall Quarrells which would not then be in our power to hinder, they then required our forsaking the Hill Putinha, and they would do so by Carri Cunha which was made imediately on our taking footing there, our doing this they Judged would appease the Apprehensions of Curringhoda & enable him Cheerfully to Cultivate his Ground, which could not be done while our Fort lyes over it, We assured them, if we kept our hold it should be rather to protect his ground at least never to give any Mollestation to it our Fort being intended for TUESDAY

The French having entered into a Conference with us for the Settling on means for the Mutuall benefit and advantage of each Company, and to morrow being the time appointed for another interview which probably may bring things to a Crisis the Chief Summons this meeting to deliberate and resolve on the Terms we Judge We may agree with them and in Order to Form an Idea of the Matter we shall here remark the heads of their Demands Viz^t.

1st. THAT we assign to Curringhoda the Lands lying unmanured and so to have his Country, free to each of us, then we may Vacate the Posts which have been lately made, and thereby ease our Masters of a Considerable Charge that we engage mutually to aid & assist each other provided the said Curringhoda sho'd attempt any thing against us, such a Conjunction they esteem will wholly prevent his injurious designs should he now or hereafter have any to either of us, this agreement is to be of Force in time of Warr should any Commence between our Crowns that they give no Mollestation to us in our Limits nor we to them in theirs, But it is to be remarkt they firmly insist on keeping the Hill Fronting Mihie on this side the river which they say is absolutely Necessary for their Security.

2^d. THAT Deserters of either side be Delivered up on pardon being always granted them.

3^d. THAT we agree mutually on the price to be given for Pepper so as the Merchants may not make the usuall advantage by pretending one gives more than the other & thereby Continually enhancing the price.

These things being of a Serious Nature & which will influence our Tranquillity for the Future, We are to Consider if we are Vested with a Sufficient Authority from our Superiours to Conclude and Signe such an Agreement, on Examination of our Orders being therefore made We find exclusive of Severall directions & instructions at other times given by the Hon^{ble} President & Council of Bombay in their Letter under the 10th. Sept^r. 1727 they say as follows

“ You have already our full orders for accomodating with Curringhoda, & since the Land without Moylan is likely to prove of so little Consequence as you represent it, We Consent that you resign that part to him, or use any other means you Judge reasonable to come to a reconciliation with him.

The above We Unanimously Conceive as a Sufficient Authority & as all our endeavours to Concurr with Curringhoda distinctly have been ineffectual, We Choose to Accept of the French propositions & do after a Serious deliberation resolve in fine to come to a full determination with them if we can on the following Terms.

1st. THAT We will assign to Curringhoda all the land lying between Putinha & Carri Cunha from the S^o.ward and up to the Eastward reserving to ourselves all the Space to the N^o.ward & Eastward of Putinha but the Hill of Punella &c^a. to remain to us as a Barrier to our Limits, We agree to Assist the French against Curringhoda should he offer to disturb them, as they are likewise us in the Same manner, in regard to the Duration of the Agreement as to time of Warr we must waite the order of our Superiours as well as for their Continuance on the Hill on this side the river fronting Mihie, which as it is in Curringhoda's Country We can in no wise give up as being directly our Masters property made to us Anno 1719.

2^d. WE agree to deliver up Deserters reciprocally.

3^d. WE also agree to Settle with them from time to time the Price of Pepper.

When the Severall Affairs come to be discoursed with them 'tis probable some small alterations will be found Necessary which we Impower Robert Adams Esq^r. &c^a. to make as they find Convenient, and as last time Stephen Law, William Forbes, & Hugh Howard went, and but only Robert Adams Esq^r. & Stephen Law satt at the debate We also agree the Same persons go to morrow and only an equall number as the French bring to sitt According to seniority.

Agreeable to what we before resolved the Chief & Stephen Law went yesterday to Moylan and there discoursed with Mons^r. Delorme the French Supravizor and Mons^r. Dedier their Engineer; they brought with them Severall heads which were to be adjusted between us for our Accomodation translate of which from the Portuguese is entered hereafter, the debate was reasumed for their leaving this side of the river and the Articles with us and Curringhoda shewn them as a proof of our right, and We also added that the Hon^{ble} President of Bombay had insisted on it in his Letter to the Generall of Ponticherry they denyed that he had wrote so, but as they had a Copy thereof it should be produced at the next interview on Monday the 5th. Ins^t. after many Arguments used they persisted firmly in their resolution of holding the Hill Fronting their fort of Mihie which was Possesst in time of Warr for their Security, & as the like Occasion might happen again it would be unsafe for them to relinquish it and therefore could not be done, We then proceeded to Agree on Curringhoda's Lands, and they Sent for some of his people and their Linguist, as We also did for ours to examine those which they demanded, upon a review thereof we found there was but a Very inconsiderable part which they expected lying inland of Puntinha but that We referred adjusting, till the next Interview on Monday next.

so be a means to Create quarrells & Continually uneasyness, Then as to Curringhoda,
if the agrieved party as we Term it should take his own Satisfaction & redress of
him ; It might happen that a Warm Man at the head of Affairs on either side might
involve these parts in great troubles, and thereby as we are so near give frequent
alarms & disquietude, in fine We agreed to alter the Terms in regard to Curring-
ghoda, and make it as they proposed, that neither of us can seperately Warr with
him, and that there might be a Ratification of the Articles by our Superiours we
both Cencurred, that We draw out the Severall heads, and they to underwrite them
that they are always ready to Sign them, and We to referr them to the approbation
of our Superiours, but 'till their Orders come, We are to observe the Tenor of the
agreement, and they do Accept of assisting in defending Narrangport Nayro, as was
before observed. Then we went to settle the Limits of us & Curringhoda but for

to the head of Balleortu and so to include all the Space from thence W^tward and
N^oward they argued Strongly for more, but as we Continued fixt they proposed

ARTICLES to be Mutually agreed on between us of Tellicherry and Mihie for the Common benefitt of the Companys of England and France and for the tranquillity of their Settlements.

1. TOUCHING Carringhoda and his Country: That he Remains a Common Friend to both, and has Liberty to Vissit either without giving the least Jealousy or distrust.

He shall not assemble people nor make any preparation of War without first advising us and obtaining our Consents. Notwithstanding this Friendship, if he should happen to have any discord with either of us, We Joyntly will endeavour to pacifie him, but if he should Continue obstinate, and persevere in his design of Molesting either We together are obliged with Force to quiet him, If it should happen that he is inclined to give disturbance to any of the Powers in the Country of Irrebenaddu, We will not permitt him, and if on the Contrary they should Aim at Molesting him We Joyntly will use means to hinder them, first amicably but if that will not do We agree Joyntly to assist Curringhoda in the manner we may Judge reasonable as we are likewise to do to Narrangport Nayro, if any of those Attempt to disturb him, he at the same time not being permitted to hurt others, and if the said Narrangport should happen to have any difference with Curringhoda, or the latter with him, We are to be the Arbitrators thereof. The said Curringhoda shall not make or raise Fortifications or any Appearance of things offensive or deffensive in any place which may give us Suspicion of his Neighbours in Irrebenaddu without first having our permission, if he should act Contrary we will oblige him to Rase such, His Country shall be open and free to both to go & come in that we may Communicate with all security and tranquillity. That he may be the more Inclined to this Union and that his Country may be the more free for our Communication, He shall enjoy freely the Lands we assign him.

2. If either of us should know of any designs of the Country people against any one of us, We are obliged to give Notice thereof to each other, thereby to prevent the evill intention of the Country people. Neither of us can Warr with Curringhoda Separately but must do it Joyntly, or with the Consent of each other, and even not then 'till we have used all possible ways for a Pacification. Neither of us can assist Curringhoda directly or indirectly with Men, Arms, Artillery, Powder shott, Rice or Money, nor even with advice against each other, but rather must prevent his giving any disturbance.

3. To Prevent the evill of Disertion of whatever Nation either white or black or even servants or slaves We reciprocally are obliged to deliver them up again whenever required on pardon granted but Criminalls of both sides are to be protected.

4. For the Benefitt of each other we agree from time to time to Settle the Price of Pepper as often as is Necessary, and neither can break the Price without advising the other, nor raise it without the others knowledge.

N.B. the Country of Irrebenaddu Comprehends the tract of land Lying between Mihie & Codollee Rivers.

Our Prince Joyned with the King of Cotata landed on Durmapatam and took one of Ally Rajahs Forts.

Deidier the Engineer came here to discourse on the Affairs of our Companys, representing that Curringhoda was not Inclinable to Adhere to the Terms we agreed on, & therefore it was Necessary to make a provision, so as to his standing out, should be no Impediment to our proceedings and that as it may happen the power from Bombay may not Arrive time enough to have the Articles ratified before the Departure of Said Gentlemen to Pondicherry it would be best to Sign them reciprocally ourselves, to prevent now any contentions with the remaining people on both sides, which 'tis possible may happen, by keeping of Papers open, lyable to alteration, after Robert Adams Esq^r. and Stephen Law, who were deputed in this Management, had Seriously considered these things, they agreed to add the following words to the Articles Mentioned under the 19th. Febr^y. and to sign them Mutually to be of Force 'till the Authority comes from Bombay Viz^t.

That as Curringhoda had given his power to the French of Mihie to Treat of his Affairs with the English, and now not being Satisfied with the Ground We have allowed him, nor the other things designed for his Benefitt in the Articles, he shall not therefore enjoy for the present those Lands promised in the agreement but we will not Molest him however in anywise, nay rather agree to give him Liberty to Enter when he will in the Engagement According to the manner Sett down though if he should presume upon his Dissatisfaction to Molest one or both of us, We Joyntly will hinder him and if he thereby Occasions us Charges, In such Case We together will Consider on what Terms to Admit him.

These Articles are approved of on behalf of the French Company by Mess^{rs}. Nicolas De Lorme, Lewis Deidier &c^a. and in behalf of the English Company by Mess^{rs}. Robert Adams, Stephen Law &c^a. but as it is Necessary the English should have the approbation thereof from Bombay, it is not to be ratified 'till that is had but in the meantime to be strictly observed Dated and Signed in Tellicherry March 9/20 in the year 1727/8.

The Councill being met, agreeable to yesterdays Resolution in Order to receive M^r. Adams his snall answer with regard to the Orders Expressed in the Honioble President and Councill of Bombay their Letter received @ Fort S^t. George Galley It was Accordingly demanded of him which best suits his present Conveniency Signing the Bond, or paying the money as directed, it being possitivly Expressed in said orders it be done one way or other. If he expects the Liberty of going off here as Chief to which he answers, that the Loans which have been made were partly for the Honioble Company's Interest for the Security of the Pepper Trade to them, agreeable to their Orders, which he offers now to prove, and after his Efforts used his Conduct therein was wholly approved of, and a Gratuity given for his faithfull Services, therefore he thinks it highly inconsistent for him to answer the defficiencys arising from said Loans, and indeed esteems it so great a hardship, that he cannot Comply with it, [. . .] that he may, while he is here, appear with the same [zeal], as he has hitherto shewn, he proposes forthwith to send for the Prince Demanding his debt, and that we allow him a Vessell of Countenance to carry him M^r. Braddyll, M^r. Law and any other we may think proper to Vissit the Samorine, King of Puniture &c^a. and being pretty Confident a great part will be paid forthwith, and the remainder put on the footing as was directed by the Honioble President & Councill, & thereby the whole recovered debating on which, and Considering the assurances M^r. Adams gives of the great probabillity there is of Obaining a Considerable Sum now, We do think it is for the Interest of our Honioble Masters, & will be approved of by the Hon^{ble}. President & Councill that we keep the Victoria for the aforementioned purpose, and as M^r. Adams shews so great a readyness, We agree to Address the Honioble President and Councill on his behalf, that they may be pleased to mitigate that part of their orders with relation to his repairing to Bombay.

As to what M^r. Adams proposes Concerning the Prince Cunhi Homa We are sensible he is so much Engaged at present in his Warrs with the Moors & Actually at this time about Attacking Cannanore, We think it Improper to disturb him now.

but as we have no reason to doubt his present Success will furnish him with Very Large Sums of ready money we Conclude to waite 'till he be in some Measure disengaged.

AGREED therefore that we give Cap^t. Reeve Comander of the Victoria Orders Accordingly, & that we dispatch the Galley to Bombay with Notice of this our resolution with all Expedition, and that M^r. Adams M^r. Braddyll & M^r. Law Embark on the Victoria with all Convenient Speed, in order to waite on the Samorine, as we apprehend the Season is not so farr advanced, but that we may dispatch our business with him &c^a. and the Vessell to Bombay in due time, and that the Callicutt Linguist do forthwith repair to the Samorine and King of Puniture with M^r. Adams his Olas to them.

And it Appearing also to M^r. Braddyll that M^r. Adams under the Character of Chief may be of greater Service in the present Negotiation than otherwise through his better Acquaintance and Experience with these Country people (he is willing to deferr publishing his Comission which now does of Course take place through M^r. Adams his non Compliance with the orders of the Honoble Presid^t. and Councill 'till his return from the Southward.

“ I have often wrote your Majesty to repair to some Convenient place for our Meeting you to finish the Hon^{ble}. Company's Accounts, to which I have received no answer, we have now repeated orders from Bombay imediately to Vissitt you, therefore I hope you will be at Penany or somewhere near it, that my Successor who is Arrived may be present with me to receive of you the money which I hope you will have [. . .] farr advanced I desire you will directly advise the day and place for meeting you, for the greater speed we send the Linguist to discourse with your Majesty—

To the King of Puniture

“ At Severall times I have wrote your Majesty about the Hon^{ble} Companys Debt, and you have in some of your answers promised punctuall payment, which not being yet done, I hope you will not fail meeting me, and my Successor at the Samorines Pallace with the whole Sum to discharge the Accounts.

This Morning the Chief received on Ola from the Samorine owning the recet of his under the 14th. Ultimo giving him also to understand he was using all possible Dilligence to pay off the Honoble Company's debt, that so soon as he knew what he was able to gather in for that purpose, he would send his Ministers to Meet the Chief and settle the time of seeing him, hoping at the sametime he would Cultivate all possible means to preserve the Friends^r. at present Subsisting between him and the Honoble Company. THURSDAY 14th.

This Evening Sailed the Fort S^t. George Galley for Bombay, by her wrote the Honoble President & Councill Acknowledging the receipt of their Pacquet under the 26th. Mr. Adams having Summon'd this meeting in order to give a particular answer to each Article wherewith he is Charged by the Hoñoble President & Councils of Bombay in the Account sent down by the Fort S^t. George Galley, does Accordingly offer to this Board for his Vindication, the reasons that Induced him to make the Sundry Loans wherewith they Deem him Chargeable Viz^t.

1st. Concerning the Loan of Sixty Seven thousand one hundred six & Five vis, to the Samorine in 1720, without Interest which is said to have been to Chastize his Subjects for Insulting the people of our Factory at Callicutt; The reasons that Induced him to this Loan, were occasioned by an Attempt made by the Dutch to destroy himself, through means of some of the Commonality of Callicutt who Actually on the 5th. of Jañry 1719/20 Beat & Vilely treated some of the Companys Servants, in their walking the usual way, and it was then the Judgment and Opinion of every one had he been there they would Certainly have destroyed him, & indeed it was renderd more Evident by the Samorine's not being able to get redress, 'till after staying for that purpose at Callicutt from February to Novemb^r. 1720 & spending upward of One Hundred thousand Fanams, a great part whereof he insisted on our paying, but the Chief Demanding the Usual protection he was at last prevailed on to give an Ola for the aforesaid Sum without Interest, had not these Methods been taken it would have been Impossible with any Safety to Have remained at Callicutt, & therefore 'tis Very obvious there was an Absolute Necessity for doing it, & that he does apprehend Authority Sufficient was Vested in him from the Orders the Hoñoble President and Council for the time being, had received from the Honoble

Company Directing them to Support him in whatever he should do for their Interest, and as they did not by anything Signified Disapprove of this proceeding he does not Judge himself lyable for this Sum.

2^d. The Loan of Seventy Thousand fanams to the King of Puniture, this sum was lent on the same Views as to the Samorine, since, as his Country was Seated between Chittoa and Penany, He was really Necessary to stop the Dutch Progress, and on him lately lay the Main stress of the Warr, and when 'tis Considered The Honorable President & Council of Bombay did repeatedly Spurr the Chief to frustrate the Dutch by all means he should think proper and Necessary, and said Prince being so Capable of rendering great service in order thereto, it was Certainly requisite he should be won over to our Interest and by all means secure him from joyning with the Contrary Party, with these Views & no other was this Loan made, and he offers to prove that Exclusive of the aforesaid Sum Ten thousand fan^s. & upwards are owing him by that Prince, although he Solemnly Protests the whole was Launched out solely for the Honorable Companys Interest; as to the Notice taken of not advising of the Loan of Twenty thousand Fanams, it was an Omission, but the same was brought into the Books the Same Season.

3^d. The Loan of Forty two thousand Fanams to Mauna Bedda Mother Queen, This was lent purely for the Samorine's Service, as appears by his having Accepted of Thirty four thousand Fanams Transferrd to his Account, and it was employed to raise the Commonality of Callicutt to joyn in withstanding the Dutch. The Good Effects whereof were manifest by a Considerable Victory thereupon, the remaining Eight Thousand he makes no doubt of receiving or getting it Incorporated into the Samorine.

4th. The Loan of Five thousand Five hundred fanams to Durmett Ponycary, was advanced for the same reasons as the other Debts to Enable him the better to Carry on the Samorine's Interest as he was Generall of the Forces, and the Authority is grounded on that Generall order of frustrat^s. the designs & Attempts of the Dutch which the Chief was possitively Directed to perform, This person Actually took the Fort from the Dutch, and Excepting the King of Puniture was the most Coosiderable Man in the Warrs he does not doubt of having this Secured to our Honoble Masters on our Intended Interview with the Samorine.

5th. The Ballance of Prince Cunhi Homa's Account being Sixty Seven thousand Thirty three fan^s. & Two Vis M^s. Adams Esteems it as great an hardship as the rest, that he should be thought Chargeable therewith, Considering for this also he had a Latitude from his Superiours at Bombay as appears by the following Porragraph of their Letter under date the 11th. October 1721. Viz^t.

We observe the wicked designs of Ally Rajah against the person of the young Prince, and how happily he escaped being Butchered, your Assisting him at this Junctures We approve of and indeed we hope our appearing for him at such a Conjunction as this will Revett his Friendship for us more especially should we be so happy as to procure the Chastizement of Ally Rajah as his Treacherry deserves.

And although he may not have been so exact in advising each particular Sum when paid, through an hurry & Continuall perplexitys with the adjacent Governm^t. Yet as the whole was fairly stated in the Books of the Settlement, such an Omission cannot be thought of weight enough to render him lyable for any deficiency that may arise, which yet he does not doubt of [recovering] from the present Ability in the Prince to Sattisfie the whole which altho not presently paid off in sums of ready money will be annually lessened and in a small Term of years totally discharged by the Dutys arising on the Trade of the Settlement and this assistance being afforded out of a Demonstration of our Inclinations to serve him, in recompence of the Many years Favours & Services recieved from his family he will never think of allowing Interest as it would thereby Cancell the obligation.

On the whole Mr. Adams does Conceive, that since the afores^d. Loans as well as many others not herein mentioned were really advanced on no other Motive or design than for the promoting and augmenting the Interest & Credit of his Hoñoble Masters, which he solemnly declares was Intended by him and as it is Demonstrable the severall persons have fairly and justly received the Sums Charged to their Account, It would be Inconsistent with the Justice he apprehends the Hoñoble Company are willing to Administer to all their faithfull Servants, anywise to Mollest him on this Occasion, especially after near Forty years Service, wherein he has been highly Comended, & Gratified for his Candid Integrity and just Demeanour in all his proceedings, & he cannot but remember in particular, the great Encomiums they have been pleased to pass on this part of his Conduct, long after the affair now in Question was Transacted.

The above being what he has to offer on these Heads, he desires the same may be remitted to the Hoñoble President & Councill of Bombay in our next Advices, which was Accordingly AGREED to.

Mr. Adams representing to the Board the Extraordinary Charge he has been lately at in Entertaining the French Gentlemen at Sundry Interviews, when the Articles of agreement between them & us concerning our Limits in Irrebenaddu, and for the better Security of these Settlements and Future Peace & Tranquillity, were adjusting, he having been Likewise at a further Extraordinary Expence on the Late Occasion of Proclaim^s. their Present Majestys, we agree to allow him for the whole Two hundred rupees, which we hope our Superiours at Bombay will approve off, what allowed the Chief here being farr from Sufficent to Support him to Such Expences, which we could not anyway avoid.

Supposing our Callicutt Linguist, who was dispatcht to the Samorine the 11th. Inst. in the Evening, to be arrived with him and to have prepared matters for our reception; Robert Adams Esq^r. John Braddyll Esq^r. & Mr. Stephen Law resolve to Embark to Morrow the 17th. Instant in the Evening on the Victoria, and proceed to Tannore forthwith, where they will be near Enough to receive dayly Advices from the Samorine, where & how he intends to meet them, and during their Absence from hence, 'tis AGREED the Charge of these Garrisons be delivered over to the Hoñoble Company's Covenant Servants remaining here, Viz^t. Mess^{rs}. John Johnson, William Forbes, Hugh Howard & William Jeynson, who are not to make any Contracts, or Extraordinary Disbursments, 'till their return, or further Orders, and to remitt all Generall Advices Express, and 'tis further AGREED they carry with them all the Originall Writs and O^las that anywise relate to the Samorine, King of Puniture, Queen Mother and Durmett Ponycarry, their Debts to the Hoñoble Company, List whereof is Entered after the Consultation as also a Detachment of an Ensign, Two Serjeants, Two Corporalls, Two Rounders, 1 Drum & Thirty Centinells to be a Guard to their persons and a Countenance to the Hon^{ble}. Companys Officers to be Transported in Two Munchuas

Timber being Very much wanted for the use of this Garrison, directed that the Callicutt Linguist be ordered to provide Four Large Trees of good Teak to be sent us up before the rains.

About Five 's Clock this Evening by Tony Express received a Letter from Robert Adams Esq^r. John Braddyll Esq^r. & M^r. Stephen Law Dated Tannore the 18th. Ins^t., advising they had received Information from Mangalore by which they apprehended there would be great difficulty to obtain a Loading of Rice for the Munchuas sent on our Honoble Masters Account which were obliged to proceed to some of the Northern Ports Occasioned by the King of Canara having given Orders, no rice should be sold to anyone. Enclosed came a Letter from the Chief to the Vicar here, & another for the Governour of Mangalore, requesting the former to proceed thither, and use his endeavours to obtain Four or five thousand Bales of Rice for the Support of these Garrisons, for which purpose they direct we deliver him Fifteen Hundred Dollars, and to send Two Soldiers in a Large Toney to Convey him thither imediately on receipt of which Letter we sent for the Vicar, delivered the Chief's paquet as aforesaid, on perusing of which, told us, he was Very ready to serve the Honoble Company in this affair, to the utmost of his power and would proceed tomorrow.

This Evening Dispatch'd the Tony to Tannore, and answered the Chief &c^a. their Letters, Informing them the Vicar would proceed to morrow for Mangalore, to gett a Quantity of Rice, and agreeable to their directions, we would deliver him Fifteen hundred Dollars and afford him the Conveyance as they ordered, & [Enclosed sent the Vicars answer to the Chiefs Letter.

WEDNES-
DAY 20th.

We this day in the forenoon delivered the Vicar Two Baggs Containing Fifteen Hundred Dollars, for which we took his receipt, & he requesting Four Soldiers might be sent with him instead of Two, they went Accordingly in a large Toney, with which he proceeded this noon for Mangalore.

21st.

This day came a Letter from Mangalore for the Chief, which we Judging to be of Importance dispatcht a Toney Express with it Enclosed in ours to the Chief &c^a. and one to our Callicutt Linguist's assistant directing him by our Linguist to forward the same by our Nays Informing them the Vicar departed yertedday for Mangalore.

Adams might follow afterwards, We Concieving such proceedings to be Contrary to the Honorable Companys Standing rules and Orders, and Consequently should we Suffer it, would be Neglecting our Duty and the trust reposed in us Consider^e M^r. Adams has not delivered over his Charge, Unanimously RESOLVED to send for the Officer on Guard, directing him not to Suffer any Goods or Chests to go out of the Fort without giving us previous notice, and as we have Acted in this affair, According to the best of our Judgments, We hope it will be approved of by our Superiours, AGREED therefore that we write the Gentlemen at Penany advising them of our proceedings and request their Orders Concerning this affairs.

He likewise delivers up the Two new olas now received from the Samorine with Nine others as & List thereof Entered after this Consultation directed that said olas be Lodged in a proper place to prevent their taking Damage by Moisture or other Accidents.

It appearing absolutely Necessary to this board that the Victoria friggat be forthwith despatcht to Bombay the Season growing late 'tis directed that the Necessary Advices touching the Settlement be forthwth. prepared.

M^r. Braddyll on perusall of the transactions here since his departure to the S^c. ward, observing the seeming restraint that has been put on M^r. Adams & her family, by the Gentlemen left in trust, moves the board to give in their reasons for these proceedings w^{ch}. they offer as follows.

That as the Charge of this Settlement was delivered over to them in the absence of Robert Adams Esq^r. John Braddyll Esq^r. & M^r. Stephen Law who were gone to Penany to adjust the Samorines Accounts and M^r. Adams not having delivered over anything of his Charge and Seeing Chests and Goods carryed out of the Fort as they apprehended the Charge delivered over to her was to remain in the Same Condition untill their Arrivall, or they had orders from them, and M^r. Adams not advising any

of them that she intended to send any thing on board the Decker and she requiring the delivery of Two Chests of Treasure, they thought it their duty to put a Stop to anything being Embarkt, 'till they had orders from Robert Adams Esq^r. John Braddyll Esq^r. and M^r. Stephen Law to whom they wrote Express, and as they have Acted in this affair wth.out any malice or prejudice to any one, they hoped it would meet with a favourable approbation of our Superiours, and Desire Copy of the Consultations Concerning this affair be sent to Bombay & Victoria.

Which being fully Considered & debated on M^r. Braddyll puts the Question, whether or no the Continuance or noncontinuance of M^r. Adams and her family & their Necessarys at Tellicherry do's any wise Effect the Hon^{ble} Companys Affairs, or comes within the reach of any orders received from The Hon^{ble} President and Council of Bombay relating thereto, which was Unanimously Carryed in the Negative and the Gentlemen then left in trust, declare they were only moved to this proceeding from the Caution they would willingly have it thought they acted withall in the absence of their Superiours, 'Tis therefore AGREED that what restraint was then thought Necessary Concerning them be now taken of, and that they have Liberty with their Necessarys to remain or goe away as they think Convenient & that orders be given Accordingly.

Our Store of Dammar being out, and there being a Necessity of making provision thereof for our Gun Carriages &c^a. ORDERED that the Storekeeper buy a Candy from some of the Bengall shipping now in the road for that purpose.

Agreeable to the resolution taken at Tellicherry We yesterday in the Evening, embarkt on the Victoria Grab and this noon arrived here having given directions to the Tellicherry Linguist to take in Suamy Putturah and the head Custom Master of Callicutt to assist in our Negotiation with the Samorine; but 'twas impossible to perswade the Custom Master to go down without the Kings Order. The Linguist brought us advice of the extream Scarcity of Rice at Mangallore and that our boats would not be able to gett any there as the Canatick King had possitively forbid any being exported and some of our people there wrote him they had resolved therefore to proceed to some of the N^e.thern places to try what they could do there.

We understand they are arrived there, but have been obliged to proceed to some of the N^o.thern Ports through an Impediment laid by the Casatick King to give no supplys to any one, and the Portugueze are incapable of getting near their quantity required for the Lading their Vessells, We have been considering seriously how to Surmount or allow all these impending misfortunes, and in fine Conceive it the only means proper to send the Vicar of Tellicherry to Mangalore with the Chiefs Letter to the Governour there pressing him to permit our having 4 or 5000 bales at least for the maintenance of our Garrisons, and for this purpose you will receive Inclosed a Letter to the Padre, who we doubt not will readily go away, We desire therefore he may have 1500 Dollars delivered him to pay for an additionall quantity of Rice and for the better security two good Soldiers in a Large Toney to be dispatcht with all expedition possible by this boat pray advice us of your proceedings herein We are

As to the King of Puniture, Queen Mother & Durmat Ponnycarree [his] Debts they urged part [was] employed for the Samorine's Service, but the main View in the Chief's lending that money was to obtains some Considerable advantages in Trade for the Honoble Company but all this should be farther debated when the King of Puniture comes which w[ill] be Very speedily, and for the other Loans they might easily be Accomodated as being inconsiderable—the Ministers seem to desire our making the Vissit the 23^d. and to have all our business done so as to take our leave the 27th. Instant at farthest their Feast of Booe being Very near but the Linguist assures us of more Certain advices to morrow. The Second King of Puniture in discourse with the Callicutt Linguist seemed Vastly desirous their Debt should be [paid] wondred the Head King had made no progress thereon, but he would imediately bring him to the Pallace and use all means possible for its being discharged. The Chief has likewise now had assurances in an Ola from the head King that he should be at the Samorine's Pallace & there settle things to his Sattisfaction.

Yesterday noon receiving advices from the Linguist that the Samorine would be ready to Accept of our Vissit at this place on Sunday the 24th. we embarkt Imediately on the Victoria and came ashore this morning sending directly to the Principall Ministers to come to us in order to Treat on the Necessary matters, but as they were with the King at a Considerable distance off they deferr'd it 'till the Morning.

DITTO DIE Received a Letter from the Gentlemen at Tellicherry dated the 21st. advising the Vicar went away for Mangallore the 20th. with 1500 Dollars in a Large Toney and three Soldiers for his Security Carrying also a piece of Dammask to give the Gov^r. of Mangallore if Necessary. The Chief is informed by a Letter from his Servants there that 35 Corge of Rice is Actually bought at 26 & 26½ Pagodas ☞ Corge on the Honoble Company's Account, but had not been able to obtain leave to gett it embarkt.

We had a long Conferrence with the Two head Generalls and the fourth pressing them for a more Considerable Sum to be now paid but notwithstanding all our Arguments they persisted the Samorine was unable at present to give us a Larger sum for even that promised must be raised with Extraordinary difficulty, however we seemed Dissatisfied and desired they would go to the Samorine & prevaile on him for more, or we could not pay our Vissit with that Chearfullness & Sattisfaction we expected his Majesty would afford us. about noon they advised us they had represented every thing, and 'twas the Samorine's request we would as soon as possible come to him, which we complied with about three in the Evening our reception was kind & Courteous & assurances given that the Friends^{rs}. hitherto existing should be maintain'd on his part, and the Debt fully Discharged in time to adjust which the Ministers would come in the Morning, and he hoped things would be settled to our Sattisfaction, after which and the Necessary Compliments part with M^r. Adams and then with M^r. Braddyll We took our leave & a small time after saw the King of Puniture who deferr'd talking, of his affair 'till to morrow.

Received a Letter from the Gentlemen at Tellicherry dated the 23^d. Ins^t. assuring us of their advising of all things of Moment that happen.

The assurances given us by the Samorine of a full Satisfaction agreeable to his promise induced our staying this day in expectation of a Sure Compliance, but by our Linguist this Evening who has been at the Pallace for Severall hours we were informed the Head, Second, third & fourth Kings were come to no resolution altho they had been in Consult ever since the morning and their Feast of Booe being this night they were all preparing to go away for the observance thereof while we were in great Surprize at so extraordinary a proceeding two of the Ministers with Suamy Putturah came to assure us by the first & second King's orders that too [*sic*] morrow every thing should be adjusted to our desire, and for that purpose altho the Feast ought to hinder it, yet they would return hither by the Evening and therefore prest our stay.

The king of Puniture being likewise with us he represented how little Success he has had with the Samorine notwithstanding the money borrowed by his Predecessor was really applyed for his Service in the Warrs. He acknowledged Frankly Justice obliged his making good the whole Sum forthwith and no inclination was wanting in him to do it, but the means is not now in his power, but he prest for going to his Pallace to perform the Anniversary Rights of the Deceased King assuring us of his returning to morrow at Close of the Evening to give a new Bond and assign a punctuall and Speedy payment, after seriously reflecting of the strange delays in the Samorine from day to day We are at a Loss how to Judge of his intentions, but the Ministers possitively affirming a Considerable sum will be paid to morrow by the Evening & Suamy Putturah giving the same hopes & it being also proper to put the King of Punitures Debt in some way so as to render it Secure if

In our last Addresses to your Honour & c^a. by the Fort S^t. George Galley, we advised your Hon^r. & c^a. what we had resolved to put in Execution concerning the Large debt due to our Hoñoble Masters from the Samorine and others in his Country judging we could not have a better Oppertunity than while M^r. Adams remained with us of settling those matters on some certain footing of being recovered in a reasonable time, and that a Vissit to the Samorine was absolutely Necessary to be undertaken there appearing no possibility of effecting it otherways from the tedious delays that have been always experienced from his Ministers, when at a distance from him, We did therefore on notice given us from the Samorine by an ola sent us for that purpose, that he would meet us at Penaney, imediately embarkt on the Victoria the 17th. Ultimo and proceeded to Tannore in order to receive more Certain Advices from our Linguist, then at Penaney what we might in reallity expect from the King and his Ministers provided we should think it proper to proceed to an interview, but they without any Demurr assured our Linguist they would infallibly pay us in ready money 200000 fanams and adjust our Account to our Sattisfaction, We thought it proper to proceed towards them & Arrived at Penaney the 23^d. and had the Ministers to waite on us the 25th. with whom we endeavoured to prevaile for a Larger Sum, but notwithstanding our Arguments they possitively assured us it would be impossible at present for the Samorine to raise more however, they promised to do all in their power, and on Notice being given our Vissit was imediately expected, We directly went to the Pallace where after making the usuall Present, we were received with Extraordinary Courtesie and Dismist with firm promises of having everything Settled to our Sattisfaction in a Very short space of time, but notwithstanding the many after meetings we have since had with the Principall Ministers and the great delays in coming to any manner of Conclusion

with us, through the many Factions prevailing at present among them, we have not been able by any means (tho none were left by us untryed) to induce them to Join the King of Punitures Debt with that of the Mother Queens & Durmet Ponnycarre's to the Samorines or even to pay us in hand the 200000 fanams they had so Solemnly promised before and after our landing they urging the 2^d. King and head Ministers had Disagreed in their manner of raising the same, but that the greatest part thereof would infallibly be ready for us at Callicutt Sometime this month and the whole paid of in May.

After all this disappointment we at last urged them to settle the Honorable Companys Account so as to have it discharged in a short time, and the whole sum Comprised [*sic*] in one ola to be paid off at Certain times to this they shewed a willingness but insisted on a Larger term than we judged your Hon^r. &c^a. would approve of as well as not being liable to the Charge of Interest in Case of Failure which we thought Necessary Strenuously to insist on, as it would be a means of Obliging the Samorine more strictly to Comply with the Agreement since otherwise arising on those Large Sums would swell so very Considerably as to plunge him into farther difficultys of Discharging them and indeed Very likely to an entire Impossibility of ever freeing himself from such a Load.

We had the greatest difficulty imaginable in bringing the Ministers to Consent to the Article of Interest & had no way left of Effecting it but by assuming an outward resolution of leaving the shore in disgust, which put them into Such a disorder that they at last Consented to Settle the Account as your Hon^r. &c^a. may please to observe by the inclosed Viz^t.

They to allow us the full Interest by doubling the amount of those Olas that have been given us for the Loans advanced on those Terms which make fanams ^{Tarr} 410680 5 and they to take up the Six Olas at Interest and one without given us last year in lieu of which to deliver us one Ola for 182000 fan^a. to be fully discharged without fail by the last of May ensuing of which a Considerable part is forthwith to be paid at Callicutt, 10000 fanams is now delivered and allowing for the 8000 fanams paid in July last, all these together make up the promised sum of Fan^a. 200000 and the said ola for the reasons before given stands at Interest one $\frac{1}{2}$ cent $\frac{1}{2}$ Mensem 'till the time of its discharge.

It is not in our power to render your Hon^r. &c^a. any possitive assurances how farr these people may Comply with the prementioned Olas but it does appear to us from their proceedings that they would not willingly give us any disgust, However, the better to Secure and Effect the speedy payment of the Ola for 182000 fan^a. payable now in Callicutt We have thought it most for our Honorable Masters Interest; that Robert Adams Esq^r. and Stephen Law repair thither and remain sometime

Stephen Law arriving this morning from Callicutt, delivered us in a Letter from Robert Adams Esq^r wherein to our great Surprize, we observe he Advices us of his Embarking on the Decker the 12th. Instant for Fort S^t. George, he also Transmitts us the Callicutt Account Currant 'till the 1st. Instant, with a receipt for the Ballance thereof paid into the hands of our Linguist, being fanams Callicutt Ten thousand Five hundred fifteen & fifteen Tarr, which is Accordingly ordered to be Examined to be more Nicely Scrutinized into by this board.

M^r. Stephen Law acquainting the board, that on observing M^r. Adams preparing to Embark at Callicutt wth.out so much as acquainting his fellow Servants there-with or even delivering over the Charge he was Entrusted with he thought it Incumbent on him to deliver him the follow^g. Protest (as Enter'd after this Consultation) In order the better to Indemnifie us, should anything be found amiss on his Arrival here; had it been possible for him to come to the knowledge of his Intention he would not have failed giving immediate advice hither, but it happening otherwise he had no means in his hands to prevent it, therefore hopes the Board approves his proceedings.

M^r. Adams likewise having transmitted his Account of Cash and Bullion from the 1st. Instant 'till the 12th. 'tis Directed that the Ballance said to be remaining, be Examined, and that the Chief takes Charge thereof.

ORDERED also that the Storekeeper do forthwith draw out an Account of the Stores &c^a. M^r. Adams remains Chargeable with as well as the Lead and other things he has Supplied the Prince, which he is Accountable for, and that the Amount thereof be forthwith paid into the Hon^{ble} Companys Cash by his Attorneys.

The Chief Acquaints the board that he had Deferr^d. the Publishing his Comission in expectation of M^r. Adams his Arrivall from Callicutt, in order then to have received from him the Charge of this Settlement in a more formall manner, but as that Gentleman has thought fitt to leave us in so abrupt and irregular a manner, The publishing the same forthwith is by him thought altogether Necessary; The Secretary is therefore ordered to read the same in the Usual manner, after assembling the Garrison for that purpose.

WHEREAS you Robert Adams Esq^r. during the Course of your managment of The Honoble English East India Company's Affairs as Chief of Callicutt and Telli-cherry, have Contracted with the Severall Powers adjacent sundry debts to the Amount of a Very Considerable Sum, part whereof the Honoble President and Council of Bombay, as well as the said Honoble Company do allow of, so farr as the same appears to have been done by Virtue of the Power and Authority by them given you; But still a large part under the Denomination of the Samorine, Prince Cunhi Homo, King of Puniture, Mother Queen & Durmett Ponnycarre they deem you chargeable with, founded on the reasons of your not having obtained from them a Sufficient Warrant for making of those Loans to said persons; and therefore on the Arrivall of John Braddy[ll] Esq^r. from Bombay, who is appointed to Succeed you in this Chiefship, a possitive demand was made for your paying directly the Principall Amount of the aforementioned Loans' or otherwise to give a Bond with Double the Penalty for your Acquiescing in the Decission thereof by The Hon^{ble}. Court of Directors of said Honoble Company, or a select part of them for the time being, and in Case of your refusal of either of these Propositions you was required to repair to Bombay, or remain here at a Certain pay and Allowance for the recovery of said Debts which you stand Charged with.

To all which you refused a Compliance, alledging in your own behalf, that as the said Loans were advanced for the Service of The Honoble Company, and in pursuance of the Liberty given, In order thereby to obtain some advantages in the Augmentation of their Trade, you could not Submitt to the Conditions required by said Honoble President and Council of Bombay, but offered to proceed with John Braddyll Esq^r. and myself, to the Samorine, King of Puniture &c^a. there to endeavour the procuring a part and putting the remainder on such a footing as that the whole might be recovered in a reasonable time, But notwithstanding this was permitted you, nothing was Effected more than adjusted with the Samorine on hopes of a due Discharge of his Debt hereafter, and a small matter paid now, and Something further to be recovered of his people at this place. Depending therefore on your Superiour skill in the management of Affairs with these people, thro' your longer Experience it was Acceded to, so farr as that you might Continue sometime here for the obtaining of said money, And then proceed to Tellicherry where undoubtedly the Demands [must] have been renewed Since none of these debts of the King of Puniture, Queen Mother or Durmet Ponnycarre's are either recovered, or in any better security; But Contrary to all this it Appears to me, your intentions are to Embark on the Decker Cap^t. Richard Upton with your family for Madras, therefore, in Case of your so doing, as the orders of The Honoble President & Council of Bombay, are uncomplied with and the Necessary Satisfaction not given—I do hereby in behalf of The Honoble United English East India Company, Protest against you Robert Adams Esq^r. declaring you by these Presents answerable for whatever Damage may Accrue to them, or their Servants by these your proceedings—Dated in Callicutt this Twelfth day of Aprill One thousand Seven Hund red & Twenty eight.

This day agreeable to our yesterdays Resolution, the Chief and M^r. Stephen Law went to Moylan, and were met by Mons^r. De Lorme, Tremisot & Deidier whereafter a Conference held, particularly in regard to the purchase of Pepper mentioned in the Fourth Article which the Honorable President & Council of Bombay thought better left out; The French Urging the advantage it would be to each of us to Consult now and then about that affair, and being Very pressing therein; We Acquiesd so farr as to advise and Consult as often as Necessary, the better to Regulate our purchase, and after drawing out the proper additions to the former Articles in Portugueze they were mutually Agreed to Signed & Sealed by the Gentlemen then present and forthwith sent first to Tellicherry and then to Mihie for the absent Council respectively to Sign, which being done, they were mutually Interchanged at four this afternoon, Engaging to each other a Strict observance thereof which are as follows.

ARTICLES MUTUALLY AGREED ON BETWEEN US OF TELLICHERRY & MIHIE FOR THE COMMON BENEFIT OF THE COMPANYS OF ENGLAND & FRANCE AND FOR THE TRANQUILITY OF THEIR SETTLEMENTS.

1ST. TOUCHING CURRINGHODA & HIS COUNTRY, That he rema[ins] a Common Friend to both and has Liberty to Vissit either without giving the least Jealousy or Distrust.

He shall not assemble people, or make any preparation of Warr, without first advising us, and obtaining our Consents notwithstanding this Friendship, If he should happen to have any discord with either of us, We joyntly will endeavour to Pacifie him, but if he should Continue obstinate & persevere in his design of Molesting either; We together are obliged with Force to Quiet him; If it should happen that he is inclined to give disturbance to any of the powers in the Country of Irrebenadu, We will not permitt him and if on the Contrary, they should aim at Molesting him, We Joyntly will use means to hinder them first amicably, but if that will not do, We agree joyntly to Assist Curringhoda in the manner we may Judge reasonable; as we are likewise to do to Narrangport, if any of those should attempt to disturb him, he at the same time not being permitted to hurt others, and if the said Narrangport happens to have any difference with Curringhoda, or the latter with him, We are to be the Arbitrators thereof. The said Curringhoda shall not make, or raise Fortifications, or any appearance of things offensive, or Defensive in any place which may give us Suspicion, of his Neighbours in Irrebenadu, without first having our permission, if he should Act Contrary, We will oblige him to Rase such; His

Country shall be open and free to both, to go and come, that We may Communicate with all Security & Tranquillity. That he may be the more Inclined to this Union, and that his Country may be the more free for our Communication, He shall enjoy freely the Lands to the S^oward & E^oward of Ponella, Putinha, Ponella Malla, & Tirimalla according to what is assigned him and Lined out by Mess^{rs}. Nicalao De Lorme and Lewis Deidier in behalf of the French Company and Robert Adams & Stephen Law in behalf of the English.

2. If either of us should know of any designs of the Country people against any one of us, We are obliged to give Notice thereof to each other, thereby to prevent the Evil Intentions of the Country people, Neither of us can Warr with Curringhoda Separately, but must do it Joyntly, or with the Consent of each other, and even not then 'till we have used all ways possibly for a Pacification, Neither of us can assist Curringhoda, directly or indirectly with Men, Arms, Artillery, Powder Shot, Rice or money, nor even with advice against each other, but rather must prevent his giving any disturbance.

3. To prevent the Evil of Desertion of whatever Nation, either white or Black, or even Servants or Slaves, We reciprocally are obliged to deliver them again whenever required, on pardon Granted, but Criminals on both sides are to be Protected.

4. We for the Common Benefit of each other do agree to Settle the price of Pepper as often as shall be thought necessary, and that neither the one or the other shall break the Price without giving previous Notice thereof, nor yet raise it without the mutuall knowledge of each.

5. That as Curringhoda has given his Power to the French of Mihie to Treat of his Affairs with the English, and now not being Satisfied with the Ground We have allotted him, nor the other things designed for his Benefit in the Articles, he shall not therefore Enjoy for the present those Lands promised in the agreement, but We will not Molest him, however in any wise, nay rather agree to give him Liberty to Enter when he will into the Engagement According to the manner Sett down, though, if he should presume upon his dissatisfaction to Molest one or both of us, We joyntly will hinder him, and if he thereby Occasions us Charges, In such Case we together will Consider on what Terms to admit him.

These Articles were approved and Accepted on the part of the Royall Company of France by Mess^{rs}. Nicalao De Lorme, Lewis Deidier &c^a. and by Mess^{rs}. Robert Adams and Stephen Law &c^a. on the part of the English Company, but whereas it was thought Convenient by the English first to obtain the approbation of the Hon^{ble} President and Council of Bombay It is agreed in the Interim the said Articles be observed & adhered to with the utmost strictness Signed in Tellicherry the 9th. March 1727/8.

That the foregoing Agreement shall be firmly observed on both sides without Committing the Minutest Violence, or Insult directly or indirectly to the Forts & Factorys of either on shore, nor to the Vessells of each other within Sight of the Collours of Tellicherry & Mihie, notwithstanding^e. there should be a Warr between our Crowns in Europe, unless either of our Companys order the Contrary, and if so imediately notice shall be given thereof.

2. For the better Explanation of the fourth Article in the foregoing Treat^y, touching the Price of Pepper, 'tis reciprocally understood that We Consult each

The Linguist delivers us in the Invoice of Ninety eight Bales Fine, and three thousand Five Hundred Sixty Bales Course Rice brought hither on his Munchuas in return for Four thousand Dollars Consigned to Mangalore for that purpose; Our Garrison Soldiers being in the greatest want Imaginable thereof, It is AGREED, that we for their relief & Sustenance afford them monthly at the rate of a Bale a man for the Single and one and an half to Two, to those who are marryed According to the number of their Family at the rate of Twelve Fanams p Bale, whereby our Hoñoble Masters can be no Loosers, Directed that the Paymaster Deduct the Same out of their growing Pay, and if the Famine in this Country Continues It is AGREED that the Warehousekeeper have orders to Issue out the rest to such persons as dwell within our Limits at said Price, but with this Caution to Reserve Sufficient for our Garrison Soldiers, and other Dependants on us 'till the last October Ensuing, when a further Supply may be hoped for.

The Treasury Account for last month, as also from the 1st. Ins^d. to the 12th. being laid a Second time before the Board for their perusall, and the Ballance said to remain, being found to come out right, are Accordingly past.

The Account Currant Callicutt being Likewise reperused by the Board, & observing for Severall months past the Charges not to Exceed what we are Limited to by the Hoñoble President & Council, 'tis ORDERED the same be Enter'd on our Books Accordingly.

Mr. Adams having thought fitt to leave us without so much as delivering the least Account of many Material papers under his Charge; It is Directed that an Exact List be forthwith taken of all Books, Papers, Olas &c^a. relating to the Honoble Company at this Settlement to be Ranged & disposed in the most regular manner possible, in the Office now sett apart for that purpose, and that said List be Entered in our Consultations to prevent any mistakes that may arise for want thereof.

The Nayrs of Narrangport & other people depend^s. on us expecting their Usual Present at their Feast of Booc^e tis AGREED y^t. the Chief Issue out the same in the Customary manner as we apprehend the same to be unavoidable & would give the highest disgust to the Natives, should We now Attempt to strike it off.

Mr. Stephen Law lays before the Board some small Charges he has been at in Callicutt, and on his way hither amounting to 172 fan^s. & 12 Vis It is AGREED the same be allowed him.

Yesterday morning the Chief received answers to the Sundry Letters of Compliment he had wrote to the Prince, King of Cotata, Nombiers Boyanore &c. but that received from the Prince being of an Extraordinary purport and an uncommon Style we here Enter Viz^t.

Translate of the Prince's Ola to the Chief.

I Received your Letter and I always understood by M^r. Adams, who perswaded my Uncle that the English Company were well inclined towards us, And that they might be relyed on; upon the which Supposition, my Uncle out of his Royall Bounty and good will had friendship towards them, and gave them a place for a Fort; I likewise following the example of my uncle bear towards them the same Love & good Esteem, in the manner, and According to our words; M^r. Adams all his time transacting the Companys Affairs with respect towards them, and with Admirable discretion kept a good & Amicable Correspondence with the Kings and Princes hereabouts; they treating each other with particular good will & respect; He therefore being a person of so just a behaviour; I cannot Imagine what reason he had to leave this Country without taking leave of me, and in a manner as if he had Fled away, if this was done by order of the Company, little Trust is to be put in them, when they disgrace a person of such a Character. 'Tis said that the Europeans are Men of their words, but the ordering M^r. Adams away, and the manner of his going, seems quite Contrary, you Very well know the business that engages me at present, but in a few days I hope to see you—April 20th. 1728.

Arrived also an Ola from the Samorine, wherein he promises that the Custom-master shall pay us immediately what he has in his hands being the produce of the whole Callicutt Customs in part of the Ola for One Hundred Eighty two thousand fanams now due, and that the rest will, without faile, be discharged in a Very short time.

Our Merchant Chatoo Chittie at Agarr, Informs us by an Ola, that the Moors had broke into that Village, and Destroyed Severall Houses & familys, and that the Muckwary and his House in particular were in the utmost danger, and desired the Chief would think on means for the Security thereof.

D^o. DIE

The Chief Considering the Detriment it would be to us, should the Moors proceed to Pillage & burn Agarr & the Cooleys thereunto belonging being a place on which we have the greatest dependance, for the procuring our Pepper, did Accordingly send an Ola to Ally Rajah's Deputy, desiring he would not Molest our Merchant Chatoo Chittie, or the Muckwary assisting under him, as the Company did not interfere in the Quarrell between him & the Prince.

Wrote also the following olas as hereafter mentioned Viz^t. One to the Samorine pressing him to pay off our Ola for One Hundred Eighty Two thousand Fanams; and another to the King of Puniture urging him to a Speedy Discharge of his Debt, and a short one to the Queen Mother, putting her in mind of the promise She made us when at Penany of Paying off her Debt to the Honorable Company and as Boyanore had not sent in the 25000 Fanams he promised to pay us this Month, the Chief wrote him in the most pressing Terms imaginable to send it in forthwith by his Ministers, or give us to understand the reason that induced him to his non-Compliance; As the Prince his Letter to us seemed of an Extraordinary Nature and Very farr different from the Style wherein he used formerly to Correspond with us, he was answered by the Chief in as Moderate Terms as possible, Inviting him to an Interview when he did not doubt of giving his Highness all the Sattisfaction he could expect both with regard to himself and the proceedings of his Employers.

The Renters of the Sundry Paddy Grounds & Verges lying under our Forts of Moylan and Putinha representing to us the impossibility they were under of paying in the full of what they had Contracted for the last Season, being in all Twenty six thousand Dungoys of Paddy since the Grounds when they took them under their Charge had lain waste for so Considerable time & were Impoverish'd for want of Cultivation, their Ditches being likewise all broken down in the late Warrs, and the Charge so great in rendering them fensible against the Cattle, that they had no means left whereby to Sattisfie us above the half, and even that not 'till October next, untill when they desire we will forbear pressing them, otherwise they cannot possibly proceed on sowing said Grounds Paddy being at present so extravagantly dear, and the Famine so great in the Country.

The foregoing reasons appearing to us so Very just and withall the Consequence of pressing these people too hard, such as must Occasion them to Desert us, whereby the aforesaid Lands of Course must lye Unmanured; That it is AGREED We forbear with said Renters untill the next Crop, to the end they may proceed on Cultivating and Manuring said Grounds which otherwise must lye waste.

The Linguist lays before the Board an Account of what has been recovered from said Renters since the month of July last amounting to fanams One thousand Ninety five and Eleven Vis which is now Accordingly paid into the Treasury, Particulars Viz^t.

Imprimis, I Constitute and appoint John Braddyll Esq^r. and Stephen Law my Executors of this my Will & Testament, who are after my Decease to Cause my Interment to be made in a Decent manner, and as touching what it has pleased the Almighty to bestow on me, I bequeath as follows, That is after my Funerall Charges & Lawfull Debts are fully discharged.

Item, To my Nephew Thomas Mostyn at present an Officer of this Garrison, I bequeath for the use of him and his Heirs for ever, all that belongs to me on the Island of S^t. Helena, which now is enjoyed (with my leave) by my Brother Joshua Johnson, Consisting of Land, Slaves, Cattle &c^o. but it is provided & intended by me that the said Thomas Mostyn cannot let the same go out of our Family; I also give & bequeath to him Thomas Mostyn for his proper use and Behoof all my wearing apparell including my silver mounted sword, a silver mounted Hanger and a pair of silver Cap'd Pistolls, & one sett of Gold wascoat Buttons the smallest, also Two pair of Gold shirt Buttons, and one pair of studs.

Item, To my Daughter Mary Douglas, wife of Cap^t. Alexander Douglas of this Garrison I give and bequeath all my Furniture, Consisting of Chairs, Chests, Escrutores, Boxes Cott & Bedding a pair of silver Candlesticks and snuffers, as also the sum of Eight Hundred Rupees, to be enjoyed by her and her Heirs for ever.

Item, To my Sister Elizabeth Taylor, I give and bequeath for the use of her and her Heirs for ever the sum of Eight Hundred Rupees to be remitted by Bill on the Honorable East India Company.

Item, To my Brother Joshua Johnson of St. Helena Inhabitant I give and bequeath for his proper use and behoof my Diamond Ring and the sum of Forty Pounds or Three Hundred & Twenty Rupees to be Enjoyed by him and his Heirs for ever, which my Executors are to remitt, According to their discretion, and one sett of Gold Buttons.

Item, To Stephen Law of Tellicherry one of my Executors before mentioned I give & bequeath all my printed Books.

Now in Case my Estate should come out more than the Amount of said Legacys before mentioned, I will, that the Overplus be given to my Daughter, Sister & Brother above named to be Divided in proportion to each sum bequeathed them. But in Case it should come out less, then a Deduction to be made out of each of their Legacys in proportion to each sum bequeathed; Dated in Tellicherry Fort this twenty second day of Aprill in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred Twenty Eight.

Considering therefore the possitive Comands Received from our Superiours at Bombay for procuring the Quantity of One thousand Candys to be ready in October next, and the Generall Opinion most people hereabout entertain, that this Comodity will rise, when the Season breaks up, through the Demands that will be made for it from Callicutt and other adjacent places, before the new Crop can possibly come in We esteem it most prudent, as the price, we are well assured cannot be less, but rather more, to Accept thereof; He therefore being called in, is made Acquainted therewith, but seemed rather to decline giving so large a Quantity, and Strenuously insisted that the Amount of the whole should be forthwith paid him, otherwise he could not possibly Comply with his agreement, In Consideration therefore of his former punctuality, and good Credit in these parts, and that we have already near half the Quantity Contracted for, Actually in our power in a readiness to be weighed off. It is AGREED that We advance him to the whole amount, being thirty thousand Five Hundred rupees.

Wrote the Samorine; That he is pleased to mention the Callicutt Governour will pay Fifty thousand fanams and the remainder he is using means to have in readiness, but said Governour declares he cannot possibly give more than Forty thousand, of which a small part is paid though not without Causing great trouble in the Collecting it, when this first payment is attended with so many difficultys, what hopes can we have of the rest; therefore, We are obliged if this is not Complied with to Advise Bombay by the Pattamarr we shall send at the end of the Month.

Aprill last, he was in no Capacity of Complying with, 'till the month of Sept^r. next altho he had in former ones given us his word, that he would send us Twenty five thousand fan^r. in all last Month.

The Board observing thereon the little Effect they have hitherto found by expostulating with him at a distance; do unanimously think it Necessary to put in Execution some Methods more Effectuall, in order to come to a Certain knowledge how farr he intends to satisfie this debt, 'ere we draw up our intended advices for Bombay, that the Honorable President & Councill may the better determine how to proceed with him. The Chief therefore proposes sending a Company's Servant immediately thither with his Letter to remain there, in the manner of an Arrest upon him, untill such time as he either pays the money, or We find it Necessary he should be withdrawn, and Mr. Hugh Howard offering his service on this Occasion, 'tis AGREED that we dispatch him to Burgorah early in the morning with the Chiefs

The Chief's Ola to Boyanore Viz^t.

THURSDAY
16th.

After M^r. Adams had at severall times wrote you concerning your Debt to the Honorable Company, and you as often making Excuses therein, you did in fine on my Arrivall here by your Ministers promise us Twenty five thousand Fanams by the 15th. Aprill, and the remainder on the Conclusion of this present month but no part of this being Complied with, I wrote you twice, and have had answers thereto Very Contrary to your promise, Therefore having Notice of your being at Burgorah, I send you this by M^r. Howard one of the Council with the Second Linguist who go to Comply with the orders of the Generall of Bombay for the obtaining this Debt, to whom you may pay the full sum Owing the Honorable Company, taking his receipt for the same, by which means you will preserve the good understanding that is between us, and animate them to assist you at other seasons of your Necessitys, but if you Deviate from this, we shall be obliged to signifie to the Generall of Bombay your resolution, so that 'tis now in your power to Chuse means most Convenient for you.

This morning M^r. Hugh Howard proceeded to Burgorah Accompany'd with the second Linguist a Corporall and Eight men of our Garrison soldiers, agreeable to our yesterdays resolution carrying with him the Chiefs Letter to Boyanore.

FRIDAY
17th.

This Evening received a Letter from M^r. Hugh Howard advising of his safe Arrivall at Burgorah, where he was informed by one of Boyanore's Ministers, that he was two Leagues inland, whither he repaired and delivered him the Chiefs Letter about eight in the morn^g. after perusing of which he told him, he would see him again, but instead thereof, sent for the Linguist about Ten, told him he was under many obligations to pay the Company's money, withall assuring him it was not in his power to do it before September next, when he would not faile to discharge the whole, the Linguist told him M^r. Howard's orders were to stay till the money was paid, on which, he replied, he might stay or go, but before that time he would not pay the Money, & affirmed the promise made by his Bramine for the payment of Twenty five thousand fanams last Aprill was not by his Order, & that he only sent him with a Compliment to the Chief.

Yesterday morning answered the above Letter directing M^r. Howard to remain with Boyanore 'till Wednesday next when a Conveyance should be sent for his return, though giving him to understand in the Interim that he would not withdraw 'till the money was paid, and in Case he should not be able to Effect anything, he must let them know it is not by any order from hence, but thro' Indisposition, that obliges him to retire.

Hugh Howard of yesterdays Date, Acknowledging, the receipt of that we wrote him; informing us that our Bramine gave him to understand Boyanore was using all means possible to raise money, and had sent four of his Ministers to Collect the same, but in Case they could not raise the Amount, he would rather than fail us within the time Limited, sell his Rice, That one of Boyanores Minist^{rs}. came to him, to learn what answer he had received from us, which he told him was Very dissatisfactory, & that he was Ordered to Continue there, 'till The Honorable Company's mony was paid; The said Minister askt the Linguist, in Case Boyanore discharged half his Debt in Twelve or fifteen days, and the remainder in September whether or no it would Sattisfie us; M^r. Howard gave him to understand, it would not, but that he believed if Boyanore would pay him half now, and give from under his hand to discharge the rest before September, or then at farthest he could prevail on us to Accept those Terms, desiring him to Acquaint Boyanore therewith, that he might know his Sentiments and Accordingly Advise hither.

Answered the foregoing Letter, informing M^r. Boyanore's Ola to the Chief Viz^t.

I have received yours and Considering my Friendship with the Hoñoble Company I did not believe on this Occasion to be so Streightned, what I owe, someway or other 'tis Necessary I pay, but I hope you will afford me some Small time since I promise you a Very speedy discharge, I desire you will recall the people you have here, and if you have no faith in me, you may direct four to remain.

The Chief's Answer to Boyanore Viz^t.

I Received your Letter, and Considering the Friendship I always understood you was willing to preserve the Hon^{ble}. Company; I little expected you would have given me Occasion to Execute those Measures of which you so much complain, and which I through the orders I have must continue to put in Force untill you give me some reason to engage me to the Contrary; if the Presence of our people is so disagreeable to you; you have effectually means in your own power to send them away to our Mutuall Sattisfaction and untill you think fitt to fullfill your promise concerning the payment of your Debt to the Hoñoble Company, I am determined to do nothing Contrary to what you now Experience.

Instant by our Nayrs Express with One thousand Seven Hundred Ninety nine rupees and One Hundred sixty six Venetians, & his Account of the Severall Sums paid & received; he learns from the Governour of Callicut, the Samorine will pay the Sum promised us by the end of June as he is about raising One Hundred thousand Fanams for a Government Granted lately;—The three Trees formerly directed to be provided are in readiness Two of which are sawed into plank of three Inches, the other remains for our Orders; The Letter sent for the Samorine is forwarded and when an answer comes he will dispatch it forthwith, as also Notice when the Queen Mother arrives at Callicut. This Evening Mr. Hugh Howard return'd from Boyanore assuring us he had During his stay with him, used all possible means to induce his paying a Considerable Sum on Account his debt, but as he found all his Arguments of little Effect, he D^o. DIE

was obliged at last (finding it to no purpose to stay longer) to Accept of Five Hundred & one rupees, Fifty eight Icarree Pagodas, Two Gubbers & eight Tarr, amounting in all to Three thousand Five hundred fifteen fanams, and a promise under Boyanore's hand in an Ola to the Chief as follows.

"I have delivered M^r. Howard Seven Hundred three rupees, by the 4th. of June
"I will send you Two thousand rupees more, & I engage to pay off the remaining
"part in all August."

Yesterday Evening the Prince Cunhi Homa came to the Fort to Vissit the Chief, who, after the Usual Compliments past, and some discourse relating to the repeated outrages of the Moors, expressing his hopes of the Hon^{ble} Company's assistance & favours, which the Chief assuring him of in the Usual manner, the want of Small Coins was represented to him, and how greatly hereabouts our people suffer thereby it being impossible to gett more than Thirteen Tarr for a fanam whereas they ought to be Sixteen, this he promised to Reddress in two or three Months;—And then the Chief proceeded to move to him the Expeuce, We have been a long time at in maintaining the Hill of Tirimalla, which now, through our Agreement with the French is become of no further Use, but instead of giving a Direct answer to this, he prest to know the reason of M^r. Adams going away without taking his leave of him, and as he always behaved with great Candour and Civillity to the Country in Generall, and to his Family in particular, he must believe his abrupt departure was oweing to some ill usage, observing withall, if a man of Such Integrity was so ill Treated by those whom he has served faithfully, there could be no Confiding in the Hon^{ble} Company; The Chief gave him just reasons to perswade him M^r. Adams had met with no unkind Treatment at his hands; but this not Satisfying him and Night approaching he moved to go away, which the Chief gave way to, in order to meet again, Very Speedily; & the Present agreed on in our last Consultation was Accordingly made seemingly to his great Satisfaction.

This morning the Prince came to the Fort, & after informing the Chief of the ill Success he has had in his design of Seizeing the riches of a famous Mosque Inland (through the baseness of the Nombiers) desired his Advice whether it was proper to see the King of Cotata in his return home since he was Certain he should be prest to part with half of the Island of Durmapatam to him agreeable to the Terms settled between them at the Commencement of the Warr with the Moors; As this is a point which in future may greatly Concern us 'twas thought proper to stick to the same Advice before given the Prince to give the King no disgust at present, but call on him in the way, taking care by Arguments to Induce him to stay 'till the Warr is over for the divission, since 'tis in doubt yet which Party will be the most fortunate in the End, it not being impossible but the Seals may turn on the return of Ally Rajah from Moco, & said Island retaken; he seemed satisfied with this & resolved to Execute it Accordingly;—The Chief then desired him to remember his promise of Coining a Number of Tarrs & desired to know if Curringhoda had Addressed him, to Mediate with us in his behalf, & what answer he had given him, He replied that he Curringhoda has Expressed an Entire submission to him & a dependance to Settle the misunderstanding with us, but that he gave him no further encouragment than that he would just let us know his willingness to Accomodate, believing withall we shall insist on some Considerable Satisfaction, 'ere we resign the Ground which he seems to expect, and which he through his Turbulency gave us Oecasion of taking from him; The Chief told him he shall be always ready to improve the Tranquillity of the Country, and Curringhoda might come here when he thought fitt to discourse on his Affairs; The Prince then moving to go the Usual Present of Twelve Rupees was given him at his departure.

Two of our Callicutt Nayrs arrived here this morning and brought with them Two English Men named John Sample & Tho^s. Moody who give us an Account of their having Deserted from Fort S^t. Davids and that they came over land from thence to Callicutt;—Our Linguist there in his Letter under the 29th. Ult^o. received this day Acquaints us, that he has disburs'd thirty Seven fanams for travelling Charges & provission for the aforesaid two English-men,—He says that some of the Samorines Ministers now in Callicutt assure him that the first Ola will be fully discharged in August and that Money is Actually gathering in for that purpose, that he has not yet been able to make up the Account of the Private Customs the Customaster being absent from Callicutt but that he will sett about them so soon as he arrives being dayly expected there, He says it is Necessary We send down the old Ola which is to be discounted out of the English Customs or that the Minister will not give us a new one for the remainder unless he has the old one ready to interchange—In another short Letter of this date he encloses us his Account disbursments for last month Amounting to Callicutt fanams three Hundred fourteen & Nine Vis, and the Samorines ola to the Chief Translate of which is as follows Viz^t.

Samorines Ola.

Your Letter was delivered me and I will make good without any demurr the remainder of the fanams that become due this year, being at this present time taking the Necessary measures to adjust this payment, I would not have you uneasy at the delays which have happen'd, neither will you have Occasion to Complain to Bombay on this head.

I suppose you are not forgetfull of the discourse We had with M^r. Adams when he went hence concerning the friendship and good agreement which I desire may Subsist between us, and as I observe the English Traffick in Callicutt to be much diminshed, I hope you will put it on the Same footing as formerly.

Callicutt and delivered them there, when a new one is given for what remains unpaid when this Account is Settled, as the Same is now about finishing, We now agree to send said Ola to our Linguist there, the risque appearing to us so Very inconsiderable, never having yet experienced any miscarriages of that kind.

Nelleseraon Maim & Feckun Cuttiassem on the 3^d. Ult^o. were seized & brought to the Fort for a Felonious theft Comitted the preceding Night at the Banksall of Chatoo Chittie in this Buzzar of a Parcell of Iron barrs, some Rice near a Bale & an half; The servant of Chatoo Chittie appearing before us this day, declares he found Nelleseraon Maim with a part of said Iron at the Shops endeavouring to dispose of it, and observing it to be his Masters, demanded where he had it, who after some Equivocations Confessed he took it from under the Sand, where he had seen Feckun Cuttiassem bury it just after his having stole it from the aforesaid Banksall; These Fellons being brought before us this day, and the Heads of the Moors being present at their Examination, the aforesaid Feckun Cuttiassem Confessed that he did actually enter under the Eves of the Banksall, and slid the bolt of the door by which means he gott in, and from thence carryed about Thirty five Iron Barrs, and buried them in the Sand, there to remain 'till a Convenient Occasion offered for carrying them away, but the Rice he took with him to his House directly; The other prisoner Nelleseraon Maim also Confesses he took 15 Barrs from the Place he had seen the other bury them and did Carry them to sale the next day in the Buzar where he was Seized by the Servant of Said Chatoo Chittie, the Continual Robberys put us under a Necessity of putting some remedy thereto, and therefore agree for Example to deliver up the greatest Felon Feckun Cuttiassem to the Prince in order for his punishing him as the Nature of the Crime deserves and the other (as his guilt bears no proportion to the other) to have him three Several times publickly whipt in the Buzzar for a terror to the rest.

The Account of Sallary due to the Honoble Companys Servants at this Settlement from the 19th. Sept^r. 1727 to the first of Ins^t. inclusive amounting to rupees 1309 ^{qr. 1000} 1 79 is now laid before the Board & Examined, Directed that the Chief discharge the same out of the Treasury;—Examined & passed the follow^g. Acco^{ts}. as Entered hereafter Viz^t.

The Treasury Acco^t. of Cash & Bullion; The Paymaster his Acco^t. disbursm^{ts}. the Extraordinary therein mentioned under the Head of Fortification & house repairs being what we could not possibly provide against, the falling in of our Wells, & the Damage done by the Rains, to our Outposts besides the Expence of Olas to prevent greater, being Charges we could no ways avoid.

The Warehousekeeper & Storekeeper their Accounts of Receipts and Issues.

One of the Bramine Messengers being at this time thought an unnecessary person 'tis AGREED we strike him of the beginning of this month, and that we entertain the two Europeans lately arrived from Fort S^t. Davids at the usuall allowance of such in our Garrison as we shall in a small time more be able when the Sea is open and the weather breaks up to disband some others less usefull.

Bourdenay from Mocho with a Cargo of One thousand Eight Hundred Bales of Coffee Account the French Company whom we expected would have proceeded to Mihie and thereby given us an Opportunity to have sent Duplicate of our advices to Madras which were preparing for that purpose but Contrary to our Expectation she stood off to Sea directly her Cap^t. having been ashore at Mihie and staid there no longer than three hours, by her we learn that the Juddah ships detain'd last year were released and sent to Madras, and the Walpole and Briggantine were Arrived there, the latter being dispatcht to Bengall with the agreeable news of Success there, as well in their Trade, as their other Negotiation with that Government, We likewise learn that the Prince Frederick was arrived at Mocho from Great Brittain with Supracargos to procure Coffee which was at Eighty Dollars q Baharr, this ship having fallen in with a Frenchman of Sixty Guns off Cape Bona Esperance bound for Pondicherry. WEDNESDAY 10TH.

This day sent a Letter to our Callicutt Linguist with Duplicates of our Advices to the Hon^{ble} President and Council at Madras under the 9th. directing him to forward the same thither by good Pattamarrs, taking care there be four days difference in their dispatch. THURSDAY 11TH.

The Cardamum Chests are making up of which 15 are done, but those who sold the Plank ar hindred Complying with their bargain through the extraordinary loss in the Teak Trees few of which affording plank of the Dimensions agreed for.

Ultimo Acknowledging the receipt of ours under the 8th. said Month with our advice to the Honoble President & Council of Bombay, which they inform us to have dispatcht thither the 23^d. by such persons, as give them no room to doubt of a safe and speedy arrivall there.

The Chief Acquaints the Board on his having notice that the Callicutt Bramines had dispersed sundry of their Agents in the Country hereabouts in order to Secure all the Pepper they could for Transportation to Callicutt where it is now in great demand and that the aforesaid Bramines had Actually offered Seventeen Venetians this Candy, which put him on Measures to gain a Certain knowledge of the quantity our Chittie was inclinable to Contract with us for, the better to secure the same before it is known what the Callicutt Merchants are willing to give, and accordingly we find he is unable to give us more than Three Hundred Candys and not at less than Sixty two & a half Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ Candy for which he demands immediate payment and refuses Pagodas,—His Brother being sent hither on this Occasion, and attending without is accordingly call'd in, who after all the Arguments We could use, to induce him to let us have it at our former price of Sixty one rup^s. could not be prevailed on to recede in any wise from what he had first offer'd either with respect to the price, or our advancing him the money, foreseeing therefore the bad Influence these other demands will have on the Price of this Comodity as well as the Quantity We are positively ordered to Secure, We do resolve to Contract with him on the foregoing Conditions Viz^t. For three hundred Candys of Pepper to be delivered us in all August next at the rate of $62\frac{1}{2}$ ru[p]^s. $\frac{3}{4}$ Candy rating them as usual in payment for Pepper, and he to take Eight Hundred bales of our Rice at $12\frac{1}{2}$ Rupees $\frac{3}{4}$ bale in part of this Contract, which the Warehousekeeper is ordered to deliver him Accordingly.
