The Consultation and Diary Book of the Worshipfull James Hubbard Esq., Deputy Governour &c. Council, being their Transactions in the Affairs of the Honourable United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East Indies. Begun this first day of January, 1733—34.

The Deputy Governour acquaints the Board that having had Information of a Murther suspected to have been Committed in Tevnapatam by one Cundapa a Black Doctor on the body of one Vencatan a Washerman which was said to be buried in Cundapa's house whereupon he directly apprehended the said Cundapa and a woman named Kistney then living with him. That he had sent Messrs. Eyre and Munroe to search and see if it were true, who accordingly on taking away some earth raised a little above the other part of the floor with a pile of parriar Pots on it, found there the body of a Man with a rope about the Neck very putrid and offensive, which being washed discover'd an Impression of the Rope very deep in the Neck, the Tongue swollen and hanging out of the Mouth and the privy parts also tumid and a little in Erection—That since This, he has enquir'd and examin'd everybody he could find to prove the fact and has the Witnesses attending ready to give in their Evidence, who being accordingly examin'd, their several Depositions on the Matter are as enter'd after this Consultation—and ORDER'd to be drawn up Fair to be sign'd and Sworn to.

Information of the Murther of a washerman in Tevnapatam.

The Merchants having been lately eas'd in the taking off the Sea Customer's fee of one per Mill on the Blue Cloth and Paintings, ORDER'd that it be Publish'd and that the Customer's other Fees be establish'd; and that the Lists of their usual Rates of Collecting be Transcrib'd afresh as after this Consultation and hung up at the several Choultrys and Banksall whereto they belong respectively.

THE INFORMATION OF KISTNEE OF CHELLUMBRUM TAKEN UPON [OATH] BEFORE ME JAMES HUBBARD ESQ<sup>a</sup>. ONE OF HIS MA[ESTY'S] JUSTICES OF PEACE & C<sup>a</sup>. COUNCIL.

This informant on her Oath [says] That on Fryday the 28 of December 1733 she cam[e to] Tevnepatam & being out of Order desired one Chelle[mbee] A Beaters Wife to Recommend her to a Doctor to [cure] her, the said Chellembee told her the house she liv[ed in] belong'd to a Black Doctor nam'd Cundapa but th[at] he being in Debt to one of the Washermen was gone abroad & she did not know when he would return [As] she lay in that house that Night to wait there for the Doctors coming the next morning the Doctor ca[me] to the house, & she acquainted him of her being out of Order & desired him to Cure her, he told her, to stay [at] the house & he would give her Phisick the next day, [which] she accordingly did, presently after her having spoke to the Doctor, A Washerman Namd Vencatandoo to whom she understood Cundapa owed money, & who had stay'd in the house all the night before in expectation of his coming home, went to the said Cundapa and ask'd him to pay him what he Owed him that he might go into the Country, Cundapa answer'd him that he would pay him his mony after Dinner & gave him a fanam to buy Rice for Dinner so the Washerman went out to buy Rice & in a little time return'd with Rice, Brinjals & Temper for Curry, & both the Washerman & Cundapa spoke to her to dress it for their Dinner, about 11 a Clock at Noon she had got the Dinner ready, (being only R[ice] & Curry) & carry'd it to the said Cundapa & the Wash[erman] who were sitting together she then took part of [the rice] & some of the Curry & put them upon a leaf & gave [them the] said Cundapa there was also a Daughter of [...] living in the same house, present to whom [the said] Cundapa bid her give some Victuals to, so [she took] out some of the Rice & Curry & put it on another [leaf] for the Girl, but she refused to eat it, upon which Cundapa took what victuals had been taken out for the Girl & put it among his own, this Cundapa told her she might go out & he would give the rest of the Victuals to the Washerman, so she went to the yard to fetch Water & brought some in a little Earthen Pot and put it upon a fogan sic in the room where they were Sitting at which time she also found the Washerman had a leafe of Curry & Rice before him when the Doctor bid her take down a Pot of Oyl Slung on a Rope in the Room she Answer'd she was busie, & thereupon Cundapa took it down himself & she saw him pour it among the Washermens Rice Whereupon the Washermen enquired why he put Oyl in his Rice, he said he had got no Butter & bid him take that Gingily Oil instead of it upon w<sup>ch</sup>. he Eat all up, she did not see the Doctor put any Oil in his own Rice but put the Pot up again directly. After Dinner they wash'd their hands & the Washerman fell immediately a Vomiting & then laid himself down on a Piall & rose several times after to vomit & then went into the Backyard to go to Stool & laid there about an hour for the Convenience of Purging downwards being in a weak Condition till about 1 a Clock the Doctor went to him & told him not to stay there in the Cold but help'd to bring him into the house where she & one Jungamia A Taylor were sitting upon which she & the Taylor went out, & the Doctor bid her bring 3 or 4 Baskets of Sand which she did & put it near the Washerman to vomit upon. The Doctor went often out & into the house & asked him how he did, & he answer'd he was very much fatigu'd & full of Pain all over the body & She herself went in several times & found him continually vomiting & purging till about 6 a Clock who light a Lamp & went to sleep being herself out of Order & this Informant knows nothing of what past that night except that once in the night the Doctor wak't her when the Dammer fellow was speaking to the Washerman but she went to sleep immediately [and] would not get up she rose about 6 or 7 a Clock [next] Morning being Sunday the 31<sup>st</sup>. when seeing none [but] the Doctor there she ask'd where was the Washer[man] he said I have paid him his mony & went with [him] as farr as Treepopilore on his way home into [the] Country This Informant observed The sand she br[ought] in the Day before was cleard away, & being a [feast] day she asked him to clear the Walls as Us[uall] that time, but he bid her clean the yard & he himself would clean the Walls of the house—she a[sked] him then to give

her Phisick but being Feast time [he] bid her stay in the house till a week after & not touc[h] cold water, then he set her to clean the Yard & rub the Pyals with Clay & other Work in the Yard but she told him she was sick & could not do so much & de[sired] him to give her Phisick or she would go to some other Black Doctor, to which he told her to Stay there this Pungall & afterwards she might go where she would, so she went to Work in the Yard a Plaistering the Pyals &c<sup>a</sup>. & he gave her Rice that Day & she continued to stay in the house till Wednesday the 2<sup>d</sup>. of January on the Evening of which Day she went to look into some of the Pots in the Room for a Piece of Rag to make a Pavy of for the Lamp & in one of the Pots she found a Turbit & Cloth which she took out & shewed to Jangomiah a Taylor & Virrapa a Dammer fellow that happen'd at that time to be in the house & ask't them if they knew who those Cloths belong'd to, they told her they believed they must be the Washermens & Advis'd her to make a Complaint of it to the Justices upon which some time after with the abovemention'd Persons & some other of the Neighbours she went to the Choultry Dubash & told him of the Cloths they had found & the Suspecion they had of the Doctors kill[ing] the Washerman, she also Deposes that the Pariar [Pot] now produc'd is the same that Cundapa pour'd Oil out of into the Washermans Rice & this is a[ll] the Informant knows of the Matter.

## JANGOMIAH A TAYLOR DEPOSES—

That Cundapa owing him 2 Pag<sup>s</sup>. he went on Saturday the 29 December about Noon to ask him for it & he promis'd to pay it him that Day so he laid himself down & went to Sleep when he awak't being he thinks about 1 A Clock he saw the Black Doctor Cundapa sitting upon a Mat, & he told him that he would have given his Daughter some victuals but she would not eat it, the Washerman at the same time was washing his hands having just done Dinner he this Deponent went immediately home to dinner with this Daughter & return'd again 3 A Clock when he found the Doctor helping the Washerman into the Room from the Backyard & he askt Cundapa what was the matter with the Washerman he said he had eat no Victuals for 2 or 3 Days & having eat a Dinner that day it had Set him a Vomiting & Purging, so he saw the Washerman go into the Room by the help of the Doctor & laid himself down on the Ground, where he saw him Vomit & purge very much & the Doctor spoke to Kistnee to bring sand for the Washerman to Vomit upon which she did next morning about 7 a Clock he came again to ask the Doctor for his mony, at which time Vencatty Putty was there, & they both ask'd the Doctor where the Washerman was, he Answerd he had given him Congy that morning & paid him his mony & went with him as farr as Treepopilore that as Vencaty Putty had Threatned him that he should be Chau[buckt] if he did not pay the mony to the Washerman, he had therefore paid him & sent him away. The Deponent heard no more till Wednesday evening when he w[ent] again for his mony but Cundapa was not at home, [at] which time Kistnee came to him & acquainted him that she had found a Cloth & Turbit in a Parrian Pot which she believed belongd to the Washerman, & the ground was a little rais'd where the Pots were wh[ich] she could not tell what to make of, & that the Doctor had forbid her to come into that Room, as soon as she told him of this he this Deponent went to acquaint the Choultry Dubash of it, after which as he was returning he found Kistnee, Virrapa & Vencaty Putty going likewise to the Choultry Dubash & he went along with them & further this Deponent knoweth not.

## VENCATTY PUTTY DEPOSES—

That he lives in the same house with the Doctor nam'd Cundapa & that on Saturday the 29<sup>th</sup>. of Dec<sup>r</sup>. about 12 or 1 a Clock as he was mending so[me] Cloaths in a Room next to Cundapas, he heard [a] Man Vomiting several times which Jangomiah & Moota told him was the Washerman upon which he got up & went into the Yard where he found the Doctor holding the Washermans head whilst he was Vomiting, both of them Sitting on the Ground he ask<sup>t</sup>. the Doctor what was the matter he said the Washerman had not eat for 2 or 3 Days but [his] having eat a great deal today that was the reason he was so sick, but that he would give him Cassay [to] make him well & that he would pay him his mony next morning & send him away, so he this Depo[nent] came home with a lighted Dammer in his ha[nd.] when he heard the Washerman crying out in a terrible manner so he went to the Door of the Doctors room (which he found shut) and askt what was the matter twas Answer'd by the Washerman that his mouth was very dry & desired him to get him some Sower Conjee to drink this Deponent answer'd he had got none now & that it was not good for him to drink as he had been a vomiting but that he would get him some in the morning this Deponent then went to his Room to sleep; about 7 a Clock next morning being the 30<sup>th</sup>. of December this Deponent seeing the Doctor in the Yard he askt him how the Washerman did, the Doctor Reply'd he had given him some Conjee that morning & paid him the fanams he owed him & he had been with him as far as Treepilore, where he deliver'd him to some of his Relations to go along with him home. This Deponent further Says that 3 Days after being Wednesday the 2<sup>d</sup>. of Jaïry when he came home about 11 at Night he saw Jangomia Kistnee & Virrapa talking together, whom he joind & then he heard Kistnee say that she had found a Turbit & Sheet in a Parriar Pot, and that Cundapa had laid some Boards & Stones upon the Ground that morning, & that she did not know what to make of it but that she was afraid there was some mischeif, so they all agreed to go to the Choultry Dubash to Complain which they accordingly did & further this Deponent knoweth not.

## MOOTA A BEATER DEPOSES—

That living in the same house with Cundapa he came home about 1 A Clock at Noon & on Saturday the 29<sup>th</sup>. December seeing the Doctor holding the Washermans head while vomiting enquired the matter, & the Doctor said that having no Victuals for 2 days till just now, was the Occasion of it, finding he had no Dinner dress'd for him. The Deponent went out to his Beating again & return'd about 6 in the Evening & ask'd the Doctor whither he had given him any thing to stop it, the Doctor Reply'd he would give him some & that he would do well. The Deponent then went abroad to water some Onions & return'd about 9 at Night of the same day when he neither heard nor Saw any thing more of it but went to Supper directly & afterwards to Sleep About 6 next morning he rose and came into the Yard & seeing the Doctor Washing his face & puting on the usual Marks of his Cast, he ask'd him for some Fire, the Doctor said he had none, & then going out to a Neighbours house to light his Banker he return'd home & seeing the Doctor Answerd, that he had given him some Conjee paid his Debt to him of

fanams 14 & went with him to the Washer's town, on his way home. That Vencatty Putty on Wednesday night (when the Clout & Turband was found in the Pot) came & waked him & asked how he could Sleep there, till this matter was clear'd up; whereupon he got up & Slept in another Room with Vencaty the Dammer Fellow; And further this Deponent knoweth not.

## CONDALOO DEPOSES—

That on Wednesday the 2<sup>d</sup>. day of Jañry 1733/4 About 11 A Clock at Night Jangomia came to this Deponents house told this Deponent that he went to Cundapa the black Doctors house to Demand some mony that the Doctor owed him, and that Kistnee was at the Doctors house when he went there, that she told him she had found a Turbant and a Cloth in a Pott and said she wondred how it came there, but upon Consideration of it they both Concluded it belong'd to a Washerman nam'd Vencata that had been in the house some days before & that she believ'd some mischief had been done him, a little time after Kistnee, & Vencaty Putty & Virrapa, (two Duty fellows) came also to this Deponent, and confirmd what related by Jangomia as above, upon which this Deponent sent Talliards to fetch the said Cundapa & enquir'd of him about this matter. Cundapa at first said he had paid the Washerman & sent him into the Country, this Deponent then askt him whose Turbant & Clout that was which was found in a Pot in his room but he would give no Answer to it, & Pressing the said Cundapa further to tell the Truth of what he had done to the Washerman he said it was his Misfortune but would say no more, therefore this Deponent put both Cundapa & the Woman into the choultry that night & next morning being Thursday the 3<sup>d</sup>. Instant carry'd them to M<sup>r</sup>. Croke & acquainted him of every thing that Passed the night before as is above related, upon M<sup>r</sup>. Crok's Examining the said Cundapa, he declared that the Washerman had din'd with him on Saturday the 28 of December & that after Dinner he was taken with a vomiting & purging & that the next morning the Washerman dyed in his Room & that he dig'd a hole in the same Room immediately & buried him there, Upon M<sup>r</sup>. Croke's asking him why he buried him in that manner & did not Acquaint the Neighbours, Cundapa reply'd as that Day was a feast day & he had no mony to pay the Charges of a publick burying, therefore he buried him in that manner, This Deponent further says that he was present when M<sup>r</sup>. Eyre & Doctor Munroe were sent by the Gov<sup>r</sup>. to see the Corps taken up & says there were Several Parriar Pots put over the Place the Washerman was buried in that the Ground over him was not above 3 or 4 Inch<sup>s</sup>. deep, that he lay with his face upwards, & there was a rope upon his face which as soon as they took him out they saw was twisted about his Neck that his body was Swell'd very much & Stunk so that they could not bear the stunk of it, the Deceas'd had two Silver Rings on his left hand fingers.

## THOMAS EYRE DEPOSES—

That being appointed by James Hubbard Esq<sup>r</sup>. to examine and Inspect into the Particulars of a Murther said to be Committed in Tevnepatam, He this Deponent went there accordingly the 3<sup>d</sup>. day of January with M<sup>r</sup>. Andrew Munroe Surgeon and was brought to a little Tatcht house where the People said the Black Doctor Cundapa lately dwelt, and that on removing some Parriar Pots Piled on each other

at the further end of it we should find a body buried under them when being towards Evening that we might the better See, we order'd that end of the House to be uncover'd, & removing the Parriar Pots with a little loose Earth laid smooth under them, We found a Body with a Rope about its Neck when we had it brought out before the house and some Pots of Water flung upon it to wash off the Earth, which discover'd the Tongue of the said body lolling out of its Mouth and the Privy Parts very much Swell'd with the Impression of a Rope deeply indented in its Neck which was tyed about the Middle of it & about 2 foot of each end of it was found laid over the Head when the Body was dugg up.

## ANDREW MUNROE SURGEON DEPOSES—

Thursday the 3<sup>d</sup>. Inst<sup>t</sup>. having received an Order from his Worship The Deputy Governour to Attend at the Gardens together with Mr. Eyre to Inspect unto a Murther said to be Committed in Tevnepatam, and having accordingly come there; There was an Earthen Pott brought before his Worship on the bottom of which there was a small Quantity of a Brunish stuff said to be the Remains of Poison given the Deceas'd. There being nothing at hand to make any Experiment I call'd for some Milk, which Accordingly was brought fresh from the Cow, and having put some of the said brown stuff into half a Sneaker full of the said Milk it broke and curdled it immediately on their being Stirr'd together; Afterwards being order'd to go to Tevneptm in Company with Mr. Eyre to see a body dugg up out of the Ground, upon our Arrival there Mr. Eyre and myself order'd the Tatch to be taken off the Top of a little straw house to give light, it being towards Evening, which being done Accordingly He this Deponent went into the said House where he Saw at the South end of it a Parcel of Parriar Pots, which being removed with about half a foot of the Earth which was laid very smooth over it there Appear'd a body with a Rope about its neck; and having order'd it to be Carry'd out to a little Yard before the house, it had a few Potts of Water thrown upon it to Wash off the Earth, Then there Plainly appear'd the Tongue of the said body Lolling out at its mouth, The Penis some what in Erection and the Scrutum tumid with the Impression of the Rope deeply indented in his Neck which this Deponent verily believes could not have happend, had the Rope not been ty'd about his Neck before he Dyed.

As the Body was so putrid this Deponent could not judge Certainly by any Symptom whither the Dec'd had been Poisond or not but the Body was much Swell'd & the hair fell easily off the scalp which are Reckon'd Usual Symptons in case of Poison this Depon<sup>t</sup>. does believe that there was Sharp accid in it which is in most Poisons, or else it would not have had that Effect so Suddenly, but what it particularly was this Deponent cannot tell.

## NUMSHAWAYA &amp; PERSERAM COMPY'S BLACK DOCTORS DEPOSES—

That the Parriar Pot which was show'd them the 3<sup>d</sup>. of January & is now again brought to them, did contain a little Grammaluck Seeds powderd & mixt with a little Gingile Oil, & being askt what Effects it would produce if given to any Persons, they say if a small Quantity is taken by any body, it will set them a Vomiting & Purging but if a large Quantity it will cause Death, being asked if

it is ever usual to eat it with Victuals, they say not, & when a little is at any time given for Phisick it is Usually given in Jaggary or Sugar in a Morning & never to their knowledge mixt with Oil.

That on Thursday the 3<sup>d</sup>. of January at about five in the Afternoon, he was in the House at Tevnepatam when some Cooly & others were a digging up the Ground where a Man had been buried & that when the Ground was open'd he saw the Corps lying with its face upwards and a Rope about his Neck which was tyed in the Middle of it, & about 2 foot of the Rope on each end of it upon his face & that he laid hold on one End of the Rope & a Taliar on the other & help lift it out of the Ground thereby & further this Deponent saith not.

CUNDAPA PRISONER—

Cundapa Examin'd acknowledges his owing the Washerman Fanams 14 & says that the Washerman Vencaty had lived with him 13 Days 9 of which days he always Dind with him, and that every time At the Washermans desire he gave him Gingile Oil with his Victuals, & on that Saturday the 28, he gave him as Usual & the Washerman only askt him whether the Oil was good or no, or the same as he always gave him, being shown the Pot he own'd it was the same he pourd the Oil out of, & that the Oil had Pepper & Turmerick beat & mixt with it & that the reason of his vomiting & Purging was from not having eat any Victuals for 2 or 3 days before, that the Washerman Continued vomiting & Purging till 4 in the Morning & then he dyed, he himself continued awake, the Woman Kistnee asleep; presently after this Examinant took a Rope & ty'd his Neck & Legs together & put him in that Condition into a Corner of the Room, about 10 a Clock in the morning when every body in the house was gone out he dug a hole & buried him first untying the Rope that went about his legs. the reason for his burying him in that manner was for fear as it was known he owd mony to the Washerman it should be believd had he been found dead, that he had killd him, for which reason he also told that Story of having paid him his mony & sent him into the Country.

That on Thursday the third of January this Deponent received a Note from Mr. Munroe ordering him to Attend the said Mr. Munroe at Tevnepatm to Inspect a Body that was said to be Murtherd there, where accordingly this Deponent went and waited for some time, till the said Mr. Munroe came accompanied with Mr. Eyre where they order'd a little Tatch'd House to be open'd where the body was said to be buried going in to which & finding it very Dark they order'd the Tatch to be pulled off some part of the house to give light, where I went in and at the South End of the Room, I saw a Parcel of Parriar Pots, upon the Removing of which and Digging about half a foot under Ground there appear'd a Body with a Rope about its Neck which threw a horrid Stench all over the House so the said Mr. Munroe & Eyre order'd the Corps to be brought out into the Yard. whera

it was brought and upon throwing some Pots of Water to wash off the Earth there Plainly appear'd to this Deponent the body very much Swollen, the Penis a little Erect, & Scrotum tumid the Tongue Lolling out of the Mouth, and the hair fallen of the head in Several Places which this Deponent takes to be Symptons Poison also a Deep impression of the Rope in his Neck which this Deponent believes must have been by the impression of the Rope in his Neck which this Deponent believes must have been by the Ropes being put before the Dec'd Expir'd.

The Deputy Governour Acquaints the Board that the Occasion of his Calling this Meeting, was, Two Letters he had Received from the Nabob & Coopsundoo relating to the Adjustment of some late Disputes between Sadashavarow & the Country Renters Whereupon Sadashavarow Appearing, Presents a Petition in behalf of Himself and the other Renters, and Several Accounts between them to Justifie them from the Pretentions of the Country Renters, Whereby it Appears that they owe but one thousand 1000 Chuckrums, Which is not Due till next month, in part, and the Month following Entirely; But, That Perria of Trevendaparum, Unwilling or Unable to Pay his Rents to Coopsundoo, Put him off by Pretending that the Tevnepatam People owe him large sums of Mony; which Occasions these Complaints; This Seems to Us but Reasonable, For had they any good foundation for their Complaint they would in all Probability have Apply'd to Us to make Sadashavarow Satisfie their Demands, and Not have Carried their Complaints to Arcot till they had been denied Justice here, As they did in a Matter of the Same kind in the month of May last, And had their Demands fully Satisfyed; On this Occasion Vengatachlum Hovildar of Waldore, (An Agent for, and concern'd with Peria the Trevendaparum Renter, in the Rents of this Country,) being come into these Bounds, the Deputy Governour Acquaints the Board, That He had Discours'd him on the Matters in Dispute, And that the purport of it Was.

SHEWETH

That your Petitioners have several years held the Rent of 27 Villages in the Tevnepatam Country of One Wolimamud Hovildar & head Renter of those Grounds at the rate of 12000 Chuckrums a Year & were never Disturb'd in the Quiet Occupation [sic] of their Leases till Now one Perria having Succeeded the said Wolimamud in those Rents your Petitioners have held them of Him also, and the year before last at 13530 Chuckrums for one Year only, at which rate those Acco<sup>ts</sup>. were Accordingly made up & passed, The said Perria then tryed to make his own Village People take the Rent at 15000 Chuck<sup>s</sup>. ¶ Anñ: But They finding they could not possibly Pay that Rent, Many of them Deserted their homes & took up their Residence in other Places Whereupon the said Perria writes to Arcot that your Petitioners Influenc'd his People to Run away, which brought down Letters from the Nabob that charged your Petitioners with that Act and your Worship & Council having Orderd Us to Agree & make it up with Perria, We did send for & Perswade several of his Inhabitants to Return on the said Perria's Promise that he would not insist on more than 13500 Chuck<sup>s</sup>. Rent as he had before from your Petitioners; But when the said Perria found his Inhabitants were Return'd, he Notwithstanding Demanded a Rent of 14000 Chuckrums and Soon after your Worship & Council told us there had been Complaints of Us in Letters from Arcot, & that It was Orderd by the President & Council of Madrass that We must Agree & Satisfie Perria's Demands or be deliverd up to him, Whereupon, Seeing the Necessity, we were Obliged to comply at the Expence of 700 Chuckrums Advance on the Rent of our last Cowle with him And Accordingly we Signed a Cowle to him Dated [lacuna] for the Revenues of 27 Villages with the Juncans & Watching Duties therein Specify'd at the Rate of 9000 Chuckrums ¶ Anñ: for 3 years 5000 Chuck<sup>s</sup>. more for Officers Presents & 200 for Security as by three other Agreements of the 16 Febr'y 1733.

The Tenour of which Cowles your Petitioners have on Their parts fully Comply'd with, As by a Translate of them & a state of the Acco<sup>ts</sup>. herewith Presented for your Perusal. And here your Petitioners beg leave to Observe that it had been always usual to give no other than the Country Renters for the Security of their Covenants, which Security the said Perria refused from the Renters & Pretended to want it from the Merchants, which your Petitioners with some trouble Obtain'd & Agreed to, & having Offerd the Merchants their Securitys, Peria still refused, but told them they must give him 200 Chuck<sup>s</sup>. & then the Renters Security should Satisfie him; And Thus he wrested the last 200 Chuckrums abovemention'd from your Petitioners.

Your Petitioners also Complain that the said Perria hath among other Acts of Plunder in the Country under their Rent taken & Appropriated to his own use Paddy to value of 1000 Chuck<sup>s</sup>. which the said Perria insisted he would not Pay for, but that 900 Chuck<sup>s</sup>. of it should be Allow'd for his Charges in Settling the Country Affairs at Aravilla.

Your Petitioners & their Ancestors [*sic*] with 10 other Renters & 400 People in their Service have Quietly Inhabited, & Traded largely in the Honble Companys Bounds, & brought in Goods & Provisions Free of any Juncan from all their Villages in the Country, to the no small Advantage of the Inhabitants in General & the Company in Particular. But now we see its Unfortunate for Us that we have Concern'd & Engaged our selves in the Country Rents with Shevnaigue Reddee, for that Perria wanting the said Reddy to Join in his Rents will take all Opportunitys to Molest or Obstruct our Business His way. We are loath to be too troublesome to your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. & when you think us so We shall be Content to Abide in our Villages without; Or if you shall think well to Examine the Acco<sup>ts</sup>. between Us & Perria we are ready to Sign what Penalty Bonds you please to stand by the Award that shall be given on it And

To Satisfie your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. of the Ill Usage we have rec'd from Perria your Petitioners beg leave to lay before you That the said Perria being either Unable or Unwilling to Pay the Rents he Owes to Coopsundoo his Master; when they are demanded of him he pleads his False Pretentions on your Petitioners, & That we being under the English Protection he cant get them of Us by any Amicable Means; Which Coopsundoo believing Complains to the Nabob & gets Letters wrote hither & to Madrass to That Effect, And finding that he thus last year Succeeded to his purpose in getting an Advance of 700 Chuckrums from Us, which for the general quiet Your Petition<sup>rs</sup>. were Order'd, & Acquiescd, to Pay, He Perria expects by the same Means; Now again in Practise to get 3 or 4000 Chuck<sup>s</sup>. from us more, and so for a Continuance.

And This Notwithstanding he has not Perform'd the Articles Covenanted on his Part But your Petitioners hope the Acco<sup>ts</sup>. we here beg leave to lay before you will Satisfie Your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. of the Injustice of the said Perria's Pretensions And That you will Communicate them for our Defence from being any further Oppress'd by such Shamefull Destructive Artifice as these of the said Perria's above Related.
