[Pages 1 & 2 are lost in the original.]

RECEIVED a Letter dated the 6th. from the Linguist] at Callicut with his General]
reas 8TH. THURSDAY

Account [a few words lost] of Cash last Month was Rs. 5132. —. 75 and [a few words lost] Rupees 3335. —. 38 in Stores for Bombay. As yet [a few words lost] received any Answer from the Samorine, being told he [sent] for the Governour of Callicutt to come to him who being sick it would be some days before he could go to him but [being] inform'd the Samorine's intentions are not only to pay [the] 25000 fanams due on his first Ola but likewise the [amount] of the second Ola due in April last.

THIS Morning anchored between Myhie and this Place a large Ship with Moors Colours which on sending off a Toney find to be a french Bengall Ship from Busorah, who [is] come for News whether it is safe to proceed to the other Coa[st].
FRIDAY 9TH.
French Ship from Bengall anchors in Myhie road.

ANSWERED the Letter received Yesterday from the Callicutt Linguist and ordered him to send 12000 Bamboes [and] the other Necessaries for this Place as soon as possible. Answered,

WE hear the french are building a Gallivat at Callicutt [and] design to build three more to convoy their Munchuaes to Mangalore for Rice.

THIS Morning appeared to the Northward two Ships one [with] french Colours the other with Banian Colours though she likewise [may prove] a french Ship. They both anchored between this Place and Myhie and are belonging to Bengall [left] Mocha the 21st. of last Month and report that the Fan[ny] Captain Graham, the Juddah Ship from Bengall sailed for Bombay from Mocha the 10th. of last Month. SATURDAY 10TH.
Two Ship appear in ye. Offing

Two Messengers from the King of Calliquilone going with a Present of a Pallankeen and a Sword for Pallyreon brought the Chief an Ola from the Samorine desiring he would send some People to accompany them in their way as far as w[as] necessary. The Messengers desired only two to see them on [to the] other Side of Durmapatam whom we sent along with them. MONDAY 12TH.

THIS King of Calliquilone was sometime agoe obliged [a few words lost] between the King of Travencore and the Dutch being [a few words lost] the latter to fly his Country, and was well received by [. . .] which it's supposed is the occasion of his sending this Present.

As the Nelly is near ripe to the Northward Baddencallencore is preparing to prevent the Prince from sei[zing] of what justly belongs to him as he has lately done and has sent to desire we would Supply him with ten Maunds of Lead and ten Maunds of Powder, which it is AGREED to let him have and that we open a head on Baddencallencore, a supply of Lead & Powder granted him

the Books for Assist[*g.*] Baddencallencore against Prince Cuni Homo and carry the Amount to it, as we have agreed to furnish him to the Amount of 4000 Rupees to recover his Rights and give a Check to our Princes oppressive and arbitrary Measure[s].

ONE of the last arrived French Ships set Sail but being [. . .] Wind was obliged to drop her Anchor in our Road. We [hear] that they have landed 35000, Rupees at Myhie in Gold and Silver from the Bussorah Ship which is a very lucky and Seasonable Supply to them, their People (as we hear) being two Months in Arrears. The other two Ships will stay 3 or 4 days longer, but whether they intend for Bengall or to go to Don Mascarheen we do not yet hear.

IN THE EVENING sent Ensign Bilderbeck with a Detachment of 40 Men to erect a Seramby at Mattamy.

He was presented as is usual annually with 120 Fanams and promised on all occasions to keep firm to the Honble Company's Interest.

WE find that since sending Ensign Bilderbeck to erect another Seramby on Mattamy Point, the People of that Place are apprehensive that we intend by and by to lay an Impediment on their cutting their Nelly and have been with the Prince to obtain leave for that Purpose, who bid them go for leave to the Ensign at Maddacarra which he knew was to no Purpose and designed it as a Slight the Rent at Mattamy belonging to one Cunhi Pocra.

She anchored near the other two french Ships still lying between Myhie & this Place.

RECEIVED a Letter dated the 29th. Ultimo from the Presid[ent] & Council of Fort St. George (with Duplicate of their last dat[ed] the 7th. Ultimo) advising us that Commodore Barnet with his Majesty's Ships Deptford, Medway and Dolphin arrived at Fort St. David's the 20th. Ultimo from their Cruise off Ceylone where they had been joined by the Lively & Medway's Prize from Batavia. The Benjamin & Sumatra arrived at Madrass a few days before from the West Coast where the Orford had called in her way to Benjar & the Porto Bello had proceeded from Batavia on her Voyage to that Port. The Wager and Edgebaston arrived in Bengall June the 6th. and they learn by their last advices from thence that a large body of Morattas had entered that Province and that the Gentlemen there were afraid the Company's Investment would be greatly impeded. They proposed to dispatch the Benjamin for England by the latter end of this Month or beginning of September. As yet none of our Honble Masters Ships were arrived.

THIS Morning the three french Ships sailed but we do [not] hear where they design to go to. On the 14th. it is said they had landed about 35000 Rupees at Myhie but we now hear that not caring to take Bills on Pondicherry (& the Chief refusing to give them Pepper) they landed none being diffident of the Bills being paid which made them ask such an unreasonable Price for their Gold and Silver, as it was impossible to give it them.

RECEIVED an Answer from the Prince to the letter wrote him on the 21st. by Chatil Conna in which he says that he could well (as the Chief desires) lay an Impediment upon Ally Rajahs Effects but our protecting the Modeliar and being twice or thrice at the Expençe of sending such a Number of Men on so insignificant a Persons Account so likewise it is reasonable for others to protect those who depend on them and that it would be a troublesome Business for the Company to take under their Protection the Slaves, Vassals, Nairs & Nombiers of the Country.

NOTWITHSTANDING this Letter we understand that there is a great coolness between the Prince & Ally Rajah the latter expecting, his friendship is not Sincere and that it will last no longer than he can feed his Avarice with Present. A few days agoe Ally Rajah having begun some little fortifications at the end of the Buzar the Dutch Captain sent to put a Stop to it which our Prince promised Ally Rajah to intercede with the Dutch Captain for leave to go on with but he absolutely refused to consent to it acquainting the Prince that if he had so far forgot himself the Dutch had not and would never give leave for any such thing. As to the Prince being disgusted at our protecting the Modeliar, it is very unjust himself begged of the Chief here to promise it him but when he is put in mind of this & his falsely accusing us of intermeddling with his Government he never returns an Answer to it. At present we understand that he is in hopes of getting an Elephant from Ally Rajah and when he has got all he can will endeavour to accomodate matters with us and pretend it is at the Request of his Youngest Brother who some days agoe returned from Cartanadu, and has hinted to Chatil Conna since his being at Mattamy that he is much dissatisfied with his Brothers Proceedings and will endeavour to persuade him to seek our friendship again but he is a Person not to be depended on and at Present has lost all his Credit, so that till the Prince finds himself obliged to it by the Streights we hope he will soon be reduced to by Bedden-callencore and his friends it is not to be expected.

THE Chief received an Ola from the Prince in which he says that he is informed that we are cutting down Trees, demolishing & doing a great deal of Mischief at Mattamy in order to erect a Seramby there. To do this in his Country is not Right, that he has bore a great deal but we may be assured that he will not permit such doings, & had therefore sent People to gather in what belongs to Ally Rajah in order to give him and likewise to prevent our making any further destruction there or erecting a Seramby in that Place.

Answered

As soon as the Chief received this Ola he sent away advice Express to Ensign Bilderbeck to be on his Guard but it seems notwithstanding that he threatens in the above letter the Prince had not sent any People or endeavoured any ways to impede our going on with the Work, and it is likely wrote that letter only to please Ally Rajah. In the Evening the Chief returned the following Answer to it. That he had received his Highness's letter; had never intermeddled or protected the Nairs Nombiers, Vassals or Slaves of this Country excepting the Modeliar of Billiapatam and that by reason of the obligation laid on us by his Highness himself, as had been signified to him in Several Letters. At Mattamy we were doing nothing new but only erecting a Seramby in the Place of the old one carried away by the Water. If his Highness would be at the trouble to inform himself rightly in this matter he would find that we were far from destroying or doing any damage to that Place on the Contrary were endeavouring to make it flourish as Ally Rajah had refused paying his debt to the Honble Company we had laid an Impediment on what Effects belonged to him, where the Company had a Right and if his Highness considered the matter according to reason he would do the same in other Places. That as to his Highness's Complaint of having bore with many Grievances from us, the Truth is the Honble Company had suffered many from his Highness, and that we had never done any thing to occasion his saying so but had conformed in every thing to the Custom of his Country.

ANSWER'D the Letter received Yesterday from Baddencallencore and sent him 100 Rupees for the feast of Ona.

In the Evening the Toney that was sent away on the 25th. with a Supply of Powder &c^a. to Baddencallencore returned, Chatole the Place they were to deliver it at being retaken from him by Ockoo's people.

CHULI PAQUI having delivered into Warehouse forty Candies and ten Maunds of Pepper (Cas. 40 Mds. 10) as per Agreement in Consultation the 24th. Instant he is paid the Amount of it Rupees 3564. —. —. Pepper purchased.

RECEIVED two letters from the Linguist at Callicutt dated the 15th. and 22^d. WEDNES-
DAY
28TH
In the first he advises to have dispatched 8 Toneys with 4000 Bamboos but by bad Weather they were obliged to put in at Juibandy [sic] were [sic] one Jngada broke loose which we had joined together again and they proceeded from thence the 22^d. Callicutt

their Amount is Rupees 269. 1. 50. Received likewise an Ola from the Samorine in which he says that we must not impute it to want of Will but other Business which unavoidably hinderd him hitherto but that he will send a Person to Callicutt in September to pay off the remainder of the first Ola and will at the same time fix a day for discharging the Second Ola, hoping there will be no interruption in the friendship between himself and the Honble Company. The Linguist likewise advises that the 1st. King of Tannore died the beginning of this Month.

ANSWERED the Letter received Yesterday from the Callicutt Linguist and order'd him when the Samorine sends his Ministers to Callicutt and has paid what is still due on his first Ola that he endeavour to fix the time for the discharge of the second due last April as soon as possible. THURSDAY

HAVING received advice from the Ensigns at Mattamy & Maddacarra that they have a strong Report of a design to attack them and to prevent them going on with the Seramby Sent in the Evening Chatill Conna with a Reinforcement of one and fifty Calliquiloners and Tiveys.

SINCE Sending the Reinforcement mentioned above to Mattamy we do not hear any more of a design to attack them, but are credibly informed that Ally Rajah's Rajadores were Yesterday with the Prince at Cheraka, and were very pressing wth. him to send a Body of his People with the Cannanore Moors to Mattamy but the Prince absolutely refused it saying that he would never go against the English but that he (Ally Rajah) might send his Moors if he pleased on which they went away very much discontented and complaining that the Prince has deceived them. SATURDAY
31ST.

THIS Afternoon the Chief had a visit from Quequedolata heir of Cacarty Nombier who died last Year. He has some difference with the other Nombiers but made great Promises of his Zeal for the Honble Company's Interest, and was presented with fanams as usuall annually. Quequedolata pays a

Ultimo to desire the Assistance of some Guns and People to go against the Moors of Tiruvanugaddy that the said Messengers were returned to Callicutt the day before Yesterday and had brought ten Soldiers from Myhie three of whom were Europeans and the rest Topasses some of them were Gunners and had also brought some Powder & Grenadoes. That they were making great Preparations to go against the Moors, who had secured themselves in their Mosque at Tiruvarungaddy and were about 500 in Number, so that in a few days he suppose, there will be a battle between them.

WEDNESDAY 4th. THIS afternoon arrived from Bombay the Advice Snow built for the Service of Fort St. George by which received a letter dated the 20th. Ultimo from the Hon^{ble} President & Council advising the receipt of ours of April 6th. and 26th. and May the 31st. which they did on the 13 of May and 31st. July.

They approve of the early Notice given them of the Northampton's Arrival and of all our transactions relating to that Ship though we needed not have kept her so late in Expectation of Goods from thence as had they intended any we should have had early notice of it. We were right in protesting against the Commander for his deficiency of Gunpowder and a Gun and in tendring him those deficiencies. They Judge with us that little is to be expected from Ally Rajah and they approve of our making Sale of what took in his Boats: but cannot as we requested spare us a Vessel for distressing him at Sea, however as our Garrison is now Strong permit us to do it with armed Munchuas and we shall not be long without a Ship to Countenance our Affairs. They do not apprehend any ill Consequences from the ffrench in our taking the proper measures to recover Boyanores debt and would therefore have us use our utmost Sollicitations for getting it as well as that due from the 3^d. King of Cotiote and in case of the Samorines death make early application to his Successor for his complying with the Agreement formerly entered into. They are concerned to find the destructions in the Country Governm^t. still continue and as they make no doubt but the Steps we have proposed (by assisting Baddencallencore and a Present to the old King of Cotiote in case he performs the Service he promises) are the most prudent could be taken in our present Circumstances, they redily approve of them. They do not apprehend from the low Circumstances the ffrench are in at present that they will be troublesome or attempt assisting the Country Government against us or very considerably interfere in the Provision of Pepper, which if so, we may be the less anxious about the squabbles in the Country, and give us a good opportunity of reducing the Price of Pepper. They dont know when the Commander of the Elizabeth will sail nor are yet resolved when to dispatch the ffort St. George to us but as the Ships in

this time of War require the quickest dispatch order us to get the Pepper garbled and every thing ready as also the Northamptons Cargoe and private trade to send off with the utmost Expedition; What small Arms we still want hope that they shall be able to supply us with on arrival of first Ship from England; Order us to send home ₹ first Ship another of Captain Backwells Bonds for Rupees 1500 at Respondentia for the Ships use: Approve of our Sale of the Seven Chests of foreign Silver by the Northampton and permitting Mr. Parker to go home: Consent to our allowing the deceased Mr. Brandling's Widdow 30 Rupees per Month; will send us a proper Company's Servant by first Ship & a Gunner's Mate; Sent us a list of some Errors in our Invoices home and Accounts and expects our Accomptant be more careful in future. By the Bussorah Ship who imported from thence the 11 August had received some Amsterdam Gazettes and enclosed us Abstract of the Europe advice in them. Had ordered the Master of this Vessel not to stay after delivering us their letter. Enclosed us a Packet for Anjengo and advise us

RECEIVED a letter dated the 20th. from the Linguist at Callicut advising his having received ours of the 13th. and that he should recover from the Toney People the Amount of 327 Bamboes they delivered short here and give Credit for it in his next Account. Has drawn a Bill on us for R^s. 2000 payable to the Chief for so much made good to the Company there. The Timbers lately brought down were very small and therefore he had not bought any but he is told that the River will increase in a few days when some large ones would come down but advises that they are very dear being at present 6 Rupees per Candy and very Scarce to be had. On the 11th. Instant was a Skirmish between the Samorines fforces and the Moors at Tirurangaddy in which 92 of the latter were killed and wounded and on

the Samorines Side 7 Nairs killed and 45 wounded. In this Skirmish there were no Great Guns nor any of the Soldiers from Myhie, their Artillery not being then ready. That it having rained excessive hard for some days after this fight both Sides had been very quiet expecting till the Ground was dry and Weather fair when there would be a great Battle. The Samorines fforces consist of 8000 Nairs half of them have fire Arms, the others Lances, bows and Arrows with Swords and Targets.

In the Afternoon sent Ensign Bilderbeck with 25 Men more to Mattamy as ²⁹ Consultation above.

WE are since informed that the Ship lately at Myhie came from the Islands where Monsieur La Bourdonnois took out the lading of 4 Europe french Ships dis- patchd last Season from Pondicherry and Bengall and had fitted them out with the Fleury and the abovementiond Ship to cruize on this Coast off Goa to intercept our Bombay Shipping but whether they are yet arrived or this Ship came first to carry Provisions to them on their Arrival we dont hear.

THIS Morning about two o'Clock we were alarmed with a great fire and Several great Guns and Small Arms which seemed to be on Durmapatam but we found at day light to have been at the Mucquary at Egar which the Moors had burnt to the Ground and killed several Mucquas, the Gun, and Small Arms were fired by our Serjeant at Eddicott who advises that the Moors were about 500 and had burnt the Mucquary entirely and then attempted to set fire to five Houses just under the Tower but he drove them away by firing on them, but could not prevent their burning 3 Munchuas belonging to Chatto Chitty, which eight or ten Men set fire to and immediately ran away. There was likewise there a Munchua belonging to a Moorman w^{ch}. they did not set fire to and they carried 4 or five Toney along with them destroying the Rest. As he was obliged for fear of the fire to throw off the Cajanns from the Tower, he desires 2 or 3 Tarpaulins to preserve their Stores from being wet in Case of Rains. Before Night we had 31 Mucquas three of which were Women and Children brought hither wounded and some very dangerously which were sent to the Hospital.

RECEIVED a letter from Ensign Bilderbeck advising that last Night he went with all our People in our Munchuas from Mattamy to Urbelly where they were no sooner arrived than they were fired upon from Madday ffort however they landed and were then immediately attacked very boldly by above 2000 Men both in Front & Flank and a Smart Engagement for about an hour when he divided his Men and advanced on them on all Sides who were soon put in disorder and retreated. He beleives that he killed and wounded Several whom they carried off except one Man they left behind. On his Side was only one Man wounded a Tivey. He then went to the River Side to give the People some Refreshment which they had Scarcely taken before the Enemy advanced upon them a Second time but they soon obliged them to fly and then burnt and destroyed all before them belonging to the Enemy. The Nairs run to Madday and the Moors to Prugenga but he believes that they shall have another engagement with them and hopes shall then gain a Compleat victory. He says that all our People behaved gallantly.

RECEIVED likewise a letter of the Same date from Ensigns Bilderbeck and Wardman advising that Since their last Engagement with the Moors they had burnt and destroyed above 200000 Dungoys of Nelly and finding that 3 or 4 Moors Inhabitants at Mattamy were present at the Engagement one of whom has always been violently suspected of concerting the Massacre of our People there about four or five Years agoe they had burnt their houses to the Ground and are of opinion their Stay any longer there is now needless and are in Want of Ammunition.

Letter from Ensigns Bilderbeck & Wardman.

RECEIVED a letter from Ensign Johnson advising that he is informed about two hundred Moors are got together at Momocoona with a design as he is told to make an Assault on Maylure and take Possession of those hills that command Maplingott River.

Letter from Ensign Johnson.

ON Enquiry into this it is said here that Ally Rajah has some Palmars near Momacoona the annual Rent of which amounts to 1000 fanhams and the Moors are gather'd together to prevent their being attacked. Wrote him this and ordered him to let the armed Tiveys keep a good Watch that way and throw up a Parapet of Earth as he desires for their Defence if necessary.

RECEIVED another letter from Ensign Johnson about Seven in the Evening advising that he is informed about 300 Moors and Tiveys are in a Moors Musquit at Egar and design to attempt some Mischief on the Island, the head Moorman's Name is Nodacarra Poka. Upon which Ensign Forbes was ordered to lye at the Banksall to be ready in Case of an Alarm to go to their Assistance with the free Guard and wrote Ensign Johnson to keep the Strictest Watch that on return of our People from the Northward he should be reinforced but at Present we could not send away any more People from hence.

In the Evening answered the Ensign's letters at Maddacarra and Mattamy, ordering Mr. Bilderbeck on his coming away to leave all the Ammunition and Stores he did not want wth. ONE of our Moor Merchants has got information that last night were brought to Cannanore 5 dead and 35 Persons dangerously wounded from the Engagement with our People at Urbelly, all Cannanore is in tears and Ally Rajah has commanded that this matter be kept very Secret. Amongst the dead was one of his Chief Officers.

LAST Night the french sent 5 Toney's with a Munchua & some Soldiers to the N^o.ward, which at first it was said were going to the Ships it is Suspected they have lying in the Offing about the lattitude of Goa or that it was some Assistance to the Moors at Cannanore but we are now informed for certain that they carried a Relation of their Linguist's to Mangulore with money to purchase Rice. A Report likewise that they had the other day passed over on this Side the River several Gabions ladders and other Materials for taking Possession of a Place near Curitchy, proves entirely false.

THIS Afternoon received a letter from Ensign Worrall at Maddacarra advising that he thinks it absolutely necessary to put a Corporal and 10 Men more in the Seramby at Mattamy as he beleives they will be attacked. The Command under Ensign Bilderbeck had a warm Engagement with the Enemy for five hours on leaving Urbelly and that they proposed returning to Tellicherry to night.

THIS Morning Ensigns Bilderbeck and Wardman return'd with our People from Mattamy except fifty Calliquiloners whom not having Room for in the Munchua's they left with the Modeliar's People. They have destroyed the Nelly at Urbelly belonging to Cannanore, and judge they have killed a great Number of the Enemy in the three Engagements they have had with them. We have not lost a Man and have but two wounded. Our People behaved all of them extremely well and in the last Engagement drove the Enemy quite under Madday ffort, where the old Prince was and had been looking on the fight.

THIS Afternoon by a Dutch Toney from Cannanore received some private letters from Bombay dated the 29th. Ultimo w^{ch}. came from Mangulore by the Toney sent thither on the 24th, with advices to Goa for our Shipping of the Report of some french Ships lying off thereabouts to intercept them. This Toney had like to have been taken by some of Ally Rajahs but made directly to the Dutch ffort and the Captain sent the letters hither with a letter advising of it. The Factore at Mangulore received our letter for Goa on the 27th. and forwarded it immediately by a Toney Express. The private letters from Bombay give Advice that the Walpole Cap^t. Lowe (appointed Commodore) arrived there the 29th. Ultimo without any other news, the Packet being just come ashore when the Vessel that brought these letters to Mangulore sailed which is a Small Grab designed to take in Rice for Muscatt.

AND to endeavour at the Same time if possible to come to an Accommodation with our Prince who we are informed begins to be afraid of the Moors whom he has Exasperated by many Promises which he has broken, AGREED that we give leave to Chatoley Namboory (who is a Bramine of the Brass Pagoda and very intimate with him) to Sound his Inclinations, said Person having made an Offer of his Service to endeavour accommodating Matters which he beleives that he Shall be able to do as besides the Princes being now apprehensive of the Moors, they have likewise made him Several Promises which they have not, nor can Comply with.

& to endeavour to accomodate Matters with the Prince Agreed to send Chatoley Namboory for that Purpose

TAKING into Consideration whether we shall at present keep any Munchuas cruising off of Cannanore we find so many Calls for our People to watch, and prevent the French's designs on our Side and the Reports of Attempts to do Some Mischief on the Island of Durmapatam on the other that we can't Spare at present Men Sufficient for that Purpose AGREED therefore that we deferr it till a fitter opportunity and only keep one Munchua well armed with a good Detachment on board to go and come from Maddacarra as occasion will require.

MR. ROBINSON Collector of the Rents and Revenues of Durmapatam delivers in a new Valuation of the Oarts on that Island as by order of Council the 31st. Eighty, two Quarters and ninety two Reas (R^s. 80. 2. 92) & he advises that the Governour of Callicutt was gone to the Samorine at Penany about paying the remaining twenty five thousand Fanams (Fan^s. 25000) of his first Ola which he had orders to do by the 10th. of this M^o. and had promised to be back again by that time. That as to the War with the Moors, the Samorine had not yet taken the great Mosquit

at Tirurungaddy having planted his Guns at too great a distance to do any Execution but he had now removed them and taken a small Musquit from them where were only eight or ten Moors who ran away. The Nairs after that went to attack a Seramby of the Moors who letting them come near before they fired on them killed 4 Nairs upon which they all retreated but he expects there will be a decisive Engagement in a few days.

And besides he insists that in Case of joining with us against the Prince as he will then be obliged to remain in Person at Natture we Shall pay him forty Rupees a day for his own Expences which he pretends they will amount to and which although we are persuaded he very much exaggerates yet on maturely weighing our present Circumstances, and that if we do not now fix him in our Interest, both the Prince & Ally Rajah are ready to make him offers & that if our is able by his near Neighbourhood to give us more trouble than either of them, The Board are of opinion that it is absolutely necessary, & do accordingly Confirm said Agreement.

WE hear that three Toney are come to Cannanore with forty five dead and Wounded from Mattamy & that Ally Rajahs Toney have taken three Munchuas laden with Rice from Mangalore belonging to Protocarem Paqui a Merchant at Callicutt, He taking this opportunity of seizing on all that falls in his way without regarding who it belongs to except to Myhie from whence he has (as we are informed) got a Supply of Ammunition.

Mr. Robinson having been at Durmapatam as by order of Council of Yesterday says that a great many of the Inhabitants had already carried off their Effects and gone away, and that the Rest seem under great apprehensions as they say that their houses are too far from the fort to be Succoured, & have no great Confidence in the Night Watch of Tivees & Calliquiloners, that he acquainted them that in Case they left the Island upon this occasion their Oarts Should be given to other People & Sent the Same Notice to those who were gone to the other Side in Case they did not return in three days. In order to encourage them to Stay this Evening ordered Chatil Conna with thirty Nairs to go out and keep the Night Watch and ordered Ensign Johnson to return the Calliquiloners in their Room if he does not want them.

SENT a Munchua to Maddacarra with the People's Pay and some Small Stores and at the same time gave the Ensign Notice that we hear the Moors design to carry four Guns to Ycott to fire on Maddacarra.

It is reported he says that the Moors lost above seventy Men in their Attacks on the Seramby, but he beleived they will still make another Trial, however he is under no apprehensions, as he has cut down above a thousand Coconutt trees and cleared away all the Bushes near the Seramby.

THE Letter from the Dutch dated the 5th. Instant (or 16th. N.S.) advises that they could wish our Munchuas did only Cruize on Ally Rajahs Vessels but they find by Experience that they likewise molest other Merchant Vessels bound to that Port, from whence the Mercht^s. of Cannanore begin to find a Scarcity of Many things & it will give them (the Dutch) sufficient Reason to Complain if we do not remedy this Abuse that they had in a former Letter in answer to ours requested that our Munchuas wou'd commit no Act of hostility within the Command of their Guns, but they coming in by Night very near their Bay and consequently within Reach of their Shott, Ally Rajah (to whom we are declared Enemies) could think no otherwise then that we Sought an opportunity to mischief him in which Case it was natural for him to defend himself from his Ship which lies in the Same place she has done these two Years past, but assure us that they will not Suffer him directly or indirectly to commit any Hostility against us under Shelter of their Guns neither had they suffered it hitherto. The Toney y^t. we demand to be returned, they are Certain was taken between Egar & Carly without Resistance, neither do they know whether she was come thither voluntarily or by force nor can they as we desire oblige Ally Rajah to return her who wou'd then with the Same reason apply to them to demand of us the restoration of what Vessels we took last Season of his, and further it is said that no body belonging to us was in that Toney and only a Moor-man who has revolted from the Prince of Colastria who as they are informed has likewise declared War against us.

ANSWERED the Letter received yesterday from the Dutch at Cannanore acquainting them that we are Surprised at the Contents of their Letter and the Complaints they make which being entirely groundless we apprehend that they are not well acquainted with our true Intentions, nor the just reasons we have to distress Ally Rajah by Sea against whom we had not declared War but designed to oblige him to pay a large Debt that he owes to the Hon^{ble} Company and which he last Season on withdrawing our Vessels (which then Cruised in the same manner they do now) promised, before the Expiration of two Months to Send Persons hither to Settle his Accounts and discharge it according to Reason and truth, which Promise as he never kept but on the Contrary sought all opportunities to insult and mischief us we laid an Interdict on his Effects within the Hon^{ble} Company's Jurisdiction of Mattamy

according to the known Custom of the Country, which he endeavoured to take off by force of Arms, in three several Attacks on our People there, that our Munchuas hitherto had not in any wise molested any Merchant Vessels bound to their Port or any other or done any thing but what might reasonably be done without the least Offence or Complaint, neither had they gone under the Command of their Guns as is pretended whereas Ally Rajah took this occasion (as they must know better than us) to rob every body that falls in his way without Distinction nor has the Prince of Colastria, as they pretend, declared War against us that we are well assured the Toney we desired they would oblige Ally Rajah to release was taken within Command of their Guns and not between Egar & Carly as they write us and the Moor-man in her was under the Honble Company's Protection with three of our armed Seepoys, for which reason we did & do desire they will oblige Ally Rajah to release the said Toney and People. We should be glad this Rupture were of no long Continuance, but hope whilst it does last that as Friends & Allies they will not permit Ally Rajah to commit any hostilities against us under Shelter of their Guns nor to rob all the World as he does at present for in Such Case we do protest against them.

In the Evening the Munchua returned from Callicut having in her way fallen in with and taken a Gundara from the Laccadiva Islands with Coyer & Coconuts belonging to Ally Rajah, Sent off a Guard to take Care of her & sent her People ashore & put them in Custody.

By the Munchua received twenty Eight thousand of fire wood, two Leaguers of Callicutt Arrack & other things amounting to Rs. two hundred thirty Six, one

quarter and eighty two Reas (Rs. 232. 1. 82) ^{qr. reas.} [sic] with Account Factory Expences for last Month & Stores provided amounting to Rs. Eight hundred fifty nine, two quar-

ters Eighty three Reas (Rs. 859. 2. 83) ^{qr. reas} as also last Months Cash Account, the Ballance of which is Rs. one thousand five hundred fifty seven & Seventy nine Reas

(Rs. 1557. —. 79). ^{qr. reas} Enclosed is likewise a Callicutt Price Currant of Goods & Coins for this Month. By the Munchua he has Sent up the Serjeant and twelve Men sent down Sometime agoe, but requests as we cannot Spare any of our own People that we will permit him to have ten Topasses there w^{ch}. he can do at 4 Rs. $\frac{1}{2}$ Month and is very necessary at present, as the Moors are very insolent, and threaten to do a great deal of Mischief if the Samorine demolishes their Mosquit at Tirurangaddy which he is endeavouring to do, and desires we will let him have a Serjeant from hence to Command said Topasses.

SENT off Robin with a Supply of Water to Ensign Wardman in the Munchuas, and our Letter with Orders to him to send it ashore by a Toney to the Dutch Fort at Cannanore and to put Colours in the Boat that the Dutch may know She is designed for them. A Supply of Water sent to Ensign Wardman.

THIS Morning received a Letter dated Yesterday from Ensign Worrall at Maddacarra advising that all was well there but that the Enemy were preparing to bring some Cannon against him, having filled their Gabions, & flung up a Bank at Irny, on which he fired on them three Six Pounders when they immediately dispersed, but he is not in the least apprehensive that they can hurt him & Concludes that they are Sick of attempting Mattamy, The Platform of which being broken with firing some Guns, he desires Plank may be Sent to repair it. TUESDAY 8TH. Letter from Ensign Worrall at Maddacarra.

RECEIVED an Answer by Robin to the Letter wrote last night to Ensign Wardman. he says that he does not well know how to Send our Letter ashore to the Dutch at Cannanore the Mucquas being terribly afraid of falling into Ally Rajahs hands, however he will try what he can do with them. He shall now as directed lye off of Carly, but the Munchuas are too heavy to pursue any thing so that many escape them, but if we send him two Small Munchuas more he should be able to take any Munchua or Boat that attempted to go into Cannanore. He is informed by the fishing boats that the Moors design to attack him with five Munchuas and several Toneys if they should he would stand to it to the last but their Mucquas are so

miserably afraid that he doubts their Stand^s. to Work the Munchuas as they ought to do.

WE hear from Cannanore that out of the three Shott Ensign Worrall mentions to have fired on the Moors who were throwing up a Bank at Irny three Men were killed, one of which was divided by the middle & was one of their best Officers.

Instant & likewise yesterday another desiring the Amount of his Expences for ten days to Commence the 1st. of this Month at 40 R^s. ¶ Diem as Long as he Continues at Natture on our Account, The Board taking this unexpected demand into Consideration are of opinion that if we refuse it he would immediately fly off, & although our Intent & Agreement was not to give him that Allowance, but when we might be necessitated to ask Assistance yet as he continues at Natture we must give it him or look upon all that we have hitherto given him as lost, for Should we refuse it & tell his Majesty that we do not now want his Assistance or that he should not continue longer absent from his Place of Residence, he wou'd then indeed have no pretence to demand any thing more and would go home, but at the Same time whenever we had occasion for him would insist upon a new Agreement and pretend that he had already fullfilled the former having by ten days Stay at Natture enabled us to put matters on Such a good footing that we of ourselves acquitted him, by telling him his Presence there was no longer necessary, and refusing to pay his Expences any longer, On the whole our Affairs at present being in Such unlucky Circumstances that disgusting him might in all probability be of the utmost ill Consequence; The Board therefore do agree to pay his Demand and as we are in hopes from Chattole Namboory his Negotiation with the Prince that we Shall shortly come to an accommodation with him that we Continue said Agreement till we See the Issue of it.

TO THE HONBLE REGNICUS SEIRSMAN

COMMODORE OF THE NOBLE NETHERLAND COMPANY &CA. COUNCIL AT COCHIN.

HONBLE SIR & SIRs & much esteemed Friends

WE do ourselves the honour to write you by a Toney Express, and could wish it were on any other occasion than the present, but the notorious partial Proceedings of your Gentlemen at Cannanore in relation to a Difference between us & Ally Rajah gives us so just reason to complain that we cannot but lay it before you hoping from Your Honour & Candour and the Strict Alliance & friendship between our two Nations, that on duly considering the matter Your Honour &ca. will rather join with us in taking Satisfaction from So unjust and treacherous an Enemy than any ways Countenance the impeding it, & therefore request that Your Honour &ca. will at least lay your Commands on those Gentlemen to behave on this occasion with that impartiality as becomes Friends & Allies especially as in the whole Course of this Affair we have not given the least pretence for their acting otherwise which that Your Honour &ca. may be the better Judges we Shall plainly & sincerely acquaint you with the Case.

ALLY Rajah being indebted in a large Sum to the Honble Company & having by his Insults and Abuses made it unsafe for our people to pass by his Buzar we last Season made a demand of it and on his refusing to discharge it we distressed him by Sea, on which he promised before the Expiration of two Months to Send Persons to Tellicherry to settle his Accounts and discharge it conformable to reason and truth and if we would withdraw our Vessels: this we accordingly did but instead of complying with his Promise he repeated his Insults and refused to come to any Account, which obliged us this Season to lay an Indertict [*sic*] on his Effects within the Honble Company's Jurisdiction of Mattamy & to distress him again by Sea in defiance of the former he three Several times attacked our People at Mattamy with a numerous armed force but with great Loss to himself.

This is the true State of the Case between us & Ally Rajah and we Shall now acquaint you with the Grounds of our Complaint against the Gentlemen of Cannanore.

1st. They permit Ally Rajah to fire from his Ship lying in their Bay on our Vessels as they pass by, although we have Strictly observed a due distance out of Respect to them.

But to obviate any Recriminations and as we have promised to give you a plain and Sincere account we must acknowledge that one time last Season a Young Officer in a boat belonging to our Grabs went so near to occasion your Gentlemen to fire a Shott from their fort and write a Complaint to us, to which we Show'd a due Regard & immediately Sent our Orders to the Commander to forbid the like in future and to keep Such a distance as might not give Your Gentlemen the least Cause to complain neither Since that which may be called an Accident have our Vessels given them the least reason to Complain.

2^{dly}. Ally Rajah is permitted to Send out his Vessels by Night & to take and to plunder Merch^{ts}. Vessels and carry them into said Bay.

3^{dly}. The Gentlemen at Cannanore assist Ally Rajah with Mucquas to carry Artillery against us.

4^{thly}. They permit People from the French at Myhie to resort to the Moors Buzar and often times even into the Noble Company's Limits and have Conferences with Ignatius Texeida and the Moors to foment the Rupture at present between us.

4^{thly}. We Shall forbear troubling Your Honour &c^a. with any particulars as we beleive it needless, and the foregoing we presume do Sufficently Shew the notorious Partiality (to call it no more) of your Gentlemen at Cannanore and we flatter ourselves from your Wisdom & Integrity that Your Honour &c^a. will remedy it.

Before we conclude we must acknowledge that in Some Instances Your Gentlemen have behaved as we cou'd wish they had done always in giving Protection to a Toney of ours from Mangulore and Sending us the Letters She brought which otherwise must have fallen into Ally Rajahs hands & afterwards taking an Opportunity to send the Toney likewise.

RECEIVED a Letter dated this morning from Ensign Wardman advising that the two Small Munchuas we sent had joined him and that he should now be able to Cope with Ally Rajah by Sea in any Shape and beleives few of his Boats or Munchuas will escape him, he Yesterday sent our Letter ashore to the Dutch Fort at Cannanore but rec^d. no Answer, the Chief having told the Mucqua that he was going to dispatch a Toney with his Letter to Telly. but had Sent him five Mucquas which he wrote him were taken by the Moors some ten days past and having made their Escape to their Fort he had Sent them off to him. Our late Conferences and Treaty with the King of Cotiote we judge has raised a Jealousy in the French and occasioned Some Letters passing between them, which, least it Should raise any unjust Suspicions in us the King of Cotiote sent us the Original of a Letter he received Yesterday from the French Chief and is as follows.

I have received Your Majesty's Letter, we have no other News from Europe than what I advised Your Majesty of in my last ever Since our Settling here we have always had Your Majesty in our Interest, of which on the present occasion, I am pleased to have no Reason to doubt. We expect that our Ships of War will certainly come, and Your Majesty need not doubt it in the least, Myhie October the 6th. 1745.

THIS Afternoon received a Letter from Ensign Wardman with a Letter dated the 21st. N.S. from the Dutch at Cannanore in answer to one wrote them the 7th. Instant O.S. they say that we endeavour uncivily and ag^t. Reason to refute what they had wrote to us on the 16th. Instant N.S. that they should not answer one Exstream with another but convince us that they know how to take a discreet Course, though they cannot conceive on what Grounds we can say that we have not declared War against the Moors of that Buzar and the Kingdom of Colastria since all imaginable Hostilities are daily and effectually committed as we must be well convinced of, however that concerns us and not them to dispute With us, It is plain they have advanced nothing but truth from our Munchua on the 17th. & 18th. N.S. the very day that we wrote them stopping four Vessels coming from the Northward and sending them into Tellicherry, and further to Shew the insignificancy of what we alledge they can prove by our own Letters that our Vessels have orders to Stop all bound to that Port for if it was not So the three Vessels bound to them last Season

had no occasion to see Tellicherry. As to the Toney we Speak of again they can say no more than what they have already wrote us, which is the naked truth. That as Friends & Allies they wish wth. us this Rupture may be of no long Continuance & assure us that as long as we attempt nothing within the Reach of their Guns they Shall give us no manner of trouble, & will take Care likewise that no body else Shall injure us under the Shelter of them.

As it is likely we may have Some bad Weather on the approaching new Moon it being very dirty and threatning already sent Orders to Ensign Wardman that whenever he finds it unsafe to continue longer in his present Station to Send the two Small Munchuas hither, & if the Wind will permit, go with the two large ones to Maddacarra and having heard Several Guns to the N^o.ward which we judge to be there or at Mattamy, Sent Orders to Ensign Worrall that if he Shou'd be in immediate want of Assistance to write a Line to Ensign Wardman, who has orders in Such Case to repair as Soon as possibly he can to Maddacarra with all the four Munchuas it being the quickest way, we can Send him any Assistance, if he should want it.

He had received the Plank which was very proper to repair the Platform.

SENT the Shells to Eddicott that the Serjeant wrote for and answered the Letter received Yesterday from the Dutch at Cannanore acquainting them that we were not in the least convinced by it as they seem to expect, that all they had alledged in their former is true, & all that we have advanced frivolous and contrary to Reason for the two Reasons they mention in support of it do not in the least prove it. The design of our Sending out Vessels (as we have already acquainted them) was to oblige Ally Rajah to keep his Promise and Settle his Accounts with our Hon^{ble} Company, and not to molest Merchant Vessels, or any body else: the four Vessels they mentioned coming from the N^o.ward on the 17th. Instant N.S. and the three bound to them last Season were, on finding they did not belong to Ally Rajah immediately released without the least hurt or Damage done them, it is true this may be inconvenient to such Vessels, but is what in Such like Cases (they must know) is unavoidable and practised by all the World, however to avoid any further dispute with them on this occasion We now acquaint them that on the 9th. Instant we had Sent a full and plain Account of the matter to the Hon^{ble} Regnicus Seirsman Commandore for their Noble Company and his Council at Cochin with our Reasons for thinking they have acted with great Partiality and not as we could expect from the Strict Alliance and Friendship between our two Nations.

He is of opinion that putting two Six Pounders into the Seramby with Plank and Gabions will be of great Service, that he was Strengthening the Pallisado but wanted more hands having but Six Tivees : Yesterday the Enemy brought their Elephants to Irny but on firing two Shott at them he had seen nothing of them Since and desires we will Send him another good Quarter Gunner.

THIS Morning received a Letter dated Yesterday from Ensigns Worrall & Wardman advising that the latter on friday Evening finding as he was returning to Tellicherry that the bad Weather was abated came to an Anchor at Eddicot & a Southerly Wind soon after springing up, had gone with all the four Munchuas to Maddacarra, the two Smallest of which he now sends with these Letters & had left the Gundara he had taken under Care of the long Boat with a Corporal and Six Men to bring hither but seeing nothing of them yet we Suspect that the Cannanore Moors must have Seen them and retaken her.

Ensign Wardman has taken this imprudent Step contrary to Orders, for in Case the Weather proved too bad to keep his Station, he was ordered to Send the two Small Munchuas to Tellv. and go (if the Wind would permit him) to Maddacarra with the two large ones, as from the Report of Several Guns to the Northward on friday it was judged his Assistance might be necessary, but in Case the Weather woud permit he was ordered to return to his Station unless Ensign Worrall Should write to him for help & then he was to go with all the four Munchuas, he has likewise returned the Letter Sent him to put ashoar to the Dutch at Cannanore not having he Says had an opportunity of sending it, both he and Ensign Worrall say that he arrived very Seasonably, as the Enemy were fortifying themselves very Strongly at Ycott tho it does not appear that they were likely to do them any more harm than they have hitherto.

SENT away immediately a Serjeant and twelve Men in a Small Munchua to Eddicott to look after the Gundara Prize and long Boat which returned in the Afternoon with a Letter from the Serjeant at Eddicote advising that the Moors of Cannanore had attacked the Gundara and Long Boat (which returned in the Afternoon) with Six Toneyes and three Munchuas and retaken the Gundara which happened in this manner. After Ensign Wardman parted for Maddacarra, the Prisoners in the Gundara being very quiet and not Suspected by the Soldiers stole to the Head and Softly hauled up the Anchor and drove out to Sea which when the Long Boat perceived they followed after them but were attacked by the aforementioned Toneyes and Munchuas off of Cannanore, on which not thinking themselves Strong enough to make any Resistance the Soldiers that were in the Gundara left her and went into the Long Boat, the Moors carried the Gundara into Cannanore & the Long Boat made for Eddicott, but unfortunately striking on the Rocks was broke in Pieces, when the Moors thereabouts got together to the Number of near one thousand and had not the Serjeant at Eddicott dispersed them with firing some Guns at them and sent down half his Men to their releif, our People must have been cutt in pieces. They returned with this Munchua & brought a line from Ensign Wardman dated off Egar Friday the 11th. advising that he then sent hither the Gundara under Convoy of the Corporal in the Long Boat & that he had persuaded the Marcan to come to an Anchor under Egar Mucquary in hopes of a Southerly Wind for Maddacarra in the Morning if not he could but at last return to Tellicherry.

THAT the Wind not permitting him (after Ensign Wardman left him to come to Tellicherry) he put five Soldiers with four Mucquas and a Marcan in the Gundara with Orders to Anchor, which he supposed they had done but in the morning found them much to the Northward upon which he immediately weighed and got up to them when they were attacked by three Munchuas and Six Toneys whom they resisted as long as their Ammunition lasted but finding the Enemy too Strong he took his People out of the Gundara into the Long Boat and made for Eddicott leaving the Prize to the Enemy. The Board not finding he was any ways to blame having but Six Men besides himself cleared him.

The Enemy were intrenching themselves at Aycott with a Design to batter the Seramby but in his opinion they must have larger Guns and go better to work though if they had they could not do much Execution they are at so great a distance. Ensign Wardman stays at Mattamy with the Command that was there, besides which he has left him 20 Seepoys and Mr. Worrall has assisted him with some Calliquiloners and Six Soldiers. AT the same time received a Letter from Ensign Wardman. He says that on the Weathers promising to be fair his Design was to have returned to his station and Cruised, but hearing some Guns to the N^o.ward he imagined the Seramby or Maddacarra was attacked and went to their Assistance so that what he did in regard to that breach of Orders he thought would tend to the Hon^{ble} Company's Interest and Safety. As it was now thought very necessary he continued at Mattamy to defend the Seramby, being reinforced with twenty Seepoys, twelve Calliquiloners and the armed Tivees we had sent, he had on going for Maddacarry dispatched the Gundara under Charge of a Corporal and Six Men in a Long Boat with particular Orders to keep close to the Gundara and he is sure they might have rowed to Telli-cherry he had received the two Six Pounders from Mr. Worrall and was erecting a Small Battery for them fronting the Enemy's at Aycott, but as Mr. Bilderbeck was going with the Munchuas to Cruise and consequently should have no Mucquas he should want Coolies to mount the Guns.

The Battery at Mattamy was half done and they had mounted one Six Pounder on it with which and from the Fort at Maddacarra they had fired several times on the Enemy and they beleive with good Execution they both are of opinion that the Enemy have got some experienced Gunners with them and expect to be desperately attacked but are well provided and shall give them a warm Reception, Mr. Worrall in a Postscript says that since writing his Letter they had received a Shott into their Guard Room.

ON examining into the matter abovementioned, it appears by the Testimony of some of Our Merchants, & People of Credit that said Munchua belongs to one Cuoy Mahmud a Merchant at Burgorah, & that she was bound to Neleasaroon for Nelly upon which released her.

The reason of my long silence, is because Your Highness has not taken the least Notice of a truth, I have been obliged so often to repeat, that without reason you accuse me of interfering in the Government of your Country, nor have I yet given Your Highness the least cause, to Violate a Friendship, which from its being established on such fundamental reasons, might have been expected to last as long as Y^r. Highness^s. Life (which God preserve) & a Memory of the many great services, done Your family, & Country, when invaded by a powerfull Enemy.

I cant conceive how your Highness, can so soon forget these things, & without the least instigation join with the most perfidious Enemy to You, Your Country, & the Hon^{ble} Company; to attack our Fortresses, of Maddacara, & Mattamy, which are most Ungratefull returns for the many services done Y^r. Highness, & directly contrary to Your true Interest, which makes me believe your Highness is Misled by those who are Enemies to us both; therefore shall take the liberty of setting this affair in its true light.

Your Highness well knows, the Fort at Maddacara, was built at your earnest, & repeated request, & for Your Benefit, promising as much land as wou^d support the expence of its Garrison, but this Y^r. Highness forgot as soon as Your Convenience was served & now wou^d drive us from thence, but since it was built at Your

request & against Our will, Y^r. Highness may be assured we shall not easily part with it, unless on the terms my Predecessor Mr. Law sev'ral times offered it You, which was, reimbursing the great expence the Hon^{ble} Company have been at in maintaining it.

Our pretensions to Mattamy Your Highness must remember, since it was left to Our discretion by those very Enemies, that wou'd have destroyed Your family, & Country, had not the Hon^{ble} Company by Force of Arms, & an unlimited expence, drove them out, & reduced to terms of Peace, & at the same time shewed the greatest proofs of sincere regard to Y^r. Highness, by an unbounded Gen[e]rosity.

The Benefit of these two Places, are Y^r. Highness^s. from their Protect^g. the Trade of Your Country & defending it from the Usurpation of others, the expence of maintaining them, being the Hon^{ble} Companys.

As Your Highness^s. behaviour of late, has been very unaccountable, I shou'd be glad to know your real intentions, & what reasons you have to complain. THIS Morning by Ensign Wardman received a Letter from Captain Fandell advising that Yesterday morn^g. early he embarked on the Jungadas with a body of two hundred ninety two Men besides forty of the Modeliars, landed without being discovered by the Enemy at Irny, which he immediately attacked and after an Hours smart Engagement carried their Fortification Sword in hand, The Enemy soon after being beat out of Irny attacked the Seramby very briskly but Ensign Worrall having reinforced serj^t. Funge with a Corporal and Six Men and keeping a Continual fire from Maddacarra and the Munchua, they retired, they brought off two four Pounders from Irny with all their Ammunition and design to destroy every thing at Irny as soon as his people were refreshed, he did not think it proper to attack Aycott with what People he had till further Orders or we could send him a Reinforcement as he was Short of his Compliment by Reason of a Long Boat, and small Munchua of Ensign Forbes's Command not being arrived him yet he now sends the two large Munchuas with Ensign Wardman, with fifteen Soldiers & ten Calliquiloners in each. We had only one Man killed Augustin D'Almeyda a good Soldier and five wounded with one Nair & one Mucqua in the Munchua's, if we would have him attack Aycott desires we will send him a Reinforcement to make up in all about four hundred Men with two three Pounder field Pieces and the Stores and Ammunition he sends List of, amongst the Dead he found a Letter in Mallabars Signed by the French Chief at Myhie which he enclosed.

RESOLVED likewise that on his Return he be ordered to stop at Egar and if he finds it practicable that he land and do the Moors there all the Damage he can and bring away with him or destroy her a Munchua belonging to them which they spared when they burnt the Mucquary and Massacred the Mucquas.

THE Mallabar Letter Signed by the french Chief sent hither by Captain Fandell is to Ally Rajah dated October the 3^d. 1745 and is a Clear Proof to us that the French as we Suspected do assist him, though their Chief has always pretended to behave with an exact Neutrality in Regard to any disputes or quarrells by Land with the Country Government Copy of it follows this Consultation.

BEING at a more than ordinary Expence of arrack for our People during those troubles and having an opportunity of twenty or thirty Hogsheads at first hand from a Souda just arrived from Goa the Warehousekeeper is ORDERED to purchase it as cheap as he can and to prevent the great Loss of Leakage by keeping it in Goa Casks that he buy up what Europe Casks he can for that Purpose.

TRANSLATE OF MONSIEUR DUVAL DE LEYRIT THE FRENCH CHIEF AT MYHIE'S LETTER TO ALLY RAJAH, FOUND AMONGST THE DEAD AT THE TAKING OF IRNY VIZ.

I have received Your two Letters, in one of which you tell me of the Quarrell you have with the English, & in the other desire Lead, Powder and other Matters of all which I take Notice. It being thus before entering on this Affair, I advised you what Lead, ready Money, Powder and other Assistance could afford you in the whole. At present you desire Money of me which I send (or will send) by Mayem Cariaicar one thousand Emperors Dollars. As for Lead and Powder I dont see in what manner I can send any besides I cant let you have any great Quantity of Lead and Powder I likewise send one thousand Flints, further Cariaicar will tell you by Word of Mouth whom I have particularly acquainted with every thing. If you have any Letters for Pondicherry send them to me and I will forward them. Wrote this 3^d. of October 1745.

The French Chief's letter to Ally Rajah.

DUVAL DE LEYRIT.

HAVING embarked the two field Pieces and Ammunition for Maddacarra with about twenty five Nairs and as many Tivees the Weather proved so bad in the Evening that they could not proceed.

The Weather prevents the Munchuas going to Maddacarra.

CHATOLE Namboory who has been so long with the Prince in hopes of bringing him to an Accommodation with us sent us Word two days agoe by a Bramine that he had concluded every thing and should return as Yesterday, but has stopt at a house he has in the way on account the bad Weather.

THE Putterah that carried the Chief's Letter to the Prince on Sunday returned this day but without any Answer. He says that when he delivered it the Prince seemed pleased and bid him come next Morning for an Answer which he went for but happening to be just as the Prince received the News of our taking Irny he was in so ill a Humour that he durst not appear, The Bramine having told the Prince on his enquiring for him that he was not there and advised him to get away to Tellicherry as fast as he could and they would take an opportunity of putting the Prince in mind to send an Answer.

The Putterah sent by the Chief to the Prince returns without any Answer.

THE Weather continues so bad with heavy Rain that the Munchuas cannot proceed to Maddacarra yet.

As we have no other way to prevent this than by giving the Prince Some trouble to the Northward whither as it is not at all likely he will go himself it will oblige him to keep the Young Prince that way and prevent his disturbing us on this Side It is AGREED therefore that we accept of a Proposal of Como's a Man of great Interest in those Parts but being ill used by the Prince has lately taken part with Badden-callencore who engages on advancing him two thousand fanams (Fanams 2000) or four hundred Rupees (R^s. 400) only, to give the Prince so much Work to the N^o.ward that he shall not have leisure to disturbe us this way.

YESTERDAY by a Toney from Callicutt received 500 Soops of Charcoal cost Rupees 23. — 24 the Linguist writes that he had received no Answer from the Governour of Callicutt who says that in the Month of November he will pay as much as he can of what remains due of the Samorines first Ola and pay the rest in the Month of December when without fail he will discharge Said first Ola and it cou'd not be done sooner on Account the War the Samorine was engaged in with the King of Mysure, between whose Forces there had lately been a great Battle near Pallycatacherry in w^{ch}. the Samorine got the better and obliged the Mysure Army to retreat two leagues. As to the War between the Second Samorine and the Moors of Tirurangaddy there has lately nothing happened by reason of the heavy Rain for some days past.

RECEIVED likewise a Letter Yesterday from Captain Fandell dated the day before, advising that on the 23^d. & 24th. they burnt the Houses at Irny and demolished as much as they could of the Enemy's Battery, that the late heavy Rain had obliged them to decamp and retire under Maddacarra Fort into Some ill covered house & exposed to the Enemy's Cannon who fired very briskly on them from Aycott but as yet had done them no Damage. On the 24th. a Small Munchua with Rice was drove ashore by the Weather on the outside of Mattamy, the people belonging to her immediately left her and run towards Madday. He endeavoured to Save as much of the Rice as he could, but it proved so bad being damaged by

the Salt Water and rain that it was unfit for use and the boat was broke to pieces by the Surf. He was fortifying the Seramby in such a manner to the Land Side that the Enemy's Guns should not be of that Prejudice to it as before. He had filled Six Gabions on the Southermost part of Maddacarra more opposite and nearer to the Enemy than the Fort and had fixed a Six Pounder there with which he beleives he had done good Execution having fired almost every Shott into their Battery and broke one of their Quarters. He says they had Suffered great Misery for want of a Lodging by Rain Wind and Cold. The Enemy are at Work in making Works and Pallisadoes to cover all their former Works and he having neither Plank nor Gabions it was impossible to hinder their Works and without a Reinforcement it would be impossible to attack them without loosing a great many Men. They have tried some Shells but the Fuzees they have dont burn long enough to throw them into Aycott so that without having an eight Inch Mortar their throwing of Shells is to no purpose. He proposed carrying over his fforce the next Night to Aycott and if he found it impracticable to Storm all their places as they had done at Irny he Should immediately begun raising of Batteries as nigh their Cannon as possible which in such Case will take some time to dislodge them.

THE CHIEF acquaints the Board that Chatoley Namboory was returned from the Prince at Cheraka where he had several Conferences with him and had at last found out his Intentions and on what terms he was desirous of being reconciled to us. The Reason of his late strange Proceedings were these two, first that his Brother's Intimacy with us had given him a great deal of Jealousy for he was a very bad Man, who had most pernicious designs and he was afraid that by our Countenancing him he might have Usurped the Government. His Second reason was that he wanted to destroy the Moors and for that Reason entered into a friendship with them that in Case he found it necessary he might not only make use of them against his Brother but the Consequence he judged would be that we should fall out with them and then we might join together and destroy them and this the Namboory says we may be assured has given Rise to the present troubles to put an end to which the Prince now proposes as follows that we shall engage to destroy the Moors and not to set up the Young Prince against him on promising which he will engage to continue always a faithfull and true Friend to the Honble Company, the Namboory says that the Prince bid him inform himself certainly if he might depend on our forgetting what is past being very apprehensive after he is reconciled to us which will make him lose all his present friends, that we shall take an Opportunity to revenge ourselves for his late Proceedings and that he had persuaded the Prince to come to Maplingatt in order to conclude matters, but his Uncle the 4th. King was so ill that his Life was despaired of for which Reason he could not leave his Pallace but desired he woud send him an Answer soon, he says likewise that he talked something of a handsome Present but not positively.

ON taking the Princes Proposals into Consideration the Board are of opinion that it is not for our Interest and in any manner necessary to come into them for as to the Young Prince who in the Beginning of these troubles we had good reason to hope might by our countenancing him put an End to them he has behaved so treacherously and basely that we can never depend upon him nor have we any hopes of Baddencallencore's being able to do any thing unless we would openly join him to Change the Government which besides the Risque would be attended

with a most Exorbitant Expence and no body can tell to what Length we should if once entered into be obliged to go, as to the Moors when once we have made friends with the Prince again, they will easily be reduced and although no body else has yet joined with the Prince against us yet if these troubles should last and the Neighbouring Powers find that we are hard pressed, they would soon join with the Strongest Side and then we should be in a much worse Condition than at Present. Besides our present Alliance with the King of Coticote which our present Circumstances obliged us to do is a very Expensive one but on accommodating Matters with the Prince would be no longer necessary so that every thing being duly Considered as it is certainly most for the Honble Companys Interest and the thing chiefly to be regarded is to endeavour to make friends with the Prince, It is RESOLVED that Chatoley Nomboory acquaint the Prince that we are willing to Come into his Proposals and to bring him as soon as possible to a meeting to adjust Matters between us on a good footing.

RECEIVED the following Answer to the Chiefs letter to Prince Cunhi Homo of the 19th. Instant.

TUESDAY 29th.

I have received Your Letter and observe the Contents. You say that I have never taken Notice of several Matters you have wrote me nor have particularly answered them whenever you have wrote me anything relating to your own Business I beleive that I have not been wanting to take due Notice of it. You likewise say that I have without any manner of reason complained of your interfering in the Governing of my Country this I did upon no other Cause but that when I place or displace in my Government the Vassals of my Country they always apply to you and you countenance them and this is the way that you interfere to my thinks. I have not violated the Ancient Friendship between me and the Honble Company the great Services done by the Company to me and my Country I do not or ever will forget. Having a mind to put down the Modeliar who had opposed some dispositions I had made in Billiapatam Fort you Sent people to assist said Modeliar to oppose me whenever I had a mind to punish any body that transgressed my Laws and Customs: the Honble Company was always on my Side and assisted me which you cannot be ignorant of, but you for the Sake of the Modeliar a Moorman and my Subject oppose me by which I judge you care not for my Friendship any longer and likewise that I cannot be at Quiet in my Country for which Reason I shall do all that is in my Power first and afterw^{ds}. leave my Country and depart from hence and my Proceedings hitherto were not with the thoughts that I should overcome the Honble Company. The General who is gone to Europe told me that if I would pay the Charges of Maddacarra Fort that he would deliver it to me with all its Stores and the reason why I did not accept it was that I wanted money and now you say that if I will reimburse what that & Mattamy have cost you will give me both Places and thus you write to me wth. good Words which I trusting to, took no Care to defend my Places and you at the same time enter them by fforce kill the people and take their Arms. However after all if you will be on such a footing that I may be at ease I will not be against it in any manner whatever. Chatoley Namboory will particularly acquaint you with every thing I have talked about with him. —October the 24th. Mallabar Stile.

Letter from the Prince to the Chief.

IN the Evening Captain Fandell returned with all our People from Maddacarra having put ashore at Egar in his way and burnt a Munchua and the Moormens House who last Month had set fire to the Mucquary there and killed several Mucquas Captain Fandell says that the Reinforcement we sent him from hence on Saturday Evening arrived at Maddacarra on Sunday Morning when he got every

The reason he did not leave Ensign Forbes with the four Munchuas to Cruise off of Cannanore as ordered was that the rest of the Boats could not have brought all our people back.

King called back their People from Maddacarra and ordered all Hostilities to cease.

LATE at Night received a Letter from Ensign Forbes advising that he saw the Dispatch Boat safe to Maddacarra by twelve o'Clock, and had taken a Toney laden with Batty which he sent hither to be Examined, at one oClock being Close in shoar to the Southward of Aycotta Hill he landed and burnt a Moors Mosquit there in the Afternoon Landed at Egar and carried off some Cattle, at Sun Sett Cannanore Fort fired at a Munchua that was coming out of that Port on which she went in again. Letter from Ensign Forbes.

BETWEEN four and five this Morning we were alarmed by two great Guns fired on Durmapatam and the Report of several small Arms on which not knowing what occasion we might have for People sent off an Order to Ensign Forbes to return into Port with the four Munchuas Cruising off of Cannanore. SATURDAY 2^d. The four Munchuas called into the Port, the Occasion of it.

On examining the Toney with Batty sent in by Ensign Forbes, she is found to belong to Boyanore, & therefore let go. Toney sent in by Ensign Forbes Examined and released.

RECEIVED a Letter from Ensign Johnson advising that the Alarm on Durmapatam was occasioned by a large Body of Moors having passed the River from Mama Cuna and attacked the Parapet at Meylure which Killoo Nambier defended very bravely for they had Scaling Ladders to it but he beat them off and killed Six on the Spot. He immediately sent Chatil Conna and ten Soldiers upon which they retreated and having burnt Six or seven houses were gone off the Island again but had lost a great Number of Men. He had likewise taken three of their Jungadas we had one Tivee wounded in the Neck and lost a hand who was sent to the Hospital. Letter from Ensign Johnson.

Dec^r. he must put in there and join what Country Ships are ready and proceed with them under his Convoy to Bombay.

16. But if he does not reach Tellicherry by that time he is to deliver the Cargoe to the Chief and Factors and obey their Orders.

17. In which Case you must direct them to dispatch the Ship Home to us from thence filling her up with Pepper and avoiding the Salt Petre if it can be done conveniently on our several returning Ships.

King of Cotiote that we are willing to have a Conference and desire his Majesty to appoint a day.

On taking leave the Prince told them that on Succours coming to him from Cartanetu and on his writing to them they must immediately all of them come again & Send likewise five hundred Men from Irevadenatu to which they answered that they had already sent three Hundred, however on meeting the Prince again they will endeavour and use all the Means in their Power to accommodate Matters.

By the Munchua sent thither on the 3^d. received a Letter from Ensign Bilderbeck at Maddacarra dated the 5th. advising that Ockoo's Nephew came the other day with a great Body of Men and took Possession of Cherakuna but that y^e. Achamars of the Pagoda telling him that he would be the occasion of the Loss of the Pagoda and it was better for him to go to Calliacherry where he might do what he pleased he went away again. He Sent two Olas from Baddencallencore and Como which was Sent him five days agoe but Since that had heard nothing about them. He had Sent a fforce to Takenbar Island and Agar Tange, and burnt upwards of one hundred and fifty Moors houses, and had likewise sent a Serjeant Corporal twenty Soldiers and twenty Calliquiloners & ten Tivees to an Island called Muttot over against Urbelly in order to Surprise a body of the villainous Mattamy Moors who had Settled there but on our Peoples landing and firing on them ran away, on w^{ch}. the Serjeant instead of keeping his People together, Straggling about for Plunder, about forty of the Enemy jump't out upon them and put them in great disorder till Six of the Soldiers and as many Calliquiloners turning face at last routed them and killed ten or twleve, & then burnt their Houses, had the Serjeant done his Duty they must have destroyed them all. They lost one Calliquiloner who was Shott dead in the Jungada coming off, he says that if he had fifty or Sixty Soldiers and as many Calliquiloners more he could oblige the Prince to leave Cadrul and go that way, that the People began to fall Sick and he now Sent a Corporal, & five Sick Men and a good many of the Calliquiloners were Sick likewise for which reason Sent Solomon Peters for some Physick.

THE Weather proved so bad on Saturday Night that the Munchua could not proceed before last Night. We have had a great deal of Thunder & Lightning with Excessive hard Rain which obliged us Yesterday to Send Bamboes and Olas to make a Place to Shelter our People at Durmapatam from the Weather. The Enemy fired at the Toney's, but upon Ensign Forbes's firing a few Musquets they retired from the Water Side to their Main Body, and then fired again at the Camp upon which they fired Eleven Shells, ten of them burst in the Trees amongst them but does not know what Damage they might do only the Enemy then hid themselves except Some that went up the Hill to their New fortification.

That he will always keep five hundred Men in readiness two hundred of which being in his constant Pay he desires nothing for, but for the Charge of the other three hundred we are to pay him one hundred Fanams ^{per} Diem but this to last no longer than we are willing ourselves and to commence Yesterday, It was likewise Agreed to give his head Rajadore Cuniachy Nombier ten fanams ^{per} Diem who has always been very warm in our Interest and for his good Services in M^r. Adams's time had then a Present given him, and one hundred and twenty Fanams at the Feasts of Ona and Biou for ever since.

apprehensions, that they had uncovered all their houses, he advises that Ockoo's Nephew was gone to join the Prince.

On the 6th. we have taken Notice of a Report that Ally Rajah had imprisoned Ockay his head Rajadore w^{ch}. we understand was false, & that he yesterday went to the Prince at Cadrul with about twenty five thousand Fanams in Gold & Silver which he had forcibly taken from the Inhabitants of Cannanore with this he has five or Six days Expences to pay, the King of Cotiote demands a Present from him of fifty thousand Fanams which amounts daily to about two thousand five hundred fanams so there is good hopes they will not be able to stay there long & the Prince it is said begins to be heartily tired.

AT TELlicherry.

GENTLEMEN

Notwithstanding the Present Scituation of Affairs between our two Nations in Europe, we have in no wise infringed the Agreement made between Tellicherry and Myhie for the reciprocal good of both Settlements neither have we taken Part in the Troubles that actually Subsist in the Country; after so moderate a Conduct we have great Reason to be Surprised that you have Settled Yourselves on the Hill of Ponella Malla without advising us of it and we cannot but observe to You that taking Possession of it is directly contrary to the Meaning of an Agreement and the Word that Mess^s. Geekie and Leyrit gave each other Since the late declaration of War.

The Hill of Ponella Malla is Expressly mentioned in our Treaty of January 3^d. 1742 and cannot be Comprised in the Exception of the 2^d. Article of Said Treaty we ought the less Gentlemen to have excepted Such a Proceeding on Your Side as Coringotta Nair has not hitherto given any Cause to Complain. We have the Honour to be with all Possible Esteem.

GENTLEMEN

WE are just now honoured with Your Letter of Yesterday's date relating to our having Posted a Party of Men on the Hill of Ponella Malla which you Say is an Infringement of the Agreement made between the two Nations for the Good of the two Settlements and that it is Particularly contrary to the Treaty of the 3^d. January 1742.

Letter to the French at Myhie.

We take this opportunity to assure You that we have no manner of Intention any wise to violate the Agreement you referr to and as long as you do the Same Shall observe the Strictest Neutrality with Regard to yourselves and your Allies and we flatter ourselves that in the Present Conjuncture of Affairs you cannot justly complain of our having Posted a Party of Men on that Hill as we assure you that we have no design to fortify or keep Possession of it, but to be on our own Defence and watch the Enemy who are assembled in our Neighbourhood to make an unjust War upon us and here we must observe that altho' you Say that Coringotta Nair has hitherto given us no occasion to Complain yet we know for certain that he has been in Person consulting with our Enemies and as we are informed engaged to join them his Excuse for this we presume will be that as he is a Subject of y^e. Prince of Colastria's he is obliged to go to him when called but as he is immediately under your Protection we are persuaded that he can take no Party without your previous Consent.

On the whole we have the Honour to assure you that we have no Intention (as said before) to fortify or keep Possession of Ponella Malla or any ways to molest Yourselves or Allies, and Shall, provided you do the Same, observe the Strictest Neutrality, being fully persuaded as we doubt not you are likewise that a Mallabar War must be the Bane of both Settlements and tend only to the advantage of our mutual Enemies. We have the Honour to be with the Greatest Esteem

They are all Consigned to us that we may land what we think Proper. Our Hoñble Masters Ship Dolphin which arrived at Madrass in August left Plymouth April the 14th. and parted Company with the Scarborough, Lincoln, Kent and Admiral Vernon with the Harwich and Winchester Men of War off Madeira the 26th. April and on the 28^d. with the London and Essex and by their advices from Fort St. George neither the London or any other Ships bound to the Coast and Bay were arrived there so late as the 1st. October.

Letter from the Gov^r. & Co. of Bengall.

THE Munchua Sent in Company with the Elizabeth and Fort St. George with Stores to Anjengo is returned and brought a Letter of December the 8th. from the Chief and Factors acknowledging the Receipt of them but the four Bales of Cloth and Perpets received were omitted in the Invoice which they desire the account of. We hear that the Prince and Ockoos Brother have had some Words and that the latter has left him and that Ally Rajah being very backward in Sending Money for Expences the Prince Sent People to his Second Brother at Cotacuna for twenty thousand fanams (Fan^s. 20000) out of his Treasury there which the Younger Brother getting Notice of went and wou'd not permit him to Send, protesting that he would lose his Life before that Treasure Should be touched, that his Brother said on going away he Should not want any thing, Ally Rajah having engaged to

Letter from Ensign Johnson.

It is Said for certain that the Prince will leave Choudar very soon.

THIS Morning early Ensign Forbes went over with a Strong Party of Men and about fifty Tivees with Hatchets to cut down the Trees and Bushes on Attara Point. About 2 o'Clock the Enemy appeared to interrupt them but were so warmly received by our People that after losing a good many Men they retired and our People continued their Work till five o'Clock. In this Skirmish we had five Men wounded. There are Still a great many trees to cutt down but our People being fatigued, ordered them not to go on that Work again to morrow but wait till Monday. SATURDAY 21st
Ensign Forbes has a Skirmish wth. the Enemy.

OUR Honble Masters Ship Prince of Orange Captain Westcott Junior arrived at Bombay from Persia the 20th. Ultimo and will be sent hither in due time to be dispatched with Pepper. He left the Downs April the 9th. in Company with the Pelham, Royal George and Princess Mary under Convoy of the Newcastle Man of War who parted company with them the 29th. following in a hard gale of wind. On June 1st. he fell in with the Scarborough, Lincoln, Kent and Admiral Vernon under Convoy of the Harwick and Winchester Men of War but they determining to put on the Cape he left them on the 1st. July in the Latitude of 18⁰⁰ South and 28⁰⁰ West Longitude from London and Report that the Men of Warr had buried many of their Men.

In their letter of the 13th. they say they had received no advices from us since our Letter of June the 10th. but learn by an Ola or rather Translate of it in Portuguese that came wth. it (both which they enclose) from Prince Cuni Homo to the President that we had commenced Hostilities against him in support as they Conjecture of Baddencallencore, but as they were ignorant of the real motive, the President had wrote him a friendly Answer (as ³ Copy enclosed) in General terms only but gave him an opening to accommodate matters in case he should be so inclined which they should be glad to hear had the desired Effect and enclosed likewise Duplicate of a Letter that the President wrote to the Chief upon the occasion to which they refer us. As the Walpole is in April to be sent to China, they order us to provide at the Cheapest hand two hundred & fifty Candies of Sandall Wood, one hundred of the 1st. sort and the Rem^r. of the 2^d. which with four hundred Candies of Pepper (the quantity they judge can be spared) we must keep in readiness to put on board her as soon as she arrives. They send this Patt^r. Boat purposely to give us an opportunity of communicating to y^m. what advices may be necessary and we may detain or dispatch her accordingly.

TRANSLATE OF PRINCE CUNHI HOMO'S LETTER TO THE PRESIDENT OF BOMBAY VIZT.

MY Predecessors as well as myself have always been devoted to the Interest of the English Company and you know in what manner we behaved to each other in times Past, but I must acquaint you there is great Confusion and misunderstanding in my Country. 'Tis true I was formerly embarrassed with Warr and laboured

under a thousand difficulties, yet with the Assistance of the Company I overcame them, because we were then united, but having lately conferred a Mark of Respect on Pallicutta Mapla in Billiapatam ffort the Modeliar of Billiapatam took umbrage at it and informed Domingos Rodrigues Linguist to the Hoñble Company thereof who was very pressing with me to revoke it which I did not comply with, the said Modeliar my subject complained of my Custom Master to Domingos Rodrigues touching various matters, who not being gratified agreeable to his Wishes, has for these Seven or Eight Months past become my Enemy and with the Assistance of the Company's Soldiers hindered Pallicutta Mapla entering into the Mosque on seeing which I withdrew from thence, however wou'd not permit the Modelair to gather in his Rents, for impeding which I sent my Nairs and some Moors from Cannanore, whereupon the Moors of Cannanore were also hindered from gathering in their Rents, which I requested they might do, but Domingos Rodrigues gave no heed to it, the Nilly was ripe & to prevent its being spoiled I ordered my People to cut it and carry it away, on w^{ch}. the Company commenced Hostilities against me, I shou'd be very glad that the Company's trade & respect in my Country wou'd increase, on the other hand that my subjects & their Estates be solely under my Controul but he (meaning Domingos Rodrigues) will not permit it to be so, from the great Regard I formerly bore to the Hoñble Company, I am in hopes you will give me a satisfactory answer without fail.

THE PRESIDENT'S ANSWER TO PRINCE CUNIOMO.

The Presi

Answer.

I received your Highness's Ola with Translate of it in Portuguese, but the Language is so bad as to render it scarce intelligible however by it I perceive the good Harmony that has so long subsisted, between the Hoñble Company and Your Highness has met with some interruption which gives me much Concern, well knowing that both Interests are mutual, the Prodigious Expence they have been at of late years to preserve your Dominions is a certain Demonstration of their Extraordinary kind and good Intentions towards your Highness and for which they desire no other Return than a quiet and free Liberty of Trade in your Country agreeable to the Grants of your Ancestors and those of your Highness. Your Customs, which tends greatly to the enriching your Country and the encrease of your Revenues. The Hoñble Company do not desire to interfere in the Government of your Country but if your Vassals are permitted to murder our People, impede our Trade by rendering it unsafe to pass in the Country, and to give us continual Insults with Impunity; under such Circumstances, what other Measures can it be expected should be taken than such as are consistent with our safety? These great Injuries obliged us last year to take satisfaction of Ally Rajah as we could then get, as it could no otherwise be obtained, for notwithstanding the great Indignities that have been given by that House even to your Royal Person I hear the Moors are greatly in your favour. The Modeliar I know was your faithfull subject, but I wish you may find the like in Pallicutta Mapla. I likewise am certain that Domingos Rodrigues was always hearty in your true Interest who cannot send any of the Hoñble Company's Military on any occasion that must be by order of the Chief which I hope there has not been occasion for as nothing but our own Preservation cou'd occasion such a step, what may have happened in about Six Months Past. I know not for want of advices from Tellicherry, but I daily expect to hear from thence, when proper directions shall be given thither for accommodating any difference that may have arose which certainly can only have proceeded from evil Counsellors being fully sensible of your Highness's good Intentions towards the Hoñble Company, and theirs towards your Highness and who never will expect any thing of you but what is Consistent with the true Interest and Benefit of your Country. When this is received I request of your Highness to send such of your Ministers to Mr. Geekie as he can have Confidence in with my Letter to him which accompanys this, giving them full Powers to accommodate matters in a friendly manner towards which I am certain he will heartily Contribute and on

From what the Messenger relates I am apprehensive the Prince's Evil Ministers have obliged you to come to blows which I shou'd be sorry for as it will doubtless create great confusion in the Country, I know one of the House of Colastria more especially will be solliciting for taking the Government from Prince Cunihomo nor do I see how you can avoid giving it him if the Prince has behaved in such a manner as to force you to have recourse to Arms in defence of the Honble Company's dear bought Priviledges. From what I remember of his disposition, I beleive your Present Disputes must have proceeded from his having unguardedly suffered his base Ministers to put him on Measures contrary to his true Interest of which I hope you may be able to make his Highness sensible and settle all affairs upon a peaceable footing, if you are not, you know what you have to do.

AND as it is likely the Prince may not yet have received the Presidents answer to the Letter he has wrote about these troubles Copy of both which we received Yesterday by the Express Boat it is AGREED to Put the President's answer into Mallabars and send it to him wth. Copy of his own Letter to the President as we hope it will have a good Effect towards speedily accommodating matters.

RECEIVED likewise an Ola from Prince Cunhi Homo in which he says he has received the Chief's Letter with Copy of the Gov^r. of Bombay's Answer to the Letter he had wrote him: as touching the Present troubles both the Chief & the Linguist must know that they are not entirely owing to his fault. He arrived at Parlacherry the 9th. of the month at Evening which the Moors hearing of were very much dismayed. That the Company ought to expend both Rice and Money to reduce the Moors. In the warrs which he had formerly made with the Moors and Canarees he had expended all that he had, raised Contributions from the Country and borrowed money of the Company, which even to this day he had not been able to pay and is not in a condition now to borrow more of the Company for that Purpose. It is four days that he has not been supplied with Expences from the Moors, he has now Nairs of Cartanadu, the Nombiers and

others to the Amount of two thousand Men and there is neither Rice nor Nelly in the Country, so that they are almost famished, and for this reason he went directly to Cheruka, and before he has a Meeting with the Chief desires he will send Unichi Nair, Chatil Conna, Chatoley Namboory and Amboo Amby with three hundred Men, as many Bales of Rice with Ball and Powder so as to arrive the 11th. their stile (which is to day) at Billiapatam before Night when he proposed & was resolved to have a meeting at Maplingatt, the Moors began to gather together thereabouts and were likewise beginning to be troublesome at Cheruka for which reason he went thither and the Chief need not have the least doubt of his complying with his Promise but may be well assured of it and secure that in future there shall be no difference between us. He desires we will send the second and old Linguist to Maddacarra to meet him when he will fix on a day to come to Tellicherry and concludes with repeating again that we may depend upon him in this Business.

Instant as he had promised: the Chief will not in the least doubt of his performing what he has promised, it was his own desire to have some of the Company's Soldiers about his Person and no body else should have any thing to do with them of which the Chief may be certain, that no Cannanore Moors either with or without Arms came thither and that none of his People should or had any ways molested any body depending on the Hon^{ble} Company. AMBOO AMBY says that the Prince really has a great deflection in his Eyes and seemed concerned at the Chiefs mistrusting it that he had not washed his body for ten days past which was a very rare thing with the Mallabar Princes and bid him by word of Mouth to assure the Chief that before the 10th. of next Month. (which answers to our 8th.) he would certainly be at Tellicherry at the latest but perhaps sooner for as soon as ever he could he would come and in the mean time is very pressing to cultivate the Verges that belong to himself and the Pagoda about Maddacarra and Mattamy which if neglected would be a great Loss to him he therefore hoped the Chief would write to the Officer at Maddacarra about it.

THIS Afternoon the Young Prince came to the Fort who pretends to be very sorry for the late troubles and to be still entirely in the Honble Company's Interest, he says that his Brother the Night before he came away was fully resolved to come himself to Tellicherry, but in the Morning without seeing him, sent him word to go alone, the reason of which was that Ally Rajah has promised him Five thousand Fanams not to go himself and to dismiss our People from his Pallace but the true Reason, Chatoley Namboory (who came wth. the Young Prince) says is, that he wants us to promise him a handsome Present, before he comes, having it often in his mouth that the Moors are good milch Cow to him, but that he gets nothing from the Honourable Company and the Young Prince had not come to Tellicherry, but that as he is going to visit his Family at Cartanedu, it lays in his way. Before he took leave he offered (to shew his good Inclination to the H^o. Company) if we would send a Party of Men to Billiapatam Fort he himself would go and stay there wth. them, w^{ch}. would defeat all Ally Rajahs Designs, and oblige the Prince to break with him, but the Chief with a hint, how ill he kept his former Promises, desired to be excused from coming into. He was saluted at coming and going and presented as usual with sixty Fanams (60).

THEY advise of having received our Letters of the 6th. and 9th. December and 7th. ultimo and have laden on the Prince of Orange Two hundred and two Tons, nine hundred fifty two Decimals (Tons 202.952) and order us to put on board her the one hundred twenty eight Bales of Surat Piece Goods (128 Bales) and thirty four Bales (Ba^s. 34) of Carmania Wool designed for the Edgbaston, compleating her Quantity of Salt Petre one hundred and fifty Tonns (Tons 150) and then send her to Anjengo to fill up in case there is no danger from Enemies but if there is to compleat his Tonnage here giving the Commander what surplus he may require at half Freight and dispatch him directly to Great Brittain. Advise the Essex and Walpole were dispatched in Company with these Ships from Bombay, the former was to call at Mangalore for part of her Mocha Cargoe. On the Walpole they had laden three hundred Bales (Ba^s. 300) of Cotton which we are to land and keep till she comes to take it for her China Voyage. Disapprove of our not protesting against Captain Lowe for not taking up the whole of the Northampton's Cargoe as they were in want of some particular sorts of Broad Cloth, and now direct the remainder be sent up with as much Salt Petre as she can take in dispatching her from hence so as she may arrive with what Ships are now waiting for Convoy here by the beginning of April. They cannot Account for the deficiency of Sixteen Rupees (R^s. 16) in the Treasure sent us last, But the Eighty thousand Rupees (R^s. 80,000) now sent was counted before the Pursers of each Ship and direct us to acquaint them what were the numbers of the Chests wherein this deficiency was. This supply with what we shall receive from the Supra Cargoes of the Essex, Mr. Geekie's paying Money in here (and in Case Captain

Westcott requires the same they order us to receive it) They judge will be a sufficient stock: Approve of our not advancing Cunhiseu any more Money as he is not punctual in his contracts. An Adjutant not being formerly allowed here they order Mr. Forbes allowance for that Post may cease, and expect the Officers should take care and exercise the Military as was usual. If no inconveniencies accrue from one Person only retailing Spirituous Liquors permit such License to be continued. Having supplied us fully with stores direct that our useless Arms be sent up. Approve of our contract for Rice with Domingos Rodrigues and are pleased to hear by our last advices that we are in hopes of coming to an Accommodation with the Country Government. Are sorry Mr. Geekie's ill state of Health requires his leaving this Place but that he has their liberty to go home on what Ship he pleases and on his Departure to resign the Chiefship to Mr. Dudley. They likewise permit Mr. Worrall to leave the service and have sent Ensign Pokin in his room. Order as a standing rule for us to send up an Account of what Europe and India Goods are always remaining in Warehouse at the date of our Advices. Two or three Barrells of Tar being deficient in the Walpoles Invoice from hence and the Commr. alledging he received the same here as delivered at Bombay direct we clear the same up to them or adjust with him accordingly; They have sent Mr. Douglas a Factor down to the Assistance of this Settlement: Are well assured the Island of Durmapatam if encouragement is given may be made very productive and beneficial and hope proper methods will be taken for that end. Have returned the Prisoners sent them up as they are an unnecessary Expence and give us liberty to release them unless we judge it is necessary to keep three or four of the Heads of them. Approve of our keeping Captain Gowin and his Detachment and their pay for December have charged to this Settlement and now transmit an Account of stoppages for Rice delivered to some of their Families. Have sent a Packet and supply of stationary ware for Anjengo to be sent by the first opportunity and order in a Postscript a supply of Plank to be provided for Gombroon Factory.

TAKING the Dispatch of the Prince of Orange into Consideration, we are of Opinion that in case she was to be sent to Anjengo to receive the two hundred and fifty Tons of Pepper and Cloth lying there, as it is now so late in the season it might endanger her Passage It is therefore RESOLVED to fill her up here excepting for Fifteen Tonns of Cloth which we are obliged to send her to take in as the Chief and Factors there advise it would spoil should it be kept, and if the Commander should want any Surplus Tonnage he may take it in there, which cannot detain him long. Of this resolution AGREED to send away a Toney tomorrow to acquaint them and send their Packet from Bombay.

THE CHIEF acquaints the Board that he had a meeting yesterday with the Young Prince who professes a sincere regard to the Company and offers to let a Party of our Men stay in Billiapatam Fort where he will likewise be in case we chuse it till such time as we have come to a good understanding with his Brother. Chief's Conference with the young Prince.

CHATOTE [sic] NOMBOREE who was with him informs us that the Old Prince had an intention to have come himself but the Moors sent him Five thousand Fanams (Fan^s. 5000) to prevent it; He says that the Prince expects a Present from us to the Amount of Fifty thousand Fanams (Fa^s. 50000) which if we would give he doubts not our being then reconciled. Old Prince expects a Present before coming to a reconciliation.

As we have hitherto known that in case we feed his Avaritious Temper he may for a time be brought to our Measures but will soon again fly from them, WE ARE RESOLVED not to give him anything unless he will cut of or put out the Eyes of some of his evil Councillors who have brought him to act so contrary to his own and the Hon^{ble} Companys Interest. This Chatote Nombooree is to let him know, which if he will do, it will frighten others who are evil inclined from putting any Confidence in him and then It is AGREED to give him to the Amount of Five thousand Rupees (R^s. 5000). Agreed to give him One Conditionally.

TAKING this into Consideration, we find that when the said Spices were agreed for with our late Linguist Domingos Rodrigues, the Essex was daily expected from Mangalore and therefore it was resolved not to receive or weigh them till the Supra Cargoes came themselves; and as upon Examination the Nutmegs prove far from being Merchantable Goods, the board are of Opinion they ought to be refused, which the late Linguist being acquainted with, consents to have them returned back on his hands.

WE having sent down to Mr. West when at Callicut Twenty five thousand Rupees (Rs. 25,000) to purchase Pepper and other Goods for the said Supra Cargoes IT IS AGREED to demand the said sum of them here, or so much of it as hath been laid out on their Account at Callicut; and that Mr. West be directed to go down thither in Order to deliver them such Goods as may have been provided, and make up the Account, with Customs and all other incident Charges; demanding from them what Balance may be due to our Honble Masters, or paying them any Sum, that shall appear due from us, on adjusting accounts.

Mr. West Ordered to Callicut to deliver the Essex's Goods, and adjust Accounts with the Supra Cargoes.

THE CHIEF & Mr. Douglas not having been paid their Passage Money at Bombay desire to receive here the usual Allowance on such occasions; which being two hundred Rupees for a Chief and thirty Rupees for a Factor those Sums are ordered to be paid to them by the Land Paymaster.

CAPTAIN GEO: WESTCOTT JUN^r. THE MUCKAS who escaped in the Massacre at Agar from Ally Rajahs People requesting a gift of about Nine hundred Rupees (R^s. 900) to assist them in providing Netts and Toneyes for carrying on their Fishery as formerly, and as they are a very usefull and necessary sett of People and being likewise convinced that they lost every thing they had by the inhumanity of the Moors: It is AGREED that we represent their sufferings to the Presidency and wait their Orders concerning them.

COMMODORE LOWE having signified to us that he should be glad to have his Detachment of Soldiers which were landed here in November last, or such a part of them as we can spare to strengthen his Ship on going up the Coast, We AGREED, notwithstanding the uncertain state of our Affairs with regard to the Prince, to send on board his Ship for her better security One Lieutenant with a Sergeant, Corporal, and twenty private Men, and that the Presidency be desired to return them back to us by the first convenient opportunity.

THE Europe Iron received by the Northampton being very rusty, Captain Lowe desired our Warehousekeeper might be present to see the Loss, that was like to accrue thereby in the weight, and having weighed two draughts, containing Twenty two Barr^s. poiz Ten hundred weight, two Quarters, Nineteen Pounds 13^q q^r. lb (10 2 19) they were taken out of the Scale, and the rust beat off: And upon re-weighing the same afterwards, they were found to have lost Thirty One Pounds. This he desired we would signify to the Presidency, which we agreed to, as we judged it but a reasonable request.

As we apprehend Ally Rajah is the Chief cause of Prince Cunhi Homo's backwardness in coming to an Accommodation with us, and that his endeavouring by presents, to keep him up strictly to his Alliance against the Company; and being likewise assured that Ally Rajah will not fail to insult us in the rainy season, or perhaps sooner; The Chief proposes writing to the Commodore and Council of Cochin and endeavour to bring them into an Alliance with us against Alley Rajah, or at least to permit of our Attacking him in Cannanore without being molested from their Fortifications whenever his behaviour shall make it absolutely necessary, and our Circumstances admit us to pursue such a Step, And as we have reason to think the Dutch are not inclined to favour him from his ill treatment of them in times past, we are in hopes of succeeding in our application, which will give us an easy entrance into the Moors Territories and enable us in all probability to bring them to reasonable Terms of Peace and prevent in future their insulting us themselves, or encouraging others to do it; which the Board Unanimously Agree to, and direct that a Letter be accordingly prepared.

You have already been acquainted by our late Chief and Council of the demand we have upon Alley Rajah in behalf of our Hoñble Company to whom he is indebted a large sum of Money; and as the heads of the Family promised to discharge the same we were in hopes to have found a performance on their part long ago; but instead of paying their Just Debts, they have treated us with the utmost Indignity by attacking our Forts of Maddacarry, Mattamy, and Durmapatam, burning our Coolery at Agar, and there Robbing, and in an inhuman manner, Killing and wounding a great number of Men Women and Children, who were quite Unarmed and Defenceless: They have likewise robbed and Plundered several of our Munchuas, and continue still to make War against our Hoñble Company.

And as we understand they have several times insulted your Gentlemen at Cannanore, and been so insolent as to attack your Noble Companys Fort there, contrary to reason and Justice and in contempt of all Europeans, we desire to know whether you are willing to Join your Forces with ours in order to obtain satisfaction from our common Enemy Alley Rajah and oblige him to make reparation for all the Injuries he has done to both our Noble Companys.

In case you do not chuse to act in Conjunction with us, we then desire you will give directions, that our Forces be not molested from any of your Forts; but that they be assisted in a friendly manner, by your Gentlemen at Cannanore and this we hope will be deemed consistent with the Amity that subsists between our two Nations in Europe and the good will we have towards each other here in India.

Whenever you shall think proper to come to a determination on this subject we desire you will not fail to send the necessary Orders to your Gentlemen at Cannanore, in so full and particular a manner that no delays or misunderstandings may happen and thereby the Execution of our Laudable purposes be in some degree frustrated and that you would advise us thereof as soon as possible. He likewise advises that the Honble Companys ship Essex sailed from Callicut for Mocha the 5th. Instant and the Phaze Salam and Fort William the 6th. Do. for Surat, and that no English Ships then remained at Callicut. Letter from

It being very late in the Season and no Money yet advanced or price fixed for this Years Pepper Our Buzar Merchants are summoned to attend on Friday the 14th. Instant. The reason for so long a delay was in order to reduce the price as low as possible and no juncture of time could be more proper for that purpose than the present, we having now in Warehouse above two thousand seven hundred Candies of last Years Crop, and by all we can learn the French of Mahie have little or no Money to influence the Market. THE YOUNG Prince who is now in Boyanores Country and intends shortly to sett out for Cherika, having sent to desire a Guard of one hundred Men accompanied with one Ambu Ambi to escort him hither, the Linguist was ordered to send that number of Nairs and Tivees. Young

Two or THREE of the Moor Prisoners brought back from Bombay having symptoms of the Small Pox, we attempted to send them away in Toney and Munchuas to the Southward of Callicut, and there land and sett them free but the Muckas refused to carry them. We therefore to prevent the infection spreading itself in our district, ORDERED some of the Prisoners that were well to carry away the sick ones a great distance from our bounds, and told them they were then at liberty to go where they pleased; and those that still remain here we propose to send away to Penany and other places to the Southward by such Munchuas as may be going from hence, and in such numbers as they can carry with convenience and safety to themselves who belong to the Boats; By this means we hope to clear our hands of them and thereby save the charge of maintaining a parcell of People whose labour is in no wise equivalent to the expence of their Victuals & Cloaths. SINCE the Chiefs arrival here several Letters have passed between him and Prince Cunhi Homo, but he has not yet been able to get him to quit his Alliance with Ally Rajah who is daily spiriting him up to attempt something of Importance against us; and while he can be supplied with large Presents from that Moor, it will be difficult to bring him over to our Interests. However we are not altogether without hopes of effecting it by gradual steps as we hear Ally Rajahs Treasures are near exhausted and of course the Princes Friendship for him greatly cooled. We told them that they were unreasonable in asking so high a price since as we understood the Crop was full equal to last Years and no purchasers now but us, that as to our own parts, we had enough of the former Years Pepper to serve our Occasions without touching upon the new Years Crop, and that we bought only to encourage the Planters and Merchants to continue their Pepper

Industry and give them employ, in Order that they may gain a maintenance for their Families. To this they answered that this years Crop was not above three fourths the Quantity of last years, and that they met with obstructions from the King of Cotiote who took some Pepper from them last Year and had not yet returned all to them; and added further, that unless we would abide by all losses that should happen thro the King of Cotiotes seizures they could not contract with safety at any price, but this being refused, and they seeming very backward in lowering the price to a less Sum than what they first asked, we dismissed them with directions to come again on Monday next, and in the meanwhile to consider better of the Affair.

Badencalameur a Present given him.

BADENCALEMCUR having wrote to the late Linguist to desire a present from us as he was going to celebrate the Anniversary day of his Birth AGREED that we give him the same as last Year, namely three Maunds of sugar and fifteen Bales of Rice, and that we send it in a Munchua to Maddacarra. This present is unavoidable while we have occasion for his Assistance against the Prince and the Moors, but when we are at peace with them, our Alliance with Badencalameur will cease, and of course their can then be no reason for continuing these Annual Gifts.

Achamars of Rhandoterra to demand the Interest due on their Olas.

THE ACHAMARS of Rhandoterra being indebted One Years Interest on their Ola for Twenty thousand Fanams due the 29th. October at 10 ³/₄ Cent, as also one Years Interest on their Ola for Sixty thousand Fanams (Fan^s. 60,000) due the 1st. of March at the same rate; and they not having tendered the Money AGREED that the Chief write them a Letter and demand Payment of the Interest due on their said Olas.

Mr. Samburgh to be maintained in the Hospital.

THERE is one Mr. Samburgh who lately belonged to the Ship Elizabeth, and was put on shore by Captain Watson (the very day he left this place) without a farthing of money to help himself; and being almost starved and a little disordered in his senses AGREED that he be maintained in the Hospital till an opportunity offers of sending him up to Bombay and that we write in the meanwhile to the Presidency to recover the expence of his maintenance from Captⁿ. Watson who shipped the Man as his Officer at Bbay for the Voyage, and ought in equity to sett him down where He first entertained him, unless good reason can be given to the contrary, more especially as he has a Wife and Family there, and was discharged from the Companies Service at Captain Watsons request, and to oblige his Owners.

William Rumbold deeded his effects to be sold & their produce to be paid into the Treasury.

The effects of Mr. William Rumbold who dyed here in August last, lying yet unsold and as they must perish and be rendered of no value if kept any longer, ORDERED that the Secry Mr. John Robinson do make speedy sale thereof and render an Account of their produce to this Board, and when the Amount of the same is collected in, that he pay it into the Companys Treasury, there to lye deposited for the benefit of the Heirs Executors or Administrators of the said Mr. Rumbold.

Letter from Mr. West at Callicut.

RECEIVED a Letter from Mr. West at Callicut of yesterdays date, wherein he tells us that his intent was to have left Callicut that Night but one of the Samorines Ministers came to the Factory and told him that the Samorine would be at Callicut on Sunday next and he being also informed that the Samorine would look upon his going away without seeing him as an affront, He had therefore determined to stay till he heard from us, and added that his paying him a visit would be attended with the like Presents given to the late Samorine when he first came to Callicut after his Coronation, together with two Fuzees, as the Samorines Ministers let him to understand.

He concludes that if we approve of his waiting on him to send an Officer with fifteen or sixteen Men which with the Serjeant and twelve already there will be sufficient, and desire they may be sent so as to be there by Sunday night as on Tuesday the Samorine would expect him.

As the above Letter came to hand while we were sitting in Council, we debated upon it some time, and then AGREED to return the following Answer.

To MR. WILLIAM WEST.

SIR

We have received your Letter of yesterdays date and are sorry to find you did not come away the day before as you write us you intended, since your stay in Callicut is like to be attended with an Extra Expence to our Honble Masters in a present to the Samorine.

We send by the Pattamar Boat an Officer and twelve Men, which with the People you have already there we Judge will be more than enough to attend you on visiting the Samorine should you be necessiated to wait untill he comes to Callicut; but we must tell you, that this Ceremony and all others of the same kind, are studiously to be avoided on every occasion and that nothing must induce you now to pay him this Compliment but an absolute certainty of disgusting him by an Omission of it, or the prospect of thereby gaining an equivolent to the Honble Company in obtaining the whole, or a part of the late Samorines Debt, or renewing his Olay, if need be. These things you must have in view and not put the Company to an Expence when they can gain nothing substantial by it.

Lre to Mr. West at Callicut.

Let the Officer and People now sent down be returned as soon as possible, together with as many of the others at present in Callicut as can be spared. We are

As we were unable last Council day to fix on a Price for the new Pepper, we ordered the Merchants to attend again and they being come according to appointment and told to acquaint us with the lowest Price they would contract for they still insisted upon the same sum as before, and the rather because the price they said was rose in the Country by the demand for it that way, since they were last before us. AGREED therefore that we deferr our Contract with them for sometime longer when they must in all probability come down to a less Price.

ON examining the Pay Masters Account of Disbursements for January we found large Quantity of Wood Oyle, Wax, Rosin and Mallabar Physick bought at very high Prices for the Hospital use and as these things as well as many others usually purchased here by the Doctor may be had much cheaper from Bornbay Callicutt and Bengall, AGREED that in future every thing necessary for the Hospital be timely indented for by the Surgeon to the Pay Master, and that he provide them at the best hand by paying ready Money for such Articles as he may be obliged to buy here and indenting for others to the Board to be by them wrote for to the Presidency and other Places where they can be provided Cheapest.

THE messenger sent with the Chief's Letter to the Achamars of Rhandoterra returned with a verbal answer that they would consult together how to raise the Money due for Interest on their Olas and then let him know when they could discharge or comply with his Demand.

ARRIVED the St. Lewis Captain Jose Gonsalves from Cochin China.

LATE in the Evening yesterday Mr. William West returned from Callicutt and brought us a Letter from the Linguist dated the 16th Instant. He advises that he had bought to the Amount of one thousand twelve Rupees and a half (Rs. 1012½) in divers sorts of Sheathing Plank at twenty two Rupees and a half Per one hundred Covits for our Men of War and that he had not been able yet to get any more. Mr. West (he says) had paid him Rupees four thousand three hundred thirty one,

one Quarter and thirty five Reas (Rs. 4331 ^{q^r. reas} 1 35) of which sum Rupees two thousand three hundred thirty one, one Quarter and thirty five Reas (Rs. 2331. ^{q^r. reas} 1. 35) was the Ballance in his hands due to the Company and the other two thousand Rupees, being his own money, he desires we will repay here to Mr. West and he will Credit the Company's Account for both sums. The Samorine's Customs on the Goods taken by the Supra Cargoes of the Essex (he writes) does amount to Rupees one thousand two hundred sixty nine two Quarters seventy five Reas ^{q^r. reas} (Rs. 1269. 2. 75) which Mr. West will Account for with us.

THE Young Prince came this morning to the Fort and was received with the usual Civilities. After some few compliments had passed, he began to apologize for having promised Mr. Geekie the late Chief more than he was able to perform and said he was greatly ashamed of his past behaviour, but that the Circumstances of things were now somewhat changed and every Mallabar began to see the base designs of the Cannanore Moors who he said were the only Cause of the present disturbances in the Country, then he assured the Chief he would endeavour to bring about a Reconciliation between his Brother and the Company and that if he could not accomplish it by fair and gentle means, he would find a way to remove from his Brother all evil Councillors that should attempt to obstruct so good a work, and as the Execution of his Purposes might possibly draw upon him the Indignation of Prince Cunhi Homo, who with the Moors and Ockoo's Gang joined together would be able to overcome him, and ofcourse overturn all his schemes, he desired to know, whether in case of his being distressed on such an occasion we would support and assist him.

THE Chief was not over Credulous in beleiving that he sincerely intended to perform what he promised now, any more than he had done before yet as no ill consequence can happen from engaging to do what our own Interest requires, he told the Young Prince in General terms, that he might be assured and depend that whenever he was involved in trouble by attempting any thing in favour of the Honble Company we would undoubtedly support him with our whole strength but cautioned him at the same time from doing rash & inconsiderate Actions which might be prejudicial to us both, and serve only to involve us still further in Warr and unless his schemes were so well concerted and like to be so vigorously executed, that there was great probability of success we should not desire him to make any Efforts on our Account. The Chief did not fail likewise to remind him of the many and great services the Honble Company had done to his Family and how ill they have been requited by his Brother Prince Cunhi Homo, that nevertheless if he would come hither and renew the ancient friendship between him and the Honble Company we should endeavour to forget all that was passed and unite ourselves to the Interest of his house by as strong an Attachment as ever before subsisted between us. All which, and more matter of less Importance the Chief desired the Young Prince to communicate to his Brother and then dismissed him with the Customary Present of three Yards of Scarlet Cloth and sixty Fanams.

BADACALAMCUR's Nephew came this Morning to the Fort with a Message from his Uncle to the Chief the substance of which was, that since his Alliance with the Company he had lost part of his Revenues and that Prince Cunhi Homo threatned to take the remainder from him unless he would submit himself to be governed by his direction and that he was in daily expectation of being attacked in his Pallace. But that if the Hoñble Company would support and assist him with the Loan of a sum of Money, and some forces he was in hopes of recovering not only what he had now lost, but also that which does of right belong to him namely half the Revenues of the Prince's Country.

THE Chief told his Nephew in Answer that Badacalamcur had already been supplied with Ammunition and Warlike stores with which he promised the late Chief to perform wonderfull things against the Prince, but that he had done nothing at all, nor could we discover that he ever intended it. As to the little Revenues he had lost since his Alliance with the Hoñble Company, care would be taken to get them restored whenever we made Peace with the Prince but to lend him money, we desired to be excused from it, hinting at the same time what ungratefull returns had been made us by some of the Mallabar Princes for our Civilities of this kind, which we told him he could be no stranger to, And on the whole he was given to understand, that whenever his Uncle should demonstrate to us by his actions a real Inclination and ability to do the Hoñble Company service we then should not fail to consider him in a proper manner; with which answer he pretended to be satisfied and departed; we giving him and his people a present of one hundred and twenty Fanams (Fan^s. 120).

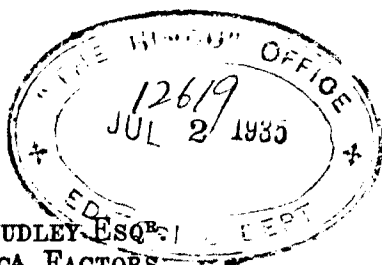

THE second day after my landing at Callicutt, the Supra Cargoes of the Essex began to send off the Goods I had provided on their Account for their Mocha Voyage, and on the 4th. Instant, they received all on board when I delivered them their Account amounting to Rupees twenty four thousand, two hundred thirty Eight one Quarter and forty Reas (R^s. 24238 $\frac{1}{4}$ 40) and received from them Rupees six hundred thirty eight one quarter and forty Reas (R^s. 638 $\frac{1}{4}$ 40) which with the twenty three thousand six hundred they paid into the Treasury here, makes up the sum of their Acco^t. Copy of which I herewith deliver you.

The Samorine's Account Customs on their Goods amounting to R^s. one thousand, two hundred, sixty nine, two quarters and seventy five Reas (R^s. 1269 $\frac{1}{2}$ 75) as well as the Honble Company's Customs of three Rupees $\frac{1}{2}$ Candy on one hundred Candies of Pepper the Commander of the Essex shipt off at Callicutt and Rupees seven hundred sixty one, two quarters and sixty Reas (R^s. 761 $\frac{1}{2}$ 60) the Ballance of twenty five thousand Rupees (R^s. 25,000) sent to me in January last to provide goods for them amounting in all as $\frac{1}{2}$ Account thereof to Rupees two thousand three hundred thirty one one quarter and thirty five reas (R^s. 2331 $\frac{1}{4}$ 35) I have paid to the Linguist Francisco Dias & advanced him more two thousand Rupees on the Honble Company's Account to pay for the sundry Necessaries he is ordered to provide for the Presidency, this Settlement & ca^s. The List of Timber, Masts & ca^s. now in readiness at Callicutt I herewith give you in, that the Masts and Yards may be recommended to the Presidency to be carried away, as they will be damaged by lying there another season.

The Samorine last Sunday Morning came to Callicutt to pay his last visit to the Queen Mother and perform at certain Pagodas appointed Rites and Ceremonies to qualify him for the Government and not having heard any thing farther from his Minister or any other Person belonging to him, concerning my paying a visit

to him and that no mention could be now made of his Debt to the Honble Company according to your Orders I let it alone, though I beleive it would have been well taken, as he shews a greater Regard for the English Company than that of any other European whatever.

RECEIVED from Cannanore by a Toney a Letter from the Commadore & Council of Cochin wrote in the Dutch Language and enclosing a Translation of it in English, being an answer to what we wrote them the 10th Instant concerning Ally Rajah. The said Translation is as follows verbatim.

TELLICHERRY

TO THE HONORBLE SIR GEORGE DUDLEY

COMMENDORE OF THE HONORABLE ENGLISH COMPANY AND THE &C^A. COUNCEL.

HONBLE SIR & SIRs & MUCH ESTEEMED FRIENDS

We had the honour of receiving in opportune time Your favour of the 10th. Courant N.S. whereby we have very unwillingly discovered the Displeasures between you and Ady Ragia [*sic*] and the Injury which that ambitious and base Mahometan according to your writing hath caused to your Noble Company with many other Insults by killing and wounding in an inhuman manner a great number of defenceless Men, Women and Children in such a manner that he not faireth to make a public war against you which doth not answer our wishes, but you shall be pleased to take it not for evil, that we declare as at present not to be empowered to act against him much less to grant your Petition of joining our forces and Men of War to obtain satisfaction from him, because we have related his ill Proceedings to our high Commendore and are still waiting their much esteemed Orders touching this subject and considering that the Dutch Gentlemen never permits any Body to commit Acts of hostility under the forts of an impartiall Sovereign we pray you to excuse us, that we never also shall permitt it as we likewise have sent already Orders to our Gentlemen at Cannanore in order to take care for it, and we cannot conceive what reasons we should have to assent to an Action wholly contrary to all practises and Principles of War and which the English Gentlemen about these Countries of Netherlands Company never have deserved and we take yourselves to witness what adversities we have must suffer in the lately finished war against the King of Travancore and by other severall occasions through your Nation instead of helping and assisting us against such a mahometan king and besides this all. we find ourselves at this time entirely obliged to complain of your little Recognisance which you are showing to us for the favourable succour to the Noble English Company in the year 1736 at Carla but otherwise we mean you should never resolve contrary to all good intentions to allure our Deserters and take them in your service

at this boistrous time whereof we are very well informed and such Proceedings are directly contrary to the Amity that subsists between our two Nations in Europe, and the Good Will we should have towards each other here in India and whereabout one cannot find on our Part the least obstacles therefore we judge also to have sufficient Reasons of protesting against you Honourable Sir and Sirs in the name and on behalf of our Netherlands Granted Oriental Company of the keeping in your service our vagabond People which proveth to our great Prejudice.

THE Ensign at Durmapatam having wrote the Chief that the King of Cotiote had seized a Toney loaded with Pepper belonging to the Company; and bid the people of the Toney go and tell the Chief that Ockoo's Brother took it. This being also confirmed by the Company's Merchant Combem Allipy who is the owner of it and by the people of the Toney; so far as related to the seizure by the King of Cotiotes Officers, and the Chief being at the same time informed, that the Pepper (being about 3½ Candies) was disembarked from the Toney & put into a house above a mile up the River of Durmapatam without any Guard to secure it, Ordered a Detachment of thirty six Seepoys properly officerd to go in four Toney's by night and bring it away. They accordingly went to the Place where the Pepper was, and surprised the people belonging to the House, but a great noise being made, some of our Seepoys were taken with a Pannick and run away to the Toney's without their Officers, which put the rest into confusion and disorder so they all embarked themselves again on board the Toney's and came away leaving the Pepper behind them; but brought hither from the House one Man as a Prisoner, who was immediately released and finding on enquiry that five Seepoys had notoriously misbehaved they were ordered to be publickly whipped for Cowards, and discharged the Company's Service.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Young Prince to the Chief wherein he writes him that he had met with his Highness of Cota Cuna and talked to him concerning the unsettled state of the Country occasioned by the bad advice given to Prince Cunhi Homo to whom likewise he had discoursed very freely on the same subject. The Prince assured him he would come to Tellicherry but his Opinion is that he has at present no such intention and as to the Business in Agitation (which he promised the Chief when at Tellicherry to accomplish) he said every thing that passed concerning it to the 10th. of the month he would advise him, when he hoped he would not be backward to give him what Assistance he should want. He concluded with a Request that the Chief would release and send him the eight Moor Prisoners who were taken at Aycote, as he said they were not People that do any harm.

THE Chief answered the above letter and assured the Young Prince as he had done before in Person, that he might depend upon our Support and Assistance in settling the tranquillity of the Country, and desired him to write of every thing that passed while he was endeavouring to effect it. The 8 Moor Prisoners were sent to him, and he was asked to use his Interest in obtaining the Release of our People who were taken by the Moors at Cannanore.

RECEIVED an Answer from the King of Cotiate. He says it is customary when Pepper is brought from Bemgatto by River to pay the Duties of Cavadda & take a Certificate from the Custom Master of the place inserting the number of Candies exported, which Certificate must be produced and shewn to the Custom Master at Eddacadagatu who on seeing the same, immediately lets it pass, but if there should be more Pepper than what is mentioned in the Certificate the Customs on the overplus is paid at Eddacadagatu. The Toney which the Chief wrote about, he says brought no such Certificate for which reason the Custom Master stopped it. He complains that some people came in Toney's one night, entered into his Country and took away a Muckua who was at the Custom house and says it is a bad action for people to attempt carrying off Pepper without paying the established duties, and it's likewise not right, that his subjects should be seized and carried away for other Mens faults; but that he should however write to his Officers at Parraporatu to know the truth and all Circumstances of the affair and would advise accordingly.

To the preceeding letter the Chief replied immediately, that the Pepper which he had wrote to his Majesty about was not brought from Bemgatto, but from Mamacuna; that in Case it had come from Bemgatto without paying Customs there the People at Parraporatu should only have detained the Toney till the Duties were paid, and then have sent her away with the Pepper. To land it was not consistent with our friendship. He was therefore desired to send the Pepper hither if he intended to live in amity with the Company. That the Muckua had been released so soon as we understood he did not belong to Prince Ockoo, & that we were very willing his Majesty should receive his usual Customs on Pepper and would not suffer our Merchants to defraud him. We then desired him like-
m^ds.

wise to return to our Merchants Ca^s. three and eight Maunds, (Ca^s. 3 8) of Pepper which they were sometime ago bringing by land from Cuddalli to Mamacuna and which was taken from them with fifty Rupees by Quellu Nombier in the name of the Prince of Cherika, but as we now understand the said seizure was made by his order we expected satisfaction and redress from him. That we were very desirous of keeping up a good neighbourly friendship with him and hoped he would give no cause on his part for any Differences or Misunderstandings between him and the Hon^{ble} Company.

RECEIVED an Ola from the Young Prince in which he says nothing shall be wanting on his part to accomplish the affair agreed upon between him and us, and that when he proceeds against those who are evil inclined towards him and the Company he shall expect and depend upon our aid in case of need. As to getting the Release of our Prisoners from the Cannanore Moors, he says we must be very sensible they bear him no good will, nor would they grant him any such

favour, was he to ask it, but he hopes with our Assistance soon to humble them in such a manner as to make them observe what he shall order. He concludes with a promise of writing the Chief every thing that passes for eight days more, and says the 8 Moor Prisoners we sent away at his Request are arrived with him.

RECEIVED a Letter dated the 2^d. Instant from the Callicutt Linguist acquaint- Letter from the Callicutt Linguist.

ing us that he had sent by five Toney's ten Pieces of Timber containing, sixty Co. Bo. seven Candies, eight Covits. and eighteen Bovlls (Ca^s. 67. 8. 18) amounting with Charges to Rupees four hundred twenty five and an half (Rs. 425 2^{qrs}).

WROTE an answer to the Young Prince's Ola received Yesterday and told TUESDAY 8TH. him, that the Officer at Maddacarry having informed us that his Highness had sent to him to know if he had orders to assist him with 50 or 60 Men and proper Ammunition, we had accordingly now sent there Chattil Conna with a body of Answer to the Young Prince's Ola. Men to be ready to support his Highness in settling the Tranquillity of the Country. And as soon as he had accomplished the work agreed upon between us, we desired he would immediately send advice of the same to us that we might give the necessary Orders to our Officer at Maddacarra for assisting him.

WROTE a Letter to Ensign Bilderbeck at Maddacarra and told him, that we had sent 50 Nairs and Calliquiloners headed by Chattil Conna to be ready for supporting the Young Prince, but ordered him not to send them out upon Action untill further Directions from us which we should give according to the Advices he might write us of the Young Prince's behaviour and that if the Young Prince should be forced to retreat to Moddacarry, he must give him protection so far as is consistent with our own safety. Letter to Ensign Bilderbeck.

FIFTY Nairs and Callicaloners embarked this Evening for Moddacarry.

A Dutch Ship passed by bound to Cannanore.

RECEIVED another Ola from the King of Cotiote wherein he says, we write him WEDNESDAY 9TH. that the Pepper was bought at Cuddually. The Place called Cuddually, he says does not belong to Colastree. He has heard that it is his Country. Pepper bought there, continues he, is bro^t. by land to the Buzar of Bemgattu, where it pays the Cavadda Customs, and is then carried away. This is the ancient Practice. When things are An Ola from the King of Cotiote. not in this order and they buy Pepper in my Country and carry it by land to the Colastree Country, it is seizable wherever it is found. If you think it just & will come by night into my Country to take bind, & carry away my Custom Master, I am at present not in a capacity to help it. You write that you thought it was Ockoo's People that took the Pepper, supposing it had been so, you ought not to enter my Country and carry away any people from thence. Every thing the Company does is of course just. In the time of my Brother there were two smiths who served us in Nettur near eight years; they went one day to Durmapatam & have not since been heard of. You have bro^t. things to such a Pass that even my servants cant go to Durmapatam, nor my Custom Master & People be safe on this side the River. I thought the English Company were very just, & therefore I gave them a Place at Durmapatam, which I had no sooner done, than you beat my people who were there and took away their Musquets & Powder after which at the request of the Prince of Cherika and with threats and Deceits I wrote some Olas. These you took from me. In this manner several things have been done to my prejudice, & for want of force I have not taken satisfaction & now I see you would hinder me from taking Customs in my own Country. The Pepper I did seize and when the Merchants make it appear that it was not bought in my Country I will release it without taking any Customs. But suppose the Pepper was not bought in my Country but brought through the River, it ought to pay me Customs. This is the right method, and every thing has passed in this manner.

ANSWERED the Letter or Ola received yesterday from the King of Cotiote, and told him that notwithstanding his unwillingness to release our Pepper, we had nevertheless now sent the Persons who bought it in Company with one Bayporratu Mamaly, to inform him where the same was purchased, as well as all other Circumstances relating thereto, and hoped his Highness would find reason sufficient to return the Pepper to it's proper owner and permit him to bring it hither without any further expostulation. As to his Reflections and Complaints we should at present take no other notice of them than to assure him, that they were Unjust and false in Fact, for that we had always acted towards his Highness and his subjects as good Neighbours & Friends.

RECEIVED a letter from the Callicutt Linguist dated the 11th. Instant acquainting us of his having sent by the Expedition Munchua Sundry Particulars amounting

with charges in the whole to Rupees 759 1 09. As to the things we ordered him to provide in our Letters of the 15th. and 29th. of March, he says, he has sent most of them here, the Remainder he will forward by another opportunity, since the Munchua can't carry them all up at Present. Of the 16th. Timbers mentioned in our List, he has sent only ten, not being able to get more, and instead of 20000 Matts has loaded only 17500 the Munchua being full; the remaining 2500 Mats will be sent by another opportunity. He adds that he could not with all the Dilligence possible get three new Ballances but he sends three of the best he could procure one of which must have an Iron Ring and then it will be good. He desires we will return the Munchua so soon as we can, that he may forward up what remains. His monthly Account of Charges &c^a. for March as likewise his Cash Account for the same month he sends enclosed.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Ensign at Moddacarry dated the 13th. Instant in which as also in one of the 11th. at night he advises that the Young Prince passed by that Place and sent him word that he was then going about the Business he had

promised to perform and desired a Reinforcement of People. But the officer told the Young Prince's Messengers that when he was certainly informed that the said Business was done he should then advise the Chief of it, who would afterwards give the necessary orders concerning the Reinforcement requested And that if his Highness should be in any danger, he might retreat to Moddacarry, where he should find a Protection for his own Person and his People and be met in the way by our Nairs and Seepoys if needfull.

An Ola was likewise brought to the Chief from the Young Prince wherein he says—You may remember what we talked together at Tellicherry. There are two or three People in the Country who have broke off the good Harmony and Correspondence that formerly subsisted between my Brother and the Honble Company the Principal of which was Unichanda Currapee, and him I have chastized. I think of doing the same to the others, for w^{ch}. I believe my Brother will come against me I therefore desire you'll send with Expedition Chitteil Conna with one Hundred Musqueteers to be with me and in Case of Need I hope the English Company will protect me with their Men and Money, and in like manner when any thing happens to the Company, or they are disturbed in their Trade I will not only assist them with my People but with my Person likewise in the way they shall desire. The Reason of this affair not being done sooner, was because the Persons I intended to punish had got Notice of my design, which prevented the People, whom I assigned for that Business from executing my Orders so I finished the work myself. I rely entirely upon the English Company and hope you'll keep me in Remembrance. When I went from Moddacarry to the Pagoda, I carried fifteen Men with me. Once more I desire you'll send Chitteil Conna and his People with all Expedition.

RECEIVED two Letters dated yesterday morning and last night from Ensign Bilderbeck at Moddacarry advising that the Young Prince went to Chericuna about 12 o'Clock at night and locked himself in the Pagoda unknown to any one. At two o'Clock the next day he sent a Putterah to him with advice that Palnunche Currupee was cutt off and desired to have Chatteil Conna and his People sent immediately. Answer was given that his Highness was in no danger, and that if our People should go now, it would alarm the whole country and put all the Inhabitants into a Fright. About an hour afterwards another Messenger came to Moddacarry with the same Request and he had the same Answer as before given him. A little before six at night the Young Prince came himself accompanied with 7 Men only, and desired a few Men to guard his Person for that he was going to the Pagoda & had not eat any victuals for 24 Hours. He said he was assured the Cannanore Moors would be sent for by his Brother, and that the Rebel Prince Ockoo was his Enemy and would soon appear. He added that he had made away with a Rogue who was a great Enemy to the Honble Company, and that there were two or three more to be served in like manner. His Highness left Moddacarry at $\frac{1}{4}$ past 8 and the Ensign let him have 15 Nairs for his Guard, and supplied him with ten Bales of Rice. The truth of all this story, the Ensign says, he has confirmed from Cherecuna. In the last of these two Letters rec^d. from Ensign Bilderbeck he writes that Prince Cunhi Homo sent an Ola to Cannanore and desired Assistance from Alley Rajah of one Hundred Men but none being sent, he wrote again and told him if the People he desired did not come soon, he would himself fetch them. The old Prince sent likewise to Ockoo's Brother, Coral Nombier, and Calla Nombier (who have always been Enemies to the Honble Company) to come to his Assistance and is in great wrath with the Young Prince his Brother, on whom he vows Revenge. The King of Colastree is also very much disgusted because Currupee was taken out of his hand in the Pagoda, and carried out by the Young Prince to be assassinated contrary to his commands, and in contempt and defiance of his Authority, but a submission from the Young Prince (who fell down to his feet and asked his Pardon) has made him easy for the Present. The Honble Company the Ensign says, is not mentioned by any one to have a hand in this work, but all is ascribed to the Young Prince's hatred to Currupee, who never was in his favour.

THE Chief lays before the Board the above Letters from Ensign Bilderbeck at Moddacarry also Translate of the foregoing Ola from the Young Prince, which are Read, and the Purport thereof taken into Consideration.

DEBATING thereon it is observed that no method appears so proper to us as this taken by the Young Prince for restoring Peace and Tranquility to the Country, all other means having proved ineffectual. Courting the Old Prince Cunhi Homo served only to make him increase in his Demand of a large Present, and had the same been given him, we very much doubt whether it would have kept him in our Interest for any considerable space of time. We therefore lay upon the defensive till we saw what Turn Affairs might take in the Country, giving out privately that we intended to keep to our Forts and not concern ourselves with the Country Powers, for that we plainly saw and were convinced by Manifest experience, that neither the Young Prince, Badencalamcur, the King of Cotiote or any other pretended Friend or Ally to the Hon^{ble} Company were to be trusted, That they had all forfeited their word and broke their Promises, and seemed only busied how to draw Money from us for services which they never intended to perform. And as the Young Prince has now made a Beginning in the manner that we approve, and which seems to bid fair for ending the War in a short Time, It is Unanimously AGREED that we assist the Young Prince with one Hundred Muskiteers as he desires, and that we give him such further Aid hereafter as the nature of affairs may require, and we are the rather induced to do this, because we are very well convinced that unless we show the Country People our approbation of the Young Prince's measures, they will not leave the Old Prince to join the Young one; nor will this latter undertake a Reformation of Affairs without a Junction of our Forces wth. his own, which give him great Credit; neither does he himself think his Person secure unless he has a Body Guard of our people. And as we did not join him before he cut off the old Prince's Minister Unichanda Currupee, who was Governour of Cherriuna, all the Odium of that Bloody Deed (if there be any) must fall upon the Young Prince solely and not at all on the Hon^{ble} Company who are entirely clear, by our denying the Prince the use of their Men untill his Purposes were executed by his own People. Indeed we do not hear the least Reflection either on the Hon^{ble} Company or the Young Prince on this Account, but all the Country seem highly pleased at it, and the Moors immediately followed his example by destroying in the same manner two of Ally Rajah's Ministers.

I received Your letter, and Ambu Ambi has acquainted me with every thing you ordered him to tell me, which pleased me much, and the Doubts that were in my mind are now cleared up.

As I have a good inclination towards the English Company, I shall proceed, and do every thing in the manner we agreed upon.

Camalla who was at Madday, got notice how I had chastized one Person, and immediately went to Talliparambu where he still continues. Patally keeps close to his Highness my Brother who is disgusted at me, and I have heard that he threatens to come soon against me. All the People of Chericuna are now here to meet me.

The Family of Badacalamcur misbehaves to those who are in our Interest, and in my Pay and committs Hostilities in their varges and Plantations, for which Reason I propose going to the Northward, and shall take Chitteil Conna and his People with me. I therefore desire you will send them Orders accordingly.

That neither myself, my Country, or the Hoñble Company's Trade may fall into discredit or disregard I hope you will assist me in the same manner you supported my Ancestors.

The Moors of Cannanote are constantly going to & from the Pallace. This is all the News at Present such as I may hereafter learn you shall be advised of. I shall depend on your assistance in all my undertakings. Ambu Ambi must always be with me.

THE Chief wrote an Answer to the above Ola from the Young Prince as follows.

I have received your Highness's Ola and observe that you have not yet completed your Designs of chastizing those wicked People who brought the Calamities of War into their Country by their evil advice and bad Actions, and as it is for the good of the Publick I hope you'll let their Punishment be uppermost in your thoughts & not attend to any other Business till that is effected. King Badencalamcur is in Friendship with the Hoñble Company, I cannot therefore send our People to do him any harm, but if your Highness approves of it, I will take upon me the Trouble to mediate between him and you, and in case he should be unwilling to hearken to reasonable Terms, I shall then consider what further steps to take. Your Highness may depend on the Hoñble Company's Assistance, against all those who shall obstruct, or endeavour to prevent the intended Revolution. Ambu Ambi may for the Present remain with Your Highness.

RECEIVED another Ola from the Young Prince of which the following is Translate.

Chaddea Mupa with the Buzar Moors assembled together in the City and killed Acay and Eddata Tupi upon which I sent one Ussen Chitty there, who brought me answer from Chaddia Mupa that the same Reasons which had induced me to kill Unnichanda Curfupee had likewise wrought on him to kill those two Persons, for which Ally Rajah was very angry. He begs of me not to quit him. This is the Notice I have received.

To the above Ola the Chief returned this answer and sent it away immediately.

I have received Your Highness's Letter giving me notice of what has happened at Cannanore which I had heard before from other hands. Chaddea Mupa with the other Buzar Moors did well in taking so good a Resolution, and putting the same in Execution; and if Ally Rajah should want to do them Harm I hope Your Highness will assist them, as it may contribute to settle the Country in Peace and quiet.

THE Chief received three letters from Ensign Christopher Bilderbeck at Moddacarry the Material Parts of which are as follows.

In the first he says, Chitteil Conna with the People under his command are now here, but I beleive the Young Prince won't let him stay long as he designs to go forward with the Business. The Nairs come all flocking after him, and he has now almost 400 of his own Men, which he will send out on service and keep Conna & his People to defend and Guard his Person. The old Prince is left alone at Cherica, and cannot raise Men to serve him they all run after the Young Prince. He sent to the Cannanore Moors and Nombiers for People, and not getting any from them, he has applied to the King of Cotiote. The Young Prince keeps a good Discipline amongst his Men. Eight Nairs were punished Yesterday for robbing the Country People of their Fowls Plantins and Coconuts, w^{ch}. is a custom that the old Prince's Men practised wⁿ. he went abroad but the Young Prince will not suffer it.

In the second letter he writes that after he had sent away his first letter he got information that the Moors of Cannanore had cutt to Pieces one of Alley Rajahs Ministers, named Attara Tupi, and that they would have served Acay Muppo in the same manner, but he made his Escape to Alley Rajah. Two hundred Moors have surrounded the House and will oblige Alley Rajah to deliver up Acay, and afterwards to make Peace with the Honble Company. This Notice was sent him by the Tangallas Brother from Billiapatam.

And in the last letter he informs the Chief that the Moors had killed Acay Canicapole who had fled to Alley Rajah for protection, and that if he had not delivered him up they would have burned the House and destroyed Alley Rajah and every body in it. The Nairs & Callicaloners sent from hence were all safe arrived and Conna had now one hundred Men of ours under him ready to join the Prince in Case he insisted upon having them.

They are navigated with Dutch People and carry a Dutch Pass but are suspected either to belong to the French, or else to have Frenchman's goods on Board at Freight.

THE St. Lewis Captain [Joze] Gonsalves weighed from this Road, and came afterwards to Anchor about Four leagues to the Northward, to wait there for Sandall Wood, which is expected in Boats from Mangeseer. St. Luis sailed.

OUR Barge, Munchua and Toneys returned from Moddacarry, and brings notice that the Young Prince with his own and our People are coming to Tellicherry by Land. Barge & co. returned empty.

THE Young Prince came to the Fort and in discourse with the Chief confirmed the Accounts we had received of every thing that passed in respect to himself and the Moors of Cannanore, He seemed to apprehend no great difficulty now in settling the Country and preserving Peace and Tranquility; as his Brother's People had all left him, and were come over to the Young Prince; but discovered an earnest desire to attack Badencalamcur, who he said was an Enemy to his House, and demanded half the Revenues of his Country. We told him that Badencalamcur was at Present in Alliance with the Company, and that we were in Justice and Honour bound, not to quit him, unless he insisted upon Unreasonable Terms. That half the Revenues of the Country he must not expect, but we hoped his Highness would not only restore all that had been taken from him since his Alliance with us, but also the Revenues of some Pagodas taken by Prince Cunhi Homo within these three or four years last past, which Proposal the Young Prince seemed to disrelish, and soon after took his leave promising to pay us another visit in a day or two. He was saluted with Nine Guns at coming and going, but the usual Present deferred till he comes again. TUESDAY 22^d.
Young Prince came to the Fort.

SAILED from Mahie the Portuguese Ship which came from Madrass and Pondicherry. She is said to belong to Macão and that she is carrying thither for the China Market 600 Candies of Pepper and 5 Candies of the first sort of Cardamums, which were loaded on board her at Mahie. Macão Ship sailed from Mahie.

THE ship St. Luis which sailed the 21st. Instant imported last night, and sailed again this day for Macão. THURSDAY 24th.
St. Luis imported and sailed again.

THE Young Prince came again to the Fort and finding that we still pleaded in favour of Badencalamcur, and would not let our People join with his, to go against him; he seemed to lay aside the thoughts of it, and then asked our assistance against the Rebel Prince Ockoo, and the Cannanore Moors both of whom being at War with us we very readily promised him, and glad we were that he asked us, as otherwise we should have been obliged to solicit for his Countenance & aid in case a Peace is not soon made with the Moors. He also desired pressingly that one Hundred of our Nairs & Callicaloners might always accompany him while the Troubles continued, which when we had promised him he appeared mighty well satisfied. And after mutual Professions of Friendship had passed between him and us, he took his leave presenting the Chief with two small Gold Bangles for the Wrist and we gave him & his Rajadore the usual sum of sixty six Fanams. The Customary Compliment of Salutes being likewise paid to him. FRIDAY 25th.

RECEIVED a letter from the President and Council of Fort St. George dated the 3^d. Instant acknowledging the Receipt of ours dated the 31st. of December and 16th. February in which they were advised of the Capture of our Honble Masters ship Princess Augusta. They write us that they had got notice from the S^o.ward of a ship said to be come from France being arrived at Caracal that she had landed three Chests of Treasure, an Officer and 40 men, and then went to Tranquebar; They were also further informed that she has since run ashore, and that the Cap^t. of one of our Men of War had taken Possession of her. They add, that the Hardwick and Northampton sailed from Wamps the 24th. of December, as they had heard by a Macao ship which arrived at their Port the 29th. of last month.

Instant as entered under these dates; and considering the Prospect there is that the Affairs of the Country may be settled in Peace and Tranquillity if the Young Prince and Badencalamcur can be brought to agree; and considering likewise the obligation we are under to get for Badencalamcur as good Terms as we can, he having refused to join with the old Prince against the Company though strongly solicited by Cunhi Homo, it is AGREED that the Chief do undertake to mediate between them, and that he endeavour at least to get every thing restored to King Badencalamcur which belonged to his House at the commencement of this War, and which Prince Cunhi Homo has since taken from him; and that in order thereto a letter be immediately wrote to Badencalamcur desiring him to send hither a Person properly instructed and acquainted with all his Affairs, that we may endeavour to accommodate the Differences subsisting between him and the Young Prince.

THE Chief wrote the following letter to King Badencalamcur agreeable to the Order of Council.

THE Young Prince of Cherica being now here considering how to regulate the disorders of the Country, and put the same under good Government, I did not fail talking to him about Your Majesty's Affairs And as I am very desirous of doing you all the service in my Power, I should be glad you would send hither with all Expedition Rami Cutti acquainting him with every Circumstance relating to your Majesty's Interest, and Expectations, from the present Prospect of Peace between the House of Cherica and the Honble Company. Letter to Badencalamcur.

No answer having been returned in writing from the Achamars of Rhando-terra to the Chiefs letter of the 14th. of March demanding the interest due on their Olas, we ordered our Linguist to write to them about it, and he has received an Ola from them to the Purport following. Ola from y^e. Achamars of Rhando-terra to the Linguist.

We received your Ola desiring our Answer to the letter the Chief wrote us. Our not replying to it was owing to disturbances in the Government of Challa, and to the Separation of some of our Body, which impeded our meeting together; but now all impediments are removed and we have fixed a day for our Meeting, namely the 5th. of May. So soon as we break up and our Business is over, four of us will come, and represent our Necessities, as there is no body besides the English Company there we can apply to. Our Debt we will satisfy in such a manner as shall be agreeable to the Chief. You must understand that Ponartachen acts entirely contrary to our opinions and Interest which you will be pleased to consider. As we are many & must all be together before we do any thing material. our Business is thereby often retarded and subject to great delays; the Chief must not therefore be displeased with us.

THE Young Prince went in the Barge designed for Chericuna and to land at Moddacarry, but the strong northerly winds obliged him to put back, and go on shore at Cannanore & thence by land to Pollicuna, where he proposes to wait for our Nairs and Seepoys to join him, who are kept back untill Badencalamcur's Messenger arrives, when they will be sent to him. SUNDAY 27 Young Prince goes in the Barge and puts ashore at Cannanore.

HAVING had a hint from our Linguist at Callicutt that this was a proper time to make a demand upon the new Samorine, for the Debt due from his Ancestors to the Honble Company, as also upon the Puniture Rajah for his Debt, the Chief wrote to them the following letters.

TO THE SAMORINE.

I have been a long time waiting in hopes that Your Majesty would discharge the debt due to the Honble Company from your Ancestors agreeable to their many Promises. And as the time of Payment has been long since elapsed, I must desire Your Majesty to comply with their obligations given in several Olas without any further delay. This will be a means of preserving the good Harmony that now subsists between Your Majesty & the Honble Company. Letter to y^e. Samorine o^f. Callicutt.

Your Majesty the last Year was to have sent your Ministers to Callicutt for adjusting your Acco^t. with the Hoñble Company, and agree upon some Method to discharge your Debt. This you did not do, and since you have putt off Payment with frivolous excuses for many Years past, I am now to acquaint you that the Hoñble Company can wait no longer, and that I do expect Your Majesty will satisfy the whole Debt without any further delay.

Copies of our said letters to the Samorine and Puniture Rajah we also enclose for your Notice and Direction.

We are in want of a Flag Staff for Moylan Fort of 14 Covits long, and 8½ Inches Diameter Mallabar measure. If any of the sparrs you have already provided will do, let us have it, otherwise buy one, and send it up as soon as Possible.

As this is the last Trip the Munchua will make to Callicutt this season you are to hire other Munchuas to bring up such things as may remain at Callicutt after she is loaded, of those ordered to be provided for the Use of this Factory.

Your letter of the 23^d. with the things sent us by the Expedition Munchua we have received.

To the Preceding Ola this Answer was returned by the Chief.

We here are likewise in want of them to deliver out to our own people, as the Troubles in this Country still continue, Prince Cunhi Homo and the Moors being at War with the Hoñble Company. I will write to Bombay the necessity Your Majesty is in for such things, and when an Answer comes you shall be advised of the same.

I wrote your Majesty the 27th. Instant desiring you would pay your Debt to the Hoñble Company which I hope you will satisfy without delay agreeable to the Royal Writings.

RECEIVED likewise a letter from the Young Prince advising the bad weather he met with in the Barge which had obliged him to land at Cannanore under the Dutch Fort instead of going ashore at Agar as he intended. He concludes his Ola with a Desire that we will send Chitteil Conna, and his People to him with all Expedition at Pollecuna To which, Answer was made, that if Badencalamcurs Rajadore did not arrive here to day Chitteil Conna and his People would to morrow, be sent to Moddacarry, and afterwards Ambu Amby should accompany the said Rajadore to the Prince. He was also congratulated on his safe Arrival at Pollecuna.

RAMACUTTI Rajadore to Badencalamcur arrived this day, and brought an Ola from his Master to the Chief, Translate whereof is as follows.

I received your Letter by which I perceive you have talked with the Young Prince of Cherica concerning my Affairs. Ola from Badencalamcur.

The way to settle Matters for the Benefit of the Country and for my safety and Convenience, I need not tell you; as you well know how they ought to be settled. I desire nothing more than that things should be put on the same footing they were faced in the time of my Ancestors which you are acquainted with. Every thing else Rami Cutti will inform you.

WROTE a letter (to go by a Munchua) to the Chief & Factors of Anjengo, advising that we had returned their Detachment of Soldiers, and were in hopes we should have no further occasion for them, as there was a fair Prospect of the Country being settled in Peace. We desired they would send back the Munchua as soon as possible it being late in the season and told them that their factory would be debted for Diet Money advanced to the Soldiers who came up in their Pinget Letter to the Chief and Factors at Anjengo.

WROTE also a Letter (to go by the Prince Edward) to the President and Council of Bengall desiring them to send for the use of this Factory, one thousand Gunny Bags, and a Jar of Wood Oyle; and sent them a Muster Bag of the size we wanted which will contain six maunds of Pepper, being the sort proper for our Warehouse use. That he had communicated all he had to relate concerning his Majesty's Affairs to the said Rama Cutti who would inform him thereof, and promised further that he would use his best endeavours with the Young Prince to get what his Majesty required and seemed to expect, but that he was afraid the Young Prince would never be brought to conclude matters on such Terms.

Badencalamcurs Rajadore has been here, and by what I can learn he will be content if your Highness will only yield to him the Rents of the Pagodas and Verges, which properly appertain to his Pallace. If this is a reasonable request, and Your Highness can relinquish them, I shall be well pleased, as I am very desirous there should be a friendship between you and King Badencalamcur.

I now send Chitteil Conna with one hundred of our people, and have directed him to assist Your Highness in settling the Tranquillity of the Country, and if you are inclinable afterwards to go against the Moors or the Rebel Prince Ockoo, they are to accompany you but as we are in Amity with Badencalamcur, I cannot let them act against him.

WROTE at the same time a Letter to the Ensign at Moddaccarry acquainting him that we had sent Chitteil Conna with one hundred Nairs and Callicaloners to the Assistance of the Young Prince. That he was not to suffer them to go against Badencalamcur, but if the Young Prince should be inclinable to attack the Moors, or the Rebel Prince Ockoo, he must permit them to join him. He might likewise let them go against the old Princes adherents. Letter to the Ensign at Moddaccarry.

SENT Amboo Amby to endeavour to accommodate matters between the Young Prince and Badencalamcur, and gave him Instructions to the following Purport.

You are to accompany Rama Cutty, and go with him to his Master Badencalamcur to know his final Resolution, and the lowest Terms he will accept in order for concluding a Peace, after which repair to the young Prince, & use all the Arguments you are master of, to induce him to agree and yield to Badencalamcur's Terms. And if you can't obtain every thing that Badencalamcur insists upon, know from the Young Prince the whole of what he will give up to him. Thence you are to go to Badencalamcur again and acquaint him with every particular that passes between you and the Young Prince. And so continue going from one to the other endeavouring to adjust their Differences, till you can, if possible bring them to an Agreement; And in the end if you cannot accommodate their Affairs to the satisfaction of both Parties, advise the Young Prince not to molest Badencalamcur's Pallace where his Women and Children are, and do you afterwards return back hither.

WROTE by Amboo Amby to the Young Prince and told him that the said Amboo Amby was sent in order to adjust all Differences between his Highness and King Badencalamcur, and at the same time signified to him that an accommodation would be very agreeable to us, as we judged it would tend to the General good of the Country.

WROTE a letter to our Linguist Francisco Dias at Callicutt in substance as follows.

You are to send up on the Expedition Munchua the 12 Soldiers that are in the factory keeping the Serjeant only and for the Guard of the Factory you may hire as many of the Country soldiers as are necessary and no more. These we understand do always serve for Wages only, whereas our Tellicherry Soldiers when at Callicutt are allowed both Wages and Provisions which is a double Expence to the Company and therefore we have thought fit to recall them. We judge six People may be a sufficient number, and we would have them all Nairs as being least chargeable to the Honble Company.

Since I saw you, notice has been bro^t. to me that his Highness (meaning the old Prince) has had a Conference with Cuddually Nambier about some Affairs; and he sent Patally along with Cuddually Nambier to Cuddually where they communed with Quellu Nambier and sent him to Prince Oma who I am advised intends to come with some People to the Fort of Billiapatam, I believe this News true, and therefore, hope on the Receipt of my Letter you will send with all Expedition fifty of your people to remain in Billiapatam Fort & so soon as I return from the Northward I will send back your Men. You shall also be advised of all Occurrences.

THE Second Letter runs as follows being an Answer to the Chief's Letter of the 30th. of April.

You write I observe, that my, Uncle Badencalamcur will be only satisfied with half the Podogas and Verges. At first there were two Places namely Odeamaogatom and Palley. The former had the Revenues of both. Afterwards, to wit, in the time of my Great Uncle, by force of Arms he took part of the Revenues, upon which Odeamaogatom joined with the Kenarees, and conquered the Country to the River Cherricui The Palace of Palley then fled the Country and settled at Torriamgattu, when Odeamaogatom promised to pay the Kenarees Tribute. Things were in this state sometime till with the help and assistance of the English Company we drove the Kenarees away and got the Revenues of the Country thô at a very large expence, Odeamaogatom Palace can therefore claim nothing, nevertheless I will agreeable to my Promise at Tellicherry give him what belongs to his Family,

which he may enjoy & possess quietly as I will not disturb him, but if he should not be contended with this Allotment and does any hurt in the Country or to any one under me, I will humble him in such manner as that he shall never more be able to do any Mischief, and I hope you will give your Assistance in my Undertakings.

RECEIVED a Letter from Naramgaporratu Comapa Nair as follows.

In times past when the Company built a Banksall at Tellicherry they were in friendship with my ancestors, & the Company then settled certain Customs with them. Since which the Company have done my Family many services, and in return I have served them all in my Power relinquishing the friendship of others to oblige them; for the truth of which I desire you'll make enquiry and peruse the writings of former times. I have never offended the Company or you either in Word or Deed.

Because the ancient Form of Affairs were changed I left Tellicherry and came here to Boyanore, a Person in Friendship with the Company, And now my Ancestor is Dead, I want to come to his House and perform certain Rites and Ceremonies, which I ought to do either in ten days, or in forty days, or else in a Year after his Death and if I omit performing the said Ceremonies it will be a great disgrace to me. I therefore desire you'll permit me to come to Tellicherry for that Purpose.

ANSWERED the two Letters received Yesterday from the Young Prince as follows. MONDAY
THE 5TH.

Your Highness asks for 50 Men more which you want to put into Billiapatam Fort, but as I had Notice a few hours after the Receipt of the Letter or Ola, that you had been to the Palace of Cherica, and there confabulated with your Brother, I judge you have now made up Affairs with him and can have no occasion for more people. The Men you have already of ours are intended only for the Guard of your Person, and not to be kept in Forts.

Badencalamcur only wants the Revenues of the Pagodas and Verges that appertain to his Family and Pallace and not half the Revenues of the Country as he formerly enjoyed. I should be well pleased if matters could be amicably made up between him and you, on this footing.

THE following Answer was sent by the Chief to Nargaporto Compa Nair's Letter received yesterday.

In looking over the Registers of this Place I find when Mr. Law was Chief, you never supplied him with the Men you were engaged to furnish for the Honble Companys Service. In the next Ola I observe that you sowed dissention amongst the Nairs of our District, and endeavoured to make them revolt from us, and being unable to accomplish your wicked designs, you then robbed the Tivees Pagoda, as also the House of Meluttee Cora, from whence you took some money and fled to Choudar, where in Conjunction with the King of Cotiote, the French and others you endeavoured to raise disturbances & make War against the Honble Company; in which you was likewise disappointed. When Mr. Wake was Chief he permitted you to return hither, imagining that you had seen your former Errors and would amend them; but instead of reforming and living quietly, you began afresh and endeavoured to persuade your late Brother who is now deceased to commit the same disorders y^t. you had been guilty of yourself and bring the Nairs to revolt against the Honble Company. Lastly in the time of Mr. Geekie's Chiefship, you again fled to Choudar and from thence to Cartanerra, and we being last year at Variance with the Prince Cunhi Homo, you embraced that opportunity of prejudicing us all in your Power. For these reasons I cannot permit of your coming to Tellicherry.

Letter from the Ensign at Moddacarry. RECEIVED a Letter from Ensign Bilderbeck at Moddacarry. He says that the Young Prince had borrowed ten Bales more of Rice which he promised to return to him again in the same specie. He also writes that the Young Prince sent to him a Moorman, and desired his Permission for him to build a small house under the protection of our Fort, as the Man had Enemies who wanted to destroy him. The Ensign adds, that this Moorman is the Person that by the Young Prince's order killed the old Prince's Minister, Palnunche Currupee at Cherricuna, and therefore desires to know whether he shall give him Protection.

WEDNESDAY 7TH. ANSWERED Ensign Bilderbeck's Letter and permitted him to give the Moorman protection and to let him build a small hutt near Moddacarry Fort for the present, though at the same time we signified our dislike to the Prince's sending him into our district. As to the Rice lent the Young Prince we bid him endeavour to get back the like quantity otherwise to let him have no more without Orders from hence.

Letter from the Young prince. AN Ola was this day received from the Young Prince of which the following is Translate.

I received your Letter wherein you write me that as I have had a meeting with my Brother, there is therefore, you suppose, no occasion for sending me more Men. I went to see my Brother for no other reason than because he was very sick, and for me to be so near him as Cherricuna without visiting of him when he was so bad, would have disgusted the People much, and given them an ill opinion of me; Queequerddata Nombier with several others persuaded me from going to the Northward immediately, so I went first to see his Highness; but he asked me no questions concerning my March, all our Discourse was about his ill state of Health.

When you have this truth related by other hands, you'll then have no scruples remaining concerning my Proceedings. I must inform you that it is a thing impossible for us to be so soon reconciled more especially while he keeps with him such a number of evil Counsellors.

While I on my part give no occasion for differences between me and the Company I hope they will assist me in all my undertakings. You need be under no apprehensions or uneasiness about the 50 Men I desired to Garrison Billiapatam Fort, I therefore hope you'll send them.

The Revenues of the Pagodas and Verges are trifles for us to keep, but as I am not certain how long we have been possessed of them, I cannot make any Promise upon that head. As to what belongs to Badencalamcurs Family, I can restore it to him and let him quietly enjoy the same, in case he does not molest my People who cultivate the Verges. This is what I have told Ambie Amby whom I have sent to him; and if he will accept of these terms, I will not go against him. On the contrary if he should be still discontented and act against me, there's no remedy. It is ten or twelve Years that he has been possessed of nothing more than what belonged to his Family w^{ch}. I am ready to resign purely on acco^t. of what you said to me at Tellicherry, and that is all I ever intended to give him.

THE Chief answered the above Ola from the Young Prince in substance thus THURSDAY
8TH.

Your Highness says it is ten or twelve Years since Badencalamcur has been possessed of nothing more than what belongs to his Family, but I am credibly informed he has enjoyed the benefit of some other Lands, and as you say the Revenues of the Pagodas and Verges are but trifles I therefore hope you will for the sake of Peace, & in regard to my intercession, give them up to him. Letter to y^e.

The fifty men you desire to garrison Billiapatam Fort shall be sent with all Expedition, but I request they may be returned hither again so soon as you come from the northward. In the mean time if the Moors should attempt any thing against our people at Moddacarry, the Ensign of that Place will have orders to recall them to his Assistance.

WROTE Ensign Bilderbeck at Moddacarry that we had sent 30 Seepoys and two Officers, and that he was, to that number to add, 18 or 20 more, making up a body of fifty Men and these he was to send to the Young Prince, who desired them for securing Billiapatam Fort, but in case the Moors should prove troublesome his way he is then to recall our people from Billiapatam to his aid giving notice of his intention to the Young Prince before he withdraws them. THE Monsoon began to sett in pretty violent with high winds from the S.W. to West and hard Rain.

RECEIVED an Ola or Letter from Badencalamcur w^{ch}. being translated is as follows. SATURDAY
10TH.

I received your Letter and Rama Cutty has told me every thing you said to him. Afterwards came Ambu Amby whom you sent to talk with the Young Prince about my Affairs. He has told me for a certainty that the Young Prince will not give me up every thing that belongs to my Family, so I sent to my Heirs and after consulting together, they agreed with me that the Young Princes offers were much less than we could accept. Letter or Ola

calamcur.

Our Dependence is on the English Company to procure us our rights, and in them we place all our trust and Confidence. I desire you will now consider of our safety and advise me what we are to expect. Ambu Amby has taken a great deal of pains and trouble in the affair.

To the foregoing Ola the following Answer was immediately returned by the Chief.

I received your Royal Letter by which I perceive the Young Prince will not yeild to you what properly belongs to your family. I have taken much pains to bring him to give up all you can in reason desire, and will still do you all the

service in my Power agreeable to what I promised Ramma Cutty. But you must not expect that I will endeavour by force of Arms to oblige him to give up what your Majesty wants, yet if the Young Prince should offer to attack you, I promise not to permit our people to join him in any such enterprize, but to withdraw them from him and this is the most I can do in your behalf.

THE following is Translate of a Letter received from Nargaporratu Comapa Nair.

I observe you say I was guilty of many faults in Mr. Law's time, but I assure you neither myself or any of my Family have ever done any thing against the Company, or their Chiefs. I am a person who always had a regard for the Company's Interest, and therefore did not go to Mahie to persuade the French Chief to make War against Tellicherry nor did I ever write to one side or other about it. I never was guilty of any bad actions but possibly my Mallabar Enemies have told you so; w^{ch}. was the occasion of your writing to me in that manner. I hope you will not entertain so ill an opinion of me. It appears to you that when the Prince of Cherica was at Variance with the Company, I intermeddled and promoted it. Ask the old and Young Prince if I ever did any such thing and they will inform you of the truth.

I desire you will keep me in remembrance & give me Protection as in times past against all my Enemies.

THE following Answer was returned to the above Ola by the Chief.

The answer I first gave was founded on matters of fact, and is very sufficient. You are a Person ill disposed towards the Company, and therefore I cannot permit of your coming hither.

RECEIVED an Ola or Letter from the Young Prince thus translated.

You say you have certain Notice that Badencalamcur has lately enjoyed other things beside w^t. belongs to his Family, and seem to expect I should relinquish them to him. At your intercession I shall give them up, notwithstanding it is a long time that we have been in possession of them. But as you are inclined to favour Badencalamcur, I am to acquaint you that my disposition towards him is the same as yours; and thus we cultivate our friendship.

When he knows I have yeilded these things up to him at your Instance, he will still want more, which I cannot give; and considering his behaviour he deserves nothing; for since I saw you he has done many unreasonable things of which the poor people have made loud Complaints, nor do I indeed think myself safe at the very time you was negotiating his Affairs he conducted himself in this manner, which has no good appearance. However if you are inclinable he should continue to act so unjustifiably I shall be satisfied.

You have done me a great favour in sending the fifty Men for Billiapatam Fort, and so soon as I return to Cherica they shall be sent back to you. In case the Moors should in the meantime commit any disorders at Moddaccarry, I will that Instant chastize them all.

Let nothing break off the good harmony and Correspondence that is between us. I have placed all my dependance on the English Company and hope they will not forget me but lend me all reasonable Assistance.

Answer to
the foregoing
Ola.

THE Chief in answer to the foregoing Ola wrote the Young Prince that he perceived the good inclinations he had to restore peace in the Country, by yeilding to Badencalamcur the things he asked, and as the same would be of general benefit to the people, it cou'd not but please him and every one else. He expressed his dislike to Badencalamcurs committing hostilities and promised to write him a Letter signifying that he must not do so in future.

WEDNES-
DAY 14TH.

WROTE this Letter to Badencalamcur.

I hear from the Young Prince and others that at the very time I am endeavouring to accommodate your Affairs You permit your people to commit hostilities against the Young Prince which gives him room to make great Complaint and

cannot turn to your advantage. Nor can I mediate between you two, with any prospect of success unless there is a Cessation of Arms and that both parties cease to offend each other in every respect whatever. If hereafter you continue any manner of hostilities I shall immediately give up my Office of Mediator and leave you to accommodate matters yourself the best you are able.

RECEIVED two Letters from Francisco Dias at Callicutt dated the 8th. and 14th. Instant to the following purport. SATURDAY
17TH.

In that of the 8th. (which was designed by the Expedition Munchua) he says, he received our Letters of the 27th. April and 1st. Instant with the Letters we enclosed to him for the King Samorine, and Puniture Rajah, the latter he sent to him by two Nairs Jungadas with a Letter from himself and that for the Samorine he delivered the 4th. Instant with his own hands, and gave the Chief's service to him and after reading it the Samorine told him he would consider and give an answer in Eight days, He intends on Saturday to go again to the Pallace, when he shall meet (he says) with his Ministers, and then he will do all in his Power to get the Chief an Answer. The Governour of Callicutt is expected there soon. Letter from
the Callicutt
Linguist.

The Flag Staff for Moylan Fort he sends in the Expedition Munchua, and its Cost is Six Rupees (Rs. 6) he also sends in the same Munchua Eight Soldiers the other four being sick are detained there. Six Nairs he says are not enough to do the business that is wanted, but if there were twenty in the factory they would not be so much respected as six Soldiers and desires to know if we will permit of his keeping at least that number to look after the Factory at the Wages of five Rupees each man ^{per} month, which is the same Pay the French give to 12 Callicutt soldiers they keep in their factory and conformable to our Answer he will act. He has likewise laden on the said Munchua the Stores that remained there, and says the reason of their being kept so long was owing to the bad Weather, attended with much rain and a large Sea, in w^{ch}. he thought the Munchua would have been infallibly lost. The particulars of the Stores are as follows:—

97 Somerheads.

3 Jarrs containing 72 bottles of Spirits of Wine.

1 Flag Staff 14½ Covits long and 8¾ In^s. Diameter.

300 Bales of Chunam.

15,000 Sticks of Firewood.

The Monthly Cash Acco^t. for April he sends enclosed.

In his Letter of the 14th. Instant he advises that on the 9th. there was a storm of wind and the Sea ran so high that it was impossible to launch a Toney. The Moors Munchuas that were with the Expedition run ashore at Pudiapi and the Sea broke one of them to pieces; upon which Advice he immediately sent out People and as they had not time to take out all the Wood from our Munchua some went into the Sea, but the greatest part was sailed. The chunam was likewise saved but some water got amongst it. Afterwards with much trouble he got the Munchua ashore and found her tackling all broke, and her Hull greatly damaged. The Soldiers (the Linguist says) are returned again to Callicutt and are all in the factory. One of them who was sick is dead; his name is Ventura de Mello; the other three are now well. He desires we will let him know whether he may send the Soldiers that were in the Munchua as well as those that are in Factory by land, for he dont know whether they can pass Mahie. He also asks if he may hire and send up a small Munchua in case the Sea should abate, which being a risque in the rainy season, he can't do without special orders. The Letter he wrote by the Expedition he sends now enclosed. He did not he says go to the Pallace last Saturday because the Governour of Callicutt was not arrived, the Second Minister called Teneuchery Eledu said he would be at Callicutt that day, so that he should go to the Pallace the day following. The Monsoon (continues y^e. Linguist) set in with great violence, and still holds severe, the two dutch Ships from Bengall, which touched here in their way to the southward were three days agoe both in sight off Cuffay, which is to the northward of Penaney and I have notice (says he) that Letter from
the Callicutt
Linguist.

for these last two days, only one of them has been seen, where the other is no one knows. An Oddey (which is a small Vessel) belonging to the Maldiva King, which was there the 10th. being unable to keep the Sea or ride at Anchor endeavoured to haul ashore and was bulged. The King Samorine had (he says) four Dutch Men in his service who deserted from Cochin a few months agoe, and as they declare the King has now discharged them, they came to him and desired to be entertained in the Honble Company's Service, but as he was not sure the Samorine had discharged them and because they had brought with them from Cochin a Slave Girl, who has stole by the advice of these fugitives some Joys and money from her Master a Dutchman, and also because he had not orders from us to entertain Renegadoes, he told them he would write hither and give them an Answer conformable to the orders he received. He therefore now desires directions about this particular. The said Renegadoes request an advance of 20 or 25 Rupees to discharge some debts they have contracted at Callicutt, as likewise something more to bear their Expences from thence to Tellicherry. The Linguist further requests our orders how he shall in future behave to Europeans or Topasses that run from Cochin as well as such that may come with Liberty from thence and desire to go to Telly. for service; because he says they come needy and want provisions for their journey up which he has frequently given them. This Letter he sends by the people of the Munchua overland, who also carry the number of Somerheads mentioned in his last and the 3 Jarrs of Spirits of Wine. Two Nairs Jungadas likewise accompany them.

RECEIVED a Letter or Ola from the Young Prince advising that as his Highness Prince Cunhi Homo grew worse in his health, he himself had returned from the Northward and arrived at Cherica the 17th. at Night when he saw the old Prince, who received him very affectionately and told him to write immediately to the Chief desiring him to come to Cherica which he accordingly requests and tells the Chief that as the weather will not permit of his coming by Sea, he will send a Pallankeen for him. He adds that every thing else will be told the Chief verbally by Chitteil Conna who now returns to Tellicherry with our Nairs and Seepoys.

Letter from

RECEIVED the same day an Ola or Letter from Badencalamour to the Chief. He promises that after he has talked to those he ought to consult he will let the Chief know what passes between him and them. Do not (says he) imagine I have acted against the House of Palley in the manner you write, I have only put a stop to some things. The family of Cherica have made me fair promises but I would not hearken to them on your account And in the conclusion he says he has related every thing else to Ambu Amby who is the Bearer of the Letter and who will inform the Chief thereof.

THIS Evening Chitteil Conna with all the Honble Company's Nairs and Seepoys who were sent to the Young Prince's Assistance (being 150 in number) returned from the Northward to Tellicherry.

Letter to our
Linguist at
Callicutt.

WROTE to our Linguist Francisco Dias at Callicut in Answer to his Letters of the 8th. and 14th. Instant. We acknowledge the receipt of those letters and the papers that accompanied them, as also of the Spirits of Wine and all the Somerheads except 15, which the Muckuas say were lost in the bad weather out of the Munchua. He is directed to take great Care of the other things till the month of August and then to send them up by the Expedition Munchua when the weather is fair. The Soldiers that were in the Munchua, as likewise those which were in the factory, he is ordered to send up overland, giving them a Certificate declaring that they belong to Tellicherry, in order for their passing at Mahie undisturbed. And in case the Dutch Men are willing to come hither he is to send them in Company with our own people giving them money to bear their expences in the way up but nothing to pay their debts. Their Arms (if they have any) and the Slave Girl are to be left behind to avoid disputes with the Dutch of Cochin. We permit him to entertain Six Callicut Soldiers in lieu of those called away from the factory because they will serve for Wages only; whereas our Tellicherry people when at Callicutt, have both wages and provisions allowed them in consideration of their being absent from their families. And we ordered him to discharge the 4 watching

Nairs, 10 Nairs Jungadas, and all other unnecessary people who were in the Company's Pay; or at least as many of them as could possibly be spared; hinting at the same time our displeasure that he had not answered particularly to our former Letter on this Subject nor discharged the people agreeable to our directions. We tell him to advise us when he gets an Answer from the Samorine & Puniture Rajahs and order that the Plank he is providing for Madrass be paid for out of the Companys money and if he is bare of Cash to draw upon us. He is likewise directed to send up a Price Current of Good[s] and Rates of Coins at Callicut, and to mention particularly in his letter the present price of Venetians. We observe to him that the Timber he has already provided for Madrass is very dear, and that we are told there is a larger quantity lately come to Callicutt than has been known for many Years past, which we supposed would greatly reduce the Price of that Commodity.

WROTE to the Young Prince in answer to his Letter rec^d. yesterday. The Chief expresses a concern for his Brothers great indisposition, and sorrow that he cannot go to see him being so much out of order himself that he has not been able to stir out of his Chamber, or even to open a window, these five days because of the damp air w^{ch}, very much affects him. Had he been in good health he would have waited upon his Highness with much pleasure.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Samorine (in answer to w^t. the Chief wrote him concerning his debt) Translate whereof is as follows.

It was agreed to pay the Company annually fifty thousand Fanams (Fan^s. 50000) including Principal and Interest, and eight acknowledgements were given for the same. Part of the first years sum has been paid and the remainder of it will be soon discharged. The reason of its not being all made good was owing to some unavoidable Expences. The Mainsure sent a Body of Horse and Foot towards Palacattacherry and ravaged my Country committing great disorders; upon which I sent my Officers and people to drive them away. This necessary Expedition was attended with a large expence and prevented the payment of the Sum due but the obligations shall be discharged agreeable to the writings given to the Company, and in the beginning of September means shall be taken towards it.

Before I go to Penany I desire you'll come to Callicut as I have several Affairs to talk to you about. You will act in such a manner on your part so as to give no room for any difference between me and the Company.

THE foregoing Letter from the Samorine came forwarded from our Linguist at Callicutt with one from himself wherein he advises us that he had seen the Samorine and all his Ministers twice at the Pallace and talked to them about the Payment they ought to have made of their debt to the Hon^{ble} Company on the terms agreed when the writings were passed. To which they answered him word for word the same as the Samorine has wrote to the Chief in his prementioned Letter or Ola. The Linguist adds that he does not know the business the Samorine has with the Chief but he has heard it is to desire the favour of his Assistance in chastizing the rebellious Moors of his Kingdom and to give him credit in the Eyes of his Enemies. He will also after a visit from the Chief expect the same from other nations that trade in his Country.

ANSWERED the Samorines Letter received yesterday. The Chief told him he was glad to observe his Majesty's intentions of paying his debt agreeable to the Royal writings in September; and he hoped no longer delay would be made that the ancient friendship between him and the Hon^{ble} Company might be preserved and kept up to its full extent. The Chief excused himself from waiting on his Majesty on acco^t. of the badness of the Weather and his indisposition; but promised him that so soon as the Monsoon was over to send Mr. William West to Callicut with whom his Majesty might confer about his Affairs. This Letter was enclosed to Franscisco Dias our Linguist to be delivered by him.

THIS morning the people belonging to the Munchua w^{ch}. carried down the Anjengo Detachment to that Settlement returned from thence overland, leaving their boat behind hauled up on Shore, not being able to bring her hither for the severity of the Monsoon, which set in so violently that she was obliged to put back to Anjengo after she had been dispatched from thence and attempted for three days to come up to the Northward. The Muckua's or Boatmen, on their arrival here, delivered to us a Letter dated the 3^d. Instant from the Chief and Factors wherein they advise of their detachment being safe landed that day and of their dispatching back our Munchua. They also express a satisfaction at the fair prospect we have of bringing our troubles to a speedy conclusion and tell us

they shall credit our factory three Rupees and sixteen Reas (Rup^s. 3— 16) for the like Sum paid the Command of Soldiers belonging to their Pinget and debt us for the Charges on our Munchua which amount as by their ^{reas} account enclosed to Rup^s. thirty four two quarters and seventy five reas (R^s. 34 2 75). ^{qr. reas}

AN Ola or Letter from the Young Prince to the Chief, was this day received, wherein he says that notwithstanding what the Chief wrote to his Uncle Badencalamcur, yet he still molests the poor Country people as much as ever. It is, says the Young Prince, a long time agoe that the Estate of my uncle Badencalamcur has been taken from him and as you desired me to relinquish a trifling part, I complied out of the regard I bear to your intercession. But he continues unsatisfied and wants to tax the Country & take the same Revenues as we do, otherwise he would not proceed in the absolute manner he does at present. You should talk to him about it, and if you cannot prevail on him to be quiet, I must then take measures myself to remedy the mischief he occasions, in which I hope for your good will and Assistance.

THE Chief answered the above Ola and told the Young Prince that he had already wrote to Badencalamcur not to order or suffer his people to commit any disorders or depredations in the Country and that he was concerned to find so little regard or notice taken of his several letters by Baddencalamcur. The Chief adds y^e. since he finds his mediation slighted and that he is not like to establish a good Harmony and friendship between them he should now leave his Highness to act as he thought fit, and no longer concern himself about their differences: but at the same time hinted to him that he would do well to content Badencalamcur, if his expectations were not very unreasonable.

Linguist.

THIS morning we received a Letter from Francisco Dias the Linguist at Calliutt dated the 25th. Instant wherein he acknowledges the receipt of ours dated the 19th. and 22^d. Currant. The 15 Somerheads which came out short of our number he believes were lost in the hard winds. He says the Munchua is much damaged, and so soon as She is repaired and the Weather proves fair he shall send up in her the rest of the Stores. On receipt of our Letter he took off the Allowance formerly given to the four watching Nairs w^{ch}. was one fanam to three of them when they did duty at Night. This, he says was an ancient Custom that has always been observed till now, as well in the French Factory as ours and by every body else who keep Nair Jungadas. In our factory (continues he) they watch only as there is occasion, but in the French factory the Nairs have constantly watched for many years, and been paid for it as extra duty. And without this encouragement he should not be able to get them for any service in the morning, as they never come from their Houses which are at a great distance till noon day. There is not says he, so great a Security in keeping these Nairs Jungadas as formerly, because the Moors now pay them very little respect to what they did in old times, yet as they are the Heads of a people who rule the Country; have certain Priviledges and are put in by the King for the Guard of the Factory, and protection to the Hon^{ble} Company's Servants, we should not be able he says without them to do any thing in the Country, nor could we stir safely out of the Factory. These Nairs, adds he being Heads of the Callicut people resemble the Parliament and do not obey.

the Kings dictates in all things but chastize his Ministers when they do unwarrantable Acts, and with this power in their hands it will be improper to discharge them. He therefore desires we will consider of it, and says he shall be determined by our second order. We tell him he says, that he takes no notice of the number of people he has dismissed by virtue of our orders, I do not, says he, know who you would have discharged; the only persons now in pay are ten Nairs Jungadas, three Tivees to clean the Factory, a Moorman at the Flag Staff, and another at the Banksaul, these are all necessary people. He writes that he has entertained six Callicut Soldiers at 5 Rupees $\frac{2}{3}$ month, who are to do duty the 1st. of June. That he sent us the Samorine's Answer but had yet received none from the King Puniture, who was not at Cottapaddy, being gone to Atrichur to meet the King of Cochin, he had however sent four Nairs Jungadas after him. That he had advanced three thousand Rupees (Rupees 3000) on account of the Plank the Chief ordered him to provide for Madrass, and as he is in want of money he desires we will send him down four thousand Rupees (Rupees 4000) and that we will pay to the Chief the amo^t. of a Bill of Exchange then drawn in his favour for Rupees one thousand three hundred and seventeen (Rup^s. 1317) being for the like sum received in Callicut and by him placed to the Hon^{ble} Companys Credit. He says there was but a small quantity of Timber and Plank came to Callicut the last fair season which made it dear; that he was unable to get the whole quantity we ordered him to provide for Tellicherry, & that there is still a scarcity as none comes from the inland Country. The Dutch carried away a great deal to the amount of above ten thousand Rupees (Rup^s. 10,000) which they bought of Diogo de Silva and Monsieur Florin at $9\frac{4}{5}$ Rup^s. $\frac{2}{3}$ 100 dutch Feet in length, 12 Inches broad and one Inch thick which comes out at 30 Rupees per 100 Mallabar Covits long, 12 Boorees broad and one Boree thick. The Portuguese likewise exported a considerable quantity, and the King Samorine is repairing a Pagoda but for want of Timber cant finish it. The Price at present is $5\frac{1}{2}$ Rupees per Candy, but if picked 6 Rupees. The Plank he bought for Madrass at 21 Rupees per 100 Covits, he says was cheap as the greatest part of it is of the dimensions mentioned in the List. The Merchants, he assures us will lose by it. Ordinary Plank was sold last season inland he says without picking or any Charges at $22\frac{1}{2}$ Rupees and at 25 Rupees when embarked, or delivered on board Ship. Enclosed he transmits to us a Price Current of Goods and Rates of Coins according to their present worth, Venetians he says are now at R^s.

437 $\frac{1}{2}$ per 100 Venetians full weight, and if a very small quantity, 500 Rupees, but R^s.

a large quantity will lower them to 434; and the Shroffs inform him that if the boats and vessels from the Northward should bring any the ensuing season, the Price will be still less. He sends up with this Letter 14 Soldiers, 1 Gunner and 1 Corporal in all 16 People, agreeable to the accompanying List. In this number is one of the four Dutch Men he before wrote about, who carries his wife with him; and as she is a free woman and a native of Tellicherry he permitted of her going with him. The other three remain at Callicutt because they would not go without their Wives. Four sick Topasses are left behind, & to accompany the Soldiers he sends 2 Nairs Jungadas. He has given he says, the Corporal a Certificate to produce at Mahie in case of need.

OUR Accomptant lays before us a List of the Debts due from the Pepper Merchants he having adjusted all their Accounts to the 31st. of December last, when some of their Olaes or notes of hand, were taken for the Ballance of Pepper owing by them. The said List or Account explains when and how the Debts arose and in what manner and how long a time they are obligated to discharge them. At the foot of it is prefixed a Translate of one of their Olaes or notes of hand whereby it appear[s] that the Merchants do not look upon themselves answerable for the Pepper that was seized by the King of Cotiote in Pyachy the beginning of October 1744 and have not therefore promised to pay the same, but mention it in their said Olaes or notes of hand as remaining in Pyachy. The whole quantity so seized by the King of Cotiote is twenty three Candies Sixteen Maunds twenty eight Pounds and an half which belonged to different Merchants as the said List entered after this Consultation will show.

DEBATING on this Affair it is observed that by continuing these Debts under the several Heads they now stand upon our Books it is not clearly seen at one view what Progress the Merchants make annually in discharging them and that by blending their old & new accounts together it becomes troublesome to seperate one from the other when we come to adjust, AGREED therefore that all the Debts due from our Pepper and Cardamom Merchants the 31st. of last December as particularized in the prementioned List be transferred from their several Names to one Head entituled, Pepper & Cardamom Merchants, and that we do in this Entry or Transferr, explain very fully and clearly the Nature of their said Debts, by inserting when and how they arose, and whether any and what Obligation has been given to discharge the same. It is also observed that if we do not convince our Merchants that they are accountable to the Hoñble Company for the full sum of money advanced to them or for it's value in Pepper according to their Contracts; great Evils may ensue and numberless Disputes happen, for should any of them be knaveishly inclined they will have too much room to practice underhand with the King of Cotiote or any other of the Mallabar Princes to cheat and defraud our H^o.Masters. To prevent therefore these and such like mischiefs it is unanimously AGREED that we always insist on the Merchants being obliged to stand all risks in respect to Seizures and every other imposition, or accident which may happen to them by means of the Country Governm^t. or otherwise and that when we make up this Years Acco^t. with them (which we propose to do in the month of Dec^r. or January next) and take their acknowledgements for what Ballance may then appear due to the Hoñble Company we do endeavour to bring them to give a written obligation for the Pepper seized at Pyachy and to insert therein a fixed time for Payment of the same.

But the Head of Charges occasioned by Ally Rajah is lessen'd Rs. ^{qr. reas.} 429 1 34 having no occasion to keep so many People to the Northward as formerly.

WROTE a Letter to the Callicut Linguist Francisco Dias. We own the receipt of his dated the 25th. ultimo and direct him immediately to discharge the Six Soldiers lately taken into the Company's Pay as it is not customary to keep any but when there are Wars and Tumults in the Country. We order him also to dismiss the three Tivees, and the Moorman at the Flag Staff, and to entertain only two Persons to clean the Factory, and hoist the Colours, that Number being judged sufficient for the Purpose. He is likewise advised, that we have been told Six Nairs Jungadas are enough for the Factory business, and that if our Information be true he is instantly to turn away the other Four, without further Orders, otherwise to oblige them to watch at the Factory. And he is told to inform us, like a good and frugal Servant if he knows where else the Honble Company's Expences will allow of a Reduction. What the French do, must be no Rule for us. They are fond of making an ostentatious Figure which our Masters Affairs do not require, their Credit being too firmly established to need a show of Soldiers and Nairs Jun-

ABOUT noon we discovered a large Ship coming from the Northward, sent off a Toney Boat with a letter to the Commander in the usual form, to know who she was. WEDNESDAY 11TH.
A Ship seen.

OUR Toney returned about midnight, or rather at near one O'clock this morning, with a written Answer from the Captain of the Ship who says his name is Des Jardins and the Ship is called the Leiucaise; that she belongs to the French and is come from Mocha, But on examining our Mucquas or Boatmen, they say she appears to them like a French Europe Ship; has about 500 Europeans on board and 30 Coffrees and that she mounts 30 Guns between Decks and 20 Brass Swivels on the Gun hill, over which she has a netting being only about two feet deep in the Waiste. THURSDAY 12.
Proves a French Ship.

THE chief dispatched a pattamar express to Madrass with a private Letter to Governour Morse, advising him of the arrival of the French Ship above-mentioned, and therein relating her Force and all other necessary particulars. Letter to Fort St. George.

THE French Ship continued in or near the same Place as when we first saw her till about two o'clock this afternoon, when she hauled close upon a wind with her Starboard Tack on board, and stood away to the south-westward, and before night she was out of sight. All the while she lay off, she kept under sail standing in and out, betwixt Cannanore and Durmapatam at the distance of about four leagues from the nearest Shore. We judge the wind and weather which was very squally and wet; and the Sea which was very rough, hindered her coming into Mahie Road, or anchoring where she lay, least the Severity of the Monsoon should drive her upon the land or prevent her from weathering the point to the Southward of Mahie, several Toney's passed and repassed between her and the Shore; but six which were sent from Mahie loaded with 120 Robins of Rice, were obliged to return back, not being able to fetch the Ship. It is also said they have left behind one of their Officers who was going off, but could not reach a board. We suppose her bound to the Cormondell Coast. No Treasure or Goods were landed from her. FRIDAY 13TH.

RECEIVED a Letter from Francisco Dias our Linguist at Callicut advising the receipt of ours to him dated the 1st. Instant and that he had discharged the six Callicut Soldiers, Two Tivees, and a Moorman agreeable to our Orders As concerning the ten Nairs Jungadas, he says, the times are now different to what they were formerly; the Moors are rose to a great pitch of strength, which occasions continual insurrections and disturbances in the Country, whereby it appears to him that the keeping Six Nairs is not sufficient, besides the King will be displeased at our turning them away, as they were put into the Factory by him; nor will they go to serve elsewhere. He acknowledges the receipt of the parcel we sent him containing 519 Gold Venetians in Tale, which were delivered to him by the two Nairs Jungadas, and which weighed $2\frac{1}{2}$ Venetians less than the full Mallabar weight making only nett 516 $\frac{1}{2}$ Venetians. These he sold at 440 Rupees ₹ 100 Venetians amounting to Rupees two thousand two hundred and seventy two Rupees, two quarters and forty reas (Rs. 2272. 2. 40) for which sum he Credits us. He is not able at present to dispose of more at that Price; but he thinks a small quantity may yeild about 437. None of the Merchants at Callicut wanting money at Tellicherry, was the reason that he could not get Bills of Exchange. He desires we will send him two thousand Rupees (Rupees 2000) more which will be sufficient and promises to send up the Soldiers so soon as they are well and able to walk. THE Chief acquaints the board that he has had several hints and intimations from the Young Prince that he expects we should wait upon him with our Compliments of Condolance on the loss of his Brother Prince Cunhi Homo. He presses strongly for the Chief to go himself, which he says will give his Brother the Prince of Cotacuna and all his Family great Credit in the Eyes of the Country People and convince the several Princes and Nobles who may be there likewise of the Hon^{ble} Companys Attachment to their House, notwithstanding the late differences between his deceased Brother and us, and show them how inclinable we were to bury all past Transactions in utter Oblivion. It will also he says discomfort his Enemies. But the Chief being sickly desired to be excused taking such a Journey. The Ceremony is to be performed at Cherrica to morrow the same being fixed to the twelfth day after the Princes Death, when all the great Men, Braminees & Nairs of the Country round for many Miles, and to the Number of five or six thousand repair to the Pallace and the poorer sort receive from the new Princes own Hand a Present of two, three or more Fanams each Person. The French paid thier Compliments of Condolance very lately to the new King of Cotiote, and as we judge an omission in us to gratify the Young Prince on this occasion may disgust him It is Unanimously AGREED, that we send M^r. Alexander Douglas, attended by a Guard of thirty Soldiers, with an Ensign, two Serjeants, two Corporals and a Drummer, as also one hundred Nairs and Seepoys, and that he carry a Present to the value of about one hundred Rupees consisting of a Piece of China Silk, and the remainder in Silver Fanams, which he is hereby directed to present in the Hon^{ble} Company's Name to the Prince of Cotacuna, and make him the usual Compliments of Condolance, and for this Purpose he is to set out for Cherrica immediately after Dinner; and its recommended to him to return back as soon as ever he can get a dismissal from the Prince.

WROTE to our Linguist at Callicut in answer to his letter of the 10th. Instant. We acknowledge the receipt of his Factory and Cash Accounts for last Month, and permit him to keep the ten Nairs Jungadas for the reasons he gives but order that some of them guard and watch at the Factory in the Night. We tell him that he will be debted for the Produce of the 519 Venetians sold on account of the Hon^{ble} Company Rupees two thousand two hundred seventy two, two Quarters and forty

reas (Rupees 2272. 2. 40) agreeable to his letter. And we observe to him that he always writes in Gen^l. Terms, by which means we are often at a loss in many things and know not well how to Act or what orders to give. He is therefore directed in future to be more particular in his Explanations and not advise us that a small

quantity of Venetians will sell at a certain Price without mentioning at the same time what Number he esteems a small quantity, which we tell him may be done in a very few words and his letters be thereby rendered more intelligible. He also desires we will send him two thousand Rupees (Rs. 2000) but never tells us when he shall be in want of it, which we likewise remark to him; and that he has now a considerable Ballance in his hands. We further note to him, that we cannot yet for sometime risk any money down in Toney's because of the Monsoon.

THE Chief being informed that the Young Prince and Badencalamcur were both inclined to renew the negotiations for settling a Peace between them through his mediation; wrote the following letter to Badencalamcur and sent it to him by Amboo Ambey. FRIDAY
20TH.

As the differences and disputes between the Princes of Cherrica and Your Majesty, remain yet undecided, I once more send Amboo Ambey to see if they can by any means be accommodated, and in Case he should now be unable to adjust them I shall then determine to give myself no further trouble but leave you and the Princes of Cherrica to settle your affairs between yourselves as you may best agree. THIS afternoon received a Packet by Pattamar from Madrass with a Letter from the President and Council of Fort St. George dated the 29th. of last month and enclosing a letter from the President and Council of Bombay. They also at the same time inform us that the said letter was brought thither by the Winchester Man of War, which left Bombay the 7th. of May, and arrived there the day preceding the date of their advices. The Princess Mary was likewise arrived from Batavia; she parted Company with the Northampton and Hardwick the 2^d. February off Java Head And the London imported there the 14th. of May from St. Hellena & the Cape to both which Places she had been to refit after the Loss of her Masts. She left the Cape the 2^d. February. By a Dutch Ship that came from Holland the beginning of Nov^r. they hear that all our Hon^{ble} Masters Ships, which had left the Cape and St. Hellena were safe arrived in Europe. That the Onslow bound for Benjar and China had passed the Cape in January; and that the Dolphin and Benjamin were there homeward bound waiting for Orders. The Augusta (whose Commander Cap^t. Townshend is Dead) was to proceed from Batavia to China the beginning of May; and the Porto Bello had left Benjar a full Ship for Europe. About the middle of April a second French Ship anchored in the Road of Caracal; she was set on Fire immediately on sight of our Men of War; her Name is not certainly known, some say it was the Fame and others the Dilligence from Bengall. The Ship destroyed in Tranquebar Road by the French Captain's beginning to fire first on our Men of War proved to be the Pondicherry from the Islands but last of all from Colatchy; whence she sailed early in March. Commodore Barnet died at Fort St. Davids the 29th. of April. SATURDAY

THE letter from the President and Council of Bombay received Yesterday by way of Madrass as beforementioned is dated the 6th. of last month, and owns the Receipt of our Advices of the 2^d. of March by Ship Walpole which did not reach them till the 19th. April. Those by the Pattamar Boat, and Ship William of the 12th. and 18th. they had likewise received. They should be glad they say to hear we had been able to accommodate matters with the Prince, but the method proposed by the late Chief of giving him 5000 Rupees to cut off his evil Counsellors carries in it something too sanguine for them to approve, indeed if he could be induced by any reasonable means to remove from his Council those ill advisers, that are incessantly fomenting him against the Hon^{ble} Company; they assure themselves all such will be made use of by us. We are permitted to give the Mucquas nine Hundred Rupees (Rs. 900 —) in consideration of their Losses at Agar, and to enable them in some Degree to buy Boats and Netts for carrying on the Fishery. The Walpole they dispatch directly to China, being too late to touch here with Safety. Her Cotton lodged here in Feb^ry we are ordered to sell if we can get an advantageous Price for it. The Dungaree they say will turn out right when we measure every Piece and allow the Surat Guz 27 Inches. They enclose an Indent

for Masts and Spans and order it to be complied with. And further advise us that the Supra-Cargoes of the Essex complain of our obliging them to take 200 Candies of Pepper bot. at Callicut at an higher Rate than what the Company's cost at Tellicherry, and tell us their intent always was that the Pepper should have been given out of the Company's own Stock, nor does their letter of the 25th. of Decem^r. (say they) order it to be purchased at Callicut but that all the Articles for the Essex should be provided at the Cheapest rates. They add that we have been absolutely forbid buying Pepper at Callicut on our Honble Masters Account.

TO THE W^o. GEORGE DUDLEY ESQ^R.CHIEF & C^A. FACTORS AT TELLICHERRY.

SIR & SIRs

IN Obedience to your orders I set out on Sunday the 15th. in the afternoon for Cherrika where I arrived the next day at 10 o'clock in the morning. On the Road I received a message from the Young Prince to desire I would march slow as he was then in his Pagoda performing certain Rites and Ceremonies, I returned him for Answer that his Request should be complied with, but notwithstanding the slowness of our March, yet I arrived before they were over, and went directly within the Pallace Walls and so soon as the Military entered the Prince's people saluted us with Guns. I proceeded on to the door of his Apartments where he immediately came to receive me, when they once more saluted. The Young Prince told me that he was then performing certain Ceremonies which till over he could not possibly conferr with me, but that he had ordered me an Apartment in his Pallace where he desired I would stay, so I took my leave and was conducted by his Rajadores to the Place allotted for me. This piece of Ceremony of coming to the door of his Apartments to meet me while at his devotions, I was informed was an extraordinary Compliment, and contrary to all their Rules and Practices and against the advice of his Braminees who were in the Pagoda with him, and which he did to show his good will towards the Hoñble Company. At five in the afternoon I received a Message from the Young Prince that he was ready to give me an Audience when I immediately went to him and was met by his elder Brother the Prince of Cotacuna and himself between the apartm^t. where I was and their own apartments, and they both conducted me to their House or Pallace, I told them I was sent by the Chief of Tellicherry to condole them on the Loss of their deceased Brother Prince Cunhi Homo and desired their acceptance of the Present I carried in the name of the Hoñble Company, the Prince of Cotacuna told me that he and his Brother the Young Prince were now left in the Government of the Country and they hoped while the Hoñble Company had a Settlement and Fort in Tellicherry there would be a strict Union between his Family and them, and as their Brother was now dead they hoped every thing would be buried with him, and what had passed lately never more be thought of; I answered the Prince of Cotacuna that the Hoñble Company still preserved a regard for their Family notwithstanding the Ingratitude of Prince Cunhi Homo and that he might depend upon the same friendship from them as heretofore, to which he replied, the Friendship that was formerly between them was not enough, but that he hoped now to see a more lasting and firm one established between the Hoñble Company and his Family than ever and that nothing on his part should be wanting to compleat it, After which he told me that since the Death of his Brother, Baddencalamcur had committed several Hostilities contrary to all reason, and as their Family had been at a very large Expence in driving the Canarees out of the Country, to which Baddencalamcur noways contributed, that therefore it was very unreasonable for him to think of having more now than what he then had, and that if the said Baddencalamcur went on in this manner and would not hearken to reason they in that case hoped to be countenanced by the Hoñble Company; I told the Prince of Cotacuna that he must be sensible the Chief of Tellicherry had lately taken a great deal of trouble and Pains to bring his Family and Baddencalamcur's to terms of Agreement as an union between them, must certainly be for the General Good and Tranquility of the Country. To which he replied he was sensible of the trouble the Chief had taken, and if such a thing could be brought about, it would be very agreeable to him, but if Baddencalamcur was deaf to all reason they hoped in that case to be assisted by the Hoñble Company, and this I was desired to represent to the Chief and that they hoped he would consider the same, and advise them in what manner they should act, The Young Prince told me at taking

leave that after they had received an Answer from the Chief, he would come to Tellicherry.

RAMMA CUTTI came from Baddencalamcur and brought a letter for the Chief wherein he says that when he returned Amboo Amby to him, he was then to consult with some people about his affairs, and advise him of the result; but he being obliged to go into mourning it was delayed. When the late Linguist was at Cherriica to pay his Compliment of Condolance, he wrote to him to send somebody in order to talk about his Affairs. What passed there the Linguist, he says will inform the Chief, and what is to come he leaves to the Company hoping they will consider what may be necessary for his Safety and Interest; and whatever it is, he shall be content to accept. He hopes to have an opportunity of seeing the Chief, and now sends Ramma Cutty & Chamgara Narranna Pattaree to negotiate his Affairs at Tellicherry.

A Letter from the Second King of Cotiate (who in the life time of the late first King, was only third King) was also this day received in which he tells the Chief, that the King his Uncle died the 29th. of May, and that he advertised the old Linguist of it and desired him to inform the Chief thereof. The 28th. Instant he says is the day fixed for instituting or establishing the new first King of Cotiate (for he is never Crowned) and so soon as that Ceremony is over, he shall go directly to Nettare, where he has some Affairs to consider of and settle. He promises that nothing on his Part shall be wanting to keep up the Ancient Friendship between him and the Company.

THE Chief answered the foregoing letter from the Second King of Cotiate, and told him that he had heard from the old Linguist of his Uncle's Death which gave him Concern. That when his Highness came to Nettare he should be glad of that opportunity to confer with him concerning all Affairs of the Country, and that he should do every thing on his Part to preserve the good Harmony and Friendship that has subsisted between him and the preceding Chiefs in behalf of the Honble Company.

THE Ensign at Moddacarry advises that John Greenhead Corporal deserted from Mottamy Point, but the Serjeant there immediately making a signal, a guard was sent after him and he was taken among the Bushes.

WROTE to our Linguist at Callicut ordering him to provide and get ready as soon as possible Sundry Poon Masts and Sparrs &c^a. for the Use of the Presidency, agreeable to the List received from thence and our Order of Council the 21st. Instant. At the same time we enclosed Copy of the said List, and told him that this Indent was an addition to what we had formerly directed, and bid him provide accordingly.

THE Chief received an Ola from the Young Prince in which he says there are some Verges in Mottamy belonging to their House of Cherriica and that when the disturbances happened the Moors who cultivated those Verges left the Place, and they have since remained untilld. That the Revenues of those Verges support the Expences of the Pallace Kitchen, and if they should lay fallow they would be unable to bear the Charges thereof. And as in Mottamy there is no body beside the Moors to cultivate the Verges and take care of the Trees, he will be cautious to employ only such as he can confide in. All which he desires the Chief to consider and advise him of his Determination. He also requests that the Chief will write to the Ensign at Moddacarry that he has put there Faithfull and trusty Moors to till the said Verges. He adds that the poor People on the other side of the River are not safe on account of the Pallace of Odeamamgalem which does things contrary to all reason and desires the Chiefs Opinion of it.

To which the Chief replied the same day that there are some Moors of Mottamy who in the beginning of the troubles did great Mischief to our People. They are known to the Ensign of Moddecarry and except those his Highness might send whom he pleased to cultivate his Verges, as the Honble Company's intentions are not to impede him in any thing that is for the Benefit of his Country and Interest of his Highness. The Chief however desired that the Moors he sent to Mottamy might first go to the Officer at Moddecarry to show themselves, and then they would be permitted to till their grounds; and agreeable to this the Chief had wrote to the Ensign, and now sent his letter to be forwarded by his Highness whenever he thought fit. As to the Disagreement between his Highness and Baddencalencore the Chief told him as he had done before that he had taken abundance of Pains and trouble by writing and sending backwards and forwards between them several times, in order for bringing them to accord and accommodate matters; and since it had proved of no Effect; he had determined not to intermeddle more in their Affairs.

In the said Letter he says that for the service of the King Samorine and with his consent: his Uncle borrowed some money of the Company and expended it. That it can't be paid by any one but the Samorine himself who by not satisfying it has occasioned a Delay. When the King Samorine comes to take Possession of Penany he will go, he says himself to him and endeavour to bring this affair to an Issue, till when it is necessary for us to wait. He adds that he shall on his part give no cause for any Differences between him and the Company.

By the above answer from the Puniture Rajah, which was received this Morning it appears plainly that he has no Intent to pay the Debt himself but endeavour[rs] to put it upon the Samorine to discharge, from whom we have no hopes of ever getting any part thereof. However it is AGREED that we press the Puniture Rajah again for Payment of the Money when Mr. West goes down to Callicut after the rains. COMBEM ALLIPY one of our Pepper Merch^{ts}. having delivered into our Warehouse forty Candies (Ca^s. 40) of Pepper more than he had contracted and been advanced Money for; desires to contract for three hundred Candies more at the same Price as before namely R^s. 84 the Candy, and that he may be advanced money for two hundred Candies only (Ca^s. 200) which is AGREED to, and that the sum of Rupees sixteen thousand, eight hundred (R^s. 16800) being the Amo^t. of it be paid to him out of the Treasury.

PERUSED and Passed the Warehousekeeper's Recets and Issues for last Month and ORDERED the acco^t. of Pepper received to be entered hereafter.

READ over three setts of our Diary and Consultations copied fair, to the 29th. of May last.

WROTE a Letter to Anjengo in Answer to theirs of the 3^d. of May, wherein we advise that we shall send People to bring up our Munchua so soon as the weather will permit and that we shall Credit their Factory for the Charges by them disbursed on the said Munchua amounting to Rupees 34. 2. 75. We also adviced them of the Arrival of a french Ship for Mahie as noticed in this Diary the 11th. & 12th. Ult^o.

THURSDAY
10.

THE Chief received an Ola from the Young Prince wherein he says he proposes sending somebody to Travencore, and that he is in want of two Muskets for presenting to the King and desires we will procure and deliver them to the Bearer of his Ola Subem Cutti. To which the Chief answered that the Company were in great want of Arms themselves for the Use of their Garrison, that however as his Highness seemed to be in Necessity for two Muskets on so particular occasion he had sent them, though they could be but ill spared with two Bayonets and Cartouch Boxes, and that he had received their cost Rupees forty four, two quarters and fifty reas (Rup^s. 44. 2. 50).

AN Ola was also received from Camporratu Nombier setting forth that a Moor boy who lives in his District and was coming from Tellicherry with a burden of Rice, was seized by one of our Mucquas under Moylan Fort and had it taken away from him. People with burdens, he says should be suffered to pass every where without molestation, and that he is certain if the Chief had been acquainted with it he would not have suffered his people to have been treated after that manner, and that the Mucqua did it of his own accord. He also says this is not the first time the Mucqua has taken things.

SATURDAY

THE Chief having enquired into the Complaint abovementioned wrote the Nombier for Answer that he had ordered the Rice to be returned to the Moor boy, and that the Mucqua or any one else should not be permitted to molest People passing and repassing with or without Burdens. But it appearing upon Examination that the Moor boy's Uncle is indebted to the said Mucqua five Fanams, the Chief desired the Nombier would oblige him to pay the same.

14TH.

THE Pattamar people who carried our Advices for the Presidency dated the 1st. Instant are returned from Goa where they delivered the Packet of Letters to Padre Alexander who writes the Chief under the 6th. July their stile that he had received it and should forward the same to Bombay on the Morrow or the next day.

And because in the Account entered after that Consultation it is said the Merchants refuse to pay the Pepper seized at Pyachy, untill they recover it; and for other reasons which they shall deliver in to the Board. Whereupon it was AGREED that this matter be presently enquired into and the Merchants summoned to attend on the Morrow for that Purpose it being now between twelve and one o'clock.

THE Pepper Merchants being come according to the order of Council Yesterday (and the Linguist likewise attending) they are called in and told that they are severally indebted to the Honble Company certain quantities of Pepper which they say was seized at Pyachy by the King of Cotiote in the Month of October 1744 and being asked why they had not paid it for so long a time; they answer; that they had not yet recovered it, and desire the Chief will give them a letter to the King of Cotiote, which they will carry to him and endeavour to get the Pepper, and if they dont succeed, they agree after the Expiration of one Month time either to pay down the money that was advanced them for it or else to deliver a like quantity of Pepper which was agreed to. They were then told they must pay the Debt now or give an obligation to discharge it at a certain and fixed time. To which they reply, that they cant give an obligation which fixes a time for Payment till they

see what success they have with the King of Cotiote; and being thereupon given to understand that their Reply was unsatisfactory, and that they must pay the demand although they should never recover a single grain of the Pepper they say, if we insist upon it they will give such an obligation now, upon which they were ordered to withdraw.

DEBATING on this affair and considering that if the Merchants should be unsuccessful in their solicitations with the King of Cotiote they only would be the sufferers and believing that our Superiors would willingly consent to our favouring them in a proper and reasonable manner we AGREED Unanimously to require no more from them than an obligation for the quantity of Pepper which they say was seized at Pyachy or the Amount of it in money at the Price they were advanced for the same, namely Rupees 87½ the Candy payable the 31st. of December next, and in case of failure to be charged Interest thereon from that day at the rate of 10 ¹/₂ Cent per Annum and that we do not demand any Interest for the two Years and three months which will then be elapsed; since the money was paid to them, nor mulct them as usual for failing in their Contract.

THIS Point being thus settled the Merchants and Linguist were again called in and the Chief being willing to try whether they had any just and reasonable arguments to offer against paying Interest from the time it was advanced to them, that is to say for such a part as amounts to the quantity of Pepper seized at Pyachy, and being willing also to let them know the favour which had been shown to them by relinquishing of it proposed to ask them for Payment of the said Interest as abovementioned, when two of the Gentlemen objected to it one of them said he looked upon it as a favour done by the late Chief in not demanding the Debt sooner the money not being actually in their hands but invested in Pepper, which the King of Cotiote had seized. The other Gentleman said he deemed the interest remitted to them as the King of Cotiote had made a forcible seizure, But the rest of the Members being for the Question, the same was asked to which, the Merchants answered that it was very difficult for them to pay the Principal, and therefore wondered how we could demand the Interest. This answer being deemed by all except the two Gentlemen above described, evasive and unsatisfactory they were required to speak in plain and direct terms and say whether they would or would not pay it, but they still repeated the same evasive words as before, and thereby indirectly refused it. So they were told the Terms we had Agreed to and then ordered to withdraw; and we directed the Linguist to write out their several Olaes ready against next Council day and acquaint the Merchants that they would then send for them to Sign them.

HAVING Permission from the Presidency in their commands of the 6th. May last to distribute about nine hundred Rupees (Rs. 900) among the Mucquas who escaped the Massacre at Egar in consideration of their Losses and to enable them in some degree to buy boats and netts to carry on the Fishery, ORDERED that the money be paid out of the Treasury, and distributed in such proportions as may best Answer the end proposed by the Gift which is to bring as great a Number of those usefull and labouring people to settle at this Place as possible and a List of the Mucquas Names being delivered to the Linguist he is directed to make the necessary enquiry concerning them and see that a proper Dividend be made of the said money, agreeable to the intent for which it is given.

TRANSLATE of the Form of the Ola agreed the 15 Instant to be taken from the Pepper Merchants being read & Unanimously approved, they are called in, and required to deliver to us, as they promised, the Olaes signed by them respectively for the Pepper they owe to the Honble Company, and which, they say, was seized by the King of Cotiote at Pyachy. They answer that the said Olaes were not wrote; We then asked them, why they had promised two days agoe to give them; to which they replied, that they expected easier Terms from us. How says we could you expect easier Terms? were not the Terms Agreed upon communicated to you? and were you not seemingly content and satisfied with them? To this they answered word for word as before and then delivered to us a Petition as entered hereafter wrote in Portuguese which being interpreted sets forth " that " they have no objection to their giving fresh acknowledgments to discharge the " Debt by the last of December next, and in case of failure to pay Interest agreea- " ble to our orders, but represent to us their inability to comply punctually with " the Terms of it when the time is expired; and thus much they say they told the " late Chief when he pressed them for the Pepper And in the Conclusion desire we " will accept of one Candy every Year without interest till the whole should be " discharged or that we will wait till their old Arrears are paid and afterwards " receive it in one or two Years according to the proportion each man owes " This being read they were directed to withdraw, when we took the Purport of it into consideration and after some Debate it was again Unanimously Agreed to adhere to our Resolution of the 15th. Instant and insist upon their signing the Olaes according to the form abovementioned. Translate whereof follows this Consultation. Then the Merchants were a second time called in and being made acquainted with our Determination, they said, it was hard for them to comply with their Old Debts much more with the Demand on Account of the seizure at Pyachy in the time we limit them. They therefore cannot sign the obligation we require as they imagine we shall distress them when the same becomes due. We told them that the Honble Company had always been very indulgent and shewn them a great deal of favour and forbearance as they themselves acknowledge in their Petition and asked them what reason they had to entertain so injurious an opinion of them now or of their Chief and Factors to w^{ch}. they only reply that the obligation is very express in limiting the Time to a Period which their Abilities, will not admit of their complying with, and we insisting upon a direct and plain answer whether they would or would not sign the obligation as it was drawn out and worded; they continue to evade the question and say as before, whereupon one of the Gentlemen of the board gives it as his opinion that though the Merch^{ts}. in strictness ought to be obliged to Sign the obligation tender'd them yet on repeated declarations of their Inability to pay the whole in so short a Time as is limited he is not for exacting it from them, but for fear of worse consequences in regard to the Honble Company he thinks we ought (if no better Terms can be obtained) to Agree to their Petition, so as not to exclude the annuall payment of their other arrears as they insinuate they must fail in if they are obliged to make good the Pepper at Pyachy according to the Tenour of the note demanded. But others of the Board are of opinion that the time given them being two years and three Months from the day they were advanced the Money is indulging them greatly and that they ought to comply with our reasonable demand, leaving it to us, or in the breast of our Superiors at Bombay to give them such further time hereafter as from their Behaviour and Circumstances may be found proper and necessary; more especially as we shall have Answers from the Presidency to our Letters concerning this Affair, long before

they propose paying, or even before we require their paying any part of this Debt. But they seem unwilling to trust to the Honble Companys Clemency which makes the board suspect that they still want to shuffle and trifle with us and therefore are the more desirous of bringing them to some certainty now or else to leave the matter to our Superiors, And the Question being put from what the Merchants have a second time represented whether or not, we shall for the present abide by our first Resolution in regard to the Tenour of the Receipt it was agreed to, and resolved in the Affirmative Two Gentlemen only being for the Negative and for now allowing the Merchants more time agreeable to the Request in their Petition. On this occasion it is further observed, that the time already offered them was judged by all the Members fully sufficient and as much as we ought to have given them; and that if we had accepted to take so inconsiderable a quantity as one Candy a year it would have been ten years before the Debt is all discharged reckoning from the time that the money was advanced, which long forbearance if stated according to Arithmetical Rules of Compound Interest at the rate of ten per Cent per Annum, would sink more than the Principal Money, and not leave our Honble Masters the Interest to receive.

Mess^s. Stonestreet and Robinson deliver to the Board their reasons for refusing to sign our Consultation of the 29th. of May last, which are Read and ORDERED to be entered underneath And on which the Chief will remark in proper time.

THE warehousekeeper and Paymaster lay before us Indents for Firewood, Chunam, Matts Bamboes &c^a. stores that are necessary to be provided at Callicut against the opening of the ensuing season, which being inspected and the quantities of some Articles lessened in hopes of getting them cheaper here than at Callicut the rest are Agreed to be wrote for and the Linguist at Callicut ORDERED to provide them.

THE Young Prince having wrote to our Linguist to desire we would spare him six barrells of Gunpowder and six hundred pounds of Lead and his Custom Master engaging to pay for the same It is AGREED to let him have them at a moderate Proffit

MANOEL ROIZ who collects the Rents and Revenues of Tellicherry and Moylan delivers in his Annual Account which is ORDERED to lay upon the board for inspection and Examination till next Council day.

TYCANDY CUNIALLY has sent a Messenger to us, desiring to know whether we will contract with him this Year for Cardamoms and according to our Answer he proposes to come hither for Advance Money, or stay in the Country where he now is. AGREED that we send him word to come hither and discourse with us about that business.

PETITION OF NELLEARATE TUPY, MUCCATO PORRATU PAQUI, BAUNIBELTI CUNHIPY, AND CHERRIANDI CUNHAMOD ON THE PART OF CHATOO OF AGAR TO GEORGE DUDLEY ESQ^r. CHIEF AND HIS COUNCIL.

The Pepper we owe the Company and which is mentioned in our Acknowledgements to remain at Pyachy, we have nothing to object why we should not give fresh Acknowledgments to discharge or pay it the end of December next and in case of failure with Interest agreeable to your orders, but as our Abilities are small we represent them to you, and our being called the Honble Company's Merchants is an honour you do us but in reality we are only servants to them, if we were people of Abilities, the Pepper which the King of Cotiote took from us, we should have paid in the same year 1744 and would not have shown any reluctance. And all that we have to say is our inabilities, and when Mr. Geekie pressed us to pay this

Pepper we then signified our Inabilities desiring him not to streighten us nor oblige us to pay it directly, as we had not made away with the said Pepper and that we were willing to pay it giving us time; and now we lay our case before you acquainting you with our Poverty, and as such desire you'll accept of our paying one Candy every Year without Interest till the whole is paid, or we hope you'll stay till our old arrears are discharged and afterwards receive it in one or two Years conformable to what each Man owes, and if with your Assistance we should get the Pepper from the King of Cotiote we will then immediately pay the whole Amount or quantity. We confide in your goodness as you have always favoured us and hope you'll not see us destroyed.

TELLICHERRY JULY THE 16TH. 1746.

I Nelearate Tupy do hereby acknowledge to be indebted to the Hoñble English Company Five hundred sixty eight Rupees and three quarters being the value of six Candies ten Maunds of Pepper at eighty seven Rupees and an half $\frac{3}{4}$ Candy why [sic] by Contract I was obliged to deliver into their Warehouse by the end of December 1744, but the aforesaid Pepper being seized at Pyachy by the King of Cotiote I was incapacitated to perform said Contract. I therefore now promise to pay the aforesaid sum of Rupees 568. 3. — to their Chief and Council in Telli-cherry on or before the end of December next ensuing, and on failure thereof I will allow Interest at the rate of 10 $\frac{3}{4}$ Ct. $\frac{3}{4}$ Annum from said time untill the whole sum of money or quantity of Pepper be made good at the price above specified.

SIR & SIRs

As my reasons for refusing to sign the Consultation of the 29th. May last may be expected, I must now beg leave to offer the following.

1st. BECAUSE in the Paragraphs relating to the Pepper Merchants Debts it is said "That it appears by the Pepper Merchants Ols or Notes of hands (of which "Translate of one is entered after the Consultation) that they do not look upon "themselves answerable for the Pepper that was seized by the King of Cotiote in "Pyachy the beginning of October 1744 and have not therefore promised to pay "the same." WHEREAS it appears to me from the Translate of the Ola or Bond referr'd to, that they not only look upon themselves answerable for, but esteem themselves bound to make good to the Hoñble Company, a quantity equal to what was there detained by the King of Cotiote; as it is included in the Ols or Bonds for the discharge of their respective Debts taken by the late Chief in December 1745. Any Method used in particularizing the Debt not seeming to me (or I beleive to them) to abate the obligation of discharging the whole or any part thereof.

2nd. BECAUSE in the said Paragraphs it is said that it was "unanimously "agreed that we always insist on the Merch^{ts}. being obliged to stand all risques "in respect to Seizures or any other imposition or Accident which may happen to "them by means of the Country Governments or otherwise and that when we "make up this Years Account with them (which we propose to do in the Month of "December or January next) and take their Acknowledgments for w^t. Ballance "may then appear due to the Hoñble Company, we do endeavour to bring them "to give a written obligation for the Pepper seized at Pyachy & c^a." Some of which words seem to me to imply that all former Chiefs and Councils, in their Contracts with the Merchants for Pepper or Cardamoms, meant that the Hoñble Company should be at all risques of seizures from Country Governments & c^a. in

Merchant to whom Money was advanced, for the purchasing Pepper or Cardamoms esteemed himself obliged to deliver into the Honble Company's Warehouse the full quantity he contracted for, or in case of failure lyable to every method in our power to compell him to comply with his contract and that the Honble Company were never designed by the Contractors to run any other risques than the Inability of the Person entrusted, in which opinion the late Chief and the other Gentlemen of Council seem to concurr in regard to the disputed Pepper said now to be at Pyachy as appears by our joint letter to the Honble the President & Council at Bombay ^{to} Walpole in December last. And as all the said words imply a doubt among ourselves whether the Merchants are at present answerable for seized Pepper, I think they had better have been left out; for should the Merch^{ts}. by any means become acquainted with this scruple it may induce them either to refuse the Payment of the Pepper seized at Pyachy, or subject us to some of the many Evils and Disputes set forth in this Consultation.

3^{dly}. BECAUSE it is said in a list of Pepper Merchants Debts annexed to this Consultation that "all the Pepper Merchants refuse" to pay the quantity seized at "Pyachy untill they recover it" which said Refusal I never heard from any one of them; and because if I had heard it from them all, I should never think it right, or agree to admit them to stand excused such part of their just Debt merely on their refusal to pay it.

4^{thly}. BECAUSE in the said List Accounts are mixed together which from their circumstances appear to me very distinct Former arrears for which with the approbation of the Honble the President and Council of Bombay we accepted particular Olaes from the respective Merchants wherein it is agreed they shall deliver proportions Annually till the whole of those old Debts are discharged, and to which Agreement the concerned Merchants have since yearly complied, being therein joined wth. the Accounts of what remains outstanding from latter Years Contracts, which Accounts I think ought to have been given separte, as they would then have afforded our Superiors an easier Prospect of the true State of the Pepper Merchants Debts.

5^{thly}. BECAUSE the said List is called a list of Pepper Merchants Debts as they stood the 31st. December 1745 being "the time some of their Olaes were taken" which last words (there being no reason assigned why Olaes were not taken from every Merchant for his then Ballance) May (without any designed Reflection from the present Chief and other Gentlemen who have signed the said Consultation) I think, be construed by others in a negligent sense with regard to the late Chief and the then Accomptant, by whom the Olaes for the discharge of the Merchants Debts were at that time taken. WHEREAS had the following true reason been given why Olan were not then taken from the four Merchants objected to, the needlessness of taking some appearing, and the impossibility of obtaining others would have prevented any injurious reflection which may, by the said Account now take Place".

TYCANDY CUNIALLY it is observed in the said List "gave no Ola for a deficiency " in a former Cardamom Contract to the Amount of Rupees five hundred twenty "five (Rs. 525). w^{ch}. Amount he promised to make good in Pepper" to which it might have been added, that when his account was adjusted last December an Ola from him dated the 1st. March 1743/4 to the value of Rupees two thousand (Rs. 2000) was detained by the late Chief as a security for his discharging the above Debt which Ola is now in our possession.

It is mentioned in the said List, with regard to Ballorte Calandra's Account that no Ola was taken for the Ballance of his contract in March 1744/5 and had we been told that the said Merchant was an Inhabitant of Billiapatam, and on account of the then troubles in the Country, had withdrawn himself and Family from his habitation out of harms way; perhaps no one would at that time have expected an Ola from him.

CACART TUPY it is well known had absconded before the usual time of taking Olas last Year, and I heartily hope will appear at a proper time to give an Ola this.

THE Debt of Ballipy Cutiasem of Irecure is an old one transferred on our Books from another Person to him: and whether in such case an Ola could be reasonably expected from him for the Amount is what I much question.

It may be objected to the above remarks on the list of debts "that it was what I signed to myself" To which I beg leave to answer: "that though I did inadvertently sign the said List in Council when a number of other Accounts & Papers were laid on the Table wrote fair for signing; it was done at a time when I had no expectation of meeting with any thing to object against had I examined it, and when there was no time for such Examination. And indeed I think all Accounts (except the Treasury) ought to be signed only by the Accomptant; my Name therefore appearing with the List will not I humbly hope be looked on as an attestation to the truth of the Account but rather be esteemed a Proof of the Confidence I had that no exceptionable one would have been offered.

For the above reasons, I therefore dissent from all the Paragraphs in the above said Consultation relating to the Pepper Merchants Debts as well as against the List of the said Debts annexed to this Consultation.

May is, because said Consultation implies a Doubt whether the Pepper Merchants think themselves obliged to pay their Debt for the Pepper stopt at Pyachy by the King of Cotiote, and as I am certain, when they made thier Contracts we were not to stand to Seizures made by any one on their Purchases, nor give them a discharge for any part thereof untill delivered into the Honble Company's Warehouse, I am therefore (on their refusal) for compelling them to pay said Debt; they having in my opinion acknowledged it to be a just one as appears By one of the Translates of their Olas given, which is entered at the foot of the Account delivered in by Mr. Douglas the 29th. May.

THIS AFTERNOON imported at Myhie a three Mast ship and a Brigantine with french Colours. Our Boatmen say, they refused to let them go into the Ship, and made one of their people, hand up his note from along side, and after they had read it, the Officer bid our Mucquas be gone. They however took some notice of her Force, and say she appears to be a Country Ship of 18 Guns, and about thirty Europeans beside Lascars. The Brigantine permitted our Boatmen to go on board her, where they heard that she came from Mauritius and Mozambique. She carries 14 small Guns, and is manned with about four Europeans and 25 Lascars.

A Ship & Brigantine import at Myhia.

A Pair of Pattamars belonging to Madrass being here, the Chief returned them with a private Letter, advising Governour Morse of the Arrival of the pre-mentioned Ship and Brigantine at Mahie, and that he heard she was an English Country Ship which the Brigantine had taken at or near Mozambique. That three English Gentlemen were come on shore at Mahie and that there was another English Ship in Company when this was taken, but she slipped her Cable and got away.

FRIDAY THE 18TH.
Letter to Fort St. George by the Chief.

THE Chief wrote a Letter to the 1st. and 2^d. Kings of Cotiote, and told them that in the Year 1744 the Honble Company's Merch^{ts}. bought some Pepper of the Merchants at Pyachy, and when they demanded it from them, they said the Pepper had been taken from Pyachy Buzar by order of the first King now deceased; and have not yet therefore satisfied our Merchants for the same. That as there continues a good Friendship between their Majesties and the Honble Company he desired they would favour our said Merchants, who are the Bearers of this Letter with their Assistance in getting the said Pepper or the value of it in money. And concluded with Assurances of our hearty inclination to preserve a good understanding with their Majesties at all times.

Letter to the 1st and 2^d. Kings of Cotiote about the Pepper seized at Pyachy.

RECEIVED an Answer from the first King of Cotiote to the above Letter, wherein he says he is really unacquainted wth. the Affair, but in order to know the truth of what happened it will be necessary to call together the Pyachy Merchants & be informed from them. And that when the Moors are examined Unim Rayrapem the Second King (who he hears went the 17th. Instant to Vaenatto) must be present. He adds, that when the said Second King returns, he shall consult with him & endeavour to bring every thing into the right way, and advise the Chief accordingly. He on his part he says will give no occasion for Differences between him and the Honble Company.

SATURDAY 19TH.
Answer to the foregoing Letter.

WROTE a Letter to Francisco Dias our Linguist at Callicut agreeable to the Order of last Council day, and transmitted him the List of Sundry Stores and necessities that will be wanted after the Rains for the use of this Place, which he is directed to procure of the best hand and in the most proper season when the same are to be had in the greatest plenty and perfection. He is likewise ordered to send us monthly an Account of such Necessaries as he may then have in readiness for this Place that we may not dispatch away our Munchua to bring them up before they are provided and thereby necessitate her either to wait at Callicut an unreasonable length of time which increases her Charges for Provisions or to come back half loaded which raises the Freight on the Goods to more than their first Cost. We also tell him that it is now the 19th. of July and no Factory Accounts for the Month of June are as yet received; that we are in want of them; and that when he draws out the General Account for the Year ending the 31st. Instant he is reminded to insert in a very particular manner every thing he has purchased, distinguishing the Place and Service the several Articles are intended for, because our Factory Books of the present Year will be adjusted conformable to his said General Account.

Letter to the Linguist at Callicut ord-ring him to provide Stores and send up his Acconts.

THE Young Prince wrote a letter of thanks for the two Musquets and Bayonets spared him, and tells the Chief that he will advise him what News happens in those Parts of the Country.

THE three Masted Ship which arrived at Mahie the 17th. Inst^t. we learn is the Lorrain Captain Magman Commander and Mr. Douglas Supra Cargoe and that she was taken at, or near Mozambique by the Brigantine which imported in her company and brought her to Mahie. It is said there was another Ship in Company when this was taken, called the Mocha Merchant Captain Carr Commander but that she slipped her Cable and got away. The Brigantine boarded the Lorrain with about 30 Men and carried her without any Resistance. She belongs to the English of Bengall and had on board some Teeth and Cowries. The Teeth and European Prisoners, were landed at Mahie; but the latter, and some say the former, were sent off again; and the Ship and Brigantine both sailed this Afternoon to the southward. It is likewise reported that a Detachment of 30 Soldiers were put on Board. the Ship at Mahie.

It is reported that a Fleet of 12 sail of French Ships under the direction and Command of Monsieur Le Bourdenay are arrived on the Cormandell Coast; and that they have been Engaged with his Majesty's Squadron off Negapatam about the 25th. of last Month; and that seven French Ships were seen in Pondicherry Road the 2^d. Instant.

THE French Brigantine and the Lorrain are yet in sight off Sacrifice Rocks.

RECEIVED a letter from the Captain and Council of Cannanore wherein they say, they suppose we are well acquainted with the Ravagement which the Moors committed in the Districts of Agar, and the inhuman manner in which they treated the Mucquas there; so that they were all ruined and obliged to fly from their habitations and disperse themselves to sundry Places. Of these, ninety souls retired to the Northward and came to Cannanore begging in a lamentable way that they would take Compassion on them, and permit them to live under the Protection of their Guns, that they might be in safety and free from Molestation; all of them declaring an aversion to return to the Place from whence they came, as they might meet with the same fate again. The hearing of this (they say) moved them with Compassion, and therefore they got such of them as were wounded cured, and took them as their Inhabitants, permitting them to build houses of which there are at present 12 under their Walls. That on the 29th. of July N.S. there came there a Toney with two of the Principal Agar Mucquas at present Inhabitants of Tellicherry, who under pretence of visiting their Relations went to the Mucquas their new Inhabitants, saying expressly that they came from the Linguist of Tellicherry Pedro Rodrigues with orders from us to advertise them that directions were arrived to make them Restitution for their Losses at Agar, and that if they were willing to partake of the donation it would be necessary for them to go and live once more under the English Protection. This (add they) being certainly true, there may probably be something more; and therefore it was well the Affair was discovered and brought to light, And as the same is not agreeable to the Maxims of Nations, they were resolved to keep the two Mucquas till they were informed who could Authorize them to go there. Their Letter was wrote in Dutch and dated the 2^d. August New stile, and they enclosed us a Translate of it in Portuguese from which Language this version in English was taken.

ANSWERED the precedeing Letter from the Captain and Council of Cannanore and told them that we had received their Letter, which we observed was wrote after they had imprisoned our two Mucquas. That it was publickly known the Agar Mucquas belong to us, and lived always under our Protection, the Cannanore Moors could not therefore have hurt them, had they not been permitted to go in the Night out of their Bay to destroy them, and afterwards to return with their Plunder. Those that Escaped and were wounded came to Tellicherry desiring Assistance: We ordered them to be maintained and cured at the Company's Expence, and told them we would write to Bombay representing their sufferings, which we accordingly did; and as an Answer is now come to our letter much in their favour. we bid our Linguist Pedro Roiz tell the Principal of the Agar Mucquas to inform the others of it as well those that were here as such, who for their Convenience were gone elsewhere without mentioning or pointing out their Place in Particular. But that if we had named Cannanore we think there could be nothing very unfriendly

in it, since they cannot well be esteemed their Inhabitants in so short a time after they had been cured and maintained at our Honble Company's Expence, which was considerable. That however, if they will not admit the just Right we have to the Mucquas whom they now call their Inhabitants, they had no reason for imprisoning the two Mucquas that went from hence, as they belonged to us, & had not committed any violence. We therefore desired they would release them And further added, that as those Agar Mucquas were people but of little consequence, either to our Company or Theirs, we could not have beleived they would have given themselves the trouble of writing so long a Letter upon so trifling a subject.

READ a Letter received this Morning from the President and Council of Fort St. George bearing date the 5th. Instant Extract of which follows this Consultation. They advise us of the arrival of nine French Ships at Pondicherry and that our Men of Warr had been smartly engaged with them the 25th. of last Month from four till seven o'clock in the afternoon when Night parted them.

TAKING into Consideration the subject of the letter from Madrass and the present Behaviour of the French at Mahie who are tampering with some of the Mallabar Princes and particularly with Alley Rajah and the Moors his subjects between whom it is said they have near brought about a Reconciliation; and prevailed upon the latter to return to their obedience and restore to Alley Rajah the Government of Cannanore which they had taken out of his hands, and kept to themselves ever since the month of April last, when they cut off two of his Ministers. This the Moors are said to have done on large Promises of Assistance from our Neighbours the French of Men Money and Warlike Stores on the arrival of their Fleet, which they report, is to be here in October. And as without such Assurances from the French we have all the reasons in Nature to think, that the Moors would not have restored Alley Rajah to the Government of Cannanore, untill he had consented to the desire of his People, who all requested him to make Peace with the Honble Company and as from many other concurring Circumstances which we may draw from the Behaviour and Management of that restless and unquiet Nation the French (whose People at Mahie are now actually making of Gabions, Cheveaux de Frizes, Hatchetts and other Warlike Instruments; and scruple not to give out publicly enough that they will soon say Mass in Tellicherry, we have more Reason than ever to put ourselves in a Posture of Defence it is unanimously AGREED that we increase for the present the Number of our Garrison Soldiers, by enlisting such stragling Europeans and Topasses as we may be able to get provided they are good and able Men; though we fear very few, if any are now to be found hereabout, the French having enlisted several Topasses who had been discharged by the Dutch of Cochin And notwithstanding their insolent way of Gasconading we hope to prevent their doing us any very considerable Mischief if we can but keep the Country Powers in our Interest, or from joyning with them; which we shall endeavour at all we are able.

READ also a Letter received from the Callicut Linguist Francisco Dias dated the 22^d. Instant, Translate whereof is likewise Extracted underneath. And as he is in want of Money to go on with his Purchase of Plank and Stores, it is AGREED that we send him down four thousand silver Rupees (Rupees 4000) by a Toney, and that we put on board her a Guard of Soldiers to secure it. His Accounts are ordered to be examined by the Accomptant.

Mr. William West having informed the Board that there is a substantial Merchant at Callicut named Porratey Paqui, who is willing to contract with us for supplying this Factory with Billet Wood at ten Fanams a Thousand sticks, to be delivered at Tellicherry free of all charges. And as the same when bought by our order on the Honble Company's Account, and freighted up hither in a Munchua, used to stand us from 14 to 15 Fanams a thousand; It is AGREED that we accept & Embrace the offer; and Mr. West is directed to write Porratey Paqui to send up a considerable quantity with all possible Expedition. AGREED likewise that we countermand our late Orders to the Callicut Linguist in respect to this particular Article, and tell him further, to see that the Merchant sends up the Wood so soon as the Weather will permit.

TYCANDY CUNIALLY being come hither agreeable to the Answer we gave his Messenger the 17th. Instant and desiring to be advanced five thousand Rupees (Rupees 5000) for Cardamoms, and he promising to deliver the full quantity he may contract for on or before the 20th. of January next, which is as early as the Season will permit of his bringing them in, It is AGREED that he be advanced the above sum out of the Honble Company's Treasury, and that the Price be settled after the Goods arrive as usual, since he cannot be prevailed upon to fix it now.

AND Mr. Nicholas Stonestreet in his Dissent to the Consultation of the 29th. May last, was pleased to say, that an Ola of Tycandy Cunially's for two thousand Rupees (Rupees 2000) was detained by the late Chief as a Security for his Debt to the Honble Company; The Board took this occasion to speak to him about it and being asked whether an Ola of his had been detained by the late Chief on account of his Debt and why he had not paid the said Debt, as it had been due a long while; He answered, that he remember'd nothing about the detention of the Ola, and quite forgot that he owed the Honble Company any thing, which was the reason that the Debt remained undischarged, And the Board considering if we took Pepper now the Price is fallen our Honble Masters would suffer by it, so we Agreed to demand the Money with Interest from the day it was advanced to him; and he accordingly consented to pay the Principal Sum, but we could not bring him to allow Interest upon it. We therefore determined to accept the Principal Money being Rupees five hundred twenty five (Rupees 525) and wait for orders from Bombay before we insisted upon making him pay the Interest or Mulet. And as the latter bears no manner of Proportion with the former being only Eighteen Rupees (Rupees 18) (or Rs. 3 on six Candies of Pepper) we did not chuse to accept of such a trifle: when the Interest for three Years will amo^{nt}. to Rupees one hundred seventy three and three quarters.

THE Honble Company's Copper Ola Box having been broke open when the Key of it was in the Possession of the present Accomptant; the same having been delivered to him by the Secretary in Public Council; Mr. John Robinson who (as Secretary) had the charge of the said Box, is ordered to inform the Board how it happened, and give his Reasons why he permitted or directed the lock to be broke, when he might have had the Key to open it.

RECEIVED a letter this Morning from Madrass dated the 5th. Instant, advising of the Arrival of nine French ships at Pondicherry on the 26th. and 27th. ultimo under the command of Monsieur Le Bourdenay, with an Import of a considerable quantity of Treasure Broad Cloth &c^a., which from the best Intelligence they could get, are named the Achilles, Bourbon, St. Lewis, Duke of Orleans, Neptune, L'Heureux, Parfait Renommie and Insultaire. The Achilles is said to carry 70 Guns and seven Hundred Men and to have come out with four more of the French Company's ships abovementioned. That the Bourbon, and Neptune are said to have been stoped at the Islands in 1744-5, and that the other two were supposed to be Country ships. That to their usual Complim^t. they had reason to beleive a Number of the European Planters &c^a. were added, which altogether, they say make no inconsiderable Force. That a day or two after their Arrival, they were informed of their having fell in with the British Squadron off Calimer, and that a Smart Engagement ensued, which lasted from four in the afternoon till seven when Night parted them. That they were not as yet acquainted with the particulars of the Fight, but judge it to have been very smart from the Reports they had of Monsieur Le Bourdenay with Several Officers being wounded and of their having put ashore upwards of five hundred Men sick and wounded. They likewise advise us of their having received our Letter of the 10th. Ultimo and of the Walpole's being dispatched from Bombay directly to Canton.

THE Letter received this Morning from the Callicut Linguist & mentioned to have been read in Council acknowledges the Receipt of ours to him dated the 18th. and 30th. of June and 19th. Instant with the Lists of Necessaries for Bombay and this Place, which with the List M^r. West left him for Gombroon, he promises to provide, but as yet he has not done it because one of the Kings Ministers has forced some Timber from the Merchants, who will not therefore bring any from the inland

Country, but he is in hopes of getting some in a few days. And for purchasing the things ordered he says he shall want four thousand Rupees (Rup^s. 4000) & desires we will send him that sum in Eight days time in Silver, as Venetians are worth no more at present than Rupees four hundred thirty two (R^s. 432) per one hundred Venetians full weight. The Callicut Toney which carries his Letter and in which came also his Nephew George Carvalho, he says will bring the Money if we think proper to send it by her, but then it will be necessary he says to put some Soldiers in her for the greater Safety. The Gombroon List was for 200 Plank of one foot broad and 20 feet long and 180 Rafters of 17 feet long and 6 Inches thick and as he does not know the thickness the Plank must be of, nor the dimensions of the Rafters; he desires we will inform him thereof and acquaint him whether the Rafters are to be a square of 6 Inches, or otherwise as the List mentions only 6 Inches thick. He encloses the Factory Expences and Cash Account for June, and excuses his not sending them sooner by saying the Death of his Cousin Manoel Netto prevented him. The General Account for the Year and an Account of every thing that remain at Callicut he promises to forward by the 10th. of August.

WROTE the Callicut Linguist that we had received his Factory and Cash Accounts for June with his Letter of the 22^d. Instant That in the Cash Account there are two Articles we do not understand. One concerning five thousand sticks of Firewood & the other about twelve Candies of Coir. The first he says is for a Mistake in not bringing them to Account in January and February and the other is for making small Ropes which he says went in February and therefore he now debts his Cash for both Articles. We desire him to inform us where the Ropes went and Explain the said two Articles more clearly to us that we may bring them to Account in a proper manner. The List of things to be provided for Gombroon we tell him he has in the same words it came from Bombay without any diminution or alteration whatever. But we imagine the Rafters should be six Inches square and the Plank of the same thickness as is usual for Plank to be made of that Length and Breadth, and he is directed to provide accordingly. By the Toney we send him a small Chest of Treasure containing 2 Bags each Bag 2000 Rupees making in all four thousand Silver Rupees (Rup^s. 4000) which sum we order him to bring to the Honble Company's credit. We also give him Notice that M^r. West had contracted with Porratey Paqui for Billet Wood to be delivered here free of all charges at 10 Fanams per Mill, and bid him see that the said Merchant sends it up in proper time, or as soon as the Weather will permit we being in want of it; and direct him not to buy any on the Honble Company's Account.

RECEIVED a second letter from the Captain and Council of Cannanore dated the 5 of August N.S., and in Reply to our Answer of the 23^d. Instant they say, we were not well informed which way the Moors went last Year to destroy the Mucquas in the district of Agar; had they gone armed out of their Bay we should not, say they, have omitted at that time to protest against them, as we did not do so, the Reasons we now give are frivolous. They say the Christian Assistance we gave the distressed Mucquas of Agar to the southward, they dont deny; nay some of the People themselves acknowledge it, and those who went to the Northward and arrived at Cannanore, they say, were also assisted by them in the same charitable manner, by curing such as were wounded and giving them their Protection, whence they conclude that they became their lawfull Inhabitants. And say they notwithstanding you had Notice of this, or your Linguist must remember it, you determined to send two Mucquas to persuade the Mucquas our new Inhabitants to remove themselves from us, as may be seen by the Relation of our own two Mucquas given there in the Presence of Witnesses, which they send us enclosed, and to which they referr. They add that they are obliged for the Reasons given in their first Letter to detain our two Mucquas till they have orders concerning them from Cochin and cannot therefore return them to us.

ANSWERED the precedeing Letter from the Dutch at Cannanore and told them that we could not imagine so trifling a thing as this is would have occasioned such a difference between us, as to oblige them to detain our two Mucquas till they received Orders about them from Cochin. They may be well assured, we never intended to get the Mucquas in any other way than what was friendly and consistent with Reason; for had we been otherwise disposed and thought those People of much consequence to us, it would have been a mighty easy matter to have persuaded them to stay here, when they came as they often do, to see their Families and Relations who live in Tellicherry; and nothing of this kind having been ever yet attempted, shews we had no bad designs. Had our Lingst. done Right he would have directed the two Mucquas to apply to them first; and we should have Expressly ordered him to do so, if we could have certainly known that the Agar Mucquas were at Cannanore. They may therefore be assured his omitting to give the two Mucquas directions to speak first to them, was through Inadvertency, and not done with any evil Intention. As to the deposition of the said two Mucquas taken by them; it is untrue in some Points, and we think they may have been induced to make such a Declaration through Fear of Punishment or in hopes of obtaining their liberty by it.

RECEIVED a Letter from the Callicut Linguist dated Yesterday wherein he owns the Receipt of ours under the 25th. Instant and the small Chest of Treasure containing four thousand Silver Rupees (Rup^s. 4000) for which he has credited the Accounts of that Factory. Concerning the two Articles in his Cash Account for June he says, they were included that we might see the true Ballance, and that they should have been brought to Account before, and that every thing may hereafter appear plain, he tells us, it will be better that so soon as he provides any Goods, they be immediately brought to Account and his Cash credited for their Cost as paid by him and that he be allowed to charge in his Acco^t. of Disbursements what has been already provided, by which Means we shall see the true Ballance every Month. The Charges of making Ropes, was paid in the Month of Febry and the Cordage was made out of the 88 Candies of Coir bought in August last for the service of Bombay. The Ropes are not carried away but remain at Callicut. Those sent up in the fair season were what had been bought the foregoing Year, which he says we shall see plainer by the General Account. As to the Firewood for which Mr. West has contracted with Porratey Paqui, he will endeavour to get it sent up so soon as the Weather will permit but as the Merchant has not yet been at Callicut he could not speak about it. He adds that as the Stores bought for Madrass, Gombroon, and Bombay are large quantities there is not Room for them all in the Banksaul, he therefore designs to build another of Bamboes and Olaes at Molencaddo near the River; which will be but a little way from the Merchants, and more free from the danger of Fire. It will also lessen the Charges, and be better for embarking and shipping off the Goods with dispatch and Convenience. The Soldiers who came in the Toney and now return he has given Provisions to the 29th. Instant being four days at four Fanams per day is sixteen Fanams (Fan^s. 16) and he has also given to the Mucquas for their Provisions six & three quarters of Fanam (Fan^s. 6 $\frac{3}{4}$).

READ Mr. Robinsons reasons for breaking open the Ola Box, which are ORDERED to be entered after this Consultation. The Excuse he makes for it is mighty frivolous, for how could he think the Key had been mislaid when he himself had, not long before, delivered it to Mr. Douglas publickly in Council, and his saying it was locked up in the Stationary Chest is untrue, for the Chief on going two different times into the Secretarys Office, saw both Box and Chest open, as well as the Office door and not a living Creature near them. His impertinent way of asking Mr. Douglas before all the Members, what Business he had with the Key when he had been told that it was to adjust and settle the Merchants Accounts and his repeating the Chiefs words in a different manner from what he spoke them and his ascribing, our calling him to an Account, for breaking open the Ola Box, to his dissenting from the Consultation of the 29th. of May, are such Proofs and Circumstances of Indecency and misbehaviour to his Superiors, as we hope will meet with their due Reward when the same shall be fairly represented to the Presidency.

Mr. Robinsons Reasons for breaking open the Ola Box Read.

Remarked upon.

ANOTHER Letter from Mr. Robinson (as entered hereafter) was also Read, wherein he says, that in comparing the state of the Island of Durmapatam with his Account for last Year (both which he lays before us) we shall observe a much greater Rent will be collected on Coconut Trees the ensuing Year, which he says is owing to a valuation made on the Oarts in August last. And being informed that if the Batty Grounds were to be valued likewise as large an Increase would be made on that head. He adds, that this being the proper time to sett about it, he desires we will determine and give him such directions as we may think proper.

Collectors Report of the Rents of Durmapatam.

Jeynson and Douglas be appointed to take a very exact, full, and particular List of all the Olas in the Copper Box; as also, of some others which are entrusted to the care of the Linguist, and deliver the same into Council, with an Account or Report of the Condition they find them in, and their opinion of the method most proper from preserving them from decay.

OUR Linguist having indiscreetly sent two of the head Agar Mucquas, or Fishermen (who also do the Business of Watermen and Porters) to acquaint some of the other Agar Mucquas who are now at Cannanore, that we had permission from Bombay to give them something in consideration of their losses, and to enable them in part to buy Netts and Boats for carrying on their Fishery provided they would come and settle here, and this Order being given them without directing at the same time the said two Mucquas, to apply themselves to the Captain of Cannanore, they were taken up and imprisoned by the Dutch, for endeavouring to entice and bring away the said Agar Mucquas, whom they call their Inhabitants. Several Letters have passed between them and us, on the occasion as may be seen in the Diary under the 22, 23^d., 26th., 28th. & 30th. Instant, and as they say, they cannot release the two Mucquas belonging to this Place, until they have Orders from Cochin, It is AGREED that we write thither by the first opportunity, and endeavour to get them sent back to us.

Mr. Robinson

MR. JOHN ROBINSON having in the paper of reasons, which he gives for breaking open the Ola Box begged leave to resign the office of Secretary; and the Chief knowing him to be the most proper person for that Post (all the other Gentlemen at the Board being employed in some branch or other of Our Hon^{ble} Masters Business) and that the reasons he urges for laying down were ridiculous and trifling did not regard his improper and unreasonable request. And Mr. Robinson perceiving that no Motion had been made for that Purpose, verbally desired leave to throw up his Post of Secretary. The Chief then told him it could not be done; and that he must continue to act as Secretary, but this not satisfying him he directed himself in a disorderly Passion to the other Members and asked them leave to resign; upon which the question was put, and one of the Gentlemen said, that as Mr. Robinson desired it, and thinking there were others capable of executing the Office, he was for permitting him to throw it up, but all the other Members being against it, he was told, that he must continue in his Post and hold the Place of Secretary as before. Whereupon he in a very saucy, unbecoming and Contumacious manner told the Board and afterwards minuted the same with his own hand; that for the reasons given in his Letter, HE WONT ACT AS SEC^y. but will Copy as far as he can the Business of the office. The Members were a little astonished at the Young Mans uncommon and Refractory Behaviour; yet he notwithstanding, again pressed us to appoint another Secretary which we not seeming to regard, he

then said that we might suspend him if we pleased, but from that time he wou'd not do the Business of Secretary. The Chief however thinking that he might possibly have been worked up to that high Pitch of Ungovernable Passion by some Evil designing people was willing to give him time to cool and consider seriously of his Behaviour, and see whether he might not be better disposed to render due Obedience to the Orders of the Board before our next meeting, and so for the present Adjourned the Council.

TO THE W^o. GEORGE DUDLEY ESQ^r.CHIEF & C^A. FACTORS.W^o. SIR & SIRS

BEING Challenged Yesterday by the Chief in C^o. with the Ola Box being broke open, and with the Loss of one of the Olas; I beg leave to give the following Representation of the whole Affair.

You all know it has been the Custom for the Secretary to keep the Key of the Ola Box. An Ola being therefore sometime since asked for the Linguist as usual was sent to me to open the Box that he might take out the Ola required; when on missing the Key, and thinking it might be mislaid I ordered the Lock to be opened by the Smith, for which afterwards a new Key was made, and thô it remained open for sometime there could no ill consequence proceed from it as it was locked up in the Stationary Chest, where Mr. Stonestreet found it when he looked for Tycandy Cunially's Ola. But it seems sometime before and ever since (within a few days) the old Key was in Mr. Douglass's Possession, what Right he had to keep it or what were his Motives for so doing let him Answer thô from what has happened since Imagine he might have done it with some design.

In regard to the loss of the Olas I shall only put you in mind that Mr. Douglas yesterday declared in Council to us all that the missing Ola the Chief charged me with had been discharged and perhaps was returned to the Person who gave it (as undoubtedly it ought) which not being contradicted I humbly presume acquits me of that Charge.

And now I beg leave to remark that I cant help thinking, but the above proceeds chiefly from my dissenting to the Consultation of the 29th. May last, as the Chief said in Council with regard to that Business "That he was glad it happened since he could now do things he designed with a better Grace. That as he found People upon the Catch with him he would be upon the Catch too." In such case therefore as it is not likely I should hereafter give satisfaction in the office of Secretary I beg leave to resign that Post to whomsoever you may please to appoint, and I shall readily give all the Assistance I can in the Business of the Office.

THE CHIEFS Remarks on Mess^s. Nich^s. Stonestreet and John Robinson their Reasons for not signing the Consultation of the 29th. May last.

I shall begin with Mr. Stonestreet's reasons first, and go through them Paragraph by Paragraph in the same order they stand placed in his Dissent, that our Superiors may have a clear view of this Affair; and I shall afterwards proceed to remark on what Mr. Robinson has said on this Occasion; by which the Reasons for wording the Consultation of the 29th. May last, in the Terms it there stands, will appear as well as the Objections against it, & then submit the whole to the Judgment and Determination of those to whom we are subordinate.

In the first Place he says it appears to him from the Translate of the Merchants Ola at the foot of the List of their Debts, that they Esteem themselves answerable for the Pepper seized at Pyachy. To this I reply, that when I examined our head Linguist Pedro Rodrigues and afterwards sent for the Merchants, they all told me they could not pay the Pepper untill they recovered it from the King of Cotiote, and they have since confirmed the same before the whole Board in Council the 15th. Instant, as appears by that days Consultation And if they looked upon themselves bound to make it good, why was their Obligation drawn out so loosely & in such insignificant Terms? or rather without any Terms or Meaning at all; for it neither mentions any sum of Money, nor promises to pay the Pepper, and where no Promise is made there certainly can be no Obligation as to their acknowledging the Debt, that is of no Use, because their several Receipts for the Money advanced remain still in the Hon^{ble} Company's Treasury; which are much better deeds for our Hon^{ble} Masters Claim, than a Writing which says their Pepper remains at Pyachy; because the Acceptance of such a Paper seems to imply (and the Merchants no doubt construed it so), that it was the Company's Pepper which remained at Pyachy. And their Refusal since in Council to sign an Express obligation to discharge the Debt, though indulged wth. so long a Credit as two Years and nine Months from the Time the Money was advanced, free of Interest or Mulet, does undeniably show, that they never intended to pay it, had they not been called upon in another sort of Manner than what they had seen before; and even now, they cannot be prevailed upon to offer any thing reasonable. Our Consultations of the 15th. and 17th. Instant, describe how they quibble, trifle, and shuffle in order to evade payment of their just Debts or giving a proper Obligation for them; & yet the Gentlman, whose paper I am now remarking upon; says it appears to him that they esteem themselves Answerable* (supposing for Argument sake they did so) if they are unwilling, and refuse either to pay the Pepper, or promise to make it good? And how do they stand Justified

* This naturally leads to the asking one or two plain & simple Questions to wit, What will our Hon^{ble} Masters gain from People who esteem themselves Answerable.

to their Masters who neglected to call upon them for it? or to take proper Obligations for putting the Debt into a regular course of Payment? Let them Answer whose Conduct is now arraigned, and who are thereby become the cause of this dispute with the merchants; which (according to what appears to us as well as to the gentleman abovementioned) might easily have been prevented.

The foregoing Paragraph being so full and particular will in part answer some of his following ones. As to his second Article or Reason the Chief ingenuously owns, that when he penned the Consultation which the Gentleman refused to sign, and therein said "That we would always insist on the Merchants being obliged to stand all risks in respect to Seizures &c^a." He was induced to it from a dread that the Acceptance of an Ola or Writing worded in such Exceptionable and un-mercantile Terms might (& probably would if an Enquiry had not been made) be construed by all succeeding Chiefs & Factors, as taking the Risk of recovering all seized Pepper upon our Hoñble Employers and so brought upon them irreparable Mischiefs; which he was determined to prevent; by bringing the Merchants to a fair and clear explanation of the matter, And if in doing this, any Errors, Neglects or Mismanagements, were discovered in the Conduct of the late Chief and Factors; or such of them as by their Offices were the immediate acting Persons; it can by no just construction extend to a Reflection on all former Chiefs and Factors as is insinuated; since none of them ever took such insignificant and ill judged Olas from the Merchants. We all know very well that it is Uncustomary here to make the Merchants enter into a written Contract for Pepper, or any other goods; and that their Receipts for the Money advanced them have ever been esteemed sufficient to make them comply with their Verbal Engagements; more especially as they always throw themselves at your feet and submit to your Clemency, whenever you absolutely determine to fix your demand in any reasonable way. But as Cavils and disputes have arose and ever will happen, in all Places where Trade is carried on and Business transacted, in a loose and Unguarded Method, Our Hoñble Masters very Judiciously ordered last year by their Ship Walpole that the Merchants Accounts should be Annually adjusted and Acknowledgements taken from them that such an Adjustment had been duly and Regularly made. The late Chief and Accomptant instead of doing this themselves, as they ought to have done, put it upon the Linguist, to be performed by him; as is partly acknowledged in your own Consultation of the 31st. of December last, but better proved by the Entries in the Factory Journall under that days date, made by the present Accomptant; and the Account Current Book kept by the Gentleman whose Reasons are here Remark-ed upon in which Book not a single Article has been added since the Month of July 1744, nor does any one Mans account appear to have been closed. How then my Adversary (who was at that time Accomptant) adjusted and settled the Pepper Merchants Accounts, let him discover, and prove if he is able. As to the Merchants being acquainted with our Doubts and Scruples about this Affair it can be of no signification, because all of us Agree that they are undoubtedly answerable to the Hoñble Company for all Seizures; and the only scruple that remains, is whether that Uncommon Ola was taken with an Intent to oblige them to pay the Debt; or whether it meant to leave the Company in doubt and suspense. Besides the Gentleman aforementioned ought to know that our Consultations are drawn [over] for the information and inspection of our Superiors and not for the Perusal of our Merchants who never can be acquainted with our transactions, Unless they are discovered by some Unfaithfull servant. But no one can wonder at the Hoñble Company's Affairs being made Publick when it has been a constant Practice of late Years to carry and send the Company's Books and Consultations out of the Fort and expose them to the view of the whole Town.

In answer to the third Paragraph where my opponent says, he never heard that the Merchants had refused to pay the quantity of Pepper seized at Prachv: It may only be necessary to observe that if the Gentleman's Ears were stopped; or which is more likely; if neither he, or his late Chief demanded the debt from

the Pepper Merchants in a proper manner, how should he ever hear that they refused to pay it? But it is to be hoped their Answers to our Examinations in Council the 15th. and 17th. Instant when their obligation was required have cured the Gentleman of his Deafness; and his not admitting their Refusal to be right without having rectified the wrong part of the first Obligation, will never get our Hoñble Masters satisfaction for the money they advanced and paid out of their Treasury on that Account.

The fourth Reason expresses his dislike to the List of Pepper and Cardamom Merchants Debts, as drawn out by Order of the present Chief; which is not to be wondered at; considering how it lays open and exposes his and the late Chiefs Indolence and Inattention to our Hoñble Masters Business; & his want of Knowledge in Accounts is not less flagrant when he says, the said Debts are mixed together, and ought to have been given sepearate. Is there not a Column to particularize and distinguish the several Items of each Mans Debt? and another Column for the totall sums? and does not the manner and Time of contracting those Debts, and every other necessary Circumstance appear plain & clear in one view for the notice of our Superiors? But these Particulars, and the seperation of the Old Debts from the new Accounts, are what is supposed to give the Gentleman most disgust, as things of Importance are thereby brought to light, which otherwise would lye hid and concealed from the Notice of our Superiors. He is however hereby called upon in the name of our Hoñble Masters, to deliver to this Board a specimen or sample, of the Method, he would recommend; that the same may be duely considered, and introduced as a Form for future practice, in case it shall be approved. And here it may naturally and reasonably be asked why this Gentleman who has acted as Accomptant at this Place some Years has not hitherto produced something, of this kind; and why he did not except to the List and Form of it when the same was laid before the Board two days before he signed the first, and twelve days before he signed the Second Account, or Duplicate, when all Inaccuracies might have been Rectified. The Board however will not, I hope, think it too late to receive any Instruction that may tend to the Hoñble Company's Benefit. But if the Gentlemans handy work should prove a counterpart, and of a Piece with his labours in the Factory Books, and his several Invoices and Accounts transmitted to England and to the Presidency, for which so many Excuses & Apologies have been already made; and for which many more require to be yet made, in our General Letters, it is greatly to be feared he will gain no credit by any thing that he may publish and bring forth of his own Composition.

His Fifth Paragraph in a very trifling manner finds fault with the Title of the List of Debts, because it says that only some of the Merchants Ols were taken the 31st. of Decr. last, And he seems unreasonably to expect that the present Chief should have assigned a cause why Ols were not taken from them all; when in truth the Chief was at Bombay at the time those Affairs were negotiated; and could not possibly know any thing of the matter. And every Circumstance he [...] has been by dint of Enquiry from People whose Interest and views prompt them to conceal every thing they could from him. Nor did the Gentleman whose Dissent is now remarked upon, ever offer the Chief any Information or Assistance. in tracing out these Irregularities. Neither do the Consultations in any Place Assign a Reason why Ols were not demanded from every one of the Merchants who were in the Hoñble Company's Debt. Nor has this Gentleman himself yet given a good Reason for it as will be further shewn hereafter; how then could it be expected that the present Chief should do it? The Gentleman asserts indeed confidently enough, that he and the late Chief took the Mercht^s. Olaes; but their own Consultation of the 31st. December says expressly that the Linguist was ordered to take them; and from Circumstances that has since occurred it is too plain, that not only this Business, but almost every thing else, was entirely left to the Management and direction of the said Linguist.

— JULY 1746 —

It is said in Excuse for omitting to take an Ola from Tycandy Cunially who owed a Ballance of Rupees Five hundred & twenty five (Rs. 525) being for Money advanced him in the Month of July 1743; that an Ola of his dated the 1st. of March 1743/4 for two thousand Rupees (Rup^s. 2000) was detained by the late Chief as a Security for the Debt; and that the said Ola is now in our Possession. This has been disproved by the Man himself, as well as the Linguist; both of them having declared that they remember'd nothing of the Affair. And although the Copper Ola Box has been privately broke open (when the Key of it was in the Custody of the present Accomptant, the same having been delivered to him by the Secretary publicly in Council) and ransacked to furnish (as is supposed) the Gentleman with Materials for his Dissent; yet no such Ola upon a re-search, can be found in the Box nor does the List mention that there should be any of such a date. There are indeed two Old Olaes of Tycandy Cunially's and abundance more of other Merchants, that have been long agoe discharged, and never yet given up to them; but that these two old Olas were detained on account of Tycandy Cunially's present Debt, is denied; for when the present Accomptant was lately adjusting the Merchants Accounts, he told the head Linguist, that Tycandy Cunially owed the Hon^{ble} Company six Candies of Pepper; to which the Linguist answered, that Tycandy owed nothing; nor does the Linguist say that the Old Olaes were detained on any such Account. On the Contrary he confessed to the Chief, that he remember'd nothing of the Debt, And when Tycandy himself was asked by the Chief about it in May last, he said he did not know that he owed any thing but that he would Examine his Books, as he was then going into the Country where they were kept; and promised on his Return to give the Chief an Answer. Accordingly he now acknowledges the Debt, and has paid the Principal Sum, but excuses himself from paying the Interest, because the Pepper was not demanded. This Debt it is said arose by advancing him more Money for Cardamoms than the quantity he contracted for amounted to; & was afterwards, as the Gentleman tells us, transferred to his Pepper Account but when or who consented to such a Transferr no where appears, either in the Consultations, or Factory Books, where the same ought to have been regularly minuted and Enterd. This is a convincing Proof that the Debt was forgot entirely. But admitting that the Old Olas were detained, to say nothing of the Irregularity of it, the same was in no wise agreeable to Our Hon^{ble} Masters Paragraph to the Presidency of Ship Walpole, nor could Answer the End and Purpose of it in any Respect. In a Word none of the Merchants Accounts had actually been adjusted in a proper manner when [...] [late] Olas were taken as appears plainly by the Account Current Book which the Gentleman so often mentioned in [...] Remarks in keeping; and in which not one Article [Subsequent portion lost.]
