Received a Letter from our Callicut Linguist accompanying his Accounts for the past Year closed to the 31st Ultimo which being examined, are found to be right. He notifies that an Arrest on the Mother Queen is continued & he is not without hopes of recovering the Amount she stands indebted. He likewise acquaints us of his having wrote the Samorine, to satisfie speedily the payment of One hundred thousand Fanams he stood engaged should be made good last month; and that s^d. Samorine in his answer promised to deliver us the same as soon as possible, though the Linguist apprehends, he shall not have it till sometime in October as before then, The scheme for raising it is not likely to take effect. Paramby one of the Ministers wrote him also to the same purport, adding that he has our Interest much at heart, though we believe he is chiefly influenced by the promise we made him to pay 3 ⁽²⁾ Cent on the Sums we may hereafter obtain from the Samorine.

Answerd the above Letter, enjoining the Linguist to exert his endeavours in the points mentiond to us, and that he acquaints us, whether the sending a Person from hence to the Samorine, may facilitate the promised payment.

Notice is brought us seeming to carry a probability of truth, that the Canaree Army are decampd from the place they were at, & are seated near the Princes Fort of Madday with a view to subdue the same, or cut off its Communication, & afterwards to approach our Fortress of Madacarra lying within the River Billiapatam, there to Erect a Battery on the Point of Mattamy for Commanding the Entrance, which they presume they may be capable of effecting, notwithstanding the Opposition we may make from the s^d. Madacarra being within Gun shott.

By our Agreement with the Canarees, It is expressly inserted that they are not to approach the place of Madacarra aforesaid nearer than half a League and therefore their Executing their project of Fortifying at Mattamy, will be a direct breach of their Articles, and since our submitting tamely thereto will infallibly encourage them in further abuses, The Board are Unanimous in Opinion, we ought to resist them should they make any such attempt.

Reflecting on the Scituation of Madacarra tis observed that though the Guns from thence, will reach the Shore on each side leading into Billiapatam River & may therefore greatly Annoy the Canarees in case they come to the Point of Mattamy which is N°. ward, yet our Efforts may not happen to be effectual in Routing them from the Intrenchments they will attempt to make, nor will it be safe for our Galevats to lye near the shore that way if Cannon is brought by the Canarees against them. The Chief to remedy this, does therefore offer to the consideration of the Board whether it will not be necessary to Erect a small Breast-Work on the S°. thern Point at the Entrance of the River facing that of Mattamy aforesaid, as the Guns from thence, assisted by those of Madacarra, & throwing of shells, may probably disable the Canarees from performing what they intend and moreover, when they perceive us resolute in withstanding their perfidy they will perhaps behave to us suitable to the Conditions stipulated in our Articles; Besides, while we maintain the aforesaid Breast-Work, It will be in our power to succour our Peple, by carrying our

Notice of the Canarees Intentions.

An Expedient proposed by the Chief.

—AUGUST 1737—

Necessaries from the Sea shore over a small neck of Land, lying between that & the River, and so avoid the hazard of entering the Bar in reach of the Canaree shott, admitting them seated on Mattamy.

The Board duly weighing the above, are of opinion, The same will be a good Expedient and may perhaps prove such a Curb to the Canarees, as will discourage them from prosecuting their design. And Therefore,

Directed That the Breast-Work be set about forthwith in the manner proposed, & Guns sent for the same; That our Linguist proceeds to the Prince for exciting him to use all possible Efforts for preserving his place of Madday, & Resolution. assigns a suitable number of Coolies and Coconut Trees for Fabricking the prementioned Breast-Work, and that he be prevailed on to cut down the Trees of Mattamy, for better discovering [it] Likewise, That Capt. William Gibbs repairs to Madacarra, for consulting with the Ensign in command there, how many Men are required for defending the Place against the Canaree Army, consisting of Eight thousand Foot, & Fifteen hundred Horse, and what Provisions & Ammunition can be received into it. Also, That the Dariamous Galevat now lying in Biliapatam River, be Stationed opposite to the Point of Mattamy, for Annoying the Canarees, should they presume to come thereabouts.

Came to hand a Letter from the Honble President & Council at Fort St. SATURDAY George Dated the 2^d. Ultimo, owning the receipt of ours under the 25th. of April $\stackrel{\sim}{\tau}$ Decker. They acquaint us of their having Landed about half the Quantity of Pepper we Loaded on her, and the remainder would be forwarded by them to the President and Council in Bengall.

Our Linguist, agreeable to our Resolution of the 5th. proceeded this SUNDAY Morning to the Prince. 718

Linguist proceeds to the Prince.

DIE

Captain William Gibbs sent to Madacarra, pursuant to our Resolution of DITTO the 5th now returns thence & represents ; That the proposed Work to be Erected on the southern side of Billiapatam River, will probably answer the Ends Capt. Gib returns. intended from it : That our Fortress is in a good posture of Defence as to the Works, but the Mines fabricked therein for preserving the stores, are so damp through the excessive Rains that have fallen. & badness of the Pavement, that there will be a necessity of finding out some Expedient for securing the Ammunition above which is about to be done as scon as possible, and that we must endeavour to lay in such kinds of Provisions as may be required for the Garrison, in case of being closely Attacked. He also gives it as his, and the Ensigns opinion now there, That in order to Defend the Place against the

Force we may suppose the Canarees will bring against it, we ought to assign to the number of Fifty Men, consisting of One Ensign, One Serjeant, Two Corporals, One Drummer, Five of the Gunner's Crue, Fifteen Europeans & Fifteen Topass Centinels; That we must not think of laying in above Sixty Rounds of GunPowder for the Guns, as more than that Quantity cannot be preserved in the present state of the Mines.

Read a Letter from our Linguist now with the Prince wherein he represents, That the Canarees are forming suitable methods for subduing Madday, which if reduced will scon enable them to give Laws to the whole Country from Billiapatam River Nº. ward. To prevent therefore this, as well as the dangers to be dreaded from their attempting to pass further this way, He has repeated. and earnestly inculcated to the Prince to supply the aforesaid Fortress with all manner of Stores forthwith, there being a great want thereof, also to assign a Large Body of Men to Act against the Enemy; But he has the mortification to find an unparalelld Supiness in the Prince, with an invincible Avarice in so much that with all his diligence and application, he cannot procure daily Sustenance to about Eight hundred Nairs, and that for avoiding immediate Mischiefs, He the Linguist has been necessitated to Launch [out] mony, which he hopes we will not suffer him to loose, That He has the rather been induced to it, in expectation of prevailing on the Prince to come to a Peace with the Canarees, on even the severest Terms, rather than to loo[se] the whole Country, which will unavoidably be the Consequence, according to the present management of s^d. Prince~

Taken under consideration. Taking the above into mature Consideration, we must with concern concur with the sentiments of our Linguist, and moreover reflect that should the Canarees Master Madday, they will probably attempt dislodging us from our Redoutt at Madacarra, unless we permit them the free Access to Billiapatam River; If we deny the latter, we shall therefore be again engaged in a War not in our power to support, but by the Issue of immense sums, as from the experience of our Prince we may averr, he will do nothing in opposing the Enemy, and should we, to avoid that Evil, acquiesce with the Canarees demand in their use of the River, The, Prince will loudly complain of our having grossly deceived him, and on that pretence side with the Dutch, or whomsoever, and grant any Priviledges demanded, tending to our detriment, when after all the mony hitherto issued in preserving our Honble Masters Trade, they may find themselves divested thereof in a great measure, On the whole therefore,

RESOLVED, That we direct our Linguist to apply all his Efforts for inducing the Prince to accept of such a Peace from the Canarees, as they may be prevailed on to Grant; And as appearing on the Defensive for some time, may probably render the Conditions somewhat more favourable than they can otherwise be, That He does issue such sums as may be required for the immediate preservation of Madday Fort, which we will reimburse out of the Five thousand Fanams Monthly granted the Prince, or in such a manner, as He the Linguist shall be no sufferer, cautioning him at the same time to be speedy in the application of his endeavours for settling the Peace least we be brought into such an heavy Expence, as we have no reason to believe will be approved of by our

Employers, and that He advises us constantly, how things move also whether the Chiefs Presence can be of any Utility in accomodating Matters, as in such wise he will instantly repair thither.

Received a Letter from our Callicut Linguist in answer to ours of the 5th. SATURDAY which sets forth, that by the End of the Month, he shall be able to judge of the measures taken by the Samorine for discharging the One hundred thousand Letter from Fanams, that ought to have been paid us last Month, and accordingly advise Callicut. us, whether it may be of any use to send one of our Members to him or not.

Received a Letter from our Linguist importing, That he has with the WEDNES. greatest difficulty brought the Prince to listen to a Peace, and that the Canarees do also seem to incline that way, & therefore recommends it to our consideration, whether it may not be necessary for the Chief to repair to Billiapatam in Letter from order to adjust matters if possible. He also advises us, that the Canarees had the Linguist. yesterday stopped all Communication with Madday, and since the want of Provisions and Ammunition there, would soon force a surrender, He had animated the Nairs and Topass Soldiers in the Prince's Service, to attempt dislodging the Enemy from their Trenches, which they accordingly executed with Victory, having killed above an hundred, and opend a Communication to the Soward, though after the Action, the Canarees repossess'd the place they were drove from to the N^o. ward. He has supplie[d] the Fort with some Provisions, but begs we will order with speed sundry sorts of Ammunition to be thrown into the place, as the Prince has none of his own, and without such Assistance, The Fort must soon fall into the Canarees hands.

Answerd the Linguist's Letter, approving of his Conduct and sent away WEDNESthe Ammunition desired for defending Madday.

This Evening the Chief Accompanyd by Mr. Richard Lynch, with an T_{HURS} -Ensign and Detachment of Men repaired to Billiapatam, for settling the DAY proposed Peace if possible between the Canarees & Mallabars.

Imported the Bombay Sloop from Bombay, Roger Woodburne Master, who FRIDAY brought us a Letter from the Honble President & Council dated the 19th. Instant acknowledging the receipt of ours under the 17th of March & Shybar, Letter from 5th 6 9 & 10th April & Cruizers. They approve of our severall Contracts of Bombay Pepper, and Direct, that in case, the Merchants cannot be prevailed on to Sloop. deliver the same in cleaner, we garble it after receiving it into Warehouse, That Durmapatam remains in the present posture, without any additional Works, and that Ten thousand Pounds Weight of Cardamoms the best sort be provided. Touching our proceedings with the Canarees and fortifying Madacarra They will give their sentiments by the Mountague, which Ship will be dispatch'd for this place about the middle of next Month. They also acquaint us, The Morattas continue upon Salsett, are in Beseige of Basseen, and have fortified themselves strongly within the Fortress of Tannah which will oblige them to keep up a sufficient Force to Defend the Island, as severall parts of the River

Received a Letter from the Chief and M^r. Lynch dated yesterday at Madacarra, importing their having with much difficulty adjusted the Peace between the Canarees and Mallabars, in the manner as will be set forth hereafter in the Chiefs &c*. Narrative of their proceedings, That they are to meet the Contracting Parties under our Guns that way tomorrow for exchanging the Articles, and though there are no just grounds to suspect any Treachery may be intended, yet we are desired to consider of the present State of this Garrison, and after providing for the security thereof in the most effectual manner, we may reinforce them with an officer, Drum and Colours, with such few Men as can be safely spared, to enable them to make a suitable appearance on the occasion, as well as provide for their's and the Prince's preservation.

After observing the contents of the precited Letter, and examining our Force here, It was thought proper to send away One Lieutenant, One Serjeant, Twenty private men and a Drum, as they might be conveniently spared, and with this Reinforcement there will be near Sixty Men to attend them at the place of Meeting.

The Chief and M^r. Richard Lynch now present a Narrative of their proceedings, with Translate of the King of Colastree Ola The Articles of Peace, enter'd into with the Canarees as signed and deliver'd by the Prince, and by Surapaya the Canaree Generall, all which being read, are fully approved of by the Board, and placed after this Consultation.

It is represented how unavoidable was the issuing some mony for supporting the Princes Nairs and Topass Soldiers, untill it could be known, whether a Peace might be obtained, as leaving the same to be furnished by him, evidently demonstrated the Enemy might gain extraordinary advantages, and thereby frustrate our project for an Accomodation.

On examining the Accounts of the aforesaid Issues, we find he has had from our Linguist to the amount of Fanams nine thousand Five hundred Forty Prince seven, & Fourteen Vis, and in Military stores from this Settlement, Two thousand six hundred, seventy six and Three vis, both making Fanams Twelve 2676.3. from thousand Two hundred Twenty four and One vis.

The Board Debating on this, are of opinion, That we ought to allow s^d. Debates thereon. Prince the Five thousand Fanams we promised to assist him with (as #) our Consultation of the 5th July last) to be reckoned for August, and then carry the difference of seven thousand Two hundred and Twenty four Fanams, & One vis to his Account,' though we are sorry to observe, what an improbability there is of his discharging it and his former Balance in any reasonable time.

An Account is next presented by the Chief of the Disbursements attending The Ch his Negotiation, importing Fanams Two thousand Four hundred Thirty six and Disburse-ments. Seven vis, which being judged to be very reasonable, and the Charging the Prince with it of little Utility, considering his Large Debt already contracted and that he may expect this Favour from us,

Taking a Survey of our Garrison, & allotting a competent Force for our A Survey of severall Places (excepting Putinha which we think to Raze speedily) It our Garrison taken. appears that we cannot avoid keeping less than Four hundred Thirty four Military in Pay, and having no more than Four hundred and Eight there will still be a necessity of employing the difference in Sepoys, to the number of Twenty five or Twenty six, which being Debated and AGREED to;

Directed, That the Thirty Bombay Seepoys now remaining here of their Resolution Detachment be sent up by the first opportunity, as being indeed very indifferent thereon. in Quality, and that we reserve to compleat the number wanted, such Carrvarellen as signalised themselves formerly in Defending our Honble Masters Factory there, Also that the Crew of the Dariamouse Galevat, and such as have been lately hired for the Tiger Galevat at Callicut, (in expectation of our wanting her) be instantly Discharged, and the Vessels kept ashore, untill we have an opportunity of Transmitting them with Convoy to Bombay; And that it may be seen how we have regulated our Garrisons, ORDER'D that the Plan be enterd at the foot of this Consultation.

GENTLEMEN,

The Chief &ca. their Narrative.

Agreeable to our Consultation of the 13th. we repaired to Billiapatam where we Arrived the 19th and then begun to confer with the Prince, who in fine represented he had no mony to prosecute a Defensive War with the Canarees, as his Subjects were strangely divided, by adhering in part to him, and others to the Fifth King actually in the Interest of the Enemy; He could not therefore depend on the Fidelity of his People and consequently is renderd unable to prevent the Loss of his Country, He could not expect or require further assistance from us, than had been granted, and considering all Circumstances, he should be highly pleased with our concluding a Peace on the most favourable Terms in our power; we acquiesced accordingly with his sentiments, and desired he would cause the Head King to write us an Ola, requesting our Mediating s^d. Peace, and thereby screen us from any unkind Imputations hereafter, for it might be presumed, severall of his subjects may throw on us the severest reflections for being instrumental in assigning a share of the Mallabar Country to the Canarees, even although they gave no Aid for preserving it, and he promised to put us in possession of the Ola we desired.

We next discoursed with our Linguist, and he gave us such a miserable description of the Prince's measures, and extream Avarice, as can scarcely be equalld, and assured us that if he had not launch'd out mony for the daily support of about Eight hundred Nairs, and a few Topasses, the Canarees had certainly reduced Madday, and subdued all to the side of Billiapatam River; He said he had sounded the Canarees, and apprehended a Peace might be attained, but for the present we must submit to the furnishing sustenance to the aforesaid Men, or they must retire, when probably the Enemy would either hearken to no Accomodation; or insist on heavier Terms, than they now do.

On the 20th. The Canarees sent a Messenger to us, and declared the Generall would readily conclude the Peace, provided the Fort of Madday, and the Country N°. ward bordering on that River were relinquished to his King. This was imparted to the Prince, who permitted us to Agree thereto, in case nothing more favourable could be obtained; we dismissed the Messenger, and promised to send M^r. Lynch and the Linguist to Treat with him, whenever he pleased. A Cessation of Arms being to commence the 22^{d} .

On the 23^d. The Messenger returned, and desired M^r. Lynch and the Linguist might proceed on the morrow, which they accordingly did, attended by the Prince's Minister, carrying a Present of Scarlet Cloth, value Sixty two

Rupees & an half, and returned late in the Evening, declaring their having done all in their power for moderating the Conditions demanded; But that the Canarees being in a manner sure of taking Madday, It was impossible to adjust otherwise than as follows. "The Fort to be instantly deliver'd up, with all "the Warlike stores now in the Prince's possession and taken, from the "Canarees, together with such Horses, and Elephants, as he has by him remai- Continued "ning. That the River of Madday separate the Boundaries of each District "vizt. From the N°. ward to be deemed hereafter the Canaree Territories ex-"tending to the Hills inland, and from the Fort S°. ward as far as a place "called Urbelly; That a perfect Friendship be hereafter subsisting between "both, and the Forces of either not to Pass the assigned Limits. The Articles "to be exchanged in the presence of the Canaree General, Prince and Chief on "the 27th at the Point of Matamy lying under our Guns of Madacarra-Our " people had much difficulty in getting over some other Demands made for "paying an Annual Tribute, and laying down a large sum."

The preceeding being communicated to the Prince, He reluctantly submitted, and gave Orders for the speedy vacating Madday which was performed on the 25th. without any Embarrassment from the Canarees, who had brought their Gabions within half musquet shott of the Place, and had Planted a 12.9.6.4. and 3 Pound Gun very near, from which the shott had so ruined the wall, as scarcely left the place tenable.

On the 26th, we proposed to the Canarees to exchange the Articles under Madacarra Fort, thereby avoiding any disaster which might attend the Resort of so many People, who had so lately been butchering each other, but this was not listned to, and the 28th. was therefore AGREED on, to meet on the assigned spot of Mattamy.

Sunday the 28th. On being assured the Canarees would not faile being at the destined place, we Pointed our Guns both from Madacarra, and our Battery, for scouring the same, & stationed the Galevat near the shore; We sent over all the Military, we had joind with sixty five of the Prince's Topasses, and above One thousand Nairs who were drawn up in good Order. The Prince, Chief &c^{*}. lying in a Munchua near, ready to Land on the Generall's coming, But after waiting in the Sun and Rain, till the close of the day, Our messenger sent to hasten his coming, acquainted us that he could not trust us at so advantageous a scituation, having reason to believe what had been inculcated to him by the Moors of our designing to Act a Treacherous part, though at the same time We were alarmed with the like Intelligence, that the Canarees intended to destroy us, and the Prince Finding our meeting for that day overset, we continued. drew off & on Landing met Two messengers from the Generall excusing his failure throug the Rain that had fallen, but after sundry expostulations they were brought to agree to our proposals of the 6th. for exchanging the Articles at our Fort on the Morrow.

The 29.th The same Messengers returned, representing what they had consented to yesterday, could not be complied with, as the Generall could not answer to his King the [sic] not personally meeting the Prince and us. That he would not faile being at the spot assigned on the morrow, but entreated our Tent might be put at a further distance from the Point; we however refused this, as not being so safe for us, and at last they concurred it might be where we pleased, and engaged to send to us Two of their Chief Men on the Morrow to compare the Articles and exchange them.

The 30.th at Noon, the Two Principal Men aforesaid met us at Madacarra. and after comparing the Articles they were exchanged by the Canarees and Prince in our presence, and towards the Evening we met the Generall on the Point of Matamy, who brought with him a great number of People who were so ungovernable, that neither He or his Officers could put them in any Order. The Prince gave some small Presents, and mutual assurances passed of future

Friendship and that when the King's Confirmation arrives, The Guns, Elephants and Horses in being may be deliverd up; we returned back at near six being extream glad at concluding a thing so difficult and hazardous, we took leave of the Prince, and Embarked early on the 31.st for Tellicherry.

Thus you have an Account of our late E'roceedings which being attended with success, we have no reason to doubt will be agreeable to our Superiours, and the Expence attending it chearfully submitted to, as we hope it will be the last of this kind. We are,

But it has since happend, that "they reenter'd the Country, being joyned by the Fifth King of the Palace of "Ody and thereby subdued all to their obedience as far as Madday, where the "English Company mediated a Peace, between us and with which I acknowledge "to be fully satisfied, Declaring by these Presents that I do Commit the "Government of my Kingdom remaining to me unto my Heir aforesaid Odeor-"men of the Palace of Pally; To which you are to bear witness.

Copy of the Articles of Peace between the Canarees and Mallabara. COPY OF THE ARTICLES OF PEACE CONCLUDED BETWEEN THE KINGS OF COLASTREE AND BEDNURE.

I the supreme King of Colastree Declare. That the Canaree Army having enterd my Country in such a manner as hath brought me into streight [s] & difficultys, Do therefore enter on the following Conditions for Establishing the General Tranquility. namely

That from the Fort of Madday Westward to Urbelly Southward, & to the Hills Eastward, with all the Territorys N^o. ward bordering on the River, I resign to the King of Bednure, to be enjoyd by him accordingly as I am to do what remains to the S^oward.

The King of Bednure shall not pass with an Armed Force through the above Limits assigned, nor yet can I. To all which the Chief & Council of the English Company are witnesses, & by whom the present Treaty was mediated

RULES TO BE OBSERVED BY THE STOREKEEPEB OF TELLICHERRY FOR THE BETTER STATING AND REGULATING HIS ACCOUNTS IN FUTURE VIZ^T.

Rules to be observed by the Storekeeper

1^s. That his Books now to be commenced the 1st. of August 1737 do contain the Generall Account of all stores whatever namely, Those in being at Tellicherry, as well as such contained in the severall Out-Fortresses depending.

2^d. That the Person in Command at every Out-Place do render to him the Storekeeper a particular List of every Item of stores under his Charge at the time aforesaid, which List is to be signed, and preserved, and whenever any thing may be wanting for whatever Out-Fort, application must be made to the Storekeeper and a Receipt had for the particulars that may be sent. In like manner, The Storekeeper must pass his Receipt for any Stores that may happen to be sent to him from any of the Places, and at the End of every Year, The Remains at each Place must be adjusted for entering them afresh on the Books.

3^d. Since the Store-Room is not of Magnitude sufficient to contain all the Things, there is a necessity of permitting a part to remain in the Charge of the Gunner in the manner practiced heretofore, But the S^d. Gunner must not only pass a Receipt to the Storekeeper for the whole under his care at this time, but also notifie in writing all such things, as he may in future receive in, or deliver out at the end of every Month, with this caution that nothing be issued otherwise than by virtue of an Order to be passed to the Gunner under the Hand of the Storekeeper.

4th. Whereas there is a considerable Expence occurring from the discharge of Arms in Exercise, both at Tellicherry and the Out-Places and of which no regular Account hath hitherto been kept. It is Directed, That an exact account be taken of the remain[s] of Cartridges now in Tellicherry, to be signed by the Head Officer and once a Month all Cartridges fired away at every Out-Place respectively shall be restored from hence; To the End that the stores appointed to be kept up at each place be not diminished. And whenever the Materials for making more Cartridges are wanted. They must be Indented for by the Head Officer aforesaid, and who is to render an account once a Month of such Cartridges, as have been new made up or expended in any manner whatever.

5th. Since the Article of Match, through the Holding so many Places is a Large Expence, care must be had, that it be renderd as little as possible, always however allowing for a Lighted Match being kept constantly at the severall Fortresses.

The sundry Claimants asserting their Title to some of the Lands on ^{Sundry} Durmapatam, taken notice of under the 28th. July, now appear, requiring they asserting may be permitted to hold their respective Properties there as in times past, their Title whilst under the Dominion of the Moors Prince and King of Cotata whilst under the Dominion of the Moors, Prince and King of Cotata.

Taking as nice a view as we possibly can of the above Demands, we conceive that by our acquiescing thereto, no less than One ninth part of the Coconut Oarts will go from our Honble Masters, & near One Fourth of the Paddy Grounds.

But the Board are however of opinion, that in reason & justice the Prince could not give, or we take the Estates of his Leige subjects, and though our Expences have been great in preserving the place, we must not have recourse to unfair means for reimbursing the same. On the whole therefore 'tis AGREED, That such Coconut Oarts and Verge Lands as have hitherto been held, and enjoy'd by their severall Owners do remain in future to them, Taken under Consideraprovided they Annually deliver to us on account our Honble Masters the One tion. quarter part of the Produce of their Oarts, and one Fifth of the Paddy Grounds, in consideration of our giving them protection; But whereas the Prince did at the time of his delivering us a Grant for the Island, solicit for something in favour of some Lands belonging to the Pagoda of Maplangatu, we do consent they pay no more on their Verges than 10 \$ Cent Annually.

Yet a difficulty arises, how we are to be assured that the prementioned Claimants have a compleat & true authority for what they solicit, and which we find some of them can no otherwise prove, than by taking an Oath, & bringing Two other Persons disinterested to do the same in their Behalf, in confirmation, that the spots severally asserted to belong to them, have been always their undoubted Property; And as no other, or better method occurs Resolution. to us than what they propose, Tis AGREED we accept thereof accordingly, meaning for such as have not their Original Deeds to shew.

Cuny Nairs District, which Marks being made with Sticks, are now quite destroy'd, and a Letter was wrote Mons'. Bunell some days ago desiring his accompanying us for the above purport, but no answer being sent by him, nor anything positively said to the Chief at last meeting, another Letter was. wrote the 5th. Instant on the above Subject; To which a reply was given, . that as none of the French Agents at present in Mihie are acquainted with the aforesaid Boundaries, we may fix the same ourselves if we think proper, according to reason and justice.

The Board maturely weighing the matters foregoing, concur in opinion, . that it will be best exerting our endeavour towards effectually accomodating the Difference subsisting between Cuny Nair and Unichato Nair, and that when the latter returns from Boyanore and Nombiers, we make known to him the French Proposals, But should he not be inclinable to repair to Mihie as required that we only give notice of his refusal to the French, & leave the affair then to take it's own course, conceiving our pretending to intermeddle farther, may give dissatisfaction to the Prince, Nombiers, and Boyanore, who now seem to espouse his Quarrel.

The Rasing Putinha is Unanimously Esteemed as highly proper for moderating our Expences, but a dread arises, that our quitting it now before We see the end of the threatening Commotions, may be productive of mischief, and the rather since we cannot have entire dependance on the Fidelity of the French, On the whole therefore AGREED, we immediately proceed in placing the Land marks for dividing the Districts with all speed, & afterwards determine, as Times and Circumstances offer, whether to Demolish Putinha or not.

The Chief represents, that just on leaving Monsieu[r] Bunell, he express'd a desire for rendering our Interest at the Settlements of Tellicherry and Mihie more Stabile [sic] than heretofore, and to which end he judged, we had best enter on a Consideration for ascertaining the Quotas of Pepper to be enjoy'd by each Company, that there should be but one Buyer, and in fine the thing concluded so, as that in future, we may have every jealousy removed, the price of that Commodity moderated, & our Expences reduced, all which he conceived might be attained, provided we could agree on that fundamental Point, and he solicited for the Chief's sentiments thereon being drawn out on paper, for his making farther remarks; Yet that 'tis to be mutually understood, we have neither of us power to determine on any thing without the absolute approval of our respective Superiours.

Debating on the Point preceeding, The Board do conceive, that an Agreement made between our Settlements for sharing the Pepper procurable in the Country, may be productive of mutual advantage, provided an upright demeanour be exercised on both sides, but our long experience inclines us to have no good opinion of the French Faith; However as knowing the utmost of their Intentions, can be of no prejudice, and the matter will naturally fall at last under the determination of our Superiours, Tis Consented that the Chief does as from himself make a reply to Mons^r. Bunell by alledging that 'tis presumed our Masters will at least expect Two Thirds of the whole procurable, since our Scituation does certainly enable us to gain the same.

The Large Debt to our Honble Masters of Rupees Forty Eight thousand Four hundred Eighty three, One Quarter & Ten Raes, lately contracted by the Prince Cuny Homo, through the assistance given in his Wars against the Canarees, requires our best endeavours for it's recovery; And as the Heads of Randotarra engaged to pay us thereon One hundred thousand Fanams in May last, but instead thereof did deliver us no more than Twenty four thousand Eight hundred & Eight, we are necessitated to renew our Demands on them, and finding the Heads aforesaid, with the People of their Country & Prince are willing we should Levy a Tax there, and receive the same.

In case however that the Canarees will not permit our Vessels to carry away any Rice, & the disappointment may prove prejudicial to the Presidency, In such wise you may as the last recourse be furnished here from between Three to Four thousand Bales at Twenty two & an half Pagodas P Corge of Forty two Bales, & Three hundred Forty five Rupees & hundred Pagodas, & besides which a small Expence will attend the carrying it off.

It occurs to us that you may perhaps have some Warlike Stores on Board your Ship appertaining to yourself or others, and Temptations may be laid by the Canarees to obtain them from you, in consideration of a great price; But as the parting with any such of what nature soever, may be attended with great prejudice to this Settlement in particular, we desire you will have the strictest care that nothing be sold thereof, this caution you will please to receive, as arising from the Duty we owe to the Interest of the Honble Company, who only would be injured by acting contrary to what we recommend.

The uncertainty of this Ship calling here, hinder their consigning us any Treasure, but there being a Surplus thereof at Anjengo to the amount of Twenty thousand Rupees, They will give directions to the Chief & Factors to remit the same hither by the Decker or Newcastle, should either of them touch at that Settlement in their way from Benga[1] and also supply us with a sufficient sum for our occasions in Januar[y.] Touching the Prince Cunhi Homo, They conceive he will not be able to regain his Authority, and the change that has happen'd at Bombay in regard to their Neighbours, besides the Expence & uncertainty of the Undertaking, will not allow them to think of joining with him again for opposing the Canarees, neither do they believe the Dutch will find it an easy Task to expell them out of the Mallabar Country, which should they resolve upon, It is to be apprehended they have deeper designs, than the obtaining One thousand Candys of Pepper Annualy at a low price, and therefore they approve of the Resolution we shewd to defend our Honble Masters Priviledges, and the answer we gave to their Protest. They recommend our obtaining the Rajah's Confirmation of the Peace, and though

The Timber wanted for Gombroon Factory was almost in readyness, and the Sorts now Indented for Bombay would be provided with all convenient speed; That the Bednure Rajah, 'tis reported, will not ratifie the Peace lately enterd into between Him and Mallabars, but is determined to prosecute the War, and has appointed Ragonat the former Generall to Conduct his Forces, and to whom he has committed the Command of all the Country from Bassalore S^o. ward. We gave it as our opinion, that a Sea Force was necessary to awe the Canarees, & therefore judged it expedient to detain the Tiger Galevat, and requested that Two others might be appointed to join her for that purpose; And on having notice that the Wilmington Capt. Charles Massey, with severall small Vessels under his Convoy were arrived at Mangalore from Bombay for Lading Rice, & being informed there was a prohibition not to ship any off, we immediately notified to Cap^t. Massey, that he might be supplied here with about One hundred Corge at Twenty two Pagodas & an half the Corge, & Three hundred forty five Rupees ? hundred Pagodas ; That M^r. William Forbes requested Bills on the Honble Company for Sixteen thousand Rupees at Two shillings & Six Pence each, payable to himself, & desired permission to return to Great Britain by the January Shipping, having been in the Service Eighteen Years.

This Evening P Shybar Bombay Merchant came to hand a Letter from THURSthe Honble President & Council dated the 31st. Ultimo, owning the receipt of DAY 10TH. ours under the 6th. July & 18th. September, & enclose an Invoice of Stores and Letter from Bombay. Stationaryware amounting to Rupces Two hundred Thirty five & Twenty five Raes. They acquaint us that on our notifying to them, We should not be able to compleat more than Nineteen hundred Sixty four Candys of Pepper by January, even admitting the Two hundred Seventy two, & Four Maund were received, They have taken the proper measures for securing Five hundred Candys of Pepper at Carwar and Onore, and forbid our buying any more of the Old Crop, unless to be had at near the price our last Contracts were made; They express their satisfaction at our bringing about a Peace between the Canarees and Prince, as it may perhaps enable the Latter to regain his Authority among the Mallabar Powers, and approve of the Stipend granted him of Five thousand Fanams Monthly for withstanding the Enemy (as set forth in our Letter of the 6th. July) and therefore should the Peace not continue, they direct our continuing the same to him, provided there appears an absolute necessity for affording him our Assistance. In case the King of Cotata persists in his base Behaviour towards us, we are to use means for curbing him. The Three Galevats now here, They direct proceed up in company of the Newcastle or Decker, and have sent People and Necessaries for that purpose. On a supposition that the Peace between the Prince & Canarees will hold, & being in grea[t] want of European Soldiers, They desire we will send up all we can spare and likewise Ensigns Forbes and Kendall, & let Lieutenant Sterling remain here in Command of one of the Companys. On the arrival of the Heathcote, They will supply us with the Assistants we desire, untill which time they cannot permit of Mr. Lynch's returning to Bombay, and as they propose keeping the Cruizers constantly off the Enemies Ports, we are to give notice thereof to the Ships bound this way.

Nair into a more just Behaviour, but without effect, as he seems to think we must put up with all his bad conduct purely out of fear of what prejudice he may be capable to do us, and as his being permitted to go on in such conjectures will naturally produce mischiefs to us; Tis offerd to the

Consideration of the Board, whether it will not be a good expedient in rejecting him from the Command, and introducing his Elder Brother named Canara in his stead which 'tis judged will be well approved by the majority in our District.

Resolution.

The Board weighing the same, & recounting the many Instances given us of Impudence & Baseness in the prementioned Nair, Do concur that it will be much the best way to take the Elder Brother Named Canara, And who on being accordingly acquainted therewith, readily accepts the Command, engaging to maintain & observe in future, pursuant to the Stipulation enterd after this Consultation, and better than which, we believe he cannot consent to, as his Revenues are not capable of maintaining more than the Fifty men mentioned therein on his Account.

A Demand is made on him before in Command of all the Mallabar Match-Locks, and Fire Arms, which have been at times deliver'd him, and examining deficiency of the same, we find he is deficient seventeen of the former valued One thousand & Twenty Fanams, and Twelve of the Latter which he is called upon to restore, or their full Cost, but as he makes sundry evasive excuses, & false pretences of their being lost, Directed the Storekeeper does see the whole, is satisfied for, and to which end that a Guard of soldiers be appointed if necessary to Arrest & force him to a Complyance, which we deem absolutely requisite, for if we put up with this Loss, we may be certain the like will be expected to be passed by in future.

> We have certain advice that one Ragonat is arrived at Mangalore for assuming the Government of all the Low Countries subject to the Carnatick Rajah, and that he already demands payment of a Duty called Adlamy, which by our Agreement we were not to pay.

> Debating on this we are to consider that our tamely giving up a Point easily will pave the way for other Impositions, and therefore RESOLVED, we despatch one Manoel Vass with the Chiefs Letter and a Present of about Fifty Rupees; That he congratulates Ragonat on his acceeding to the present Station, desire he will send the King's Ratification of our Peace concluded in February last, That made with the Mallabars in August, and acquaint us whether he is willing to maintain the Treaty or not, for our taking suitable measures, and that he forbears troubling our Vessels by demanding the abovementioned Duty called Adlamy.

> Notwithstanding the Prince Cunhi Homo will not or cannot find mony for restoring the large sum advanced him by our Honble Masters, we understand he has undertaken to Celebrate a Religious Feast, which will cost him in feeding Braminees & otherwise near Twelve thousand Rupees. The Principal People of the Country are respectively sending to him their Offerings & Presents on this occasion from all Parts, and we are told he expects a Compliment and Gift from us in the manner practiced in the time of his Predecessours.

> Enquiry being made therein, 'tis found that it was usual in the like case to send one of the Members and a Guard with a Present and therefore as omitting it now may be deemed a Slight.

> RESOLVED M^r. William Forbes with our Linguist an Officer and Twenty four Men do repair to the Prince on the 21st. Instant & carry with them One hundred Rupees deposited in a Chest, coverd with Scarlet cloth, & filled with Rice, also Eight Pecull of China Sugar value Seventy six Rupees.

Directed that leave be given to all the muckas of that place to return thither, and all others that have Deserted us; On Condition that they subject themselves to our Mandates, and repair to us on all occasions we may require them.

Sailed Ship Ceres, Rachel Brigantine & Bermudas Sloop for Surat also the TUESDAY Triton for Goa; By the former wrote the Honble President and Council of Bombay a Letter of this date, notifying the receipt of their Commands of the Letter Bbay. 10th. Instant, and enclosed Copy of our Address to the Honble Company, E Mountague, Treasury & Paymaster's Accounts for October. We signified the ill prospect of the New Crop of Pepper, which was judged much less than for some years past; and that the French had lately purchased Old Pepper at Eighty four Rupees \mathfrak{P} Candy, notwithstanding the pernicious Consequence thereof was represented to M^r. Bunell and that we apprehended unless we paid as much for the new, as they, we should be disappointed in obtaining any Quantity, and therefore should wait Orders, er'e we made any Contract That M^r. Bunell, lately hinted to the Chief, it would be of advantag[e] to our Companys respectively, in case a Scheme could be concerted for dividing the Pepper to each in such Shares as might be agreed on, and only one Purchaser, which was listned to, & intimation given that our Scituation entitled us to Two Thirds of the whole Produce, however we should wait their Orders concerning this point, and in [the] interim as occasions offerd, not seem to despise the Proposal. That we had no hopes of receiving the Chittys Balance untill January, and our Remains of Pepper this day were Seventeen hundred Thirty Candy & Outstanding Two hundred Eighty one. That Ragonat was Arrived at Mangalore, though uncertain whether the war would be renewed, and the King of Bednure, dangerously ill, & in case of his demise, the[re] was a prospect of this Settlement remaining quiet for some time; But should the War be prosecuted, there was little reason to believe the Prince would exert a Suitable Resolution for preserving his Country which would lay us under great difficulties, & perhaps prove a severe wound to our Honble Master's Interest, That it does not suit our present circumstances to use Hostile means with the King of Cotata but we should, when any opportunities offerd, endeavour to obtain from him his Renuciation [sic] to the Island Durmapatam, provided it can be done for nothing, he having actually promised the same on our driving out the Canarees. That the Three Galevats would be in readyness for proceeding up in Company of the Newcastle, or Decker But in case we are apprized, that the King of Bednure is determined to prosecute the [War] [we] should deem the detaining them unavoidable for aweing the Canarees by Sea, & that it was inconsistent with the safety of the Settlement to Detach any Europeans, This Fort being Large, many others depending on it; The Topasses in the Service inferiour to those formerly entertained, & no Serjeants fit to be trusted with the Command of any of the Out Posts, which renders the Duty of the Officers pretty severe, there being only Two for Relieves, so that the returning Ensigns Forbes and Kendall was impracticable ; The Quantity of Timber lately Indented for, to be sawed into Plank, was procured at Callicut, but the Flag Staff for Bengall was not to be got, and even should we light on one, there is no probability of obtaining a conveyance to transport it. That the Person in Command of

Narranport's Nairs having for some time behaved in a most unjustifiable manner, by defrauding the Men paid by our Honble Masters, & often leaving the Fortresses of Moohara & Codolee Defenceless, & rendering himself remarkably untoward & insolent, we were obliged to reject him, and appoint his Elder Brother in his place, who we hoped would behave better. The One hundred thousand Fanams promised to be paid by the Samerine in July last, was not made good, 'though we conceived it shortly would, and means are now using for the recovery of what Puniture Rajah & Durmett Ponicary owe, & we had hopes of receiving something from the Heads of Randotarra, account the Princes Debt.

Came to hand a Letter from the Chief and Factors of Anjengo Dated the 15th. Instant, acknowledging the receipt of ours under the 1st. Ultimo. They acquaint us of their being directed by the Presidency to remit hither their Surplus of Treasure amounting to Rupees Twenty thousand by the Decker or Newcastle, which they will comply with by the first of those Ships that arrives with them; That the Chief had notice of the Mountague being at Cochin the 7th. Instant, & would saile directly from thence to England, without touching at their Port.

The Mischiefs that may result to all our Honble Masters Settlements in India by the above practice, needs no explanation for it must be apparent, that the Indians who are very numerous and furnished with Weapons of the Sorts we use, may soon prove an over match for us, and therefore we do sincerely lament, that any of our Country Men should prefer a mean private advantage to the Publick Benefit. We for our parts were so sensible of the ill tendency of the above Detestable Proceedings, That in our Address to our Superiours of Bombay under the 11th. January 1734/5 we entreated a stop might be put thereto, and they were pleased in their answer of the 14th. February following to promise to represent it to the Honourable the Court of Directors. However since we took the best method we could in writing the Commander of the Wilmington the 21st. of October for preventing the Evil complained of, and have also pursued other means to the same end, The Chief

Smith aforesaid for the Sixty six musquets deliver'd by him and now in the Store-Room But that our Honble Masters may not suffer too severely hereby; Directed, That the Storekeeper does sell any of these to our immediate Servants, who want them for the Defence of their Munchuas at the price they cost, always taking the utmost care that the Settlement may not be prejudiced by any such Sales, as we are likely to be in a most sensible manner by the Guns landed from the Wilmington at Mangalore, & the Arms that may be vended at Onore; For we are still assured, The Canara Rajah will Violate the Peace Lately concluded by his Generall with the Mallabars through our Mediation.

Vass repair to him the following day for an answer, but on going accordingly he has denied admittance, & the same repeated at the severall times he attended; and in fine that he conceives it is Ragonat's Intention to continue to refuse seeing him, & therefore desires our Orders in what manner to proceed.

The Board have too much reason to believe the Governour aforesaid will if possible compell us to pay the Duty styled Adlamy, although we are exempted so doing by our Agreement with the king of Bednure; and will also shew other Instances of Baseness, and for which We shall be at a Loss how to provide a Remedy in the present state of Affairs under the Presidency; However as the Person in Command of the Canara Forces at Madday, shews hitherto a great Regard to us.

Directed that a Letter be wrote him by the Chief, representing the ill Treatment of Ragonatt, and to let us know whether we are to expect the same in future, or not, for our taking proper Measures. This may perhaps produce an Expostulation between the Parties, and probably give a favourable turn; But as the continuance of our Messenger at Mangalore under such slights will only expose us the more; Directed, he be ORDER'D to return hither in case he find no better Behaviour from the Governour.

Read a Letter from the Canaree Generall in answ[er] to what was wrote him, and taken notice of under the 30th. Ultimo; wherein he represents his sincere desire of preserving our Friendship, and that he will do all in his power for inducing Ragonat the Governour of Mangalore to give our People, & Vessels there all the good Treatment possible.

Manoel Vass the Person appointed to repair with a Present to Ragonat eturns from aforesaid enterd under the 16th. Ultimo, now returns with a Letter to the Chief in Canarees, but as we cannot at present find any one to read it we must defer inserting it's contents. The s^d. Vass acquaints us, that his Treatment in General was in the most insolent manner, however by the assistance & assiduity of Ventato Mallo the Custom-Master, he at last got a permitt for Lading all the Munchuas belonging to our servants, exempted from paying the Duty styled Adlamy. Tis reported that the former Order for prosecuting the War against the Mallabars is contradicted, and that things are to remain in the state the late Governour Surapaya left them. The King of Bednure is said to be recoverd, but by other Informations we learn he is actually Dead, and which according to the Canaree maxims will be kept as a secret untill the Government is settled.

> The Demands we made on the Canarees as explained in M^r. Lynch his Narrative of the 15th. February last, being all satisfied; an Account is now drawn out, and presented to the Board, which being approved of, and Enterd after this Consultation.

> Directed that the same be brought on our Books, and we do make good to the severall Claimants what respectively belongs to them.

> On reperusing the Paymaster's Account for November, 'tis observed that he has continued to charge Five hundred Fanams deliverd to Naranport Nair. when by our Agreement of the 16th. Ultimo, we therein concert with him another Method for paying him in future, to take place from the 1st. of October; And as thereby an Overcharge appears by the Paymaster of Two hundred Sixteen Fanams and a quarter. Directed he gives Credit for the same in the Account to be tenderd for this Month.

– DECEMBER 1737 —

When the Martha Grab sailed hence in April last for Bombay, we Laded ^{Damaged} on her Twenty Barrels of Damaged Gunpowder, which we find by an Account freighted on lately transmitted from the Presidency, produced there a Value of Two hundred and Forty two Rupees; And as we, have still a considerable quantity of the same, unserviceable stuff by us, which we are without hopes of transmitting by the Honble Company's vesslls[sic] 'Tis judged that it will be the best way to Freight the same up on the Grab Martha now here, The Commander appearing willing to carry it for Eight Rupees the Candy; and as our omitting sending it may occasion a Loss, as we cannot new Corn it here suitably.

Directed that the whole be Embarked on the Terms aforesaid, and Bills of Lading taken for it's delivery to the Honble President and Council their Orders.

But we notifying the are now informed by s^d. Serwan, that his Expostulations were ill received, epproach of though there is the greatest reason to surmise the Deceived. though there is the greatest reason to surmise the Peace mediated by us between the Canarees & Mallabars will speedily be violated by Ragonatt and if so, our Prince seems to have no other thoughts, than to engage our Honble Masters in protecting his Country, while he remains an idle spectator of what passes between Us.

> Some Vessels being about to depart for Bombay this night, We wrote the Honble President & Council Two Letters under the 22^d. and this Date (The former was intended to have been transmitted but the Boat did not proceed) We therein acquainted them, that New Pepper was likely to be at Eighty two, to Eighty four Rupees the Candy, and our present Remains in Warehouse of that Commodity were Seventeen hundred Seventy one Candys, & outstanding in the Merchants hands contracted with Two hundred Forty five Candys. That we had wrote the Commander of the Wilmington at Mangalore under the 21^s. of October, desiring him by no means to permit warlike stores of any kind to be disposed of at that place, In reply to which he assured us he would have a strict regard [there]to, but since then we had repeated notice, that Two Guns' six Pounders were Landed there from s^d. Ship & placed before the Rajah's Store-House. That severall Chests of Small Arms were likewise brought to Onore by a Vessell Trading under our Honble Masters protection, and exposed to Sale; And Cap^t. Rawlinson of the Martha Grab, & M^r. Smith Supracargo of a Bengall Brigantine, having to the number of an hundred Twenty six Firelocks to dispose of, we judged proper to buy them on the Honble Company's Account to prevent their falling into the hands of the Natives. The Samorine proving [dilatory] in discharging the One hundred thousand Fanams promised to be deliverd us in July last, M^r. Lynch was dispatched the 3^d. Instant in company of our Callicut Linguist to Penany for demanding immediate payment thereof. That we have credible notice, Ragonat proposes to renew Hostilities against the Mallabars, and the Prince is by no means to be prevailed on to Levy any Forces, or make any disposition for opposing his Enemies, but aims at laving the whole Burthen on our Honble Masters as in times past, and that should the Canaree Attempts prove successfull, their Interest would be greatly prejudiced thereby. However we should wait their Orders touching this important matter & in the interim pursue the best methods which occur, & such as we judged would square with their sentiments, That the Chief & Factors of Anjengo had remitted us Twenty thousand Rupees # Fame who arrived the 22^d. & for which the Presidency would be duly Credited.

The Prince Cunhi Homo was met yesterday by the chief at the House of Conference our Linguist, when he set forth the great reason he has to believe the Canarees with the prince will speedily Violate the Treaty lately made through our Mediation enterd Cunhi under the 1st. September, That he has therefore no Remedy left than to place his Dependance on the protection of our Honble Masters, for he is himself bereaved of mony & Men, & the more as a number of the Natives resort to and pay their Obedience to Ragonatt the Canaree Generall now at the Camp near Madday. That we must resolve on succouring him the Prince, while he does what little may be in his power & on the whole requires to know whether he may rely on assistance adequate to his necessities, and that we will acquaint him how far we are determined to support him. The Chief affirms he omitted no Expostulations that were reasonable for making him sensible his request was in all respects unjustifiable, alledging our Honble Masters profess Trade & not Warfare, and 'tis always with regret that they employ'd their Arms in securing their immediate Property. We commenced an Establishment here on certain Conditions consisting chiefly that we should pay certain Duties on our Merchandise & rely on the Aid of the Prince for our Preservation; But Things are now brought to such a State, as hath compelld us to Fabrick a do[wn] Fortifications, instead of one at first designed, we are subjected to a necessity of buying Pepper at a most excessive rate, and at last as appears by the Prince's Demand above recited, called upon to Defend the Country against a Potent Adversary, when we have no Revenues of Consequence to ease our Exorbitant Charges. And in fine, if things stand thus much longer, 'tis to be presumed our Honble Masters will chuse to resign many of their Places, rather than hold them under such evident disadvantages; However the Prince was not to be prevailed on to recede from his demand.

And as we are under a necessity of giving some reply to the above, The Chief calls upon the Board to consider maturely how we are to conduct ourselves in case the Canarees do break through, & Violate the Articles last concerted through our Mediation; And after sundry Debates & recapitulations Taken under had of the present posture of Affairs at & under the Presidency, The monstrous Considera-Charge we have been lately exposed to, The danger and damage threatening our Interest, should the Canarees master the Country, The obligation we are under to secure our own Rights as far as possible. 'Tis in fine, Unanimously what resolv; AGREED, That we exert our utmost in securing the Pass at Madacarra, and ed on. enforce an observance of the Articles stipulated between the Honble Company and the Canarees enterd in our Diary the 16th. of February last and that in this we shall not call upon the Prince to give us any mony nor in providing for what Vessels we can send out to Annoy the Enemy, nor will we issue any thing for supporting his Nairs, or continue to assert our Rights longer than he the Prince demonstrates a sincere Zeal for defending his Country, for if he as a King will tamely suffer his Honour and Authority to be wrested from him, we must then chuse such a method as may best square with our Interest. Mr. Lynchs Report.

Pursuant to your commands of the 3^d, Instant, I repaired to Penany with the Linguist for seeing Samorine, & after sixteen days stay We were not able, to obtain more in hand than Forty five thousand Fanams, and Fifty five thousand Fanams more to be deliverd in a few days hence, for which purpose one of the Samorines Ministers is repaired to Callicut, we found it unavoidably necessary to allow the Parambees not only the 3 & Cent on the present hundred thousand Fanams, but also on that obtained last year. The Samorine on his taking his leave of us, express'd a great desire for his seeing the Chief, before he the Samorine dyes, or the Chief leaves this place, he acknowledges himself to be in great want of his advice, as the Dutch daily threaten him and most of the Southern Powers at variance with him; Misure is making Incursions into his Territories inland, and also to settle Accounts with the Honble Company. He says as he has by degrees pretty near paid their Debt with a very growing Interest, he hopes should he be in straits he may apply to the Honble Company, To all which I made him for answer, that I would make you acquainted therewith.

On our arrival at Penany, we immediately sent the Heads of the Company's Jangados to Put Puniture under Arrest, but after seeing his Ministers three times, & found at present nothing is to be recover'd from him by the advice of our Jangados we have only left Four Nairs 'till your further Orders; he promises to come to the 2^d . & 3^d . King in the month of April, & come to some determination how to Defray this long outstanding Debt.

Jur Linguist wrote an Ola to Durmett Ponicary setting forth how extreamly sorry he [would] be to attach any part of his Estate about Callicut, which he is positively orderd to do; if he does not pay off his long Outstanding Debt, To which he gives for answer, that he will be at Callicut by the 25th. of January next, or would send Talapacham. I have not to add but that I am most Respectfully.

William Forbes & our Linguist, with the Resolution we had above come to; and told that though he might esteem the same as a small favour, We could not avoid judging it as one very extraordinary, after having assisted him so greatly heretofore, wherein we had issued prodigious Sums, and he is now so largely indebted to us. To which he made answer, that he would do his part for defending his Territories, & on the whole did not seem entirely satisfied with our offers But waved the discourse and alledged how

desirous he was of discharging his Debt, to which end he intended to fix the whole to Four Payments to be made good in four years, provided we would agree to assign him the Annual Customs of the Settlement. Though soon after he declared he was in immediate want of about Three thousand Rupees, & therefore we must not deny it him and the Chief not caring directly to disoblige him told him the Linguist would give an answer thereto, meaning that the Latter should as from himself offer such reasons as might silence any future application.

The Board naturally remark the haughtiness of the precited Ragonat, and how base is his Disposition. The Chief never thought proper to visit him even in times of the Canarees Elated State, well knowing that Chicane & Treachery are what Ragonat is extreamly addicted to. However as we are desirous of considered omitting nothing for keeping things in a State of Tranquility, so Tis AGREED. of. That Mr. Richard Lynch accompanyd with Pedro Rangell does repair to him Resolution. this Evening for knowing his Intentions, and withal assure him we shall on our parts steadily observe the Articles made between us (as enterd under the 16th. February) and likewise cause the Prince to do the same, in consequence of those mediated by us inserted under the 1st. of September; And as 'tis usual to carry a Present on such occasions Directed, That something be procured which may be acceptable, to the value of about Eighty Rupees.

Which being Debated & Approved of, AGREED the Head Nair executes what proposed.

M^r. Lynch on repairing lately to the Samorine for demanding immediate payment of the one hundred thousand fanams promis'd to be deliver[ed] us in July last had recover'd forty five thousand thereof and the remaining fivety five thousand is shortly to be made good at Callicut; But there was an unavoidable Necessity of promiseing his Ministers 3 P Cent on the present & past Payment. That the Samorine had solicited the Chiefs repairing to him, in order to fix on some means for dischargeing the Ballance still due, and gave it as our Opinion, it would be eligible to relinquish part of the Interest arising on the Debt, rather than trust to the Uncertainty of a Tedious recovery & therefore desired to know how much they would chose to Discount admiting the Ballance that afterwards may be fix'd be duly & speedily Satisfied. We also acquainted them of our having Laid in nine thousand Bales of Rice at twenty three Pagodas & Corge being out of our Power to obtain that quantity on easier terms.

But if three or more Country Ships arrive with you sooner, you may dispatch the Rose in their Company believeing Angrias Fleet wou'd not Venture to attack The prince of Wales You may in that Case keep to convoy up that Number. the Latter Ships till Two Country Ships or one from Europe may arrive with You; But as you will have better Intelligence of the Ships expected from the severall parts of India than we can give you, We must leave to your Discretion to regulate the Convoys for them in Such a manner as you think may be attended with the least Risque.

Cunisew the Cardamom Merchant after repeated Messages sent for his coming now appears & declares that Exclusive of the four Candys & three quarters of Cardamoms deliver'd us, he has not sold above ten Maund[s] in small parcells to oblidge particular his Friends, The produce this Year has been the least that ever was known & in fine we ought to allow him therefore an advanced price, and which he could have got by sending them to Callicut where t'is said a small matter has been put off from between Six to Seven hundred Rupees the Candy.

The Board are fully convinc'd of the truth of the above in regard to the Extream Scarcity of Cardmons, & also that private persons might afford to offer an high rate for them, which being considered t'is thought reasonable to tender him one hundred & ten Gubbers the Candy & he accordingly Accepts it alledging he had rather oblidge us herein than use any Arguments in a matter of so little Consequence.

We are given to Understand that some People are employd at Cananore by one Protocarem Paqui of Callicut to collect Pepper from the Country of Randotarra, & that a small quantity has Actually been bought in order to transport it to Callicut the like being practis'd the last year. On notice thereof, We instantly sent proper persons for impeeding any such pernicious methods, & we conceive the Heads of Randotarra will exert themselves therein, but to give the greater Weight, the precited Protocarem Paqui has been positively forbid prosecuting his Scheme in depriving our Honble Masters of the Pepper, on peril of losing all we may be able to Seiz[e] yet as this matter is of the utmost Importance The Chief recommends to the consideration of the Board whether it will not be proper to write the Heiress of Cannonor[e] that we cannot permit any peper being sent to Calicut & if we meet with those carrying it, We shall treat them with the utmost rigour & confiscate all we find which being Debated & approv'd Directed the Letter be sent Accordingly.

The Moors of our Buzar employ'd in purchaseing Pepper have contracted for some in Boyanores Country of which the French geting Notice, we are told endeavour by all means in their Power to Seize & Confiscate it, though the same is more to be wonder'd at, as they continually carry away this commodity from the parts about Cotata, which lye very Adjacent to us & we have hitherto tamely submitted thereto with a View to use them in the same Manner from the places near them, & in fine if they are allow'd to take a Latitude with us, & will not consent to be treated in the same way we shall soon trade under a worse footing than those of Mihie, notwithstanding our prior right, and long Standing & as it is incumbent on us to support our Interest in the best manner in our Power, & aprehending The Country People will not suffer our peper to be seiz'd Tis Unanimously judged most suitable to animate our Moors in bringing away all the Pepper that can be had in Boyanores Districts, yet to use the strictest caution it does not fall into the hands of those that may be employ'd to seize it from Mihie.

On Viewing the Accounts of the above Persons we perceive that Chatoo-Chitty has not weighed exclusive of his preceding Ballance above forty Candys this Season & the Moors about three hundred Candys so that there is a Considerable Quantity to be respectively receiv'd from them, which however they promise shall be justly Satisfied, provided we advance them Money forthwith to the amount of our present Contract, & since we are Sensible they must immediately set about Securing the whole AGREED We do pay the Whole Sum that will be due to each person on the Quantity's severally bargain'd for above & that all possible means be applie[d] for geting as much more as can be by all ways in our power.

Notice is now brought that the French People setted at a place call'd Peringature inland of Mihie in the Territories of Irrebenadu have lately seiz'd four Loads of Pepper coming hither from the Country of Boyanore, consisting of twelve Mau[nds] & which with the Carriers are detain'd, although our Merchant who sent it, have tried all Methods for Releasement.

In our last Consultation we took notice of what we conjectur'd, might ensue from the French Attempts though had our Instructions been observ'd in conducting the Pepper by ways remote of their place of Peringature, we judge the present Indignity might have been avoided; However as it has happen'd, & our aiming to right ourselves by stoping theirs, may be productive of protracted disputes as well as Expence, though seve[n] of the Country Powers adhering to the French & others to us, pure[ly] for what they may have hopes of gaining from each of us. T'is AGREED that the Chief writes a Letter of Complaint to the Director[s] of Mihie (as enter'd after this Consultation) & that another be Sent to the Family of Boyanore, entreating that our Merchants may continue to enjoy the same Liberty as hither[to] in trading within the Districts of Cartuanadu, notwithstan[ding] any Impediments that may be attempted by the French.

I have now received notice that Your People have seized four Loads of Letter to Pepper coming hither from the Country of Cartuanadu & carried the same with the Bearer to Mihie.

This being the first Instance of your commiting the like I am at a loss how to assign a reason & the more when [I consider] that you constantly practise with all freedom m[ethod] of conducting Your Pepper from Cotata & the [place] wherein we are seated called Irrebenadu, The thing being such strange it is that you should aim at depriving us of what you enjoy with all frankness.

It is Necessary that you reflect on the Pains we took for preventing the access of peper to Calicut little immagining the consequence could be, that you would attempt excluding us, from what we have for so many years openly enjoy'd, and were we to pursue the same means you have done now, in order to do ourselves justice, t'is certain the advantage would turn on our side, though the Consequence will be infalliably attended with reall damage to us both, because the Country powers in perceiveing us two ingaged in disputes, might contrive to render the same gain to themselves at ours, & Your expence. On the whole I desire you will weigh the present matter with Judgment & then I am perswaded you will find, that what is actually conducise [sic] to the Interest your Company will be also so to ours.

On meeting the Merchants & discoursing them on the price of Pepper they absolutely demand Eighty Rupees & an half the Candy, if You can possibly procure it for less, I beg you will let me know I am.

Wrote a short Letter to the Honble President & Council of Bombay P Shybar enclosing duplicate of our last under y^e. 6th. & acquainted them of our having in Warehouse Seven Candys & three quarters of Cardamoms purchas'd at one hundred & ten Gubbers the Candy; That we had contracted with Chatoo Chitti for four hundred Candys of Pepper & the Moors of our Buzar for eight hundred at eighty Rupees & an half & Candy it being impracticable to procure it under, through the remarkable scantiness of the Crop. We also notified the French Vigilance for impeeding our geting any Pepper from Boyanores Country & that they had lately seiz'd twelve Maunds that were coming hither & closly imprison'd the Carriers. This we judge a very imprudent Step & never heretofore practised, but should we proceed in the same manner, by Stoping the Pepper constantly carried to them from Cotatas Country it would inevetably occasion a division among the petty powers as some would in such wise cleare to us & others to the French thereby expose us equally to a great Expence; & therefore the Chief had [given] M^{*}. Bunel a Letter of Complaint therein & we should endeavour to have the peper brought through places more remote from their Fortress at Peringature, and which had been before inculcated to the Merchants. That the Samorine had compleated the payment of the one hundred thousand fanams which was to have been made good in July last, & our utmost Efforts should be used for obtaining what promisd us in this Season.

I did not faile to reprimand our Merchants for not giving the Speedier Notice of the seizing the prementio[nd] peper but he excused himself therein, by alledging that he ha[s] been Inform'd its being known to have belonged to us, would [expose] the Carriers to the severest treatment, and therefore he had endeavourd to gain its Releasement by other Method[s].

On the whole I desire you will inform me whether you will release the Pepper & person's belonging to the Company now in your Custody or not, for by your Answer I cannot discover your Resolution, I likewise beg to know which are the Districts you claim as belonging to you for hitherto you have made free with all the parts hereabouts & yet complain of us, To be plain S^r. your present proceedings [savour] of prejudice, which will naturally contribute to the enhancing the Pepper & ennabling the Country powers to make their advantage at our mutuall Expence as I have already declared; my Aim is to correspond with you in everything that may convey to us a Mutuall Benifitt I am.

Instant after taking in one hundred & ninety Letter from five Tons of Goods together with [we] [*sic*] hundred & five Candys of Pepper to be carried at half Freight. That the Commander of the Expedition had landed there eight Cases of Salt Beef put on board by the President & Council of Bengal for Bombay, but as he did not propose to call here, they had forwarded them by a Munchua & request our sending them up by the first conveyance & the Charges they had been at therein of six Rupees to be made good to M^r. Law.

Ultimo B Wilmington with the Treasure & stores consignd us by her & assured them of our complying with their Directions relating to said Ships dispatch for England, we notified to them the severall Contracts we had made for Pepper at what rate & the quantities already received, That we apprehended it would be impracticable to secure more this season than Eighteen Hundred Candys & our [remain^g.] in warehouse of the old Crop were about Fourteen hundred ninty nine Candys, That the French of Mihie still continue to detain the Pepper & People mention'd in our last address notwithstanding our repeated application for their Releasement & has placed guards in severall parts of Curringhoda's Country for preventing our obtaining, any more from the places Contigeous thereto. Admiting there was a reasonable Prospect of a Speedy recovery of what due from the Samorine on relinquishing part of the Interest, We requested to know how much they were wiling to give up That we still remain'd Uncertain of the Canarees Intentions [in] reporting the King to be near Mangulore & others that he is Dead, That M^r. William Forbes has paid into Cash sixteen thousand Rupees & received the bills on the Honble Company, But we apprehended he could not proceed for England this Season, being at this time Extream III of a Violent Fever, which seiz'd him a few days ago; The Neptune Grab's prize shoul'd be return'd in Company of such of the Bengall Ships as may arrive, or otherwise order'd to Goa, unless anything arises from the Canarees to prevent it.

I have waited many Days in hopes You wou'd restore our Pepper Seiz'd, Letter to as well as the People detain'd but as you make no manner of Account of our just demands twice made you thereupon, I am oblidgd to renew the same, & to answer your last Letter without Date.

You say, that because we had contributed in Enhanceing the Price of Pepper, & your Merchants had applied to you on that matter, you had thought Proper to hinder the access of that Commodity to us; But we must declare the allegation of our raising its Value to be without foundation, It being contrariwise evident that during the la[st] Rains, we desisted making any Investment with a view to lessen the Terms then demanded & reduce the new Pepper to moderate conditions & I did repeatedly inculcate to you to take the same Course; but you paid no regard thereto & instead issued your Companys money to severall Vagabond Moors & also to some of the Country Powers for rendring them Merchants, through which means only the Pepper is become extreamly increasd in price, and for knowing which of us generally buy Cheapest, I desire our respected Books may be examind. It is certain Sir that without a due harmony being maintaind, founded on Sincerity & Uprightness, We must both of us suffer in our Interest. You have lately challenged us to try which of us can [most] embarrass the Affairs of each other, but I had rather Undergo the Mortification of some Injuries, than take such means as would naturally tend to prejudice both of us by opening away to the Crafty Malabars to plunder us equally, which if you do not now discover, surely time must convince you of it, & give you more just Ideas. Tis without doubt certain, that whenever the Canarees do Violate their late Agreement made through our Mediation, between them & the Prince A V[e]ssel of Countenance will be of the utmost benefit for keeping them in awe, but as the rainy Season approaches, We yet uncertain of the Canare[e's] reall Intentions & this Vessell may be of the greatest Service in withstanding in Conjunction with other Ships the present [. . .] Power of Angria, That we can at the worst have assistance from the Presidency at the opening of the fair Weather in September, and that the detaining her will be an heavy addition to our present insupportable Expence, as well as Inconvenient for us in providing the proper Eatables for her Crue in this barren country. The Board do on the whole Unanimously concur in returning the said Grab Neptunes Prize to Bombay immediately, when the Boat gone to Cochin does return, or we can be appriz[ed] whether any more Ships are to be expected or not.

[...] [encloseing] Duplicate of our Last under y^e. & 27th. Let to Copy of our address to the Honble the Court of Directors & Ship Wilmington, Bombay. dated the 16th. Currant, said Ships Invoice & bills of Lading Treasury Account [carried] on to the 18th. Paymasters Account for February, List of the European Soldiers sent up & forwarded [. . .] from Anjengo, and the Stewards account of Sundries supplied the Grab amounting to fanams nine hundred fifty six & Seven Vis together with an Account of our purchases of Pepper, The present remains in warehouse, The quantity outstanding & what more we judgd procurable this Season [...] we find the arrival of the King of Bednure at Mangalore who tis said will prosecute the war against the Malabars, unless the Prince will become tributary to him (though it is the generall Opinion he will never be brought to submit thereto) & for which [...] amicable means will be furnished, but in case of a refusall an Army of twelve thousand Horse & foot under the Command of Ragonat will be appointed for carrying on the War. Ragonat the Governour of Mangalore is [crafty] cunning $[\ldots]$ may perhaps draw you if possible into discourse about the King of Colastre in order to induce us to stand Neuter in the War he may probably have $[\ldots]$ to wage on them notwithstanding a peace was mediated between the Canarees & him in August last you are therefore to say your business is not to enter into those affairs, but to pay a complement to the Bednure Rajah in behalf of the Company & to solicit for the delivery of the Ratification of [the] Peace concluded between us in February 1736/7 & that premention'd with the Canarees & Colastre in August and these you are accordingly to obtain if possible according to what is requested in the Chief's Letter to the King now deliver'd you.

We must [leave] [. . .] on the most proper Season for visiting the King and as he is one who delights in show do you & your people make the [handsomest] appearance in your [power] you will be inform'd of the manner he has receiv'd those belonging to other European Powers which do you also claim so as to be placed on an equal footing with [. . .] of them. These points as being in a great measure known to us you must direct yourself according to the Intelligence you may get, [. . .] must submit to your giving away such Sums as are customary to some of the Kings attendants, at the same time avoiding everything that tends to Extravagance; though a present must be made to the Portuguese Factor, as an equivolent to the trouble & Civilities he may exercise on your Account.

As the hire of the two Munchuas that attend you, will amount to a con-siderable Sum do you in order to ease that Expence lade on them such a quantity of rice as they can carry without in[conveniencing] the People; we suppose you may return on the Barge [. . .] at Mangalore waiting on the King but however dont press for her if you find it will be ill taken. For providing the aforesaid Rice and defraying your Expences of which an Exact Account must be kept we now deliver you three hundred & fifty nine Pagodas & Eight hundred Rupees, and once again enjoin a becomeing Frugallity.

10. Yesterday a Letter was receiv'd by the Chief from Ragonat desiring a Surgeon might be sent to his King said to be indisposed, and as our denying this may be resented we have therefore directed Mr. Rose to proceed with you, but let him be extream Cautious in what he administers; For should the King prove worse under his hands, the Heaviest complaints will be made. We wish you Success in your present undertaking and are.

We are greatly at a loss how to assign a reason for the preceeding treat- Remarks. ment, which is such as we cannot remember to have heretofore met with, Tis however to be supposed, that as the King intends to prosecute the war on the Malarban, & will if possible deprive us of Madacarra Fortress he may have [to] [frighten] us into whatever compliances he shall me[an] [to dictate] & should he get M'. Verelst into his Power, as Ragonat did the Portuguese Factor [by treachery] some time since such things may be [insisted] [...] us [...] Interest of our [. . .] or their reputation will suffer us to submit to.

We are unable to dive into the true reason's for the above extraordinary proceedure but as it follows severall other gross insults committed this Season, We may justly suspect the King of Bednure has an Intention to Violate the Peace made between him & the Mallabars in August last through our Mediation, & probably may mean to oblidge us, if he can, to resign to him our Fortress of Madacarra, as tis what may for a time impeed his [. . .] moreover he may in order to come at his Views the better attempt to seize & secure your person, As Ragonat did some time since the Portuguese Factor, whom he confin'd for severall Months.

On the whole therefore We have thought proper to direct you will on sight of this return back, after delivering to the bear[er] the Letter you have in possestion for the King, another for Ragonat & one for the Portuguese Factor at Mangalore, all which we have ORDER'D to be carried by the Person that conveys this, and who has others to the above parties respectively, complaining of the treatment we have mett with, & that therefore we have remanded you back; you must also bring M^r. Instant write the King of Bednure & MONDAY Ragonat in complaint of their proceedings in seizing the Guns of the English Boats at Mangalore River, & forwarded those before entrusted with Mr. Verelst, The Cana-Yet our People there, were fearfull of delivering said Letters, untill the Chief rees Behaviby another order positively directed them to be instantly committed to the hands of the Parties; But the King seem'd at first averse to receive [this] & Ragonat pretended we had conducted ourselves very ill by not making a Complement as others had done, attended with a handsome present; However he was at last prevail'd on to permit all the Laded Vessells to come away, which accordingly arrived yesterday morning save two appertaining to Chatoo Chitti, Continued. which are not in readiness to depart, but no entreaties cou'd pre[vail] for restoring the Guns small arms & Gun powder forcibly taken away from the Boats some time since nor was the Barge sen [t] to please the King on the 7th. February suffer'd to repair to us her Guns being likewise seized, Our people there seem to [avoid] violence to their persons & on the whole represent that the Canarees [are] entirely regardless of what they do to us, so that from what appears We may reasonably expect they will continue to [...] us the [...] unless we are capable of retorting their abuses.

About two Months since a fire broke out within our Limits, which consum'd severall dwelling houses belonging to our Soldiers & Servants who were in [. . .] Capacity to repair their loses & therefore a Subscription was made among us, and about four hundred Rupees collected; And Yesterday another fire happen'd at a time when the Wind blew very fresh which presently laid waste Twenty two Houses some where of being of value; And as we are Consumed in [. . .] Capacity of raising of Ourselves wherewith to relieve the unhappy by Fire. Sufferers even in a limited manner, The Chief recommends to the consideration of the Board, to pitch on some Expedient for aiding the distresed with Speed & so enable them to provide against the Violence of the Rains now approaching.

Debating thereon the Chief readily offers his assistance, as do the severall Members according to their Abilities, but even with this & including what other ways may be obtain'd in the place t'is presumed the whole to be obtain'd cannot exceed four hundred twenty five Rupees, which will go but a little way towards each man's loss; therefore as the Calamity lies chiefly on the poor Soldiers depending on the Hoñble Companys Service tis presum'd we may venture to issue as far as four hundred & fifty Rupees on their Account And as we Conceive the same will not be disapproved of, Directed the Treasury makes said sum good, which join'd with the other Contributions may be divided with the utmost impartiallity for enabling each poor Sufferer to provide against the Inclemencies of the approaching Weather.

Among the Houses burnt we have the misfortune to loose 94.90.8 Bitters Fans. vis.

of fire wood value 1010. 10 that were laid in as stores [exclusive] of two thirds of the like quantity appertaining to the Chief & since it may prove of ill consequence to remain unprovided with so usefull an Article.

Directed a Provision of as much as possible to be bought, be made forthwith by way of Calicut, or otherwise, And since all the Cajan houses erected for keeping our timber, Bamboos, Chunam, Gun Carriage and petty stores of Severall kinds, are continually exposed to [disaste[r]. The Board however unwilling to encrease our Expences, do hold it absolutely Necessary to cover all such places with tiles & the rather since omiting so to do may endanger our Warehouse of Peper & the Buildings of the Fort, which for want of room, are too near each other. The Hospitall Kitchin by being cover'd also with Cajans is exposed exceedingly & has narrowly escaped being burnt twice within the two Months past, & as its continuing in the same state may endanger the whole Hospitall. AGREED it be as soon as possible cover'd with Tyles.

This Evening appear our People that have been soom [sic] time at Mangalore who[are]convey'd hither in the Barge already Mention'd to have been for gratifying the King under the 27th. February. They inform us that the Bednure Rajah was not to[be] brought to restore above fifty small Guns & some small Arms he had forcibly receiv'd from the Munchuas belonging to our Servants under the Honble Companys Protection, exclusive of brass peices taken out of the aforesaid Barge, That said Guns were laded on board his Gallevats, in readyness to depart to Bassilore, from whence the whole are[to]be convey'd to Bednure; And in fine they Acquaint us neither said King or his Governour Ragonat makes any Account of us nor will either of them give any reply to the Letters which have been sent, complaining of the treatment we have lately met with, nor could the Mariners of the Barge obtain Provisions for a part of the time they were detain'd, And it was with no small difficulty they got leave to come away, with the two Munchuas appertaining to our Merchant Chatoo Chitti.

The above is a sufficient Specimen of what we are to expect should the Canarees subdue the Mallabars & a tame submission will tend only to encourage farther Injuries. The Board are therefore Unanimous in Opinion that as we are [rationally] to hope for no other favour or common honesty from them, than is to be obtain'd by force of Arms, so it does behove us to take whatever methods in our power for gaining redress from those base & treacherous People. Our Servants now arrived tell us, that some Gallevats & a Number of Boats lye ready for repairing to their Army; And as t'is conceived three Munchuas well mann'd with some Tonys to attend them may be capable of seizing those Vessels. The Board concur in fiting them out with all Expedition so that our Officer be [able] to bring all that he may meet with[in]this Port, taking especiall care no Injuries be committed to the People after they are subdued, or any [Embezlement] made in their Cargos; When shou'd we be succesfull The King may probably be induced to restore our Guns, treat us

hereafter in a juster manner, & perhaps be brought to satisfye the Expence of the Armament now about to be made; Tis however evident the present state of Affairs under this Presidency, gives little Encouragement to commence any Broils, But as the Security of the Settlement does greatly depend on resolute Mcasures, since we cannot hope to humanize the Canarees by a mean Submission to all their abuses, that no favour or common mercy will be Shew'd us, should we fall under their Yoke, And the Security of our Trade & Priviledges solely depends on our continuing able to pretect them; Tis conceived our present determinations will be approved of what[so]ever consequence may ensue.

TO CAP^T. JAMES STERLING.

SIR

The King of Canara having lately treated us with remarkable Insolence & Captain injustice & not being to be prevail'd on to give us any redress, We are compelld to use the necess[ary]means in order to bring him into a better Disposition; To which end we appoint you in command of three Munchuas & six Tonys that lye ready prepared with warlike Stores, & a good body of Men with which you are to proceed (Wind & Weather permitting) as high as Pongoy or Dacla and in your way to or from thence you are to seize by force of Arms such Galevats or Boats belonging to the said King, as you may meet with, And are now expected with a supply of grain for his Army lying near Madday. The Gallevats as we Understand are not of much force & the Boats of none at all therefore on taking the former, you may easily with the assistance of your Tonys probably secure the Latter & on doing so return with them hither having the utmost care and attention that nothing be embezled by your People nor that any abuses be committed against those of the Canarees, after you have subdued them; But as t'is usuall for the French of Mihie & others in the Mallabar Country to hire Canaree Boats on their proper Account & risque to carry Rice, we enjoin you not to meddle with any such, as may be going or coming in that Service, and that you may be appriz'd of those so imploy'd, We send with you one Paqui Mupa & Two of our Balicars who are acquainted with them, and by their Information you are to act therein. Though [. • •] as are found in the Kings Service whether in the Sea or at any of his places, even as low as Pudiangady, lying on this side Mount Dilly, seize & bring with you if possible & which [. . .] you may look into, as you go up.

The Season being far advanc'd we are exceeding fearfull, least the Monsoon, should set in on the new moon, and as on your passing Billiapatam, there are no Ports that you can enter with safety, it behoves you to be expeditious in getting up to Pungoy or Dacla aforesaid, so as you may return in Season; however as the distance hence is not great & your[Muchas] [. . .] generally make a good judgment by some tokens previous to the approach of the Weather, do you follow their Opinion in this matter, & should they inform you, you run a risque by staying out, of having the weather break upon you, in such wise 1737-38-13-4

repair back, for on no Account should we care to risque the safety of your Vessells & People & if it should happen that your gaining this place is precarious then enter into Billiapatam giving us immediate notice thereof, and we will remand you hither by Land; It occurs to us withall that on your being disapointed of meeting the Galevats & Boats, you will do well to shew those at Neleasaron Pudiangady &c^a. that you are sent out in pursuit of their Vessels, as this may perhaps incline them to believe we are earnest in gaining address And thereby move them the sooner to give it us.

We need not recommend to you to use all your People both Soldiers & Muchas with the Necessary kindness as we believe you will in this, & every other respect act to the best of your Capacity for the good of the Service. We wish you success & are

The Season being far advanc'd & the Chief in Particular extream fearfull, that the Munchuas & Boats appointed out for Seizing the Canaree Vessells may run a great risque of meeting the Monsoon & through their want of Decks expose them to be drove on Shore in the Canaree Country, produceing thereby Unspeakable Mischiefs in the loss of Seventy five of our Best Garrison Soldiers & near one hundred Muchas, He therefore summons this meeting for taking the same into mature consideration; And in order to have the best advise possible, The Principal Muchas with others who have most Experience are call'd upon to give their Opinion whether we may with a view of Safety execute what is proposed or not. To which they say, that since we have hitherto wanted the usuall rain and Squalls previous to the Monsoon We may reasonably expect tempestuous [rain] on the Change of the 7th. of May, or two or three Days before, which may come in so suddenly from the Southward as to render It impracticable to gain Billiapatam River & as [their] is no Port to the Nº.ward save Goa wherein the [. . .] [. . .] to get shelter & that at too great a distance they [. . .] it will be prudent to risque it.

Debating thereon [. . .] that we are under no immediate Necessity of runing extraordinary hazards, and the effects proposed, if attended with [success] not equal to the Consequence of being deprived of so great a part of our force and People, Do on the whole conclude it will be eligible to desist for the present and the rather, as the Munchuas appointed having no small[er] are large & therefore cannot depend on their Oars for getting to the Southward; should the Wind happen to be against them. But t'is remark'd that our omitting to apply the means for gaining redress now & seeking it in the fair

Season, may prolong our dispute with the Canarees, & so deprive us all that time of getting Rice from their Country whereas seizing their Boats now, may introduce a Conference between us in the Rains & in August Satisfaction may be obtain'd, as well as the freedom of their Ports.

A Letter is now read from our Linguist at Billiapatam, which represents that the Prince Cunni Homo has for some time through the means of a principal Woman that long since fled from the Canaree Country, & now under his protection, been endeavouring to bring over about four hundred Horse & one thousand foot at present mercenary Soldiers in the Bednure Rajahs service near Madday that they may in conjunction with a body of [Nair] [. . .] destroy the Canaree Camp & seize the severall Fortresses raised in the Mallabar Teritories and the Success of the undertaking to [. . .] [depended] on by the Prince, that he Solicits us to Garrison any one of such Fortresses when secured, It being his Opinion the same may be easily perform'd & then he shall be in a Condition to preserve the rest with his Nairs, & the Topass Soldiers in his Service.

Resolution thereon.

The preceeding being a matter of the greatest moment; Sundry Observations are made thereupon; And after Consulting with our Chief Officer Cap^t. Gibbs; It is unanimously AGBEED that the Chief answers the Linguist according to the Report of the Letter enter'd here after & recommends to him to [. . .] the Matter so as the Prince may not immagine, We want inclination to serve him in anything Consistant.

To Domingos Rodrigues.

Answer.

We have weighed with the utmost attention, the Point set forth in your Letter, and we cannot avoid making our remarks & reflections thereupon.

Should the Mallabars succesfully execute their intended purpose & the Canarees become thereby terrified, It may be easy for us to effect an Accommodation between all Parties but contrariwise, should the Canarees be fired with the Treacherous part acted against them, & exert a Resolution, t'is to be feared the Prince will soon want mony & consequently the means of resistance & in suchwise our conjunction with him may expose us to Unspeakable troubles, of the same kind as we experienc'd when we before engaged with him, and from which we were compell'd to extricate ourselves by a Seperate Peace.

Our Present dispute with the Canarees is owing to their grosely abusing us at Mangalore, for which through the Divine Assistance, we may be able to gain redress, without entring into a protracted, & precarious War by land.

In case however we should resolve on taking upon ourselves to Garrison a Fortress after [Its] being seized by the Canarees, The Rains are very near, & it would therefore be impracticable to convey the necessary Ammunition provision &c for preserving it, & provided we are [. . .] out of our Communication by the Superiority of the Enemy, The Issue might be very deplorable.

Our Superiours are not averse to assisting the Prince, but experience has shewn us, he is not of himself competently active, and all his Affairs tend to ruin through the want of mony, and this it was that induced us to make a Seperate Peace with the Canarees, However if they Violate their Articles by approaching Maddacarra or otherwise, We must then unavoidably oppose them in our own defence.

Do you weigh the aforesaid reasons & endeavour[s] to excuse us to the Prince for not complying with his present request and you may assure him we are as warm in his Interest as ever, & which we shall be ready to demonstrate in all reasonable Cases, We wish him Success in his Enterprize & the more as he is about to free his Country from a deceitfull & base People, who we believe would omitt nothing for rendering him their Vassall I am.

Our Linguist returns from Billapatam, and acquaints us that as he found SATURDAY we were no way[s] inclinable to gratifye the Prince in the manner he desired he had done his part for convincing him it proceeded from no other motive Linguist than the impossibility of transacting such an affair with success in the rainy reports his Scason; And he at last seem'd contented, and only requested that on an with the occasion, We will send some People to take care of Billiapatam Fort, and then Prince. he can carry his whole force against the Enemy, which the Linguist said, he apprehended would not be denyed nor a supply of such Warlike Stores as can only be had through our means.

He tells us that he had imploy'd his utmost means for bringing the Princes Brother (Mention'd under the 6th.) into an entire Obedience but as he is of an haughty disposition, & the other not to be prevaild upon to take the Proper harsh means, he was only [able] to patch up the matter for the present & wait for another Oppertunity to manage the thing more Effectually; Though tis to be fear'd both the Prince & us may in time experience Sundry Mischiefs from him & the rather as the French are [...] him & had prevail'd on him to pay them a Visit at Mihie.

The Intention of [. . . The Intention of [. . .] over a great Part of the Canaree force taken notice of in the preceeding Consultation, Our Linguist assures us has been a long time in agitation, even immediately after we had concerted the Peace between the Mallabars & Bednure Rajah in August last; From whence we must remark that our Prince Paid no manner of regard to our being Mediators of said Peace but is like the other Indians, ready to sacrifise whomsoever to Interest and Convenience.

The Misure Rajah has been repeatedly applied to in a secret manner for sending a powerfull force into this Country, some mony has been sent on that Account by the Prince & it was expected that above one thousand Horse & five thousand foot would soon descend the Hills in order to join him in extirpating the Canarees, but our Linguist Says, that by the best Intelligence he was able to acquire, this affair will come to nothing as mony cannot be raised for supporting such a force, And indeed in our Opinion, t'is happy if they do not come, as tis probable they would prove as great an evil in the Country, as are the Canarees.

By a Patamar via Madrass, wrote a Letter to the Honble President & TUESDAY Council of Bombay under this date Acknowledging the receipt of their 23^b Commands dated the 8th. Ultimo with the Stores sent us by said Ship and the Life to 23^D. two Brothers, We inform'd them that our Honble Masters Ship Wilmington. Bombay.

departed hence for Madrass the 7th. of said Month, where the Commander proposed to stay untill the Latter end of August 'ere he proceeded for Great Britain. That through the Scarcity of Peper last Season, the more than Ordinary demands for it made by the French & at Callicut we had [only] been able to contract for two thousand five hundred forty five Candys & thirteen Maund and were determind to forbear buying any more, unless to be had at Eighty four rupees the Candy (The Terms of our last purchase) and which the Direc. tore of Mihie had engaged to concur in; That the Samourine had not made any proposialls for adjusting the payment of the ballance still due to our Honble Masters, which led us to conclude this long depending Account would not be speedily discharged. Puniture Rajahs & Durmet Ponicarys Debts remain Unsatisfied, But Prince Cunni Homo's was lessen'd twelve Thousand Eight hundred twenty six Fanams And six Vis and it was conjectur'd more would be recover'd from him by means of the Contributions raised in Randotarra. That we had determin'd on sending Mr. James Verelst to Mangalore with a Present to the King of Bednure (as the severall European powers had done the same) & accordingly he set out on the 5th. Ultimo; But on the 7th, we had certain Notice that all the Vessels belonging to our Servants in Number thirteen, carrying English Colours, were not only detain'd by the Canarees, but their Gun's & small Arms forcibly taken away by the Kings Officers & some of the Crues, abused for attempting [to freed]; who also took out of the Barge, which was [sent] at the request of Ragonat for the Kings Recreation ([. . .] the River) six small brass peices & carried them away and it being reported, that he would speedily repair to the Army and Endeavour to disposses us of Madacarra, led us to apprehend a design might be laid for imprisoning M¹. Verelst and the People who accompany him, adequate to a peice of the like treachery committed by said Ragonat on the Portugues Factor three Years ago, whereupon we immediately remanded back Mr. Verelst but forwarded the Letters he carryed for the King & him with others wrote at that time, repre-senting the Indignities done our Nation which we should not tamely suffer in case a plenary Satisfaction was denied however that the same was totally disregarded, but on the 28th. of said Month with much difficulty all the Munchuas & Barge were suffer'd to come away, though fifty Iron Guns, six Brass & all the small Arms were detain'd, which by the Kings commands were transported to Bossalore in order to be carried from thence to Bednure whereupon we came to a Resolution of fiting out some Munchua for seizing & bringing hither a Number of Vessels which [were] repairing to the Army with grain, but the Weather appearing Tempestuous the attempt was laid aside; However as we conceived, They would esteem it Necessary to obtain Redress from the Canarees we requested to be furnish'd at the opening of the Season with some Vessels of War to be employ'd against them, That the King of Cotata had in many Instances behaved very basely [...] in his Country the small Dutys formerly collected on Durmapatam, alledging the Island to be his property & though the Chief complain'd to him of this unjust proceedure he [. . .] giving a reply thereto. That notice was sent us lately by our Linguist at Billiapatam of the Prince having been sometime past Waiting with a Body of Horse & Foot in the Canarees Service to attack treacherously in concert with his Nayrs the forces of the Bednure Rajah over Madday [...] defeating them to seize said fortress with others erected in the Mallabar Territories, desiring we would secure one of them after It's reduction & he would take care of the rest; But the Rains approaching & that he wanted to entrust us with, could not be relieved this Season, We judg'd it necessary to decline gratifying him in this Particular but assured him of our readyness to oblige him in any other way without making an open breach with the Canarees. The French of Mihie continuing to introduce so large a quantity of fif[th] of rupees & a number of them base & there being at present an advance demanded for exchanging them into Rupees, we proposed with their permission to issue & receive only our own Fifths which if approved of we requested to be supplied

with the amount of Eight or ten thousand Rupees in that coin carrying their just Value And it being impracticable for us to adjust with Pondra Anta Naiques & Nursu Naiques Family, We entreated they would please to deter-mine the matter, as they best approve, having refer'd the contending Parties to them. That M^r. John Rose our Surgeon's Assistant being infirm & proposing to repair to his native country after the Rains, we desired another able Person might be appointed in his stead, And Ensign Henry Forbes judging his repairing to Bombay may probably tend to his [. . .] Which if they are pleased to admit of, we entreated their sending down a Capable Officer, as we cannot be without the number at present kept up. That we should use our Endeavours for providing the fifty Leaguers of Batavia Arrack they have order'd, which must be done at Cochin & therefore we apprehended some difficulty would arise in obtaining conveyances for it. The Annuall Papers required were also transmitted. Wrote likewise a short Letter to the Henble President & Council of Fort St. George, recommending to their care the forwarding the foregoing Advices to Bombay in the most safe & expeditious Madras. manner possible.

The Board concur in the same Sentime[nt] and as no Government can be Resolution. maintain'd but by Suitable reward to Punishments; Do Agree to deliver over the Delinquents into the Hands of the Minister, & leave him at liberty to execute the [law] of [the] Country, which may probably terrifye others from committing such Offences.

An Inhabitant of Durmapatam wounded by two Cotata.

Further Instances of his Malpractices.

On the 1st. Instant at Night Two Tiveys belonging to the Dominions of Cotata passed over the River at Durmapatam at the Eastermost part, and there cruelly wounded one of our Tivey Inhabitants, as he was descending from drawing a Coconut Tree, and left him in such a lamentable condition, that his belonging to life was their despair'd of.

> We have made all possible enquiery into the above & find that by severall Circumstances, the same was committed by the Direction of the King of Cotata, and which in some degree corresponds with what he inhumanely practised on one of our Principal Inhabitants taken Notice of in our Diary under the 3^d. of July 1736; He lately murder'd a deserted Soldier & took his Arms as enter'd under the 9th. Ultimo assumes & Collects the Dutys formerly paid on Durmapatam inserted at the same time, & compell'd us to desist from levying the same as mention'd in our Diary of the 1^{st} . of March 1736/7 and besides all which he is continually disturbing our People who frequent his Country. Stops sometimes our Pepper on trifling [. . .] & at present gives Counte-nance to Narranport Nair the Person who After robing a Tivey fled from the District (as remarked under the 4th. of January) nor will this King restore to us the Arms, wc^h. some of the Vagabond Nairs in our Pay have carried away into his Territories, although the same is a Current practice, & has hitherto been held as Inviolable among the Mallabar Powers.

Taken under consideration.

It is too obvious the King aforesaid means to give us all the Molestation possible & by little & little on finding us tamely Submitting will proceed to farther hostilities, which in some measure he may have been cautious in, through the Embarrassment the Commonallity of his Country have exposed him to for some time past with an Intent to screen themselves from a power he has assumed of Levying illegal Ta[xe]s & exercising other Instances of Injustice.

Should we forbear taken notice of his abuses, The few Inhabitants we have now on Durmapatam will inevitably forsake the Island And it may be difficult, if not impossible for us he[re]after to prevaile on others to settle there when it will be render'd a me[re] desert, Therefore the Board do concur in appointing ten Nairs more to be join'd with fifteen at present there, for protecting the Inland parts all in their Power and to be directed not to permit of any Persons from the other side to pass with Arms, nor suffer any Boats to ferry over after Sun Setts, And since we have cause to dread even more severe Mischiefs in future from this King provided he should once come to an Agrement with his Commonallity. It seems to us necessary that we keep up the misunderstanding

between them & him at the Expence of some mony If not to be otherwise done; And that for which end AGREED tha[t] [. .] be sent for to know their Intentions, And as a Patamar is about to depart to Bombay, that we represent the Matter to our Superiours & solicit for one hundred & fifty Military to be sent us in order to bring him to a more friendly disposition as that number with those we have here may in all probabillity effect what we desire, and which will prove a far less expence than employing Nairs of the Prince, or others: Besides our dependance is such on his Cotata's Country for Peper & provisions, that the Settlement must inevitably suffer greatly in case he goes on in his base practises, And it appears to us Impossible to avoid it, but by the use of Arms. For should we once content him with gifts or Loans, he will construe the same, as proceeding from our dread of him & make so many Demands on us, that we must in the end deny him, whe[n] he will commence again in giving us other Instances of his Baseness.

The Board however remark, that although the thing proposed for humbling Remarks. him is absolutely Necessary, it cannot be effected until we are shure the Canaree[s] will avoid troubling us, And we are to Suspect that the French may give him Assistance; which yet will not as we suppose be much, as he is already largely in their Debt, without a present prospect of recovering it.

On the whole t'is most severe on our Honble Masters to be compell'd to Issue so considerably for geting a Limited share of Pepper, and although we so punctually render our Prince his Customs & assist him at their expence on all Occasions, We are incapable of exciting him to give a Suitable protection to our Affairs; oweing in part to his Inactivity, but chiefly to his Avarice; though the remedy of either is out of our power, and therefore we are chiefly to rely on our own Strength, for conducting & Supporting the Trade of the Settlement.

There is a generall Complaint made by the Traders here that the French French fifthe by introducing a great Number of Fifts of rupees to answer the want of fanams, here. hath render['d] it difficult to gain any other specie than [said] Fifths, & which when they attempt to exchange for Rupees, they suffer therein from two to mental. two and an half & Cent & the more as the Fifths are often [Satisfied] and will in no wise pass currant out of the Territory of Colastry which in time may be productive of farther prejudice, we are severally sencible of this just complaint, which has arose by the French not proceeding with the caution we have exercised for we have always had a regard that no larger number of the fifths made at Bombay, are issued than is requisite for providing, for the common Exchange among the ordinary People.

To remedy however this growing mischief It occurs to us that it is proper Resolution. the Chief writes the Directore of Mihie, pursuant to what is contain'd in the Letter following this Consultation, and in case he will not Acquiece with our proposiall that we in future deliver & receive only our own Fifths within this district which we may be able to manage in such a manner as will prevent their becomeing to plenty and when we receive the amount desired from Bombay under the 23^d. May last, We may be capable of conducting our Intentions with proper efficacy.

In time past there was such a generall Scarcity of fanams of this Country that we were oblidged to' introduce a Competent Number of Fifts of Rupees to remedy the same & which had its desired effect through their being entirely acceptable, But afterwards the Gentlemen of Mihie brought such large & repeated supplie[s] of those made by you & dispers'd them in such quantities. that at present these Territores are encumber'd with them, and are not to be exchanged for Rupees without a loss of one & an half Vis to two Vis in a rupee & as this is a prejudice which may still greatly Increase it is Incumbent on us to seek a suitable remedy & wc'h. may be had provided you will on your parts deliver us Rupees for such of your Fifths as cannot be exchanged within this District without loss & we in like manner will render you rupees for such of our Fifths as your are unable to Exchange in your place without loss; But if with this reasonable Proposiall you are not enclined to Acquiece surely then you will not be displeasd that we reject your Fifths here, & suffer our only to pass currant with us, as t'is the sole method which occurs to us for supporting their due Credit I am

This Evening two Topasses were found to have passed from Cotatas side to Durmapatam, under pretence of fishing in our shore, but the Nairs appointed to Watch, not being satisfied with that excuse conducted them hither, and they were ordered to be secured untill we may determine in what manner to proceed with them.

Wrote a Letter to the Honble President & Council of Bombay under this date, enclosing Duplicate of our last dated the 2[5]th. Ultimo with the severall papers accompanying the same and Copy of our address to the Honble Company now forwarded to Madrass to be sent \mathfrak{P} Wilmington. We acquainted them of our having a prospect of securing two hundred & fifty Candys of peper

more at Eighty four Rupees the Candy And should endeavour at encreasing the quantity provided it would be done without making bad debts. That the Princes debt was lessen'd since September last to Rupees thirty nine thousand one hundred twenty three one Quarter and [...] Raes by assessments recover'd from Randotarra, but that the [project] laid by him for secretly gaining the Fortresses [. . .] [by the Canarees] was likely to prove abortive, And Ragonat was reported to be [. . .] out from Mangalore with a Body of Horse & foot for molesting the Malabars & the Bednure [. . .] would continue there during the Rains, That notwithstanding our utmost endeavours for preserving a good understanding with the King of Cotata, they have no [. .] He having on the first Instant sent two Tiveys over to Durmapatam who already wounded one of our Inhabitants on the Eastermost parts thereof [. . .] the arms of one of our [. . .] Soldiers refusing to deliver them back & afterwards [. . .] their, Goods [Pro . . .] to Narranport Nair & who was turn'd out of his office for [. . .] in Novb^r. last & fled from hence after robing a Tivey house in this district to the value of near eight hundred Rupees after molests our People frequenting his country . . .] our peper on frivolous pretences & [. . .] it is our Opinion, unless some means were soon applied for curbing the Insolence of said King's greater mischiefs might be expected from him, & he being now at variance with the Commanallity of his Country (which we should endeavour to keep up) we esteem'd it a fit juncture to fall upon him, & therefore desired they would for that purpose send down after the Nairs One hundred & fifty Military which joind with the like number here & the Nair and Tiveys of this district, might in all probability bring him to reason, The Chief & M^r. Howard as trustees to M^r. William Forbes deceased requested bills for Eight thousand eight hundred Rupees in favour of Mess¹⁸. Alexander and Hugh Forbes & that they might be drawn at two Shilling and six pence each. The deceased being in the Company's Service at the time of his demise That M^r. One John Seaton our Gunners Chief Assistant with John Wright a quarter Gunner having leave to go to Eddecaute for doing some work at the Fortress there, do not now appear, but are by the best intelligence deserted & have carried a black Montross with them, & two of our Fuzees which they had The Gunners charge of.

Yesterday as one of the Tiveys belonging to this district was on Cotatas side, The Nairs belonging to that King seizd & bound him threatning to kill him instantly, & the poor wretch suffer'd all the terrours possible, but in a small time the Nairs left him, & The Tivey by one Means or other got loose & swam over to our Shore.

The Linguist this day received an Ola from the King of Cotata, requesting he would apply to us for the releasement of Two Topasses taken on Durmapatam the 3 Ins^t. To which the Chief directed the Linguists giving for answer, That since he the King continues to keep all our deserters that repair to his Country, refuses to restore our Arms, which they & others carry, & one of the Cotata to Topasses aforesaid having received a suitable punishment from M^r. Braddyll for crimes committed here formerly; tis conceived he cannot in reason expect a Reply. complyance with his request, and the rather as we must suppose the Topasses were not on Durmapatam, with any good design, considering what had happend there lately (meaning the wounding our Tivey) of which matter the King must be fully acquainted.

Yesterday Evening one John Jarrat a Topass dwelling on Durmapatam borrow'd a Gun of the Officer under a pretence of Shooting & then went to his house; where he shot his Wife and thence fled to Cotata.

Tis observed by the board how greatly the Currant expence of the [...] is encreased to what is paid at in farther times being to the many places we at present hold and by keeping up more than ordinary force for withdrawing the perfideous [. .] nor is to apprehend in the state things are at this [. .] it is in our power [. .] although conti-nuing in the present [. .] the Settlement of little Utility to our Employers [. . .] pepper [. . .] extravagantly dear.

Enquiry being made concerning the two Topasses of Cotata's brought from Durmapatam on the [8th] We find one is a Smith employ'd in mending the King's fire Arms & the other a carpenter, The first was long since chatised by M^r. Braddyll for attempting to [serve] there & then sent to Callicut wih strict Injunction never to repair again to Cotata.

T'is evident by the many instances of Injustice done us by the aforesaid King, that we cannot expect gaining his friendship through the returning the Topasses and as our detaining them will certainly prevent the mending his fire Arms, thereby rendering many useless, we esteem it the best plicy to keep them confi[nd] untill an opportunity offers for transmitting them to a place far distant from whence they cannot easily return; Besides as none of our people who repair to him are ever return'd or were our Arms, he cannot reasonably blame us for following the same method he at first practised.

Canaree Service in order to destroy the Camp & $[\ldots]$ the severall Fortresses erected by the Bednure Rajah in the Mallabar Territories, would be put in Execution, when the season becomes fair, & that he had the strongest hopes of Success.

On the 24th. The Chief waited on him again at the same place, when the Prince told him, that he had lately received sundry Invitations from the French of Mihie for inducing him to accept of the Customs of that place, amounting annually from Six to eight thousand Rupees, to give the like countenance and protection to their Affairs as the English Experience from him, & they the French would faithfully on their parts assist him against whomsoever of his Ennemies, [sic] That they had indeed adhered to Boyanore, supposing him proprietor of the Country wherein they are situated, & Also given their aid in supporting the King of Cotata, but on being convinced now, that he the Prince is Sovereign of the Kingdom of Colastry, they should in future acknowledge him solely; And then he ask'd the Chief his Sentiments of the above proposialls, appearing at the same time extream ready to embrace them, Yet by way of Compliment alledged, he would not go to see the French, as they had requested him to do, or deem to listen to them, unless t'is agreeable to us.

The Chief aserts that he was in the utmost Consternation to find the Prince so much inclining to embrace his interest at the expence of his own honour & our Welfare after our performing so many Valuable services with the loss of a large Sum purely for supporting his Authority; However as entering on Expostulations might prove of no Utility, He replied, That the point in question was of the utmost consequence therefore it ought to be well weigh'd, and after which he might proceed as should be really found consistant with his [. . .] Interest, The engagement he is under to us and his own reputation; with this Answer he appear'd Satisfied, say'g he conceived we should ever be averse to his Amity with the French, and therefore would do nothing to disoblidge us; He wrote an Ola to Carringhoda, whom we find to have been the principal person employ'd in the affair. (That after seeing us he had consider'd that he ought not to go to Mihie) or enter into any Engagement with those there, untill he is previously secure of the amount of all the Customs, which by Right belong to him from the first establishing that Place.

Notwithstanding the precited remarkable behaviour of the Prince, The Chief thought it incumbent on him to represent the late Insults committed to us by the King of Cotata, & requested that since we are strictly just in all our Transactions, & have disbursed very extensively in support of his Authority, are Invested with Authentick Grants empowering our holding Durmapatam, he ought in reason to determine on using such means, for curbing said King as may effectually secure us from his treacherous practices hereafter; To which he replied that he was there about concerting ways with the Principal Men at this time engaged in opposing the Kings usurped Authority, & doubted not but very shortly he should be able to reduce him, so as may free us entirely from future Molestation, recommending to us to transmit to Him such of the Heads aforesaid, as may come to us to discourse on the affair which the Chief thought Proper to assure him, would be complied with.

Remarks.

The Board are sorry to observe that all the Pains and Expence applied in the service of our Prince for so many years, is likely to terminate in the Vilest Ingratitude on his part, for this present Disposition in him to embrace the French for the sake of the Customs, join'd with the Steps he made lately for giving the Dutch an entrance into the Pepper (notwithstanding the trade of his Country is made over to our Honble Masters in the most confirm'd manner) serves to demonstrate fully, that we can have no reall dependance of his prefering our Welfare to whomsoever, provided his Interest might be otherwise secured and mony is so much his [ruling] passion, that although the French

have contrived all possible Means to bring him under the Canaree Yoke, excited his Subjects to dispute his Authority, and actually aimed at placeing another in the Goverment as set forth in our Diary under the 17th. of December 1735.

Yet we now see he is ready to pass by all this merely for a temptation of present profit; But however since the rooting out this base Affection, seems impracticable and we can pitch on no other person for countenancing our Affairs Necessity compells us to keep fair with him in the best manner we can.

Our Linguist has hitherto been highly cares'd by him, & few things of moment have escaped his Cognisance. But in the designs of the Dutch, and those of the French aforesaid, he has not had the least confidence placed in him owing as we suppose to the Princes conceit, that his Principels are [...] sound to be byass'd in anything wherein the Interest of his Employers may suffer.

On the whole The Board conclude, that since our proceeding to aid him in Resolution. future cannot be attended with the Benefit, We have hitherto expected, and these Indian Rajahs are in generall equally knavish, It is our bussiness to [...] the Estate of our Masters by all fitting means, & not to engage in opposing the Canarees, in case they will let us alone, & give us a tolerable Satisfaction for their past ill Treatment, but rather suffer the Mallabars & them to contend with each other, if they are so disposed; apprehending the conquering & preserving this Country to be a work to [sic] difficult for him to Accomplish.

The above person's being called in & made acquainted with the state of their Debts, give us assurance of a Speedy payment, and Apprehending them to be the most proper to rely on for supplying us; They are desired to declare the amount they are willing to contract for & on what Conditions, To which they say, That through the small remains of Pepper in this Country the dread of a bad Crop ensuing from the more then usual dry weather lately, It is not in their Power to offer more than one hundred Candys of Peper at eighty six rupees, & yet they are in no wise solicitous to engage for that, and the rather as the French give out they expect in this Month a Ship from Europe, with a large Sum to be invested in Pepper.

The Board remark that what is tender'd will be very inconsiderable & we having wrote the Honble Company & our Superiours at Bombay lately of our Intentions to give no more than Eighty four & wherein the French Chief had concurred It is not improbable but our accepting the present offers may be disaproved; Though on the other hand We are Unanimous in Opinion that if We slip the present Oppertunity, The French will buy up all the Pepper they can gett at any rate, alledgeing the necessity of so doing, And as the Crop must certainly suffer greatly by the unseasonable dry Weather, We have lately had; The Value & Scarcity of this Commodity may be such, as will deprive us of making our purchases some time hence on the present footing Demanded, And therefore we do agree to accept the quantity offer'd of one hundred Candys at Eighty Six, and that we issue immediately the Value namely Viz^t.

& then the French used all possible means for sinking the Value of those made at Bombay, but without any Effect, as our people shewed an Eagerness for collecting all that could be met with & we are under no manner of Apprehensions of our Fifths carrying a less Value than the just one they are now esteem'd at, especially while we continue to issue no more than are absolutely Necessary for the Currant exchange of the Country, pursuant to the first Intention we had at our introducing them.

Several of the Tiveys inhabiting Durmapatam & who are esteemed responsible soliciting for some Arms in order to defend themselves from the attempts of Cotata; It was thought convenient to deliver them thirty three firelocks & the like number of Cartouch Boxes They engaging to exert their utmost at all times for securing the inland parts, but where promised not to be called upon for other Services, unless in times of absolute Necessity, And as the ten Nairs appointed in our Consultation of the 5th. Ultimo for securing the Island do not seem now requisite to be continued, They are ORDER'D to be withdrawn for easing the Expence in Supporting them.

Pedro Rodrigues appointed for collecting the Revenues of Durmapatam delivers in his Account thereof from the 1st. of August last to the end of this Month, which being examined and found to be right; is enter'd after this Consultation.

The Ballance which appears to be now due from him of Fanams four thousand one hundred Seventy two and a quarter and is the same as last Year, did arise from a quantity of Salt sold to the Person's mention'd, and who have not as Yet been able to vend it through the Value being considerably decreased, nor is it in our power to obtain the amount at present without going to severities which the Board apprehend had better be avoided.

The loss of Fanams Eight hundred seventy Nine and for which is [sic] Account has Credit was oweing to advancing Money to several People who where judged to be so industrious as might in a little time greatly contribute to the Cultivation of a large Tract of Ground. But as we are likely to be frustrated therein by the desertion of the Parties, We hope our Superiours will be satisfied with our deducting it, as We have done out of the produce of the Revenues.

We are sorry to observe how little probability there is in the present state of things for our advancing the Revenues of this Island, as People are in generall terrified from setling their through the repeated abuses committed by the King of Cotata which have been already taken notice of in this & the preceedingDiary.

Manoel Rodrigues tenders his Account of the Revenues arising in the parts between this place and Moylan which are found to be more this Year than before by collecting an Accustomary fine on the Verges levied once in five Years (called in Malabars Coucon's) his Account on Examination being found right, will also appear after this Consultation.





Brother and our Apprehensions thereupon, And under the 20th. t'is remark[ed] in what manner our Linguist had Accommodated between them for the present, But we now find he is eagerly endeavouring to gain the Moors of Cannanore on his side as also the Country of Cartuanadu, in order as he pretends to wage War on the Canarees, but in reallity to try how well he is likely to succeed in opposing the Government of the Prince Regent Cunni homo and which our Linguist had an Oppertunity of learning late. Upon this the Chief caused notice to be given to our Prince exciting him [to] apply an immediate remedy, as delays might be attended with fatall Consequences but he in answer to this declares, he is under no manner of Uneasyness at whatever the other may attempt, & provided he once discovers evident proof of a Treacherous disposition, he will confine him in prison, Though we are apt to conceive the thing cannot be so easily done, as the Prince immagines, but it does not become us to intermeddle farther at this time.

Notwithstanding the disgust entertain'd by the Nombiers against the French for erecting a Fortress some time since at a place called Peringatur and lately for aiding Curringhoda in Routing a petty Power near him as taken notice of in our Diary in August last: Yet the said Nombiers were on Sundry invitations made, prevailed on to go lately to Mihie, where the French made them large & repeated offers of Friendship and then pressed the[m] to assign all the Pepper of their Country to the French Company who wou[ld] pay a Rupee in a Candy more than the Tellicherry price & give them the Nombiers two Rupees Customs on each Candy brought down the River of Mihie This offer being so much in favour of those People, they began to consider how to grasp it, but on discussing the point, they were at last ind[u]ced to declare it to be out of their power to appropriate the Trade solely to the French as the Authority for so doing lay entirely in their Soveraign [sic] but that they would protect such Merchants as might be sent to buy Pepper on the same footing as The Nombiers then demanded the French's Assistance for compelling others. Curringhoda to restore them some Palmars usurped by him, which was readily promised, but Afterwards on the attempting to possess them, such an Opposition was made by the other as led the French to send a Messenger to the Nombiers in excuse for not performing their promise at present, referring the matter to a Enquiery in future.

And Prince Cunhi Homo.

We have Notice that the French have been lately very Anxious for gaining our Prince on their side & pay him the duty of Mihie, and to which end the Moors of Cannanore have been applied to, as well as severall principall Nairs of the Country; But we have the Satisfaction to hear he would not give ear to the Proposialls ma[de] him on that Affair, & so far he has kept his promise given us as remarked in our Consultations of the 26th. June, But we are very fearfull that times & Circumstances may at last tempt him to deviate, & thereby lay our trade here under more disadvantages then hitherto tending to render this Settlement of little Utility to our Honble Masters.
