HONBLE SIR & SIRS

My last to Your Honour &ca. bears date the 30th. November; It's with no Small pleasure I can now Acquaint You that After a long since of disquietude, the Country about us, is pretty easy, The Catack Country likewise which has been embroil'd, in War, now almost four Years, is also at peace which makes the demand for Europe Goods, in these parts very Considerable; the Necessary Indent for this Place, I have Sent enclosed, which I beg your Honble &ca. will be pleased to Comply with.

By the former Accounts I have given of the troubles here, You will judge, I have been able to do no business this last Year, and the Cloth I have on hands is so little, that its not worth the Sending, besides which as it is Reported here, that the Enemys Ships are off Ceylon, had I more I should not have sent it without Your Orders.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We wrote you last under the 15th. October, Duplicate of which is inclosed; Since which Your honour &cas. Advices of the 9th. and 21st. Septr. and 4 October have been received; the former of which the President Acknowledged to governour Floyer under the 28th. Ultimo, when he informed him of the Arrival of our long expected Ships the Durrington and Streatham at this Place.

The Essex Sailed hence the 6th. Instant directly for Great Britain, as did the Orford on the 23d. following to fill up on the Mallabar Coast.

With regard to what your honour &c**. wrote us under the 4th. Ultimo concerning Sultan Davids Affair, we shall only Observe, that Althô it is not to be doubted but your honour &c**. may be well Assured that Sultan David will not contest the Attachment of 20,000 Rupees in the Presidents Hands, Yet we wish it had been as Suitable to have got Such a Declaration under his hand before our General Discharge was deliver'd up, Conformable to our Request under the 22d. July last; However, as the Term of Six months, which the Law allows for Exceptions to be given in by the Defendant to an Attachment, expires, this day, we Shall pray the Mayors Court for a Decree in the Honble Company's Favour.

The City of Surat Still continues in Trouble and Confusion, on Account of the Contest between Meah Atchund and Suffdar Cawn for the Government thereof.

As Your People are withdrawn from the Camp, we hope Your honour &c². will be able to Send us (Agreeable to our former Request) a List of Such Persons belonging to this Presidency as would have their half Pay made good to their Families here, as likewise An Account of what Pay is due to the Detachment that came here on his Majesty's Ship Winchester, As till then we cannot make any Payments on either of those Accounts.

With regard to lading Goods on board any Ship that might be Sent to the Mallabar Coast from Your Side, we formerly proposed it to Your Honour &ca. in case of your being over burthened with Tonnage, in consequence of which Suitable Orders were then transmitted, as well as Since Repeated, to our Subordinates, and it will be found that none of our Honble Masters Ships will meet with any disappointment.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We have now before us Your favour of the 6th. Instant, Advising of Your Intentions to Send the Colchester hither for filling up with Pepper, which Shall be Complied with, having Standing Orders to load Any Ship's which may Come from Your Side. We have now Remaining in Warehouse Candies 5321. 14. 293

of Pepper, and as we don't Know of any more Ships than the Stretham and Oxford to be loaded from hence this Season, we leave it to you to Send Such others as you may judge Necessary for taking in the Remainder, which we hope will Ease you considerably of the Great Tonnage you will have on your hands when Mr. Boscawen Returns the Ships to you.

On the 11th. Instant Captain Powlett in his Majesty's Ship the Exeter arrived here, having under his Command the Harwick and Eltham, as also the Elizabeth and Brilliant Snow Captain Cummens in the Royal Duke did not reach this place 'till the next day, having Stopt at Callicut to take in Sundry Necessaries for the men of War After being Supplied with Water and fresh provisions for their people, they all Sailed for Bombay the 17th. following.

Enclosed is three Receipts from Cap^t. Powlett Amounting to Rupees Six thousand nine hundred fifty five and eighty Reas (Rupees 6955 — 80) for what Supplied his Majesty's Ships, while here, which please to Recover of the Admiral, As we Shall debt your Presidency for the Same.

The 19th. Ultimo the De Lawarr Capt. William Steevens Arrived here, and agreeable to Your Honour &cas. Orders we put on board her three hundred Candies of Sandall Wood, and Consigned the same to Her Supra Cargoes, whom we Acquainted with our proceedings in regard to the Dispatch of that Ship, enclosing them all Necessary papers. She did not Sail from hence till the 1st. Instant.

On the 3^d. Instant Our Honourable Master's Ships Orford and Stretham Imported here from Bombay, the former of which we dispatched to Anjengo the next day to fill up for Europe, and the latter to Bombay the 16th. following, with Pepper, and such part of their Several Indents as She Could take.

We must now Acquaint Your Honour &ca. of Angria's Fleet Cruising off this place, with Seven Grabs and a great Number of Gallivats the 16th. the Men of Warr exchanged a few Shot with them, but were not able to get nigh enough to do them any Damage. They were Seen the 19th. in the Morning Standing to the Southward, upon which the Chief Sent Letter's to Anjengo and Cochin Directed to Capth. Steevens of the Oxford, Advising him thereof, as he had done before, of their being off Mount Dilly, which we hope will reach him, and by it prevent, any Accident which might otherwise happen.

Mr. Douglas in a private Letter to the Chief Advices the Arrival of Ships Colchester and Oxford at Callicut the 13th. Instant and their leaving that Place the 14th. following, but they are not as yet in Sight.

Angria who has been Cruising between this place and Cochin for Sometimepast is now Gone to the Northward with his whole Fleet without having taken any thing.

We fully Acquainted Your Honour &c*. in our last of all Material Occurrences So that we have at present no more than Assure You of our being.

Honble Sir & Sirs

We wrote You last under the 28th. November Duplicate of which is enclosed; and on the 2^d. Instant received your Honour &ca. favour of the 14th. November Brilliant Snow, which came from Tellicherry under Convoy of his Majesty's Ships Exeter, Harwich, and Eltham, with the Honble Compys Ships Royal Duke, & Elizabeth, under Command of Captain Paulet; which Squadron is at present refitting here.

When the Brilliant is properly repaired She Shall be returned conformable to Your Request.

Since we wrote You last our Chief & Factors at Surat found it absolutely Necessary for the preservation of the Hoūble Company's Effects and Factory's in that City, to join Such People as we had there to those of the Government and Principal Merchants Against Suffdar Cawn; who After two or three Skirmishes Obliged him to Surrender Himself, with his Guns Ammunition &ca. to the Gov. Meah Atchund: But Suffdar Cawn not caring to continue there Requested a Passage on one of our Grabs to Scindy; which being also Strenously entreated by the Government and all the Principal Inhabitants our Chief and Factors thought themselves Obliged to Consent thereto: But the Vessell meeting with hard Weather upon that Coast the Commander at his pressing Request put into this Port, when Suffdar Cawn came ashore, having been promissed protection by the President, with Liberty to go away when and where he pleases. Thus Stands Affairs in that City, thô from the Weakness of the Mogull Government (And there are not wanting those inclined to make an ill use of it for their private Advantages) there is too much reason to Apprehend fresh Troubles will Arise.

We hope Speedily to be Acquainted what Ships will be discharged his Majesty's Service, that we may comply with the Honble Company's Orders concerning them, which are "to Act According to the Circumstances and Situation of their Affairs, "by dispatching some of them with proper Cargoes home as fast as can be, Send-"ing others to Bengall or Fort St. David."

From what we wrote You last Your Honr. &c. will Observe we had no reason to expect any Disappointment on the Mallabar Coast in loading Goods on board any Ship from Your Side; but we are Since to our Admiration informed that the Chief and Factors at Anjengo committed an egregious Error in not ordering the Oxford from Gallee, especially as Your Honour &c. Directions were so clear for Sending her to Tellicherry in case they had not Goods to load her; And they were informed of the Cessation of Arms; However Mr. Byfeld remedied that mistake, by transmitting the Commander Orders to proceed directly to Tellicherry, and Sent the Orford, being a small Ship, and partly loaden, to take in the Goods lying at Anjengo. Upon Captain Steevens requesting People to Navigate his Ship home, we Supply'd him accordingly, and whom he will receive at Tellicherry.

We are preparing to Dispatch the Streatham to Great Britain.

Our last Letter to Your Honour &c. bore date the 17th. Instant, and late last Night Arrived here An Express Boat from Bombay who brought us a Letter from the Honble President & Council, Acquainting us that they intend to send home the Stretham directly from thence, by which Step (after loading Ships Oxford and Colchester) we shall have no further Demands on us for Pepper than only three hundred Candies (Cas. 300) for the Durrington. Our Remains in Warehouse this day is five Thousand three hundred twenty two Candies Eight Maunds twenty md. 1b.

Nine pounds and three quarters (Cas. 5322. 8. 29\frac{3}{4}) but as you have not Sent as any Calculate of Tonnage of either the Oxford or Colchester we Cannot pretend to say what may remain after Loading those Ships therefore must leave it to You to Send Such others as you may judge Necessary.

The Colchester And Oxford have been in Sight these two days but are not yet Arrived Owing to the Strong N.W. we have had lately.

The Winchelsea Arrived here the 24th. After a tedious passage we have given her the greatest dispatch we could and inclosed is Invoice and Bill of Lading for 164 Bales of Callicoes Amount^g. to Pagodas 12092. 6. 2 exclusive of the Madepollam Chay Goods.

With this comes copy of our Books ending April 1748.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

This Dispatches the Winchelsea with 150 Bales of Callicoes on Account & Risque of the Honourable Company, for which Invoice and Bill of Laden come Inclosed; I am Sorry I have to Acquaint Your Honour &c. that in Order to give her a quick Dispatch (as She Arrived So very late) I had provided a Small Vessell that carried above 200 Bales which with three Boats that carry from 50 to 60 Bales more was in Great hopes of Dispatching her in four or five days at furthest, But to my great Misfortune after the Boats had made 2 Trips on board with 116 Bales & were going down the River in company with the Vessell as the last Trip & Violent Squall of Rain with Wind came on & After that another which lasted altogether above 5 Hours & has Damaged 200 Bales so much that I could not think of Sending them on board without their being all Unpack'd & dryd well in the Sun, which must have detained the Ship at least Six or 7 days longer, So that I thought it wou'd be proper to dispatch her with the few that escap'd the Rain & have wrote to Vizagapatam for their Advice wether [sic] I shall Send the remaining Bales by the first Opportunity that offers to Your Honour &c. or wait Your Orders About them. The Factory lying many Miles from the Sea & having nothing but open Boats with Cadjan Matts to cover the Bales, that Such an unforseen Accident Could not well have been avoided, & I hope Your Honour &c. will not think it any Neglect or missconduct [sic] of mine.

Mr. Saunders Arrived at Vizagapatam the 29th. December when I deliver'd over to him the care of that Settlement Cash & 164 Bales of Callicoes together with the Several Books And Papers designed for England; The Ingeram Books for the Year 1747 Mr. Saunders carried with him to Vizagapatam and I suppose takes this Opportunity of forwarding them to your Honour &ct.

I have received Your Several favours of the 21st. November 2 December and 16th. January with Duplicate of what wrote me by the Ingeram Boat, who is not Yet Arrived; Account Current Fort St. David Shall be Credited for the sundries she has been Supply'd with, and for the batta & Charges remittance on the 5000 pagodas to Vizagapatam,

Your Honour &c^t. may be Assur'd I shall give the Grain Merchants all the encouragement Possible & my best endeavours shall not be wanting to procure Wheat, but I believe impractable; for it was by mear [sic] Chance & with great difficulty M^r. I send You this to Acquaint You, that having used my Utmost Endeavours to get round the Island of Zeyloan, And proceed on my Voyage to Tellicherry, I could never get farther to the Southward then Nine Degrees & a half. I made point Pedra Tuesday the 7th. Currt. was Close in with the Shoals off that point, the wind being to the Southward of East, was Obliged to stand to the Northward to get Clear of it, And then to the Southward Again, with fine Little Gales of wind, but the Current so Strong Against me that I lost Ground daily, Yet I made the Island two or three times Anchored under it for 36 Hours, in hopes of a Change of wind or Current, but neither of them Shifting I weighed Again, Since which have drove to the Northward So farr that I could but Just reach this port where I Arrived this day and Anchored, for had I kept the sea with these winds a few days more I should have been driven to the Northward of FORT ST. DAVID, Should the Wind Yet Change in my favour I shall not wait for your Answer to this, but proceed on Conformable to my Orders, but if I find I cannot, Shall waite here untill I have Your farther Oders, I am with the Greatest respect.

Enclosed is Duplicate of our last under the 14th. Instant P Cuddalore Sloop, and on the 20th. the President received a Letter from Governour Floyer dated the 2^d. Ultimo, wherein he desires to know whether we would have any of the eight Companys Ships that would be returned by the Admiral, sent this way, as he Knows not well otherwise how to dispose of them.

When we wrote Your Honour &ca. in August last, that there would be twelve hundred Tons of Pepper on this Coast to Spare, for such Ships as you should think Proper to send for it, we expected the Doddington might Arrive here in time to be dispatched home this Season, and Allowed Accordingly for that Ship in the Calculate we then made; But On receipt of Your Advices of the 14th. December last We Ordered the Chief and Factors at Tellicherry, immediately to inform you what Quantity of Tonnage they Should have remaining after the Dispatch of the Oxford and Colchester, as mentioned in the inclosed Duplicate; and upon receipt of their Advices You then doubtless came to a Resolution whether to send for such Surplus Tonnage, or otherwise, As you judged most Suitable, as before this can possibly reach You it will probably be too late in the Season for You to dispatch any Ship to Tellicherry.

We are in expectation of receiving Your Directions concerning the Royal Duke and Elizabeth, the Commanders of both which Ships have lately informed us of their having Iron on board, which we believe will turn to best Account here, notwithstanding we have on hand fifty Tons from the Delawar, And the Doddington may probably bring a large Quantity. The Commander of the Royal Duke says She is to proceed from Your Coast to China, and, in such Case, if You think proper, she may have Cotton, and Some of the new Crop of Pepper for her Voyage, and probably Some Sandall Wood; but we shall be in want of Silver to compleat her Stock, and therefore we judge that ship must be returned to Your Presidency. The Elizabeth we at present have thoughts of sending to the Bay with Cotton and some Pepper, Ordering her first to you, except your honour &ca. shall in the interim think proper to direct us Otherwise.

As Yet we have received no further Orders from the Honble Court of Directors than mentioned in our Letter of the 10th. Ultimo but it may be Supposed You have 'ere this can be received; from whence we are in daily expectation of receiving Such Advices in regard to the two Abovementioned Ships, and what else Your Honour &ca. shall judge necessary.

Please to Observe to Credit this Presidency for the Papper [sic] As well as Gun powder sent by the Cuddalore Sloop, and not Tellicherry Factory for the former, as erroneously mentioned in our Letter by her, and the enclosed Duplicate of it.

The Box of Tea Musters was deliver'd to us for our Guidance, but we, in the Streights of Sunda Opening the Box, And judging from the Several Cannisters of Tea of each Number, that those Gentlemen had deliver'd us all the Musters which had been sent them, conceived it absolutely necessary to return the Remainder, After taking enough of them for our Governance, Seeing the Inconvenience which would Arise both to you, & them (without the Musters) if any Teas Should be brought to you, and A few days After we met with, as we thought, a good Opportunity; These Musters I hope have been Safely received, and some of them forwarded to you; The Gentlemen of Fort Marlborough say in their Letter to us, that they believe it will be highly Acceptable to our Honble Masters if we can prevail upon any of the Armenians, or Portuguese to carry the wanted Sortments, at the laid down Prices, to Fort St. David, or their Settlement. The Opinions of those Gentlemen, and a hearty Desire to promote the Interest of my Employers.

have Occasion'd me to labour at obtaining such an Importation of Tea; The Person whom I have discoursed with on that Head is Mr. Duff whose Residence is at Maccoa, And who is the Bearer of this Letter, and finding he would much like the thing, could he be certain of selling his Cargoe, I have ventured to shew him all the Paragraphs of the beforemention'd Extract, to induce and encourage him to the Undertaking, and beleiving that no other Means could possibly determine him in Favour of it; In Consequence of which, he has promised me either by himself, or in Partnership, to take the first Opportunity to carry you a Quantity of low priced Teas, which shall be sweet and good, not Musty, or damaged, and that he shall be very ready, And willing to contract with You for Teas Yearly, and has given me a Letter to the Honble Court of Directors, informing them of his Intentions. I cannot venture to Mention more of the Extract lest things should miscarry than that the Honourable Company will give from Ten to Eleven Curr^t. Having lately received from the Agent & Council at Gombroon an Extract of Europe News we enclose Your Honour &ca. Copy thereof.

His Majesty's Ships Exeter and Eltham sailed hence the 8th. Instant for Surat and the Harwick lately hove down is preparing to follow them with all Expedition.

Honble Sir & Sirs

By the Success Galley Captain Thomas Barton, who arrived here the 23d. January, We received Your Honrs. &ca. Letter, bearing Date the 13th. Ulto. with the enclosed Copies of others, and his Majesty's Proclamation, as Specifyed therein.

We are glad to hear of the speedy Dispatch which is intended to be given the Princess Augusta; and hope she will be with Us in due Time.

The Scarcity of Rice and the Liklihood of it's continuing so, induce Us to Apply to Your Honour &c*. to be remitted a Quantity by the first Opportunity.

For these Five Months past the contagious Distemper of the Small Pox has been very fatal Amongst Us, having carried off several Covenanted Servants, Military, many of the Honble Company's slaves, and great Numbers of the Mallays; the Consequences thereof evidently Appeared last Season by a Consederable Decrease of Pepper; And the Disease still spreading both to the Northward and

Southward of this place give Us fearful Apprehensions, that their Honours Investments will yet greatly suffer thereby, especially since We have but very little Encouragement of reaping a Sufficiency to comply, only, with the next Storeships Charter party Tonnage.

The Dutch at Padang have of late caused Us much Uneasiness by their Arbitrary Behaviour in making Reprisals of Two Praws and their Cargoes Amounting to the Value of near \$\pi\$ 12000 Twelve Thousand Spanish Dollars at first cost, the Sole Property of a Chinaman here, and in massacreing [sic] their whole Company's to the number of thirty seven in a most flagitious and inhuman Manner without Shewing the least Regard to our Passes, which were with the utmost Disdain torn to Pieces upon their immediately being produced These Praws were embarked on a trading Voyage to Sinkel, Pooloo Nias and Natal at the former of which Places the Crime was perpretrated [sic] and notwithstanding We have sued for Satisfaction We find no probability of gaining it.

A Little after the above Incident a private Vessel, called the Brigantine Fanny, was also sent to several Ports, entirely independent of any Nation, to the Northward of us on a mercantile Expedition; But the Gentlemen of Padang, procuring Intelligence, directed a Country Vessel to pursue her in order to deliver the Master a Protest, which no sooner performed than the Brigg was obliged by it's Unjust and most haughty Threats to return hither "ere any Part of her Cargoe was Offered to sale which has been a manifest Prejudice to the Owners.

As these Procedures of the Dutch are more amply set forth in their protest, and the Letters We forwarded to Padang and Batavia on these Occasions, (Copies whereof are enclosed) We humbly crave Your Honours Reference thereto.

We have also now wrote to Admiral Boscawen on the Aforesaid Heads, wherein We requested his Protection from the Insults of that Nation; and at the same time hinted to him, the Indignities, offered our Honble Masters in debarring them the Trade of Banjar Masseen, which the Inhabitants would gladly renew if countenanced by the English.

Captain John Stevens, Commander of the Goldolphin, Arrived in our Road the 24th. of September, and when the Pepper at this Place and the Northward was transported on board him the Ship proceeded to Manna with 269 Tons the 11th. of January, from whence the Resident was Ordered to Dispatch her for England, but a few Days ago We had Advices, She was not yet Loaded Occassion'd by the Inclemency of the Wheather [sic] and the Shallowness of the Bar, which would not permit the Boats to go off; so that she will meet with about a Weeks Detention beyond the Limits of her Charterparty Term.

The Sloops Louisa and Mary were sent in Nov^r. last to Pooloo Pesang to bring up the Pepper of it's Districts, where, the latter was loaded and sometime after safely imported at Manna. The former was drove by Stress of weather, as We imagine, to Batavia, having had no Information of her Arrival at any of the Oute Residencies.

We shall Add Nothing further at present, since We expect to Address Your Honour &c*. by the Princess Augusta with a more Prolix Account of Our Transactions.

JOSEPH HURLOCK JOHN MASSEY CHARLES SMITH To the Worsh. The Governour & Council of Padang.

Worsh't. Sir & Sirs

We might very justly be taxed with very great Neglect of Duty to our Honble Masters, were We to Omit the first Opportunity of taking proper Cognisance by this publick Remonstrance of a Cruelty lately committed by the Master of a Panchallong belonging to Your Place, a Cruelty not only repugnant to all Laws, as well Human as Divine, but also a Manifest Breach of a Most Solemn Treaty, Subsisting between Our respective Sovereigns.

The Case is very Authentically related to Us by the only Person who had the good Fortune to Escape the Villanous Hands, of those who Acted a Part in that too Tragical Scene. Which was as follows.

Between five & six Months Ago, two Praws, the property of a Chinaman here residing under our Protection, sailed on a Voyage from hence to Sinkell, to which Place, as it is a Free port, the Owner had an undoubted Right to send them, & for their better security the Deputy Governour, gave each of the Masters his Pass or Licence, which ought Always to be Deemed Sacred by all Nations at Peace with each other Notwithstanding this, about three Months ago the Master of the Panchallong abovementioned, who was a Dutch man, went forcibly with his People, Composed of Sundry Nations, on board the said Praws, & demanded the Masters passes, which were immediately Presented him, upon sight thereof he with Disdain, first broke the Honble Company's Large Seals, which were thereunto fixed, tore the Passess to Piecess, threw them Overboard; & then in cold blood Massacreed both the Praws Companys to the Number of Thirty Seven Men, that being Accomplished he Carried or ordered the said Vessels with their Cargoes, Amounting to near the Sum of Eleven Thousand Six Hundred Spanish Dollars into Padang, where We are informed they now Lay.

In behalf of their Owners We hereby Demand immediate restitution, & Ample Satisfaction for the Loss of so many Mens Lives, as also for all Costs & Damages the Owner has, or may Sustain by your Detention of the Said Vessels, & are greatly Surprized at your not Advising Us of this Affair long ago, the more so as You cannot Plead Ignorance by way of Excuse.

We shall be indispensibly obliged to represent this unjustifiable proceeding to the General & Council of Batavia, as also to Admiral Boscawen & by his means to his Britannick Majesty, as well as to the Honble English East India Company who have by this Barbarous transaction been offered the highest Indignity, & give Us leave to Acquaint Your Worship &c^a. that Men inclinable to Project or Capable of Committing an Act of this Sort are unworthy the Name of Human.

This is not the first insult by many that has been offered to Passes granted to People under our Protection, by Masters of Vessels belonging to Your Port, which We are inclinable to think the Honble Netherlands East India Company are entirely unacquainted of.

About Six Weeks ago a small Dutch Sloop bound from Batavia for your Place, had the Misfortune to run ashore at one of our Northern Settlements & was lost, but by the Assistance of our Resident there, the Men were all saved with their Pacquet, which was immediately forwarded Overland to Your Worship &ca. Council.

We require an immediate Answer to this our Letter by the Hands of those You will receive it, they being employed by us for that Purpose.

PROTEST in the Name and Behalf of the Honble Netherlands East India Company, sent inform by Serjeant Lasper Lapping to the Captain and his Officers, on Board the English Vessel, named [lacuna] by Christian Elsevier Governour of Padang &ca. Council, on the West Coast of Sumatra,

As by certain Intelligence, We have received, We hear that Your Vessel lays at Anchor near, or at the Island of Priamong; You are therefore Hereby causioned, Althô the [sic] We believe you cannot plead Ignorance that Since the Sovereign, Inhabitants of this Country, under whose Dominion the District of Priamong belongs, as well as the Princes of the other Places along the West Coast of Sumatra; together with the Adjacent Islands, are by Successive Contracts from Ancient Times, the Right of the Honble Netherlands East India Company whom they decreed to enjoy Lawfully and deemed them sole Protector thereof, having bound themselves especially within Bounds of their respective Jurisdictions and bordering Islands to accept of no other Nation to trade with their Subjects, than the Aforesaid Company and their Substitutes, who are in full possession and Masters of the West Coast of Sumatra and the above mentioned Islands not only thrô strength of Contracts but by Lawful Arms.

These Sensible Motives oblige Us to maintain the Rights of our Lords and Masters as by Oath We are bound to do as also to regulate every Disorder with all the force our Power is capable to Afford.

Further in the name of the Honble Netherlands East India Company We Strictly give You warning upon Sight of this to way Your Anchor immediately and proceed some where else beyond the Companys Limits: protesting by Disobedience of this our sincer and friendly Advice to Acquit ourselves, from all Damage and Molestation which of Course will thereby ensue in Your persisting to infringe on the previledge of our Aforesaid Company as of all Differences, Enlargements and, Consequence arising from Such Your Usurpation, In case you Should proceed in your outrageous Commerce and Progress, We shall not fail to execute the Orders given us by our Lords and Masters, having understood the true Natire [sic] of this Affair Let all be at your Perils.

To the Worship^L. The Governour & Council of Padang.

Worship^l. Sir & Sirs

The threatning Protest which by Your orders was Delivered to the Master of the Brigg Fanny & signed by you, We have most Carefully perused and shall as explicitly reply thereto, wherefore this Affair most Essentially requires Your Attention, Althô our Amazment [sic] is as great as the Affair is extraordinary.

Can any We say under the Auspicious Names of Allies, Act so contrary to the Treaties Subsisting between our two Nations & so reverse to the Laws thereof, as you have done in many of your late Proceedings, & Lately in regard to the Aforesaid Vessel who had not only our Pass, But We presume as Free a Liberty to trade in these Seas, as even any belonging to Your selves but our Admiration Almost ceases When We reflect on the most Unhappy and Cruel Fate, which attended two Praws Company's that went from hence on a trading Voyage to Sinkell. & perpetrated thereby Some of Your Dependance, this We have Already represented to you and the Topick gives Us to much uneasiness to make repetitions where We have so little reason to Expect either Humanity or Redress, these unheard off Preceedents have however taught Us experience, by giving way to more Distinct & Regular Considerations, which will never We hope fail to be Assisted by the Arguments of others, and a through [sic] observation of the Sentiments of all for every one who is the Least Susceptible of his Rights and Priviledges being infringed upon, will no doubt make it his Study to Fly from so eminent a Oppression, and our Honble Masters who want not Discernment to perceive their Own in Danger, when Measures are offered contrary to their Honour and pernicious to their Interest, will easily be Induced to resentment, & Suffer themselves to be as far Biassed by the Desire of preventing Disgrace as of Assuaging it.

In Your Protest as you are pleased to Stile it, You seem Gentlemen to Lord it to much over Us, by Your Unjust & Arbitrary Claims to Engross the whole trade all along the West Coast of Sumatra, & the Adjacent Islands, under the Simple Shadow of Successive Contracts from ancient times Concluded between the Agents of the Honble Netherlands East India Company and the Monarchs of the several Districts of this Coast, & therefore call Yourselves the only & Lawful Protector of this Part of India, if these Remonstrances of Yours have any weight of truth in them, it would have been friendly to have pointed out proper Limits so should We then have no Longer Cause to Dispute the Validity of them, but instead of this You argue quite Contrary to reason & Justice or why are you remiss in Reminding Us of Your Just Pretentions.

A Representation having been made to Us by the Owners of the Brigantine Fanny, Setting forth the Losses they Are likely to Sustain, by Your interrupting them in a voyage to Priamong, & having Seriously Considered the Merits of the said Representation We could not in Equity or Duty to our Honble Masters whose Rights & Authority have been We Apprehend Violated by such an unwarrantable Proceedure, nor in Justice to ourselves (greatly thereby injured) Defer offering our Judgment to You on so important an Event, which may perhaps in its Tendencies become the subject matter of Memorials, to be presented to our Respective sovereigns between whom at this Juncture there Subsists the Perfectest Amity, so ought their Subjects to do every thing in their Power to preserve & Cultivate an Harmony, so beneficial to the Interest of Both, nor are We on our Part Conscious of having ever Acted (since the Management of our Honble Masters Affairs here has devolved upon Us) in any instance Contrary to the Law of nations or infringed knowingly on rights belonging to the Netherlands East India Company, or their Servants, & in the Present Case We have all the Justice to Plead on our side, as Circumstances can Possibly require.

You cannot but be Sensible that the Monarchs of these Eastern Nations, have as just Claims to Indepency, [sic] & as well Founded a Power to make what Treaties they Please, with Foreigners, & as Tenacious of their Rights & Properties as European Monarchs. In Virtue whereof the King of Manang Cabow has by several Letters to the Leading Men here, Invited the English either to settle or Trade with him & his People Alledging he having no Contract with the Dutch, that he was intirely Independent of them, & further that he would enter into no Treaty with them on any Consideration whatever, This We conclude to be a Sufficient Vindication of our Conduct, & granting the Honble Company's Pass to a Vessel sent thither to trade with him, But if it should be made Appear in the Negative by incontestable Proffs, that the said Prince has since the Difference which Subsisted between him and the Dutch entered in Consequence thereof into an Agreement to Commerce only with the Dutch, exclusive of other Nations. We shall be ready to Acknowledge our mistake Althô. it was incumbent on You to Notify such Treaties to us, but We have lately had Substantial reasons to Guess at your extraordinary Behaviour, with respect to our Settlement, because You seem to lay it down as a first Principal that all the Places where We send our Vessels, even to Nuetral [sic] Ports you pretend a Prior Right under the Cover of some Treaty which is a mighty easy way to obtain an Universal Trade, & subject all mankind to your Dominions in Mercantile Concerns We cannot help further remarking that had our Ancesstors made use of such Pretexts, which We imagine they had good Title to their Successors would now be in Possession of Colonies usurped by others.

It will not We flatter ourselves be Supposed the Effect of Disregard to the Honble Netherlands Company or Malevolence to their Servants that We are indispensibly obliged to stand in our own Defence, being publickly involved by your Indignities & Gross abuses, which have been of too long Duration, & We believe without the Knowledge of your Principals You don't surely imagine Us to be Vassals, subordinate to your will & Pleasure, or that We shall any Longer brook Your ill Treatment, in a Word, all our Future Actions shall show, that it is out of your Power & even at your Peril to Diminish the least Part of our Rights and Properties, which we shall in a fair Way pursue as usual.

By a Letter We have Received from our Honble Masters, We have strict injunctions to Extend their Limits when Evident for their Interest to all Places unpossessed by European Powers, In pursuit of which notwithstanding your Threats, our King & Parliment are Resolved to Stand by them & maintain them in their full Rights & priviledges in India, this Intelligence We were ordered to Communicate to your Superious [sic] on the first Occasion, & We deem this to be a proper one with the Difference that We are only imparting it to a Subordinancy, they moreover intimate the Countenance promised their Affairs by his Majesty's Fleet now in India under the Command of the Honble Edward Boscawen Admiral.

To all this We further add our firm resolution to pursue the Indulgence of our Private Trade to all Ports not under the Inspection of the Dutch as Priamong Nattal, & Sinkell Are not in Consequence whereof We are influenced to make a Suitable return to your Protest, By now Protesting in Behalf of the Honble East India Company, & ourselves against you for all Lett Hindrance or Molestation whatever in your Opposing our Indisputable Right of Traffick in these Seas, & for all Costs Damages & Delays that have or may happen, or hereafter Ensue, by such Your Collusive Practices.

Your Worship &c*. will please to observe that We have hitherto upon every occasion, endeavoured to Cultivate the good Harmony subsisting between the Hoñble Netherlands East India Company, & our Hoñble Employers by Shewing with the utmost Alacrity & readiness to serve & oblige the Commanders of Dutch Ships, When called upon for Assistance even to our own prejudice, & are very sorry for the Cause of our taking Notice, of the unsuitable return You have made.

What offence have We committed that the Governour & Council of Padang, Should Contrary to the Laws of Treaties Subsisting between our two Nations make Piratical reprisals of our Vessels when Sent to Neutral Ports to Traffick, as was the treatment of two Praws, bound in June & July Last from hence to Sinkell, Pooloo Nias & Natall, at the former of which places they were Seized with all their Merchandize, Amounting to near Twelve Thousand Spanish Dolars, by a Panct—allong well manned, & Commanded by a Dutch Man, who After he had Disdainfully broke the Honble English East India Companys Seals & tore their Passes to Pieces most inhumanly ordered both the Praws Companys to be massacreed. to the Number of Thirty Seven Men, which was soon Perpetrated in so Vile & Barefaced a manner, without reflecting upon Moral or Divine Laws instituted for

the benefit of all, We say that if these Cruelties and Injustices are Suffered to be passed over with impunity & Ample restitution Neglected to be rendered back to the Owner, for all Losses & Damages he may Sustain thereby, We shall Judge that no Solemn Contract, is of Sufficient force to bind those, who would trecherously Concert Against the Principal Foundation of its Laws.

Upon Advice of the Above Relation We wrote a Letter to the Chiefs of Padang, expressing our great astonishment at their late Arbitrary Proceedings, & requiring the full Value of what clandestinely Seized to be immediately returned. But by the Answer We Since Received they Notifyed, that it would be Agreable to them to lay our Loud Complaints before Your Excellency & your Honours, at the same time mentioned that they did not doubt on their own Parts to give Sufficient Grounds & reasons for their taking the Aforesaid Vessels, which are now in their Custody.

These Gentlemen must certainly be influenced by the rule of Sophistical Logik, if they Pretend to Clear themselves of the Guilt of Such a Breach of the Law of Nations, We cannot help speaking Our Sentiments, Since so many of Our Pass Ports have been so reproachfully used, & regarded by the Dutch as Null & of no Effect, & our Rights & Priveledges in India thereby greatly infringed upon, of which We have hitherto omitted to take proper Cognisance, lest We should Disturb and Embroil the Tranquility reignidry [sic] betwixt our respective Sovereigns, Your Excellency & Your Honrs. will however perceive, We are at Last roused out of a Lethargy, which has been of a long Standing, & this enforces Us to Confess that many of the Gross Abuses, We formerly received, from Your Adherents Crowd in at once on our Imaginations & call for our hearty endeavours to Employ the Sense We have, in putting a stop to them in Due Season.

A Brigantine Called the Fanny belonging to this place, having been Also Sent on a Voyage by the Owners in the Month of October, to Priamong Nattal & Sinkell, which We undoubtedly presume are Free & Open Ports, & Obsolutely [sic] independant of any Nation (the Dutch excepted) We were again Surprized to find the Governour & Council of Padang Still persisted in their unjust resolutions of depriving Us of a Free Liberty of Commerce along the West Coast of Sumatra, Althônot in their Terrtories [sic] now under their Protection by the perusal of a Haughty Protest delivered the Master of the Brigg, & Signed by the Abovesaid Gentlemen, declaring if he failed to Obey the Contents) which imported his proceeding Directly out of their Dominions, to some other Place, they Should indispensibly be obliged, as Lawful Protectors of India to follow the Instructions received from their Lords & Masters, which they pretended would Acquit them from all Infringments, Enlargements & Consequences & that would infallibly Accrue in Non Compliance with the said Protest, so that the Vessel returned hither, without the Opportunity of disposing of any Part of her Cargoe, to the great Detriment of the Owners.

By the perusing two Letters Copies of which come under Cover, forwarded to Padang in Answer to the Protest &ca. remitted Us from thence, Your Excellency & your Honours will be pleased to Observe the Orders, We lately received from our Honourable Employers, in regard to extending their Limits, & a more Distinct Account of the Brigg & two Praws, which has Cost Us so much uneasiness.

We beg Leave to Assure Your Excellency & Your Honours, that We wish for nothing more then these Differences to be speedily Accommodated in a just and Friendly manner, & that if it were possible a Strict Harmony might Yet be Kept up, to the Honour & Advantage of both Companys.

HONOURABLE

We cannot omit adressing Your Honours in a Separate Letter upon a most disagreeable Subject, and Since it concerns in a great measure the Welfare of your Honrs. Establishments on this Coast and the Credit, power and Authority of the Honble Company as well as the Indulgence of our own private Commerce, We could not resist the Temptation of impartially representing the Occasion in the Light it bears.

In June and July last a Chinaman residing here under your Honours protection sollicitating [sic] the Deputy Governour to grant him a Pass or Licence for two Praws, his own property, bound on a trading Voyage to Sinkall Pooloo Nias & Natal, which are free and Open ports to the Northward of this place, and entirely independant of any Nation whatever, His request being reasonable it was permitted But a few Months After to our vast Astonishment, a Mallay man, belonging to one of the Said Praws returned in a very main'd [sic] Condition, with the Melancholy News that a Vessel well manned had forcibly Seized them, and Sent on that purpose from Padang; the Master thereof was a Dutchman, and his Crew composed of Sundry Nations, and that notwithstanding our Passes were produced and delivered on immediate demand, the Said Dutchman thereupon with the utmost Scorn & derision broke the Honble Companys Seals Affexed [sic] to them, tore to Peices and threw the Passes over Board, bound the whole Crews Company in Fetters, and with all the Seeming Coolness and Serenity of mind orderd them to be brought Severally upon the Deck, and most inhumanly Slain before him to the Number of thirty Seven Souls (Inhabitants here) being quite void of the Sence of Pity, or the pangs of remorse, to upward his Consience with these unlawful and wicked Deeds concerted against those whose fortune Deserved a better Fate, than to be massacred in so vile and barefaced a manner, especially too, by those who pretend to keep up and cultivate the Strict Friendship and Amity Subsisting betwixt our two Nations, and who boast so mightily of Adhering to the Laws thereof; so soon as they had perpretrated [sic] this Barbarity and tragical Scene of Sloughter, [sic] they insolently carryed both the Praws and Cargoes amounting to near twelve thousand Dollars to Padang, where they are Still detained, And protected, and no Account rendered Us from thence of this Arbitrary and unaccountable Procedure: We however forwarded an immediate Express thither, requiring full Restitution for all Damages and Injuries the Owner is like to Sustain through these means and if ample Satisfaction is not made, it will not a little deminish [sic] the Honble Company's Power and Authority here in the Opinion of the China and Mallay Merchants, who frequently were sending their small Vessels to traffick along the Coast under the protection of your Honours Pass; these Audacious Circumstances having already been a Motive for Umbrage to Some, and Discontentment to others, of the Dutch Company's being Superiour to that of the English, or more valiant and strong by lawful Force of Arms, which oblige us they Suppose to put up with their manifold Indignities; and We are really concerned to know ourselves incapable of remedying so great an Evil.

The Above said Person who just brought us this unhappy Intelligence made a very narrow and Surprising Escape, having received Several Stabs with the Weapons of the Dutch, which were deemed Mortal, and thereupon cast into the Sea; but finding his Wounds not very painful he endeavour'd to save himself bye Sevimming [sic] the Dutchman then perceiving his Mistake that he was not dead, gave further Directions to fire on him in the Water, whereby he had the Misfortune of a Musquet Ball's purcing [sic] thrô both his Cheeks, nevertheless he reached the Shore and made the best of his way to Marlbrô as before related: He is Since pretty well recovered, tho' this Disaster has caused a great Impediment in his Speech which will always Afford him time and Opportunity enough to reflect upon the cruel Disposition of the Dutch before We were acquainted with the Seizure of the two Praws, a Brigg named the Fanny, was fitted out belonging to Some

Gentlemen here and sent upon a trading Voyage to Pryamong Natal Sinkal &ca. but she was obliged, to the great Loss of the Owners, (altho' those too are neutral Ports) to return back without disposing of any Part of her Cargo, being manaced [sic] to be also made a Reprisal, in Consequence to a most haughty Protest dated at Padang, and expressly Deliver'd to the Master of the Brigg setting forth that if he did not upon the very sight of it weigh his Anchor and proceed out of their Territories as (they Stiled them) they thereby Acquitted themselves from all Prejudices that might ensue from our persisting to infringe on their Rights and Properties in mercantile Affairs, which they said extended along the West Coast of Sumatra, and the adjacent Islands, under the Colour of Successive Contracts from Ancient Times concluded between the Agents of the Netherlands East India Company and the Monarchs of the Several Distrects [sic] of this Coast, and therefore called themselves the only & Lawful Protector of India.

In Answer to the Said Protest We imparted to them Your Honours Sentiments in the 18th. Paragraph ... of the General Letter # Grantham, because We thought this Juncture was Applicable to our Duty and fulfilling your Honours Pleasure.

With all due Submission We humbly request Your Honours will not defer Seriously to peruse the Dutch protest with our Reply thereto; as also a Letter we wrote to the Gentlemen of Padang when We were informed of the Massacre committed at Sinkall; Copies of these are enclosed in the Pacquet.

By the first Conveyance We hope to have the Satisfaction to hear Your Honours have taken our case into Consideration, and found out Some proper Method to curb the Insolence of the Dutch lest their Ambition Should lead them to so exorbitant an Height as to look upon us no Longer worthy to be their Neighbours, Such may possibly be the End if they continue to lay Claim to all Your Honours Investm¹⁸. to the Southward of this Place, and make Repetitions of what they have before told us that even Bencoolen it Self was not out of Criticism.

We were in daily Expectation of Seeing the Winchelsea here & Should Agreeable to Directions have laden on her what Pepper and Plank she could receive, but the Season being far advanced we have given over All hopes of her Appearing now especially Since receipt of Your last Advices.

We are in much doubt whither we shall be able to procure You the Three hundred Candies of Sandal wood wrote for in March last as it is usual here to Advance Money for this Article in the Month of July which was Accordingly done by private Merchants at this Place and Sold to the Maccoa Shipping before receipt of your Advices, besides which we have lately received Directions from Our Superiours at Bombay to procure Two hundred Candies for the Doddingtons China Voyage, but if there is any to be got After making this Provision so as to send round by the expected Shipping we shall take proper care to purchase the same.

The 28th of Febry the Cuddalore Sloop arrived with Us from Bombay built for the Service of Your Presidency whom we had Orders to keep untill such time as we thought it necessary to fill her up with Pepper and send her to you, wherefore having asked Advice of Such Commanders of Ships as were then with Us they gave it as their Opinion that we ought not to dispatch her sooner than in the Month of April, during which time the Gentlemen of Anjengo having made a Strenuous Application to us for Rice for the Service of their Garrison we dispatched her with the same to them the 23d. Ultimo but having Since had a very severe Gale of Wind which has drove Several Small Craft ashore up and down this Coast we imagine the Same Storm has likewise reached her She not Appearing, and not having had any Advices of her being put into any Place of Security between this and Anjenge nor heard of her loss we are Apt to imagine the Master of her has pushed round to You, as otherwise it is most probable we should have got Notice of her.

The True Briton and Stretham sailed from hence the 2^d. Ultimo the former having filled up at this Port Agreeable to Your Directions and was joined here by the latter in her Passage home who was dispatched from Bombay.

Captain William Webber in the Prince William joined the Restoration Grab at this Port and sailed for Bombay and Surat the 20th. Ultimo the latter having been sent down as low as Cochin to look for him and such other English Vessels as wanted Convoy.

We are in daily Expectation of the Doddingtons Arrival with us from Bombay to be dispatched from hence to China likewise of the Arrival of his Majesty's Ships and Our Honble Masters under Command of Captain Powlett to whom we shall tender the Timber and Plank for Your Presidency which is all in readiness at this Place and Callicut for Shipping off at a Moments warning. We have nothing further to communicate but our being

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

This comes by Cuddalore Sloop which was sent down here in March with Rice for the use of this Garrison & was dispatched the 30th. of the same Month for Tellicherry to have taken in Pepper for Fort S^t. David, but we had such an Extraordinary Season of N.W. winds that in fourteen days She had not got Ten Leagues to the Northw^d. of Anjengo when She met with a Gale of wind which split all her sails & sprung her Mast which obliged her to bear up for Anjengo, where she has been Supplied with every thing needful as provisions &c^a.

We immediately informed the Gentlemen at Tellicherry of the Accident & as She was too late to return there we desired they would Send down what Goods they intended to load on board her for your place, Yesterday we received their Answer that the Season is too far elapsed to freight any Pepper down the Coast to putt on board her & we having none in our Warehouse we now give her, her dispatches.

The last time I had the pleasure to Address Your Honour &ca. I acquainted you how little disposed the Merchants were for bringing any Cloth tolerably good, & it concerns me to think I have Still the Same Cause of Complaint against them, they Say it is owing to the great demand there is now made for that Cömmodity both by the Dutch at Polecoil & Cockanar & the French at Yanam, the latter having advanced their Merchants a little Money for Cloths of 30, 26, 23, 19, & 15. Punjams and give out that they Shall have a large Supply of Cash very Shortly which news has so Affected the Country Weavers that they are quite indifferent about improving the Manufacture unless they could get a better price for their Cloth, & the Merchants for their part declare that their Proffit Arising from the Ordinary Cloth is so very Small they cannot Afford to give the Weavers a better price for it, This makes me doubtful of the Merchants fulfilling their Contract made the beginning of this Month which is to bring in two hundred & fifty Bales by next September, but if in a few days I am not more Successful I shall despair of having 200 Bales by that time, I have now in the Godown & at Wash 58 Bales and I believe I have turned out near as many.

I humbly request your Honour &ca. will favour me with a further Supply of Cash as soon as Possible least the Merchants Should plead the want of Money as an excuse for their not performing their Contract and bringing better Cloth, likewise that You will be pleased to send me the Broad Cloth Indented for by the first Opportunity, for the Nabob & Phousdars Deloyts are perpetually teasing me for their Masters Annual Present.

Inclosed is Duplicate of my last with Journal Parcels & Cash Accounts to Ultimo March, and Your Honour &c*. will please to Observe that I have Credited Account Current Fort St. David for the Amount of what was due to Mr. Saunders at this Settlement as he agreed to receive it at Vizagapatam.

The President has received Advice from the Consul at Aleppo dated 12th. January last that a General Pease was concluded on the 19th. October proceeding, without any other material News.

Your Letter of the 21st. April reached us the 11th. Ultimo with the melancholy Account of the General Loss by the hard Gale of Wind and since these Advices to us we hope You have had no further bad news.

This Pattamar is dispatched purposely to forward our Advices to Bombay as usual at this time of the Year, We are therefore to desire You will send them as Soon as possible.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

- 1. The last Addresses, We paid to your Hon. &c. went by the Success Galley Capt. James Barton Commander, and were dated the 30th. January last; enclosing Copies of Letters concerning the late Arbitrary Deportment of the Dutch in Opposing our indisputable Right of Traffick Since when our Honble Masters Ship, named the Duke of New Castle Captain Francis Fowler bound to this Place, having touched in his Way at Batavia, brought Us a Reply to our Letters from the General and Council on the Above Occasion, which Seems, if We may judge by its Contents, Somewhat inclinable to render back Restitution for the Loss Sustained in the Seizure of the Two Praws at Padang, mentioned in our last to Your Honour &c. by Strictly examining into the Merits of the Case; for which End they have requested the Person, who escaped the Massacre might be sent to them, as an Evidence but as We think this Affair is of too much Consequence to be decided in their Courts, We dont esteem it just to comply therewith.
- 2. The Abovesaid Ship Arrived in our Road the 29th. Ultimo from Europe, with a Supply of Covenanted Servants Stores Military and Five Chests of Treasure,
- which last, and 606 Pieces of Lead weighing 810. 2. 3 We now consign to Your Honour &c.a. We also received a Pacquet from the Honble Court of Directors, wherein We had Orders to fill her up with Pepper and Afterwards dispatch her directly to England. These Injunctions We found impracticable to be performed, unless the Ship had been detained till the Season was very far advanced, and then little would have been remaining to load on Board the Next Annual Storeship, there being, at present, but a very Small Quantity of Pepper in the Godowns, and that too, chiefly the Gleanings; this happ'ning to be an unusual Time of the Year for the Planters to bring any to the Scale; besides the last Harvest was transported on the Benjamin and Godolphin. This latter Ship wanted a good Deal to conclude her Charter party Tonnage, partly thrô the Surprising Rage of the Small Pox and

partly by an unforeseen Disappointment Occasioned at Manna, thrô the Inclemency of the Weather and excessive Shallowness of the Bars within the Districts of that Place; So that to our Concern, She did not depart from thence till the 14th. February, and even then was forced to leave behind her 10 or 15 Tons, the Resident Apprising Us, that he thought it more Advisable to Dispatch her than detain her any longer upon Demorage, as he discerned no probability of a Change of Weather, the heavy Charge too, of her Continuance, althô the Quantity of Pepper might have Answered for some Days was an Inducement not to rely upon Uncertainties, where there was so little prospect of Advantage to be expected.

- 3. The Louisa Sloop, We took Notice of to Your Honour &c. by the Success Galley, that She was not then Arrived (thô dispatched from Pooloo Pesang with a Loading of Fifty Six Bahar of Pepper) at Manna We Supposed She was drove away by Stress of Winds and obliged to put in at Batavia, where, We hoped the Godolphin would find her, the Captain designing to touch at that Place. We presented him with proper Directions to take in the Sloops Cargo; but, to our great Uneasiness, Neither Capt. Stevens nor Louisa had reached the Port of Batavia, when the Duke of New Castle departed from thence, which was on the 6th. March; The former We Surmise made the best of his Way to England, for Fear of Loosing his Passage; and relating to the latter Mr. Combes gives Us Intelligence, dated the 2d. of the Same Month, that Captain Barton and the China Praws heard no News of her, thô a Dutch Ship had informed him, that cruizing in the Streights Sometime in December last they met with prodigious bad Seas, and Saw a Sloop or Such like Vessel driving Bottom uppermost, whereby We Apprehend She is lost.
- 4. The above accident renders it Absolutely Necessary to Apply to Your Honours-&ca. for Another Sloop to be Sent us from the Coast, as soon as practicable, in the Louisa's Stead, having at Present no other Vessel but the Mary to bring up the Pepper from Croee &c and to carry the Necessary Supplies to such Oute Settlements, which often Stand in need of our Assistance.
- 5. For the reasons just now imparted to Your Hon^r. &c. in Regard to the unseasonable Arrival of the Duke of New Castle, We were at a Great Perplexity to resolve which Way to dispose of her for the Benifit of our Honble Masters; especially as We were Already Acquainted of the heavy Tonnage on the Other Coast; However our Minds Occurred to Send her immediately to China to purchase Ordinary Teas, in like Manner as We Acted by the Norfolk, but these precautions, were soon frustrated with the Sensible Reflection of our Incapacity to imburse the Captain Cash, equivalent, for Such an Expedition, We therefore proposed to consign her first to Mr. Thomas Combes, their Honours Agent at Batavia, with what Treasure We could Afford giving the latter full Power and private Instructions to borrow a Sum of Money of the Dutch there, Sufficient to procure a Loading and draw Bills upon the Honble English Company for the Payment, which when Accomplished, We intended to direct him to Dispatch her forthwith to China. Yet upon maturely weighing this Method, We had great Cause to believe it would not Succeed, but only be a means for Umbrage should Such a Scheme come to the Knowledge of the General and a Disappointment of that Kind, would at once under her Passage thither precarious. These just Considerations influenced Us to enjoin the Capt. to Sail from hence directly to the Presidency of Fort St. Davids to wait there, Your Honour &c. Pleasure and Commands for his further Proceedings; which Resolution, We hope may not be disapproved of, Since We deemed it the best and most Secure for the Honble Company, whose Sole Interest We have particularly Studyed herein.
- 6. By Captain Barton We made Known to Your Honour &ca. the little Likelihood We had to entertain ourselves with the Pleasing Expectation of procuring Pepper enough to Suffice a Loading for the next Storeship; and indeed We are Sorry that the Constructions We then placed Should begin to Shew its Validity, making the unhappy Distemper of the Small Pox the Occasion which, thô abated a few Miles about Us, still vehemently Spreads and rages both to the Northward and Southward of Us, causing great Scarcity of Provisions, and an universal Dread Amongst the Planters, in so much, that We have frequent Accounts from those

Parts, of Several flying from their Doosoons and Plantations to seek Shelter in the woods, others refuse either to Cultivate their Vines or bring what Pepper they have on hand down to the Quolloes. It is also Death in most of the Country Villages to conceal the Disease: And those, who have the Misfortune to catch it, are banished to remote Places, where, for want of Food and Nourishment are starved or devoured by wild Animals, Nevertheless 'tis a pleasing Satisfaction to us, that the Settlements of Moco Moco and Croee have not as yet felt the least Effects of that contagious Sickness; not that We can rely upon their Honours Investments (in those Quarters) escaping the threatning Danger.

- 7. On our Parts We can Assure Your Honour &ca. Nothing has been wanting to Animate and Spirit up the Inhabitants to cultivate and improve their Pepper Gardens, as well as to dispel their Fears at so critical a Juncture; but Such unavoidable Casualties as these are beyond the Art of prevention, and therefore, We indulge ourselves they will be free from Censure.
- 8. We received a good Quantity of Rice from Batavia by the Duke of New Castle; So that We have no Reason to be troublesome to Your Honour &ca. for a Supply of that grain.
- 9. The Expectation We are in, of the Princess Augusta's Speedy Arrival here, and to conform with our last, We Shall reassume that Opportunity of tendring more full and Satisfactory Advices to Your Honour &ca; We therefore humbly crave Leave to curtail them by this Conveyance, and to conclude, at present, with this Token of our Respect that We are

I must request the favour Your Honour &ca. will give me Some Orders about the Ingeram Barr Boat being very much out of Repair, & at present unfit for any Service, Her Stem & most of her Plank up to her Bends are Eat through by the Worms & as several of her deck plank are country Wood & decayd they must be taken up & new Ones put in their Stead, which by the Nearest Computation to

Honble Şir & Sirs

Begging of Your Honour most Obediently leave, to lay down before You with all reverency a Sincere and Concernfull Memorial, touching the Power and Liberty which the Popish French Priests formerly have got and hetherto usurped in Madrass, as also concerning the ruin which the Protestant English Mission hath Suffer'd there, and to add, for Conscience's Publick Interest's, and suffered Loss's Sake, Some Most humble and Lawfull Proposals and petitions; We have the Confidence, that by reason of Your Honour's Bounty and Candor, and the Importance of the Matter, we may bring before You our respectfull representations of the Truth freely and without any Fear.

In the first place it is Notorious; that the Roman Catholiks in none of their Countries, Places or Settlements give us Protestants any Liberty, or even as much room as to be burried in, much less to teach the People or to have Ministers of our Church Amongst them. It is Notorious likewise, that their Anti Christian Doctrine and Idilatrous [sic] Practice is a Stumbling-block to all Sorts of People, and the greater the Offence if Carried on publikly in Protestant Towns, and especially in Protestant Settlements establish'd Among the Gentiles. And not to say now, that the favouring and exalting them, who are the Greatest Enemies of God and the Protestant Religion needs must be against the Love of both, and Consequently Against our Own Welfare; it is at least notoriously a great Misfortune, if we are beguiled by the Outward good Appearence, fine Words and Simulated respect and humbleness of those whose proper Character and even religion it is, to hate the Protestants in their Heart unto Death and to stay only for fair Occasions, to do their private and publick Affairs all the Mischief they can, But notwithstanding these Truths, it is also Notorious, what Great Power and Liberty the French Padres formerly have got and hitherto usurped in Madras, where they have built a Church near the Castle in the White Town, and besides (some lesser Idol-houses) three other Churches without the Town upon the Company's bounds, One to the North in Parratsheri, one to the South in Sepakam, and another, A new one, to the West near Woeperi; that in the Town having been Appointed Also for the Use of the Black Garrison, which was under their Ecclesiastical Care.

So great a Liberty given to the French Priests and Roman-Catholiks, hath proved very prejudicious and fatal before, in and After the Loss of Madrass. Before the ruin of our Town, the lethiferous poison of their Idolatrous Doctrine

and Practice hath many Years since infected Multitudes of People, and became Year by Year more dangerous by their Authority and Impudence (wherewith they Used even to Scorn at us and to call our Religion the Tosca Ley, which is to Say the rude Religion) Only one Instance to Say no more, can be enough to be convinced of the Harm of this Poison, viz^t. that even a great (if not the Most) part of the Orphan Girls of the English Church, brought up in the English Charity-School, Afterwards have been made Prosselytes of the Popish Church by the French Padres.

And not to touch here, what an Influence hereafter the Power and the Presence of the French Padres and Roman Catholiks in Madrass, hath had in the Loss of the Town, before and in the Arrival of the French Forces, and in the Days of the Siege; Surely, besides that, it hath had a very Strong Secret Influence in it. For, undoubtedly, one of the Chief Reasons, which have provoked the Justice of God to the heavy and long lasting judgement Over Madrass, hath been also the settling, favouring and exalting there the Ennemies of Christ and of his Church in so high a degree. To French Missionaries hath been given so much room and liberty in Madrass, that at last the French became Masters of Madrass, and drove the English out: Veteres migrate Coloni.

After the Loss of Madrass, no body remembring the high favours the French Priests and Roman-Catholiks had enjoyed so many Years since under a Protestant Government, (1) the English Church, besides loosing it's Bell and many other things, hath been dishonourd and profaned excessively for a Considerable time, Serving for a Store-house and for a reserver of Water ets, [sic] and now only a short time Since they repair and cleanse it again, thinking that that will be all enough to gain them the former Love and Leberties [sic] (2) The Protestant English Mission's Buildings in the Black Town with all that belonged to them, have been intirely raized and demolished. And unto this very day they do not think of any restoration, or Satisfaction, Neither have we had at any time a mind to beg it from the Enemy, but relying all this Time confidently on Your Honours future good reformation of the Madrass Affairs we have patiently waited hitherto for the long expected restitution of that Town, as the right Opportunity to see them rewarded even as they rewarded us.

Hoping than finally, that that Seasonable time is now at hand, Your Honour please favourably to look upon our following Most humble proposals and petitions, which we Most Sincerely and respectfully lay before You as well for Conscience's And Publik Interest's, as also for Suffered Loss's and Ruin's sake Vizt. (1) To let the French Priests go to their Own Settlements, and to give them at the Arrival of a New English Government, no farther Footing neither in the Town nor in the Company's Bounds, Considering that French Missionaries have nothing to do in English Settlements.

- (2) If it should be thought necessary, to Allow Still to the Popish Inhabitants an Excreise of Religion within the bounds of the Company, (which Yet cannot be of an absolute necessity, Since they have St. Thomé very near) to allow them only, under a Strict limiting to make no new proselytes, a Portugueez Padre and one Church without the Town. But not that to the North in Parratshere, because there Allways dwell the Most part of the black Soldiers and the Palanquinboys &c[e.]; neither that all the West near Waperi, which would not serve to that purpose being too far of, and besides that it would not be Advisable to have them on the Land-side betwixt Madrass and the Country; but that at the South of Madrass, in Sepakam, on the other Side of the Island, the way to St. Thome.
- (3) To confiscate the other three Churches together with all other things and Possessions the French Padres have upon Company's Ground; and, if it Should be thought proper, to take out of it what perhaps can Serve to the English Church or School, and to give the rest, and particularly the Churches, to the English Mission for a just retaliation and Satisfaction Against it's Losses and endured Affront's and Miseries; considering that the English Mission's—Buildings (wherein we had both Church, Schools and Dwelling) together with the houses of the Catechists and Several other Mission's Servants, have been made even with the

Ground, and that the One Missionary being then in Madrass hath been driven out together with his people and Orphans, and within these 2 Years and a half been Obliged to live at the Northern side of Policate like as in an Exile [sic] continuing there his Ministry, Church and Schools, and Suffering with his dispersed flock all the time long a great Deal of hardships.

- (4) Especially, to turn the Portugueez Town Church of the French Padres, that hath been hitherto a Popish Black-Garrison's Church, into a Protestant One, by giving the Care of it to us the English Missionaries, whereupon we shall not sail [sic] (if only Assisted by a proper Rule of the Honourable Government) to furnish within a little time, or from time to time So many Protestant Topases or Soldiers [as] there are required, and to Keep them always under a good divine instruction.
- (5) If perhaps the French Padres (or any body else in their behalf) Should Offer great things, as it is their Custom, for to enjoy their former Liberty; the best way would be to take it all and to let them go thereafter. For by all they are able to give, they cannot make good the Damage they done and Caused to be done before.

Most humbly praying to pardon all the Freedom taken in this Matter of importance, and not doubting but your Honour shall by your inlightned Judgement find, that all the Contents of this our concern and respectfull memorial Stand upon—Truth, and urge upon nothing else but the Sanctification of the Name of God, the Honour of the Religion, Government and Nation, and a blessed Welfare and Safety of the Town and it's Subjects; We give this whole Address over to your Honour's bountifull Care, recommanding the Oppressed English Madrass Mission to Your lovefull Curatorship, it being, besides the Divine Providence, not only Yet unprovided with any Fond in the World, but now also robbed, destroyed troden down, cast out and greatly Affronted and despised by the Anti-Christian Foreigners Such a one imploreth Your Honour's Help and Justice in this fair Occasion You have to undo abominable Working places of Iniquity, and on the Contrary, to promote the Kingdom of God, and to inherit the blessings of those, that glorify His Name in this Wicked part of the World.

May by Your Honour's Service henceforward glory dwell in our Land, mercy and trust meet together, and Righteousness and peace Kiss each other, Truth Spring out of the Earth and Righteousness look down from heaven and may the Lord bestow Millions of Blessings over the new Settling of the Affairs of Madrass as well as over the Honourable whole East India Company and all their Settlements, and especially over Your Honours Person, favouring You allways with His particular devine Assistance and giving You good Health and temporal and everlasting Welfare, are the faithfull Wishes of

January of this Year, containing an earnest Complaint, that two Vessels belonging to you with a Cargo of about 12000 Spanish Dollors, were Arrested at Sinchel by a Panchallong belonging . to Padang, the Seals and Pass ports torn and Violated, and besides this the Crews of the said Vessels all Massacre'd but one, further more that a Brigantine called the Fanny being Trading at Triamong, was by the Orders of our Servants at Padang driven away, desiring that concerning these Affairs We would give You satisfaction, but as our Advices from Padang are not Yet received here, we find our selves incapable of Judging of this Affair. But you will be pleased in the mean time to rest Assured; that on the receipt of the said Advices we shall not neglect to make a careful Enquiry into the said Accidents desiring in the mean time to a careful Enquiry into the said Accidents desiring in the mean time that You will send hither the Person that was saved for further Examination and Elucidation since it appears that all the hatefull Circumstances of the first Accident are taken from his single Evidence, and we Acknowledge our selves not only obliged; but shall Always show our selves inclined to Punish severely all excesses that are not only called but are found indeed to be against all moral and Divine Laws, The Law of Nations, or what may Properly belong to it, to have been committed by our Subalterns, against whom soever it might be & therefore much more so when against our good Friends and Neighbours, and a Nation whose Friendship we seek & highly esteem, but at the same time we think we are bound not to suffer our

selves to be frightned from the Mainten[ance] to the utmost of our Power of the rights & Priviledges of our high sovereigns and Principals, by the Dissatisfaction, of Private People, or by premature and improper Threatnings.

Our last was dated the 10th. May and went by the Tryal Snow, Duplicate whereof You will receive herewith.

On the 1st. June we received Your Favour of the 21st. April, advising of the Violent Storm that happened on your Coast on the 14th. of that Month. The same Gale of wind was felt at this Place on the 14th. April, and likewise on the Mallabar Coast that day, where a small Sloop of the Honble Company's belonging to Anjengo Factory was lost in Panane River, with a Cargoe on board value about eleven thousand Rupees Consigned from thence to Tellicherry. The Cuddalore Sloop (which was built at this Place for the Service of Your Presidency Agreeable to your Honour &cas. Desire) was dispatched by the Chief and Factors at Tellicherry to Anjengo Factory sometime in March, with some Rice for the Service of the Garrison, it being Judged she could perform that Service and return to Tellicherry time enough to take in a Loading of Pepper for Your Place, but as she was not heard of at that Factory so late as the 24th. April, it is hoped that the Gale having reached her, she pushed her Passage directly to Your Coast.

At the time we received the above Advices from Your Honour &ca. the President received a Letter from Admiral Boscawen with a Packet on his Majesty's Service for the Admiralty to be forwarded to England in the most expeditious manner, we therefore dispatched the same to Bussorah on the Drake Ketch the 20th. Instant, being as soon as She could possibly be got ready, and at the Same time Acquainted the Honble Company with the above most unhappy Accident by forwarding Copy of Your Letter to us Abovementioned.

We have no Opportunity at present to Send them Your Packet that we received the 24th. Instant with Your Advices of the 11th. May but shall Dispatch it the first Opportunity that Offers at the Opening of the Season which it is probable may be about the latter end of August.

We therein informed you of the Arrival here of our Honble Masters Ship the [T]airstock [sic] whom We intended to Send you in a few days with the Madeira Wine She had on board for your Place as also the Four thousand Five hundred bags of Salt Petre (4500) to compleat Your Indent But as our Honble Masters have in their Commands # this Ship positively Ordered us to purchase no more Petre than what might be necessary for the Charter party Kintledge only, as they had a large quantity in their Warehouses at home and expected more having Observed to us that those Ships that had Iron & Stones for their Charter Party, Kentledge were to have no Salt Petre put on board them We came to a resolution of Sending up no more Petre than what we had laden on the Elizabeth.

On the 3d. Instant the Tryal Snow Imported here having passed by Vizaga-patam Ingeram & Ganjam on Account of the hard Gales of Wind which the Captain said he met with off Dew Point which Set him So far to the Eastward that he could not reach any of those Ports.

Captain Nathaniel Cush the Commander of the Tavistock informing us by Letter that on taking out the Cargo designed for this place he found a great many Drains in the Ships Sides which made it requisite to Caulk her All round and that having Sprung Two Top Masts and broke his Main Yard it would be impossible to get on the Coast before the Monsoon Set in We gave directions to our Master Attendant to get the Tryal Snow in readiness with the utmost expedition the Master of her Acquainting us She was in want of Caulking and on her We shall Send the Treasure and Bales You designed for your Northern Settlements and from thence We shall direct the Master to proceed to your Presidency with what Madeira Wine he can take on board.

We have Agreeable to Your Honour &cts. request in your favour of the 28th. May demanded of Captain Tiddeman commander of the Edgbaston One hundred Forty four Pagodas (144) due to Peter Dencher on Account of Oxen he Supplied that Ship with, When Captain Hereford Commanded her, He informs us that Captain Hereford has credit on the Ships Books for Forty eight Bullocks for which if Dencher is not paid he desired us to request your Honour &ca. would Apply to Vallapah Captain Hereford's Dubash who has upwards of Two hundred Pagodas (200) of the deceased Captain's Estate in his hands which will not only defray the Ships Debts but all other Demands on him.

We are now to Acquaint Your Honour &ca. of our having drawn First & Second Bills of Exchange on Your Presidency in favour of Mr. Edward Holden Cruttenden payable to Messrs. Moses Berend Heyman & Levy Moses for Arcot Rupees Twelve thousand and Forty nine (12049) or Current Rupees 13133. 6. 6 which We request You will pay when due.

Our Honourable Masters have Sent us no Recruits this Season Apprehending we may be able Sufficiently to Recruit our Military out of the Forces and Marines in his Majesty's Service We are therefore to desire Your Honour &c*. will use Your endeavours to prevail on as many as possibly You can to Serve the Companys here and for an Encouragement to the Non Commission Officers & private men to enter into their Service they have Allowed us to give a Bounty not exceeding Forty Rupees to each man but in cases where any one enter on his being promoted to the Rank of Serjant or Corporal not having served in that Rank before they expect Such Person to enter without any other Bounty than that of his promotion.

Your Letter of the 11th. July Arrived with us on the 31st, whereby we Observe the large Tonnage You have to compleat this Season, and the hopes entertained of meeting with Assistance therein from this Place, which we are Sorry to say we shall be unable to Comply with, as the produce of Pepper in these Parts will we imagine be very Small this Season, from the excessive Rains that fell in the Country which destroyed the fruit on the Pepper vines; And it was with much difficulty we could prevail on our Merchants to Contract with Us for One thousand five hundred Candies (of 600 lb^s. ea) of which they have deld only to this day Seven hundred twenty five Candies two Maunds twenty Nine Pounds and a half

(725. 2. 29½) and we fear they will not be Able to make good the whole Quantity which Allowing them to do, in all December, we Shall have only in Warehouse of the Old and New Crop One thousand eight hundred Seventy nine Candies Sixteen

Maunds and Nine Pounds (1879. 16. 9) so that with ten thousand Pounds

(10000) weight of Cardamoms which we expect Orders from our Superiours at Bombay to provide, will be the whole of what we may expect to get this Season.

Our Honble Masters in their last Commands to this place gave us positive Orders not to purchase more than Two thousand Candies of Pepper Unless to be

got at, or under Seventy Rups. (70) P Candy in which Case they Ordered Us to go on purchasing what was procurable, Nothwithstanding which on receiving Notice of the extraordinary Demands at Your Place we Agreed to have recourse to Callicut, Penany, and other Ports to the Northward to procure this Article at any rate, so as to prevent a disappointment of the Above quantity, but all without Effect hitherto.

We Shall Advise our Superiours at Bombay what you have wrote Us by the first Occasion and Adhere to Such Orders we may receive from them for giving You all the Assistance in our Power, Should the Honble Rear Admiral pay into Your Cash Rupees three hundred twelve, two Quarter and twenty five Reas

Not receiving the Supply of Cash and Broad Cloth Your Honour &ca. Sent by the Tryall, has not only created me a deal of trouble with the Country Government but been a great check to my Investment.

The confermation of Peace I judge to be very Agreeable News to all well Wishes [sic] to the Honble Companys Affairs as well Madrass being again in our possession, to which place I have encourag'd the Grain Merchants to Carry their Grain & Acquainted them of the 6 Months indulgence Your Honour &ct. has thought proper to allow them for that purpose.

All due regard Shall be had to the mistakes & deficiences that have been complain'd of in the Ingeram Goods and I hope to prevent the like in future.

A few days past the Sloop Fort St. George brought me Your favour of the 20th. Ultimo with the Money & Broad Cloth that was carried to Bengall by the Tryall Snow, which Supply & the former I hope will Invigorate the Merchants to make up for their lost time & great disappointment in the said Vessell.

I Shall Acquaint the Merchants here, with the Encouragement You have been pleas'd to propose for the Supplying Madrass with Grain; which Join'd to their Own Interests in other respects, will not fail to carry them there, for as most of their Vessels are but badly furnish'd, for the Sea, and generally late in the Season before they are dispatch'd from their respective ports; it cannot but be more convenient to them, than proceeding further up the Coast.

Our last was dated the 6th. Ultimo, Duplicate whereof comes enclosed, Since when we have received Your Letters of the 29th. June and 11th. July last.

Immediately upon receipt of Your Letter of the 11th. July advising us of your intentions of Sending the Newcastle to the Mallabar Coast to fill up with Pepper, and that the Dragon would proceed thither from the Bay, we Acquainted the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry thereof Agreeable to Your Advices, but as the Prince William which is on the War Freight & Demorage may in all Probability be expected thither from the Bay to take in a Loading for Great Britain, we gave them directions to reserve for that Ship about four hundred Tons of Pepper out of the eighteen hundred Candys it is Judged there will be in Warehouse by the end of December, and to dispatch home either the Newcastle and Dragon with the remainder although one hundred & fifty Tons dead Freighted detaining the other Untill we can find means to give her a Dispatch, though in case they had not more than Sufficient for the Prince William in manner abovementioned, we directed them, not to dispatch home either of the other Ships till after her Arrival, or they received Advices from the Bay that she would proceed home from thence, in which last Case they will put on board the Ships from Your side about three hundred Tons each, & dispatch them therewith to great Britain, we cannot as Yet Say in what manner we shall be Able to provide even for one of the three Ships consigned to this Presidency so as to send her home this Season, nor can

we at present determine how to dispose of any of them in India so as to earn Something to help out Dimorage, wherefore if Your Honour &ca. Should have more Ships on Your hands than you can provide for, it, will be needless to send any to this Side as we shall have no Tonnage for them.

The Lead taken out of the Brilliant at this Place was weighed off by our People in the Presence of the Commander, and Afterwards on delivery again weighed off when there was only Such an Inconsiderable difference as not worth mentioning we shall not Credit Your Presidency for the Difference mentioned in Your Honour &ca's. Letter of the 29th. June.

Enclosed is a General Account Current with Your Presidency from the 30th. April 1747 being the Date of the last transmitted from this Place by which You will Observe the Several Debts and Credits Arisen between the two Presidencys Since that time.

On the 26. Instant our Honble Masters Ship Durrington sailed for Great Britain with a full Loading of Coffee, and Yesterday Arrived the Stafford Capt. Felix Baker, in About five Months from the Downes, but as yet, we have heard nothing of the Salisbury and Warren.

On the Seizure of the Portugui Church the Fathers Capuchins desiring a prolongation of the Time allotted them to remove, I forward You their Petition to that Purpose. Mr. La Metrie Acquaints me that both his Houses are mortgaged to the deceased Mr. Medeiras & that the Honourable Company must be Accountable for them to that Estate: This Gentleman, the Fathers Capuchins, & most of the others, whose possessions are Seized have desired an Attested Copy of my Orders to Mess18.
