EXAMINED and Passed the following Accounts as Entered after this Consultation Viz<sup>t</sup>. The General Paymaster his Account of Disbursments for the month of July. Also the Warehousekeeper and Storekeeper their Accounts of Receipts and Issues for said month; with the latters Account Sale for the months of May June and July, Likewise the Account of Pepper deliver'd into the Honble. Companys Warehouse last month.

Munchua taken from the Canarees Agreed to be put up to Sale.

ORDERED that the small Munchua taken from the Cannarees by the Neptunes Prize Grab be putt up at Publick Sale and that the Linguister gives proper notice thereof.

Instructions from the President &cs. touching the Building a New Banksall taken into Consideration.

Taking into Consideration that part of the Instructions left us by the Honble. Stephen Law Esq<sup>r</sup>. & Charles Rigby Esq<sup>r</sup>. relating to the building a new Banksall within the Limitt Wall which they judged absolutely necessary for containing the Honble. Companys Effects in safety, what room we have now not being near sufficient without lodging them in Cajan Houses which from the many accidents that has happened is found to be extream hazardous and as the Honble. Company seem determined to land here a Quantity of Tea, which with their repeated Orders for providing a double Stock of Pepper (whence we must have one Years Crop always in Warehouse) such building is now become more necessary than formerly and according to the best of our judgments ought to contain Two thousand Candys.

As it must be situated near the Fort, & between it and the Sea it is necessary that it be so low as the Guns can play into the road, whence it will not admit of a roof, and therefore ought to be covered with Tarrass, which will require very large Beams if it is not built narrow, all which being duely Considered Resolved that the said intended Warehouses be built of the following Dimensions Vizt.

It's Dimensions.

Long One hundred and eighteen foot from outside to ouside.

Broad Twenty two foot ... Ditto ... Ditto.

Heigh Twelve foot from the Floor.

Thickness of the Wall two foot from the foundation.

That for the Conveniency of stowing away other Goods than Pepper wh may require being kept separate, that it be divided into four rooms the Two  $\epsilon$  ones to be Twenty four foot long and Eighteen foot Broad in the clear and two middle ones Thirty foot long and Broad Eighteen foot in the clear with Th partition Walls of Two foot each in Breadth.

The present Season of the Year being the most proper to commence any buing Ordered that suitable provisions of Stones Lime and Timber be immediately provided at the most cheapest rates & that the work as soon as possible be begin the cost of the whole according to the best Computation we are able to make the work as something more than thirty thousand Fanams.

Anjengo.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo dated the 24<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo inclosing an Indent of Plank for Gun Carriages to be sent them by such Country Vessels as may be bound that way. Copy of which Indent is this day sent to our Linguister at Callicutt with Orders to provide it with all convenient speed. They write us that the Rice sent them from hence[11] February last was not all disposed of: when it was they would send us the Account Sale of it.

SATURDAY 11 Domingo Rodregues returned this day from Cannanore and gives the following Account of the Circumstances of the Family of the late Chatoo Chitt[y].

Domingo Redregues report of the Circumstances of Chatoo Chittys Family. Letter from his Heirs. That the Lands Verges Houses Joys and Effects now in their possession may amount in Value to about Sixty thousand Rupees and Debts that are esteemed good to near Forty thousand and that it is well known the Deceased was not indebted except trifling Sums to any but the Honble. Company. The Heirs wrote by him that as soon as the usual Ceremonies on this occasion were over they would come hither and adjust their Accounts which should be fully discharged.

The Amount of his Debt.

Their Debt on Account of their Contract for Pepper amounting to Rupees Eleven thousand two hundred forty two and two quarters, for a transferr made by the Prince Rupees Four thousand one hundred thirty two, three quarters and

sixty raes, and for Rice sold him two hundred six Rupees one quarter and thirty raes, which last two Sums were to be deliver'd in Pepper, all which amounts to Rupees Fifteen thousand five hundred eighty one two quarters and ninety raes.

The Deceased was by much the most considerable Merchant of any other in this Country and for many Years past contracted for the largest Quantity of Pepper Remarks which he allways punctually complied with 'till within these two Years past when relating thereto. the Wars with the Cannarees so ill effected that part of the Country he lives in as occasioned his being in the Honble. Companys Debt as abovementioned but from the Circumstances we learn from all hands it is not to be doubted but the Heirs can and will discharge it tho' we have reason to apprehend they cannot this Season comply with the Deceased's last Contract for Pepper which in such case will lessen the Quantity we expected to have in readiness for the Homeward bound Ships in December near two hundred Candys.

THE Weather being pretty fair it is likewise proposed to send him one thousand Rupees by Domingos Rodregues now going thither, to enable him to comply with the Indent for Plank for Anjengo according to our Orders of the 9th. Instant which is also Agreed to and that a Letter be now wrote him advising him of the same.

THE Munchua taken notice of under the 8th. Instant is now putt up to Publick Sale & Manoel Rodregues appearing to be the highest bidder the Munchua is deliver'd him for Eighty five Rupees and the amount received into the Treasury. It cana was a sowed Boat and very much out of repair.

RECEIVED an Ola from the present Heirs of the late Chattoo Chitty advising of the Death of him that was the Principal Heir two days past but that it would not create any disorders in the family as they were to inherit that part of the Estate which belonged to him, and that they would come and adjust their Accounts as Chitty. soon as their Cerimonies were over.

ARRIVED Mr. Richard Murray Surgeon from Battecolay about Thirty five Leagues to the No.ward of this place where he was cast away in a Small French Ship in the beginning of June and who was formerly Surgeon of a Danes Ship to Madagascar where he & the Supracargo Mr. Charles Barrington with some others were left.

This morning arrived a large Ship at Mihie called the Prince, D' Conta Capt. Salle from France as in the afternoon did a small one called the Sierva Capt. Bachelie fro Mosambique both belong, to the French Compa. & bound to Pondicherry.

Mr. Richard Murray Examin'd. The occasion of this Meeting is to Examine Mr. Richard Murray Surgeon a Subject of Great Brittain who arrived on the 20<sup>th</sup>. Instant and acknowledges to have come out in Forreign Service. having fully Intorrogated him the substance of his Answers and such Circumstances as he can recollect are contained in the following Narrative of him the said Richard Murray and are as follows Viz<sup>t</sup>.

That he the said Richard Murray in April 1737 was invited by Mr. Charles Barrington to Copenhagen & there by him entertained as Surgeon of a Ship about to proceed to Maddagascar a Slaveing. That the said Barrington there contracted with the Danish West India Company to provide them with a Certain Number of Slaves and for that purpose freighted one of their Ships called the Grewinde Laurwigen of Sixteen Guns Thirty six Danish Seamen and sundry other Officers and Seamen as hereafter mentioned, and procured the King of Denmarks Pass wherein the Direction of the Voyage & management of the Cargo was set forth to be lodged in the said Mr. Barrington & the Command of the Ship in Jacob Nicholas Houlste.

Jacob Nicholas Houlste—Capt. Johannes Hanson 1<sup>st</sup>. mate Danes. 2<sup>d</sup>. Mate -Summers $\cdot$ Brown Purser Andrew Anderson Assist. Supracargo. Ninian Brice ... Mate. Andrew Mitchelson D۰. English. Surgeon. Richard Murray Robert Mongomery.  $\mathbf{D}^{\mathbf{o}_{\mathbb{S}}}$ . Mates. James Grier.

That on the 5th, of June following they Sailed from Copenhagen and on the 16th. of January 1737/8 arrived at Youngola on the Island of Maddagascar from whence after having traded for six Weeks by reason of a rebellion in that Kingdom they Sailed for new Massalege, at which place the small Pox rageing in a Terrible manner, they built a House or Factory on the shore, about the distance of a mile from the Ship after which Mr. Barrington went to the Kings Town to provide the remainder of his Cargo, when the Captain who had broke through all Mr. Barringtons Orders theretofore, took this opportunity to gain his Ships Company to his side by telling them sundry frivilous Storys and perswading them that Mr. Barrington delayed his time, upon which he the Captain sent some armed Men a Shore, and brought one Leith and the abovementioned Richard Murray Prisoners and proposed Sailing to them, which they not agreeing to in so Piratical a manner, after having Shipt of what part of the Cargo he could he permitted them to return a Shore, promising to stay for them till such time as they had acquainted Mr. Barrington, who was then about three days Journey in Land, with what was done. On hearing of which Mr. Barrington judged it unsafe to go on board till the Captain had made him some reperation for this Piratical proceeding which he alltogether refused, and weigh'd Anchor, and Sailed the 2<sup>d</sup>. June 1738 leaving the said M<sup>r</sup>. Barrington, Walter Leith, James Grier, the said Murray, & three Danish Servants behind, who thereupon proposed fitting out a Small Country Vessell to follow them to Mosambique (whither they intended to proceed with the Ship) in hopes of there having them brought to justice, but Mr. Barrington, Walter Leith, & two of the Danes Servants dying, their designs were crossed, and the Survivors obliged to remain nine months at Massalege during which time they received a Letter from Andrew Mitchelson, on board of said Danes Ship adviseing them that he Mitchelson, Ninian Brice. & Robert Montgomerey had informed the Governour of Mosambique where they then

were of the Captains Transactions to which he gave no attention but suffered the Captain to sell his Cargo there which consisted of small Arms, Ammunition and some Coarse Piece Goods.

That about this time the Subtil a small French Ship from Mascareen commanded by Mons<sup>r</sup>. Champloret arrived at Massalege, on which the said Richard Murray, James Grier, & a Danish Servant all that remained alive of those left behind took their Passage for Pondicherry in order to repair to Fort St. George, and in the beginning of April last they left new Massalege but by Stress of Weather on the 6th. of June they were forced ashore at Battacolai on the Carnatick Coast, where all perished excepting three French Sailors, the said Murray, & two Slaves, who gott a Shore without saving a thing belonging to them, or the Cargo of the Ship which consisted of Rice & Slaves, That he the said Murray being greatly fatigued and much out of Order was obliged to stay some time at Barcelore for his recovery, after which he proceeded hither where he Arrived the 20th. of August.

Ordered that this Declaration be copyed and signed by the said Richard Murray who being destitu[t]e of mony and cloths and all other necessaries of life Resoluit is AGREED that he be decently supported at the Expence of the Honble. Com-tion. pany till we can send him up to the Presidency.

The same day he wrote an Answer in substance as follows Vizt.

That about a month & an half past Boyanore intended to declare War against the Nombiers for some Insolences they had Committed against him which he had prevented with intentions to accomodate those differences, and had requested of Abswer the Nombiers several times to come to him for that purpose but they dispised his request and took a Hill belonging to Cunhi Nair & to prevent their being Masters of others he had fortifyed another from whence he was committed. Hostilities against the Nombiers as was Boyanores Nayrs likewise. The reason of his not advising us of these differences, he says was because he did not suppose but they would quickly be ended, if not, he hopes we will assist Cunhi Nayr according to the Agreement made between these Settlements but if Mr. Wake could think of any method to make up these differences he desires they may be communicated to him.

They are pleas'd to approve of our Management with Ragonat and hope that as the King of Bednure is Dead we may be able to conclude matters with the Cannarees on the footing of the Peace made with Surapaya, also of our releasing the Munchua seized by our round Munchua on the 3<sup>d</sup>. April and of appointing the Son of Domingo Rodregues Linguister. Ordered us to send up the Poon Masts by the first Europe Ship being much wanted, also the Lances & Spunge Staffs formerly Indented for with Fifty maunds of Candles.

Sent us Copys of sundry Paragraphs of the Hoñble. Companys Commands Prince William and Haeslingfield requiring our special attention to that of the 37th. recd. P the latter. Also the Paragraph of their Letter P Harrington relat-

ing to the Issuing Passes with the form of a Certificate.

TUESDAY 28<sup>TR</sup>. Letter To Anjengo. DISPATCHED a Pattamar to the Chief and Factors at Anjengo with the Packet received yesterday for them advising of the receipt of their Letter of the 24<sup>th</sup>. July and of our having Ordered the Timber for Gun Carriages to be provided conformable to their Indent.

DITTO DIE Monse. Moreau arrives with a Letter from the Directore of Mihie. CAME hither Mons. Moreau one of the French Council at Mihie with a Letter to Mr. Wake from his Chief in which he writes that he admires much at our not giveing Credit to what he writes rather than to Vulgar reports & that Mons. Moreau will give Mr. Wake a full account of their proceedings in respect to the present disputes.

Mons<sup>r</sup>. Moreau in discourse with M<sup>r</sup>. Wake upon the Subject of the Embroils of the French with the Nombiers took notice of their Insolence in not shewing due respect and regard to Mons<sup>r</sup>. Derois's good Offices for accommodating the disputes which had arose from the injuries some people of Boyanores had received from the Nombiers on their Frontiers, such as their having some time past abused

a Moor and taken some mony from him laying claim to some Coconut Gardens and hindering the Renters from Gathering the produce & that they had committed abuses of the like kind upon People belonging to Cunhi Nayr. That the Nombiers had fortifyed the Hill of Chembera which belonged to Cunhi Nayr, and also Poiterra which was neuter, but so near to their Fort of Carlay as for the security of it and to prevent them from carrying on their Fortification thereon they had been obliged to secure the Hill of Beria which Cunhi Nayr by their Order, had assisted them with Nayrs to secure.

Mr. Wake reply'd to Monsr. Moreau that disputes of this kind ever subsisted between these petty Governments that lay Contigious, & he presumed the better way on such occasions was to give the Prince to whom they are Tributary the trouble of deciding them for they were never better pleased than when they could engage the Europeans in their Warrs which gave them the opportunity of easing their own Expence and loading the Europeans with the Major part if not the whole The Hill of Chembera did not belong to Cunhi Nayr, nor was Poiterra neuter but both belonged to the Nombiers. nor ought we to suffer Cunhi Nayr to engage in a Warr with his Neighbours as fully appears by the Agreement made between The Gentlemen of Mihie and Tellicherry in the Year 1727/8 wherefore Monst. Derois engaging Cunhi Nayr in the present Contest was a Breach of that Agreement which if not stricktly adheared to the monstruous price of Pepper would still be kept up to the benefit of the Malabars though to the great prejudice of both Companys. upon the whole, he expected the four Nombiers here this Night when he would enquire into the greivances complained of and use his best endeavours with them to come to reasonable Terms of accommodation, the accomplishing of which he believed would very much conduce to the mutual benefit of both Companys but whatever his Success was it should immediatly be communicated to Mons<sup>r</sup>. Derois.

This afternoon Mons<sup>r</sup>. Moreau returned to Mihie by whom the Chief wrote a returns to Short Letter to Mons<sup>r</sup>. Derois in which he took notice that we should sincerely Mihie with observe the Agreement made between these two Establishments in 1727/8 and a Lotter beg'd leave to refer him to Mons<sup>r</sup>. Moreau for what discourse had passed between birectore.

A Messenger arrived from the Cannaree Government with Letters for the Wednes-Chief from Paramissora the first Minister of the new King of Bednure Surapaya General of his Forces in Malabar and Governour of Mangulore and from Subesenoy Renter of all his Sea Port Customs. The Letters were much to the same purport, Canaree that from Peramissora was as follows Vizt.

DAY 29TH

Messengr. arrives with Lett<sup>18</sup>. to the Chief Paramissora Surapaya Subesenoy.

That the new King had given the Government of Mangulore to Surapaya and Substance also the Command of his Army in this Country with a Power to adjust all the late missora's differences between the Honble. Company and that Government and to conclude Letter a Peace upon the same foundation as Surapaya before had done in the year 1736/7 in which Subesenoy was to assist him. he requested we would send a Companys Servant to Mangulore for this purpose and when all things were adjusted, to advise him when he would send the Kings conformation, That the King was very desirous of being in the same good friendship with the Hoñble. Company as had formerly subsisted between them and his Ancestors, concluding with Compliments.

Surapaya requested that we would send Pedro Rangel to him so soon as he Surapaya's came to Mangulore which would be very shortly, when he should set out for Madday where he desir'd the Chief would meet him, when we might be assured all affairs should be settled to our entire satisfaction.

Subesenoy's.

Subsency mentioned his shewing the Letter wrote him on the 31st. July to those of the Government who were very glad to find we were willing to accommodate the late differences.

Paramissora and Surapaya sent the Chief a Present of a small value.

DITTO DIE Nombiers arrive. This Evening the four Nombiers came hither but being late they desir'd to go to a Pagoda which is at a small distance and to return to morrow.

DITTO DIE Letter from the Directore of Mihie. THE Chief reced a Letter from Mons<sup>r</sup>. Derois wherein he recites what M<sup>r</sup>. Moreau related here on the 28<sup>th</sup>. Instant as entered under that date, and adds as follows Viz<sup>t</sup>.

That nothing in their proceedings was Contrary to the Agreement made between these Establishments in the Year 1727/8 that Mr. Wakes supposing he may have been misinformed is no reason for his not securing the Posts under his Government he acknowledges it to be true that Cunhi Nayr is entered into a league with Boyanore, but that neither of them Commenced Hostilities, wherefore he intended to oblige the Nombiers to come to an Agreement till when it was not of Consequence to write further about them. The whole fault he alledges to be owing to the Nombiers, who had the insolence yesterday to descend from the Hill of Poiterra with Two thousand Men and make an Attack, wherefore he permitted Boyanore to pass the River and says "See Sir where your Interest is affected in respect to "the above Agreement and take such measures as you think proper as I shall do.

He adds that it now appears to him that the Nombiers are more irritated against Cunhi Nayr than Boyanore, and as the former was the weakest he should not want the Protection of their Company, and that we might now see what we are to do on our Parts in favour of Cunhi Nayr. And as the preservation of tranquility in these places are for the Interest of both Companys he should be obliged if Mr. Wake could find out proper methods for obtaining it—Concludes with observing that he did not advise him what was the result of the Nombiers Visit which were to come here last Night.

THURS-DAY 30<sup>TH</sup>. Letter from Fort St. George. RECEIVED a Letter from the President & Council of Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George dated the 2<sup>d</sup>. August wherein they acknowledge the receipt of our Letters of the 27<sup>th</sup>. May and 29<sup>th</sup>. June accompanying our Packetts for the Presidency which were forwarded a few days after they were received. The last Packet was opened by Persons the Pattamars met on the road who robbed them (as they say) of thirty Rupees for the future they desir'd our Packets might be made up in smaller Parcels for the better conveniency of Carriage, the Shroffs having complained that the two last were very bulky. Recd. a Letter for the Hoñble, the Court of Directors which they desired might be forwarded by the first Ship bound home from hence. They were likewise pleased to advise us of the safe arrival there of our Hoñble. Masters Ships Normanton Grantham and Somerset.

THURS-DAY 30<sup>TH</sup>. Letter from the Directors of Mihie. Mons<sup>r</sup>. Derois in his Letter to M<sup>r</sup>. Wake received last Night reciting what Mons<sup>r</sup>. Moreau had related here in respect to the Hill of Chemberah's belonging to Cunhi Nair &c<sup>a</sup>. he wrote him as follows Viz<sup>t</sup>.

Answer.

That Chemberah by all Accounts of such as were neuter in the Present disputes, belonged to the Nombiers, and that they had fortifyed it many Years past and was well informed that they or Cunhi Nair had taken possession of the Hill of Beira before the Nombiers began to Fortify Poiterra in their own defence. and was also informed that his complaint of the Nombiers Insolence in making an Attack was occasioned by his and Cunhi Nairs attempting to take their Hill of Poiterra.

But if we give attention to all what the Nairs or Nombiers alledge we must be continually molested who will assert any thing to embroil us so they can find their conveniencys thereby for which reason it must much concern us to consider well before we take parts in their disputes.

#### — AUGUST 1739 .

As I am as desirous of a perfect Tranquility in your Company's Affairs as I am in respect to those of our own, I permitted the four Nombiers to come hither where they did not arrive till last night with whom this day I shall use my best endeavours to bring them to a reasonable conclusion of these unhappy disturbances, when I will immediatly inform you of what passes between us.

THE Nombiers being returned hither from a pagoda they gave the Chief the THURSDAY following Account of the present differences subsisting between them & the French, Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr.

That one Palatche a Nair in the pay of the French being indebted to them for Their some Years Rent of a Ps. of Land at the rate of Ten fanams ? Annum they impeded of their him from receiving the benifit of it till be should need to their him from receiving the benifit of it till he should pay them, the manner of which disputes with the impediment is tying a small bough to the body of another Tree which the French with the French &ca. pull'd down and protected him in reaping the produce of the ground contrary to the usage and Custom of the Country—after which Mr. Derois sent some of Cunhi Nairs People to cut down the Trees & bushes about the Hill of Beira. upon this the Nombiers complained to him who told them he should desist, but still continued clearing the Hill, and when they complained again he would not give them any Answer, then the Nombiers complained to Cunhi Nayr who reply'd that it was not by his Orders but by those of Mr. Derois, who now began to pass Gunns &ca. Warlike Stores over the River when the Nombiers being apprehensive of being attacked they began to repair their old Fort upon the Hill of Chemberah, and the next Night the French fortyfied the Hill of Beira which they had been before clearing and placed Guns upon it; upon which the Nombiers thought it high time to secure themselves upon the Hill of Poiterra. On the 28th. Instant the French with Boyanores Nayrs and those of Cunhi Nair attack'd Poiterra (which is the Insolent Attack Mons<sup>r</sup>. Derois in his Letter of Yesterday says the Nombiers made) but were obliged to retire.

They declare they do not know any reason why the French and Cunhi Nayr makes War upon them and that Boyanore has wrote them that he has no occasion to make War upon them and that he sends his Nayrs only because the French order'd him to do so.

This was the whole of what the Nombiers related, the purport of which Mr. Letter Wake wrote Mons'r. Derois under this date, adding that he did not give entire Directore Credit to all they said as he supposed he did not to the reports of Cunhi Nayr and of Mihie. Boyanore, but it appeared to him that Peace was most consistant with the Commerce of both Company's and if Mons'r. Derois thought proper to send any of his and Cunhi Nayrs People hither to confront what the Nombiers alledged he would detain them till they came.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mons<sup>r</sup>. Derois acknowledging the receipt of both the Preceeding Letters wherein he says that Mr. Wake may excuse him from not answering the first because he gave no Credit to what he wrote; and in respect to Answer. the other wherein is mentioned the detaining the Nombiers till he advised whither he thought proper or not to send hither any of his People and Cunhi Nayrs to confute the Alegations of the Nombiers, he refers to an Answer which he says he gave those Insolents yesterday and adds that it is true he desired Mr. Wake to use means to procure a Peace but he did not chuse him to be Judge.

Mr. James Verelst now brings in the Store Books for last Year Ballanced with an Inventory of the remains Signed by him and Mr. William West and the latter is now ORDERED to take sole charge of the Office of Storekeeper for the discharge of which he has now Instructions deliver'd him.

An Increase of several Articles set forth.

The several remains having been counted at the end of last month there appears an Increase in several Articles under the head of Garrison Stores amounting to Fanams Three thousand nine hundred and Eleven and in that of Gunpowder to the amount of Four thousand eight hundred sixty one Fanams and Eleven vis. In the former Sum there is included the value of Five thousand three hundred sixty six pounds four ounces of Iron round Shott amounting to one thousand seven hundred Twenty four Fanams and Twelve vis which we suppose may have been gather'd up in the late Warrs and not brought to Account. There was likewise found almost buried in the Mine a Brass Cohorn Morter and also Three hundred and Twenty Cohorn & Thirty four Bomb Shells with several other lesser Articles amounting to Three thousand nine hundred eleven fanams as aforementioned for which Garrison Charges has Credit at the close of last Books as it has for Four thousand eight hundred sixty one fanams and eleven vis for the increase of the whole Article of Gunpowder although there is a decrease of two thousand six hundred forty seven pound in the Europe Powder which proceeds from the carelessness of our late Gunners Mate in mixing some Europe and Country together when drying it, but there is an Increase in the Country Powder exclusive of that Quantity of Two thousand five hundred fifty nine which may be supposed to be a part of the deficiency there was in it last Year, the value of which together with the value of Two thousand six hundred forty seven pounds Europe and Country mixt rated at the Medium price between both and the accustomary Value of one thousand eight hundred eighty two pounds of Dust makes the Sum of four thousand eight hundred sixty one fanams Eleven vis as above specifyed.

Nelearatee Tupy requests our receivs. back Rups. 3440.

On the 23d. Instant Nelearatee Tupy returned to us by one of his People Rupees three thousand four hundred and forty as part of what had been advanced him for Fifty five Candys of Pepper in June last and now declaring that he cannot possibly procure old Pepper for it desires it may be received back and his Contract Ola given up to him alledging that some of the French Merchants gives for small Quantities from Ninety five to one hundred and ten Rupees ? Candy. We well know by many Instances that some of the French Merchants has given the extravigant prices abovementioned which cannot proceed from Honest Intentions as they receive but Eighty six Rupees # Candy, but these are Men of ill repute and greatly indebted to the French who in the end must suffer by them. however this keeps up the price of the very small Quantity of Old Pepper that is still remaining in the Country and we thinking it would be too great an hardship on Nelearatee Tupy to insist upon the performance of his Contract in which he has met with such Impediments as abovementioned and we know is not in his Power to comply with together with his being a punctual Merchant it is AGREED that the above Sum of Three thousand four hundred and forty Rupees be received back into our Treasury and his Contract Ola given him up.

THE French having landed Seventy Europeans from their Ships now in the road which joined to a strong party of their Garrison and a great Number of Boyanores, Cunhi Nayrs and the King of Cotiote's Nayrs Marched against the Nombiers forces but upon the Attack of a rising Ground the French having their Commanding Officer and several of their Men killed they were obliged to retire as did all the Nayrs with very considerable loss.

DITTO DIE Prince Cunhi Homo conferr'd with Prince Cunhi Homo came hither with whom the Chief had a long conference upon the distracted Situation the Affairs of his Country were now in, observing to him that Boyanore and the King of Cotiote long since had scarce acknowledged him for their Sovereign and Cunhi Nayr was [now] in Arms without his Permission against his distressed Vassals the Nombiers and that in case his Majesty did not exert himself in the better Government of his Country he must inevitably remain with an empty title, and loose the whole, but even the best reason and advise is entirely lost upon such a mean Spirited Wretch. Indeed he said he would proceed to his Pagoda at Terreangat and Summons them and Boyanores Ministers and enquire into the grevances of all Parties and endeavour to bring them to an accomoda[tion].

Companys Priviledge of Trade in their Country which is now in danger of being subjected by the French, The Circumstances of the present disputes between them every Member has been duly acquainted with by perusing the Letters and Answers that has passed between the French Chief and Mr. Wake upon that Subject as they were received and sent.

#### - *SEPTEMBER 1739 —*

From the whole proceedings of the French it is apparent their present designs The French are to reduce the Nombiers to their Obedience in like manner as they formerly did remark'd Boyanore, whom tho' a Vassal to Prince Cunhi Homo, from the Protection the on. French has given him he pays no tribute or any other kind of Obedience to the Prince than a formal one on some occasions, and the French enjoy the whole Pepper Trade of Boyanores Country, which they for several Years past pretend a right to by Virtue of a grant from Boyanore whom as he is tributary to Prince Cunhi Homo has of himself no power to give without the Consent of the Prince which he has never granted.

The Chief end and design for procuring this Grant is that in case the French The design should reduce the Nombiers to hard terms and thereby oblige them to sign such a Agreemt grant as they did Boyanore to prevent their having even the like pretence for a set forth. Prior right to the Trade of their Country.

This Agreement having been read & fully consider'd as likewise the present Resolution. unhappy Circumstances of Affairs in the Princes Dominions it is AGREED that the said Agreement be signed by the Chief and deliver'd to them and that it be entered after this Consultation.

TRANSLATE of an Agreement entered into between the Hoñble. Company and Translate of the Nombiers, read, Signed and Deliver'd in the presence of the Prince of Cherrica the Agreement Entered into September the 7th. 1739 Vizt.

Nombiers.

- 1st. Should any Power make Warr upon the Hoñble. English Company We hereby engage not to afford them any assistance whatever nor shall said Company, in case any one makes War upon us.
- 2d. All Goods belonging to the Hoñble. Company, which are brought through our Territorys to Tellicherry shall be permitted to pass without the least Impediment as heretofore; and furthermore should whomsoever attempt to hinder the same we will oppose them. The said Company engaging to act in like manner in respec[t] to any Goods' which may be brought from Tellicherry to our Country.
- 3d. Whensoever the Honble. Company desires assistance of Men from us, We will afford it them And should any Power (Europeans & the King of Paliquilote excepted) without a just pretext make War upon us. The sd. Company oblige themselves to afford us the Assistance of Armed Nayrs.

PRINCE CUNHI Homo and the four Nombiers being at the house of our Linguist- FRIDAY er the Chief repair'd thither when the Ola of Agreement with the Nombiers, was 7<sup>TH</sup>. read, Signed and Deliver'd to the Nombiers in the Presence and by the Consent of Executed. Prince Cunhi Homo who deliver'd in like manner a Counterpart Signed by them.

THE Chief wrote the following Letter to the Chief of Mihie.

Letter to the Directore of Mihie. The reason why I did not Answer your last Letter of the 16th. Instant N.S. was because although the Prince & the Nombiers have been here two days they have not yet come to any resolution material enough, to inform you of.

In the above Letter you write that we are obliged by the Agreement made between these Settlements in 1727/8 to assist Cunhi Nayr. to shew you Sir that I was not inclinable to enter into any disputes about him, I have not before reply'd to what you wrote concerning him. but as you again repeat it, I now take the liberty to tell you, that if you will please to look into that Agreement you will find that you and Cunhi Nayr have broke the 1st. Article of it for which reason I do not think we are obliged at present to enter into these Contests, much more not to assist Cunhi Nayr, and still more especially, as the War is offencive against those of Erevadunadda Whence all that appears proper to me under these circumstances at present is to stand Neuter as we have hitherto done. Though I am so well inclined for the benifit & Commerce of both Companys which these Wars so much impede, as without the Vanity of pretending to be judge (If you please) I will use my utmost endeavours to bring them to a peaceable conclusion to which end I am ready to do myself the Hon<sup>r</sup>. to meet and confer with you at Moylan, or if your business will not admit of it to wait on you at Mihie, I am

SUNDAY 9<sup>TH</sup>, Answer. RECEIVED an Answer from Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois to the Letter wrote him yesterday in which after repeating what he had mentioned in some of his former Letters he desires M<sup>r</sup>. Wake will go to Mihie as his going to Moylan will occasion the Malabars to think he is very desirous to make Peace.

DITTO DIE PRINCE CUNHI Homo repairs to his Pagoda at Trereangat and the Nombiers to their own Country when we assured them they might depend upon our friendly assistance in a proper manner.

MONDAY 10<sup>TH</sup>. The Chief proceeds to Mihie. M<sup>B</sup>. WAKE went to Mihie to whom Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois related the occasion and Circumstances of the War between him and the Nombiers as follows Viz<sup>t</sup>.

That Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr had several times complained to him of Injuries they had recd. from the Nombiers upon the Frontiers of their several Districts which he in a friendly manner enquir'd after with intent to settle the Differences that had arose between them but the Nombiers treated his good endeavours with insolence and some little time before Hostilities commenced between him and them, the Nombiers were so insolent as to ill treat a Nayr in the French pay and prevented him from reaping the produce of some Lands, refusing to give him any reason for such an affront that upon the Nombiers Fortifying the Hill of Chemberah belonging to Cunhi Nayr & that of Poiterra which was Neuter, which last was so near as they might be incommoded from it in their House as well as their Fort of Carlay for these reasons Hostilities commenced.

Substance of what Passed between him and the Directore.

> He then mentioned that we had very lately made an Agreement with the Nombiers by which they were obliged to deliver the whole Quantity of Pepper produced in their Country to the English and that we had engaged to protect them

against all Enemies whatsoever adding that such a transaction was contrary to the Agreement between the two Settlements in 1727/8 by which both Companys were to have a freedom of Commerce in Errevadunadda.

Mr. Wake first observed to the Chief that the Hills he mentioned was well known to belong to the Nombiers. That his engaging Cunhi Nayr in Warr against any of the Province of Erevadunadda was directly contrary to the 1st. Article of the Agreement made between these Establishments by which he (Quina Nair) [sic] was not to Fortify make preparations of Warr or even assemble People before advising us and obtaining both our Consents; and by the said Agreement we are mutually obliged to advise each other of any designs of the Country People against either Party, but Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois entered into this Warr before he gave us the least intimation of it.

That our late Agreement with the Nombiers no ways affected the Interest of the French Company, and if he would send one of his Council and Linguister to Tellicherry they should peruse the Original Ola, when it would appear there was nothing in it Contrary to the Agreement made between the Two Settlements in the year 1737/8 [sic] nor could we obtain of them any new priviledge in respect to Trade as their Sovereigns Ancestors had granted to the Honble. Company the whole Pepper Trade of that Country and of his whole Dominions.

The Nombiers abusing a Servant of theirs was indeed an Insolence that they ought to make suitable reparation for which might doubtless be had without going to such extremities as must greatly prejudice the trade of both Companys but our entering into the disputes and greivances between these Petty Princes would be endless.

After much more discourse of this Nature, Mr. Dirois agreed that if Mr. Wake would bring the Nombiers to Mihie under his safe Conduct and they ask pardon of the French Company for the affront they had committed promising to live in Amity and Friendship with them in future; demolish all Fortifications errected since the commencing of these disputes which the French would likewise do on their parts, All things between them should remain upon the same footing as before the Commencing this War. That during the space of three days to commence on the 12th. Mr. Dirois would procure a cessation from Hostilities on their Parts and Mr. Wake was to do the like on that of the Nombiers.

Mr. Dirois then proposed the settling the Price of Pepper for the ensuing Season to which purpose they Agreed to Summons the Principal Merchants and offer them no more than Seventy six Rupees ? Candy without previously advising each other.

LAST Night the Chief wrote an Ola to the Nombiers to come to Tellicherry.

#### – SEPTEMBER 1739 –

By several informations from the Country People we find that Prince Ockoo Tuesday visits the French and holds a Correspondence with Boyanore Cunhi Nayr and all others that endeavour to disturb the Peace of this Country. Prince Cunhi Homo Prince Ocou having some time past been Politically reconciled to him brought Ockoo with him his proceedings set as one of the Royal Family to be present at the Nombiers Signing their Agreement forth. who went directly to Mihie and gave the French an Account of it with extravigant additions such as our ingaging to support the Nombiers against the French with Men Mony &c<sup>2</sup>. &c<sup>2</sup>. which Mr. Wake finding they had given Credit to, occasioned his desiring one of the French Council and Linguister would read the said Agreement that they might not retain any suspicions that should create any jealousie in them.

THE Messengers that arrived from the Cannaree Government on the 29th, past Ditto went hence for Mangulore by whom the Chief wrote Letters in Answer to those they brought from Paramissora, Surapaya & Suba Senoy importing that we were Canareo well pleas'd with the good dispositions in the present Government for confirming Messengers returned the Peace made with Surapaya to whom when we were advised of his arrival at with Mangulore we should send a proper Person according to his request & that upon Paramissora, his coming to Madday with Suba Senoy we made no doubt but speedily to settle Surapaya Affairs on so good a footing as would perfectly restore the same good understanding Senoys and friendship that formerly subsisted between the Honbie. Company and the Kings Letters. of Bednure especially as we were informed the Chief Authors of the late differences had been dismissed his Majesties Service.

We made each of the Messengers a small present amounting in all to Fifty Present fanams and the weather being fair we lent them a Boat to carry them to Madday by Sea.

This Evening the four Nombiers sent an Ola to the Chief signifying that they Ditto consented to a Cessation of Hostilities for three day's and would speedily come to the Fort of which Mr. Wake instantly advised Monsr. Dirois.

Ola from the

MR. Moreau of Council at Mihie with their Linguister brought a Letter from Wednes-Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois to M<sup>r</sup>. Wake signifying that Boyanore had agreed to a Cessation of Arms for three days & inclosed the Complaints & Injuries of Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr. The French Linguister having interpreted the Agreement made between Mr. Moreau us and the Nombiers, to Mr. Moreau, and Mr. Wake explaining the intent and with a Lettr. meaning of it, he seemed fully satisfied of it's not being in any sense prejudical to from the Directore of the commerce of their Company in the Nombiers Territorys and which he would Mihie. relate to his Chief to whom Mr. Wake wrote a Letter signifying that Mr. Moreau Answer. was so satisfied, and that as soon as he had a Conference with the Nombiers he would acquaint him with the result thereof.

Mons<sup>B</sup>. Dirois wrote M<sup>r</sup>. Wake that the Nombiers took the present opportunity of a Cessasion to fortifie upon their Hills and cutt their Neally and if he did not order them to desist he should immediatly be obliged to fire upon them. To which M<sup>r</sup>. Wake Answer'd that he would immediatly send a Person to the Nombiers Army to hinder their Fortifying &c<sup>a</sup>. which was accordingly done.

This Evening arrived here the four Nombiers to whom the Chief related the grievances of Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr which consisted of their having abused People belonging to their Territories; hindred others from gathering the produce of some Lands that lay upon their borders with many others of the like nature, and demanded the Charges they had been at in the Warr.

The Nombiers reply'd to every particular in such manner as seemingly clears them of having acted any thing of moment to the prejudice of Boyanore or Cunhi Nayr, and alledge that they have reason to demand the Charges they have been at in this Warr as they were not the Aggressors. The Nombiers also make their Complaints of Boyanore's having made incroachments by degrees for about two Miles into their Territories, taking Possession of the Coconutt Trees and obliging the People to pay him their Rents &ca. That Cunhi Nayr had deprived them of the benifit of several Varges near Curiche, by obliging the People to pay him their Rent amounting to Six hundred Dungoys Annum for years, and had done the like in respect to Fourteen Coconutt Oarts which was well known to belong to them.

They were willing to make Peace with the French on the Terms the Chief proposed to them which were such as Mr. Dirois and Mr. Wake had agreed as mentioned under the 10<sup>th</sup>. Instant.

THE Chief wrote to Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois that he had conferred with the Nombiers and related to them such greivances as Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr had complained of and sent him their defence as also such complaints of Injuries as the Nombiers had received from Cunhi Nayr & Boyanore by which he would perceive that it was impossible for us to adjust those differences to the satisfaction of all Parties as M<sup>r</sup>. Wake had formerly observed, but the Nombiers consented that all Fortification[s] should be demolished that had been made since the beginning of these troubles; that they; Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr should remain in quiet Possession of all such Lands as they were possessed of at that time and that they were ready to go with him to Mihie and ask pardon of the French Company upon his promising them a safe return.

FRIDAY 14<sup>TH</sup>. RECEIVED an Answer to the above from Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois which in substance is as follows Viz<sup>t</sup>.

Answer.

That he thinks as Mr. Wake do's in respect to the Greivances of both Parties, nor does reject the Nombiers going under Mr. Wakes safe conduct to Mihie and beg pardon of their Company when they have totally disbanded their Forces and he receives an Answer from Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr the former is a Minor under the protection of the French, and without whose consent Mr. Dirois cannot receive the Submission of the Nombiers who were the occasion of the War, and of the Charges that Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr had been at which if the Nombiers do not pay it will be impossible for either Mr. Wake or himself to bring about a Peace, as this is an Article of so much Consequence amongst the Mallabars. It is easy for their Company to excuse the Expence they have been at and also their audaciousness out of respect to the English East India Company but they merrit no such When he can get satisfaction of the Nombiers for Boyanores Expences he will then treat about demolishing the Fortifications. He concludes with his thanks to Mr. Wake for the Pains he has taken on this occasion but his, & those himself has taken will be of no Effect if the Nombiers must enjoy all advantages on their parts, and the French Allies should bear all the Expence on their parts which the Nombiers were the cause of.

Mr. Wake answered the Chief of Mihie's Letter rece'd Yesterday which in Satursubstance is as follows. 15TH.

Mr. Wake judging it for the benifit of both Companys that the present Commotions should be accommodated he had therefore taken all the methods he could Letter to the think of to obtain that end and having discoursed with the Nombiers this morning Mihie. he now sends him the result of it.

The Nombiers alledge that they were not the Authors of this Warr nor gave any provocation for their being Attacked and at the beginning of it Boyanore sent his first Minister, Addioddy, to acquaint them not to be offended at his sending some Forces against them at the request of the French, which he could not deny them tho' it was against his own inclinations, after the Skirmish at Billaparambu he sent again in the same manner, which shews there is no great Animosity between them and as they were not the Agressors they think it unreasonable to pay Boyanores and Cunhi Nayrs Charges, but rather that they be repaid their own, however they are willing to make Peace on the terms Agreed upon between Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois and Mr. Wake which if agreed to, the Warr between themselves would drop, as neither party would then care to be at any considerable charge to support it. Concluded with requesting an Answer, the Nombiers wanting to repair home to cutt their Neally.

It is to be observed that it is the French who are at the whole Expence of this Warr they paying & feeding Boyanores and Cunhi Nayrs People. and we are fully assured that Boyanore would be willing the French would make Peace on the bare the terms at first proposed by them, whose Power they do not wish increas'd though whole they are so subjected by them as they are obliged to supply them with Nayrs as [ex]pence of the Warr. the French demand them.

What Nayrs the King of Cotiote sends against the Nombiers the French pay and give rice to in like manner as they do Boyanores and the same to Cunhi Nayrs People which amounts to a very considerable Expence beside their own of Powder Ball &ca. all which is so great as we believe they would willingly make Peace if they could be repaid but this the Nombiers are not able to do.

RECEIVED Two Letters from Mons'r. Dirois one adviseing that their Merchants SATURhad been with him to receive mony in advance for Pepper upon hearing that our Linguister had advanced mony to them at Interest desiring we would assemble our Merchants and depended upon our not offering more than from Seventy six to Letters from the Direc-Seventy eight Rupees & Candy. Likewise he took notice that the Nombiers work- tore of ing in their Intrenchments this morning he had been obliged to fire upon them.

In the other he mentions his having sent Cunhi Nayr in Mr. Wakes name and his own not to commit any Hostilities against the Nombiers, and of his having sent for Boyanores Ministers to come to him upon the Affairs of Peace and concluded that as the Nombiers were the Aggressors Boyanore could not be brought to bear the whole Expence of the Warr.

THE Nombiers repair'd to their Country promising to return when the Chief DITTO should send for them.

Inclos'd us Invoice and Bill of Lading for Forty thousand Rupees and Stationary ware, Mr. Thomas Stonestreets Bill on the Chief for Seven thousand Rupees to be paid into our Treasury; and their Land Paymasters Indent for Sixty Blackwood Plank.

WAKE wrote a Letter to the French Chief of Mihie informing him that FRIDAY the reason for his not answering his Letters reced the 15th, before now was occasioned by several meetings of our Merchants whom even at last could not be prevailed upon to Agree to fix the price of Pepper at present. but they will stand to such Price as it shall be opened at with Ponambate Paqui and Tayparee, who are two of their most Creditable Merchts., as most of the others will Contract at any Price to get ready mony into their hands. but he is the best judge if it is so or not, although it is certain several of their Merchants have given from Ninety five to above one hundred Rupees P Candy notwithstanding the Stipulated price between these Settlements last Year was at Eighty six Rupees, that we are sensible at both Settlements we may Contract at Seventy six or Seventy eight Rupees, therefore it will be absolutely necessary to limit the Merchants not to give more than a certain price which may easily be done. And if he pleased that their Merchants and ours should meet here, or otherwise as has been formerly practised on the like occasions, at Mihie or Moylan where one of our Council should go with those of

this place to endeavour with him to bring them to the lowest Terms, when we should consider further upon this most important Affair; but in the mean time he might rest assured that we would not come to any Agreement with the Merchants without previously advising him. Dirois hopes orders will accordingly be given, that this Article may not prolong the War. The other Article is, that the Nombiers will not pay Cunhi Nayrs Damages and Charges. he also writes that the Prince of Colastry threatens to burn Peringature where the French for some Years past have kept a small Garrison.

DITTO DIE. The Chiefs Answer to Mr. Dirois Letter was in Substance as follows Vizt.

Answer.

That he had before informed him of ye. Nombiers readyness to comply with the terms of Peace at first Agreed upon between both Chiefs at Mihie, when nothing was mentioned of either Parties paying the charges which the other had been at or in respect to damages, which neither would do if they were able, which Mr. Dirois since insisting upon necessaryly occasions a continuation of the War, and Mr. Wakes endeavours for concluding it of no effect.

In respect to the Agreement We had made with the Nombiers Mons<sup>r</sup>. Moreau one of their Council & Linguister had perused it and acknowledged their was nothing in it that prevented the French Companys Traffick in the Nombiers Country in the same manner as before the Commencing of this War, or was any ways prejudicial to them.

Two of the Princes People were here the last Night and assured Mr. Wake that the Prince has no intentions for burning the Buzar of Peringature, or any other than what tends to accomodate the differences amongst his Vassals. this we believe, and which was the only thing recommended to him when went hence.

The Chief now lays before the Board several Letters and Answers that has passed between him and the French Chief in respect to breaking the Price of Pepper since the 21st. of past month from several of which Letters it appears to us that the French are willing to reduce the price at least to Seventy eight Rupees & Candy which neither their Merchants nor ours would hitherto agree to tho' it is certain if they are sincere and will not give more the Merchants will comply. It is true

that Seventy eight Rupees P Candy is a much greater price than it was at till some Years past, and if the French would heartily join with us in not advancing mony but at a lower price the Merchants at last would be obliged to take it, although perhaps it might make them somewhat backward both in Contracting and bringing it in. but it would doubtless put them upon useing all manner of Clandestine means to run it by Sea as well as by land to Callicutt, where it has for several Years past been at above one hundred Rupees P Candy. The French Chief in his Letter reced this day says, the only difficulty their Merchants make against Contracting at Seventy eight Rupees is, that they do not know whether ours will Agree to accept of that Price. Wherefore the Chief now proposes to the Board if it is their opinions that we give Seventy eight Rupees P Candy this Year for Pepper, which is Agreed to. as also that Mr. Wake writes the Chief of Mihie that we will not Contract at more than Seventy eight Rupees P Candy the ensuing Season provided they think proper to do the like; and not pay their merchants in any Species of Coins at an under price but at the true value and rate of Seventy eight new Bombay or Surat Rupees (in which Species we pay our Merchants) P Candy of the usual weight.

Candy and in that month to pay the aforementioned Sums of Four thousand one hundred thirty two Rupees three quarters and sixty raes and two hundred sixty Rupees one quarter and thirty raes amounting to Four thousand three hundred thirty nine Rupees and ninety raes in ready mony or deliver Pepper for it then at the price we shall Contract for with other Merchants.

Pedro Rangel arrived from Mangulore with a Letter from Surapaya, wherein he expresses a great deal of Friendship & respect for the Hoñble. Company—that he shall very shortly leave Mangulore and come to his Army at Madday where he desires the Chief will meet him and all Affairs shall be adjusted to our entire satisfaction. but as he has some Affairs to adjust with Prince Cunhi Homo he desires the Chief will be Arbitrator between them. Pedro Rangel informs us that by all he could learn from Surapaya and others of the King of Bednures Ministers whilst he was at Mangulore, they fully intend to Sign the former Articles and to live in perfect friendship with the English in future; That the present Government had already made at Mangulore and other Trading places in the Kingdom many good regulations in favour of the Mercantile Affairs, and that the Present Government seemed to be highly agreable to the whole Kingdom.

THE Nombiers not being longer able to maintain themselves upon the Hill of Chimbera for want of Water and Provisions they deserted. And the French and Cunhi Nayrs People took possession of it which will be a great Hinderance to the Nombiers from receiving Rice and necessarys from these parts.

In a Letter rece'd this day Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois mentions his inclinations for comeing to an accommodation with the Nombiers and requests M<sup>r</sup>. Wake would go to Mihie as the War takes up so much of his time as he cannot come hither or to Moylan.

It is a great inconveniency that attends the Correspondence between the French and us that they have no Person that can read or Speak English or we that understands French, wherefore all Letters are wrote in Portugueze from whence mistakes are liable to arise. Wherefore it is Agreed that Mr. James Verelst goes to Mihie and Explains to the French Chief the prejudice it is to the providing Pepper at such high rates as their Merchants have done, notwithstanding they Contracted at Eighty six Rupees & Candy but such of them cannot have honest intentions for clearing their Accounts, and only raise the price upon those that have to such a Degree, as they cannot purchase it; but at an unsupportable loss. and when these Resolution. dishonest Men have bought as much as they care or intend to deliver, the Inland Merchants keep up what they have in expectation of geting the same high price whence the Pepper will not be procured in due time, and as the French have not a double Stock they may probably think themselves obliged to raise the price when the time draws near for the dispatch of their Ships.

Another Evil may arise from their paying away their Coins at low rates in Comparison with Rupees in which specie only we pay our Merchants.

Mr. Verelst may likewise assure Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois that if he has a desire of accomodating their Embroils with the Nombiers and will send his proposals in writing, other Mr. Wake will again use his endeavours to bring the Nombiers to comply.

Upon Mr. Dirois complaining of the Assistance the Nombiers had from hence; he replyed that our Buzar was open to all the Natives with whom we were in friendsh[ip] to purchase Rice and other necessarys, but there was not a Topass or other Person in our pay that were with the Nombiers.

This day Mons'r. Moreau one of Council at Mihie came hither with Proposals Wednes-Signed by the French Chief and Council for making a Peace with the Nombiers DAY 24TH. Translate of which are as follows Vizt.

Monsr. Moreau comes hither with Proposals for Peace.

Out of respect to the Honble English Company, The four Nombiers shall be Translate of permitted to come to Mihie und[er] the safe Conduct of Mr. Wake, to ask Pardon them. of the French Company, and to swear Fidelity & Friendship to them; and the said Company shall keep Poitera for the Security of the Nombiers Estates at the Bottom of this Hill.

The four Nombiers shall totally demolish Manna Cunna and Odote Cunna in the Territorys of Chalacare, & whomsoever it may be, not excepting any Europe Nation shall not take Possession of the said places, nor fortify them; The Chief and Council of Tellicherry and Mihie shall be bound for this Article and the former shall restore their Protection to Cunhi Nayr, which Mr. Wake had withdrawn by declaring himself Neuter.

The Nombiers shall promise by one Article drawn up with all the Necessary Circumstances of the Treaty that they shall make with them, to give free Passage to all Pepper that shall pass thro' their Country, to go as well to Tellicherry as to Mihie (The Council of Tellicherry will ratify this Treaty). In Consideration of this, the Council of Mihie promise to endeavour sincerely to procure them Peace, Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr shall accommodate with them amicably by nominating Umpires on both sides, and that Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Wake and Dirois shall be Judges between the Umpires.

Brings a Letter from the Directore [of] Mihie. Mr. Dirois wrote a short Letter to Mr. Wake signifying that by Agreement between both Settlements at our makeing Peace with Cunhi Nayr, the French were obliged to demolish a small Fort which they had erected upon a Hill called Cariacunna as we were that of Putinha which we had not done.

Conferred with. Mr. Wake acquainted Mr. Moreau there never was any such Agreement as mentioned in Mr. Dirois Letter but if there were no other Obstacles in making a Peace than the razing our Fort of Putinha we would then take it into consideration, but he hoped Mr. Dirois would not insist upon their keeping Poiterra However he would immediatly summons the Nombiers and lay the proposals before them when he would use all his best Offices to bring these unhappy troubles to an end.

Receives a Letter from the Directore. In this Interim M<sup>r</sup>. Moreau rece'd a Letter from his Chief wherein he wrote of his being then advised that the Nombiers had offered the Hill of Chimberah Cunna to us which we would accept of as soon as the French should leave it. Upon M<sup>r</sup>. Moreau's communicating this to M<sup>r</sup>. Wake, he gave him his Assurances that it had never been offered, nor should we accept of it or so much as think of Fortifying in the Nombiers Country if the French would not likewise; with which M<sup>r</sup>. Moreau seem'd satisfied and returned to Mihie with a short Letter from M<sup>r</sup>. Wake to M<sup>r</sup>. Dirois specifying to him the same in respect to the Hill of Chimberah and referred

This abrupt manner of the French withdrawing their Proposals we attribute to the insinuation of Cunhi Nayr of whose Artifices the French are not aware, being remarks thereon. all of them Strangers to the Manners and Customs of these People, and we know that Cunhi Nayr would be unwilling the French should come to an accomodation . being in hopes of gaining some acquisitions from the Nombiers which by the Proposals hitherto made he does not. Insinuations of this kind have been made in our Letters to Mr. Dirois as well as Verbally by Mr. Wake.

Letter from Anjengo. Mr. Richard Sanders late one of the Factors at Anjengo arrived here with a Letter from the Chief and Factors there and a Packet for the Presidency which they requested might be forwarded by the first Conveyance. They likewise transmitted us an Account Sale of the Penany Rice sent them from hence in February last amounts. to Rupees One thousand one hundred sixty nine one quarter and sixty seven raes for which Sum the Chief there drew a Bill on Mr. Wake payable to us at Three days sight which is now accepted. There is a loss upon the Rice of Three hundred and fifteen Rupees two quarters and sixty eight raes which they write would not fetch any more it being so decayed and deficient in Measure. They likewise inform us of the King of Travencores having drawn the Dutch upon him by having taken possession of Changanauts Dominions, that they were very much importuned by the King of Travencore for their Assistance which they were not in a Capacity to give him.

They requested we should send them a Candy of Wax and advised us that M<sup>r</sup>. Sanders's repairing hither was by permission of the Presidency.

Instant for the amount Sale of Penany Rice sent thither from hence. And of our Dispatching their Packet for the Presidency on the 26th. Also what were our motives for sending to them our late Gunner Peter Croes who although through Age and infirmities

was not able of undergoing fatigue yet he was very capable of giveing Directions in any part of his business. We likewise expressed our Concern at the disputes between their Country Government and the Dutch and as they intimated in their Letter of the 22d. Instant to us that they were not in a capacity of giveing the King of Travencore any assistance for which he had very much importuned them, We wrote them that we thought it our Duty to assist them with what they wanted as far as our present Circumstances would admit of, which thro' the late transactions of the French were much of the same nature with theirs. We are sensible that if the French Subject the Nombiers it will deprive our Honble Masters of a considerable part of the Pepper Investment in those parts. On the other hand the Expence of Prince Cunhi Homos assisting them in an Debated. Effectual manner upon a moderate Computation cannot amount to less than Five hundred Rupees P Diem nor can we tell how long the Warr may continue more especially as the French spare no Expence.

We doubt not indeed but the Nombiers would willingly put us in possession of some remaining Fortress but it would require a strong Garrison to maintain it which could not be relieved but with great Hazard and difficulty especially in time of Warr; their Country having no communication with the Sea. but we are certain that the benifit that can accrue from such a proceeding will not be equivolent to the Expence. But as the supplying the Prince with necessarys may enable him to Resolution. bring his Vassals, Boyanore, Cunhi Nayr and the King of Cotiote to reasonable terms of accommodation so as the Nombiers may still retain their libertys and the Honble Company their Priviledge of having Pepper out of, or that pass through their Country as heretofore; It is RESOLVED that as occasions offers we do supply the Prince with Necessaries in the abovementioned manner till we can receive Answers from our Superiours at Bombay to such further representations as we shall now make to them upon this Subject by the Express Boat returned this day from Cochin.

Not having heard from the French since we returned them their last proposals for making Peace and they prosecuting the Warr with more vigour than before we wrote them the following General Letter in English and Portuguese.

To Mons<sup>R</sup>. Dirois

DIRECTORE FOR AFFAIRS OF THE FRENCH EAST INDIA COMPANY &C. COUNCIL AT MIHIE.

Sir & Sirs

Letter to the Directors & Council of Mihie.

Since many Letters have hitherto passed between the Chiefs of these Settlements in regard to the troubles in the Country of Erevadunaddu, without any good Effect, and the continuance of said Troubles being prejudicial and hurtfull to the Honble the United English East India Company, for the better preservation of whose Interest, our Duty obliges us to send you the following.

You must be sensible, Sirs, that the Articles Agreed upon, in the year 1727/8 between the Gentlemen of these Settlements, & confirm'd by their respective Superiours at Pondicherry and Bombay, were intented for the mutual benifit of both Compas. & preserving these Settlements in Tranquility by obliging the Powers in the Country of Erevaddunaddu to continue in Peace & Quietness. Though from the Middle of August last it hath been oppressed with a War, which even from the Commencement thereof we perceived would tend to the prejudice of Commerce, wherefore Mr. Wake on the 10th. of September waited upon Monsr. Dirois at Mihie who declared that the War was occasion'd by the Nombiers having injured a Nair in your pay, & after some Expostulations used by Mr. Wake They then agreed that the Nombiers under the safe Conduct of Mr. Wake should go to Mihie, ask Pardon of your Company, and promise in future to live in Amity & Friendship with you; That all and singular the Fortifications which had been erected, by either Party, since the beginning of the Disputes should be razed, & not suffered to be rebuilt by any People whatever.

Mr. Wake immediatly on his return to Tellicherry sent for the Nombiers, who accepted of these Conditions, which when Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois was advised of he receded from, by insisting upon the said Nombiers paying the Charges which Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr had been at during the War.

Notwithstanding which, to shew our readiness for accommodating these differences, as Hostilities still continued Mr. James Verelst on the 23d. Ultimo was sent with a Letter to Monsr. Dirois, who the next day sent Monsr. Moreau with such Articles or Propositions of Peace, signed by you, as Mr. Wake might make to the

Nombiers, which he forthwith acquainted them with, and desir'd them immediately to repair hither for that end, which the fear alone of their being in the Interim attacked prevented them from; and this Mr. Wake advised Monsr. Dirois of, and therefore desir'd a Cessation of Hostilities upon which Monsr. Dirois demanded said Propositions again, which were immediatly sent him.

We really know not what are your Views and Intentions for continuing this War in the Country of Erevadunadda in which our Company so long have had a free and uninterrupted right and Priviledge of Commerce, and in which you have likewise carried on yours. If it is plundered and destroy'd, and if you do not imagine it will ill Effect your Commerce, We are too sensible it will be of great prejudice to that of ours, unless timely prevented by an Accomodation of these disputes, to which end we are still ready to contribute our best Endeavours. And if you can think of any method more just than what Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois and M<sup>r</sup>. Wake at first Agreed upon (as the Demands on each side of the Country partys engaged will have no End) we desire you will communicate it to us.

THE Letter rece'd this day from Mr. Dirois &ca. Council of Mihie dated the Substance of the French 16th. Novr. being wrote in French and Portugueze our Linguister is now called in Letter and to read it to us and is in Answer to ours of the 3d. Instant. In theirs now read Protest. they assert that it was the four Nombiers that began the troubles in Erevadunaddu. That the Agreement we made with the Nombiers (Entered under the 7th. September) in the time they were at Warr with them is Contrary to the Law of Nations. That the Nombiers intending to deliver the Hill of Chimberah to us Mr. Wake made ready a Detachment of Fifty men of our Garrison under the Command of Capt. James Sterling to take possession of it, but were disappointed by their having before done so. They Protest against us for assisting the Nombiers with Men Money Ammunition and Provisions. Also they Protest against us for keeping the Fort of Putinha which we were Obliged to demolish by Agreement in 1726. But if we are desirous of a Peace they are willing to enter into measures for obtaining it &ca.

The whole of what they Protest against us for is entirely groundless; We never having sent or intended to send any People against them, nor lent them Arms Remarla. Ammunition or Mony. There never was any Agreement made between them and us in relation to our Fort of Putinha, nor any Agreement at all before the Year

1727/8 wherein, or any other afterwards this particular is not so much as mentioned, nor is the Agreem<sup>t</sup>. we made with the Nombiers any ways prejudicial to their Trade in the Nombiers Country. In respect to who was the commencers of this Warr, it is every one of the Partys engag'd in it according to Mr. Dirois Letters, he sometimes affirming one Party occasioned it and sometimes another, but we were no ways engaged in it and are truely sensible that all of them being at Peace is most for the benifit of the Honble Companys Commerce in those parts.

The Bearers of it called in.

The three Gentlemen that brought the Letter are now called in and told that we were ready to prove that all the abovementioned Assertions are without the least foundation and entirely fictitious and that the informations they have had must be from ill designing People who have no good intentions for the real benifit of either of the Honble Companys, but the Gentlemen excused themselves from Arguing upon the Subject declaring they were only sent to deliver the Protest which being done they were Ordered to return when they accordingly took their leaves being first informed their Chief and Council should receive an Answer.

Resolution.

For want of a Person that can write or perfectly understands French or Portugueze, and also English Ordered that the Secretary takes particular care of the Originals and that a just translate \* be made of one of them so soon as we can get a proper person that is capable of it. And also that an Answer to the substance of the Letter and what they Protest Against be drawn up & translated into Portugueze to be sent to Mihie.

Instant wherein came inclosed to us an Invoice of Treasure Stores and Stationary Ware amounting to Rupees Twenty thousand three hundred ninety nine three quarters and eighty two raes with other Papers. They acknowledged the receipt of our Packet dispatched hence on the 29th. June, and are pleas'd to Örder us to dispatch the Rose Galley in Convoy of our Honble Masters Ship expected from Bengall whither it be the Warwick or Resolution. That we send the Galley to Callicutt to bring up the Timber for the use of the Presidency, having strickt regard that such Service may be performed in time so as not to retard her dispatch with the Europe Ship—Enjoin'd us to secure all the Pepper we possibly can, and to take especial notice of the Honble Companys expectations in their Commands contd in the 37th. Paragraph of their General Letter of the 2d. March 1738—To send up an Estimate of the Expence for rebuilding Callicutt Factory before we provide the materials—The Chief only to sign Certificates to Country Vessels and not affix the Honble. Companys Seal to them—To specify the Averdupoiz weight of the Candy &ca. Country weights in our Price Currants.

In our Letter of the 24th. October we advised the Presidency that there was Paragraph not above Twenty Candys of Pepper procurable at Onore and the parts adjacent of our Lettr. which was at the rate of Ninety Rupees & Candy of Five hundred and ten pounds relating to We likewise then wrote them of the Hazard in bringing it down in Pepper. Munchuas on Accot. of Angria and other Pyrats with what else was necessary upon this Subject upon which we may expect their further Orders.

DIRECTED that an Order be given to Capt. Wm. Nash to send ashore the Order to Treasure well buoyed And also the Stores & Stationary Ware which he has on board Capt. Nash. for this Settlement.

THE French still very Vigorously prosecuting the War against the Nombiers Posture of and our utmost endeavours for accommodating these disturbances having been affairs between the ineffectual notwithstanding the Nombiers have always expressed their readiness to French & comply with reasonable Terms as they were not the Agressors Vizt. That all the Nombiers taken under Country Parties engaged in this War shall remain in possession of what they were considerabefore the commencing of it, and to ask pardon of the French for the pretended tion. Insults to a Nayr in their pay; but this will not satisfie the French whom we conceive will not be content with less than subduing the Nombiers and keep posses[sion] of some proper Situations in their Country for the easier keeping them in subjection, which will prevent the Honble Company's procuring Pepper of the produce of their Country and also hinder that which usually passes through it from other Parts

being brought to us. We therefore think ourselves obliged to Protest against them as Agreed upon in Council the 6<sup>th</sup>. Instant, conformable to which an Answer to their Letter of the 16<sup>th</sup>. N.S. and Protest is now read, approved of and Signed and Ordered to be entered after this Consultation. Agreed that this Answer be sent to morrow to Mihie and deliver'd to the French Chief & Council there by Mess<sup>18</sup>. William Jeynson and James Verelst.

An Answer to the Protest of M<sup>B</sup>. Dirois Directore &c<sup>A</sup>. Council of Mihie Dated the 16<sup>TH</sup>. Nov<sup>B</sup>. 1739 N.S.

Sir

Protest against the Directore & Council of Minie.

Whereas in reply to our Letter of the 3d. Instant you altogether insinuate 1st. that not you but the Nombiers were the occasion of the War now subsisting between you and them though the whole Country as well as ourselves know the contrary, and that you and Coringhoda Nayr commenced the same by sending Guns, Ammunition and other Warlike Stores to several Parts in the said Coringhodas Country, in order as you yourselves gave out, to make War upon the Nombiers, who had not at that time fortifyed their Hill of Chimberah which afterwards (as it was natural to suppose they would) they were obliged to do in their own defence. Soon after this you took the Hill of Beira belonging to them, which to every body but yourselves must make you the commencers of the War, which likewise you will be found the Prosecutors of. Mr. Wake and Mr. Dirois as mention'd in our former, having agreed that upon the Nombiers asking pardon of your Company, all things should remain upon the same footing as before the troubles began, which the Nembiers Agreed to & Mr. Dirois afterwards receded from in his Letters of the 25th. & 26th. September to Mr. Wake, whom he tells the Nombiers must pay the Charges which Boyanore and Coringhoda Nayr had been at during the War. From all which it is evident that you were the beginners and are still the Prosecutors of the War. Your entering into which without our consents or previously adviseing us of the same is moreover a direct breach of the Articles of Agreement made between these two Colonies..

"You likewise alledge that these troubles cannot prejudice the Hoñble. English "East India Company because we made an Agreement with the Nombiers not 'till "after you had dispossessed them of the Hill of Poiterra."

Concerning which Agreement M<sup>r</sup>. Dirois wrote several times to M<sup>r</sup>. Wake, at whose request M<sup>r</sup>. Moreau one of your Council with your Linguister was sent hither to peruse it which they did and is as follows Viz<sup>t</sup>.

- 1st. Should any Power make War upon the Hoñble. English Company We hereby engage not to afford them any assistance whatever, nor shall said Company, in case any one makes War upon us.
- 2d. All Goods belonging to the Hoñble. Company which are brough [t] through our Territorys to Tellicherry, shall be permitted to pass without the least Impediment as formerley; And furthermore should whomsoever attempt to hinder the same we will oppose them. The said Company engaging to act in like manner in respect to any Goods, which may be brought from Tellicherry to our Country.

3d. Whensoever the Hoñble. Company desires assistance of Men from us, We will afford it them. And should any Power (Europeans and the King of Paliquilotu excepted) without a just pretext make War upon us: The said Company oblige themselves to afford us the assistance of Armed Nayrs.

In which it must appear there is nothing contrary to the Interest of the Company of France, or that interferes with the present disputes between you and the Nombiers, and the only intent of makeing said Agreement was because some months before One of the Nombiers had committed an insolence against us, and prevail'd on others of them to act contrary to the conveniency of our Commerce in their Country, to prevent which in future we took this method of accommodating that difference, which can no ways affect your Company.

2<sup>d</sup>. In Answer to what you say in the 1<sup>st</sup>. Paragraph of your Second Article, "That you will not be subject to any Wrong Constructions that may be putt upon "the Articles made between these Settlements in 1727/8 &c<sup>a</sup>." we must tell you we look upon them no otherwise than in their literal sence and true meaning.

In the next place you are pleas'd to say "That there are many strong reasons "for the occasion of this War, and that Mr. Wake is deceived in thinking it was on "Account of a Simple Nayr only &ca." If he is, it is by Mr. Dirois who gave him when at Mihie no other reason there for than that of the Nombiers having insulted a Nayr in your Service—Nor can we guess at any other unless it be the frivilous complaints of Boyanore and Coringhoda Nayr pretending they have been injured by the Nombiers, who make the like complaints against them. But surely such complaints can never be admitted amongst Europeans as just reasons for this War, since such trifling disputes daily occur between these petty Governments which may be amicably and easily accomodated by the timely Interposition of these Settlements. Tho' you say "how can we imagine you would give Boyanore such "occasion of complaint as to make Peace without him and Coringhoda Nayr" which indeed seems to us to be an extraordinary question, since we do know Sirs that if you make Peace with the Nombiers the War will immediatly cease between them and Boyanore and Coringhoda Nayr, when Mr. Dirois can call the several Parties together that are now engaged in it and adjust all manner of differences between them according to the Customs of the Country, of which Mr. Wake wrote Mr. Dirois on the 15th. of September.

3d. In the 3d. Article you set forth "that when Mr. Moreau was here with your "last propositions of Peace, you rece'd certain advice that the Hill of Chimberah, "being distressed by you and void of Succour, the Nombiers offered to putt that "place into the possession of the King of Colastry, which he being indiferent in "accepting of Mr. Wake determin'd to take it in the name of that King and immediatly sent Capt. Sterling with Fifty men and four Peices of Cannon to Panoly "where they staid from the third November N.S., to the fourth at Night but "perceiving that you kept a good Watch and had hoisted your Colours upon the "said Hill, he retired."

The whole and every part of which Allegation we affirm to be untrue, and declare that the Hill of Chimberah was never tender'd to him, neither should we in case it had, have accepted of it, the truth of which M<sup>r</sup>. Wake assured M<sup>r</sup>. Moreau before he went from hence, and by him wrote M<sup>r</sup>. Dirois to the same Effect under the fourth of October. But such mere inventions as these merrit no reply, and if you will suffer yourselves to be imposed upon or give Credit to such informations as have not the least shadow of reason or foundation, how is it possible there can be any mutual Confidence between us on this or any other occasion.

4thly. In this Article you say "that by a treaty we made with the Nombiers we have "obliged them to dispose of to us all the Pepper their Country shall produce and "that we are to promise them a favourable Peace with you and your allies. That "we Assist them with Powder, Ball, Topasses & Seepoys. That you know of no

"reason we have to pretend to any priviledges in the Country of Errevadunadda "and that your Predicessors seized some Pepper as it was carrying out of the said "Country of Errevadunadd[a] to some other place than Mihie."

In answer to which we say, We have no other Agreement with the Nombiers than what is above specified, and you know that Mr. Wake had brought the Nombiers to such terms as Mr. Dirois at first proposed. how then is he endeavouring to procure an Advantagious Peace, And in respect to our Assisting them with Topasses, Sepoys &ca. There is no better foundation for this Assertion than for that of our sending an Officer & Men to take possession of Chimberah. In short it is a meer Invention and as such we shall pass it by. But in regard to our makeing an Agreement with the Nombiers for the whole product of Pepper in their Country, We must acquaint you Sirs we are not so ignorant as to imagine they can give such a Grant, because they are not endowed with any manner of Authority or Power so to do, being Vassals of the King of Colastria whose Ancestors free Grant we have for the whole Pepper Trade in his Dominions, and which we a great Number of Years enjoy'd before the French Company Settled at Mihie. These Sirs are our reasons & Authority for a free and undeniable Liberty of Trade in the Country of Erevadunaddu notwithstanding you pretend to be ignorant of them. The Pepper yau say that was seized by your Predicessors in carrying out of the Country of Erevadunaddu to some other Place than Mihie we know nothing of, nor could they nor we do so. but we know that once as some of our Merchants were carrying Pepper out of the Country of Cartuanaddu (in the same manner as yours carried it out of Errevadunaddu) Mr. Bunel then Chief stopped four Mens loads about the month of February 1737/8 and upon complaint being made to him of such an unwarrantable transaction, Mr. Bunel on the Second of March following reply'd that the Pepper he had stopped was claimed in the Names of other Merchants &ca. from whence sure you ought not to insinuate that we have no right to the Pepper of Errevadunaddu.

And lastly you require of us as follows Vizt.

- 1st. That we make void the Agreement we have made with the Nombiers.
- 2<sup>dly</sup>. That we desist from Assisting the Nombiers with Ammunition Men Provisions or money.
- 3dly. That we Oblige the King of Colastra with his Brother and Troops to retire for it is not proper (as Mr. Wake writes in his Letters) that he decide Affairs between the French Company and their Allies. And in default of our performing all this you Protest against us And also if we do not raze our Fort of Putinha which you say we are obliged to do by a Treaty made between our Predicessors and yours in the Year 1726 when you razed yours of Cariacunna.
- 1st. We need not say any thing more to the first Article haveing already made it evidently appear that in no sence whatever our Agreement with the Nombiers concerns your Company.
- 2<sup>dly</sup>. To the Second we have amply reply'd and as we do not Assis[t] the Nombiers we shall take no further notice of it.
- Nayr, who are only Vassals to come into a Peace which was agreable to you, but in such manner as they pleas'd, how unreasonable is it in you, to expect we can oblige the King of Calastria who is their Sovereign (notwithstand[ing] you say his title is only nominal) to retire with his Troops since we do not at any time intermeddle with the disputes between him and his Vassals or Subjects. We are likewise extreamly surprised at your demand of razeing our Fort of Putinha, it would be as consistent with decency in you to demand of us to demolish this of Tellicherry There is no Agreement subsisting or ever was made between the Gentlemen of these Settlements for the demolishing of Putinha either in writeing or Verbally.

Thus Sirs we have fully shewn that every particular which you Protest against us for is without reason or foundation, nor have we at any time given any real occasion.

We Sirs out of respect to your Company, to the Peace and Quietness of the Country of Errevadunaddu, and for the mutual benifit of both Companys carrying on their Traffick therein, perswaded the Nombiers to consent to ask pardon of you for the insolences you pretended they had committed against you, and to promise to live in the same friendship with you as before this War began. which was conformable to what Mr. Dirois requir'd, as is sett forth in the first Article. But as he afterwards receded from those terms of accomodation & you again begun Hostilities against the Nombiers which you still continue, and were the Authors of this War, which is so prejudicial to the Rights and Priviledges of the Trade and Commerce of the Honble United English East India Company in the Country of Erravadunaddu. We out of our Duty and regard to their Interest are Obliged to Protest against you and We hereby accordingly do Protest in the most Ample manner against you Mr. Dirois Directore of Mihie for Affairs of the Company of France and your Council as the immediate commencers and Agravators of this War, and therefore are answerable for all Losses, Damages or Impediments that have shail or may happen or befall the Honble English East India Company on Account

DATED in Tellicherry this Seventeenth day of November Anno que Domini one thousand seven hundred and thirty nine.

Mr. William Jeynson and Mr. James Verelst went to Mihie and Deliver'd our SATURDAY Answer to the French Protest and returned in the Evening, receiving no other Answer than that they had read it and should consider further upon it.

17TH. Messrs.

Jeynson & Verelst proceed to Mihie.

A Small French Ship arrived at Mihie. Welch an Irishman Master he came Ditto Die last from Surat in September and was bound to Bengall but lost his passage.

SAILED the Rose Galley Capt. William Nash for Callicutt to bring up Timber Rose Galley and Topmasts for the Presidency. By the Commander We wrote our Linguister dispatch'd and Topmasts for the Presidency. By the Commander We wrote our Linguister dispatch'd Francisco Dias there Ordering him to give the Galley the most quick dispatch he to Callicutt to fill up to Letter, to possibly could. Likewise Sailed Ship Narcissus for Cochin and Callicutt to fill up the Linguist with a Gruff Cargoe for Mocha.

Being informed that Two of the Samorines Ministers were at Mihie we ordered Monday our Linguister to write to them to come hither which they did this day, when the Chief told them of the Samorines having promised to send proper People to Adjust Samorines Unier told them of the Samorines having promised to send proper reopie to Adjust Minister his Account after the rains and enquir'd of them if they had any Orders concerning arrives from it. They reply'd that they were Ordered away suddenly without seeing the Mihie. Samorine and solely upon business with the French and had no Orders in respect to his Affairs with us, but that they knew he intended to comply with his promise.

Upon enquiry we find their business with the French was to inform them that Their Negotiations with the Samorine could not permit them to settle in the King of Ponitures Dominions the Direcwho was tributary to him, as it would be contrary to his Agreement with the Dutch. tore there. The French Chief reply'd that he had the King of Ponitures Grant for settling and building a Fort in his Country which he should prosecute and hoped the Samorine would not be against it and that he should show no regard to the Dutch.

These Ministers at takeing leave promised to put the Samorine in mind of sending proper People to adjust his Accounts with the Honble Company which we might expect at the end of the month.

THESDAY 20TH.

French Attack a Fort belonging to the Nombiers were repulsed.

This morning the French with a great Number of their Allies Nayrs attacked a small Fort belonging to the Nombiers but were repulsed with the loss of a considerable Number of Nayrs whom the French only support. We are informed that Our Princes Nayrs amongst which were several of Narrangports were of very considerable Service in this action. Narrangports Nayrs were Summonsed by their Prince to act in conjunction with his, under the Nombiers which we cannot prevent they being his Majesties Subjects and are obliged to serve us for a Stipulated pay only when we require it of them.

WEDNES-DAY 21<sup>ST</sup>.

Take posses-sion of Monnacunna.

THE French and their Allies early this morning took possession of the Fort of Monnicunna, by treachery as it is said, the Nombiers Nayrs abandoning it in the Night without the knowledge of the Princes People or those of Narrangport who at first opposed the Enemy but finding they were not supported from the Fort were obliged to retire when the French entered it and hoisted their Colours.

Fishe Moors be sent with the Prince who has assembled about Eight hundred Nayrs at Detachmt. Opened the Packet rece'd this day & read Duplicate of a Letter Dated the 23d. Letter from Ultimo, Original of which was intended to be sent by the Emelia Sloop, also a short Bombay perused. Letter of the same Date directing us to forward instantly their Packet to Anjengo. In their Duplicate they were pleas'd to inform us of the receipt of all our Letters to our last of the 3d. of past month with all Papers Copys and Accounts specified in the List of our several Packets. They were pleas'd to approve of our Conduct in endeavouring at first to restore Tranquility between the French & Nombiers, although it had not the desir'd success, as that of the French was not equal to it which appeared by their sending Proposals, & resuming them whilst they went on with their Hostilities, and in respect to our future Conduct in regard to the Situation of Affairs according to our representation of them in our Letter of the 24th. October they are pleas'd to write as follows.

"On your reference to the President concerning your present posture of Affairs, he confirms & explains the Nature of your Situation & the Dangers to the Paragraphs Priviledge & Trade of our Honble Masters at your Settlement, agreable to what therein you represent in yours of the 24th. October, so that we concur with your opinion the French that in case of the French subjecting the Nombiers they might afterwards do the & Nombiers. same by Cotata and then altogether fall on Prince Cunhi Homo who without being streniously assisted would in all likelyhood not being able to withstand them, In which event ill Consequences to our Honble Masters Interest at your Settlement appear clear & evident. We do not therefore consider this Quarrel as merely a contention betwixt the Country Powers, but a formed design by the French for paveing the way to get by means of it such a footing in the Countrys from whence our Pepper is extracted, as may if not duly and timely opposed supplant or destroy the possession of our Priviledges and Emoluments in them.

Considering therefore that we are in Duty bound to support all our Honble Masters just Priviledges and rights and oppose any Encroachments on, or measures prejudicial to their Interest and Concerns, We accordingly Agree to give you the following Directions.

If you find the French still proceed in their Invasions and continue pushing such measures as to endanger our Honble Masters Trade and Interest, after trying ineffectually all pacifick and amicable means for putting a stop to them you are to Protest against them for all Damages that may be sustained by the Honble Company by reason of such their proceedings and all such measures pursued by them as are contrary to the rights and Priviledges of our Nation in those Parts: And at the same time they cannot complain of your supporting the Prince or our Allies. And you have accordingly our leave to engage in such measures as may be absolutely necessary for the preservation of your Trade & Interest which must be done with the utmost caution & reserve. We shall not like the French show little regard to the Expence neither shall we grudge what is strictly requisite for your Protection

and the defence of the trusts committed to You, whilst that necessity continues: The measure of your Charges to be incurr'd cannot well be fixed here, but must be governed by the Exigences and Occasions which must be left to your discretion and judgement, and we do not doubt of your keeping strictly in view our Houble Masters Sense and Orders against the least encrease of their Expences, where it can any ways be avoided.

We think therefore you judged right in refusing the Princes offer of a Number of Men, which would have brought on such an enormous expence as five hundred Rupees & Diem; But as far as a proper Encouragement to him or the Nombiers to persist in the Defence of their Country & your Priviledges with a competent assistance on your parts of Military Stores & such helps as your Settlement can afford towards preventing their becomeing a prey to the French or subservient to their Power & Will, We shall approve of your furnishing them therewith, or with Issues of such a Sum as may draw off those now engaged on the French side, provided it be within a tolerable compass, so as to Answer the end of opposing any Encroachments of the French that may hurt or lessen the Hoñble. Companys Interest in your Settlem.

We empower you likewise to settle & conclude with the Nombiers such Terms and Articles of Agreement as you shall judge most advantagious to the Honble Company giveing them such countenance and support as you may think necessary. We have perused their Ola dated the 7<sup>th</sup>. September last by which we observe their disposition to enter into a Defensive and Offensive League and you will do well to improve it, so as to Answer the abovemention'd purposes.

The Prince ought surely to resent the behaviour of his Vassals to him, as well as that of the French who encourage and spirit them up against his Interest & Authority, But as we have often experienced his Slackness & Indolence, when his Country was before at stake during the Canaree Invasion, it will requ[ire] your best care and attention as well to keep him firm and steady to your Interest, which is in truth inseperable from his, as to animate him to use his best endeavours to suppress these Commotions in the Country before they go to far, or concur effectually in the defence and preservation of your common concerns.

We are entirely against accepting a Grant from the Nombiers of any part of their Country to raise a Fortification in, both for the reason you mention in your Letter of the 3<sup>d</sup>. Inst<sup>t</sup>. and because such a step would furnish the French with a Pretext for Jealousy, as well as of Grounds to procure the like, as they seem by yours to be desirous of obtaining a Fort at Poiterra which we are sensible must be of the worst consequences to our Honble Masters Trade; And you will do well therefore by all means to spirit up the Prince Cunhi Homo and the Nombiers to oppose it to the utmost as that Situation Commands such an Extent, as would greatly affect your draughts of Pepper out of those Districts, And you on your parts are to Protest against their Fortifying in a Country which ought to be free & open.

With regard to the Fort of Putinha which we observe you have reinforced during these Troubles, We leave the disposal therein entirely to your discretion and if the French relinquish their unreasonable Pretentions & the Demolition of it will be any ways serviceable towards a fair accommodation of all matters we shall approve of your razing it, & taking away thereby any Pretext it may afford them for Umbrage or Complaint.

We are pleas'd the French were disappointed in the Scheme they had laid for Building a Fort in the King of Ponitures Country, and notwithstanding the renewall of a promise of settling there, We hardly believe they will attempt or at least succeed in it, as the Dutch know the effects of their Neighbourhood too well not to oppose their gaining a footing any where near them, where they can help it.

Our concern for the present embroild State of the Country round your Settlement is somewhat compensated by the advice you give us of having nothing to fear from the present Carnatick Government, & that you expect soon to come to an happy conclusion with Surapaya now in Command of their Army at Madday.

As there was no Pepper at Mangulore & the Twenty Candys we mentioned to be at Onore being so dear as Ninety Rupees ? Candy of about Five hundred and ten pounds, & was likewise too inconsiderable a Quantity to Order a Ship to call for it, they declined giveing us any Orders about the price, nor was there any encouragement to send a Comps. Servant to purchase in those parts from the dearness of it.

APPROVED of our timely advanceing mony for Cardamoms & also of our composition for time with the Heirs of Chatoo Chitty.

THE Emelia Sloop being small could not carry a sufficient Quantity of Stores for Anjengo, wherefore they directed us to supply them with what we can spare, & also send them thirty thousand Rupees by the Emelia Sloop when she arrives with us, or more if we could spare it 'till they could supply us. Also on the arrival of Ship Harrington to take on shore what Gold might be on Board if we judged it would Answer better than at Bombay. ORDERED us to send up the Surgeon of the Danes Ship whereof Mr. Charles Barrington was Supracargo.

In which We acknowledged the receipt of all their Commands 'till the last dated the 4th. with Duplicates-& all other Papers mentioned to have been sent us. Expressed our concern for the Cruizers being missing so long, although We were not without hopes of their being safe, as all the Gallivats and other Vessels escaped. The same day We rec<sup>d</sup>. the Packets We dispatch'd that for Anjengo, and Yesterday which was as soon as We could get proper Pattamars, one of those for Fort St. George, as We should the other to morrow. Wrote them the necessary advices of the Country Government and of the Nombiers being reduced to sue for Peace with the French by the mediation of Peramby the Samorines Minister; and what else had occur'd upon that Subject as entered in our Diary. That notwithstanding our utmost endeavours for getting in the remainder of the Pepper Contracts We found it was impracticable for the Merch[ts.] to comply further than what We had formerly wrote. The French having a large Ship to dispatch for Europe from Myhie & but little Pepper in Warehouse, We fear it may putt them upon pernicicus measures to procure what they want to compleat her Loading in time. Advised of our having Advanced six thousand Rupees for Pepper and in what manner-and of our having wrote the Chief and Factors at Anjengo to know what money they should want by the Emelia Sloop which We should supply them with—requested they would advise the Commanders of Europe Ships that were to pay Rupees into our Treasury that We rould not take such as were chopped, as We meet with difficulty in making them pass Current.

WE now take into Consideration the Chief & Factors of Anjengo their Letter Letter from rece'd the 15th. in respect to supplying them with an Officer, Two Serjeants & Two Factors at Corporals and Twenty Private Men and also a Quantity of Rice.

Anjengo taken into Consideration.

It is now a very sickly time, and thirty eight of our Private Men are not able to do Duty, nor will the troubles up Billiapatam River permit us at present to withdraw the Detachment there consisting of Seventy four Effective Men including Officers, and being bare of Petty Officers and no proper Europeans to make others, It is AGREED that consistent with our present Circumstances, We cannot spare more Resolution. than an Ensign and Ten Topasses for the Service at Anjengo.

We have not Rice sufficient for our Garrison longer than 'till the end of January. Wherefore it is proposed that Two thousand Rupees be sent by Boat to Mangulore & deliver'd to Francisco d'Sousa now there with a Munchua called the Adjuda belonging to Domingo Rodregues, who offers her to bring it down upon Freight at the usual rate of Two Pagodas & Corge & that the sd. D'Sousa be Ordered to purchase one thousand Bales at the cheapest rate he can, & send it further down with all possible expedition which is AGREED TO.

PARAMBEE the Samorines Minister who was Mediator between the Nombiers and French signified by an Ola to our Linguist that they had made a Peace, the principal Articles of which were that the French are to keep possession of the Hills of Poiterra and Chimberah, & to have half the Pepper of the Growth of their Country and that passes through it and were to pay the French at Two Payments One hundred & Eighty thousand Fanams. The Samorines Minister makes a great merrit of his getting the French to comply on so easy terms in respect to the Honble Companys Priviledges in the Nombiers Country.

WEDNES-DAY 19 TH. Letter to the Directore of Mihie.

THE Chief wrote to Mr. Dirois Directore of Mihie that being informed of his haveing made Peace with the Nombiers he intended to waite upon him with our Linguist to peruse the Articles thereof as they must more or less affect the Honble Company's Priviledges of Trade in their Country &ca.

Pedro Rangel returned from Surapaya with a Letter signifying the desire his Master had of being in Peace & Friendship with the Honble Company—That he desir'd the Chief would meet him at Matamy, or where he thought proper to adjust some Affairs in relation to the Prince—The Articles formerly Agreed upon between Stephen Law Esq<sup>r</sup>. & him should be deliver'd—of all which he had given information to Pedro Rangel.

Letter to Surapaya & Domingo Rodregues order'd to Billiapatam. As this Visit would according to their Customs take up several days, & also create an expence as the Chief must have a sufficient Guard with Boats Coolys &c<sup>a</sup>. He this day wrote Surapaya to send some proper Person to Billiapatam, whither he would immediately send Domingo Rodregues who was well acquainted with the Country Government, & they could first consider of what Affairs he was desirous of Negotiating with the Prince when the Chief would meet him at Mattamy according to his request:

WEDNES-DAY 19<sup>TH</sup>. Capt. Wm. Gibbs arrives from Maniur. Cap<sup>‡</sup>. William Gibbs arrived from Manuir who relates that the Rebells gives the Princes People little disturbance & if they were not such indolent Wretches, those Commotions might easily have been ended before now, but he suspects if we were to withdraw all our People they would again Plunder the Country People.

THURS-DAY 20<sup>TH</sup>. relating to the Fl et under Mr. Rigby's Commd.

A Shybar belonging to the Chief of Anjengo arrived this day with about Five hundred Bales of Rice from Mangulore & is bound to Anjengo. This Vessel came out of Bombay in Company with the Honble Comps. Ship Defence about the 4<sup>th</sup>. of September; but meeting with bad weather was obliged to take Shelter in Rajapore & afterwards joined the Cruizers under Mr. Rigbys Command, who on the 9<sup>th</sup>. Novr. left him with the Rose Galley, but blowing hard in the Night he lost Compo. & went to Goa from whence he proceeded to Mangulore.

THE French Hoisted their Colours on an Hill very near to their Fort at Mihie which it commands. This belonged to Boyanore and on which 'till now they never had the liberty of Hoisting their Colours, but by good information we understand they have bought it of the Youth Boyanore about Ten years of Age for Eight their Colours thousand Rupees, but the mother has not given her consent, however they are on an Hill Fortifying it which will render their situation very strong.

SATUR-DAY 22<sup>D</sup>.

Commands Mihie Fort.

M<sup>R</sup>. Dirois wrote the Chief that being absent from Mihie when he wrote him Dirto was the reason he did not reply to that Letter before, and that if Mr. Wake will go to Mihie, he will produce the only Article of the Peace he has made with the Letter from Nombiers that anyways relates to our Company, in which is shown the French of Mihie. moderation.

By the return of the Boat we sent to Anjengo with a Packet for the Gentlemen MONDAY there from the Presidency, We rece'd a Lettr. from them Dated the 18th, wherein Letter from they acknowldge the receipt of our Letters of the 8th. & 12th. Inst. with the Anjengo. Packet, & advise that after the Arrival of the Munchua Load of Rice they requested on the 12th. Inst. they hoped their occasions would not oblige them to request any more, as the Rice we send turns out very dear, what with short measure & one charge or other; wherefore they desire we would not send them the one thousand Bales they wrote for by the Europe Ship, as what they had rece'd with the Munchua Load expected would enable them to waite & see if they cannot supply themselves from the Bengallers. They likewise write that if we send them Thirty thousand Rupees by the Emelia Sloop that Sum will be fully sufficient as they have an Order to take some Gold out of the Harrington.

THE Rice we have hitherto sent them, has all been whole Bales and in good thereon. Package, and the Cost no more than what it is deliver'd out at, to our Garrison; Our Charges in Shipping here &ca. as appears by the Invoices are very small. The freight & Charges at Landing there is Charged by themselves.

Remarks

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors at Surat dated the 30th. of October wherein they write that according to directions from the Presidency they had sent us Two Carpenters who had rece'd One hundred & forty five Rupees for Letter from five months Pay, One at fourteen & one at fifteen Rupees & Month and are to have Surat. their Provisions as customary.

WEDNES-DAY. 26

Imported our Hoñble. Masters Ship Harrington Capt. Robert Jenkins from Canton but last from Anjengo. The Commdr. informs us that he sent ashore there some Gold & that he has no more remaing, than Seventy four Bars & seven small ship Bitts, which he this day rece'd an Order from us by Vertue of one we have rece'd arrives from Canton. to bring on shore here. Also tender'd him the Order for taking on board the Masts for Bombay which he refused, giveing us in writeing that he had more than his Transactions Charter Party Tonnage on Board, and as there was no other Ship of any considerable force to go up the Coast with him his Ship being lumber'd with Masts may be attended with ill consequences in case he should meet with an Enemy.

ROBERT JENKINS informing us that he had Two Chests of Treasure on Board containing Twenty thousand Rupees which was part of the Stock to China; Order'd to We considering that our takeing it out here will save the risque to Bombay & back Treasure. again as we must have Treasure sent us from thence this Season, we gave him an Order to send the said Treasure a Shore well Buoyed, which counted were found to be Twenty thousand, & the Gold being weighed the whole being Sixteen Parcels

Advised of our Transactions in respect to the Gold & Treasure rece'd from the Harrington, and of our haveing sent a further Recruit to Anjengo with all other necessary Transactions.

ORDERED that the Secretary makes up the Packet enclosing Duplicates with all other necessary Papers to go by this Conveyance and deliver it to Capt. Jenkins.

Sirs

The Chiefs Narrative. On my Arrival at Maddacarra the 1st. Inst. Surapaya, the Canaree General, sent one of his Chief Officers to me with a Compliment, requesting I would meet him at Mattamy the next morning; but upon enquiry I found that the Articles Signed by the late King, which had hitherto been promis'd should be deliver'd on our meeting, were at Mangulore; wherefore I would have avoided seeing him, as it must be attended with some Expence in Presents: but considering that returning without so doing, might give hopes to such as are not Friends to this Government, that we might be again Embroil'd, I therefore told the Officer, that if Surapaya would promise to send the said Articles to Tellicherry so soon as they could be brought from Mangulore, I would meet him, which he Surapaya complying with, we accordingly met on the 2d.

After a very long and tedious discourse, I perceived, that what prevented the Articles being deliver'd, was Surapaya's first wanting us to induce the Prince to stand by the Agreements made with him, which the late General Ragonat had also broke through, when in such case he would reduce his Army, which now is an Expence of more than Twelve thousand Pagodas # month, but I knowing the Prince (however unable to defend himself against the Canarees) to be unwilling to come to any firm Agreem<sup>t</sup>. of Peace, except they restore to him that part of his Country which had been given up to the Canarees by those Articles, I only therefore assured him that if he would send proper Persons to Telli<sup>ry</sup>. to treat with the Prince I would use my best endeavours to bring about so desireable an End.

Upon my insisting on the Honble Company's being reeimbursed the great Expence they had been at in opposing Ragonat when he so unjustly violated the Articles agreed upon with Surapaya he replied his Government had likewise been at a very great expence & for which the present King had dismissed Ragonat from all his Employments but as his Majesty had not given him Authority to pay any Sum on Acc<sup>t</sup>. of the Expences We had been at, he must write to him concerning that Affair before he could come to any determination about it; He said the King was very desirous of establishing a perfect Friendship with the Honble Compa. and very earnestly requested I would use such means with Prince Cunhi Homo as might induce him to confirm the Articles formerly Agreed upon; when after the accustomary Compliments We parted. And from all the observations I could make the Cannaree Government seems desirous of settling their Affairs in these parts in a peaceable manner that they may withdraw, or at least reduce their Army. - THE French Company are to continue in possession of the Hills Chimberah and Poiterra, which the Nombiers nor their Heirs shall hereafter claim any pretentions to.
- THE Nombiers are to raze the Fortifications placed on Odeote Cunna Manna Cunna & Quezeque Cunna & their People are to quit their habitations & retire from the parts contiguous to the former.
- THE Lands lying between the Hills Poiterra, Beira, Mannacunna Odeote Cunna, Quezeque Cunna, Chimberah &ca. the Nombiers are to reap the sole benifit of, in which the French Company are to Protect them.
- THE Fortifications raised in the Territories of Narrangole Nombier on Account of the War are to be demolished.
- THE Nombiers are to make Publick Renunciation of their late Agreement with us, in case it should prove prejudicial to the Commerce of the French Company.
- THE Pepper which is carrying to Mihie through the Nombiers Territories is to pass free, and one half of what produc'd therein appropriated to the French Company at the Current Price it may bear in the Country.
- The French Company are to defend the Nombiers against whomsoever shall come against them without a just pretext.
- THE Nombiers are to continue in possession of the House on Odeotu Cunna but the Fortification thereon is to be razed & the Ditch round it filled up.
- The differences subsisting between the Nombiers Boyanore and Cunhi Nayr are to be accommodated by proper Persons of this Country appointed by the Contending Parties to be Arbitrators and with their determination the Nombiers are to acquiesce, otherwise the French will oblige them to it.

Protest against the Directore & Council of Mihie. Whereas upon your commencing Hostilities against our Friends and Neighbours the Nombiers, Mr. Wake charg'd himself with the mediation between you and them for accomodating your differences, and preventing the evil consequences of them on the Trade of both Companys which you at two different times accepted of & as often without reason receded from; The Nombiers having through the perswasion of Mr. Wake been actually prevail'd upon to submit themselves to your first Conditions, as well as afterwards to any other moderate ones you should propose, which evidently instances in you the excess of Infidelity and Injustice, especially as the most amicable means, and such as in appearance ought to have been the most effectual were by us made use of for composing your differences as will appear by Mr. Wakes sundry Letters to Mons<sup>r</sup>. Dirois at that time.

SINCE the Arrival here of Surapayas Messengers they have had several Confer- Wednesences with the Princes Minister at our Linguists House But it haveing been day 23°. insinuated to them that the readiest method they could take to accomodate with the Prince would be to send hither the Articles so long promis'd, and adjust what restitution is to be made to the Honble Company for the great Expence they have been at in the late War occasion'd by Ragonats Entering this Country contrary to the Agreement made with Surapaya; when the Prince would see that the Canaree Intentions were to live in Amity & Friendship with this Government. Upon which the Messengers desir'd leave to return for the Articles.

By the Messengers the Chief wrote Surapaya he was very sorry he could not Letter to yet prevail upon the Prince to adjust all the Pretentions that were depending between him and them, but would continue his good Offices to obtain that end; withall putting him in mind of the Charges concerning which he had promis'd to write the King & of the Articles not being yet sent.

We are under no apprehensions that the Canarees have any intentions of disturbing this Government, but rather that they want to lessen their Charges by withdrawing a considerable part of their Army, from which consideration possibly they may be brought to make some acknowledgement on Account of the Charges the Hoñble. Company have been at Nor does it appear of any great consequence whither the Articles concluded with Surapaya & Signed by the late King be deliver'd or not, as all English Ships & Vessels are very Civilly rece'd at Mangulore & other Ports in the Canaree Dominions.

Cunhiseu being come hither to adjust the Price of Cardamoms he has deliver'd is now called in, and their being light and of a very bad colour is represented to him, It is also remark'd that he has been supplied with mony whenever he requir'd it; He replies that the Weather at the latter part of the Season being very uncommon is the reason of their being of a bad colour and not filling, as when it is proper; But according to his promise, He and Paraporem Ussem Cutty secured all of the produce of the Head Sort which are esteem'd of the highest flavour, and which have been deliver'd to us although he could have sold any Quantity to the French and Callicutt Merchants for a much greater price than he now asks which is four hundred and twenty nine Rupees Parapore Candy of five hundred and sixty pound, the price he was paid last Year.

WE are indeed sensible that our advanceing mony in time prevented the French purchasing any, & that this Year Six hundred Rupees & Candy Callicutt of six hundred pound[s] has been paid there for about six Candys. After many Arguements we Agreed with him for four hundred and ten Rupees & Candy which is the lowest we could bring him to, without makeing him a sufferer. The Quantity of about Two Candys which he has remaining he promises to deliver in a few days.

OPENED the Packets recd. this day from the Presidency, and read the Letters. Letters from That by the Boat Express was dated the 27th. Instant wherein we are order'd to Bombay. forward the Packet for the Honble Company received with it by the Haeslingfield, & another to [the] Gentlemen at Anjengo.

In the President's &ca. Commands of the 19th. January by Ship Haeslingfield came inclosed Invoices & Bills of Lading for what came on those Ships for this Settlement and that of Anjengo, with a Packet for the Gentlemen there.

The Chief delivers in an Inventory of the Adventure's Stores & List of her Crew reced from the Presidt. it not being prepared in time to be sent in the Packet.

Our Superiors in their Commands of the 19th. January acknowledge the Receipt of our Letters of the 14th. & 15th. of past month, with all such Papers as we then sent, with a Packet from Anjengo. They Order us to compleat the Haeslingfield's Charter Party Tonnage with One hundred, ninety five Tons; eighty seven Decimals in Pepper & Cardamoms, and to permit the Commander any Quantity of Pepper more that he may request in writing at half freight. If the Country Ships care to call at Goa to give Capt. Shuter Directions to go thither with them, and take in such Arrack there on the Hon Company's Accot. as may be ready to be sent on board by Padre Vieyra. To return the Warwick in Convoy with such Ships as may be ready to take the Benefit of it, and load on board such Timber, Masts & Plank as may be ready here and fill her up with Pepper in such manner as the Ship be kep[t] in a Posture of Defence, so necessary for the Service she is employ'd upon.

To dispatch the Adventure Grab to Anjengo with the Guns, Powder, Stores &ca. now on board the Warwick and Haeslingfield; but the Treasure for that Settlement is to remain on board the latter Ship provided the Commander will engage [to] deliver it there, & take his final Dispatches from hence for Great Britain. If the Gentlemen at Anjengo should return the Adventure Grab hither in time to save her Passage, we are to load her with Timber & Plank. Also Ordered us to provide but Nine thousand pounds weight of Cardamoms.

Ensign Cheesbrough came on the Warwick with Seven men for the Service at Anjengo. The Officer we may retain here in lieu of one we sent thither.

They are pleased to observe the Course of our Proceedings in regard to the Disputes in our Neighbourhood, and the Prince's Expectations of being assisted with Loans of money for the Support of his forces in the Defence of his Country, which he ought not to expect of us, whilst he seems so indifferent about it himself. Earnestly recommended the getting in the Outstanding Pepper Debts of last year.

We need not make any further Provision of Batavia Arrack at Cochin for the present, as it comes out dear, and they otherwise supplied. But when it is to be done on proper terms it is not to be omitted—Not to take of the Commanders or others for Bills on the Honble Company any but new Bombay Rupees, except at such Discount as the Honble Company may be no Sufferers.

Capt. Shuter & Capt. Cooke have permission to pay money into our Cash upon their making Oath in the manner formerly Directed, when We are to give them Certificates. Mr. Thomas Stonestreet has liberty to pay money into our Cash on his own or the late Mr. Nicholas Goodwin's Account at the Rate of Two Shillings & Five pence Provided Rupee at ninety days Sight, as has Mr. George Percival & Mr. William Wake, they taking the Oath in the prescribed manner. And if the Supracargoes of the Mary request to pay into our Treasury any money on account of the late Governour Horne, We are to give them Bills for the same.

Proceedings thereon. CAPT. COOKE being now called in, and asked if he would deliver what Treasure he had on board for Anjengo, notwithstanding he was to receive his Dispatches from hence to proceed directly for Great Britian: He reply'd, he would give it from under his hand that he would deliver the said Treasure at Anjengo, altho' he reced his Dispatches from hence.

By the Warwick they were pleased to send us a Supply of Two hundred thousand Rupees, which they compute is fully sufficient for the Present, with such Stores on these Ships as we may want.

THE Quantity of Cardamoms We are now ordered [to] provide being One thousand pounds less than what is specified at the foot of the Honble Company's Paragraphs reced the 27<sup>th</sup>. of Aug<sup>t</sup>. It is necessary that due notice be taken of the same in the next General Letter to Bombay.

Treasure & Stores order'd a shore from the Warwick and Haesling field. DIRECTED that the Secretary writes Orders to Capt. Shuter & Cooke to send ashore such Treasure & Stores as they have on board their respective Ships for this Settlement by such Boats as shall be sent of to receive them. Also such Stores as they have for the Settlement of Anjengo, except the Treasure; And that he likewise writes an Order to Capt. Laurence to receive on board the last mention'd Stores, That the Warehousekeeper get in readiness what Pepper & Cardamoms are to be loaded on board the Haeslingfield and send off as fast as they can be received.

They are view Gold & now Called in, & the highest Price they will give for it is Three hundred Seventy purchase it. eight Rups. Bar, deposite now Ten thousand Rups. in our Treasury and take away Twenty Bars, and the whole in Ten or twelve days.

THE Price they offer, conformable to the weight of the whole Quantity, is at the Rate of Three hundred eighty six Rupees, 8765 Decls. for Ten Tale weight, But not having an Invoice of it, We cannot tell the Touch it was taken for in China, although We suppose it might be ninety Six, but we beleive it will scarce be Ninety five Touch when essay'd. By the Calculate sent us from Bombay, Ten Tale weight of eighty nine & a half Touch produced from the Mint to the Amount of Three hundred Sixty seven Rups. 5508 Decls. Whence supposing the Gold to be ninety five Touch, Ten Tale weight of it will produce there Three hundred ninety Rups. 1377 Decls. and is about Three quarters # Cent more than the Shroffs now offer, which Difference will not be equivalent to the Risque from hence to Bombay & back again. But it may further be observed that the Gold, which produced Three hundred Sixty seven Rups. & an half at Bombay, was esteemed in China of Ninety three Touch, but in the Mint it came out no more than Eighty nine & a half: and if the Gold, we have now to dispose of, should prove as deficient in its fineness, there would be a considerable Loss in sending it thither.

From the Discourse we have at several times had with him, it is apparent that the only Impediment for our receiving the Articles Signed by the King of Bednure, is our Prince's Obstinacy in refusing to Ratify those he Agreed to in 1736/7, nor will he meet Surapaya to receive those Signed by the present King, which Subasenoy now earnestly requests we will endeavour to prevail upon him to do: To which end, It is AGREED that Domingos Rodriguez proceed this Evening to the Prince with a proper Ola to him from the Chief on this Subject.

Domingos Rodregues sent to the Prince.

Subasenov thinking it would evade disputes, that very probably may hereafter arise about the Adlamy or Duty on Rice, if it were limited to a certain Quantity, which in the 5<sup>th</sup>. Article of the Agreement with the Canarees is extended to particular Company's Servants and others.

A seperate Article agreed to be entered into with the Cannarees. It is to be Observed the Presidency seldom wants any Rice from the Canaree's Ports, and three hundred Corge or Twelve thousand six hundred Bales (which Subasenoy says will be allowed annually free of that Duty)) is more than the Honble Company wants for this settlement, It is AGREED that a seperate Article which has been drawn up and now Laid before the Board be Signed by the Chief (as enter'd after this Consultation) and that it be deliver'd upon receiving the Signed Articles of 1736/7.

MUCCATUM Paqui, Baunibelti Cunhipy and several others of our Pepper The Merchants came to the Fort and complained that those of Myhie give such prices complaint for Pepper, as they cannot procure any at the rate they contracted for with us; that they naming several of the French Merchants that give in various parts of the Country comply with from Forty five to Fifty Milled Spanish Dollrs. P Candy, which is from Ninety to their Pepper upwards of One hundred Rups. And they Request that We will advance upon the Price agreed upon this Season. Price agreed upon this Season, or they cannot deliver more than what they have given out money for, and must return what money they have in their hands; when they withdrew.

We have been sensible that the French all this Season have shewn no Regard to the agreement made with them, for not giving more than Seventy eight Rups. Candy for Pepper this Season, and which we have complained of in several Letters to the French Chief, but more particularly by Mr. Verelst when he went to Myhie on the 23d. of October last. But in the Chief's answer, and to Mr. Verelst, he denied they paid any more than the Price agreed upon, notwithstanding the most evident Proofs to the contrary. Our Linguist sent Ten Maunds by our permission to Myhie, and sold it there to one of their Merchts. for Two hundred Thirty seven Fanams & a half, which is at the Rate of Ninety five Rups. \$\mathbb{P}\$ Candy: wherefore we judged it of no Signification to take further Notice of it to the French. But supposing the French make up their Accounts with their Merchants at Seventy eight Rups. they must make them suitable allowances in some shape or other, or the Merchants must never intend to give Pepper, at that rate, for the whole Sum of money they have reced; and from the Poverty of most of them, and other Circumstances, there is great reason to suspect the Merchants never intend to clear their Accounts. But those or any other such like Practices are nothing to us. We know it is true they have given the Prices our Merchants mention, and for considerable Quantitys; whence it is evident We must permit our Merchants to advance in price, or we shall be greatly deficient in the Quantity that may be expected We should procure, which will in all probability occasion a Deficiency of Tonnage for the homeward bound Ships next year.

THE Merchants cannot deceive us in the prices they give in the several Bazars Taken into or Markets, which are greater to the Southward, & those parts adjacent to the Considera-French than to the Northward: Wherefore, after duly deliberating and considering thought all Circumstances relating to this very material Affair, IT IS RESOLVED that the reasonable. Merchants have liberty given them to purchase all the Pepper they can, at the least Rates, giving notice when they are to advance in price, and that we do promise to make them a proper acknowledgement for their Trouble at closing their accounts, and advance them money in the usual manner.

THE Merchants are now called in, and our Linguist informs them of the above Resolution, which after some Arguments they promise to conform to.

The Contents of which are to inform us that by the Amsterdam Gazettes received from Aleppo they apprehend our Nation is on the point of declaring War against Spain, ordering us to be upon our Guard at all Events, more especially as it may be inferr'd that France may take part of the War against Great Brittain, requiring our utmost precaution against the designs of that Nation. That by private advices they were informed that the Royall Guardian which was intended for Bombay & China was not Sailed the 23d. of August from Great Brittain, and apprehending she might not arrive in time to gain her passage to China, We are Ordered to dispose of the Sandalwood in case of her not arriving on this Coast before the time absolutely necessary for that end be expired, if to be done without Loss, otherwise to reserve it 'till their further Orders.

DIRECTED that a Letter be wrote to the Chief and Factors at Anjengo with the Advices We have received this day from the Presidency, and that the Express Boat be dispatched with it to give the Gentlemen at Anjengo an opportunity of sending such Advices as may be necessary to Bombay.

Upon receipt hereof you are to make enquiry after that Commodity at Mangulore, & to the Northward and Southward and buy up what you possibly can.

To assist you in this material Affair We have appointed Ventura de Souza, who is well acquainted with the Customs, Manners & Language of the Cannarees. In respect to price you are not to exceed Ninety eight Rupees the Candy of five hundred & ten pounds Averdupoiz, but as much under as you are able.

It is necessary that you be private in this Affair 'till you have made some considerable purchase, to prevent the Merchants raising the price: Wherefore dispatch proper People to Onore and Manjaseer at the same time, without one knowing of the other's Dispatch, both which you are to make before you buy or even make any publick enquiry after Pepper at Mangulore, except you are apprehensive it should be suddenly bought up. Ventura can inform you what Merchants to trust at the last mentioned place, and at Onore apply to Hur Comity, for whom you have an open Letter from the Chief acquainting him in a proper manner of your business.

If it is possible, you are to make your Agreements for what Pepper you purchase at Manjaseer as well as at Onore, to be deliver'd at Mangulore, where pay for it, except what you may find necessary to advance to the Merchants; and in your Agreements with them, which let be in Rupees, take care to specific the weight of the Candy, which first compare with the Candy of five hundred and ten pounds: but if you cannot get the Merchants to comply with delivering the Pepper at Mangulore, it must be upon their risque from Fire and other accidents 'till it is deliver'd.

This day arrived from Mangalore Seven Munchuas which brought us Six thousand nine hundred & three Bales of Rice for this Garrison. By this Confrom veyance Mr. Purnell wrote us that the Warwick and the Ships under her Convoy did not arrive there 'till the 2d. Instant, and the Commander having Landed the Company's Treasure sailed the next day. He likewise advised that he had exchanged the Sixteen thousand Rupees sent by him for Iccaree Pagodas at Three hundred forty seven Rups. Pone hundred Pagodas, which was the lowest Rate he could exchange at, and that he had received One thousand One hundred & fifty Pagodas of Ventura

de Sousa, for Four thousand Rups. which Ventura had exchanged at about Three hundred forty seven Rupees, & 83 Decls. and had purchased the Chamsall Rice now sent at the Rate of Twenty two Pagodas & five eighths & Corge of Forty two Bales, lower than which none had been purchased this Season.

THE last night passed by here at some Distance several boats from Myhie with SUNDAY Mons<sup>r</sup>. Moreau & Thirty of their Military, with a Present for Surapaya the Canaree General at Madday; Upon which Mr. Wake immediately sent the Serjeant Major French Boats pass with orders to the Commanding Officer at Madacarra not to suffer the French to to Madday. enter the River; to send over to Mattamy Point two Three pounders and an Officer with Twenty five men, to oppose them if they attempted landing there. At the same time he also wrote to Domingos Rodriguez to send Pedro Rangell to Surapaya, to get Intelligence of their Proceedings.

Received a Letter from the Callicut Linguist, in which he writes that he had Letter from not been able to purchase more than forty Candys of good Coyr of the Quantity Callicutt. we had order'd for the Presidency, nor could buy it for less than Ten Narodes one quarter, or Twenty nine Rupees, Two Quarters & forty five Raes # Candy, and that he did not expect to procure the One hundred Candys indented for; and make it into Cordage before the Rains set in. That he had bought Seventy Candys of Pepper, at One hundred Rups. # Candy, and was in hopes of getting about Thirty Candys more from Panany, at about the same price: That there was Sixty Candys more at Callicutt, for which they asked One hundred Two Rups. & a half # Candy, and requested we would send him about Thirty six thousand Rups. to clear the Ballance then due to him & to pay for Pepper.

ARRIVED an Express Boat from Anjengo belonging to Bombay by which we reced a Letter from the Gentlemen there dated the 11th. Instant, and Duplicate of one of the 8th. by the Adventure Grab, which Vessel is not yet arrived. They transmitted a Packet to be forwarded to the Presidency, & acknowledge the Receipt of all our Letters, & of the Rice sent them on the 24th. & 25th. Ulto. which came out right in Quantity of Bales, but they complain that many of them were broke, requesting none but tight Bales might be sent them, or our Honble Masters will be Sufferers. They are surprized at the loss of weight in the Pepper sent hither, which they say must have happen'd in bringing it on shore here, & in weighing it by the single Maund, and that the nine pounds wanting by the Emelia was returned by the Master. The Naique of Maduras forces having passed the wall of Towall, & marched to Cotata, has put the Country of Travancore into such Confusion, as they apprehend they shall be in want of another Officer and desire Ensign Cheesbrough may be sent them. They likewise advise that the French landed at Coletchy from Two Ships and a Grab, above One hundred European Soldiers & Officers, and as the Dutch have five Ships there, it is apprehended some blows will happen between them.

The French at Coletchy.

We observe that the Loss of weight in that Pepper is most likely to have happen'd on board, as most of what came by the Adventure was shott in the Hold: That by the Emelia being in Bags wanted but fifteen pounds at the first weighing, but the Master delivering Six pound which he found loose in the Hold, it was included upon drawing out the Short Delivery. The Rice consigned them by those Vessels was sent on board in good Package, nor did the Masters make any Objections or Complaint of its being otherwise.

A French Munchua Anchors at the mouth of Billiapatam River.

Received a Letter from the Commanding Officer at Madacarra advising that the Day before a Munchua anchor'd at the mouth of the River within Reach of the Guns; and not sending ashore, or shewing any Colours he fired a Shot at her, when she hoisted French Colours & stood out to Sea.

RECEIVED a Letter of yesterday's Date from Pedro Rangell whom Domingos Rodriguez had sent to Madday to get Intelligence of the French proceedings with the Canarees. He now writes the Chief that a French Gentleman of Council and an Officer with fifteen Soldiers & their Linguist, as likewise a number of Moors had been there three days, & made very considerable Presents, when they were dismissed & returned. That Surapaya Ordered him to advise us, that the French had made many Propositions & Promises to him, but we might be assured that so long as the Honble Company continued in Friendship with the King of Bednure, those of any other Nation would not obtain any Priviledges to their prejudice. Pedro Rangell likewise added that by good Intelligence, he is assured the French offer'd to assist the Canarees against Prince Cunhi Homo, but it was rejected, & they obtained nothing more than a civil Dismission with Promises to write to the King of Bednure in their favour. Surapaya desired We would press the Prince to send the Elephants, and Pedro Rangell mentions that he beleives it would be a proper time to send the Present, formerly intended for the late King of Bednure, ordering the Person that goes with it to call at Madday and take a Letter from the General.

PEDRO RANGELL returned this day from the Cannaree General at Madday, and Thursday with him a person to receive the Two Elephants from Prince Cunhi Homo, which when deliver'd, Pedro Rangell was assured by the General, the Articles of Peace Pedro between the Cannarees & Prince Cunhi Homo should be deliver'd to the latter signed Rangell returns from by the present King of Bednure upon the Princes going to Madday to receive them. Maday. Pedro Rangell further relates that the Cannarees had sent back from Madday the greatest part of their horse, the General not doubting but we will prevail with the Prince to deliver the Elephants, and also for him to go and receive the Articles His relation of Peace; but if we could not, the General said plainly he must call in some Foreign between him Nation to settle in those parts for to protect that part of the Country from any & the Cannaattempts of Prince Cunhi Homo, in case we would not take it upon us.

IT appears, from the Transactions of the Cannarees, that they are very desirous Observations of lessening the Great Expence, they are obliged to be at, for maintaining an Cannarees. Army sufficient to Protect such part of the Princes Country as they Conquered in 1736, and which the Prince Granted to them by the Articles then Agreed upon between them, and interchanged; but those deliver'd by the Cannarees were Signed only by Surapaya (who was then General) and were to be Signed by the King likewise; but shortly after Surapaya was recalled and Raganaut took the Command of the Army, who broke those Articles, by renewing the War with the Prince. But upon the Death of the Old King Raganaut was recalled, and the Command of the Army given again to Surapaya, who now offers to deliver them, to the Prince, renewed and Signed by the Present King; but the Prince cannot yet be prevail'd upon to go and receive those Articles, notwithstanding his Rajadores promis'd in his Name He would, when Mr. Jeynson was at Madday.

That part of the Country, in the possession of the Cannarees, produces no Pepper or any other Commodity in demand for the Honble Company; but if any other European Nation were settled at Madday they would certainly drain the Country about Billiapatam (to which it is contiguous) of a great part of the Pepper We now procure in those parts.

By several Letters from Domingos Rodregues, concerning this affair, it appears the Prince is very averse to go to the Cannaree General or deliver the Elephants, which he took from the Cannarees in the first War and was to restore to them by the abovementioned Articles. but as a long delay, in this Affair, may be attended with very ill consequences to the Prince, as well as to the Honble Company, Mr. Wake this day wrote to Domingos Rodregues to represent them to the Prince, and to use his utmost endeavours, to prevail with him to comply. Mr. Wake likewise wrote the Cannaree General, giving him assurances that He was using his best endeavours with the Prince to come to a good accommodation with him, and had hopes of Success.

Domingos Rodregues returns from Billiapatam, who assures us that Prince Cunhi Homo cannot by any means be prevail'd upon to go to the Cannaree General, and receive the Articles, Signed by the present king of Bednure, alledging that the Cannarees broke the Articles Agreed upon in the Year 1736, & although the present is not a proper time, for him, to attempt the recovering that part of his Country, which they took from him, such may offer hereafter, however he gives his assurances, that out of his regard to the Honble Company, He will not molest the Cannarees, provided they do not disturb him. Observations on Domingo Roderiguez his Report.

TAKING into Consideration the report of Domingos Rodregues, in regard to Prince Cunhi Homo and the Cannarees, as Entered Yesterday, It is observed that Prince Cunhi Homo's going to the Cannaree General, to receive the Articles of Peace, which they broke, by entering the Prince's Country shortly after it was made, may be consider'd by him below his dignity; nor is four thousand Rupees, which Surapaya has engaged to pay us for the Prince, near the Value of the Two Elephants; whence the Prince might have some reason to stand out, provided he were in a Condition to defend himself against the Cannarees; but that He is not, without the Assistance of the Honble Company, which would create an Expence, We can by no means Answer to engage in, wherefore to prevent any new troubles, which would be extreamly hurtfull to our Honble Imployers Affairs, at this Settlement, it is incumbent upon us, to use our utmost endeavours to accomodate matters amicably between them; and as the Prince promises not to molest the Canarees, We may write Surapaya accordingly, who makes the restoring the Elephants a point of so much consequence and Honour, as he very probably may be satisfyed therewith, when Affairs may remain in a peaceable State whither the Prince receives his Articles of Peace or not.

WE have received of the Twelve thousand Rupees which the Cannarees are to pay, only one thousand Iccaree Pagodas or Three thousand five hundred Rupees. but as Domingo Rodregues will be indebted to Subesenoy about Seven thousand Rupees, which He engages to pay us and there being no doubt but that We shall receive

the remaining One thousand five hundred Rupees of Subesenoy; Mr. Wake proposes Domingo our paying Prince Cunhi Homo the four thousand Rupees, promised him by the Roiz order'd to Billia-Cannarees, upon his delivering the Two Elephants, and that Domingos Rodregues patam to return to Billiapatam with a Letter, from the Chief, to the Prince exhorting him to Confer with Prince Cuni comply upon such reasonable terms, which proposition is AGREED TO.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Chief and Factors at Anjengo dated the 11th. Instant by a Boat Express, also Duplicate of one from the Presidency of Bengall Letters from dated the 21st. of February.

The presidency [of] Bengall's Letter informs us of their having sent a party of Men to the of Bombay.

In the latter is acknowledged the receipt of our Letters to them of the 23d. & 25th. December last, with the Letters We then sent them from the Presidency of Bombay; they write that by the Calcutta Grab and Bermudas Sloop they had sent a Detachment to the Presidency of Bombay, under the Command of Lieutenant Nathaniel Jacobs and Ensign John Davis, who were Ordered to make the best of their way hither to receive our Directions for their better proceeding up to Bombay or otherwise as should be thought most proper. They were likewise

pleased to advise us of their dispatching our Honble Masters Ship Richmond directly for Great Brittain on the 3d. of February, of the Duke of Lorrain's arrival at Fort St. George on the 23d. of January from China, and of the Normingtons leaving Fort St. George on the 18th. as did the Shaftsbury Fort St. Davids on the 21st. for England.

The Letter, from the Chief and Factors of Anjengo informs us that the Bermudas Sloop arrived there on the 11th. Instant, when the Calcutta Grab was in the Offing, and not having any advices of them, they sent us Express the Presidency of Calcutta their Letter to us, and one for Bombay, that We might inform them what directions We had received in relation to those Vessels if through the lateness of the Season, they should not be able to reach this Settlement. By the Express boat they returned Ten of the Military We sent them at the beginning of this Monsoon.

The Marcar of the Boat informing us that they saw the Bermudas Sloop off The Bermu-Panany, and as the Weather is very moderate We may speedily expect her here.

That He was as zealous for the purport Interest of the French Copany as Mr. Wake appeared to be for that of the English, by preventing the Fishing boats of Myhie entering our river. That He should take all just and convenient measures to preserve the Commerce of his Company in Tranquility and safety, & waited to be Honour'd with an Answer. To which Mr. Wake made the following reply in the Portuguese Language Vizt.

To MR. DIROIS CHIEF OF MYHIE.

SIR

I have been Hond. with a Letter from you, to advise me of an English The Chief of Munchuas being in Cota River, that I may Order her away immediatly.

Answer'd.

On the 10th. Instant, I sent a Munchua into that River, on the Service of the Honble United English East India Company, where they have the right and Priviledge of a free liberty of Commerce, which none can impead except the Samorine; wherefore I admire you consider this transaction as any thing new.

The commerce in the Rivers, to the Northward of this place, belongs solely to the Honble United English East India Company and to no other Nation, notwithstanding which, when any that are not under the protection of the said Company, wants any necessaries, I allways oblige them, provided I am satisfied upon whose and what Account it is they send into those Rivers.

MONDAY 21st. The Munchua arrives from Cota River. ARRIVED the Munchua, mentioned in the Letter Entered Yesterday which belongs to Robert Adams, a Topass and Inhabitant of this place in the Honble Company's pay, who had a Certificate granted him at the beginning of the Monsoon for the term of it, to which the Honble Company's Seal was prefixed as usual, for We then had not received Orders from our Superiours at Bombay to give Certificates without prefixing the Seal.

The French Treatment of said Munchus.

We, being in want of Olas (the French having prevented any coming to us through the Nombiers Country) sent this small Munchua into Cota River to fetch some; and as they were for the use of the Honble Company, We gave the Munchua English Colours, and Ordered a Topass Soldier to go in her, and she Anchor'd in Cota River on the 19th, and recd. some Olas on board from the Northern side of the River, and was to receive more from Cota which is on the Southern side; but on the 20th, about two oClock in the afternoon three Toneys with a French Serjeant, Eighteen European Soldiers and a Topass from Myhie, entered Cota River and the Serjeant with all the Soldiers boarded the Munchua. The Serjeant demanded of the Muccadum his Passport which was deliver'd him, when He opened it and put it in his Pocket, and Ordered the Muccadum instantly to go out of the River with his Munchua and proceed to Myhie, the Muccadum reply'd He then could not get out of the river by reason it was strong tide of flood, then the Serjeant Ordered the Toneys, He came in, to take the Munchua in Tow, which they did but could not get her out; wherefore they came to an Anchor, 'till the tide of Ebb was made, when the Serjeant Ordered the Muccadum to weigh his Anchor and to proceed to Myhie, which He did. The Muccadum would have Hoisted the English Colours but the Serjeant would not permit him. The French Military continuing on Board 'till the Munchua Entered Myhie river, when the Serjeant only went ashore with the Passport, and deliver'd it to the Serjeant Major who carried it (as the People of the Munchua believes) to the French Chief, and on his return He deliver'd it to the Topass Soldier and Ordered the French Soldiers from the Munchua on shore, when the French Linguister in the Portuguese language, Ordered those of the Munchua immediatly to carry her out of the river, which they did and on their arrival here gave us this relation.

So late in the Season as it is at present, bad weather has often happened on this Coast; and although it should continue fair, it will be with difficulty for any Vessel that does not row to get to the Northward, the Northwest winds now blow fresh and will in all probability continue to do so 'till the South West Monsoon sets in, which generally is with such bad Weather, as renders it very hazardous for even good The Detatches Ships to be upon the Coast, more especially near in shore. We are advised by ment on this shing boats that the Bermudas Sloop was yesterday on this side Callicutt; but there Grab & Grab & was no advice of the Calcutta Grab at Callicutt Yesterday; and if she does not sail Bormudas well it will be impossible for her to gain any Ground to the Northward against the Sloop, Orders in Wind and Currant. From these Considerations it appears to us imprudent for the regard to Calcutta Grab & Bermudas Sloop, with the Detachment on Board them, to attempt Francisco gaining their passage to Bombay this Season, wherefore It is RESOLVED that Fran-Dias. cisco Dias, at Callicutt, be Directed to dispatch a Munchua down the Coast, as low as Chittoa, to meet the Grab and take on Board from her the Military, with such other directions as are necessary for bringing the People hither; and that a Letter be wrote to Cap<sup>t</sup>. John Beck, Commander of the Calcutta Grab, Ordering him to deliver them with their Accoutrements and Stores, and return to Calcutta if He finds any difficulty in getting to Callicutt for such necessaries as He may want; also that a Letter be wrote Lieutenant Jacobs, on this occasion, giving him proper directions for his proceeding hither with the Detachment under his Command. Ordered that those Letters be entered after this Consultation.

But as it is too late in the Season to proceed to Bombay, and even your Passage to Callicutt may be rendered precarious by contrary Winds, We therefore send this Munchua for you and the Detachment under your Command, and have wrote the Captain of the Vessel to supply you with five day's Provisions and Water, or in case He is short of Water, to deliver you a Couple of Empty Casks, which you can gett filled any where on shore.

If you meet with bad weather, you may putt ashore at Tannore and go by Land to Callicutt, where Francisco Dias, our Linguister, will supply you with Provisions and Boats to Convey you hither.

The Moorman, that delivers you this, will shew you the way, and provide necessaries for you and those under your Command, if you are obliged to come by Land.

To William Wake Esq<sup>b</sup>. CHIEF OF TELLICHERRY.

The Chief of Mahie his Letter.

Your sending a Munchua into the River of Cota is a new Usurpation upon the Commerce of the Company of France, which We will not suffer. The pretentions of the Honble English Company in that River cannot be with any foundation, because the Commerce there is reserved 'till this present time to the Company of France; of which none can be ignorant. Wherefore I sent the Munchua out of that River, being obliged to it for the security of our Commerce; and I will not suffer there in future any Vessels of yours.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. Thomas Purnell at Mangulore dated the 20th. WEDNES-Instant inclosing an Account of the Cost and Charges of Nine thousand and three Bales of Rice, which He had bought and sent hither. Also Inclosed Copy of a Letter, не wrote to the Honble President of Bombay, under the 10th. Instant by a Mr. Purnel'a Conveyance that offered thither from Onore, to which He referrs for the #ticulars purport of his transactions, in respect to the purchasing Pepper of Hur Comity at Onore; thereof. which are that He had bought of the said Hur Comity One hundred Candys of Five hundred and twenty pounds Averdupoiz at the rate of Ninety seven Rupees. Candy, upon it's being deliver'd at Mangulore clear of all Charges, and promised to send thither a greater Quantity before the rains, when the Honble Company might take it at that price or not as they thought proper. Also that He had Agreed with Hur Comity for Two hundred Candys more, at the rate of Eighty five Rupees \$\mathbb{H}\$ Candy, clear of all Charges, to be deliver'd to any Ship or Vessel that shall call for it at Onore in September next, and to be advanced now ten thousand Rupees on that Account.

In his Letter to us he requests Fifteen thousand Rupees may be sent him, which, with the Ballance remaining in his hands, will enable him to pay for the one hundred Candys purchased at Onore; and Advance Hur Comity Ten thousand Rupees for Two hundred Candys to be deliver'd in September. That He expected the Pepper from Onore every day, and the next day He should weigh off what was at Mangalore and send it hither.

IMPORTED the Bermudas Sloop Joachim Humphrys Master from Bengall. From Ditto her came on shore Lieutenant Nathaniel Jacobs with a Serjeant Corporall and fourteen Private Men belonging to the Bengall Detachment.

WROTE a General Letter to the Chief and Council of Myhie in Answer to that DITTO Mr. Wake received yesterday from Mr. Dirois. Our Letter was as follows Vizt.

## Sir & Sirs

Mr. Wake received a Letter of yesterday's date from Mr. Dirois, representing Our Letter that, by a New Usurpation on the Trade of your Company, a Munchua of ours had to the Chief entered Cota River, and that in future He should not suffer any of our Vessels to Mahie enter that River.

his Letter reced the 22d. Inst.

We are to acquaint you, that this is a right, among others, long since granted to the Honble English East India Company, by the Supreme Authority both of the Samorine and King of Colastree; and which We have enjoy'd to this hour, in common with others, without any Interruption.

We therefore with the greatest Justice and Propriety say, that your sending an Armed force, to strike the Colours of said Munchua, in which was a Topass Soldier, belonging to the Honble Company, obliging her to go out of the River, and afterwards carrying her into Myhie, where her Pass was produced and examin'd, is a flagrant Usurpation on the Trade and Priviledges of the Honble English East

Instant, wherefore It is AGREED that the Packet for the Presidency of Bombay from that of Bengall be opened; which being now done, and the General Letter read We find that the Calcutta Grab is upon the Establishment of Bombay, and the Bermudas Sloop is to be returned to Bengall. Inclosed was Invoice of Salt Petre, Account Currant, List of Stores &ca. necessary Papers relating to the Detachment.

The Master of the Bermudas Sloop being, now called in, and Examin'd in respect to the Condition and Sailing of the Grab, by whose relation it will be necessary to send boats to her assistance with proper tacle for towing and warping when it is Calm or little Wind, otherwise she being no extraordinary Sailer it will be impossible for her to gain any thing against the Currant and Contrary Winds wherefore It is Agreed that Francisco Dias be directed to send proper Assistance to the Commander of the Grab for getting her into Bypore River, it being so late in the Season. Although if she were here the River of Billiapatam would be more proper to stay the rains as the Vessel, would lie under the Command of the Fort of Madacarra.

A Letter being now wrote to Capt. John Beck containing Orders for his proceedings is now Read and Signed; and Ordered to be Entered after this Consultation.

Here being a Parcell of Coir belonging to the Gunner of Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George under the Direction of the Chief, who now proposing to Freight it thither on the Bermudas Sloop, leaving the Freight to be adjusted by the President and Council there, Crediting the Presidency of Bombay or this Settlement for the amount thereof IT is. It appearing by the Account Currant that, Lieutenant Jacobs received in Bengall One thousand Madrass Rupees, for the use of the Detachment, He is now called in and declares the President of Bengall did tell him He should have that Sum paid him, to purchase necessaries for the People if there was occasion, but did not receive any Sum whatsoever.

On the 22<sup>d</sup>. We wrote you to endeavour to gett to Callicutt but in case you found any difficulty therein to bear away for Anjengo for Provisions or proceed back to Calcutta.

Since when We find you and your Grab are upon the Establishment of Bombay, wherefore We hereby Order you to use your Utmost endeavours to get up to this Port but if you are no higher than Callicutt the 2<sup>d</sup>. of May, provided you have not a fair Wind to proceed hither, remain there, adviseing us immediatly how much Water your Grab draws and enquire of Francisco Dias our Linguister there whither or not you can with safety carry her into Bypore River without taking out the Salt Petre.

But in case you think it hazardous to go over the Bar with your Cargo and Stores, you may Land such a Quantity of the Salt Petre at Callicutt (which you are to deliver under the charge of Francisco Dias the Linguister there) so as to bring your Vessel to a proper depth of Water as you may proceed over with safety.

What assistance you may want apply to the Linguister for who has Our Orders to give you such as you shall judge necessary.

The President & Councils of Bombay's Letter read. Orders therein & Observations thereon.

OPENED and read a General Letter from the Presidency dated the 20<sup>th</sup>. Instant acknowledging the receipt of our Letters dated the 21<sup>st</sup>. Febry. 14<sup>th</sup>. & 21<sup>st</sup>. March.

In this Letter they are pleased to approve of our Contracts for Pepper for this Season, as they do not see how better could be made considering the embroil'd State of Affairs about us. Also approved of our imploying Mr. Purnell in default of a Covenanted Servant. Likewise approved hitherto of our Managem<sup>t</sup> in respect to the French, referring to the former Lattitude given us in respect to Expence for disappointing such designs of theirs as may be prejudicial to the Interest of our Honble Imployers.

Ordered to provide Ten thousand pounds weight of Cardamoms, recommending to us to adjust the price according to the goodness, before the time comes for Shipping them; that receiving Goods beneath the Musters or Standard is to be avoided as much as possible. The small peice of Gold sent by the Warwick touched no more than Ninety one and three quarters & approved of the Sale, but as the price is riseing they direct us to advise as it alters with us. Also not to dispose of the Sandal Wood for loss.

Ordered us not to provide any more Batavia Arrack at Cochin except We are assured it is very good. Received an Order upon the Chief to pay into the Treasury the Sum of Five thousand two hundred thirteen Rupees, one quarter and thirty five raes which Sum they have paid there to Mr. Horne. Received an Ensigns Commission for Mr. John Johnson. Directed us to procure One hundred Bolts of Hollands Duck to be sent up by the first Conveyance on the cheapest terms We can.

It is to be observed, that it has allways been the practice here to advance mony for Cardamoms, without agreeing or stipulating any price 'till after they are deliver'd, which practise is too difficult to be broke at present, as We are obliged to use all suitable means of obliging the Merchants who can Command those, of the Growth of the Hills, called Peria, which are esteemed Superiour to any other. What those Hills produce Annually is seldom more than what the Honble Company demand; and the last Year their whole produce was not sufficient, tho' We had them all. There is no Second or Third sort of Cardamoms of the Growth of the same place, and they are distinguished, in respect to their goodness, only by the Name of the Hills that produce them. The Dutch, and French more especially, use all underhand means of purchasing the Peria abovementioned, but are generally disappointed because they come through our Princes Dominions.

The piece of Gold mentioned in the Letter was a piece cut of from one of the Bars taken promiscuously out of the whole Parcell rece'd from the Harrington; which Parcell appeared to us to be all of one touch, and We supposed was Invoiced.

Capt. Henry Hoadlys Letter to the President & Council of Fort St. George was as follows.

### — APRIL 1740 —

To The Honble Richard Benyon Esq<sup>B</sup>.

President & Gov<sup>B</sup>. &c<sup>A</sup>. Council of Fort S<sup>T</sup>. George.

Honble Sir & Sirs

Capt Hoadleys Reasons for going to Fort St. George. I yesterday received a Letter from Mr. Secretary Savage by your Order demanding my reasons for coming in here not being consign'd hither, in obedience thereto I am to acquaint your Honr. &ca. that though I left the Downes the 9th. of August, I did not reach the Cape 'till the 25th. of November, where I put in agreable to my Instructions for refreshment to my People, who began to fall down with the Scurvey, I was necessarily detained thereby till the 8th. December, when I went on Board in Order to proceed on my Voyage for the Mallabar Coast, but a strong N.W. wind prevented my getting out till the 18th. I had not been long out when my People began again to fall down, and when I made the Island of Ceyloan the 27th. of March, I had buried four of my own People, & had forty six of them quite useless; of forty Soldiers I had for Bombay Six are dead, one deserted at the Cape, and the rest are in a miserable condition, and of Twelve Lascars I was ordered to bring out, Six are dead, and the rest are down.

We fell in with the Island about 7 leagues to the Et.ward of Dundrahead, & tried to beat it up, but the South West Wind, & Current so strong against us, that We found We had lost about Six Leagues that day, whereupon I called a Consultation of all my Officers, at which it being consider'd that in the condition We were in, it would be impossible to gain our Passage to the Mallabar Coast, that the hands We then had, were not sufficient to weigh our Anchors, should We be obliged to make use of one, or to work the Ship, and even those daily falling down, it was unanimously Agreed to be absolutely necessary for the safety of the Ship and the Lives of our people to bear away for this Port, where I have buried three Men since my arrival, and am obliged to land all the Soldiers, and almost all my own people in order to their recovery. I am.

Sundry Pepper Merchants arrive here, Our Conference with them.

Ballortee Callandra of Billiapatam, Also Baccadem Chandu and Neyen Ellea Chettian come now to adjust their Accounts of New Pepper deliver'd us this Season, which they have purchased at various prices to the Northward. At the beginning of the Season We broke the price of Pepper, at the rate of seventy eight Rupees & Candy, conformable to the Agreement made with the French at Myhie, as mentioned under various dates in our Diary, as is likewise how their unfair proceedings thereon obliged us to give all our Merchants a liberty of advancing in price, as is fully specified in Consultation of the 23d. of February. We have, from time to time, carefully observed what prices Pepper bore in the several Bazars where these Merchants purchase at, and the Quantities deliver'd to certain times; from whence We compute that the whole Quantity of Pepper purchased this Season about Agar and Billiapatam 'till this day (where it has been from Seventy six to eighty five Rupees & Candy) upon a Medium have cost the Merchants somewhat more than Eighty one Rupees # Candy, by such time as they weigh it off into Warehouse here; wherefore it is now proposed that their Accounts be made up at the rate of Eighty three Rupees & Candy which (as two Rupees Proffitt is sufficient for the Merchants as mony has been advanced them as they wanted it) Is AGREED TO; and the abovementioned Merchants are now acquainted with the same.

Money Advanced for Pepper. Ballorte Callandra now assuring us that one of the Country Merchants has inland ready weig'd off Fourteen Candys, fifteen maunds and two pounds of Pepper, which, with Charges in bringing hither, will stand him in full Eighty six Rupees & Candy, but at which rate He consents to deliver it in September next (but He cannot now on Acc<sup>t</sup>. of the bad Weather) and which We being well assured of, It is Agreed that the Sum of One thousand two hundred sixty eight Rupees three quarters and forty raes be now adv<sup>d</sup>. him out of the Treasury on said Account.

Mr. Purnel delivers in his Accounts of Pepper & Rice purchased by him.

Mr. Thomas Purnell now Delivers in his Accounts of Rice and Pepper, purchased at Mangulore and Onore, Also his Account of House hire & Expences, with Travelling Charges, from the Twenty first of February to the eleventh Instant, amounting to Rupees One hundred thirty nine one quarter and seventy four raes. Likewise Hur Comitys Obligation for the delivery of Two hundred Candys of Pepper to be deliver'd in September next as specified in Consultation on the 1st. Instant.

A Gratuity allow'd Mr. Purnel. His Accounts upon a due examination are found to be just, whereby it appears there is a Ballance due to him of One hundred forty one Rupees and sixty raes, The Sum of what has been Invested amounts to Rupees Forty six thousand nine hundred ninety two and eighty five raes, and the whole of his Transactions, being satisfactory, & as his Expences are frugal they are allowed as charged in his Account IT IS THEREFORE AGREED that the Sum of four hundred Rupees be allowed him and his Assistant Francisco D'Sousa, for their care and trouble, and that the Paymaster pays him the same with the Ballance of his Account, both which Sums amounts to Rupees Five hundred forty one and sixty raes.

Emi. Vass's Bill of Charges dd. in & A gratuity allow'd him. Emanoel Vass gives in his Account of Cooly hire & Expences with the Presant to the King of Bednure, amounting to Rupees Two hundred eleven and twenty raes which, appearing reasonable IT IS AGREED that the Paymaster pays him that Sum with One hundred more for an extraordinary Expence that He was at in Cloths and for his trouble.

Old Remains of Pepper in the Wareho. weigh'd & our Resolution in consequence thereof. The Warehouse being near clear of old Pepper, and the New having not been mixed with it, the Warehousekeeper has taken the opportunity of weighing the remains, which after cleaning is no more than Fifty seven Candys, ten maunds by which it appears by our Books that there has been damaged and lost in weight Fifty nine Candys, seven maunds and eight pounds more than has been allowed on

the several Invoices for Seven Years past. Since when 'till now the remains has We are sensible that the greatest part of the loss proceeds from not been adjusted. the dampness of the Walls, in the Wet Season, to which the Pepper sticks and rots, and as it may be prevented by lining or casing the Rooms with Plank, which is the method taken by the Country People, IT is Resouved that the same be laid before our Superiours at Bombay for their approbation; And as We are not in the least suspicious of this deficiency's arising from any fraud or neglect IT is Agreed that the Sum of Three thousand nine hundred seventy seven Rupees one quarter and thirty seven raes be wrote off to Proffitt and Loss being the amount of said deficiency of Fifty nine Candys seven maunds and eight pounds at sixty seven Rupees \* Candy which is the rate the remains of Old Pepper stands charged at on our Books, but is less than the prime cost as some of the Invoices have been over rated.

Examin'd and Passed the following Accounts as Entered after this Consultation Monthly Viz<sup>t</sup>. The General Paymaster his Account of Disbursments for the month of Accounts April. Also the Warehousekeeper and Storekeeper their Accounts of receipts and Issues for said month; with the latters Account Sale for the months of February March and April. Likewise the Account of Pepper deliver'd into the Honble Company's Warehouse last month.

The Chief now relates to the Board a complaint made to him by Muicarra A Consider, Nayr, who is Head Nayr of a small District called Muicarra, about the Hill of called Andolla Malla, and Borders upon the River, which separates it from the King of Mucarra Cotiotes Country Eastward, the Nombiers Country Southward and on Coringodas desires the Protecta, of the Ho. Country Westward.

Company.

· Muicarra Nayr is under the Protection of the Honble Company in the same Consultation manner as Narrangport Nayr; has the Companys Arms for Ten of his Nayrs, and is to bring Thirty more when called upon as the Companys Service may require. He now complains that Coringoda Nayr had sent for him several times, and when He, at last, went to him, the said Coringoda told him to stop the Communication between Choudar (in the Nombiers Country) and Tellicherry, and to take away the Bridge of Corumballe for that purpose, which as He said was by Order of the Chief of Myhie, and withall threatned Muicarra Nayr, that in case He did not comply, He should be compelled thereto by force, which the said Muicarra Nayr being very apprehensive of, earnestly requested of our Chief to send a Party of Soldiers to his Assistance. and to supply him with Fifteen Arms for his Nayrs which He hoped would be sufficient to protect him from any insults.

& Resolution thereon.

The passage, in the District of Muicarra intended to be stopped, leads into the Nombiers country, and through it into that of Boyanore; as also into the King of Cotiotes Country, out of all which, more especially the first and last mentioned Countrys, We receive very considerable Quantities of Pepper, & are chiefly supply'd with Provisions and other necessaries, which this Settlement will be depriv'd of to the great prejudice of the Honble Companys Interest if the said Passage through the District of Muicarra & likewise over the River into the King of Cotiote's Country is not kept open and free. Wherefore It is Resolved that Muicarra Nayr be Protected, for the better keeping the Communication between these parts and Choudar open and free, as it has hitherto been. Also that the Chief writes Mr. Dirois letting him know that Muicarra Nayr being under the Protection of the Honble Company, We shall accordingly protect him from any insults. ORDERED that the Storekeeper Issues out fifteen Arms to Muicarra Nayr.

Observations on [the] above Letter. For some days past We have had reports of the French having some disputes with Boyanore, but what is mentioned of Prince Cunhi Homo (Cherical Tamban) his making any Treaty with Boyanore is entirely without the least foundation and nothing but mere invention, although the French Chief in his Letter makes it a pretext for stopping the passages in and about the District of Muicarra. His alledging that the District of Muicarra belongs to Coringoda is in all respects as false and rediculous; Muicarra and Coringoda Nayrs, with some few other Heads of small Districts, being entirely independent of each other, and all Subordinate to Prince Cunhi Homo.

"That the District of Muicarra, belonging to Coringoda Nayr, your Company has a right of laying under the same Prohibition, and is in a Capacity of maintaining the Orders which you have given."

To which I reply,

That there was such a Treaty made I never heard but from yourself, tho' I do not pretend to know all the Prince of Cherica's Transactions, I am firmly perswaded, and, I think, I can with certainty, say that such a Treaty never existed but in your own imagination. You have many times heretofore mentioned, in your Letters, several Transactions of Domingos Rodregues which had not the least foundation, no more than the cheve mentioned. foundation, no more than the above mentioned; which is so entirely groundless and contrary to truth, as I desire Sir you will not in future trouble me with such errant inventions, but confine yourself to such matters only as you can prove, or such as are at least probable.

You are actually deceived in respect to the District of Muicarra it's belonging to Coringoda Nayr. It does not belong to Coringoda Nayr, any more than that of Coorechy does to Muicarra Nayr, and as the latter is under the Protection of the Honble English East India Company, I have sent a Party of Soldiers to defend him against any insults. But admitting the District of Muicarra did belong to Coringoda Nayr, how can you, without a Breach of the Articles of the 9th. of March 1728, entered into between the Gentlemen of Myhie and this place pretend to make a stoppage of Merchandize or Provisions coming hither? It is what you cannot do with justice.

This morning the Chief sent Lieutenant Thomas Fisher with a Guard of Wednes-Twelve Men to view the Situation in and about the District of Muicarra, who being DAY 11TH. returned reported that the Hill of Andolla Malla, in that District, entirely Commands those parts; and receiving information that the French were assembling their Nayrs An Officer &ca. We Ordered a Serjeant and sixteen Men to take possession of it; but in the Soldiers Evening receiving certain advice, that the French were sending that way One sent to hundred of their Military with some Moors and People, belonging to Coringoda Nayr, Andola Malla. We instantly dispatch'd Ensign Christopher Bilderbeck with a Party consisting of Thirty seven Men, including Serjeants and Corporalls; The Chief at the same time giving him Orders to proceed immediatly to the Hill of Andolla Malla and to Hoist our Colours, and defend it against whomsoever might Attack him giving him the sole Command of all the Military there and in Muicarra.

THURS-DAY 12TH, CANDIL NAYE, who is the Head of some few Nayrs in the District of Muicarra, now requesting eight Small Arms may be deliver'd to him, and obliging himself to supply the Honble Company with Twenty Armed Nayrs, on all occasions, in like manner as Narranport Nayr, they are accordingly issued out to him.

The Chief acquaints the Board that the 3d. King of Cotiote, has, by our Linguister, informed him that He is desirous of meeting him this day at Chittiella, on this side Codoly River; His business is to propose entering into a friendly engagement with the Honble Company, for supplying them with such a Number of Armed Nayrs as shall at any time be requir'd of him; We giving them, when on Service, only the usual allowance of four measures of Rice and one sixteenth part of a Fanam Piem, and the Honble Company to assist him, in case of his being oppressed with such necessaries as He may want Vizt. Ammunition and Rice He paying or giving security for the amount of the same.

Character of the above Prince. This Prince being a remarkable, moderate and just Man, has a great influence over the Heads of his Country, in so much as to prevent the 1st. King from committing many Acts of Oppression and Cruelty towards his Subjects, & unjustly warring against his Neighbours. The last mentioned is greatly Indebted to the French Company and has allways been in their Interest and formerly given this Settlement great disturbance; Wherefore it has been judged consistent with the Honble Companys Interest to be upon good terms with the 3d. King (the 2d. being in a manner incapacitated) even to supplying him with a moderate Sum of mony if his Service had requir'd it.

Reasons for the Chief's meeting him. Ever since the French have been settled at Myhie they have from their situation prevented our getting any, or but very little Pepper out of the Country of Boyanore which has in a great measure been in subjection to them altho' indeed now they are at varience, but We apprehend it will terminate in their total Subjection. At a Prodigious Expence they the last Year brought the Nombiers to Submit likewise, and notwithstanding in the last Investment We did not feel any very considerable alteration therefrom in respect to Quantity, yet their Fortifying in so many parts of their Country must in time have a very bad influence over them likewise, and had they succeeded in their late attempt upon the District of Muicarra and the Passages adjacent that lies between the Nombiers and Cotiote's Country's the French would have been Masters of half the Pepper Trade in these parts; And it appears that in case the King of Cotiote (who's Country lies on the back of that of our Prince) cannot be diverted at any time from joining those Powers that are under the influence of the French, He (Prince Cunhi Homo) would soon be reduced, the bad consequence of which need not be mentioned.

The great probability there now is of a War with France, being likewise consider'd in which case doubtless the French at Myhie will openly assist the Country Powers in alliance with them and make War upon our Prince, in which if the King of Cotiote is diverted from joining, the Prince may with such assistance as Wecan give him oppose all the other Powers.

It may be expected as before mentioned that the 3<sup>d</sup>. King at M<sup>r</sup>. Wakes interview with him, will request a loan of mony which is indeed forbid by our Honble Imployers in several of their Commands, but when upon emergent occasions it

appears that moderate Sums may be lent without any likelyhood of a loss ensuing and that it is for the benifit or Security of their Trade it may be presumed they will even expect their Orders in such Cases should be dispensed with.

After duly perusing the Instructions of our Superiours at Bombay in their Letter of the 20th, of April last for our behaviour in respect to assisting the Country Powers and reflecting on the foregoing remarks upon the present situation of Affairs in the several Governments about us, and the methods the French are prosecuting at a prodigious expence to Subject them which if effected will inevitably very greatly prejudice and deminish the Honble Companys Trade and Priviledges in these parts, and it appearing to us that the preventing the King of Cotiote's joining the French Interest may very probably disappoint their designs which a good Understanding between the 3d. King of Cotiote and this Settlement may Effect, Wherefore It is AGREED that the Chief makes the most proper Agreement with the 3d. King of Cotiote that He can for his not joining with any of the Honble Companys Enemys, but on the contrary when requested to assist them against such as may be so, and if it appears necessary, to lend him any Sum not exceeding four thousand Rupees.

THE Chief goes to Chettiella with a Guard of Seventy Private Men, Commanded DITTO by a Lieutenant and an Ensign.

Last Night the Chief returned from the 3d. King of Cotiote and gives the follow- The Chief ing relation of what Passed between them and of the Verbal Agreement made with returns from meethim in behalf of the Honble Company.

Cotiote.

After the customary compliments were past the King related the Seizures and Conference Oppressions the 1st. King had made upon his Subjects which for some few Years them & past He had generally prevented by giving all such of them Protection as deserved Resolution it of him: and at such times as the King wanted to enter into unjust Wars with his thereon. it of him; and at such times as the King wanted to enter into unjust Wars with his Neighbours, He influenced the Heads of the People in such manner as the 1st. King could only Command about Three hundred Nayrs and such Moors as were his Creatures, by which means He preserved the Country in Tranquility; but as the King from the influence the French had over him might call to his aid such Assistance as might distress the Country, without He (the 3d. King) could be Supply'd with Powder, Ball and Rice, and also with some mony if his occasions requir'd, which mony should be justly repaid and the amount of Ammunition &ca. paid for. And in case the Honble Company would in this manner supply him the 3d. King

He would engage to supply them with Two thousand Armed Nayrs or more whenever demanded of him to Act against any of the Honble Company's Enemies or in such manner as they should direct; The Company giving them four measures of Rice and one sixteenth of a Fanam P Diem which is the usual allowance.

What the 3<sup>d</sup>. King offered on his part being all that was necessary to be requir'd of him, the Chief in behalf of the Honble Company engaged to supply him, in case He should be Attaked by any of the Country Powers with Ammunition and Rice He paying for the same, and if [h]is Affairs should require it, with a moderate Sum likewise.

According to their forms of Government the 3<sup>d</sup>. King cannot sign any written Agreement of this Nature, wherefore this Agreement was Verbally declared before the said 3<sup>d</sup>. Kings Rajadores or Ministers the Chief & Linguister being present, when the Chief made the King and his Ministers Presents to the amount of Rupees One hundred thirty four, one quarter and sixty raes; And He presented the Chief with a Gold Manilla value Six Venetians; and mony to the Servants with him. Which Agreement being conformable to Consultation of Yesterday is APPROVED OF

I learnt this morning that you have taken possession of the Hill of Andolla Malla, belonging to Coringoda Nayr, who to this time hath given you no reason to treat him as an Enemy, and to oblige you to pass the Limits that were accorded you by the Treaty of 1728. Your procedure is altogether contrary thereto; and since you have not been accustomed for a long time past to break in upon it, in the manner that all your late actions have done, we believe that the reports you spread, in the Country, in respect to the War between France and England are well grounded. If this be the case, your Conduct does in nothing surprize us. Providence has happily placed in our hands the means of defending ourselves, and We shall employ them.

Nevertheless, as We have no certain advice of the War, your Hostilities on the Country of Coringoda Nayr are too early, and We cannot comprehend the reasons of them, We presume that you mean to disturb us in the War We have with Boyanores Mother; Howsoever this may be; to avoid running the risques of uncertainty (the Country of Coringoda Nayr being under the Protection of the Company of France) We give you Notice that We are sending a Detachment to Polery, and that We are there hoisting the French Flag.

It is not the manner in which you impose silence on me by your Letter of yesterday, that shall make me hold my Tongue, in regard to a Treaty so certain and so flagrant as that in Question, and of which you give me proofs by your

manner of acting. It is a long time that We have been informed of all the Transactions of Domingos Rodregues. All his proceedings with Boyanores Mother, and other Princes of the Country cannot be so secret but that We are apprized of them. If We are in Peace you ought to Answer to us for the Conduct of that Man.

THE Chief wrote the following Letter to Mr. Dirois in answer to his Letter Dirro received Yesterday Vizt.

To Dirois Esq<sup>R</sup>.

CHIEF OF MYHIE.

SIR

I received your Letter dated the 12th. Instant, which from the groundless Mr. Wakes assertions in many of your former does not at all surprize me.

Monsr. Dirois.

You sir know that the Hill of Andolla Malla never belonged to Coringoda Nayr, and that you were the occasion of our giving ourselves the trouble of taking possession of it by your Ordering Coringoda Nayr to stop the communication of those parts.

I never spred a report of there being a War between our Two Nations, and upon our being advised, by those you call your Enemys, of yourself having declared there was, I informed them there was none that I knew of.

We have not offended or prejudiced Coringoda Nayr in any one single particular, nor can you make appear to the contrary, or that We have not stricktly observed the Agreement made in 1728 between our two Settlements.

You cannot take Coringoda Nayr solely under the Protection of your Company, because by those very Articles he is equally under the Protection of both our Company's.

In my Letter to you dated the 11th. I wrote you that I believed there was no Agreement made between the Prince of Cherica, and the Mother of Boyanore and I now know there is not any. If your suspicions of it, or your repeated Chimeras, concerning Domingos Rodregues, are your only motives for engaging in a War against her (in which We have not nor shall be so idle as to interpose) I can only say that I am sorry you give yourself so much trouble without any cause.

ORDERED Seventy Caliquilone Moors to the Hill of Punella Malla, giving the Officer of Putinha Orders, first to Challenge any Armed Men that came upon it or within the Limits of the Fort, and Order them to retire, which if they did not obey to fire upon them and drive them out of our Limits.

SUNDAY 15TH.

ORDERED Fifteen Caliquilone Moors to Patrole in the Night between this Place and Moylan.

MONDAY

SENT Two Guns to Terra Malla Vizt. one four pounder and One two pounder 1678. with Ammunition.

TUESDAY 17TH. Advice of the French having hoisted their Colours under our Cannon of Andola.

EARLY this morning the Chief received a Letter from Ensign Christopher Bilderbeck, advising that in the Night the French had made a lodgment under our Guns, upon a rising Ground where they had fired a Volly of small Arms and Hoisted their Colours, but if it was thought proper to send him Orders He could easily drive them away, as He believed there was not above Sixteen Soldiers with the Officer, but there was a great many Nayrs, and that they were intrenching themselves.

TUESDAY 17TH. Orders sent to our Officer at Andola Malla.

This morning the Chief wrote an Order to the Commanding Officer at Andolla Malla, immediatly, upon receipt of which, He is to send a Serjeant with a Drum to the place where the French Colours were Hoisted, and to declare to the Officer or whomsoever Commanded there, that if He did not strike the French Colours and depart with those under his Command, within the space of one Hour, they should be fired upon and treated in all respects like Enemys. and to Fire upon them accordingly from Andolla Malla advising him that Capt. Fisher would be with him with a reinforcement before the Hour was out, whom upon his arrival He was to Obey as his Superiour Officer.

TUESDAY 17TH. with a party of men sent to Andola Malla.

LEAST the French should be more numerous than We were informed, or speedily receive a reinforcement, the Chief Ordered Capt. Thomas Fisher, with Thirty Capt. Fisher five Private men and Petty Officers, immediatly to march to Andolla Malla; and upon his arrival there to take upon him the Chief Command, obeying such Orders as the Officer, now there, was to deliver him; and further, that if he did not perceive that the French retired, upon their being fired at from the Hill, to Order Ensign Bilderbeck, with a Party of fifty Soldiers and two hundred Nayrs and Tiveys to

attack them; and treat them in all respects like common enemys; but in case He found that force was not sufficient, to annoy them with the Guns from the Hill, to prevent the French from intrenching; and advise what was necessary hither when He should receive further Orders.

RECEIVED advice this afternoon, from Capt. Thomas Fisher, that the French TUESDAY having had notice given them to retire, but not complying therewith, nor upon being fired at with our Great Guns at Andolla, altho' very much annoyed thereby He Detached Ensign Bilderbeck with Fifty Soldiers and two hundred Armed Nayrs and the French Tiveys to Attack them, which He performed. As our Men Marched through the proceedings, Verges (it being impracticable for Trees Ditches and Bushes to March directly thereon. from the Hill) the French fired briskly upon them, but so soon as they got near the Entrenchment, the French cutt down their Colours and with their Nayrs retired with great haste to Chatotee in Coringoda Nayrs Country; He likewise advises that the French had about Thirty of their Military and two or three hundred Armed Nayrs, also Three hundred Cooleys for throwing up an Intrenchment in which by about a 11 in the morning they had made a considerable Progress, which as soon as demolish'd Mr. Bilderbeck would retire to the Hill of Andolla, We had two Nayrs wounded in the Skirmish and one of them mortally; but what loss the Enemy sustain'd was not known.

This afternoon, a Serjeant and Drum came hither from Myhie, with a General Ditto Letter dated the 28th. Inst. which was concluded with Protesting, Translate of DIE which is as follows.

## GENTLEMEN

The several reasons, which you have given us, to justify your Conduct, when Monst. you took possession of the Hill of Andolla Malla, are too bad pretexts to be able to Council satisfy us, and are not sufficient to remove the suspicions, which your Conduct ought their Letter to excite in us; It is therfore to shelter Coringoda Nayr from your insults, and to & protest. prevent your ill designs against us, that We have posted ourselves on the Hill of Mallaparacunna. We did not hoist the French Flag there, 'till after a Donation was made us of it, by the Proprietors, from whom you have usurped, (Contrary to the Laws of Nations, and without regard to the faith of Treaties) the Hill from whence you are now firing upon our Flag. Your rash proceedure may well surprize us; nor is it regular; since your commanding Officer, when He sent a Serjeant and a Drum to Summon our Detachment, to withdraw our Colours, that were upon that Hill, ought to have waited, before He committed any Act of Hostility, for the arrival of the Orders which the Serjeant expected from Myhie in the manner that He required. Whatever may be the consequence, We advise you, Gentlemen, that We will not withdraw our Colours, untill you shall have withdrawn yours as also your Cannon from the Hill of Andolla Malla, and We Protest against you Mr. Wake and your Council as Agressors and render you responsible for all the evil that may from hence arise.

Ensign Bilderbeck having leveled the Intrenchments on the Hill of Malla-Wednessparacunna, but better known by the Name of Muicarra Candil Paramboo which the French had thrown up, retired to Andolla.

DAY 18TH.

DISPATCHED a General Letter to the French Chief and Council at Myhie in THURS-Answer to theirs received the 17th. Instant. Also inclosed Translate in the Portuguese Language of our Chiefs Letter to Coringoda Nayr of this date. The former is as follows.

DAY 19TH. • The French Letter & protest, answer.

To Mr. Dirois Chief for Affairs OF THE COMPANY OF FRANCE &CA. COUNCIL AT MYHIE.

#### GENTLEMEN

WE received your Letter dated the 28th. of June N.S. in which you Protest The Answer against us for our Conduct at Andolla Malla, in driving your People off the Ground French of Muicarra Candil Nayr (who is under the Protection of the Honble English East Letter & India Company) where your Colours were hoisted under our Cannon at the said protest. Andolla Malla.

You will please to observe, that our Commanding Officer there first sent a Serjeant and a Drum to summon your People to retire from that Post in an hours time, or He should be obliged to disloge them by force of Arms, but they continuing still in the Post after the expiration of the limitted time, He did accordingly oblige them to retire, together with such Nayrs as were assembled with your People in an Hostile Manner.

As the hoisting the Colours of one Nation, under the Cannon of another, is never permitted, so We have Acted nothing contrary to the Laws of Nations in removing them. You then were the Violators of the Laws of Nations, as well as the Agressors who planted them there and sent a Military force to defend them.

It is before remarked, that the spot where your Colours were Hoisted belongs to Muicarra Candil Nayr. From whence your pretended Donation comes, is not to our purpose to enquire. We are certain it does not come from Muicarra Candil Nayr, the true and rightfull Proprietor.

#### *– JUNE 1740 –*

We assure you Gentlemen We have no intentions of disturbing you, Coringoda Nayr or any other of the Country Powers except it be, in the just Defence of our Companys unalienable rights and Priviledges, which We will not suffer to be invaded by any Power whatsoever. But as We understand Coringoda Nayr is making preparations to attack Muicarra and Candil Nayrs, We do now advise both you and him, that We shall Protect those Nayrs against such his Attacks, and treat him, in all respects, as an open Enemy; nor ought you to Protect or any ways assist him against us, in such his disturbance of the Publick Tranquility, unless you mean a direct violation of the Articles of 1727/8.

The Chiefs Letter to Coringoda Nayr was as follows.

Mr. Wakes Letter to Curinghodo Nayr.

I wrote you on the 17th. Instant, to which you have not returned an Answer. I now a second time advise you, that as you have called Muicarra Nayr three times and threatned him in case He did not impede the free passage of Pandocal hither, the French would send their People and oblige him to it; wherefore I was obliged to send some of the Honble Companys Soldiers with English Colours to keep the said way open and free, not only to us, but to all in general as usual.

It is not our Interests, in any manner, to molest you or any others, yet I have notice you had the presumption the other day; which you still continue, to molest Muicarra and Candil Nayrs, who are in our pay and carry our Arms. I now tell you that We do not, nor intend to disturb you, if you do not molest us or those under our Protection, and should you act otherwise We shall proceed against you as an open Enemy. We have likewise advised the Chief of Myhie to this purport.

THURS-DAY 19TH. Nairs wrote for to the 3d.

THE French still keeping their People at Chatote in Coringoda's Country the Chief wrote a Letter to the 3d. King of Cotiote to send one hundred of his Armed Nayrs to Andolla Malla and for them to follow such Orders as they should receive from our Commanding Officer there.

TO THE HONBLE MB. DUMAS GOVERNOUR &CA. COUNCIL AT PONDICHERRY.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

The transactions and proceedings of Mr. Dirois, your Chief at Myhie, and his Our Letter Council, have been such, for about Ten months past, as are in many respects contrary to the litteral intent and meaning of the Articles Agreed on, between the Council of Gentlemen presiding at Myhie and this place, in the year 1727/8 and approved and Pondicherry. ratified by their respective Superiours at Pondicherry and Bombay but more especially a late proceeding of theirs, directly repugnant to the known Laws of Nations, obliges us to have recourse, in this manner, to your Honr. &ca., in order to prevent, as far as in us lies, the confusion that must necessarily ensue, if not timely prevented, by such prudent Orders and Instructions, as you may think proper to send to your Gentlemen at Myhie.

At the beginning of their late Commotions with the Nombiers, Mr. Wake used his best and most friendly endeavours for accomodating them, and twice brought the Nombiers to accept of such terms as Mr. Dirois and himself had previously Agreed upon. But when these terms were again communicated to Mr. Dirois He would not accede to them.

During these troubles We were charged by Mr. Dirois with sending a Captain and a Military force to the assistance of the Nombiers, supplying them with mony, Arms &ca. which We never did nor can the same be proved by any single Instance.

But as We have sent our Superiours at Bombay true and just Copys of all the Letters, which passed between us relating to those Affairs (and We hope Mr. Dirois &ca. have done the like, in a faithfull manner to your Honr. &ca.) We need not here make any further mention of them; but proceed to lay before you, truly and impartially all that relates to their late Transaction abovementioned.

The Chief here, having due information that Mr. Dirois had caused to be stopt the Communication between us and Choudar, thereby impeding all Merchandize and

Provisions coming hither from those and the Adjacent parts, wrote Mr. Dirois under the 9<sup>th</sup>. Instant O.S. on that Subject Copy of which Letter goes under No. 1 as does Mr. Dirois's Answer to it under No. 2.

In this Answer Mr. Dirois asserts, that our Linguist had assisted at a Treaty between the Prince of Cherica & Boyanore, which We know never had any existance; and likewise that the Territory of Muicarra belonged to Coringoda Nayr: of which the whole Country knows the Contrary He having like many others, only some Lands and Hutts dispersed in it.

Mr. Wake wrote him again on the 11th. O.S., Copy of which Letter is under No. 3. Our Honble Company having an undoubted right of Trade in the District of Choudar and the parts adjacent, We found it necessary to keep the Communication open between them and this place, wherefore We Ordered a Party of our Military to take possession of the Hill of Andolla Malla, and that of Tera Malla, of which our Company had been in possession on former occasions. This We did without molestation given to any one whomsoever, either passing or repassing with Goods, Provisions or on any other occasion: and it was far from our thoughts to interfere with Mr. Dirois in his disputes with Boyanore, or to afford the latter any kind of assistance.

If the sole intention of Mr. Dirois in stopping the communication with the District of Muicarra, was to prevent supplys being thrown into the Country of Boyanore, whom He declares your Company was actually chastizing for his Treason, it is natural to imagine He would confine himself to securing the Borders of his Enemys Country, and not stop a free passage so far distant from it, between which and Boyanores Country lies Territories belonging to other Petty Governments.

On the 16<sup>th</sup>. Inst. O.S., in the Night Mr. Dirois sent a Party of his Men joined with those of Coringoda Nayr, who posted themselves under our Colours, and the Command of our Cannon at Andolla Malla; which our Officer there perceiving the next morning, he sent to the commanding Officer so posted, summoning him to withdraw his Colours and Men within the space of one hour, or He should be obliged to compell him by force of Arms. This demand not being observed or complied with, our Officer did accordingly oblige him to withdraw; which is an Action warranted by the Laws of Nations; as that of hoisting the Colours of a different Nation under the Guns of another State, is a direct Violation of them.

Likewise are inclosed four other Letters that have passed between us on the Subject of this Transaction Vizt. one from Mr. Dirois dated the 23d. June N.S. No. 4. and another from Mr. Dirois and his Council dated the 28th. No. 5. Also one of Mr. Wakes to Mr. Dirois dated the 14th. No. 6 and one of ours to Mr. Dirois and Council dated the 19th. No. 7. since which no others have passed between us, and to these We beg leave to referr for what may be further necessary on this Subject; withall observing, that it is known to the whole Country that neither of the abovementioned Hills ever belonged to Coringoda Nayr or any of his Ancestors; and that the Sovereignity of them is in the Princes of Cherica, who have so many Years past granted to the Honble United English East India Company a free right of Trade throughout their whole Dominions and a liberty of Fortifying in any part of them.

Mr. Dirois would insinuate, that Coringoda Nayr was under the sole Protection of his Company, and seems to form his measures upon this mistaken belief: For such it will appear if the Treaty of 1727/8 is attended to, where it is expressly mentioned that Coringoda Nayr is equally under the Protection of both Companys

What We have further to represent to your Hon. &ca., is in respect to the mutual Agreement made between Mr. Dirois and Mr. Wake the last Season, for paying no more for Pepper than Seventy eight Rupees P Candy of Six hundred pounds English, in any shape or manner whatever, without previously advising each other of our intentions to the contrary. This agreement We, on our parts strictly observed 'till We were fully assured the Merchants of Myhie had greatly

exceeded the price stipulated: and Mr. Wake offered to make proof of it to Mr. Dirois, by proposing to send him proper Testimony with one of our Council; but he rejected it in a very evasive manner. He knew very well that Mr. Wake actually received mony for a parcel of Pepper sold at Myhie, which He had caused to be sent there, in Order to come at the fact in a manner incontestable, at the rate of Ninety five Rupees # Candy. After such a manner of acting, is it possible We can ever in future come to such an Agreement with Mr. Dirois; although it so visibly appears to be for the great Advantage of both Company's?

THE Widdow sister of the late Boyanore & Regent during the minority of her SATUR-Son sent an Ola to the Chief with three of her Rajadores, and the Head Person DAY of Three thousand Nayrs, representing the depredations of the French in her 21st. Country without any cause and withall requested the Assistance of the Honble Receden The Chief told them that the French and English Nations were at Peace Ola from the wherefore We could not engage in their behalfs, but out of regard to the Family Boyonore of Boyanore We would supply them withall such necessarys as they wanted provided they were consistent with the rules that were to be observed by a Neuteral Nation, and they returned this Evening very well satisfied.

RECEIVED a General Letter from the Chief and Council of Myhie dated the SUNDAY 3d. July N.S. translate of which is as follows.

To Mr. WAKE CHIEF OF TELLICHERRY AND HIS COUNCIL.

GENTLEMEN

We have received your Letter of the 18th. June O.S. also that you wrote the Chief &c. Council of Mahie their Angwr. Coringoda Nayr on the same day.

to ours of the 18th.

It is in vain you pretend to justifie your Acts of Hostility against our Flag. All your reasons are no more than pretexts, which will not be able to dazzle our Sovereigns and our Superiours, to whom We are to render an Account of our Conduct.

You tell us that it is not permitted any Nation to post themselves and Hoist their Flag under the Fire of another. We agree to it; but by what right have you Hoisted your Flag on the Hill of Andolla Malla? could you take possession of it, without passing the limits which were assigned you in the Treaty of 1728? and in passing them do you not commit usurpations, although indirectly upon us? ought We to suffer them tamely? moreover the eminence on which We were Posted is not so near to Andolla Malla, as you would have it believed: Since the Fire of your Cannon, which lasted four Hours, did no damage to our Intrenchments.

It is certain that your Commanding Officer, on the Hill of Andolla Malla, acted contrary to the Laws of Nations in sending a Serjeant with a Drum to him, who

Commanded in our Post, in Order to summon him to withdraw and carry away the Colours within an hour, threatning him to Fire from above after the term limited. You ought not to be ignorant, Gentlemen, that a Commanding Officer in a Post cannot, nor ought to abandon it without Orders from those by whom He was sent. The space of an hour which you prescribed to him, who Commanded on the Hill of Mallaparacunna, was not sufficient to give him time to receive our Orders. Your Fire had lasted above an hour when his Letter was brought us.

You came to the Number of between seven and eight hundred Men; Drum beating; Colours flying; to force us in our Intrenchments. We had only sent there a Serjeant and Twelve Men, trusting more to the Laws of Nations than to the Number of our People. You took possession of the Post and immediatly Hoisted your Colours in the place of ours, which our People brought away with them: What could you have done more in time of War? Can We reckon at present on the faith of Treaties?

If We were determin'd to take possession of the Hill of Mallaparacunna, We never had a design to cutt off Provisions going to Tellicherry; those little methods of Chagrining our Neighbours with whom We are at Peace, are beneath our way of thinking, nor did We pretend any more to stop the Communication of those parts, nor to disquiet Muicarra and Candil Nayrs, but We had reasons, which We shall produce in time, & of which We shall give proofs, before those to whom it shall belong.

The two Hills, in Question, belong say you, to Muicarra and Candil Nayrs; this is a discussion, We shall not enter into at present. But supposing that it was from them, that you pretend to hold the property of them, they have no right to make you such a donation without the consent of Coringoda Nayr whose Vassalls they are, and who to this time has received the Customs of their Country.

Muicarra and Candil Nayrs are, you say, under the Protection of the Honble English Company and you will defend them against Coringoda Nayr. Is not the latter likewise under your protection as well as under ours? We can besides assure you, that neither We nor Coringoda Nayr design any harm to Muicarra and Candil Nayrs. We are certain that Coringoda Nayr never had any dispute with them, and that He has not made any Warlike preparations against them; We do not believe him either in a condition, or weak enough to design to attack your rights and Priviledges. If these are the reasons which engage you to threaten him with War, We are sorry you should putt yourselves in a passion without reason.

It is visible Gentlemen that you seek pretexts to disturb us in the War We have with the Mother of Boyanore, with whom you have, for a long time, had an understanding, You act in consequence of the several Deliberations held between you and our Enemies, who go daily to Tellicherry to take your Counsel. You encourage them against us, by your promises and Presents, and you assist them with Money and Warlike Ammunition.

THE Chief received an Answer to his Ola to Coringoda Nayr on the 19th. MONDAY The substance of which is as follows. Instant.

He acknowledges the receipt of two Olas from the Chief, and writes that The Substance He did not tell Muicarra Nayr to stop any Goods passing to or from Tellicherry, of Corinbut, by Order of the French Chief He told him to prevent Powder, Ball, or Rice Shaper's Ola passing to Boyanore, but not to impede any kind of Merchandize, which was no in answer to more than a report of his Enemies, and for which reason He supposed We had the Chiefs. taken his place. He afterwards adds his hopes of having his Lands restored that We formerly took from him and concludes that Muicarra and Candil Nayr are his relations, whom He had never offended, and hopes for the favour of the Honble Company.

It is to be observed the French Chief in his Letter of the 21st. Instant N.S., that He actually had caused all communication to be stopt. By the Place taken the French. which Coringoda calls his, is meant Andola, to which He has not any kind of pretentions whatsoever.

THE French, for some time past have had disputes with the Sister of the late Boyanore, the Chief occasion of which are their building two Forts, out of their Limits, and with no other grant than a Verbal one, obtained from the Heir, who is a Minor (without the knowledge of those in the administration) by making him a Present, which, with what they bribed those about him, amounted to Forty thousand fanams, but this has been greatly Agravated by their abusing their Women, killing their Cattle and cutting down their Coconutt Trees. These disputes have run so high, as yesterday in a Skirmish between them, the French had four Topasses, one European and nine Seepoys kill'd, with many wounded, when they retired to their Forts.

Observations on the advantageous Situation of Andola Malla & Resolution thereon. From the situation of Andolla Malla it Commands the several Passages into the Nombier's Country, and to the Southward of it, as also the Bridge over the River into the King of Cotiote's Country, which River runs into the Sea between Durmapatam and Codoly to the Northward of Tellicherry, and by which River We can always have a free Communication with Andolla Malla, upon which if a small Fort with two Bastions, at opposite Angles, be raised of Earth, Thirty Men will defend it against a very considerable force it being very steep. We are well assured by good inteligence, that if We had not taken possession of the said Hill, the French would, which indeed their Actions confirm; and if We do not maintain it, and they take possession of it, the Trade of this Settlement will be greatly prejudiced thereby,

and our Prince, except the Honble Company will be at the Expence, will not force them away, which may then be difficult, and attended with such an Expence as We cannot sufficiently warrent being at. The Earth is exceeding proper for erecting Walls being of a hard binding Nature when exposed to Air and very durable; But a Fort cannot be Built in the dry Season as the Earth will not cement without great Quantities of Water. A Breast Work for the present security of our People is absolutely necessary, the Expence of which will go a great way towards building a small Fort in a proper manner which if done the Charges of maintaining the Fort of Morah will be saved and that of Durmapatam may be lessened; which Forts were built as a Cheque upon the king of Cotiote, but are not near so effectual in that respect as a Fort on Andolla Malla will be and which will very little, if any thing, increase our Garrison Charges. Wherefore the Chief proposes the raising a Fort of Earth upon the Hill of Andolla with two Bastians for Three Guns and five embraziers each, and Twenty five Yards in the clear conformable to a plan now produced the charges of which with a Stone house for keeping Powder and Rice according to the nearest computation will amount to something more than Two thousand Rupees, which is AGREED TO, and that it be immediately commenced and finished withall Expedition.

The Treasury Account for last month being laid before the Board for their The Inspection is accordingly Examin'd and the several Ballances of which being this Treasury day counted and agreeing therewith It is accordingly Passed and ORDERED to be last month Entered after this Consultation.

The Account of Salary due to the Honble Company's Covenanted Servants The 1 Year commencing January the 2<sup>d</sup>. 1739/40 and Ending the 1<sup>st</sup>. of July inclusive is also Salary Bill Do. brought in Examin'd, and Passed as Entered after this Consultation. Ordered that the Treasury makes good the amount thereof being Rupees Six hundred seventy eight, one quarter, and twenty raes, together with the Chiefs allowance for six months Table Linnen and China Ware amounting to Seventy five Rupees.

April and advise that the Rice and Sheet Lead sent them by the Emelia Sloop came out right according to Invoice.

They give us the unwelcome advice of the Dutch and Changanaut being, in a manner fully possed [sic] of the Country of Peritaly and to the Northward of Anjengo, which entirely prevents their procuring any Pepper from those parts, and add that the Dutch will spare no charge in bringing the King of Travencore to their terms.

DITTO DIE READ and Signed a General Letter dated this day to Mr. Dirois and Council at Myhie in Answer to one received from them on the 22<sup>d</sup>. Ultimo which We should have sent before, but our Portuguese Writer being Ill, We could not till now get it Translated into the Portugueze Language. The Letter now dispatched is as follows.

To M<sup>R</sup>. Dirois Chief for Affairs of the Company of France &c<sup>a</sup>. Council at Myhie.

#### GENTLEMEN

Answer to Mons<sup>2</sup>. Dirois &c<sup>3</sup>. Council of Mahie their Letter of the 3d. Ins<sup>4</sup>. On the 22<sup>d</sup>. Ultimo, M<sup>r</sup>. Wake acknowledged to M<sup>r</sup>. Dirois the receipt of your Letter dated the 3<sup>d</sup>. Instant N.S., which We have been obliged to defer Answering 'till now, our Portuguese Secretary having been out of Order, but the most material points thereof have been Answer'd in former Letters.

You acknowledge that is not permitted to any Nation to Post themselves and Hoist their Flag under the fire of another's Cannon, & consequently that the acting in such a manner is a breach of the Laws of Nations. This acknowledgment fully justifies all our proceedings in consequence of Your Intrenching yourselves under our Cannon; which will evidently appear your People did from the distance of the Hills belonging to us, on one of which your Colours were hoisted.

Notwithstanding you are pleased to demand by what right We hoisted our Flag on the Hill of Andolla Malla, and whether We could take possession of it without passing the Limits assigned us by the Treaty of 1728. to which We have already sufficiently reply'd and shown you that We had a right to do so, it being both by the free consent of the Proprietor thereof as well as that of his Sovereign, tho' you, as appears from Mr. Dirois's Letter of the 21st. June N.S., occasioned our taking possession of the said Hill, by ordering the Adjacent Passages to be stopped, in a Country, which, for Ages past, has been open and free, but were actually stopped during the time your Colours were Hoisted on the Hill of Mallaparacunna commonly called Muicarra Candil Paramboo.

The Limits, you mention, were assigned by us to Coringoda Nayr by the Treaty of 1727/8, and such Lands, as were then granted him, were to be free for those of your and our Nation to pass and reepass, as will appear to any one who shall peruse the said Treaty; But We did not enter the limits of Coringoda Nayr, in passing to Andolla Malla, which would have been much out of the way thither: from whence, it is plain you have not the least pretence for complaining of Usurpations, committed upon you or indeed upon any one else.

You insinuate that the Sovereignity of those two Hills in Question, is in Coringoda Nayr, by your asserting that Muicarra and Candil Nayrs the Proprietors of them, are his Vassals, which We affirm they are not; nor is there a Subject of this whole Country, who is anyways acquainted with the Customs thereof, but what knows that those Nayrs, as well as Coringoda Nayr and some other Nayrs, are entirely

independent of each other. wherefore to assert as you do, that Coringoda Nayr has. to this time, received the Customs of the Country of Muicarra, is to offend against Truth and Fact in the highest degree, as are several other Assertions in your last and other Letters that have passed on this occasion.

We have not, either before or since you have been at War with the Mother of Boyanore, assisted her in any manner as you alledge, nor can you prove that We have by any one single instance. We are indeed in Amity and Friendship with Boyanore, and communicate with those of that Country accordingly; But when some of her People came hither and informed Mr. Wake of their being engaged in a War with you, He immediatly advised Mr. Dirois the Substance of all the discourse that passed between them, which is agreable to the Friendship that was intended to be preserved and kept up between these Settlements by our Predicessors, in making the Articles of 1727/8, which they foresaw would prove their common Interest and Advantage. Though now it is hardly possible there can be a good harmony between us, when you actually impede the Communication between this place and the Country's with whom you are at Peace, Contrive spurious Donations; Charge us with engaging in Treaties with your Enemys that never were made, or We believe thought of; supplying and assisting them in such a manner, as must be visible to the whole Country if it were so, without so much as being able to prove one single instance when called upon; wherefore such proceedings must certainly create jealousies between us, which the Mallabars alone will reap the Advantages of, whatever hopes of Profit you may imagine will arise to you therefrom.

Being in Expectation of receiving Europe Advices by the way of Fort St Tuesday George before this time, but as none are yet arrived, We now return the Pattamar which brought us a General Letter on the 5th. Instant from the Gentlemen at Return'd Anjengo, with Duplicate of our last, adding what has occur'd here since that time.

RETURNED the Pattamar We sent to Goa on the 20th. Instant with our Packet DITTO for Bombay, which the Padre Procuradore writes He forwarded thither on the 4th. DIE Instant N.S., and had paid the Pattamar thither Twenty five Rupees, and that which returned this day Two Rupees, which Sum of Twenty seven Rupees He should place to Mr. Wake's Account.

RECEIVED a General Letter from the Chief and Council of Myhie dated the 2<sup>d</sup>. Wednesof August N.S., Translate of which is as follows. DAY 23D.

TO MR. WAKE CHIEF &CA. COUNCIL AT TELLICHERRY.

## GENTLEMEN

Since the receipt of your Letter of the 5th. of July O.S., Mr. Dirois has been Mr. Dirois so much indisposed, that We could not sooner reply to it.

Chief &c . Council of of Mahie their Letter.

We still grant you that it is not allowed any Nation to intrench themselves and hoist their Flag under the Fire of another's Cannon; But as We do not come within the case, that acknowledgment cannot justify your Acts of Hostility against us and our Flag.

It is certain and a thing Publickly known that Muicarra and Candil Nayrs are the Vassals of Coringdoa: We know exactly that Muicarra Nayr pays him Yearly Two hundred and sixty fanams, which He collects from the Tiveys and other Inhabitants of his Lands: Besides which, Muicarra Nayr altho, the Proprietor, pays Coringoda Nayr the Customs of his Palmeiras according to the Custom of the Country, amounting to sixty fanams Annum; and Coringoda Nayr gives him as his Subject sixteen fanams at the Feast of Ona, and as much at that of Booe. This being proved, it follows that the Hill of Andolla Malla & Mallaparacunna are under the jurisdiction of Coringoda Nayr, who We are well assured has granted you no Priviledges on those two Hills; therefore you have made an Usurpation upon him, which falls indirectly upon us, in taking possession of the Hill of Andolla Malla where your Colours are still hoisted. This Usurpation is directly contrary to the Treaty of 1728 which assigns you certain Limits that you have passed without any regard; Consequently you have violated the Laws of Nations in insulting us on Mallaparacunna; and We renew our Protests against such unjust procedures.

As to the reasons or rather the Pretexts which you alledge, in Order to justify your taking possession of Andolla Malla, We have sufficiently answer'd them in our former.

When you tell us that there is no Subject throughout this whole Kingdom, and that all the Nayrs are independent one of another, We cannot comprehend you. You might as well deny that there are Stars in Heaven. But what Kingdom do you mean Gentlemen? We presume you mean that of Colastra. But what relation has that Kingdom to the business in Question? We know it not but as a Country bordering on those wherein We are settled.

You affirm to us that you do not assist, in any manner, the Mother of Boyanore with whom We are at War, and that We cannot prove it in the least circumstance, any more than other assertions We have made. We shall produce the proofs of every thing as We have already said, before those to whom it shall appertain. For the rest Gentlemen, We refer you entirely to all our preceding Letters.

Observatiogs on the above Letter. What the French assert, in respect to Muicarra and Candil Nayrs being Vassals of Coringoda Nayr, is entirely contrary to the known Laws of this Kingdom, according to which all Nayrs are free and independent of each other and liable to the Kings Commands only, and that in a limitted Sense. Those called Head Nayrs are Chiefs of Districts; and, as Generals or Officers, are upon the Kings Command to bring into the Field the Nayrs of their several Districts. moreover conformable to the Laws (which indeed in this Pticular are often broke) no Head Nayr can Order those of his District upon any Service but by the especial Command of their Sovereign the King of Colastra, who at present is Prince Cunhi Homo or the Prince of Cherical, (though He has not as yet been Crowned), the Heir by desent who is still living, being set aside (for want of Capacity) by the late King, who some time before his Death appointed Prince Cunhi Homo Regent, which is consistent with their Laws.

Muicarra Nayr do's not pay any thing to Coringoda in the manner asserted in the Letter, although those of one Province or District receives rents of such Lands as they have in another, but not a single Fanam can be paid by a Nayr as Vassalage, because they are all to the lowest, Free, and if one serves another for hire, He lays down his Service when He pleases. What is further instanced in the Letter to prove Muicarra Nayr a Vassal or Subject of Coringoda's by the latter his paying to the former Sixteen fanams at the Feast of Ona and Booe, is likewise exceeding Rediculous; as almost the whole Country at those Feasts give and receive presents in mony and otherwise. Whence, according to the way of reasoning in the above Letter, they must all be Slaves or Subject to each other, one may owe Vassalage to Twenty Masters and those Masters may be Slaves to a Slave. These Presents, at the abovementioned Feasts, between Familys and others pass as Tokens of Friendship, and are also given to Servants, much after the manner as in Christian Countrys, tho' they cannot claim them.

The revenues of the Hill of Andolla Malla was appropriated, by one of the Kings to a Pagoda commonly called Tellicherry Pagoda, but the King is Supreme of all Pagodas, from whom the Honble Company have a Grant to Hoist their Colours, at any time, and at any place in his Kingdom, which Consists of Seven Provinces Vizt. Pallartuta Naddu, Choulsaroum, Neliotusaroum, Alerta Nadu, Edevadu Naddu,

Cartua Naddu & Porovenaddu. of all which He still bears the Title of King, although the Cannarees have Conquered the Province of Alerta Naddu, and long since one of his Ancestors being embarrassed in War Granted to one who was of the race of Kings (which is a particular cast) the Province of Porovenaddu (now called Cotiote) which He was to Govern according to the Dictates of an Idol of a Pagoda, who is called Peremala Podee.

The Kings heretotore appointed a Governour in Cartuanaddu, but some few Years before the French settled at Myhie, the Governour (called Boyanore) paid little regard to the present King who was then likewise embarressed with War. Upon the French's settling they countenanced him and since the Governours death, his Sister who presides pays no allegiance at all.

The Sister Governs during the Minority of her Son whom the French stiles in their Passports Prince Boyanore, but lately, upon some disgust to the Widdow Sister, they have set up a Prince, a Child, who is of the Cast of Kings, which is highly resented and which they are now fighting about. From hence the French insinuate in their Letter that the Province of Cartua Naddu (now generally called the Country of Boyanore or Bounore) no ways depend on the King or is part of his Dominions; tho on all proper occasions, in our Letters, We have set forth the contrary, and that they (the French) have no legal Grant for settling in that Country as none such has been made them by the King of Colastra.

All else in the foregoing Letter and indeed the whole of it has been fully Answered in our former Letters.

RECEIVED a General Letter from the President and Council of Fort St. George Wednesdated the 27th. of June and one from Capt. Henry Hoadly Commander of the Royall Guardian the 28<sup>th</sup>.

DAY 23D. Letters from Fort St. George

In the former is acknowledged the receipt of our several Letters dated the 28th. of April, 2d. 6th. & 28th. May, and advised that the Bermudas Sloop arrived there on the 11th. of May & The Prince William on the 21st. That the President would receive the Freight of the Coir by the Bermudas Sloop when it was adjusted and advise us the amount when Mr. Wake would pay the same into our Cash here.

They were likewise pleased to advise us of the arrival there of our Honble Masters Ships Princess of Wales and Wilmington from England and that War was declared against Spain the end of October, but all the other Powers continued Neuter. Inclosed us a List of Ships arrived in England the last Season, and of those taken up and design'd for the several parts of India.

Capt. Henry Hoadly's Letter was as follows Vizt.

To THE WORSHIPFULL WILLIAM WAKE ESQR. CHIEF &CA. COUNCIL AT TELLICHERRY.

Worshipfull Sir & Sirs

By the Prince William importing here the 21st. of May I received the favour Capt. you did me the 2d. of that month and hold myself much obliged by the kind part Hoadly his Letter. you take in my misfortune. I at first purposed to have attempted my Passage to Bombay by the latter end of this month. But when I reflected on the great charge I am intrusted with; The uncertainty of the Southward Passage, a Tract unbeaten by any of the Companys Ships and in which I have the help of no Journals, That my People not yet fully confirm'd in the recovery of their healths might soon fall down again and in such case besides that their not being able to work the Ship might endanger not only a Second loss of Passage but expose her also an easy Prey to any Enemy who should attempt her. I have for these reasons determin'd not to proceed from hence till the first of the Season for going about Zeloan as well as

that my People may be perfectly recovered and I may comply more exactly with the Orders I received from my Honble Masters respecting my outward bound Voyage to which you are pleased in the close of your Letter to referr me and which when I have an opportunity of laying them before you I hope you'll think no insufficient ground for my proceeding.

The amount of the Duty on Goa Arrack retailed in our Limits amounting to Two hundred forty seven fanams and an half is likewise ORDERED to be paid in.

## AT A CONSULTATION

#### Present

GEORGE HAMILTON.

Our pepper Contracts now adjusted. The Pepper Merchants of the Buzar and others, being come to the Fort to Adjust their Accounts according to a Summons sent them. We have taken notice in Consultation of the 23d. Feb<sup>Ty</sup>. and 13th. May of the necessity We were drove to, by the French proceedings, for not insisting upon the Merchants delivering Pepper at Seventy eight Rupees & Candy, the price Agreed upon with the French under the 1st. of October, and according to Contracts made with some Merchants on the 7th. & 8th. of Jan<sup>Ty</sup>., and conformable thereto with others on the 5th. Feb<sup>Ty</sup>., but some time after finding the French gave from Ninety to One hundred Rupees & Candy. We judged it was absolutely necessary to give the Merchants the Liberty of purchasing at the Cheapest rates they could, and afterwards make them a suitable consideration for their trouble, or We should be able to procure but a very small Quantity of Pepper, which would be attended with exceeding bad consequences, as appears from all the Commands of our Superiours at Bombay in respect to providing that Commodity.

To Adjust the Price with the Merchants, now come for that purpose, We take the same method as with those to the Northward on the 13th. of May, which is from duly observing the increase of the prices of Pepper at the several Bazars where they buy, and the Quantities deliver'd with what mony was advanced to each Merchant, at such times as the Price altered. This indeed cannot be an exact way of computing, nor have the Merchants been advanced in equal proportion, but it is the most just and equitable We can possibly compute from, as their Books or Olas, are not to be depended upon and as they are generally concerned with each other in these purchases, they can best Adjust among themselves such disputes as may arise between them, from one being advanced more or less or sooner or later than another. And as it is our Duty to purchase for the Honble Company as cheap as We can, so it is for their Interest that We do not oppress the Merchants, but allow them what is reasonable for their trouble, which as they are advanced mony at their request, may be deemed about Two Rupees P Candy exclusive of Charges in bringing it hither, when the medium price of what these Merchants have deliver'd this Season, the Candy will come out at Eighty four Rupees, 45408 decs. which is computed as above, and which has been bought by the Merchants this Season from Seventy six to Eighty nine Rupees the Candy here, at which price (what little is not Contracted for by our Merchants) it now is to the Southward.

It being now Agreed, that the whole Quantity of Pepper deliver'd this Season by the Bazar Merchants, and to the amount of what they have been further Advanc-

ed mony for be rated at 84, 45408 decs. P Candy, they with the Linguister are now called in, and do consent that their Accounts for what mony they have hitherto received this Season be made up at that rate.

Cacart Tupy and Combem Namby are likewise called in, and being Northern purchasers, it is Agreed that they be allowed no more than Eighty three Rupees & Candy which they also consent to, as do's Ballipy Cunhimy that his Account be made up at Eighty two Rupees he delivering only Twenty seven Candys two maunds. The Heiress of Cannanore having Contracted only for Twenty Candys and delivering but ten of it, her Account is Agreed to be adjusted at Seventy eight Rupees the price We Contracted with her for, as is Annada Cuttys for Fifteen Candys and an half.

It is likewise AGREED that the Accounts of all the Merchants that were deficient in their last Year's Contracts except the Heirs of Chatoo Chitty (whose accounts were Adjusted the beginning of this Season) be Debted Three Rupees P Candy, on

such their deficiencys, DIRECTED that the Accomptant at the close of our Present Books make up the respective Merchant's Accounts, conformable to the above Agreement and that the Names of them with the rates of their several Adjustments and Allowances made for not complying with their old Contracts be specified after this Consultation.

Cacart Tupy requesting to be Advanced for Fifty Candys of Pepper, which Money
He can procure out of the Country of Cotiote but cannot deliver it here under Eighty nine Rupees P Candy, which We being well assured of, it is Agreed that
He be now paid out of the Treasury the Sum of Four thousand four hundred and fifty Rupees on said Account.

CUNHISEU likewise now requests to be Advanced the Sum of Three thousand Money Rupees, for which He will deliver Cardamoms at the price the Head sort of that for Carda-Commodity shall be broke for at the opening of the ensuing Season.

Upon our representing to him what a precarious & uncommon proceeding it is with the amongst Merchants, to Advance mony without settling the price and goodness of the this Head. Commodity, He Alledges that He and all other Cardamom Merchants, when they make a Contract it is always in that manner, and if He is not Advanced in time, He cannot engage the Inland Merchants so as to be certain of complying with such Agreement as He may make with us; and when mony is advanced before hand the Cardamoms are always deliver'd, at a much cheaper rate, than those that are not bought after that manner, which indeed We are sensible of both in respect to the Custom and Price, and it being a Commodity of late Years in such great demand, as if We break the usual Custom, We may be disappointed in the Quantity of Ten thousand pounds weight We are Ordered to provide or pay an extravigant price for The last Year, some that were good sold at Callicutt for Seven hundred Rupees \$\mathcal{P}\$ Candy. Wherefore It is AGREED that We now Advance Cunhiseu the Sum of Three thousand Rupees on Account of Ten thousand pound weight of Cardamoms called Peria (which are esteemed the best that can be provided) to be deliver'd so soon as the Season will permitt and Adjust the Price upon the Delivery of the first Parcell here; Cunhiseu on his part agreeing to the same provided the Hills of Peria produce that Quantity, all which He makes no doubt of procuring, but will not engage for those of any other parts as they are so remote from hence.

Mr. George Hamilton having translated the French Protest dated the 16th. Novr. 1739 N.S., and their Letter of the 24th. Janry. 1739/1740 N.S., they are Ordered to be Entered after this Consultation.

To Mr. Wake Chief &ca. Council AT TELLICHERRY.

#### GENTLEMEN

It has not been our fault that the several Letters you mention have had no French better effect. We were not the Authors of the Troubles in the Country of Erre- Letter and vadunaddu, but the four Nombiers, whom you protect and at this hour openly under the assist, who after taking possession of, and Fortifying themselves on the Hill of 16th. Novr. 1739 N. S. Chimberah, which did not belong to them, proceeded at length to Fortify themselves on that of Poitara which commands Myhie, and with which they might have annoyed it greatly, if We had not, determin'd, after divers representations, to drive them from it and fortify ourselves there.

If these troubles are become prejudicial to your Honble Company, it can only be, because the Agreements Mr. Wake made, against the Law of Nations, with the four Nombiers, immediatly after We had driven them from Poitarra, cannot subsist. By the grace of God you shall not deprive our Company, as you have projected, of all the Pepper which passes thro' the Country of the four Nombiers, and which grows there. It appears by what is underlined of your Letter, that you pretend to arrogate to yourselves an exclusive Priviledge of Commerce in the Country of Errevadunaddu, and chiefly in that of the four Nombiers. We take the liberty to declare to you that We acknowledge no such priviledge and that our Predecessors have never acknowledged it, since at different times they have caused to be stopt and confiscated such Pepper of their Country as would have been carried to other places than Myhie. If you had thought yourselves justly established in that pretended Priviledge, you would have spoke to us of it sooner; and Mr. Wake would not have entered into new Treaties with the four Nombiers, perecisely at the time of an open War between us and them: nor would you have had recourse to the measures you employ to prolong that War, by the strong Succours you daily afford them, in order to procure them that advantageous Peace, for which Mr. Wake has engaged himself by those Treaties. This will appear very extraordinary in Europe; and in the Sequel of this Letter something will be found still as extraordinary.

Doubtless, Gentlemen, our Predecessors had good intentions when they enter'd into those Articles you mention. But we repeat to you, on this Head, what Mr. Dirois wrote Mr. Wake under the 4th. of this Instant November, that when you wrest the Sense of those Agreements with a view of restraining our Company, in what the Circumstances of things may require them to act for the good of their Affairs, and for the support of that respect, which is due to them from these People; We do not think ourselves obliged to yield to such Interpretations. It should seem as if you had a mind to appoint a Guardianship for our Company, and that it cannot repell the Insolence and Temerity of the four Nombiers without your permission.

Mr. Wake is mistaken. It was not Mr. Dirois, who told him the occasion of that War was on account of a single Nayr. He has the strongest reasons to think that all this did not take it's rise from a trifle. We shall trace the matter to its Source in time and place, and before those to whom it belongs to have cognizance thereof. Mr. Wake found this little circumstance among the Complaints of Coringoda Nayr, which Mr. Dirois sent to him in writing, together with those of Boyanore just as they furnished them.

It is true Mr. Wake gave himself the trouble to come to Myhie, and He and Mr. Dirois, on each side, endeavour'd to sound one anothers Sentiment. The Propositions and reasonings, that were made, were loose. Mr. Dirois did not engage to receive the Submission of the four Nombiers untill Boyanore should have reason to be satisfied on his part. The Letters are possitive in this respect, and We beg you Gentlemen & Mr. Wake, to have recourse to them in order to refresh your Memorys. How could Mr. Wake persuade himself that He should bring Mr. Dirois

to commit a fault, of which Boyanore would have had reason to complain bitterly? His minority and Interests being under the Protection of the Company, was it natural and equitable, to come to an Accommodation, in which He & Coringoda Nayr were to have no part?

As to the new Fortifications on Chimberah, Deevara and Poitara, Mr. Dirois-acknowledges that He was willing that all should be razed reciprocally; and that it should be Agreed that no Nation whatsoever should fortify themselves there in future. This was Expedient in Order to save an Expence to our Company. But the four Nombiers, being since arrived to such a Pitch of Insolence & Temerity as deserves all the attention of those to whom the care of this Colony and Place is entrusted, they have reduced us to the hard necessity of preserving those Hills and Fortifications; that We may be able to repress, for the future, any other effects of their Ill-will and Presumption, which We cannot now foresee.

This was the true reason that determin'd Mr. Dirois to desire Mr. Wake to send him back the Articles of Peace, which He had sent him by Mr. Moreau. We acted with so much openness and Sincerity that We drew them up before M<sup>r</sup>. Verelst, and gave him a Copy of the minute. But hardly was M<sup>r</sup>. Moreau arrived at Tellicherry before We were informed, in a manner, that would admit of no doubt that as soon as the Nombiers saw our People had invested the Hill of Chimberah, soas it could not be succour'd, they made an offer of it to Colastra, begging him to take possession of it and keep it under his Protection; That Colastra having no. thoughts of engaging himself much in any of these Affairs, Mr. Wake had perswaded him to it, and had resolved to take possession of it in the name of Colastra. immediatly Mr. Wake had formed a Detachment of Fifty men, out of your English Garrison, commanded by Cap<sup>t</sup>. Sterling, and had caused four Pieces of Cannon tobe carried in the Night to the Foot of the great Hill Ponolly, where they were guarded by your People disguised like Blacks, and dispersed some one way some another without seeming to guard any thing. That all was adjusted and disposed for taking possession of Chimberah, on the Night of the 3d. of this Instant: That on the same Night Mr. Wake had three times successively sent Spies to observe if our Nayrs kept a good Watch at the foot of that Hill. That those Spies having reported that they were all duly upon their Guard, Mr. Wake had remitted the Enterprize to the next morning: That Colastra was advanced near Putinha; but, that on the morning of the 4th. Mr. Wake having received Intelligence that since the preceding Night our People were in possession of the Hill, and that We had sent there a French Garrison and hoisted the Flag according to right in cases of a lawfull Conquest; the Cannon which were in the Wood at the foot of the great Hill Panoly were carried back by Mucquas in the night of the 4th. Mr. Dirois wrote to Mr. Moreau and gave him Orders to make a Civil complaint of this matter to Mr. Wake, who in his Letter of that day answered Mr. Dirois, That if the Nombiers would give him the Hill that Instant, He would not accept of it. These Gentlemen according to our opinions are sufficient reasons to dispense us from a total acquiescence, in the exteriour management of Mr. Wake, for the bringing about this pretended accomodation. As he has refused to comply with the demand that has been made of him in the King's Name to desist formally from his Treaties with the four Nombiers, since their Rebellion against the Company & the French Nation; it is to be feared that the great distance We are at from Europe may in the consequences of these Affairs, still further weaken the Impression of that profound respect, which We all owe to the Sacred Names of their Majestvs, your King and ours; who repeatedly forbid us in the strictest manner to engage them under any Pretext whatsoever, directly or indirectly. To what extremities. Gentlemen had vou exposed the two Nations, if in taking Possession of Chimberah in the name of Colastra (who in such Affairs as these, does no more than lend his name, and who will never be acknowledged in Europe as a competent judge in the disputes between the French and Nombiers, as Mr. Wake has been pleased to declare him in his Letters to Mr. Dirois, tho' after an indirect kind of a manner) you had proceeded to plant your Cannon and Garrison between our two Conquests

of Devara & Poitara? you thought to have thundred upon our Allies, who were spread between those Hills: But We return thanks to providence that did not permit you to put such a design in execution.

The end of our intentions should be to see ourselves effectually in Peace, and to see the Country enjoy it likewise. But how to arrive at this end is the Question, while you continue to support the obstinacy and Insolence of the four Nombiers, by the Succours which you daily afford them and by the advice you give them to persist therein, in order to maintain the Treaties Mr. Wake has entered into with them; whereby they have engaged thmselves, to furnish you with all the Pepper which Passes thro' their Country, and which grows in it; and Mr. Wake on his part to constrain us and our Allies, if He can, in order to gain them a more advantagious Peace than they deserve.

You explain yourselves here a little more clearly on those pretended Priviledges you would claim in the Country of Erevadunaddu, for which We refer to what We had the honour to answer to your first Paragraph. We shall not acknowledge that pretended right untill superiour Orders shall determine us thereto. It is a Novelty you seek to introduce, to cover the part you have, from the beginning, had in this War, and the continuation of it. If Gentlemen you really wish for Peace as sincerely as We do, cease to succour the four Nombiers; Send back into their Country Colastra who lends you his Name, and all those of that Name, whom you have brought into the Field with their Topasses, their Sepoys, or your and their Navrs. Then labour as honestly as We. We engage ourselves, that the Nombiers, not knowing where to have further recourse, will return to their Duty and to what Justice requires of them, and that the Peace may be Signed in four days after. In the mean time, Gentlemen, We depute to you Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Moullineau and Bourquenoud of Council, and the Secretary and Notary of the Council to declare to you in behalf of the King and of the Company, that, in order to avoid the entire ruin and destruction of the four Nombiers Country, and part of that of Erevadunaddu, and for the good of the Commerce of both Companys as well as to putt an end to the War, which you carry on against us under the Name of Colastra, you desist actually from the Agreements made between Mr. Wake and the four Nombiers, since the time they have dared to take up Arms against the Company: That you cease to supply them with Ammunition, Arms, Men, Provisions and mony; which We can prove you have done in time and place, and to those to whom it shall belong from the beginning of this War untill this Hour: and that you oblige Colastra and his Brother[s] to retire home with their forces, as being incompotent to be proposed (as Mr. Wake has done in several of his Letters) for the Decision of those disputes, which the Company and their Allies may have with the four Nombiers. In Default of which, We Protest Gentlemen by these Presents, that all your Pretentions to the Country of Errevadunaddu shall not prejudice those of the Company of France: And We declare to you that our Intentions are to make our Complaints before those Powers on whom you and We depend in Europe, and to obtain of them, by all rightfull means that you be made Answerable for all that may happen in future with respect to this War. We Protest likewise against you Gentlemen, on Account of the Fort on the Hill of Putinha where you have a Flag, and which you obliged yourselves to demolish, at the same time that our Predicessors demolished that of Carriacunna by the Agreement in 1726, and which you have notwithstanding still further Fortifyed some days since, instead of Answering to what Mr. Dirois wrote Mr. Wake on that Subject under the 14th. of this Inst. November.

Notwithstanding Gentlemen this procedure, which such troublesome circumstances have obliged us to take; We have the honour to affirm to you that We are sensible of the Desolation, which the Nombiers have drawn upon their Country: and altho' since projecting the conditions that were deliver'd to Mr. Verelst, they have greatly aggravated the occasion of the Companys Complaints against them, yet, if it is desired to renew the Conferences, bona fide, in order to arrive at a reall Peace, We shall sincerely agree thereto. If you are desirous Gentlemen that these Conferences be renewed, be so good as to advise us. We beg you to believe

that We shall resume the same dispositions We had before of living with you in the strictest Intelligence, if it is agreable to you. It were much to be wished, for the Good of both Companys, as We have often said to you, that the Two Factorys should act nothing but with one and the same mind, and with an entire Confidence
