By this Pattamar you will Receive the Six Quire of Small Paper and enclosed is an Account of the 6 Spare Musquets and Six Bayonets at which Rate bring them on this Years Books.

WE have now before us your favour of the 17<sup>th</sup>. Instant the Success you have met with in your Investments of Cloth and Pepper gives us a Sensible Pleasure and to prevent a Stop heing put to either we now Send by your Toney's under a Serjeants Commands a Supply of Fifty thousand  $\mathbb{R}^s$ . (50,000 —. —.) Gold of no Sort is at present procurable here but as we understand there's some at Mahie and Callicut we have taken the necessary Steps in order to Secure as much as possible and if we Succeed we shall remit the remaining Seventy thousand Rupees (70000. —. —.) in that Specie; The Chief now writes a proper Letter on the Occasion to the Commodore of Cochin as proceeding through that River we esteem the Safest.

By the Stretham in December 1748 the Honble President and Council of Bombay Sent us Sundry Stores and in the Invoice  $rec^d$ . at the Same time theres a Chest of Locks mentioned which not Coming to hand and by Enquiry made we Judge the Same was Sent to your Factory we request Gentlemen you Examine into it and advise us thereof.

THE News on the other Coast we had before been advised of however think ourselves obliged to you in Communicating the Same.

You may be assured of all due Care in forwarding whatever Packets you may transmit us for the Presidency being

THE reason you alledge for debting this Factory the Amount of thirteen Md<sup>a</sup>. of Pepper is by no means satisfactory, as you have been no where advised in any General Letter from hence of two hundred and twenty Candies being rec<sup>d</sup>. but as you represent the Same to have arose from Loss in Weight it will be wrote off to its Proper head.

As the Plank provided for Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David is lying at Callicut and not here you must therefore bring its Amount being Rups. 8401. 2. 54. on your Books for this Current Year.

#### Sib & Sirs

WE have now before us your favour of the  $4^{th}$ . Ultimo and to prevent any disappointment in your Investments for want of Cash you will receive by these Toneys a Supply of fifty thousand Rup<sup>s</sup>. All Endeavours have been used to Get the Gold you mention but to no purpose none being procurable. This Supply has reduced our Cash so low that we cannot make up the remaining twenty Thousand Rupees without taking up the Sum at Interest, therefore shall wait till we may receive your Answer agreeable to which we shall act.

PEPPER still bears a high Price and till the new Crop is Gathered we cannot form any Judgement what we may be able to provide but intend advancing Early in the Season.

THESE [sic] being a Soldier Named Peter Mendes at your Settlement belonging to this Garrison who went from hence with Ensign Edgerton of Ship Duke of New Castle we must desire he may be Returned by these Toneys. In his Room we Send Balthazar Vonderberg who is of your Garrison, he has been paid to the  $30^{\text{th}}$ . Ultimo-[F]s B

and is indebted to his Comm<sup>r</sup>. (Cap<sup>t</sup>. Bilderbeck) R<sup>s</sup>. 8. 2. 4.

PLEASE not to detain either the Toneys or Command longer than you may esteem necessary that our Hofible Masters may not be at a needless Expence and having no more Military than are wanted for Duty. No advices being yet rec<sup>d</sup>. from the Presidency we have only to assure you our being.

YOUR Letter of this date addressed to the Chief and Council having been Read to the Board it is their Opinion that it is not Consistent with the Respect due to your Superiors as you ought to acquiesce with all orders from them without Calling their Opinions in question and which is more particularly faulty in you as being the Commanding Officer of this Garrison.

As you Seem to be unacquainted with the Negligences which have Crept in: Since the Regulations [the]y are now pointed out to you Viz<sup>t</sup>.

NEGLECT in regard to visiting the Hospital as us [sic] down in the Regulations. THE not releiving out Posts or Stations at Stated Times.

THE permitting any Petty Officer or Soldier to be at their House when Sick and not Sending them to the Hospital where a Proper Care might be taken of Such Sick Persons without the previous Consent, of the Chief This has been fatally Experienced shown in a Corporal lately whose Disorder Its Judged became Mortal'. from his not being timely Sent to the Doctor.

THE Pay M<sup>r</sup>. declares he never had any Disputes with you but frequent Complaints having been made by your People in Respect to their Accounts not being regularly Settled the order which you have rec<sup>d</sup>. is relating to them.

COMPLAINT has been made of the New Recruits you enlisted for Bombay the Greatest part being esteemed not Capable of Bea[ring] Arms the enlisting of whom you Solely was relied on, as the most Proper Person to judge whether they were able Bodied Men or not and what induced you to take Such as abovementioned you best know As the Honble President and Council of Bombay desire to know whether you advanced the Said New Recruits one hundred Rupees delivered them by the Pay M<sup>r</sup>. I am directed to desire you will advise the Chief and Council thereof as also on what Account.

THE Particulars would have lain Dormant ha[d] not your Present Behaviour and of Consequence the Publick Service Calle[d] on the Chief and Council for them.

Your Letter of the 9<sup>th</sup>. Instant We have rec<sup>d</sup>. with the Heads that compose part of your Books and can't help Saying we are Surprized to find you did not perceive those Errors on Balancing as without doubt had you added up the Several Heads on your Ledger you must naturally have discovered a diffic<sup>e</sup>. between the D<sup>r</sup>. and C<sup>r</sup>. Side which of course you must know the Books were wrong.

In Callicut Books ending last July We observe four Entrys in the Ledger in the heads of Anjengo Factory, Tannore Factory Stock and Charges General but canot find from whence they were posted there being no Entry in the Journal for that purpose notwithstanding in one of them the Page is referred to, and as nothing can be Posted in the ledger but what has a Journal Entry We enjoyn you to adhear thereto in the present Books. As the Expences of Tannore Factory has been always included in the Callicut Charges you are therefore to clear it by Charges General and not Account Current Tellicherry.

WE Send on this Munchua Fifty five Lances which lett be repaired.

AT present we have no Salloes in Store when we receive any from the Presi-Jency Collours will be Sent you.

WE have thoroughly examined the Account Current of Plank Sent us in October 1748 (Copy of which is with you) but can find no mistake therein and if you'l once carefully look over it you'l find the Same as by Said Account the Ballance Covits B

the 26<sup>th</sup>. March 1748/9 was Rupees 8483. --. 12. for 40015. 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> whereas what we-Covits B

directed you to bring to Account was Rupee[s] 8401. 2. 54 for 34433. 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>, the-Balance this day according to our Books.

THE Accou[n]t Current with you was drawn out at Callicut only to advise us the quantity and as the then Resident was unacquainted what we paid here on account Interest he could not incert it therein & which Occasions a difference between our Books and the Acco<sup>t</sup>. with you of Rup<sup>8</sup>. 1100. 3. 97. and not as you write of Rupees 81. 1. 58.

FOR your Guidance we send you two Account Currents of the Plank one of which is drawn out agreeable to the Account at Callicutt the other as it stands on our Books the Ballance of the latter is what you must bring on as before mentioned.

As we shall Shortly be in want of Chunam Send us by return of this Munchua as much of our Indent as you may have procured the 150 Bales you last transmitted us turned out right.

By this Conveyance you will receive a Supply of Stationary agreeable to your Request.

THE Arrival of his Majestys Ships the Vigilante and Ruby gives us the Opportunity of replying fully to Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &c<sup>n</sup>. Commands of the 15<sup>th</sup>. May and that of June and to advise of our Transaction Since our last Address under date the 10<sup>th</sup>. of September Duplicate of which goes Enclosed under N<sup>o</sup>. 13.

Our Honble Masters Ship Severn Captain Richard Dorrill Arrived us the 16<sup>th</sup>. August in Company with the Mamoody both which Sailed hence the 18<sup>th</sup>. following for Bengall.

By Advices from Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David we learn the Dispatch of our Hoñble Masters Ship Lapwing the  $28^{th}$ . September the Arrival of the Norfolk from Madeira the  $21^{st}$ . of the Same Month and her being Since dispatched for Bengall. The Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George its Judged would sail as [sic] the  $25^{th}$ . Ultimo for Great Brittain but we are Extremely sorry to advise your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that the Lynn Captain Edgerton was unfortunately lost nigh Calcutta a Small Part of Cargoe being saved.

FROM our Address under the  $10^{\text{th}}$ . June last your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & c<sup>a</sup>. will please to observe means were taken to provide an Early Tonnage of Pepper the reasons for Such a Step are fully Sett forth in Consultation under the  $2^{\text{d}}$ . June to which we must beg leave to referr As Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. however steemed the Price given for this Article to be so Exorbitant as not to answer at any Market Either in Europe oi India, we were induced to put a Stop to our Purchases had we not Given the Prices Pepper bore last February its Scarcity and not a Grain in Warehouse upon the Salisbury's Arrival She must have been detained in India which we hope is Suffict reason for our Conduct in that affair. The New Crop promises Exceeding well and from the best informations we may reasonably Expect 3000 Candiesthe quantity limited by our Honble Masters as the Price will we imagine Greatly Exceed 70 R<sup>s</sup>. the Candy For its Provision we forward Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. a Calculate of Cash which we request may be transmitted to us so soon as it may Suit with your Conveniency as we Shall Shortly be in want.

THE Several Co[nsu] Itations under the 15<sup>th</sup>. and 30<sup>th</sup>. of March 1748/9. (to which we beg leave to referr) will fully inform Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. in that manner the Price of Cardamoms was then Settled with the Merchants who you will please to observe made a proper Abatement for Loss in Weight; In respect to the interest the then Members beg leave to inform Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>., that the Administrator to the deceased M<sup>r</sup>. Rawdons Estate did not deliver in the Account of Cardamoms made over to the Hoñble Company till then to which omission Its hoped the paying the Surplus Interest (being for February and March) will be attributed. The Hb

annual quantity of 12000 Weight directed to be provided by your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. for this Season all due Care has been taken to prevent a Disappointment the Sum of Rupees 5500 having been already advanced to the Merchants on this Account.

By the Several Advices lately rec<sup>d</sup>. from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo we learn their Investment of Pepper will be nigh 3000 Candies and that there might be no Stop we have remitted them the Sum of Rupees 100000, they write us that they are still in want of upwards of two Lack which we presume they have duely Set forth in the Packet now forwarded.

ALLY RAJAH has been advised the Price offered for his Ambergrease at Bombay which he requests may be sent down, as he will be able to dispose of it to much better advantage. His Debt Continues Just on the Same footing, but no application has been wanting to induce him to pay it off Gradually his Plea is the Poverty of his Family, which we really esteem to be true as from his Seeming readiness to Come into any Proposals it appears to us that Inclination is not wanting.

THE Affair of Boyanores taking on himself the Title of King Contrary to his Sovereigns Permission is still in Agitation Our Prince has been and Continues making Alliances with the Several Country Powers to take Satisfaction for this Insult the whole however depends on the Samorine Should he therefore fly off we beleive the Expedition will drop though no Proper Agreements have been or shall be omitted to rouse our Prince and make him Sensible how deragatory this Step of Boyanore is to his Sovereign Authority. At this Critical Juncture Palliarem is very Pressing with our Prince for the Payment of his Security to the Bednure Rajah threatning in Case of Refusal to join the Cannarees Seem ready on this Occasion to invade the Mallabar Country, to prevent the [ref]ore Such an Evil Our Prince 1750-51-2 is trying all Methods to Satisfy the Palliarem with whom Its Judged he will Come to Some Composition and to forward it we shall not be wanting to make the Proper Remonstrances to the Latter.

THE Achamars have paid off the whole of their Several Bonds taken from them in Sept<sup>r</sup>. Last and have Settled the Sum to be levied this Year being Rupees 1518. 1. 87 in part of their Principal as also the Interest on the whole Debt which in time we dont doubt of recovering.

FROM a Report of Mess<sup>18</sup>. Douglas and Hornby enclosed N<sup>o</sup>. #### FIRST OF SHIPPING.

THE Stafford Captain Talix Baker returned to us from the Presidency the 1<sup>st</sup>. May 1750, on which Ship we loaded two hundred and twelve Candies, thirteen Maunds and Sixteen Pounds of the 1<sup>st</sup>. and 2<sup>d</sup>. Sort of Sandall Wood as P Copy or, reas.

qr. reas. of her Invoice under N<sup>o</sup>. 2 this with Rupees 4502. 3: 94 made up her Stock one 'hundred and Sixty thousand Rupees agreeable to our Superiours Directions; she Sailed hence the 6<sup>th</sup>. following for Canton Consigned in the usual manner and we have the pleasure to advise your Honours of her Safe arrival.

THE True Briton Captain Henry Broadley arrived us from Canton the 29<sup>th</sup>. December last bound to Bombay she was detained here till the arrival of the London -Captain Sedgwicke from Bengall the 9<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo and by Advices lately received from our Superiors we learn of their Safe Arrival.

YOUR Honours we presume will be fully advised by our Superiors of the Warrens arrival at Bombay, and her being dispatched round to the Bay in Company with the Britannia, they were Seen off Anjengo So late as the Middle of November and we have Since learnt that the latter has put into Madrass. The former is to be returned to this Coast, we being directed immediately on her Arrival to land her Bengall Cargoe and Ship off Such Pepper we may have in Warehouse which if Short of her Charter party Tonnage, she is to be Sent to the Gentlemen at Anjengo for Compleating who in Such Case are to Give the Commander his final Dispatches for Great Brittain, These Directions Your Honours may be assured shall be punctually Executed though we are under Some apprehension, she will arrive us too late to Save her Passage round the Cape this Year.

THE Kent Captain Robson we hourly expect from Bengall being the Freight Ship to Surat, but the Lynn Captain Edgerton we are extremely sorry to Say is lost in Bengall River Some part of her Bales as we hear were Saved as also the Treasure the particulars of this unfortunate Accident not being acquainted with we must therefore beg leave to referr Your Honours to the Advices from that Presidency.

is at [sic] yet fell no lower than to ninety Rupees the Candy at which rate we have Agreed with our Merchants for 1000 Candies to load this Ship though the Price by beesteemed high yet we flatter ourselves Your Honours will approve this Step, the necessity of giving this Ship a timely dispatch little or no Remains in Warehouse and the Failure of Tonnage at Anjengo being what Obliged Us to it The French at Mahie are also in the Same Scituation having now two Ships on their hands to provide for the one being designed for Pondicherry and the other immediately for Europe To these unlucky Circumstances therefore the dearness of Pepper is to be attributed as we Can assure Your Honours no proper means have been omitted to lower it as may be Seen in the Several Parts of our Diary. Upon weighing the remains of the Last Years Contracts we found a Loss of 10. 9.  $24\frac{1}{2}$  from Garbling of this we duely advised our Superiors and wrote the Same off which we hope will not be disapproved of by Your Honours.

THE Several Ballances due from the Pepper Merchants on former Contracts have been recovered except that of Baunibelty Cunhipy's and Cacart Tupy we have laid an Attachment on the formers Effects which will be disposed of and Carried to Your Honours Credit we are afraid they will not turn out nigh Sufficient if Soimprisonment must be the last Resource and which we hope will bring him to Some reasonable terms. The latter Still Continues in the Cotiote Country out of our reach frequent Applications have been made to the King for Redress and promises as often Given particularly in a late Interview Set forth in the Diary under the 4<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo we think, if ever he will now oblige us, being under Some necessity for our Good Offices with the Prince of Cherrica with whom he is linked against Boyanore one part of whose Country he has Some Claim should we be disappointed the only Method left is to Give him up Apart for the recovery of the remainder for which we have permission from our Superiors and this intended Step we flatter ourselves will also meet with Your Honours Approval.

' THE Pepper Merchants Accounts for the last Year were made up the 31<sup>st</sup>. December last Agreeable to Your Standing order, their Several Balances are to be paid us in Pepper at the Price we may Contract at for which they have given their respective Bonds.

To provide the quantity of Cardamoms directed by Your Honours, we have advanced the Sum of 5600 Rup<sup>s</sup>. what has been delivered into Warehouse hitherto are So bad, that we have been obliged to reject them and have little prospect of purchas<sup>g</sup>. Nigh what indented for which we attribute to its Scarcity and the many Purchasers, as the Merchants have been applied to from time to time to take a further Sum but to no purpose, the Cardamoms already received their Produce when Sold will be kept by us to Secure Your Honours from any bad Debts on this Account.

WE have received orders from our Superiors to provide two hundred Candies of Sandall Wood for the Lord Anson and 1500 Pecuals for the True Briton on this Account we have advanc'd the Sum of forty Six thousand Rupees and hope to have them in readiness by the middle of next April.

# FOURTHLY OF THE TRADE IN INDIA AND THEREIN ANY TRANSACTIONS WITH THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENTS.

SINCE our Address by the Salisbury, a new Scene of Affairs has opened which has flung the Country into Some Consternation. Boyanore Governour of a Province belonging to the Prince of Cherrica has lately flung off his alligiance and taken upon himself the Title of King this has produced Several Treaties and Alliances between our Prince and other Powers as Set forth in the Diary; it being absolutely necessary for Your Honours Interest to give a Check to the Growing Power of Boyanore we have not failed to represent this Extraordinary Step of his in the worst of Colours to our Prince who Seems very desirous to show his Resentment but we are afraid means are wanting as hitherto he has Continued inactive only making a Show of War, his Chief dependance is on the Samorine who has given Assurances of a Powerfull Assistance he is Certainly well able to keep his word out his Veracity is not interily [sic] to be depended on should he fail we have very little hopes.

ever to See Boyanore effectually reduced who must in time become a very dangerous Enemy to the House of Colastria to which he is allied by the Brother of the Prince Regents Marrying his Sister, who by this Alliances is become an Advocate for him as on his Death a Son he has by this Marriage is to Succed. From the Regent and his Brother being thus of different Sentiments the Ministers employed by each are as Opposite we must therefore leave Your Honours to Judge the Confusion of Politicks this party Government must Occasion, and however Zealous the Regent may be to Support his inclinations, the latter we are afraid will be an overmatch for him having the Commonalty on his Side, The Regent notwithstanding these difficulties pursists still to make preparations for a War against Boyanore but how he will raise a Sufficient Sum to Carry on Such an Undertaking we are at a Loss as his Subjects Seem not very ready to past [sic] with their money and Force Cannot Conveniently be made use of at this juncture.

YOUR Honours doubtless are well acquainted with the Seperate Treaty of Peace made by our Prince with the Cannarees upon their evacuating his Country for the Performance of which Palliarem Stood Security he is now pressed by both for Payment of the Sums therein Stipulated and threatened in Case of Refusal with an Invasion we are in hopes however the Prince will be able to raise Sufficient from his Revenues to Satisfy them for the Present and we shall not fail to make proper Remonstrances to the Bednure Rajah for this Purpose.

THE Several Debts from the Puniture Rajah Boyanore and Samorine we have very little hopes of recovering that of Ally Rajah must be a work of Time the Poverty of his Family, and not want of Inclinations, rendering him at present not able to discharge the whole he has lately put into our hands a parcell of Ambergrease the produce of which when disposed of will be Carried to Your Honours Account.

THE Princes Debt will be Annually decreased by our Carrying the Customs on Your Honours Trade to the Credit of this Account.

In former Advices Your Honours have been Acquainted with the Reduction made in the Achamars Debt which is in No danger as they Continue paying not only the Interest but part of the Principal Yearly.

THE Consultations and Diary now forwarded will advise Your Honours the ungratefull Behaviour of the Samorine by his endeavouring to introduce new Customs on your Trade at Callicut this however has been prevented without Coming to any Rupture which is Extremely agreeable as we have orders from our Superiors to avoid if Possible any Difference, The Anjengo Sloop's Cargoe we have as yet obtained no Satisfaction for, nor do [w]e See any likeliwood unless Vigorous Measures are made use of which we presume is not Convenient from the Injunctions laid on us by our Superiors.

#### FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

THE Several Fortifications being in very good Repair our Charges on this head are very triffing we shall Shortly be under a Necessity of rebuilding a Small Warehouse which has lately fell and making a New Gate to Tellicherry Fort decayed through Length of Time the Expence of which will not be very Extraordinary for this we have our Superiors Permission and hope the Same will not be disapproved of by Your Honours.

WE are Sorry to observe to Your Honours that Your Plantations upon a Survey made on them have not been found to be in that flourishing Condition as formerly represented. this we impute to a Larger Parcell of Ground being Cultivated than Could possibly be taken Care of by the Coffrees, to recover them from their decaying Condition we have been obliged to employ a Number of Coolies under the Directions of John Frasier a Renter by whose Skill and Knowledge in this Part of Husbandry we make no doubt of once more of bringing the Plantations into a flourishing Condition; Our Superiors having been pleased to approve this Step and

permitted us to make him an adequate Allowance for his Trouble we have therefore thought proper to allow 30 Rupees P Month, which his Industry wells deserves.

YOUR Revenues being much the Same as the preceeding Year we have therefore nothing more material to Say under this head.

SIXTHLY OF COVENANTED SERVANTS MILITARY AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

David but they will be kept no longer than till we hear from Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>.

ENCLOSED is an Indent of Cloth wanting to Compleat the Cloathing of our Military and part of our Militia which we request may be Complied with if possible before the Rains.

As the Kent which arrived here the 28<sup>th</sup>. Inst<sup>t</sup>. will Sail in about two days we shall only add now that we are with the Greatest Respect.

The Price of this Article we have-Settled at one hundred and fifteen Rupees the Candy for the Second and one hundred and thirty Rupees for the first Sort which we are Sorry to observe is more than was. given for it the last Year but the Sweede Ship (which is still at Mahie) has Occasioned this increase the Supra-Cargoes giving one hundred thirty five for the worst Second Sort under the Denomination of the first and one hundred twenty five for the: Common third under the Denomination of the Second this are the Prices wrote in private Letters from Mahie and which the Second of that Place confessed when here Some Days past.

THE Shaftesbury Captain Bookey is returned from Persia but in the Passage running ashore rec<sup>d</sup>. Such Damage as to prevent her being Sent home this Season.

WE have had this Year a Swede Ship from Surat Commanded by one Sherman (formerly in Your Honours Service) She Sailed for Canton about three days Since with a Cargoe of Sandall Wood which her Supra Cargoes bought of the French at Mahie at Such Extravagant Prices as 135 Rupees for the first Sort and 125 Rupees for the Second but very bad Second was imposed on them for the first and third for Second which has affected our Purchasers Greatly as Your Honours will please to observe in the Subsequent Part of this Address.

THE Kent Captain Robson arrived here from Bengall in last Month and Sailed hence for Surat and Bombay the 1<sup>st</sup>. Instant.

THIS you will receive by his Majesty's Ship the Vigilant M<sup>r</sup>. Lisle who with the Ruby Captain Knight arrived here from Bombay the 25<sup>th</sup>. Instant under their -Convoy Your Honours Ships the Lord Anson and True Briton the Sandall Wood is now Shipping off with two hundred Candies of Pepper on board the former and one hundred on the Latter; the one's Stock we are directed to make up Rupees 250000. —. —. and the other Rupees 152583. 1. 77. with Dollars or any Species of Foreign Silver but if that is not procurable with new Rupees which Shall be Strictly Complied with and we are in hopes to dispatch them in all this Month.

THE Morratta Fleet has been this Season so low down as Callicut in their Return they touched at this Port for Wood and Water which were Supplied them esteeming it most Prudent to treat them as Friends and show them Courtesy at Such a triffing Expence than acting otherwise especially as they are in Amity with Your Honours and a Denial might have endangered our Small Craft then daily expected from Mangulore with Rice for this Garrison.

In our last Address Your Honours were advised the State of our Pepper Investment and the Calculate of Quick Stock enclosed under N<sup>o</sup>. [lacuna] will show our Remains in Warehouse. From the Extravagant Prices Given by the French for the dispatch of two Ships they have had this Year obliged us to Settle our Purchases at 95 rupees the Candy; this we hope will be approved of as we Can assure Your Honours it has not been bo<sup>t</sup>. for less. Our Superiors in their Commands dated the 14<sup>th</sup>. Current have directed us not to make any further Purchases unless to be Got under 90 R<sup>s</sup>. and expect it to be got at Seventy the Candy which being impossible at this time we have therefore put an entire Stop to our Investment of this Article.

THE Cardamoms delivered by our Merchants this Year were So Extremely bad that we Could not possibly accept them they will therefore be disposed of and their Produce kept for what advanced on this Account.

THE Sandall Wood bought for Ships Lord Anson and True Briton turns out at 130 Rupees for the 1<sup>st</sup>. Sort and 115 Rupees for the Second which we are Sorry to observe is 10 Rupees dearer than the last Year, this is intirely owing to the Purchases made by the Swedes, and the Scarcity of this Article inland, which we hope will render us excusable.

Our Scituation with the Prince is very indifferent to Get in favour With the Boyanore his Highness has lately been tampering with the Several Powers to prevent Goods being Exported out of their respective Territories to this Settlement and making Strong Alliances against us To prevent if possible a Rupture the Chief went himself to expostulate with his Highness on the unreasonableness of this Strange Behaviour, who immediately flung off the Mask and begun hostilities, this Journey however has discovered to us that the intended Expedition against Boyanore was no more than a Blind to lull us into an imaginary State of Security that they might Come on us unexpectedly. This Flame has been blowed up by Boyanore and we have Some reason to think that the French underhand have likewise been instigators this unsettled Scituation of Affairs have obliged us to encrease Our Garrison which we hope will be all the Extraordinary Expence Your Honours will be put to on this Occasion and you may be assured no Opportunities shall be omitted to put an end to this Troublesome Affair.

## HONBLE SIR & SIRS

WE have now before us Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. Commands dated the 14<sup>th</sup>. April per Lord Anson which Ship with the True Briton arrived us the 25<sup>th</sup>. in Company with the Vigilant and Ruby, the Stores and Treasure turned out agreeable to Invoice and we must beg leave to referr ourselves to the enclosed Letters under N<sup>o</sup>. 16 and 18 for the particulars of their Dispatch. they Sailed hence for Canton the 7<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo and were Seen the 11<sup>th</sup>. following by Captain Higginson in the Travencore Snow Standing to the Southward with a fair Wind so that we doubt not of their having got Safe off the Coast. We were indeed under Some apprehension for their Safety as the Monsoon Set in the 9<sup>th</sup>. Pretty Severely in the bad Weather the Danbury was drove ashore a little to the Northward of Callicut as also a Maccao Ship named the S<sup>t</sup>. Minguel. The Travencore is now at Cannanore refitting the Master of her intending to Proceed for the Bay in August next.

THE Chief and Factors of Anjengo have been acquainted with Your Honours &c<sup>as</sup>. Orders to Supply them with Treasure which upon their Application Shall be duely Complied with. The Box of Medecines for that Factory from the Monsoon Setting in So Early and the want of a proper Conveyance Still his [sic] here but will be forwarded after the Rains.

By the encolsed Calculate of Quick Stock Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will observe our Remains of Pepper in Warehouse; this Article Still keeps up from 90 to 95 Rupees the Candy which exceeding Your Honour &c<sup>as</sup>. Lemitation we have therefore put a Stop to any further Purchases. At Callicut the Price is much the Same but Manoel Netto having been found tampering with the Merchants to take that Article in Ineck [sic] for Goods at 115 Rupees it was Judged Necessary to Order him thence as Such a Proceeding (if permitted) will naturally affect to Price here when it may reasonably be expected to fall there being no Vent at this Season of the Year for Pepper.

IN Several of our Addresses to Your Honour &cas. you have been advised of the firm Attachment our Young Prince has had to the Boyanore which he has Carried to so great a Length as to form a Scheme with him and the rest of the Country Powers to act offensively against us which we have full Conviction of having detected an Ola from two of the Boyanore's Ministers to him assuring their Master was ready to assist him in his design with both Men and Money at his own Expence and that they doubted not by a Suitable Management they Could draw in the King of Cotiote to Join with them. At the Same time his Highness likewise endeavoured to prevail with Palliarem to impede the Sandall Wood Contract made by us for the Lord Anson and True Briton and to get the French fixed at Nelleaseroon which we advised we had a Suspicion of Sometime past the King of that Place at last having Consented thereto after Several Conferences held by the French with our Princes Ministers for that purpose. These glaring Instances of his evel [sic] designs and many more of the like kind (which to insert would not Come within a Compass of a Letter) induced us to Come to a Serious Consideration how to guard our Honble Masters dear bought Priviledges at this Place and frus-trate his designs when it was Agreed in Council that the Chief should proceed to Balliapatam with a proper Guard to Conferr with the Old Prince on this Occasion and being informed that if the King of Colastria would exert his Authority he Could prevent the ill Consequences that must inevitably follow if the Young Prince was permitted to pursue his destructive measures a Conference was held with him on this Subject who being persuaded the Country must Suffer if a Speedy Redress was not thought of he Sent for Prince Amboo Tamban of the Same Branch and appointed him the acting Person in the Government Saying he did not doubt as Soon as his orders were made known to the Prince of Cotacuna both him and his Subjects would pay a due Obedience to the Authority he had invested him with while their own Priviledges were held Sacred. Before this Appointment was made due Care was taken that Prince Amboo Tamban should do nothing Contrary to what was esteemed for the Company's Interest when the Chief Set out for Cotacuna to have a Conference with the elder Prince of Colastria who having been fully informed of the Young Princes base Behaviour and of the Kings Constituting Prince Amboo Tamban the acting Person in the Government, after pleading for his own Brother he Publickly acknowledged the King of Colastria had a Power to appoint whom he pleased to transact Affairs and promised faithfully to consider thereof and go with the Chief to the King of Colastria and Settle Affairs to the Content of his Majestv and the Hoñble Company when returning into his Fort of Cotacuna he prepared to attack us and being Sent to make good his Promise he returned for Answer he was ready to receive us therefore. Seeing his people resolved to fire on us we were obliged to Commence hostilities in order to Cover our people in their Retreat from thence receiving advice Just then that the Boyanore had Sent fifteen hundred and the King of Cotiote two thousand People to his Assistance which proved true as we found on our Return. The King of Colastria accompanied the Chief to Telli-cherry fully persuaded of the Young Prince and his Adherents Resolution to do the Honble Company all the Mischief in their Power for which Purpose he makes large Presents to the King of Cotiote and has the Boyanore entirely in his Interest the Nombiers from the dread they have of their Country being ruined in Case they Join us (it laying between the Boyanore and King of Cotiotes Territories) Standing Newter. As to the Achamars of Rhandoterrah he is fleecing them in a terrible manner, in So much that this flourishing part of his Country will probably in time

be as desolute as the rest. His Highness had not hitherto Given us any Extraordinary trouble, owing to the Cannarees being on his Fronteers with about 6000 Men. threatning an Invasion, this Seasonable Diversion will prevent our being obliged to run our Hofible Masters to any large Expence (which must otherwise have happened) as we are able to Stand on the defensive and shall be ready to embrace the first favourable Occasion to put an end to the distracted State of the Country if possible.

THIS Leads us to advise Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that the Samorine lately by a most bare faced act Seems to us not to have the least regard for the Friendship of the Hoñble Company when Self Interest is in view in May last we were under a necessity to Send to Callicut the Sum of 4000 Rupees the Toney by bad Weather put a Shore a little to the Northw<sup>4</sup>. of that Place and our People was Soon after Stopt Several Remonstrances have been made to the Samorine on the occasion whoby his evasive Answers appears to us no wise inclined to Reimburse us and unless Some Rigorous Measures are taken against him our Hoñble Masters Trade at that Port will be but on a very Precarious footing.

THE Several Debts due from Puniture Rajah Boyanore and Samorine Continue the Same nor have we any Prospect of Recovering either that from Ally Rajah will be a work of time as it is not in his Power from the Poverty of the Family at present to pay off any Great Sum at once.

UPON the Books of this Factory Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will please to observe the Estate of  $M^r$ . Robert White has Credit Rupees 389. —. 43. this we mention at the request of our Surgeon  $M^r$ . William Gill who has a demand, upon it but no bodys administering it has Continued unpaid, and as we understand that the Surgeons Bill is the first paid off after the Funeral Charges he hopes Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will permit us to Satisfy him it being for his attendance during  $M^r$ . Whites Illness.

FROM the indisposition of Lieutenant Bilderbeck and Ensign Harris (the latter of whom is Since dead) we have been in Great want of an Officer for to Command at the out Forts to remedy which the Chief has thought P[r] oper to make M<sup>r</sup>. Foreman our Serjeant Major a Private Ensign and as Necessity was the Occasion he hopes Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will approve of it for we have not Serjeants or Corporals that can Write or read to go on Duty and of Consequence no Written reports can be Sent and besides the people will not pay Such a regard to a Serjeant as an Officer of higher rank.

Ultimo they left England in Dec<sup>r</sup>. in Company with the Caesar, Essex and Triton all bound for their Port and China and the Warwick for Madeira, and Coast and Bay the Dragon is intended by them to carry the treasur designed for Bengall. The Sweede Ship that Sailed from Mahie the 22<sup>d</sup>. April bound for China has been forced into Pondicherry without Masts, and four French Ships expected from the Islands are judged to be lost.

In our last address we advised the Price of Pepper which has Since fell to eighty four Rupees the Candy this being under, what limited by Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. in your Commands by the Lord Anson, we shall therefore endeavour to make a further Provision, as the Gentlemen at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David Seem to hint to us a want of Tonnage at Bengall, The Enclosed Calculate of Quick Stock Sets forth our Remains of this Article in Warehouse: the Monsoon has continued very favourable for the Pepper but as we can form no judgement of the Crop Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. we hope will excuse our not forwarding a Calculate of Cash wanting at the opening of the next fair Season though an Early Supply of about three Lack will enable us to have Some Influence on the Market.

WE omitted formerly to advise your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that the Ambergrease belonging to Ally Rajah Still continues unsold and we are under Some apprehension of its Spoiling from the badness of the Sortment this he has been made acquainted with but he Sends us only Equivocating Answers.

WE have already wrote Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. in respect to the difference between us and the Prince of Cherricka things remain in the Same Scituation, nor can we judge of his Intentions; Some Say his Highness is inclinable to accommodate Matters while others Seem to think otherwise. IT is with Concern we must acquaint Your Honour &ca. that the Differences between the Prince of Cherricka Carry Still an Appearance of a long Continuance. The French two days Since Marched a Body of one hundred Military and Militia to the Northw<sup>d</sup>. to form the intended Settlement at Nelleaseroon or Some other Part of the Princes Dominions having Permission from their Superiors at Pondicherry for which they have hitherto waited. As Such a Scituation will inevitably be attended with very ill Consequence to our Honble Masters Trade as well in Pepper as Cardamoms and is an Infringement upon their Priviledges derived to them from Grants given by the Several Kings of Colastria for a Sole Trade in their Dominions exclusive. of all other European Nations except the Dutch we have been induced to Protest against M<sup>r</sup>. Louet and his Council on this Occasion and hope it will meet with Your Honour &c<sup>as</sup>. Approbation. The Prince Continues to make Alliances with the Several Country Powers who appear to wait the event the King of Cotiote indeed Seems to have flung off the Mask as he escorted the French through his Territories; but we can have little to fear from him as his Friendship Continues no longer than he is paid for it. What the Princes Intentions are or how he will act we Cannot pretend to Say till the fair Season opens when we have reason to think the Cannarees will oblige him to turn his Highness an opening, an Ola has been wrote him Setting forth the distractions of his Country and the ill consequences that must ensue by a Continuance of his present Conduct to this we have not yet recd. an Answer but hope it may be the means of paving a way towards an Accommodation should it not we have only to assure Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that our utmost attention shall be lent to Secure our Hoñble Masters Priviledges in this Country.

OUR last Address will inform Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. the State of our Pepper Investment; the Price Still Continues at 84 Rupees the Candy, we then wrote our Intentions to make a further Provision of this Article with the Reasons that induced us to Come to this Resolution. Agreeable to which the Sum of ten thousand Rupees has been advanced and hope the Same will prove agreeable. You being fully acquainted with our Reasons for having wrote the Dutch Captain and Council of Cannanore to join with Us in Suppressing the Encroachments the French Nation are making in the King of Colastrias Dominions to the prejudice of our Respective Companys who have the Sole Priviledge of Tradre [sic] in His as [sic] Country exclusive of every other European Nation, You are therefore to proceed to Morrow Morning to Cannanore and See the Captain and his Council will agree to act jointly with us in expelling them by all justifiable Measures (if the Same hereafter may appear practicable) assuring him in the mean time that we are re-solved to act openly against the Princes of Cherrika for having permitted them to Settle in the Colastria Dominions as their Schemes could not have been executed without their permission, and if you find he is resolved to join his Endeavours with ours you may acquaint him of our design to take Cholasavaron, but if as we expect he should declare he cannot act till he receives a Force and Orders from Cochin represent in the strongest Terms the delaying of taking proper measures to bring our Prince to a just way of thinking may give the French time to fix themselves in a State of Security and render abortive any Plan we may hereafter form for routing them out, whereas by distressing the Princes of Cherrika immediately we may oblige them to act jointly with Us to prevent the unforeseen prejudices that may happen to our respective Companys from their meeting no Opposition, telling them if they are averse to joining us or have it not in their Power at present. Sufferer for having proved a Faithfull Ally to Us If there is any particular thing hewants to attain at present in possession of the Princes of Cherrika Urge him todeclare his Intentions in the beginning and if reasonable they will be backed to Us.

IF you are Successfull in this Point you will easily Contrive means to Visit Ally Rajahs Fortifications for which purpose Captain Cameron now proceeds with you to make his Remarks and you are to endeavour to perswade him to let Some of our Gunners be fixed in those that Commands the Plain as you go to Cherrica & particularly in that Fort called [*lacuna*] which is near Colasavaron the Place we have an intention to take provided this Alliance can be formed so that a free Communication may be kept open between Cannanore and Tellicherry.
