TO THE HONBLE RICHARD BOURCHIER ESQ<sup>R</sup>.  
PRESIDENT & GOV<sup>R</sup>. & C<sup>A</sup>. COUNCIL OF BOMBAY.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We wrote you under date the 22<sup>d</sup>. Nov<sup>r</sup>. by Pattamar that the Shaftsbury having suffered some damage at the Negrais, We Intended to send her to your Settlement in Order to be refitted and then returned with a Loading of Rice Timber, & Plank; We now accordingly, dispatch her to you, and request that you will Use the Necessary Measures for furnishing her with the above-mentioned Cargo, and send her back to Us so that she may Proceed to China in Proper Season.

By a Letter lately Received from the Gentlemen at Bengal, We are informed of the safe arrival of the Stormont; she Parted Company with the Ajax & Houghton off the Arracan Shore, By Private Advices We learn that these ships were met going up the River.

The Denham is to be sent from Bengal to the West Coast to take in what surplus Pepper may be on hand; The Oxford is destined for this Place with half a Loading, We shall fill her up & Dispatch her to Europe.

We have duly received your favors of the 11<sup>th</sup>. & 24<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo, & 5<sup>th</sup>. Instant with the Consignment [of Treasure] by the Duke which arrived at a time when [ . . . wanted ] and consequently Proved a very [ . . . ].

The Scarcity of Grain still continuing We find ourselves under the Necessity of sending back the Duke to you, in Order that she may be returned with a Loading of Rice, she will sail from hence in three or four days and We request of your Honor & c<sup>a</sup>. to provide a Cargo for her, & dispatch her as Expeditiously as you can, that she may afterwards proceed to the West Coast. at the same time We must intreat you not to omit any Oppertunity which may offer of sending Grain hither, to Releive as much as Possible the Great distress of the Inhabitants.

In the Letter we did ourselves the pleasure to write you under date the 14<sup>th</sup>. September We inclosed an Indent for Packing stuff & desired your compliance therewith as we have received no Answer from you Concerning that Article, we now Repeat our Request, not having sufficient for the Package of our Bales.

Our Works being much at a Stand for want of Jaggery, We desire you will send us some by Every Conveyance to the amount of two hundred Candy as otherwise the Carrying on the Fortifications will be much Impeded.

The Shaftsbury sail'd for Bombay the 14<sup>th</sup>. Instant to be Repaired, as soon as she returns we Propose sending her to China.

The Prince Henry Packet will be dispatch'd to Europe in ten or twelve days with the agreeable News of our late success in the Field against the French.

SIR

There having been a Deficiency of Six Garse and one hundred & seventy three Mercalls of Rice in the Cargo of the Prince Henry Packet from Mazulipatam, We called upon Captain Reynolds to make good the Amount Who alledges in his defence that the Rice was weighed with Dutch Weights that it was afterwards carried to the Open Beach, where it remained for a fortnight under the care of the Conicoplys & other Persons on Shore, without being delivered to him, for which Reasons he refused to Sign the Bills of Lading any further than for the Number of Bags he received, without specifying the Weight Agreeable to Your Invoice the Bags should weigh one hundred & sixty Pounds Each, but when landed here they Poized no more than from one hundred & two to one hundred and twelve Pounds. As most of the Bags [ . . . ] turn it down above six inches and sewed there is great reason [ . . . ] must have happened at your Place [ . . . ] the Weights Enquire into this Abuse & give the Necessary directions the Gentlemen whose charge the Exporting Grain is immediately under, to act with greater circumspection in future.

Admiral Cornish arrived here the 22<sup>d</sup>. Instant with six ships of the line, He informs Us that his squadron is very much in want of Provisions and has Intreated Us to Request you in the most Pressing manner to send hither all the Salt Provisions you have belonging to His Majesty We would therefore recommend to your Honor & c<sup>a</sup>. to load as many of the Companys own Sloops as you can well spare, or in case you should find it Impracticable to send a sufficient quantity on them to freight a vessell or Vessells for that Purpose.

We likewise desire you will take every oppertunity of furnishing Us with Rice, as also some Pease.

Your Favor of the 26<sup>th</sup>. December reach'd us the 9<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo to which we shall now Reply.

Your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. are Pleased to Remark in Answer to that Part of our Letter of the 15<sup>th</sup>. October last which Related to the Ship Protector, that you are of Opinion it will be far more regular to bring her Charges to Account on our Books than on Yours, as she has been for the most Part Employed in our immediate service; We agree with you that it is altogether immaterial with respect to Our Honble Employers, on which Books her expences appear, and therefore now propose to you as the most proper Method to avoid all Confusion to [debit this Presidency and] the whole amount of her charges, so that [she may not be dis]continued on our Establishment.

We would very willingly have confirmed Captain Nesbitt in the Command of the Fort Marlbro' Schooner in Consequence of your Recommendation but he Requested our Permission to Resign.

Inclosed We transmit you an account shewing the difference between the Pay issued to the Kings and Companys Troops, & the Gratuity made to the former, together with all the Extraordinary allowances to Officers attested by Our Military Paymaster, which we hope will prove sufficiently authentic.

We wrote in General terms concerning the Timber and Plank we desired might be provided for the Shaftesbury, as all sorts would prove very acceptable, but our Immediate Intention was for your Honor &c<sup>a</sup>. to Embrace this Oppertunity of sending round the Timber & Planks long since purchased at Calicutt on our Account.

We have received your favour of the 4<sup>th</sup>. November Last, Advising us of the safe arrival of the Prince of Wales, Brittania Tilbury, Rhoda & Essex in China and of the Departure of the Pitt from thence—Our Letter of the 7<sup>th</sup>. September informed you that Mr. Pocock, had dismissed the Oxford Denham & Pocock but the Season being too farr advanced to Dispatch them to you we intended to send them to Bengal together with the Shaftesbury.

The Admiral Afterwards on his arrival here desired that the Pocock might attend the Squadron to Bombay in Quality of a Storeship and We complied with his request she returned the 2<sup>d</sup>. Instant and [we] shall [ . . . ] her to you.

The Denham [ . . . ] the former we hear proceeded to the West Coast to take in the Surplus pepper on hand there and from thence to go to Europe the Oxford returned hither the 26<sup>th</sup>. Day of March with half a Cargoe for

Europe but being then too late to dispatch her and on opportunity Offering of sending her to Manilha in her way to China, on Terms Beneficial to the Company we thought it most prudent to Embrace it and to wave [*sic*] her Europe Voyage we have accordingly Given Orders to Captain Webber to Touch at Manilha there to deliver a Cargoe put on Board here for that Market on Freight and the Persons Concerned in the Voyage have agreed with us to Ship on Board the Oxford at Manilha in Dollars the Outturn of the Cargoe which we have reason to Believe will be Twenty Thousand Pounds or upwards and to consign the same to you for the use of the Company upon condition we will repay the amount here, dollar for dollars after deduction of Freight by these means the Ships Demurrage will be eased, And you Gentlemen at the same time furnished with Money and Before Advice Arrives of the Consignment having been made, We hope to receive Ample Supplys from Europe when we shall be in a Condition, to reimburse the sum which may be advanced by the Freighters this is the only Expedient we could fall upon to procure a stock for you for so Great is our present want of Cash, the Remittances from Bengall having fallen very Short of our expectation, and the Presidency, of Bombay having Contributed but little to our Assistance that we have lately been Obligated to make use of the 32 Chests of Treasure landed from the Shaftesbury, and also to appropriate the Gold Dust sent from Bombay in order to be coined here and the value forward<sup>d</sup>. to you in Dollars in part of the Ship Griffins stock, to the defraying [of] expenses on the [coasts] which from the Maintenance of [ . . . ] Army as we have been under the Necessity to support, prove extreamly heavy it is with Great Reluctance we have been Compelled to this step being very sensible of the Great Advantage the Company must necessarily reap by having a Considerable fund in China and nothing but the Exigency of our Affairs should have forced us to it.

Bombay has formed a Line of Blockade, by sea so that all succours are cutt off; If our Reinforcements this year are any ways Considerable, and the French Fleet not superior to Mr. Stevens we make no Doubt but that Pondicherry will fall.

April And the Latter was speedily to follow, inclosed you will receive copys of the Receipts for that Treasure.

We also transmit to you a Letter addressed to you from the President & Council of Bombay.

The Cash put on Board those two ships We hope will arrive safe with you, as it must of Course prove a very welcome supply.

The Pocock being ready to proceed to China We now dispatch her to you.

We have not as yet received any advice of our expected China Men when they do come you may depend on our giving them as early a Dispatch as possible. Captain Newton Mr. Lane and his family with two French Officers & fifteen French Prisoners take their Passage on the Pocock, We are sorry to say we find it impracticable to Prevent People Going to Europe by way of China the Prisoners we desire you will send home on such ships as you shall think Most Convenient.

We have received the Disagreeable advice Both from Mr. Priston at Moco Moco and Mr. Norris who was at Croe of the certain Loss of Fort Marlbro and that all the other settlements on the West Coast [ . . . ] to be in the hands of the French who it is most probable wou'd carry the Companys people all off from the Place which it is reasonable to Judge wou'd be abandon'd when the Enemy had done what mischief they were able; However we have thought proper to Order Capt<sup>n</sup>. Baker in the London Schooner to call upon the Coast at the Most safe place that he may Obtain Intelligence if the Enemy is gone and in what Condition the Honble Companys Settlements are left, that in case it should happen, any remain in our possession where some of the Companys servants not fallen into the hands of the French should still reside. He may go there to Learn their situation and afford all the assistance he can by taking on Board his Vessell you and all the Companys & Your Own Effects which he may have room for, if you are under the apprehension either of being distress'd or Unable to keep the place you are in with safety which we are very sorry to find the cruel and Treacherous Behaviour of the Malays reported to us has Given too much room to Doubt of. We therefore hope if any of the Companys people yet Remain on the West Coast in Dangerous Circumstances Capt. Baker May Relieve them and bring them to this Coast to wait till Opportunity Offers for us to Reestablish the Companys possession on the Island of Sumatra with Security. Wherefore when you leave the shore you should cause the English Colours to be fixed there and signify to the Inhabitants that tho' you quit the place it is only to bring a Sufficient force to maintain the Company's Right [to it which you assert] by fixing their standard.

April and the Latter was speedily to follow.

The Consignment of Gold dust you were pleased to forward hither turned out in our Mint Ten thousand Nine hundred & Twelve Pagodas four fanams And seventy Cash (10912-4-70) which at A.R. 368  $\frac{3}{4}$  % Pagodas made Forty thousand one hundred & fifty six Arcot Rupees ten Anaes and six pice (40156-10-6) and we have agreeable to your Honr. & C<sup>t</sup>. Request Granted Bills on the Presid<sup>t</sup>. & Council of Fort William in favor of Captain Edwards for that sum.

Nothing but the most urgent necessity should have induced us to deprive you of such parts of the Military Stores as were Landed here, Originally designed for your Settlement; Our intended attack on Pondicherry will we hope evince we had some reason for so doing. We observe the manner in which

Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &<sup>t</sup>. have been pleased to fix the destination of the several ships and immediately Gave Orders on receipt of your Letter of the 6<sup>th</sup>. November for thirty Tuns of Redwood to be split for the Onslow Your last letter however mentions your having procured a sufficient quantity for her, you may depend upon our using our utmost Endeavours to supply you as Amply as Possible with this Article for to Compleat the Tonnage of your next Years Shipping.

The different supplys of Money with which your Hon<sup>r</sup>. &<sup>t</sup>. have lately furnish<sup>d</sup>. us & the advice you are pleased to Give us of your intention to send more if Possible deserve our particular attention We return you many thanks for such Marks of your readiness to assist us and hope the Company's affairs will soon feel the Good Effects of it.

You will be informed from the Select Committee of the Destination of the Fort William Schooner.

The Falmouth is at present taking in Stores for the seige when the Prince Edward arrives we shall be able to Judge in what manner she can be Best employed.

We have presented Mr. Brohiers Bill on Mr. Call for acceptance which has been of [ . . . ] the time limited for payment expires we shall [ . . . ] Protested and shall thence [ . . . ] We observe what you write of Your intention to send 50 chests of Opium for the West Coast on the Leopard which you Purpose should touch here about the 20<sup>th</sup>. of this month to take on Board a proper person to have charge of Disposeing of it for the Company and we will take care to provide for the same but we must remark to you that we understand the Meaning of the Company in taking this article into their hands to have been principaly to defray the charge of their settlements at Nattal and Tappanooley and to that end we are told it was proposed to have opium sold on their Exclusive account. But not to such people who had the care of Cultivating pepper for amongst them was it once introduced it would be so far from Being a means of Leading them to preserve their Plantations that it wou'd be a sure method of corrupting their manners & involving them in Vice to the sure destruction of their Gardens and for which Reason it has always been a Rule to prohibit pepper Planters from the use of this Pernicious drug leaving it only to those whose avocations were less liable to be insured by it or indeed whose service we have no occasion for to such therefore we may order your Cargoe to be sold which will serve to show we preserve a Commerce with that Coast and at the same time Instructions shall be Given [to the Leading] Men at our Settlements, shall be assured [ . . . ] of soon [ . . . ] to reestablish them and [ . . . ] use their authority to oblige the pepper Planters to keep their Gardens in order not by the Distribution of Opium but by promise of the advantage they will receive from the pepper they may have ready to supply these ships we may be able to send thither and endeavours shall be used to prevail on the natives to provide such Materials as may be necessary to rebuild what the French may have destroyed for the above purposes We therefore think the stock of opium you put on Board the Leopard will be full sufficient without encouraging private Traders to export any for that market more especially as a quantity is lately Gone from hence which with what you send is as much as can be needfull for the present and more would not only impede the Companys Interest but distress those who may hereafter be appointed to settle there.

The Baron De Vasserits appointment whilst On our Establishment were fifteen shillings & [six pence] ₤ Day as Captain of Horse and six Rupees [ . . . ] the Field, Besides which he receives [ . . . ] cloathing of the Troops the [ . . . ] One Pagoda & an half ₤ month the Court of Directors further Ordered that he should have the preference in any Contract for feeding the Horses, and he accordingly did feed them for some time, But lately upon our Being Desirous of putting that charge upon a Regular and less expensive footing he declined the contract.

The Packet from the Court of Directors addressed to Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>t</sup>. & mentioned in Mr. Secretary James Letter to have been sent hither in the Onslow, we imagine was enclosed in a Packet directed to the Chief and Factors at Anjengo which we duely forwarded.

We some time ago received a Letter from the Reverend Mr. Northcote requesting us to Grant him a Certificate shewing the appointments of his Majestys Caplains [*sic*] doing duty on this Coast to enable him to recover some Arrears whilst the Detachment of Artillery was at your Presidency in Answer to which we Informed him that we cou'd grant no other Certificate than just to acquaint your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>t</sup>. that the Kings Chaplains received a Monthly Gratuity of Pags. 14-23-73 and the same Batta when in the Fild [*sic*] as a Captain, that we cou'd not Give him any satisfaction with respect to his Demand on You; being entirely strangers thereto, but that we wou'd Transmitt you a copy of his Letter which we now do, in order that Your Hon<sup>r</sup>. & C<sup>t</sup>. may settle with him in such manner as to you shall appear most proper.
