Misenor importedthere 19th Novem: that the Severn arrived there from Mocha the 27th November. Letter from Mr. Bour-chier advise ing that the Prss: Augusta is ransomed from Angria & gone to Bombay. Advice from Achin that Comm: Griffin in the Pres Mary with the Pearl, arriv'd there the 28th October & left it 2d Novem: for Bengall Four French Ships arrive at Achin 25th November & leave it 11th December Four French Ships with a Tender arrive at Madrass.

The Deputy Governor acquaints the Board that He has received a Letter from the President of Bombay wherein He acknowledges the Receipt of what wrote them advising of the Loss of Madrass and that He has wrote our Board by way of Arcott which is not yet come to hand and that they have directed the Gentlemen at Suratt to remitt Us by Bill on that Place Forty Thousand (40000) Rupees and that Our Indents for Stores &c. shall be complied with as far as they can spare from their Own Garrison but that the Supply cannot reach Us till March or April which We are sensible of. He further advises that they have wrote our Honble. Masters of the Loss of Madrass by way of Bussero the 7th of November, that the Warwick Capt. Misenor imported at Bombay the 19th Novr. that He parted Company with his Majesty's Ships the Princess Mary and Pearl off Madeira when they went in Company with his Ships bound to China and Two to this Coast and Bay which We presume to be the Illchester and Britannia. The Severn arriv'd at Bombay from Mocha the 27th of November. By the Same Conveyance Mr. Bourchier advises that the Princess Augusta is ransomed from Angria and gone to At the Same Time We have receiv'd Advices by the Dane Ship from Achim [sic] that Commodore Griffin in the Princess Mary in Company with the Pearl arriv'd at that Place the 28th October and left it the 2d November bound for Bengall in Order to join his Majesty's Squadron; Four French Ships under the Command of Monsr. Dordille arrived there the 25th November and sailed the 11th December N.S. which 4 Ships with a Tender to our great Concern and Uneasiness arrived at Madrass the 1st Instant, as We know not what Exploits this Reinforcement may put Our Enemies upon and We have vett no Assistance nor even Advices from Bengall which gives Us the Utmost Concern. The French Ships Names are the Centaur, Mars, Brilliant and St. Louis who report that Monsr. De La Bourdonnais with the Other Ships is gone to the Islands.

Lre advising that the President & Council of Bengall had sent the Ship Kent to their from Vizaga-Place for their's and the Ingeram Bales, which they had accordingly complied with, patam. and that they had taken the Opportunity to send the People We wrote for by that Ship to Bengall in Order to be sent us from thence.

No. 4 from Mr. Thomas Saunders at Ingeram advising of one Hundred and Ingeram. twelve (112) Bales sent to Vizagapatam to be forwarded to Bengall by the Kent.

No. 3 To the Chief and Council at Tellicherry adviseing of the Arrival of five [To] French Ships in Pondicherry Road As likewise of the Arrival of one of their Sloops Tellicherry. and gsiving them the best Intelligence, We could learn of them. Also desiring them to contract with any returning Vessells to take Rice on Freight on our Honble Master's Account for the Use of this Settlement, Grain of all kinds being very scarce with us, and likewise to supply us with some Europe Sieves for makeing Gun Powder.

No. 4 to the President & Council of [Bombay] acknowledgeing the receipt of forty thousand (40,000) Rupees received by their Order from Arcott, and giveing them an Account of the present Situation of Affairs with us. And requesting them to supply us with [all] kind of Stores, particularly Implements for makeing Powder as likew[ise] for the Mint and whatever else might occur to them.

The Deputy Governour represents to the board that He has receiv'd a Letter Letter from from the old Nabob Anaverdy Cawn, imp[ar]ting his Expectation of some allow- Nabob ance from the Company towards defraying the great Expence He is at in the two Cawn. Armies commanded [by] his two Sons that now lye at our Bound Hedge, as He says, purely for the Defence of this Settlement, He likewise sets forth that He [has] receiv'd continual Messages or rather Demands on the same Account from Mohofoz Cawn & Mahomed Ally Cawn his Sons, wi[th] whom He has had an Interview and long discourse on the Subject and upon the whole He represents to the Board that is is [sic] impo[ssi] ble to put them off longer without paying them something m[ore] than the small presents they have Yet had, and that a farther [de]lay may be attended with the Utmost ill Consequence to our Hon[ble] Masters Affairs, as We have yet receiv'd no certain Advices nor indeed any at all from our

Friends, when We may expect to be [Suc]coured and the Deputy Governour haveing represented to them in the strongest Terms, that it is not in our Power to advance any of the large Sums they so often talk off as Lacks of Pagodas [&] the like. And that under the unhappy Cloud our Master's Affairs at present are on this Coast, haveing lost our head Settlement w[ith] all the Money & valuable Effects, As likewise that this is a little Place depriv'd of all it's ancient & natural Support. and prov[ided] with nothing but for its defence, And as these are also Times in which all Credit and Commerce is at a Stand; The most We have in our Power is a small Present to convince them of our Gratitude for their Assistance & as a Mark of our dutiful & Respectful Behaviour towards them & to assure them that our Honble Masters will not be ungrateful when they shall receive any Solid & Material Marks of their protection & friendly Assistance. Upon the Whole the Deputy Governour is advis'd by the Officers of the Durbar that in consideration of our present posture of Affairs for the sum of about six thousand (6000) Pagodas they may be made easy for some Days by which time We hope our Ships & Supplys will arrive; In Consideration of all Which and that the Sum is but inconsiderable in comparison of any Risque of disobliging them, and thereby giving our most Industrious Enemies any Handle against us. Agreed that the above Sum of six thousand (6000) Pagodas or thereabouts be given in Rups. and that all proper Methods be taken to keep them in a good disposition towards us.

The Houses in Tevenepatam that were within 400 Yards of the Fort haveing been pull'd down in Consequence of an Order of Consultation of the 17th. November; The Inhabitants of whom haveing been very importunate to the Deputy Governour in regard to their sufferings on that Occasion, The same is now taken into Consideration, And as it appears they have been all contrary to the establish'd Rules given to be observed at the beginning of this Settlement, It is generally AGREED that they have no pretentions to any Restitution being made them for any Houses within that distance, but as our Military Officers still represent it to be very requisite for the Security of the Fort to level the Ground yet farther, In Case We may find it necessary to come to a Resolution of so doing. It is thought reasonable patam to be and hereby AGREED to allow the Owners of such Houses a proportionable recompence for the same.

AGREED that a General Letter be drawn out & sent to the President & Council of Bengall to advise them that the five French Ships mention'd to be arriv'd at Pondicherry in our last, left that place the 28th. Past bound seemingly to the Southward. That We were sorry his Majesty's Squadron did not appear before they went, as they might have stopp'd a great many Bales & Valuable Effects, put on board them, as likewise have prevented their Doing any mischief in other Parts of India. And that We think it cannot now be long before some Ships come to us to take away our Bales & to relieve the Garrison which could not have subsisted had not the President & Council of Bombay supplyed us with forty thousand (40,000) Rupees.

I desire You will mention upon Consultation of this Day, that I require in behalf of the Honble Company whose Servants We are, that whatever Money of the Honble Company's that is or ought to be paid aw[ay] in Fanams to the Military, or that for any other Use is disburs'd for their Service, be for the future accounted for to the Honble Company at thirty six (36) Fanams to the Pagoda, and that the Batty which is gain'd by the Exchange of Pagodas for fanams, be allways brought to account in the Cash Book.

My Reason for this request is that the Profit arising to [Com] pany in every ten-(10) Pagodas worth of Fanams so paid away wi[ll be] thirty two (32) Fanams.

He also informs that the Nabob had sent a Dalhoit to remind him of the Annual Present which He should defer sending till He received our Directions thereon.

No. 7 from Mr. John Andrews at Ganjam adviseing of Eighty Two Bales with some Gunnys and Ropes as Per Invoice sent agreable to our Orders by a Country Boat, and that He has engaged what Vessels are remaining at that Place to come hither with Grain on promise of our Favour.

Genl. Letter from Ingeram.

No. 9 from Mr. Thomas Saunders at Ingeram Adviseing of Five hundred, and Forty (540) Bales sent to this Place Per Ship Success, and One hundred and Twelve (112) by Sloop Fortune and that the Remainder with him being about One hundred and forty He will forward by a Country Vessel, And requesting as He has had no Remittance for some Time, that We will order Mr. Prince to supply him with what Cash may be necessary for the Support of that Factory: Also that He will do his utmost in encourageing an Importation of Grain to this Place.

Genl. Letter to Tellicherry.

No. 10 from the Chief and Council at Tellicherry adviseing of the Receipt of Our Orders to Capt. Somner which They had accordingly sent to Anjengo in order to be forwarded to him at Galle, and that they shall not fail to advise Us of the Arrival of any Shipping on that Coast, and what other material Occurrences that may happen.

Genl. Letters to Vizagapatam, Ingeram and Maddepollam.

No. 7, 8, 9 to the Chief and Council at Vizagapatam, to Mr. Thomas Saunders at Ingeram, and to Mr. Samuel Banks at Maddapollam the Contents of all which are to inform them of the Departure of the French Ships and that they might send up their Bales with Safety, and directing Mr. Banks to contract the Expences of that Factory, till We had Leisure to overlook them, and that We could by no means allow of any Present to the Government at a Place where no Business was carried on for our Masters Also directing him to go immediately to Masulipatam and demand of Coja Mirza to the Amount of about Five thousand (5000) Pagodas in Chay Goods to have been provided by Him for the Company according to his Contract, and to lett Us know the Reason why He has not already sent them conformable to an Order of Mr. Hinde now some time Since.

The Nabob's Armies decamp. A Present Mdee him;

The Deputy Governor represents to the Board that notwithstanding the several Methods that have been used to amuse the Nabobs and to endeavour if possible to keep them in humour so as to detain their Armies with Us, yett to our

great Misfortune, the long Delay of our Ships, and the frequent Proposals they daily receive from the French, have at length brought them over to accommodate Matters with them, under Pretence of having been at the Expence of 5 Lack of Rupees in our Defense. In Consequence of which unhappy Circumstance both their Armies are now beginning to decamp. The Deputy Governour having been apprized of their design sent a Vakeel to them with a small Present of Twelve hundred and Fifty (1250) Rupees, and to offer them Two Thousand (2000) Rupees Per Day, if they would stay only Ten Days longer, in hopes that Our Ships might appear in that Time; But the French promising them the whole 5 Lack as above, they have resolved to leave Us in spite of all Arguments to the Contrary, and had We even engaged for that Sum (which was impossible) the French would still have bid more, having this Advantage, that if they do not perform what they promise they can be but upon the same bad Terms they already were with the Government, whereas had We acted in that manner We must have made them our Enemies instead of being as they say our Friends, though they will not go such Lengths as We would have them. Upon the whole We have nothing in Our Power but to lett them act as they think proper and secure from them as much Protection as We can. Accordingly they have promised that the French shall not molest Us, and in Case they should, they will come again to our Assistance, but not to depend entirely upon them. Agreed that We muster all our Force and put them in the best manner We can to defend Ourselves, in case they should fail in their promise; which tho' very precarious is the best We can procure for the Interest of Our Masters or Ourselves in our present unhappy Circumstances; Not having yet received a Line of Advise or any Promise of Succours from Bengall which We so much depended on, though We hear of their Shipping being sent to all Parts of India but this Coast and the French have had Advices four Times by Sea from Chardenagore [sic], and boast that they know all the Gentlemen's designs in Calcutta; One of which they pretend to assure Us is that We shall have no Ships to take in Our Goods for Europe tho' We have above Two Thousand One hundred (2100) Bales, and no room to keep them, nor in a Capacity to defend them.

Mr. Sidney Foxall Assay Master arrived here the 7th Instant, Agreed that Mr. Sidney He be entertained at the same monthly Pay and Allowances as He Received at Assay Fort St. George.

He representing the Want of Conveniencies for coining both Gold and Silver, represents He proposes the Gold Mint to be in the Factory House at Cuddalore but there being Materials. no Room in that Compound for coining Rupees, He represents a House at a small Distance from the Factory that has a large Spott of vacant Ground about it to be fitt for that Purpose, Agreed that it be purchased, and the Paymaster is order'd to make what Additions to it as likewise to the Factory House as Mr. Foxall thinks necessary, and that the Charges of getting the Mint necessaries out of Madrass and bringing them down be paid him.

Messrs. William Smyth King and Edmund Maskelyne Writers from Fort St. Writers George requesting to be continued in the Company's Service, as there is great entertain'd. Want of Assistants Agreed that they be entertained on the same Terms as was Mr. John Pybus and Ordered that they be employed under the Secretary.

John Smith Steward delivers in his Account of the Expences of the General Steward Table to the 31st Ultimo, Amounting to Two hundred and Sixty Eight Pagodas, Acct. of the Thirty Four Fanams and Forty Cash (268. 34. 40) which is order'd to be paid and Expences of the Genl. Table.

Mr. Cornelius Goodwin offering to pay into Our Cash the Sum of Three Money paid Thousand (3000) Pagodas for a bill of Exchange on the President and Councill of by Mr. Cor. Bengall; AGREED to receive the same and that the Bills be accordingly drawn out nelius Goodwin. and delivered him in favour of Messrs. Fytche and Burrows.

The Deputy Governour represents to the boar[d] that He hath certain Intelligence the Enemy is comeing against us & [that] a large Party came out of Pondicherry yesterday to Areacopang wi[th the] necessarys proper for such a Design, Upon Hearing of which New[s we] order'd Cap^t. Gingins to March out early this Morning with about 3[...] European & Topass Soldiers, as likewise Cap^t. Hollond attended by M[r. Hal]liburton & Mr. Joseph Fowke with a small Party of European

Proceedings thereupon

Hor[semen] tho' as many as We could get fit for Service together with [a]ll our Peons to [a] number of about three thousand to assemble at the Company's Gardens Where upon viewing the whole it was thought they made a tolerable figure [as] to oppose at least for some time any Forces the French could as yet bring ag[ainst] us (as far as We could learn by the Advices receiv'd of them) If the Blacks d[o] not desert us, and by the appearance of our Military attended by the [Gun] room Crew with some Artillery & our European Horsemen, We hope they w[ould] be encourag'd to stand their Ground but without them We think the Cou[ntry] People would give way as not being us'd to stand against the fir[...]lar Troops, but Care nas not been wanting to put their Chiefs in [mind to] exercise them often & make them fit for Service in our Way of engage [ing the] manner shewn them how to

behave in time of Action, AGREED that We [Consult] the chief Officers of the Garrison, If We can risque the same Number of Mili[tary] in the field that were out this Morning & leave a sufficient Number of M[en] in the Fort for its Security.

The Deputy Governour also represents that [he] has advice that Meersul 70 Moratta Governour of Velloure has assisted the [French] with 300 Horse, on which as Horse entertain'd. He is well assur'd that Horsemen are [of] great Service in the field, He has entertain'd about 70 Morattoes being as many as He could get from Mohofoz Cawn & Mahmed Ally Cawn while they were encamp'd near our Bounds a short time past, & that He has wrote repeated Letters to them for more as well as to request their Assistance against the Enemy who he has advis'd are coming against us as likewise to Gingee for one or two hundred Horsemen as good as can be got & to Captain Hopkins at St. Thos. Mount to send immediately to our Assistance a thousand Pollygars, He being advis'd that those People have offer'd their Assistance.

Gingins with the Remainder into the Fort, the Peons were to keep round about, but not to go too far from the Military for fear of a Surprize from the Enemy who were advanc'd about half way from Pondicherry.

[Fren]ch enter our [bo]unds. [Engage]-ment with them

Early this Morning Advices came that the Enemy mar[ch]ed forward apace & between 8 & 9 o Clock entered our Bounds, Upon which the Governour ordered Capt. Gingins immediately to march out with 100 Europea[ns] & 200 Topasses including Ensign Schrimpsaws Party, & the Train of Artillery with orders to endeavour if possible to hinder the Enemy's crossing Penniar River & taking Possession of the Garden House, where We judged rightly they would endeavour to fix their Head Quarters, the Horsemen were also out under the Command of Capt. John Hollond, Our Men made a stand for some time near the Points of Tevenepatam & Patcheree, The Enemy being five times the Number of ours, but between one & two our Troops march'd forward to the Banks of Penniar River, The Enemy being on the other Side, & immediately the Field Pieces fir'd very briskly on both Sides, Between 4 & 5 the Enemy press'd hard upon our Troops who did not give Way but fir'd briskly their Small Arms, but in the Dusk of the Evening, Ours being a small body in comparison to the Numbers of the Enemy, could not keep the Field all Night, so were obligd to retreat into the Fort which they did in good order & brought all the Artillery with them & by this means left the Enemy to proceed as they pleas'd.

[Offi]cers report their [Peo]ple to behav'd [very] well.

The Officers upon coming in report their People in general behav'd very well & could not do more than they did with such a Handful of Men against the Force of the Enemy, being as they believe at least one thousand Europeans besides Topasses, Coffrees & Seapoys altogether about two thousand. They say they had but little Assistance from the Peons & none from the Moratto Horse, they keeping at a great distance & would not come near our Horsemen, that they stayed as long in the Field as they could with Prudence & report the Enemy to have acted cowardly in not advancing sooner upon them; They believe they must have done the Enemy some damage, as the Field Pieces were fired between 6 & 7 Hundred times, on our side We have only one Topass kill'd, 3 Europeans Wounded & a few Peons.

Majesty's Squadron & as they drew near the Enemy perceiv[d] from the Garden His House & immediately made a slow retreat, Upon which [a par]ty of Military were Squadron ordered out with the Horsemen & Artillery as before, to [win] what Advantage arrives. they could, but the Enemy not haveing brought up their [hea]vy Artillery & but a Part of their Baggage, We could reap no great Adv[an]tage over them, but We kept a constant fire upon them from the Fort & [...] Battery that could possibly reach them, as they retired & were very than [kful] to God for so critical a Delivery from our Enemies who must have done [the Com] pany an infinite deal of Mischief at Cuddalore & the Washing Towns had [not] the Ships appear'd as they did for the most We could do was to defend [our] Fort, As We had had no Advices from Bengall We could not expect the Squadron because it was natural to believe our Enemies would not have come against us had that been the case, as We know they had continual Advices, but they were deceived in the Shortness of their Passage.

The Governour upon Sight of the Squadron wrote a Letter & sent Mr. Wynch Mr. Wynch to compliment the Comodore upon his Arrival & to desire He would immediately wi[th] a send a Force ashore to follow the Enemy in their Retreat which He directly complyed with & landed between 7 & 800 Men most expeditiously, but the [French] [plime] the Commo; were march'd too far for the Troops to be able to come up with them. were march'd too far for the Troops to be able to come up with them.

We have taken into Consideration in what Method to reward our Garrison [...] Gunaccording to a Custom allow'd by our Masters in their Ships & our Promise in [awar]ded consequence of it made to them at going out, They haveing by the Report of their for their syallour Officers & as We ourselves could plainly perceive from the Fort, behaved well both in the first & second engagement with the Enemy, AGREED that on behalf of the Honble Company We present the whole of the Military in the Garrison with a Coat & Cap to the Gunners a Coat & Pr. of Breeches & to the Ensigns & two Masters of the Artillery 5 Yards of fine Scarlet Broad Cloth each with sufficient for faceing the Paymaster is ordered to set about the cloathing immediately, & the Warehousekeeper is ordered to deliver out Broad Cloth for that Purpose & for the Officers, which allowance will amount to about two thousand (2000) Pagodas no great matter for such a Number of Men & is better than giveing them Money which would soon be gone & occasion disorders while it lasted, whereas they will reap the Benefit of this Year round by haveing nothing to pay for their cloathing.

Our late Governour Mr. Hinde some time ago was pleas'd to compliment my judgment so far as to ask my Opinion of what I thought would add to the Strength of this Fort & render it tenable against the [Fort] of our neighbouring [Enemies] at Pondicherry; In Obedien[ce] to his Commands, I projec[ted a] Plan which now I have the Honour to lay before you, [and I would] inform You, that I have been I have the monour to lay before you, [and I would] inform You, that I have been so happy as to have the Desi[gns of the] new works which it contains approv'd off By Commodor[e Griffin] whose Skill & Experience will I am persuaded influence [the Car]rying it into Execution beyond all Arguments which [I am able] to use, nevertheless You will permit me to give you the bes[t reasons] I can, in support of what I am engaged in & I am to request [. . .] wherever You may find them defective, that You [will] judge [favour]ably of me, since I have not been bred this Way, & Consequ[ently] cannot be entitu[led (sic) to] any great Knowledge in Affairs of [the fu]ture.

FORT S^T. DAVID in [its] Construction is but a small, irregular Fortress, yet sufficie [nt in] my opinion to withstand the Forces of a Nabob or a Moratt[a] but the Enemies We have now to oppose are too well skilled [in the] Art of War not to know its Weakness & defects which I wis ll endeavour to point out to you & then offer what I judge [as] necessary to remedy them.

It's Situation is upon a sma[ll] [emi]nence & surrounded with a Fausse Bray & a Ditch of fifty foot neither of which has hitherto been compleated; but admitting both were, the Fort would still be too weak to make a defen[ce of] any duration, was an Enemy lodged either at the place [where the] Roman Church now stands, or amongst the Houses in the [. . . .] way, for from those places the Western Flank of the NE^t. [sic] [Basti] on & the Northern Flank of the SW^t. Bastion are both ali[ke &] exposed to almost a Rectangular fire from the Besiegers, in th[at] Case, none but the Flank Guns which they are endeavouring to dismount can be brought to bear upon them, & they in number, One in the first & Two in the second for none of the Guns on the N.E. N.W. nor S.W. Bastions, owing to their obtuse forms, can be of the least Service, These Flanks Rendered useless, no other, can enfilade any Approaches, so 'tis reasonable to conclude, the next Step the Enemy will take is to make a Lodgement in the Covert Way, & then 'tis to be presumed the Situation of the besieged will become somewhat desperate, On the other Hand N.E. of the Fort are [some s]mall Sand Hills, A Lodgement there lays open the Eastern Flank [of] the N.W. Bastion & the Northern Flank of S.E. Bastion, & the Consequences pretty much the same as what has been said of the Roman Church & Collaway, The River washing the South Side of the Fort, not b[ein]g fordable, I shall for the Present reckon that the Strongest Side.

I am off [sic] a steadfast Belief what I have said will be duly weighed & as due Measures enter'd upon for the Preservation of the Settlement, & therefore I will proceed to lay before You, what in my humble Opinion, will in a great measure tend to & I hope totally destroy, all Attempts of our Enemies, & thereby preserve to the Company so much of their possessions as now remain on the Coast of Coromandel.

The clear Space from the Fort to the Church and E^t. end of the Collaway may be computed at most 500 Yards, at this Dis[ta]nce, Batteries of heavy Cannon will both Batter & break; fewer Traverses need be made & of Course less time will be spent in approaches than if the Distance was greater, The Bombardire so nearly situated will also give his Mortars so much more Elevation that the Descent of the Shell will have the greater Velocity, & in this Case I need not mention the Danger of your Magazines Caserns &c^a. & the only Way to remove these Evils farther off is [to level] the Church, Colloway & [Buil]dings thereabouts for full [800 ya]rds or more & the like Space tow[ards] Tevenepatam.

It may [be] said this will not save us from a Bombardment, nor prevent the Enemy from opening the Ground or carr[ying] on their Approaches, the same [F] lanks will still be as much expo[sed] after an Advance of three Hundred 300 Yards is made & [B]omb[ardment] still as liable to make fire as before, It is upon these Supp ositions Gen tlemen, that the Outworks designed are the more necess[ary to] leave to begin with the Hornwork, as for its Dimensio[ns I shall] Refer you to scale & Compass, & shall only say [that] it [will require] One Hundred & forty 140 Yards of firm Cassim[. . .] Guns from the Curtains thereof, will enfilade any Appr[oach to the] Collaway the [Eastern] Bastion scours all the plain fr[om Tevena] patam Gate NorthW^t. ward the East Curtain & W^t.ern [. . .] thereof answers the same End in Respect to the Sand [Hills] already spoke off; 'twill not only cover the No.ern Curt[ain and the] two exposed Flanks on the N.E. & N.W. Bastions, It will [also] be a Work capable of defending itself but defends & is [. . .] by the Fort, & will mount 24 Pieces of Cannon, here [with case] mated Arsenals enough to contain all those Articles [. . .] now exposed in the Fort, with Lodgings for the Guards & the [. . .] within itself, the more Guns that can be brought to enfilade an[. . .] with more difficulty & greater Loss He carries on his Works for [. . .] as well as for the Security of the Flanks that I have laid [down...] Lunettes, One in the Ditch to the W^t ward & the other on the E^t side of the \lceil . These Answer all the Ends of the Horn work, tho' not in so extensive a manner As this cannot defend itself so well; They will be both casemated & serve [for] Storehouses, Prisons, & many more purposes, They will mount 12 Guns [. & as I said before will have all the properties of Defence & being defen[ded] as such Works will admit off, these three Works will have four Magazin[es] for Powder large enough to receive one hundred & fifty 150 Barrels each, which will greatly contribute to the Safety of the Fort whose Magazine is not altogether so trust Worthy, The Advantages of the Covert Way & Glacis, are understood by every one & nothing more need be said in their Commendation than they are of incomparable Service wherever they are lin'd out, it would not be amiss to inform You that Tevenepatam River (I know no other Name for it) turn[ing] in a Bed of [eight] foot deep & 16 wide quite round the Foot of the Glacis wou[ld] add so much [to the] Strength of the place in General, as would more than infi[...]ly countervail the Expence of turning so small a Brook, It would give m[e] great pleasu[re] were I sure that this Work would meet the Approbation [of] the Gentlemen in England & nothing would increase it more than to [secure] some very able Hand sent from thence as it is so highly necessary to have su[ch] Works skilfully executed.

A General [Letter] from the Governor & Council at Negapatam dated the 4th. May N. S. is likewise now read & entered No. 33 wherein they are pleased to signify to us the orders of the Honourable the States of the United Netherlands, & of the General priviledged East India Company at Batavia their high Superiors in a Declaration or act of theirs forbidding the Trade in Ophium within the Streights of Sunda & through the Streights] of Malacca & that they have further taken upon them to prescribe certain Limits fo[r the] exclusive [Tra]de, such as Java, Madura, Sambawa & the other Islands to the Eastward Boeton, Saleyer, Celebes, Borneo, & Banca & all the Inner Coast of Sumatra, with all other places where the Netherland East India Company pretend solely to the Right of Navigating & trading & giving us a formal information hereof to the End that We [mi]ght guard against Damages, & have no plea for Ignorance.

The Board taking the for [egoing] Letter into consideration AGREE to prepare an answer to the follow [ing] [effect.]

- MAY 1747 -

That the Trade carried on by our [Honble] Masters & by all other persons who Remarks of the Board have permission from them for that purpose in the several parts in India & in the on the seas they mention is derived from the Liberty Granted them by the Authority of foregoing our most gracious Sovereign & is confirmed to them by his Charter & the Acts of Lre. the Legislative power of great Britain & that consequently they have a Right to Enjoy all the Benefit of his Royal Benevolence, & that the States of Holland being in Amity with his Majesty, His Subjects have the more just Reason to expect the Countenance & protection of the Netherland's Company in such their lawful Traffick, rather than any Molestation & more especially as it is Notorious for Time immemorial, th[ey] have carried on the same in the Seas, where the Declaration would now [...] them from, That therefore their pretensions to the Sole Navigation & [...] of those parts, cannot but be deem'd as an Innovation, & a proceeding arbitrary & in no Manner to be submitted to, That We see this with More Concern as the Servants of the Netherland Company, seem unsatisfied with having wrested from the English that Valuable Branch of the Spice Trade, & to be eager in Grasping at the small Remains now left them, Likewise that it is no less Matter of Surprize to us, that there comes in this Manner, an Act of the Governor General of the Netherla[nd] India & his Council which has never yet been digested in Europe, [& war]ranted by any Authority from thence, as any Ways appears to us. [That on] the whole We can look upon this their Declaration, in no other lig[ht] but as an Usurpation of Authority derogatory to the Honour, Interest, & Priviledges of the English Nation in the Indies, and as such We a re under a Necessity of protesting as We now do in full Form against [the Governor] General & the Council of the Netherlands India & against [all persons] whomsoever, acting under their Authority, in Matters relateing [...] for all Losses, Damages & Accidents that any Ways may accru[e the] United Company of Merchants of England tradeing to the E[ast] or any Person or Persons tradeing with their License where [...]ration Refers to, by any Seizure of Effects, detaining of Ships [...] in any Manner tending to injure them in their Trade.

The Council of War held on the [29th April] having appointed the Military Officers in Conjunction with Mrs. Jones & Baker to consider on the present State of the Garrison & to lay before us, the Governor & Council their Opinion of what Measures ought to be taken to render it tenable against the Assaults of the Enemy, also to rectify such Defects in Military Discipline as might occur to them and finally all such things as are necessary to be known for the preservation of the place & the better conducting Matters relative thereto; They accordingly now tender to the board their Report in writing, containing their several Occurrences, which being read by the Secretary is ORDERED to be entered after this Consultation.

And in Consequence of the Sundry Articles therein offered to our Considera-[Proceedings] tion, It is hereby Ordered and Agreed

That the Spot of Ground mentioned to be the most convenient for the Inhabitants of Tevenepatam to build on be immediately lined out & Permission given them to build accordingy.

That the pulling down of the Dutch Factory as set forth in their Report to be absolutely ne [cessar]y, be deferr'd 'till a proper Opportunity offers of representing, the same [to] the Governor & Council of Negapatam & to wait their [Ans]wer thereon.

That all the Soldiery & those of the Artillery in the Garrison be kept in strict Discipline & that Martial Law be introduced among them.

That the Secretary cause Copies of the Several Articles of War to be wrote out, agreable to those they have extracted & that the same be affixed to all Publick G[uard]s as Likewise.

That O[rder be] issued out to the proper Officers to summon the whole Garrison under Arms once in three Months at farthest to have the said Articles read before them.

— MAY 1747 —

That the Method prescribed for the securing the Main Guard Gate as likewise for the Erecting Soldier's Barracks & Lodgings for the Subaltern Officers be proceeded on as soon as a sufficient Number of Workmen can be procured without taking those off which are now employed.

That what is proposed [for the se] Curity of the South West Magazines as well as the new [...] pulling down part of the sorting Godown & other Lodging for [the] Space of thirty five Feet be referred to our farther Consideration.

That the Magazine at the South East of the Fort said to contain about four Hundred 400 Barrels of Powder be immediately strengthened in such Manner as may be deemed secure against a Bombardment and that the Paymaster do make the Hinges of the Doors with Copper, that the Doors themselves be doubled, & the Jambs strengthned & plated with sheet Lead & this to be done as soon as possible.

That the arched Godowns under the East Curtain which are now full of Stores, be cleared out in all Haste & laid open for Barracks.

That the Storekeeper deliver out fresh [mus]quet Powder to the Master of Arms for the making of new Cartr[idges] Agreable to the new set of Formers & that the powder of the old [Cartrid]ges be returned to the Storekeeper & remade & this to be done with [...].

That the Warehousekeeper do see all the Company's Bales & Calicoes which are now in the Fort removed to Cuddalore & that He keep them there in the best Godowns that can be got, 'till Opportunity offers to export them.

That the Broad Cloth which is fit for [the] Coast be sold & delivered out to the Company's Merchants as soon [as] possible in Order to clear a large Godown in the Square very pro[per] for Grain.

That the Steward provide three Hundred 300 Head of Live Cattle the best that can be got, besides one hundred [...] More to be salted up; also three hundred & fifty 350 Hogs & a sufficient quantity] of all [sorts] of provisions fit for the Garrison, particularly a larg[e quantity] of salt fish & a very large Supply of good firewood.

[That] the Storekeeper do provide fifty 50 Leager[s] of good Columbo or Batavia Arrack.

That the Warehousekeeper do lay up [in the] Fort a Store of six Months Rice for one thousand (1000) Men [and] none be expended out of that Stock, 'till He receives Orders for [...] Board, but that the Daily Expence be delivered out from Tevene[patam to] Cuddalore.

That the Outworks on the North Side of Tevenepatam be secured as soon as possible by Digging & Palasading, a good Wide Trench round them, & a proper Shelter built for the People that are to guard them.

That with Regard to what relates to the Workmen & Cooleys & the Method proposed to pay them, It must be observ'd the same has been practised for sometime, excepting two of the Company's Servants being present at the paying them which is now Agreed to & Mess¹⁸. Baird & Duncombe appointed to assist under y°. Paymaster for that Purpose & farther.

That all Manner of Encouragement be given to all Labourers to come into our Bounds & to induce them to stay with us.

That no pains be spared to procure Trees proper for Stakes, as also all other Materials that may be wanting to forward the Works on hand with all Expedition, & that the Paymaster do hire what Vessels He can to bring in firewood & Chunam.

That the Gunroom Crew be regulated, agreable to the Method proposed to us as soon as possible, & that the persons Recommended to us to have Ensign's Commissions, have them given accordingly, also that all good & skilfull Men be encouraged to enter in that Service.

---- MAY 1747 ----

The Houses of Tevenepatam a[...] now pulling down, & those in the Col[...] AGREED to come down, as soon as the Inhabitants of them can remove their Effects, Notices therefore Ordered to be given them for that Purpose & a Day allotted for it.

To the Worshipful Charles Floyer Esqr.

AND THE GENTLEMEN IN COUNCIL OF FORT ST. DAVID.

WORSHIPFULL SIR AND SIRS,

Pursuant to the Result of a Council of War held the 29th of last Month, wherein We were directed to consider of the present State of this Garrison, and to lay before You our Opinions, what measures ought to be taken to render it tenable against the Assaults of an Enemy, to rectify such Defects in Military Discipline as may occur to Us, and finally all such things as are necessary for You to know for the Preservation of this Place, and the better conducting matters tending thereto; We shall now endeavour to do it in the best manner We can, and hope that what We lay before You will not only meet your Approbation, but excite You to forward so good a Work with that diligence and Spirit which the Case requires, as the Time of doing it cannot be reckon'd longer than the Stay of his Majesty's Squadron upon this Coast.

The order in Council of War relating to pulling down all Buildings, and making a clean Explanade [sic] round the Fort for the Space of Eight hundred Yards is begun to be put in Execution, and We hope to see the Labourers daily encrease, that a speedy End may be put to this Work, having many more to enter upon which will require as much Dispatch.

As the Principal Buildings, Dwelling Houses and Gardens are within that Limitt, and of Course must be cleared away, We are of Opinion that when that is compleated, to make the Explanade [sic] 400 Yards more will be of so little Consideration in point of Labour and Expence, and of so much in Respect to the defence of the Place, that We are perswaded You will have no Objection to it.

About West and by South near 2000 Yards distant from the Fort is a rising Ground, and near the banks or [sic] Trepopilore River, where it winds from South to an East Course, this Spot we think most convenient for the Inhabitants of Tevenapatam to build upon; 'Tis true the Soil is sandy; but the Place they live in now is equally so; and this Situation has one Advantage the other has not; which is that Two Sides of the Village will be refreshed by the Water of Trepopilore River.

The Dutch Factory in Tevenapatam Town stands distant from the foot of the Northern Glacis no more than 644 Yards; 'Tis not only a large House of itself, but has a large Space of Ground walled in besides; sufficient to lodge perhaps the whole force of Pondicherry, and may prove of the most fatal Consequence to this Fort if it is permitted to stand, as it is reasonable to suppose an Enemy will seek Shelter wherever it is to be had, and here it is to be had, tho' all the Rest of the Country be cleared round Us.

As We are altogether ignorant of the Laws of Nations in such Cases, We earnestly recommend this to your serious Consideration, and can do no more than offer our Opinion, which is, that it is absolutely necessary that Building should come down.

--- MAY 1747 ---

The next matter recommended to Us in the above Council of War, relates to discipline and Law Martial in the Soldiery and Artillery, which We have observed has not been put in Practice hitherto in any of our Company's Settlements in India, perhaps from a Tenderness the Gentlemen in Direction at home might have for this lower Class of their Servants: or it may be from a Jealousy of trusting their Governors and Officers with so extensive a Power as that of Life and Death, independent of the Civil Magistracy. Whether this be so or not is not to our present purpose to enquire, We shall only observe to You, that at this Time We hold it above all things most needful to be put in Execution. But least We should be misguided in our Opinions, We have had Recourse to the Copy of his late Majesty's Charter granted to the East India Company the 24th of September in the 13th year of his Reign: in the 27, 28, 29, and 30th Pages thereof We find he has been most graciously pleased to grant Powers to the Governors in India to exercise Law Martial and Military Discipline: We have extracted the Same from the Charter Word for Word which is as follows.

"And our further Will and Pleasure is, and We do of our more abundant "Grace for Us, our heirs and Successors, give and grant unto the said Company " and their Successors by these Presents full Power and Authority from Time to "Time to name and appoint such Person or Persons, as they shal[1] think fitt to be "General or Generals of all the forces by Sea or Land of or belonging to the said "Town of Madraspatnam, and the Towns Places and Dependancies of Fort St. "George aforesaid; and to nominate, constitute and appoint, such and so many "Commanders and Military Officers, as to them shall seem meet and requisite for "the leading, conducting, and training up the Inhabitants of the said Town, Places, " and Limits aforesaid, and such a Number of Seamen and Ships of Defence, as " are or shall be necessary for the Defence and Safe Guard of the Same, and such "General or Generals or other Officers, or any of them at the Pleasure of the same "Company to displace and remove, and that it shall and may be lawfull to and for "the said General or Generals of the forces by Sea and Land of or belonging to the " said Town of Madraspatnam, and the Towns, Places and Dependancies of Fort "ST. GEORGE aforesaid, and all and every such Commander and Military Officers, "that shall be so as aforesaid continued and appointed according to the Tenor of his and their Respective Commissions and Instructions to assemble, exercise "in Arms, Martial Array, and put in Warlike Posture the Inhabitants of the said "Towns and Places either by Sea or Land for their Especial Defence and Safety, "and to lead and conduct them, and to encounter, repulse, expell, and resist by "force of Arms as well by Sea as by Land, and also to kill Slay and destroy by all "fitting Ways, Enterprizes, and means whatsoever all and every such Person or "Persons as shall or may at any Time hereafter in an hostile manner attempt, or "enterprize the Destruction, Invasion, Detriment or Annoyance of any of our "Subjects within the said Towns, and Factories, and Limits, or any of their Ser-"vants or Persons dealing with them; and in time of War, or open Hostility to use and exercise Martial Discipline and the Law Martial in such Cases as Occasion "shall necessarily require, and may legally be done, and to take and surprize by all ways and means whatsoever all and every such Person or Persons, with their "Ships, Armour, Ammunition and other Goods, as shall in hostile manner invade " or attempt the defeating or destruction of the said Towns and Places, or the "Hurt of any of our Subjects, inhabiting there, or any of their Servants or Persons "employed by them, and upon just Causes to invade and destroy the Enemies of "the same.

And at the close of the Charter it has been also his Majesty's Pleasure to declare in the following Words.

"THAT these our Letters Patents or the Inrollment thereof shall be in and by all things valid and Effectual in the Law according to the true Intent, and Meaning of the same, and shall be taken, construed, and adjudged in the most favourable and beneficial Sence for the Best Advantage of the said Company."

—— MAY 1747 ——

From these Royal Grants We cannot conceive otherwise than that our Governor is fully vested with Authority and Power to put that part of the Charter relative to Law Martial in Execution, and in Confidence that He will do it, We have procured and now is before Us, an Act of Parliament passed in the 17th of his present Majesty's Reign for punishing Mutiny, Desertion &ct. with Rules and Articles for the better Government of his Majesty's Forces in GREAT BRITAIN, IRELAND and Dominions beyond Sea. Perhaps some may urge a Distinction ought to be made between his Majesty's Forces and those belonging to the Company. We confess ourselves disqualified for such a Contraversy [sic], nor have We Discernment enough to make any, since We are all subjects to the same Monarch, are permitted to hoist the British Flag, and have the Sanction of his Majesty's Charter to support Us. All the Difference We can make, which We think next to none is in our Commissions. The General and Officers immediately in his Majesty's Service have the Royal Sign Manual put to theirs; and Ours come by a Power delegated, but derived from the same fountain. If We are so happy as to be right in our Conjectures of this Matter, We then beg Leave to lay before You such Extracts from the abovementioned Articles of War, as We think necessary for the good Government and Preservation of this Garrison, And do request also, that You will cause your Secretary to let them be engrossed in a fair hand, and affixed at all Guards and Publick Places with such Extracts of his Majesty's Charter, as shall seem necessary for the Information of the People, whereby they may know it is by Virtue of Sovereign Authority You proceed. We are likewise to represent to You that We hold it necessary to have a day appointed to summon the whole Garrison both Soldiery and Artillery under Arms to hear the said Articles read, and that You would make it a standing Order to have this repeated at least Once in three Months.

In these Articles some are entire others passed over in Silence, and some abridged; but throughout the whole We have as impartially extracted such as give Relief to the injured Soldier, as those which give the Officer Authority and Dominion over him.

ARTICLE 1st.

All Officers and Soldiers (not having just Impediment) shall diligently frequent Divine Divine Service and Sermon in such Places as shall be appointed for the Regiment, Sorvice and Sermon Troop or Company, to which they belong, and such as either Wilfully or negligently to be absent themselves from Divine Service or Sermon; or else being present do behave frequented. themselves indecently or irreverently during the same; if they be Officers they shall be severely reprimanded at a Court Martial; but if private Soldiers they shall for every such first Offence forfeit Each Man Twelve Pence to be deducted out of their next Pay, and for the Second Offence, shall forfeit Twelve Pence, and be laid in Irons for twelve hours, and for every like Offence afterwards shall suffer and pay in like manner, and the money so forfeited shall be applied to the Relief of the Sick Soldiers of such Troop or Company to which the Offenders do belong.

ARTICLE 7TH.

If any Officer or Soldier shall excite cause or join in any mutiny or Sedition in The Penalty the Company, Troop, or Regiment to which He belongs, or in any other Company, of Mutiny. Troop, or Regiment in his Majesty's Service, or in any Party or Post, where the Duty is done by Detachment from several Regiments or otherwise in the Army, he shall suffer Death, or such other Punishment as a General Court Martial shall inflict.

And if any Officer, Non Commission Officer or Soldier hear any Words tending or concealing to Mutiny or Sedition, or being any way privy thereto do not immediately use his Mutiny. utmost Endeavours to suppress the Same, as also to discover it to his Superiours, if an Officer He shall be Cashiered, and if a Non Commission Officer or Soldier He shall be severely punished at the Discretion of a Court Martial.

ARTICLE STH.

Execution of his Office or refusing to obey Orders.

If any Officer or Soldier shall strike or use any Violence against his Superior of strikeing of Officer being in the Execution of his Office; or shall refuse to obey any lawfull Command of his Superior Officer; all and Every Person or Persons so offending shall Officer in the suffer Death or such other Punishment as by a Court Martial shall be inflicted.

ARTICLE 9TH.

ARTICLE 10TH.

The Penalty of Desertion.

All Officers and Soldiers who have receiv'd Pay or have been duly listed in our Service, and shall desert the Same, either in the field, upon a March, in Quarters, or in Garrison, and be convicted thereof before a General Court Martial, shall suffer Death or such other Punishment as by the said Court Martial shall be inflicted.

ARTICLE 11TH.

Officer or Soldier leaving his Troop or Company without a Discharge in Writing, to be reputed a Deserter. The Penalty of an Officer entertaining a Soldier belonging to another Regiment.

No Non Commission Officer or Soldier shall leave his Troop, or Company, and enlist himself in any other Regiment, Troop, or Company without a Discharge from the Commanding Officer of the Regiment in which He last served under pain of being reputed a Deserter, and suffering accordingly; and in Case any Officer shall knowingly receive or entertain any such Non Commission Officer and Soldier, upon Proof made thereof before a General Court Martial, He shall be Cashiered.

Nor shall any Discharge granted to any Non Commission Officer or Soldier, Discharge after He has joined the Regiment, Troop or Company, into which He is enlisted, unless signed be allowed of as sufficient, unless signed by a field Officer of the Regiment whence Such Soldier was dismissed.

ARTICLE 12TH.

The Penalty of perswad-

If any Officer or Soldier shall perswade or advise any other Officer or Soldier ing any one to desert our Service, He shall suffer such Punishment as shall be inflicted by the Sentence of a General Court Martial.

ARTICLE 13TH.

The Penalty of breaking Prison.

If any Non Commission Officer or Soldier Committed to Prison shall break thence and endeavour to escape Punishment, and leave the Service, He shall be punished as a Deserter and suffer Death or such other Punishment as shall be inflicted by a General Court Martial.

And if any Officer under Arrest shall leave his Confinement, before He is set at Liberty by the Officer, who confined him, or by a Superior Power, He shall be

ARTICLE 14TH.

Whatever Officer or Soldier shall misbehave himself before the Enemy, or run away or shamefully abandon, any Fort, Post, or Guard, which He or they shall be commanded to defend, or speak Words inducing others to do the like; or who after Victory, shall instead of pursuing the Enemy, quit his Commanding Officer, or Post, to plunder and pillage; Every Such Offender being duly convicted thereof, shall be reputed a Disobeyer of Orders, and shall suffer Death, or such other Punishment, as by a General Court Martial shall be inflicted on him.

ARTICLE 18TH.

If any Officer thinks himself wrong'd by his Colonel, or the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, and shall upon due Application to him be refused to be Officer must redressed, He is to complain to the General or Commander in Chief of our Forces, do if He in order to have Justice done him.

And if any Inferior Officer, or Soldier shall think himself wronged by his Captain, or Officer commanding the Troop or Company, He is to complain thereof to the Officer commanding the Regiment, who is hereby required to see Justice done the Complainant at a Regimental Court Martial, from which, if Either Party think himself not fully wrighted, He may appeal to a General Court Martial, where if upon a Second Hearing, the Appeal shall prove Groundless or Vexatious the Appellant shall be punished accordingly.

ARTICLE 19TH.

No Officer or Soldier shall use any reproachfull or provoking Speeches or The Penalty Gestures to another upon Pain of imprisonment, and asking Pardon of the Party of provoking offended in Presence of his Commanding Officer.

Officers be acquainted therewith: And whosoever shall refuse to obey such Officer (tho' of inferior Rank) or draw his Sword upon him, shall be punished as a General Court Martial shall appoint.

Nor shall any Officer or Soldier upbraid another for refusing a Challenge, since according to these our Orders, They do but the Duty of Soldiers, who ought to subject themselves to Discipline, and We do acquit, and Discharge, all Men, who have Quarrels offer'd them, or Challenge sent to them of all disgrace, or opinion of Disadvantage, in their Obedience hereunto, and whosoever shall upbraid them, or offend in this Case, shall be punished as a Challenger.

ARTICLE 20TH.

A General Court Martial shall not consist of less than Thirteen Commission A General Officers, and the President not to be under the Degree of a Field Officer, or the Court Martial. then Commander in Chief of our Forces in Garrison, where such Court Martial is held.

All Witnesses shall be examined upon Oath, and no Field Officer shall be tried by any under the Degree of a Captain, nor shall any Sentence of Death be given against any Offender, unless a Majority of the Officers present shall concur therein, and such Majority be nine or More; and no Proceeding or Trial shall be had upon any Offence, but between the hours of Eight in the morning, and One in the Afternoon; nor shall the Sentence of any Court Martial be put in Execution, untill Report be made of the whole Proceedings to his Majesty or the General commanding in Chief, and his directions signified thereupon.

And if the General Court Martial be held in Ireland, the Sentence of such Court shall not be put in Execution, untill Report of the whole Proceedings be made to the Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom, or other Chief, Governor or Governors there for the time being, and his or their Directions signified thereupon.

All Members of Courts Martial shall behave themselves decently, and in giving their Votes begin with the Youngest.

ARTICLE 21st.

ARTICLE 41st.

The Penalty if a Soldier sell or spoil his Arms &c[†].

or Steal his Comrade's Cloaths, Arms, &c[†]. Every Non Commission Officer or Soldier of Horse, Foot, or Dragoons, who shall at a Regimental Court Martial be found Guilty of having sold, or wilfully lost or spoiled his Horse, Arms, Cloaths or Accoutrements, or of Pilfering or Stealing his Comrade's or other's Soldiers Cloaths, Arms or Accoutrements, shall be subject to such Weekly Stoppage (not exceeding One half) out of his Pay, as the Court Martial shall judge sufficient for repairing the same, and suffer Confinement and such other Corporal Punishment, as in their judgement the Nature of his Offence may deserve.

ARTICLE 42D.

Prisoner's Names are to be returned within 24 hours. And Every such Officer to whose Charge Prisoners are committed, is hereby required within (24) twenty four hours after such Committment, or as soon as He is relieved from his Guard to give in Writing to the said Commander in Chief, the names of his Prisoners, and of the Committers, and, as far as He knows, of the Crimes alledged against them, under pain of being punished for his Disobedience at a Regimental or a General Court Martial.

ARTICLE 45TH.

These Articles to be read Once every 2 Months.

The aforegoing Rules and Articles shall be read and published at the head of every Regiment, Troop, or Company muster'd or to be muster'd in our Service once every Two Months at farthest, and are to be duly observed by all Officers and Soldiers in our service, and also by our Company's of Gunners and other Military Officers of our Trains of Artillery.

The next Representation which We shall make will be the present Condition of the Fort, in Respect to its Buildings, Barracks, Magazines, and Ramparts, and shall begin at the Place We sett out from, which was the Main Guard Gate.

It need not be told You that it is a winding Passage without the least Communication with any Room whatever, and would be crowded were Twenty Men to stand [in] it, the Barracks, which should contain the Guard being near 80 Yards distant in the North West Area of the Fort. This We reckon in the number of defects, which You shou'd be acquainted with; for it is most certain, the Gate might be seized by Surprize, and by a few People, before an alarm can be given to the Soldiery in their present Barracks. We therefore judge it highly necessary that an Arch be turned Westward and another Eastward in the Passage within the Gate, and Guard Rooms prolonged under the Curtain Each way; at the Ends thereof to have Lodgings for the Subaltern Officers, the Cases of Arms, and Prisons, the whole extent of the Curtain East and West; by this Alteration the Men will always be ready, and being more immediately under the Eye of their Officers, better Order may be preserved among them, than possibly can be, lodged as they are at present; 'Tis a work easily compleated, and without either much Labour and Expence, as very few Materials for Building will be wanted therein.

We proceeded from thence round the Curtains where We found little more needfull to be done besides the clearing the Bastions of some Shells &ct. and giving Directions to secure the small Magazines, that are to hold the Powder for present Service, so as to prevent Accidents from Carelessness &ct.

Descending from thence to the S.W. Magazine which is capable of containing 450 Barrels of Powder, We thought it deserving of our Attention, and upon Enquiry, We were told, the first Arch or Covering was 3 Bricks in thickness, then

a Space of about 3 feet filled with Earth or Sand, and over that another Arch of 3 Bricks more has been turned; so that allowing One Brick with its Mortar to be 10 Inches, Each of the Arches can be no more than $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet of Masonry, and joined with the Earth, the whole does not exceed 8 foot, which in such a Position, We do not think can be said to be Bomb Proof, nor indeed any [sic] like it, since a very common Shell would perforate the outward Casing, and that done, Another Such would endanger the whole Fort, and all that may be in it; and We are more concerned to mention this, than any thing else, since both Workmen and Materials in large Quantitys will be requisite to make it what it ought to be. It is also closely confined by other buildings, namely those called the Paymaster's Lodgings, which must be taken down to make an open space of at least 35 feet round it; for as it is ill provided with doors and Traverses, the Effects of a Bomb falling near it, closely pent up as it is, may be of as fatal Consequence, as piercing the Arch; We would have this Area well railed in, and proper Centries placed at the Entrance of it.

Going to the Back Gate, where One Man stands Centry, which is the Landing Place for all Boats, and a pretty large Concourse of People being commonly thereabouts We think it necessary in future, that it should become an Ensign's Post, and that the People should be lodged in those Godowns, which have an Entrance into them from Each Side of the Gateway: As the Gate itself is but single, and liable to be burst by a Petard, We propose to fix Orgues in the Lodgings over it to lett fall on any Emergency.

The new Caserns ranged East and West by the side of the Southern Rampart is a necessary Building and no fault can be found with it, besides its being parted from the Sorting Godown by a Passage of barely 5 feet wide, and from this Passage are all the Entrances into it, which renders it liable to the same Accidents as those We spake of at the Magazine, save this, that a Bomb bursting in this narrow Passage might destroy only a few men by driving in the Doors and Windows of the Casern: and perhaps may shake down so much of the Warehouse, as to be obliged to remove many Tonns of Rubbish to get the People out again. The same Remedy of clearing here 35 feet in front of the Casern, We hold to be equally necessary, as that before the Magazine.

We now come to another Magazine of near 400 Barrels of Powder, at the East End of the Caserns, which Mr. Baker reports to be the best, as being least damp, of this We know not what to report, since 'tis neither of Shape, Make, or built for that Purpose; therefore We are to pray of You to let it be taken immediately into Consideration, and that some Skill be forthwith employed to render it safe and secure, and that You will order the hinges of all the doors to be made with Copper, the doors themselves to be doubled, the Jambs to be strengthen'd, and that they be plated tho' it can be done with nothing better than Sheet Lead.

All along the East Curtain are arch'd Apartments, which We recommend to be turned into Barracks for the Gunroom Crew, Elaboratories and other Services for the Artillery.

In our Progress We looked into the Storeroom, where the Master of Arms keeps his Musket and Pistol Cartridges; The Captains of the Military are of Opinion the greatest Part of them are too high for the Bores of their Pieces, and too slack for Service. We have order'd a new sett of Formers to be made and deliver'd to him. You will please to order him fresh Musket Powder on his returning that with which his Catridges are now filled, and that He sett about this Work with all speed

The South Side of the Fort should in our Opinion have some pro tempore Works raised to defend it till Time can furnish Us with Materials to do it more effectually: And We deliver it to You also as our Opinion in order to render a Bombardment less mischievous, that all Combustible Matters, more especially the Callicoe Cloths, should be sent out of the Fort, not only on Account of the danger of its

taking Fire, which is One Material Reason, but least We should be streightened in Case of a Siege for Room to lodge Grain and Provision which will be the Case if the Cloth remains in it.

As it is impossible for Us to foresee what may befall Us, in our Opinion the worst that can happen ought to be guarded against, which leads Us to inform You of the necessity there is of laying in a Sufficient Stock of Provisions, which We reckon should not be less than 100 Days for 800 Men, and upon Computation 450 head of Cattle with about 350 Hoggs salted up with Grain and Salt fish will do, And We hope You will give Orders accordingly.

The Outworks raised heretofore on the North side of Tevenapatam, if We are so fortunate to receive Succours from Bombay, deserve your Consideration, and We think so far from abandoning them, that for a small Expence they may be so far serviceable as to dispute the Enemy's Approach on that side inch by Inch. We fancy digging, and Pallasading a good wide Ditch will greatly contribute to the maintaining those Posts; This with contriving some Shelter for the People will be the whole Charge You need be at for the present. If You differ from Us in Opinion, all We shall say then is, 'tis requisite they should be totally destroyed.

The new Counterscarp, Horn Work and Lunetts, that are now in hand, We earnestly press may be pursued with the utmost vigour, as it is of the greatest Importance to have them so far compleated as to mount Cannon on them before the Squadron is to leave the Coast, and nothing will conduce thereto so much as giving good Encouragement to all kind of Labourers, and Artificers to come in; the Common hire together with some small Bounty in Grain will We believe be of good Effect, provided Care is taken to see them duly and regularly paid.

On the other hand to prevent frauds and Abuses in Conicoplys and others, who may have any share in the Payment of them, We think some Expedient ought to be found, and We cannot propose a better than the following One, which We will submitt wholly to your Judgement, and shall be very glad to have any other prescribed that will more effectually answer that Purpose.

We think that were You to order the Assay Master to stamp about 6000 Pieces of Metal (suppose a Mixture of Tin and Lead) with any One of his Dies, and these to be distributed to the Workmen at 7 in the morning, before they begin, and when the Time of Payment comes at night, to pay none, but those, who deliver in their Chops; and forasmuch as many People do not come so early, and as a great part of those, who do come are Women and Children, we would have 1500 Chops, marked on the Reverse 1, 1500 marked \frac{3}{4}, 1500 marked \frac{1}{2}, and the remaining 1500 marked \frac{1}{4}; by this let a Cooley come at what Season of the day He pleases, or be they Women or Children, the Fate on the Chop will regulate their Pay proportionate to their Labour; to see this done it would be proper that the Paymaster should have at least two Gentlemen that are Covenanted Servants to inspect it, and see it be duly performed, and tho' some may think it beneath them to count Cooleys, We must say, that it is an Office at this time of such Importance to the Welfare of the East India Company; that they cannot shew their Duty better than by doing it with Cheerfulness.

Before We leave this Article relating to Workmen, We must repeat it again that all due Encouragement ought to be given not only to them that are here now, but to bring in as many more as can be got, as the Work in hand is sufficient to employ Multitudes: for this End We think furnishing them with Rice and Paddy at the Market Price with One Hollock bounty to every able bodied Man would be One good Step; for 'tis natural to suppose Labourers will go to that place, where they can be best fed and paid; and if we can once be so happy as to remove all cause for murmurs amongst them, We make no Question, but We may bring in numbers of hands from all parts of the Country; and as there are none of these kind of People, but are in Subjection to some Poligar or other, 'tis our Opinion a few Yards of Aurora, and other trifling Presents rightly placed, will not only keep them in good Humour, but engage them to send You what Men they can.

Should the Number of Labourers encrease (as We hope they speedily will) of Course the Consumption of Materials for Building will do the Same, and this is a main Point to be consider'd; Brickmakers and Limeburners must be procured at all Events, or all that which is begun will be to no manner of Purpose, and it had been better no Beginning had been made. Therefore We both humbly and heartily request that neither Cost nor Pains may be spared to gather together as many as can be had, since the Topes and Walks of Trees in and about the Bounds will furnish them with firewood to to [sic] burn, and Clay for Bricks is almost every where; Shells for Lime are neither so near nor so plentifull, as the other, therefore it will be proper to hire as many of the Grain Vessels, as are needful to fetch them from all Places, where they can be purchased or procured.

The last thing We have to offer is the Regulation of the Gun Room, and the Appointment of Officers for the Train of Artillery, and may be said to be of as much Importance as any other thing We have hitherto mention'd.

It is proper this Corps should consist of at least 120 Effective Men, and as no Duty should be without Relief, 'tis necessary also that there should not be less than 8 Officers with Ensigns Commissions, and double the number of Subalterns, or Non Commissioned Officers under the Train; by this means proper Order and Regularity (so long wanting) will be introduced among them. Mr. Jones proposes the following Persons as qualified to carry Commissions. Messrs. Edward Burman, William Petch, Michael Collings, and Henry Collings, as they have all been Commanders of Shipping, and have approved themselves at Madrass, Men of both Skill and Courage, of these four the three last mentioned are now Prisoners of War, and We desire You would recommend them to the Notice of Commodore Griffin to be exchanged whenever an Opportunity shall present itself. When this is done four more will still be wanting, and with whom to fill up that number We as yet cannot tell, but hope when any Persons of Capacity willing to enter may come to your Knowledge, that You will give them due Encouragement so to do.

Mr. Jones promises that whatever Officers will engage themselves to serve for a Term not less than three Years shall have free Access to the Elaboratory for Fireworks, and shall be instructed by him in so much of that Art, as He himself is master of.

We have held You a tedious time in these our Reports, but We hope You will not think it misemployed to read so true a state of this Garrison; and as We have now done it to the best of our Judgements, We have the Satisfaction to Ourselves of having done our duty to the Company, You their Constituents, and our own Consciences, and shall therefore beg leave to subscribe with great Respect,

General etter from Maddapollam.

General Letter No. 35 from Mr. Samuel Banks at Maddapollam, inclosing Duplicate of his former dated 6th of April, and accompanying his Accounts for the Months of January, February, and March.

Genl. Letter to Bengall.

General Letter to the President and Council of Bengall as Enter'd No. 27, is now read adviseing that We had drawn on them for the Sum of Twelve thousand Two hundred and Six Arcott Rupees, and four Anna's (12206. 4.) in favour of the Owners of Ship Prince of Orange, being the Amount of that Ship's Cargo of Rice, agreeable to the Terms of their Honour &ct. Contract.

Arrack petitions the Board.

Cootah Arrack Farmer presents a Petition to the Board, as Enter'd hereafter, setting forth that Several Persons are Guilty of retailing Arrack, and Toddy contrary to the Terms of his Cowle, which tending greatly to his Prejudice, He humbly requests that a Stop may be put to the Same, It is therefore Order'd that the Secretary do affix Copies of his Cowle at the Fort and Cuddalore, that all Persons may be acquainted with the Terms of it, and if any One should hereafter be found trespassing therein, It hereby is agreed that such Person or Persons so offending, be fined as the Board shall think proper.

Mr. Chas. Nicholls order'd from Porto Novo to Negapatam.

It being thought necessary to have some One in the Company's Service to reside at Negapatam, to the End that We may receive Early Advices of any Ships that may arrive on the Coast as likewise to forward our Orders to the Europe Commanders; It is therefore ORDER'D that Mr. Charles Nicholls now resideing at Porto Novo for the same Account do remove thither, and that the Governour do write a Private Letter to the Governor of Negapatam to request his Countenance for the Same.

House Furniture bought.

There being great Want of House Furniture for the Accomodateing the Commodore, and the Gentlemen of his Majesty's Squadron, Agreed to purchase what remains at the Garden house belonging to Mr. Hinde, and that a List of them be deliver'd the Steward.

Twenty bought.

Some Good Horses offering for Sale, and it being thought they will be horses order'd to be exceeding usefull in Case of another Attack from the Enemy; ORDER'D that Twenty be purchased on the Company's Account.

Copy of a Bond attested.

Mr. Moses Berend Heyman requesting the Board to attest a Copy of a Bond on the Honble. Company for Ten thousand (10000) Pagodas, The same is accordingly complied with.

Investment taken into Consideration.

The Time of the last Years Investment expiring in January last, and the Place being at this time free from any Disturbances of the Enemy, by the Presence of his Majesty's Squadron; The Board now have it in Consideration, whether it be suitable to the present Circumstances of the Garrison to engage in a new One; in which No other Objection ariseing, but the Apprehension of not having a Sufficiency of Money to purchase that Business, and to defray the Expences of the Garrison, which must now be expected to be very considerable, and of very material Consequence; Reference is therefore had to the Ballance of the Honble. Company's Cash, and the Quantity of Treasure unsold, both of which being to a large Amount, the Board in General are of Opinion, as a farther Supply may be daily expected from Europe, that a small Part may be spared, without rendering the Garrison under any Inconveniency.

The Merchants are therefore now called in, and discoursed with on the Subject The Merchants of an Investment in which many Arguments being used to demonstrate to them the discoursed present cheapness of Cotton, and the little Demand of Callicoes in the Country, thereon. the French continuing entirely quiet, and no ways capable of interfering therein, They are at length satisfied with the Reason of these Circumstances, and as such come to an Agreement to lower the Prices, One Pagoda and a half the Corge cheaper than the preceding Year, but beg leave to inform the Board, that if any larger Abatement should be made, the cloth cannot be so good and substantial as it is at present, which might possibly occasion large Quantities to be turn'd out in sorting, so much that it might take a long time to dispose of, especially at the present Season, whereby they the Merchants might be render'd incapable of paying in their Ballances, which they humbly offer to our Consideration, but the Board being of Opinion that the Circumstances of the present time will very well admitt them to come to more reasonable terms, They were given to understand the Same, and desired to withdraw, and consider of it.

In the mean time the Governor informing the Board, that other Merchants Other have offer'd to provide half a Pagoda the Corge cheaper than Andiapa, Agreed offer to that they be called in, and Recourse had to them, hoping by that means the Others provide will be induced to a more Speedy and favourable Resolution; They are therefore than admitted, and desired to give Us the Rates, they can provide for, which being Andiapa. nothing cheaper than what the Governor advised of, It is supposed their Offers are only designed in Prejudice to the Old Merchants, who having greatly recommended themselves in their Performances the two past Years, and being far better acquainted with the Business, It is thought to be greatly for our Honble. Master's Interest to continue it to them, as well for the Advantage that may arise from their Experience, as likewise in Consideration of their past Merits.

Accordingly they are again called in, and desired to give their final Answer, at what Rates they can engage for, when being acquainted with the offers that were made by other Merchants, and much Pains being taken to lower their Demands, They at length deliver in a List of the Prices as follows.

The humble Petition of COOTAH Arrack Farmer

SHEWETH

THAT your Petitioner has held the Arrack Farm of the Honble. Company for five Years on Terms that none of the Europeans belonging to the Military should sell any Drams of Batavia or Columbo Arrack within the Company's Bounds, without your Petitioner's Permission, and those Persons that shall be found Guilty of any Such Crime, to be fined as your Worship &ct. shall think proper, and the Toddy fellows to sell their Toddy at the Gardens where they draw it; but now they act contrary to your Petitioner's Cowle; for they bring and sell their Toddy in the Town, and the Europeans, that came from Madrass have bought several Leagers. of Batavia and Columbo Arrack from the Dutch Chief, and sell it to every Body in the Place at 6 fans. a Bottle, and some keep Punch Houses at the Colloway, Tevenapatam, and Cuddalore; formerly Michael Donovan Serjeant bought Batavia Arrack of your Petitioner for some time, but now He buys it of Mr. Smith and sellsit to the Sick People in the Hospital, and to every Body in the Place: the Store-keeper likewise sells Arrack to several People: Your Petitioner lately complained to his Worship that Ensign Franken sold Arrack to the People and his Worship check'd him for it, but He sells Arrack again to the People, formerly when there was any Arrack come for the Gentrys or Black Merchants, the Arrack Farmer used to go and seal the Leaguers with his own Seal to prevent them from selling it to any other Person except the Company, Gentrys or the Arrack Farmer; Now there are some Leagers of Batavia Arrack come for the Dutch Chief, and black Merchants. Your Petitioner sealed the Leagers that came for the Merchants but as the Dutch Chief has transgressed the Orders given in your Petitioner's Cowle, and has made a Practice of selling Arrack to the Europeans belonging to the Military, which is a great Detriment to your Petitioner, and to prevent him from selling any more Arrack to them, your Petitioner begs that your Worship &ct. will be pleased to order your Petitioner to seal the Arrack that is come for him; there are several

that sell Arrack underhand to the People, which will take up some time to discover: Your Petitioner bought Five thousand Pagodas of Arrack, in hopes He could dispose of it to the Military, and Ship Gentlemen; but now as there are several Punch Houses in the Place, and most Part of the Europeans, which came from Madrass, sell Arrack to the Military, and Black Inhabitants, Your Petitioner cannot dispose of his Arrack, therefore your Petitioner humbly begs, that your Worship &ct. will be pleased to put a Stop That the Europeans and Toddy fellows may not sell Arrack and Toddy in the Place; if your Worship &ct. pleases your Petitioner will keep a Punch House, and let the Europeans come, and buy it of him, or else hope your Worship &ct. will take the Arrack which your Petitioner has in his hands which will bind your Petitioner Over to pray &ct.

Herewith You will receive Six Letters of the same Tenour and Date, directed to the Commanding Officer on board any English Company's Ship, that may call at Negapatam. We have Reason to think our Ships bound to the Coast this Season (Some of which are expected daily) will call at Negapatam for Advices; You are therefore to keep a good Look out, and as soon as they arrive, You are to send as many Letters on board as there are Ships: One to Each Ship, but before You send them, You must be certain they are English: A Note from You at first will do, to desire to know what Ships, and where bound to, if One of the Company's to come to an Anchor immediately. The Captains have Orders from Us in the Enclosed to send on shore at Negapatam Two thirds of their Treasure out of each Ship, which is to be done with all Expedition after their Arrival, which you are to receive, and to desire Mr. Mersen's Protection for it; Adviseing Us of it, and to keep it till You receive Orders from Us about it. After the Delivery of the Silver, if You hear of no French Ships upon the Coast, which You will hear from Us, You are immediately to order the Ship or Ships to this Port, but in Case there be any French Ships upon the Coast, then the whole of the Treasure is to be landed with the Company's Packetts and Private Letters, as also the Valuables on board them, if You can get Liberty from the Governor for it, and the Ship or Ships to remain at an Anchor there till further Orders from Us.

You are to keep this a Secret, and to acquaint no One with our Orders to You, and We are certain the Cautiousness of the Dutch will not permit Us to act publickly in this Affair, but as Governor Mersen must be acquainted with it, We think it convenient that Mr. Floyer write him about it to desire his Assistance in this Affair of so much Consequence to the Company.

Upon the Arrival of any of our Ships or upon any other Advices of Consequence, We think it best that You send them by a Cattamaran, as being the quickest and safest Conveyance. Take particular Care that the Captains do not loiter away their time in selling their private Adventures. If they dispute your Authority, You may show them our Instructions to You, which are to stand Good, till alter'd by Us.

I take the Liberty to acquaint Your Worship &ct. that in this Place, It has all along been our Custom to measure of [sic] all Grain imported for the Company's Use, till this Season, that We have been obliged to receive it in by Weight, for as Mr. Hinde wrote to Bengall last Year adviseing the great Scarcity of Grain here, the Governor and Council there contracted for the Company with the Owners of three Ships Cargo, (Namely) The Jenny, Fort St. George, and the Prince of Orange, that they should deliver their Rice here by weight, allowing in their Contract 2 Buzar Maunds Per Bag, and 56 Bags Per Garse, but when they deliver'd it Us, they allowed Us but 160 lb. Per Bag, whereas Our Madrass Conicoplys and Others inform Us it is usual to allow 10 Per Cent upon a Maund, which makes it 165 lb. Per Bag, which makes a wide difference and considerable Loss in a large Quantity, but We have further experienced that Even had We that Allowance yet the Company must sustain a great Loss by this contracted Method of weighing: for some days ago We weighed off a Garse of Rice, in the Presence of Mr. Cope and some others, when allowing 165 b. Per Bag it then turned out 58 Bags, by this You may plainly apprehend in such large Quantities, when We come to deliver it out by Measure what great Sufferers our Honble. Masters must be, and as I am Warehouskeeper, I think it my Duty to advise You of it, at the same time to prevent any Blame, that may in future be cast on me, and as I design to have the said Rice carefully measured off in order to represent to your Worship &ct. the particular Loss arising thereon; I request some Gentleman or European may be appointed to be present, that the Grain Conicoplys may not play any Fraud, as hitherto they have not been capable to do, never having the Keys in their Custody, but when they deliver out Grain. Honble Sir & Sirs

According to the Commands I received when call'd before you Yesterday, I shall now give my Reasons for going to Bencoolen in my outward bound Passage & for returning there again from FORT St. DAVID which I hope will prove sufficient for my Justification to you & to my Honble Masters at home.

When got into the Latitude of 1. 26 So. having beat ten Days & gain'd very little against strong No.W.erly Winds & having sixty Men at that time infected with the Scurvy & incapable of Duty on the 17th. September I called a Consultation of my Officers who unanimously AGREED that it was for the Interest of the Honble Company & my Owners to make the best of our Way to Bencoolen, which We accordingly did & arrived there the 28th. but before that time had twenty Men more down with the Scurvy, Which I think Justifies the Necessity of this first Step. I herewith deliver you Copy of that Consultation.

I left Bencoolen the 31st. October having stayed but just time enough to recover my Men & by Contrary Winds was obliged to stand over to the Coromandel Coast, where I fell in with Pulacat the 2d. December in the Evening, when thinking I had drift enough to Madrass I lay too but in the Morning found the Current had set me to the So. ward of Cobelon I then stood off and on for eight & forty Hours against Strong No.erly Winds, but finding I rather lost than gain'd & my Main mast heing sprung & unable to bear any Sail on it, I thought proper to go to Fort St. DAVID to repair it & arrived there the 5th.

Immediately came off the follows. Letter from Mr. Hinde.

Sir

FORT ST. DAVID 5TH. DEC. 1746.

"It is with great Pleasure I observe an [English] Ship in the Offing, The Surf "runs so high I fear the M[assa]las cannot get to You & as You lay so much to "Windward [the] Cattemaran will be some time in doing it I imagine [that] "to be the Britannia if so please to fire three Guns & hoist a Pendant at the Main "Top mast Head & come nearer in [...] considerably [...] safe here Thank God " & [...] Danger."

"I [am in] great [haste]."

[Your m]ost Humble [Servant] JOHN HIN DE .

Which I answered by acquainting Him who I was & when [ce I] came about two Hours after I receiv'd a second Letter from [Mr.] Hinde as follows.

"SIR

"I did not mention in my last [Letter by] the Cattemaran that Madrass is taken & now [in possessi] on of the French as I thought you must know [I shall] beg of you for God's Sake, You will immediately co[me] in & send all your Packets ashore by the first [boat &] your Money as fast as ever Boats come on board [for "there] are three Ships lying in Pondicherry Road, If You'll [come] where our Boats can Reach You, I'll send you to morrow Morning off 40 or 50 Men as you "shall want them. Please to Anchor the Flag Staff bearing W^t. by South, We will keep lights at the Flag Staff all Night, & desire You will do the same at your Main." Topmast Head. I am ".

Hearing Madrass was lost & the above Letters being Signed only by Mr. Hinde it occurred to me that it was not impossible but the Place might be in the Hands of the french And (as I knew not Mr. Hindes Hand) This right probably be a Finesse to take my Ship & having observ'd that one of the ships in Pondicherry Road was so far rigged as to be able to be down on me the next Day, I called a Consultation of my Officers when We Agreed it was very unsafe to stay there & determined to stand to Sea & bear away to Batavia, Therewith deliver you Copy of a Paper dated the 5th. December signed by myself & Officers which includes that Consultation.

I must beg leave to observe to your Honour &ca. that the Manner in which the Princess Amelia has been taken by the French at Madrass shows that my Precaution was not groundless.

As my Intention to go to Batavia was from no Private views but for the Security of the Ship alone, I thought [Proper] to call at Moco Moco on the Coast of Sumatra for intelligence determining to go no farther if all was safe there & accordingly arrived there the 3^d. January where I acquainted the Chief of all that had happened. On the 14th. I received a Letter from the Governour & Council of Fort Marlborough desiring I would bring my Ship up there, as it would be of great service to the Honble Company, since the News of Madrass. This I complied with & arriv'd there ye. 16.

After having supplied that Settlement with what Warlike Stores &c^a. belonging to the Company they had occasion for I left it the 6th. Febr^y. & made the Best of my Way hither.

I now hope I have clear'd myself from all Blame in these Proceedings as I can assure your Honour &ca. I have had nothing in View but the Interest of those I am concern'd for as well the Honble Company as my Owners. I am with Respect

Came to an anchor in Fort St. David Road about two o'Clock in the Afternoon & about 4 Do. a Cattemaran came on board with a Letter from Governour Hinde directed to the Com[mander] of the English ship in the Offing the Contents of the Letter was that He imagined me to be the Britannia & if so to fire three Guns & hoist a Pendant at the Fore Topmast Head & to come nearer [...] for they were all safe & thought in [no] Danger, On the Receipt [of] this I wrote him where I came from & what [times] left England [...] not suspecting in the least of Madrass being in Possession of [the] French at 8 at Night I received another Letter from Deputy [Go] vernour Hinde informing me Madrass was taken & in Poss[ession] of the French & desired me for God's sake to come immediately in & send my Packet ashore by the first Boat & Money as fast [as] the Boats came on board for

there was [sic] three large Ships lying [at] Pondicherry Road which I was very sensible of having Pass'd [by] at Noon they seemed to be 50 or 60 Gun Ships, One of them ha[d the Top] Mast up which looked as if she was Preparing to sail, & [...] shore upon this I called my Officers & informed them of M[adrass having been] taken, On which We Agreed unanimously to weigh & stand [out to sea] directly not thinking it Safe to continue there all Night [...] for certain would have been there next Day and as to Depu[ty] Governour Hinde's private Letter to send Packets, Money &c. ashore co[uld pay] no regard to it having no Consignments for the Place, about 11 o[clock] at Night the 5th. Instant the Ship being under Way & standing to sea called a Consultation of Officers to agree where We should proceed for the Good & Safety of the Company & Owners upon which We agreed unanimously to go to Batavia Judging that to be the safest Place by Reason of a Sloop which called at Bencoolen & inform'd there was no french ships at Batavia Nor in the Streights of Sunda, neither had they heard of any in those Seas, therefore We judge it safest for the good of the Honble United East India Company's Effects to proceed to Batavia & lye there till the Monsoon Shifts and then proceed to Bengall to which We hereunto set our Hands.

The Occasion of this Address [is to com]plain of the ill usage I have receiv'd from Mr. Edward Hardwick [on Sun] day the 7th. Instant.

The Occasion of the Complaint I [would] relate with as much truth as I think the Mind of Man is capa[ble] of.

On Sunday the 7th. Instant I had occasion to come from Cuddalore hither, the Heat of the Weather made [me] take the opportunity of coming early in the Morning on Horse back I breakfasted with the Governour, did my Business & was going [home] again, The Ferry Boat over the first River was so extreamly

crouded [sic] with Passengers, black People, that the Boat was ready to sink, happening to have no Servant with me that could speak English, I cryed out to them to clear the Boat, there being a great Clamour & Noise among them Disputing who should get out first, & as the Boat I really thought must either be staved, or would sink before it could get over the River I whipt out of my Palanqueen & with a Horse Whip I had in my Hand struck those that were nearest me, Several of them got out, In the meanwhile the Boat Fellow puts off, just as I was striking a young Lad whom I did not Particularly know or distinguish by any means whatever from any other Person in the Boat 'till He cryed out He was a Gentleman's Servant, but did not mention whose & made signs by which I understood the Boat was out of his Depth in Water, & that He could not get ashore without Danger of drowning, However I gave him another Stroke such an one as could not hurt him & bid him come in but at the same time chiding him for coming in when He sa[w the] Boat was so full, By this Action I no more suspected have [. . .] affronted or done injustice to any Man breathing, that I spent the rest of the Day doing my Duty in my Station at Cuddalore till about 7 in the Evening when sitting at the Choultry in Cudpany [sic] with Mess¹⁸. Smith, Irwin & Rosewell with M¹⁸. Golightly, M¹. Hardwick coming in was offered a Chair, He set down for a little while then taking me on one Side desired to speak with Me, The Subject of the Conference was as follows, He told me I had us'd him very ill & had taken great Liberties with him, I ask'd him in what, in striking my Servant (replies He) when says I. In the Boat this Morning I denied I had so done, not knowing that I had struck his or any Man's servant, He persisting that I did, & that I had struck him after He had told me He was Mr. Hardwick's I persisted upon my Word & Honour that I did not. Which was really & sincerely the Case, for had I known it had been Mr. Hardwicks Servant, I believe It would have been the very last I should have lain hands on; He told me I certainly knew whose Servant He was & threatened to cane me. As I that [sic] I told him He might do as He thought Proper, but it was the Liberty I or any of the Company's Servants would take in the Company's Boat's to strike any Passenger in such Circumstances when the Boat was sinking, Will You, says He, then (calling me abusive Names) take that for your Pains, striking me violently with a Cane, I return'd the Blows with a Stick I had in my Hand, This cane being thicker, & ferril'd, By repeated Blows He knock'd me down, but recovering soon & Blood gushing very smartly from the Wounds He gave me I had no more to do than to get them dress'd as well as I could I called to my Servant that was by to send for a Guard which He accordingly did & got him secured, My Head being bound & the Blood stopt I came to the Fort desiring Mr. Floyer to have him secured, till I could make Complaint against Him in Consultation, The first Consultation since being on Fryday last, The Note comeing to me too late & business of Consequence to the Company falling out, I could not attend, since which this Day being appointed by Mr. Floyer for a Hearing between us in Consultation [he] has this Morning made his Escape from the Fort, & is the [occa]sion of this Address that you may take into Considerati[on] [and] give me such Satisfaction as you may think proper for so [great] an Insult.

I will add no more than that if such [vio]lences are suffered to be co[ntinued] upon us with Im[punity, the] Administration of our Offices [. . .] Government mus[t] [fall] into the utmost Confusion For [. . .] I had resolute [...] as my Letter to Mr. Floyer can Prove no[...] in [. . .] without some redress for the Injury, If no redress [. . .] am determin'd for England, where the Laws are oper[...] Man & Redress for Injuries may be had from the hi[ghest to the] lowest. I am with much Deference & Respect,

Our Honble Master's Snow Swift arriveing in this Road on the 18th Instant The Honble. from Europe, The Council was summon'd that morning in Expectation of receiving Company's Snow Swift a Packet by her, but finding that She brought nothing but a Couple of private Letters arrives. from the Secret Committee, (one of which to the Governor, the Other to the Commodore) there was no Sitting that day, as there was nothing for notice but the Accounts We had from the Captain, the most remarkable whereof, being, that the Porto Bello Sloop dispatch'd hence for Europe sailed from St. Helena on the 10th February: That the Somerset and Pelham left the Cape homeward Bound on the 4th April, that the London and Augusta were to leave it on the 13th and that the Walpole had either passed that Place, or was taken by the Appollo and Anglesea Privateers then cruizing thereabouts.

General Letters to Bombay and Tellicherry are now read, containing our Ack-Gon. Letters nowledgements for the Assistance We had received from them, and adviseing of to Bombay the Arrival of the Swift Snow, and of the foregoing News received by her, as Per Tellicherry. the Copies thereof as enter'd Nos. 40 and 41.

Ensign William de Morgan arriving here a few days past, and making Applica-Ensign tion to be continued in that Commission: Examination is thereupon had into the William de manner of his Escape from Madrass, In Vindication whereof He humbly refers the desires to be Board to a Letter He wrote Mr. Hinde when at Vizagapatam, under Date the 8th continued in that April, wherein He had given a perfect Relation of that Proceeding; The said Letter Commission being produced by the Governor, is deliver'd the Secretary, and read, as Enter'd Examination is had into hereafter, and as it appears from the several Articles of the said Letter, as well as the manner from other Accounts, that He did not desert his Post, till the Surrendry of the Town of his Essen was actually agreed on, which putting it out of his Power to be of any further Madras. The late Drought having occasion'd a vast Scarcity of grain in the Country, and there being no more in Store, than what has been lately imported from Bengall, which as We find is not sufficient to last the Garrison above four months at farthest; In these Circumstances It is judged highly requisite to give all necessary Encouragement for a farther Importation of that Article, in the Months of August, and September, and therefore AGREED to write to Bengall, and the Northern Factories to send Us such Supplies as may be in their Power, and that whatever Quantity may be imported during those Months, shall be imported Custom free.

Contract made for Redwood.

The President and Council of Bengall having indented for a Quantity of Redwood in their Letter of the 16th March for the Kentlidge of our Honble. Masters homeward bound Shipping: A Contract is now made with Packala Rownapa for the Quantity of Five hundred (500) Tonns to be provided by him at the Rate of Pags. 2½ Per Candy, and to be delivered at Dongarazpatam (alias Armegon) at or before the 15th Day of September next ensuing and on failure or Non Performance thereof, He the said Packala Rownapa to forfeit the Sum of Two hundred (200) Pagodas, as by the Copy of his Contract Enter'd hereafter.

Ship Princess Augusta deliver'd

Our Honble. Master's Ship Princess Augusta being unloaded and having no immediate Employ for her, Agreed that She be for the present made Over to the Directions of Commodore Griffin: An Order is therefore drawn out to the Com-Commodore. mander for that Purpose as Enter'd hereafter.

Paymaster advanced.

The Paymaster requesting to be advanc'd Three thousand (3000) Pagodas for Disbursements, AGREED that the Same be paid him.

Pagodas order'd purchased

There being a Scarcity of Pagodas in the cash Chest; ORDER'D that the Warehousekeeper do purchase Ten thousand (10000) on the Best Terms.

Worshipful Sir

With Submission I beg leave in these few Lines to beg your Worship's Pardon for my Negligence in not writing to You before: not doubting but You are mercifull enough to forgive.

I must make bold herein to give your Worship a full Account of my Proceeding from the time of my leaving Madrass, and in what manner, to the day of my Arrival at this Place, of which I will leave You to judge whether I was Right or Wrong, for I do assure your Worship very sincerely, that what I did, was entirely with a View to serve the Company by saving them so many Men, whereas if I had staid, those poor Wretches would perhaps have been drowned among the Rest, and I should have been bound upon Parole of Honour, so that I could have been of no further Service to the Company, whereas now I can lawfully fight for them, and will do it as long as I have Life in Me.

____ JUNE 1747 ____

Now Your Worship will please to observe that on the Tenth day of September at Seven o'Clock in the morning, as I was walking about upon my Post (which was, Vernon's Battery in the Black Town) all on a Sudden I see a great Confusion among the Peons, calling out to one Another, that the Place was surrender'd, and in about Two minutes Time the Black Town was clear'd of all the Peons; After they had all got out, They went towards the Sea Gate at the white Town, where they met with the Head Poligar: and the Governour's Dubash: As they were returning back to my Battery to go away, I made my men stand to their Arms, and threatned the Peons, if they offer'd to advance, that I would fire upon them; upon which they stood and the head Polygar with the Governor's Dubash came up to Me, Sobbing, and crying, Saying the Place was deliver'd to the French, and that the Governor had order'd him with all his Peons to make their Escape, where they thought proper, upon which I let them go; and I stood there for a good while, till I was tired, then I set myself down on One of the Pyalls, till at last I see some Europeans from the white Town come running towards Me, upon which I immediately looked up at the Sun, afterwards at my Shadow, and judged it then to be about 9 o'Clock; presently after I see some more Europeans and Topasses come running out of the Sea Gate of the white Town; then I began to think it full Time for Me to make my Escape; Upon which, I said to my Men (as I was determined not to surrender Myself Prisoner) My Lads (says I) have You a Mind to be Prisoners? They answered, No, then say'd I, My Lads stand by Me, and follow, so We lipped over the Walls with Arms, and Ammunition, and march'd away to Pullicat with a Resolution not to surrender Ourselves to any French Parties, that might be sent after Us. I march'd till about five in the Evening, Expecting every minute a Body of Horse or Foot after Me; at that time I set myself down in a Choultry, being very much tired and fatigued with marching. About an hour after I saw a Body of Armed Men marching up towards Me: I immediately put my Men under Arms, which was forty Six including Black, and White, and waited for the Event, but they proved to be our Men, that had made their Escape, and were coming to join Me, when my Number was increased to a hundred Mon including Europeans and Topagges. increased to a hundred Men including Europeans and Topasses. After their joining Me I waited half an hour longer, and set out from that Choultry, and marched all that night till about One in the Morning (which was the Eleventh day of September) when I made my second Stage, laid Myself down, and rested till about three the same Morning and about Ten I gott into Pullicat, where I was all that day laid up, by Reason my Leg was so swell'd I could not set it on the Ground: The Men were obliged to sell their Arms and Ammunition for their Maintenance, or else they must have starved, for the Dutch would assist Us with nothing, and if it was not for a friend I got acquainted with, when I was at Fort St. David, I must have starved, for I had not a cash in the World: I laid in that manner quite helpless, Expecting every minute to be sent back to Madrass: And did intend, as soon as my Legs were well to have sett out with all my men for Fort St. David; but as it happen'd The Vernon (Mr. Morse's Ship) came in the next day, which was the Twelfth of September, She being quite destitute of hands, having on board only Three Lascars, and those would not go any further in her, I put myself and as many men as I could get to go along with Me on board purely to assist Mr. Archer in saving that Ship, and We had nothing to depend on for Provisions, but Paddy and Water, and that I got with much Difficulty: We trusted to Providence, and weighed Anchor at 12 o'Clock that night, and were making the best of our way for this Place, when about Ten the next morning We made a Sail ahead of Us, which proved to be the Wake, Captain Norton, from Bengall bound to Madrass laden with Rice, who assisted Us with Five Baggs of Rice, a Jarr of Ghee, some fowls, and Four Sheep; Afterwards Captain Norton tacked and went away to Maslipatam, and on the 20th We met him again, and kept company till We arrived here, which was that same day in the Evening, the same Evening We landed, and Every Man was enter'd in the same Station they were in at Madrass, but they encroaching so much upon Mr. Prince's Civilities and Good nature, that He could not bear with them; and was obliged to send them away to Bengall: I don't doubt but your Worship is sufficiently informed of their Behaviour to Me.

If this can be called a Crime or an Act of Cowardice, Your Worship is best judge. Here I will wait your Mercy and disposall, begging the favour to be honoured with one Line from your Worship, to know whether I am to stay here or come up; had I my choice I chuse [sic] the Latter, that I may have an Opportunity of retrieving my lost Character. I can say no more but trust to your Worship's mercifull Goodness in forgiving all Offences that may or have been committed in this piece of a Letter (which I am almost afraid of, tho' not sensible of any) therefore beg leave to conclude.

The above is what I had just finish'd at Vizagapatam when Mr. Prince sent me an order to get ready to go to Fort St. David P Ship Success which made me defer sending the Letter as I was coming myself. On the 13th. Ultimo in the Night I went aboard & the 14th. in the morning We weigh'd & stood off S.S.E. The Wind at S.W. We could but just see the Dolphin's Nose when the Ship prov'd so leaky We was obliged to put back again & went away to Callingapatam where We sent Letters ashore to be forwarded to Vizagapatam, in answer to which We had orders to make the best of our Way to Ganjam where I am now waiting with [Impat]ience till I can meet with such another opportunity which [I] am afraid won't be till August.

The 3^d. Instant I had the agreable News of the arrival of our Squadron from Bengall which occasion'd the flight of the cursed Enemy we have to deal with, & don't [doubt] to hear by the next Packet of your Worship's being in possess[ion] of Pondicherry & Madrass.

I was in great Hopes of being there at the taking of it but as there is no possibility of expecting such Honours, I beg leave with submission to conclude

The humble Petition of WILLIAM DE MORGAN.

SHEWETH-

WHEREAS your Petitioner having by Mr. Prince's Orders on the 13th March embarked himself on board the Success John Herriot Master, bound for this Place, but (after putting out to Sea) was obliged to put back again, Occasioned by a Leak She sprung, that She was not able to proceed on her voyage; We were oblig'd to put in at Ganjam, where your Petitioner remain'd for a Month, and seeing no Likelyhood of getting a Passage by Sea, till August, He determined at last to sett out overland, being willing to be here as soon as He could, has Occasion'd him an Extraordinary Charge to the Amount of Rups. 295, which He has been obliged

to borrow: Therefore your Petitioner humbly begs, your Worship &ct. Council will take it into Consideration, as also that his Pay be allowed him for the Months of March, April and May; and,

YOUR PETITIONER as in Duty bound shall ever PRAY &ct.

Worsh^L. Sir & Sirs

As We cannot expect [that our Squa]dron can remain upon this Coast much longer, It is [Time to make] some proper Regulations in order to enable us to ma[ke a vigorous] Defence if our Enemies should make any attempt [on this place, as] very likely they will after the Squadron has left [Us: therefore I] think it my duty to represent the absolute necessity there is to form a Camp of our best Troops to oppose the Enemy in Case they should come in to the Honourable Company's Bounds with an intent to fix their head Quarters at the Company's Garden to secure their ammunition & Provisions requir'd to carry on the Siege of this place as laying very convenient for them for that Service.

For which Reason I propose that a Detachment of sixty five of the best men out of each Company, including the commission Officers & Drums amounting to two hundred & sixty 260 men, be join'd to the Reinforcement, sent us from Bombay consisting of two Hundred & seventy Men, Officers included which all together amounts to five hundred & thirty Men to form a Camp at the Companys Garden, & proper Sheds to be m[ade] there, at convenient places to secure the men from the Inclemency of the Weather, as also eight Field Pieces & two [Hobits] to be placed on the Wings & Center of the Battalion or some Eminences where the Chief Officer shall think fit to place them to advantage to annoy the Enemy the most, & a sufficient Number of Men for the artillery with their proper officers & Lascars to serve the Train.

To make this Body useful; It is absolutely necessary to appoint a proper Officer to have the sole & Chief Command of the same, that a due Subordination may be kept among the Officers; for without this material point be observ'd, I look upon the whole to be a body without a Soul, & the Destruction of all Military Discipline, Therefore It is my humble opinion that your Worship &ca. Council be pleased to order a Commission to be drawn up of a superiour Rank to what We have here for the time being to be presented to one of the Officers of the Garrison whom you judge most able to take that Charge upon him that so the Articles of War may be put in execution, which should be read before the whole Garrison drawn up in Battalia with Colours flying in the presence of the Governour & his Council for the first time, that so, none may plead ignorance, if any Officer or soldier should infringe those martial Laws which are establish'd by Authority of the legislative power for the better Government of the Army, & keep up Discipline.

This Officer so appointed should have a Power invested to him, to summon all the Peon's in the Company's Pay & their several Commanders to give him an Account where they are posted & to appoint proper Guards of them at sundry places on the Frontiers of our Bounds to prevent any Surprize, as also to appoint a place of Rendezvous in case of an Alarm & order several Bodies of them to go upon Patrol every night to visit the Several Out Guards, As also the Chief Office[r] to have a Horse allow'd him or any other Officer He shall appo[int] in order to visit the several Out Guards, to see they keep a good [look] out & do their Duty

---- JUNE 1747 ----

The Moratta Horse should also be order'd to be under his Direction, and be canton'd in Manjecopang Town, or thereabouts, that they may be ready for Service to be sent out by small Partys between Four and Five in the Morning towards Kistnaparam, as Scouts to get Intelligences by taking up such Persons as they meet, and examining them, in order to discover the motions of our Enemies. And to have several Night Guards, consisting of a Serjeant, Corporal, and Twelve Men to mount every Evening about 6 o'Clock at a proper distance from the Camp to prevent Surprize, and the Guards to be withdrawn at Sun riseing; as also Rounds to be order'd from time to Time to visit those several Guards with a Countersign that they may be known from an Enemy.

That the General may be beat twice or more every month, that they may be exercised, and made fit for Service: and an Able Officer appointed by the Commander in Chief to serve as his Adjutant to be assisting to him in the Discharge of his Duty.

I could wish that our Governours wou'd vouchsafe a little Indulgence to some of our Commission Officers of an inferiour Rank in this Garrison, by allowing them sometimes a little Admittance to his Presence, as all Governors of Garrisons do in most parts of the World: It would very much contribute to increase the Respect and Submission they are in Duty bound to have for their Superiours: If some of them have by their Misbehaviour deservedly forfeited that Remark, let them thank themselves for it: I think it hard a Gentleman should suffer for faults committed by others.

I hope that what I have here represented to your Worship &ct. Council will meet with a favourable Acceptance, as I have nothing else in view but the Service of our Honble. Masters, who have already suffer'd too much for want of proper Measures. I am with the utmost Respect,

After the repeated verbal Representations, I have made to your Worship of the necessity there is of providing by times a commodious Lodging for the Reception of the sick & Wounded in case of their being drove in by the Enemy from the Out Guards I do[ubt] not has merited your due Consideration but least th[at] among the multiplicity of your other A[ff]airs should [have] escaped your memory I take this Opportunity [of remi]ndi[ng] you of it in order that such Accommodations may be p[ro]vided for them as You shall think that Men in such Circumstances require.

The Number of Irregularities that of late have been committed in the Hospital such as absenting themselves from it without License getting drunk &c². there appears to me as I hope it will to your Worship &c². an absolute necessity of having a timely Stop put to it, as many of the People by it render ineffectual all means that are made use of for their Recovery & alway[s] greatly protracts their Cures, what I would Propose is to have a Guard under the Direction of a proper Offic[er] appointed to prevent their straggling about which is the only means I can think off to put a Stop to this gorwing Evil, as the Peons that are appointed for the Service in no Shape answer the Intention of their being there I am with due Respect.

That the said Bea[ting Godown h] as been kept standing single from all other-Buildings 'till within these few Days past, when as all the Houses that were within eight Hundred Yards of the Fort were Ordered to be levelled by a Council of War held on the 29th. After all this done your Petitioner found that Ensign Wardlow sold Arrack by retail in [Cud]dalore without any Application for a License to your Petition[er] as the said Cowle directs, of which your Petitioner inform'd your Worship & You was pleas'd to forbid him to do so for the future but notwithstanding that Prohibition He now Sells it at [Cud]dalore, & another Ensign Mr. Turnbull at the Fort, which [is] the more Surprizing because your Petitioner has been [informed] that your Worship's Express Orders are that no strong Liquors shall be permitted to be brought to the Military at their [Fort].

Your Petitioner has at present Liquors on his Hands to the Amount of 5000 Pagodas, [which] it will be impossible for him to vend, or to pay the Company [...]

Your Petitioner intreats likewise that some expedient Means may be found out to put a Stop to such Proceedings for the future & to prevent the Jaggary being carried out of the Bounds on any pretence whatever.

The Contents of your Letter explain'd to me that You had once wrote me before & that the French who possess'd Chinapatam are troublesome &ca. This was occasion'd by the Carelessness & Want of Dili[gence] of the Deputy of that Fort who notwithstanding he had a considerable Quantity of warlike Stores & other Implements & provisions enough [to] support against a Siege, surrender'd so strong a Fort & has been the occas[sion] of the universal Destruction Loss & Misfortune of the Inhabitants [in] General, He was the Cause of all the Merchants & other Tradesmen being plunder'd of all their Money & Effects, & the means of all the Disturbances; I never received the other Letter You spoke off, & as to what You wrote me that the above [mis]fortune had happened by Mahaph[...] Cawns neglecting to give [his assis]tance, I must inform You that [the] said Cawn was near the For [...]ne, & offer'd a Siege & Engageme[nt] But by Reason of the St[rength of] the Place, as well as your [not] sending any Assistance, & the [...]ence that had been made [...] of in some things, did not accomp[lish that] Design, & it was the Will [of] God Almighty, it is not [any] Ways owing to the Disregard of the brave Anawardean Cawn.

Now by the help of God Almighty's Blessings the victorious Ensigns of my most potent Army, which destroys all Enemys & advances the Beauty of Riches & Glory are marching towar[ds] the Kingdom of Carnatica for settling affairs there & as it is unalterably his Excellencys most just & lawful Sentiments, to do justice to the whole Empire by punishing the oppressors & protecting & aiding the oppressd, & is what I am also delightful in, I have now & once before wrote to my Friend Anawardean Cawn Behauder (who is worthy & trusty among the Servants) to cause that the lawful Proprietors are Righted & dispossess the Usurpers, & by the Almighty's Grace, the said Cawn Behauder will put the Orders in Execution, agreable to his Duty which requires him so to do.

You wrote me that the Arrival of your Ships are designed for War in General & that You will commence it, I must now desire You to give me an Account of the Force that You have on board every Ship, the Quantity of the Warlike Stores & other Implements you have on board every one of them for accomplishing the Business & whether by the Strength of these You are capable to resist & engage with them, & what Force the Enemy has got with them on shore & how much they have in their Ships on [...] for Engagement, Pray find out these things, & let me kn[ow them] very particularly, as also the Falsities of Sumpat Roy & [...]mud Hussain Jahier, which You complain'd of to me [...] begin upon any thing, consider beforehand what the [...]es of it will prove afterwards.

The Letter which You wrote to his [Excellen]cy my Father, I have forwarded to him & also rec[ommended to] him everything that was most necessary in your Favour [you] may be very easy in your Mind by all Means. Be[...] Duty of being a well Wisher & Benefactor to the Sire[...] me with the p[resen]t State of your Affairs particularly [...] that Incl[...] & Esteem will daily be adva[nced].

I now send Phyzulla P[...] being one [of those] that are acquainted with [...] Man of [...] & Mahamud [...]ge, Serv[...] of the [...] to learn some Affairs from You, [...] inform them of all your Affairs particularly [...]tention what [...]ey shall inform You from [...] accordingly.

Worshipful Sir and Sirs

Being under the most absolute necessity that I am sorry that I must acquaint You, I cannot any longer bear the ill Behaviour of my Chief Mate Mr. John Widdrington, whom I was obliged to confine to his cabbin for several Acts of Mutiny committed by him on the 15th instant between the hours of 9 and 11 at night, and the next morning between 6 and 7—Which was as follows:

As I lay in my Bed hearing myself abused by him in the Grossest manner, and call'd Scoundrel and Rascal several times, I gott up, called for a Candle and Lanthorn, and went down into the Great Cabbin with the Officer of the Watch, and asked him how He durst abuse his Commander in the manner He did, and order'd him immediately to his Cabbin, upon which He had the Assurance to ask Me what Business I had there, and refused to go, whereupon I order'd some of my People to lay hold on him and put him into his Cabbin, but he resisted them, and it was as much as 4 or 5 of them could do to prevent his laying hold of Me, threatning Me with Death and Vengeance, and challenged Me &ct. accompanied with all the names He could think of; However We got him in at last, and soon after He got half out of his Scuttle with an Intention to murder Me as He threatned, till the Centrys swore they would cut him down if He did not gett back again. The Pistols were taken from him in the Cabbin, but were not loaded.

The next morning as the People were washing the Steerage, He began to tell them, He loved Seamen as He did his Life, and would always stand by them, and hoped that they would do the Same by him, for that He had not Robbed or thieved and knew no Authority Captain Browne had to confine him, but supposed I had done so because He stood by them, and would not beat or abuse them, or suffer them to be used ill, or Words to that Effect.

The preceding night being in Liquor (as was customary with him almost every night) He commenced a Quarrel with an unfortunate Brother I have on board, without any manner of Provocation from him, telling him I brought him to be a Spy on his Actions, and that He and I were both Scoundrels and Rascalls, and He a Telltale Scoundrel and that He wondered the Company would trust the Ship with such a Gouty Wretch as Capt. Browne, especially after losing them a Ship &ct. which last Expression He has often repeated to some of my Officers, but I never took any notice of it.

I beg leave further to observe to You, that scarce two hours before He had so abused Me behind My Back He and I satt down on the Quarter Deck, and discoursed together for near an hour, the Subject of which was chiefly, that He was extreamly sorry I should give myself any Trouble in regard to the Affairs of the

Ship, since I had very good Officers whom I might entirely depend on, and as for his own part He would run thro' Fire and Water to serve Me, with fulsome Compliments and Praises of my Knowledge and good Conduct &ct. except in One thing, which was my being too complaisant to the Governor and Councill, who, He insisted had no Power or Authority to detain or put the Ship in Warfare under the Commodore, and had it been his Case he would not comply with it &ct. But knowing the man's insincerity I soon saw what He aimed at under the disguise of Friendship in desireing Me not to fatigue myself with the Ship's affairs, least it should impair my health, but leave it to him: it being obvious to any One that He only wanted the Power in order to make an ill use of it, if Opportunity offer'd.

It is needless to take up more of your Time in mentioning other Circumstances, such as his Beating and abusing several of my Officers and Servants, and threatning at other Times (when drunk) to put my 2d. and 3rd Mates in Irons with other Actions displeasing to Me, which I can no longer bear. And even could I put up with his Mutinies (according to the Articles of War and several Acts of Parliament) I must not expect to carry home half of my People, should We go to a Place where they possibly could gett away, which as in Duty bound for the interest of the Honble. Company and my Owners, I am to prevent, and therefore apply to you and Council for your Orders herein, and if You find I have just Reason for dismissing my Chief Mate, Mr. John Widdrington, I beg the favour I may wait on You with my Second Mate Mr. Joseph Bustoll and 3d. Mate, Mr. Nevil Norway for your Approbation to be my Chief and Second Mates, who are both as Capable Men to take Charge of One of the Company's Ships as any I ever knew: They were both Strangers to Me, having never seen or heard of them till I began to take in the Company's Goods on board this Ship at Deptford, so that I can have no other View than the Peace, Safety, and good Government of the Ship I am entrusted with: And as to the truth of the above facts a great number of my People can prove them to You if necessary, and am the more surprized at this usage from Mr. Widdrington, having all the voyage treated him rather as a Friend and Companion than my Chief Mate.

As I hear We are to sail in 2 or 3 days I have now only to beg a Single Line from You, which will add to the many Obligations already conferred on.

By this Ship the Board have likewise a Letter from the Governor and Council A Gonl. of St. Helena, containing Advices of such of our Honble. Masters Ships as have Letter from St. Helena touched with them, which is likewise Read, and enter'd No. 78.

Letter from Mr. Henry Kellsall at Ingelee is also now Read as enter'd No. 80 Letter from Mr. Henry incloseing a Protest against Captain Thomas Harry for not having his full Compli-Kellsall at ment of Men, and but 2 Guns mounted in the Gun Room. ORDER'D that a Copy of Ingeles read the said Protest be enter'd hereafter.

The Reinforcement of Military by this Ship being in number 113 together with The detachtheir Officers, having been safely landed, AGREED that they be detached to the Men by this Garden House, and that the necessary Orders be given for their Accommodation and Ship order'd Diet.

Company's Gardens

The Ship Fanny having been freighted by the Honble. President and Council stores sent of Bengall for the West Coast, and being in Readiness to depart accordingly, to the West AGREED that the Warehousekeeper do lade on board her 20 Bales of Gunnys and Ship Fanny Ten of Ordinary long Cloth that have been dyed Blew, for the Use of the Slaves, and as the Governour and Council of Fort Marlbro': have indented for a Quantity of Fanams and Cash, such as are Current at that Place, which our Minters here are not acquainted with, AGREED that We send them by this for the Supply of their present Occasions to the Value of Five hundred (500) Pagodas of such as are Current at this Place, and in case they should not pass with them, to desire they will return them to Us, with the Musters of the different Sorts they would be furnished with. And the President and Council of Bengall having sent to Us Mr. Charles Hampton a Writer, whom the Company have positively order'd to reside at Bencoolen, AGREED that he be sent thither on this Ship, and that the Secretary do give the Captain a Permitt to receive him on board.

ORDERED that a General be drawn out to their Settlement to advise of the fore-Gonl. Letter going, and to reply to their Letter by the Success Sloop, Signifying our Justification to the West regarding the Badness of the Rice, and other Supplies sent them by the Lapwing and Fanny, and that being now better informed of the Sorts they most esteem, We should for the future supply them accordingly, taking Care to have them examined by the master of the Vessel, before they are sent off, that so He may have no Room to shift the Damage upon Us, that the Gentlemen of Bengall had complied with their indent by the Houghton by this Ship, and that We should take Care to supply them with what may be wanting to compleat their Indents to them and Us, that We approve of their having sent Mr. Massey to Batavia, and to desire them to give him Directions to write to this Coast by the Ships that leave that Place for this side,

which will not only be a great Satisfaction to Us but may be of great Importance to the Squadron. That We shall take the first Opportunity to reinforce their Garrison with some Men, which may be more Serviceable than Peons, could We prevail on That We shall duly observe our Honble. Masters Directions by the Norfolk regarding the Purchase of Teas for the use of the Markett, that as We understand a Chaplain is sent on the Grantham for their Place, if Mr. Rider has a Mind to come this way, He will be entertained according to the Allowances of Fort St. George; that in the Present Juncture We can give no General Permission for the granting certificates for money that may be paid into their Cash, and as there is a General Order with Respect to deceased Persons and those who had resigned the Service to grant Certificates for any money paid into their Cash, We think they should equally enjoy the same Indulgence now as before and believe our Honble. Masters will not disapprove of the Continuance of it, And that We had some thoughts of returning to them the Sloop Success, but She proving of Service to his Majesty's Squadron We have thought proper to employ her for the present in that Service.

Letter from Mr. Alexander Douglas at Calicut read, accompanying the Seapoys. Mr. Douglas from Tellicherry, as mentioned in their Advices.

General Letters to Bengall

General Letters to Bengall are now Read as Enter'd No. 72, 73, 74, Informing that the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam have advised of the Receipt of the Pagodas, and other Particulars designed them by the Jenny, and hoping they would supply them with the Rupees, when in their Power; That Mr. Charles Hampton was gone to the West Coast, that We should be very exact in complying with their Agreements regarding the Several Cargos of Rice, and as far as in our Power forward the Dispatch of Each Ship: that the Gentlemen at the West Coast would be much obliged to their Honour &ct. for the Articles sent by the Fanny, And as We purpose to send a thousand Bags of Rice in January, We requested them to furnish Us with that Quantity of the best new Patcheree Rice; that as it Appeared Mr. Sterling had suffer'd greatly by the Arrack, and as We understood by their Letter, that it was sent purposely for the use of this Settlement. We desired they would be pleased to allow him whatever they might think reasonable on that Score: that the 30 Tonns of Redwood was continued on the Princess of Wales, and We had returned her Charter Party: that We esteemed Ourselves greatly obliged to them for the Military and Stores sent Us by that Ship, and that We should not fail to comply with whatever Terms they had made with them; that four of them had died in the Passage, and mentioning their Names; that Mr. Hook the Surgeon returned on the Ship, and forwarding them the 14th Paragraph of our Honble. Master's Letter by the Oxford, wherein they permit Lieutenant Holland to remove to their Place and to have a Company with them, that as there were many Accounts relating to the Squadron unadjusted for Disbursements at this Place, as well as at Madrass, which not being to be settled without the Presence of Mr. Richard Rosewell the Agent Victualler, We desired they would intimate to him the absolute Necessity of his coming here for that Purpose, That We had advanced Captain Harry Eight hundred (800) Pagodas on Account of his Charter Party, and encloseing One of his Receipts for the Same, and adviseing of the Capture of our Honble. Master's Ship Anson, Captain Charles Foulis by the Apollo and Anglesea Privateers then cruizing off Bombay, but that She had landed her Packetts and all her Treasure before She struck, and that the Portfield narrowly escaped the same Fate by getting into Bassein, that in Case several Coast and Bay Ships should arrive with them, We desired they would supply the Northern Settlements with at least Fifty (50) thousand Rupees, and requesting they would supply Us by the Ships in December and January with as far as Six or Eight thousand Bags of Rice, and desiring the Same might be all good and New and if possible at a more moderate Price, adding that what We received from them last Year was extreamly bad, and would scarce have been vendible but in such Times, Also desiring they would forward the Remaining Sixty (60) Pipes of Madeira designed for this Coast by the Oxford, as We were in Extream

want of it, further that We had drawn on them in favour of the Owners of the Prince of Orange for the Sum of Five thousand Three hundred Fifty Nine (5359) Rupees and Ten Sixteenths (10/16) in part for the Discharge of her Rice Cargo, and inclosing Invoice of Redwood and Iron laden on the Princess of Wales. Number'd 73 and 74 adviseing of having sent on board the Princess of Wales Eight French Deserters, and enclosing Copy of our Orders to the Commander thereon Also that We had made a further Draught on them for the Sum of Twelve thousand (12000) Rupees in favour of Messrs. Fytche and Burrows, being for the Amount of the Ship Success's Cargo of Rice.

Captain Thomas Harry pays into Cash on the 14 instant the sum of Five hun-Capt. dred and Sixty Pagodas account of his Priviledge for which the usual certificates Harry pays were given him.

SIR,

On Receipt hereof You are to repair on board, and to take the first Opportunity of Wind and Weather to carry your Ship into the Offing abreast of the Fort, where You are to anchor and continue there till the Fort makes the Signall of a Pendant at the Top of the Flag Staff, and fires 3 Minute Guns, when You are to weigh and proceed to Bengall, and there follow all such Orders as You shall receive from the Honble. John Foster Esqr. President and Governor &ct. Council of Fort William for your further Proceedings.

Our design of having you wait in the Offing some days is to watch the Motions of the Bourbon now lying in Pondicherry Road, whom We have Reason to believe may be prepared to transport Cannon, Mortars and Ammunition to act against this Settlement, and in such Case Your Ship may be of particular Service in preventing the Enemy from landing them, as may the Presence of her possibly deter them from any Attempt that way: You will therefore keep a Man at the Mast head to constantly observe the Bourbon, and if You find She is preparing to gett under Sail, You are to hoist a Jack at the Mizen Topmast head and fire two Guns, if the Fort observes her first, there will be a Jack hoisted at the Flaggstaff and two Guns fired, and it may be proper that You also gett under Sail and observe her Motions.

It is wrote from the Malabar Coast that three French Ships left Mahie the 10th September, who may be supposed to be bound to this Coast, in Case of their Appearance or other of the Enemy's Shipping, You are to make the best of your way to Bengall; or if the Weather should come on so hard as that You apprehend a Gale of Wind is like to follow, in such Case You are likewise to proceed to Bengall. I was much surprized in the morning by having these Eight french Deserters sent on board our Ship without any Provision for their Subsistence: As I had the honour to write to day by my former Letter, I hope Gentlemen, You'll please to send some Provision for them or else I must be obliged to send them on shore, for I have none lay'd in for their Account, but am much more surprized to receive your finall Orders, that instead of proceeding to Bengall directly, I am now obliged to lay in the Offing as a Guard Ship, without any Reinforcement of Men to defend our Ship, but those of the Enemy sent this morning, which I had much rather been without: You all very well know, Gentlemen, the State of our Ships Company, therefore if You expect any defense from Us, We have need of Reinforcement of Men, otherwise I am sure We can make but a very weak defense, against an Enemy so much Superior to Us, as are those Ships so suddenly expected from the Mallabar Coast as You say, and the Bourbon so near at hand, So that We can be but of little Service to your Garrison. However in the morning I shall endeavour to follow your Orders as strictly as in my Power, but first I must be obliged to enter a Protest in behalf of the Owners, on account of our being confined here in this dangerous Place, and Season, in order to wait for the Enemy instead of avoiding them, for further Consideration, I refer it Gentlemen to yourselves, and remain with the greatest Respect

To the Medway 40 Europeans, and to the Pearl 52 Europeans and 40 Blacks which if You can possibly spare, I pray the favour You will order them to be imbarked with all possible Dispatch.

To the Worshipful Charles Floyer Esqr. Governor &ct. Council of Fort St. David.

WORSHIPFULL SIR AND SIRS,

I think it necessary to remind your Worship &ct. that Mr. Hinde some time before his Death, wrote a private Letter to the Governor of Calcutta adviseing him the excessive Scarcity of Grain in this Place, and that We were apprehensive of being put to great Distress, as We had a great Augmentation of Forces in our Service, and surrounded by our Enemy so that, had there not been a Dearth in the Country (as there was at that time) We could not have had the inland usual import: at the same time He desired the President to send Us a large Supply of Rice by the very first Conveyance, which was accordingly sent Us but contracted with the Owners by the President and Council at so high a Price, and to be received here by weight contrary to our usual Custom, that the Company in both these Articles, and hereafter mentioned further Respects, will sustain a considerable Loss, which I shall endeavour to make appear by first reminding your Worship &ct. that it was contracted for Us to receive it at 56 Bags, Each Bag to contain 2 Bengall Maund, which is 112 Bengall Maunds or 8960tb. Per Fort St. David Garse, which when We measured a Loss appeared upon each Garse of 744tb. or 613 Mercalls as a Garse of our[s] will weigh 9704tb., a very considerable Deficiency especially when We add to it the Loss by remeasuring it out to our Military &ct. Servants, and retailing in the markett, besides the prodigious Waste We sustained by the perpetual Removal in Mr. Hinde's Time, and since from One Godown to another as from Cuddalore to this side: And such was and is our necessity for proper Godowns, that some of them, tho' damp, and consequently, of Damage to the Grain, yet as We have been obliged to demolish our Buildings, I have as directed been obliged to make use of them. The great Deficiency by the difference of Bengall Weight with our Garse considered, with the loss of remeasuring or retailing, the waste by continual Removals and the Consumption by Vermin, and damage by damp Godowns, it is too visible there will turn out a prodigious Loss to our Honble. Masters, but to compute it exactly, I cannot at this time.

And now I cannot omit to take notice, that We are liable to receive a particular loss by the Cargo of Ship Phaza Salam, the Supracargoes having had a large Quantity of Rice to be weighed off, and being impatient to be speedily dispatched in order to make a Second Trip, sollicited the Govr. that 200 Bags might be weighed off for a Standard to compute the rest of the Cargo, by assuring at the same time that all their Bags contained two Bengall Maunds, which was complyed with, but having occasion to deliver 500 Bags for the West Coast there appeared in weighing them off a vast difference not one of them coming near to the weight of the Bags the Supracargoes deliver'd for a Standard, which occasioned me to make another draught of 135 Bags promiscuously taken out, and found them in like manner vastly short, wherefore a third Draught was made of 269 Bags, but would not answer the first, most of which surpassed 2 Maunds, upon this the Supra Cargoes

sollicited the Governor, that the last Draught, reckon'd One with another might be the Standard at 58 Bags per Garse, but as most of the Bags turned out so much short of 2 Bengall Maunds Per Bag, We have great Reason according to the best Calculation We can make to expect We shall find a considerable Loss.

In Regard now to the Price the President and Council of Calcutta had contracted for Us to pay, being Pags. 100 Per Garse, which with Charges of Godown Rent &ct. amounts to Pags. 102 Per Garse, tho' We had a great Scarcity of Grain yet what little was sold in the Markett was considerably lower than the price sent Us, so that when We attempted to retail it to our Military, Sepoys, Peons, &ct. Servants at the Rate charged Us, We found a general murmuring among them, insomuch that to content them (as it was War time) agreable to your Worship &ct. directions, I have been obliged to deliver it them at the Rate of about Pags. 88 Per Garse according to the Change of Pagodas, and as there is likely to be a plentiful Season, and We a considerable Quantity by Us, and in Expectation of large Importations from the Northward, which in all probability will abate the Price, therefore to prevent any further Loss, We are obliged to retail it in the markett at 2 Measures for a Fanam which amounts to Pags. 79 Per Garse, all which I am sorry to say will encrease our Honble. Master's Loss, and refer to your Worship &ct. that We consult on some Method to prevent the Company suffering so much by the Bengall Rice in receiving it by the prementioned Weight, as well to endeavour to lower their extravagant Price of the Grain.

WORTHY SIR AND SIRS,

Agreable to an Order received I now deliver an Account of the Loss of the Honble. Company's Sloop Success which is as follows;

On Sunday the 4th of December 1747 We had fresh Gales of Wind Northerly, with very hard squalls and a large Sea setting from the Eastward, the Sloop being mored with an Anchor to the Eastward, and a Grapnoll to the Westward: at 2 o' Clock in the Afternoon We brought the Grapnoll home, at $\frac{1}{2}$ past We let go another Anchor to prevent the Sloop driveing further in shore, if the Wind should come from the Eastward, by Reason the Surf broke but just within Us all day, notwithstanding We lay in $6\frac{1}{2}$ fathom Water, about 4 o'Clock the Surf broke upon Us, the force of which caused Us to part from the Anchor We lett go in the Afternoon, between 6 and 7 o'Clock the Wind coming from the Eastward, caused the Sloop to tend in and made Us ride more in the Surf, however the Sloop did not mind it her head being to it. The People all came to Me desireing I would cutt the Cable and run the Sloop on shore, telling Me that if We should ship One of the Seas, it certainly would sink Us, but the Sloop being lively (as her head was to it), and making no water I did not think there was so much Danger as they imagined; a little past 7 o'Clock the wind not being strong enough for the Current (as there was a very strong Current setting to the Southward) to keep her head to it, in tending and being in the trough of the Sea, We shipped a Surf, the force of which almost at once oversett the Sloop, It layd the Larboard Gunnell under water but She righted so much that the Chains were only in the water, I wanted the Lascars to go down and trim the Ballast &ct. that was shifted in the Hold, but could not gett any of them to go, so shipping another made her crack in such a manner as I take it tore her Side from her Deck, at which time I found a great deal of Water in her, and seing

it was impossible to do any thing with the People (for they would not so much as put their hands to the Pump to endeavour to free her of what water was in her) so I order'd the Cables might be cutt, which the Syrang did directly, and hoisted the foresail to make her go in what We could, I took the Helm in my hand and put it hard over to Port, for the Larboard side was the Weather Side, but the Surf came with such Force against the Rudder, that caused the Tiller to break in the Rudder head, about ten minutes after She was all under water. I hope these Circumstances are sufficient to plead my Justification.

I take the Liberty to represent to your Worship &ct. that agreable to an order in Consultation of the 16th I have open'd some of the 440 Bales of Cotton recieved from the Ship Warwick, and find them extreamly damaged, having had such heavy Rains this Monsoon, that notwithstanding We frequently renewed the Packing, yet I find One third, and in some half, and in others two thirds entirely spoiled, and as We have had some heavy Rains since this Order, I find the middle of the Bales yett damp, therefore it will take up a Considerable Time, in drying and separating the Good from the Bad, and as I am required to have the good from the 440 Bales repacked in readiness to send to Bengall upon the first Europe Ship, which may be very speedily, is the Reason I acquaint the Board, that as I said before, Separating and drying Cotton so much damaged and damp Time must be allowed for it, and as We have no Godowns empty in the Fort, nor on this side the River, the Bales that are yet unopen'd upon the Works, if Rain should fall, will be liable to be wett, and detain Us longer, however I shall use what Expedition I can, and am with Respect,
