She has on board Eighty Tons of Salt Petre and twenty four of Redwood, for which You have Invoice & Bill of Lading inclosed also her Charter Party & list of her Complement of Men.

The Honble Company write us in a Letter dated 10th. May last "As Hostilities" are ceas'd, our Ships must be dispatched directly home to Us after the 19th. "October next in the usual manner as before the Commencement of the War,

- "directing the Commanders to proceed to our Island St. Helena and after refreshing there for a few days, to make the best of their Way to the Downs" and further in another Paragraph.
- "Notwithstanding the above in case any Men of War are bound home, and any of our Ships can conveniently join them, We would have them come in Company with such Men of War for their greater Security till further Orders."

We therefore advise You (if you have not particular Directions from Bombay relating to the dispatching the homeward bound Shipping) to give the Commanders directions in case of meeting in their passage or at St. Helena with any of the Kings Ships bound home that they put themselves under their Convoy, which may be very proper as We imagine upon a Peace the Sea will swarm with Pirates.

We have put on board this Ship for St. Helena two Tons of Rice & two Tons of Sugar. We are

When we receive the Gunpowder by her we shall Credit your Presidency for the same as also for what pepper she may bring from Tellicherry, as you mention in your Letter of the 24th.

We observe what your Hon. &c. say concerning The loading of Sundry Goods on board our Honble Masters Ships Royal Duke and Elizabeth, and that you were in expectation of receiveing our Directions concerning those Ships. But as they have not yet been deliver'd over to us by Admiral Boscawen and were sent to your place by him to bring the necessary Stores &c. for his squadron we can give you no Answer thereto, thô we are informed that at Governor Wakes desire to have the Elizabeth deliver'd over to him the Admiral has sent Orders for its being done.

The Admiral having discharg'd the Chesterfield from his Majesties Service, that She might not lay idle We have resolved to send her to Madagascar, for a Cargo of Slaves which are not only wanted at the West Coast, but will be very Serviceable here though as this is the first time of any Vessells being sent this Voyage from hence we are unacquainted with what Allowances to make the Commander for his trouble and to the Surgeon for his care of the Slaves, therefore are to request Your Hon^r. &c^a. will inform us, what were granted to Cap^t. Bagwell of the Resolution and his Surgeon, who went on the like Voyage from your place as we are Inform'd.

In our last of the 2^d. Ultimo, but yet the original has not reach'd us, By the Ship Success bound to your place, We have sent You a Supply of 10,000 Madras Pagoda's which is all we can procure at present, but shall send you some more as We can get them for the carrying on your Investment which we are glad to hear goes on well, but if we dont shortly receive a Supply of Cash from Europe we fear We shall be oblig'd to direct You, to put a stop thereto, as we are at present very bare of that Article which is the reason of our sending You no Rupees, as We wrote You in our last we intended & should You be in want thereof for your Current Expences, you must make use of the Pagoda's for that purpose, such part of your Indents for Wares and Stores as We are able to comply with we shall do by this Ship for which you have Invoices & Bills of Lading inclos'd, The Emboss'd Cloth which you represent to be much Damag'd & to have lain a Considerable while in your Godowns, You have our permission to sell at Publick Outcry, for the most it will fetch as there appears no better method of disposing of it.

Our Honble Masters having sent Us by the Pelham, some new Regulations for the Forming and Disciplining the Military here, We therefore inclos'd send You a Copy thereof and direct that you comply therewith as near as you can able [sic] We would have the Military at your Place formed into a Company in the Manner mention'd in the said Regulations and have appointed Lieut. Peter Love Capt. thereof whose Commission to act as such is inclos'd but notwithstanding we would have him come up here by the first Conveyance that offers, Mr. John Turnbull We have appointed to be Lieutenant and Mr. Edward Lewis to be Ensign both which take their Passage on this Ship and on their Arrival must act in those Stations, The Court of Directors have also been pleas'd to order their Covenanted Servants to be paid at Eight Shillings Pagoda, as also their Military which You will observe by the aforesaid Regulations therefore we direct that you act according thereto, our Method of paying the latter here is as follows, We make monthly Payments to the Captain or Commanding Officer of the Company which he pays out to his Men at two payments Vizt. the first of the month and the 15th. By the Arrival here of His Majesty's Ship the Pembroke Yesterday from Colombo, We are inform'd that the Syren Man of War of twenty Guns from England which Place she left the 28th. August has put in there, having by the length of her passage greatest part of her People Sick When she came away. The Peace was not Proclaim'd, but great preparations were making for it, and all the French and Spanish Ports were open to the Ships of our Nation, We expect to see her here in a few days, and that she has a packet for Us from the Honble: Court of Directors.

Having appointed Mr. Thomas Heath to be an Assistant to Mr. Andrews at Ganjam He therefore now takes his passage on this ship for your place and from thence will proceed to Ganjam.

We now send You The Duplicate of our last Letter to your Honr. &ca. of the 31st. Ultimo and the occasion of this is to advise You of the melancholly accident that has happened to a number of ships and Vessells upon this Coast by a violent gale of Wind that came on the 13th. Instant and lasted two days which drove Ashore Five and forty between Negapatam and Sadrass and several others that happen'd to be in the Offing carried away all their Masts, Among the former are his Majesty's ships Namure and Pembroke who were both lying at anchor in this Road till the Evening of the 13th, when they Slip'd or Cut their Cables and put out but the Wind being far Easterly, they could neither of them Weather Cauldron point which is about ten Leagues to the Southward of this place, wherefore the Namure after She had carried away her Masts came to an Anchor & soon after founder'd, and the pembroke struck as She was trying to get round with as much Sail set [sic] as She could carry & immediately Split to Peices, of the Crew of the former only 27 were saved & of the latter but eight, that aboard those two Ships have perished about 950 Men, The Appollo Man of War we fear has met with the same fate as we hear of Vessells being a Shore near a place call'd Devecotah to the south ward and she was seen in the heighth of the Gale near that place & very nigh the Shore, that doubtless it must be her on board of whom was about 330 Men; Our Honble Masters Ships Winchelsea and Lincoln have fared no better being both drove ashore about a Quarter of a Mile to the Southward of this Place & the Sea being very high carryed them so far upon the Strand that they lost very few of their Hands & their Hulls are still entire, but the Prins. Augusta was dashed all to peices about Seven or eight Miles to the Southward, some part of the Crew of which Ship perish'd, The Honble Companys Ships Somerset, Royal George and Rhoda that arriv'd here the 16th. from Bengal met with the Gale of Ceylone, the latter of which had liked to have overset, the Wind having laid her quite upon her side at which time her Cargo Shifted in the Hold, but upon cutting away her Topmasts She righted again & came off only with that loss and the others escaped without any, The Edgbaston that was bound for the Southward lost all her Masts and is in a very bad Condition at present, off Pondicherry where she has rece'd great assistance from Mons. Dupleix, The Tartar & Deal Castle with the Swallow Sloop Man of War, that were also bound to the Southward carried away all their Masts & are at present lying in our Road as are several other Dismasted Country Ships many of which also were wrecked but as yet we are not acquainted with how many belonging to each Nation for Our Neighbours the French and Dutch have met with the same bad Fortune.

The 7th. Instant we receiv'd Advice by the Unfortunate Ship Pembroke who arriv'd here that day from Colombo that the Syren Man of War of twenty Guns, from England, which She left the 28th. August had put in there greatest part of her people being down with the Scurvy, wherefore She purpos'd to stay there some days to recover them, When She came away, as the Packet She brought out for Admiral Boscawen mentions, The peace was not proclaim'd but great preparations were making for it and the Ships of our Nation had free Access to the French & Spanish Ports, We are in daily Expectation of seeing her here and imagine there must Certainly be a packet for Us from the Honble Court of Directors on board her as we are inform'd they have sent out some Treasure on her.

Last Night after having wrote so far came to hand Your Hon^r. &c^a. Favour of the 12th. Ultimo contain^g. the Extract of Europe News &c. Papers.

The Winchelsea after making a further Attempt to gain her passage round Ceylone not being able to effect it returnd here again the 7th. Instant and very unfortunately with forty four more Vessells was wrecked by a very hard Gale of Wind that We had here the 13th. & 14th. Instant amongst which number were His Majestys Ships Namure and Pembroke both of which were at Anchor in this Road till the 13th, in the Evening when they cut or slipt their Cables and endeavour'd to get out to Sea but the Wind being far Easterly, they could neither of them weather Cauldroon Point which lyes to the Southward of this place about ten Leagues wherefore the former came to an Anchor and very soon foundred and the latter struck as She was endeavouring to get round it with all the Sail out She could carry & split immediately, on board of which Ships about 950 Men perished & not above thirty five sav'd their Lives, The Lincoln with the Winchelsea came a Shore about a Quarter of a Mile to the Southward of the Fort, & lost very few of their people, the Hulls of which Ships are still entire, but our Honble Masters Ship Prs. Instant, and are concern'd to write to you upon so unpleasant a Subject as the present which is to advise of the terrible Disaster that has happened to a great Number of Vessells on this Coast by a Violent Gale of Wind, coming on the 13th. Instant, which lasted all that and the next day, and proved very fatal to five and forty Sail that were all laying at anchor when it commenced, besides which several that were in the Offing carried away their Masts and suffered greatly in their Hulls amongst the former are his Majesty's Ships Namure and Pembroke, who in the Evening of the 13th, cut or slip'd their Cables & attempted to get out to sea but the Wind being far Easterly they could not weather Cauldron point which is about ten Leagues to the Southward of this Place wherefore the former came to an anchor and in a short space of time foundered, & the latter struck with as much sail out as She could carry in trying to get round and immediately slpit [sic] to peices, On board of which two Ships near Nine hundred and fifty men have perish'd & but thirty five were saved out of them both, There being no News of the Appollo Man of War that was going to the Southward we are not without Apprehensions that she must be wreck'd also and what Inclines us the more to imagine so is that We have rece'd, information of a large Ship being a shore near a place call'd Deve Cotah to the Southward, & in the heighth of the Storm She was seen very nigh the Shore & close by that Place that we fear She must certainly be gone, on board of whom was three hundred and thirty Men. March as also the two Hundred Bales of Callicoe your sending Us which by the Phoenix Snow, notwithstanding You had recievd no Directions from us at that time for doing so, meets with our approbation and We would have you in future take all good Opportunitys of sending Us, The Quantity You have on Hand when they may offer that is cur'd, tho none but what is so, as we shall with what we provide here, and the Quantity we recieved brown from Your Place last Year, keep our Washers fully Employ'd, We are concernd to hear, that your Merchants have behav'd so ill as to bring in very little that could be taken in and hope they will keep up to their promise of Amendment, & procuring a large Quantity by the End of the Year which we must recommend to you to do all in Your power to prevent their deviateing from.

By a very Violent Gale of Wind that came on here the 13th. Ultimo and lasted all that and the next day upwards of forty Vessells were lost among which his Majestys Ships Namure and Pembroke with our Houble: Masters Ships Prs. Augusta Lincoln and Winchelsea, from the two former not above thirty of their Crew were sav'd tho of the Prs. Augusta greatest part, and only one or two belonging to the two last Were drowned As they were both drove very High on the Shore and near

the Fort His Majestys. Ship the Appollo and the St. Francis Snow a Tender to the Squadron are both also missing and it is much to be fear'd have met with the same Fate.

Our Honble Masters having been pleas'd to order that all their covenanted Servants be paid in future after the rate of eight Shillings Each pagoda, You will therefore comply therewith, And they having sent out orders relating to the Trade of Opium which the Dutch pretend an Exclusive right to, and directed Us to put the same at all our Gates as well as those of the Subordinate Factorys, we therefore Inclosd send You One to be Affixed at that of yours.

Such of the Wares and Stores You have Indented for, as We can spare we have sent you by this Vessell & shall forward the remainder when we recieve further Supplys thereof.

On this Vessell We send You a supply of five thousand 5000 Madrass Pagoda's, and Mr. Alexander Baird to be an Assistant at your Place takes his Passage on her also.

The 8th. Ultimo by the Ship Success Galley We recd. your Letter of the 30th. January, wherein We are much Concern'd to read that the Small Pox has been so fatal on your Island as also that by the want of People to cultivate the Pepper plantations, Our Honble Masters are likely to suffer so greatly on their Investments, but We hope that it hath pleas'd God to put a Stop to that Contagious Disease.

Upon the Account You gave Us of the late Insolent Behaviour of the Dutch at Padaug notwithstanding You wrote to Adm!. Boscawen thereof, We thought it highly necessary, that he should be acquainted with it also from Us, whereupon We wrote him a Letter and requested him to take Cognizance thereof, in Consequence of which He sent a Letter to the General and Council of Batavia, a Copy whereof We now send You Inclosed, as also of his Answer to Us, by which You will perceive that he is determined to Curb the Insolencies of the Dutch and have Satisfaction for the late Indignities they have offered Us.

The Ps^s. Augusta whom We wrote You We Should Dispatch to You in January with the Necessary Supplys for your Settlement, not arriving in Bengal' till December and wanting a good deal of Repair did not return hither till the Month of March, When as the Lincoln was just discharged from his Majestys Service, and We intend to dispatch her to Batavia, We came to a Resolution to load on her the Supplys for your Settlement, and order her to call in her way to Batavia to deliver them, and had put almost her Cargoe on board when on the 13th. April there came on such a Violent Gale of Wind that not only She but every other Vessell that was at Anchor in this Road perished, among which Number his Majestys Ship Namure and Pembroke on board which 950 Men were lost, and out of them both not above 35 were saved. Belonging to our Honble Masters were lying here besides the Lincoln, the Winchelsea and Ps^s. Augusta, which also came on shore and we have great Reason to beleive the like Accident has happen'd to his Majestys Ships Apollo and the S^t. Francis Snow a Tender to the Fleet or that they have founderd as they have been missing ever since the Gale, The French and Dutch between Pullicat and Negapatam Shard the like ill Fortune for not one Vessell belonging to Either of those Nations, that were at Anchor escaped, and the whole Number of Vessels Wreckd are judgd to be about 45, several Vessels that were going down the Coast being in the Offing escap'd with the Loss of only their Masts, and Damaging their Hulls.

In Consequence of the Complaint You made to Us in your Letter of the 10th. April 1748 of Cap^{tn}. Rannies haveing broke a Contract He enter'd into with You to bring You sundry Supplys from Batavia, We on his Arrival here demanded his Reasons for such a Proceeding in Answer to which He gave us a very Sufficient Plea for not returning to your Place from Batavia and at the same time deliverd Us a paper which He said was a Copy of your Agreement with him, wherefore We now inclose it, which Appearing to Us to be only a Promisory Note of yours to him to receive such a Quantity of Rice and Arrack as should be put on board his Ship by Mr. Combes and to make him certain Allowances for bringing the same and nothing binding on his part We could not but be surprised that You should term it a Contract and make a Complaint of his having broke the same, when to Us there seems to have been no Grounds for it.

Captain Barton having made Us an Offer to carry any thing we might have to send to your Settlement freight Free we have therefore put on board the Success Galley Sundrys as \$\mathbb{H}\$ Invoice and Bill of Lading Inclosed, and shall very Shortly Dispatch to You a small Vessell, with a further Suppply by whom We hope to send You the News of the Peace being Confirmed having Expectations hourly of seeing a Vessel from Europe.

Inclosed We send You a Packet recd from the Honble Company by the Tartar, for your Settlement which Ship with the Somerset and Pelham left England in June

last, and Arrived here in January as have the other two since and are both Dispatch'd for China having no Advice of the Dolphin as yet We think it's greatly to be fear'd some Accident has happend to her.

If Mr. Richard Smith Writer at your Place is desirous of coming over to take his Standing here, You may permit him so to do.

As We are informed Coals are Produced on your Island, having Occassion for them for our Smiths Work, We direct that You procure a Quantity ready & send them Us by any Conveyance that may be coming to this Place.

We are much Obliged to your Honr. &ct. for your haveing forwarded to the Northern Settlements, the Treasure Consign'd them on the Tryall.

The Bills you drew on us payable to Messrs. Heyman & Moses for Arcot Rupees. Twelve Thousand & Forty Nine (12049) we have discharg'd, as we likewise shall those in favour of Charles Brett Esqr. for fifty Thousand (50,000) But we must request that your Honour &ct will not in future draw on us to so Considerable an Amount, for as We have this Year Remitted to your Presidency, so large a Share of the Treasure imported from Europe, & only detain'd sufficient for our own Expences we are not Capable of answering such large Demands, without putting ourselves to much Inconvenience.

Yesterday morning our Hoūble Masters Ship the Chesterfield sail'd for England, on whom we forwarded your Packet to the Court of Directors, and the Duplicate will go by the Royal George whom we hope to dispatch in about Eight Days.

We observe the Answer made your Honour &ct. by Captⁿ. Tiddeman upon your demanding of him the One hundred and forty four Pag^s. (144) due to Peter Dencker from the Ship Edgebaston in Consequence of which We have applied to Vellapah Captⁿ. Herefords Dubash, who is said to have in his Possession two hundred Pagodas (200) belonging to Captⁿ. Hereford, and find by his Accounts that the Ballance is in his favour four Pag^s. thirteen fanams and Seventy Nine Cash (4. 13. 79) instead of against him, wherein he has only Debted the Edgbaston for fifteen Oxen bought of a Black Man Amounting to thirty three Pag^s. twenty Seven Fanams (33. 27) and not for those deliverd by Dencker Wherefore We desire the Payment of them may be no longer deferr'd and that You will please to Credit Us for the said Amo^t. as your Presidency at present stands Debted for it.

As we judge by the End of July you will have compleated that Number You are then to give the Commandr. Orders to proceed to this place thro the Inner Passage & the Eight Degree Channel that you may arrive on this Coast the Latter End of August or the beginning of September, You are by no means to stay Longer on the trading Scheme than the Latter End of July although you are considerably deficient of the number of Slaves before specified.

We have put on board six Leagurs of Arrack for the Service of the Slaves & Presents, You must take particular Care to have a Sufficient Quantity of Provisions & Water on board for which Purpose we have Laden on board 60 Tuns of Casks & Order the Commandr. to be always on his Gaurd to prevent their Rising as has frequently happen'd We also direct that you take Care they receive no ill treatment on board DATED in FORT ST. For the Carrying on the Civil Business at Forr Sr. George We have appointed Richard Prince Esqr. Deputy Governour there, & the following Gentlemen of Council Mr. Richard Starke Second, Mr. John Smith Third, Mr. William Smith King fourth, & Mr. John Walsh fifth, and Messrs. Starke and Walsh will set out to morrow to take Charge thereof till Mr. Prince & the rest of the Gentlemen proceed thither which will be shortly.

The fanams You have Requested shall be forwarded You in few days, and as the Cloathing is near made We think it is hardly worth while to send it till it is finish'd.

Inclos'd are Duplicates of what We wrote You by his Majesty's Snow the Swallow.

On the 19th Ulto sail'd for Great Britain in the Exeter, the Honble Rear 'Admiral Boscawen with his Majestys Ships Deptford, York, Chester, Harwich, Eltham & Deal Castle & Young Eagle, the Sheerness & Bomb Ketch saild some days before for the Cape, leaving behind him Commodore Lisle in the Vigilant, Who with the Ruby, Tartar Syren & Swallow Snow are to remain in India, and on the 21st, the Commodore Sail'd from hence on a Cruize as did the Syren & Tartar the Day before & the Ruby the 18th, of that month for Bombay.

Our Honble Masters having by the Sandwich & Walpole transmitted Us an Account of a Deficiency of Several Pieces in sundry Bales of Izzarees which they reed by the Grantham. The same was immediately sent to Mr. Thos. Saunders the late Resident at Ingeram, at which Place they were provided that the Honble Company might receive Satisfaction on Accot. thereof agreable to their Directions, By his Reply to which (a Copy whereof your Honour &ct. will Receive Inclosed) likewise of the Accot. of the said Deficiency, It Appears that the Bales must have been Repacked which We suppose was done at your place, and as the Wax Cloth is mention'd to have been whole, as Your Honour &ct. will Observe by the said

Account We apprehend the Embezlement must have been Committed at the Time of their being Repacked, wherefore We are to Request you will make strict Enquiry into the same and Comply with our Honble Masters Commands to have the Amotof the said Deficiency made good to them.

Upon Revising the Account of Treasure that We have Recd this Year from Europe, likewise what has been transmitted from hence and Received at your Presidency, We find we were guilty of an Error in advising your Honour &ct. in our Letter of the 12th. Septr. that We had detain'd here only two hundred and fortynine Chests, instead of two hundred and Sixty nine, exclusive of what was put on board the China Ships, which notwithstanding is a less proportion than You have been furnish'd with;

As our Honble Masters were pleas'd to direct that Fort St. George was to bedeem'd as a Subordinate Settlement untill We should Receive their further Orders. We have therefore put it upon the same Establishment as this Place was during the time of that's being the presidency, and Appointed Richard Prince Esqr. Deputy Governour there which Settlement in few Years We hope to see again in a very flourishing State.

On the 1st. Instant sail'd from hence our Honble Masters Ships Elizabeth & Fort St. George, the former for Acheen & the latter for Madagascar, as did their Ship Royal George the next Day for Great Britain, by whom we forwarded your Duplicate Packet to the Honble Court of Directors.

Of late, Affairs in the Country hereabouts have been in a very bad Situation-occasion'd by one Muzepher Jung (Grandson to Chicklass Cawn), pretending to a right in the Succession of his Father, which Nazir Jung Son to the said Chicklass Cawn would not Submit to, therefore he seperated from him, and collected an Army of about thirty two thousand Men, when he came into this Province and met with one Chunda Saib, who had for Eight Years past been a Prisoner with the Morattas, but was lately set at large & coming this way with a small force to Rob & plunder where he could to discharge his Ransom, which Person Muzepher Jing fell into a Union with & soon After they came near Arcot where with the Assistance of a Body of French Troops with a Train of Artillery, which Mr. Dupleix at Pondicherry. sent to join them, they in a Battle unhappily defeated Annarvardeen Cawn the Nabob of this Province, Who was himself Slain & his Army Routed upon which Chunda Saib was immediately proclaimed Nabob by Muzepher Jing & they both came directly to Pondicherry where they remain'd some days & have since-proceeded towards Tretchanopoly to beseige it as Mahomud Ally Cawn, a Son of Annvardeen Cawn's is Govr. there, & has by Nazir Jing been appointed Nabob of this Province, who being on his March this Way with a numerous Army will We hope in a short Space make these Usurpers feel the Effects of his displeasure.

By these Commotions our Investment for near three months past have been greatly Impeded, by which We apprehend We shall be Unable to compleatly load the Elizabeth by the End of January.

We have recd. your Severals of the 9th. 16th, 21st, 24th. & 29th. Sepr. and are glad to find You have recd. from Bengall the Treasure and Wares we intended You Tryall Snow which with the Supply You before recd. Pthe Dragon We hope will enable You to make a Considerable Figure in your Investment by the latter End of December, notwithstanding the Time that was lost by the Tryalls overshooting Your Port.

The Ship Success arriving here so very late Obliged Us to reship Your Cloth on board the Chesterfield without resorting it, so that we cannot send You our Remarks thereon but must observe to You that there was too great a Quantity of fine Cloth in Proportion to that of the Ordinary and therefore direct that the quantity of fine Cloth You send Us in Decr. with that which We have already recd. from You may not exceed \(\frac{1}{3} \)d. of the Amount of Your whole Years Investment which will be more in Proportion than is allowed the Merchants of this place.

As the Upparra Salam P³. have been always deem'd the best Ord³. Cloth that is made to the Norw^d. and far Superiour to the Ord³. Long Cloth that comes from Boney & that part of the Country We strenuously recommend to You the Incouragement of that Manufacture, and in future You must not fail to specify in your Invoices the exact quantity of each Sort, under their respective Heads.

You was some time past acquainted with the Military Regulations We recd. from our Honble Masters by this Years Shipping and as Rupees are the Currency of your Place You must pay both Officers & private Men at the rate We are inform'd they are paid at Bengall which is at 2^s : 6^d . the Arcot Rupee & as You have One Hundred Supernumerary Peons that were taken into the Service when Times were looked upon as Dangerous, which ceases to be the Case at present, We direct that You immediately discharge the same and entertain no more than the former Complement of One Hundred or thereabouts.

As We find great Difficulty in procuring Artillery Officers to inable Us to put Things upon the footing the Company has directed We leave You to regulate your Gunroom in the best Manner You are able and to imploy such People and as many of them as You think that Service requires.

If the Gentlemen at Bengall should Order one of our Honble Masters Ships tocall at Vizagapatam to take in your Bales which We suppose they will, You must be carefull not to detain her longer than is absolutely necessary for that Purpose, giving the Commander Directions to call at Fort St. George.

The Upper Terrass of the Fort House at your Place having long since been represented very leaky, and in Order to prevent the Beams & Joices from receiving Damage thereby We think it ought to be repaired without Loss of Time, and therefore grant you our permission to set about it, We would also have you send Us a Calculate of the Cost of repairing the Barracks and other Buildings within the Fort that the same may be taken into Consideration.

In Consequence of the Petition of the Fathers Capuchins, We give them leave to remain in their present dwellings till the 1st. of next month but no longer on any pretence whatever.

We take notice of what Mr. La Metrie has mention'd in Regard to both his Houses being Mortgag'd concerning Which We shall make due Enquiry, and We acquiesce in the permission granted Mr. Jones to live in one of them, till We settle the Rent to be paid for the same.

Although the House adjoining to & belonging to the Portugueze Church, was through mistake omitted to be mention'd in the List of those to be Confiscated it must now be appropriated to the Use of the Honble Company.

Inst. with the Original One and Copys of two others from Mr. De La Mettrie, Who with Mr. Barnewall It is our directions that you call before You and (as it is their strenuous desire) that You acquaint them the Motives that induced Us to arrest them were, In Regard to Mr. La Mettrie, because he not only resided under protection of the French, after the Capture of Madrass, but proceeded to Pondicherry, at a time when We were in actual War with that Nation, and as to Mr. Barnewall because We have sufficient proofs that he acted as Quarter Master to the French Troops, under the Command of Mr. De La Bourdonnais, and We likewise further direct that You deliver to each of those Gentlemen an Extract hereof.

We Observe what You mention in regard to the Bengal Rice, disagreeing with the People, wherefore You have our permission to lay in a Supply of Country Paddy, the Rice must be continued in Store, unless any part of it is damaged, which in such Case, must be exposed to Sale in the Buzars.

With Respect to the Valuation of the Town, We think it improper it should be mentioned on your Books till We receive further directions from our Honble Masters Regarding it, and as to the Confiscated Houses, we would not have them yet brought into your Books, but the rent they may produce accounted for under the Head of Rents & Revenues. The Sundry Garrison Stores received from His Majesty's Ships must be inserted in your Books, without the prices till We receive information of the Terms, We are to have them on.

Having come to a Resolution to continue only a Body of thirty Horse in our Honble Masters Service, all above that Number, at present with You except Ten to Supply any Casualities must be immediately sold by publick Outcry as also the Camels.
