May, acquainting us that agreeable to their former advices they had intended dispatching to us the Winchelsea and Montfort with the remainder of the detachment design'd for Us, but as they were oblig'd to send them on Freight to Surat, they dispatch the Protector, Commodore James to Us in Stead and put on board her 59 Europeans and two Compys of seapoys containing 100 Men each, a List of whom with account provisions &ca. supply'd them they enclose as also a List of Officers on that Establishment sent on command to Us, who are to be promoted as vacancies may happen according to the Rank therein placed. That Captain Andrew Armstrong is to have the command of the Seapoys they send us, but that is not to prevent his promotion in the Military. That as the Officers sent on command to us made a voluntary tender of their service they desire We will promote them as vacancys may happen with us if it can can be done without prejudice to others of the same Rank on Our Establishment, that in case the Gentlemen at Tellicherry and Anjengo should send us any Topasses they are to be incorporated in the Company commanded by Captain Forbes. That they send us by the Protector two hundred and fifty thousand (250,000) Rupees which they desire us to forward to Bengal, also the amot of Bill for 25000 Rupees on Gocane Pusotom of this place that they also send us by the Protector one hundred three Inch Plank that they desire the Protector may be return'd to them as soon as possible so as to arrive there in August, that they proposed sending us some Gunpowder, but desist because the Gentlemen at Bengal having acquainted them that they intended to supply Us.

Fort St. David.

No. 109 and No. 110 from the Deputy Gov. and Council of Fort St. David, the first dated the 7th. Instant advising the arrival of the Protector Commadore James from Bombay with 56 Military and two hundred and thirty Seapoys which they have landed, but as the Deputy Gov. informs them the Major has form'd a New plan for the disposal of the expected Troops they shall wait our directions, as well as in relation to 40 Men of Captn. Zeigler's Company which was forc'd back there, that one of the Boats with the Detachment going to DeveCotah which was missing, was taken up at sea by the Elizabeth Captain Massey, and another with Captain Zeigler was driven to Sadrass. The other Letter is dated the 8th. Instant acquainting us that in receit, of Our Letter of the 5th, they dispatch'd the Protector to us with the Mility and Seapoys she brought together with 40 Men of Captain Zeiglers Party that were drove back fm. DeveCotah & they have directed Captn. James in case he shd. meet ye. St. George in his passage to take out the Mility on board her & they have sent an Order to Captain Robinson after he has delivered the Men to proceed directly thither as they are in great want of the Money and Stores on board her that they desire our further directions in regard to landing the Recruits from Europe. That Captn. Gaupp takes his passage on the Protector. That the Bombay seapoys being in great want of money their Military Paymaster had advanced them eighty Rupees.

Order for delivery of Treasure &cs. # Protect. Bombay officers cannot be promoted in our Establishment.

Paper provided in China turns out dear. An Order is now sign'd to Captain William James for the delivery of the Military Treasure and plank on board the Protector for this Presidency.

AGREED that the Gentlemen at Bombay be advised that we cannot promote their officers on Our Establishment without disgusting the whole Corps which inconvenience we foresaw and took notice of when we requested a supply of officers, but that we shall be very ready to serve them on every other occasion.

It is signify'd to them in the said Letter that Mr. Richard Fairfield had desired to resign his office as Alderman and that you had accepted his Resignation and then immediately follows your Request, that the President and Council will elect some other person in his stead, the obvious sense of which seems to be that Mr. Richard Fairfields place was become vacant by your acceptance of his Resignation, a power which does not appear to be granted to any one by the Charter and which on the present occasion there is the less reason to assume as there is an express provision made by the Charter the words are if the said Mayor or any of the Aldermen shall remove to any of the said Company's other settlements &ca. the place or office of every such Mayor or Aldermen shall be void By which it seems pretty plain that on Mr. Fairfields Removal to Fort St. David his place was vacated of course, for these Reasons I am directed by the President and Council to return you the said Letter (and it accordingly accompanies this) as in their opinion the above recited passages in it are inconsistant with the Charter and therefore improper to be registered with their proceedings. Mr. Secretary Dupré having address'd a Letter to the Mayor and Aldermen dated the 28th, past, they order me to write your Honour &c^a, that he has communicated some partial Remarks which you have been pleased to make upon a Letter which I had the Honour to write to you the 7th, past, by their Order, and what is yet more extraordinary, that by your direction he has sent back that Letter, with an Intimation that you think it improper to be registered with your proceedings, but that this might not be done without offering some reason, they take notice you have been pleased to excerp [sic] the last passage of my Letter, which your opinion pronounces inconsistent with his Majesty's Charter, after having overlook'd the first part thereof without a Reference to which, it is by no means canded [sic] to pass any opinion on the last part.

I am directed by the Court to acquaint your Honour &ca. that it would be highly improper to admit any matter a subject of Dispute with you, which relates to the authority with which it is vested as a Court of Record and a Corporation, because there is no matter of Right granted to your Honour &ca. by his Majesty's Charter to impugn those Resolutions, which the Court does think proper to preserve for the due support to the authority thereof. But at the same time I am directed to say that the Indispensable Obligation which the

Court is laid under to defend (when attack'd) that publick authority which is constituted to maintain and the purpose of the present Judges to transmit the same intire [sic] to their successors (lest the many good ends for which this Court has been establish'd should by any means be frustrated) makes it necessary that your Honour &c. should receive an answer to your Secretary's Letter. That the Letter wrote by Mr. Rchard Fairfield to the Court as well as, that which I had the honour to write to you are both proper, is a matter which the Court has a right to determine for itself, even altho' your Honour &c. should still remain of a different opinion and therefore I am directed to return my former Letter, with this, that you may still have an opportunity (if you judge it proper) to Register both with your Proceedings (as the best means of remedying that palpable Mutilation which your Secretary by your direction) has been pleased to make in my former Letter.

The Court is willing to impute the unbecoming manner in which it is treated upon this occasion to the Multiplicity of Business in which your Honour &ca. are engag'd, because no doubt can be made, but a more deliberated consideration must have produc'd a far different Resolution, but I am desired to say that you will now have an opportunity to reconsider this matter, and at the same time you will be thoroughly convinc'd that if the Letter from your Secretary is entered amongst your Proceedings (which is not to be doubted) and if the Letter which I had the Honour to write to you is not entered, that this affair is treated by you in a most disingenuous manner and to convince you of this at once, there is nothing more necessary than that you will take the Trouble to compare both these Letters together, in that which I had the honour to write to you, it is expressly mention'd that Mr. Fairfields Resignation was accepted of in consequence of his Representation that he had received Orders to repair to a station in the service of the Honble Company at Fort St. David, and the Court are of opinion that this does not in any sense clash with that part of the Charter which Mr. Secretary does transcribe in his Letter, whilst it preserves. that just and necessary Respect which the former Judges of the Mayors Court (in the same situation with Mr. Fairfield) thought themselves oblig'd to shew to that Corporation, of which they had the honour to be Members, a Respect which every Member of a Court of Record instituted by his Majesty's authority, must think it his indispensible Duty to preserve for that authority Now in Mr. Secretarys Letter there is not the least mention of the representation made by Mr. Fairfield nor any reason given for his desiring to resign. This is the true state of the case and the bare mention is sufficient to put it in a proper light.

I am ordered to add that it is to the Honble the East India Company alone that the Mayors Court are to give an account of this matter.

Honble Sir & Sirs

In consequence of your Orders to the Committee you have been pleased to appoint for carrying on the Honble Company's Works with economy, and for considering the several matters complained of in Colonel Scotts Letter of the 6th. Ulto. and the Replys made thereto by Charles Boddam Esqr. Paymaster and Alexandr. Wynch Esqr. Storekeeper, I take this Liberty to lay before the Honble Board my sentiment on their contents.

I must first beg leave to represent that I humbly conceive that Col¹. Scotts Assertion of the Works being carried on in an Expensive manner (partly from the Materials being furnish'd by the Paymaster at his own price except^g. Wall Bricks without check on Controul) is justly grounded.

The accounts of supplys of Bricks plainly demonstrate that all sorts of Bricks out of the common Demensions are charg'd at an exorbitant price, the Well Bricks for Instance do not measure above 60 Inches Cube & are charg'd 100 Pagodas Dack whilst the common standard Bricks measure upwards of

91 Inches and are only charg'd Pags. 66. 24. Page Lack according to Agreement at St. David. It cannot be said that those Well Bricks are better burnt or require more Firewood to burn them than the Wall Bricks, but on the contrary they do not require 2/3ds. of the quantity of it, notwithstanding which they have been for the most part the worst burnt Bricks of any received to the Works.

And all these (charged at this exhorbitant Rate) are burnt in the Kilns in common with the Wall Bricks, with a small addition of Firewood for the large Bricks and consequently this exorbitant charge is evident in all the accounts, let the consumption be never so little.

The Bricks mention'd by the Paymaster to have been enlarg'd to an extraordinary size by order of Col¹. Scott, are only to the standard Demensions, by Act of Parliament in England, and such as Mr. Boddam agreed with Mr. Robins to make and deliver at 1500 \$\Psi\$r. a Pagoda at Fort St. David; notwithstanding this Agreement the Moulds wearing away the new Moulds made to replace them were kept at the size of those last worn out, and the Bricks were reduced again to near their old demensions in 18 Month's time.

Those ordered to be made for carrying on the Works at this place were all made of the reduced size and continuing to be made so, I represented it to the Honble President the 20th. August last, copy of which Letter is here annex'd, and Mr. Boddam's Letter to me for new Moulds, which were accordingly made, but (notwithstanding the allowances for shrinking) I am sorry to say many of them fall still short of the proper Dimensions, by the Brickmakers artfully scooping the clay out of the Moulds with their Hand, as they do not make use of any Boards for scraping off the surplus clay which rises above it when full, this is Demonstrable by the Bricks now brought to the works, musters of which must beg leave to lay before the Board as a proof of it.

The advantage which the Paymaster claims to have had at S^t. David of cutting Firewood free of Custom to the Renter of DeveCotah, I humbly conceive ought to have reduced the price of Bricks there instead of augmenting it for in 1748 and 1749 the Paymaster supply'd the Honble Company with 1800 Bricks for a Pagoda & since DeveCotah was taken, their price was encreas'd and the works were only supplied with 1700, till M^r. Robins reduced the Quantity to 1500 for a Pagoda on condition they should be of the standard Dimension.

I am sensible the Expence of burning a Lack of Bricks here is greater than at S^t. David, but I humbly conceive that the Honble Company has not been credited with all the Fire wood which fell in the November storm 1752, as I am unacquainted with the quantity or by whom it was gather'd, I humbly leave to your superiour consideration.

The Reply of the Paymasters being constantly in advance to the Honble Company in procuring the Materials wanted for their works, I must beg leave to represent first that I humbly conceive the exclusive Right he has had of supplying the Inhabitants with Bricks and Chunam at what price he pleased has made him ample amends for any sums he may have advanc'd on that Manufacture, the rest of the Materials such as Timber plank palmeiras &ca. Bought out of the shipping have been engross'd by him (not entirely for the works) as the Inhabitants have been also supplied with what they have wanted that the Honble Company has been for these two years past, constantly in advance to the Paymaster is demonstrable, and the Honble Board has herewith an Abstract of the Ballance remaining in his hands (Monthly) from the 1st. of May 1752 to the 31st. December 1753 by which it will appear that for above half that time, those Ballances exceeded any supply'd the works ever received.

Another Objection to the advance the Paymaster mentions he is in, is that several Materials amounting in the Lists annex'd to Pags. 3189. 16. 41 have been purchas'd at the Banksall, Buzar or within the Bounds, and charg'd to the works at his own price such as country Timber, Plank, Redwood, Mallacca Boards and all the small articles mention'd in the said Lists, on which there has been little or no advance, as they have been always bought and supplied as wanted and never any quantity laid in stock, and therefore has run no risque of his Money in this particular, no more than in all the rest of his supplies, as he has had always the Materials by him as a security for it, neither has any stock of any particular sort of Materials, remain'd long on his hands (excepting Timber) with which the Honble Company's stores have been furnish'd lately, as it may appear in the General Accounts of supplys, which altho' mention'd by him as inconsiderable amount to no less than Pagodas 27,857. 35. 25. and whether those Materials have been charg'd at the lowest price they could be had, I humbly leave to your superiour Judgement, but must observe that the Batta on the Fanams, which is not taken notice of in the purchase of Materials or of the Bullock hire of Bricks, sand, Clay, &ca. has been a very considerable article and an Encrease of charge to the works amounting to Pagodas 982. 19 in Two Years time.

The Cooley hire is certainly paid in fanams and cast up at 36 to the pagoda, the accounts evince that Circumstance and it swells the workmanship to near 20 \$\mathbb{P}\$ Cent more than if it was cast up at 43 the Current Exchange and whether the Honble Company is credited for it or not it has encreas'd the apparent charge in two years as \$\mathbb{P}\$ abstract annex'd to Pagodas 3861. 31.

The pay of Labourers mention'd by Mr. Boddam to swell the Honble Company's works to the Exhorbitant sums they amount to by it's having been encreas'd by Mr. Robins to half as much more than before, I am sorry I am oblig'd to contradict and assert that no pay but the Overseer of the works from 13 to 15 Pagodas, and the principal overseers or workmen distinguishing themselves by skill or activity were ever encreas'd, as an example to others and to creat [sic] Emulation among them.

Some women cooleys at S^t. David who formerly brought a small Basket to the Works which could hardly contain 5 or 6 Bricks were paid ½ a fanam a day, but some of those Women having been employ'd to bring Bricks by Tale from Tevenapatam to the Works, brought considerable Loads and Earn'd two fanams a day whereupon it was thought proper to employ them to bring Ground for the Glacis at 1 fanam a day, provided they made use of large Baskets, which the Overseers were ordered to see filled and this is all the encrease of pay there has been, and much to the advantage and forwardness of the Honble Company's Works. The Paymasters Books will evince the Truth of what I have now the honour to advance.

All the Bullock Hire of the Chunam is paid in Fanams & the Batta on the Exchange of the pagoda amot, for these two years to Pags. 326. 24. which when added to 5 \Re Ct. swells this article to Pagods. 631. 24.

Some of the best whole Bricks and extraordinary good ones, I humbly assert have been carried to the Inhabitants, thô very fit for the Honble Company's use. Mr. Boddam seems to call it an injurous [sic] assertion and adds that two Bricklayers are constantly at the Kilns to pick out the best Bricks for the Works. In answer to which I must beg leave to say that the works themselves evince that those Bricklayers have not done their Duty for which I have often threatned to punish them. But when I consider that those people could not be accountable for what Exchange might be made in transporting of the Bricks, from the Brick Kilns to the works which are near 1 Mile \frac{3}{4} from the Town. I could only attribute the fault on the People who brought them, for the Bricklayers have no power to hinder the best Bricks from being carried to the Inhabitants, nor cannot know for certain whether the Bullock loaded with the

Bricks they so pick are really carried to the works or not, I do not assert possitively that this is the case, but that it may so happen is certain & that many Lacks of bad Bricks have been employ'd in the Works for want of better, which would have been rejected, had we had plenty of those Materials, the truth of this the Honble Company is well acquainted with by the Letters wrote to the Court of Directors by Mr. Robins and Coll. Scott on their arrivals in India. Mr. Boddam may be acquainted with the irregular proceedings of his servants, but that this is the truth I have the honour to assure the Honble Board.

An Encrease of Charge I most humbly beg leave to lay before you which is that whilst this place was a subordinacy, the carriage of Bricks was only charg'd 4 fanams to the Company, the Paymaster paying 7 fanams out of their Profits for every pagodas worth 'till June 1752 when the whole Bullock here was thrown on the Honble Company's account which has swell'd the Expence of 1 Lack of Bricks delivered to the works of Pags. 12. 34 and which for these two years past has amounted to Pags. 1246. The Paymasters Books for 1750, 1751, 1752, 1753 and of this year will evince the Truth of this additional charge.

As to the Storekeeper supplying the Materials to the Honble Company at the price he has sold them to the Inhabitants of the place is certainly at his own price and without check, for I have not yet been empower'd to object to the price of any Materials so furnish'd by him or the Paymaster, tho' I humbly conceive Colonel Scott never meant that those so supply'd by the Storekeeper were charg'd at an exorbitant Rate but that it might be the case, if no check is appointed to inspect into it, is what I humbly conceive he meant.

I must beg leave to represent to the Honble Board that by the Orders of the Honble Court of Directors The Paymasters accounts of the disbursements for the Works are to be inspected by the Engineer and no payments allowed the Paymaster but on his having passed his account, this was the case 'till July last since which time I have not seen any account of the Paymasters consequently do not know what he charges the Company with Monthly. It is true I give in accounts to the Honble Board but whether the Paymasters accounts agree with those I know not, and I humbly conceive the Honble Compys Instructions are, that he is to deliver me his accounts of payments which if conformable to the check are to be countersign'd by me before this are passed all which I humbly submit to your superiour Judgement.

The method ordered to be pursued by your Hon. &c. for supplying the Honble Companys Works for the future with Materials purchas'd at prime Cost will I am perswaded greatly lessen their Expence and will I hope in all other Respects answer the views Colonel Scott had, when he wrote his Letter to the Honble Board.

As my Observations in these Gentlemens Letters proceed from no other motive than the Zeal I have for the Interest of the Honble Company's service and my Duty in the employment I have the Honour to serve them, I hope they will meet with a favourable reception from the Honble Board here and from the Honble Court of Directors in England.

HONBLE SIR

THE Dimensions of Bricks at Fort S^t. David in 1750 being scarce above $1\frac{1}{2}$ Inch thick $8\frac{1}{2}$ Inches long & $4\frac{1}{4}$ Inches broad, M^r. Robins ordered that the Moulds new made should be of the standard establish'd by Parliament in England, which is that the Bricks should when Burnt be 9 Inches long $4\frac{1}{2}$ broad and $2\frac{1}{4}$ thick whereupon M^r. Boddam as Paymaster said he could not make the Bricks of those Demensions without a further encrease of price which was allowed by M^r. Robins as follows.

That the Paymaster should supply the Company with 1500 standard, instead of 1700 undersiz'd Bricks for a Pagoda which the Company had before, and according. they were made of the proper demensions for some time but the Moulds wearing away by use, the new Moulds made to replace them were kept at the demensions of those last worn out, and consequently the Bricks deminish'd to their former size before the Enhanc'd price.

The Bricks ordered to be made for this settlement by your order for carrying on the Works here (and their size being omitted in your order) were all made of the old reduced Demensions but kept up to the enhanc'd price, & I am sorry to say that my Remonstrances to Mr. Boddam on the badness and smallness of his Bricks having been ineffectaul, I ordered some Moulds to be made of the proper demensions, but he refused them and sent me word that he would make his own Moulds, I think it therefore my Duty to remonstrate to you sir the deficiency of this article which is of the utmost consequence to remedy, as the badness of the Bricks we have hitherto recd if continued to be made as they are at present will endanger the Works they are employ'd in and may greatly forward the reduction of the place if beseig'd as Works carried on with bad materials will be easily ruined.

THE Well Bricks are also reduced greatly from their true proportion without the Reduction of their price, I must therefore beg Sir that this article may be considered, and that you would be pleased to order that they may measure 9 Inches in length, $4\frac{1}{2}$ Inches Bredth at the broadest end and $2\frac{1}{2}$ Inches thick, As to their small and it must diminish according to the Diameter of the Well they are made for.

Having caus'd Moulds to be made of the standard dimensions and of those of the Bricks now made, I take the Liberty to lay them before you, that you may by ocular Demonstration be convinc'd of the Truth I have now the honour to advance to you.

These defects being properly remedy'd will reduce the Expence of the Works intended to be carried on here of at least 26,000 Pagodas and will save upwards of 63,000 Parahs of chunam, an article the much more to be attended to as it is difficult to be procured and that I foresee that the delays the Works will meet with, will proceed chiefly from the Scarcity of it.

As I have no other view in my representation but of doing my Duty and the Interest of the Honble Company's Service, I hope they will meet with your approbation being with profound respect.

HONBLE SIR

As you were pleas'd to tell me last Sunday that Mr. Boddam had accused me of having caused the Workmen to be paid $\frac{1}{2}$ in Rice for these twelve Months past, I must beg leave to represent to you that as this accusation may insinuate some disadvantageous Ideas of my Integrity in carrying on the Honble Company's Work, I must therefore Justify myself of it and demonstrate to you Sir the rectitude of my conduct in this particular.

In January and February 1753 Rice being scarce and very dear, the Workmen and Cooleys surrounded me several times on the Works and in a Clamarous manner complain'd they were starving for want of Rice, that it was true they were paid regularly but that they could get no Rice for their Money, Whereupon I took the liberty to apply to you to order some Rice to be served out of the Company's Godowns to the people to which you were pleased to reply that there would be great losses to the Company by the Knavery of the Conicoplys and that it could not be conveniently done. Whereupon finding the Complaints encreased daily, I caus'd Rice to be bought out of the Compys Godowns and

Banksall and to be served out to the People every other night at the Buzar price according to their Request, telling at the same time every person on the Works that they were at liberty to take either Rice or Money when they thought proper, but the scarcity of Grain made them prefer to take it rather than Money, to this must be added that being served Rice on the Works they went immediately home with it and dress'd it for use, whereas had they been paid Money, they must have gone to the Buzar near $\frac{1}{2}$ or $\frac{2}{3}$ of a Mile from the Works to have bought it, and then the lower sort of Cooleys being 2 or 4 to a double fanam, took up some time to divide it, and the number of people making it late before they could be all paid. The serving Rice on the Works was an ease and indulgence to them of which they were very sensible, and would have been glad to have been paid so, had not Mr. Boddams conicoply by his Masters Orders gone on the Works the 1st. Instant and Harangued the people, and desired they would not take any More Rice for their Hire, as they had done every other day this 15 month's past, to which no doubt the people through fear of so great and powerfull a Man as Mr. Boddam's Conicoply is readily consented, as Grain is cheap at present.

I must further take the liberty to present you a General account of all the Workmen and Cooleys which have been employ'd daily on the Works by which it will appear that the serving Rice to those people far from having been detrimental to the service has been the means of procuring a greater number of Workmen and Cooleys than We had before—for in

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

I received a Letter of the 19th. ulto. from Mr. Dupré Secretary with an Extract of a General Letter from the Honble Court of Directors mentioning the difference in the weight of Rupees.

I am extreamly sorry to hear of such a complaint and shall do all that lays in my power to rectify it (tho' at the same time must say it is impossible, for the method of coining in this country will not admit of it) was I to have Engines and other Materials proper for the art of coining am certain I could make the Rupees all of a proper weight, but then to bring these people to make use of the same would be out of my power as they go by custom which is a thing I mention'd to your Honours in some of my former Letters and am certain you must be sensible of the same.

I have, since I received the above mention'd Lre weigh'd four thousand Rupees singular, and have found no more than two Grains, or two and a half more or less, Difference, in each, and really as I have said before the manner of coining will not admit of bringing them all of an equal Weight.

The List from the Honble Court of Directors mentions some (tho' few) to weigh from twelve to eighteen Grains more, I am sorry to hear it, and will use the utmost Dilligence to rectify it as far as lays in my power.

By one of the ships there was delivered to the Mint nine hundred and eighty four Ounces of silver markt Estimates, but a different sort from what we formerly received, I have made an Assay of several of the same and they turn out worse four penny weight and three Quarters, whereof the others (or what we formerly used to receive) used to turn out two penny weight and a half worse, I shall be glad to know, as there is such deficiency in the Touch, how I am to receive them into the Mint.

I have given Orders not to let them be melted as I should chuse some of the Gentlemen in the Honble Compys service to inspect the same and likewise the process of coining in the Mint.

Your complyance to the above Request will greatly oblige he who is with the greates [sic] Esteem.

That the Pollygars are quite negligent of their duty and act as if they were not subject to any Government or controll which he desires may be redress'd that he has since his last advices rais'd 150 seapoys but he has no arms for them. The second is dated the 4th. Instant and acknowledges the receit of our Letter of the 27th. Ulto. to which he promises due regard, and advises that Morarow has separated from the Enemy at Seringham who are endeavouring to obtain his Return but he refuses unless they pay him six Lacks which are due to him & advance him six more. That he is advised great discontents have arisen among the Seapoys at Chellumbrum for want of their pay, that they desist daily but yet the Enemy find means to enlist others by fair promises. AGREED that eight thousand four hundred & five Pags. fourteen fanams and forty eight cash (8405. 14. 48) be advanc'd the Commissary to defray the Charges of the Troops abroad, to compleat which sum the Import Wareho.kr. pays in five thousand four hundred and five Pagodas fourteen fanams and forty eight Cash (5405. 14. 48) for Rupees sold.

THE petition of Paul Polier De Bottens.

SHEWETH

That the losses he has been oblig'd to suffer of his own money advanced for the cloathing of his Company of Swiss soldiers upon those Men that have been killed or Dead of their wound or made prisoners in the different Engagements where his Company has been, obliged him to request that the Honble the

President and Council will be pleas'd to order that the 2 pence which are retain'd for the Captains on account of the cloathings of the soldiers be paid him for the soldiers killed dead of their wounds or made prisoners of war or dead or lost in prison untill the end of the Year accounting from the day that the sd. soldiers have been cloath[ed] as well for the pass'd [sic] as for the future by which means he will not be oblig'd any more to make war at his own Expence, and the said Captain humbly presumes to make this request by reason that it is not usual in any service in Europe, that the Captains suffer for the losses that happen in Engagements and for the service of their Masters, on the contrary they have in all services sufficient gratifications to make them amends not only for the losses in action but also for those they may suffer by Mortality or desertion of their Men which hitherto they have not had in the Honble Compys. service at least the Swiss Captains notwithstands, some of the Honble the Directors did give to understand to the said Captain that he would always draw for the cloathings compleat and that the Honble the Court of Directors intimated that it was a favour to him that they had pass'd him 160 Men which he had brought to England instead of 140 he should have brought according to his agreement the said Captain therefore humbly prays the Honble the Govr. and Council to consider that the same favour upon the terms he is paid for the Cloathings of his Company which is after the pay list of every month for the Effective Men is entirely to his disadvantage and evident loss because the more men he has brought to India the more he has been obliged to cloath and the more there is dead or deserted whose cloathing have been a clear loss to him for if he had done as Messrs. Chabbert and Schaub and had brought to England no more than 110 Men instead of 140 they should have brought he would have reap'd the benefit thereof for that the advance he has been oblig'd to make in Bengal of his own money would not have been so considerable as well as the Mortallity and desertion and for that the Honble Court of Directors would have treated him as they did Messrs. Chabbert and Schaub and remitted him as to them the moneys they had advanced for the raising of the 30th. Men they wanted in the agreed for compliment. The said Captain also prays the Honble the Govr. & Council that they will please to order that he may be repaid the charges he has been at in the Month of January last for the transporting of the cloathings of his Company from Fort St. David to Tritchinopoly amounting to 10 pagodas of which he has not been able to obtain the payment in the Army under pretence that it was not known if the Honble Company must pay for it or not. The said Captain also begs leave to represent to the Honble the Govr. and Council that Major Lawrence finding himself in a bad state of health and oblig'd to quit the camp to retire himself to Trit? chinopoly did leave to the said Captain as senior the Command of the Army leaving him no other orders than to do and act as he should judge proper and necessary for the service, that he was going to Tritchinopoly to take care of his Health and that he would not trouble himself with any thing untill his health would permit him to do his Duty the aforesaid Captain Commandant from the 18th. April till the 12th. May on which day he had the honour to command in the General Engagement which happened that day between the two armies and which thanks to the Lord & to the bravery and good conduct of our Troops was terminated to the honour of the Arms of the Honble Company, the said Captain then recd. two wounds, besides a deal Ball upon the left knee, which oblig'd him after having conducted the army under the canon of Tritchinopoly to retire himself into the Fort to be cured of his wounds and reestablish his health, and that the said Captain has not recd. for the time he has commanded as chief the benefit of the Table allowed by the Honble Company to the Chief Commander as well as several other perquisites, wherefore the said Captain prays the Honble the Govr. & Council that the Batta of 15 Rupees for each day (which has been allowed to other Captains who have commanded in Chief) may be allowed him for the days he has commanded the army.

Honble Sir & Sirs

I am sorry for the occasion of troubling this Board a second time, but however averse, I may be to disputation of any sort, there is an absolute necessity for replication when characters are called in Question, not only to justify as well as display ill grounded assertions, but sometimes also to examine the motives for such a Behaviour that mine in particular is aim'd at in the Letter now under consideration, I think too plainly appears thro the whole, I mean Captn. Brohiers, which is not only an answer to that I address'd the Board with some days past, and was a reply to Colonel Scotts on the same subject, but also an endeavour to lay more odium on the Paymaster's conduct, tho' I am persuaded the little concern you are sensible I can possibly have in carrying on the Honble Company's Works with Dispatch or even economy, will induce you to think with me an answer quite facile and clear, however I shall not let pass unregarded any paragraph contained in this further Complaint.

Mr. Brohier conceives that Coll. Scott's assertion for the works being carried in an expensive manner is justly grounded, and that it partly proceeds from the Materials being furnish'd by the Paymaster at his own rate, Without Check or Controul, to which I answer as before, that I have ever charg'd the lowest Town price, and if a profit has been got on part of them it did not proceed from charging at my Own Price without Check or Controul (as is designedly suggested) but their being purchas'd at a distance in such manner, that would afford a small premium and yet not be over the Market, for tis not to be supposed, but that there are perquisites in all Employs, the Paymaster's as well as I presume there are in being Captain of the Train; the Honble Company, this Board and all the World knows it, and when they are obtain'd by Industry and not to the detriment of constituents are lawfull and just.

In answer to the paragraph relating to Bricks at the rate they are charg'd to the Company, I get little or nothing by them, and however extravagantly dear they may be thought, it will be seen now there is a Committee appointed for that purpose, whether they can be agreed for on better terms, as to those out of the common dimensions said to be exorbitantly rated thô promiscuously burnt with the rest, I must beg leave to inform the Board that in the very moulding of them, I pay the Brickcutters, infinitely more than I do for others, and this is not the whole nor material objection for enhancing their value, the least flaw or crack is sufficient for rejection, & they are not otherwise, saleable than as turn'd out Bricks and it's often found of one thousand put in the Kilns for Burning, not a Quarter has been serviceable the same hold good with regard to the well Bricks charg'd at 100 Pags. A Lack, if they are not entirely whole are rendered likewise useless, but admitting them ever so dear no more is now paid for them has for a series of Years and that the Honble Board may be a Judge of this futile charge, I have annexed the whole quantity of these amazing dear articles by me furnish'd since Madrass has been the Presidency and then please to ponder within yourselves the cause or rather insufficiency for so malign a Representation.

This I think will shew that what has been offered on the subject is merely to exaggerate and not from any solid Foundation there is for complaint.

Let the standard dimensions of Bricks, by Act of Parliament be what they will, those Ordered by Coll¹. Scott's directions were of an extraordinary size, and never made here before, and tho' I agreed to deliver them 1500 for a Pagoda at Fort S^t. Davia, I found it was not to be done here on account the scarcity and dearness of Wood.

As to the Brick layers artfully scooping the Clay out of the Moulds with their hands, they not making use of Boards for scraping off the surplus as in England, it is not to be remedy'd; attempts have been made by my Predecessors but without success, these country people have no notion of the European manner of working and it is well known by those the least conversant in their constitution and Genius the great difficulty or rather impracticability of drawing them from old practices, so tenacious and obstinate are they in the uses and habitudes of Life.

Mr. Brohier has readily catch't hold of what I mention'd to this Honble Board in my Letter of the 8th. Ultimo. namely the advantage the Paymaster at Fort St. David had of cutting firewood, my sole reason for it was to evince the apparent cause for my not being able to supply the Honble Company with Bricks of the standard Dimensions at the usual price, therefore I shall not take notice of his shrew'd remark further than by saying that on account the larger siz'd Mould Mr. Robins ordered them to be made by, he thought it reasonable his consenting their price should be raiz'd.

I am excessively oblig'd to M^r. Brohier for his compliance in allowing me the Expence of burning Bricks here to be greater than at Fort S^t. David, and as to the other part of that paragraph relating to Firewood which fell in November storm 1752, I believe his Inclinations would induce him even to fix that upon me if he knew how so indefatigable is this Gentleman in flinging all the dirt he can, but I am ready to answer the Honble Board concerning it when called on.

I do affirm to be under large advances for the Company in procuring Materials of all sorts for their Works and the exclusive right of supplying the Inhabitants with Bricks and chunam at my Own Price (a vague tho' a favourite expression) has not made me amends, it is well known the Town people are supply'd at a fix'd Rate, till lately on account of the larger size Moulds of the Bricks, I have been oblig'd to raize that article. He thinks fit also to say I have engross'd the Materials imported by the shipping, surely Mr. Brohier's Memory must be very treacherous, and to quicken that faculty, beg leave to mention a cargo of Timber brought from Pegue, in April last by Captain Moor, and I would fain ask him who were ye. purchasers of them, that I was not is certain but I have heard it taken notice of and I think at this Board, that it was brought by Captain Brohier & Duffield the Carpenter, I dont take upon me to say the view's they had in buying them but rather chuse to submit it to the consideration of this Honble Board. About the same time or a little after a Dutch ship arrived from Batavia with Plank &ca. I neither meddled with these but they were purchas'd by the Inhabitants of the place; this Gentlemen [sic] I believe will convince you of the ill grounded assertions contain'd in his Letter and that there is more malevolence than Zeal in its composition.

The next thing to be answered, is the curious Extract from the Paymaster's Books of Ballances due Monthly to the Honble Company and his Argumts. on this Head are inconclusive, for tho' those Ballances might exceed any supplies the works received, yet on an average I have been under larger advances in Order to expediate the works all in my power even in the articles of Bricks and chunam alone and not to mention Materials on hand & money outstanding to procure more.

I come now to the further objection made by Mr. Brohier for the advance I mention'd to be under on procuring Materials in General, which is that several articles P Lists annex'd to his Letter have been purchas'd at the Buzar and Banksalls as wanted, & therefore could be no cause for a plea of that sort,

but before I quit this paragraph, I shall make it appear that in the List of Materials ungenerously said by him to be supplied by the Paymaster (amounting to Pags. 27857. 35. 25) there are several articles included bought of other people unknown to me, and that the Major part of them have been certified by himself, If this is the case I leave him to reflect on his artfull design of inserting them as supplied by me, but there would be no end of commenting on the unfair Proceedings in this Transaction, tho' what is now under consideration is of so flagrant and delusive a nature, that it requires to be examin'd, and I hope will not only plead an Excuse with this Honble Board for the digression but also bespeak your attention to the subject matter, Inclosed you have an account of the greatest part of the small articles which has been supplied all along by the Company's Conicoply, and to the best of my knowledge at prime cost, for a proof of which he tells me no money has been paid for them but in presence of the Engineer's conicoplys as a Check, I likewise take the liberty to present you with an Exact List of what I have furnish'd myself, as also those bought of other hands, all which collectively make up the Materials supplied the Honble Company from the commencement of this Presidency and are industriously accumulated in the abstract delivered as furnish'd by me, it occurs here likewise to mention tha[t] what I advanced in my last concerning Timber and pl [ank] being inconsiderable in proportion to other supplies, I had provided, is evident matter of fact and that out of Pags. 3819. 14. - paid for those articles and included as sold by me Pags. 1972. 33. 33 of it was purchas'd of other hands, all which I presume will be so conspicuous to the Honble Board at first sight, that you'll fathom the design of this zealous performance, and that there has been great pains likewise to make appear an increase of charge in a few hundred Pagodas in matters relating to the Paymaster; when thousands not under his management have been pass'd over in silence, can the Board think otherwise when you reflect on the money laid out in the repair of Egmore Fort and fitting it up for a powder Mill Pags. 7307. 13. 4. Triplicane Bridge Pags. 1753. 9. 73 the Engineers clerks, Assistants, Overseers Conicoplies &cs. Pags. 1986. 2. 74 amounting in all to Pags. 10866. 25. 71 and which have been often mention'd [. . .] council, but we are left to suppose everything otherwise furnish'd is at best hand, and that the Conduct of Managers, Directors, Projectors &ca. in their several capacities are unexceptionable, but I submit if it would not be more eligible to propose and promote the forwardness of the Works than seeking ill grounded faults in trifles, for considering the little concern the Paymaster ever can have in the management of them the cause of Complaint must be somewhere else.

Mr. Brohier might with some shadow of Justice take notice of the several Batta's on cooleyhire, Bullockhire of Bricks & Chunam, Clay, Sand &ca. was not the Paymaster to receive fanams for that purpose, but if he will give himself the trouble to review those accounts from whence he extracted his Ballances due Monthly from me to the Honble Company he will find that all he can say on the subject is null and void.

It concerns me to resume the matter for refuting the Engineer in what I set forth with regard Mr. Robins's encreasing the pay to Laboureres of all sorts tho' no ways reflecting on that Gentleman, whose memory I shall always esteem and regard, and I believe on this point it will suffice, that I refer it to your own Experience and knowledge whether within these few years the pay to artificers. &c. have not been, encreas'd one Moity at least.

As for Chunam with all the glaring advantages mention'd to accrue on that account, I am confidently persuaded cannot be provided on more tolerable terms by other Contractors, neither will there be any supplies brought to the works without large advances are made for it.

I do call it an injurous [sic] assertion to say the Honble Company are served with broken Bricks and those none of the best, can there be a more severe accusation does it not imply that the Company has no good Bricks at all and how has Mr. Brohier supported it Vizt. that he does not assert possitively that

is the case, but that it may be so, and give me leave to appeal to the Honble Board if this is Equity, on the contrary is it not sporting with my character to the last degree, may not every thing be concluded from any thing on the same principles, and might I not with as much propriety say the Engineer charg'd more Artificers &ca. than actually work'd and when called on to support it, answer, if it was not so, it might be so, but I am sorry for the occasion of repeating it. Mr. Brohier further complains the Bricklayers station'd at the Kilns have not done their duty, are they by my appointment or is the Paymaster culpable for their conduct, but I humbly submit to your superior Judgements the force of such arguments.

The Bullock hire of Bricks at Fort St. David was wholly paid by the Company and I did not imagine any objections could be made to it here, however if any future Contractors furnish wall Bricks at a less price than I have supplied them including Bullock hire, I shall readily submit to any allowance this Honble Board shall seem requisite and I cannot conceive it any imposition when it is not to be done cheaper, which I flatter myself the Event will prove.

I shall just lay before you the incongruity there appears in that paragraph of Mr. Brohiers Letter wherein he is pleased to say he has not seen any account of the Paymaster's since last July and at the same time presents the Board with an Abstract of Ballances taken from those Books to December 1753 his memory is certainly vastly deceiving, especially in this particular, for I should be glad to know from whence he gather'd those Ballances, if not from my accounts and whether the Inspection of any matter concerning the Employ has ever been denied him or how he makes out his Expence for the works unless he has from me the price of Materials & yet this Gentleman asserts he knows nothing of my charge to the Company or would he insinuate that I make out one account to him and another to them, but I am apt to believe the order of Council last year, that no materials should be kept in the Engineer's Possession has a little chagrin'd him, how otherwise can I account for this absurdity.

I hope with Mr. Brohier the Method ordered to be pursued for the better carrying on the Honble Company's works will be found big with Benefits as it will give me great satisfaction if any savings can be made, and in the course thereof it will be seen the large advances the Paymaster inevitably must have been under for the procuring Materials, and were they not at hand the Clamour in that case would have been the works, stood still for want of them.

I humbly beg leave to be inform'd if Mr. Brohier acting in his Employ as Engineer is so independant as not to be subject to any controul and whether I am to observe an implicit obedience to his commands, I think the following Letter that I received from him the 5th. Instant implies as much and give me leave to premise the cause that produced it, was his blending several Conicoplies mighty obscurely in the cooley account, which I forbid.

My answer to the foregoing I kept no copy of tho' I presume Mr. Brohier has preserved the original and with due difference and respect to this Honble Board, I cannot but offer it as my opinion the falling on some expedient for knowing the number of artificers &ca. really employ'd on the works daily by a more certain method than at present practis'd which is mustering them at the close of the evening when Labour is over and they said to be the Workmen of that day on publick service and paid accordingly, but may not others creep into the croud acquainted with the hour that has been differently employ'd the preceeding part of the day; perhaps on private Jobbs for the European Bricklayer and carpenter the former of whom you'll please to remark is the first Overseer and teller of the Cooleys at least the late order of Council (from what has been undertaken since) seems necessary to be enforc'd for preventing this and the like Malpractices, the carpenters Yard is wholly under the direction of the Engineer and I presume to recommend as proper to be inspected into, that no Imbozzlements [sic] are committed of Materials delivered to be expended on the Honble Compys account, as that Check and controul he claims over the Paymaster in his Branch of business and I humbly entreat of this Board that you will be pleas'd in future to assign the seperate duty of the different Employs and submit if the raising of pay adding neu servants or in any shape increasing the charge of the Works is to be done without your knowledge and

Lastly I proceed to take notice of a Letter to the President read the 25th. Instant at the same time with that I have just gone through, Mr. Brohier apprehends my mentioning to the Govr. his serving Rice to the Workmen may convey some unfavourable Ideas of his Integrety, and if he means with regard to the Zeal he professes for the Honble Companys Interest. I own I think so to, maugre all his Efforts, and that it was very impolitick of him. 'twas lately and by accident I came to the knowledge of it—the Companys Conicoply complaining to me that the Cooleys had been long murmering at their being oblig'd to take Rice instead of Money, and that neither so good or at so cheap a rate as they could buy it elsewhere.

In January and February 1753 it seems Mr. Brohier began to have thoughts of setting Rice to the Cooleys, in consequence of their repeated supplication on that head and in March put it into Execution by purchasing out of the Company's Godowns and Banksalls as set forth, and serving it every other night from the latter place he might furnish himself, but as to the former tho' they were open from 16th. November 1752 till the end of January 1753 it dont appear by the Warehouse Diary Captain Brohier had any more than Pags. 531 in Rice at three several times Vizt. 19th. 21, and 23d. January and that for family use—there was no more sold 'till 5th. December 1753 (9 Months after he had served) and continued 'till 23d. January 1754, in all which time, I dont find a Grain delivered him, so that his first purchase and distribution must have been either from the Banksalls, or out of 14 Garce 18 Mercalls he imported in February from the Northward as P Sea Gate Grain Book and from whence was all the rest procured which cou'd be no small quantity for serving 1057 People 15 days in a Month for 15 Months together, that from his own account on an average he did and that there has been paid his conicoplys by the Honble Company's from March 1753 to May 1754 two hundred eighty one thousand two hundred and thirty six fanams fifty Cash or Pagodas 7812. 4. 50 as account annex'd, however it's not material, where, when and from whom it was

bought, I only have shewn it could not be out of the Company's Godowns, and here I think the weakness of his arguments appears, and the whole parade of relieving the Wants of the poor Labourers falls of coarse, for I would ask what is the Chief reason for purchasing and laying Rice in store by the Company, but in times of scarcity to supply the Inhabitants to relieve the necessities of the Indigent by their having recourse thereto, and to render it the more efficatious by it's not being engross'd, the Gov. out of a humane disposition has often told me not to suffer the conicoplies to sell more than a pagodas worth at a time to any of the Black People which was strictly adherr'd to. If then such a provision is made, where was the necessity of Mr. Brohiers supplying, but I will even suppose the extream scarcity he represents how long could it subsist, in January Grain was daily importing and plenty there was of it as well as a fine harvest at home to make it remarkably cheap, for generally speaking this want is only about a Month before the fresh Imporation, to wit in December, and if the intention of retailing Rice was from Bowells of Commisseration divested of any advantage, it must have soon dropp'd, as for serving the Company, it's too foreign to suppose it, they are such acts of supereogation as seldom to be met with and never expected, I shall now set forth the Incoherency there seems to be in his representing that my conicoply should go on the Works and harrangue the people concerning their taking Rice and through the fear of so powerfull a man readily consented to take money as Grain is cheap. And first I beg to observe my private Conicoply has never interferr'd in any shape in that Business much less in paying the cooleys or disbursing of the Companys Money, I have no Conicoply but the Companys and the Truth of the Matter is this I told him that none of the Engineers People had any thing to do in paying of the Workmen, and reprimanded him for acting as he had done so many Months without my knowledge and consent, his Reply was that the Engineers conicoplys acquainted him, the Govr. approved their having Rice if they pleas'd every other day, but no ways crediting the relation, I ordered him to see every man paid himself agreeable to his Duty and that no money should be given into the Hands of other Conicoplys on any account whatever, this he terms harranguing the people and with the cheapness of Grain influenc'd them in favour of Money and tho' Mr. Brohier is pleas'd to pass the matter over in so favourable a light to himself, by saying it has been an ease and an Indulgence to them, yet it dont appear they were sensible thereof or satisfy'd with it, for I am credibly inform'd and if required shall be given upon Oath that when it was put to them for their choice of Money or Rice they answered if they were oblig'd to take any more of the latter they would desert the place, for they were not at all pleased and instead of option it was compulsion, that Grain had been very cheap and plenty many months, and the dread of flagettation alone prevented them from seeking Redress, If the case was otherwise of being that ease and Indulgence so much boasted of, would they not have renew'd their Intreaties for a continuance of his wanted Goodness, for I will not suppose with him the Company's Conicoply to be that tremenduous man.

I am surpriz'd Mr. Brohier should imagine he could impose on this Board in so palpable a manner with the abstract he has given of workmen and cooleys employ'd daily on the works, as to make it appear that the selling of Rice has been of service in procuring numbers. What opportunities has not this Gentleman thrown in my way of exposing the frivilousness of his arguments and rendering them abortive. In the beginning of last Year the Fortifications to the Westward was set about and there was a want of workmen and cooleys to any number that could be obtain'd for expediting the progress thereof, and how was it effected, thirty or forty peons appointed under the Engineer, were sent out to different parts to bring in all they could pick up of every profession, in consequence thereof Gardners Husbandmen. Workmen from the salt pans &ca. were forcibly brought to the Works, nay there was such a diligent and strict search, that I believe some at this Honble Board may remember had artificers taken from them, who were imploy'd either in repairing their Habitations or making some necessary Furniture, and many are the Inhabitants that

have suffered in having a stop put to their Business by being deprived of their servants, particularly the salt farmers have complain'd of the great loss in that Branch, not to mention the assistance given by application to the Polligar and Poonemalee Renter of their allotting a number of Cooleys from every village within their districts, but it seems these measures having been ineffectual and that the expedient of delivering Rice on the Works, has enticed and attracted the Multitude. All which I humbly submit to your consideration and Judgement and dont in the least doubt your ordering a continuance of the same practice, if it appears to you Beneficial, and for the service of Our Honble Masters—if you please one Remark more and I have done with the subject, Grain has been singularly cheap for many Months, but if it has been the alluring Bait where was the necessity for those rigourous means to be pursued that I have related.

To conclude, I have done all in my power for the Interest and advantage of the Honble Company in the Employ I at present hold, and do sincerely believe that Mr. Brohier's aim in his attack upon me has proceeded from no other cause than that in time he might have the whole Management of the Works to himself, in providing all sorts of supplies and to put it out of the power of any Paymaster to interfere with him, and this is a priviledge the Engineers in Europe are known to have, though the Command of a Company in the Train here is so profitable and pretty a Post, and which Mr. Brohier has had conferr'd on him through the great favour of the Honble Company for the Trouble of acting in the Engineers Employ, I think he may be very well contented his obtaining it and not so soon to grasp and aspire at more.

Instant, General acquainting us that he has begun to settle those Books, but is at some Difficulty from Devein regard to an article of Firelocks for which Expedition to Tritchinopoly Cotch. stands Dr. to Account Current Fort St. David tho' no such Entry is in the St. David Books, desiring our directions thereon, he also represents that there are about 700 Valees of Ground within the Limits of that place, which the Inhabitants claim without producing any Title to the same which being a Hindrance to persons from coming to inhabit the Bounds he proposed to those people to put up said Ground to sale which they consented to and he reckons the produce of it to the Company might be about five Pagodas ? Vale besides the advantages of Quit Rent &ca. desiring Our Directions, that he has got some Musters of Chially Cloth & only waits for the rest to forward them to us enclosing the Monthly papers of that settlement.

No. 135 from the Deputy Govr. & Council of Fort St. David dated the 17th. Fort St. Instant touching their Investment the General purport of it being that their Chief dependance must be on Irshippa Chitty and Paupa Rauze, that as to Cawn Moodelaire, Govindoo Chitty and Tonneveroy they have behaved so ill in the last Tryal made of them that they are not to be trusted for their Ballances still stand encreas'd three thousand Pagodas by the last advance made them & all they promise is to bring in that amount by the end of the Month of August, that Irshippa Chitty and Paupa Rauze, will engage to bring in four hundred Bales in time for the September dispatch, provided they are not impeded from the want of Money, but that if they are allowed to advance no more than five thousand Pagodas at a time it will be impossible to procure even that quantity as to the Salem Merchants they have been called upon to bring in their Cloth and all the answer they give is that if the Roads are safe they will bring it in by September.

Dispatch, wherefore considering the uncertain State of the Country they had advanc'd them only 5000 Pagodas each & taken their Bonds to be answerable for all Risques, upon the whole they do not flatter themselves with any Success agt. the September Dispatch, nor any thing material for the January ship and even what may be provided for Septembr. must be sent up, brown as the short time remaining will not admit of curing it.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

My last was on the 30th. Ulto.

I have examin'd Captain Polier's petition, and think it but reasonable that he should receive the stoppage allowed for the Cloathing of his Company always to the full of his establishment, but let that Establishment be settled, that Gentleman says 140 Men was the number he agreed to bring over for the Company, but as a favour they passed him 160, since that was allowed by them

I think they intended his Company should consist of that number. In consequence he should draw the Off reckonings for them, for otherwise, only drawing for the effective on the Spot (as he plainly shews it himself he must be a loser by the Casualties, which have and still must happen besides if any Recruits come for him he has no fund for their Cloathing, the money must be advanc'd by him, and should his Company suffer by death and desertion he cannot reimburse himself.

I think therefore he should be allowed to draw the Offreckonings to the full of his Establishm^t. for the future, and I believe the Company intended the same and what he has already suffered on that Account should be made up to him by giving him the Allowance from the time he came to this presidency. As to what he mentions of Gratifications which are given in other Services, by the Employers, either as Rewards or to make up losses, and which he says hitherto have not had in the Honble Companys service at least the Swiss Captains, I know of no Gratifications, that any of the Captains have received in the English service, so that is no particular hardship on them.

The Expence he has been at in bringing up his Cloathing, I referr'd him to you for, as I could not know your Intentions about it, and as them Gentlemen have, and insist on Distinct priviledges, Our Rules cannot be precedents for them. But as Our Captains have their Cloathing sent up without Charges the same Indulgence I think can be allow'd them.

The Gentlemen may be very just as to the time he commanded the Army; and so should I in taking an Account for how long it was, that I left it to him. But as I often had been oblig'd for Health sake to go in three or four days, I was in hopes this would not have been for a longer time, and therefore I did not dream of such a Charge, or I too would have been particular, but I dare say he is right to a day, neither did I offer the Table for the same reason, besides I had often asked the Gentleman to it, but was always refused on Account of his Health, and being oblig'd to keep up to a Regimen. I imagin'd the same reason subsisted, and as I naturally hate Ceremoney left him as I thought was most agreeable to his own Diet and Choice, But I beg he may have 15 Rupees day, since he has asked them, but at the same time I insist on it that he tells you the other perqusites which he has been deprived of during his Command, and I desire Gentlemen you will please to acquaint me with them.

As to the Affair of the 12th. he behaved then agreeable to the Character I ever knew him maintain of a good and brave Officer. The Gentleman also took the Command after he was wounded, had some small share in the honour of the day, both before and after he join'd them.

I cannot finish this without mentioning a Word about the Swiss Priviledges, which the Company desires the Gentlemen may enjoy the same as they do in all foreign services, agreeable to their Order I assure you that whatever priviledges the Swiss Officers have themselves said was their Right, I always granted them & shall continue to do it, they shall have no reason to Complain, nor I believe they do not, if they were asked the Question, But by the by, such distinctions are impossible to be made without creating some disputes in such a small Corps as Ours. And the way Our Gentlemen have manag'd with regard to these Troops at home, makes us liable to many more. The Capitulation made by the Company with the Cantons for these Troops should have been sent over, and every right and Priviledge they were to enjoy by it set down clearly and distinctly. Then we must have known what to do. Instead of that it is only in general terms specefy'd they are to enjoy the same priviledges as in other services. These priviledges differ in every service, their Rights and Customs being determin'd according to the Agreement made by their Employers with the Cantons from which they are hired—the only way We can be inform'd what are the Rights agreed upon and granted them, must be from the Gentlemen themselves, which may be just what they please, this is certainly not

a proper way to inform us of What we ought to know. I do not doubt the Honour of the Swiss officers, or that they would ask for more than their due, but the Misfortune is they differ amongst themselves, nor have they nor can they, exactly agree what are to be their priviledges from having different ones in every different service they have been in.

This step of the Company one would have thought of Consequence enough not to have been lightly considered and worse managed, they have run away with the name of the thing Swiss Troops they might have had British ones as cheap and as good not by that that I would depriciate the merit of those who have certainly behaved equally well with the rest, but it would have been more natural and more agreeable to the British Constitutions, who are not used to such Mixtures or at least in such a small Corps as Ours.

General Letters read. General Letters read Vizt.

From Vizagapatam. No. 152 from George Pigot Esq^r. Chief &ca. Council of Vizagapatam dated the 12th. Ulto. acknowledging the receit of Our Letter of the 30th. June § St. George and advising that that ship having fallen to Leward they have ordered Captain Robinson to anchor in Bimblipatam Road, where they propose to land the money and Stores. That the four serjeants who came with Lieutenant Nelson are landed, but as to Captain Gardner they apprehend he must be drove past and gone to Bengal, the Vessell he was aboard having parted two Cables in Bandarmalanka Road, that they will provide all the ordinary Cloth they can and not exceed the quantity limitted of fine. That they apprehend the difference in the measure of Cloths in England and the lengths as ¶ Invoice arise from their being Measured here brown and there white as they generally shrink a yard in the Wash, that they will if possible get all their Cloths made 75 Covids long and 2 Covids 6 Inches broad, but they despare [sic] of getting any quantity, Cotton being very dear and the Country much impoverish'd, that they will give possitive directions to the Washers not to mix Chunam with the Conge. That they will endeavour to procure a Bale of the different sorts of Muslins made in those parts, by September & dispatch the same to us with what other cloth they have ready which they dont think will exceed 100 Bales besides what they have on hand being 106 Bales.

No. 153 from Mr. Foss Westcott at Ingeram dated the 29th. Ulto. advising from the French have delivered him his Timbers and have not such as Ingeram. that the French have delivered him his Timbers and have not yet made any demands of the Towns which he mentions in his last, but seem to have some design on Ingeram, and it's thought they are come to destroy it. That he is advised a 1000 Seapoys and 100 Horse are arrived at Rajahmundrum from Mr. Bussy with some large Guns &ca. that he is preparing for the defence of the place and hopes to maintain it till he receives Our Orders, that he is also getting ready a vessell to embark the Companys Effects on. Cloth on hand 272 Bales.

No. 154 from Mr. John Andrews at Bandarmalanka dated the [lacuna] Bandar-Instant advising that Mons^r. Bussy with his Camp is at Elore raising Money for Salabat Jing and to pay his own people who are very pressing. is shortly expected at Rajahmundrum and as he comes in quality of Nabob and expects to be treated as such, he (Andrews) desires Our Orders how to act in this respect as he apprehends that he must either treat him as such, have a sufficient force to oppose him or suffer Our Business to be interrupted. Enclosing Monthly accounts.

Some disputes having arisen between Mr. George Dawson, when he had the Charge of DeveCotah and Captain Pascal who was then Commanding Officer Mr. Dawson there, Complaint was made to Major Lawrence touching some particulars and Capta. wherein Captain Pascall thought himself aggrieved which the Major having examin'd recommended to the consideration of the Board they have thoroughly enquired adder-min'd. into the several Facts and do find.

Dispute

That Captain Pascall did without consulting Mr. Dawson dismount a Gun on a Bastion, in which he was culpable, Mr. Dawson being then provisional Chief, noths. ought to have been done without his Order or Consent.

That Captn. Pascall did without Consulting Mr. Dawson order the Lascars to dismount the said Gun in which he was wrong, they being under Mr. Dawson's Command as Chief, who was therefore Justifyable in taking them off and directing them to do nothing without his Order.

THAT Captain Pascall did of his own Authority dismiss a Subadar from the service whilst Mr. Dawson was prest. and contrary to his request and representation in which he was highly blameable as such an action was a direct breach of all Order and Regularity, for the Chief Command being necessarily lodged in the head of every settlement, and Mr. Dawson as provisional chief being such, nothing should have been transacted without his Order much less contrary to his Inclination and Consent.

THAT the said Subadar being afterwards brought before Captain Pascall he did either kick or ignominiously turn him down stairs publickly in which he was blameable, such usage being unbecoming an Officer to give or receive, if the Subadar had been guilty he ought to have been regularly try'd and punish'd.

THAT Mr. Dawson did refuse to let Captain Pascall have a Roll of the Lascars in which he was to blame as Captain Pascall being the Commanding Officer ought to have been acquainted with the full state of the Garrison.

That on Occasion of Captain Pascalls writing to S^t. David for Centry Boxes, M^r. Dawson being acquainted with it and thinking it an encroachment on his Office flew into a passion and called for his Sword and pistolls, in which he was highly Culpable as he ought to have represented to the presidency any Misconduct or encroachment on his just power, and not have resented it in such an indecent manner.

Having recd by the Anson a Letter from S^r. Luke Schaub, dated 11th. Febry, wherein he tells me that a[ll] the Swiss Recruits come out this Year or to come is for to [be] incorporated in the three Companys on this Coast (namely) Schaub, Gaupp and Polier.

Be pleased Honble Sirs, that in regard to the said Letter I had the Honour of shewing Gov. Saunders emboldens me to hope you will order the said Recruits that is arrived, or those that may arrive might be shared equally, in the three abovemention'd Companys.

Permit me likewise Honble Sirs to take the Liberty to represent not only for me but likewise for the good of the Swiss Captains, that as there will be a very little number of Recruits come out, in comparison to the great losses we have sustained in the last Campaign makes us hope that the Swiss and Germans Deserters from the French at Camp or other Settlement belonging to the Honble Companys might with their Consent be incorporated and equally divided in the four Swiss Companys at present on this coast which will keep them equal in force.

The Swiss Captains think themselves the more founded to ask that favour, as it will be the means to uphold their force, and turn the more to the Advantage of the Honble Companys service who did engage themselves to make Recruits for the Swiss Companys as for the English, and that attended with great Labour and Expence considering the distance from Swisserland to England, so that by the abovemention'd means the Swiss Companys can be compleated, by the Swiss and German deserters which will ease the Companys in sending so many out attended with vast Cost.

And another advantage will accrue from it, is, that the Swiss and Germans hearing they will be incorporated in the Troops of their Nation, where they will meet with good Encouragement and pay, wont fail of quitting the French service to come in that of the Honourable Companys, which will enfeeble the Enemys Army and reinforce Ours, which might cause the fall of the Swiss and Germans, raised in their service from Our Example, but have not considerably the same pay as Ours.

HONBLE SIR

Having gone to the Powder Mill yesterday, John de Roos the Overseer of it acquainted me he had refined a quantity of Salt Petre for some time past and had begun to make Powder the 24th. Instant, that he finds his Mortars will contain 40 lb. of Composition each, which is 640 lb \$\mathbb{H}\$ day, but as some of the Pestalls may be often out of Order, and (till mended) the Mortars thereby stand still, besides waste about 5 \$\mathbb{H}\$ Cent, He assures me he will deliver 500 lb weight \$\mathbb{H}\$ day provided he has a drying Room built, as he cannot dry the powder, in the rainy weather, this drying Room will not amount to above 200 Pagodas and the Working part of the powder Mill will be compleat.

As to the Graining and Sifting Mills which Mr. Bishop, wants to have erected are entirely useless to John De Rose, they may be of use for the powder Mill proposed to be erected with Roling stones which are coming out by the Little Anson or the other shipping expected, and as those Graining and sifting Mills will cost 2/3ds' of the Charge at least of that whole Mill compleat, and that the Company have been at the Expence already of all the utensills for that Mill I humbly submit It to you, whether it would not be more eligible to erect the rolling Stone Mill at Fort St. David and thereby divide the Risque of their blowing up, [as] well as the quantity of Powder necessary for each Settlement and their respective Subordinacy's.

John De Rose tells me also that he [will] want four Bullocks more to replace any of those already broke to the Mill if any Accident should happen to them & the Mill should thereby stand still.

If the Rolling stone Mill with it's grain and shifting Mills are built at Fort St. David, there will be nothing to be added to the Mill now erected, but the drying Room, before mention'd, the Guard Room which is almost finished, the Cook Room and the necessary House and one side of the former Guard Room to be enclosed by a Wall, all which will not amount to 300 Pagodas, I am most respectfully

Honble Sir & Sirs

Your Honour &ca. Council having in Consultation of the 20th. July approved of my writing to Major Lawrence, in regard to an injurious insinuation, which I then and not till then learn'd had been levell'd at me by Mr. John Moore the Carpenter, I accordingly address'd the Major on that Subject and now beg leave to lay before you his Answer with what I have to offer in vindication of my Characters from that very unjust Aspersion, and I trust it will have the desired Effect as well with my Honble Masters [as] with your Honour &ca., That part of Major Lawrences Letter which relates to the point in Question is in these Words, which the Major says is the Substance of what John Moore declared to him, Vizt. "I carried in my Bill for payment, Messrs. Smith and Cooke were together (the amount of his Bill I think he said was between 8 or 900 Pagodas) on presenting my Account either Mr. Smith or Mr. Cooke, or both of them, said We will pay you the account, but cannot you increase the amount to 1500 Pagodas, upon enlarging the Articles upon which He (John Moore) said what Gentlemen, would you have me cheat the Company? I will do no such thing."

In answer whereto I must observe that sundry Bills during the time of my being Paymaster were presented to me by John Moore, which after being approved in Council were duely paid; That Mr. Cooke might have been in the Room at the tendering some of these Bills is a Circumstance not improbable from the intimacy between us, tho' at the same time it is what I cannot recollect, however as he is mention'd by Mr. Moore as a person concern'd with me, it may contribute something to my vindication would your Honour &ca. be pleased to cause a Copy of Mr. Moore's Assertion to be transmitted to him and require his Answer, when if there should be the least Room to doubt my Innocence, I must in that Case say, I am ready to affirm the Contrary upon Oath whenever required; Tho' I am inclined to hope, that if a thought be had to the Credit and probity of the two accused compared to the well known dissatisfied Mind of the Accuser, it would need little other Testimoney to prove the Assertion amounts to nothing more than the effect of a base and Malicious intention. A few things occur to my Reflection that will yet more clearly corroborate it, which I take leave to mention. That John Moore never taxed either Mr. Cooke or me with it himself is what I can averr, nor did he, as it appears, mention it to the Major till he was turn'd out of his post, and I beg leave further to remark that the said John Moore on his first coming to Madrass began to usurp most insufferable Prerogatives, such as distressing every Inhabitant by taking away the Labouring Carpenters, suffering no one to have any thing done but at his hands, and afterwards charging very exorbitant prices for it; All which, added to a most insolent Behaviour complained of by every one, it was found necessary to give him a Check & reduce his Authority, This was accordingly done in Consultation whilst Mr. Prince was Deputy Govr. as will appear by Our Address to the Presidency, in which myself with another of the Board were strong Advocates; How far that might have induced him to raise this falsity against me, I cannot tell, but, upon the beforemention'd Complaint against him. He went to several persons in Town and cried out agt. the Injustice done him, in saying he charg'd Materials at an exorbitant Price, when he had been oblig'd to pay for Iron &ca. out of the Company's Storehouse at a higher value than what was usual, and this he said he had notes to prove. That Gentleman abovemention'd more fortunate than myself, hearing of what John Moore had reported, desired that he might be called upon to explain himself, which he accordingly was, and still insisted on the Truth of What he had said, till upon a Calculation it was found he had accounted 100 lb. instead of 100 and 112 lb. to the hundred weight, he begg'd pardon for his Mistake and was excused that time with only a Reprimand to be more careful

in future how he aspers'd a Gentlemans Character, from the above I take the Liberty to inferr, that when this Complaint came before Mr. Saunders he found it of the same validity and thought it not just to put one of the Council without reasonable grounds to answer publickly to an Accusation from Mr. Moore the Carpenter, who had before been detected in publishing an untruth and that his Silence did not proceed from the intercession of the party Accused, as has been represented to our Honble Masters, by the Hint they gave us in their Genl. Letter, for I now declare that not one single person ever mention'd to me the least suitable of John Moore's Affair till that Paragraph in the General Letter was read, when the Govr. said it must be owing to the Report which he had heard as before mention'd. All which I beg leave to submit to the Consideration of the Board, but especially the Gov^r. who is best acquainted with this Affair, not doubting but their concurrent opinion will convince my Honble Masters that sometimes wicked Aspersions may be cast on their faithful Servants by designing Men, when they find themselves opposed in their dishonest Practices and hindered from getting a fortune by imposing on the Company and oppressing the Inhabitants, which was the Case of John Moore, who was so biass'd with the hopes of getting one soon, that having his priviledges as he called them. curtail'd, refused to stay in the Service when offered [lacuna] Pagodas & Mo. a handsome Lodging and Pallankeen with some other Allowances.

Further I have not to offer, but to request you will be referr'd to what you may hear from Mr. Cooke after which I submit myself to your sentiments whether you think my Oath requisite or not I am with the greatest Respect.

Mr. Alexander Wynch reports that he had visited the Hospital and found no just cause of Complaint.

General Letters read Vizt.

General Letters Read. From Fort St. David.

No. 164, and No. 165 and No. 170 from the Deputy Govr. and Council of David the first dated the 8th. Instant accompanying their Consultations and Monthly Accounts for July and acquainting Us that their Committee had made a further enquiry in relation to Mr. St. Pauls Tents but had gain'd no further Information except that the Dubash who acted under Mr. St. Paul had been whipp'd out of the Bounds sometime before his Death. As to the Damag'd and torn Brown cloth they can give Us no further Information than we have already had, the Conicoplies offer to swear it was not chang'd after it was sorted, and they are of opinion it was owing to the Ordinary Vessells, on which the Bales were sent up, but if We should be of a different opinion they then think the guilt cannot be more justly fix'd than on the Merchants who brought in the Cloth. That finding their Merchants trifle and bring in but small quantitys of Cloth by way of Sample, they called them before the Board and after discoursing with them, they are convinc'd their delays are only to struggle for the

Victory in obliging them to take Cloth of an inferior Sortment, which they say is full equal to what is provided here that the Merchants have promised to bring in a quantity for Sorting and if it should not prove Satisfactory they propose to send us Samples for our Sentiments thereon, in regard to the deficiencys & Vernon, Bombay Castle, and Chesterfield they refer to the List thereof, which points out who were Under Wareho. keeper at that time, requesting a supply of fanams and copper Cash. Enclosing an Account sale of Madeira Wine That the DeveCotah Bound Renters promise in a few days to produce the proofs of what they alledge in their petition. That they shall deliver the Dutch Long Boat when demanded and give Protection to all deserters. That the Hospital necessarys for Tritchinopoly shall be provided that the money has been advanc'd Ebrar Cawn who has given his note to be accountable in Case Mauphoos Cawn should not proceed to join the Nabob. That our directions shall be observed for supplying the Kings Troops with the Matts and Cotts for the Hospital. That they are apprehensive the disabled Lascars will hardly be prevailed on to accept a Gratuity instead of a pension as some of them may be incapable of getting their Living enclosing a Memorial of Lieutenant Davis in regard to a Ballance due to him for money disburs'd at Trividy for the Garrison, enclosing also two Petitions of Cootahs one as Arrack Farmer the other as Renter of the weighing and Measuring Duty, in regard to the first he mentions some disputes with his Copartner in that Cowle and desires Redress, as to the latter he alledges that he must be a considerable Loser as the Rent of that Cowle was settled at 400 Pagodas \$\mathref{B}\$ ann when Fort St. David was the Presidency, but that being now removed has greatly lessen'd the Importation of Grain, Cloth on hand 51 Bales. The next is dated the 10th. Instant and advises that his Majestys Stores being all landed from the Brittannia they dispatch her to Us, that Admiral Watson in His Majestys Ship Kent with the Salisbury arrived there that morning, that they send Us a Bale of each Sort of Cloth brought in by their Merchants as a Specimen and desire our Sentiments, whether considering the Circumstances of the times such a Sortment may be admitted representing that the Warehousekeeper is in distress for an Assistant and requesting to be supplied the last is dated the 13th. Instant and acknowledges an Omission in not immediately sending Us the Brittanias Packet, which they say they deferr'd, expecting to dispatch the ship as soon as the Troops were landed, but were oblig'd afterwards to land the Stores, desiring we will comply with an Indent for Timber and Plank sent us sometime ago.

No. 166 from the President and Council of Bombay dated 26th. August From acknowledging the receipt of our Letters of the 16th. March and 14th. June, enclosing Invoice of Arms and Accoutrements supplied the several detachments sent round hither also an account of Pay and Provisions furnish'd them, for both which they have debted this Presidency, acquainting Us that having in one of the above mention'd Letters from Us received a protested Bill they sent for the person who procured it in Order to recover the Amount but he produced the original Bill regularly endors'd as being paid, which they are at a loss how to account for, enclosing an Account Cost of the Slaves delivered by Captain Cleugh of the Swallow, to the Commander of the Dragon at Madagascar. That Sr. James Foules Bart. Major of Bombay having been inform'd of the death of Lieut. Colonel Scott made a voluntary tender of his service which they approved of judging that We might have occasion for a field Officer: and therefore they have ordered the Winchelsea to touch here to give him a passage, that Captain Baron having supplied them with four Puncheons of Beef for the use of their Cruizers, which they are unable to return they request We will do it, as well as to satisfy him for the diet two Europeans who attend Sr. James Foules, That they send us by Captain Baron a silver Mace for the

use of our Mayors Court.

From Deve Cotah No. 167 from Mr. Charles Hopkins Chief of DeveCotah dated the 10th. September advising that he has laden and consign'd to Us on the St. John Baptista a Bale of Musters of Chially Cloth and if we approve of them the Merchants promise to provide five hundred Corge the first year and as much more the succeeding Years as he shall be advanc'd Money for.

From Mr. Newton at Tanjour. No. 168 from Mr. Andrew Newton at Tanjour in relation to the St. David torn and damag'd Cloth on which Subject the Secretary wrote to him for Information advising that the Cloth was sorted as usual when taken in but as it was sent away Brown Mr. Starke ordered it to be embaled without sorting into Numbers and be all placed to No. 2 that his great hurry at that time in writing Bale and Ship Notes prevented his inspecting so closely as was necessary at the embaling, but he is of opinion that the fraud must have been committed with the privity of the Conicoplies.

From Mr. Starke at Fort St. David.

No. 169 from the Deputy Gov^r. of Fort S^t. David advising that the Kings Troops are provided with Tents which are on board the Warren, that in consequence of Our Letter which he has communicated to Lieu^t. Col¹. Bagshaw, he has given Orders for preparing every thing to take the field, that he will endeavour to provide the pallankeens and Horses we allow the field Officers, but apprehends some difficulty in procuring them that the Number of Kings Troops landed from his Majestys ships & Britannia are 419.

St. David to be wrote to.

AGREED to write to the Deputy Gov. and Council of Fort St. David that in regard to Mr. St. Paul's Tents they must call for the Vouchers for the several Articles and from them state to Us the particulars of the Charges with their opinion therein, that as to the torn and damag'd Cloth, We have already given Our Sentiments fully and only add that it is improbable the Cloth could be torn after it was embaled and it would be unreasonable to make the Merchants answerable after the Cloth had passed the usual Examination, that the Company must be indemnified, and as they can give Us no further Information We guide Ourselves by a Standing Order which directs that the Chief of every Employ shall be answerable for all his Servants, and therefore the Export Warehousekeeper must pay to the Company the full Amount of all the Torn and damag'd Cloth which shall then be delivered here to his Attorneys and if the real Author of the Fraud should be discovered hereafter he shall be made Accountable. That We cannot supply them either with fanams or Copper Cash, but as soon as the Mint is disengag'd, We shall coin a quantity of the latter and send them a proportion, That they may protect all Deserters, except the Danes with whom We have agreed to return all Deserters on Condition of Pardon That they may grant Pensions to such Lascars as are really incapable of getting their Bread and Gratuitys to the rest. That the Ballance of Lieut. Davis's Account must be paid him if on comparing it with the Original Rolls it appear just, that they must also enquire of Lieut. Davis whether he can give any Information, in relation to a Sum of money which was found amongst Captain Chases Effects after his death at Pondichery, which it was apprehended was part of a Ballance of Money belonging to the Company which was in his hands at Trividy, that in regard to Cootahs Representations, touching the weighing and Measuring Farm we think there are Grounds for an Abatement, as the Importation of Grain by the removal of the presidency is certainly decreas'd and therefore We consent to an Abatement of one hundred Pagodas a Year from the Commencement of the cowle as to the Account of Debts he annexes to his petition, he must mention the particulars & the time, that his Disputes with his Copartner in the arrack Farm being of a private Nature and regarding matter of property, We cannot take upon Us to decide it, but those who took the Cowle of the Company must pay the Rent That altho We have directed them to shew all manner of Civilities to the Kings officers, they are not to have any Command in the Company's Settlements, but are to be considered merely as Troops in Quarters.

"The Directors sent for Mr. Schalch hither, agreed with him for the same enlisting Money, as is stipulated in Our Capitulations, swore him, gave him their Brevet & sent him back to shaft house with Orders to supply them for this year, and expressly by the 5th. December ensuing with 120 Recruits, which are all destin'd for your Compy and Mr. Chabberts, for Messrs. Polier and Zugler having each had twenty Men above their Compliment, they will have no need of Recruits, till next Year, The Directors did immediately advance to Mr. Schalch the whole enlisting Money for the 120 Recruits to be shar'd between Mr. Chabbert and you and thereby have sufficiently exempted you from con-Chabbert and you and at the same time eas'd you of all Doubts with regard to any Recruits you may be in want of hereafter.

Give me Leave Honble Sir & Sirs to request of you that to indemnify Captain Gaupp and me from the Damage We suffered by the loss of the 28 Men, the Recruits now arrived may be put into Our two Companys, and shar'd in such a manner as to render Our two Companies entirely equal in number of Men.

For the rest Honble Gentlemen, whatever you may be pleas'd to determine will be equally agreeable to me.

Honble Sir & Sirs

Having carefully perused the Several Books, Papers, Letters and Accounts transmitted from the West Coast, We now lay before you Our Remarks thereon.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

The Loss of Passages by Ships Godolphin and Dragon, as to Our Honble Masters the expences from hence arising must be considerable and the disappointment great, requires your particular consideration, it is occasion'd by their late dispatch from thence or more properly arriving there so much out of Season, as to render it impossible for those Gentlemen to have prevented it, in future the Ships design'd to take in the Surplus Pepper should sail from Bengal the beginning of December and make no deviation on this Coast, they will probably arrive at the West Coast the beginning of January and leave it Febry by which means their Passage round the Cape will be secure, particular Orders should be given to the Gentlemen there not to detain them an hour more than necessary.

THERE has always been a difficulty in transporting the Pepper from Subordinate Factories notwithstanding the many Steps taken to remedy it still it subsists; the use of Country Boats will by no means, answer the purpose, they are unskillfully navigated, often drove ashore and wreck'd hence great Losses. The Provision of European small Vessells has at times been abundantly supplied, but for want of proper care, ill conduct and an application of them to private Emolument, these endeavours have proved fruitless; the means that appear to us most likely to remove these Obstacles are, that the Ship from Europe (as is usual) continue to make her Trip to the Northward, where she will take in all the Pepper at Laye, Bental, Priamong, Ippoe and Moco Moco on her return to Marlbre, what on hand there will be put on board, and she may after proceeding to Manna, Cawoor or Croee, receive her Ultimate dispatches for Europe, the same rule may be observed in regard to the Ships design'd for the Surplus, liable indeed to some Variation by Circumstances that cannot at this distance be foreseen; for carrying on this business in the interval Seasons, supplying the Subordinates with Stores &ca. loading and unloading vessels, 'tis the opinion of the Supra Vizors that two Sloops of 50 Tons each, and 3 Long Boats are necessary, We concurr with them, They have now sloops Mary and Swallow with three Long Boats, but one of the Sloops are so much out of Repair that it must be a considerable time before she can be of any service, which renders it necessary either to return the Cuddalore or supply them with a new one, when they are thus supplied it will very imperfectly answer the Intent if proper care be not taken to keep these Vessels in good order, the Carang or Harbour at Marlbro is capable of receiving small Vessells, but the Work for want of Materials and Artificers has as yet been experienc'd to be so tedious as to be attended with great Ill convenience. Pooloo is a fine Harbour for ships of any Burthen, its Situation extreamly unhealthy and will also be liable to the aforementioned difficulties. In the Districts of Croee, Billingbing is represented as a good Harbour, but the Violent Gusts of Wind and Stormy Weather that generally almost constantly prevail, evident from the Sloops being so frequently drove to Batavia, the distance, consequently trouble of transporting Artificers and Materials determine that this place is improper, when Marlbro is supplied with Timber and Plank from Batavia with Naval stores from hence and proper Encouragement given to Artificers, We think it would be much the fittest place, and that on Emergencies only, the Vessells should go to Batavia & then such a Restriction to be made, that under pretence of sending them to Repair they be not loaded with private Merchandize, the Masters of those

Sloops should constantly give Receipts for what Stores they are supplied with and give in a List of them every six Months, which should be examin'd and if any deficiency, made good.

The Indents from the West Coast are so large that the Prince George will not be able to take them on board, and as the constant demand for Salt, Rice, Iron &ca. will sufficiently employ her two Trips in the Year, she should always be dispatch'd from hence the Middle or end of September and return'd to Us in January, she may proceed again in Febry and be with us in May or June, when she may be sent to Bengal, such Repair made as necessary and come up here in good time to proceed again to the West Coast, particular directions must be given that she be not detain'd there longer than to deliver her Cargoe.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA TO BE DISPOSED OF AT ANOTHER.

They write that by January there will be 250 Tons of surplus Pepper, immediate Advice should be given to the Gentlemen at Bengal of it, as well as to load on the Ships they may send 50 Chests of the best Patna Ophuim 250 Barrells of Gunpowder which they are greatly in want of; Gunney Baggs, Taffities, with such other Wares and Stores as are purchas'd therefor the first Cost, whereas if provided here must be at a considerable Advance.

Exclusive of their General Indent they are Annually to be supplied with 140 Garce of Salt and 400 Picul of Iron as these alone are more than Tonnage for the Prince George for 2 Trips, to prevent their want of them, some method must be taken, the Company are averse to purchasing another Vessell, a Contract might be made with private Traders to deliver it at a fix'd Price, but this will be uncertain, and a failure would greatly affect the Plan they have propos'd for Natal.

Rice and Timber & Plank may be purchas'd at Batavia and convey'd them by the Store Ship, but as the first Article is sometimes scarce and dear there, the Ship from Bengal should always fill up with it, the fine sort should be recommended and the Gunney Baggs should be good, as they will afterwards serve for Pepper.

The small quantity of Arrack and Sugar; sent us as Musters, sold well, the Arrack at P. 36 \$\mathbb{P}\$ Leaguer, They mention that they shall have 75 Leaguers of the former and 400 Peculs of the latter, which may be ordered to be shipp'd on the Prince George.

THE Coinage of Bullion for the Bay has prevented as yet, but a quantity of Copper Cash & fanams will be necessary to send them by the first Conveyance.

THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENTS.

The Surveys of the several Districts had been mostly taken, by which there appears a prospect of a future Increase, Moco Moco, Bental, Priamong, Ippoe, Caltown, Tallo, Croee, Cawoor all had a fair appearance. They had not however kept up to the Vines usual which should be recommended, Indolence should meet with a proper Resentment and the Industrious be encouragd, Laye, Marlbro, Sillebar were in a bad condition owing to neglect the plantations at Laye are most of them of Vines of seven Years growth and no new ones as yet raised, Gumbeer is cultivated here which should be forbid or discourag'd in Marlbro and Sillebar upwards of 1000 Families without any plantations. As the several Countries that are flourishing require a particular Attention to keep them so, these latter demand an immediate Scrutiny why they have been neglected, the Dupatties of the Different Dusans should be called upon, Contracts made with them and a ready Complyance insisted on; in short it is Generally allowed that with discreet conduct the Investment may be considerably increas'd and therefore it will be highly necessary to repeat those Salutary orders, that the Pangarans, Dupatties and Leading Men be treated with Respect, the common people

with Humanity and justice impartially administred, that the Residents at the different Subordinates be always ready to receive the Pepper as brought in and not make the planter wait that Justice be done them in the Weight and Garbling, that they be paid in ready money and not Goods forced on them at exorbitant Prices. Surveys should be constantly and regularly continued, a moderate Gratuity given to those that make them is an Encouragement well placed.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT &CA.

Peace and Tranquillity seem to reign throughout the whole of the Companys Possessions, On the death of the Sultan of Moco Moco 'tis apprehended the Competition of his Sons for the Government may raise some Commotions, Circumspection and prudence should be recommended to stifle them in their Infancy, the Sultan of Minum Caboo is the prince of the several Countries, wherein are situated the Companys Settlements, a friendly Correspondence should be kept up and a good understanding cultivated with him; 'tis a Quare [sic] whether they have the necessary Grants from him for the several Establishments, if not they should by all means get them.

The Gentlemen at the West Coast should be ordered to send the whole correspondence that has pass'd between them and the General &ca. Council of Batavia relative to the pretensions on Natal, for want of our Remarks cannot be so particular as We could wish it appears the Dutch Claim is founded on Conquest and a Treaty with the King of Baroos, of whose Dominions Natal is said by them to be a part, in answer to which they alledge that there is no Proof produced of this Conquest that upon the Strictest Enquiry they cannot find the least Traces of it at any period of time, and that the Dutch have never been suffered to land there, they are equally in the dark also in regard to any Treaty with the King of Baroos, tho' Chronology is not in use amongst the Natives, yet they are remarkably exact in their Oral Traditions concerning any great events, such as the Conquest of Countries, Revolutions and the Races of their Kings, by their learned Men it is generally allowed that the Sultan of Minam Caboo and King of Acheen are Sovereigns of the Dominions from Acheen to the southwd. of the Line, and that there are no others independent of them, from whence 'tis inferr'd that the pretended King of Baroos can be no more than a Delegate or Viceroy and consequently not legally empower'd, by Treaty to grant or Dispose of Countries, besides the Inhabitants of Natal say they never made any Contracts with them, on the contrary had declared them-selves Enemies to them from the earliest times to the day of Judgement, and the Sultan of Minam Caboo affirms they had no Grant for that place, these are the Principal Arguments made use of to shew the Weakness of the Dutch pretensions, to support their own they advance that frequent have the people of Natal invited them to settle there, that 'tis with their desire and consent, and that the sultan of Minam Caboo has confirm'd and given this Settlement to them. If the Dutch cannot bring more substantial Proofs than those already offered, We think the Claim of the English just, having recd no Letter from the General &ca. Council of Batavia it is uncertain whether the Dutch will persevere in their Claim or not.

Notwithstanding the Pretensions to this settlement as far as yet appears are just yet highly inexcusable is the Conduct of the Deputy Gov^r. &c^a. Council of Fort Marlbro, in daring under the specious pretence of extending the Company's Limits and increasing their Pepper Investment, at a great Expence to occupy this place, purely to serve their private Interest, and support a particular Trade at their Honble Masters Cost; this is very evidently the case, they acknowledge it in saying very little Pepper is or can be procured there & now tell us that if the Company reserve to themselves an exclusive Right to the Trade of Iron Salt and Ophium & levy a Custom on piece Goods imported there, it will not only defray the Expence, but a considerable profit will arise. This by

what the Supravizors say and We can learn is true though it does not in the least vindicate their Conduct and We think it may be greatly doubled whether if a Scrutiny had not been made, they would have ever proposed this plan, the Affairs seems too far advanc'd to retract and the Company are already considerably in Advance, without having received the least benefit, 'tis therefore Our opinion that the Settlement be continued on the proposed Terms Vizt. That

The Supravizors are of opinion that by selling the ophium at a low price (50 %) Cent) would in time occasion a considerable Ophuim Trade at this place, it may do so, and We can make this Regulation when We please, We conceive but too many reasons will be alledg'd for diminishing prices, but very few for raising them and judge it best to sell them for the most they will fetch, the success of this scheme will depend greatly on the faithful execution of it, which should be strongly enforced, and as a Complyance will always meet with suitable Encouragement so should it be declared that an Infringement will be immediately resented by a Suspension from the Service; Publick Notice should be given at Marlbro and its Subordinates that an exclusive right of selling Ophuim Iron and Salt is placed with the Company only, and whosoever is detected vending these Articles, if a covenanted Servant shall be suspended the Service, if a Person in the Seafaring or any other way, deprived of their Employs and excluded from the privilege of the Company's protection.

Sinkell a Port contiguous to Natal is remarkable for a Villanous set of people, who attempt to Masacre the Crews and seize such Vessells as they can over power, 'Tis a part of the Dominions of the King of Acheen, who Annually sends his Vessells to this Coast and sometimes to Our Port, We correspond with him in a friendly manner, may remonstrate to him these Insults and at the same time declare if they are not prevented We shall be oblig'd much against Our Inclination to make Reprisals.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS REPAIRS AND REVENUES.

We are sorry to observe that almost the whole of the Fortifications and Buildings at the several Settlemts. are in a bad condition, and that several Additional ones are wanting, this is attributed to unskillfullness of Artificers & perishable Materials; those probably bad in their kind & to these reasons We think can be added want of proper care in suffering them thus to run to decay, it is recommended that substantial Materials be in future made use of & that an Engineer is absolutely requisite to direct, the defect is so general, the Expence must be so great and the supply of Artificers and Materials, such unsurmountable difficulties that We think it should be referr'd to Our Honble Masters and for the present the illconveniencys removed as appear most immediately material, these seem to be Accomodations for servants Civil and Military, a Grainery and necessary Storehouses, and the Buildings at Subordinates have only the absolute requisite Repair, but no new ones to be erected.

The fixed Revenues have been increased by an Advance on the Ophium Licence of 147. 2 and on that of the Arrack & 170 ? Month the Increase on this of the Arrack is very particularly considerable which will be taken notice of when We speak of Deficiencys.

THE Supravizors have made a Regulation of settling a Duty of 5 7 cent on all Imports except those in the Manifest which pay only 2, what may come from Natal and from other Subordinates they rate at 2 7 Cent We Judge it would be best to put this Settlement at once on the same footing as most in India Vizt.

That a Duty of 5 ? Cent be collected on all Goods imported at Fort Marlbro, whether by Companys Servants or Others, that the Quantities and Sortment be manifested but the Duty collected on the Marlbro prices, in regard to such Goods as come from Natal &ca. as they are for exportation the Duty of 5 ? Cent be levy'd either on their Import or Export as they see convenient, and that all Goods transported from Vessell to Vessell in the road, be liable to this Custom, for the preventing of fraudulent Practice it may be publish'd that all Goods Clandenstinely landed will be confiscated, and whoever gives Information of and detects such Goods shall be entitled to 1/3 of them as a Reward, there has been a prohibition on the Importation of Bugguess Clouting, a Sortment of Goods which must hurts the Coast Trade, it has been taken off and in it's stead a Duty of 15 ? Cent substituted.

It will not be improper under this Head to mention the Arrack and Sugar Works, represented by the SupraVizors and Council to be in a flourishing condition and capable of great Improvements, that the Undertakers are industrious Chineese, Men without a Capital, if not supported in Advances of money by the Company as all Works of this Nature require in their Infancy large Disbursements, uncapable untill they are brought to some perfection to render adequate Returns, it must fall to the Ground, These Advances they are of opinion may be made with little Risque to Our Honble Masters Estate, as it is Agreed that for what Arrack and Sugar they furnish 1/3 of the Amount shall be carried to the Credit of their Debt by which means it will be gradually diminish'd and in about four Years totally paid off the premium on this loan of 10 ? Cent is judg'd to fall very heavy on them, which We think may be as an encouragement reduced to 5, and Advances with great Caution made them; their Request also for being supplied from Europe with Utensils on an Advance of 25 ? Cent may be granted, and every other fitting Encouragement given them; notwithstanding the flourishing Condition of these Works and the Appearance of Improvement by which the Undertakers will very probably have their Industry handsomely rewarded by large profit, yet the Gentlemen seem to have been so wholly engag'd with this fair Prospect, as not to extend their Views and enquiry to what Advantages will arise to Our Honble Masters or rather whether they may not be sufferers. Arrack of 150 Gallons to the Leaguer is generally sold for, from 40 to 45 Rix Dollars and good sugar at 4½ to 5 Pecul at Batavia, the former at the West Coast is invoiced at 60 Spanish Dollars P Leaguer of 160 Gallons and the latter 5 P Pecul, the prices here are variable also as they are more or less in Demand from 35 to 40 for the Arrack and from 13 to 15 Pagodas ? Candy The Sugar may be reckon'd a Medium. so that if the first Cost of these articles at the West Coast will not allow a profit equal to the risque, freight, Charges Merchandize & Leakage, the Company must evidently be sufferers; when the West Coast and Batavia prices are compared this may be reasonably demanded that We may be the better able to prevent the Contractors debt from swelling instead of diminishing an Account Current with them should be constantly transmitted as well as an Accot. of the Annual produce of these Works.

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS WRITERS MILITARY OFFICERS and their Accounts.

WE now lay before the Material regarding the particular Charge of Our Honble Masters to the Supravizors Vizt. that they had been assured their late Deputy Gov. Mr. Hurlock had quitted his Station to Mr. Hindley in consideration of a Sum of money given to him for that purpose "that if they found it true to dismiss him from their Service, whether it was a Sum of money paid or to be paid, whether a Debt or Debt to be forgiven or desperate Debt or Debts to be taken off, or a pecuniary consideration in any Shape what ever, it amounted to the same and they should proceed accordingly, as the putting a Stop to such Shamefull corruption was one of the principal Views in sending Supravizors to the West Coast" The Supravizors accordingly in Consultation of the 26th. December opened the Charge against Robert Hindley Esqr. and desired the several Members would inform them what they knew of this Affair, the 31st. Messrs. Massey, Combes and Gun addressed the Board, the Substance of their Letters were Mr. Combes declares Mr. Smith offered Mr. Hurlock 4000 Dollars to quit the Government which was refused, that afterwards an Agreement was sign'd by Messrs. Hurlock Massey and Smith in behalf of themselves and Mr. Hindley to take Mr. Hurlocks goods at Prime Cost and his Malay Debts. Mr. Massey affirms to the same purpose, Mr. Gun makes no mention of the Offer of 4000 \$\Display\$ but conforms the Contract and is more particular in regard to the Goods and Debts it appears very near the whole of the Moco Moco Debts have been paid half of those at Marlbro recover'd, that the concern in the Fanny, Goods Brilliant and furniture were charg'd at reasonable prices, some others are

said to be old and some damag'd, after these Circumstances were examin'd into the Opinion of the Board were collected. Messrs. Tottie and Gun declare they do not think it a pecuniary Consideration, Mr. Marriot the same but with this Addition, that according to the Companys mention of it he look'd upon it in that light. The sentiments of Messrs. Jack, Smith and Combes are in the affirmative, when the Supra Vizors upon Messrs. Massey and Combes taking their Oath that they heard Mr. Smith offer Mr. Hurlock 4000 Dollars to quit the Government deliver it as their Judgement that Mr. Hindley had given a pecuniary Reward to Mr. Hurlock therefore conformable to the Commands of Our Honble Masters they dismiss'd, him the service, Mr. Hindley alledges in his defence that he never heard of the offer of 4000 Dollars; its certain he was not on the Spot, 'tis true he impower'd Mr. Smith with an implicit confidence to act for him. He is generally reckon'd a Worthy honest Man, but by Misfortunes is so much involved that by this alone, he is according to the Company's Orders excluded from any pretensions to their Service, having delivered his Affairs into the Hands of Trustees, and being deprived of all support, he petition'd for an Allowance which the Supra Vizors have granted him (\\$50 \?) Month) it lies in your breast Gentlemen to recommend him as an object of that inestimable prerogative of Our Honble Masters (to shew Compassion to the unfortunate).

In Consulation of the 12th. January the Supra Vizors observe to Mr. Combes that he was not only privy to the Contract, but that it is in his own hand Writing and Witness'd by himself and therefore desire to know how he can reconcile his not making a publick Representation of it with the Duty he owes to the Company, to which he replies that the persons concern'd were a Majority of the Board, that the Contract was in their hands consequently he could bring no other proof than his declaration on Oath, which might have been overawed, that he cannot think this would have prevented it might indeed have induced them to transact the Affair more secretly, and that he took the first Opportunity of advising his Masters of it. Though Mr. Combes in a private Capacity may be greatly censur'd, he did his Duty in acquainting the Company of this Contract, it would indeed have been more conformable to their Orders had he immediately disclos'd it, by which many personal Reflections would have been prevented, very probably the Contract dropp'd and therefore he seems so far blameable.

Mr. Combes made application to the Supra Vizors & has address'd the presidency to succeed to the Vacancy occasion'd by Mr. Hindleys Dismission alledging a service of 20 years, being next in Standing, his many Services on an Embasy to Benjan an Expedition to Pooloo Pisang, wherein he acquired the Croee Districts and his Residence at Batavia as Agent during the French War. Our Honble Masters mention this Year, Mr. Combes with Marks of Approbation and therefore becomes matter of Consideration of this Board whether during the Commission of the Supra Vizors being in force the Appointment of a Deputy Gov^r. is necessary, and whether Mr. Combes's Standing and Services do not entitle him to the Succession.

Mr. John Massey Paymaster had before the arrival of the Supra Vizors been dismiss'd the Service, Upon Request his Case was reheard and full Liberty given him to make his defence, when Neglect, Embezlimt. of Materials appeared so clear, to which adding his being concern'd in the Contract with Mr. Hurlock, his Dismission was confirm'd and the Amount of the several over Charges and deficiencys demanded of him, which being unable to comply with, he delivered over his Effects into the Hands of Trustees. Messrs. John Douglas and Robt. Nairne, who took their Oaths to render a just Account of the same. Mr. Massey Addresses the presidency hoping that in Consideration of long Services his Allowances may be continued him. As the Supra Vizors mention that a bad Example from his predecessors probably had greatly influenc'd him in his

Conduct as Paymastr. by which he might in many respects plead Custom, It is left to your Honour &ca. Consideration whether you will please to allow him $30 \ \%$ Month till Our Honble Masters pleasure be known.

Mr. Daniel Tottie offers to this presidency a Complaint of great Injustice done him in the Appointment of Mr. Darval to the Residency of Manna to his prejudice being in Station superiour, and not offering any pretensions to it 'till he was by Standing intitul'd it appears something particular that Mr. Darval should enjoy the Secretarys Employ at Marlbro and that of the Residency of Manna at the same time, Stations greatly inconsistent with each other, for they both certainly require a constant Attendance on the Spott, Mr. Tottie We observe has a Seat at the Board, and though We would not propose it as a General Rule never to admit of an Exception that Merit and Capacity may sometimes take place, yet as Superiour Stations are certainly the Reward of long Services We are of opinion that very just reasons should be given for any Deviation from the General Rule, for if partiality takes place great Abuses may succeed, if no just objection can be alledg'd, We do not see why Mr. Tottie should not succeed, that a Secretary whose presence is absolutely necessary, at the same time to be appointed Resident at Manna, is a Transaction very particular.

Captn. Lieu^t. Gabbot by the Deputy Gov^r. directions drew for Captns pay and did Duty as such, he has been ordered to refund as it appears he acted by the Order of his Superiours, We think this a Hardship and that he is entitled to the pay. The Company in their General Letter to Fort Marlbro mention they have ordered an Officer from S^t. Helena otherwise Captain Lieutenant Gabbots Conduct seem to entitle him to the vacancy.

Josiah Smith a Soldier has been tried for the Murder of Farroo a Coffrey Woman and found guilty of the Fact, he remains in prison for Orders from hence.

Under the denomination of a Court of Judicature the Supra Vizors have appointed a Court consisting of the Members of the Council or any three of them (who have taken their Oaths to administer Justice impartially) to meet every Tuesday to decide all matters of property under the sum of \$\oplus 200\$ between Europeans, Chinese &c2. Inhabitants & that in Causes exceeding \$\oplus 50\$ an Appeal may be made to the Deputy Govr. &ca. Council also to enquire into all petty Crimes and Misdemeanours and upon Conviction to inflict Corporal Punishment, that the Fees of the Officers of this Court were to be settled—To create a Court of Judicature seems to be of so serious a nature, & what they have certainly no Authority to make or we to confirm, that it would be prudent immediately to set it aside & in its stead that We order the Deputy Gov. &ca. Council to meet once a week to hear all Causes of Property, and to enquire into all petty Crimes in regard to property, if between Europeans they may be recommended to Arbitration, if between Natives three of the Head Men may be joined with the Deputy Gov. &ca. Council and the Cause be decided, but it ought to be strongly enforced to them both in Cases of Property and Misdemeanour where Europeans are concern'd to act conformable to the Laws of the Nation and upon no Account to deviate from them.

SEVENTHLY OF ACCOUNTS.

In perusing the Consultations after the Arrival of the Supravizors, the first that presents is that in receiving the Cash there appears a Surplus of \$\poppoonup 699.3 upon Mr. Hindley and the other Gentlemen in Council being called upon to declare what they know of it. It appears that on receit of the Bullion from Europe they computed each Bag at 1000 Dollars, brought it in to Account on this footing and took the Overplus. For how many Years this Custom has prevailed & the Advantages that have arose on it is impossible to assertain, The

Surplus is now brought to the Credit of Account Current Fort S^t. George—In future the Treasure should be counted in presence of the Deputy Gov^r. &c^a. Council immediately after the receipt of it.

There appeared on the Books a Ballance of Copper Cash of \$\rightarrow\$ 410. -. 16 and not a Single one remaining upon enquiry it could be fixed no where and therefore the whole Board ordered to pay it, it was not collected; Care should be taken that it be, and in future it may be a Head on the Warehouse Books Credited Monthly for what delivered out as sold and be under his Charge.

In reading the Cash Account for June there appeared a deficiency of 579. –. 83 The Supra Vizors and Gentlemen having keys to the Chest, it could not be accounted for and was therefore made good by them all. This is a Convincing Proof of the Effects of Irregularity and lead us to take notice, that We dont observe the Cash Accounts for April, May, June and July entered as is usual after Consultation.

The Supra Vizors on being offered \$\pi\$ 300 for the Arrack Licence very justly enquired how it came before to be let only for \$\pi\$ 130, and were answered it was put up at Outcry and bought in by Mr. Hindley and Mr. Harlock at \$\pi\$ 130, The Gentlemen of Council were of opinion the Outcry was unfair and therefore the difference demanded of Mr. Hindley and Mr. Hurlocks Attorneys.

In appears a Custom has prevailed of selling the Company's Stores to Inhabitants and others at so large an Advance on the Company's price as 40 Cent, Mess^{rs}. Gunn, Tottie and Idell have paid into Cash on that Account 391. 1. 96 Mr. Combes also has dealt very largely that way, but alledging that agreeable to an Indulgence granted by the Company he bought them on his own Account and afterwards sold them on his own to the Natives therefore no demand has been made on him, which is extraordiny as the others might have alledg'd the same, it should therefore be demanded and explain'd to those Gentlemen that if the storekeeper knowing the Company are in want of Articles, purchases them first on his own Account & then sells them to the Company at an Advanc'd Price, if knowing many articles are in Demand, he takes them in his Name out of the Storehouse and sells them at an Advance price, leaving those that may possibly lay a considerable time, he acts upon a wrong principle and abuses the Indulgence to their servants to take out of their Magazines such things as they may want for their own use at a moderate price, Mr. Combes we think ought to pay the Over Charge.

In taking the remains of the Storehouse several Deficiencys arise amounting to \$5591. 2. 8 after the strictest Scrutiny they have not been able to fix them directly on any one, but Messrs. Raine, Massey, Coales & Hampton having been the Storekeepers, they charg'd each with such a part as they thought just and demanded the Amount, but as We observe that the Supra Vizors and Gentlemen all allow Mr. Henry Coals to be an honest assiduous Man and that the Remains were not taken till after his Death, six Months consequently the care of the Storehouse must have been in other hands for that time, We are of opinion he cannot be justly charg'd with any part and therefore think the Bonds taken from the Exor should be return'd, a Remain Book interchangeably sign'd will prevent the like in future.

In regarding it is represented there is quantity of light pepper not fit to be mixed with that for Europe, The Question is what becomes of it.

In regard to the several Deficiencys &c*. We shall only add that if the Supravizors on the Spot are not able to trace out under whose Management they have arose much less are We, Impartial Jutsice should direct them, and when our Honble Masters have been injured all lawful means shou'd be made use of for obtaining proper Satisfaction.

As to the Deputy Gov^r. and Paymaster, We believe Deputy Gov^{rs}. & Paymasters from the Commencement of the Settlement have enjoy'd Advantages, nor do We see amongst all the Gentlemen there any one that has scrupled taking them in their Employs, probably had they been in the same Stations would have acted just the same, while these Emoluments were moderate, We believe Our Honble Masters would not disapprove them, but when they exceed, a Reform is absolutely necessary.

The Reduction of Expences amounts to \$\Delta\$ 20194. -. 92 of which 12000 comes under the head of Charges Garrison & Country Guard. The Garrison of Marlbro consists of 120 Military & Train, Moco Moco 16, Manna 16 and Natal 30 Total 182. A Number full little enough for such an Entent of District, We cannot think it prudent under a Notion of saving, to risque the Welfare of those settlements. The Malays are remarkable for Treachery, should it be necessary to make any considerable Draught from Marlbro that Garrison would be very weak, the Covenanted Servants now are 29, by a Calculation made by the Supra Vizors 42 are necessary, for transacting the several Branches of Affairs on that Coast, so that We can regard this Reduction of \$\Delta\$ 20194. -. 92 as temporary only & from hence We conclude that what Our Honble Masters say that this Settlement & it's Subordinates are Annually a loss to them will not be removed so much by the lessening Expences, as by a prudent Conduct and proper Attention to the Investment, which tis unanimously allowed might be encreas'd at least to double it's present produce. This therefore should be strenuously recommended and will We hope be pursued with Vigour as the surest means to recommend them to the Esteem of their Employers.

It would have been of great help to us had the SupraVizors form'd their Regulations into a Journal or Diary or rang'd the whole under the usual heads, We are now oblig'd to have recourse to theirs & the General Letters with Consultations where they are mix'd with the Current Business, which renders it a Work of more time than is consistent with the Dispatch of the Prince George at this Season, to be exactly particular as we could desire, however We have omitted nothing very Material, We could wish Leizure from their other Avocations would have admitted of one of them having visited the subordinates, it would have given them a more clear & entensive [sic] knowledge of what they now only have from Report, It is a work that still continues necessary.

To do Justice to these Gentlemen they have not been wanting in the due-Execution of their Trust repos'd in them, the Regulations they have made will We believe put that Coast upon a good Establishment and Our Honble Masters approve their Conduct, but still the path is only mark'd out a Relapse may succeed, therefore We conceive the Supra Vizorship should be continued in Mr. John Pybus & if possible another joined with him, when one might visit the Subordinates, whilst the other remain'd at the Head Settlement, till Our-Honble Masters advised of the several Transactions should send us their Directions.

Honble Sir & Sirs

As I am very sensible of the many important Affairs, your honours have to transact, it is with reluctance, that I give you any trouble at this time, but hope you will excuse it. As it is now seven Years since I was appointed Commander of the Sloop Porto Bello by the Honble Court of Directors in London, and ever since have been employ'd on such service, as has been attended with a great deal of trouble and fatigue, but very few opportunitys of reaping any Advantage. The first four Years and half I was employ'd as Tender to his Majestys Ships under the orders of Admiral Boscawen, Comm^{dr}. Lisle and lastly of Captain Spike after being discharg'd from that Service I arrived at S^t. David in Febry 1752, the Vessel being that time much in want of Repairs, I received Orders to get the Sloop ready to proceed to Syrian as soon as possible in order to be repaired, which I accordingly did, and in the meantime (by the Advice of People who were acquainted that way) I purchas'd some Goods of different kinds fit for that Market; but afterwards was detained at Fort S^t. David 'till the 19th. 1752, when We sailed with a Detachment of Men, Military Stores &c*. for the Negrais where We remain'd till the beginning of September, at which time the people being sickly ashore (by Mr. Taylors orders) the Detachment with all the Stores &c*. was again embark'd and We proceeded to Syrian but on my Arrival there, could not dispose of any of the Goods I brot, with me as the Market was then overstock'd by Vessells arriving a long time before us

and some Months after Mr. Westgarths House took fire and was burnt, in which I lost Goods to the Amount of above five hundred Pagodas prime Cost at Fort St. David; All which I humbly submit to your honours Consideration (the Time I serv'd in this Sloop, the trouble and fatigue attending the Service and the loss I have sustain'd) hoping that your Honours will provide better for me than the Vessell I am in at present—I am

I therefore hope your Honour &ca. will not condemn me for expressing an uneasiness at being much disappointed in the expectation I had entertain'd of your following what I have always heard has been laid down as a Standing Maxim, to allot the Honble Company's Servants such posts as their Ranks give them Claim to, if their Conduct does not forbid it, and your disposition of me on first coming to Madrass (a Goodness which I had a due sense of) strengthen'd me in that Notion, a Presumption that has made less Assiduous in solliciting when there has been any prospect of a Vacant Employ that I thought I had pretensions to apply for; but am sorry to find I have laboured thus long under a Mistake, whereof the Advancement of Messrs. Fairfield and Lewen Smith, as well as the Gentleman in Question are Instances too apparent.

I could enlarge my Letter with many Arguments that I conceive are on my side, and which I shou'd have urged in time had I had the opportunity & been sensible it was needfull to advance them, but as I have too much reason to think they will now avail me nothing I should avoid detaining your Honour &c. therewith, & conclude with this one essential Request, that you will do me the Justice not to leave room for my friends in England, who will be acquainted with my degradation to suspect me of being so undeserving of the promotion they have put me in the way of, as the Cause of my Complaint seems to indicate, unless my Demerits are the real Obstruction, or if that be the Case. of those I shall be thankfull to be informed that I may either clear the impediment or no longer indulge Views that are groundless. THE Military Storekeepers Advantages arise from providing of sundry trifling Articles in the Country, at the Risk of his own Money, these are charg'd to the Company at a moderate profit to answer the losses and Inconveniencys the Storekeeper is liable to by making such Advances being a length of time out of his money, and having on hand a Stock of those Articles ready for use when called for, as they are only brought to Account when wanted, & in the year the whole Amount (as farr as I can judge from the Interval I have been in the Employ) is about 3 or 400 Pagodas—And though with the Addition of the other establish'd Allowances I enjoy from the Company amount to Pags. 900 # annum. HONBLE SIR & SIRS

As I have had the Honour of being employ'd by your Honble Board on an expedition to the Negrais, I beg leave to present you with some few Remarks that I have made on that place and of the Town of Persain.

THE Entrance and falling in with the Negrais, We have found by a Survey taken by Captn. Wm. Grierson in March last not to be near so dangerous as [We] before apprehended it to be, to the Westward of Cape Negrais is soundings 40 and 50 fathom, ten or twelve L[eague] of Shore and these Soundings reaches to the Southwest of the Laguardas but to the Northward of the Cape, the Soundings does not run out near so far, it is not safe for any Ship to come under ten fathom Water rounding the Cape, as there is foul ground and over falls so that it is not adviseable for any Ship to go nearer the Cape and Shore towards Pagoda Point than five Miles untill Diamond Island is in Sight at E.N.E. or E. by N. at which time the Ships Course must be so directed as to

bring Pagoda Point N. E. and Diamond Island East, then N. W. Point of the little Negrais will be open with Pagoda Point and this is a good place to Anchor in case a Ship want a Pilot, I would not Advise any Ship to go nearer to Pagoda. Point in the Southwest Monsoon, without going into the Harbour as there is a great Sea occasion'd by the South West swell meeting the Ebb Tide, which raises a great Surf from Diamond Island to Pagoda Point notwithstanding there is seven fathom Water, but on the flood Tide and in the N. E. Monsoon it is smooth Water—if a Stranger should want to go in without a pilot, after he has brought his Ship to the above bearings, he may direct his Course directly for the opening made by the N. W. Point of the Negrais and Pagoda Point, and must mind to keep them at the same bearings, as the Ebb Tide setts to the W.S.W.] flood to the E.N.E. gives Pagoda Point a Birth of one Qu-[arter] of a Mile and when you have shut in the Land to the Westward of Pagoda Point, the flood Tide runs up the Negrais Harbour, he is then to steer directly for the opening made by the N. W. Point of the little Negrais and Main Land which may be done with a Leading Gale with Safety, When you come up to the N. W. Point of the little Negrais, keep about Mid Channel 'till you have past it, then you may Anchor in the Harbour in 5 or 6 Fathoms, soft Mud all the Way to the N.E. Point, I judge the N.E. End of the Harbour to be the best place for Ships to refit and Carreen as it is entirely defended from the Sea, and so, erly Winds, but the S.W. end lays too open to the Sea for any such work.

I judge the N. Et. part of the Island Negrais to be the most proper place for a Town, and think it will not be so sickly as Our present situation, here the ground is higher than the high Water Mark, and the Beach, Sand and Gravel, but at Our present Situation the Tide flows 50 or 60 yards nearer the Hills than the inner part of Our Works, and leaves a number of small fish and Slimy Mud, which has so great a Stench when the Water leaves it, that it alone is sufficient to make any body sick, and the Beach is Ozey Mud, it is the most capable of making the greatest defence as it will give an Enemy an immense deal of Trouble to approach it by land, admitting they should make themselves Masters, of the So.ern Part of the Island, they will have to go thro. a Morras or bring their Baggage over the Hills, which I think is impossible to do with any thing more than a Man can carry upon his back as they will be oblig'd to go down into many deep valleys, and I think an Engineer may so dispose of his defences upon those Hills that the back part of the Town may never be in danger of being taken, this part of the Island produces great quantitys of blue Marbel and Clay to make bricks and very good Timber. The Peguers say We may get, free Stones out of the Hills, We dig'd into a Hill, about 6 foot, found the Clay to be white two foot deep but soft, at six foot it was much harder but the excessive hard rain put an end to Our design. The Southern part of the Island does not produce any Materials to carry on any Buildings. the Wood is small & crook'd and the Soil sandy so that all the Materials must be carry'd to it, for if in case the Island should be requir'd to be fortify'd, I think Batterys or small Forts would be absolutely necessary upon the N. W. and S. Et. points and if that upon the N. W. point was to have heavy Cannon upon it they might annoy any Ships greatly coming in.

Persaim by all Accounts is a Wholesome Country at least I found it so from the beginning of Spr. 'till March, at which time Our people was Sickly at the Negrais, It's a ruin'd City that formerly belong'd to the Portugueze and at present round the Ruins is a fence made of thick Plank about 12 or 14 foot high, it is about 1400 Yards in length and about 900 Yards in bredth, it has likewise a ruin'd Citidal of about 350 Yards in length and 250 Yards in breadth, and round the outside of the Walls for about two Miles is the ruines of many brick Houses, Malabar and Pegu Pagodas, it seems as if it had been a place of great Consequence, the * Tallapoys have inform'd me that by their Manuscripts a great Number of China Men, inhabited this place & they not only traded to

the East part of China, but to the West part overland, and at the same time the Portugueze govern'd the City it had a very extensive Trade and that the N. E. point of the little Negrais was then Inhabited. We have discovered there a foundation of a brick house and a large Mallabar Tank.

Persaim River has a Communication with the grand River to Ava, and joins it a little below Prone & I have been inform'd by Burma Merchants & Armenians who have lived in Ava many Years that great Quantity of Salt Petre were produced in the Country between Prone and Ava, and that before the Revolution it might be bought at the rate of 8 Pagodas P Candy for the first sort, the Country likewise produces Silk and Cotton, & I think in all probability a Cloth Manufacture might be carry'd on, as I have never seen a House without a Loom and Spinning Wheel, and that We may dispose of great quantitys of Woolen Cloths, the people in general seem to be fond of it, and what is now sold goes through the Mallabar hands, so that by the time the Peguers or Burmars get it, it amounts to near one hundred P Cent on the Madrass Price.

The present Government of Pegue is excessively arbutary, [sic] so that when the King pleases, he can demand every thing in the world that any of his Subjects has, and if there is any such thing as Slavery in the World, I think the Peguers wear that Yoke & they think that all Europeans that come into their Country is as much their Slaves, and that they have as much right to their properties as to their own Subjects and it is from this Principal that they are jealous of having a European Power independent of them in their Country.

This being an unparalled[sic] Case was unwilling to enter into a Charge so contrary to all former Appointments, without any just reason to doubt the Capacity or abilitys of the Gentleman at present directed to be Second of Council, which otherwise might give Cause—And further more presuming a thing of this nature might be contrary to your Honour &ca's Intentions, I with due submission take the liberty of representing the present case, being well assured of your Honour &ca's, Impartial Consideration and Appointment according to the long Approved Rules—observed here, and not permit the private or Sinister Ends of any one to set it aside, where no just Reason to the contrary is offered.
