Sir, As for the Carolina Sloop having but few conveniences ready for getting her ashore, I am providing Tackling and Necessaries for that purpose and desire you would please to prevail with Irshepa Chitty to lend or sell the old mast he hath by him the only Timber I see about Cuddalore fitt for halling the Sloop upon the Company having none fit to bear so weighty a Vessell; Before she can be hall'd up, She lying in a hole Steep too, the Ground must be levelled with an easy ascent which will require some time to do and fair Weather for that Work, Therefore I cant say what time 'twill Require the People to do it with not being very Expeditious in such performances especially when necessaries and Utensils are to be first got in Readiness for the Work.

Sir, This is all I can say on these Occasions at present in Answer to your note save only that I shall do my best to forward these Affairs as soon as I can, who am

Mr. Phillip Baker Gunner delivers in a Paper Containing his own Opinion, and as he saies that of several experienced Sea men whom he has consulted Concerning Sloop Carolina which is enter'd hereafter setting forth the Difficulty, if not impossibility there will be to get her into the Sea, and that before he can set about it, he thinks it Absolutely necessary that she should have a thorough repair, many of her Bottom Planks being so much worm eaten that she can hardly float and will not bear being hal'd some hundred Yards without it it is therefore Agreed to transmitt a Copy of his report to the Honble. TO THE WORSHIPFUL JOHN HINDE ESQR.

DEPUTY GOVR. &amp;C. COUNCIL OF FORT ST. DAVID.

WORSHIPFULL SIR AND SIRs,

I have considered the means directed to be us'd for getting the Sloop Carolina overland into the Sea and am not unacquainted with the Application of the Grand Mechanical Power Recommended for the Purpose of removing her out of the Hole she hath long floated in; for I have used that way of purchase when tackles alone apply'd were insufficient for hauling vessels ashore and into the River again, after refitting, it being the Common Country way us'd in these Parts when the Ground is firm and an easy ascent choosen for that purpose, but the Carolina is in a Deep Hole between two Steep sandy Banks and will require a Considerable deal of levelling work before any of the Mechanick Powers can fitly be Applied to good Purpose, and when out of the Water the Strand she is to go over is a very Deep and loose Sand, the Sea Shore exceeding flat, the Sea usually breaking one or two hundred yards from the shore and not five foot water 100 yards from the Beach, amongst the Breakers, and what means to be us'd to get her over the Breakers I am utterly a stranger to, and I can find nothing in the scheme receiv'd to get over this difficulty, the Vessel drawing seven foot Water abaft, and five before without any thing in her.

However possible it may be to get her Safe over I am fully persuaded the risque is very great and the Charges as considerable, more than equivalent to her present worth, this difficult affair will be found an undertaking of much more Expence than what set down in that minute Calculate at the foot of the scheme for that Business, I believe I need not say that there are many things in Theory which seem easy to be effected yet hardly reduceable to Practice if at all to be done, and this if Compass'd will be with the Utmost difficulty, wanting many Necessarys here suitable to the Business, as Dogs convenient for her, Crabs, Thick Planks to lay under the Timbers she is to slide over, that they be not buried in the sand, also Timbers for the Dogs to Slide upon.

Besides the Vessel drawing so much water and the Shore so exceeding flat, unless a Stage be provided to put her upon over the Surff; the foregoing Labour and Charge will be in vain, and that will require a large Supply of Timber Plank and other Necessarys not Mentioned in that estimate of the Charges of this undertaking not to mention Cordage of many sorts, besides Blocks, Tackle Falls of Hawsers, old Cables &ca. to force the Vessell over the sand and Surff.

And before this difficult Jobb be undertaken I think it necessary to acquaint You the Sloop must first be thoroughly Repaired, and many of her Bottom Planks taken out for she's so much eaten by the Worm that she'l hardly float, where she is, and utterly unfit for the sea, much Less to be drag'd some hundred yards overland and then over the Surff.

This [is] what I have to offer to your Worship &ca. Council upon this 'Affaire as may deserve Your Consideration however referring it to better Judgment I add no more but that I am with respect

I beg leave to represent to you the Condition of the Factory House at Cuddalore before the Monsoon setts in, that the window Shutters and frames are entirely old and decayed, that the frames will not bear the hooks to Support them, the Rattans are old and Weather beaten in so much that the Wind and rains we have lately had, beat in, into the middle of the Hall, and into Severall rooms, the doors and window frames some of them are much decayed having been Often repaired — the rails round the terrass are entirely decayed, and makes it dangerous for any one to raest against them and cannot be repaired.

There is also Some Small Matters to be done to the Land Customers Choultry at Cuddalore, as changing the Tiles, for at present it leaks, and other little repairs to be given to the Godowns there, as also to the Banksalls at the river side.

However there wants some to the uper part of the Wall above the Moratta Stone Work in Severall parts round the Fort and find by it's Swelling outward the Ramperts and Bastions too much Loaded with weighty old Guns, and many of them useless, and too neer Crowded together on the Bastions, as hath been before observ'd also by Mr. Monson, many of our Guns are very defective and were so in their Casting having large holes in the Chamber or Chargeable part of their Cylinder and other[s] Hunny Comby and decayed by age and Rust, and was Examined August the 10th 1742 and Verbally Reported; The Number of defective Guns as Per Account Accompanying this Report is in all round the Bounds eighty Seven.

AMUNITION We have enough for Ordinary Expence, having now remaining about 28 Candy of the Two usual Sorts of Powder for Cannon and small Arms; and the 12 Candy Indented for the 7th of this Month wou'd be Sufficient for the next Year's; according to the usual Expence, but on the present Appearance of Troubles, three times that quantity may be little enough for such Occasions; Considering one Load round for all our Guns Mounted in the Bounds requires more than Two Candy of Powder.

All the Guns in the Fort are kept continually Charg'd except in the Rainy Season, and some of those facing the Sea Shotted, and the Flankers Loaded with Partridge and here Considering the badness of many of our Guns in the Fort, in Number 32 and Most of those large and heavy if Instead of them, we were supply'd with Sakers of about 20 hundred weight, they wou'd be of much more use and easily mannaged with less than half the People that our Culverins require, especially if Mounted on Field Carriages.

A NEW SHOOTING BULL for Exercise of the Great Gun is Necessary the old being dug down for the Shott lodg'd in it, that being made, the Great Gun Exercise shall be continued According to order.
