To the Honble Charles Floyer Esq^B.

President and Governour &c^T. Council of Fort S^T. David.

Honble Sir & Sirs

Mr. Barnewall returned [...] the 27th at Night and the next Morning we deliver'd to him an Order requiring him to quit Madrass and its dependencies within the space of five days & Acquainted him of Your having been pleas'd to restore to him his House & also with the Reason that induced You to Confiscate them And Arrest him & that the Bond Mrs. Medeiros gave for his Security had been Already deliver'd Up to her. This Morning the Deputy Governour produced at the Board a Protest he had received from Mr. Barnewall Copy of which is inclosed, wherein Your Honour &c^a. will Observe he has thought proper to Misconstrue Your Lenity in permitting him to remain in India (provided he quitted this Place and it's Dependencies into an Order of Banishment for which he threatons [sic] You and [Us] with most formidable Penalties, and as a Subject of the King of Great Britain, peremptoryly demands to be sent thither, as we did not belive [sic] Your Honour &ct. could have any Objections to gratifyin[g] him herein. We sent for and Acquainted him that Since we understood he was so pressing to be sent to England, his proper method was to repair to Fort St. David from whence a Ship would Shortly be Dispatched And We made no Doubt of his Obtaining a Passage reminding him at the same time that in Conformity to Your Orders He must at all Events quit Madrass and it's Dependencies this Nigh[t] it being the Expiration of the Time allowed him, but he Obstinately refusing to Depart unless compelled We did not Hesitate to Give Captain Gingins an Order to get ready a Party of Peons, with whom likewise we have sent Lieu^t. Campbell to Conduct him to Your Presence [...] & determin [sic] with him as You shall judge [proper]. [We are] with Respect.

Honble Sir & Sirs

We wrote Your Honour &cta. under date the 8th. Instant as \$\mathbb{P}\$ Duplicate thereof enclos'd Since which Time We have received Your favour of the 13th. and 16th. October \$\mathbb{P}\$ his Majestys Sloop the Swallow.

We have Come to a Resolution of Sending the Brittania to Surat Freighted & Shall Order the Prince William to Touch at Vizagapatam for the Bales laying there.

We shall send You a quantity of Salt Petre in July next, but at Present cannot Comply with Your Honour &cta's Request having no Tonnage to carry it up.

We have accepted Your Honour &cta's Bill in favour of Mr. Percival for Eight thousand Arcott Rupees (8000) but being quite destatute [sic] of Money are Oblig'd to Lett it Run at Interest and notwithstanding Your Honour &cta write that

You are not in a Capacity to Answer our Draughts in future having detained of the Money arrived this Year only Sufficient for Your own Expences, Yet we must remark that we have received from You far Short of the Treasur [sic] designed us by our Honble Masters, and therefore hope that You will not fail to Supply us by the first Opportunity that Offers with all the Money You can by any means spare.

We have agreeable to Your Honour &cta request demanded of Captain Teddeman the Money Due from the Edgbastions Owners to Moñs. L'Bon Account of Stores Supply'd that Ship with as also the One Hundred & forty four Pagodas (144) due to Peter Denker, both which Sums he promises to Pay tho' the last with some difficulty as his Owners stand already debted for that Sum in account with Captain Hereford as soon as the said Sums are paid into the Companys Cash We shall give Your Presidency due Credit for the Same.

We are sorry to Acquaint Your Honour &cta tha[...] the Marrattoes hav[...] [P]rovince and are daily molesting & Stoping Our Boats [...] en enough in Garrison to Ac[...] Offensively We de[...] all the Men Yo[...] spare which We [...] this in Conseque[nce] of our Request to Your Hon. &cta under date the 10th. August last,

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We have received Your favour of the 3d. Instant Inclosing Invoice of Stationary Sent us overland which is also arrived and turns out Right.

The Chay Goods you mention provided by Linga Chitty as far as brought in were Sent to the Washers the 20th. of last Month. We shall not fail forwarding them as well those Yet to be delivered, when a Conveyance Offers, And Should be glad to know if Your Hon^r. &c^t. would not choose Telle Singa Chitty & Sunca Ramah's Cloth to be embaled brown, and Sent You as We apprehend it cannot be cured before the Dispatch of the Elizabeth.

These Merchants tell us that in three or four Days they shall bring in Cloth to the Amount of their Advance by You, and that they were promised a further One here. Your Honour &ct. will please then to furnish us with a Supply of Money for that Purpose You will likiwise order Musters to be sent us of the Different Cloths contracted for.

We shall observe what You direct in relation to bringing the Seepoys, Slaves, and Horses to the Account of this Place but as Captain Gingins has already transmitted you the Expences of the latter for the month of December You will please to Discharge the same.

[...] Your Hon^r. & Give [u...] for fifteen thousand Rupees advanced M^r. Smith here and repaid at Your Presidency but we have also Charged You for all advances to that Gentleman as Steward.

We tender'd Cojah Miguel de Gregorio the Bill of Exchange and he does not accept it declaring in excuse that Marut Marcar is Indebted to him, We shall therefore Protest it.

We have laden on two Mussoolahs and a Boat called Mera Madutt whereof one Fackeer is Tindell Sixty five Bales of Cloth brought in by Linga Chitty and Servanna Chitty Bill of Lading and Account of which go enclos'd. We advanced the Tindall Ten Pagodas for the Boat and four Pagodas for the two Mussoolahs. and to a Serjeant that accompanies them five Pagodas for his Charges You will please to return the Tarpawlins before sent with the Broad Cloth and those that go now with the Bales.

Your Honour &ct. are credited for fifteen hundred and five Pagodas Twenty Seven fanams for the Sale of Horses and Camells and One hundred fifty more paid by Peter Dencker in part of his Debt the Rest He promises to discharge by the last of the Month. We are with Respect

It will be impossible to compleat the Examination of Gundaveddy Vencaty Ramah and Nella Chilly's Accounts in Time to go by her: When finished we Shall not fail sending it with our Remarks in the Same manner with Telle SingaChitty and Sunca Ramahs already forwarded.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Our last to Your Honour &ct. was the 3d. Instant we now enclose the Commissarys of Stores Indent for Sundries and beg Your Compliance therewith.

The Merchants desiring an advance here You will please to instruct us at what Exchange we are to deliver them Rupees whether at the Honble Company's Stated Price of 350 or at the Currency of Madrass and if we may not for the greater Regularity of Accounts, debt the Merchants themselves for Such Advances & give them Credit for what Cloth they bring in.

The time lemitted [sic] for Dispensing with the Customs of Fort S⁵. George being near expired we refer it to Your Honour &ca's Consideration whether we are to begin levying them from that Time on all importations or for the Encouragement of the Place continue the Indulgence Still to Grain & Provisions.

We have had Application made to Us from Several quarters for Renting the Betle and Tobacco and other of the Company's Farms, which to the great Hurt of their Estate now lye unimproved, but find by a Varietý in the Offers that it is impossible for us to fix their True Value in the alter'd State they now are [...] we also find expressly pointed out by our [...] former President and Council of this Place for the Year 1743 But as our Farms at this Time labour under many Disadvantages & May be judged dayly improvable, We Submitt it to Your Hoñ[rs.] &ca. to determine the Duration of the Lease and beg Your advice as to any other Step it may be proper for us to take in this Affair.

The Quit Rent and Scavingers Duty not Having been Collected Since the Restitution of the Place and the Company being at a Monthly Charge for Cleaning the White and Black Towns we purpose with Your Approbation to Appoint a Person to Receive those Duties according to the Method formerly observed here Only it will be Necessary to have regard at Present to the Circumstances of the Inhabitants. By this Means our Honble Masters will be eased of a Constant Expence and a Small Revenue accrue to them.

Mr. Jones being acquainted with Your Honour &ca's Commands of the 19th. Ultimo, and Demanding of us if no refusal to Comply therewth. he Should be denyed Permission of Passage on the Elizabeth was Directed without further Interrogatories to inform us Possitively whether or not he would deliver in the Accounts required, He has thought Proper to make no Answer thereto and we are to request Your Honour &ca. would Dictate to us our Proceedings on this Contempt.

Mr. Smith arrived the Second of the Month and made a Tender of refunding into our Cash Fifty thousand fanams advanced him here as Steward We Shall wait Your Directions for Receiveing it, and are with the Greatest Respect.

Your Obliging favour of the 10th. Novem^r. reached me a few days past. The Nabob remains as Yet at Chicacul and it is said will go for Golcandah very soon; however we are under no Apprehensions of his coming this way at Present.

Agreeable to Your Honours &ca. Orders I now send You by the adventure Briggantine Fifty Bales of Sallampores Ordinary as Finvoice and Bill of Lading enclosed; it was the last of September before I received any Money from Vizagapatam for my Investment, the begining of November, the grain is ready to Cut here which employs all the poorer sort of People that notwithstanding Cotton is plenty the Weawers were forced to stand Still for want of Thread otherwise I should have sent more now; but as that is over and as I have money in my hands to begin with and the Year, before me, I hope I shall be able to do something Considerable before it is out.

I shall be greatly Obliged to Your Honour &ca if you would be pleas'd to send me by the Return of this Vessel, Ten Candys of Lead and Ten Candys of Copper (of the large round Plates, the other not being esteemed here) I have likewise sent with this a Beam Weights, & Scales, which are defective, and beg you will be pleased to send me others in their Stead with a pair of Triangles.

Your favour of the 15th. December covering Duplicate and a Bill of Exchange for 10000 Pagodas on Copperty Tarra Linga [...] came to hand [...] and the money duely received Conformable to Your Honour's &ct. Orders I immediately forward^d: five thousand Pagodas to Vizagapatam and for the Remaining five thousand with the [Balls] & Charges thereon. Account Current Fort St. David shall be Credited.

The 6th. Current I dispatched the Phænix and Suncrapollam Boat to Your Honour &c^t. which I hope are safe arrived Inclosed comes Duplicate Invoices and Second Bills of Lading for the same, I am sorry I could not send You more Ordinary Cloth and lessen the quantity of Fine being made Sencible of my Mistake when it was too late [and] beg Your Honour &c^t. will escuse [sic] it as I shall take particular Care in providing this Years Investment which I flatter myself will be more favourable than last, by reason the present Government is pritty Quiet and my Neighbours the French quite tranquill who I am persuaded have had less Money than what they Boasted off.

In the beginning of the Year 1746 Mr. Saunders had permission, to Repair the Roof of Nellepillee Godown which to this Time has been neglected most the Pallamerer Reapers & Wossalls being so Eat by the White Ants that the Tiles are frequently falling down on the Cloth and Peoples heads and as it is the only Godown we have to sort and Keep out cur'd Cloth in I hope Your Honour &ct. will give me liberty to repair it before our Rains set in.

Whereas Disputes have arisen of late between the Right and Left hand Casts Inhabitants of Madrass in Relation to their different Rights and Priviledges and whereas they have severally brought their Complaints to the Council Board requesting the Decission of the Deputy Governour &c⁰, thereon and have enter'd into a Mutual and Voluntary Engagement to abide thereby under Penalty of Ten thousand Pagodas to be paid to the Honble Company by such Cast as shall any ways Offend against or infring the said Decision Provided nevertheless that it be not contrary to the Regulations agreed and Sign'd to by both parties in the Year 1708 and since in 1728.

We Richard Prince Esqr. Deputy Governour of Fort St. George, Richard Starke, John Smith, William Smyth King, and John Walsh of Council at the same Place having thoroughly heard and Consider'd the Complaints and Answers of both Casts do give our final Judgement and Determination as follows, requiring due Obedience thereto by each party on the aforesaid Penalty of Ten thousand Pagodas, First, In Relation to that part of the Black Town which was laid open by the French. The right of the Ground shall continue to its Old Proprietors, Where Right Hand Streets Stood to the Right hand Cast and where left hand Streets Stood to the Left Hand Cast. But no Shews or Processions shall be brought upon this open Ground farther than is Necessary for turning out of one Street down into another for which a Space of 120 feet Broad will be allowed and as Middle Gate by which the left Hand Cast used to enter the White Town, is Stop'd up, It is determined that they come Straight from Permal Pagoda Street to the Fort of the Glacis, where a Road of 40 Feet Broad running for Opposite to Choultry Gate to the sea Side shall be marked Out which Road Shall be common to both Casts The Left hand Cast by turning to the Right may proceed thro Choultry Gate into the White Town and by the Left to Treplicane and else where. The Right hand Cast if inclin'd may likewise use this Road for going to the sea Side and so on. For the more perfect knowledge and Observance of these Dispositions Stones, Posts shall be fixed at proper Distances to Plan therewth. at the expence of both Casts, but it's Particularly remarked that they are only made in Consequence of Middle Gate [...].

Secondly Concerning [...] Pettah As it appears in Contestable that Tomby Chitty had for Several Years and without interuption gone in his Pallenkeen that way to Cachalli Pagoda, we pronounce that his Brother Tillisinga Chitty is therefore not liable to the Fine expressed in a Contract between the Contending Parties of the 28th. October 1728, But Conforming to the Apparent Intention of this Contract We order in future that the left Hand Cast go to Cachalli Pagoda in State (as in Pallankeens, Hackrees, on Horse Back, with Roundellis, or Dooties) by no other Street than that opposite the Pagoda made by the Pulling down of Two Conicoply's Houses. They may cross the Pagoda Street but not turn to the Right or left, it

being in all Respects considerd as a Right hand Street. Nothing therein contained extends to the Religious Processions of the Idol, which is precisely regulated, in the forementiond Contract. As the Codum is a particular Ceremoney which there is a Necessity of Performing at [Mootama's House], The Left hand Cast have liberty of Proceeding thither on this Occasion with the usual Pomp by Jugganaudums Alley.

THIRDLY Concerning the Houses inhabitated by Dancing Girls as they have appropriated to this Use for many Years and no Contract is produced by the Right Hand People to Shew they were originally intended for Bramineys, it is determined that they remain to their present Service.

FOURTHLY Concerning the Ravages committed by each party on it's opposite, as they are Reciprocal and impossible to be estimated, It is adjudged that each Cast do submit to its own Losses, but we recommend at the same time to the Heads of both to make amends as much as Possible to Such of their Poorer followers who have Suffer'd in this Outrage.

We have no advices as Yet of the Severn and Britania being on the Coast but expect by Your Letter to hear of them dailey.

The Boscawen Captain Braund is design'd from Bombay for Mocho as is the Salisbury Captain Burrows for Europe in Case her Tonnage can be Compleated on this Coast which we entertain hopes of.

In Consequence of our Honble Masters Orders Mr. Richard Bourchier proceeded to Bombay for Succeeding Mr. Wake & Mr. Byfeld is Appointed Chief of this Settlement in his Room.

Honble Sir & Sirs

On the 26th. Ultimo, imported in our Road the Brillant Snow Captain Edward Burman Commander, and brought Us Your Honour's &c^a. Commands bearing date the 27th. July last, Wherein we are glad to perceive, that the Resolution We came to in sending the Duke of New Castle to the Presidency of Fort S^t. David was not altogether disagreeable but in some Measure conformable to the Honble Company's Injunctions; and We hope Your Honour &c^t. have met with Success in the Execution thereof.

As to the Louisa Sloop We entirely give her over for lost and are in daily Expectation of Your Honours &ca. favouring us with another in her Steed being reduced to the greatest Inconveniency in furnishing the Out Settlements with occasional Supplies, and transporting the Pepper hither from the Residency of Pooloo Pesang.

The Rice Salt &c^a. loaded on board the Brillant for the Service of this Place turned out according to Invoice and Bill of Lading enclosed and have been carried to their proper Account.

The 22^d. Ulto. arrived here the Marlbro Captain William Parks Commander from England, but last from S^t. Helena with Stores and Treasure, which latter Article upon Examination proved to be all in Estimates and Old Pillar Dollars contrary to our expectation, especially since we have for some Years past with much Difficulty supplanted most of the Old Mexico, to make Way for the Currency of Mill'd Money; occasioned by Our Hoūble Masters repeated Orders on this Head, they assuring us it would [not in future] lay in their Power to Supply us with the former Dollars, [...] not as Yet [thoroughly] established tho We believe it would soon have the desired Effect were there no other Coin introduced to kindle again the Superstitious Disposition of the Inhabitants, This Disapointment gives us great Concern, and in all Probability will frustrate the Design We have long labour'd to instill in the Natives, and in all probability prompt them to refuse Payment for their Pepper in Such Sort, as was formerly the Case: For these Reasons We have Ship'd on board the Brillant Eight Chests of the said Money and Consigned them to Your Honours &c, flattering our Selves, that in exchange We shall be furnish'd with New immediately after the exigency of our present necessity becom's known; The Hoñble Company's Stock on hand of that Coin, not being near Sufficient for the Purchase of this Seasons investment.

Mr. Thomas Combes took Passage on the Briggantine Fanny at Batavia and put in here the 30th. of last Month; By him we are informed he had loaded on Board a Vessel, there, a Quantity of Salt. for the use of this Settlement since which she is also arrived.

Captain Parks Proceeded to Moco Moco the 17th. Instant, to [take] in the Pepper of its Districts; and We hope his Ship will meet with no Retardment in receiving this Season's Crop either there, or at the other Out Residencys, Nevertheless We are Still unable to Calculate the Damage their Honours Investment's have Sustained, thro: the Contagious Distemper of the Small Pox, which Yet spreads in the Countrys of Manna, Peeno and Laye, and gives Us Room, to Apprehend a Deficiency of Pepper will now appear by means of that fatal Discease: However our endeavours shall not be wanting to animate the Planters to Keep up to their Contracts so as if Possible, to affor'd the Ship a full Cargo without incuring Demorage.

Inclosed in Your Honours &cs. above advices, came to hand a Manifest of Private Trade laden on board the Brillant, and the Sea Customer has duely accounted for what goods disposed of here.

From the Country's Appearing in Perfect Tranquility, except where the Small Pox rages, We may reasonably conclude, when that is quite abated to see the

Pepper Gardens again in a flourishing Condition, and have the Satisfaction to render Your Honour &c. more Pleasing Relations thereof. In the Interim We crave Permission to Protest to Your Honour &c. that We are

[Arrived] here the 3^d. of September last, and shall go from [hence in two] or three Days on Ship Delawar for Great Britain, [Admiral] Vernon and Edgcot will be dispatch'd tomorrow [...] by the Somerset, Pelham [...] Royal Duke, and Roda, the Griffin, Sandwich, and Montford will be going hence in December & January.

Besides the foregoing Ships there is at this Port this Year, Two Danes, two Sweedes, two French, and three Dutch Ships all of which are bound for Europe, except two of the Dutch that go for Batavia, and Sweeds Ship that cant get her load ing Stays here till next Year.

There is also here a Surat Ship Freighted by Armenians.

The Augusta not being able to reach Your Port got to Malaca where She Stays till the Munsoons Shifts.

TO THE MUCH NOBLE COMMANDER AND

Counsellors of the Honble English Company In the Government of Madrass or of Fort S^T. David in Cuddalore

When I received Advice that an Detachment from the British [Garrison] of Madrass went for to Seize upon [and] to take out of the City [of San Thomé] Father Francisco Antoni[o] Purification a Portu[guese Fra]nciscan Fryar, I imm[...] private affair with [...] might have [...] such like an Insult, and that it might have been committed by some Passionate Officer, without his having orders from his Superiours, but being since presented to me that Admiral Boscawen will send the said Fryar to London in One of his Ships, and that immediately after the said imprisonment Joseph Coelho de Campos presenting the said Mr. Boscawen the Patent, which I dispatched from this City of Goa and which was then Arrived at St. Thome, by which I appointed the said Franciso Antonio, as Attorney for the Portugueze Nation of the City of St. Thome, untill such time that I should appoint a Governor. and that the said Mr. Boscawen paid no attention to an Instrument so Authentick, but even went so far as to Order the said Campos to withdraw himself from the said City of St. Thomé, and from its districts, and that He went Personally, and Committed in the said City great^r. Insults to the Flag of the King my Master which were then Flying, or Hoisted, by placing in their room those of the Brittish Nation I understand that all these things were done by his Order.

An Insult of this Nature, is no way justifiable but at a time when our Nation Should be at War, and Should have made formal declaration thereof, that I might be acquainted therewith, but it being certain and evedently [sic] manifest to me, that neither the King my Master or his Britanick Majesty, have changed to this hour that Alliance, and Good understanding which has ever Subsisted, betwixt them, my great Admiration is unexpressible.

I have wrote to Mr. Boscawen desiring to know the Motives for so extraordinary a proceeding but being impossible that any Reason can justify it, and as I immagin, from some advices which I have received, that he will be returned for Europe, I find myself under an Obligation to Manifest to his Successors now in Government, that this Transaction, the I [should] have it in the Most clear light, appears to me incredible and [unheard] of and as I cannot reconcile myself to dissimulation, I can [...] but represent and Protest to the much Noble Commander, [and Counce] llors of the Honourable English Company [...] of Fort St. David in Cuddalore, or whereseever the Government, and Councill of the said Honourable Company may be, that I hope for the restitution of the said City of St. Thomé, to it's former State, as the Dominion of the King my Master, replacing in it his Royal Flag as it was at the Time when the said Insult was committed, that, by this Means the Consequences, that may attend it may be avoided; against which I do protest on the Part of the King my Master, and of this His Dominions of which he has been pleased to give me Charge.

The left hand Cast desired before it Shou'd be carried into execution to have Liberty of Sending it for Approval to their People Scatter'd about the Countrey, But as prolonging the Dispute might be of the utmost ill consequen[ce] and the Inhabitants of this City are Solely considerd in these regulations, We could not by any means defer Publishing our Resolutions, No Attention has been wanting in us to inform ourselves of the Justness of their different pretentions, in order to give the most candid and impartial Decision on the Whole, and if it has met with Your Honour, &ca's, Approbation we must beg You'll Perm[it] us to enforce a Compliance therewith; for it gives us the utmost Concern to Consider the Severe Effects these Dissensions must produce, if Protracted, both to the Company Investment and Trade in General.

We are very sensible the Upparra Salempores has always been very acceptable, but the frequent Shocks those Countrys received from the different Interest and Partys in them cause great Alterations this has been the Case with the Several Towns where the Salempores are Manufactured, Villages have been burnt and Plundered, the Inhabitants some put to the Sword, others fled, Armys Encamp'd and property always precausions [sic] which has proved very Detriemental to Trade our best endeavours shall not be wanting to give all possible encouragement and We hope that Manufacture will again revive.

We shall Punctually observe Your directions as to the proportion of Fine and Ordinary Cloth which if Your Honour &c^t. will please to look upon our Investment for last Year You will perceive we have not exceeded.

Our Militarys Pay is Regulated According to Your Orders, Our Supernumenary Peons disbanded and the Gunroom will be Settled with the greatest frugality.

Whenever any of our Honble Masters Ships fall in here if the Season Admits we Shall Order them to proceed to Fort St. David.

The Gentlemen at Bengall sent the Prince William Captain William Webber for Our Bales (She did not arrive here till the 5th. Instant) with Orders to dispatch her Directly for England, We sent on Board 260. Bales 50. of which were return'd the Captain Alledging he had not room for them, Whereupon we Protested She was Dispatched and Saild for England the 9th. in the Morning, Inclosed are Copys of the Sundry Papers thereto relateing.

We now inclose an estimate of the Charges repairing our Several Buildings But we Shall not be able to Set about them till we are Supplyed with Timber and Plank for that purpose.

Our Washers Godowns at Valtair being quite out of Repair and useless M^r. Prince Offering a Good Strong House fit for that purpose for Rupes, 1400, We believe if it Meets with Your Approbation it will answer the End purposed.

The 25th. ulti[mo] [we] received Pagodas 5000, from Metchlepatam which was very acceptable and We hope as Opportunity Offers we Shall receive [a] Supply of Pagodas and [Rupees on] which our Investment depends.

We shall [apply] Presidency for the deficiency of Broad [cloth as] Directed.

Inclosed are our Cash & Paymasters Accounts &c². Papers as \$\P\$ List of the Pacquet Account Cloth on hand as Under Written.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Your favour of the 16th. Instant we have received and are concerned to find the [sic] having been prevented from transmitting our Papers has occasioned Some false Representations to gain Credit with Your Honou[r] &c^t. and induced You to imagine that we have not only misapprehended but in Some Cases acted in Contradiction to Your Orders: The Perusal of our Consultations which accompany this address would We doubt not be alo[ne] Sufficient to acquit us of this Charge but as we think we can not be too explic[it] in refuting what has been artfully alledged to our prejudice and of Convincing Your Honour &c^a. of the Strict obedience we allways have, and ar[e] truely Sensible must be paid to Your Commands, We shall particularly answer to each Article.

With regard to Mr. Jones, it will be evidently made [...] appear to Your Honour &ca. that there is but one part of it that bears th[e] least Colour of truth and even that, proceeds rather from our Mistaking th[e] manner of Executing Your Orders, that from misconstruing the Meanin[g] of them. This occasioned us to require M^r . Jones to deliver in to us, his Accounts in Partnership, in Order that we might give them to M^r . Moses; which had he complied with, M^r . Moses would have done the same; And this Method we conceived [answerd] Your Intent of their Accoun[t] being reciprocally delivered. Here is so Small a Deviation from Your Directions (even as they have been Since explained) that we hope it cannot have any Pernicious Consequences, and will be easily excused by You: As to every other part of Mr. Jones's Allegations they are so totally void of truth that notwithstanding we have had frequent Experience of his Crafty Misrepresentations, Yet we cannot but be Surprized at his extraordinary Presumption in advancing Such bold Falsities to Your Honour &c². especially his Asserting that we wrote, that You would deny him Permission of Passage on the Elizabeth, in case he did not deliver Mr. Moses his Accounts; This could very unfitly be Supposed for us to tell him, and which our Answer to his peremptory Demand of the 23d: Janry. most effectually disproves, We shall in Conformity to Your directions Send him Copy of Mr. Mose's Letter of Complaint, Mr. Jones is applying himself to Your Honour &ca:, for this Letter would perhaps insinuate thereby that he was unable to procure it from Us, but Mr. Jones is far from being ignorant that it was ever the Practice of the Secretary's Office to deliver readily all papers of this kind when required.

We are now to reply to that Part of you Letter concerning the Carpenter John Moore we Should have been glad if Your Honour &ca. had been more particular in acquainting us wherein it is said we have abridged him of any Priviledge You were pleased to grant him, But as You have not, we can only Assert in general and with Confidence, that we have not in any one Instance infringed the Contract that was made with him, So far from it that he was for a long time indulged in many advantages that did in no wise belong to him in Right of that Contract till at length wearied with the Repeated Murmurs & Complaints of all the Inhabitants alledging that they were greatly imposed upon in the price of their furniture &ca: and absolutely deprived the Use of a Carpenter except by a Submissive Application to John Moore who Offen [sic] used to refuse them that favour with some degree of Insolence, we are induced to make the Regulations as Mention'd in our Consultation of the 19th: February, where You will please to Observe the Most Material is, that Such Carpenters as Moore had not occasion to Employ in the Honble Companys Business, should have Liberty to work for any off the Inhabitants who wanted them, And that Mr. Moore should not have power to Seize any Carpenters; but the Number Requisit for the Company's Work he was to acquaint the Paymaster with, who was [Ordered] to take Care that he Should be constantly supplyed with the [m], This [we conceive] does not in any Shape interfere with Mores Articles, no more [than to] the other Regulations then made.

[...] Competently disproved the Several Suggestions that have been made You to our Disadvantage and we doubt not but what we have Said will cause Your Honour &ca. to Shew a due Resentment to the Authors, as may in future put to

Silence all Such who thro' Malice or Disgust at not being Supported in their unjustifiable Encroachments may be enduced [sic] to Misrepresent the actions of Those, You have judged proper to Substitute for the Management of Our Honble Masters Affairs here.

We shall punctually execute Your Honours &ct's, Several Commands, Particularly in transmitting regularly our Consultations and Cash Accounts: The dispatch of the Elizabeth having broke in greatly upon the Month of January we were in hopes for once of obtaining an Excuse for sending the Consultations of that Month with those of February; And Nothing has detained their going some days past but the unsafety of the way: However they now Sett Out with the usual Monthly Papers.

That You [sic] Petitioners constituent did at Maca'o lend Sundry Sums of Money to Joseph Coelho and Miguel Pedro to run on their Several Bonds at Respondentia from thence to Manilla on the Terms and Conditions specified in their Said Bonds or obligations, as also in the Paragraph of the Letter from Your Petitioners Constituant, Translates of which several Papers for the more clear Stating the Case he begs leave to annex hereto; Now Your Petitioner further begs leave to Show that as by the said Joseph Coelho and Miguel Pedro have acted very unfairly and unjustly, and are now arrived in a Briggantine on this Coast and Your Petitioner is informed that Shortly intend to come to this Port; therefore, Your Petitioner most humbly Prays as he conceives would be needless to prolong this Petition as the annexed Papers so Plainly Shows His case that Your Worship &ct. will be pleased on the arrival of the said Briggantine to cause the said Joseph Coelho & Miguel Pedro to Pay their Several Debts, or on their Refusal that Your Worship &ct. will Please to take such measures for the Retention of their Persons the said Briggantine and Cargo in Order that Your Petitioner may be Satisfied his Several demands, as Your Worship &ct. shall seem meet and,

Your Petitioner shall ever Pray.

PARAGRAPH OF M^R. MANOEL VICENTE ROZA'S LETTER TO ADRIAN FOURBACK, CONCERNING THE BRIGGANTINE ARRIVED FROM MANILLA TO THIS COAST, COMMANDED BY JOSEPH COELHO DATED AT [Maca'o] THE 20TH. JANUARY, RECEIVED HERE THE 29TH. MARCH 1750. N.S.

[...] You have heard of the great loss I sustain'd [...] the Ship Pied [...] last Year on the Coast, being to the amount of above Fourteen thousand Tales, besides the Ship which I had given some Years ago to my Nephew notwithstanding that loss, I am also disappointed by Joseph Coelho and Miguel Pedro, who being Oppress'd by the late Governour here, and in fear of what might be the Consequence, they retird with me to the Jesuits's College, from whence I sent them to Manilla in a Sloop belonging to Captain Don Jeronimode Hitta Sallazar, with the greatest part of the Cargo which was Returned to me, back on the Ship St. Anna, from her intended Manilla Voyage, as She was Obliged to bear away again to this Place by bad weather: I gave them those Goods at the same Price as they cost me, and an Order to them, that in case they found the Galeon missing at Manilla, and they on that account not able to dispose of the said Goods without loss; they might then, give or send them at Respondentia to New Spain on my Account and Risque, and to that Purpose I recommended the above Persons to my Attornies and Friends at Manilla. There were the Persons I had sent to that Place in the said Sloop with Goods and only one of them Named Joaquim Lopes da Silva took the advantage of my order in Applying to my Attorney Dr. Thomas Sanches Bernardo de Queiros, who gave him 30 \$\text{ Cent advance on the prime Cost and sent on my Account and Risque to the Value of Nine Thousand Dollars to New Spain, of which the said Joaquim brought me Sufficient and Authentick proofs; But the other two Persons being at variance with one another, namely Joseph Coelho and Miguel Pedro. would not follow the method as Joaquim did, to get rid of the Goods in their hands. but came into a Scheme of Buying a Vessell in Company with an Armenian named Gregorio de Jacob, To do which, they Sold the Goods at 15 or 20 P Cent loss on the prime Cost in order to get ready money in their hands and have accordingly purchas'd a Briggantine and a Cargo of Cowries to proceed to the Coast without my permission to make such a Risque; and I being inform'd of these transactions, and at the same time the said Vessell, was to depart from Manilla in October, I could not send my Letters thither by way of Amov in time so as to reach the Vessell at Manilla before She Left that Place, I have therefore now taken Authentick Copys of Joseph Coelho's Obligation, as also that of Miquel Pedro who goes on this Ship St. Catharina; and as I have no other Person to Apply to in this Affair I must desire You'll accept the Power of Attorney I now send You inclos'd, as also Copys of

their Obligations, and as soon as You have Advice of the Arrival of said Vessell from Manilla in any Port on the Coast, I desire You'll put an Arrest upon her, and the Cargo she brings, and the Captain also, and Demand and receive from the said Captain and Miguel Pedro all such Sums as are mention'd in their obligations with 20 P Cent Respondentia, and 10 P Cent more [from] Manilla to the Coast, as the risque thither I now take on my acc[ount] [and] when you recover the Money I desire You'll send it all [...] English Ships bound to Canton on Freight with orders to deliver it there to Don Joseph de La Barre, but in case, You have not an Opportunity to send it By an English Ship, You may then send One half of the Money on the St. Catherina, and the other half on the Ship Nossa Senhora de Ampar[o], In Case either of the Above Persons can Produce any Sufficient Written Proofs of their having sent any risque to New Spain on my Account, You may Accept the Same and Carry to their Credit, otherwise dont admit any reasons that they may 'Alledge; and all such Papers as You receive from them, transmit to Manilla to Captain Joaquim Lopes da Silva who goes from hence to that Place in a Galley called the S^t. Francis Xavier, and in his Absence, to my Attorney's there, D^r. Thom^s. Sanches Bernards de Queiros and Don Joseph de Mimije Bernando de Queiros; I hope You'll use all deligence in getting my Money from them and Remit it to me in the manner abovemention'd.

In pursuance of our Most Humble Petition of the 2^d. of this Month, and of Your Honours favourable resolution taken upon it; We see us Constrained by the long lasting hardships we have been under here these Seven Months, not finding a Place to continue the Duties of our Ministry in Preaching and Catechising and Administring [sic] the Holy Sacraments, to implore Your Honour in these further most humble Lines, kindly to let us enjoy in the mean time (till Your Honour can provide for our Restablishment) so much relief, as to lend us the mere Use of the Void French Portugueze Church here in Town together with those rooms of the Convent house next it, that are as Yet empty and not used by any body.

We do the less doubt of Your Honour's compassionated [sic] agreeing us this Petition, as it cannot be prejudicial to any Body, and as the Holy Easter is near at hand wherein we heartily Wish to be not destituted again of the blessed Opportunity of a Devine [sic] Service, being with the Utmost Respect.

On the 17th. we had an Address from Mr. George Jones, intimating, That he had received Information from your Honour &c. of the Directions you had given us to furnish him Copys of the Papers exhibited against him by Mr. Moses which He prayed us to have done and attested by our Secretary: That he also beg'd to have an attested Copy of an Order said to be given by You sometime in January last: And that he earnestly desired we would inform him whether two Orders dated the 23d. & the 24th. January (which he Subjoin'd) were exhibited and Sent him by our Directions, as they were said to be by our Secretary Mr. Walsh.

Mr. Jones being sent for was acquainted that the Papers he requested were ready for him: and being required at the same time to pay to the Secretary his established fees for reading & entering former Papers, he declared he would not

unless the Bill was first authenticated in writing from the Board, notwithstanding our Assurances of Redress in Case it were exorbitant & unprecedented. As such a proceeding would be quite new, we did not think proper to gratify him therein and having no other means to oblige him to pay the Fees, as You had Order'd us, we resolved to retain the Papers 'till we Should be furnish'd from You with further directions thereon.

As to his Second Request, for Copy of Your Honor. &c's Order to us, we did not think our Selves oblig'd to comply with it, And the other desireing to be informed whether the Papers preferred to him by Mr. Walsh subscribed by Our Order and as our Secretary, were wrote with our Knowledge & Direction, we regard as a great Indignity offer'd to us, and cannot help testifying our Resentment therof to Your Honour &c^a.

Mr. Walsh desires leave to enclose for Your Inspection the Bill Mr. Jones Refused Payment of, which he drew up agreable to the best Information he could get, The List of the established Fees formerly affixed in the Secretary's Office being missing: And he therefore begs that Mr. Secretary Bourchier may be permitted to Send him a List of such as are authorized to be received at the Presidency, that he may guide himself thereby.

In Relation to the Briggantine St. Anna The Deputy Governour having recommended it to us to let the People land their Goods from her of themselves as we could then oblige them to accomodate the Affair with more ease & Security, we delayed executing Your Orders concerning her 'till the 17th, when seeing that the owners had made no advance in unloading her we Order'd a Sergeant & some men on board to prevent her leaveing the Port and at the same Time sent for Coelho & Heitor to examin them on the Affair: They both acknowledge the Obligations transmitted You to be authentick but declare nevertheless that Vicente Roza has no concern in this Briggantine: That Gregorio Jacob, Don Manuel Tresgallo & Philip da Silva are the People whose property She is: these three being sent for deliver in their Claims & the two last make Oath that their respective Sums being at Respondentia were taken up at Manilla and Bonds deliverd them there, The former apparently is a third owner in the Brigantine but no otherwise concern'd with Coelho & Heytor: The only Part of the Maca'o Cargo that they give Account of is 77 Pounds of twisted Silk Isquerdilha 119 lb of Twisted Silk and 153 lbs of untwisted colour'd Silk which Coelho left at Manilla in Order to be sent to New Spain whereof he deliverd us a kind of Memorandom Signed by one Manoel de Sespedes taking his Oath to the Fact; On the whole it Appears to us that Coelho & Heytor embessel'd the Cargo entrusted to them by Vincente Roza and with the Money purchased the St. Anna, that they afterwards sold a third of her to Gregorio Jacob and took up Money at Respondentia on the Voyage from Don Manuel Trasgallo & Philip da Sylva: But as this is an affair of Consequence in itself and the more so as it entirely relates to Strangers We desire that Your Honour &c: will be very explicite with Regard to all the future Steps You may judge proper to be taken hereon. We Joseph Coelho & Meguel Pedro Heytor Do acknowledge to have bought a Brigantine of the Dominican Fryars for the Sum of Sixteen hundred Dollars in which Joaquim Lopes da Silva was to be Concernd, but he declaring off of his intention, & the Voyage being intended for the Coast of Chormandell, we admitted Gregorio de Jacob for a third Part in the said Brigantine in the Same footing as Joakim Lopes da Silva was, and we give his Part free from Embroils, he the said Gregorio de Jacob being obliged to come in for the Charges of the Brigantin equally, and we shall oblige our Selves to proceed our Voyage to the Coast of Chormandel and her Return back Shall be Elsewhere as Conveniency Should require for our most advantage without any of the Copatners [sic] Puting an opposition to Such Voyage, but if it happen that any of the Copartners do So, then Such of the Copartners that does it Shall be obliged to answer for all Losses & Damages, that may cause to his other Partners, And We Joseph Coelho, Meguel Pedro Heytor & Gregorio de Jacob declare that every One of us have enterd with Six thousand Dollars each, the Charges of the said Brigantine including, and that all the Respondentia that Jointly & Seperately can be got on her for the abovesaid Voyage Shall be on account of the Copartners, obliging our Selves to answer for each other & the Bond to be Signed by all three as Customery [sic], Having Drawn two of this Tenor One Sign'd by us Joseph Coelho & Meguel Pedro Heytor & the other by Gregorio de Jacob Manila. the 23d. May 1749.

I Leave in Your Hands a Receipt of Don Andres Blanco Vermudes Serjeant Major for Seventy Seven Pounds of twisted Silk Isquerdilha also One hundred Nineteen Pounds Twisted Silk and One hundred fifty three pounds of untwisted colour'd Silk being all of Canton; and on the Arrival of the Galleon I desire You will receive the Amount thereof in Spanish Dollars that I may receive it from You on my Arrival to this Place, and in Case I dont come here; then I desire You'll remit the said Money to Senhor Antonio Joze da Costa at Maca'o, in his absence to Senhor André Martins de Ramos, or in the absence of both to the Reverend Padre Fr. Manoel de Remedios Augustin Friar, which You are to send by the first Conveyance of a Vessel going to China or Canton; & being in hopes of Your acting for me in this Affair better than I can recommend You herein, I have made two of this Tenor, one of which being Sign'd by You to keep by me as a Receipt, the other Sign'd by me to Serve You for a Memorandom. HEALTH BE TO THEM.

I cannot omit this favourable opportunity to forward the Present to Your Honours, since it is my Duty to exert myself as much as in my Power lies, to do all things which may tend to the advantage of his Imperial Majesty, and much more so for the preservation of his Right in this Place, so unjustifiably violated, Since it is Gods will that I have not the means necessary to effect this, I am obliged to importune Your Honour's to find me such as may be most expedient to Support the Honour of his Imperial Majesty, and our Quiet, I am well Assured of Your Honours, readiness to Shew, at this juncture, the esteem You bear his August House, which will ever Remain ready to Shew You its August acknowledgment, Prosp[e]rity is not the Time to discover the sincerity of a Friend, but Adversity makes the tryal, and Shows, What it is, With all confidence, therefore I take recourse to Your Honours, not in the least doubting, but that from Your generosity, and true friendship, You will be pleased to favour me in this Affair, which is so pressing, and Shew Yourselves according to my wishes.

Before General Boscawens departure from this Coast I beg'd the favour of him to remember, that the English Gentlem. when Nazerzam arrived, would obtain a fermao: of this Place, and of it's dependances, which I was assured would be highly approved of by his Imperial Majesty as being the most sure Steps to put an end to so many troubles, and disturbances: but in case the multiplicity of Business may have occasioned the General to forget this, the Present serves to renew my remonstrance. intreating Your Honour's to use Your Interests herein, in the best manner you Possibly can, For this Purpose, I will lay before You, in behalf of his Imperial Majesty, the reasons of my Complaints.

It is well known to the World, that it is above Forty Years since the Imperial Flag was hoisted here, the Nabob Sadatolakan promising that at the Request of the Imperalist's [sic], he would make over to them this City with all it's Dependencies, and Privileges, according to the Usual Forms; in the mean time, he assigned, or Appro-. priated for the Habitation of the said Imperialists a Place, which begins at our Factory, and reaches to the mouth of the Barr; as many Troubles prevented our having an Opportunity to get executed the abovementioned Promise, we thus remained in good harmony, and without any disturbance untill the Year 1743, at which time Anavartikan was Nabob of Arcot, who being desirous in case of a Revolt, to have some place near some European Nation in which he might secure his family, chose that of Coublao, placing here a Turk, called Romikansaibo, as Governour, with the necessary Orders for building a Fort, who having examined every place about the City, found none so convenient as that next to our Factory, upon the Side next to the Mouth of the Barr, and upon the Spot which was granted to us by the Nabob Sadatolakan, the said Romokan being fully informed thereof, he came to me with a great deal of goodness, and Courtezy, beging [sic] permission to built thereon, declaring that by doing it, he did not pretend to deprive the Emperor of a Right, which he had for so many Years peaceably enjoyed in this Place, but rather intended to confirm the same by this Building, and for this, he did beg my Permission giving me his word, on the part of the Nabob, that whenever any Ship from the Emperor should Arrive, that would give up to us the Fort for our accommodation, with the City, and all it's dependences, agreable to the Custom of other Nations, To all this, I replyed; that since he was desirous to be my Neighbour, that he must oblige himself to the law of good Neighbourhood, which was that of a true, and faithfull harmony in all things, Romikan answerd me to this; That I might remain assured, that he would keep his word in all things, and that he would Shew by his actions, his desire to live in good harmony with me; as in fact he did do, He Set about building the Fort, and finished it with all expedition; and gave orders to the Moors, and Sentenals [sic] who garded [sic] it that a[t] any time when I pleased to go into it, immediately to Open the [Gate] and to let me go without molestation, wherever I pleased, as Owner of the Fort, From hence the insult given by the French was very raanifest, First by entering into the Fort by open violence, even upon the very ground given to his Imperial Majesty, & Afterwa[rds] endeavouring to get by deceitfull means a grant of this City, and it's dependencies, from Frazed Modekan, and Sandersoib, whic[h] they gave, neither one, or the other knowing the thingswhich had passed for I am well assured, that had they known, they never would have given such a grant; so that I have no reason to Comp[lain] of them but only of the French, who by dint of Falseties and deceit have violated the just Right which his Imperial Majesty [had] here I should not have failed to have advised them of every thing being assured that they would have render'd me justice, for will any one wrong those, with whom he has a good understanding but as a bad Conscience is always fearfull that trators [sic] will be discover'd, and Punished, the French, that this might be Yet more concealed, watched most diligently, as they still do, to intercept my Letters to prevent, by that means, my getting any redress; and this has been the reason of my having, laid, Say, remained Silent untill the Present.

Being assured that his Imperial Majesty will not pass over so high an affront without demanding Satisfaction, I cannot neglect doing my duty, and to intreat Your Honours to Sollicit Nazarzam to give me a fermao for this Place, together with all it's dependences, and Priviledges; this being the Shortest Step to take for our quiet, at the same time, your Honours may inform Frazed Modikan of all which I have related, makeing him to be sensible, that his Imperial Majesty has not obondend [sic] this Place, as the French may have suggested to him, therefore I intreat them to recall the grant which may have been given by means of the false informations they may have received; causing the recall of this grant to be made publick to the Council at Pondicherry and if by this means, the French cannot be brought to give up this Place, otherwise in due time will not be wanting, in the meantime, may your Honours be pleased to use Your Interests that we may not be oppres'd either by Maratas, or Moors, for we are in a very reduced State indeed, If your

Honours will but reflect on the great importance of this, you will find it Your own Interests and I request it in the Name of his Imperial Majesty, and I am well assured that means will be found to over come all difficulties which may Offer.

You will do me much favour to advise me of the reception of the Present, both for my certainty, and my comfort, but it must be with the greatest caution, that the Letters may not be intercepted, and be pleased to write in Portugeze, French, or Latin as I do not understand English.

May God preserve Your Honours, with as perfect health as I wish you being always with the greatest Sencerity [sic] and respect at Your Honours disposal, and am,

Honble Sir & Sirs

Our last was dated the 13th. October and Yours of the 11th. January came to hand on the 15th. February as did that of the 17th. January on the 21st. Ultimo, enclosing the Honble Companys Packet for this Presidency & Ship Lapwing.

The Cost and Charges of the Cuddalore Sloop were taken from our Marine paymaster and Regularly transmitted you on that Vessel the 14th. February though not duely noticed in our Letter, We now enclose an Account aditional Charges to the Cuddalore Rupees forty five, two Quarters & Seventy Eight Reas (45, 2, 78) being for Sundry Small Articles taken by the Master after the above Letter was closed for which Sum You will please to Credit our Presidency, as also for the Several Supplys from Tillicherry & Anjengo agreeable to the enclosed Statement of which You have doubtless been duely advised from thence.

We do not clearly understand the Article of Rupees two hundred and Seventy Six two quarters & thirty Reas (276, 2, 30,) as mentioned in Your Letter of the 11th. January, for Sundry Stores sent us on his Majesty's Ship Winchester. We did indeed request Lord Thomas Bertie when here in July 1748 to Spare us a Small quantity of Iron, Canvas & Twine, which he accordingly comply'd with, and We desired Your Honour &c. in our Letter of the 22^d. of that Month to Charge us for those Articles, which we observe You did for the Iron but not for the others, the above are all the Stores we received out of the Winchester, nor do Your Advices mention any being consigned us on that Ship and the Canvass and Twine being only four Bolts of the former and five pounds of the Latter as mentioned in our said letter cannot Amount to the Sum abovementioned therefore we desire You will Clear up the same in Your next Advices and Enclosed You will receive an Account Current with Your Presidency to this Day.

The Honble Companys Ship Newcastle Sailed for Great Britain from Anjengo on the 25th. January with three hundred Tons on board, and the Dragon was Shortly after to be dispatched from thence about fifty One Tons dead Freighted, and we are in hopes the Salisbury who Sailed hence for the Malabar Coast on the 30th. January in Company of the Boscawen bound to Mocho will likewise Proceed home in Due time, altho we are not sure her Charter Party will be compleated.

We are concerned to have had no Accounts of the Warren since Captain Burrows of the Salisbury left her in the Channell outward bound.

Enclosed is the Presidents first Bill of Exchange for Rupees Seven thousand and Seventy six two quarters and eighty seven Reas (7076, 2, 87) on Commodore

Lisle as also his Letter of advice being for the Amount of Sundry Stores Supply'd his Majestys Ship Syren, which You will Please to receive accordingly and give this Presedency Credit for the same.

The export WarehouseKeeper has represented to us that the Bengall Rice damages exceedingly fast and that he does not now dispose of above half a Garce a Day in the Buzars, so that unless Your Honour &ca: furnish us with some other Expedient for Clearing the large Quantity we have on hand, Our Honourable Masters must Shortly feel a Considerable Loss therein.

About 14 days Since orders came from Nezem to distress the French as much as Possible along this Coast, accordingly the Matchelepatam Phousdar Seizd that Factory & imprisoned those that were in it; the Nabob of this Province was willing to do the like by their Factory at Yanam and detached 3000 Horse & Foot for that Purpose who have lain unacted these 9 days past close under the Walls of my Town, and I am afraid Should they continue here much longer it will be a great hinderance to my business: on this Occasion I have inlisted 50 New Peons & got 12 Arcollas of the Nabob to Protect the Honble Companys Effects which I hope will be approv'd off by Your Honour &ct.

My Journal Parcels & Cash Accounts to the last of February accompany this, & am with Respect.

Honble Sir & Sirs

The 7th. November last the Brillant Snow Captain Edward Burman was dispatched to Batavia and Private Instructions Presented him by the Deputy Governour here in Regard to the Exchange of Money as we Set forth to Your Honour &c^a. under Date of the 27th. October these Advices were deliver'd Captain Burman on his first Sailing from Hence who has Since acquainted us he forwarded them by the Ommoody Captain Holmes, we therefore hope they have Safely arrived Your Honour &c^a. will however be Pleased to receive under Cover Duplicat's thereof. When Captain Burman returned from Batavia which was on the 19th. February he brought us the Pleasing News of his having in Conjunction with M^r. Garden there to whom Application was made for Assistance disposed with some difficulty of the Eight Chests of Treasure and Obtain'd new Mild in Exchange at a Reasonable premium In return for M^r. Garden's great Trouble and Service we allowed him Conformable to his request two Pent Commission thereon.

Captain Burman likewise apply'd to us for Commission on the Sales of the Treasure which We did not Comply with because we judged it an unpresendented Demand he was accordingly acquainted therewith tho' at the Same time we Permitted him to lay before us his extraordanary [sic] Disbursments during the Negotiation, which we Promised to consider But on Perusal of his Account Presented to the Board the Next Consultation we were Surprised to find him debt the Honble Company \$300 and Expressed only for Diet Lodging &c². Expences at Batavia, We then came to a Resolution to Offer him \$2 \pm diam which is the Usual sum when any of their Honours Servants are sent thither on particular Occations We also address \$30, to the Whole in Consideration of Coach Hire and other small Articles Yet the Captain being not Satisfied beg'd to decline the Payment, and desired to refer the Affair to Your Honour &c² in Order to Settle it, which was immediately agreed to.

We made known to Your Honour &ca. in our last advices that the Marlborough Captain Parks had proceeded to the Northward Settlements to take in [pepper] of those Districts. She returned thither the 5th of December with 249. 11. 3: 24: of Pepper and by the 24th of the said Month all the Pepper in the Godown here

was Shipped on Board but a Prow arriving from Coowar with 304. 1. just in the Interim of her Departure to Manna we detained her two days longer to Transport that Quantity to the Ship which being accomplish'd we sent her to Manna the Total

of her Cargo then Amounting to Tons 378: 7: 3: 19: Orders were at the same time forwarded the Resident to use all Expedition in Shipping of the Remainder of her Tonnage by the 22^d. January in the Evening it being the limited Bounds of her Charterparty Agreements, We are Sorry however, to impart to Your Honour &c^a. that the Representations we received from the Resident of the Inclemency of the Weather and Shallowness of the Bar together with the Captains Evading to send his Pinnace on Shore for the Pacquet when a good Opportunity offered occasioned the Ships Continuance at Manna till the 27th. The Resident however

Shipped off Tons 68, 12: which were Tons 43: 3: 3: 16: more than the

Charterparty Tonnage The Marlborough also left behind 176: 27: The Weather preventing any more being Transported on board.

The Cuddalore Sloop was Dispatched to Moco Moco in December last to furnish that Settlement with Several Articles it Stood in Need of, and to Serve as a Conveyance for the Resident to Proceed to Marlbro: Agreeable to his request Soon After her Arrival there the Master Mr. William Petch died of a Violent Fever and the Sloop returned the 30th. December.

The loss we Sustained by the Louisa and other emergencies render it necessary to detain the Above Vessel She being of a Commodious Burthen and very fit for the Service of this Coast We therefore hope as this Proceedure corresponds with Your Honours &ca. Leave it will meet with Approbation.

At the Departure of the Store Ship the late desease of the Small Pox began pritty much to Abate and thereby afforded a prospect of the Pepper Plantations again reviveing as formerly but it is no small Concern to us to Apprise Your Honour &c. of the return of the fatal Distember [sic] in many Places both to the Northward and Southward of us the Consequence of which if Should long continue will no doubt be very Prejudicial to the Honble Companys Interest in those Parts.

The Apprehensions we are under of not having Treasure Sufficient to hold out till the next Store Ships Arrival especially should she Meet with Longer Detention on her Passage hither than Usual, induce us to [importune] Your Honour &ca. to Send us, Two thousand Pounds in New Mill'd Dollors by the first Opportunity that Offers.

We haveng [sic] a Quantity of Salt in our Godowns which will Suffice for our Uses upwards of a Year we desire Your Honour &ca: will furnish us in Lieu of a Supply thereof with as many Iron Stones as can possibly be loaded on board any Vessel that may be next consigned to the Coast.

We now remit Your Honour &c². Perusal Copy of our addresses to the Honble Court of Directors & Marlborough and Sundry other Papers as & List of the Pacquet inserted herewith.

We have sent as Prisoners [sic] by this Conveyance one of our Military late a Serjeant at Moco Moco named Thomas Pool for Killing in a Duel William Powel a Corporal there, attested Copies of the Depositions concerning this Affair taken from our Regester Book are enclosed for your Honours &cas. Perusal: The Originals having by some accident or other been Mislaid tho if they should be found which we are in hopes of, they shall be remitted to your Honour &ca. the first Opportunity that Presents itself.

Being in want of some Kentlidge for the Honble Company's Sloops We tender'd Order to Captain Burman to deliver us his Kentledge Guns, being 13 in Number and have accordingly received them.

The following Persons having desired to deposite Money into the Honble Company's Cash here and have Certificat's drawn out for the Several Amounts we granted their Request, and Humbly beg your Honours &ca. will Please to discharge them. Vizt.

After aBundance of Pains and trouble We have at last got all the Treasure (You consign'd us) brought into Round spanish Dollars Had it been all spanish, it would have turn'd out to better advantage but there was 1278 Real Weight of French Money Sold only at 126 R. Ds. the 100 Rl. weight when the Spanish Sold for 129 besides this there was 50 Real Weight of money thrown out by the Shroffs for Copper which we mixt with some good Silver and melted it, amounts. 95 1/16 R: Wt. which we sold for 57 Stivrs. the Rl: Wt: and there was likewise 250 Rl: Wt. of Dutch Sold for R Ds. 325,33, the Spanish Money alltogether Weigh'd 29941 Real Wt. at 29 PCt. so that the Whole Amounts to R: Ds. 40672, 34, As Account Sales which is more than We could have expected for it's generally allowed here that 29 PCt. by the Real Weight comes to but little more than the 25 PCt. by tale (which is the Current Price) and Calculating 3200 \$ at 25 PCt. is only 40000 R.Ds. Therefore you have gain'd R: Ds. 672, 34, more than if it was sold by Tale at the Current Price.

It was a great favour that the Director bought the Money of us, for he Complaind it was such small Stuff that He Did not know what to do with it and likewise declared it would not Answer for the Mint and therefore Distributed it to other Settlements, as the Malabar and Cormandel Coasts where the Dutch Company must Certainly lose mony by it Having now given You an Account of our Sales we Shall now come to Our Purchases.

After having Sold the Treasure to the Director (for the Dutch Company) we Offered him 32 \$\mathbb{C}^t\$. for Round Spanish, but to no purpose therefore we immediately Sent People about Town to buy of those that would Sell at reasonable Rates, at first we bought in Small Quantities at 29 \$\mathbb{C}^t\$. in this manner We pick'd up \$534\frac{1}{2}\$ then We were Obliged to give 30 \$\mathbb{C}^t\$. at that Rate we got 12,000 by this time We were Oblig'd to rise to 31 \$\mathbb{C}^t\$. at this Rate We got the Remainder 3000 which is in all \$\mathbb{S}\$ 23534 & \frac{1}{2}\$ amounting to R: Ds. 30539,24, the rest We paid away in the following manner, Mr. Combes his Bill R: Ds. 5000, Lent Mr. Dunckley on his Bond R: Ds. 2400 And Captain Burman for Stores bought on Account of the Company for the Settlement of Bencoolen and Charges on the Snow Brilliant 1700, Other Petty Charges with Shroffage on the rix Money amounting to R: Ds. 33,10 but we thought there was no Occasion to Pay for Shroffing the Spanish as We could judge of them ourselves.

As for our Comisssion We have left a Blank for it both in Your Account Current and in the Charges on the Account Sales for Altho it is the Custom of the Place to Draw five $\{P, C^t\}$ for transacting any kind of Business and in this We have had infinately [sic] more trouble than in Purchasing the Same Value of Goods Yet to prevent Your thinking too much of any Charge We have left it to be Settled by Your Self when the Brilliant Shall Arrive.

The Money We have lent Mr. Dunckley is We think some small Help in Your favour as We Should have been oblig'd to purchase at 31. PCt. if not more whereas His Bill is to be paid in at 25 PCt. besides Saving the Risque of that Part which is not on the Company's Account, a Copy of which Expences He leaves here in Case of an Accident.

We send You inclosed Bills of Loading for the Treasure and Arrack, Likewise Vouchers for the Money lent and paid And as We have done the best We could for Your Advantage We therefore flatter Ourselves that the Accounts will turn out as much to Your Satisfaction as You can Expect which will be the greatest Pleasure We can Desire.

It afforded Us no small pleasure to Peruse Your Honour's Letter bearing date the 5th. of June last, in Reply to ours of the 30th. January, wherein We faithfully related the late arbitrary Proceedings of the Dutch in Refringing on our just and lawfull Rights We can therefore do no less than own ourselves highly beholden to Admiral Bascawen for endeavouring to free Us from the flagrant Power of Injustice in taking Cognizance of an Affair on which wholly depends our future Security and Whelfare [sic].

We are now to acquaint Your Honour that on the 30th. of September last returned our Agent M^r. Thomas Combes from Batavia, with advice, the General, there, had offered him part of Restitution of the Goods seized in the two Prows formerly mentioned but that M^r. Combes refused the Proposal least he should

hereafter incur Blame. The General at the same time refered Us to him by a Letter on this Occasion which we Could by no Means condescend to, more especially because, We were not apprised of Your Honour's Determination; neither did we apprehend that Restitution in Part, without the Whole, and ample Satisfaction were rendered, could be Safely received when Your Honour had been Pleased to take the Affair under Cognizance, We have now wrote our Sentiments to the General, in answer, Copy of which is herein enclosed, and We wait with Patience, to know what Your Honour thinks will compromise and reconcile the Difference, so that we may not thro Inadvertency be thought capable of Censure by a too great Officiousness in adjusting a Matter, which requires a Judgment Superiour to those, who with the Sencerest Respect Stile themselves.

Septemr. and communicated to Us the kind Treatment and Civilities he met with during his Stay at Batavia, in return for which We crave leave to offer this to Your Excellency and Your Honours as a tender of our thanks and Acknowledgments, flattering our Selves it will be construed so favourably as to need no other Opology [sic].

We have likewise been informed by the same Messenger of Your Excellencys Resolution (concerning our late heavy Complaints) which he imp[1]ored that Restitution should be made as far as could be found, and Due Punishment inflicted on such who were deemed guilty of the Massacre.

The Sensibility with which Your Excellency seems to weigh this unhappy Affair ought certainly to be a Means of Bringing it to a Speedy Conclusion, tho howmuchsoever, we may find ourselves inclined Amicably to Pacify the Injuries offered Us Yet since it is under Cognizance of such whose Intentions we are not fully acquainted with, We cannot accept of Your Excellency's Proposal in receiving part of the Goods Seized for Restitution, without the leableness of Censeure from our Superiours, or indeed the Whole, unless full and Ample Satisfaction for all Costs and Damages ensued, not only those Sustained by the Proprietors of the two Prows, but also in Regard to the Prejudice the Owners of the Brigantine Fafiy, Suffered in Some Measure, on the like Occasion. Such We must take liberty to insist upon, and expect to recive as soon as possible. This impartial Suit on our Side being compromised and Complyed with cannot fail to reestablish a good Harmony and understanding between Us; and Your Excellency and Your Honours may be assured of our Hearty Endeavours to Support it by Embrcing [sic] all Seasons and Opportunities to Shew the utmost readiness to form our Frendship as lasting

as sencere, Not Doubting but the same Tie and Disposition in Your Excellency and Your Honours, will be as firm to renew the foundation, for it creates in us a vast Concern only to Suspect that their Should be the least Breach to appose our Mutual Peace and Tranquility.

Your Excellency and Your Honours will receive this token of our Respect, by the Brilliant Snow Captain Edward Burma[n] who We Request may be Permitted to Purchase a few Stores for the Use of Fort S^t. David & this Settlement he being to Proceed to the former Place so soon as he has delivered Us the Necessarys We are in want of.

HONBLE SIR

Since we have had the Pleasure to find the addresses to Admiral Bascawen, in Relation to the Seizure of the two Prows at Tinkel were deemed worthy, his Cognizance and Notice, We think our Selves indispensably obliged to embrace this Opportunity to make further Application to Your Honour on that Head and more especially, because He assured Us on his quitting these Parts proper Injuntions would be invested in his Absence to the Commander in Chief of his Majesties Forces remaining in India; to the End that Satisfaction might be renderd for the Late Injuries We have Sustained from the Dutch We therefore Sue to Your Honour whom We hear has been called to that Station and flatter ourSelves that Inclination Power and Opportunity will all concur to favour our Present and future Prospects, not only by Curbing the Daily insolent Encroach of the Dutch, but also in the Maintenance of the indulgence of our Rights of our Commerce: An Obligation which will always bind us to a thankfull Acknowledgment.

We have no Occassion, We Presume to mention at this Juncture the Particular Circumstances of our Grivievances [sic], as there is no room to doubt but that the Admiral has fully communicated them to Your Honour may it then Suffice to say that the Prime Cost of the Goods Laden by the Owner (a Chinaman here under the Protection of the Honble Company) on board the two Prows amounted to very near thirteen thousand Spanish Dollars and the Crews thereof all masacred saving One, in an inhuman manner The Owners of Briggantine named the Fanny belonging to some Gentlemⁿ. of this Place being sent on a trading Voyage to Neutrall Ports upon this Coast likewise suffered very much by a threatning Protest Delivered the Master and dated at Padang in-so-much that it deprived the Vessel of the Sale of the least part of her Cargo.

To be more Prolix on this Subject would be only reh'arsing Repetetions and Perhaps agree against the Sense of the Justice upon which we enitrely depend—on Your Honour's procuring Us in Regard to Restitution and Satisfaction for the Above Affronts for the Dutch well Knowing our incapacity to oppose them convince Us too often of the Necessity We are in to secure in the best manner our Lawfull Priviledges, which they make their Principal Aim to debar us of as well as to take all Seasons to apprise Us with their Arbitrary Sentiments.

Sheweth, that Your Memorialists labouring under Repeated losses by the Receipt of their daily Subsistance (which being very Small and having nothing thereto anexed) have thought it Advisable to make a first Appeal to this Honourable Board in Order to a Redress (tho the above reasons have prevented Some Persons Signing this Memorial) Upon a former appearance of this Nature we were obliged with a Copy of Military Instructions Signed by the Honble Court of Directors in which it is Expressly said we Shall be paid in Pagodas at 8 Shillings each which falls considerably Short of what we Receive them for at Present On our first Receipt of Pay in this Manner the loss was not very great which we imputed to the Mercenary Views of the Money Changers and were at that time unacquainted with the Instructions from Europe, We have been particularly ill Treated also by a Gentleman who has Persuaded Some of the Inhabitants not to Deal with us after he had Refused our Money as not Current tho he has a Voice in determining the regulations to which we have hitherto comply'd As our Memorial may Appear Reasonable to Your Honble Board we hope You will take some Method in Order to Our Redress as we are of Opinion it may be done without farther Proceeding by Honble Gentlemen,

That Mr. John Walsh /being of the Council who they thought had the regulating the Value of Money in which they were paid/ Did on the Officers sending to him for Arrack refuse their Money as not current & Possitively order'd Samuel Troutback not to Sell them any (so that the Officers were at that time destitute as he would not take their Money or Suffer any other Person) which they concluded Mr. Walsh had done to Oblige them to deal with him on his own Terms, Upon a Personal application to Mr. Walsh by Ensign Spear to know his reasons for su[c]h refusal, his answer was, he would not take any Rupees and if he wanted any of his Arrack he must go to the Buzar and Purchase Pagodas, As Mr. Walsh's Order to Troutback Appears to the Officers as an absolute infringment of their Priviledges they do in that Point, expect some Satisfaction.

As Mess¹⁸. Charles Campbell, James Hockett, Peter Campbell and James Spear have thought Proper to reflect upon me in their Memorial of Yesterday, I take the liberty to Offer the following in Answer.

First, In relation to my ordering Samuel Troutback not to Sell Arrack.

It has been judged necessary for preventing the disorders which an unrestrained Command of Arrack might occasion among the Military, to place the Sole Priviledge of Retaling it in the Storekeeper (conformably to the Practice of the Presidency) in execution of which Office I forbid Samuel Troutback & others, who were Suspected of having done it, to Sell any to the Military or to the Natives, by whose Means the Military might be Supplied: but that I ever forbid or prevented his furnishing Such Gentlemen of the Place as might be desirous of it, is an absolute Falisity; and that he has fully & freely enjoined this Priviledge, many can testify, & it is extraordanary how the Memorialists themselves could be ignorant of it, when others of their Corps Knew it by Constant Experience.

SECONDLY In Regard to the Exchange of Rupees.

That the Companys Servants in General receive their Pay at the Rate of 350 Rupees for One hundred Pagodas is True; But it is equally True, that this did never influence the Price of Rupees among Individuals, and that even Rupees at all are never esteemed in Payments the Currency of this Place, but Pagodas, Fanams & Cash by Custom immemorial.

Having replyed to Such Part of the Memorial as concerns me, I have now to request of You that You will declare your Sentiments of my behaviour & then give me leave to lay down so invedious an Employ.

The 27th. of last Month I inform'd Your Honour &ca. the Moors were come down to Seize the French & their Factory Yanam; the latter they Effected some time past, the French retiring to their Vessells on the River where they made a Small fight of it near their Factory for about an Hour And this to Advise Your Honour &ct. from the time the Moors have had Possession of the Factory to the Present have I been Plagued & my Business Stop'd by them for not as they say being Assistant & Hinder their Running away & also Credit a false Report that I have secreted their Money & Merchants and say provided neither are secreted, some of my Merchants are nearly related & must be deliverd up to them; On no other Account is my Factory now besett with 11 Horsemen & my People daily insulted to whom I am Obliged to Pay 36 Rupees P Day Batta which is to commence from the time the Cowle is dated and Amounts to about 1400 Rupees, I wrote the Nabob a Letter concerning this Affair foreseeing what was coming & for Answer received his Cowle & 11 Horsemen as aforesaid, Copys of which comes [sic] Inclosed, This certainly is an insufferable Imposition and most Villianous [sic] Trick to inrich himself by which imposture he has put on the Dutch and all the Wealthy People in His Dominions, I believe I shall write to Vizagapat: for thirty Soldiers to Protect the Factory till such time I can get redress from Your Honour &ct. and humbly beg it may be as Speedy as possible least worse Should happen, And as Nazer Jing is in the Province of Arcott I hope You will be able to get some Priviledges of him for this Factory that it may be Put out of the Power of a Nabob to insult & Extort Money from us for every little Trifle & misinformation, which in a few Years if Permitted to run on will increase to so great a highth [sic] it will be

almost impossible to do any business unless by making great Presents or that the Honble Company would allow of a Proper force to withstand their vile unreasonable Demands.

Instant with the Several Papers enclosed The York arrived here the 15th. and we shall Pay Strict Regard to our Honble Masters Directions on Delivery of her Wares & Stores at this Settlement: It would have given us great Pleasure could we likewise have complied in Providing her Goods for her China Market, but in Case either Tin or Elephants Teeth may be procurable on the Arrival of the other China Ships, we have to request Your Honour &ct's Advice on the Price we may venture to give & what quantity will be Sufficient.

The Translates of our Phirmaunds & Grants shall be compleated with as much expedition as Possible & the form of the Account Remains, when come to hand, closely followed, And when any of the Europe Ships fall first in with this Port, we Shall duely Observe Your Directions on the Subject.

We made Known to the Officers Your Honour &ct's Sentiments regarding their Memorial and likewise Your Directions concerning their Payment in future, Should they continue to be discontended with the Method hitherto Observed: We cannot quit this Subject without clearing up one Particular concerning Capt. Gingin, whom You imagine to have been unacquainted with the Proceedings of the Memorialists: He informs us that when a Petition of the Same Nature was formerly in agitation amongst the Officers he prevented it by Representing the Ill consiquences [sic] it might be attended with; and that upon their again coming to a Resolution to Prefer a Petition to us and their desireing his concurrence in the same, he told them he would by no means be concerned therein & that he was Persuaded they could not be redressed but Still finding them determined not to Suppress their Complaint, he then advised them to make it in a Private Manner to the Deputy Governour.

As the Officers are desirous of Receiveing [sic] their Pay in Rupees as before We shall find it difficult to issue the large Quantity of Fanams brought us by the York in the Manner Your Honour &ct. direct, but it has however had this good Effect of lowring [sic] the Price of that Money and thereby quiting the Murmers of our Military.

Honble Sir & Sirs,

Our Passage to this Place having been greatly protracted beyond the usual lenth [sic] by some extraordanary and very unhappy circumstances Possibly you are already informed by later advices from England that the Grantham and Duke of Cumberland saild from thence the 20th, December last both Consigned to this Presidency.

So long a retardment we presume may have occasioned some doubts of our Safety, and it is with great concern we are now to confirm them with respect to the Cumberland.

The two Ships unexpectedly fell in with the Coast of Guinia near Cape verd on the 16th. January last about eight o Clock at Night in thick weather and by a fatal change of Wind succeeded by a calm were under the Necessity of coming to an Anchor very near the Shore; the Grantham rode the Whole Night and with Difficulty got of the Next Morning but the Cumberland by the parting of her cable was drove into the Surf and there lost.

This great misfortune detained the Grantham near a Month on the coast from whence Sailing on the 13th. February we on the 5th. of March happily met the Durrington under the Line, homeward bound, on her we sent Mr. Torriano one of our Supra Cargoes to give the Hoñble Company of Directors the information necessary on this Melancholy occasion: We shall not trouble Your Honour &ca with a long and Disagreeable recital, but Proceed to acquaint You we are not without hopes that the Treasure may be Saved since the early intelligence by the Durrington will not only be in Time to Procure assistance from England, but as we have made the best Provision we could at Gambia /an English Settlement on that coast/for fitting out a Sloop and long Boat to make a Tryal on the wreck as soon as the season of the Year should permit, to which we may add that the King of that Country had not any Knowledge of the Treasure nor in Twenty Days Time so long as the Wreck continued entire could get any thing on Shore from it but what was upon the Decks.

The equipment of the above mentiond Sloop & Long Boat seem'd of great importance and in Order to do it in an effectual manner we have trespassed on a few of the Company's Naval Stores and also on a Small quantity of his Majestie's Salt provisions which were on board the Grantham consign'd hither We have likewise engaged to the Commander of the Grantham that he should be reinstated from

hence in several parcels of Cordage and other Stores procured from him which were absolutely Necessary for our undertaking: We can only plead in excuse for Such liberties the urgency of the occasion, where the recovery of Seventy four Chests of the Companys Treasure might Possibly depend on this Supply.

The inclosed is an account of the Provision[s] belonging to his Majesty and of the Company's Stores [...] Occasion, the Cost of which we are ready to make good, and with Respect to those Supply'd from the Grantham, we beg You will give orders that Captain Oliver may be furnished from Your Magazines on his Paying their amount, We are

Honble Sir & Sirs

This wates [sic] You by the Honble Companys Ship Grantham, to acquaint You of my Proceedings, and am Sorry they cannot be more Satisfactory.

After a long Passage of two months & a half (having buried 6 Men) on the 15th. of January, we arrived at Augustine Bay, having then 29 Men on board incapable of Duty and we were obliged to Stay there to Shift the Ship and Clear her Bottom.

At my Visitt to the King of Babaw, he told me he made no doubt, but that he Could Slave me, but he would have me bring the Ship at Tullea [sic] Bay, for he would not make Trade at Augustine Bay, The King to the Southward, and himself not being on very good Terms.

While I stayed at Augustine Bay, I had Several messages from him importing, that he wished my Company at Tullea, for he was very Sure, of the Great Number of Slaves very soon and in one Message by Cap^t. Martin, he told me, that if he did not make good his word, he would forfit his Honour with the English, and never desire an English Ship to come to his Place any more; but I have since found, he had not any to loose.

It was the 21st. of March here we had the Ship in any condition for Sailing; and then it was with the greatest Difficulty, we Purchased our Anchor and the same Day about Noon we Anchored at Tullea [sic] Bay; where we have ever since laid in a dismall condition not having for most part of the time Men enough to Man the two Boats.

Since we left Fort S^t. David we have buried 21 Men of the Ships Crew, and William Gray of the Train, that by Your Honours Permission came with me, and the People are now /although cured of their Distemper moste of them very weak and not fitt [sic] for any hard Duty; and I can't see how we can Possibly sail from hence, at least these 14 Days, for the Captain has not above half his Provision Salted and wants to fill part of his Water the which he sends to Augustine Bay for, I have now on Board forty one Slaves on account of the Honble Company and Dispair of getting any great Number more, not only here, but also to the Northward Cap^t. John Bell in the Honble Companys Ship Swallow being gone up the Coast Slaving before me, so that I shall have but the Cleanings, He arrived here the 20th. of March, & Sail'd the 7th. of April, after Slaving he is bound to Fort S^t. David or Bencoolen, which he shall think most convenient, for the season when he leaves this Island, He left England in October but last from Lisbon in December.

The Ship Grantham being Bound for China, & the Season being so far advanc'd, I have let the Captain have Twenty Baggs of Rice weighing 25: 1: 4: English, and two thirds of Leagers of Arrack, for which He is to account to Your Honours, The nearest Computation I can make of the Price of Rice here allowing

the goods which I paid for it, (of Your Honour's Shipping to me) at Prime Cost, is from 37 @ 40 Pagodas | Garce allowing the Mercal at 23 to Weight, a Receipt for which is inclosed.

I shall take care to follow Your Honours Directions moste [sic] Punctually in Respect of leaveing this Island So as the Ship may not (without some unforeseen accident) loose another season.

Instant by the Lynn and the 15th. by a Cattamaran; and cannot But look upon it, as a very extraordanary proceeding Your taking upon You to give dispatches to the Lynn for Bengal notwithstanding She was to touch here, where You must be Sensible the Superiour Power was lodged by the Majority of the Council being upon the Spot, and least the Gentlemen at Bengal Should Judge of it in the same manner we thought Proper to open Your Packet and forward it under cover with such further Advices from us as were Necessary to be communicated to them; and also to give the Captain fresh Dispatches Neither do we Conceive there is the absolute Necessity for Mr. Prince's quiting this Settlement in Order to take Charge of St. David for a few Weaks [sic], as You represent; for Should the Lapwing be with You before Mr. Saunders, which We don't apprehend she will, We think it would be improper to Dispatch her to Europe till he arrives; and as to the investment, We hope the Gentlement [sic] who are going down are capable of managing that Branch of Business for so short a Time: We are also persuaded, that this part of the Country is as Yet in a more flourishing State than that to the Southward, and the Merchants promising to bring in to the Amount of Seventy or Eighty thousand Pagodas in the Midling and Ordinary Sorts of Cloths between this and January Provided they are not inturrupted in their Business by unforeseen Accidents, and are Supplyed with Money when they call for it /Mr. Prince is of Opinion that he shall render the Company more Service by Staying here and forwarding this Important Work, than he Possibly could by Repairing to St. David; and as the Military Affairs have been under Your Directions from the Commencement of the Troubles, We presume no body is so capable as Your Self to conduct them in future.

June Our Nabob with a Powerfull Army came into these Parts, the French left there Factory on his Approach which & their Town he has Burnt Two or three times over, his Presence created me inexpressible Trouble & has Put the Hoñble Company to about 150 Pags. additional expence in Batta & Presents for the Day after his Arrival here He sent Horsemen to my Factory demanded the Merchants & made me Sign a Note that I had not Secreted any of those belonging to the French which with a Safe consience [sic] I the more readily did in hopes it would have put an end to farther troubles, but He Still Presisting [sic] in the Delivery of them I was Obliged to comply and as Soon as He had got them Threatned to Whip them wanted to Extort Money from them & Kept them Prisoners 14 Days under Pretence they were French as well as English Merchants, I wrote him three Letters in their behalf & Twice gain'd Audiance but He seemd deaf to any thing I advanc'd in their favour, Till just He was going to leave the Place when he sent for me deliverd up my Merchants gave me great assurances of his Friend Ship & that he would Promote the Hoñble Companys Affairs to the Utmost of his

Power he further told me if I was in want of 10 Thousand Pagodas to carry on my Investment, with Pleasure He would lend it; I evaded his Offer caring to be as little Obliged to him as Possible & must believe his head was ripe for Villany had not some of Nazer Jings People been with him who are as Spys over his Actions.

If these troubles had not put a Stop to my Business for above a Month I should have Sent Your Honour &at. an acceptable Investment in August, I hope now to have few Short of 4 Hundred Bales & if the French do not cause another Revolution in this Part of the Country and I can be Supplyd with Cash, believe I shall be able to Procure as many by January.

Conformable to what Your Honour &ct. was pleased to write me the 10th. of May I shall use my endeavours to comply therewith, and am with Respect.

I now take the Opportunity to reply to the Letter reced from the late President & Council Wherein I am desired to give any Information I can in regard to the Matter Complained of, by Mr. John Andrews Resident at Ganjam for the Outrage committed on the Factory there, And the Nabobs forcibly taking from him a Sum of Money of the Company's, To this Purpose I now send you herewith Copy's of the Letters from him on that Subject, as also a Representation he drew up of the Affair, which set it forth in a very Plain and Clear Manner, as well as what has Pass'd since and I Know of Nothing More, or of any other Moneys being recd since, than what is there Mentioned and in my Openion [sic] the Whole is very fairly and Justly stated and what the Vile Government of the Country brought Unavoidably on him, for he is well Known to be a carefull, Sober, Diligent & Capable Person and well Acquainted with the Customs and Manners of those People, and that it was not Occasioned by any inadvertant Act or mis-Conduct but solely from the Oppression of the Nabob, who then Govern'd in those Parts.

As I understand the Lynn or Kent will be laden and Dispatch'd from the Presidency in the early Season, I shall Accordingly repair thither in Due time to Proceed for Europe thereon

Extracts of two Letters from M^R. John Andrews, Dated at Ganjam the 10TH. Nov^R. 1747, and 2^D. April 1748.

I formerly Acquainted your Honour with the Treatment I had met with from the Government, and the loss that was likely to fall upon this Factory on that Account, I have now stated the whole in a general way as it Pass'd here, by way of Letter to your Honour, and Inclose it, Herewith; Had this been an Establish'd Old Factory, And such an Accident had happened, It would not have Affected me so much as it Does now, because I am certain Your Honour is Desirous of the Success of this Place, And I think my own Reputation too much at Stake to be Unconcern'd, tho, I cannot charge my self with any fault, and am Sensible the same must have happen'd had any other Person been here.

I wrote your Hoñ: some Days past, & then Acquainted You that this Nabob have Absolutely refused to Allow me any Part of the Money taken by the late Government, Yesterday I was Obliged with your favour of the 27th. February Wherein you tell me it is reported that I gave the Moors a Handle to take that Money, from me by becoming a Renter—Whoever was the Author of such a report, Has Done me a great deal of Injustice, I Assure your Honour when that Affair happened I had Nothing to do with the Government, either Directly or Indirectly, as a Renter or otherwise; nor was I engaged in any broil or Disturbance Whereby to give them any Handle the Renter of this Place was the Nabobs Instrument to Persecute me for that Money, he made use of 500 Peons which were sent here to guard the Place from the Insults of the Rajahs, to block me up with, and the same time beat the Tom Tom round the Town Declaring that if any Washerman Barber, or Parryar, came to the English Factory, or if any body was seen to carry Water, Firewood or Provisions there, or if any Banyans or others were known to sell or Deliver any Paddy or Rice, or any other Kind of Subsistance to any of the Compys People, such Persons Should be Whipped out of the Town, and their Houses Plundered. I have lived many Years among the moors, and without much vanity may Pretend to some Knowledge of their Customs and Designs: but such unjust and Violent Proceedings as these I never met with before, nor can I be Persuaded to think that any thing but the great Distress his Army was in at that time, could induce any Nabob to Write to an English Factory that if they Did not lend him so much Money they might Shut up their Doors and go away, and at the same time Prevent their coming out, and endeavour to starve them to Compliance within, I should be glad to Know what a wiser Head than mine would have Done in this case, without repells. Force with Force, which was not in my Power-how I became a Renter Afterwards, I have already wrote your Honour, Not by Choice, but Compulsion; Not for Interest, but in hopes of recovers, a Part of the Money; and Whatever in conveniencies attended it /which was only 6 Months/ they in no wise Affected the Compy, but myself only, by the Uneasiness it gave me Whilst I had it, and the Difficulty I met with in Parting from it, Which, however I Affected, And am as free from any concerns with the Governmt. as any other Person on the Coast; therefore I hope your Honour will do me the Justice to Vindicate me in a Public Manner to the Board, from that groundless and Malicious report that has been spread abroad, that I gave the Moors a Handle to take that Money from me by becoming a Renter, which was Subsequent to the loss of the Money, And not Antecedent to it.

This Government is bad enough, yet I dont Apprehend any Danger to the Company's Affairs here, it is to be hoped many Years may Pass before such another flagrant instance of Injustice Presents itself.

I am very sure your Honr. had the Company's Interest at heart in Settling this Place, and I have a Due Sense of the Confidence Placed in me for that Purpose; And I can with Sincerity say I have not been so Solicitous about my own Interest as I have been about the Success of the Company's Affairs here. I Know very well the Infant state of this Settlement will make such a loss appear the more heavy, but this I cannot help.

To the Honble Nicholas Morse Esq^b. Honble Sir

Your Honour may Remember, I from Time to Time Acquainted you with the Troubles that Subsisted in the Months of May, June & July 1746, between the Nabob and the Rajahs, of these Parts, In my last to your Hon. on that Subject, I wrote you they had Agreed for certain Sums; and the Country was again in Peace but this Treaty of theirs was only to elude the Time, And get an Opportunity to return to their Forts, for they Afterwards refus'd to Pay the Nabob any thing by which Means his Army was so Distress'd that they had not Rice to eat, this Put him, upon the most unjust Methods for their Support, it was at this Time he wrote to lend him 20,000 Rupees which I absolutely refus'd, and wrote him word, that I had no such sum, nor could lend any Money Without my Masters Orders; to which

he replyed, that the Company traded here free of Custom under his Protection, and if they would not Assist him at such a Juncture what Signified the Factory to him, that I must either lend him the Money or shut up my doors, and go away, this last Past I should have complyed with till Matters had been Accomodated, but he took care to Prevent it, by Surrounding my house, with 500, Hungry Peons who would Suffer Neither Water or Provision of any Kind to be brought in, in this Manner I continued several Days till Necessity Obliged me to Promise them what Money I could make up, but they would not Suffer me to be quiet till I had Paid them Pagodas 4300, During this Time he was using the same Methods with the rest of the Country where he Knew he could get any thing, even the Bankers did not escape; besides, not Satisfied with what he had taken from me, he sent to the House, of one of the Company's Merchants, (a Man reputed to be worth 30,000 Rupees) and dug up the ground in all the rooms, thinking To find money burried there, but being Disappointed Kept the said Merchant Prisoner, till he had paid him 2000, Rups. soon After this, he return'd into his own Dominions, upon which I went to Demand the Money he had received from me, but it would be Needless to tell your Honour the Tricks and Evasions he made use of, to Tire me out, And indeed he had well nigh done it, for the bad Accomodation I met with in the Camp, the Inclemency of the Weather Joined to the Uneasiness of my own Mind, had almost cost me my Life, however at least he told me, he would give me an Order to receive 5000 Rupees of the then Renter of Ganjam, and that if I could take the Country into my Hands for that year, he would Allow me 5000 out of the Rents, the remainder he would Pay me Himself; this I would by no means Here of, till I receiv'd the Melancholy news of the loss of Madrass, And being Sensible how great an Effect, that must have on us all, I was Willing to get out of his Hands before the News reach'd him, not Knowing what Advantage he might take of me at that Juncture, In a Short time after this Nizum recalled him and sent another Nabob, as I know what the Old one had Done, would Signifie nothing; without the Concurence of the new one, I sent the Company's Vakeel to meet him, and wrote Mr. Prince at the same time to Talk with him, as he Passed that way, which he did, and the Nabob promised him that money should be put into his Accounts, and that he would see me paid; the Vakeel followed him to this Purpose; and in all Probability would have effected it, But a Skirmish happening at the Nabobs Tents, between some of his, and Vizaramrawzis people, and the Vakeel being at that Time in the Tent was unfortunately killed, I Immediately sent another Person to Supply his Place, But the Nabob, has been so much embroiled since in War with that Rajah, and so much distressed in his own Affairs, that I am affaid [sic] little is to be done with him, on the Subject of money and what makes the Case Worse, the late Nabob being pressed by Nizum, for a large sum of Money, which he owed him, has poisened himself, and is since dead and this Nabob we expect will be recalled in a very few Days.

I cannot charge myself, with any neglect of Duty or the omission of any Proper means, either to save or recover the Company's Money, and though I know the same must have happen'd had any other Person been in my Place Yet I cannot but be Truly concerned for the Occasion, I have recovered a thousand Pagodas out of the Country money, whether they will let me keep it or no I cannot Tell; I shall not Cease to use my Endeavours to get what I can, so long as these is the least Probability of Success. I am with the greatest esteem.

Hallyburton, which were Provided by that Gentleman for the Companys Particular Account, and, on former Directions from Your Presidency, in a manner Contracted for by us, and at an inferiour Price to M^r. Starke's; we should therefore be glad of Orders to Prepare this Parcel likewise for Shiping to the Bay.

If you have received any Stationary by the London you will be Pleased to Comply with the Indent before transmitted, as we cannot meet with any here to our Purpose.

GENTLEMEN

I have received Your Letter, which makes me Surprized to see the insult confirmed, which General Boscawen committed upon St. Thome, belonging under the Dominion of the King my Master, which action was not to be expected from a Nation that is with us in friendship and so Strict an Alliance, and much less could it be expected You should use Such affected pretexts for to take the like resolution, as is to be seen from thence, when you communicate to me, that it is 50 Years ago that St. Thome produced any acknowledgment to the King my Master For even if this was the Case, the King my Master has other Dominions that are an Expence to him, and no gain, and on account of such circumstances neither he doth loose his right, nor has any Nation allyed & in friendShip the right to invade them, and much less, when it is well Known that But a Short time ago, there were Ministers & Officers of the King my Master who administered Justice in that Place, so is it no Sufficient motive that Padry Fr. Antonio of the Purification had no ferman from the Moors neither from any lawfull or Rebell, to administer Justice to the Moors without St. Thome, that General Boscawen proceeded So Violently against a Vassal of the King my Master.

Against all these insults I protest once and a thousand times, to this Council of the Honble Company of Great Brittain, that You restore to me the Possession of the Town of St. Thome in the same form as the King my Master possessed it, when his Colours were Taken down and those of his Britanick Majesties were hoisted, that You may avoid the heavy detriment & inconveniencies which, on the Contrary will follow, God save you for many Years,

Our last to your Honour &cta. was Dated the 29th. June Duplicate whereof goes enclosed and on the 5th. Instant came to hand your advices of the 13th. of that Month with the several Papers said to be enclosed This we Transmit you Phip Severn, which we now return to the President and Council at Bengal with a Loading of Cotton.

On her we consign Your Honour &c. Twenty five Chests of Treasure amounting to Rupees one Hundred Nin'ty three thousand seven hundred Sixty three and eighty Reas (193763, 80 — as Finvoice and Bill of Lading enclosed, The Produce thereof in Arcot Rupees we desire You will please to Transmit to the President and Council at Bengall on Said Ship.

Enclosed we transmit Your Honour &c. Duplicate of the President's Letter of Advice and Second Bill of Exchange, on Comodore Lisle for the Amount disbursed here on Account of his Majestie's Ship Ruby, The only Reason that we did not write Your Honour &cta. by that Ship was that her Commander went off and Sailed the Instant he had signed his Account of Disbursments, and we Should have sent you the Vouchers for each Ship as usual but we judged it unsafe to send them by Pattamar and Vouchers for each Ship goes now enclosed in this Packet, which is the first Sea Conveyance that has offer'd since. However our not sending the Vouchers for the Rubys Expences, would be no good reason for not answering the Bills

as the Commander of that Ship could have Produced his duely and Properly authenticated, and every Commander has the like, and further it may be observed, that the Presidents draws, those Bills was Conformable to Commodore Lisle's request to You, as mentioned in Your Honours &cas. Advices to us of the 20th. October last altho we shall not omit transmitting you the Vouchers on Such occasions by the first good Sea Conveyance that Offers.

When the Bills your Honour &c. has drawn on us for fifteen hundred eighty three Rs. one Quarter and thirty five Reas (1583), 1, 35—in favour of Captain Andrews are tendered they will be duely discharged.

We shall examine your Account Current and acquaint you hereafter if we find any errors in the Accounts we formerly Transmitted your Honour &c*. and shall continue to debt you in Rupees as heretofore, and if at any Time you have occasion to debt us in Pagoda's, please to advise us the Exchange at that Time between them and Bombay Rupees.

We observe you are pleased to indent for so large a quantity of Gunpowder as seven Thousand Barrels, we should have sent you some by this Ship, But the Commander acquaints us that he cannot take any more than fifteen Barrells; in our next we shall advise you what quantity we can make annually to send you.

We are Pleased to here of the Brittanias Safty which Ship we now daily expect. The Walpole we understand will sail in a few days for Bengall.

GENTLEMEN

We have had a Mutiny among the Military of this Garrison which had nearly ended in a general Insurection; the Particulars of it as related by Lieutenant Campbell who had the Main Guard, are, that yesterday Evening, soon after reading a Notice signifying that their Grievances in Relation to their Pay should be represented to Mr. Saunders on his arrival, (being occasioned by a Disturbance among them the Day before) about forty Men of both Companys came to him, and said that another new Governour might come after him and then it would be delayed again: on which he told them he could not redress them himself, but beg'd them to be orderly and he would represent the thing to Captain Gingins; and that thereon they retired for the Time, but much dissatisfied: soon after a Serjeant came to him & beg'd him to order the Guard to Stand to their Arms, for that the Men in the Barracks were loading their Pieces and had threatned to shoot him, on his asking them the Reason; Lieutenant Campbell accordingly ordered his Guard to load & fix their Bayonetts, and at the Same time Sent a Serjeant & four Men to desire the Mutineers to lay down their Arms and give their Reasons for behaving in that manner; but Receiving no Satisfactory Answer he went to them himself with a Part of his Guard, & endeavouring to enter the Barracks, which were by this Time dark, they pushed him with the Butt Ends of their Firelocks, and Treated him 1750-12

with great Insolence: On which he returned to his Guard and Orderd the Drum to Beat to Arms, in hopes there were some good Men among them to Secure, the Rest, and with Design of Alarming the Officers, who were then absent, and at the same Time sent to advise the Deputy Governour of the Affair they thereon fell into their Ranks as usual, but being Order'd to march after grounding their Arms, not one of them would Stir: at this Lieutenant Campbell threaten'd to make the Guard fire on them, and accordingly gave orders for making ready which the Guard would not obey; and the Company, which was drawn out opposite to the Guard, immediately thereon Took up their Grounded Arms: He then went to the Deputy Governour's, and returning Told them from him that their Grievances Should be considered & redressed; on which they gave three Huzzas, & retired to the Barracks, carrying their Arms off with them.

This morning we appointed Captains Gingins and Campbell to make enquiry what their Complaints were, and they having order'd One Man to be sent them out of each Company, who might prefer the General Voice, James Carr of Captain Gingins's Company of Foot, & Robert Kersey of Captain Campbell's, were deputed, and alledged, that Major Lawrence on their enlisting into the Companys Ser-

vice promis'd they should receive 21: 6. Month in the Country Currency, clear of all Deductions, which sum they have never received, but have been baffled of a Part of it by taking a Rupee for 12 fanams whereas they can get but 11 for it, and by that means they sustain a loss of 8 fanams Month in their Subsistance.

Having consulted Captains Gingins & Campbell it was thought Expedient in the Present Exigency to Comply with the Complaints so far, as to acquaint them,

that we never hear'd of any agreement being made with them to Pay them 21: 6: Month, but that we should enquir into it; and in the mean Time to assure them that whatever Major Lawrence promised them should be observed, & that we have given Orders for 12 fanams to be paid them for a Rupee from the first of this Month: At which they acknowledged themselves Satisfied.

From this Detail you will be able To judge of our Situation, and from such Resolutions as may be Necessary to prevent Disorders of this Kind in future, which you will please to acquaint us of as soon as possible, for we shall expect them with great Impatien [ce] We are very Respectfully,

GENTLEMEN

Since our General Letter of the 10th. we have been favour'd with Your's of the 9th. and having apply'd to Cap^t. Knight for the Salt Provisions wanted for the Fort S^t. George, he has been so kind to give orders for the Delivery of twenty One Puncheons & Two Hogsheads of Beef from the Kings Storehouse at Cuddalore and as the Squadron is Short of Pork, has Promised to give us in lieu Ten Puncheons more of Beef which nearly make up the quantity of Meat required but desires the same may be accounted for with Commodore Lisle or the Agent Victualer: We shall not fail Sending the Ten Puncheons By the first Conveyance, and expect very Shortly to be furnished with One.

The Deputy Governour having received an Invitation from the Killdar of Poonamallee for hoisting the English Colours in his Fort, immediately Sent Ensign Talbot with some Seepoys and the Master Carpenter to have it executed, but on our having yesterday heard some Discharges of Small Arms from that Part of the Country which only proved to be Vollys fired in honour of our Flag not hoisted, till then for want of a Flag Staff, and apprehending the Place might be attacked by some of Chundasoib's People, who we knew were in the Neighbourhood, we order'd Captain Campbell with 50 Men & Some Seepoys to march directly thither. As this Place is generally esteemed the Key of our Country its of the utmost Consequence to Prevent it's falling into the Enemies hands, and we must accordingly request your resolutions in Regard to it, Till the Receipt of which we shall continue a Party of Europeans their & Some Seepoys.

Honble Sir & Sirs

Under date of the 6th. of June I acquainted the President with the Disturbances at Brampore, they at last got the better of that Rajah, and have plundered not only what remained of Brampore but all the Towns and Country Round about it Eercole Narrain one of the Companys Merchants, inhabiting one of those Towns, had his House robbed & plundered, & himself Imprisoned, but has since made his escape,

and fled to the Hill Country, as has likewise Two others of the Merchants; I have long known, and guarded against, the Villainous Proceedings of this Nabob, but as Vizaramrauze wrote me before he went away that he has assured him that nothing should happen amiss to the Factory I rested secure but they found means both to Surprize and Robb me, the 7th. Instant about 100 horses, & 200 Peon's came into the Town, the Reports concerning them were various, some said they were going to Catack, others that they came to borrow Money as I knew this Nabob was going away, & his affairs in a desperate Condition I thought it best not to Trust them, and accordingly wrote Mr. Saunders that Night for a Command of Men, to stay here, till they were gone but the Next Morning, the Captain of the Horse, came to see me under pretence of Buying some Broadcloth with him were about 12 People, Fifty or Sixty more Insensibly dropped in, when having as they thought got a Sufficient number within and the Rest ready without; upon a Signal given they seized me and Cap^t. Bonnady, by the Arme's and throat, and putting a Drawn Dagger to my Brest, (to prevent me from making any resistance, or any body from rescuing me,) they carried us to a house in the Town, where they kept us that Day, the Next morning they released Mr. Bonnady, and carried me to the Camp had I known their Intentions, or had Time to Shut the Factory gates, I could have Defended myself against a Much greater Number, upon my Arrival in the Camp, they kept me Surrounded with Horsemen & Peons three Days before they would let me see the Buxy, (the Nabob being of no Account) when they did, I asked him what He brought me there in, that manner for, he Reply'd, as to the manner it was without his orders that Letters were come from Nasar Jing, that his Camp had been Robbed whether by French or English he could not tell but that he wanted to talk with me on that Account and accordingly dismissed me guarded as before, but soon after open'd his designs, by sending me word that, the Camp was Starving and that I must lend the Nabob 20,000 Rups, which should be Punctually Repaid, that the Banker at Itchap^m. had assisted them and I must too (I must acquaint your Honour &ca. that as I went into the Camp, I met the Banker coming out under a Guard, they had carried him thither in almost the same Manner they had done me, and having treated him Vilely made him promise 10,000 Rupees and then let him go home) I told them I had no money, and absolutely refused to lend any thing, upon which they sent Arabs, Caffars & all the Vilest fellows they could pick out in the Camp to me, who would not let me eat Drink or ease my self but when they Pleased, and at most extravagant Batta, in this manner I continued 7 Days, having no Vakeel to talk for me, him they beat upon the Road, and sent back because he should not spoil their Design Vazaramrauze's Vackeel, and some of the most considerable Men in the Camp, talked with the Buxy, and told him the Ill Consequences of such proceedings that the Company would Resent it besides, that the Nabob, had a Cargoe of Rice at Vizagapatam which no doubt they would Seize, but finding all to no Purpose, (he being always drunk) they came to me, and advised me by all means to get out of their hands, that their Affairs were desperate, they were going out of the Country, and had no regard to their Actions, that it was a Shame for the Company, that any Body Should see their People Treated in the Manner I was Influenced by their advice, reduced to a Verry low Condition for want of Necessarys, and Tired out with the ill usage I received, I at last with much difficulty made it up with them for 8000 Rupees, besides Presents, Batta to Horsemen, Peons Arabs Caffars &c2. a years Extraordanary Present for the Factory, Seven Corge Ten Peices Sallampores and 200 Rupees Broad cloth which they owed me for before, and after all they made me Sign two Notes, one that they had taken no unreasonable Money from me, another that I had no Concerns with the French, nor any of their Effects in my hands, (this last story they made to cover their design, in carrying me out of the House in the manner they did) Soon after I came Home Lieut. Grant with a Command of 25 Men Arrived here I have requested Mr. Saunders to Stop the Ship and Rice now at his port, and I perswade my Self Your Honour &ca, will not let such Treatment as this Pass Unnoticed, no account having been made of the Proceedings of the late Nabob, before he went away, has encouraged these Villains to Act in the manner they have done, the Buxy talking with Doctr. Munro. (when in the Camp) about the affairs of our Factorys asked him, why the Company did not take back the Money Jeffar Allie Cawn, had robbed Ganjam of, they are this Day gone for Chicucul where a New Nabob's Standard is already hoisted.

I Wait Your Honour's &ca. orders, as for my own part when I consider that my best endeavours have been frustrated, that the Company & myself have been such Sufferers in this Place, I am quite dispirited, nor can I see how its possible any Business can be carryed on for the Company in a Country, where such rapacious Camps Come every Year to Plunder. Mr. Saunders has wrote me that as a New Nabob was coming to avoid if Possible any Rupture with the Government or else, I would er'e this have repaid the Ill usage I have met with by the Plunder of Ganjam.

Cargoe & Freight on Board we Stood to the Southward with a Dutch Ship & a Ketch with Drizly Over Cast Weather the 20th. About Noon the Wind began to Blow & a Sea Rise then Saw a Brig Stand as We did till night when it began to Blow harder we then Stoad our Sails but the fore Sail which we was obliged to Furl at 11 at Night & Lay Too about 2 in the Morning the 21st. the Wind Blew so hard & so great a Sea Layd us Gunnell under Water so that she lay Like a Log of Heav'y Dead Wood The Fowl Coopes Washed over Board as did our Prow which as we Judge got in the Dead Water under our Counter & Tore our Helm Coat much & of Course Put the Ship in great Danger of being lost as we Ship'd Much Water there in so great a Sea, in which Time we had about $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet Water in the Ship & Several things Damaged, about 3 we got her to Weere and Run before the Wind & Quartering Till Noon it then growing moderate we Stood Again to the Westward about 5 in the Afternoon got the Ship to Suck & things Tollarable well to Pass but found by the quantity of Water She had Ship'd both by Streams. & the Helm Coat that there must be Damage Done both to our Cargoe of Rice Bale goods &ca. Now we the said Master & Officers are ready to give our Corperal Oaths to this as Matter of Fact for which Several Reasons we do Protest Against the Winds & Sea's for all Damage Arising there from this 22d. Day of August 1750, On Board the Ship Lisle in Latitude 26. 19, No.

Since our last to Your Presidency bearing date the 8th. of March We received a Letter from Mr. Floyer & his Council under date the 6th. of May and another from Major Lawrence dated the 13th. July to which we embrace this Opportunity of Replying.

In the former came enclosed Copies of the Warehousekeepers Report of the Packing Stuff we sent You \$\mathbb{H}\$ Sloops Grampus & Boneta & Observe thereby that

there were 60 Pieces of the Gunneys and 1. 19. 3 of Ropes Landed by You from the Grampus much damag'd and unfitt for Service, on the Return of that Sloop we called upon M^r. Roberton the Master of her to know the Reason thereof, who inform'd us it was owing to the bad Weather he met with in his Passage & of the remainder which was sent to Fort S^b. George being 640 Pieces of Gunnys he brought back with him to this Place 636 Pieces & some Jute Rope which the Gentlemen there refus'd to land & M^r. Riccards who commanded the Boneta attributed the Damage to the same cause but assured us he did not know of any deficiency & produced his Bill of Lading.

We received from Fort S^t. George in part of our Indent for Redwood eighty nine Candy and twelve maunds of Grampus & Eighty Six Candys five maunds and Seventeen Pound of Boneta & request Your Honour &c^a. will Comply with the remainder of our Indent by Opportunities as they Offer having none in our Warehouse for the Service of our Honble Masters Ships.

Inclosed in Majors Lawrence's Letter we receiv^d. the Invoice & Bill of Lading for 78 Chests of Arcot Rupees which being weigh'd off there was a Deficiency of 45 Qrs. occasioned by some of the Chests being broke at the Corners and not well secured which we shall demand of the Captain when he comes up to Town.

In consiquence of an Indent from Your Presidency last season for salt Petre we have come to a Resolution to send you 3000 Bags on freight which will go on the Ships now under Depatch and will sail from hence within the Month.

It is with the utmost concern we are to acquaint Your Honour &ct^a. of the loss of our Honoule Master's Ship Lynn in this River on a Sand at Fulta to which Place the Captain made the Pilot bring her up Contrary to our Directions, We have sent down all the Assistance in our Power to save our Honole Masters Broad Cloth Copper &ct^a. from the Wreck & have protested against the Captain & his Owners in behalf of our Honole Employers for all Damages they may sustain thereby.

We are now to congratulate Your Honour &cta on Your Accession to the severall Appointments of our Honble Masters & wish you all imaginable Success therein.

Honble Sir & Sirs

This is to acquaint You that according to my Purpose I touch'd at Reho, in order to Procure Satisfaction for the Publick Affront offer'd to us in the Murder of the Master & divers Persons belonging to Peyton Galley; and for the losses sustain'd by the Gentlemen concern'd in that unhappy Voyage. Upon my arrival, I sent my Linguist aShore with a Letter for the King to that Effect to which He return'd me for Answer, that the Persons who Perpetrated the Murder were Dead; (and which, from the Best Intelligence I cou'd procure, is a fact) He pleaded great Poverty, and as a Proof of it, and an Acknowledgement of the Justice of the Demand, sent me off one small Parcel of Silver and three of Gold, chiefly consisting of Joys (Jewels) belonging to his family: He further Promis'd that He will Stop the Customs arrising from the Shipping, amounting to 4000 Spanish Dollars, which shall be ready against next Monsoon; & the same sum for the following one, which shall be paid on Demand, As to the money received I will pay it on my Arrival at Madrass, to the Gentlemen Concern'd in the said Voyage.

The Situation of Reho which lies, inland, some Miles from the River's Mouth, made it impracticable for me to anoy them there from my Shipping: Tis true, I could have taken some Revenge by Destroying several Prows & Boats which Appear'd within the River, But as I could reap no advantage for those concern'd in the Voyage by that Measure, and as many innocent People must necessarily have sufferd with the Guilty, and being Cautious of taking a Step which might prove injurious to the Companys Affairs, I thought it better to accept at Present the Terms offer'd; By which means, (if you concur with me in opinion) I can take a more ample Revenge, and with a prospect of considerable advantage to the Gentlemen concern'd; By sending a Man of War next Year, to cruise upon their Prows and small Craft; of which there are great Numbers belonging to their Port; Tho their Season for Trading was past's before my arrival there this Year.

I have the Pleasure to let you know that the King of Salangore was at Reho; & that He acknowledged his Share of the Debt and Promised to pay it chearfully early next Year at Salangore upon Demand.

I hope Gentlemen, to hear that you have all enjoy'd Your Health during my absence my health is very indifferent at present having a Small fitt of the Gout upon me, which prevents my having the Pleasure of seeing You aShore.

I shall sail directly for Madrass, where I shall stay some Days: if you have any thing to comunicate to me for the advantage of the Company; or if I can be of any Service to You in any shape; depend upon it that no one will undertake it more readily, or with greater Zeal than.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS,

Since our last of the 20th. Instant We have received Your favour of the 17th. and in Regard to the quantity of Cloth that can be provided at this Place by the last of December we have discours'd our Merchants on the Subject, and they tell us that they can no ways form a Judgement of the Matter, from the Precarious State of the Country which Obliges them to advance the Weavers in such small Sums and at the same time prevents the usual Supplys of thread from the Southward, that they are therefore under a Necessity of furnishing themselves from the Northward, in which they may fall Short of their Expectations, but that without these impediments they could bring in among the Three Setts about Six hundred Bales.

By Directions from the late President and Council We have used our Best endeavours to recover the Ballance due from the Old Madrass Merchants when the Place was taken but without Success.

Tellesinga Chitty, Brother of Tomby Chitty acquaints us that he transmitted a Pitition to the Court of Directors in which he set forth his own and his Brother's Case, in this Respect and begs that an Answer thereto may be waited for.

Molinga Woobal Chitty Son of Molinga Kistna alledges that his Father Dying about Two Months befor the loss of Fort S^t. George, all his Cadjans and Accounts were sent for by M^r. Morse and that it appeared large sums of Money were owing to him which if recover'd he is ready to Discharge the Company's Debt out of; He added that his Uncle Molinga Bal Chitty who was also concern'd in the Commission with his Father, is now a Prisoner at Ponticherry.

Ponopah Chitty another of the Merchants we understand is with You at Fort St. David But the Undertakers of or [sic] Chindadree Pitta having laid before us a Representation of their Case we now transmitt it for Your Honour &c².'s Perusal.

In the Extract sent us of the General Letter from England by the York are Directions for Collecting the Old Madrass Phirmaunds & Grants and Getting them Translated; After Strictest Search we can only find those obtained by the Embassy from Bengal of which Mr. John Surman was Chief, and have procured a translation of them from Paupas Braminey the former Linguist of Madrass which is now Copying over fair & shall be Shortly sent You He has likewise diliver'd us a List of such Grants as are Missing, as far as his Memory could help him, But we can get no account of what is become of any of them except that for Coinage of Money in

Chinapatam, which M^r. Morse says he carried out of Town when this Place was taken by the French, for fear it should fall into their hands, and that it was lost with some of his own Papers in the Countrey. The List is now enclosed.

We have spared Captain Joseph Knight for the use of this Majestie's Ship Ruby One hundred and Ninety Mercall of Rice and request you will account for the same with Commodore Lisle, it amounting at 80 Pagodas the Garce to thirty Nine Pagodas Seven fanams and Sixteen Cash (39, 7, 16).

We accompany this with our Consultations for August and the usual Monthly Papers. In the former you will observe the Proceedings in Regard to Singanah the Deputy Governours Dubash with the Deputy Governour's Remark at the End by way of Dissent Likewise the Storekeepers Account of a Small Difference in the Nails received Prince Edward from that Ships Invoice, which we have carried to Your Account, but omitted to advise of before.

The Humble Petition of Jaggoo & Chengalroyah.

Your Petitioners beg leave to represent to Your Worship &ca. that in Mr. Pitts time the Honble Company sent orders to make a Village for the Weavers within the Jurisdiction of FORT ST. GEORGE in which time Several Merchants Took a great deal of Trouble about it. but it was impossible for them to accomplish it, & When Mr. Benyon came out, the Company sent out the same Orders again, and on his Arrival here he sent for Your Petitioners Fathers Narrain & Chintomby and promised them that if they wou'd Take the trouble & find means to make a Village as aforesaid he would allow them the same priviledges & Liberties that their Grandfather Timan enjoy'd, and, that he would also write to the Company for a Reward for them, & further promised them that he would allow them Duties, Customs &ct. free & that they shou'd have the Sole management of the Village, & for their better Satisfaction, the Govr. and Council gave Your Petitioners Fathers a Cowle & 3000 Pagodas to Build Houses for the Weavers accordingly Your Petitioners Fathers made a Village & Called it Chindadry Petta after which they sent for a great Number of Weavers from several Countrys with about 600 Looms for the manufacture of the Companys Fine Goods, after which they began to make the Company's Cloth, the Governour & Council used to advance about 8 or 10 thousand Pagodas Yearly on that account afterwards they made a great Quantity of Cloth and marked on them (Chindadry Petta) and sent them to England. some time after Your Petitioners; Fathers to make the Place of flourish Spent about 18,000 Pagodas & began to Build Two Pagodas and Prevaild on the Merchants and Inhabitants of the Place to give them an allowance Yearly which amounted to 2000 Pagodas which was for the Service of the said Pagodas & got a Parwana likewise

from Nabob Subderally Cawn to get an allowance of 1500 Pagodas from the Merchants and Inhabitants of the adjacent Countrys, which allowances continued for some Years, During which it happen'd that Narrain Departed this Life, upon which Mr. Morse sent for Chintomby & told him that as Narrain's Son was Too Young to take Chindadry Petta & Cadapaucum into his Possession and Management, and at the same time told him to take what Money was Necessary for the Service of the Pagodas only out of the said allowances & the remainder together with the Proffits that arose from Cadapaucum to Pay in the Company's Ballance (sic) that was on the Weavers, to which Chintomby told Mr. Morse if he wou'd advance a little more money to the Weavers to keep up the Manufacture that in a Short time he cou'd recover the whole together with the remainder of the Allowance Money he cou'd pay the Company's Ballance, (sic) to which Mr. Morse agreed & desired Chintomby to advance the Weavers & that He would pay him again, accordingly Chintomby Borrowed some Money and advanced the Weavers on Chints, Moorees & Ginghams which Chintomby brought into the Warehouse, Chints Morees 44 Corge and 8 Ps. amounting to Pagodas 1824³/₈, out of which M^r. Morse deducted 1000 Pagodas on Account of the Company's Ballance, (sic) besides which Chintomby left in the Warehouse 20 Corge & 1 Ps. of Chints Moorees 15 Corge, & 12 Ps. of Ginghams all amounting to Pagodas 1254 which were Plunderd by the French at the taking of Madrass; and a Ballance (sic) of 240 Pags. remain'd on the Weavers, and about 112 Pags. worth of Cotton thread which remain'd in the Godown at Chindadry Petta was likewise plunder'd by the French, & 256 Pags. which Chintomby laid out in making Tanks at Cadapaucum to water the Paddy fields; Now Your Petitioners beg that Your Worship &ct. will take into Consideration the great losses their fathers sustain'd by the loss of Madrass (not only which) the French has Plundred Chindradry Petta burnt several Houses & ruind the Pagodas, which Your Petitioners refer to Your Worship &cas. Judgment & Your Petitioners as in Duty Bound.

This accompany's Duplicate of what We wrote to Your Presidency under the 7th. August last \$\mathbb{B}\$ Severn, which we hope has been duely received.

On the 22^d. August came to hand a General Letter from Fort S^t. George, dated the 18th. July, informing us of the Arrival of the Ships Lynn and Grantham at Your Presidency & that by them the Honble Company has been pleased to appoint Thomas Saunders Esq^r. to Preside over their Affairs on the Cormandel Coast, in which we wish him all immaginable Success.

We are much Concerned for the Loss of the Honble Companys Ship Duke of Cumberland, but glad to hear of the safe arrival of their other Ships.

On the 11th. Instant we received a Letter from the President and Council of Fort S^t. David dated 27th. June, with a Packet from Tellicherry; as we did the same day one from M^r. Lawrence dated 17th. July with a Packet from Anjengo, in which He Observed that the Packet from the Honble Company P Lapwing was not sent by Captain Somner, with the Reason for it.

Captain Somner did not arrive here till the 27th. August, & having taken in Water proceeded two days After for Surat to deliver his Bengal Freight, from whence he did not return till this Day, having been so dilatory in the delivery of it, as the Chief and Factors were Obliged to Protest against him, and we shall give him the quickest dispatch possible, with a Cargoe of Cotton for the Bay and the Warren in his Company with the like Cargoe; by which Ship we shall send a very considerable consignment of Bullion and Treasure to that Presidency.

In our last we mentioned that We should advise in our Next how much of Your large Indent of 7000 Barrels of Gun Powder we could make annually to send to Your Presidency, but You did Not acquaint us in what time so many Barrels would be wanted, nor in what manner such a quantity of an article that requires so much Trouble and care in the conveyance was to be sent to You: We have now 600 Barrels of Good Powder, that we could send to You provided a Conveyance offered, and we can supply you with about 900 Annually, which with the Common Powder you usually make for Salutes &ca. may probably be sufficient. We desire your speediest reply to this, which will be by the Way of Tillicherry.

On the 28th. Ultimo arrived the Lord Anson directly from great Brittain, as on the 18th. Instant did the Shaftsbury, those Ships Left the Downs the 4th. April with the Ilchester bound to Persia which is Dayly expected from thence.

Enclosed is our Account Current with Your Presidency, our adjustments with Your Books, and Copy of a Letter from our Accountant containing his Remarks thereon, which we hope will prove agreeable.

Enclosed also is Copy of the 22^d. Paragraph of the Honble Companys Commands to this Presidency & Lord Anson, by which you will Observe they are Pleased to direct that Captain Taylor of the Tryal Snow be dismissed from the Comand of that Vessell, & their Service, for Suffering several fishing Boats, belonging to this Place, to be Taken while he was Cruizing off this Island, by Angries gallivats, & that even without fireing at them, tho within Gun Shott; which if He should be at Your Presidency, you will doubtless put in Execution. We are Obliged for Your Advices concerning our Honble Masters Shipping and are under great Concern to Observe the Misfortune the Cumberland met with.

There was a Difficiency in the Treasure received Don Carlos of Twenty Rupees in Chest No. 105 for which We Shall Debit your Presidency as the Commander of that Vessell informs us he did not See it weighed off The Treasure & Wohen Goods by her and the other Ships are not as Yet Surveyed when they are we shall advise Your Honour &ca. how they turned out.

We have already this Season complyed with Part of your last Years Indent for Salt Petre by sending You 3000 Baggs & Shall comply with Your Indent this, to compleat the 5000 Baggs if Sufficient of that Article can be procured here.

Observing by Your Honour &cas. favours Declaration London that Captain Sedgwick had Your Orders to call at Vizagapatam to land some Madrass Pagodas and he having passed by that Place was on his Arrival here called before us to give his reasons for Not touching there when he informed us he endeavoured to make that Port for four days but the Wind and Currents being contrary and meeting with the Success a Country Ship belonging to Mr. Saunders, the Master Henry Hunt informed him if he persisted in his attempts any longer He would certainly loose his Passage to Bengal whereupon and as his Ship was extreamly rich he bore away for this Place having but a trifling sum to put ashore at Vizagapatam.

The Country around us is in perfect Tranquility and the small Pox very near abated so that there is a good prospect of Providing a Cargo of Pepper for the Next Store Ship.

Whole Years Amount is only Pag^s. 2106, 22. 53. which We have Received into our Cash and Carried to the Head of S^t. Thome Revenues, but should the Grant of this Place be confermed to us, we are of Opinion it would be best to farm it out in the Manner of our other Villages, only reserving the Sea Customs in our own Management, as there are many Reasons against having them in other hands.

We have hitherto had no Accounts with Tonnapah &ca. Painters, all advances having been made to them by You, and what Cloth they had Occasion for supplydfrom Your Investment, Your Honour &ca. will therefore please to acquaint us on what footing you would have this Business in future.

The late heavy Rains have thrown down a Considerable Part of the Walls of Ponamallee Fort and by the Computation of Lieutenant Hockett of the Train and John Moor Master Carpenter it will cost P. 575. to repair it we have nevertheless order'd out some Canon thither, but shall wait Your Directions for any thing further.
