Our last bore date the 17th. Instant Duplicate whereof comes Enclosed, We shall now reply to the several Letters therein acknowledge [sic]. It is the utmost Concern to us to find that no Money passes your Port to our Assistance, and having supplied your Settlement to the utmost of our Power We are reduced to inform you that it is impossible for us to proceed any further in such aid to you or to carry on our Honble Masters Affairs here unless you send us a very large Supply out of the Treasure that shall arrive with you from Europe, When you receive such Supply We desire you will send as large a part of what you design us in Rupees as may be soon procurable for our Necessities will not Admit of delay therefore what cannot be turned soon into Rupees must be sent us in Bullion, though the Shroffs here have reduced the price of Bullion so low that it will be most for our Honble Masters Interest to have it Coin'd with you if it can be done expeditiously.

The Bales and Copper you sent us \$\ \text{Ship Warwick were duly delivered and the Copper came out right, but the Gentlemen from Fort Marlborough having advised us that the Copper which they had Laden on Ship Bombay Castle wou'd, as they expected, come out Short, We enclosed sent you an Account thereof and Desire you will demand the difference from the Commander of the Bombay Castle & advise our Hon[ble] Masters about this Difference and your Proceedings with the Captain thereon.

We observe you desire to have the Brown Cloth (sent us for Europe) Whiten'd here, but that will not be in our power as We had a large quantity came brown from Vizagapatam last Year which has fully Employed all our Washermen and We fear will not be all Compleated before the dispatch of our Ships for England.

We are in great want of Red Wood not having Sufficient for the Kintldge [sic] of all the Ships now on hand therefore desire you will forward the quantity before wrote for as soon as possible.

We have received the Ten Bales of Cotton you mention to have remain'd on board the Warwick, as for what you took out of her, to place on your Terasses, you will please to forward it to us as Opportunity Offers.

Your Bill in favour of Mr. John Hammon was duly paid, as also all the Bills you mention to have drawn on us in your favour of the 23<sup>d</sup>. September.

By Ship Jenny we received the Broad Cloth and Perpetts you sent us on her agreeable to the Bill of Lading and have paid Freight for the same. Upon inspection thereof, many of the Bales appeared damaged which the Captain affirmed

could not have happen'd on board his Ship Upon which the damaged was Survey'd by the whole Board and it Appear'd to us to be an Old Damage a great Number of the Peices being quite rotton, which could not have been the case had it happen'd in the Jennys Short Passage We presume the Brittanias Cargoe was duly survey'd with you and that you have accounted with the Captain for what damage appeared but as We have had no Account thereof. Enclosed send you an Account of the Damage which appear'd here, Also an Account Sale thereof, which We desire you will transmit to our Honble Masters that they may Account for the same with the Owners in case you have not already accounted with the Captain.

Enclosed comes Invoice and Bills of Lading for the Rice and Stores leaden [sic] on Ships Oxford and Exeter. We therein have Complyed with your Indents as near as we could, but we could not put on board them all the Rice we intended, as Mr. Hammon Agent Victualer to his Majesty's Squadron applied to us to send a large quantity of Rice and Biscuit for the use of the Squadron which being so essential to the General Service We thought necessary to Comply therewith, but as many of our Country Ships are gone and going to your Coast You cannot want a large Supply of that Grain should you have occasion for it. The Rice We have laden on the above Ships is such as We could procure of the August Crop, not having it in our power to send any other as the latter Crop is not yet arriv'd.

The Gentlemen at Vizagapatam Ingeram and Ganjam having advised us of the number of Bales they expect to have ready by the beginning of January We have dispatch'd our Honble Masters Ship the Houghton to Vizagapatam in Order to bring them away, as they had no Tonnage for that purpose.

Rupees you design'd for Vizagapatam, We desire you will Supply that Settlement with what you think proper as Occasion offers.

In regard to the Arrack design'd for your use by Ship Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George which it seems was afterwards sold at Outcry at your Settlement We must leave it to you to Satisfy the Owners for the same as you are best acquainted with the Sale thereof.

As Captain Holland's Service has been so acceptable to you and as you think his further Assistance usefull We entirely approve of his Stay with you 'till you think proper to send him to take Charge of the Employ our Honble Masters have appointed him to.

Agreeable to your desire We have apply'd to Mr. Richard Roswell and informed him how necessary you thought his Presence wou'd be on the Coast for Settling some Accounts unadjusted with the Squadron, his Answer to our Application comes Enclosed.

We have deliver'd to our Paymaster the Roll you sent of the Military under the Command of Lieutenant Brown & directed him to make the Stoppages out of the Soldier's Pay conformable thereto.

We have duly discharg'd your Bill on us in favour of the Owners of Ship Prince of Orange.

In regard to the Patcheree Rice you want for the West Coast, it is impossible to Supply you therewith so early as you mention, that Sortment not coming in to us before the Middle of January, but We shall send it you by the first Opportunity that Offers after it is procurable.

The Lead and Iron you sent us \$\mathbb{Y}\$ Ship Princess of Wales not being yet landed We cannot yet advise how the Weight comes out.

We have demanded of Captain Harry to Account for the differencies [sic] and short Deliveries which you mentioned to us, which he has desired to be referr'd home to be adjusted between our Honble Masters and his Owners. In future We must desire you will adjust all such Differencies with the Commanders of the Ships before they leave you, since, when they are demanded here they make Excuses, Charging your Connicoplies and Boatmen with Pilfering and other Rogueries which you on the Spot might disprove though We are incapable of, Confuting them.

Mr. William Frankland who dispatches these Ships will advise you of their draught of Water and what else is necessary.

Since closing the foregoing We received advice of the Arrival of Five of the Honble Company's Ships in Ballasore Road Vizt. the Winchelsea, Benjamin, Colchester, Eastcourt and Cæsar under Convoy of three of his Majesty's Ships the Exeter York and Eltham, The three former having Stores on board for the Squadron which the Commodore desired might be sent him as soon as possible We came to a resolution of sending them up immediately to your Settlement and have Ordered Twenty five (25) Chests of Bullion to be laden on them The Bills of Lading for which will be forwarded to you by Mr. Thomas Coales whom we have sent down to dispatch those Ships and the Commanders of them have Orders on their Arrival with you to follow your Directions for their further Proceedings which we must leave entirely to your Management only advising you that it will not be in our power to load any of them from hence for Europe, And as the Gentlemen at Bombay have long since advised us that there would be a quantity of Pepper laying at Tellicherry We acquaint you hereof, that if you should find it convenient Some of them may be sent there to be laden with that Commodity We hope the above Supply of Twenty five Chests of Bullion will be Sufficient for your Expences for some time as our own Necessities would not permit us to Spare more and as the latter Ships may be soon expected, should they fall in with You may supply yourselves or We shall send you more if you have occasion for it. On board the before mentioned Ships is Major Stringer Lawrence with 5 Officers and 84 Private Men design'd for your Coast Whom We have directed to proceed to your way 33 TH 1881

David setting forth that Answer to there being several Accounts relating to the Squadron unadjusted both before ye scored Mr. Barnetts Decease & Afterwards which they are told cannot be Settled in a Proper Manner & form Unless I the then Agent Victualler be present And as I am now at this Place they beg the favour the Governour & Council will Mention to me the Absolute Necessity of my going up to them for that Purpose I degree you? me the Absolute Necessity of my going up to them for that Purpose I desire you'll please to Acquaint them that when I was last at Fort St. David in the Month of March April May & June to which Place I went on purpose, I settled All Accounts

with the Company for Provisions and Stores Supplied the Squadron both before and after Mr: Barnett's Decease And therefore Apprehend the Accounts they mention which I could never get a Sight of, when there, are, of Provisions and Stores which they say were Provided for the Use of the Squadron by order of Commodore Barnett and Capt. Peyton (to which I am entirely a Stranger) and kept in Readiness to be Supplied the Squadron on their Arrival at Madrass but were never delivered the Place being Unfortunately taken by the French and that there is not the Least Necessity for my going up to Fort St. David's as the Accounts are of too great Consequence for me to Pretend to adjust and must be settled between the Government and Company in England to which Place I shall go by the first Opportunity. Since we wrote you last, under the 17th. July. (Duplicate of which goes enclosed) your Letters of the 18th. June, 6th. & 21th. July 12th. August, and 28th. Septr. are come to hand, which last was not recd. here till the 21st. of last Month.

On receipt of your Letter requesting us to furnish you with a Letter of Credit

on Arcott to the Amount of one hundred and fifty thousand (150,000) Rupees, we accordingly gave Orders to the Chief and Factors at Suratt for that purpose, but on their acquainting us no such was procurable there, we directed them, under the 14th. October last, to remitt you by Bill, on the most Advantageous Terms the Sum

 $\mathbb{R}^{s}$ . of one hundred thousand (100,000) Rupees which we doubt not 'ere this you have duly received.

The Bill you drew on us for Rupees one thousand twenty (1020), in favour of Mr. Samuel Hough or order, was duly discharged the 1st. Instant & your Settlement Debted accordingly.

The President duly advised the Deputy Governour of the loss of the Honble Company's Ship Anson, which was taken off this Port the 2<sup>d</sup>. Septr. by the Apollo and Anglesea French Privateers, who quitted their Cruize the 4<sup>th</sup>. following, and proceeded to Goa with said Ship, and a Country Ship with Dutch Freight & Passport, that they seiz'd in her way hence to Surratt, & which Ships and their Cargoes, we are informed, they intend Selling at Goa. These Privateers, by our last Advices, are still on this Coast, and three of the French Ships that Winter'd at Goa were Sail'd, as was reported, to Cruize off the Lacadivee and Maldivee Islands. The 4th. Ship the St. Lewis has been at Mangulore for Rice, from whence She returned and is with the Privateers at Goa. The Ship mentioned in the Duplicate proved to be the Princess of Mary wch. fell to Peices on their endeavouring to haul her on Shore to Clean and refit. All the Treasure by the Anson, being 10 Chests, was saved, which Capt: Foulis sent us a Shore, with his Packets in a Fishing Boat before the Engagement began. To this Ship's lost [sic] it is with additional concern, we have to add that of the Heathcote, which run a Shore on the Island of Socotra on the 7th. June at One in the Morning, and 16 of the Crew were drown'd ... The Captain, Agents, and others to the Number of 41, came hither in a small Vessell from thence, and the rest were to proceed in Boats to Muscat, whither we have sent for them about 14,000 Dollars of her Treasure were brought hither by the Commander.

The Portfield, from Mocha, was luckily saved from the Privateers, on the 1st. Sept, by 4 of our Intelligence Boats, who tow'd her away while the Enemies Ships were obliged to Anchor, for want of Wind, and a Swell Setting in Shore, and She arriv'd Safe at Surat on the 5th following, from whence She Sail'd for England on the 29th. Ulto. with a Cargoe of Coffee.

The George Snow arrived at Anjengo on the 8th. of October, of which you have doubtless been advised from thence. She left England, as we are informed, about the End of April, but we are not acquainted when our latter Ships were, or would be dispatch'd.

We have a much greater Quantity of Pepper upon the Coast then we judge we shall have Tonnage for, or can be sent to the Bay, and China, Altho' opportunities should offer, therefore we desire you will timely acquaint us, whether, in case any can be sent you towards the End of the Season, you can dispose of it to Advantage, and what Quantity.

# HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Agreeable to our Last of the 29th. Instant take Liberty further to Advise of a few Particulars therein omitted for want of time.

We left Spithead under the Convoy of his Majesty's Ship Telbury, who see us with the Honble Company's Snow Swallow, Hutchinson, and Tryal Snow, Tayler, about 150 Leags. to the Westward of the Lizard.

On the 13th of August Swallow left our Company In the Lattitude of 47:  $^{\circ}00$  N. and Long<sup>d</sup>. 12: 00 West who Arriv'd at the Cape the Day before us, having on Board Packets from the Prince of Orange, to the Governour of the Cape and General of Betavia, containing Orders to Sink Burn and Distroy the French where ever they meet them. The Tryal Snow kept us Company In[to]  $^{\circ}4$ :  $^{\circ}00$  N. and Long<sup>d</sup>.  $^{\circ}20$ :  $^{\circ}00$  West, Where We left her, She Sailing heavy, She is under Secret Orders.

The Lapwing Cheney got Safe to the Cape the beginning of Augst. being but 31 days from Bencoolen, her Stay at the Cape was only five or Six days.

We left the Kent Robson there, who with the Marlborough Smith, and Salsbury Borrows, lost their Passage, and Winter'd at Delagoa, the two Latter did not touch at the Cape, being Ordered to S<sup>t</sup>. Pauls Loango Where they are to meet a Sixty Gun Ship of War, and the Kent to S<sup>t</sup>. Helena.

The Ships as \$\mathbb{P}\$ list Inclosed was taken up some time before we left Portsmouth, but where \$[sic]\$ not Station'd. We left at Spithead the Dorrington Crabb for Bombay, and China and the Strattam Pennell for Bombay, who we Suppose will leave England under the Convoy of Admiral Boscawen.

The Duke of Cumberland has had a Battle in Flanders in June last, but the French got the field tho' with great loss, and what has greatly lessn'd their Joy on that Account is a Signal Victory Gain'd in Italy over the Chevalier Belleisle's Army, where in they lost five thousand men with the Death of the said Chevalier, who behav'd very Gallantly or rather Rashly. The King of Sardinia with the Empress Queen lost no more than 120 men, the Battle being fought, on the heights of Evil & Assiety which are Places difficult to come at, which Occasin'd that Great Dispropotion of the Enemy's loss.

The French have taken most of the Dutch Barriers, and on the 3d. of July laid Seige to a place is thought by the Dutch to be Impregnable called Bergen o[p] Zoome, the Enemy has lost Already ten thousand men, and are no nearer taken it than the first day & it was Strongly Reported before we left England that they had Rais'd the Seige.

They Desired a Suspension of Arms to bury their Dead, but was Answer'd as they came not according to the laws of War, but as Incendiarys they would not grant it.

We Expect, Orders hourly from the Gov<sup>r</sup>. of Columbo to go in this Bay for at Present we all lay in the Road. We are

Captain Thorp and Graham Anchor'd in this Road the 2<sup>d</sup>. Ins<sup>t</sup>. who gave us some Acc<sup>t</sup>. of the Situation of Affairs in the Bay, they are bound up the Malabar Coast with Rice, but Seem'd inclinable to call in at Columbo as we hope they did, or Else they will Run a great Risque of Meeting the Enemy.

We have nothing further to add Worthy of your Notice but Shall be Sure to learn what Intelegence we can, at this place, and Communicate the same by all Opportunity's that Offers, & we are Sir & Sirs with great Respect

She Carry's Two teer of Guns has about 150 Europeans On Board and a Number of Coffrey's I take her to be the St. Lewis which was refitted at Goa.

I hope this will come in time to Prevent Your falling into the Enemy's hands & Should She quitt this Station I will Immediately send 'Advice both to Galle and Columbo.

It has been reported that Three french Ships were seen time ago Off Dieu Point but that is Black-fellows Advice and not to be depend'd on if it is true it must be the Two Privateers and the Anson. Angrias Fleet has been down the Coast and return'd to the Northward some time ago without doing any other mischief besides taking a few of the Northern Bombaras.

Not one Vessell has yet appeared from Bengall or Europe. I wish all may be Safe as their [sic] was terrible Weather In the Beginning of December. You will please to make this Letter up again when you have Read it to Advise any Person who may Come after You. I am

Your Favour to Us by the Princess Augusta Dated the 2<sup>d</sup>. Ultimo, reached Our Hands ye. 30<sup>th</sup>. of the same Month, and as We observed therein was your Inclinations to have that Ship forwarded to Betavia, We caused the 485 Bales Consigned us on her to be immediately Transported to Our Honourable Masters Ship Grantham now in Our Road and Shall continue them on Board her as part of her homeward bound Cargo. We have also deliver'd and Consigned to Captain Jacob One Chest of Treasure Contains, four thousand Dollers in order to purchase Timber Plank and Arrack which you are in want off, Conformable to the Directions, which We Suppose he has received from Your Worship &c<sup>2</sup>.

In our Last letter by the Sloop Success Dated the 29th. July Duplicate of which comes Under cover we acquainted Your Worship &c\*\* with the extream bad Condition of the Fanny which Vessell was then thought to be capable of Repair, but upon a thorough Survey since taken It was found impracticable, and She has been Condemn'd, Upon Examination all her Floor Timbers proved entirely Rotten and most of them Seperated from her Keel, which was not seen till her Loading of Iron was Landed, and indeed was a matter of Surprize that She had not foundered at Sea, We must therefore request Your Worship &c. to return us back the Sloop Success or Some other Vessell in her Stead, having only two Small Sloops to perform the Service of the Coast.

The not Sending us any Rice or Sault on this Ship proves no immediate Disapointment to Us, having rec<sup>d</sup>. the Supply's We mentioned to have wrote for from Betavia. We Nevertheless request a Compliance with our Indent to Your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. the first Opportunity.

By private hands We are acquainted that the Brillant Snow Captain Byers is dispatched by your Worship &c\*. for this Place, but we are not Informed what She has on board, a Duplicate of Your Letter by her would have given us much Pleasure as We Suppose it Contains an Answer to Our Packet by the Bombay Castle.

We Shall not fail to Dispose of the Two Letters sent by the Commanders of any Ships bound Your Way in the manner desired and to enforce a Compliance by Orders from hence, in case any of those Ships Should touch here.

Your Worship &ca. may be Perfectly Assured that we should not have detained the Military by the Bombay Castle without an Absolute Necessity: but at that time the Safety of the Honble Company's Settlement Obliged us to do it. The News of the Loss of Madrass, and the Apprehensions We were Under Ourselves, rendered it a Duty incombent on us to provide for Our Safety as We are distant from all Assistance, and our Chief Dependance lies on the European Garrison: We Shall ever Act for Our Honourable Masters Interest, which We Apprehended to be in danger when we detained those Men, and Your Worship &ca. will Observe by the Inclosed Duplicate of our Letter by the Sloop Success, that we were even then, obliged to ask your Assistance in Sending Us Peons; which we Still recommend to Your Compliance.

The Graham Arrived here the 11th. Septr. having first touched at St. Helena and Betavia. She Sail'd from Spithead the 19th. February in Company with the Stafford the York and St. George for China, the Anson for Persia and Bombay and the Heathcote for Mocha. The Eastcourt, the Cæsar, the Colchester, the Winchester, and the Benjamin all for Coast and Bay, were intended to Sail some time in March in Company with three Men of Warr, and the other India Ships; but as We imagine the Unwelcome News of the Loss of Madrass arrived In England before their Departure, it may probably have detained them somewhat Longer, or perhaps, Altered the Honourable Company's Disposition.

The Grantham is now going to receive the Pepper of the Nothern Ports, and will be dispatched home in proper time.

The Reverend Mr: Ryder, who came out for Fort St. George On the Bombay Castle, and requested Liberty to remain upon Our Establishment, takes Passage on this Ship and has Received his Pay to Ulto. September, Mr. Fordyce our late Chaplain upon his quitting the Place, took with him the Register Book of Death's, Mairiages &ca. we must [t]herefore request Your Worship &ca. to Order the Delivery of it, and to transmitt it to Us by the first Opportunity, reserving an Attested Copy of it in case of Accident. The Reverend Mr. Burges who is appointed Chaplain here and Arrived On the Grantham expressed a good deal of Surprize at the above proceeding.

Captain Jacob having presented us a Petition and Indent for Some Stores for the Use of the Ship, We have caused what part of them We could Spare to be deliver'd him and enclosed is the Storekeepers Account of the Particulars. We have also at his request Advanced him the Sum of (800) Eight hundred Spanish

Dollars to discharge two Months Imprest to the Ships Crew amounting to (1098) Rupees and to Purchase those Things we could not Supply him with at Betavia, having as he Assured us no Stock belonging to the Ship, nor a Sufficiency of Provisions for the People and for the Disbursements of which he is to Account with Your Worship &c<sup>a</sup>. upon his Arrival at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David, Enclosed comes his first Receipt for the Same.

We do not Observe in Your Invoice of the Price Goods Princess Augusta that you have made any Charge for the Allowance of Freight Usually brought to the Credit of the Hoñble Company's Ships Accounts upon the like Occasion, We cannot therefore insert it in our Invoice home, lest the Credit allowed by Us should not agree with your Books.

We have therefore wrote them a Letter as We are inform'd by Captain Jacob he had none from Your Worship &c\*. We hope It will prove a means of his Obtaining the Necessaries wanted and prove agreeable to Your Sentiments.

Having in a Former Letter \$\mathbb{P}\$ Sloop Success requested a Parcell of Fanams and Cash to the Amot. of about four thousand Dollars We beg Leave to remind Your Worship!! &c\*. of it as that kind of Money will be very Usefull for Currant Change among the Mallays and for the Reasons Specified therein.

By this Conveyance comes the remainder of the Iron sent out on the Norfolk Vizt. One thousand and thirty Bars which with the Twelve hundred laden On Board the Sloop Success make the whole Quantity of Fifty Tons received here accepting two Bars which were Stolen during its Continuance at Pooloo Bay. And the Persons concerned Still Undiscovered We cannot therefore ascertain the Weight. We

When Captain Edward Jacob Comm<sup>r</sup>. of the Princess Augusta, returned to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, In the Year 1745 from this Coast, he left a Parcell of Goods in the Hands of M<sup>r</sup>. John Cranmer and myself to be disposed of on his Account, and drew up a Letter appointing Us his Attorney's. We accordingly acted as such in the Sale of Part of the said Goods, when upon the News of that Ships being taken by Angria & that Captain Jacob was killed in the Engagement, his Creditors put a Deamand into the Mayors Court at Madrass, and procured an Order of the Said Court, to Attack Captain Jacob's Effects in Our Hands for their Use with Directions to remit the produce from time to time as it Should come in, whether by Bills or otherwise to the said Court. This Order We esteemed ourselves Obliged to obey & in Consequence of it, Adjusted Captain Jacobs Account to the Departure of the Ship Sumatra In July 1746 when by that Conveyance We remitted An Account Sales & Account Current with the Ballance thereof Amounting to Dollars Three Thousand Seven hundred & Thirty Eight One Suca & Fifty Cash.

Part in Gold a Part in Dollars which to my Concern was all lost when the Ship fell in the Enemy's Hands & Enclosed your Worship &ca. will receive an attested Copy of that Bill of Lading.

Upon Captain Jacob's Arrival here this time, he desired me (Mr. Cranmer the other Attorney being returned to Europe) to Settle all Accounts with him, Pay him the Remainder due and return him what Goods were Unsold, but Considering that by Virtue of the aforementioned Order of the Mayors Court, I was Obliged to remit the whole to them, and as I was entirely unadvised by any of his Creditors, in what manner he had Satisfied them, I desired to be excused from complying with his Demand; rather Chusing to obey the said Order for my Own Security, I have therefore now Laden on this Ship Princess Augusta the Sum of Three Thousand Six hundred Ninety five Dollars, Two Sucas, & Ten Cash; which is all the Money and produce of Effects in my Hands excepting a Note from One Timothy Tolley Now at Betavia or elsewhere and another of Adam Syrang, both which amount to Dollars Two hundred fifty & Two Sucas, and I am Apprehensive will be a long time before, or perhaps never recovered. Equity It gives me no Small uneasiness, that our Joint Security renders it a Duty incumbent on me to request Your Worship &ca. Cognizance of this Affair at so unsettled a Juncture, when the Honble Company's Affairs ought not to be interrupted by any private Consideration whatever but I am inclined to hope for your Generous Mediation, & I dare say the Creditors cannot but be Satisfied with the Impartial Distribution You may please to Make.

When Captain Jacobs Arrived here I was at my Residency of Tallo from whence I came up wth. the Permission of the Governour & Council, but the Ships Stay was so Short that it was not in my Power to provide the Necessary Papers to Accompany his Remittance, but Shall not fail to remit them with the Declarations I have made of the Risque of an Account of my Proceedings with regard to the Sale of the Goods for the Brillant or first Vessell bound to the Coast.

You will observe by the Account Currant which also comes Inclosed that we have Advanced Cantain Lessly, agreeable to his Letter of request One Thousand Spanish Dollars for Repairs and Expences of the Ship, for which he is to Account with You.

We are sorry to advise your Worship &ca. that in sending Off the Plank there has been fifteen lost, (we beleive the most part marked 111) occasioned by a Squal of Wind and a large Swell that came on of a Sudden which Seperated the Raft and drove them from the Ship.

Inclosed is Captain Lessly's receipt to Captain Pelly for tenn Chaldron of Coales & thirty Deals that were designed for Fort St. George on the Prince of Wales, but when her Passage was altered were omitted to be put on Shore. As We think it for Our Honble Masters Interest they Should be sent to Fort St. David we have advised Captain Lessly to take them On Board.

We have had everything On board this fortnight except five Timbers which the badness of the Weather prevented our getting Off; the reason of the Ships n[ot] Sailing so soon, has been Occasioned by a request, the General made Captain Lessly to Stay a few days in Expectation of an Advice Boat from Holland with the News of the Prince of Orange being Statholder of the United Provinces the Consequence of which he Apprehends would be their entering into a Warr with France.

Our Honble Masters Ship Brilliant Captain John Byers, & the Fanny Captain Renny arrived here the 16th. Instant from Fort Marlbro.

We have advice from Canton by a Junck lately arrived here that there were twenty Europe Ships in the River as follows. Eight English, Six Dutch, four Sweeds, & two Danes, & that all Sorts of China goods proper for Europe were at a very extravagant Price.

The Bussoro Ship that is Arrived at Fort St. David was freighted by Coja Menos de Elias, and other Armenian Merchants of my Nation I have likewise a Factor Named Johannes Gregory that is come upon this Ship. She was freighted in Calcutta with these Portugueze and loaded there with Goods for Bussoro. She Sailed for Bussero from Calcutta. When this Vessell Sailed, the Honble Commander was then at Bengall, and then Every Body knew what She was, & where She was going; wherefore why was She not then Condemn'd? This Vessell left Calcutta in a publick manner, and Sailed directly for Bussero wth. Portugueze Colours.

This Ship neither came from any of the Enemy's Ports, nor was going into any of them. This is the very Same Ship that left Bengall In the Honble Commodores Sight, and has not been Exchang'd for any other. If She had been Suspicious of anything, She would have gone directly to Bengall, & not come this way, but She Confided in belonging to the English Merchants, and in having departed from One of their Ports.

All her Cargoe belongs to the English Merchants of Calcutta and Madrass, And not only they, but the Moors of Arcott and Bengall, of Bussero and of Persia are concerned in this Ship.

I have been informed, that She is going to be Confiscated by the Honble Commodore. I dont know, nor can I conceive upon what right this is founded, and I am not a little Surprized at it.

You know very well that we Armenian Merchants have been for 60 or 70 Years Inhabitants of Madrass and Calcutta and you may See in the Company's Books what a Vast Sum the Company have got by Us in Customs &ca. When you consider these things, and besides this, the Honble Company have given a Priviledge to us, which in a few days I will send to you to peruse.

The Honble Company have desired the favour of the King of England, to Send Ships of Warr here to take Satisfaction of their Enemy's, Protect their Settlements, and those that live under them, and to deliver them from their Enemys. Now the Men of Warr, have began to Confiscate the Effects of the English Merchants and Inhabitants which Surprizes me not a little, to think, what Sort of Justice this is. I cant understand it.

We Armenians have Suffer'd great Losses by the Enemy's of the English, but we dont think of all that which is passed; but always ask of God to assist and Strengthen the English, & to See Madrass and the English Flag again restored. This to us will be a great Satisfaction, and in a Short time we Shall gain recover our Losses. As to what we have lost by the Enemy, we have forgot it. But now the Englis Men of Warr, are going to ruin us, and instead of Assisting us begin to destroy us. In this Ship all Nations that are Concerned, will make great Clamours, and there is now a great Noise about it every where. God forbid this loss Should fall upon the Honble Company, as it will Occasion a great deal of trouble to all the English Factories. And this will be a very bad Credit to the English Nation.

All that I now write to you, I would not have you imagine, is upon the Account of my being Concern'd in this Ship. Even if I loose as much again, as I have already done, it will be Satisfaction enough for me, to See the English Affairs again restablished. It is my Duty to impart these things to you and your Council, because you are President for the Company. Therefore be pleased to consider of it. Because when the Men of Warr shall have done, they will go home, and you will

Stay, to act for the Honble Company. Therefore it is better to prevent in time what may happen in future. Don't Imagine this is good Success for ye. Men of Warr, but take care that the Company may not Suffer for it in time to come.

You may remember that my Lord Northesk took a Ship which belonged to the French, called the Chardinagor, with french Colours, and brought her to Calcutta, upon which She Shew'd Moors Colours. She had upward of Lack of Rups. The Nabob Sent to demand that Ship with her Cargoe, and there was a great Noise about it. The Company's Agents at Calcutta were Obliged to give my Lord Nor-

thesk (50,000) Rupees, on the Company's Account. They freed the Ship and Car-

goe, and put her in the Moors hands.

Thus it happened in regard to that Ship. You must Consider that there will be a great Noise about this Ship, on all hands. Consider, and take care that the Company dont Suffer, because the Honble Companys Order is, that all their Factories in Indie keep a Strict friendship with the Lords of the Country, and that with great Policy too, and that they must not be disputed with, because all the Companys contract is within Land, and that must not be impeded. I am a Son and a friend of the Company's, and it is more than 40 Years Since I have been in Madrass, Under the English Flag. It is my Obligation to Acquaint you of this and your Council, for which reason do not take amiss the Liberty.

Likewise I beg the Favour of a Speedy Answer, and your Sentiment of the Case because I design to write, by the way of Persia to the Honble Company In England and to the Admiralty and if Need be to the King himself. And will prove by the General Consent of the Protentates in India, & the King of Persia that the said Ship is not a lawfull Prize. I am with all Submission,

As the Kent was got safe to the Cape and the Marlbro and the Salisbury gon safe round we hope they will arrive safe in great Britain and that the Lapwing has done the same.

Give us leave to Congratulate you Gent: on our Honble Masters favour of making Fort St. David the Presidency, and Confirming you in your Posts, and Major Stringer Lawrence in his seat at your board.

The 8th. Instant we recd a Letter from the Commodore & Council at Cochin much to the same purport as that you recd from the Governour &c2. of Negepatam which we answer'd in the same Manner.

We are glad to hear that the Exeter is safe returned. The last Advices we had from Tellicherry say that the St. Louis lies a Shore at Mahie, and that a hard Gale of Wind which came on the 4th. Instant did great Damage On this Coast half filled her with water which we hope has rendered her incapable of ever being repaired, It is reported that a Dutch Ship from Cochin & Moor Ship belonging to Cannanore were lost in that Gale. and a Vast number of Country Vessells. A New Sloop of Our Houble Masters and a small Schooner belonging to this Place both lost the former lost five men, two of them Europeans, the latter had the good fortune to Save all her People.

We have been favoured with yours under Date of the 19<sup>th</sup>. August and 5<sup>th</sup>. October to both of which we shall now reply.

As to our Fortifications We are doing the utmost in our Power with the few hands We have got to compleat them in the best manner, possible, for the Defence of Ourselves and Our Honble Masters Settlement.

The Grantham of whose Arrival We Advised You by the Princess Augusta has received on board her Charterparty Tonnage, inclusive of the Bales sent us from the Coast on Account of the Honble Company, Captain Wilson having Petitioned us for One hundred Tons Surplus Pepper, We have granted his request upon the Usual Conditions of half Freight, and shall be able to dispatch the said Ship in a few days without incurring any Demorage.

Agreeable to your Worship &c\*. Permission We have granted Certificates to the Attorney's of Robert Lennox Esq\*, payable to himself or Order for the Sum of \$\mathbb{B}\$ 4500 Four thousand five hundred Spanish Dollars paid into the Honble Companys Cash here.

We are entirely of Oppinion that the sending of a Person properly Qualified to Reside at Betavia during the present uncertain Situation of Affairs in India, will be greatly conducive to the Interest of Our Honble Masters, and have in consequence thereof appointed Mr. Thomas Combes our Youngest in Council to that Station, with Orders to transmitt by every safe Confeyance the most early Intelligence as to the Motions of the Enemy both to the Coast and our own Settlement, And as Mr: Combes does not at present enjoy the most perfect State of Health, We hope that the Change of Air will greatly contribute to the Establishment thereof.

The Fanams you were pleased to send us, not proving of a proper Sort, We have now returned them according to your Order, and have enclosed You a Muster of the sort We request you to send us by the first Conveyance /Vizt./ to the amount of about Six or Eight Thousand Pollars with the Fanams /of which four hundred makes a Dollar/ to the amount of four or five hundred Dollars.

We further desire You would send us Thirty Bales Long Cloth White, and Ten Corage Combay's Blue for the Use of the Slaves.

The Reverend Mr. Ryder left this place the 18th. October and took his Passage on the Princess Augusta who Sailed the same Day for Betavia.

Mr. Charles Hampton is safely Arrived and Ordered to take his Standing upon this Establishment.

We have been carefull to Observe your Directions as to the Payment of Customs for Goods sold by Captain Rannie, for the Consumption of this and all other Places within the Jurisdiction of the Honourable Company.

The Salt which Captain Rannie had on board for Account of his Owners We have Purchased at the rate of \$ 25 Twenty five Spanish Dollars \$ Coyan.

Your Worship &ca. will receive this Letter by our Honble Masters Snow Brillant on board of which Vessell We have loaded the Fanams abovementioned together with four Chests of Opium /as # Invoice and Bill of Lading enclosed/sent us by the Gov<sup>r</sup>. and Council of Fort William, by the Fanny, its proving so extreamly bad, and the Farmer of that Commodity absolutely refusing to take it. We are Oblig'd to return it by this Conveyance; As We had some Remaining upon the Place of a good sort the Farmer chose rather to take it at an Advanc'd Price. Otherways the Honourable Company would have been in danger of losing that deliver'd him here for the Use of the Brillant.

At Captain Byer's request We have advanced him \$ 300 Three hundred Spanish Dollars for which he is to be accountable to Your Worship &c\*. as \$\mathbb{P}\$ enclosed receipt, You will also receive Our Storekeepers Account of Necessarys deliver'd him here for the Use of the Brillant.

We have nothing further to Add at Present, but to assure You that We are with the greatest Esteem.

in 26, fathom off of the Nassaw Island & found the Current sett S.E.tSo: 4 Knotts by our Logg with which Weigh'd and having some favourable Squal's got in Shore and in Sight of Bencoolen Flag where I made my proper Signal web, was Answered by the Fort and Captain Wilson's Ship then in the Road, I arrived here September the 27th, the reason of meeting with Calm's & so much Rain was my Sailing too Soon from Fort St. David having the Sun near Our Zenith all the way or when came near the line. The Morning after I left Fort St. David I saw a Ship to leward bearing about NNEt, we then going SEt. Wind at S.Wo. fresh I immediately hall'd Close on a Wind and out Reifs for so I was going before, I saw the Ship at Noon but at a greater distance And by 3 PM was out of Sight from Mast head when Night alter'd my Coarse More Et. (& so got from her, for, I am certain she gave

me Chace my carrying so much Sail Sprung Our Main Top Mast another of which I got here of Captain Wilson for which paid him 40 Dollars. the Ship we Saw I conjecter'd might be the Princess Amelia but whether or no I cant say. I have receiv'd the Chest of Treasure according to Instructions likewise the 800 Dollars 6 of which is 2 Months Imprest Ours being out the last of September the remaining 200 to defray Charges &ca. Expences at Batavia Our Bales all turned out right and well Conditioned and was put On board Captain Wilson in the Road who Sail'd for Mocho Mocho the 8th. Instant I have just received my dispatches from the Governour & Council here in Order to proceed to Betavia where I shall with the greatest diligence transact my Commission with the least Expence to the Honourable Company if possible and beg your Honour will beleive that I shall make all dispatch as possible, and with great regard follow all Orders mentioned in my dispatches and that I am With great Respect

The St. Lewis Still lays in Mahie road, but it is our Oppinion she will never be able to put to Sea, as the Monsoons hitherto has greatly Damaged her, having Started two Plank near the Keel and She is so much Sunk in the Mudd that the Sea washes over her both a head & a Midship, and by the Account we have She is continually full of Water.

We learn that the Ship St. Antonis Alma Santa Antonio Caiton Decampo Commander coming out of Goa, was lost in the Storm last Month and drove a Shore near the Alguada few of her Crew being Saved.

A Ship under Armenian Colours called the Mombarrack mosul Richd Tinly Commr. which lost her Passage to Bussorah, winter'd at Cochin and from thence will proceed early in the Season for Bussorah, and as we learn the said Tinly has for many Years past Sailed always In the French Service, and being married to the late Director of Charnigurs Sister, we therefore are Apprehensive that the said Ship may belong to the common Enemy, & desire you will communicate the same to the Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Squadron, as likewise the Letter we received from the Commodore and Council of Cochin Copy of which we transmitted your Honour &ca. the 18th. 14th. October attack'd in 47. 49 No. Lattitude from Cape Finister 1 12 West, by his Majestys Ships under the Command Rear Admiral Howke, who after a resolute and bold resistance, Oblig'd the Six Capital Ships to Strike Vizt.

I am Obliged by your Honour &ca. favour of the 21th. April, enclosing Invoice Ten Thousand Rupees and a Chest of Stationary Ware, sent by True Briton to Vizagapatam; I some time since wrote Mr. Prince, if any Money came to his hands for the Use of this place, to forward me some immediately that I might lose no time in going on with my Investment; which he complied with, but hearing soon after that the Nabob was coming this way (a thing very unexpected at this Season of the Year) and not knowing how his affairs may go on in these parts, I kept only Two Thousand Rupees, and sent the rest back again. till I am Satisfied I can employ it with Security, I know I lose a very good Opportunity of making Cloth Cotton, and Grain being Cheap, but the Severe treatment, I met wth. from the late Nabob, will ever make me Cautious, how I proceed, while the Nabob, and Rajahs, are at Variance.

I from time to time acquainted the President of Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, with the troubles that Subsisted here, in the Months of May, June & July 1746 and the Consequences of them, M<sup>r</sup>. Hinde likewise was afterwards made acquainted with the Usage, I had received from the Nabob, and the Money that was forced from me, but that your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. may have a clearer light into the Affair, I have requested M<sup>r</sup>. Morse to lay before you Copys of what I have wrote him on this Subject.

Though I cannot Charge my self, with contributing any way to the loss of this Money, or omitting any possible means for the recovery of it, yet it gives me the greatest concern, such an Accident should happen at this place, so soon after its Settlement however, I am not without my hopes, that a good part of it, may yet be recover'd.

It is strongly reported within these few days, that this Nabob is going away, and will be Succeeded by a Grandson of AnaWardee Cawn, which will prove a happy Exchange for the Country; so soon as I see things rightly Settled that I can go on wth. an Investment with any tolerable Security, I shall lose no time in doing it, conformable to your Instructions.

Your Honour &ca. are pleased to Order me to cure what Cloth I can, which I should have done before had it been practicable, but here are no Washers, and if there were, here is no Water, without making a Tank On purpose. I am with the greates[t] Esteem

I have received the Answer you have been pleased to give to my Letter concerning the Bussorah Ship and as I am now Sensible from it, That its Affair is entirely foreign to your Province, & that nothing can be done with regard to it, in this Part of the World, I have now only, to desire the favour of your Honours that you will be pleased to represent it, to England, and lay it, before the Court of Directors, as I have already done, with Copies of all my Letters, & their Answers thereunto which Admiral Griffin & your Honours have given, that the World may See on which Side, is the more Justice. I beg leave Once more, to Assure Your Honours, that my interesting myself in this Affair, does not proceed from any private View's, tho my Concerns in that Ship are considerable, but a sincere Regard, for the Credit, and Interest of the English Nation and of the Honble Company.

I hope your Honours will be pleased to entertain this favourable Oppinion of me, begging at the same time the Liberty to recommend to your favours, Minas de Elias and Johannes Gregory two very Honest Men, and to look upon me, as

Honbile Sir & Sirs

By our Honble Masters Ship Oxford which imported here the 29<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo in her way to Betavia We received Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. favour under date of the 13<sup>th</sup>. February as also the Several Articles You were pleased to Send for the use of Our Settlement, all of which turn'd out agreeable to Invoice.

Conformable to Your Honour &ca. request We have Laden On Board this Ship two Chests Treasure as Invoice and Bill of Lading, towards purchasing a returning Cargoe, This was realy the utmost We could do, for upon Examination We find the Ballance of Cash will Scarcely be Sufficient to Supply the Current Expences of this Place untill the Arrival of Our Storeship supposing her to be with Us in Due time, and in case any Accident Should protract her Passage, the Consequence may prove very prejuducial [[sic]] to the Interest of Our Honble Masters, more Especially to their Honours investments of Pepper.

We are very Sorry for the Loss of the Sloop Success, and the more so as She would have been of great Use to the Honble Company on many Occasions upon this Coast, having but one Sloop at present that the [sic] can Employ. Mr. Combes has our Orders to purchase a Vessell at Betavia proper for the Service of this place &ca. but as Yet he has not been able to procure One. To hear that the late Designs of the French against your Honour &c. Settlement have been frustrated, & Commodore Griffins Squadron reinforced, together with ye. Arrival of Several of Our Honble Masters Ships upon the Coast affords Us the greatest Satisfaction imaginable, & We hope that whatever attempts the french may think proper to make against any of the Honourable Companys Settlement in India will prove Abortive.

We think ourselves much oblig'd to Your Honour &ca. for transmitting us so particular an Account of the Defeat of a French Squadron in Europe by Admiral Anson; A Squadron destined not only to Disturb the Tranquility of our Peace, but also Intended to give a Total over throw to the commerce of our Honourable Employers in India, As they have been very Seasonably met with, and the Execution of their Pernicious Designs against Us prevented, there is great Reason for Us to hope We shall meet with no further Disturbance from that Quarter.

On the 3<sup>d</sup>. Current Arrived in our Road the Sloop Friendship from Betavia, which M<sup>r</sup>. Combes has Dispatched hither with a Small Supply of Rice and Arrack, by the Sloop We received a farther conformation of the good News Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. were pleased to send us together with the Addition of some other Advices, which we have herein taken the Liberty to transmitt for Your Perusal.

Mr. Combes in his Letter by the above mentioned Sloop tells us, that upon his Arrival at Betavia he found there The Princess Augusta and was immediately informed that Capt. Jacob was Dead & that the Officers on Board had in General a very Indifferent Character, whereupon he proposed and prevailed with Captain Lessly to resign the Commd. the Princess Augusta to Captain Byers and to take Charge of the Brillant Persuant to this Proposition the two Captains agreed to Exchange Ships, but Capt. Lessly being soon after otherwise Advised instead of putting it in execution went on Board and Sailed away but meeting with Contrary Winds, and things being ill conducted, they were Obliged to put back on the 13th. February having been out about Twenty Days, and had Lost an Anchor and Cable Mr. Combes procured them another Anchor and Cable and a Coyan of Rice, & moreover desired Captain Byers to Stay a few Days and take them in Company with him, he wrote also to Captain Lessly desiring him to keep in Company with the Brillant and to follow all such Order's or Directions as he might receive from Captain Byers; they both sailed from Betavia the 3d. Ulto. and We hope by this time are arrived in Safety.

The 21st. January Arrived at Betavia The Honble Company's Snow the Swallow, Captain Norton Hutchinson who left Portsmouth the 6th. August last in Company with the True Britton Prince William and Porto Bello Indiamen bound to the Coast, they all put into the Cape which they Left the 17th. November last.

Captain Hutchinson deliver'd Mr. Combes a Letter Directed to us from the Honble Court of Directors Signifying that on Fort St. George's being taken by the French they deem their late Servants there as no longer in their Service, and thereupon have constituted Fort St. David their Head Settlement for transacting all their Affairs on the Choromandell and Sumatra Coast: to this order of Our Honble Masters We shall be carefull to pay all Due Obedience.

By Mr. Combe's Letter We are told that Warr was not yet Declared between the french & Dutch, Notwithstanding which the former had proceed'd to the Seige of Bergen op Zoorm in Zeland, which was so bravely Defended that they had not been able to make themselves Masters of One Single out work the Dutch at Betavia seem to think that the French Squadron defeated by Admiral Anson was designed against the Cape or their Place. All our China Men are passed the Streights for Europe, and a Squadron of 3 or 4 Dutch Ships are very Speedily excepted [sic] In the Streights of Sunda. It is said that on Board the French fleet taken by Admiral Anson was found Twenty Waggon Loads of Silver, and that the French compute their Loss at one and half Million Sterling.

By an advice Boat from Ceylon which left that Place the latter End of January last, Mr. Combes says he had received Advice that the Apollo and Anglesea had left Bombay and were gon to Mocha.

M<sup>r</sup>. Combes Acquaints Us that Agreeable to our Orders, He has wrote to Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. by Every Opportunity and once to Commodore Griffin, informing of Every Material peice of News that came to his hands. By a Private Letter from M<sup>r</sup>. Combes We are Informed y<sup>t</sup>. sometime agoe Captain Monro was Cut Off at Johore.

The beginning last January Captain David Rannie of the Ship Fanny enter'd into a Contract with us to go to Betavia and bring a Supply of Sixty Leaguers Arrack and Sixty Coyan of Rice promising to be back by the 1st. of this present Month, but soon after his Arrival at Betavia having some other Voyage, We presume, proposed to him which he thought more Advantageous, He told Mr. Combes that it was not consistant with his owners Interest or his own to return to Marlbro; that the Contract was binding only on our Parts and that he thought himself at free Liberty to return or not, as it Suited best with his Interest, Whereupon Mr. Combes wth. great Reason protested against the said Captain David Rannie, his owners &ca. for all Costs and Damages wch. the Honourable Company may Suffer by the Nonperformance of his Contract. By this Extraordinary Proceeding of Captain Rannie's We are greatly Disapointed of the Supplies We Expected, and unless Mr. Combes dispatches another Vessell very Speedily our Settlement will be much distressed by the want of Arrack and other Necessaries.

On the 25th. November last Captain Rannie presented Us a Bill of Charges for the Passage of Twenty two Lascars from Bengal amounting to \$\mathbb{P}\$ 486. 3. 20 Four hundred Eighty Six Spanish Dollars Three Succars and Twenty Cash which We think a very unreasonable demand, especially when we Consider the Service the Lascars are of to a Commander in the working his Ship During their Passage: As We have had no convenient Opportunity of representing this Affair to the President and Council of Fort William We have taken the Liberty by this Conveyance of Mentioning it to your Honour &c\*a. to the Intent that if in future any Lascars should be sent from your Coast to this, You would be pleased to regulate the Pay for their Passage in such a manner, as to prevent Our Honble Masters being impos'd upon by any Commander hereafter.

The four French Desertors Your Honour &c\*. sent us on the Oxford We have incorporated with our Military.

As to the four felons We have recd. them also, and heartily wish Your Honour &ca. could find out a more convenient place of excile for these Sort of Criminals, for they are not only extreemly Troublesome in so Small a Settlement as this is, but also very Instrumental in Causing others, Which before were tolerably good, to be as bad, or worse than themselves.

Enclosed Your Honour &c\*. will receive Captain Thomas Stevens Receipt for the two Chests of Treasure abovementioned As also for an Anchor which we have e

Spared him Poizs. 32 Thirty two hundred Weight Valued at \$ 192 One hundred Ninety Two Spanish Dollars Under Cover you will also receive Duplicates of our Letters Princess Augusta and Brillant.

We request Your Honour &ca. would be pleased to Send us by the first Conveyance for the Use of this Settlement, Hospital Clothes, 100 one hundred Suits Betillas for Colours four Coarge White, four Coarge of Blue and four Coarge of Red.

The Secretary having paid into the Honourable Company's Cash here the Sum of \$29. 1 Twenty Nine Spanish Dollars & One Succa We have granted Certificates upon Your Honour &ca. for the same in favour of the Reverend Mr. Francis Fordice which We request you would be pleased to Honour. We are with great Esteem.

I shall Observe the Regulation made by the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam as to the Rup\*.

The death of Nizam and since that of our Nabob it was thought would Occasion Some Troubles in this Country, but nothing appears yet further than the Confinement of the Mussendar and two Rajahs, as the Jentoos may Possibly lay hold of the 1st. favourable Opportunity I shall Act with the greatest circumspection possible.

I have Invested the remittances sent me and have now packed and ready for any Conveyance that may Offer 120 Bales particulars as Undermentioned I Should have been glad to have got it cur'd but the precarious State of Affairs in these Parts render it very unsafe to trust any Cloth abroad.

June and observe what you have bee[n] pleased to write us concerning the Exchange of the Ru[pees] as they were rated to us at 350 \$ % Pagodas We thoug[ht] 37ó was full as far as We could possibly go of our own Authority and accordingly made a tender of them to the Merchants at that Exchange which they refused to receive and said they could not take them under 400 \$ % Pagodas but as the Price of Cloth has been raised of late Years We thought this so unreasonable that We determined not to go further than 375 and We flatter ourselves that Your Honour &ct. will think We have acted for the Interest of Our Honble Masters in so doing, but in case any thing should happen to prevent Your

Hon. &ct. sending the Madrass Pagodas you intend us We shall take this Affair Once more into Consideration and rather than let the Money lye unemployed try if we can't bring them to Split the Difference.

We cannot express the Satisfaction We have had in reading that Part of Your Honour &ct. Letter which informs us of the ill success of the French in their Attack upon Cuddalore; We hope the warm Reception they met with will discourage them from making any further attempts upon that Place.

As Our Honourable Masters have thought proper to appoint Mr. Prince Mr. Goodere and Mr. Westcott to the Council of Fort St. David Messrs. Prince and Westcott purpose to take the first Opportunity of repairing to their Stations and leave Mr. Goodere in Charge of the Honble Company's Affairs at this Place with Mr. Banks to Assist him as your Honour &ct. has been pleased to direct.

Captain Hutchinson having represented to us the Abso[lute necessi]ty of having our Hoñ: Masters Vessell the S[wallow Snow] speedily sheathed in order to preserve her Bottom w[hich] has already received some Damage, We thought this is a proper Time and Place to do it in, and accordingly lightned her as much as Possible but our Barr being so Choked up for want of Rain that we found it impracticable to bring her into the River, Upon this Disapointment and the certain Advices We afterwards received from Ballasore that none of the Enemy's Ships were there the 22<sup>d</sup>. Ulto. the Captain came to a Resolution of proceeding with her to the Bay, and Sailed from hence the 18<sup>th</sup>. It was the 29th. of March 'ere I reach'd Fort Marlbrough at which place after delivering the Consignments to it I Received two Chests of Treasure on Account of the Honble Company and Sailed again the 11th. of April for Betavia.

The Monsoon Setting in Sooner this Year than Usual I did not See Bantam till the 17<sup>th</sup>. of May, here I met a Ship on her way to Holland and forwarded Letters to the Honble Company, Arriving in Betavia Road the 20<sup>th</sup>.

On the 29th, of the said Month a Contract was Signed by me and Mr. Peter Garden Mercht. In Betavia for four hundred Leaguers of Arrack, to be delivered in five Weeks but from the Demand, and the Scarcity of Casks it Occasioned, I could not get them put on board Cheaper than fivety Seven Rix dollars clear of all Charges and Duty's, One of which being five dollars P Leaguer, is additional, and Laid on all Arrack put on board English Ships, Your Honours will be pleased to Observe the Measure is to be 384 of the Dutch Companys Canns Computed to Each Leaguer and the Arrack to be full Proof.

I Represented the Hardship of this New Duty to his Excellency, who Seemed Inclined to make it much Easier in that Respect, Provided the Honble Company would Contract for a Certain Quantity Annually, As I had no Power to Enter into any Engagements of this kind, I found I might as well Submit to their Duty's And leave the farther Consideration of it to your Honours.

There is a Request now lying before the Council for the Anchors & Two Bowsprights, wch. are the only Masts my Ship is Capable of Receiving unless I cut away her Stern Timbers, the Anchors wch. are to be found in their Store of the Dimentions I want may be had, but the General Seemed wavering about the Masts and Seems Surprized Your Honours had never Sent to the Ports of Columbo or Port de Gall, who have it not only in their Power but Particular directions to Supply the Squadron [with] these Articles.

The Last Advices from Europe to this Place were by the Swallow Sloop, on which Acc<sup>t</sup>. His Excellency, seems under the greatest Uneasiness.

HONBLE SIR AND SIRS

Your Several favours of the 23<sup>d</sup>. June, and 9<sup>th</sup>. Instant both reached me the 25<sup>th</sup>. agreeable to which I now send you an Account of the Stock of this Place, as likewise the last Years Books, which had come sooner but I deferr'd closing them, not knowing whether there might be any difference between the Warehousekeepers Account of the last Cloth, and the Invoice, The Duplicates shall follow in two or three days.

What reasons I had to distrust this Nabob were grounded in some Measure, on his Conduct at Chicacul, which however notorious is not to be compared with his Conduct here, as your Honour &ct. may Judge by the following hints; so soon as he Arrived at Itchaporum 500 Horse and Peons were Ordered to Stop all the Avenues to the Town; this done they Informed themselves who were worth Money in or near the place and Accordingly their Emissnaries [sic] were dispatched to bring 'em. when without giving any reason for their so doing, they demanded from One to Twenty thousand Rupees as they Judged of their Abilities and to enforce their Compliance with these demands they, (without any Respect of Persons) made use of such Extraordinary methods, as I never heard or read of amongst the most barbarous nations of the World, nor could I have beleived it had not they been practised in this Town. Upon this News I thought of retiring and as I knew if they had any designs upon me they would Stop me in my way to the Southward, I wrote the Nabob of Catack for his Cowle to Stay at Moneckapatam till the Storm was over, which he readily granted, but at the same time Inform'd me that the Morattas were more Masters of the Country than he, and that if they made any demands upon me he could not protect me, this made me give over all thoughts that way and resolve to Stand my Ground; a few days after 40 Horse and 300 Musqueteers, were sent here under pretence of making reprizals upon the Naboh and some Cutack people, whose money and goods were lodged here having blocked up the Town on all sides, they begun wth a Moors trader here, from whose house they took about 20,000 Rupees in money and Goods and a little Box wth. that Nabob's Seal upon it, said to Contain Diamonds of great Value, this business with digging, Searching, and punishing people to make them Confess where any thing was hid, took them up some days, from this they proceeded to five or Six other Houses In the Town where they thought they could get any thing Considerable, & after all were Idle enough to rob, two Towns belonging to the Catack Government, near this Place: this has Exasperated the Morattas so much, that they could hardly be restrained from coming to Plunder In these Parts they have sent Embassadours to this Nabob and demanded a large Sum of Money, how they will adjust this Affair I can not say; These Proceedings in a Government where People should fly for Frotection I beleive Your Honour &ct. will think with me is very unprecedented and Extraordinary but I presume the Death of Nizum and the Unsettled State the Affairs of the Country might be in

for some time has emboldened them to proceed thus far; Several Letters have come from Nassar Ging to call this Nabob away, but the time of his Rent wanting yet a month of its Expiration its probable he will prolong his Departure till then; beyond that he durst not; They have sent to me, for Several little things, which for Peace sake I have sent them, but Yesterday he sent to me, for 500 Peices Sallampores for Tents, in ye. usual Strain, that he would pay for them, upon which I took Occasion to let him know that he had given no Encouragement to trade, nor had I made any Sallampores since he came into the Country, and therefore could Sell None.

I am Sorry to be so prolix upon so unpleasant a Subject, but I have been thus Particular, that your Honour &ct. might have a View of the distress the Country is in under such Masters and the rather because should any Accident happen all that an Unfortunate Man, could say Afterwards might perhaps prove too little, for the Justifying of his Conduct I am with the greatest Esteem.

We have forwarded the Copy of the Letter from the Governour and Council of Negapatam to you to the Gentlemen at Hughley and have desir'd their Assistance in case We should have Need thereof who wrote us in Answer that they have Stationed their Ships at Bernagore for that purpose.
