GENTLEMEN

The Honble Court of Directors by the Lynn that Arrived here the 6th. Instant having Dismiss'd Mr. Floyer from their Service as likewise Mr. William Holt and appointed the Honble Thomas Saunders Esqr. to [be] President and Several of their late Madrass Servants whom they have reinstated to be of the Council here as neither Mr. Saunders nor any of the rest of the Members are yet Arrived I am now to acquaint you that your Several favours of the [10th.] April 31st. May and 13th. June have been duely received and that what the Pattamar fellow Urged of having been here with the former was very just but as it was directed for Callicut Mr. Floyer thought it improper to Open it [and] Ordered him to carry it thither which was the Occasion of his returning to you the Packet for Bombay accompanying your Second Letter was to have been forwarded by the Britannia Who Sailed the 28th. Ultimo but Captain Somner Went away without it therefore as I shall Dispatch a Pattamar thither now it shall go by it.

The York and Prince Edward having both Arrived the beginning of last Month Sailed the latter End for China and the 13th. Instant the Grantham came in with Benjamin Robins Esqr. on board Who is Engineer General to the Hofible Companythe Duke of Cumberland that came out with her was unfortunately last upon the Coast of Guinea near Cape Verd and no part of her Cargo has yet been Saved thô there is hopes that her Treasure will when the Season will admit of their Working upon the Wreck the Supra-Cargoes having fitted out a Sloop and Long Boat for that purpose. WORSHILL, SIR & SIRS

WE are now to acknowledge the receipt of your two favours dated the 9th, May and 24th. July with the Treasure and our Superiors Commands that accompanied them.

The Investments both of Cloth and Pepper made by us having greatly exceeded all Expectation we find ourselves under an immediate necessity of applying to you for a Supply of Cash, and the last advance made this day on Account thereof reducing our Balls. to Rupees five thousand One hundred and Eight and forty five reas We therefore now return your Pattamars to request fifty thousand Rupees may be sent us in the quickest manner possible either by Sea or land and as the Exchange of Rupees have been very low for some time past (and still continuing so) we shou'd be glad to receive that amount in Venetians or in China Gold as they will answer much better than Silver if the former is procurable from four hundred and thirty to four Hundred and forty Rupees hundred Venetians full weight and shod Gold of ninety two Touch at about four hundred and thirty Rupees Shoe. We are in hopes soon of increasing our Pepper contract very considerably but at present not certain of the quantity therefore cannot ascertain what Sum will be required from you in the whole till the same is concluded but to compleat the Investment already made and defraying the monthly charges of this Settlement till December next we compute Rupees One hundred and twenty thousand (1,20,000) will be wanting and Agreeable to Our Superiors last Commands now desire you will remit us that amount as occasions offer when the Season opens (including the 50,000 Rupees therein).

By Letters from Fort St. David we are advised that our Honble Masters Ships Portfield, York, Prince Edward, Grantham and Lynn are all Safely arrived there. The latter left England in March last and by whom the Honble Company were pleased to dismiss Governour Floyer and Mr. Holt their Service, appointing the Honble Thomas Sanders Esqr. President and Several of their Maddrass Servants members of Council. She likewise brings the mallancholly news of the Duke of Cumberlands being lost on the Coast of Guinia near Cape Verd with every thing on board except her Crew five of whom where only drowned however the Super Cargoes we find were in hopes of recovering the Treasure having fitted out a Sloop and Long Boat to work upon the Wreck when the weather will permit.

When we are at some certainty in respect to enlarging the Investment our Superiors Commands will be replied to and the Pacquet recommended to your Care at which time we shall add what may be further necessary to mention in respect thereto and till then beg you will believe us to be.

In Conformity to the directions of last Council We have looked over the Island Durmapatam taking to our Assistance Lieutenant John Johnson, John Frazier, Kellepo Nair and Mannaree Corouropa, and find the Grounds thereon to be as follows.

THE Honble Companys Plantations in general are very ill looked after, so much that those whom we took to our assistance esteemed Trees that have been planted Six years to be only the growth of four years and others that have been planted four years to be only the growth of two years and a half. The Coffrees have been suffered to sow yams in the Honble Cos. Plantations which is esteemed prejudicial to the Trees as being of a hot nature therefore We think this Should not be permitted in future. The above mentioned people judge it will be eight years before any of the Honble Companys plantations will yield Coconuts excepting a few Trees that are near some of the Coffrees Houses which now give fruit, and that every Acre of Ground should have two People to look after it. They likewise are of Opinion that Pepper would grow very well in most of these Grounds sett in the manner Johnsons and Frazers are that is between the Coconut Trees. At Meylure there are Several large Trees proper for Pepper Vines and as they esteem this a fitt place for the same We beg leave to recommend it to your Consideration.

THE Plantations of Christopher Bilderbeck John Johnson, Edward Targett, John Frazer and Jozeph Alves are in a flourishing condition and well cultivated but that of Leonard Lopes is in a very bad condition, it being not near half planted with Trees, nor what is half taken care off.

Several People who have Grounds on benefit or Improvement have taken but little care to plant the same sufficiently with Trees, therefore We think they should be called on, and that in future great care ought to be taken when Ground is given in this manner to see its well planted, that is for every Acre of Land to contain one hundred Coconut Trees as also that no more Ground be given to any one Person than what he has circumstances to improve or cultivate many of these people who have land on benefit have gathered fruit some for Six Years Some for five years and so on and hitherto have paid nothing to the Honble Company, therefore We think their Several Grants or leases should be examined into that our Honble Masters may receive their proportion and the People obliged to perform what Stipulated therein.

We can't help begging leave to recommend to your favour Kiaca Manna and Ponnapa Conna Moupa their Grounds being both better cultivated and more care taken of than any. We see who have Lands on benefit, the formers Plantations now bears and ought to pay what Stipulated by Agreement but the Collectors Assistants informed us the late Chief the last year as an encouragement allowed him three years longer.

WE are of opinion there ought to be kept in the Collectors office a Register Book of every Person that have Lands on the Island specifying the quantity of Ground each Man has, the Condition, with the time he took it &ca. for want of which we were obliged to have recourse to his assistants.

YESTERDAY afternoon we recd. your favour dated the 29th. Ultimo with fifty thousand Rupees (50,000 Rs.) Escorted by a Serjeants Command in four Toneys and thô you mention nothing about their return still we presume the Military may be wanted for Duty, therefore now dispatch them back, as another Opportunity of writing will soon offer by a Munchua belonging to your Settlement that laid up the rains in this River, at which time we are in hopes of being upon some certainty in respect to the Pepper Investment as the Governments People and some private Merchants are dailey expected here for concluding the same. To carry on what is already made the Rupees you have been pleased to send us will be Sufficient but as this Specie lowers in value to the Southwd. daily we impatiently wait to receive the Gold you give us hopes of providing at Mahie and Callicut to advance our Cloth Contractors who will we imagine apply for the same very shortly.

ALL due enquiry has been made about the Box of Locks you mention to be missing but we do not find by the General Books or Storekeepers Receipts and Issues any such were recd. here Pr. Oxford on which Ship the Stores designed for this Place from the Presidency Pr. Stretham 1748 was then sent from your Settlement But we observe in April 1748 a small Box containing four Locks were recd. more than Invoiced which was mentioned in a Letter from hence to the then Chief and Factors who in reply declared that upon reference had to the Bombay Invoice they were not incerted therefore imagined they belonged to Some private Persons here desiring if they did not the Presidency might be advised of what was necessary to mention about them.

Worshipfull Sir & Sirs

I Rec^p. your Order of the 12th. Instant and in Regard to contradicting your Worship &c^a. opinion that it has been taken in that Light I never intended it So, I only gave you mine and this I must beg Leave to Say that it is the first time ever I was called to an Account for want of Shewing a Due respect for Obedience was the first thing I Learnt as a Soldier.

I RETURN you thanks for advising me wherein I was Cupable in not Sticking up to the Regulations.

As to visiting the Hospitall agreeable to the Regulations I gave orders to the Officers to visit the Same which was done by the Officer that went off guard and as for the him I was upon guard being 35 days their was an Officer to do it Cap^t. Bilderbeck being Sick.

As to Releveing the out Posts the Chief was allways accquainted with any that went to Maddacarra or else where and Never fault found in future they shall be relived [sic] monthly unless otherways ordered.

No officer or Soldier has continued at his hours by my consent as for Mighuel De Leavero Corporall he was permitted to stay at home by Mr. Hornby who I had orders to make all Reports too while the Chief was absent.

In Regard to the Defferences at the pay Table the people themselves were the occation [sic] of them they not Rembering [sic] how their accounts stood for which their accounts was examined and they found themselves in the wrong to which every man Signed his name to his Accot.

As to the Recrutes sent to Bombay which I was ordered to Rase [sic] they were the people turned out on Reducement of this Garrison so that had they been so bad as is Represented I belive they would have been out Long befor in Regard to the money that was advanced them it was on account they complained they were Quite Cair of Neceasserys and told me they could not proseed without, as having famillys &ca. which I advised the Pay Master off who made answier and said you must then

advance them Something each man and it will be paid you again which Sum was Rupees 102. —. 40 which Account I sent to Captain Gibbs that it might be stopped by the Captains in what Company they might be destributed into but as for Receiving any of the paymaster on that head not a Cash.

SIR & SIRS

It is with no Small Concern that I am Obliged to Trouble you Gentlemen with any Controversies of Mine, but as my Character is Touched by Captain Mostyn in his last Paragraph, to Clear myself therefore from Such an Imputation I must beg leave to offer the following and then Submit to your Consideration esteeming myself much obliged to you for given me the Opportunity.

In my Account for the Month of January you will please to observe there is only One hundred Rupees (100. —. —) Charged whereas the Sum advanced by me to the New Recruits was 104 Rupees this arose, that my Account and the General Letter to the Presidency might Agree but as Captain Mostyn absolutely denies ever receiving the same I shall endeavour to Convince you Gentlemen as far as the Thing will admit of a Conviction that the money was Disbursed by me.

For this purpose therefore I now lay before you the Pay Book with the adjustment of January's Disbursements in both which the 104 Rupees appears to have been paid. In his Letter you will please to observe he absolutely denies ever receiving a Cash from me on Account the new recruits but in Council among other things said he was ready to Swear to the best of his Knowledge he never was paid any thing. This I think is showing a Diffidence whether he had or had not for was he Certain he Surely would have offered to Swear directly and not in such indirect Terms as above. But to show further his Uncertainty, I have a flagrant Instance to inform you of some time since he sent Chandu Nair to my head assistant to know if he had advanced him any Money an [sic] Account the New Recruits, now had he been Certain of never Receiving any Money on that Head why this Message Surely, if he keeps any Accounts from them he would have known, and if he keeps none it is not probable nay possible that a Persons Memory can be so Good as to recollect for 8 Months all Receipts and Disbursements in that time, and if this is the Case I leave the impartial to judge whether accounts regularly Carried on from Month to Month are Not to be relied on before a Persons Memory. Captain Mostyn is a little Mistaken in Saying he Spoke to me about the Recruits, it was to Mr. Douglas to speak to the Chief, who accordingly did and wrote me by the Chiefs order to make the advance for the Truth of which I appeal to that Gentleman Now from hence a very natural question may be asked which is that in Case he Intended to advance the New Recruits out of his own money and at his own Risque why this Application to the Chief but even to allow that he did Speak to me and that I returned him the Answer he mentions, has he ever applied to me for being Reimbursed, and I can affirm the first Time I heard of Captain Mostyn having given the New Recruits money was from Reading the General Letter last received from the Presidency.

Before I Conclude I must be gleave to point out to you a very Remarkable Instance of Captain Mostyn's bad Memory and show that he keeps no Accounts, In the Time of the late Chief there was a Considerable Difference in the Rice that is from what enserted in the Several Rolls and what recd. from the Warehouse; when I acquainted Captain Mostyn of this he was as positive as now and not Relying on the Account I had drawn out of the Same applied himself to Mr. Byfeld who took the Trouble to Settle it, but Strange when he was Called on for his Rice Book

he had none to Produce but only Slips of Paper however my account being Examined and found Just Captain Mostyn was ordered to make Good the Difficiency and which you will please to observe appears in the Pay Book now before you.

I Cannot likewise Pass over the Declaration made in Council by the Serjeant Major which Agrees with the Sum advanced by me Rups. 104. —. —. This with Captain Mostyn's Refusing to produce his Cash Book (which every Gentlemen thô not a Merchant for his own Satisfaction I beleive keeps but what his Motive may be for Refusing Such a Request I can't say) beleive will not appear in his favour however I submit the whole to your Judgement being with the Greatest Respect.

We are not as yet certain what quantity of Pepper will be gott at this Settlement the Ensuing Season but our Contracts hitherto amounts to Two thousand eight hundred and twenty Candies, and we have in Warehouse one Hundred and twenty Six Candies Nine Maunds and Two Pounds (126. 9. 2) of Pepper with five thousand three hundred and Sixty Two Pieces and a half of Cloth besides thirteen thousand Seven hundred and twenty four Pieces of the Latter in readiness at Cotata which will be sent for when the weather clears up, and we Sincerely Wish, that Success may attend your early advancing for the new Crop of Pepper towards providing for the heavy Tonnage that will be on hand this Season.

The Soldier you mention (named Pedro Mendes) having liberty to be Exchanged when Ensign Edgertons Command was at your Settlement and Since petitioned for his discharge the Same has been granted it appearing by his petition, that he had Served the Honble Company upwards of five and twenty years, so that Balthazar Vonderbeg is now returned with your Command, the former not being under Our Direction at present.

We send by these Toneys Two Europeans that lately left the King of Travancores Service, who by their behaviour appear to be sober good men, but as Entertaining of them here may in all probability give disgust and make his Majesty imagine it was by our Instigation they left him, We deem it more prudent to send them away in this manner that they may get Service either at your Settlement or at the Presidency.
