A Letter from the Governour and Council of Pondicherry dated the 9th January N.S. read acknowledging the Receipt of ours of the 22d Ultimo and in answer to what We mention'd about Mr. Dela Mettrie, they say they shall write to him and communicate his Determination; till which time their Protest subsists in his behalf. They then proceed to make Observations upon the Depositions of our Peons &ca. by which (as well as by those of their own People) they say that it evidently appears that the two Sailors were taken by Force from their Districts and whether they were Deserters or not We could not proceed in that Manner, without violating the Rights of Princes and insulting the Majesty of their Sovereign; That our asserting tis the common Custom of all Nations to pursue their Deserters into any Territories and to carry them off if able without it's ever being complain'd of as an Insult is a Maxim entirely new to them and should their Conduct be founded thereon, it would appear very extravagant in Europe. They They [*sic*] cannot refer the Decision of this Affair thither, that our Complaint in regard to Padre Antonio de Purification is entirely owing to our Ignorance or Misapprehension of the Letters that pass'd between him and Mr. Dupleix, Extracts of which they therefore inclose with a Paraphrase for the making them more clear to our Understandings. From the Review of those Letters they take Occasion to run into an E[u]logy on their Governour and defy us to find the least Opening in them for the Imputations We have cast upon him. That it is not the first time he has been falsely aspers'd and acquitted himself with as much Honour as now and will not fail to address himself to the Directors of our Company to obtain by their Order that Reparation which so false an Accusation requires. They conclude by demanding

that the Deserters may be return'd and ample Satisfaction made for the Insult. In Answer to this Letter, it's AGREED to write the Gentlemen at Pondicherry that We cannot think their put[t]ing up a white Flag close to our Bounds or the Depositions of our People any Proof that Paralapetta or Bahour are lawfully the Territories of their Company not that We intend to prescribe Limits to them or suffer them to mark out ours. That their esteeming what We have done in this Affair an Insult offer'd to their Sovereign proceeds from their being unacquainted with the Laws of Nations; since We could instance Examples where their own Nation have pursued Deserters not only into the Territories of other Powers, but even to the very Garrison Gates without it's being look'd upon in that Light. That the two Seamen who are the Occasion of this Dispute belong to his Majesty's Squadron under the Command of Mr. Lisle who will be shortly here and to him We must refer them, But were They Soldiers belonging to this Garrison they would not be returned, as We are sensible They have no Right to them; Copy of their Letter with it's Translate and of our Answer are ORDER'D to be enter'd after this Consultation.

Letter from Mr. Morse requesting to remain some time longer in India Which it's agreed to comply with and a Letter wrote to him, recommending his getting ready to go in September.

A Letter (as enter'd hereafter) from Nicholas Morse Esqr. dated 29th December, read, representing that his Affairs are at present in so unsettled a Condition that his proceeding immediately to Europe must be attended with the utmost ill Consequence both to himself and those concern'd with him, wherefore he desires permission to remain some time longer in India. As the Reasons that Mr. Morse urges for the Necessity of his remaining some time longer abroad are what We well know to be true, It's AGREED that his Request be complied with: But as our Honble Masters have Judg'd it necessary he should return to Europe and directed us to give him Notice for that Purpose. Its further AGREED that a Letter be wrote him strenuously recommending his putting his Affairs in such a Posture as to be able to proceed by the September Shipping, Copy of which is enter'd hereafter.

Letter from a Jesuit at Pondicherry concerning the Money lent the Company by their Padres at China. Ordered to be answer'd by the Secretary.

A Letter from the Reverend Father Memie Gargam Jesuit Missionary at Pondicherry dated the 12th January N.S. read (as enter'd hereafter) acquainting us that the English Company had received from their Padres at China the Sum of twenty thousand (20000) Pagodas at the Rate of 6½ Per Cent which was duely paid 'till the Year 1746 included but that there remains due three thousand six hundred (3600) Pagodas for the Years 1747, 1748 and 1749 which he desires (as their Agent) to know our Sentiments on. In Answer thereto the Secretary is ORDERED to write him that the Honble. Company have not yet authoriz'd us to discharge any Demands that may have been due from them before the Loss of Madfass, but that We expect Orders for that Purpose in a short time when what he mentions will be taken due Notice of.

Import W: Ho: kr: reports a Deficiency of Bullion per Augusta which Capt. Parker is ordered to make good.

The Import Warehousekeeper reports a Deficiency of three Pound eleven Ounces (3^{lb}. 11.) of Bullion in Chest No. 133 receiv'd from England by the Augusta which it's AGREED that Captain Parker do immediately make good and the Secretary is directed to serve him with an Order for that Purpose.

Company's Lead to be sold at Outcry.

As Lead bears at present a pretty good Price in the Country It's AGREED that only a Sufficiency of that Article be reserv'd for the Uses of the Garrison and that the Overplus be sold at Outcry the 15th Instant of which the Import Warehousekeeper is directed to affix Notice at the Several Gates.

Bill of Exchange drawn by the President and Council of Bengal discharged.

The President tenders to the Board for Payment a Bill of Exchange drawn on us by the Gentlemen of Bengall for Arcot Rupees seven thousand, five hundred and twenty five (7525) which is ORDER'D to be discharg'd.

A PONDICHERRY LE 9 JANVIER 1750.

MESSIEURS

Pour repondre a votre Lettre du 22 passé V.S. nous allons en Consequence de ce que vous vous avez marqués au Sujet de Mr. La Mettrie luy écrire et nous vous ferons part de sa Determination et jusques a ce temps la notre Pretestation subsistera dans son entier.

La Déposition de vos Pions se trouve assez conforme a celle des notres et prouve que tout ce que s'est passé envers les Deserteurs a été fait sur le terrain de la Compagnie puisque l'aldée de Paralapetta ou le Pavillon est battant est une Dependance de Bahour qui est a elle avec tout ce qui en depend, Votre Doute a ce Sujet en vous servant des termes de vos pretendues Limittes nous a paru mal placé comme s'il dependoit de vous de limiter l'entendue de notre Domination dans ces Parties de l'Inde, nous vous prions doresnavant de mettre a part ces termes peu mesurés et ironiques, nous n'usons envers vous que de ceux que la Politesse nous permet et nous eviterons autant qu'il sera possible les Termes peu convenables et qui ne servant qu'a aigrir les Esprits, d'ailleurs tout ce que nous vous dirons, sera toujours dans le vray rien ne sera hazardé.

La Deposition de vos deux Matelots est telle qu'elle doit etre, Ils ne sont pas assez depourvus de bon Sens pour s'accuser Deserteurs devant vous, celle de vos Pions est plus que suffisante pour vous prouver qu'ils le sont mais Deserteurs or non ils etoient sur le terrain de la Compagnie; le Droit des Souverains leur accordoit sur le Champ un Sureté que vous n'avez pu violer sans insulter la Majesté de notre Souverain, et si ces Deserteurs n'avoient point été dans l'intention de deserter et qu'ils se fussent simplement egarez on vous les eut renvoyé avec la Precaution de vous demander leur Grace.

Il est donc prouvé par la Deposition de vos Pions et de notres que le fait s'est passé sur notre Terrain, que vous y avez envoyé un Detachment qui a enlevé de force ces deux Deserteurs et pour autoriser cette Operation vous la fondez sur un Maxime qui ne pourra jamais etre admise par les Souverains sans s'exposer a la Destruction totale du Droit des Gens, droit qui assure les frontieres les plus mal gardées, Droit qui affermit la Sureté des Peuples, droit naturel, droit qui a été connu et etably de tems immemorial et que vous memes seriez les premieres a soutenir si on y donnoit le moindre Atteinte ainsy permettez nous de regarder comme bien hazarde le Paragraphe de votre Lettre qui suit " The Common Custom of all Nations pursuing their Deserters into any Territories and if They have force enough, taking of them without it's being ever complain'd of as an Insult."

Tout ce que nous pouvons conclure d'une Maxime si nouvelle c'est que nous ne devons plus trop compter sur ce Droit des Gens et des Souverains, et que nous devons nous mettre en Etat de repousser par la force celle dont vous voulez faire Usage et oublier les traittés les plus solennels, notre Conduite reciproque paroitra monstreuse en Europe.

Nous ne pouvons renvoyer la decision de cette Affaire en Europe vous fondez ce Renvoy sur ce que vous n'ignorez par les Instructions que Monsr. le Commandant general a donné a P. Antoine de la Purification Gouverneur pour les Maures de St. Thome et Procureur general de la Nation Portugaise a cette Cote. Nous n'ignorons point l'arret que vous avez fait de ce Religieux a main armée et de la Saisie de tous ces Papiers et nous pouvons dire que le tout ne s'est point passé sans que ce Droit des Gens dont il paroît que vous faites si peu de Cas ait été violé autant qu'il le peut être mais comme ce n'est pas a nous a le Debattre dans cette Occasion nous nous contenterons de vous dire ce que nous en avons pensé.

Les termes dont vous vous servez au Sujet de ces pretendues Instructions nous auroient causés quelque Surprise a la Lecture de votre Lettre si moins prevenus que nous ne le sommes en faveur de celui qui nous commande, nous avions doute un moment de sa Prudence ordinaire mais Pieces en mains il nous a bientôt fait connoître le faux de votre Accusation et que trop légèrement vous aviez couché cet article sans egard pour luy particulièrement et pour le Poste qu'il a l'honneur d'occuper. Tout ce que nous pouvons penser a ce Sujet c'est que Mr. de Boscawen qui est le Porteur des Papiers du Pere Antoine ne vous aura dit que légèrement ce dont il s'agit ou que la Langue Francoise ne vous étant pas ordinaire vous n'avez pas senti ou voulu connoître la force des termes. Voicy le sujet qui a occasionné la Reponse au Pere Antoine de Mr. le Commandant general, ce Pere luy escrivoit le 5 de Septembre 1749 ce qui suit en Portugaise—" aqui hum Matalot " fiances fogido dos Barcos Inglezes e me pediou queria hir a Pondicherry et " que nao tinha Gastos, Eu doy lhe algumas Rupias et hum Piao e mandey para " Covelao mas hoje me mandou dizer que ainda tinha mais de vinte que todos " viria a nado por esta barra e que si eu promettia fase hir para Pondichery, Eu " lhe respondy que vindo de noite com todo meu corraço faria seguramente chegar " a Pondichery agera Va. Sa. me avije de pressa se he este mesuro ogosto de V : S :

Suit la Reponse de Mr. le Commandant general en datte du 8 : September " Je vous suis bien obligé du Soïn que vous prenez de nos francois Deserteurs " qui se sauvent, ne vous compromettez cependant pas avec les Anglois et faittes " les Choses de facon a ne vous point faire d'Affaire avec eux, je vous rembour- " seray les Depenses que vous ferez a leur Sujet.

Cet Article est suivy dans la meme Lettre d'un autre comme suit, " La Letter " de Mr. Boscawen est fort polie et vous avez lieu d'en être content, affectés de " vous lier d'amitié avec ses gens la et dans vos Conversations ne parles jamais " de nous et lorsqu'ils parleront mal de nous, contentés vous de les prier de cesser " en leur rappellant que vous tenez de bien près a ma femme, en tenant cette Con- " duite et allant audevant de tout ce que leur peut faire Plaisir, vous ferez d'eux " tout ce que vous voudrez.

Ces deux Articles paroîtront a toute la terre dictés par la Prudence et nous osons vous defier d'y trouver le moindre Indice des Imputations que vous en voulez tirer, le Roy, ses Ministres et la Compagnie ne pourront que remercier Mr. le Commandant general de ses Sentimens pour les Sujets du Roy et de son Attention pour eux, Il étoit blamable s'il avoit agi autrement et nous ne pouvons trop en notre particulier le remercier de ses Soïns paternels. La simple Lecture de ces Articles fait d'abord sentir le faux de votre Accusation, et prouve ou que vous n'entendez pas Francois, ou que vous voulez l'interpreter a votre fantaisie, ce que Mr. le Commandant general prescrit au R P Antoine contient des Instructions bien differentes de celles de n'epargner ny frais ny peines pour engager vos Gens a deserter comme il vous a plu de l'avancer dans votre Lettre puisqu'au contraire il luy marque positivement de ne se point compromettre et d' aller audevant de

tout ce qui pourra luy attirer L'Amitié de votre Nation, rien de plus sage que ces Conseils et de plus opposé a ce que vous avancés, il ne luy dit pas non plus de recevoir ny ne pas recevoir les françois qui se sauveront chez luy, il le laisse a ce Sujet le Maitre de faire ce qu'il voudra et s'il les recoit et qu'il les fasse passer icy qu'il luy remboursera les frais que cette Depense occasionnera mais il ne luy dit pas de les attirer; cecy n'est qu'une Paraphrase de ces deux Articles et nous ne la faisons que pour mieux vous les donner a entendre.

Mr. le Commandant General doit ses soins a tous les Sujets du Roy qui sont dans l'Inde n'importe d'ou ils viennent ny ou ils sont il n'ignore pas non plus que nous que ceux qui estoient sur l'Escadre de Mr. de Boscawen ne s'y estoient engagés que pour se delivrer des longues Prisons, ainsy tous ceux qui se presenteront pour rentrer sous le Pavillon du Roy y seront reçus sans nulle Difficulté de notre Part et lors que nous les scaurons refugiés ailleurs que chez vous nous leur procurerons tous les Secours necessaires pour se rendre icy et nous avons tous lieu de croire que nos Superieurs nous rendrons a ce Sujet tout la justice que nous meritons.

Ce n'est pas au reste la premiere Imputation fausse qu'on a legerement avancé contre Mr. le Commandant general, il en a en Mains les preuves qui luy ont été envoyé par notre Compagnie et des quelles it s'est lavé avec autant de facilité que la celley, mais il ne manquera pas de s'adresser a Mrs. les Directeurs de votre Compagnie pour obtenir par leur Ordre la reparation que la fausseté de la derniere l'autorize a demander hautement de vous Messieurs a moins que de votre propre Gré vous ne jugiez a propos de la luy faire.

Nous terminerons la presente par vous repeter que nous ne pouvons consentir au Renvoy de l'Affaire des Deserteurs que vous devez la decider icy en vous repettant que nous reclamons de nouveau les deux Deserteurs pris de force par vos Gens sur les terres de la Compagnie, que nous exigeons une Reparation convenable a l'insulte que vous avez fait avec dessein au Pavillon du Roy et que le Droit des Gens subsiste dans son entier dans toutes les Terres de votre Dependence et de la notre ainsy que nos Souverains respectifs en ont toujours usés de tout temps.

Nous avons l'honneur d'etre tres parfaitement.

TRANSLATE OF THE FOREGOING.

PONDICHERRY 9TH JANUARY 1750.

TO MR. FLOYER GOVERNOR AND
THE GENTLEMEN OF COUNCIL.

GENTLEMEN,

This serves to answer your Letter of the 22d Ultimo, in Consequence of what You observ'd to us regarding Mr. La Metrie, We have wrote to him and shall communicate to You his Determination, till which time our Protest subsists in his Behalf.

The Deposition of your Peons is quite agreeable to that of Ours and proves that what passed relating to the Deserters was done in the Company's Territories, as the Village of Paralapetta where the flag is hoisted is a Dependence upon Bahour.

Your Doubt on this Head in making use of the Terms *your pretended Limits* appears to us ill founded as if it depended on You to mark out the Extent of our Bounds in this Part of India, We should beg of You to make Use of Terms less ironical and less liable to Doubts. Our Expressions to You have been such as Politeness and good Manners have been capable of furnishing us with, and We shall avoid as much as possible reproachful Terms, which serve only to promote ill Will and whatever We shall have Occasion to say to You will be the Words of Truth without severity.

The Deposition of your two Sailors is such as it should be, They have Sense enough not to declare themselves Deserters before You, but the Declaration of your Peons is more than sufficient to prove to You that they were, but Deserters or not They were in the Company's Bounds, where the Right of Princes afforded them a Security, which You could not violate without insulting the Majesty of our Sovereign if these Men had no Intention to desert and were only idly wandering about they would have been return'd You upon Promise of Pardon.

It is then evident by the Declaration of your Peons as well as ours that the Affair happen'd in our Districts and that You sent a Detachment to carry back by force these two Deserters and to shew some Authority for it You make Use of a Maxim which will never be allowed of by any Prince whatever without exposing to total Destruction the Right of Nations, a Right which secures frontier Places even the most negligently guarded, a Right which confirms the Security of the People, a natural Right which has been establish'd and acknowledg'd time out of mind, which even yourselves would be the first to support were any Violence to be offer'd it; therefore permit us to look upon that Paragraph of your Letter as a very bold one which says "The Common Custom of all Nations pursuing their Deserters into any Territories and if they have force enough taking of them without its ever being complain'd of as an Insult.

All We can conclude from this Maxim so new to us is that We ought no longer to reckon upon this Right of Nations or Princes as any thing valid but that We ought to put ourselves in a Condition to repel by Force that which You make Use of and have no Regard to or Remembrance of the most solemn Treaties, Should this be our Conduct in Return it would appear very extravagant in Europe.

We cannot refer the Decision of this Affair to Europe, You found your Remittance on what You are quite ignorant of, the Instructions our Governour gave to the Padre Antonio de Purification Governour for the Moors of St. Thomé and Vicar General for the Portugueze Nation on this Coast. We are not ignorant of your arresting by force this Padre nor of the Seizure of his Papers, and We can say that the Right of Nations which You make so little Account of has been violated in the highest Degree throughout your whole Proceedings in that Affair, but as it is not for us to debate on those Matters we shall content ourselves with giving you our thoughts on them.

The Expressions You make use of on the Subject of the pretended instructions surpriz'd us not a little on the Perusal of your Letter so unexpected that We disregard the Man who is our Chief and doubt for a time his Conduct, but producing the Papers he soon open'd to us the falseness of your Accusation and how lightly You have treated that Article without any Regard to him in particular or for the Post he has the Honour to bear. All We can think on this head is that Mr. Boscawen who is the carrier of Padre Antonio's Papers has not fully represented to You this Affair or that the French Tongue not being generally understood by You You have not known or been willing to know the true Meaning of the Words The Subject which occasion'd the Answer from our Governour to Padre Antonio was as follows, the Padre wrote to him on the 5th September 1749 in Portugueze to the following Purpose.

" A French Sailor who ran away from the English Ships asked me to go to Pondicherry and for Money for his Expences, I gave him some Rupees and a Peon and sent him to Covelon, and to day he sent me Word that there were

“ twenty more who were inclinable to make their Escape by swimming on shore
 “ at this Place if I would promise to send them to Pondicherry, I replied if they
 “ landed in the Night I would with all my heart therefore I desire your Honour’s
 “ Approbation on this Head as soon as possible.

The Answer our Governour made him dated 8th September was Vizt: “ I
 “ am much obliged to You for the Care You take of our french Deserters who
 “ come to You nevertheless make no Conditions with the English but act in such
 “ a Manner as to avoid having any thing to do with them I will repay You the
 “ Expences You may be at on this Account.

The ensuing Paragraph of the same Letter is “ Mr. Boscawen’s Letter is very
 “ polite and You have Reason to be satisfied with it affect to maintain a Friend-
 “ ship with these People and in your Conversation never mention us and if they
 “ speak ill of us content yourself with desiring them to desist in representing to
 “ them that You are nearly related to my Wife and in behaving in this manner
 “ and doing everything agreeable to them You will do with them what You please.

These two Articles will appear to all the World the Dictates of Prudence, and We defy You to find the least Opening for the Imputations You would infer from them. The King, his Ministers and the Company cannot but return their Thanks to our Governour for the Tenderness and Regard he shews to the Subjects of the King. He had been blameable had he acted otherwise and We on our Part cannot sufficiently express our thanks for his Paternal Cares, the bare Reading of these two Articles convinces us of the falseness of your Accusation and proves that You either do not understand the French or that You are willing to interpret it agreeable to that falsity. What the Governour wrote to Padre Antonio contains far different Instructions from what You represent in your Letter *to spare no Charge or Trouble to engage your People to desert* since on the Contrary he ordered him positively not to trouble himself about them but to behave so as to gain the Friendship of your Nation, could any thing be more wise than this Advice or more opposite to what You have advanced? nor did he order him to receive the French who might escape to him but leave him to act as he pleases and that if He should receive them and send them hither, that he would reimburse him the Expences attending it, but he does not tell him to engage them to it: This is only a Paraphrase on these two Articles and We only make it to make it the more clear to Your Understandings.

The Governour owes his Cares to all the King’s Subjects in India no matter from whence They come or where they are: neither He nor We are ignorant that those who were on board Mr. Boscawen’s Squadron only engag’d to deliver themselves from Prisons, therefore all those who shall offer themselves to enter under the King’s Flag will be received without any Difficulty and can We learn they have fled any where but to You, We shall give them all Encouragement to come here and We make no Doubt but our Superiours will do us all due Justice on this Occasion.

Moreover this is not the first false Imputation that has been laid to our Governour’s Charge; He has by him Proofs transmitted by our Company from which he has acquitted himself with as much Honour as from this but he will not fail to address himself to the Gentlemen the Directors of your Company to obtain by their Order the Satisfaction which the falsity of this last requires him strenuously to demand from You, Gentlemen, though it does not suit with You to give it him.

We shall conclude the present by repeating to You that We cannot consent to defer this Affair of the Deserters which You ought to decide here, by repeating also that We again demand the two Deserters taken by force by your People out of the Company’s Territories, and that We require ample satisfaction for the insult offer’d by You knowingly to the King’s Flag and that the Right of Nations may subsist as well in your Districts as ours as our respective Superiours have always observ’d.

TO THE SUPERIOUR COUNCIL OF PONDICHERRY

GENTLEMEN

A few Days ago We had the Honour to receive from You a most extraordinary Letter and were not a little surpriz'd to find You therein accuse us of Want of Politeness and at the same time addressing us in a Style not only indecent but even impertinent and We must take the Liberty to acquaint You that if your last bearing Date the 9th January N.S. was a Specimen of your genteel Writing We desire no more of it.

We cannot think that the Deposition of your Peons at all proves that Paralappetta or Bahour are lawfully the territories of your Company because You have been pleas'd to put up a white Flag close to our Bounds, not that We intend prescribing Limits to You neither shall We suffer You to mark out for us.

Your Complaint of an Insult to the Majesty of your Sovereign in bringing back by force the two Deserters entirely proceeds from your being unacquainted with the Laws of Nations since were we minded to enter into a Debate with You We could instance where your own Nation have pursued Deserters not only into the Territories of other Powers but even to the very Garrison Gates without it's being look'd upon as an Innovation, and You may depend upon it, We shall never deem it an Insult, your recovering Deserters from our Bounds.

In Regard to your Arguments of Force about our Way of Proceeding (which with your own and every other European Power has been customary) it appears evident to us that your Inclinations are not in the least for Peace or Friendship.

Your censuring the Conduct of Mr. Boscawen who is a Man of Honour is taking too great a Liberty as We are fully convinc'd he will be able to reconcile his Behaviour not only to his own Prince but to any other that may think himself injur'd.

We can't help thinking ourselves better Masters of your Language than You of ours by your putting things in so wrong a Light but are much oblig'd to You for pretending to clear our Understandings although your Capacities unhappily come short of your Intentions.

As the two Sailors belong to his Britannick Majesty's Squadron under the Command of Mr. Lisle (who will be shortly here) We must refer You to him for them but were they Soldiers in the Company's Service, they would not be return'd as we are conscious You have no Right to them.

The Right of Nations will always be observ'd by us, nor can We accuse ourselves of any infringement thereof but be assur'd, although We are not capable of giving Insults We shall never fail of returning them, and have the Honour to be

Court of Directors as well as to your Honour &ca. and be set forth in that Manner in your next Address to them. I am

No. 1 from the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort St. George dated the 2d Instant importing that on Mr. Barnewal's Return from Pondicherry they had deliver'd him an Order to quit Madras and its Dependencies within the Space of five Days and acquainted him with our having restor'd his Houses and the Reasons that induc'd us to confiscate them and arrest him, also that Mrs. Madeiros' Bond had been return'd her. That a few Days afterwards Mr. Barnewall sent in a protest, Copy of which they inclose us (and is enter'd hereafter) wherein he threatens most formidable Penalties and as a Subject of the King of great Britain peremptorily demands to be sent thither, that supposing We could have no Objections to gratifying him therein, They had acquainted him that the most proper Method was to repair to Fort St. David from whence a Ship would be shortly dispatch'd and They made no Doubt of his obtaining a Passage on her reminding him at the same time that he must quit Madras that Night it being the Expiration of the time allowed him but he obstinately refusing unless compell'd They ordered Captain Gingins to prepare a Party of Peons and had sent them with Lieutenant Campbell to conduct him through the Mogul's Dominions to this Presidency.

No. 2 from the President and Council of Fort William dated the 21st December acknowledges the Receipt of ours of the 13th and 16th October and acquaints us with their Resolution of sending the Britannia to Surat with Freight and that they shall order the Prince William to touch at Vizagapatam for the Bales lying there. That they shall send us a Quantity of Salt Petre in July next having no Tonnage now to bring it up. They also acquaint us with having accepted our Bill in favour of Mr. Perceval for eight thousand (8000) Arcot Rupees but complain of their great want of Cash and of our detaining so considerable a Part of

what was design'd them by the Honble. Company and requesting We will supply them with all We can spare by the first Opportunity. That they had demanded of Captain Tiddeman the Money due from the Edgebaston's Owners to Monsr: Le Bon for the Stores supplied her at Pondicherry as also the hundred and forty four (144) Pagodas due to Peter Dencher for Provisions, both which Sums he had promis'd to pay and as soon as he did it they should give our Presidency Credit for the same and lastly They acquaint us that the Morattas were very troublesome in the Province and desire We will send them all the Military We can spare.

A Letter from Captain Thomas Parker (in answer to what the Secretary wrote him by our Order in last Consultation) dated the 5th wherein he acquaints us that the Deficiency of Treasure in Chest No. 133 is owing to its being broke open and plunder'd by one of his Sailors whom he detected time enough to save some Part of the Money which he would deliver to us. That the Fellow had remain'd ever since under close Confinement and he desires We will send for him on shore that he may be tried and punish'd according to his Demerits. In Answer to which our Secretary is ordered to acquaint him that as there is no Court here for prosecuting the Person that committed the Robbery We do not think proper to send for him ashore but insist upon having the Deficiency made good immediately, Copy of which Answer and the Captain's Letter is enter'd after this Consultation.

SIRS,

This Day between the Hours of eleven and twelve in the forenoon I receiv'd from You in Consultation a peremptory Order for me to depart this Town of Fort St. George and its Dependencies in the space of five Days, as will appear by the said Order signed by each and all of You, I having well and duly considered the Nature of the Order do now tell You that 'tis not only an unlawful but a barbarous, a malicious and a wicked Order, and such an one that I cannot obey without offending the Laws of my Country, for as a Subject of Great Britain I cannot nor dare I consent to give away or part with so much of my Liberty and Freedom as the abovemention'd Order imports nor can You say that either yourselves or the Governour and Council of Fort St. David can presume to arrogate either of You a Power to banish a Subject of Great Britain as I am from the English Territories into those of the Mahometans or other foreign Dominions or from the Protection of the Laws or his Majesty's Flag.

That I am ready and desirous to leave this Place and to depart from India. I have already told You and now tell You so again, therefore I charge You upon your Allegiance to his Majesty King George not to offer the least Violence to me his Subject more than the Laws can support you in and that You do not presume to make use of any Force or Violence towards me by putting the abovemention'd Order of Banishment in Execution as You shall answer the same at your and all your Perils, But that You immediately cause to be issued out an Order to any Commander of an English Ship bound to England to receive me a Passenger.

And forasmuch as the said Order for my Banishment is You say done in Consequence of one given You by the Governour and Council of Fort St. David, KNOW YE that I Francis Barnewall in the Name of his Majesty KING GEORGE, on the Part and Behalf of all his Subjects as well as on my own Part and Behalf do now enter my Protest and by these Presents I do protest against CHARLES FLOYER, EDWARD CROKE, STRINGER LAWRENCE, ALEXANDER WYNCH, FOSS WESTCOTT and THOMAS COOKE all and every one of them for having issued or caused to be issued the said Order for my Banishment from this English Settlement and Town of FORT ST. GEORGE so manifestly destructive to the Liberties of the Subject and so repugnant to the known fundamental and establish'd Laws of Great Britain; FURTHERMORE I also in the Name of his Majesty KING GEORGE whose Subject I am and on Behalf of all the Subjects of Great Britain as well as on Behalf of myself do by these Presents enter my Protest and accordingly I do protest against You RICHARD PRINCE, You RICHARD STARKE, You WILLIAM SMYTH KING and You JOHN WALSH, all and every one of You in the sum of one hundred thousand Pounds Sterling Money of Great Britain besides all Damages, Costs of Suit, Loss of Credit, Interests suffer'd and to be suffer'd by me Francis Barnewall whatsoever or howsoever in consequence of all and every unwarrantable and illegal Proceeding had and done by You and every one of You and also for Your having issued out and sign'd this Day an Order to expel and banish me out of the English Limits of Fort St. George. AND FURTHERMORE in case You do persist in executing the abovemention'd Order or offer any Force or Violence or Force to my Person by putting the abovemention'd Order in Execution or by expelling or banishing me from this Town of Fort St. George KNOW YE that I do protest and accordingly do hereby protest against You RICHARD PRINCE, You RICHARD STARKE, You WILLIAM SMYTH KING and You JOHN WALSH all and every one of You in the Sum of one hundred thousand Pounds Sterling Money of Great Britain for so enforcing and executeing upon me so very unlawful, wicked and unchristian an Order so greatly tending to the Destruction of the Rights, Liberties and Priviledges of a Subject of Great Britain and the established Laws of the Land. GIVEN under my Hand in FORT ST. GEORGE this twenty eighth Day of December in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and forty nine.

Company's Ships and subscrib'd by Messrs. Hadley, Searle and Kinnersley, giving an Account of an extraordinary and unprecedented Proceedure of the Dutch towards the Arcot a Country Ship belonging to this Place bound to Manilha, whom they visited in such a Manner as made it evident they had receiv'd Orders from Batavia to stop her intended Voyage. He also produces a Letter from Mr. Beawes Supracargo of the Arcot which confirms the above Account and another from Mr. Combes the English Resident at Batavia, who positively says that the Dutch had sent Orders to Malacca not only for detaining all Ships bound to Manilha but likewise any that might have Goods on board proper for that Market. By which Proceedure We are of Opinion so great an Indignity is offered to the English Flag that We cannot avoid taking Notice of it, and 'tis therefore AGREED that a Remonstrance be immediately sent to the Gentlemen at Negapatam desiring They will forward Copy of it to Batavia by the first Opportunity, likewise that Mr. Lisle be acquainted with the Affair as soon as possible. GENTLEMEN,

We are concern'd to have Occasion to leave this Piece of Notice for You by which however We propose as far as in us lies to prevent any Misfortune that You might fall into by entering into this Port of Malacca or by going on shore in the Manner that has been usual.

This Morning the Arcot bound to Manilha came into the Offing and has since been visited by a Dutch Man of War's Boat in such a Manner as to put it out of all Doubt that they have receiv'd peremptory Orders from Batavia to detain her so far as to hinder her Proceeding to that Place, this has been own'd to us by several of the Dutch whilst We were on shore which They have been the readier to acknowledge as it is a thing not at all acceptable to the Government of this Place.

In the Evening We all came on board along with our Commanders who have determin'd to defend her according to the Orders receiv'd at Fort St. David which is to protect the English Flag (under which this Ship has appear'd) whenever there may be Occasion.

We imagine that within this Hour the Dutch Man of War has sent a second Boat after her, She having weigh'd and stood with the Flood further out towards the Water Islands and upon the whole Matter it's apprehended that to morrow Morning We may possibly find ourselves oblig'd to come to Hostilities for which

Reason We have left this Letter to be immediately sent off to any Ship under English Colours coming hither that She may be upon their Guard, presuming that possible Reprizals may be made upon what may happen to morrow.

If this Notice should prove of any use, We will suppose that some such Advices may be left for the next that may come for their timely Caution not to be involv'd in any of these Difficulties which this is meant to preserve You from.

The Arcot has 80 Bales of Piece Goods consign'd to Armenians here which She proposes to carry on with her as it's impossible upon the present Footing to deliver them.

We are sorry to write to You upon so weighty an Affair in such a hurry and Confusion as You may venture to suppose us to be in and heartily wish that into whose Hands soever this may happen, that they get clear of all Difficulties and Embroyls.

The Letter from Mr. Dela Mettrie to us is dated the 27 January N.S. and imports that he had at last (in Consequence of our Orders to the Gentlemen at Madrass) learnt from their Secretary the Cause of his Imprisonment and our Violence towards him, that he shall abide entirely by the late Treaty of Peace and our own Laws for the Redress of Accusations so injurious, that he now transmits us his Protest dated the 26th Instant which will acquaint us more fully of his Intentions and Pretensions, And that he might be certain of it's coming to our Hands, he had taken the Liberty to reclaim the Protection of the Superior Council of Pondicherry from whom he thinks We will not deny it a Reception. In his Protest He enumerates with all the aggravating Circumstances that Animosity can dictate our Proceedings against him with the Disgrace, Danger, Inconvenience and Losses that the same has render'd him obnoxious to. Declaring that He shall take the readiest Method of laying his Case at the Foot of the Throne of his Britannick Majesty; and before the august Parliament of Great Britain, protesting in the most ample and extensive Manner against the Honble. Company of England and us their Agents for whatever has been done ordered and executed against his Person and Effects and rendering us and them answerable for the Amount of near four hundred and fifty thousand 450,000 Pounds Sterling on sundry Accounts therein specified besides reserving to himself the Liberty of adding any other Articles he may hereafter recollect in favour of his Cause which he intends to enjoy as fully to all Intents and Purposes as if They were actually incerted. COPY of Mr. La Mettrie's Letter to the superiour Council of Pondicherry, dated at Marmelon 2 Leagues Distance from the English Limits the 27 January 1750.

GENTLEMEN

I have receiv'd the Honour of your Letter of the 10th Instant, It is true indeed that the superiour Council of Fort St. David have renounced the Right they claim'd over my Person and Effects by a Sentence of Banishment from their City and Territories of Madrass, They mean no doubt by this Retraction so condescending and but ill becoming a Council to evade the Demands You have made upon them for the Discharge of my Accounts with the Company and by a Decree more scandalous than the former to wipe off the Ignominy and affront offer'd to me and to ward off the Demands my Creditors and I are about to make, If they had at first had the latter in View and instead of ordering me to be imprison'd and my Goods and Effects to be confiscated They had immediately on taking Possession of that Place signified to me their Will for my quitting the English Territories my Credit, my Honour, and my Fortune had not suffer'd in the Manner they have and it might have been possible enough for me to borrow Money to satisfy all my Creditors had They insisted on it, But now, Gentlemen, I labour under three different Decrees of Council. The Publickness of the Demand which the Sentence of my Emprisonment in order for my going to Europe oblig'd You to make, The Seizure of my Houses and the repeated Injuries I have suffer'd have been so great a shock upon my Credit that the pretended Liberty which these Gentlemen have now given me will not enable me to fulfill my Engagements; With 60000 current pagodas laying in different Parts of India I find myself at a Loss to furnish the Necessaries which the Preparation for my Voyage to Europe occasions without selling off my Moveables and Plate at a Disadvantage how then shall I furnish the Sums necessary for discharging my Debts; my readiest Help which was the Fortune of my Mother in Law

I am now depriv'd off, for although freed from her Security I can receive no Assistance from her Purse, as these Gentlemen have omitted to pay her the 48000 Pagodas principal with the Interest for five Years, placed by her deceas'd Husband in the Company's Cash. The Governour of Madrass on his Part has prevented all Methods which notwithstanding my Banishment I could make use of by forbidding all the Inhabitants of that Place having any Correspondence with my Mother in law or any of her Family.

Judge Gentlemen from this of the State I am in and of the Clemency of this last Sentence of the Council who give that the Name of Liberty which the Laws would look upon as a Deprivation of my Right as Citizen and would be to me by my seeming to put up with such an Injury a Want of my natural Functions if I had not in the good Faith, Equity Humanity and the Clemency of the English Laws a Refuge and certain Asylum against the unjust Proceedings of this Council, It is for this purpose Gentlemen I have taken the Liberty of transmitting to You the Appeal I am about to lay at the Feet of the Throne of His Britannick Majesty and before the august Parliament of England to obtain Satisfaction, Damages and Interest which the superiour Courts shall be pleas'd to allow me and to the End that I may pursue it with as much Eagerness as these Gentlemen have acted with Violence towards me in the Execution of their Decrees I beg the Favour You will grant me a Passage to Europe; I ought to ask for it on an English Ship but how can I hope to obtain it after such an absolute Denial of Justice from the said Council who kept me confin'd 'till the Evening of the Expiration of the Time of my Security by their first Arrest without answering three Petitions I made to them or acquainting me with the Cause of my Imprisonment. I am French and implore your Protection and Liberty for seeking Justice for what I have suffer'd; on this Account and as I may not be able to express my Protest in the necessary Form and Method I beg You will be pleas'd to receive it to have it register'd and afterwards notified to the superiour Council of Fort St. David whom I, at the same time and manner as You have already done, make accountable to the French Company for the Ballance of my Account with them, which I am unable to pay nor can I answer for my being in a Capacity to pay by my being oblig'd to quit all my India Affairs in general, to go in order to wipe off the Stain of Infamy which the Execution of these three different Arrests have thrown on me.

GENTLEMEN,

You are at last eas'd of the Weight of our Iniquities and out of your abundant Justice after two Months and a half Entreaty have condescended to give us (my Brother in Law and Me) the Reason for your Violence towards us and the Cause of your Imprisonment Four Days after the Execution of your Orders for my Banishment, Your Secretary to the Council of Madrass transmitted me an Extract of your Letter of the 10th December O.S. to the said Council which no doubt you mean as an Answer to that I took the Liberty to write You of which You mention the Receipt, in the said Extract You direct (in order to satisfy my repeated Sollicitations) that the said Council should signify to me that the Cause of my Imprisonment was my having resided in Madrass after the taking of the Place under the Protection of the French Flag and having gone to Pondicherry during the War with that Nation. The last Treaty of Peace cannot be more clear or more expressive and it is a great Deal of Clemency and Justice entirely contrary to your Arrest. That perhaps gives You Offence and as it is not intended (though You do) that the Misfortunes of the War shall extend or be remembered after it, so shall I abide (with your Permission, Gentlemen) entirely by that Treaty and your own Laws for Redress of Accusations so injurious; and for that End I now transmit You my Protest dated 26th Instant which will let You into my Intentions and Pretensions; and that I may be certain of it's coming to your Hands I have taken the Liberty to reclaim the Protection of the superiour Council of Pondicherry to whom I think You will not refuse to acknowledge the Receipt.

To the Gentlemen of the superiour Council of Fort St. David, to Major Lawrence the former Governour of Madrass and to the present Governour and the under Council of the said Place.

GENTLEMEN,

You have pronounc'd and put in Execution three different Arrests against my Person injurious, grievous and defamatory You have made Use of Military Violence for my Imprisonment and Banishment from your City and Territories of Madrass You have stuck at Nothing to ruin my Credit, my Honour, my Reputation and my Fortune. By an absolute Denial of Justice during the time I was under the Power of your Arrest, You Prevented my justifying myself by refusing to acquaint me with my Crime and by your last Sentence which still augments the Disgrace You have loaded me with You have averted my Executing the Security I gave for my appearance in January by having yourselves given it up If Gentlemen You think by this Proceeding to evade the Appeal I have a Right to make by repealing your three Arrests and thereby to put a Stop to the Justice of the Laws of your Nation against the Injustice of your Proceedings, I declare to You the President and to You the Counsellors of the superiour Council of Fort St. David and to You Agents for the India Company of England that notwithstanding these Obstacles laid by You in my Way, I shall take the readiest Method of laying my Case at the Foot of the Throne of his Britannick Majesty, and to the End that You may not pretend Ignorance, I signify to You by this that I protest against whatever has been done ordered and executed against my Person and Effects and without Derogating in any Manner from the customary Laws and Ordinances which may be partial by my being a Stranger and a French man I implore the Authority of the august Parliament of England and of the Courts to which my Cause is referr'd to obtain satisfactory and publick Reparation Damages and Interest and every thing that can be given against You whether criminal or civil and as the three Arrests abovemention'd, the first of the 11th September O.S. the second of the 13th November and the third of the 20th December 1749 (Copies of which have been transmitted to me by the Governours and Secretaries of your Council of Madrass) have been dictated by You the President and Counsellors of the superiour Council of Fort St. David and put in Execution by You the Governours, Council and Officers of the Garrison of Madrass all by and in the Name of the India Company of England, I sue the said Company as being answerable for the Proceedings of their Agents, and You the President and Counsellors of Fort St. David You the Governours and Council of Madrass and each of you singly and separately in your own private Name, and all those who may have had any Part in the Violences exercis'd against my Person and Effects and Family making You responsible for the Sum of sixty thousand Current Pagodas which I have laying in different Parts of India which the Voyage You obliged me to prepare for by your first Arrest and now the Necessity of my requiring Satisfaction for my lost Honour and Credit oblige me to depart from. And as the Recovery of the said Sum requires my being on the Spot and which my Departure for Europe will prevent my paying: in Consequence of such Departure I make the India Company of England and You their Agents answerable to the French Company for the Sum I am indebted to them in the same Form and Manner that the superiour Council of Pondicherry have already rendered You responsible Item I make You answerable for the Sum of Pagodas 22000 which

I am indebted to particular private People which the Publickness of my Loss of Credit the Sum for my Appearance in January, my Absence from my Affairs and the indispensible Risque of my Voyage which your Arrest obliges me to will incapacitate me to discharge. Item in Consequence of my Departure as abovemention'd and the Losses that may attend it, I make You responsible to my Wife Catherine Barnewall and to my Children for the Sum of thirty two thousand Gold Pagodas being so much receiv'd from the said Woman and for two thousand, Eight hundred Pagodas to her Inheritance.

Item as You the President and Council of Fort St. David have by your second Arrest confiscated and seized for the Benefit of your Company two Houses belonging to me situated in the Town of Madrass and have obliged me by acknowledging the Mortgage of the said Houses to lay open my Affairs, I make your Company and You their Agents indebted to the Creditors of the said Mortgage the Sum of seven thousand thirty nine Pagodas, fourteen fanams, fifty four Cash: As if You have claim'd a lawful Right over them the Houses belong to the Company; and if You have taken them having no Right They still belong to them and by Virtue of your Act of Seizure and the Tenour of your Arrest in Opposition to the last Treaty of Peace and are consequently charg'd with the Acquittal of the said Mortgage and after what has been said on the Subject of the said Houses I declare to You that I shall oppose the Seizure's being taken off which was signified to me at the time of my Proscription as your renouncing it is only on account of the Mortgage therefore I acquaint You that if your Governour and Council of Madrass refuse to receive the Keys of the said Houses I shall only keep them till our lawful Right shall be decided in Favour of the one or the other by a Sentence of Court Item to obtain Satisfaction for this Oppression, the depriving me of what Nature my irreproachable Conduct and Fortune has made most dear to me and in Compensation for the Risques and Dangers I am obliged to hazard to wipe off the Spot of Infamy You have thrown on me by carrying me by force from my House at 11 o'Clock at Night between the 22d and 23d October N.S. by my Imprisonment, by the sudden Warning for my Departure for Europe which nothing less than the Risque of my Mother in Law's Fortune by her having given Security in the Sum of twenty thousand Pounds Sterling could avert and for the Losses my Trade has suffer'd I likewise make you answerable as well as for the Profits which the Tranquillity restored by the late Treaty of Peace put me in a Condition of making by my Alliance to a rich and opulent Family and which You have entirely overset and destroyed by ruining my Credit. I again sue the said Company of England and You the President and Counsellors of the Superiour Council of Fort St. David and You the Governours and Counsellors of the Council of Madrass and make You responsible to me (and in Case of my natural or violent Death during the Course of my Voyage going or coming) to my Wife Catherine Barnewall and to my Children for the Sum of two hundred thousand Pounds Sterling Money of Great Britain and as when You ordered and put in Execution the Order for my being seiz'd, my Imprisonment and for my embarking You did not pretend any further Right over my Person than as a Citizen and ancient Inhabitant of your City I protest against the Sentence for my Banishment from your City and Territories of Madrass and against the Execution of the said Sentence put in force the 25th December 1749 O.S. by Capt. Macdonald the Officer of the Guard and commanded so to do; and forasmuch if your pretended Right over my Person is well founded as being a Citizen I ought to have enjoyed the Benefit of the said Laws by which You were authoriz'd to act with such Rigour against me, I am consequently under a Necessity of making your said Company and You their Agents responsible for the further Sum of two hundred thousand Pounds Sterling Money of Great Britain as well for the meaning as the Execution of the said Banishment which could not nor ought to have been put in Execution having yourselves allowed and confirmed to me the Priviledge of a Citizen by the pretended Right You have claim'd over my Person and for Satisfaction for the Dishonour, Ignominy and Discredit I labour under by this Sentence as well as my Wife my Children and

Family I demand whatever the utmost Rigour of the Laws can and ought to give me in this Case as well as for the absolute Denial of Justice on your Part from the Day of my Imprisonment to the Time of my Proscription and to the End that the present Protest may be no ways deficient or liable to be annulled I mean to renounce all and every Clause capable of invalidating it not being in a Capacity myself by means of my Banishment to put it in the due and necessary Form: as I also mean and intend to enjoy every Clause and Article which may any ways be assisting in the said Protest in favour of my Cause as if they were actually herein inserted and to prevent any Accidents that may attend by my Death or Delay in the Prosecution of my Voyage I appoint my Brother in Law Francis Barnewall to carry on the said Suit and in Case of his Death Charles Quentin my Agent in Europe and fully empower them both or each of them for this Purpose and declare that my Will is in Case of my Death or Absence that they act and demand for my Wife Catherine Barnewall and for my Children, full Satisfaction, Damages and Interest requir'd in this Protest from those whom it may concern. In faith of which I have sign'd the present 2 Leagues from the English Territories at my Country House at Marmelon a Village belonging to the Moors, the 26th Day of January in the Year 1750 and having no Witnesses have affixed my own Seal thereto.

Your Assistance to those cursed Rebels is very bad and will lead You into Misery and an unhappy State, I cannot but imagine your Union with those Wretches and Disturbance in the Mogul's Country proceeded from your Want of Sense which will be a Means of Evil to You both in this and the other World and will bring Shame and Disgrace upon You, if any unhappy Wretch should join the Rebels He will be like to black Ashes. I therefore require You to take Care of yourself in future and abandon the Rebels entirely and in Order to make Amends for your past Misbehaviour You'll endeavour to weaken those cursed Traitors and blot out the ill Name which You have got. If you continue to assist them it will bring Shame and Trouble upon You. Observe this as a Warning of my firm Resolution.

Instant read, in which he sets forth his having been acquainted by the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort St. George with our Answer to his last Letter and after expatiating upon our Proceedings against him, acquaints us as We had thereby depriv'd him of the Rights of an Englishman he was compell'd to apply to the Governour of Pondicherry for a Passage to Europe on one of the French Company's Ships which had been granted him, that he is now going to England to seek Redress from his Majesty and the Laws of our Country for the Injuries We have done him, that what We have laid to his Charge of having acted as Quarter Master is both scandalous and false and had We applied to Mr. Morse for the Transactions of the 11th and 12 September 1746, We should have found how it came about and who employed him and he is persuaded alter'd the Opinion We have entertain'd of him in that Respect; He also tells us to remember having omitted to reply so fully as We ought to have done to his Letters and as We have thought fit to confiscate his House in the White Town, He will not receive it back again on any Consideration and likewise as it was in Consequence of our Orders that he was imprison'd, his House confiscated and he banish'd from his Majesty's Flag and the Bounds of Fort St. George, he therefore protests against us in the Sum of two hundred thousand 200000 £. Sterling of Great Britain besides all other Damages that may accrue to him from those our unwarrantable and illegal Proceedings and moreover protests against us in the Sum of two hundred thousand 200000 £. Sterling of Great Britain for enforcing and executing upon him so very illegal Acts of our Authority which Letter and Protests are order'd to be enter'd hereafter.

SIRS,

I had the Honour to receive the 28th December last from the Deputy Governour of Fort St. George your Answer to them upon my last Letter to You of the 13th December wherein to my no small Disappointment I find the mighty Crime I stand accused of and for which I have suffer'd Imprisonment, Confiscation of my House and a Bail of twenty thousand Pounds and to sum up all I was told the same Day that there remain'd to crown these Proceedings against me no less or mild a Sentence than Banishment from the English Flag and Bounds of Fort St. George in Consequence of Orders receiv'd from You, I deliver'd in my Protest to this Act of your Authority to the Deputy Governour and Council of Madrass and I waited to see whether they were in earnest, I found to my great Sorrow and Surprize they were by putting the Order of Banishment in Execution the 2d Day of January, as I had already receiv'd too many Affronts of this kind from your Governours of Madrass to avoid the ignominious one they threaten'd me with I thought it most proper and most prudent to submit to the written Order they deliver'd me the said 28th Day of December and retir'd to Pulicat chusing rather to reside in an European Settlement than to wander amongst Moors and Infidels, 'till I got my Affairs in some Readiness to repair to England; as I address myself to You several times without being favour'd with a Reply and the Council of Madrass telling me that it was not in their Power to grant me a Passage to Europe on the Company's Ship bound to England this Season, as the said Ship was not to be dispatch'd by them, moreover as by the Order of Banishment I was depriv'd of the Rights of an Englishman, I was compell'd to apply myself to the Governour of Pondicherry for a Passage to Europe on one of his Company's Ships which he has been so good to grant me.

I now tell You, Gentlemen I am going to England to lay my Grievances and the Injuries You have done to my Credit as a Merchant and to my Person as a Subject of Great Britain before His Majesty King George and the Laws of our Country who will not support You I am persuaded in all your illegal and barbarous Proceedings against me.

Believe me Gentlemen your saying I was Quarter Master to the french Troops under Mr. Mahé De la Bourdonnais is both false and scandalous, for I detest such a Service and was ever too good a Subject of his Majesty to have even thought of the French or other Foreign Service in my Life But had You been so gracious as to have made any Enquiry into this Matter You would have found how it came

about, who employed me, and what I did and I am persuaded You will alter your Opinions of me, when you take the trouble to apply yourselves to Mr. Morse for the transactions of the 11th or 12th September 1746.

Now pray Gentlemen tell me whether or not You think this will justify You in any of your rigorous Proceedings, but this seems to have been more the Effects of your Malice than justice and such a trivial Pretence I believe you were constrain'd to make use of instead of a better and even this has been a long while ere it could be drawn from You.

Give me Leave to assure You Gentlemen I abhor Falsehood and Treason and every thing tending towards them as much as any one amongst You can do, and I make no Manner of Question but I shall be able to convince the whole Universe of my Loyalty and Allegiance being unspotted in spite of all that Malice itself can invent to render it otherwise.

Remember Gentlemen that You have evaded replying to my Letters so fully as You ought, and as you have thought fit to confiscate my House in the White Town of Madrass to the Company's Use, I hold You accountable to me for the same for I will not receive it back again from your Hands, upon any Arguments or Considerations You may offer for that Purpose, I have signified the same to your Governour and Council of Madrass.

Forasmuch as in Consequence of Orders from You to Major Stringer Lawrence and to Mr. Prince and Council I was taken out of my House by a Military Officer and imprison'd in the Fort of Madras under the Charge of three Centinels, my House confiscated and banish'd from His Majesty's Flag and Bounds of Fort St. George, Know Ye that I Francis Bar[newall] in the Name of his Majesty King George on the Part and Behalf of all his Subjects as well as on my own Part and Behalf do now enter my Protest and by these Presents I do protest against You Charles Floyer, You Edward Croke, You Stringer Lawrence, You Alexander Wynch, You Foss Westcott and You Thomas Cooke all and every one of You in the Sum of 200000 Pounds Sterling Money of Great Britain besides all Damages, Costs of Suit, Loss of Credit and Time, Interests suffer'd and to be suffer'd by me Francis Barnewall whatsoever or howsoever in Consequence of all and every unwarrantable and illegal Proceeding had and done by You and every one of You for having issued or caus'd to be issued out the said Orders for my Imprisonment, the Confiscation of my House and my Banishment from the English Settlement and Town of Fort St. George and its bounds, so manifestly destructive to the Liberties of the Subject and so repugnant to the known fundamental and establish'd Laws of Great Britain.

Moreover know You that I do protest and accordingly do hereby protest against You Charles Floyer, you Edward Croke, you Stringer Lawrence, you Alexander Wynch, you Foss Westcott and You Thomas Cooke all and every One of You in the Sum of 200000 Pounds Sterling Money of Great Britain for so enforcing and executing upon me so very unlawful and illegal Acts of your Authority so greatly tending to the Destruction of the Rights Liberties and Priviledges of a Subject of Great Britain and the establish'd Laws of the Land. GIVEN under my Hand and Seal in Pondicherry the 2d Day of February in the Year of our Lord, one thousand. seven hundred and forty nine, fifty.

As in the late Troubles I had taken all possible Care to preserve and bring out of Town all the Accounts I had of the Business I was employed in, I hope the putting them together as perfectly as can be may be look'd on as an acceptable Employment and in that View I here present to You the Fort St. George Paymaster's Accounts for the Months July, August, September and October 1746.

As these Accounts consist of so great a Variety of Articles and especially while the White Town Fortifications were in hand though the other Parts of the Account lay in a readiness to be tender'd on the last Years Dispatch for Europe yet as some of the People who sent in the Supplies of Materials were not then return'd to us to make up their Accounts I thought it better to wait the Expectation of them than to present your Honour &ca. an Account with some of those Articles imperfect. And this I humbly offer in Excuse for what may thus seem to be an Omission on my Part.

I have been careful that these Accounts are as correct as can be and that no more stands on them than the Charges really incurred as may be observ'd on the Charges Garrison and other Heads by comparing the Accounts subsequent with that for the Month of July and

As the Occasion for most of the uncommon Charges is generally express'd in the Account, I presume I need not trouble your Honour &ca. with any farther Observations on them, and

When a due Allowance is made for the unhappy Occasion and the Cost of the necessary Preparations and of the Provisions laid in for the Siege, I hope the whole will appear no more than necessary.

As the Company's Cash by the large Advances made for the Investments was at that time very much reduc'd, so the Advances to the Paymaster were not equal to the extraordinary Expences at that Juncture by which means there lies a Ballance of Pagodas 3562. 15. 78 in my favour, and as I have been thus long out of that Money for the Honble. Company's Use and am besides a very considerable Sufferer by the Loss of a large Amount of Brick and other Materials provided for the Fortifications in hand, As such I beg your Honour &ca. after the perusal of them will be pleas'd to make mention of them to the Honble. the Court of Directors and to let them go in your Packet for their Inspection and I pray their Honours will please to give such Directions as they may think proper, and that I may be reimburs'd the Amount of what [was] so necessarily laid out for the Service of the Settlement.

TRANSLATE of a Phirmaund under Nabob Mahomud Ally Cawn's Seal Dated the 1st of Moon Sapher Hegra 1163 answering Decr. the 31st 1749 O.S.

WHEREAS Tervendaporam Country belonging to the Carnateek in the Pain Gaut Bounds under the Government of Golacunda, was delivered up to the English at Fort St. David in the year of Phasely 1159 according to the particulars hereunder written on condition they come and join us with a Force and other necessaries whenever they may be call'd for upon the Circar's Business; They may therefore be perfectly easy and continue in their Duty and obedience and be ready to serve the Circar.

Dasamokeys, Dasapandies, Mokedems, Inhabitants and others belonging to the said Country are hereby requir'd to pay due allegiance to the English on whom the Affairs of the said Country depend and they are likewise requird to look upon them as Persons of such Authority as what may be said by them concerning them whether they be good or bad will be deemed by us Authentick and they are strictly enjoind to act agreeable to this writing.

Tervendaporam Country belonging to the Carnateek in the Pain Gaut Bounds under the Government of Galaconda was delivered up to the English in the Year of Phasely 1159 according to their request which was granted by the head man as will appear hereunder on condition they assist and Join the Circar.

A MANIFEST of the request of the English endorsed on the back of the Original according to the Custom of the Durbar is as follows.

A Letter from the English at Fort St. David is arriv'd hither to be enter'd upon the Records which mentions that the French took Possession of Tervendaporam Country belonging to the Carnateek in the Pain Gaut Bounds and that as the same will be Detrimental to the interest of the Circar and to their own affairs at Fort St. David, they are desirous that a Phirmaund may be granted to them for that Country that it may lay them under an Obligation so as to engage them to adhere to the interest of the Circar and they desire to know our will in this Case.

A manifest of the head man's Answer to it by his own hand also endorsed is as follows.

Grant a Phirmaund for it on condition that they Join us and adhere to the interest of the Circar.

N.B. The Original was attested by the Divan with his proper mark as may be seen in it, setting forth that the Copy of this Phirmaund was Registerd in his Books in the 1st Day of January 1749/50. Mustaphey an Officer attested the Original with his proper mark as may be seen in it setting forth that the Copy of the Phirmaund was Register'd in his Books in the above Date.

SIR

I am just now advis'd that your People have taken Possession of Trevendaporam, and it's Dependancies; and that they have likewise carried before You One Chandra Chekara a Braminy, whom I had plac'd there to collect the Rents: Abdull Jaleel some days before also carried away this same Braminy, but You oblig'd him to send him back and your Dubash Mouddere Quishenapoule lent him his Palankeen to carry him to the Place from whence Abdul Jaleel had taken him; upon which our Dubash Rangapoule wrote your Dubash a Letter of thanks the Conduct observ'd at present is intirely opposite to what I have the honour now to represent to You I do not any way pretend to dispute the Right You may have to act in the manner You do: I only complain that those Villages being mortgaged to the Company for 12000 Rupees and the Kings Flag fix'd there, You have not judged proper to advise me of your intentions, before your People remov'd this Flag You could not be ignorant of these Villages being mortgag'd to the Company, and it is above 4 months since Our Flag was set up there; and our Dubash Rangapoulé in the abovemention'd Letter of thanks to your Dubash gave him an account of the Lands that were mortgag'd, which I now repeat: The Lands of Tevenapatam those of Tervidy Panerotty, of Vengata Pette, of Bouanaguirry, of Ville paron, of Tirtanaguiry, of Portonovo, of Covelon, and Ponemelly Your Merchants have begg'd of Rangapoulé that they may rent many of the Villages of Tevenapatam.

Being thus acquainted with these Circumstances the Respect due from us to the Flags of our seperate Monarchs should have induced You to have advised me of the Priviledges You may have as I declare to You beforehand if the Great Mogull in Person should tell me to remove your Flag from any part whatever in his Dominions I should give him an answer which might make him sensible of the Respect We reciprocally owe to each Other, I could wish You had been willing to think in like manner, and not affect a kind of Contempt for a Flag to which the same Respect is due from You as from Us to yours; One word of advice would have sufficed but You have not judg'd that proper; and oblige me thereby to protest against You for the Injury offer'd our Flag and for the Loss that may accrue to our Company from taking off the Mortgage. I shall as soon as possible furnish you with the Accounts of what has been received to this time, the remaining will be on your account. I beg of you to think that I should be very cautious of shewing to this Rabble the Moors so glaring a Contempt to your Flag as You have shewn for Ours. It can never be approv'd by your Superiours, who will see as I do the mischievous Consequences that may attend the Example You have this day set me.

I hope You will be pleas'd to return the Braminy if You do not look upon him as your Prisoner of War. I must not forget to tell you that in the number of the Villages, which compose the extent of Tevenepatam, there are 5 nam'd Nellatoor Mandagut Patton, Vana Medeve Viraperoumal nellour Annavaly which have been given as a present to our Dubash Under the Protection of the Company and where the Flag has been fix'd for some time past.

GENTLEMEN

Our Governour has laid before us A Letter he has received from Mr. Dupleix, and has taken a good deal of pains to search into the Complaint we believe by the inclos'd Declarations made by your people plac'd there to collect the Rents, that t'will appear a groundless one. Our Governour sending back Your Braminy that was taken by Abdul Jaleel is a strong proof of his desire to avoid giving you any Offence, we were so far from looking on Your Braminy as a Prisoner, that he never has been under the least restraint and only desird to come in and see the Grant we have for Trevendaporam and all its dependancies, and he was told that he was at Libery to go where he thought propper. By this we have the Honor to advise You that we have hoisted our Colours at Trevendaporam and that it and all its Villages belong to the English Company you cannot think yourselves any way neglected by not having earlyer Notice of it, since you never thought it worth your while to give us the least intimation of your hoisting Flaggs close to our bounds, you may assure your selves that we shall always show the same Respect to your Colours, that we expect from all other Nations (at Peace with us) to Ours we can have nothing to do with your Mortgage on those Villages now become ours and believe you had better apply to the Person you lent the Money to for Payment.

As We are inform'd that the Peyton Galley fitted out by us in 1747 on a Voyage to the Streights of Malacca is lately arriv'd at Porto Novo, which Ship with her Cargo was, in the year beforemention'd Piratically and Forcibly taken by the People of Rio, and the Captain and Officers Murder'd; all which Circumstances could not but be known to the King of Cuddah; notwithstanding which the Ship is said to be Purchas'd by him and now sent to the Coast; whether with or without any part of her Cargo we cannot say; but some part he did buy, as we have been assured. We presume Your Honour &ca. will be of Opinion that the People of Rio could give him no proper Title to either the Ship or any part of her Cargo, and that our Property remains in them, and that we are Intitled to the Protection of the Honble. Company in our Lawful Commerce WE THEREFORE take the Liberty of Addressing Your Honour &ca. for Relief in the Premises, which we doubt not you will be so good to favour us in, As well in regard to the Justice of our Case, as to discourage such practices in future; Since if these People can find Persons to abet and aid them in the Disposal of what they have gotten by such means, it may incite them to Commit further Acts of the like Nature, and render the Trade in those parts more hazardous. All which we submit to your Consideration, And are with Respect

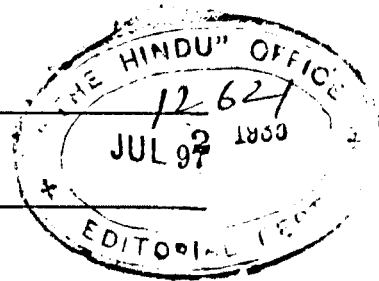

The President acquaints the Board that the Reason of his summoning them at this time is to communicate two Letters he has rec'd from our Ambassadors at Nazir Jings Camp the first dated yesterday encloses Copy of a Protest which they think it would be proper to send to Pondicherry on occasion of a Notorious Insult committed against the Flag of our Sovereign by the French Troops in the Field on the 24 Instant, the Day when Nazir Jing engaged the Enemy The propos'd Protest being also read contains a Particular Account of the Indignity offerd us and sets forth that on the Day above mentiond they did actually fire upon and wound some of our People then marching under English Colours to the Attack of Chunda Saib's Army; The Board calling to Mind the Letter laid before them the 26 Instant from the Commanding Officer of the French Troops to Captain Cope, are at a loss to express the Greatness of their Surprize to find this same Officer offending in so flagrant a Manner against Treaties; he had just before mentiond with the greatest Veneration and AGREE that a General Letter be immediatly wrote to the Governour and Council of Pondicherry to the above purport and that it be sent with the Protest abovementiond to Camp to be there sign'd by the Ambassadors also, and from thence forwarded to Pondicherry This Letter and Protest are enter'd in the Books of French Correspondence under No. 9. The second Letter from the Ambassadors to the President is dated this Morning and advises him that finding it would be agreeable to Nazir Jing to propose a Peace between him and the French, They had wrote a Letter to the Governour and Council of Pondicherry to offer themselves as Mediators The Board cannot but highly approve this Proceeding though they are sensible of the little Effect it will have upon the French whose ambitious Designs it is plain are no ways to be Curb'd from their taking no notice of the Mediation formerly propos'd by us in our

General Letter of the 10th Ultimo. These Pieces will however be a Proof to our Superiors and the whole World that the Tranquility of the Province and a speedy Restoration of Peace were the Ends propos'd by us from the Beginning and that our utmost Endeavours have not been wanting to arrive at them.

Several Buzar People that attended with Provisions to supply the Troops on the first Expedition to Tanjour making Complaint to the Board that they lost a great deal of their Stores partly by crossing the Rivers and partly taken by the Enemy and that by this they are quite disabled from being of the same Service on any other Occasion. they therefore hope that, We shall think it reasonable to make them some Recompence: Their request being considered the Board think it very hard that the Poor People should suffer for their Readiness to serve us and as in all probability we shall have further use for them, it is AGREED that they be repaid out of Cash and that two hundred and forty five (245) Pagodas (the amount of the whole Loss) be deliverd out for that Purpose and brought to account under the Head of Expedition to Tanjour.

Several Buzzar People paid for their Losses on the first Expedition to Tanjour.

Two Letters from the Ambassadors dated this Morning are now read, advising their having drawn on us two Bills for Money taken up by them for the use of the Troops in Camp, one in favour of Buckanjee Doss for five thousand (5000) Arcot Rupees the other of Captain James Cope for two thousand, seven hundred and forty six Arcot Rupees, thirteen Anaes (2746. 13.) The said Bills being now tender'd for Payment are ORDERED to be discharg'd and brought to the Account of the Present to Nazir Jing.

Bills drawn by the Ambassadors discharg'd.

The President reads the Cash Account for last Month Ballance whereof now compar'd with the Chests is Pagodas twenty eight thousand seven hundred and twenty eight twenty six fanams and thirty five Cash (28728. 26. 35) which is carried forward and the Account ORDERED to be enter'd hereafter.

Cash Account Read.

A Bill of Captain Gingins being tendered to the Board for sundry Charges disburst by him upon account of cloathing the Troop in August last amounting to Pagodas twenty nine, one fanam and twenty four Cash (29. 1. 24) which the Military Paymaster being not appriz'd of in time to include in the General Charges of that Article made in his Account for February He is therefore now directed to discharge the same.

Captn. Gingins Bill for sundry Charges on cloathing the Troop Discharg'd.

Captain Peter Love making Application for his Subsistance from the Time he left Vizagapatam and it appearing from their Paymasters Account that his Pay has ceas'd at that Settlement ever since the Month of September last ORDER'D that Mr. Cooke do immediately pay him his full Subsistance [sic] from that Time and charge the same in his Account for this Month and whereas it appears that for some Months whilst the said Captain Love continued at Vizagapatam he was by some Mistake paid at the Rate of 140 Rupees Per Month which amounting to some thing over and above the stipulated Subsistance mentiond in our Honourable Masters late Instructions, It is therefore Orderd that the Military Paymaster do discount the Difference from the Pay due to him.

Captn. Love paid a Subsistance due to him.

Speke by them for the use of the Swallow Snow. The latter dated the 26 Febr'y. (being a Duplicate, the Original of which is not yet come to hand) advises that they have given Captain Speke Interset [*sic*] Notes for the Amount of the Bill we drew in his Favour and have discharg'd the one in favour of Mr. Percival but desire we will on no account draw any more Bills on them as they have it not in their Power to answer them, that the Severn and Britannia are dispatch'd for Surat and the Edgbaston for Europe fully loaded.

General Letter from the Govr. and Council of Pondicherry dated the 15 Instant N.S. read in answer to our Letter and Protest of the first Instant, inclosing a Declaration of their Officers in Camp in Opposition to what we advanced of their firing first upon our People, who depose on the Contrary that they receivd several Shott before they fir'd one and that they distinctly saw several English pursuing them They inclose a Declaration of one Aluro de Sylva setting forth that he was three days in the English Camp with the wounded French Men and had been charg'd by them to acquaint the Gentlemen at Pondicherry that they were ill treated particularly in Point of Provisions, declaring that he also saw near a hundred Englishmen in pursuit of the French the Day of their Retreat. In answer to these a General Letter is now ORDERED to be drawn out to acquaint them that we cannot look upon the Declaration of their Officers as any Proof that the Commander of our Troops was guilty of what they advance or that theirs did not

first fire upon our Colours which it is plain they did from a Deposition sign'd by the whole Corps of our Officers in the field that Day which it's AGREED to inclose to them and that therefore our Protest remains in full force; That to pay any regard to the Declaration of Aluro de Sylvia would be demeaning ourselves very much as that Wretch is prov'd an infamous Perjurer by the Letter address'd to themselves by their own People in our Camp Copy of which is also inclos'd; and we hope will sufficiently convince them that our utmost Care has not been wanting to preserve those unfortunate Men from the Fate that must inevitably have attended them. The above Letters and Papers are all enter'd in the Book of French Correspondence under Nos. 10 and 11.

The Ambassadors having drawn a Bill on us the 4th Instant in favour of Buckanjee Cossidos for five thousand (5000) Arcot Rupees the same was discharg'd the 7th when it was tender'd for Payment.

The President lays before the Board a Letter from the Ambassadors dated this Morning acquainting him that last Night they had a Conference with Nazir Jing and the Prime Minister at which it was propos'd to them to send our Troops to Attack Wondewash Fort where it is reported some of Chunda Saib's Relations and the greatest part of his Treasure are lodg'd but that esteeming this a Proper time to press our Affairs which have already met with too great Delays they had replied that we would give him no further Assistance 'till he had sign'd our Grants. The Board concur entirely in this Method of proceeding as they think it high time Nazar Jing had given us some proofs of the great Esteem he professes to have for us especially as there is reason to believe the French are at work under hand and have already great Influence at his Court. This Letter mentions the Arrival of two Gentlemen from Pondicherry.

Nazir Jing at this Meeting desir'd that our Troops might assist him in the Reduction of the Tanjour Country which had refus'd to pay him his Tribute. The Board having taken this Request into Consideration cannot by any means submit to be guilty of such a Breach of Faith therefore Agree that Mr. Westcott return with a Letter from the President to Nazir Jing acquainting him that there are Treaties subsisting between us and the King of Tanjour which were we to offend in so notorious a Manner must give even himself a bad Opinion of us and make him jealous that we should without scruple abandon him in the same dishonourable Manner whenever any Thing might offer to our Advantage.

In Conformity to your Directions to Account for the Deficiency and Damage the Packing Stuff I brought You on the Sloop Bonetta has sustaind: I take the Liberty to Inform Your Honour &ca. that the same was stow'd by our Water Casks, which when We came to Sea proving not tight contrary to our Expectation when in the River and aggravated by the hard Weather leak'd considerably among the packing stuff, which we no sooner perceiv'd but mov'd it among the drier Casks, nevertheless through Stormy Weather, We Shipp'd such large Quantity's of Water and our Decks not being well Caulk'd, through their leakage the packing stuff was kept continually Wet and We three Weeks on the Passage which are the only reasons I can assign for the Damage and With Respect to the Deficiency's as I never saw it Weighed and can take my Oath that the whole Quantity I receiv'd at Calcutta has been deliver'd here I can no ways account what it has been Occasion'd by

with Shaw Navaz Cawn (the Prime Minister) whom they have gain'd to their Interest by a Present of two Lacks of Rupees As long as this Minister continues in so great Credit at Nazir Jing's Court The Board cannot flatter themselves with the least hopes of Success in our Business and therefore think the Ambassadors judg'd right in returning with the Troops, for to have sent them with Nazir Jing to Arcot according to his Desire must have been unavoidably attended with a very great Expence and in all Probability to no purpose This Letter and the List of Presents deliver'd in with it are entered in the Book of the Ambassadors Proceedings.

No. 38 from the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort St. George dated the 20 Instant, advising that Mr. George Jones had refusd to pay the Fees due to their Secretary and that therefore they had resolv'd to detain the Papers he wanted till further Directions from us; that they had sent a Serjeant and some Men on board the St. Anna Brigantine to prevent her going out of the Road and had made a strict Enquiry into the Affair mention'd in Adrain Fourbeck's Petition, and that on the whole it appears to them that Coelho and Heytor had embezzled the Cargo entrusted to them by Vicente Roza and with the Money purchas'd the St. Anna. They beg we will be very explicite with regard to what future Steps we may judge proper to be taken on that Affair and for Our Information inclose Translates of the several Papers preferrd to them, They also advise that they have been oblig'd to borrow twenty thousand (20000) Rupees of Linga Chittee. As Mr. William Beawes is just arriv'd from Manilha and may probably be capable of giving us some Information in to the Affair of the St. Anna Brigantine it's AGREED to call upon him next Consultation and to deferr our Answer to the Gentlemen at Fort St. George 'till then

Angelo de St. Gertrude who stiles himself Resident for his Imperial Majesty at Covelon giving a long Account of his Masters Right to that Place which the French have violated by taking Possession of it in Consequence of a Grant from Chunda Saib and requesting we will use our Interest to get him a Phirmaund for it from Nazir Jing; As our Concerning ourselves in this Matter can be no ways Serviceable to our Honble. Masters but on the Contrary may be against their Interest and not meet with their Approbation and our own Negotiations with Nazir Jing require our greatest Attention It's AGREED to decline Complying with Father Angelo's Request and that We excuse ourselves to him on that account and the Secretary is ordered to write him a Letter to that purpose.

Morse and Munro with Regard to the Peyton Galley: that Affair is now debated on and the President lays before the Board Extract of a Letter he has receiv'd from Mr. Morse on the Subject with a particular Narrative of the Seizure of that Vessell and the Murder of the Captain and Crew by the King of Rio which are enter'd hereafter However sensible the Board may be of the notorious Villainy and Barbarity of this Action and of the heavy Loss the owners have sustain'd still they do not think that the King of Cudda should be depriv'd of his Property without some Recompence as possibly He might have bought her of the King of Rio without being fully acquainted in what manner he became possessd of her, and as the Owners will no doubt be glad to recover her for the small Sum of two thousand five hundred (2500) Spanish Dollars, the prime Cost paid by the King of Cudda. EXTRACT of a Letter from Nicholas Morse Esqr. to the Honble. Charles Floyer Esqr. relating to the Seizure of the Peyton Galley Dated the 12 March 1750.

I now inclose a Narritive of that unfortunate Affair, which I had from Mahomud Mera Labby which sets forth many Circumstances attending it and the several Steps taken by the People of Reo from the first to the final accomplishment of their wicked and cruel Designs against the Captain and Persons belonging to the Peyton and to which there is all the reason to suppose, that they were incerted to from the hopes of Possessing themselves of a Cargo so valuable. Some Time after this bloody Scene was over, and the Ship and Effects were thus got into the hands of the People of Reo, the King of Cudda Nagotiates with them for the Ship Peyton Galley and Part of her Cargo altho' he must know in what Manner they became possess'd of her, and the effects the Question then is whether such a Purchase is fair or Legal and gives him a sufficient Title to her, in leu to the owners Pretentions This is requir'd of him to prove and maintain and that the King and People of Reo are not to be esteemd as having acted in this Instance as Pirates and Robbers. But if on the contrary it shall appear to your Board, that they did so, and that Persons under that Character cannot authorize the sale of the Ship, or effects, that in such Case the owners may hope to have them restor'd to them.

When Captain Andrew Munro saild for Bengal, he Left at Rio in the King of that Places hands named Raja Salimon 16,000 Spanish Dollars to be paid him on his return in the following Species Vizt.

Gold	@ 15 Spanish Dollars	Per Buncal.
Tin	@ 11 Do.	Per Pecull.
Pepper	@ 8 Do.	Per Do.

From Bengall Capt. Munro arriv'd at Sallangore, where he made a Contract with the King of that place named Dion Camboja, who Stood Bail for several Merchants as Per their Obligations receiv'd from them by the said Capt. Munro, being for several sorts of Bengall and Vizagapatam Peice goods and some Ophium, the Quantity of each sort and the Merchants Name Meera Labby was unacquainted with, But after Capt. Munro's death the said Meera Labby hand an Account thereof as shall be shewn hereafter.

Besides the abovemention'd Goods which Capt. Munro sold and deliver'd at Sallangore, he further particularly sold to the King Dion Camboja 2½ Chests of Ophium in Barter for 34½ Bahars of Tin to be paid him immediately upon the Delivery of the said Ophium. The King upon receiving the Ophium from Capt. Munro deferrd giving him the Tin as Per Contract, but told him he would give him his Obligation to give him the Tin on Capt. Munro's return to that Place from Rio, where he was then going. Capt. Munro, Seeing the King did not keep his word in giving him the Tin, he desir'd the King to return his 2½ Chests of Ophium at which demand the King deliver'd back to Munro the said Ophium, which was put in Jars and the King had put notes in them declaring the Quantity and said it belong'd to him all this being unknown to Munro, after whose murder when the King of Sallangore went up to Rio he demanded from the King of Rio, the said 2½ Chests of Ophium which was put in Jars, as belonging to him, for proof of which he Referr'd them to the Notes in those Jars which he had put in them abovesaid Capt. Munro after receiving his Ophium as was return'd to him in Jars by the King of Sallangore he sail'd to Rio, where on his Arrival he demanded from the King of that Place named Raja Salimon his Outstanding debts being to the Value of 16000 Spanish Dollars, and told him he would by no means Trade with him before he had Satisfied him of that money, Capt. Munro was at Rio about 2 Months all the while he did very little business with the King, who wanted him to sell his goods upon Trust, which Munro would by no means do but oftentimes demanded the King to pay his debts, which he promiss'd if Munro would wait 3 Months longer he should pay him, but as Munro was very often deceiv'd in his promises, he would grant him any time longer but insisted for the prompt payment of the Money or Goods: otherwise he desird the King to give him sufficient Security for it the King being Greatly enraged on this demand he took out his Cris from his side, being of a Gold Hilt and beset with Diamonds and other precious Stones, and offered it to Munro who took it. The King observing he receivd it, he was the more enraged, and from that time forward he sought all means to destroy Munro: in order to it he told his mind to one of his Confidents a Captain of his guards named Ponquilimo Abdil, and desired him to put in Execution, who accordingly Advisd the King not to kill Captain Munro, at Rio, but at some other place, and Accordingly the said Adil under took to do it in order to which he insinuated himself greatly with Capt. Munro and persuaded him to go to Trangany to dispose of his Goods, And Offer'd himself to Accompany Capt. Munro there and render all the Service in his Power, Munro took his Advice and went with him in the Ship to that Place where on their Arrival Capt. Munro sent ashore his writer Charles Pritchard in Company with this Adil with Musters of all his Goods to try the Market. They Offer'd for every thing a very great price which was done by Adil in order to get Capt. Munro ashore to Cut him off, but in the mean time there happend a hard gale of Wind which drove the Ship from her Anchors, and was Oblig'd to return to Rio, leaving behind Charles Pritchard And the said Ponqiumila Adil, who seeing that the Ship was gone, was oblig'd to hire a Prow and Return to Rio the said Ponquilina Adil after advis'd him to hire 2 or 3 Prows and Load them with

Goods to send over to Pattapan: Munro finding this Advice Good did accordingly hire 2 Large Prows and loaded them with several sorts of Goods and sent his Writer and some of his Men in them; the said Adil also going; at the same time Munro sent another Prow to Malacca to bring Stores for his Ship these 3 Prows after they left the Ship having met together at an Island as was projected by the said Adil, and there they destroyd all Munro's Men that were in those Prows; having done this the said Adil came over to Rio and Acquainted the King with what he had done, who ordered him to keep himself conceald, and sent the old Shabandar (whom Capt. Munro used to call Father) named Nocquedah Samodoo, on board of Munro's Ship with A pretence to Assist him, and Carry a present of Green Coconuts and Fowles. Munro receiv'd him very kindly, and while Munro was drinking a Coconut the Shabanders people had orders to murder him. Munro, as soon as he found himself wounded with a Crese he run into his Cabbin; another Mallayan struck of his head with a Choping Knife; they threw his Body over board; the Seas brought it ashore; and there it lay expos'd: They carried away the Ship up the River before the Kings House, and sent his Guards of Buggueasses and Malayans on board of her The King of Sallangore as Soon as he was inform'd of Munro's Murder, immediately went up to Rio, and gather'd all their great men to be present at the Examination of Munro's Effects. The Honble. Company in their Commands just receiv'd by the Portfield having directed the Appointment of Mr. Joseph Fowke to the Station of 2d of Council at Fort St. George As the Reasons he gave for declining to accept of being readmitted into the Service, when tender'd to him last Year in Consequence of the Honble. Company's Orders, still subsist and we conceive our Honble. Masters when acquainted therewith may therefore deem him undeserving of that Station and probably be displeas'd should we make their Service so cheap as to admit of it's being declin'd or accepted off as it suits Peoples Conveniency, It is therefore AGREED to suspend complying with their Directions regarding Mr. Fowke 'till we are acquainted with their Resolution upon Receipt of the Advices we transmitted them of the Refusal of Mr. Fowke and the Rest of their Madras Servants to be re-admitted into their Service upon the Terms it was offered them of being under the Council of this Place as some of the Members of it were Junior upon the Madras Establishment and as we have taken this Step it is judg'd unnecessary to give Mr. Fowke any Advice of the Honble. Company's Directions regarding him And

It being ORDERED in the 17 Para: of the above Letter that no Buildings publick or private be carried on at Madras 'till the Arrival of Mr. Robins an Engineer who is coming out in their Service on one of the Latter Ships, Its AGREED that a Copy of that Paragraph be sent to the Gentlemen at Fort St. George with our next General Letter.

The Phoenix Snow being to sail in few Days for Ingeram it's AGREED that a supply of thirteen thousand (13000) Madras Pagodas be sent on her thither and forty eight thousand (48000) Rupees to Vizagapatam for the Encouragement of the Investments at those Places.

As the latest Account we have of that Port is contain'd in a Letter from Captain Stevens of the Delawar to Mr. Secretary Mole a Copy of which the President receiv'd some time since from Mr. Combes at Batavia, One is therefore now ORDERED to be sent to the above Supra Cargoes with a General Letter acquainting them that as that Tract is never made from hence we have not a Person here capable of giving them any Information about the properest Passage but shall use our endeavours to get them the Linguists they desire This Letter is also entered hereafter.

HONBLE. SIR AND SIRS

The long and tedious Passage We have had since leaving the Downs, the 20 of November 1749 to this time fills us with the greatest Concern and apprehensions for the disappointment it may be off to our Honble. Masters intentions and

not less so to our own Expectations, But as this Misfortune has befallen us Wee have nothing left but to do all in our Power to make it as light to the Honble. East India Company as Possible.

In order to which we Embrace this as the earlyest Opportunity to address your Honour &ca. Council being perfectly well assur'd, that you take as much Pleasure in advancing their Interest, as you do in Consulting your own, And as you are sensible Wee have no time to lose Consequently Wee ought to Employ the whole of it in discharging the trust Reposed in us.

We therefore annex your Honour and Council a Copy of two Paragraphs out of our private Instructions No. 4, 5 the latter carrying our Justification for both in our Application so that we must Request your Honour and Council to Communicate to us in Writing What advices you have received from Banjar as likewise whether the Dutch still continue these as their only pleas or Rely on them as sufficient to Palliate their uncomon acts of Arbitrary Power or to Protect them in the open Violation of all Treatys, by Engrossing the Trade of Banjar on the Island of Borneo absolutely to themselves, or whether since the Companys Informations they may have thought proper to Start some other Pretext for the support of their unjust Claim, this is nothing new or strange among them what ever it may be to other Nations, and as an Instance your Honour and Council will observe a great difference and Variation between the first and second of these Paragraphs and probably if they have thought proper to add or alter; which doubtless must have Reach'd you long before this, it may be of a Peice with all the Rest (Meer Shadow without substance) but still Necessary and what may be of use to us to have the Intelligence off. And what makes us the more Earnestly to Entreat your Honour &ca. to Impart to us Every Circumstance that is New to our Present advices, and Particularly what Success the Delawar met with, or whether any other Ship before, or since have made any Efforts there and what treat[ment] they Receiv'd, and how succeeded and how they stand affected to us as the Toomongon &ca. Great Men.

And we now further Acquaint your Honour &ca. that our Honble. Masters have perempory [*sic*] fixed the time for our stay at Banjar, Whether wee succeed in procuring Pepper or not, and this at furthest is to be the last day of June When we must proceed from thence to China. Our Gentlemen on board being all Entire Strangers to this Port, and every other Man in the Ship the same it indispensably obliges us to Endeavour to get all the Intelligence we can of it, and the best Passage towards it, And Consequently Compels us to give your Honour and Council further trouble, by Requesting that you would send for the most Experienced Captains and Mariners in your Service or out of it that are Acquainted with the Navagation and take from each his Opinion in Writing how long he may Esteem the Passage to be all at this Season of the Year and what Rout is properest for us to Pursue or any thing else your Honour &ca. may Imagine to be of use. And could they be persuaded to permit the Captain to peruse their Journal, it might be of Real Benefit, and service; the sooner your Honour &ca. could assist us with these Informations the more Welcome they would be; as wee shall have time to Copy them and Enclose them with this to our Honble. Employers.

Wee beg leave to Apologize to your Honour &ca. for the length of this address, but as the Consequences are very Material, both to our Security and the Company's Interest you must be sensible they Requir'd the more fully Particularising As they are the Honble. Companys orders to us, In Paragraph No. 5 and directions for Your Honour and Councils Compliance therewith being a Copy out of your General Letter Paragraph No. 6 delivered us which we presume to Annex.

A Copy of another Paragraph of your General Letter No. 7 and the Same in our own Instructions No. 14 your Honour &ca. are desired if Possible to supply us with a Mallay Linguist and we must beg further to add our Request, If we are able to proceed to Banjar Massin that you would assist us with a Sober discreet

Person that can both speak and Write Dutch and English Well. For probably if the Dutch Fleet are still there Wee may have more occasion for the last, then the first, As Your Honour &ca. are well acquainted, that they will let slip no Opportunity to Pester us with Letters, Memorials and Protests if they do nothing more. And we have not one Man on board the Portfield that can Either speak or Write Dutch could we have got one in England, it would have prevented our Present Sollicitations to your Honour &ca. Council.

A COPY of some Paragraphs in our Instructions from the Honble. Company by their orders addressd to your Honour &ca. Council.

Our View in sending this Ship to Banjar is if Possible to procure Lading of Pepper and Assert our right to a free uninterrupted Trade to that Place which has been lately obstructed by the Unfriendly Behaviour of the Dutch who in order to Engross the whole Trade to themselves Blocked up the Port of Banjar Massin in 1746 and under the Pretence of that Blockade insisted that pursuant to the Restriction at the end of the 4 Article of the Marine Treaty 1674 they would not allow Entrance to any Ship what so ever In Consequence whereof the Onslow was not sufferd to have any more Pepper after the arrival of their Squadron, And the Dragon was obliged to Return to Batavia and under the same Pretence that Ship and the Prince Edward were prevented by the General of Batavia from proceeding thither the following Season. Wee call this a Pretence, because Wee are Convinced a very Material Point was wanting to make this a Blockade according to the sence of the said Treaty which is an Actual War subsisting between the Dutch Company and the Banjireens.

Wee learn from the Supra Cargoes of the Prince Edward that the General and Council of Batavia pretensions to an Exclusive Treaty, are founded on an Old Treaty as they alledge with the Sultan of that Part of the Island Borneo which cannot justify their Arbitrary way of proceeding as the Banjareens have time out of mind enjoy'd a Right of Trading with what Nation they pleas'd unless prevented by Force and have in Consequence thereof Entered into Subsequent and later Engagements with us and by advice very lately receiv'd it Appears that the Delawar proceeded from Batavia to Banjar in March last but before she sail'd the General and Council deliver'd a Protest to Capt. Stevens Wherein they set forth that the Dutch East India Company have Renewed with the Sultan, their old Contracts Prior as they alledge to any Engagements of that People with other Nations and in Consequence thereof that the Trade of that Place belongeth only to them in short [it] appears that they have lately pretended to and set up a Claim of an Exclusive Right of Trade not only to Borneo but the Island of Sumatra and all or most of the Places to the Eastward and in support thereof have been guilty of some Extraordinary and most Cruel Acts of Power Authentick Proofs thereof now lye before His Most Excellent Majesty, the said Supra Cargoes of the Prince Edward likewise informs us that the Toomongon whom wee always look'd upon as our very Good Friend has been gain'd over to the Dutch Interest and it is much to be fear'd has influenced the Sultan against us. Wee have thought proper to give you this Detail that you may in some Degree be acquainted with the situation of our Affairs at Banjar and Point out the Necessary Enquirys to be made at Fort St. David and whenever else any Opportunity offers in which wee Require your utmost address and Deligence as the Success of the Voyage will in a great Measure depend upon it.

- No. 6 Our view in sending the Portfield to Banjar is not only to Purchase a Cargo of Pepper for the China Market but also to keep up and assert our Right to a free and unintirrupted Trade to that Place which has been lately obstructed by the Chicany and Arbitrary Behaviour of the Dutch, you are therefore to communicate to our said Supra Cargoes all the Intelligence you are Masters of relating to that Place particularly what success the Delawar met with and in General give them all Possible Assistance as the Success of the Voyage greatly depends on their having a thorough information of the Situation of Affairs there.
- No. 7 You are to provide and send aboard to our Supra Cargoes aforesaid the Assistance of a Person well Skilled in the Mallay Language.

SUPRA CARGOES OF THE SHIP PORTFIELD.

GENTLEMEN

In reply to your Letter presented to us the 7 Instant We are to acquaint You that the only advices We are at present able to furnish You with relating to Benjar Massin are contain'd in the Copy of a Letter we now inclose for your perusal, From Captain Will: Stevens of the Delawar to Mr. Mole which happen'd accidentally to fall into the Presidents Hands otherwise We should not have had it in our power to have given You the least Information of that Port, as We have no Intercourse with it nor is that Track ever made from hence Whereby We are concern'd to say not a Person at present here is capable of giving You the least Account of that place or which is the best Passage towards it. By the said Letter You will observe that Captain Stevens met with the same treatment from the Dutch as the Prince Edward and Dragon that went before him; And we must fear You will prove as Unsuccessfull with Regard to the procuring a Cargo of Pepper, as By the Incitement of the Dutch the Great Men seem treacherously Inclind Our Apprehensions of which We shall be glad to hear You have found groundless and hope the Intent of your proceeding thither will be fully answer'd by Opening the Trade to that Place.

We are using our Endeavours to procure You a Malay Linguist also a person that can speak and Write Dutch but are apprehensive We shall meet with some Difficulty therein, and particularly the latter as We have been greatly put to it of late to get Translated the Letters We have receiv'd in that Language. No. 42 and 44 both from the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort St. George the former dated the 4 Instant advises that the Grampus Sloop saild the 27th Ultmo: and the Bonetta the 3 Instant that Peter Dencker declares he has discharg'd One hundred (100) Pagodas of his Debt here that their Bengall Rice damages very fast and they dont dispose of above half a Garse a Day from which the Company must feel a very great Loss shortly if we dont furnish them with some other expedient for getting rid of it, that they have advanc'd their Merchants largely out of the last supply and should be glad of another and incerting an Account of Cloth brought in — the latter dated the 7 Instant inclose[s] a Protest from Don Manuel Tresgallo against the Orders given by us for the Seizure and Sale of the St. Anna Brigantine and her Cargo.

No. 43 from the President and Council of Bombay dated the 4 April advising that no Ship is yet arrivd with them from the Bay but that the Severn and Britannia are hourly expected that the Tartar saild the 26 March for the Gulph of Mocha and that they suppose the Syren was sail'd for that of Persia before the Date of their Letter.

AGREED that a General Letter be now wrote to the Vice Roy of Goa acquainting him in answer to his of the 5 February that when General Boscawen took possession of St. Thomé there were no Portugueze Colours flying there nor had the King of Portugal receivd any Revenues from that Place these fifty Years that we had a Grant for it from the lawfull Nabob of the Province whilst the Padre de Purification only govern'd as himself declar'd, in Right of Chunda Saib, a Rebel ORDERED that this Letter be dated to day and sent away immediately.

The Company's Treasure and other Consignments by the Portfield for this Presidency being landed, the Captains Instructions and a Letter to her Supra Cargoes are now ORDERED to be drawn out that she may be dispatchd to morrow. A Letter from Messrs. Morse and Munro Owners of the Ship Peyton Galley dated the 9 Instant read acquainting us in answer to ours of the 2d that they do not think themselves authoriz'd to lay down the King of Cuddahs purchase Money and that what they had requested was only for the Recovery of the Right and property they conceiv'd they had to the Ship agreeable to the Laws in such Cases provided. Having been acquainted to day by Letter from Mr. Charles Bouchier that Your honour and Council requir'd from me to know by what means I was inform'd that the Dutch at Malacca had Intention to detain us there in opposition of prosecuting our Voyage to Manilha I readily obey and the following are the particulars relating to that Affair.

The 31st of July last we came to an anchor before Malacca and found Riding the three of our Honble. Company's Ships bound to China Viz. the Royal Duke Capt. Cumming, the Rhoda Capt. McNamara, and the Griffin Capt. Dethick.

Here the Captain self and Purser going ashore were met with a letter Importing that the Dutch had resolv'd to detain our persons and if possible prevent our Ship proceeding on her Voyage there being as was Reported particular Orders from the General of Batavia to suffer no Country Ships to pass bound to Manilha.

We immediately determin'd upon this information to return to our Ship and were soon over taken by Capt. McNamara who Confirmd what had been wrote us and moreover that all the China Supra Cargoes Vizt. Messrs. Hadley, Surl and Kennersley as also the Captains were entirely of opinion we should not hazard our Voyage by putting ourselves in Dutch Power who at least would Certainly find means to detain us till too late for proceeding In Consideration of which and the assurances given by all the Gentlemen both Captains and Supra Cargoes that should the Dutch Ship of War laying there with Jury Masts attempt to molest us they would risque their whole force in our defence and the next day accompany us on our Engage [*sic*], we resolv'd to accept their Advice and Protection and Consequently to remain at an Anchor without till they came to us but In the Afternoon rec'd by Capt. McNamara's boat the following Letter.

SIR,

It's the Opinion of the Gentlemen here you get under sail directly on receipt of this and go out of the Dutch Man of Wars way who is now getting under sail to bring You in here as he has no Masts you can easily outsail him. I am &ca.

McNamara's Boat came aboard we saw that of the Dutch Ship approaching and therefore got the Crew of the other into our Ship and arms ready in the Round House when a Dutch Lieutenant came on board with orders he said from the Commodore to enquire who we were and whither bound and at the same time acquainted us there were Strict orders from the General of Batavia that no Country Vessells of any Nation whatever should pass those Streights without reporting their Voyage at Malacca and that particularly if bound to Manilha they should not be sufferr'd to proceed, to which was answerd that we had also a General to Obey and would neither go to Malacca nor be hindred proceeding to Manilha or else where if in our Power to avoid it with which answer he departed and we the next morning saild under Convoy of the three China Ships.

The next day Coja Joanes Marcar the freighter for Malacca came aboard with a Sloop to unlade what of his Goods Time and weather would permit and acquainted us the Dutch were several hours in Consultation about the Ship of War being ORDERED to attempt the Impeding our passage and that our being to be detaind was the publick discourse ashore.

The Brother of said Armenian who now came with us from Malacca affirm'd in the Passage concerning our affair there last Year that to his knowledge the Dutch [were] under the greatest uneasiness least we should have gone ashore and thereby oblig'd them to Execute orders they knew were like to Cost them dear.

General Letter from Pondicherry dated the 2d June N.S. read as enter'd under No. 14 protesting against us for a Resolution of our President to detain thirty three Coffree Slaves which have lately deserted from their Settlement to this, making us answerable for the Sum of 19000 Dollars which they say is the amount of these and about thirty more which have come to us since the Peace and declaring us accountable for the Crimes that will infallibly be the Consequence of the Impunity the run away Slaves will be shure [sic] of meeting in our Settlement. The Board being unacquainted with this Affair now desire the President to let them see Copies of the Letters that have pass'd between Mr. Dupleix and him on the Subject which being laid before them are read and the Arguments on both sides being well and impartially weigh'd we cannot conceive on what Foundation the French can build the Right they so strenuously assert. It cannot be on any former Agreement between them and us as after the most diligent search in our Records it does not appear that any was ever made nor on the common Custom of Nations as the Contrary, it must be well known to them as well as us, is every day practis'd in America, and even here there have been frequent Desertions of this kind before the War without any Notice being taken of it. The Board therefore concur in the Presidents Opinion that as these People have bore Arms against us during the War and lately in the Disturbances they have thought proper to raise in the Country they should not by any means be returnd and AGREE that a General Letter as enter'd No. 15 be now wrote to the Governor and Council of Pondicherry to make known this our Resolution and the above Reasons for it, and that with Regard to impunity of Crimes in Deserters they are themselves much more open to Censure on that account than we as We have an Instance of a Mans being protected that murder'd his Officer on Duty. Enclosing a Memorial Address'd to them by Messrs. Campbell's Hockett and Spear, Officers of that Garrison representing that their Pay as receiv'd at present falls Considerably Short of it's appointment by the Honble. I am much oblig'd to You for the honour You have done me in complying with my Request of the 22 Instant and Mr. Secretary Bouchier has transmitted me by your orders a Copy of the Para: of the Companys Letter relating to my Appointment at this place, and your Resolutions thereon against which I shall now remonstrate for my Justification.

As to the Company's order in my favour it appears to me so clearly worded, and in such express and positive terms that I am very much surpriz'd how it can any way be interpreted to my Exclusion. Tis so very full, that even my Qualifications are not left to your Judgments, and I shou'd think If I had a Commission in my Pocket from the whole Court of Directors an Obedience to it might be disputed with equal Reason.

The Arguments you have used Gentlemen in support of this Extraordinary Proceeding against me, I doubt not I shall be able to refute easily. In your Consultation of the 7 May, It is said that the Reasons I gave for declining the Service last Year still subsist. Those Reasons were, as you observe, because I would not serve under my Juniors. But surely they do not subsist in my Person as second of Council at Fort St. George. If that were allow'd it woud follow, that the Deputy Governour serves under his Juniors, which nobody I believe will affirm. As Second of Council at Fort St. George I serve under You in a Collective Capacity, but out of Council I shou'd serve under you in a Separate as well as a collective Capacity, which makes a great Difference: So great a difference, that I never cou'd nor ever will submit to it, so that You see I am very far from recanting from my Declaration of last Year.

But Altho' I am so very stiff on the Point of my Right, and I woud always preserve such a Temper, Yet I will venture to assert there is not one, this day in the Service of a livelier Zeal for the Company's Interest than myself or that wou'd go greater lengths to promote it and therefore when you "conceive that I may" be thought undeserving of the Station to which I am appointed, and that it "wou'd be making the Service cheap to admit me" They are such Expressions as I flatter myself do not suit with my Character; at least If the admitting a Person into the Service against whom no one Objection can be started but that he refus'd serving under his Juniors; If this I say be making the Service cheap, I wish for the Good of the Company it may be always made cheap after such a rate.

One thing more I am desirous of setting You right in, which is in the opinion you entertain of my accepting the service for my Conveniency, for altho' this is generally allow'd a reasonable Motive to all Employments, yet I can safely declare in the present Case it is no Motive with me, and this I am certain many People must be sensible of, who know the particular Circumstances of my Affairs.

Having answer'd all the Arguments for my Exclusion I chearfully submit my Cause to my Honble. Masters, and I hope they will consider that it happens a little unluckily for me, that the half of my Judges shou'd be my Juniors in a dispute which has turn'd wholly upon Seniority, and in which their Gain arises from my loss. A Due allowance being made for this, and I remain entirely easy about the Event.

Genl. Letter to Pondicherry.

The Secretary agreeable to our directions in Consultation of the 31st Ultimo, having procured the necessary Information concerning the fellow who fled hence to Pondicherry after having Murdered his Officer and was there protected; A Letter is now drawn out (as Enterd No. 17) In answer to the last receiv'd from Mr. Dupleix and Council of the 9 Instant N.S. Containing our reply to the Arguments they advance in support of their right to the Deserted Slaves, and reciting the particulars of the Fact abovemention'd, as also of another of the like nature And as they not long ago Protested against Us for pursuing some Deserters into their Territory as an Unprecedented Insult offered to the Flag of their Sovereign,

We think it proper to put them in Mind of the very same thing done by themselves in the Year 1731 when Mr. Fowke was Governour of this Place and Mr. Le Noir of Pondicherry.

Masters Ship Princess Augusta in the Great Storm of 1749 We have found Ourselves a good deal at a Loss for a proper Vessell to supply the West Coast with the necessary Articles they require from this place and Bengall. The Brilliant Snow which is the only one now remaining, being too small for that Service, and might be more Suitably Employ'd in other parts of the Company Business. It is therefore AGREED that a Ship of between 250 and 300 Tons be built for that purpose at Vizagapatam where We are inform'd they have proper Conveniences for such an Undertaking; and that Mr. Francis Taylor (in Consequence of the Honble. Companys orders to provide for him) be appointed to Command her with Directions to proceed thither on a Country Vessell that will sail in a few days to Oversee the Work. That the Revenues of that Country were Computed at Ten thousand Rupees a month and till the Saned was delivered Us for taking Possession of it that Sum would be Monthly paid Us for the Maintenance of our Troops; as two Months advance for which he encloses a Bill of Exchange for Twenty thousand (20,000) Rupees; and desires they may join him without Delay.

to the President requesting Us to join him with a Body of Troops. Advising that a Grant of the Punoomalee Country is drawn out for us and Enclosing a Bill of 2,000 Rupa. for maintaining Our People two Months.

The Purport of this Letter being thoroughly Considered by the Board It's AGREED to Comply with his Request; as the same Reasons which first induced Us to take part in these Troubles, Subsist as forcibly as ever and should We desist from Supporting Mahomud Ally, the French will undoubtedly succeed in establishing Chunda Saib in the Province, which they have plainly told Us is their Intention and then by their Influence over him infallibly ruin the Companys Affairs Besides the Acquisition of Punoomalee, and the Grants before made Us of the Milapore and Trevendaporum Countries are Conditions Extreemly advantageous to the Honble. Company and will when Tranquility is restor'd to the Province: bring in a very Considerable Addition to their Revenues.

Agreed to comply with his request and the Boards Inducements to that Determination.

The Major is therefore Consulted upon the Number of Men it is proper to send, and Advises Six hundred including Officers; He says they will be ready to March in five or six Days, and delivers in a Calculate of the Charge of Maintaining them in the Feild, amounting to 15000 Rupees Per Month, which though half as much again as the allowance made by Mahomud Ally yet We are of Opinion the Profits ariseing from the Punoomalee Country when we're in Possession of it, will sufficiently repay the present Expencc, It is therefore AGREED that the Troops set out as soon as possible under the Command of Captn. Cope, and as it is not unlikely that the French upon Intelligence of our Design, may endeavour to Possess themselves of Punoomalee, The President is desired to write immediately to Mahomud Ally Cawn to obtain Permission for hoisting our Colours there Directly, in order to be beforehand with them, and then there can be no Dispute.

The number of Troops to be sent him regulated with the charge of Maintaining them and Agreed they set out as soon as possible.

To prevent any Designs of the French, the President is desired to write to Mahomud Ally for permission to hoist Our Colours at Punoomalee directly.

At about 10 A.M. anchord in the Road the Honble. Companys Ship Lynn Captain William Egerton from England from whom rec'd a Letter by a Cattamaran advising as his Packet was directed to the Honble. Thomas Saunders Esqr. President and Governour Richard Prince Second Stringer Lawrence third Cornelius Goodwin fourth, Richard Starke fifth Joseph Fowke Sixth Charles Boddam Seventh Henry Powney Eighth, Robert Gooder ninth George Pigot tenth and Samuel Greenhaugh Eleventh of Council of this Coast, He intended bringing it ashore himself and about half past Eleven o'Clock being accordingly landed as Major Lawrence is the only Member of the Council mention'd on the Direction of the Packet at present on the spot and judging it highly proper that the Contents should be immediately known and the Invoice and other Papers taken out in order to the Ships being unloaded which otherwise will not be done for some days as the other Members Except the President are at Madrass and He at Vizagapatam The same is therefore now opend and the Honble. Company having ordered the dismissal of the Honble. Charles Floyer Esqr. from their Service as likewise Mr. Wm. Holt Mr. Edward Croke an Allowance of £200 Per Annum and the rest of the late Members to continue their several Stations in the same manner they would have done had Fort St. George not been taken by the French. They are all made acquainted therewith in Consequence of which Mr. Floyer intends delivering over to morrow the Charge of the Garrison &ca. to the Major and the several other Gentlemen to continue in their Employs till Advice may be receiv'd from the Gentlemen at Fort St. George relating thereto a Letter to acquaint them with which and to inclose a Copy of the Honble. Company's Letter is now drawn out By the Lynns Invoice it appearing that she has on board 70 Chests of Treasure which the Honble. Court of Directors have ordered to be landed here and Replac'd with Rupees and that Ship dispatch'd as Early as possible to the Bay, her whole Cargo being Consign'd to the President and Council there, Major Lawrence desires Mr. Floyer and the rest of the Gentlemen will favour him with their Opinion and Advice how to act herein whereupon they acquaint him, they think it necessary the Treasure should be immediately landed and as there is to very near the Amount of it in Rupees now in the Ware House that as soon as it is ashore the said Rupees be Shipp'd off and what may be wanting to compleat the whole coin'd with all Expedition upon which an order is now sign'd and sent to Captn. Egerton to deliver the said Treasure and Linga Chittee directed to attend the Major tomorrow concerning the speedy Coining What Quantity may be wanting to send on the Lynn At 10 P.M. Dispatch'd a Cattamaran to Fort St. George with a General Letter of this Date.

Linga Chittee being discours'd with regard to what time it will require to Coin the quantity of Rupees which are wanting to compleat the amount of the Lynn's Bullion which is about 20 Chests Promises to have them done by the twelfth. Upon which Messrs. Croke Wynch, Westcott and Cooke are desird to attend the Major on Monday Morning at 9 o'Clock at the Fort to give him their Opinions what is further necessary to be done with Regard to the Lynn's Dispatch. This Forenoon The late President delivers over to Major Lawrence the Keys of the Garrison &ca. and likewise those of the Cash Chest the Ballance of which Amounting to Pags. 49027. 5. 29 being Examin'd which turns out right also delivers over the Charge of the Mint.

Sent a Letter of this date to Captn. Joseph Knight to desire if his Majesty's Service did not require his leaving the Road that He would Continue here to cover our Garrison as there had been a necessity of sending out most of the Troops to preserve the peace of the Country.

9TH Advanc'd the Steward to procure Provisions for the Garrison two thousand two hundred Eighty five Pagodas twenty five fanams and fifty six Cash (2285. 25. 56)

9 Messrs. Croke, Wynch, Westcott, and Cooke being met in Consequence of Major Lawrences Desire, the 6 Paragraph of the Honble. Companys Commands by the Lynn relating to her Dispatch is read and the aforesaid Gentlemen conceiving from thence that her Detention here should be no longer than Absolutely Necessary they are of Opinion that the Rupees in the Warehouse shou'd be sent off with all Expedition, as the Bullion is near landed and that as there is a probablity of having the Sentiments of the Madrass Gentlemen on this Matter by Thursday when the Rupees to the full Amount of her Bullion will be ready, they judge it will be proper to keep her till then and should no Answer arrive from Madrass by that time, that He then Dispatches her thither, to land her private Consignments and to proceed immediately after for Bengall as so early a supply of Rupees must be very Advantagious to our Honble. Masters Affairs there.

Several Letters being receiv'd from the Country, they are now read as Enterd in the Book of Country Letters.

In one of which from Mahomud Ally Cawn as he has given permission for our Colours to be hoisted at Poonamalee to give Notice to the whole Country of our having a Grant of it and inclos'd a Letter to be sent the Havildar of Conjeveram for that purpose a Letter is now drawn out to the Gentlemen at Fort St. George to inclose the same and desire they will Order a Set of Colours to be sent under Charge of two Peons to be accordingly hoisted but that no Revenues are yet to be Collected there.

11TH The Nabob being in want of all Military Stores Encamp'd this day with his own and our Troops on the Banks of Trevendaporam River on order to his being the better supplied therewith therefore the Military Storekeeper is directed to let him have what He may stand in need of on his paying for them and that our Troops be supplied with every thing Necessary for the Campaign.

Received a Letter from Mr. Dupleix and Council of Pondicherry directed to the late President and Council dated the 21 July N.S. and Enter'd in the French Correspondence under No. 21 which is an Answer to one sent them the 6 Instant and judg'd unnecessary to be reply'd to at present.

Receiv'd a General Letter from Fort St. George No. 71 dated the 9th July acknowledging the Receipt of the one sent the 6th to advise of the Honble. Company's Resolutions by the Lynn which advises that Mr. Prince thinks it unnecessary to remove for so short a time as Mr. Saunders may be Expected in that they continue Major Lawrence in the management of Affairs here till the Arrival of Messrs. Starke Boddam and Powney who will set out to his Assistance by the first Opportunity but as they think it unsafe to come by Land desire the Lynn may be sent up for that purpose after taking out the Wares and Stores as are wanted here directing the coining her Bullion with all Expedition and that the Brilliant be dispatch'd to them immediately likewise the late Members to continue their Employs till the arrival of the Gentlemen they have as before nominated and that if no Vessell has been Contracted for to fetch the Rice wrote about in the General Letter of the 6 not to send one as the price of Grain there is considerably risen.

No. 75 Dated in May from Mr. Henry Collins at Tulea Bay on the Island of Madagascar, Giving an account of his Passage thither, the Success he has met with that the Ships Crew have been extreemly Sickly and that they have buried One and twenty Men, that He has let Captn. Oliver have twenty One Bags of Rice which He is to Account for here and for which He incloses a receipt.

Companys Merchants and join'd in the Salem Manufacture with Nella tomby Chittee and Sada-shavareddee and Tashareeff'd as usual on these Occasions.

20 Rec'd by Peons from Fort St. George a General Letter No. 78 dated the 18 instant acknowledging the receipt of the Letters from hence of the 13th and 15th and advising they cannot but look upon it as a very Extraordinary proceeding my taking upon me to give dispatches to the Lynn for Bengall notwithstanding she was to touch there and when I must have been Sensible the Superiour Power was lodged with them by the Majority of the Council being there and least the Gentlemen of Bengall should judge of it in the same manner they thought proper to Open my Packet and forward it under Cover with such further Advices from them as Were necessary to be Communicated and also to give the Captain fresh Dispatches and assign several Reasons Wy [sic] they think it unnecessary for Mr. Prince to come hither that with Regard to the Investment they hope the Gentlemen coming down are capable of managing that Branch of Business for so short time that Messrs. Starke and Powney will set out this day in Mussoolas, but Mr. Boddams ill State of Health prevents his coming yet, and directing a supply of at least 30,000 Pagodas to be sent them.

Per Month in the Country Currency clear of all Deductions which Sum they never have received, but have been baffled of a part of it by taking a Rupee for 12 fanams, whereas they can get but eleven for it, and by that means Sustain a Loss of 8 Fanams Per Month in their Subsistance That having consulted Captains Gingsins and Campbell it was thought expedient in the present Exigency to comply with the Complainants so far as to acquaint them that they never heard of any Agreement being made to pay them 21s. 6d. Per Month, but should enquire into it and in the meantime assured them that whatever Major Lawrence promiss'd them should be Observ'd, and that they had given orders for 12 Fanams to be paid them for a Rupee from the first of the Month, at which they acknowledged they were satisfied, They conclude with desiring we will take such Resolutions on this occasion as may prevent the like disorders in future.

Company since the year 1710, and had the Command of a Company of Soldiers for these thirty three years, Excepting the four years it took him up in going to and from England, as from August 1725 till he return'd in the same station June 1729 from which time he was Continued at Fort St. David Commander of a Company untill October 1748 when he was required to resign his Commission by the Honble. President and Council under promise to have a Pension settled on him, they judging him too old and Infirm to Execute his Duties with the vigour he had formerly done and having younger Persons then dependant thought more Capable to support the fatigues; your Petitioner was prevail'd on, not without some reluctance in regard to his Honour as

the Cessation of Arms was not come out but as Obedience was his Duty he Comply'd; and the Honble. President and Council accordingly in Consideration of his long service were pleas'd to settle a Pension on him of Pagodas twenty five Per Month which he received from that time untill the Month of June 1750 when July the 25 he was acquainted by the Worshipfull Deputy Governour and Council of Madras with a Para: the Honble. Court of Directors had sent in their General Letter to the purport that they would not allow the Continuance of his Pension, and if your Petitioner was under that Necessity as Represented to send him home at their charge, and they would provide for him according to his Merits How shocking this must have been to your Petitioner, he refers to the Honble. Boards Consideration at a time when he had flatterd himself with a Comfortable Support from his Honble. Masters gratuity (Conferr'd on him as aforesaid) the few years he might Live, and help his Numerous family Nevertheless Your Petitioner would gladly accept of their present generous offer, but it is attended with so many Incumbrances, it is next to an Impossibility; as Infirmitys of Age daily Increase which Cannot be suppos'd can bear the various Changes of Climates His Family, Consisting of two Boys and five Girls, which he cannot leave here without a Sufficient support which he is not in a Capacity to leave them for he must be at some extraordinary Charge to provide for his Voyage home and during his stay in England, as also for his return (should it please Providence to grant it him) but on the Contrary Should he be seiz'd by Death at such a Distance Judge Gentlemen, into what a miserable Situation would his Family be reduced Orphans; and some young ones too, for which reasons he implores your Honour &cs. Gracious Assistance to Confer a Line in his favour to the Honble. Petition to them, hoping by your Honour &cs. recommendation it will meet with such Success as he may be favourd with some allowance in the Country as they in their Wisdom and Goodness shall think meet, which will not only be a great relief and Comfort to your Petitioner but an Encouragement to their Military servants to spend their Youthfull days with Alacrity in their service.

As we are likely to have a Rainy Passage, Which will oblige us to keep the Slaves below, and if they are Crouded for Room and with the Excessive heat We must Inevitably Expect to lose a great many of 'em Indeed from Madagascar we brought 245 and with surprizing Fortune did not lose any in the Passage, but frequently they used to be brought upon Deck for Dead by being Crouded and suffocated with the Heat, And we were oblig'd to give 'em their Meals at three or four Separate times for the Deck will contain but a few, Allowing room for working the Vessell, And the Passage from Madagascar was a fine airy (Weather Passage) And also I think it is necessary to consult for the Safety of the Ship and Slaves, to have our Cables clear. Whereas in our Passage from Madagascar we had not one Clear By reason of having such a Number of Slaves on Board And your Petitioner also begs that your Honours will take into Consideration the aforesaid Inconveniency's, and not send us a second Voyage to Madagascar, As we have not a Sufficient Number of Men Provided they were to be all in Health to take care of the Slaves, Manning the Boats Factory &ca. Our Number is but 38, and it will take above half the said Number to Man the Boats &ca. aforesaid And we cannot reasonably expect the Men to be so healthy as they were fresh from England Therefore your said Petitioner humbly begs your approbation and Remains.

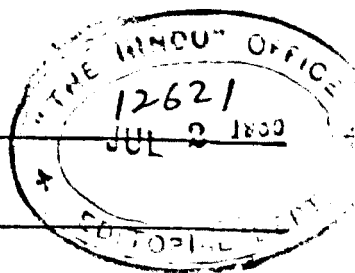

No. 121 and 122 both from Commodore Lisle, dated at Madrass the 28th and 29th Ultimo, The first acquainting us with the Orders he has received from the Lords of the Admiralty to proceed to Europe with the Squadron under his Command; That there being more Stores at this place and Madrass belonging to the King than he can take home, He desires we will appoint a proper Officer to receive them of the Naval Storekeeper offering the whole or any part we may think proper for the Company's use, and desiring that we will account for the same with the Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy, and that such part as are not proper for our Service may be disposed of to the best advantage; The other desiring we will send by any Conveyance that may offer some Stores and a Spare Top Mast that are now lying at Cuddalore; In answer to the foregoing directions were sent the 3d instant for our Storekeeper at Madrass to receive into his Charge such Stores as may be offered by Mr. Lisle, and to give proper Receipts for the same; But finding on enquiry there is no Vessell bound to Madrass, and it being so very doubtful whether any Boat would reach him in time should we hire one for that purpose; It is agreed to acquaint Mr. Lisle therewith and at the same time to tell him if he can possibly call here the things shall be in such readiness to ship off that he need be detained but few hours.

No. 123 from the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort St. George of the 30th past, accompanying Thirteen Bales of Sewanah Chitty's Cloth and twenty three Bales of Chints With the Consultation Books for 1744 and 1745, The Letters sent for 1741 and Translate of the Phirmaunds and Grants from the Mogul in the year 1716.

General Letter to Bengal to go by the Norfolk with Captain Hancock's dispatch signed, and agreable to what we therein write them it is ordered that twenty Chests of Rupees be shipped on the Lisle, and twenty more on the Success two country Ships now bound to Bengal, that our Honble. Masters Risque on the Norfolk may not be too great.

A Letter from Mr. William Perceval at Madrass dated the 5th Instant read, as enter'd hereafter desiring to be Appointed of Council there Agreeable to his Standing in the Honble. Company's Service, The same being taken into Consideration the Board were of Opinion they could not gratify him therein As it would be not only Unprecedented but also unjust to turn out any of the present Members to take in Mr. Perceval which must be the Case if His Request is complied with, as that Council is already Compos'd of five Agreeable to our Honble. Masters directions The Secretary is therefore Order'd to Acquaint him We can't grant his Petition.

Letter from Mr. Wm. [sic] Empson representing the Inconveniencies & Expence attending the want of proper Graineries.

A Letter from Mr. Matthew Empson of this date read as Enter'd hereafter representing the great Inconveniencies that attend the want of proper Graineries and the Loss at present Sustain'd by our Honble. Masters by keeping the Grain in Malabar Houses Which tho' the best He could procure for that purpose, are Extreemly bad and in Continual want of repair, which has oblig'd him to remove the Grain very Often, the Expences Attending with the Rent of the Houses and the Damage done to the Grain he Computes will Amount to about Three thousand five hundred (3500) Pagodas Per Annum therefore He takes the Liberty of offering it to our Consideration As this is an Affair that ought to be remedied as soon as possible Agreed that We Consult Mr. Robins about the properest measures to be taken in regard thereto.

Committee for Inspecting the Expences of the Settlements delivers their Report.

The Committee Appointed last Consultation for Inspecting the Accounts of this Settlement and it's Subordinates in order to reduce the Expences as much as possible now deliver in their Report which is Ordered to lay on the Table for further Consideration.

The King of Tanjore pays in 15000 Rups. in further part of the Deve Cotah Treaty.

The President Acquaints the Board that in Consequence of his Application to the King of Tanjore He has receiv'd from him in further Part for the Expences of the Deve Cotah Expedition fifteen thousand (15000) Rupees and,

Lodging Rooms Ordd: to be built for the Officers in the Fort.

As the Honble. Company's Grain is under my Care I cannot Omit acquainting You of the great Loss, Charge and inconvenience that attend it for want of a proper Place to keep it in free from Damp and Vermin it now lays mostly in the Malabar Houses at Cuddalore which as they are built only with Brick and Mudd Walls without a plaister of Chunam and no pavement; must alone occasion no little Damage this Rainy Season besides the Distruction that unavoidably attends a Wet Monsoon. Care was taken to repair these Godowns in the months of August and September notwithstanding which no less than the tops of eight of them have fell in and this usually happens in the height of the Rain, often in the night to the great detriment of the Grain before it can possibly be remov'd. You cannot but be sensible Gentlemen how difficult it was to find room for upwards of Eight hundred Garse of Rice and Paddy when His Majesty's Forces were here, since which I have kept removing it into better Godowns as occasions have offer'd, but the best of them make but bad Graineries for the reasons above mention'd which I have taken the Liberty to lay before your Honour &ca. for your Consideration

In Obedience to your Honour &ca. Commands We have examin'd for some Months past the Accounts of the several Employes at this Place and its Subordinates, and in order for reducing such Expences as may be thought necessary, We now lay before you the following Remarks VIZT.

FORT ST. DAVID.

IN THE EXPORT WAREHOUSE KEEPER'S ACCOUNT.

Under the Heads of Rice and Paddy there is a monthly Charge of Pags. 100 to 120 for Godown Rent. This we think an heavy Article which cannot be remedied but by building proper Graineries for the reception of it, as it is thought necessary during the unsettled State of the Country always to have large quantities on hand for the use of the Inhabitants as well as the Garrison.

The Charges Merchandize appear likewise pretty large, occasion'd by two Assistants at 5 and 10 Pagodas each employ'd in the Accomptant's Office, and monthly paid by the Warehousekeeper, who ought properly to be discharg'd by the Paymaster As also by the Pay and Number of Bamboo Cooleys monthly entertain'd, which We are of Opinion cannot be lessen'd, because it wou'd be difficult to collect as many as the Service may require these People being Inhabitants of Madrass and very desirous of returning there.

IN THE PAYMASTER'S ACCOUNT.

The Monthly Charge of Oil appearing very large, occasion'd by a greater Number of Guards, Points, and Peons Mettaks than were formerly at Madrass, is the Reason That that Article cannot be retrench'd, and as the Occasional Peons to the number of 279 are order'd in Consultation to be discharg'd, We do not observe any other Expencc in his Account that can be lessen'd unless the Batta paid the Boatmen when unemploy'd can be taken off, which we offer to your Consideration, these People belonging to Madrass and telling us they cannot maintain themselves here without Employment, or the said Batta being allow'd them.

IN THE SEA AND LAND CUSTOMER OF CUDDALORE HIS ACCOUNT.

Upon examination We do not find any of the Charges can be reduc'd, but that an Additional one must shortly be made for Godown Rent to receive such Goods as are imported by Sea our Honble. Masters having no proper place for that purpose.

IN THE STOREKEEPER'S IMPORT WAREHOUSEKEEPER'S SEA AND LAND CUSTOMER OF TEVENEPATAM MILITARY STOREKEEPER'S AND PAYMASTER'S ACCOUNTS.

We do not observe anything in their Monthly Expences that can be reduc'd, and as to the Charges Garrison being much larger than ever they were at Madrass arises from a greater Number both of Military and Train being entertain'd, and the

Officers's as well as Private Men's Pay augmented by the New Regulations. A further additional Expence are the Coffrees and Tellicherry Seapoys, the latter of whom receive not only great Pay but Diet money These we wou'd recommend to be discharg'd as soon as the Country is in Peace and Quietness, but while the French are daily enlisting Men to carry on their pernicious Scheme of conquering the Province, We cannot think it adviseable to reduce any part of our Military Force.

IN THE STEWARDS ACCOUNT.

Upon Examination of the several Accounts monthly deliver'd in by him, We find the Charges to be very large particularly that of dieting the Company's Slaves at near Four Fanams Per diem each person which upon Enquiry We are told cannot be lessen'd unless some part of their Allowances are taken off and therefore We offer it to your Honour &cas. Consideration but with respect to the other Charges, they are chiefly from dieting the Bombay Military Seapoys which must of course cease upon the Country's being restor'd to Peace, as those Forces will consequently be sent back to their proper Garrisons.

FORT ST. GEORGE.

No other Account but the Paymaster's being monthly transmitted from thence, on examination thereof We find a monthly Charge of 200 Rupees for Fifty Peons Extraordinary that were entertain'd in December last on account of the frequent Desertion of the Military, who at that time were new Men and very frequently they are by this time better reconciled to the Settlement, We think our Honble. Masters might be eas'd of that Charge.

The next that come under our Observation are the following Factories Vizt. VIZAGAPATAM, INGERAM, GANJAM, and DEVE COTAH which Accounts have been strictly examin'd, and nothing appearing in their Expences that can be reduc'd, We have only to add that We are

The President acquaints the Board That it is with the greatest Concern He observes the low price of Silver and Rupees Which is an Affair that requires our greatest Attention and He judges to proceed from a Scarcity of Gold, Whereby Rupees have since the loss of Madrass almost been the Currency here most payments and Advances having been in this Coin for want of a proper Check being given to it in it's Birth. That formerly Bills to a large Amount were drawn on Arcot and the Revenues of the province were transmitted in Rupees But now the Merchants instead of Bills from the other Coast make their Returns in Goods, and Nazir Jing has brought a large Quantity of Rupees with him for the Payment of his Troops. He therefore further Represents to the Board that the most probable methods which occur to remedy these Difficulty's are That all Payments for Wares and Stores be made in Pagodas Which He hopes will at least supply our Current Expences and that the Company's Servants and Military be paid as usual which will prevent any Scruples or discontent, and Instead of Coining when our Occasions Require that We dispose of some Silver, He also acquaints them that the Merchants have applied to him for Advances, but as making them in Rupees at the present Exchange must be a Considerable loss to the Company and as the Ballances in their Hands are pretty large He thinks it would be imprudent to gratifie them at present as it is likely that the Gold Expected by the Macao Ships may very Sensibly affect the Exchange. The Board taking the same into Consideration direct that all Receipts and payments be made in Pagodas and that We suspend advancing the Merchants for the present in hopes the Exchange will shortly be more favourable.

That as they believe the Benefit intended the Place in dispensing with the Sea Customs is very ill Answer'd They shall be glad of Our Orders for levying them Informing Us they shall stand in need of a further Supply of fanams by the end of next month if they are to continue paying their Military in that Money, And requesting we will favour them with any Regulations We may think Necessary to make about the Payment and Receipt of Rupees @ 350 Per one hundred Pagodas as is their Practise at present with all Covenanted Servants and Military Officers acquainting Us with Mr. Cooke's arrival there the 15 and of their having sent Us their Consultations and monthly Papers for November also sundry Fort St. George Books as Per a List Subjoin'd and inserting the Quantity of Cloth they have on board, Which having been considered on the following Answer was Agreed to be sent them That We would have them pay their Servants and Military in Pagodas As

we have already commenc'd doing so and levy the Customs immediately on the Grain imported by Sea, and that as We observe their Merchants have lately brought in but little Cloth to recommend to them to use all means to prevail on them to Exert themselves to direct them to send their Bales by the Europe Ships Expected from the Bay should they touch with them. And as in the present unsettled State of Affairs, some Persons of Distinction may probably apply to them for Protection, in such Case We would have them grant it and use them with great Civility.

The President lays before the Board a Letter He has receiv'd from one Raza Ramah Chender a Person of Distinction in Muzepher Jings Camp requesting as there is a Strict Friendship between them, that He will Assist a Dubash Whom He has wrote to for sundry Things in the Procuring Of them Whereupon It is observ'd that as the Amount of what He wants will not Exceed A hundred and forty or fifty Pagodas, And in the present Situation of Affairs it is highly prudent to have as many Friends in the Camp as possible as should any disagreement amongst them occasion the Army to divide it may turn to our advantage and the making him a present of these Articles may probably be a means of continuing him in our Interest it's therefore Agreed that He be presented with them and that they be got ready immediately.

Upon the Arrival of the Augusta a Committee of the Board was Apply'd to View the Broad Cloth, when all Bales that Appear'd to be Damaged were opened; and all such Peices as were so, were taken out and deliver'd to the Captain on his Paying 30 Per Cent Advance on them, as was usual in those Cases and Good Cloth out of the Warehouse was Packt up in the Room; so that I can't think the Damage could be of an Old standing.
