General Letter from the Honble. President and Council of the 4th Instant read, acquainting us that they have received advice that the Moratto Army consisting of Seventy thousand 70,000 Horse were advanced within four Days March of the River Kishnah, and that the King of Setarah had refused the offers hitherto made by Nizam and the Several Nabobs, and had also Demanded Trechenoply to be restored him, besides the Usual Choutai; and as the former had been refused them, it is apprehended they will Endeavour to Possess themselves of it by force of Arms, and as it is not unlikely they may take their Rout through this Province they think it is proper therefore till they can obtain more Certain Intelligence if matters are likely to be accomodated or not, that we be spareing in our Advances to our Merchants, that the Capture of the Favouretta by his Majesties Ships the Midway and Dolphin, at Atcheen will possibly set the French on some Enterprize, they therefore recommend to us to be on our Guard.

Genl. Letter from the Honble. President and Council read, giving Acct. of the Morattoes.

They direct us to be Spareing in our Advances to the Merchants.

The Foul Copy of our Annual Letter to the Honourable President and Council acquainting them of the past Years Transactions at this Settlement, being read is Ordered to be Copied fair to send away this Evening.

The Annual Letter ordered to be Sent away, The Merchants Called in.

Our Merchants being Sent for in and acquainted with what the President and Council wrote us Concerning the Morattoes, and that they would therefore have us be Spareing in our Advances to them; to which they Replied that they should write to their Goa-Masters in the Country to take all Necessary Precaution, but that it would be of the Utmost Ill Consequence not only to the Present but the Ensueing Investment, as also to their outstanding Bills, if they put a Stop to the sending of farther Supplies immediately; we acquainted them of the Danger and that if they took any it must be Entirely at their own Risque; which they being made Sensible of, desired the following Advances. Andeapah Five Thousand 5000 Pagodas, Irshapah Chitty Two Thousand 2000 Pagodas, and Narain Chitty One Thousand 1000 Pagodas, which being thought for the Interest of our Honourable Masters, AGREED that it be Advanced them, and that we acquaint the President and Council accordingly, and that we hope it will meet with their Approbation.

Advances made them.

General Letters from the Honourable President and Council of the 12th, 17th and 20th and Two of the 22d Instant read, accompanying Two Supplys of Five Thousand 5000 Pagodas each, That they observe we have acquainted our Merchants of the News of the Morattoes and had given them all the Caution they thought Necessary to give us, and therefore they had no reason to Object against the advances we made them; that they cannot yet learn that Matters are accomodated, though the Armies are very near, that the Morattoes seem willing to Compound for a Sum of Money for these Governments, but insist on the Delivery of Treechinoply. That as soon as any of the Northern Vessels arrive with any Quantity of Grain, they shall not fail to send us the Two hundred Garce we wrote for. That as they find we can make new Bale Screws here, they shall not mention them to England as they before proposed, That as the alterations we propose in our Sorting Place is very Necessary they acquiesce with our Setting about it, as the Cost will not Exceed Five hundred 500 Pagodas. That they haveing received Advice by the Ships from Bengall that the French Companys Ship the Neptune of Forty or Fifty Guns lay ready at the Rivers mouth to Sail for Pondicherry, they therefore Judge it will be most for the Security of the Companys Effects to order all the three Ships they have there to proceed in Company to bring away what Cloth we may have on hand Embaled, whom they Shall dispatch as soon as they can be got ready. That they would have the Bales divided between the Durrington and Beaufort, in which we are to be as Expeditious as possible and return them to them that they may Compleat their Tonnage, Sending the Invoices, Accounts of Tonnage and the list of Packing Stuff on the Bales on each, overland. That they shall take the opportunity of sending us what Wares and Stores they have in their power to Supply us with they having been disappointed in their Expectations of receiving the remainder of their Indent by the Godolphin which Ship did not bring them any to Bengall. That our Honourable Masters in the 17th Paragraph of their Letter of the 21st March last are pleased to acquaint them that to prevent the great Damage they Suffer, and the danger that may befall their Settlements in India, by the desertion of Soldiers and Sea men, they have come to a Resolution to Dismiss their Service the Commanders of any of their Ships Seducing away or Coniveing at any of their Soldiers or Seamens comeing on their Ships, and not delivering them to the Settlements they belong to, or such other of the Company's Settlements as lye in their way after their dispatch from any Place. That they are pleased also in the 64th paragraph to tell them that it being difficult in Warr time to get men that are good for any thing they would have us to Encourage such to re-Enter whose Times are Expired, That if therefore the Commanders of their Ships should Seduce any our Garrison whose Times are not Expired, to acquaint them therewith, and as a means to induce those whose Times Expire to Re-Enter they would have us make the Term for relisting three Years instead of Five. That in the 71 paragraph of the Same Letter, wherein our Honourable Masters Express their Approbation of the Suspension of Mr. Burton, they direct that as Mr. Croke gave Information of Mr. Burton's Male Practices in Consideration thereof and his Long and Faithful Services a Present be paid him of Five hundred 500 Pagodas out of their Cash on Receipt of that Letter, and that he have likewise a Gratuity of Fifty Pound Per Annum over and above his Sallary and other Allowances, to be Continued till they order the Contrary, which they order us to Comply with. Those of the 22d by the Durrington, Beaufort and Benjamin acquainting us that they have ordered the Several Commanders to keep Company till their Return to them, Subject nevertheless to what Orders we may give them in the Interim, and that for the greater Security of the Honourable Companys Effects on board, they have sent on Each a party of Men to assist in their defence if Attack'd, under the Command of Lieutenant William

General Letters to the Honourable President and Council of the 9th, 15th, 19th and 25th read, inclosing our Accounts of Expences for November, Consultations, Account of Cloth brought in, and Cash Account for last Month. That our Bale Screws being so bad that they can't possibly hold out till we can receive new ones from Europe, and the people that made these haveing undertaken to make New ones, we have accordingly set them to Work, and therefore desire they will not write for others on our Account; That we Inclose our Indent for Wares and Stores, and as we think it absolutely Necessary to have a good Store of Grain in our Fort at this Juncture of Time, We request they will send us Two hundred Garse with as much Expedition as they possibly can, that it may arrive before the Northerly Current and Wind Shifts; That on its arrival we shall be able to make a Contract for some in the Country, whereas if we should set about it before it will not only Encrease the Price but make a Scarcity too. That the Sorting Place we wrote them about in November last, on a Calculate we find will Cost from Five hundred to Five hundred and Fifty Pagodas, as it must be raised on Four Rows of Columes, and Timber and Plank is very Scarce, and dear with us. That we have received Two Supplies of Five Thousand 5000 Pagodas each, and that they Turn out Right.

AGREED that we write the President and Council acquainting them of the Ships arrival and that we shall follow their Orders and send what Bales we have ready on board them as fast as they can take them in; That Captain Crabb has had Fifty sent off this Morning and will have Fifty more this afternoon, That Captain Stevens could not take in any to Day but to morrow they will have a hundred each; though they both say they cannot Stow away above Seventy a Day. That in regard to their Dispatch from hence we shall be directed by what we receive in answer to this; That we have about One Thousand 1000 Bales ready and the Washers bring in about One hundred 100 Per Week. That the longer they Stay the more Bales they can have, and of Course the fewer we shall have left to lye in the Godown the Year round, and to have many as we have no Opportunity of sending them to Madrass this Warr Time and having reason to Expect a larger Investment this Year that we were able to do the Last, we apprehend it will be a Detriment to our Honble. Masters; but of this they are the best Judges. That we have acquainted our Military with our Honble Masters Orders in Relation to any of our Soldiers getting on board any of the Ships without their Liberty, or before their Time is Expired, and likewise of their Indulgence in permitting them to receive their Usual Allowance, and to relist for Three

General Letters from the Honourable President and Council of the 22^d. and 28th. read Accompanying a supply of Five thousand 5000 Pagodas, and that they have rece^d. our Letter wherein we propose the keeping of the Ships sometime longer for the bringing away a larger Quantity of Cloth, but that as the season is so far advanced they judge it most Proper to hasten them away they having goods sufficient to Compleat their Cargoes; and as a disappointment of not getting round the Cape might be attended with great disadvantage to the Honble Company: wherefore they would have us put on board Agreeable [to] their former directions what Cloth we may have ready and return them as soon as possible, and that they hope the Commanders will be able to make a Quicker dispatch that what they represented to Us. That they do not doubt but in a short time to have an Opportunity of having what Bales we may have ready brought up there in safety, and are very glad to read the hopes we have of A Large Investment the ensuing Year that they shall comply with Mr. Crokes desire of transmitting the Paragraph to our Honourable Masters.

General Letter to the Honourable Presid^t. and Council of the 29th. read Acknowledging the receipt of Five thousand 5000 Pagodas and that it turns out right.

Paridis the French Commandant at Karrical the 24th. Instant in the Night sent 4 Chellingas with Military force from that Place to Tranquebar Road where the Sloop Ramsunca Robert Norton Master of & from Bengall lay, & cut her Cable & Carried to Karrical the Master being ashore at Tranquebar but on the Gov^r. & Council of that place protesting against them in strong Terms they have brought the Sloop to the Place from whence they took her & restored her.

Narrain Chitty & Devenaigue Chitty Offer to provide thirteen hundred Bales Pa.

of Chemanaickpollam Cloth at $47\frac{1}{8}$ P. Corge Brokerage Included which is half a pagoda Cheaper than Andeaph, & Eight hundred Bales of Sallampores at $20\frac{3}{4}$ P Corge Brokerage also included, which is $\frac{1}{4}$ of a P Cheaper than last year, & promise if the Prizes of the Cloth should fall in the Country to fall in proportion & to be of equal goodness with Andeapahs & that they desire only 25000 Pagodas in adv^{ce}. for 2100 Bales, & that if they should fall short in their engagement to the Compy they offer after two or three months Tryal to pay in their Ballance in thirty days, & they offer to let any other person be joind with them that we shall think proper. AGREED that a General Letter to the President & Council be drawn out, acquainting them of these proposals made us as also to inform y^m. that Narrain Chitty was a Merchant in M^r. General Letter to the Honble President & Council under the 3^d. Instant read the purport of which we find to agree with our result in last Consultation.

General Letters from the Honble President & Council of the 6th. & 7th. inst^{ts}. read in the first of which they advise of hav^g. forwarded the Iron we wrote for by a Country Boat & hope that we have long Since received it, And also give us to understand that they are very Sensible that the Small quantity of Bales brought in here since the departure of the ships for England has been entirely owing to the apprehensions our Merchants have entertain'd of suffering by the late Incursions of the Morattas & that they are [sic] has been no want of Care in us to Set that Business as forward as possible, They likewise observe the Death of Mr. Graham & approve of our appointing Mess^{rs}. Floyer & Holt to take an Inventory of his Effects & an Acc^t. of the Cuddalore Customs & direct that we take care of his Effects till Letters of administration be properly Granted.

In the other of the 7th. they advise us of a Supply of Five thousand 5000 Pagodas being Sent us therewith, An answer to which of the 12th. read Acknowledging the receipt of it & that the mony turn'd out right.

Another General Letter from the Honble President & Council of the 9th. read wherein they acknowledge the receipt of ours of the 3^d. & acquaint us that as Andeapah is well known to be a very cautious man they are the less surprised that he should talk of no more than one thous^d. 1000 Bales, at a time when the Morattas were expected every day in these parts, & are pleas'd to find now those fears are abated by the hopes of their leaving the province that he is become more Sanguine

& inclined to enlarge his Contract & as we have happily brought him to this promise of Two thous^d. Bales they readily agree to our Closing wth. him for that Number, but as to a farther advance they think 30,000 Pag^a. to remain in his hands a Sum Sufficient for procuring them therefore hope he will rest Satisfied therewith. In regard to the thirteen hund^d. Bales of Chemanaickpollam Cloth offered to be procur'd by Narrain Chitty & Devenaigue Chitty with the Eight hundred Bales of Sal^a. If we are of opinion that those people are responsible & safe to be employed in such a Trust they are willing to admit them into the Service. They inform us of their having had an Eye to the Tonage on Consideration of which they apprehend it will not be very large this year as so many Ships were left in India in 1743, however the Circumstances they fear Bengall is in from the Morattas makes them think it highly requisite we should lose no oppertunity of Contributing all we can to their dispatch, thereby to supply any Difficiency which the troubles there may have occasion'd & as to the sum Narrain & Devenaigue Chitty ask in advance being no less than 25000 Pagodas is so Consider^{le}. that they Should be better Satisfied if some person whom we may approve of be joined with them for a greater Security in case they should meet with any disapointments which the unsettled state of the Country makes them liable to, they also remark that it will be more Secure if part of the Sum they dem^d. in advance be not paid till the Morattas are retired out of the Country which the advices they have received Since their last Say is yet uncertain They Suppose the engag^e. with Narrain Chitty will be no hindrance to any agreement for Chemanaickpollam Cloth with Andeapah & Join with us in opinion that there may be an Inconven^{ev}. in employing only one Sett of Merch^{ts}. but at the Same Time they apprehend very good Effects may be produced from having only one purchaser at the Weaving Towns, & as we desired them to acquaint us if any other method of dividing the Investment Occurd to them they accordingly give us their opinion representing to us, that it might be a means to preserve the Fabrick of the Chemanaickpollam Cloth as also to Comply the better with our Honible Masters directions Signified to them this year relating to the Manufactures of that Country if it could be thus managed, That as Narrain Chitty has promised the largest Quantity of that Cloth that we have the whole & Andeapah take the Sallampores in Lieu of what quantity of Chemanaick^m. Cloth he promised to bring in, by which division of the Investment neither of them will interfere with each other, nor the Weaver have it in his power to take advantage of them, They say they are very well acquainted with the difficulty there is in lowering the prizes of the Cloth, & that if we are not like to bring our Merchants to that, the present prizes will allow them to procure a good & well wrought Manufacture & they doubt not but we Shall take effectual care to keep them to such a standard, they also think proper to appoint Mr. Holt to succeed to Mr. Grahams Station & that Mr. Wynch take that of Mr. Holts & that Mr. Thomas Cooke Jun^r. do supply the Vacancy at this Board.

Having taken the Substance of the above Letter into our Serious Consideratⁿ. & Andeapah not only rising in the Number of Bales but agreeing to fall in the prizes of the Cloth, We are come to a resolution of Contracting with him as last year for all the Sortments of Goods Excepting the Sallampores which we Continue with Narrain & Irshapah Chitty the Terms of our Contract are that he Supply us with Two thousand Bales between the first Instant & the last of January next. Exclusive of the four hund^d. & four Bales already received on the New Investm^t. The Prizes of each Sortment are Somewhat lowerd (Excepting the Sheally which we look upon to be worth the present price) & are as follows.

Instant read the first of which permitting Mr. Thomas Cooke Jun^r. to go up to Madrass for a few days, & the other advising us of their having had Information that the French at Pondichery are making preparations to act offensively as well as Defensively & that they are in Expectation of a Number of Men from the Islands which they apprehend may Set them on some Enterprize & they Considering our Situation being within four or five Hours March of that Settlement and the Uncertainty of his Majestys Ships giveing us any assistance for sometime whose Success to the Eastward being likely to draw on the Resentment of the Enemy, & our Settlement being so near become their first object to which the quantity of Cloth now lying in our Fort being a farther Encouragement to their making some Attempt, In these Circumstances they judge it may be one means to abate the Enemys hopes & make them less forward to Attempt any thing against us by removing as much of the Cloth as possible to which purpose they tell us they have prevaild with the Owners of the Success Galley to Spare her for that Service who being a prime Sailor may in all probabillity Convey them with safety, therefore if we are of the Same opinion, & that the Bales Can be Sent on board with Security, they direct us to put on board the Success Galley, & Brigantine Mermaid (A New Vessel of the Companys, who proceeds with the Success Galley) what Bales they Can take in, and return the Vessells to them with all Expedition, but if we should be of another opinion, or the advices of any Vessells of the Enemys being Arrived, or Such like, prevent the Execution of this Design, then we are to order the said Vessells to return Back They likewise advise us that they have for the Better defence & security of the Honble Companys Effects, as well as the Ships, sent a Party of 100 Military under the Command of Lieutenant John Holland, and that he has Directions to receive any farther Orders from us, as have the Comm^{rs}. of these ships, They also acquaint us, that the Deputy Gov^r. having represented the want of an Engineer for some Work Necessary to be undertaken, they have Sent Mr. Smith to us by this oppertunity, to give us all the Assistance in his power during the time he Continues wth. us, which they direct to be no Longer than the return of these ships.

General Letters from the Honourable President and Council of the first, fifth, and Sixth Instant read, each of the two former Accompanying A Supply of Five thousand 5000 Pagodas, and the Latter acknowledgeing the receipt of the Bales. Sent them the 31st. Ultimo by the Meirmaid Brigantine, and Acquainting us that the Master of that Vessel had then got their Directions to proceed to the Southward with Some more Provisions for his Majesties Ships, and Afterwards to Make the best of his Way to this Place, where they direct that we put on board her what Bales She can take in, and return her to them; also Adviseing us that Mr. Alexander Baird A Writer that Came out on Captⁿ. Raymond takes his Passage on her, whom they direct us to employ in what Station he be most Useful, That his Allowances have been paid him for the last Month and that he has been Advanced Ten Pagodas for his Passage.

Two More General Letters to the Honourable President and Council of the 6th. & 10th. Instant read, Signifyeing the Receipt of both their Supplis and that they prov'd right.

The Deputy Governour Acquaints the Board that he Advanced the Paymaster under the 5th. Instant Five-hundred 500 Pagodas for Disbursements.

He also Acquaints the Board that Andeapah having requested him to let him have an Advance of Five thous^d., 5000 Pagodas on Account of the Investment, he Accordingly paid it him the Same Day.

That he likewise Advanced Narrain Chitty and Irshapah Chitty the 7th. Instant, Two thousand 2000 Pagodas each for the provision of Sallampores.

Suncha Latchmia Puttee now requesting to be Advanced one thousand 1000 Pagodas for the provision of Salem Cloth the Same is Ordered to be paid him, &

Andeapah desiring to be Advanced Two thousand 2000 Pagodas for the Same Account that Sum is likewise paid him.

Agreed that A General Letter to the Honourable President and Council be drawn out in Answer to their Favour of the 19th. Ultimo, with their remarks on the Cloth Sent from this Settlement, where they are pleased to Observe that the Warriarpollam Cloth and Sallampores, Appear to be thinner than last Year, to which we think it proper to acquaint them, That it is now near three months Since we made the Same Observation Ourselves, and Complained of it to the Merchants, who Sent Several Parcels of it back to the Weaveing Towns and threatned the Weavers to lower the Prices, which we thought had Some good Effect, but notwithstanding it Came in So indeferently that we have accepted only Eleven Bales in the Months of June, and July, and the whole Year but Eighty; and that it is Much the Same Case with the Sallampores, That we have turned out Abundance of them but as they are Sure of A Market for these Goods Among the Dutch it is very little Inconveniency to them, but that we hope even these Sortments will not in General be found fault with at home, That it gives us great Satisfaction that the Chemanaickpollam Cloths which is the bulk of our Investment gives no Occasion for Complaint, That we have Strictly Charged our Merchants to keep up the goodness of the Fabrick of each sortment of Cloth, and shall use our Utmost Endeavours to Oblige them to it, That

if some of the Cloths Appear not so well Cured as we Could wish, we hope the Uncommon dry Season will plead an Excuse for it, That the Tank at the Washing Town which we Chiefly depend upon has been Useless for Some time, and it has been with Great difficulty we have got Water at Bandipollam therefore we have Digged the Tank and Cleaned it so well as we are Informed it will not need any farther Expence these five or Six Years, and within these few days have begun to wash there which Makes us hope that part of the business will go on better than lately; That the Gentlemen that Sort the Cloth will use their best Endeavours to sort it even as well for the Companys Advantage as their own Credit, That we had News of a Europe Danish Ships Arrival at Tranquebar the beginning of last Month, and that another is Expected every Day, which likewise Occasions a Demand for Ordinary Cloth; That his Majestys Squadron have been all here who we have Supplyd with between Three and four hundred Tons of Water, and what provisions they wanted, and that they are now all gone upon a Cruize; That we have about A hundred and Forty of their People left Ashore Sick, Eleven of which have Dyed and we fear Several more will meet with the Same Fate, That we are but Poorly off for Hospital room but do as well as we Can, That we have Yet remaining Thirty Eight French Prisoners besides what we Sent them, we had Thirty Nine but one is Dead, and some of the rest are in a bad way, That the French have just now sent the Nabob A present of Three Thousand 3000 Pagodas, and that the Meirmaid past through this Road the 9th. Instant put Mr. Baird Ashoar and proceeded to the Southward.

East Bastion of Small Service, as it Can't cover the face of the South West; by which Means the Enemy haveing lodged themselves under the Face of the Bastion, woud be Entirely Secure from the Flank of the South East Bastion as the line of Defence is Several feet without the Flank of the South West Bastion, He also represents that as there is a Range of Buildings between the South East and South West Bastion parrellel to the Curtain Forty Eight foot from it and a Strong Wall, it may be of bad Consequence to the Garrison in Case the Enemy should Land and Lodge themselves behind it, as the Guns in the Flanks will be rendered Entirely unserviceable on this Occasion as likewise woud be the Small Arms on the Curtain, he therefore thinks it proper this building Should be removed, and that there Should be a Platform with Flanks made on the Ground where that stands on, and to Face the Curtain as near the River as the Ground will allow, by w^{ch}. Means the Fort Facing the River will be Entirely Secure and the New bastion will Flank the Face of the South East and North West Bastions, And as y^e. WORSHIPFUL SIR AND SIRs,

Having taken a Survey of the Fort, I now lay before your Worship &ca. my Reasons why I think it requisite that there should be a New Bastion built to the South West part of it, and the following Alterations made.

The Flanks of the South West Bastion being one Five feet the other Six in length makes the Bastion of Small Service to Itself and the Same to the South East and North West Bastions and may be of Great Service to the Enemy in making a Lodgement under the Face, as the Guns from the South East bastion Cant Flank the Side Facing the River of the South West Bastion, the Flanks being so Small and no Room to Traverse the Guns in each Flank, nor the Gunners to load them only in the Center of the Embrasures will make them very little Useful and as they can't be Traversed will make the Direction near the Same.

— AUGUST 1745 —

The Angle of the Gorge of the South East Bastion Cutting the Face of the South West, Renders the Flank of the South East bastion of Small Service as it can't Cover the Face of the South West, by this means the Enemy having lodged themselves under the Face of the Bastion will be Entirely Secure from the Flank of the South East Bastion as the Line of Defence is Several Feet, without the Flank of the South West Bastion.

Between the South East and South West Bastions Parrellel to the Curtain is a Range of Buildings 48 feet from it and a strong Wall this Building may be of bad Consequence to the Garrison In Case the Enemy Shoud Land and lodge themselves behind this Building as the Guns in the Flanks, woud be Renderd Entirely Unserviceable upon this Occasion, and the Small Arms from the Curtain. On the Ground where these buildings Stands, or nearer the River as far as the Ground will Permit, It will be proper to make a Plat Form with Flanks and Face the Curtain as near the River as the Ground will Permit, by this Means it will Entirely Secure the Fort facing the River and the New Bastion will Flank the Face of the South East and North West Bastions.

The Ditch haveing been Carryed on no farther than Parellel to part of the Face of the South West Bastion It will be Proper and of Great Service to the Garrison to have it Carryed on in the same manner as at the South East part of the Fort, which will Entirely Secure the Garrison from any Surprises whatever and must Occasion any Enemy to open their Trenches at Good Distance.

WORSHIPFUL SIR AND SIRS,

Since my Former Report requesting Two Godowns to be added to each of our Washing Godowns namely at Bandipollam and Tevenapatam I have found the Small Godown run up at the latter Place of Ten foot with a Narrow Verando only Sufficient to Contain Rice for Conjeeing therefore am obliged to request that the other Godown remaining to be built may be Augmented to Thirty five feet with a Verando, which must Contribute to the Preservation of our Honble. Masters Cloths

for had I not secured them in a House of my Own during the Violent and Successive Rains we have had this Season for want of a Godown large enough, I must through the Severity of the Season have had them Spoiled and as the Spots the built Godown and this now desired to be Erected on, both lye open, being only inhedged and in Continual Charge in repairing I desire for the better Preservation of the Cloths both these Spots as well as our Godowns at our Washing Places at Bandipollam may be Compounded with a Brick Wall which Compounds will Require to be each Eighty feet in length and Sixty in breadth and the Wall to be Seven in height a Brick and a Half Thick, and which will not only Prevent the Cloths being Stole (as it has often happened) but be a great help to the boiling of them in Windy Weather for as they are now open the Wind often much Impedes them, To Prevent any Losses and to forward the Cloths in boiling is the Occasion of this Request, but am farther obligd to represent.

That as we have such large Quantitys of Cloth more then Usual, and not Such frequent Conveyances (by Reason of the Warr) that our Godowns at our Sorting Place is hardly Sufficient to Contain our Bales and as we are obliged to turn out at Sorting of Brown Cloth large Quantity's for want of a Secure Place to put them up, we are very much Incumbered by being obliged to Stow them in the Verando's of the Sorting Place and so what with them and the Brown Cloths Comeing daily in, We have not Room to Sort and as our Present Godown in the Fort has been long built and as most of the Timbers give way, and some are Crack'd, we dont know how Speedily we may be obliged to take the Roof of, and then as well as the Pre-mentioned Uses, we Shall be at a Loss to Stow our Bales, On these Considerations I request there may be Joyned to that Godown a Terass Godown in length One hundred feet and in breadth Twenty, or to be Erected in any other Place your Worship &c. shall think Proper.

My Desire to Forward as also to Secure our Honble. Masters Bales and Cloths is the Occasion of this Application.
