GENTLEMEN.

We have receiv'd your Favours of the 28th. Nov^r. and 16. Ultimo and are glad to hear the Ilchester is Dispatch'd for Europe.

By a Dutch Ship that came from Malacca We have Advice that Commodore Paulet with three of his Majesty's Ships and five of the Companys left that Place the 12th. November and a Ketch that arriv'd from Bengall the 4th. brings Advice that she saw nine Ships off Point Palmiras the 20th. Ultimo so we must conclude those are the Ships and hope soon to see Them here.

The 6th. Instant Mr. Dupliex at the Head of all the Forces He could collect together, having withdrawn the greatest part of their Garrison from Madrass incamp'd about three Miles from our Bounds, We expected to have been attack'd that Night, but as They were preparing for it in the morning Mr. Griffin arriv'd with 4 Ships of his Squadron upon Sight of Them The French retired home again. A l'arty from Carrical consisting of about 120 Men came to Porto Novo the 5th. but did not join the Main Body, We guess the Enemy had about 1000 Europeans besides a great Number of Topasses Seapoys and Coffrees and were sufficiently prepar'd in every Respect for such an Undertaking.

The George Snow arriv'd here the 30th. Ulto. on whom came Mr. Charles Bourchier whom We have appointed Secretary. We are

This comes to advise your Honour &c^a. of the Receipt of the One Hundred Thousand (100,000) Rupees You were pleas'd to remitt Us by way of Surat and Arcott, for which We must own ourselves greatly obliged to You, and request your Honour &c^a. will be persuaded that We shall retain a Gratefull Remembrance of the Same.

His Majesty's Squadron, excepting the Medway, Preston, and Medway's Prize (which Ships are expected daily) are now with Us. And We have the Satisfaction of informing You that on the 11th, past the Ships York and Exeter of 60 Guns Each anchor'd in our Road from Europe and last from Ballasore where they left the Eltham Man of War of 40 Guns with three of the Company's Ships, (Vizt.) Winchelsea, Colchester, and Benjamin, which Ships likewise arriv'd here Two days after. The Cæsar and East Court are gone up the River of Bengall. The Exeter and Oxford arrived with Us Yesterday, who inform Us that the Lively Man of War, with the Warwick that was taking in Bales at Ingelee as fast as She could in order to come to this Place were to sail in a few Days. By these Ships We have no News further than what We have before advised You.

Some of the Seapoys from your Place having died, and deserted, and part of their Pay still continuing to their Families there We have inclos'd a List of such to You that the same may be stopp'd accordingly.

Inclos'd is Duplicate of our last to You under date the 1st. Ultimo, in which your Honour &ca. will please to observe a Mistake in the Amount of the Draught therein advised of, which Should have been but 1173 Rupees as will appear by our said Bills on your Honour &ca. We doubt not but the same has been duely discharged by You.

TO THE HONOURABLE JOHN FORSTER ESQR.
PRESIDENT AND GOVERNOUR &C.A. COUNCIL
OF FORT WILLIAM.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We Shall now reply to your Favour of the 26th. January and are sorry We had it not in our Power to Send You a Supply of Treasure last Year, but We hope You will be so just to Us to believe We reserv'd no more to Ourselves than was absolutely necessary for the Expence of this Garrison, which We thought deserv'd to be maintain'd at almost any Charge and We have some Expectations that the Event hereafter will ju[s]tifye our Measures wherefore We cannot help remarking that the concern You express to find that no money passes our Port, is equall'd by our Suprise to Observe that none ever returns out of Yours for We must look upon the 25 Chests You have sent Us as a very slender Supply compar'd with our Wants, by which We shall be again plung'd into the utmost Difficulty's should any Accident detain our Outward Bound Squadron longer than the Month of March and You may easily judge of the Uneasiness of our Situation in Such Circumstances with so large a Squadron of the Kings Ships in the Road, unsupported by Credit, when your Honour &ca. reflect upon this cooley, it cannot fail awakening your strictest Attention to our Preservation and Safety, therefore We shall leave it to You to judge how far it would be proper to send Us a further Supply of 25 Chests of Treasure, though We Should not hereafter have Occasion for it, in which case You cannot suffer much by our sending it back again to You recoin'd.

We must also beg leave to recommend the Northern Factory's to your Care who will be in great Want without your Assistance, as We are utterly incapable of giving Them any and an Investment of Calicoes from Vizagapatam and Ingeram

would certainly be highly agreeable to our Honourable Masters Your Honour &ca. will excuse Us in giving our Opinion that those Settlements at Present in point of Trade ought to be first considered.

We shall demand from the Commander of the Bombay Castle the Difference of the Copper short deliver'd and advise our Honourable Masters of our Proceedings herein.

The Princess of Wales arriving on this Coast so very late We could not send Her to take in the Redwood at Durassapatam nor could We prevail with any of the Country Shipping to do it but We will take all Opportunitys of sending a Quantity to You, but it cannot be done in time for the Shipping now with You.

Upon the Broad Cloth and Perpets being landed here, the Warehousekeeper Reported several of the Bales to be damag'd upon which an Order was made for survey'd all that appear'd to be outwardly damag'd which was accordingly done in presence of the Captain. The Damag'd Cloth was sold at Outcry and the Account of it sent to the Company, We must agree with your Honour &ca. that what you found bad must have been an Old Damage as the Outsides appear'd very fair here and the Ship that carried Them had a short Passage Inclos'd We sent You a Report on this Affair.

The Rice and Stores not being quite landed from the Ships Oxford and Exeter, We cannot advise how they turn out, but will not fail so to do in our next Letter.

We will settle the Affair of the Arrack design'd for our Use the last Year by the Fort S^t. George.

We are Oblig'd to your Honour &ca. for consenting to let Captain Hollond remain here till we think proper to send him to take Charge of the Employ our Honourable Masters have appointed Him to.

Mr. Rosewells presence was absolutely necessary to settle some Accounts belonging to the Squadron which cannot be done without Him the Account did not come in to Us till after He went for Bengall, or We should have endeavour'd to settle Them before He went, but We must now send Them for Europe.

We shall adjust all short delivery's of Stores with the Commanders of the Ships as You desire, that they may not lay the Blame on our Conicoply's and Boatmen, Upon their Arrival at another Port.

Yesterday arriv'd the Warwick She brought Us your Honour &cns. Favour of the 10th. We hope to dispatch her for Europe about the 12th. Instant and the Commander will have the necessary Directions given Him for his further Proceedings by this Ship We have receiv'd the Packet You sent Us & hope soon to have the Other You promise to send Us by another Conveyance.

Inclos'd come an Indent from our Storekeeper for Sundry's We are very much in want of. and We desire your Honour will supply Us with all of Them Procurable with You by the return of the Colchester, she will sail from hence in two or three Days We are

Our Honourable Masters Ship Oxford being a going to Batavia for a Supply of Arrack and lower Masts for the Squadron We have laden on board her Sundry's for your Place as P Invoice and Bill of Lading inclos'd, where She will call to deliver Them, and must proceed on immediately to Batavia therefore You must on no account detain her longer than to deliver them; We have put on board this Ship under the Care of Captain Stevens five Chests of Treasure for Purchase of the abovemention'd Arrack &ca. which is all We could Spare, and if You have any Bullion further than You are in immediate Want of, We desire, you will put on board this Ship all that can be spared not only for the purchasing a returning Cargo for this Ship but to supply the Necessity's of this Garrison which We hope You will be able to do, but You must not fail to put on board two or three Chests towards the Purchasing the returning Cargo, as the Sum We have sent on Her is not sufficient.

The Sloop Success whom We intended for the Use of your Settlement but was kept here for the Service of the Men of War, by a Gale of Wind that happen'd here the 4th. December had the Misfortune to be drove on Shore, as was also the Fogo a Fire Snow belonging to the Commodore, and the Medway who was then lying Guardship here having parted her Cables was obliged to put out to Sea by which means the Princess Amelia who was then lying in Pondicherry Road had an Opportunity of taking in between a Thousand and Twelve Hundred Bales of White & Blue Cloth and saild the 13th. at Night and as We imagine is gone to the Islands.

On the 6th. January M^r. A Party from Carrical consisting of about 120 Men came to Porto Novo the 6th, but did not join the Main Body We guess the Enemy had about 1000 Europeans besides a great Number of Topasses, Seapoys and Coffrees and were sufficiently prepar'd in every Respect for such an Undertaking.

On the 11th. January We had the Pleasure to see arive here His Majesty's Ships Exeter and York of 60 Guns and two days after the Eltham of 40 with our Honourable Masters Ships Winchelsea, Colchester and Benjamin, last from Ballasore where they left the EastCourt and Cæsar who were detain'd by the Gentlemen of Bengall for the Treasure &c*. they had on board.

As yet We have heard nothing of the Princess Augusta whom We have been long in Expectation of seeing and hope that no Accident has happen'd to Her.

The 16th. Ultimo We had the Satisfaction to hear from Mr. Bourchier, at Anjengo of the happy defeat of a French Fleet that was coming out to India by Admiral Anson and two days past We had the Pleasure to have it confirm'd from Bombay as also that a considerable Fleet of ours was to leave England in October on board of which was a large Number of Land Forces.

On this Ship We have sent four Felons Who are to serve the Company in the same Capacity's as Persons in their Circumstances did that were Sent from Madrass. We are.

At about 11 Mr. Griffin weighed & sailed with his Squadron to the Northward to prevent their getting into Pondicherry but They were out of Sight in The Morning as is our Squadron also at present.

Mons^r. Dupleix upon seeing our Squadron had left Us the 16th. Instant at Midnight march'd out of Pondicherry with a large Force and the next morning We had Advice of a Party consisting of about 2000 Men being to the Westward and upon the march to the Southward within few miles of our Bounds, upon which as We had Intelligence that They intended to attack Cuddalore that Night it was thought

proper to prevent Them in some measure by sending a Detachment from hence, which had the desir'd Effect for upon their making their attack about a quarter after nine they met with so warm a Reception that They thought it most prudent after a very short Stay to retire and are since marched back to Pondicherry; It's reported that they lost in the Engagement 30 Europeans & fifty Blacks and that the number of their Wounded & Deserted amounts to near 100 more. We have taken Prisoners & have Deserters and not one Single Man belonging to this Garrison receiv'd The least Hurt.

Instant arriv'd here the Ship Scarborough from England belonging to our Honourable Masters by whom We have receiv'd Advice of their Intentions to dispatch The Delawar for this Place Benjar & China & Directions to write to You and the Chief & Factors of Tellicherry to procure two or three Hundred Candys of Sandall Wood of the China sort for Her Who is to be dispatched as soon as possible after her arrival here to take it in and Enclosed comes an Extract of that Paragraph of their Letter to Us, as also a List of The Homeward bound Shipping's arrival in England last Year. This You will receive by our Honble Masters Ship Benjamin, on whom We have laden Two hundred Bales. 200. and twenty two Candy's Thirteen Maunds & Eighteen Pounds 22. 13. 18. of Redwood for Europe and direct That You compleat her Tonnage with Pepper and dispatch her to Europe as soon as possible.

We have put on board Her also Thirty Six Bales one Ditto of Chints &c-Moorees, Some Hospital Cloaths and Madeira Wine for your use.

It is very certain We omitted to insert in The Invoice The Allowance of Freight for The Bales sent by The Princess Augusta, which was Pagodas two thousand five hundred 2500, This Sum We shall Debt your Settlement for as you may Account Current London. What was told You by The Syrang in regard to The Lascars commencing pay The 1st. May was very just.

As We find You are so much in want of a small Vessell for The Service of your Place, We have Directed one to be built accordingly, and also approve of your having ordered Mr. Combes to purchase one; The Sloop Success which was lost here last December You must not omit to write off your Books.

Our present want of Military will not permit Us to spare You any from this Garrison and as to The Peons and Arabians You desire We find they are of so little Service to Us here, That We think it would be only putting The Company to an unnecessary Expence to send You any of Them, provided We could procure their.

Consents to go, but very few of them will do that. You must Therefore make as good a Shift as You can with what few Europeans You have, till You are supplied with more from Home.

In regard to what You write Us concerning Mr. Fordyces bringing away, The Register Book of Marriages &c. We have inquired of Him and He acquaints Us as follows. That it was sent Him here to his great Surprize with some of his own Books he left behind at Marlboro: on the Sloop Success in September last and no sooner He found it among Them but he return'd it by the first Opportunity Vizt. Captain Rannie Commander of the Fanny in the beginning of October and has receiv'd Advice by the Brilliant Snow that Mr. Hurlock had it in his Custody in November at least That it was Then delivered to Him, although You make no mention of it either by That Vessell or Ship Oxford.

We have receiv'd The Fanams and Cash You return'd Us by The Brilliant Snow Page. Fas. Ca.

and now send You on This Ship Fanams to the amount of 3445. 2. 22 and Cash

to Pagodas 87. 10. 16 which are made after The muster You sent Us & this is all We have ready made is the reason We do not now Send You The whole Quantity You desired. The Red & Blue Bettillaes for Colours not being ready also is The Reason Why They are not sent by This Conveyance.

The Ophium which You return'd Us on Account of it's being so bad, having been sold by Captain Byers He has paid Us The amount Thereof, As We have already done of what You wrote concerning Captain Rannie.

The amount of the Certificates you sent Us in favour of Robert Lennox Esq^r. for Dollars four thousand five hundred and The Rev^d. M^r. Fordyce for Dollars twenty nine, One Suco, have been duely paid to those Gentlemen.

Notwithstanding The French have had so many Fleets taken and destroyed This War, They found means to send one consisting of Eight Sail This way which the 10th. June appeared in Sight of this Place and We imagine would have proceeded directly for Pondicherry had not Mr. Griffin been lying here with part of his Squadron at that time, which when They could plainly discern, They immediately hau'ld off to The Eastward, & at dusk tackd and stood to the Southward but This was only a feint for as soon as it was dark They tacked again and made the best of their Way to Madrass, where They landed some Treasure and Military and after a Stay of about two Hours sail'd away again, but which way we are quite Ignorant; Mr. Griffin imagining they might push for Pondicherry about Eleven o Clock That Night, weighed and stood for That Road to prevent Them, and there He lay till the next Evening when finding They did not appear He went to Madrass, but it was too late and so he return'd hither again.

During Mr. Griffins absence Mr. Dupleix thought He could not have a better Opportunity to attack Cuddalore, so the 16th. at Night marched out 2000 Men 900 of which were Europeans, who the next morning We were advised were within 4 Miles of our Bounds and marching to the Southward about noon They were due West of Us and in the Evening went to the Southward & so came round upon Us: But having an account from some deserters that their design was upon Cuddalore there was a Party of Seapoys immediately sent thith[er] and in the Evening Major Lawrence went Himself. at a quarter past nine they begun their attack but met with so warm a Reception that in a very short time They thought it most prudent to retreat with the Loss of about 30 Europeans 50 Blacks & their Commanding Officer, & the next day went back to Pondicherry & not One of our People receiv'd the least hurt.

On the 26th. July we had the Pleasure to see Mr. Boscawen arrive in the Namure with the Deptford and Bomb Tender, and the next day the rest of the Fleet both of King's and Company's Ships followed Him; He is since gone to besiege Pondicherry, and has taken several of the Outworks belonging to it, by which the Enemy have lost a great Number of Men. The Ships have likewise fallen down thither and in a day or two We expect both Them & some Battery's of Cannon and Mortars that

have been erected will begin to play upon the Town; There has been several Bombs already thrown into it which We hear has done a great deal of Mischief, & We hope soon to advise You it is in our Possession.

We are sorry We can find no other Place of Banishment for those Poor Wretches, whose Crimes are not quite bad enough to merit Death; You must therefore still continue to be troubled with Them and this Ship brings You One named Nellanah Who is to remain with You, but the Other named Becan Cawn is to be sent to St. Hellena.

As We have not time to send a Person on board to muster the Benjamin's People and Examine her Warlike Stores, We direct that You do it before her departure from your Place, & send the Lists thereof in your Packett to our Honble Masters.

Inclosed is Manifest of the private Trade We have permitted to be shipp'd on this Vessell & if it is usual to pay Freight for the same You will see that Captain Meard, is satisfied accordingly. We are
