November, and to Load on this Ship the Timber & Plank provided for Gombroon Factory with the Utmost Expedition, which We did suppose would be all ready by the 21<sup>st</sup>. Ins<sup>t</sup>.

MONDAY 16<sup>TH</sup>, Lre from Dom<sup>2</sup>. Rodrigues Our Head Linguist Domingos Rodrigues returning from Callieut acquaints us by Letter, that before his Departure thence, he had a Meeting with the Head Customaster, & Secretary of that Port who Disputed with him concerning the Interest becoming Due on the Second Payment alledging the same ought not to be Calculated but from the 1st. of May, whereas the Ola Bears Date the 1st. Aprill 1729, however they did at last seem to be over persuaded by his reasons. Receiv'd likewise a Letter from Francisco Dias our Callicut Linguist, acknowledging [to] have receiv'd from the former the Samorine's Original Ola for Six hundred Sixty eight thousand One hundred Twenty two Fanams, & Four Tar of Callicutt.

This Evening received a Letter from our Callicutt Linguist, wherein he gives us to understand, that by reason of the Bad Weather he had not been able to Load on Board the Monmouth, the Timber, & Plank ready provided sooner that the remaining would be in a Readyness by the time s<sup>d</sup>. Ship return'd from Cochin: As to the Pepper We Orderd him to provide, he says there is but a very trifling Quantity of the Old in Callicutt, & that at so high a Price as Seventy seven Rupees & an half & Candy. He likewise Encloses us a Letter from Captain Montgomery of Ship Monmouth Dated the 20th. Inst. wherein he Informs us, that he had taken aboard all the Timber & Plank that was ready, & that he was obliged to proceed to Cochin for Provisions & Refreshments none being procurable in Callicutt, his Ships Company in a very Sickly Condition; but that he would make all possible Dispatch back again.

The Advices received from Cannanore this Day being taken into Consideration Which is now The Chief observ'd to the Board, he could not help remarking the Prince's Behaviour taken into in so hastily Striking up a Peace with the Canarees without making us acquainted tion. with the Particulars, & that he doubted our Honble Masters Interest was not at all Consulted on this occasion, it appearing to him that Sd. Prince being Disappointed of the Succours he expected from us, might be so far Enraged, as rather to Incite the Canarees to molest us, than otherwise.

As it seems to us necessary that the Honble President & Council of Bombay be immediately acquainted with this Unhappy Turn of Affairs: Agreed We forthwith advise them Express by way of Goa, recommending our Letters there to the ViceRoy or the Council for the time being to be forwarded in the most Safe & Expeditious Bombay by a manner they can.

By a Bramine Express, the Chief received a Letter from the Prince Cunhi Homo, in Substance as follows.

WEDNES-DAY 25TH.

That finding himself abandon'd by all, and none were Inclinable to Stand by him, he found himself in danger of loosing his whole Country; that therefore he prefer'd Homo Conthe Peace he made, to so uncertain and unequal a Contest—That Judging our Honble of the Mactions which he Peace with Masters were his Friends, he had Severall times Signified to us, the Motives which he the Canarees. thought sufficient to Induce us to Assist him on this Criticall Occasion, to which We always gave him for answer, that we could not openly Engage in anything of this kind without Express Orders from our Superiours at Bombay; That since he could not longer Support himself under such Delays, he found it Necessary to do, what already done; Nevertheless, if hereafter the Honble Company can do anything for him, that may better tend to the Conservation of his Country, he shall willingly Accept the same; After this, he says, he believes the Canarees are going against Cananore, the rest he refers 'till his coming to Tellicherry, which will be in a few days.

The Bramine Messenger, who brought the aforesaid Letter, having been privy to the Articles Concluded on between the Prince and Canarees, gave us the following Information.

That the Prince on Saturday last accompany'd with Fifteen Hundred Nayrs, and Further the most Principal of his Subjects, passed the River Billiapatam, where he was received by the Canaree Army who shew'd him such respect as is only due to Kings, Bramine and correct him to a rich Tent where Responds to Canaree General came out to and carryed him to a rich Tent where Ragonatt the Canarce Generall came out to receive him. The particulars of the Treaty then Concluded are these.

#### OCTOBER 1782 -

Partioulars of the Treaty between the Prince & Canarees.

That the Country to the No. ward of Billiapatam, as far as Nelleasaron is to be Governed by the Prince Cunhi Homo who is to pay such an Yearly acknowledgement to the King of Bednure as shall be hereafter Agreed on, and thought possible to be raised without Encroaching too far on the Abilitys of the People. That in the aforesaid Country his Carnatick Majesty shall have leave to Build three Forts, One at Madacano, another at Caia and a third at Nelleasaron. That from the River of Billiapatam to the Southward, his Carnatick Majesty had not, nor was to have the least pretension thereto, but was only to serve the Prince with his force thereby Obliging. all his Rebell Subjects to submit to his Royall Will, and that their Army should be wholly at the Obedience and Disposal of the Prince Cunhi Homo; This Agreement being made, was afterwards Sworn to, by both Partys before two of their Religious men, then Olas were Signed and Interchanged. Immediately the Prince gave Order that the whole Army should pass the River Billiapatam, and Joyn his Forces on the Counter side in Order to Rase the Buzar of Cananore, which was immediately obey'd by Ragonatt, and put in Execution; The whole Army afterwards Decamping and Passing the River bent their march towards Cananore, which being Destroy'd, as he Supposes it must be in a few days, it is not yet known, nor hath the Prince yet declared whither or no his next attempts will be on the King of Cotata, or what other Country.

By a Message from our Broker Chautoo Chittee 'its represented to us, that the French Agents have been so very busic for some days past in the Country about Agar, giving out money for the new Crop of Pepper, that they were not only likely to deprive him of the greatest part of what expected, but also to raise 'its price to a pitch scarce hitherto known, and therefore recommended our taking the same under our Consideration, otherwise we should in a great measure be disappointed of the growth of that Country.

Cardamum Merch<sup>‡</sup>. fails in his Contract. Our Linguist likewise acquaints us, that the Cardamum Merchant named Cunhiseu, notwithstand[ing] his promise to let us have the whole Crop, had yesterday in a Letter signifyed to him, he could not Comply with his word being Engaged by the Heiress of Cananore to serve the Dutch in that Affair Prior to any one else, in Lieu of some particular favours she had received from them.

As touching the first of these Evils, We are to remark, that the French have not untill now, taken upon them in so open a manner to Trade in that part of the Prince's Country well knowing our Title thereto, and the risque of being opposed therein by said Prince, whose Affairs being now on the Decline, may probably Encourage them to Invade our Property in the manner they have always done, when they Judge it practicable, 'Tis likewise observable that on Occasions like these, and to prevent Pepper from being Exported from Boyanore's Country they have Constantly placed Guard Boats in Order to Seize what might be carry'd away Contrary to their License, and that they cannot surely take it amiss in us, were the like put in Practice, where undoubtedly our Honble Masters have so much better pretentions.

Resolution Concerns, the French. Having therefore so good an Argument to Support us, AGREED we place our Smack and Two tonys, with a Detatchment of our Garrison Soldiers, to Cruize between the Point of Agar and the River Trentapatam, in order to prevent any Pepper or Cardamums from being Exported from the Country within that Distance.

Les Order'd to be wrote ye. Cardamum ORDER'D likewise that the Linguist write the Cardamum Merchant Cunhuiseu a shap [sic] letter, letting him know that We Deem him answerable to Our Honble

Masters for the present Crop of Cardamums, agreeable to his promise, that on Failure thereof, we shall immediately proceed against him according to the Custom of the Country.

The Commands reced yesterday from our Superiours at Bombay being again reperused, The more Effectual and Speediest Method for obtaining the Large Quantity of Pepper wanted for the Three Ships intended home this Season was taken into Consideration; & allowing for our Remains now in Warehouse to be One thousand and Thirty one Candys or thereabouts as well as for what the Marlborough received here at Cochin & Anjengo being Nine Hundred & Ten Candys, there will be Defficient for the aforesaid three Ships One thousand three Hundred fifty Seven Candys besides Twelve Hundred Ordered to be provided for the Compton on her return to China and the Two expected next Season from England being Fifteen Hundred more.

Debating on the means for procuring the immediate Quantity required; It is of Pepper Order'd taken observed that there is none of the old Crop remaining, nor will it be possible for us to order'd taken book to the latter end of January, & therefore we can hardly hope to weigh'd 'till towards the latter end of January, & therefore we can hardly hope to Dispatch the intended Ships home Sconer than the 15th. February nor even then should it so unfortunately happen that the Canarees in Conjunction with the Prince carry their Army into Cotata and the Country adjacent, which will inevitably stop Trade in Generall, & We still labour under greater difficultys from the French having dispersed their money throughout the Country for the Purchase of this Commodity without even ascertaining any price; and our Linguist who is perfectly Versed in the Country & entirely attatcht to our Honble Master's Interest, Concurrs with us in this our Opinion.

Our Superiours having now repeated their Direction for the providing the Quantity of Cardamum Annually required; The Linguist was call'd in and Ordered to procure all that is possible for our Hofible Master's Account.

As it is Very apparent there is the most Extraordinary Coldness on the side of the Prince Cunhi Homo towards us, having received no Letters, or Message from him since October last; It is thought absolutely Convenient in Order to obtain the good understanding so indispensibly necessary and without which our Honble Masters affairs must in Generall be entirely Impeded that the Chief write him a Complimentary Letter, acquainting him of this Arrival, with the desire he has, as well from his personall acquaintance with him, as from the known regard he has always Shewn to our Honble Masters; That the former good understanding be Establish'd, & that nothing shall be wanting on his part towards obtaining the Publick Tranquility.

The Honble President & Councill of Bombay in their Letter of the 11th. October last, are pleased to Direct that what Gold should be deliver'd us by the abovementioned Supra Cargos, should be sold by us to the best advantage, and timely Notice given them of its produce; in Order to which the Shroffs of Cotata and Callicutt, as well as some Merchants attended to give in their Proposals for the purchase thereof, and by what we are able to learn, Supposing we should divide it in small parcells, it would fetch very near the Price in former times of Three Hundred Sixty four Rupees for Ten Tale weight, which is as much as it has been Its Supposed known to sell for here, though if We were to Compute it at Nineteen and an half Vallue here. Fanams Callicutt & Museall, and those at four & five Eighth the Rupee, which is the present Rate of Exchange it would not yeild more than Three hundred fifty five rupees & one fifth for Ten Tale weight; This Difference arises from the scarcity of Gold little or none having been sold here for some time past, However, though we might Justifie the Vending thereof agreeable to the Orders We received, yet as The Sale of Mess. Starke and Plant have Signified to us by Letter Dated yesterday, that it will be deforred to as they apprehand sell to much greater advantage in Madras, We are unanimously of Opinion it will be more Eligible to keep it by us, 'till we have farther Directions from our Superiours at Bombay Concerning the same, as We shall be in no want of Money to carry on our Investme. of Pepper.

Discours held wth, the French. The French Chief of Mihie with the second and third of Councill, coming Yesterday morning to pay a Complementary Vissit to the Chief, He informs us, that in the discourse held with them at times, they seemd greatly to Lament the present distracted Condition of the Country about us through the progress of the Canarees, and the rather as without some Effectual means were taken to prevent it, they must in all likelyhood be Masters of the Country.

They signifyed the Moors of Cananore are desirous of Clapping a Seperate Peace with the Canarees, Excluding entirely the Prince, which if Effected will undoubtedly in the Issue strengthen the Power of the Conquerors, and in a great measure Contribute to the Reduction of the Sundry Potentates about us, the Consequence of which must be, the leaving our Trade to their Avaritious pleasure, but if this is prevented, the Canarees will soon find many difficultys, & great Expence will attend them, and very soon render them tired of their present undertaking. That We may come to a better knowledge of the designs of the Canarees, and what will be most agreeable to our Prince, It was proposed they should sound the former, and We the latter, after which to Concert together such means as may in the end Oblige the Canarees to retire to their own Country; Assuring us they would very heartily endeavour in Conjunction with us to accomplish an Affair so imediately tending to the publick good in Generall, and to each of us in particular.

Taking the above into Serious Consideration, We cannot but be highly of Opinion, 'Tis absolutely requisite that a Stop be put to the Treaty now on foot between the Moors of Cananore and the Canarees, as otherwise the Prince's power will be Vastly Weakned & Consequently render him less able to remove the Canarees out of his Country and without which all our Grants, Priviledges & Immunitys must be lost, & perhaps this Settlement Invested by them to the destruction of the Inhabitants, and an Extraordinary Expence to our Honble Masters, and after all, be left in an uncertainty how or in what manner We may carry on our Trade with the Conquerors.

Taken into Consideration,

RESOLVED therefore the Chief write a Letter to the Heads of Ally Rajah's family, representing to them, how Injurious it must be to themselves, in making a Peace with the Canarees, & Excluding their own Sovereign, which he will not fail to revenge as soon as he is able, therefore a little forbearance is Necessary, as We on our parts shall endeavour to Reconcile things in a way much more advantageous to them.

It has been Generally our Maxim here, never to introduce the French into Affairs where the Interest of our Prince is imediately concern'd, least they should Ingratiate themselves with him, and thereby become Competitors with us in the Trade, which on this side of the Country We solely are Entitled to; but in the present Occasion, as We have little or no Communication with the Canarees and felt many Instances of their ill Treatment, we Conceive that of ourselves it will be impossible to Establish the desired Tranquility, which can no otherwise be obtained, than by getting the Canarees out of the Country, after sundry debates thereon.

RESOLVED that from time to time hereafter We endeavour in Conjunction with the French to bring this. Important Point to a good Issue, and that We Confer together thereon as often as is Necessary observing the due Caution in everything undertaken, so as that the end obtained may prove to the Interest of our Honble Masters which We have Entirely at heart.

The Chief lays before the board a Letter reced from Ragounat the Canaree Letter reced from Ragounat the Canaree Letter reced from Bombay of our intentions Ragounate to preserve the good understanding which he says Subsists between us, and that in Order thereto, our Superiours had thought fitt to appoint a new Chief here, he therefore Congratulates him on his arrival, and Wonders he has not thought fit to send the Customary Message to him, hopeing we shall behave otherwise in future, and that as he is Encampt for the laying a Seige to Cananore & not able to move from it, desires the Chief will come to him, to talk of sundry affairs of Importance.

We are now to Consider what answer to return to the above Letter, and first we are all sensible, that for some time past, We have been Very ill Treated in all the Canaree Forts and Latterly wholly deny'd the liberty of Exporting Rice therefrom to the great Damage & inconvenience of this Settlement, and without some speedy remedy is apply'd, We shall this year be in no Condition of providing for our Subsistance; This usage is the rather to be wonder'd at, as We have given no Cause whatever for it; and that We may come to a Speedy knowledge of the manner they propose to behave towards us in future.

AGREED we give them for answer, that the Chief being but lately arrived, and Answer sundry weighty affairs requiring his attendance here 'tis impossible for him to him agreed on. [sic] the Vissit he Expects, and withall that since he assures us of maintaining a good understanding with our Nation, We are at a loss to account for the ill Treatment We have lately been subjected to at their Ports even to the forbidding our carrying on any Trade there, whether the same prohibition is to be Continued or not, We desire to be positively and speedily informed, that We may then be able to Judge if they are the Friends they profess themselves to be or not.

The Chief summons this meeting to represent to the Board the advices Just now received of the Canarees having Vigorously attack'd the Southermost of Ally Rajah's Forts, but were repulsed with loss, and a great body of the Army enter'd the Country of Randoo Tarra, disturbing the Inhabitants in such a manner as obliged many of them to leave their dwillings, and their Pepper growing on the Trees.

We cannot but be all sensible, should the Canarees Continue thereabouts, it will be impossible for us to provide for the Tonnage required of us for the shipping bound home this season, and more over the money now in the Hands of our Chitty living at Agarr in great danger of being wholly lost, 'Tis from this part of the Country We expect to make our provission of Pepper and some little from a place called Bengatt scituate inland & Bordering on the River Trentapatam, the Communication to which must be very soon cutt off, should the Canarees Continue to frequent the parts about Agarr.

Our Honble Masters have been at Very great Expence in securing this part of the Pepper Trade, and 'tis Very Melancholy to have so bad a Prospect before us of its being in a great measure lost or Exposed to the Exorbitant Dutys which the Canarees in all likelyhood will lay on it so as to render these Settlements not worth maintaining.

Our Prince seems to have nother View at present, than to take a full Revenge on the Moors, and the other Powers, which have fail'd in their assistance to him in the time of his Necessity, so that Notwithstanding all our endeavours, We have not been able as yet to prevail on him to Commisserate the Calamitous Condition of the Country, which as 'its Sovereign, he ought to protect, We are fearfull of offending him, and yet all that is Valluable to us seems to be at the last stake, Our present Consideration therefore under these Circumstances must be how to preserve the remaining part of our Trad [sic] and that can be no otherwise done, as We apprehend, than by keeping the Canaree Army out of the parts adjacent to Agarr.

The Two Galvets we have here will be sufficient with a proper Detatchment of our Garrison Soldiers; to prevent any Provissions or Warlike Stores being thrown in for the support of the Canaree Army about Agarr but should We apply this Remedy, the Prince Very likely may be offended there at, and perhaps the French on application made to them by the Canarees may either supply them with Provission themselves, or give Convoy to their Vessells in hopes from such a piece of service to Ingratiate themselves so as to obtain Certain Priviledges from them should they become Masters of this Country, to prevent which as much as in us lies.

First, both the French & We agreed, the stay of the Canarees in these parts is absolutely Opposite to the Interest of both our Companys, and to remove whom there were but Two ways offer'd, either Peace obtain'd by Treaty, or applying Arms, which latter seem'd almost unavoidable, as there could be little hopes of their being brought to Relinquish their Pretensions to a Country they had already in a great measure subdued.

To render our Arms successfull 'tis highly Necessary We have the assistance of Sohome the Prince as well as the Moors, Joyn'd by land, and then We, in Conjunction with Expells. the French can easyly stop the Provissions now Continually brought the Canarees by Country. Sea, and their army being Very numerous as well as a great Number of Horses Cammels, Elephants, & Oxen for burthen to feed, in a Very few days We Conceive they must be obliged to Decamp and return to their own Country and without this is Effected, We must in all appearance be disappointed of the Pepper required from us this Season, and render'd unable to purchase any in Future without Submitting to such Exorbitant Dutys as We believe will by no means answer the purchaseing thereof, and if so, as We have before observed these Settlements will become a Dead Charge to our Honoble Masters, and it will be well if we are not attack'd by them in an Hostile manner thereby bringing on them an Immense Charge as well as Terrifying our inhabitants so as to Compell them to fly from us, which must lay us under the greatest Difficultys imaginable.

The Consequence of our using the premention'd Method with the Canarees, can The Conseonly as We Conceive Induce them to deny the French and us the Liberty of their quences Ports and as the French, notwithstanding they are at present pretty well Stock'd Considered. with Rice, yet in Future they must be in want thereof; They therefore proposed, That in such Case, We mutually assist each other to the best of our power Rating it only at the Prime cost with the Charges Incident thereon, and that neither of us Conclude any agreement with the Canarees without each Party being mutually admitted, and if Force be Necessary to obtain it, that We Join together for that purpose.

The foregoing Proposals We apprehend, to be Very Just, therefore do agree to Ratify them after We have sounded the Prince & Moors, taking care that as this undertaking is as much for the benefit of one as the other, the burthen lyes Equally each furnishing the same number of Men and Vessels to be paid by their respective Masters; providing also that if the Moors, should seem averse to the satisfying of our Prince in such Demands as are reasonble, that We Joyntly Compell them thereto, which we believe may Very easily be done by proper Arguments.

RESOLVED therefore We send Orders, for their retireing to Agar, and that We our vessells endeavour to bring the Moors to the Prince's Terms; and Embrace the present offer of withdrawn from Agar. the Canarees for obtaining a supply of Rice from their Ports, and that all the Vessells We can procure be gott in readiness forthwith for that purpose, and that We Signifie the same to the Prince, and give him a proper Present, and a small one to the Canaree Messengers.

We cannot help observing the fickleness and inconstancy of these people, who notwithstanding the Articles Enter'd into with us, do now in so peremptorily and possitive a manner declare the whole to be Void, however, We hold it proper to dissemble our Resentment and have recourse to Expostulations, and 'tis AGREED We write them to the following purport.

Answer'd,

That the Chief possitively denys his having signifyed any Impossibility of Gaining the Prince to our side; but on the Contrary said he would have things in readiness as soon as could be, and to prevent any Jealousy between him and the Canarees, persisted on our withdrawing our Vessells; That we Enter'd into Terms with them, with the greatest Chearfullness, honesty & Sincerity with Views imediately tending to their Interest as well as our own and it cannot but surprize us to find them attempt oversetting a design which had taken up so much time to Deliberate on, That it is no new thing to find the best designs frustrated for want of Confidence, which we plainly observed to be the present Case with them, and on which subject We could say a great deal, but chuse rather to waite for an Opportunity to discourse with them Calmly and moderately thereon.
