DIARY AND CONSULTATION BOOK, 1755.

INTRODUCTION.

The truce and the provisional treaty concluded by Saunders with Godeheu towards the close of 1754 put a stop to the active hostilities between the English and the French in the Carnatic. To George Pigot, who succeeded Saunders early in 1755, it appeared as if the French would co-operate with the English in maintaining the status quo until at least the orders on the provisional treaty could arrive from Europe. Commissaries were appointed on both sides to investigate the alleged violation of the truce in Karunguli and other contested districts. De Saussay, the French Commandant at Srirangam, apprised Major Kilpatrick of a daring scheme of night attack hatched by the Dalavai to take Trichinopoly by surprise. He even offered assistance to attack the enemy from the rear when the Major was to attack him from the front. But circumstances soon proved too adverse to indulge in anticipations of peace. The utter poverty of the Nawab and his growing debts to the Company compelled Pigot and his Council to assist him in re-establishing his authority in the Madura and Tinnevelly countries. The fact that the poligars of these countries had all along, even before the truce, recognized the Nawab as their overlord, and never during the late war sided with the enemy banished all fears of trespassing on the terms of the truce. Major Heron sent at the head of an expedition reduced Madura, appointed Mahfuz Khan, the Nawab's brother, as the Governor of the conquered country and after some fighting, succeeded in reducing Tinnevelly also. But though a novice in country politics, Heron trusted to his own greed and abilities where he ought to have trusted to the instructions of his superiors, and committed blunders after blunders until he was peremptorily recalled by the Presidency. His promises and advances to the Maravar roused the suspicions and jealousies of the Tondiman and the King of Tanjore. The two faithful allies of the English could only be, with great difficulty, restrained from attacking the Maravar, their common enemy, and thereby violating the truce and placing the Presidency in the invidious position of opposing them with the assistance of the French. His unauthorized pecuniary transactions with the poligars and with Mahfuz Khan robbed the Company and the Nawab of a large portion of the revenues of the conquered countries. His recall, dismissal and flight constitute a sad episode in the history of 1755. But it was by no means the only sad event of the year. The arrival of the new French Governor, De Leyrit, ushered in a fresh crop of troubles. Under his regime the French pressed their claims for Torriore, Arealore and Warriorapollem, protracted the negotiations over the contested districts and more than once created a critical situation. At the same time the King of Tanjore, heeding little to the entreaties and remonstrances of the Presidency, ordered Manoji to march against the Tondiman to recover certain districts, which Manoji had, some years ago, given him without the King's knowledge and consent. The most delicate but firm diplomacy was required on the part of Captain Caillaud, to compose this quarrel.

And yet the year closed not without bringing some substantial advantages to the English. Bussy was, it was true, still exercising supreme authority in the Deccan; but his approach with Salabat Jang towards Mysore forced the Dalavai to quit Srirangam, to move with all his troops to his own country, and thus removed a constant danger to Trichinopoly. Heron's expedition, indeed, did not immediately lead to the subjugation of Madura and Tinnevelly. The rebellious poligars who had fled on his approach returned on his departure and assisted by the forces of Travancore harassed Muhfuz Khan. But the countries, though not completely subdued, were annexed again to the Nawab's dominions. In fact the Nawab was steadily being re-established in his dominions by the Company's forces. In July he was escorted by the Company's troops to Arcot, his ancient capital, where he made a grand entry on 21st August. From there he visited Madras, mortgaged certain districts

to the Company as part payment of his debts and promised to pay half of all collections of his tribute, if only he were assisted in reducing the recalcitrant poligars of the Arcot country. The Presidency acquiesced in his proposals and sent Mr. Percival and Major Kilpatrick with a considerable army to accompany him on this expedition.

The Public Consultations of the year mention only such of these military and political events as came occasionally for discussion before the full Board. These were few, but none the less important, so that we find here much useful information which supplements the Military Consultations. Thus the blunders committed by Colonel Heron are not described here, but the deliberations of the full Board on the result of the investigations conducted by the Secret Committee are here narrated in full. On the 29th September, we are told, the current business of the day being over, the President briefly informed the Board of the origin, development and mismanagement of Heron's expedition and drew their attention to the several charges framed against him by the Secret Committee and his replies. The Board, having "maturely weighed" the case, unanimously came to the conclusion that he had been guilty of "perverting the intentions of his Commission" on the following counts: on his not having settled accounts with the poligars jointly with the Commissary, Mr. Maunsell, and Mahfuz Khan in the manner directed by the Secret Committee, on his not having immediately returned with the army on receipt of the Committee's orders, on his having applied for his own use and that of other persons all the tributes collected from the poligars instead of bringing them into the public account, on his having farmed out the conquered countries to Mahfuz Khan instead of collecting the tributes due in conjunction with him and Mr. Maunsell, and on his having incurred a greater expenditure than the collections could reimburse. On these charges he was suspended from his seat at the Board "until the Honourable Company's pleasure be known?." He, however, ignored this order on the ground that it should have been communicated to him not by the Secretary but by the Board's. Meanwhile a Court Martial on his conduct had been ordered by the Secret Committee and appointed by Colonel Adlercron⁴ and its sitting at Madras being shortly expected, Pigot and his Council resolved to place before it four brief articles of charges that he had been guilty, first of perverting the intention of his commission, secondly of authorizing and collecting for his own use a bazaar duty on the necessaries of life brought into the garrison at Madura, thirdly of committing breach of orders and fourthly of behaving in a manner unbecoming an officer. Secretary was deputed to attend the Court Martial on behalf of the Board and to "deliver in the Charge, produce Proofs, call and examine the witnesses . . and to do all such Things as shall be needfull for supporting the Articles proposed 5." The reader may refer to the Military Consultations for the full details of these charges. As the first three charges have been already indicated above, only the fourth requires some elucidation. On Heron's return march from Madura considerable loss was occasioned to the army by an unexpected attack made by the Kallars in the Nattam woods. The reason for this attack was that he had confiscated a large number of "religious images" of the Coilgudy Pagoda which the Kallars wanted to recover. This act was rightly regarded as "unworthy of an English Officer" as also the detention of certain Brahmin women in the camp and the keeping of a guard for several days on a Muhamadan's house in Tinnevelly?. The Court Martial, however, acquitted him of the second and fourth charges, but found him guilty of the first and third and dismissed him. Then occurred an ignominious episode

which was, however, not without some theatrical glamour. On the 4th December, Colonel Adlercron's approval of the sentence of the Court Martial having arrived, the Board resolved to consider it on the following day. But before the 5th dawned, at 5 a.m., we are informed, Heron with a handful of his attendants fled on a palankeen towards Sadras. At 9 a.m. the President was apprised of this flight. Pigot imagined that Heron's intention was to take refuge in Pondicherry. This was greatly detrimental to the Company, since Heron, having been a member of the Board, could supply the French with confidential information. Nor could he be reclaimed as a deserter, having been dismissed the service. Pigot, therefore, immediately despatched a party of sepoys and some troopers in pursuit of the fugitive. But at noon the next day the troopers returned to report their failure. After a full gallop one of them had come upon Heron. But "as soon as the Colonel was infomed by his servants of the Trooper's approach, he leapt out of his Palankeen, and stood on his Guard, being armed with a Sword, a Carbine and a Case of Pistols". When the trooper told him that the Governor had ordered him to return "he refused to comply and bid him depart or he would instantly shoot him". On this the trooper thought best to return without attempting violence. Such was the sad end of a career steeped in arrogance and selfishness, but none the less adorned with gallantry. For, Heron during his expedition did not fail to show that he was endowed with personal courage and bravery of the highest quality on the battle field.

Pigot and his Council were equally embarrassed by the independent and, in general, unreasonable attitude shown by Colonel Adlercron. The Public Consultations give us only a glimpse of this strained relationship between the Civil and Military authorities. In order to get a full view of it we may refer here to the Military Consultations as well. In the previous volume we have seen that it was not without much difficulty that Saunders had extorted a promise from the Colonel that he would do every thing to promote the Company's interests and would not interfere in the "command of their garri-But the Colonel, it will be seen, did not scruple to break the promise the moment the restraining influence of Saunders was removed from the Government. Pigot, however, gave him little scope to exercise supreme authority over the Company's army or to meddle in country politics. He reminded him of the compact he had made with Saunders in those matters, and humoured him in other matters of lesser consequence. He acceded to his demands where prudence dictated such a course necessary but always impressed on him the cardinal fact that the Company's Civil authorities would never submit to the dictation of the Military authorities, even though such Military authorities might have been appointed by the Crown.

The Government were not chary in providing all the necessary comforts to the King's troops. They lodged them in the Garden House and other houses hired for the purpose in Manjakkuppam, a place situated between Fort St. David and Cuddalore. They granted them a fixed allowance with retrospective effect from 1st September last in addition to the advance for oil, water, etc., which Adlercron demanded. They granted Adlercron and Admiral Watson a daily allowance of 5 pagodas from the date of their arrival. But they insisted that for all stores supplied a regular account should be maintained by the Deputy Governor and Council of Fort St. David. They believed that Adlercron had come with sufficient cash to defray all these expenses. But when Richard Starke, the Deputy Governor, asked for the payment of the stores supplied, Adlercron refused to comply saying that the accounts might be transmitted to England for settlement. They then directed Starke to draw up a consolidated account of all the stores supplied and to present it to the Colonel for his signature and to follow the same procedure monthly so that the authenticated accounts might be sent to England⁶. But, even to this procedure, which was substantially the same as that suggested by him, Adlercron

partially demurred. He refused to certify the stores supplied him till March but promised to adopt the procedure for the future. Such difficulties over details could have been raised only by a person who did not seem to evince any desire to co-operate with the Company's Government.

Instances soon occurred to test the measure of his suspicion, hostility, pride and rancour. In May, Starke as usual approved the sentence of a Court Martial held on some of the Bombay detachment stationed at Cuddalore. Adlercron fulminated against this procedure. Pigot calmly informed him that Cuddalore being a Company's settlement subordinate to Fort St. David, it was only right that the Deputy Governor should have the sole voice in the matter. The Colonel was quartered with his whole regiment at the Garden House; and therefore, he "cannot be said to be personally present in the Garrisons either of Fort St. David or Cuddalore". He reminded him of his promise to Saunders, but it was of no avail. Adlercron held that Cuddalore was within his jurisdiction and declared that he would refer the matter to the decision of his superiors in England. And, in order to humiliate Pigot, he refused to grant him the power of approving the sentence of a Court Martial which was then to be held at Madras and conveyed the same to Major Kilpatrick. Instead of resenting this treatment, it is refreshing to notice that Pigot thanked him for what he had done and agreed to apply to him for every general Court Martial which might, in future, be held at Madras2. To show his goodwill and amicable disposition he immediately adopted this procedure in the case of some Swiss deserters³.

But goodwill had no soothing effect on the irate Colonel. He professed that he was always for maintaining harmony but insinuated that the "Managers of the Company's Affairs have not taken so much care on their part", and, as an instance of his being neglected, mentioned of his not having been supplied with a copy of the provisional treaty. The treaty did not in the least refer to any military matters but as the truce did contain some military clauses it was transmitted to him for his information.

No sooner had these clouds passed the horizon than another of a yet darker hue made its appearance. On the 14th July, the Deputy Governor and Council of Fort St. David wrote to Pigot that the commanders of the garrisons of both Cuddalore and Fort St. David had been put under arrest by Adlercron and threatened with a Court Martial. The offence alleged was that they had desired to receive directions from the Deputy Governor before proclaiming an order of the Colonel to the effect that "no Officer in future should sleep out of the Bounds of Fort St. David without leave from him ". Adlercron had put Captains Forbes and Campbell under arrest without even consulting Starke and this high-handed act menaced the privileges and interests of the Company. And yet Pigot and his Council did not wish to rake up the controversy and cause unpleasantness by any lengthy correspondence. To settle all disputes and to consult him on some political matters they invited him to come to Madras 5.

The Colonel however never came, nor did he, it was fortunate, keep the officers for long under arrest. He gave vent to his anger by threatening to retract the promise made to Saunders. The Government explained to him the extreme unwisdom of this course. They considered that it could hardly be reconciled with His Majesty's instructions to him "which expressly say that the Troops are sent abroad for the Service and Benefit of the East India Company, and in support of their just Rights and Priviledges'."

This was not all. On the 30th July, Adlercron wrote direct to Colonel Lawrence asking him whether he desired to attend a Council of War which he would shortly summon at Fort St. David. Lawrence placed the communication before the President and Committee. The Committee decided that Lawrence's presence was absolutely necessary at the Council Board and directed Pigot to

inform Adlercron that as Lawrence was one of the General Council, he should have addressed him through the Council and his addressing direct to Lawrence without even acquainting the President that he had done so "is failing somewhat in that Respect which he insists so much on himself"."

In August when on his way to Arcot the Nawab arrived at Fort St. David escorted by Captain Polier's party, Adlercron, without consulting Starke, ordered a Captain's guard with 100 men to wait on the Nawab. Polier was taken by surprise. He thought that he had been superseded, and this, indeed, would have been the case, had he not immediately consulted Starke and the Nawab and nipped the plan in the bud. The Nawab politely declined to accept the Colonel's guard, assuring him that the force sent by the Government was quite adequate for his protection. Thus was avoided much needless expense, division of command and the "Disputes hurtful to the Service²."

Meanwhile the Council of War which Adlercron had summoned, seemed to have been fruitful only in inflaming his passions. For, in communicating its opinion to Pigot, we learn that he cast "many Reflexions which are neither Polite nor well grounded". He reproached the Government for having preferred "the private Interest of the Company's Troops and Servants to Justice and every other Consideration." He reproached them for having been "of Opinion that the King of Great Britain has no authority in or over the Company's Settlements." Caustic as were these remarks, Pigot and his Council did not wish to fan the flame afresh. They simply ordered that a general memorial be drawn out of all their transactions with him from his arrival in India and that it be transmitted to him with a reply to his letter answered paragraph by paragraph from the facts taken from the memorial. They felt that such a plain recapitulation of the facts would be sufficient evidence in their behalf³. But we learn that to avoid friction even the memorial and reply were subsequently ordered not to be transmitted to him.

This genuine desire to heal the wounds was, it would seem, altogether inexplicable to Aldercron. He accused the Government of neglect and disrespect and towards the end of the year when he was informed to be ready to intercept any French forces which might be despatched by De Leyrit from Pondicherry to prevent the Nawab from demanding the tributes due from his poligars. he doubted "whether We have not first broke the Treaty by sending an Army with the Nabob on such a Service". He likewise complained of his not having been furnished with a copy of the Provisional Treaty and talked of the "most unprecedented usage" throughout meted out to him. This was too much for Pigot and his Council. "He cannot address us on publick Business without a large Mixture of Expressions tending only to inflame Divisions." They were thoroughly convinced that by the instructions of the Crown he is only to execute the Plans sent him by us as far as the Council of War find them practicable without enquiring into our Reasons." Still, however, to set his doubts at rest, they sent him a copy of the Provisional Treaty and explained to him the justness of the Nawab's right over the poligars and the weakness of De Leyrit's pretensions.

This was one of the last occasions on which Adlercron addressed the Government during the year. But the Parthian shot came not from him but from his assistant, Lieutenant Colonel Bagshaw. This man appears to have shared fully the views of his superior. It was he who had been authorized by the Colonel to enter into an agreement with Saunders which was subsequently disavowed by the Colonel. He now put in an indignant representation against the appointment of Major Kilpatrick to lead the expedition against the Arcot poligars. He claimed to be the oldest officer on the Coast, next to the Commander-in-Chief of the King's forces. He asserted his "undoubted right" to

command any body of troops where his superior did not act himself. And he represented that until he was convicted of want of courage, capacity and conduct, his claims could not be set aside without the "greatest Partiality and Injustice." To make matters worse, he proceeded in a tone which he must have known could hardly have furthered his cause. "I believe the Merchants of England are superior in Wisdom as well as Riches to those of any People in the World. Yet I will persume to say, their Credit and Esteem with other Nations depends on their Integrity and the justness of their Actions, not on their Riches or Understanding. And I hope the Gentlemen who represent the most considerable Body of Merchants in Great Britain, will not refuse even to a single Person that Equity they would observe to a Community." This was a needless, irrelevant, insinuating piece of insolence. Pigot and his Council dismissed it by directing the Secretary to let him know that they always looked upon him as being directly under Colonel Adlercron and as the Colonel had been allotted a station in Cuddalore, they deemed it only proper that he too should remain at that station under his immediate superior¹.

At this stage we may set the clock back and review from the beginning the public events of the year narrated in these Consultations. The year opens with Saunders at the wheel of affairs with George Pigot, Stringer Lawrence, Charles Boddam, Henry Powney, Robert Orme, Alexander Wynch, William Percival, John Smith and Charles Bourchier as his colleagues in Council². Within a few days, however, Saunders, after a brilliant career set in a darkening gloom bids farewell to Madras just as he had hailed it some 20 years ago, a lone and solitary figure, self-satisfied maybe, but not sufficiently rewarded for his signal services to the Company. On the 12th January, he handed over charge to Pigot and on the 14th embarked on the Norfolk for England. And yet he left a deep impress on the administration. His legacies, both in the matters of external and internal concerns of the Company, were piously treasured by his successor. Assisted by the same Council, Pigot, at any rate during the first year of his rule, displayed a conduct in many ways similar to that of his illustrious predecessor. His determination to oppose the French aggrandizement, to uphold the Nawab's rights, to put down corruption and indiscipline in the Company's army and preserve its interests in the midst of much opposition from the officers of the King's troops has already been indicated. His genuine efforts to revive the Company's investment, to set right their finances and in general to improve their administration now claim our special attention.

The times were, indeed, unpropitious. The Anglo-French wars had ceased, but ceased only to revive bitter memories of frustrated hopes and secret revenge. Both nations gave little hopes to the country to relapse into its normal peaceful conditions. The air was still impregnated with doubts, suspicious and secret preparations for yet another conflagration. The last conflagration had, both in the Arcot country and in the Deccan, left by no means easily indelible marks of its ravages. It had blighted cotton cultivation, forced the weavers to fly from their homes, discouraged the merchants, set up a chronic state of diminishing finances and fostered unhealthy competition between the French and the English in the provision of the investment. This state of affairs, though relieved to some extent by the temporary peace patched up between the two nations, continued to make its effects felt throughout 1755. To the scarcity, dearness and bad quality of cotton were now added a fierce competition between the French, the Dutch and the English and a combination among the merchants to artificially keep up the price of all articles of finished goods.

Complaints were early received from the Northern Factories. Andrews of Bandermalanka attributed the badness and dearth of the investment to various causes. There was the alarm of the Maratha incursions which had obliged the merchants to procure what they hastily could from the panicstricken weavers. There was the competition set up by the French who had advanced their merchants 30,000 pagodas for the supply of ordinary cloth.

Their gumastas were receiving all the cloth turned out by him at an extravagant They were also taking in cloth without measuring or sorting, a thing which he dared not do for fear of displeasing the Company. There was the intrigue engendered by the weavers who, taking advantage of the pressing demands of the merchants, were supplying bad cloth. And so far as he was concerned, there was the want of early supplies of cash which was hampering him not a little in his dealings with the merchants1. In February, he sent in a small consignment of bales and reported that owing to French competition he had not been able to procure a single bale for the last two months². Foss Westcott of Ingeram, too, reported the same tale of misery. He, too, could supply only a small quantity of bales in February. He had been forestalled and outbidden by the French. They had advanced their merchants large sums of money and bought all cloth he had rejected at a price higher than he could offer. Moreover, a parcel of his cloth had been seized by Jaganauth Razu's. About the middle of the year, we hear of the dearness of cotton, of the whole crops having been destroyed, presumably by the country troubles. Andrews reported that the Dutch were making a large investment in fine goods and that this had severely affected his provision of ordinary goods, inasmuch as the profits on the fine goods were much greater and therefore more tempting to the merchants⁵. At Vizagapatam alone, it would seem that the investment was procured without any difficulty. And this was because of two reasons. Vizagapatam had been permitted to buy a larger quantity of fine goods than the other two factories, and Vizagapatam had only to contend with Bimlipatam which, since the pillage of the Marathas in the previous year, had lost its importance to the Dutch. The Dutch had since then transferred their headquarters to Cokinana near Ingeram and the French had resolved to carry on their investment at Yanam, which was much nearer Ingeram and Bandermalanka⁷. Pigot and his Council could hardly contend with these factors. They, however, permitted the Chief and Council of Vizagapatam to increase their investment in fine goods as an encouragement to the merchants to provide a better investment in ordinary goods 8. They allowed them also to repair their factory house at Upparah. remonstrated to Vizairam Razu about the seizure of the Ingeram goods by Jaganauth Razu. They periodically supplied the Northern Factories with cash 10 and urged them to put forth all their exertions. They instigated the Nawab of Cuddapah to undermine, if possible, the French influence in the Deccan¹¹ But they did not wish to openly oppose the French in those quarters. Bussy was there still dominant, exercising a supreme influence over Salabat Jang, and any attempt to oppose him by force was not only risky but contrary to the terms of the truce.

Prospects were not better at Fort St. David. Early in January, Starke and his Council intimated that they would not be able to supply more than 210 bales for the season and enquired as to what should be done with their turned out cloth. As there was some difficulty in completing the tonnage of the Europe ships, the Presidency advised them to admit the best of the turned out cloth at an abatement¹². But this cloth was soon discovered to be so bad that scarcely 10 bales of them could be admitted 13. And yet the merchants had demand for such cloth from other quarters: for, we are told that they refused to sell it at an abatement of more than $2\frac{1}{2}$ pagodas per corge when 12 pagodas per corge "would be barely sufficient," And though the merchants promised better cloth for the future, they actually brought in poor sortments, pleading a series of excuses, some facile and quite unjustifiable, but others, it must be noted, partly justifiable but mostly coloured by their own cupidity. Nor did they hesitate to back out of their contracts where possible. Govinda Chetti complained

that he could neither fulfil his contract nor pay in his balance due. 6,000 pagodas of his balance had been advanced by his partner, Tenneveroy Pillai, to the weavers and they were refusing to bring in any cloth, saying that they had settled everything with Tenneveroy. He promised to pay the rest or even half of the whole balance, provided he were disengaged from his partnership with Tenneveroy. This measure was recommended by Fort St. David to the Presidency on the ground that "the latter has a bad reputation but the former bears a universal good character." Pigot and his Council, however, pointed out that the reason for contracting with sets of merchants instead of with single persons was that the Company might have a better security for the money they advanced; that this was well-known to the merchants and therefore, Govinda Chetti could not expect that "the Company will disburthen him to load themselves with his Partner's Misconduct." It was, indeed, unwise to create bad precedents, most unwise in times of disturbance when the merchants might take undue advantage of the Company.

Indeed, the merchants did attempt to take undue advantage of the Com-At first they showed themselves backward in bringing in their cloth. Nagore Kistna and Ramayya desired to pay their balances in money, alleging that they could not risk it in the hands of the weavers when there was a rumour that the Marathas would come to Srirangam³. The full import of this became clear a little later when, on orders from Home, the Presidency directed (May) that public notice must be given to all persons desiring to undertake any part of the investment, to deliver their proposals at once. For, in June, the Council of Fort St. David wrote that they had not received any proposals despite They believed that their merchants had formed a combinathe public notice. tion" to reduce the Investment to their own Terms." Irshappa Chetti and Paupa Razu, having promised to bring in musters, brought "extreamly good" cloth. But then they pretended that it was made of old cotton and so they could not undertake to provide such cloth until they could judge how the new cotton would turn out. "Upon this trifling Behaviour they were ordered to pay in their Ballances at the next Consultation, when they again appeared with the other Musters made (as they said) of new Cotton so very bad that the Board unanimously rejected them, upon which they positively refused intermeddling in the Investment without an Advance in the Price of 3 Pagodas per Corge and they have accordingly declined taking any further Advance untill they have discharged their Ballances." Starke and his Council went on to express their fears that Parasuram Pillai in whom they had great hopes was also trifling with them. He had asked for more time to bring in his cloth, while Nagore Kistna and Rama Chetti had paid in their balance and declined any further concern in the investment 4.

This was grave news. The recent war might have been partly responsible for the dearth and poor quality of cotton cultivation and consequently a poor investment. That it was solely responsible for the conduct so persistently shown by the merchants, however, could not be believed by Pigot. He agreed with Starke and his colleagues that a combination had actually been set up and to break it, hit upon an ingenious idea. Nella Chetti, a Madras merchant of good credit, had, in the previous year, made certain proposals for providing an investment at Devicotta. The scheme of the Devicotta investment had been given up as impracticable, but Pigot now sounded him as to whether he would agree to provide an investment at Fort St. David. Nella Chetti expressed willingness to do so and Pigot told him "that if he acted in this undertaking with spirit and to the satisfaction of the Board he might depend on having every Encouragement and support ... with particular Marks of Favour." Fort St. David was, at the same time, directed to give him all encouragement and assistance. The plan worked admirably. The moment it was bruited about that a formidable intruder had come upon the scene. Irshappa Chetti and Paupa Razu

consented at once to contract for the new investment at old prices. Others came later, but come they did, notwithstanding their professions never to undertake the investment. But the Presidency were not to be deluded. They wrote to Fort St. David to inform Irshappa Chetti and Paupa Razu that their conduct "leaves a strong Impression on our Minds, and nothing but the punctual Performance of their Contract can efface it³."

But the stock of deceipt was not yet exhausted. Parasuram Pillai who had been largely advanced, gave false assurances that his cloth was ready and was actually on the road from Salem. For three months, Starke and his Council awaited and at last, finding that they had been deceived, put him under confinement and sent a trustworthy person to Salem to make enquiries. It was discovered that he had "not above 4 Ox loads of Cloth ready" and none at the weavers. But the Presidency ordered him to be released on condition that he gave security to clear the balance within a reasonable time*.

All this time it must be admitted that the conditions obtaining in the country were far from favourable. The new cotton crop was anything but good; the French competition was inescapable. In September, Fort St. David complained that all their remonstrances to their merchants had been in vain. They had been obliged to reject considerable quantities of cloth, but still the merchants were bringing in the same sorts, though in smaller quantities, alleging that it was the best that the country could afford and that it had great demand from other European nations. This allegation appeared to be true; "for on turning out a large parcell of Cloth lately, Irshappa Chetti and Paupa Razu wrote to their Gomastahs to dispose of what remain'd which they did to the French, who, it is said, have by this means collected near a thousand Bales and unless we pursue the same Measure, it is not to be expected we can procure any quantity of Cloth." Even Nella Chetti was reported to have supplied bad cloth, saying that it was the best he could provide.

Nothing could have been more disconcerting to Pigot and his Council. They had been repeatedly reminded by the Directors to improve the investment and to send only the best cloth to Europe. The cloth they had recently supplied Home had elicited a warning from the Company to be careful in future. All the time the investment at Fort St. David as also at other places was diminishing in spite of their best efforts to revive it. Both the quantity and quality were deteriorating on account of the French competition and the distracted state of the country. In these circumstances prudence dictated to them only one course, and that was not to allow as far as possible the investment to slip away from their hands for ever. And this course they adopted disregarding the Directors' warning in the best interests of the Company itself. They asked Fort St. David to take in all inferior cloth at an abatement and directed that in doubtful cases the cloth might be sent for their inspection, particularly the cloth supplied by Nella Chetti7. Fort St. David relaxed their strictness in sorting, but felt that to send up Nella Chetti's cloth for the approval of the Presidency was to destroy their own influence with the merchants. And they also enquired about another matter which was troubling them as to what they should do to allay the opposition of the merchants to the customary chopping of all turned out cloth at the centre '. As the season was then drawing to a close, the Presidency did not repeat their orders about Nella Chetti's cloth and as to the other point raised, they observed that the method of chopping in the middle might have had good effect when it was first introduced, that it had been given up in Madras owing to many practical difficulties, and that Fort St. David also might do the same and chop at the end of the cloth to prevent it from being brought again. During the later part of the year Pigot and his Council again

advised Fort St. David not to be too strict in sorting and to avoid "coming to Extremities" with merchants of credit. They allowed them to admit Bowani, a new Salem merchant, and upon noticing that many of the principal merchants had paid in their balances, instructed them to re-admit those merchants. "We would have them call Paupa Rauze, Irshippah Chetti . . . before their Board and without asking, endeavour to engage them to receive back the Money they paid in and even make them further advances2." This wise policy of bowing to the necessity of the times so as not to permanently injure the investment was adopted by Fort St. David.

Conditions were somewhat different at Madras. Here we do not come across French competition, large outstanding balances, combinations or other intrigues of the merchants. But we do hear, however, of the dearness of cotton and consequently of the bad investment. In January, Gundaveddy Venkataramah and Nella Chetti, the Company's old merchants, were advanced 5000 pagodas'; Sunca Venkataramah and Ambalatody were advanced 4000 pagodas. In the next month was tried an experiment which had been much favoured and strongly urged by the Directors. It was resolved to give a month's notice to all merchants to submit proposals for providing the investment. But the experiment, however, soon proved a failure. In March, proposals were received from two new merchants, Yacun Pillai and Poncala Narain Chetti. Yacun Pillai offered to contract for the same goods at the same prices as were offered by Sunca Venkataramah. This was encouraging. But Yacun Pillai. it was discovered, was a man of straw, "a person of no Distinction, substance or Credit." The Board, therefore, considering it inadvisable to leave at his hands at the end of the year "so large a balance of 6000 Pagodas or any balance at all", rejected his offer. Poncala Narain Chetti's proposals seemed to them calculated to raise his credit as a Company's merchant. No great advantage, the Board thought, could be expected from a person of his character, but still, as the Company could not be losers by his undertaking since "he is to receive no Money till the Goods are delivered", they agreed to receive and pay immediately for what cloth he might supply. For the bulk of the investment, the Board had to depend upon the old merchants and these merchants, being fully aware of the results of the ineffectual trial made by advertisement, did not fail to remind the Board how profitless the investment had become, compared with its hazards. They, however, promised to do their best and entered into contracts?. Soon after Tellasingha Chetti was advanced 10,000 pagodas and Gundaveddy Venkataramah and Nella Chetti another 10,000 pagodas.

The promise was not fulfilled. In April, the Export Warehousekeeper reported that the cloth brought in by the merchants was "extremely bad". was therefore felt necessary to consult the merchants and they were called before the Board and examined separately. All of them, however, stated that the had quality was due to the dearness of cotton "which at present costs from 38 to 40 Pagodas per candy of the same kind that usually sold for 25 Pagodas per Candy." And all of them hoped that as the new cotton was about to be gathered. the price would soon go down and this would enable them to supply better cloth in future. Pigot warned them that unless better cloth could be provided at the Company's prices, it would be in vain to attempt an investment at Madras, and in such a case all balances outstanding against them would be rigorously demanded and a trial made of entirely new set of merchants. It does not appear that this threat had any effect on the merchants. They replied that unless the prices fell, they could not expect to show an amendment. And the Board realised the truth of this statement. "The Board are of Opinion that a further Tryal be made of them as it is well known that the Price of Cotton has for some time past been very high and Experience has already proved that there are not any other Merchants of Credit in the Bounds who will undertake the Investment "."

In June and July, 10,000 pagodas were, in each month, advanced to Tellasingha Chetti and others on account of the ordinary goods. Similar advances of 5,000 pagodas in each month were made to Linga Chetti and others on account of the fine goods1.

Meanwhile fresh complaints about the debasement of manufactures came from England. Pigot and his Council exerted their utmost to discover the real cause of this growing evil. They discoursed with the Company's merchants and other traders and manufacturers and devised some new measures to meet a novel situation. In all the places where the Company's investment had been provided, there had gradually grown up the manufacture of various kinds of inferior quality cloth on account of private traders. And the weavers, finding that engagements for inferior sortments were much more paying than those for the Company's cloth, had become backward, and when pressed, had supplied inferior sortments to the Company's merchants. The Company's merchants now undertook to remedy this state of affairs in some measure provided that they were not suffered to interfere with one another in the provision of particular kinds of cloth and provided that the manufacture of inferior cloth was prohibited in the countries of Chumbauck, Madurantagam, Collyapetta, Conjeeveram and Trivatore. On these conditions Tellasingha Chetti and other merchants with Sunca Ramah promised to provide 300 bales of 8 caul long cloth by February next and Nella Chetti and other merchants undertook to deliver a considerable quantity of Salempores².

These conditions were directly contrary to the orders of the Court of Direc-For, the Directors had specially required that a competition among the merchants should be set up and for that purpose a month's previous notice for submitting proposals should be given. The Directors were convinced that a competition was sure to yield beneficial results. To the Board, however, this seemed quite chimerical. When the demand, as was then the case, was greater than the supply, competition in their opinion could only tend to raise the price of goods. The prices under competition would be reduced only when the supply was greater than the demand. Independently of this "universal Maxim" in trade, they had seen how futile it was to advertise for proposals, how not a single merchant of credit had come forward. "Upon the whole the Board are of opinion that the most Effectual Means to restore the Manufacture or prevent its further Debasement will be to limit the Provision of every particular species of Goods to particular sets of Merchants in certain Districts on the Company's Account and discountenance as much as possible the Provision of Inferiour sortments on private Account." This was, it was obvious, a step towards monopoly. But they took it and ordered Tellasingha Chetti and other merchants to provide all the long cloth ordinary and Nella Chetti and other merchants all the Salempores ordinary in the districts mentioned above and in the same districts. it would appear, prohibited the manufacture of inferior sortments3. In August, Sunca Venkataramah and other merchants were advanced 5,000 pagodas 4; Gundaveddy Venkataramah and Nella Chetti were advanced 10,000 pagodas. In November Servanah Chetti, Linga Chetti, Tellasingha Chetti and Gundaveddy Venkataramah were advanced 15,000 pagodas on account of fine goods. Tonappa, Condappa and Ninappa were advanced 10,000 pagodas for painting chintz'. Another advance of 10,000 pagodas to Tellasingha Chetti and other merchants was made in November' while Gundaveddy Venkataramah and others were advanced 10.000 pagodas in December. In December, Moota Chilumbrum and Weydalingam, two merchants of good credit, having offered to provide Soot Romals, were advanced 2,000 pagodas9.

The finances of the Company during the year did not cease to cause some anxiety to Pigot and his Council. There was, indeed, no active warfare with the French. no rush of sudden expenditure, no urgent calls for money from the

camp and from Fort St. David to meet the demands of the army and the investment. But there was the prolonged campaign into the Madura and Tinnevelly countries, a backwardness among substantial men to bid for the Company's farms, a fall in the price of silver which depreciated rupees and a scarcity of gold which demanded frequent exchanges of rupees for pagodas. Large sums of rupees were sold in January, March, April, May, June, September and December¹. In January, it was resolved to purchase 20,000 pagodas from Linga Chetti, the Company's merchant and shroff at 91 per cent. premium for an early supply of cash to the Northern Settlements. We learn that the exchange ratio was then 373 rupees for 100 pagodas2. The same month, having, it was reported, a large quantity of rupees in the treasury and apprehending that their value would fall on the arrival of silver on the expected ships from Manilha, the Export Warehousekeeper was authorized to sell rupees to the amount of 20,000 pagodas3. In March, because of the same reasons and because also of the expected arrival of silver on ships from England, a lakh of rupees or upwards was ordered to be soon disposed of. And Linga Chetti, having proposed to receive rupees to the value of 22,000 current pagodas at the rate of 373 rupees for 100 pagodas and to deliver the Madras pagodas for the same in 30 days at the rate of 10 per cent. batta amounting to 20,000 Madras pagodas for 22,000 current pagodas or 82,060 Arcot rupees, his proposals were accepted in order to make an early supply of Madras pagodas to the Northern Settlements. In September, 108,000 rupees were ordered to be sold to Linga Chetti, at a favourable rate of 360 per cent. and 18,000 at the same rate to Alexander Wynch, to both at 10 days In December, Linga Chetti having again proposed to purchase 30,000 pagodas worth of rupees at the current rate of 361 for 100 pagodas, amounting to rupees 108,300, it was agreed to accept his proposal. By this means, by frequently exchanging rupees for pagodas, Pigot and his Council met the expenditure not only of Madras but also of the Subordinate Settlements.

It was not less easy to regulate and, if possible, to augment the income in this period of general turmoil and unrest. We have already seen how, in order to restrain the growing debts of the Nawab, Saunders and his Council had, in the previous year, acquired the mortgage of Seven Maganams, Manimangalam, Covelong and Chingleput from the Nawab'. In April, the Nawab's debts still stood at about 2 lakhs of pagodas with every prospect, not of decrease but of increase on account of the Madura and Arcot expeditions and of the charges of maintaining various military posts to defend his country. Pigot and his Council, therefore, considered it necessary to have a personal interview with the Nawab and sent Lawrence, Palk and Walsh to invite him to Madras from Arcot. And on his arrival they told him that the best course would be for him to leave the management of the whole of the Arcot country into the Company's hands until all his debts were discharged, and to receive till then an ample allowance for his expenses. This was a solution big with possibilities. The Company could, during their temporary management, introduce many reforms into the administration, while the Nawab could, at the same time, prevent his brother Abdul Wahab Khan and other reckless dependants from squandering his revenues and dismiss a long train of worthless sepoys who simply swelled the charges of his army. But it was by no means a solution palatable to the Nawab. He saw in it the loss of all his dignity and authority and begging to be excused from accepting it, offered in its stead a promise to pay bills for 8 lakhs of rupees on his shroffs, and as part payment of this sum to mortgage to the Company the countries of Peddipollam and Ponneri which yielded an income of about 30,000 pagodas a year. Pigot and his Council asked for the mortgage of Conjecveram also and for the future years, half of all the collections made from the poligars and from the Madura and Tinnevelly countries. But the Nawah expressed his inability to mortgage Conjeeveram, though he agreed to accept the

other proposals. This arrangement was not altogether satisfactory to the Government, but it was all that they could secure without disgracing or disgusting their faithful ally 1.

As regards the Company's farms, no difficulty was felt in realizing the rents already contracted for them by the old renters. The rents of the Betel and Tobacco Farm, Arrack and Wine Licence, the rents of Paddy fields, Salt-pans and of St. Thome, and the rents of the Poonamallee country and Jaghir and of the Seven Maganams, Chingleput and Manimangalam, all these were collected with ease and regularity. But on the expiry of some of the old farms, some difficulties arose in securing new renters on the old terms. Thus in the case of the cowle for the Devicotta bounds, though the usual one month's notice for the sale was given at the sea gate in Madras, at Fort St. David and at Devicotta, when the farm was actually put up at outcry on the 31st May for one year from 1st June 1755 to 31st May 1756, on the same terms as those of last year, no one from among the Indians came forward to purchase it. Orme and Smith offered 4,200 pagodas for it, which was the highest bid, but which was less than the rent of the last cowle by 1,800 pagodas². Pigot attributed the decrease in the rent to the short term of the cowle. He said that not many days ago a former renter had offered 3,000 pagodas more on a lease of 5 years. He explained that the scarcity of the monsoon during the last year had destroyed all crops on the ground and brought much loss on the renter³. But the Directors had ordered annual leases and the Board did not wish to alter the period of the lease. And though the Directors had also ordered that Europeans should not be allowed to bid for the farms, save under exceptional circumstances, the Board let the farm to Orme and Smith on the ground that none of the Indians had outbid them. Orme and Smith seemed to have bid for the farm principally with a view to keep up its price; for, they stated that they were ready to surrender it at any time to the Company, should the Board think that their holding it was contrary to the orders from Home 5.

When the cowle for the Poonamallee Nor was this the only instance. country and Poonamallee Jaghir was resolved to be put up at outcry, a combination among the principal renters was suspected, to underbid the value of the farm. This necessitated a short adjournment of the sale and the Board's authorization to the Secretary to bid for the farm up to 48,000 pagodas on account of the Company. The Board on this occasion ordered that "no Europeans be permitted to bid for this or any other Cowle or be accepted as security for any Renter." It was in a way fortunate that, when the farm was actually put up at outcry on the last year's terms for one year from 1st July 1755 to 30th June 1756, one Numboor Venkata Subbiah offered 52,400 pagodas. This was an offer higher than the last year's cowle, but he delayed for long in giving securities and eventually it was decided to put him in possession of the country on his depositing 8,000 pagodas and to order the Company's shroff to receive the revenues until sufficient security was given for the payment of the rent6. Other farms which were put up for sale during the year gave no trouble to the Board. Of these, however, two may be mentioned here. The cowle for the Ruby Brokerage, which was for the first time since the loss of Madras offered for sale, was purchased by Linga Chetti7; while the cowle for St. Thome and its villages was bought by a substantial renter of the Nawab, Meer Dianatullah who had temporarily settled down in Madras8.

In July, an important reform for controlling expenditure and checking irregularities was introduced by Pigot and his Council. On the recommendation of the Court of Directors, they appointed a Committee of Accounts, consisting of the President, Robert Orme and Alexandar Wynch of Council and John Walsh, James Alexander and James Bourchier under Council. Bourchier was

appointed clerk of that Committee and it was ordered that from that time onwards all monthly accounts of the Presidency should be completed and delivered to him as soon as possible in the succeeding month and that all accounts of the subordinate settlements should be delivered to him as soon as they were received. He was to lay all these accounts before the Committee who were to examine them and report to the Board with their remarks as to "Method, Overcharges, Omissions, Irregularities1." Many an item of expenditure was thus closely scrutinized and many an irregularity corrected. The reader may refer to the Consultations themselves to form an estimate of the changes introduced on the recommendations of the Committee². It may be sufficient to notice here that as regards Devicotta accounts which were stated by the Committee to have been in utter chaos, a member of the Board was deputed to overhaul them.

In the previous volume we have seen the circumstances under which a Committee of Works was appointed to supply materials for the Company's fortifications and buildings, and an enquiry was ordered into the charges preferred by Colonel Scott and Brohier, the Engineer, against Paymaster Boddam⁴. On the report of the Committee of Enquiry⁵, the Board passed certain orders for the better management of the Company's works. No one, not even the Engineer, was to raise in future the pay of any subordinate or workman without the permission of the Board or the President. No work or repairs exceeding 50 pagodas was to be undertaken without the Board's order on an estimate submitted by the Engineer. Boddam, who, it was clear, had charged excessive bullock hire, was to refund the overcharge. These orders for the regulation of the Company's works were supplemented by others during the close of the year. In order to comply punctually with the Company's instructions, public notice was directed to be given for receiving proposals for the supply of bricks and chunam⁷, though a similar experiment had been tried without success⁸. This attempt likewise proved a complete failure. In December, the Committee of Works reported that some Indian inhabitants had submitted proposals for taking the manufacture of bricks in their hands by an exclusive contract for five years, and offered on that condition to supply the Company with 70 lakhs of bricks in 1756 and 80 lakhs per annum for the next four years. But the Board considered that the proposal could not be accepted. They could see no reason why the Committee of Works could not supply the bricks on the same or even better terms than those offered by Indians, since the latter possessed no advantage over the former. The proposal also involved the payment by the people of a higher price for the bricks supplied them than that paid by the This was opposed to the orders of the Directors who had required that the bricks should be sold at reasonable rates to the people. And further the entire proposal was quite contrary to the Directors' order that all monopoly of materials should be prohibited. The Board, therefore, directed the advertisement for receiving proposals, to be published again and instructed the Committee of Works, in the meantime, to undertake the making and supplying of bricks for the use of the Company's

All this economy, scrutiny and strict management did not prevent Pigot and his Council from spending money over some new schemes. In order that a commodious house might always be in readiness in Madras for the reception of distinguished strangers and persons of rank and station, a house belonging to Messrs. Lopez and De Castro, in Charles Street, was purchased on account of the Company 10. On the recommendation of Brohier, a bridge connecting the White to the Black Town was ordered to be constructed and to speed up the work no person whatever either in the White or Black Town was allowed to employ any bricklayers, carpenters and blacksmiths after the 15th April¹¹. The houses hired for the hospital in Peddanayague Pettah, and for a hospital in

Cuddalore were ordered to be purchased1. As there was an "unusual Number of Officers and Covenant Servants" at Madras unprovided with apartments, the Paymaster was authorized to rent a house for them². The Governor's seat in the Church which had been demolished during the French occupation of Madras was ordered to be refitted³. And an old custom which prevailed before the loss of Madras was revived by ordering the purchase of 6 chaise and 2 saddle horses for the use of the President⁴.

Turning to the sale of Europe goods, we observe that there was not, as in the previous years, sufficient demand for broad cloth. Broad cloth put up at outcry in February had no bidders, even for a single lot. In March, we learn that it had become greatly damaged by the worms and mildew. It had to be sold piecemeal in April, May, July, August, September, October, November and December. Copper was sold in August⁸; lead in November. Iron was sold in June at 15½ Pagodas per candy 10. Part of the Barbary copper consigned to Bengal by the *Norfolk*, but landed at this settlement was disposed of in June and the rest, having had no bidders, was sent to the Bay¹¹.

Looking at the administration of justice, we find that there was not the same amount of friction nor the same strained feeling between the Government and the Mayor's Court as was noticeable in the previous year. Occasionally, however, the Government resented the language used by the Mayor's Court in its correspondence with them¹². But on the whole there was harmony and on many occasions Pigot and his Council never refused to comply with the requests made by the Court. They allowed it to retain all the law books sent for reference and supplied it with other law books which had hitherto been kept in the Secretariat 13. They furnished it with copies of all correspondence of the Home authorities relating to the administration of justice 14 and permitted its Registrar to attend on the President while he administered oaths to new Aldermen 15. They allowed it to pay all the fines collected once in a year 16 instead of periodically as before¹⁷.

This account will not be complete without noticing an important letter written by the Mayor's Court to the Court of Directors. The Mayor's Court asked for directions and orders on several points relating to law and public administration. It reiterated its opinion that it was essential to permit Indians to bring in their suits into the Court. Experience had shown that they were by no means willing to settle their affairs among themselves without incurring great expense and without resorting to "unbounded frauds". It should also be made clear whether the authority and jurisdiction of the Court extended to the new possessions already acquired, or which might hereafter be acquired by the Company on the Coast. The case of insolvent debtors, another important matter, called for remedy. Such of them as were ready to give a true and exact account of their estates should be allowed, as in England, to apply for "A relief of that kind would be very useful to the Trade of bankruptcy. these settlements". Nor was the manner in which commission was charged by executors in Madras satisfactory. In deciding upon this question it must, however, be remembered that Europeans dying in India were almost in every respect differently circumscribed from those dying in England. Here they had no relations and few friends who would undertake the trouble of performing their duties as executors without a reasonable commission on the sale of effects, or receipts of money, or on the net estate. It was also advisable to relax the statute of limitations for admission of suits into the Mayor's Court, considering that Madras had, for about seven years, no court since its loss to the French. Orders should also be sent on the revival which had been made of a rule of the former Mayor's Court by which the Court had resolved to hear petty causes

not exceeding the value of 20 pagodas nor less than 5 pagodas, in a summary Finally, the Court might be supplied with suitable law books and Acts of Parliament to enable it to discharge its duties efficiently.

During the year Henry Vansittart, an Alderman, having resigned a new Alderman, Samuel Ardley, was appointed². In December, a new Mayor and Sheriff, George Mackay and James Bourchier respectively, were chosen and sworn in³. In the same month, the Court of Requests informed the Government that it had, in accordance with the Charter, chosen new commissioners. As some inconvenience had arisen from their number being no more than eight during the year and as the Company had authorized the Court to choose any number of Commissioners at the annual election provided the whole did not exceed twenty four, it had added twelve new Commissioners to the four remaining of the last year's election.

Among the miscellaneous subjects the scheme proposed by Pigot to regulate the management of the boats in the Madras harbour and some incidental references to Negrais and Fort Marlborough deserve to be mentioned. Pigot's scheme, though admirable, was destined to meet much opposition⁵. From Negrais we learn that war was steadily going on between the Peguans and the Burmese and that while the French sided the former the English showed their sympathies towards the latter. From Fort Marlborough we hear of a complaint from the Military Officers that they were allowed neither lodgings nor allowances for oil, etc. as were customary. The Dutch Government from Batavia, too, preferred a complaint asserting their rights to Natal and enclosing the extract of an agreement made by their agents in 1693 with the people of This was ordered to be transmitted to the Court of Directors. TO THE HONBLE COURT OF DIRECTORS FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONOURABLE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

We received a Letter by Order of Your President & Council bearing Date the 28th. day of January 1754 Enclosing Paragraph of your General Letter to them date January the 24th. 1753, In which You desire that We would transmitt to you particular Accounts of the several Proceedings in our Jurisdiction pointing out to you any further Alterations, Power and Authorities that may be necessary, or wherein the Present should be varied.

We addressed your President & Council by Letter bearing Date the Day of February 1754. Copy of which is inserted in our Book of Letters sent, for the last Year.

In that Letter you will find Reasons [were] given for the altering that Part of the Charter which excludes the Indian Natives from commencing any suits against [Each]other in this Court, and further Experience has now furnished [us] with stronger Proofs that their not having it in their Power [to] apply for Redress, when any Disputes happen amongst th[em] touching Civil suits, is only an Inconvenience to the[m] but to every European Merchant in these Settlements, as well as a Prejudice to the Interest of the East India Company in particular and there is undoubted Reason to believe that the Remedy pointed out by the Charter, To Wit, "That all Suits and Actions shall be determined among themselves." As it is a Remedy attended with very great Expence, and perhaps with unbounded Frauds, is by no means agreeable to them and it seems to be the Earnest Desire of Men of the best Characters among them to be put upon the same footing with Regard to the application to Justice, in civil Matters as they were formerly should it be thought proper to have this Part of the Royal Charter altered, we must intreat you will be as explicit as possible both in your Orders & Instructions whether our Authority is to extend with equal Force & Efficacy in such new Possessions as are already or may be hereafter added to the Honble Company's former Jurisdictions as it is now in this, and the other Factory's subject or subordinatethereto, or to the Governour or President & Council of Fort St. George.

The Case of insolvent Debtors in these Parts, who are ready to give a true & Just Account of their Estates and whose principal Creditors are willing to accept of such Accounts, deserves particular Consideration. In England, Statutes of Bankruptcy in such cases may be taken out, which relieves them from further Molestation on Account of their Debts, But as this is at present impracticable here, We therefore think some Relief of that kind would be very useful to the Trade of these Settlements.

We have Reason to believe that the manner in which Commission has been charged by many Executors in these Settlements may be liable to Exception, and although we do not imagine it would be expedient to make any Enquiry into what has passed under the former Courts upon this Head Yet We are desirous that a Matter of such universal Concernment to the Publick should be put upon as certain and clear a footing as Circumstances can admitt of. pleased, therefore, that it may be taken into Consideration, and that we may receive your Opinion upon it in as particular and distinct a Manner as possible to serve us as our future Guidance, But we desire that particular Notice may be taken that Europeans dying in these Settlements, are almost in every Respect differently circumstanced from those Who die in England not having their Relations, and often but few of their Friends near them, who will take the Trouble to perform the Office of an Executor, and therefore many Reasons may be urged for allowing a reasonable Commission either upon the sales of the Effects, the Receipt of Money or on the net Estate &ca. If a Testator should leave a Legacy to his Executor as a sufficient Recompense for his Trouble, it may not be reasonable to allow any Commission, but if no such Legacy is left, it may often, if not always, be found necessary to allow a Commission because otherwise the Executor may refuse to act, and this may prove of material Prejudice to the Estate since it must be supposed that the Person appointed by the Testator to be the Executor, is looked upon as the most Capable Person to discharge that Trust and if it should be said that a Testator has it always in his Power to consider the leaving a Legacy in making his will, Let it be considered that perhaps the greatest Part of Testators may be unacquainted with this Matter, and likewise that others may forget it, in an act which many are found to put off to near their last Moments, We therefore think this Matter may be put upon such a Footing as to hinder Executors from taking an Advantage of the uncertainty upon which this Affair does at present stand.

Since Commission is the only Reward which Administrators have for their Trouble, We apprehend that no Doubt can be made of their Right to the same, and more especially in the East Indies. But that this matter may likewise be sufficiently understood We should be glad to have your opinion in what manner this Commission is to be charged. Thus much only We Suggest upon it, That from the frequent Experience of the Difficulty that is found in prevailing upon proper Persons to accept of Administrations, there will be a Necessity to give Encouragement to honest & Capable Men, receive those Trusts rather than to lessen any Emolument which they may expect as a Compensation for what does often prove very troublesome to them.

By referring to the Rules of Practice framed by the former Mayor's Court you will find that on the 20th. Novr. 1744, An Order passed. "That no Suit, Action, Bill, or Plaint should be commenced or received in that Court after the 20th. November 1746 unless the same was prosecuted within ten Years from & after Cause of such Suit or Action had arisen or should arise except as is therein excepted)" But the Loss of this Place did not only prevent this Order being put in force, but likewise has deprived us of an Opportunity of knowing whether the then Honble Court of Directors did approve of the same or not. Altho We join in Opinion with the former Mayor's Court that this Rule was

well calculated for the Benefit of these Settlements, and so well adapted to the Temper and Constitution of the Natives in particular, that if they should be admitted to apply to this Court, in the same Manner as to the former, it may be extremely necessary and proper for this Court to adopt that Rule as soon as the Causes of Actions which have arisen before the Loss of Madrass and during the Time that there was no Court, are determined, always having a strict Regard that such Causes of Action shall not exceed the Time limitted by the Statutes, But under the present Circumstances we are of opinion that in many Cases there will be a Necessity to receive Suits, Actions &cⁿ. as well upon Specialties as simple Contracts, not only of an older Date than the Time limitted by the abovementioned Rule, but even further back than what is prescribed by the Statues of Limitations, Because by the Loss of Madrass no Person had an Opportunity to apply to Justice during the space of seven years, and if it should be determined that the Natives shall enjoy the same Priviledges in applying to Justice, as they did formerly the Time with Regard to them is already above Eight Years, and is daily encreasing, We cannot therefore at present but look upon those seven Years (occasioned by the Loss of this Place) as a Chasm in the Administration of Justice with Regard to all such Matters as are cognizable by this Court, for otherwise it must happen that in many Cases We cannot avoid acting in express Contradiction to Statute 21st. Jac: 1 Cap. 16 Sec. 3d. which limits Actions of Account, and upon the Case, and all Actions of Debt grounded upon any lending, or Contract without Speciality, and all Actions of Debt for Arrearages of Rent &ca. to six Years, likewise some actions to four years, and others to two years. And for that Reason it is, that We think it proper to receive Suits, Actions, &ca. beyond the Statutes of Limitations, and therefore in reckoning the time from which the Cause of Suits and Actions take their Rise to bring it conformable to the Statutes of Limitations, It is our Resolution to omitt those seven Years, as if no such space had happened, and we cannot but think that the time which the Natives have been already excluded from the Court, as well as whatever further time they may hereafter be excluded should likewise be annihilated, with Regard to them as well as the seven Years abovementioned.

Having consider'd the Advantages that will accrue to this Place, by hearing Petty Causes, not exceeding the value of Twenty Pagodas nor less than five, in a summary Way, We do therefore intend to adopt a Rule of Practice made for Petty Causes by the former Mayor's Court the 5th. day of June 1733, and propose to put the same into Execution, as soon as conveniently may be.

Finding it frequently necessary in the Course of our Proceedings to have a particular Information of the Laws of England in many cases that come before us, We did in consequence thereof apply to your President & Council for such Law Books as were sent out as well appear by our Letter to them dated 10th. December last: They thereupon sent us Cay's Abridgement of the Statutes, Hawkins's Pleas of the Crown, Barlow's Justice, Blackerby's Justice, Office of the Clerk of the Peace, which they have Duplicates of, and at the same time acquainted Us that they had Woods Institutes, Horseman's Conveyancing, Woods Conveyancing, Jacob's Law Dictionary, Molley de Jure Maritimo, Domals Civil Law and Wood's Civil Law, but as they had no Duplicates of them they were not sent We therefore think it necessary to desire you will send us these last mentioned Books together with such others as you may think necessary for the Benefit of this Court, and we likewise request that you will send us such Acts of Parliament as relating to any matters cognizable by this Court and which have passed since the Publication of the above Books which we already have or which you may hereafter send, and that you will be pleased to transmitt from Time to Time whatever new Acts of Parliament may pass in future, that are to extend to the Jurisdiction of these Settlements.

Inclosed you will receive a List of our Packet together with copies of such Rules & Orders as have been made by this Court since its Re-Establishment.

March and 12th. of April last and Enclosing an Extract of an Agreement made in the year 1693 between their Agents and the People of Natal who thereby put themselves under the Protection of the Dutch Company and the King of Mananeaboul & acknowledge the Sultan of Baroos2 for their lawful Lord, and further granted an exclusive Trade to the Dutch, all which they hope will be sufficient Proof of their Right to Natal. Letter of the 24 Janry 1754 order'd that such Buildings should be immediately set about as soon as a Place should be agreed upon by late Colonel Scott & myself, I take the Liberty to represent that the Buildings from the Northermost Pavillion of the Barracks to Mr. Edward's House, are mostly tumbling down (the Joint of the Terrasses being rotten) and that as that space of Ground will be sufficient to contain Barracks for 250 Men commodiously, and for 20 Officers Rooms over them, a Considerable Expence will be saved in the Terrass of the Barracks, & in laying Foundations for such Rooms should they be built in another Place.

Rupees 490500 and have consignd to us on her 30 Bales of Goods as Invoice. Enclosing a Packet to us from the Negrais, and acquainting us that they send a Box Packet to our Honble Masters by the said ship. William Ellis will dispatch her to us, and that they have put the St. Helena Stores on board. N. 26 is from Mr. William Ellis dated on board the Winchelsea at Ingellee, and advises her Draught of Water and encloses the Papers on her Dispatch. N. 21 is from the President and Council dated the 13th. Janry. and advises that they have laden on the Britannia and consigned to us a Cargo as \$\mathbb{P}\$ Invoice and Bill of Lading amounting to seventeen thousand seven hundred & seventy Eight Currt. Rupees, three Anaes and nine Pice (Curt. Rs. 17778-3-9) and that Mr. William Ellis will dispatch the ship to us. N. 22 & 23 are from Mr. William Ellis both dated the 18th. Ulto. HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Having made a very strict Examination into the Subject of the two Letters addressed to your Honour &ca. by Captain John Brohier Engineer and Mr. Charles Boddam Paymaster, and the several Allegations on both sides, we now lay before you the Result of it with our opinions thereon, as your Honour &ca. have been pleased to direct, We shall accordingly begin with our observations on Mr. Brohiers Letter as Mr. Boddam's is properly an Answer to it And

With Regard to the Affirmation in his first Paragraph Vizt. "That Col-"onel Scotts Assertion of the Works being carried on in an expensive Manner "is justly grounded, Partly from the Materials being furnished by the Pay"master at his own Price, excepting Wall Bricks, without Check or Control" We have spared no Pains both to find out the Prices charged by the Paymaster for the several Materials the Company's works have been furnished with, since Mr. Boddam's being in the Management of the Employ and what they were rated at his Predecessors before and since the Place was taken by the French, from whence it appeared to us that the Principal Articles such as Bricks & Chunam of all kinds, sand, Clay, Palmeiras, Reapers &ca. are charged at the usual Rates and no higher than for several years past others purchased at the Banksalls and the Bazar are at various Prices sometimes high and some times low according as there has been an Importation of & Demand for them, and we can't learn are higher rated by the Paymaster than they have in general sold for at these Places. Timber & Plank have indeed been extremely dear which your Honour &ca. must be well convinced of from what was bought by Order of Council of the owners of the Neptune Snow and another Vessell or two for the Company's Use in the year 1752 and it does not appear to have been higher priced than it sold for before and since that Time, As our scrutiny into these several Particulars did not point out to us that our Honble Masters had been charged more in the Purchase of the Materials, (except Timber & Plank already taken Notice of) for the Works than at any time heretofore even before the Place fell into the hands of the French, when by Experience in our private Capacities we find every Thing in general was much more reasonable than at present, or that they might have been supplied in a cheaper Manner, We thought it requisite to desire Captn. Brohier would give us some Instances in support of what he had advanced. His answer to this was, That as he had not been invested with any Publick Authority to object to the Prices charged by the Paymaster we must acknowledge it as our opinion that it appears to us he is not deserving of any Censure with Respect to this Circumstance.

The second Paragraph is a Complaint of the Exorbitant Prices charged for all Bricks out of the common Dimensions, we have examined into the Reasons urged by Mr. Boddam in his Letter for there being so which appear very just, as we are well assured the Brick Cutters are paid more for moulding them than the Common sort, That the least Crack or Flaw subjects them to be rejected (& thereby saleable only as Turn'd out Bricks) and there is also great Loss by Breakage in the Kilns. The Paymaster's Accounts for the year 1742 & thereabouts shew they are rated now at the same Prices they were which we think clears Mr. Boddam of having acted unwarrantably herein. The whole Expence of these Bricks as he takes Notice since he has been Paymaster amounts to only Pags. 123-18-22 & Can't have been any considerable Addition We imagine to the Charge of the works.

Paragraph 3d. asserts that the Wall Bricks order'd to be made by Colonel Scott were of the same size as Mr. Boddam agreed with Mr. Robbins at St. David

to deliver at 1500 Pagoda, which notwithstanding were reduced to near their old Dimensions in the space of Eighteen months, In explaining this Particular Captain Brohier says the Reduction of the Bricks which was chiefly in Point of Thickness regards only those made at Fort St. David as when Directions were sent hither for providing a Quantity in readiness for the Works, No Orders were given to enlarge them so they were continued of the old Dimensions, From hence it is evident as Mr. Boddam has advanced, that those ordered to be made here by Colonel Scott were of an extraordinary size, since Mr. Brohier has acknowledged only the smaller sort were ever made herebefore, which being rated at only 1500 Pagoda as well before the Place was taken as since, it seems a natural conclusion that the enlarging the Dimensions must have enhanced their Price, And as the Company were supplied with the same Number of the large as the small ones for a Pagoda, We think there is some weight in what Mr. Boddam has urged that the Scarcity & Dearness of wood here would not allow him to deliver them so cheap as at St. David.

The 4th. Paragraph sets forth that although new Moulds were made of a proper Size for the Bricks with allowances for shrinking many still are short of those Dimensions by the Brickmasters [Brickmakus?] artfully scooping out the surplus clay that rises above the Moulds with their hands as they make no use of Boards to scrape it off. Upon questioning the People attending the Kilns concerning this Particular, we are assured that it has ever been usual with the Brickmaker's to scrape off the surplus Clay with their hand tho' Attempts have been made to perswade them to the use of a Board, and as it is very certain the Natives in general are so prejudiced in favour of their Antient Customs, that it is with greatest Difficulty they can ever be prevailed on to deviate from them. We are inclined to imagine that may be a prevailing Argument with the Brick Cutters to persist in making use of their hand in Preference to a Board But at the same time Regard ought to be paid to what Captain Brohier says further on the subject which is, That by scooping off the Clay with their hands there becomes a Hollow in the surface of each Brick that in the Quantity of a Kiln diminishes very considerably the substance of Clay to be burnt, from what it would be was there no Defect in the Bricks and of course, a less supply of Firewood is necessary This he does not charge Mr. Boddam with, having given any Orders about, or being acquainted with; But apprehends it to be a Contrivance of the Inferiour Servants that attend the Kilns that they may charge more Firewood than is really expended, and we think it a Circumstance highly necessary to be remedied, Mr. Boddam positively assures us he never had the least conception of this Deceipt, till it was taken Notice of by Captain Brohier.

The fifth Paragraph remarks that the Advantage the Paymaster claimed when at St. David of cutting Firewood at DeveCotah free of Custom to the Renter, ought to have reduced the Price of Bricks there instead of augmenting it for before the Place was taken they were cheaper than afterwards, In this we thought it very reasonable to be of Captain Brohiers Sentiments, but informing ourselves of Mr. Wynch (who was Mr. Boddam's Predecessor in the Paymaster's Employ at St. David) of the Reasons for what is alledged when the Paymaster had that Indulgence, we are assured by him the only Advantage that arose from having the wood from DeveCotah was the certainty of large supplies which was particularly serviceable in expediting the works as what brought from the inland Country frequently was impeded in the Road and came in sometimes in only small Quantities which put a stop to making Bricks, but with regard to Price, the Expence of cutting and Freighting the DeveCotah wood made it turn out rather dearer than what came from the Country And this seems to us a plausible Reason for the raising rather than lowering the Price of Bricks after DeveCotah was taken.

In the 6th. Paragraph Captn. Brohier acknowledges himself sensible that the Charge of making Bricks here is greater than at St. David, but intimates

that the Honble Company was not credited with all the Firewood which fell in the November Storm 1752, as this Intimation we thought required to be further explained, We desired Captn. Brohier would do it, He did so by acquainting us he acknowledged the Information he received of it was from Comrapah Moodelaire the Governour's Conicoply since deceased who told him he had been engaged in a Dispute with Mr. Boddam, to which of them it belonged as a Priviledge. Mr. Boddam positively averrs he never had the least Discourse with Comrapah on the subject neither did he give his People any orders to gather it or did they, except a small Quantity from beyond the Mount, which from the Distance it was brought he has Reason to believe the Expence of the Carriage as well as cutting must have made it turn out to him as dear as the wood purchased here, besides the Trouble, Captn. Brohier seems to be of the same sentiments with regard to the Price; Wherein we likewise concurr, and must further observe, That we don't think the Company were justly entitled to all the wood that fell in the storm, and indeed to but a small Proportion, as Numbers of People are possessed of Gardens & Groves within their Limits who had an undoubted Title to the Wood blown down therein, and the remaining Part of the Company's Districts are farmed out.

In the 7th. Paragraph, Captain Brohier represents that he apprehends the exclusive Right the Paymaster had of supplying the Inhabitants with Bricks and Chunam at what Price he pleased, has made him ample amends for any sums advanced by him on that Manufacture, though it has been urged he is constantly in Advance to the Company for procuring the Materials wanted for the Works; The other Articles, such as Timber, Plank, Palmeiras &ca. bought of the shipping he was engrossed tho not entirely for the works, and that the Company for two years past have been constantly in advance to the Paymaster for above half which time the Ballance in his Hands exceeded any supplies the works ever received. Mr. Boddam in his Reply to the first Particular positively affirms he was under large Advances for Materials of all kinds for the works, and the sole Priviledge of supplying the Inhabitants with Bricks and Chunam has not made him amends, for instead of their being charged, as is asserted at what Rates he pleased, there is a fixed Price upon them which indeed on Bricks has lately been raised, as their Dimensions have On this we must observe there is Reason to be persuaded, been encreased. We think, of the Reality of Mr. Boddams assertion that he has been much in advance for Materials of all kinds, for as the works required, constant and large supplies, it may be justly imagined, but few would have been furnished had not considerable sums been distributed by him to the Brickmakers, & those who provide Chunam as well as other Articles in the Country, and the Works have suffer'd infinite Impediments thereby, for which without doubt he would (and deservedly we are of opinion) have been deemed culpable. The large Quantities of Materials that remained in his hands when the Committee were appointed for supplying the Works with them and have since been dispoed of, as well as the sums the Committee have already had for the Provision of those Articles appear to Us corroborating circumstances that there was even an absolute Necessity for his being considerably in Advance By the exclusive Right granted him (which was no more than all his Predecessors were allowed) of supplying private Persons with Bricks and Chunam, an advantage we think must have accrued, tho' as he has averr'd giving 1500 of the large sized Bricks for a Pagoda to the Company was more than he could afford, it is probable his Gains were little above sufficient to ballance the Account, Altho' the Price on the Bricks to the Inhabitants was raised in consideration of their being of the large Dimensions, as he declares he should have otherwise been a sufferer by them, and we cannot say we have found any Reason to contradict this Assertion. To disprove that Part of the same Paragraph, where Mr. Brohier

accuses him of having engrossed sundry other Materials bought out of the shipping, such as Timber, Plank, Palmeiros &ca., Mr. Boddam quoted some Instances of others being Purchasers, and Captn. Brohier himself, This reduced us to the Necessity of applying to Captain Brohier to be more particular on this Head, when he related to us an Instance in regard to some Palmeiras, imported by a Country Boat, it was as follows, That being one Day in Company with Captain Maskelyne, a Boatman came there to dispose of to him some Palmeiras', accordingly Captain Maskelyne entered into an Agreement with him for a Quantity for his Buildings @ 11 Pagodas \$\mathbb{9}\$ 100, but before they were delivered, he told Captain Maskelyne he could not possibly stand to his Bargain being order'd by the Paymaster's Conicoply not to sell them as they were wanted for the Company's use and in consequence they were taken by Mr. Boddam from whom Captain Maskelyne purchased the same Palmeiras at twelve Pagodas # 100. Mr. Boddam in answer to this affirms, his servants had no Orders from him to store any Palmeiras in the Company's Name, but acknowledges he has dealt in them and that his Conicoply had bought some for him at the sea Gate and very culpable if to induce the seller to part with them to him in preference to others he had taken upon him to say they were wanted for the Company for it was entirely of his own accord; The Conicoply being sent for, and questioned about the Matter, declared when he made the Purchase it was wholly in his Master's Name, and no mention made they were wanted for the Company's Use; as there were no Evidences produced, we could get no further Proof against the Conicoply; nevertheless must remark that as he had at times before bought and paid for many Articles for his Master as Paymaster, it was very natural in the Boatman to imagine (tho' it might not have been mentioned) that he then was also contracting for his Master in the same Quality and that the Palmeiras were intended for the Company, & for that Reason deviated from his Agreement with Captain Maskelyne. We are therefore of Opinion both this Conicoply and all Servants belonging to the Gentlemen in Station in the Service should be strictly enjoined to be particular in declaring under what name they make any future Purchases, otherwise it may be productive of many bad Consequences. With regard to the other Articles mentioned to have been engrossed Captain Brohier says he has not given himself the Trouble to Collect any Instances thereof (as he never intended to assume the character of an Informer) But has heard great Complaints from the Inhabitants in general of the Difficulties they laboured under in getting Timber and Plank, which in our way of thinking carries with it no Proof that they had been engrossed by the Paymaster, and we are rather of Opinion it must have proceeded from the scarcity of it then in the Place, from but a trifling Importation, as the Company about that time had occasion for most part of what was brought for sale Captn. Brohier acknowledges he purchased the Eagles Cargo of Captain Moor and has still a great Part of it on hand but that this happen'd only about 7 or 8 Month's ago after Mr. Boddam was plentifully, supplied and large quantities were expected from Batavia, and elsewhere, However as Mr. Boddam urges, it is certainly a Proof that he has not engrossed the Timber and Plank brought to Market here.

In the 8th. Paragraph Captain Brohier makes a further objection to what is mentioned by the Paymaster of his being in Advance, and we think it not an improper one altogether, for it is certain for such articles as are procured from the Banksall's & Buzar, There is no Necessity for his being longer in advance than from the Time one Consultation is held till another, however it must be allowed he ought to have some Cash in hand to discharge the daily Demands that are made as well for other Current Expences as what regard the works, and this there is an Instance of in the Draughts on him for Materials bought of other Persons to the value of upwards of three thousand Pagodas (which are certified by Captain Brohier, but that Gentlemen assures us he did

so as to their Quantity and not with Regard to their Price, and Mr. Boddam declares he is ignorant who fixed the latter and knows nothing more of them than observing they were certified he paid for them) moreover as a Consultation seldom happens on the first day of the Month and sometimes not till near a week after, was he not to have a Ballance remaining with him he would be obliged to disburse his own Money till he could have a supply from the Board. But Mr. Boddam solemnly protests to us that altho' the Ballances which Mr. Brohier takes Notice exceeded any supplies the works ever received (To expedite the carrying them on all that lay in his Power) he has on an average been in Advance much larger sums than those Ballances, for the Articles alone of Bricks and Chunam, exclusive of the amount of other Materials remaining on his hands and Money outstanding for procuring more, in Proof of which is ready to produce his Books if it should be thought necessary. It appears very evident that from the Paymaster's Books we have seen for some years before this Place was taken by the French, the Paymaster at the End of the Month was generally in Advance to the Company a small sum, but in those times there were no such Demands for Materials of all kinds, and consequently the monthly Disbursements and his stock on hand could have been but trifling in comparison to what they are and have been, ever since the commencement of the Works, We are therefore of opinion that can be deemed no Reason against the Paymaster's having a Ballance in hand in the present situation as keeping the Works supplied in the best Manner he was capable of ought to have engaged his utmost Attention, and in which his being assisted with a constant Advance from the Company was no more than was requisite, of the whole amount of Materials which Mr. Boddam is said to have supplied being Pags. 27857-35-25 He declares several have been purchased unknown to him of other Persons and as before observed the Major Part certified by Captain Brohier, besides which sundry others to the amount of upwards of three thousand Pagodas were provided by the Company's Conicoply from the Banksalls & Buzar, and to the best of his Knowledge at prime Cost, so that only the Remainder was in Reality what he supplied himself, for the Particulars of which he referrs to a List annexed to his Letter. He also persists in his first Assertion that the Timber & Plank he purchased himself, bore that a trifling Proportion to the other supplies, for out of the whole amount thereof included in his accounts which is Pags. 3819-14-0 to the value of Pagodas 1972-33-33 were brought of other hands, and these last two Circumstances the said Lists he has delivered in which we have inspected, testify As Captain Brohier has farther declared in the same Para. of his Letter that some country Timbers and other Articles have been charged by the Paymaster at his own Price, we judged it necessary to require an Instance of it, He replied as before the Like Circumstances in the preceeding Part of this Report Vizt. That as he was invested with no publick Authority to check his Accounts, it was in his Power to rate them as he pleased, but does not say he had done it in an unjust Manner and as he likewise in another place says that he leaves it to the Judgment of the Board whether all the Materials have been charged at the lowest Price they could be had, which may be thought an Insinuation of the Reverse; we must take the Liberty of troubling your Honour &ca. with a Repetition of what we have already related with Respect to this Particular, to wit, That we have done our utmost to learn what are and have been the Prices of every Article and have no Reason to think they have been overrated in the Paymasters accounts with the Company, altho' Mr. Boddam in his Reply has advanced, the Company's Conicoply had assured him that the Materials he had provided were paid for in the Presence of the Engineers Conicoply, The latter averrs that he had seen discharged only the Amount of some and with regard to the rest is entirely ignorant if they were ever paid for nevertheless upon our reading over to him every Article singly and asking his opinion of their Prices, He assured us he beleived them to be the same as they really cost at the Banksalls and Buzar of which he said he had some knowledge having made frequent Purchases himself from thence.

In the latter Part of his Eight Paragraph Captain Brohier observes, that the Batta on the Fanams which is not taken Notice of in the Purchase of Materials or of the Bullock hire of Bricks, Sand and Clay &ca. has been an Encrease of charge to the Works of Pags. 982-19- in two years, And likewise in his ninth Paragraph, That the Cooley hire being cast up at 36 fanams to the Pagoda has swell'd the Article of workmanship more than it would have been if cast up at 43 fanams the Current Exchange, and thereby encreased the apparent charges of the Works in two years to Pags. 3861-31- we cannot but allow these observations to be very just, and as the whole Amount of Fanams disbursed on account of workmanship, and Materials within the two years has

been at 36 to the Pagoda

The Difference in casting them up at 43 to the Pagoda makes just the two sums Captain Brohier specifies and together Pags. 4844-7- But as the Paymasters Accounts which we have inspected, demonstrate that he has been paid out of the Company's Cash in fanams at the Rate of 36 to a Pagoda to the Amount of Pags.

In reality the Difference has been no more to the Company by the Batta than what has arose on the Exchange of

And from what we have further to remark, it will appear, We imagine, not to be even that, tho' it has been a considerable apparent charge to the Works as set forth by Captain Brohier, for it is very certain that the Exchange has but seldom within these two years been at 43 fanams & generally between that and 42, moreover though Captain Brohier has made out an account of fanams to a large amount in the supplies of Materials received of the Paymaster, and cast them up at 43 to the Pagoda, many Articles were paid for by him in Gold and whenever the Company were supplied with so small a Quantity (which is often the Case in trifling Repairs) as came to the value of only a Quarter or half a Pagoda he charged for the same in his Accounts at the Rate of no more then 9 & 18 fanams reckoning a Pagoda at 36 which We conceive must greatly lessen if not wholly clear off the Difference arising on the Exchange of the said Pagodas 3210 disbursed on fanams by the Paymaster over and above the Number paid him out of Cash, and seems evident to us, as we imagine it will to your Honour &ca. that the Paymaster has had a very trifling if any Advantage from this Particular.

In the 10th. Paragraph Captn. Brohier contradicts Mr. Boddams Assertion that the Pay of Labourers has swelled the Expence of the works by being encreased to half as much more by Mr. Robbins and declares only the Pay of the Overseer of the Works, and the principal Overseer's or Workmen that distinguished themselves by skill or Activity was raised and that to serve as an Example to others to merit it.

And in the Eleventh, he allows that some women Coolies who usually received but half a Fanam were paid a whole one (as it was found they could earn it in consideration of their using large Baskets to bring Ground for the Glacis at S^t. David and this was the whole Increase that had been made in the Pay. Mr. Boddam in Reply referring it to the Board's Experience and Judgment whether the Pay to Artificers has not been raised one moiety at least within these few years. We searched the Paymaster's Accounts both before and since the Place was taken to be certified of this Matter, by which it appears there has lately been an Increase to some of the Artificers Captain Brohier having declared Mr. Robins had not done it, we thought it necessary to desire Information of him who had, He replied it was himself, and for the following

Reason That finding on his Arrival here some of the Workmen were very diligent in their Business and capable of acting in quality of Directors of particular Branches of Work, as these were but few, he judged it for the good of the service to raise their allowances, not only as a Recompense to them but an Encouragement to others to improve themselves in like Manner, for the consequence of delivering a Piece of work into the Charge of an unskillful Person might require it to be under and begun again. That to some of the Hammermen who had exerted themselves & worked laboriously an Increase had also been made, and to the hire of Men Cooley's a Quarter of a Fanam had been added to encourage them to resort here, and this with the Governor's Consent, He further mentioned that, on his coming hither observing the two Maistree's or Head Bricklayers had, besides a Monthly allowance of a Pagoda and an half each, two fanams each 👸 day, He order'd the latter to be struck off and that they should receive two Pagodas a peice & month and this instead of augmenting was a Diminution of their Pay upon all which We must make this observa-tion that the Arguments urged by Captain Brohier make it evident that what he has done therein was extremely necessary thought at the same time We think it should have been first represented to the Board for their consideration, and Approval, before it was fixed, as indeed ought all concerns, tho' but triffing that relate to the Company.

Paragraph the twelfth represents that the Bullock hire on the Chunam being paid in Fanams, the Batta on the Exchange of Pagodas amounts to in the two Years Pags. 326-24— as this Article, we find was paid for in fanams and is included in the Account of those disbursed by the Paymaster to the amount of Pags. 26200, It appears to be no real charge to the Company as is more particularly shewn in the Remarks on the 9th. Paragraph of Captn. Brohiers Letter.

The other Intimation at the End of the 12th. Paragraph of the 5 P Cent advance on the Chunam, Mr. Boddam does not deny having received This we learn from the Enquiries we have made, is no more than a Priviledge enjoyed by his Predecessors for a great Number of Years past, and is granted by the People who engage to deliver the Chunam as an equivalent for the Inconveniencies and Losses he is subject to by wastage, and otherwise in the Advances made in the Country, for providing it as the Company are entirely exempted therefrom, paying for it only as brought into Town and then without any Advance on the Country Price. We are therefore of Opinion Mr. Boddam cannot be deem'd culpable in accepting the same as it might be looked on by having been so long practised, an Advantage appertaining to the Employ.

In Paragraph the 13th. Captain Brohier asserts that good Bricks have been carried to the Inhabitants tho very fit for the Company's Use, and that the Works evince the Bricklayers at the Kilns have not done their Duty, tho Mr. Boddam seems to put a stress on their being thereto sort out the best for the works. However he excuses them from Blame entirely as the Kilns are at a great Distance and they cannot be accountable for any Exchange that might be made in transporting them from thence, nor certain if what they pick out and send for the works are really carried there or not, He does not positively say It is the case, but that it may be so and that many Lacks of bad Bricks, which would have been rejected had there been Plenty of better, have been made use of thro' the want of them. Mr. Boddam in his Answer still insists that the foregoing is an injurious Assertion and makes use of some Arguments to prove it so, To enable us therefore to form a proper Judgment on what was advanced on both sides, we desired they would relate to us such further Circumstances as they might be acquainted with regarding the Matter, Captain Brohier peremptorily averrs that he had himself seen at different times a considerable Number of Bullocks loaded with extraordinary good Bricks going from the Road leading to the Kilns into the very center of the black Town & Colonel Scott was in company with him more than once & an Eye witness of it also.

Mr. Boddam solemnly declared himself to be entirely ignorant thereof, and Captn. Brohier does not charge him with the contrary, nay allows that it may have been done without his Privy by his Servants who are entrusted with the Distribution of the Bricks. This being the Result of our Enquiry, we are to observe upon the whole, That we are of Captain Brohier's Opinion with Respect to excusing the Bricklayers at the Kilns, especially as the Distribution of the Bricks after they have sorted them does not come under their Management but other Persons, and also as to any Exchange that may have been made in the way, as the Distance is considerable and they are obliged to give constant attendance at the Kilns, We dont find the least Proof that Mr. Boddam gave any orders or Permission for the black Inhabitants being supplied with any good Bricks, and therefore are induced to concurr also with Captain Brohier that the servants may have taken upon them such a Liberty without his knowledge not unlikely we think, on account of some particular Attachments or other Considerations which we have great Reason to believe People in their Stations the Natives of the Country are very prone to; we have however been very assiduous to get a knowledge of it, by examining all kinds of People that have any connections with the Kilns, but to no Purpose for they all protest themselves entirely ignorant and we have no circumstantial Evidence to the contrary, except what has been already alledged by Captain Brohier, that he saw Bullocks loaded with them going into the Black Town.

The 14th. Paragraph contains an accusation of Mr. Boddam's having charged the Company seven fanams extraordinary in each Pagoda's worth of Bricks since June 1752 which till that time was paid by the Paymaster and for these two years past has amounted to Pagodas 1246 — as may be seen by the Paymasters Books, Mr. Boddam acknowledges it and Excuse alledges that being allowed it at St. David he did not imagine any objection could be made to it here, and if any one will contract to furnish Bricks cheaper than he has done, not including this Charge, he is ready to submitt to any allowance the Board shall judge requisite, But we cannot concurr with him that what he has offered are arguments of sufficient weight for laying such a Charge upon the Company without Application to, and the Permission of the Board.

In the 15th. Paragraph Captain Brohier mentions that with Regard to the Storekeeper's charging for Materials supplied the Company at the same Price he has sold them to the Inhabitants of the Place. It is certainly at his own Price without Check, for himself has not yet had a Power to object to the Price of any furnished by him or the Paymaster thó he conceives Colonel Scott did not mean that those supplied by the Storekeeper were charged at an exorbitant Rate, but that it might be so, if no Check was appointed to look into it, which we are of opinion sufficiently vindicates the Storekeeper, and it is therefore unnecessary for us to say any thing on the subject.

With Regard to what is represented by Captain Brohier in the 16th. Paragraph that the Company's Instructions for his inspecting the Paymaster's Accounts had not been complied with since July 1753 till when it was done, and is therefore unacquainted if his Accounts delivered into the Board monthly agree with the Paymaster's. Mr. Boddam thinks it an Inconsistency as at the same time he delivers in an Abstract of Ballances from the Paymaster's Accounts to December 1753, and from whence could he Collect them but from his Books, Mr. Brohier answers that since the Resolution of Council in July 1753 That the Materials for the works should be again under the Care of the Paymaster and Storekeeper and delivered out by them as required, agreeable to the Practice before Mr. Robins arrived (instead of being in the Charge & supplied by the Engineer, this seeming to be a much more regular Method of bringing them to an account) The Paymaster's regular Accounts were never tendered to him, but about the Middle of the Month, one of the Conicoplies used to attend him from whom he collected what had been expended the preceeding one which being

so long after they had been made use of it was then out of his Power to check them in a proper Manner and he had therefore not done it since the time before mentioned, and that the Opportunity he got of a late Order of the Governour's, for the Accounts being delivered him as he had requested it, Mr. Boddam assures Us he gave particular Directions that his Accounts should be carried to Captain Brohier as usual, till he was told by his Servant Captain Brohier had refused to receive them, This Captain Brohier absolutely denies, The servant being then called upon declared he carried the Books as customary to Captain Brohier's Conicoply who told him as an order had passed in Council that the Engineer was to deliver in his Accounts separately to the Board every Month when the Paymaster's were also read, his Master had acquainted him it was no longer necessary to sign them as he had done. This being supported by only the bare word of the Paymaster's Servant, we think it an argument of very little Force for discontinuing to comply with the Honble Company's express Directions and cannot but acknowledge Mr. Boddam culpable in permitting it to have had any Weight with him, for even had Captain Brohier really objected to signing his Accounts as it is said, We imagine That would not have been thought a proper Excuse for it's not being performed, but that he should have represented the same to the Board, and desired their Orders upon it. We must also here observe, That as Captain Brohier in this Paragraph has expressed the Paymaster's Accounts had been inspected by him and pass'd agreeable to the Company's Orders till the Time they were omitted to be carried to him, it seems a contradiction to what he has asserted in some of the preceeding Parts of his Letter Vizt. That not being empowered to check the Paymaster's Accounts he was at Liberty to Charge them as high as he pleased.

The 17th. & 18th. Paragraph's being the Conclusion of Captain Brohier's Letter & containing no further allegations against the Paymaster or Storekeeper we shall now proceed to take Notice of such Particulars as are Necessary in Mr. Boddam's Reply, and first, with Respect to the considerable sums he alledges to have been disbursed, which not being under his Management have been passed over in silence Vizt. Fitting up Egmore Ridoubt for a Powder Mill amounting to Pag⁸. 7307-13-4) Repairing Triplicane Bridge to Pag⁸. 1573-9-73 and the Engineer's Clerk's, Assistants &c⁸. to Pag⁸. 1986-2-4 in two Years. Captain Brohier being accordingly desired to explain those Particulars, acquainted us that after the Estimate of the Expence of erecting the Mill was laid before the Board it being judged necessary to encrease the Dimensions of the Pestles and Mortars for beating a large Quantity of Composition at a time, the Brass work alone came to a considerable Proportion of the Amount of that Estimate besides which several Buildings were added that at first did not appear to be wanted and were not included in the said Estimate as may be easily seen by surveying the Mill and the Buildings adjacent, Timber & Plank being also then infinitely dearer than at present, and the Materials of the Portugueze Church (many of which had been taken for that service) were rated according to the state of the Market at that time which was not very reasonable and these Circumstances have occasioned the Expence attending erecting the Powder Mill to be so much beyond what was at first proposed; as to Triplicane Bridge he said of the Materials sent there for carrying on it's Repairs, several were washed away by the Freshes and otherwise destroyed in the Storm to the Amount of Pagodas 319-30-76 and some Bricks that had been left there for the same Purpose, were afterwards brought and made use of in the works, The value whereof was Pags. 97-12-50, which reduced the real Expence it had cost from the sum it stood on the Books of Pagodas 1573-9-73 to only Pags. 129-3-67 The Charge of his Assistants &ca. We judged it unnecessary to make any Enquiry into, as it appears so plain on the Books and by the Accounts delivered in by Mr. Boddam, However we must acknowledge we think it not so reasonable as it might be as Mr. Boddam mentions there are besides several Conicoplies &ca.

included in the Cooley Account. What he has declared concerning the Disbursements on the Powder Mill and Triplicane Bridge, We have had no Reason to doubt but might have arrived at a greater Certainty of the Matter had exact Estimates been deliver'd into the Board before those works were recommended, We therefore take the liberty of recommending it as Very necessary that the Order of Consultation to that Effect be enforced.

We questioned Captain Brohier very minutely on what Mr. Boddam has advanced about his distributing Rice to the workmen and Cooley's in lieu of Pay, He said that being solicited by them to be supplied with Rice, He represented it to the Governour for his Consent and Orders that it might be delivered out of the Company's Godowns, but he objected to it, alledging it would give great Opportunities for Embezzlement to the Conicoplies, upon which as the People repeated their Importunities on that head, He took upon him to furnish them himself at the dailey Price of the Buzar assuring them at the same time that such who disliked it might object and receive their Money as a few did at first tho' very soon after changed their Minds and desired to fare the same as the rest, but not from any compulsive Means as has been suggested by Mr. Boddam and if any were corrected it was for neglect of Duty. Accordingly the Artificers and Cooleys engaged on the Company's Business, were served with Rice every other day from the 8th. of March 1753 to Ulto. May 1754, He then produced us his daily Account of Persons employed by which it evidently appeared, that the Months when Rice was served the Number was superiour to those preceding, and some time near twice as many. He owns that a Tax was made (but with the Governour's Approval) upon the Gardens, Salt Pans and Villages about the Bounds and upon a moderate Calculation; the Inhabitants and Farmers agreed to supply the Works with 825 Persons & day upon an average, but what came never exceeded 121 and for five Months of the Eighteen there was not one, He acknowledges he was guilty of an Error in mentioning that he purchased the Rice from the Company's Godowns having since found he had only from thence a trifling Quantity for the use of his family as Mr. Boddam has asserted. As we apprehend there is no Room to doubt that the several accounts are genuine presented us by Captain Brohier in Testimony of what he had declared, we think it a very more numerous at the time Rice was served, they looked upon it as an Advantage especially as they were at Liberty to reject it If they were so disposed, but being issued to them at the Buzar Price where could they go to have it more reasonably? The inconsiderable Number of People sent from the Gardens Salt Pans, & Villages, tho' the Proprietors had consented to furnish 825 dailey, serves as a Proof that what Mr. Boddam mentions to have been complained of by the Salt Farmers was without Reason, and upon the whole We must say we are of opinion that the Distribution of Rice has undoubtedly been useful to the Company and an advantage to Captain Brohier, which we do not complain of, as the Loss of Interest on his Money and Wasteage thereon are heavy Articles; However we cannot excuse him entirely for taking such a step without first having the Board's Permission to whom had it been properly represented & appeared of that service as it now seems to have been or to the Governour when first mentioned to him, it can't be doubted both he & they would readily have consented to it and the Company have likewise reaped the Benefit that it is reasonable to imagine Captn. Brohier has now done.

We cannot omitt mentioning Mr. Boddam's Request that it may be determined by the Board what connections the Engineer and Paymaster are to have together and if the latter is to pay an implicit Obedience to the former to obviate any further Differences between them; nor can we think otherwise than he does of the Necessity of having one or more Persons to be a General Check as well over the Carpenters Yard and every other Place where any of the Company's Business is carried on, as over the Paymaster, we therefore presume to

recommend it to your Honour &cas. Consideration to appoint such for as Mr. Boddam takes Notice, the head Bricklayer being first Overseer & Teller of the Cooleys it is no difficult Matter for him at the close of the Day to introduce amongst them such as may have been employed by him on private service, which We understand He and the Carpenter still continue to engage in tho' in direct Breach of a positive Order of Consultation, having we are well assured lately given a thorough Repair to a House belonging to the Estate of Coja Petrus in Choultry Gate Street. It also appears to us necessary to become a Resolution of the Board that no alterations shall be made in the hire of any Artificers or Labourers whatever, or that any Repairs or works be set about without their Permission is first obtained, for if that is not the case the Company are liable; we apprehend, to be led into many considerable & needless Expences.

This being the Substance of our Enquiry into the Particulars alledged against each other by Captain Brohier and Mr. Boddam, it only remains with us to assure your Honour &ca. We have not been wanting in our utmost Endeavours to attain the most perfect knowledge of every Circumstance, in which we hope we have so far succeeded as to merit your Approbation, being

Of the Second that it has Holes and is in no wise fit to be sent to England, but may fetch some Price at a sale here.

Of the third, that it is exceeding bad full of Holes & Patches.

I subjoin for your Inspection the quantity & qualities of the Cloth's that underwent this Examination as they turned out to the 1st. 2d. & 3d. Sorts abovementioned.

All the Cloth at the Painters was dispersed into so many different hands, in so many different Habitations & are in such a variety of Conditions arising from the strange Methods of painting Cloth in this Country, that the Collecting and examining them would have been a work of two Months at the same time that it would have utterly put a stop to the operations the Cloth might have been under, & thereby ruined it or at least have rendered it impossible to have prepared any Part of it for the Cargo of the Ship Winchelsea just now dispatched.

I therefore summoned the principal Painters, Men of substance & old servants to the Company, They very readily agreed to signing the following Declaration.

Having now gone thro' a particular Detail of all that remained at the time I took on me the charge of the Warehouse I submitt to your consideration what Resolutions are necessary to be taken in Regard to such articles which J am sorry to say do not answer to the value they are rated at.

The great Dearth of European Servants in this Employ, and the swarm of Black necessary to carry it on with sufficient Dispatch is a Circumstance not unworthy, in my opinion of the Attention of this Board and of a Representation to our Honble Masters. It is true the Warehousekeeper is deemed answerable, but at the same time I am persuaded that as European Servants

can alone alleviate the Care & anxiety of this Charge, Our Honble Masters will not hesitate to supply them, as the above Detail too plainly shews the Consequence of reposing a Confidence in the Natives.

The Minutes of last Consultation dated the 20th read and signed by all the Members of the Council then present, except Mr. Charles Boddam who sailed for Vizagapatam the 22d. Instant.

N. 47. General Letter from Mr. John Andrews Resident at Bandarmalanka read, acknowledging the Receipt of our Letter of the 22d. Janry, Enclosing the Monthly Accounts of that Settlement and desiring his Indents may be complied with.

Letter from Mr. John Brohier read as enter'd hereafter, Representing Letter from Mr. John Bronier read as cheef a state of the Engineer that the Current of the River being stopped by the new works, the Course of the Ranks of which having an Estimate it was turned thro' a Channel cut by the Freshes, the Banks of which having been carried away last Monsoon to near 180 Feet wide, it is now become impassable without Boats or a Bridge, wherefore he represents the Necessity of building a substantial one, the Expence whereof, as appears by an Estimate annexed will amount to Pagod⁸. 8353 — 46.

Agreed that it be built.

Mr. Brohier being called before the Board and consulted whether there is an immediate Necessity for building the proposed Bridge, or whether the Temporary Bridge already erected may not answer the Purpose untill the Fortifications are at least so far advanced as to put the Town in a defencible condition. After maturely weighing the Reasons for the one and the other, the Board are of opinion that there is an immediate Necessity for making a Rivetment to the Banks of the Channel as they would otherwise be in danger of being washed away by the Freshes, and in that Case a great Part of the Island would be overflowed, The Charge of repairing which would probably amount to as much as the whole Expence now proposed. It is therefore Agreed that sufficient Materials for the Purpose be first collected, and that then the Work be set about & compleated with all possible Dispatch agreeable to a Plan thereof which laid before the Board and approved, and that it may [not] meet with any Interruption for want of Artificers, it is Ordered that after the 15th. of next Month, no Person whatsoever either in the white or black Town be permitted to employ any Bricklayers, Carpenters or Blacksmiths, but that all such as can be found be entertained on the Company's Account, of which it is Ordered that Publick Notice be affixed at the Sea Gate.

No Carpenters, Bricklayers or Smith's to be employed on private after the 15th of next Month.

Ordered that the Expences of the intended Bridge be carried to a new Account to be opened for that Purpose in the General Books under the Title of New Bridge on the Island.

And that another Head of New Barracks be opened for the Expences attending those Buildings.

Instant accompanying their Monthly Papers and Accounts for Febry. and Invoices of Military Stores & Arcot Snow & Bridgwater, Enclosing also Petition of sundry Persons in Regard to their Houses which were taken in Mr. Floyers Government for an Hospital in Cuddalore, but they have not received any Rent for the same, desiring our Directions in Regard to the Merchants turn'd out Cloth. That Captain Charles Campbell having desired Leave to go to DeveCotah the Charge of the Garrison was given to Lieutenant Wagner, but Lieutt. Merryman claims it as an older Officer, and Mr. Wagner pleads that as Lieutenant Merryman has not a Commission as first Lieutenant of Artillery all Lieutenants of Infantry take Place of him, whereon they desire our Directions. That Mr. Call has got the Dragon Sloop out of the sand where she has sustained considerable Damage but may be repaired for one hundred and Fifty Pagodas, Desiring a supply of Cash as their Ballance is small, and as they imagine their ill success in the Investment last Year was owing to their late Advances to their Merchants, they hope we will shortly send them a sufficient sum.

That they dispatched the Prince Henry the 22d. Ultimo to compleat her Cargo at Onore and the Shaftesbury at the same finally for Europe with a full Loading of Coffee. That by a Letter from Captn. Forbes to their Military Paymaster they have Reason to think their People here have not been paid agreeable to the Lists [with] us which they desire may be regulated, accordingly. That the Weight and Fineness of their Rupees turn out agreeable to our Assay Master's Report, and they think it will answer to recoin them in our Mint when occasion may require to send any round.

The President acquaints the Board that the Decrease in the Rent of this Farm appear to him to have arisen from the short term for which it is let, as he was offered some days ago by a former Renter the sum of three thousand (3000) Pagodas a year more on a Lease of five years than the highest offer that should be made this day at the Sea Gate for 1 year, The Reason for so considerable an Advance is that the Farmers by holding it for so long a Term may be enabled to reap the Fruits of the many Expences which are necessary in cultivating the Lands of this country & which a shorter Term deters them from engaging in and consequently the Products of the Country must be greatly diminished another strong objection that has been generally made agt. such short Lease is that a Renter can have no opportunity of retrieving the Loss that may happen by a failure in the Crops, whereas on a Lease for a longer Term the Loss by one season may be compensated by the Plenty of another As a Proof of which the President further acquaints the Board that from the best Accounts he has been able to collect the Produce of DeveCotah Bounds for the last year has not exceeded two thousand Pagodas occasioned by the severity of the last Monsoon which destroyed all the Crops on the Ground, whereas in one plentifull season the Renters collected upwards of Ten thousand Pagodas.

That they have been unsuccessfull in the Notice of Persons to make Proposals for the Investment, none having been made, and they have great Reason to beleive their Merchants have entered into a Combination to reduce the Investment to their own Terms for Irshippa Chitty & Paupa Rauze having promised to bring in 400 pes. of Cloth as Musters of what they could afford to provide did accordingly produce some extreamly good but then pretended it was made of old Cotton and they could not undertake to provide such untill they could judge how the new Cotton would turn out, upon this trifling Behaviour they were ordered to pay in their Ballances at the next Consultation when they again appeared with the other Musters made (as they said) of new Cotton, so very bad that the Board unanimously rejected them upon which they positively refused intermeddling in the Investment without an Advance in the Price of three Pagodas ? Corge, and they have accordingly declined taking any further Advance untill they have discharged their Ballances. That they are afraid Persheram Pillah, of whom they had the greatest Hopes, is also trifling with them, having promised his whole Ballance in Cloth by the twelfth but now requests 15 days more That Nagore Kistna & Rama Chitty have paid their Ballance and decline any further concern in the Investment That upon the whole they can have no Hopes of an Investment this season unless some effectual Means are found out to bring their Merchants to Terms.

N: 84. from the President & Council of Bombay dated 23d. ultimo, acknowledging the Receipt of our Letters of the 21st. March & 15th. April, and acquainting us that they wrote us the 30th. April. That being in hopes no Measures have been taken in Europe which may render it necessary to detain their Military here, and having Reason to beleive the service will be in want of them on that side at the opening of the season, they send the Protector to us for them and in case she should not be capable of receiving the whole, They desire we will embark all the Europeans and as many of the Natives as we can and dispatch the ship so as to arrive there in all the Month of August. That their three Companys of seapoys returned lately by Land from St. David & having been allowed only two Rupees & a Month's Batta each Man, Captn. Armstrong has advised them that he was obliged to advance the subedars fifteen hundred Rupees, and as they behaved well, They think it would be but reasonable to allow their Expences, they have therefore ordered the Account to be settled and shall debt us for the Amount. That they are equally embarrassed with us in Regard to the sale of woollen Goods which disables them from making us a consignment of Treasure by this Conveyance for Bengal Presidency.

Merchants offer with Sunca Ramah to provide three hundred Bales of Eight Caul Long Cloth ordinary against the Month of February and Nella Chittee &ca. I am likewise directed to acquaint Your Honour &c^a. that upon Perusal of the Records of the former Mayor's Court, it has been found to have been a Standing Practice that the Register of the Court always attended to see the usual Oaths administred by the President to every new Alderman and the Court having likewise seriously considered how reasonable it is that this Custom should be always continued, have resolved, That it shall be a Standing Rule for the future, that the Register shall always attend upon the President, with every new Alderman in Order to see him sworn in, And as his Majesty's Charter directs that in case any Person chosen an Alderman shall neglect or refuse to accept that Office and shall not within fourteen days after his Election, take the Oaths, this Court think it highly necessary that your Honour &c^a. should cause Notice to be given to them immediately when any Election is made; that in case the Person elected refuses to accept of the office, the Court may within the proper time proceed with him conformable to the Charter, and on such immediate Notice to this Court, the proper Notification will be sent to the Person elected.

Your Honour &c². will therefore be pleased to cause Notice to be given to this Court when any Alderman is elected.

Conformable to your Orders, We are to Acquaint you, that we have in Several Sittings inspected the Accounts of this Settlement for the Month of June, of which We now present you with our Report under the respective Offices.

1st. THE EXPORT WAREHOUSE.

THE Calculations, Additions and Statements of the Journal Parcels have been examined and are found right.

We observe that the Goods for Packing and Sale cause a Head of intricate Accounts, at the same time that the Sale of them by retail yield little or no Profit to the Company. We submit to Your Honour &c². whether it is not proper, that no Goods for Packing and Sale be henceforth sold out by retail, which will prevent these perplexities.

There Appears by the Warehouse Books, a quantity of Oil belonging to the Company which was intended for the West Coast, but on Account of the badness of the package refused by the Commander. This Oil is subject to much waste, & to the Charge of Godown rent. If it is not soon sent to the West Coast, it will be a saving to the Company to sell it, as what little is expended in the Warehouse for the Packing Screws, can at any time be bought by retail.

We do not find any daily Account of Coolies employ'd in the Warehouse, it is true this Disbursement Amounts to no great matter, but we think it proper that a daily Account be kept.

The Warehouse Ballance for the Month of June is the sum of Pagodas 3839. That Ballance on examination does not appear in the Warehousekeepers hands, but mostly in Notes outstanding.

2d. The Storekeeper.

The Storekeepers Accounts have been examined, and the Calculations, Additions & Statements are found right.

The Method of keeping these Books appear sufficiently explicit, but we think that in this Office likewise a Daily Account should be kept of Coolies employ'd, as well as of all other Disbursements.

The Balance in the Storekeeper's hands for the Month of June is Pag^s. 5800 of which near 3000 Pag^s. is a Ballance due from the Paymaster, the rest is reserved for the Expences of the Company's Vessels.

3d. THE MILITARY PAYMASTER.

The Calculations and Additions of these Accounts have been examined and are found right.

The Military Paymaster we find has Vouchers from the Rolls, of the Money he disburses in payment to the Soldiers.

We observe that many Men not actually resident in Madrass, are paid by the Military Paymaster here some of the Captains drawing for their whole Companys be they where they will. This Method is very liable to produce confusion to say no more, We therefore take the liberty to recommend that the Men of every Company be paid on the Spots where they shall be doing Service, and no where else.

4th. PAYMASTER.

The Calculations & Additions of these Accounts have been examined & found right.

— FORT ST. GEORGE, AUGUST 1755 —

There is a daily Account of the Batta paid to Hircaras, Peons & Messengers attending on Duty in the Place, or dispatched from it, & this Account is daily deliver'd to the President.

The Amount of Oil expended in the Garrison is Pags. 53-24-72 of which an account was produced to Us. The Monthly charge of Oil, for the Garrison &cs. Buildings belonging to the Honble Company, is doubtless a large expence amounting to Pags. 79. — We do not see how this expence can be retrench'd, but by recommending to the Paymaster that it be purchased at the Cheapest rate, as the price varies.

The expence of Water is likewise very large, all the Water fit to drink being brought from Wells at a great distance from the Town. On a Calculation of the Number of Men in our Garrison, Hospital & Out Posts, all which are serv'd with it, We don't find how this expence can be retrenched, without the subjecting the soldiers to the inconvenience of being frequently in want of it.

We observe that the Honble Company are at a charge for Burying the Military, We Apprehend this expence should be defray'd by the Captains.

The Hospital expences amounting to Pags. 224-9-56 appear to us very large, but find the Paymaster has Vouchers for the full of the Disbursement.

We observe 4 Pagodas a Month charged for the hire of Colonel Bagshaw's Palankeen, and do not find by looking over the Fort S^t. David Accounts, that any other of his Majesty's Officers are allowed one, except Colonel Adlercron Commander in Chief.

5th. THE ENGINEER'S ACCOUNTS.

The Calculations & Additions of these Accounts have been examin'd and are found right.

We observe on the examination of these Accots. that there are proper Checks on the expence of every Article of the Materials, as well as on the pay of all kinds of workmen and Coolies.

6th. THE SEA CUSTOMER.

The Calculations and Additions of these Accounts have been examin'd & are found right.

The Receipts of this Account are not exactly for the Goods imported that Month, many are for Goods imported in preceeding ones. The usual Lenity of this Port having always permitted responsible Merchants to carry away their Goods, and to Allow them some time for the payment of the Customs, from which this Port has obtain'd no small degree of Reputation. We therefore submit to Your Honour &ct. whether any Stricter method than the present should be put in force. The number of Servants charged in this Account, we find are necessary to Prevent frauds, as the Boats are by the Current, often obliged to land at a considerable distance from the Gate.

The Customer's reasons for the large Ballance of his Account for the Month of June Pags. 14379-11-78 is that the whole of that Money was not collected within the Month. We think therefore that it would be proper he should express in his Ballance the Monies he actually has in hand, and the List of what is outstanding.

7th THE LAND CUSTOMER.

The Calculations and Additions in this Account examin'd & are found right.

We have nothing to object to the present method of carrying on this Office, as Servants are Station'd at all the inlets of the black & white Town, from whence the Goods are immediately brought into the Land Customer's room where the Land Customer or his Deputy prize them to the best of their Judgement.

8th. THE IMPORT WAREHOUSE.

The Calculations and Additions have been examin'd and are found right.

We must observe in regard to the Import Warehouse Accounts, that on the face of the Entries there is no Appearance of an Outcry made, which has of late been the Orders of our Honble Masters. It therefore appears to us necessary that these Outcry Accounts be methodized as follows.

When an Outcry is made, Enter.

Accor. Outcry Dr. to Sundry Accounts.

These Accounts are the amount of every particular kind of Goods sold at that Outcry.

Then Enter

SUNDRY ACCOUNTS DR. TO ACCOT. OUTCRY.

These Sundry Accounts, are the Purchasers at Outcry for the Amount of Goods each has respectively bought. Every one of these Names must have Account Outcry annex'd to it.

When Goods are clear'd Say

CASH DB. TO SUNDRY ACCOUNTS.

This is the Persons Account Outcry, for what they clear out—If the Goods clear'd in any particular Month, are within the Discount time, at the end of such Month, an Entry must be made of.

DISCOUNT DE. TO SUNDRY ACCOUNTS.

To the Person's Account Outcry, for the respective Discount they are entitled to.

The Account of Discount will be clear'd in the General Books, by Profit and Loss.

The Charges Merchandize this Month appears very reasonable but the Ballance large Pag³. 31546-12-2 upon enquiry, the Import Warehousekeeper informs us that he has paid part of it in the Treasury.

9TH. THE MILITARY STOREKEEPER.

The Calculation, Additions & Statements of these Accounts examin'd and are found right.

The Method of keeping these Books are sufficiently explicit, but we recommend that a strict Diary be kept of the many minute Disbursements in this Office.

10th. THE MINT ACCOUNT.

We observe on this Account, that the Charges Merchandize run high, which is owing to an extraordinary large coinage this Month.

Having now gone through all the Home Accounts of this Settlement, we think proper to include them in a separate Report, as we shall those of the Subordinate Factories in another, and the Country Disbursements in a third.

That they are concern'd to observe the quantity of Cloth design'd for the three Presidencys as they have a large one on hand and the Company have exceeded their Indent by 200 Bales, but when they receive those intended for them by the Rhoda they will use their best Endeavours to dispose of them, That they have paid the Seapoys who return'd from hence Rupees 2225-3-67 for their travelling Expences, and they have also demanded an Allowance for Provisions whilst they were at Cuddalore and on their return amounting to Rups. 7260-3-67 requesting to be informed whether our Troops had that Allowance. That they purpose shortly to dispatch the London & Anson to the Bay with Cotton.

No. 125 From the Deputy Governour & Council at Fort St. David dated From Fort St. David. the 23d. No. 127 From Mr. Charles Hopkin Chief of DeveCotah dated the 22d. September Acknowledging the Receit of our Letter of the 14th. Instant, offering his reasons for the Monthly Charge in his Accounts under Fortifications & Repairs which were made in consequence of Estimates sent up here for our approbation, but the Work by reason of bad weather and want of Artificers has been unavoidably protracted That such a place as DeveCotah which has been so long built and badly taken care of must be in continual want of repair, that he had our permission in our Letter of the 31st. July last year "to make any trifling repairs that might be really necessary & not otherwise", and that none but such have been done, That the sand Bags we mention are still in being & in good Condition and his reason for mentioning Embrassures was that he thought them more durable and less lyable to Accidents. That no Captain there has over been paid but for Men actually doing duty on the Spot, and they have always defrayed the Charge of burying the dead. That the Advertisement for Encouragement of a free & open Trade has been Translated in the several Languages, & publish'd throughout the Bounds, but as no one there knows the Establish'd Rules, he submitts to us whether it may not be necessary to have Copies of them sent down & published there.

Para. of the Bom ay Lette: referi'd to the Committee. Agreed that the Paragraph in the abovemention'd Letter from Bombay relating to the Seapoys be referred to the Committee for Country & Military Affairs to do therein as they may think proper.

300 Bales; Broad Cloth & L. Ells for Bombay to be sent on Freight by the Squadron. The Proceedings of the Gen!. Committee in their Examination of Col!. Heron's Conduct laid before the Board.

The Current Business of the day being gone thro', the President acquaints the Board that the principal reason for his desiring them to Assemble at this time was to lay before them the proceedings of the General Committee in an Examination they had made into the Conduct of Col¹. Heron one of the Members of this Board and Major of the Companys Forces on this Coast. That being willing this Gentlemen should be present, the usual Summons had been sent him, but about Eight this morning he received a Letter from him (which is inter'd hereafter) excusing himself from Attending on Account of an Indisposition desiring however that his absence might not prevent the Committee laying before the Board what Charges they pleased, and he should be ready by two o'clock to lay every thing before the Commander in Chief of the Forces meaning Col¹. Adlecron now at S^t. David's.

The President thereupon proceeded to inform the Board that after the Conclusion of the Treaty of Truce the General Committee having taken into consideration the forming some Scheme to reimburse the Company a part of that large sum they are in Advance for the Nabob, Saw with concern the little probability there was of its being done out of the Revenues accruing to him from the Arcot Province, And the Nabob having himself frequently press'd the President to Order a detachment of the Army to march with him into Madura and Tinnevelly Countries, Assuring him that very large sums were due to him from the different Polligars and Chiefs there, who had paid him no part of the Tribute due during the whole time he was involved in the late war, and that notwithstanding he was now in peace he found as little inclination in them to settle Accounts with him as before, and that unless a sufficient Force was sent there he judged it would ever be the Case; The Committee taking this into serious consideration, saw clearly the necessity of undertaking the Expedition, as it appear'd the only step they could possibly take to enable the Nabob to clear off a part of his Debt to the Company. They therefore came to a resolution to put this design in Execution, and relying on the Integrity and prudence of Col¹. Heron, made Choice of him to conduct this important Expedition and the 4th. of February last sent him Orders, to march with the whole European Troops he lay there at the head of, with one thousand Seapoys into the Madura and Tinnevelly Countries, and for the greater satisfaction both of the Company and the Nabob the Committee directed that for all moneys collected Joint receits should be signed by Col¹. Heron, Mr. Maunsell and the Nabobs Officer, Having taken this precaution they flatter'd themselves with the greatest hopes of this Expeditions being attended with all the desired Success. But finding after the Army had been abroad above six weeks, that there was little appearance of any thing considerable being collected, and Judging it necessary for many important reasons to recall the Troops, the Committee sent Orders to Coll. Heron the 26th. March to return, and repeated those Orders the 3d. 22d. & 24th. April, but Coll. Heron not arriving at Tritchinopoly till the 6th. June. which was full three weeks later than the Committee expected, and the President having had information of several matters that it was judged necessary should be enquired into, orders were sent to Coll. Heron the [lacuna] to give the Command of the Troops over to Captain Polier and to come to Madrass himself. Soon after his Arrival being called upon for a Journal of his proceedings, the same was delivered to the Committee who upon a Strict examination therein found Sufficient reason to blame many parts of his Conduct, and the better to enable him to clear up those matters they drew up in writing a Charge against

him, the 9th. Instant to which he answer'd the 11th, but that not being satisfactory to the Committee, they made their objections with some further observations, which also were delivered him in writing the 19th. Instant, and he replyd the 22d. All which together with Copies of the Letters that passed between the Committee and Col¹. Heron during that Expedition, and the several Information since taken relating thereto, are now laid before the Board, and being entered at length in the proceedings of the Committee, reference may be thereunto had.

The several Charges, Replys and Vouchers abovementioned having been maturely weighed and considered upon the whole the Board are unanimously of Opinion,

That Col¹. Heron has been Guilty of Breach of Orders, and of Perverting the intentions of his Commission in the following Instances among many others of less moment Vizt.

Breach of Orders.

In not Settling Accounts with the Pollygars jointly with Mr. Maunsell and the Nabobs Officer in the manner he was directed by the Committee and in not immediately returning with the Army on the receit of the Committees Orders to do so, but delaying the same under various pretences which seem of little weight.

Perverting the Intentions of his Commissions:

by applying to his own use and that of other private persons all the ready money collected from the Pollygars, except three thousand Rupees, instead of bringing the same to the Companys Account. And in farming out the Madura and Tinnevelly Countrys to Mahafoos Cawn the Nabobs Officer, who was to take Charge of those Countrys for the Nabob, instead of collecting, in conjunction with that Officer and Mr. Maunsell, the Arrears which had then become due, and leaving Mahafoos Cawn at his departure in possession of those Countrys, to receive and Account for the future Rents. Thro. which, and other parts of his Conduct the service hath been greatly injured, by incurring a greater Expence in the Expedition than the Collection can reimburse; whereas it manifestly appears that had he duely and faithfully executed his Instructions, a large sum of money might have been required, for all which, the Board thinking themselves in Duty to their Employers obliged to shew the severest marks of Resent-

ON THE QUESTION PUT

It is agreed That Alexander Heron Esqr. be, and he accordingly is hereby Col. Heron suspended from his Seat at this Board until the Honble Companys pleasure be from his known.

Order'd that the Secretary signify the same to Col!. Heron, and a Letter being accordingly prepared for that purpose, is entered hereafter.

The Board further remark that many other parts of Coll. Heron's Conduct, and particularly that in the Natom Woods, Appear to be very unlike an Officer, But as these will come more properly before a Court Martial (which the Board observe Coll. Heron intends himself to apply for) they take no further Notice of them at present.

The Book of Standing Orders lying on the Table. The Minutes of last Consultation dated the 29th. ultimo read and sign'd. General Letters read Vizt.

Geni. Letters read Vizt. From Fort St. David.

No. 128 & 130 From the Deputy Governour and Council at Fort St. David, The first dated the 30th. ultimo acknowledging the Receipt of our Letter of the 21st. and enclosing their Accounts of Profit and Loss to the 30th. of April 1755, to which they desire our Answer that they may close their General Books; Desiring also our Permission for disposing of some Stores in the Garrison at publick Outcry which are unfitt for service as ? the List they Enclose us. That they observe what we wrote to them in Answer to their Paragraph about the Investment, That they are very sorry their Endeavours to improve the Manufacture should bear so unfortunate a Construction, but that they can assert with Truth, their only motive for turning out so large a Proportion of cloth was to induce the Merchants to mend their hands on account of the continual Complaints made by our Honble Masters, but however the present Juncture being not so favourable, they must wait a better Opportunity, and in the mean time shall observe our Directions for relaxing their strictness in sorting as much as possible. That they shall comply with our Orders for sending up Nella Chitty's cloth if we think proper to repeat them, but represent at the same time that such a step must be attended with bad consequences, as it will, utterly destroy their Influence with the Merchants, and therefore hope we will dispense with it. That they are so particular in the pointing out this Mans ill Performance, because they had so much Reason to expect better from him, as he was introduced into the Investment there professedly with a view to improve it. That they have resorted his Worriarpollam Cloth and accepted with Difficulty about two thirds which is kept in the Godown till our Pleasure is known; but the other sortments he has brought in being more tollerable, they have been accepted and sent to the Washers and Dyers the Quantity however is very inconsiderable; That the Merchants in General having often sollicited to have their turned out Cloth given back without the chop and still persisting in their Request the it has always been refused them, as being contrary to Custom, they desire our Instructions, The other dated the 7th. October serves only to acknowledge the Receipt of our Letter of the 2d. with the Invoice and Bills of Lading enclosed and to accompany their Consultations & Monthly Accounts for August.

From Bandarmalanks.

N. 129 & 132 from Mr. John Andrews Resident at Bandarmalanka, The first dated the 6th. Ultimo advising us that the Bales were then loading and would be dispatched in a few days. Enclosing his monthly Accounts for August and the Duplicate Books for last Year Ending 30th. April 1755, Cloth on hand 188 Bales. The other dated the 25th. of the same Month Enclosing Invoice and Bill of Lading for 215 Bales he has consigned us by the Fortune Snow, and acquainting us that he would have sent them sooner had not the Weather been very stormy for some days & prevented his sending them on board. That in a violent storm the Long Boat he had sent on board was obliged to be cut away from the Vessel and was lost, which is the more to be regretted as there are no Mussoolahs or any other Boats to send off on an Emergency. That a French Sloop was blown out of the Road at Narasapore and two Boats lost which were loaded with Bales and other Goods. That he had just received

our Letter of the 8th. Ultimo and thanks us for the supply of Pagodas sent him by the Cuddalore Sloop, which he thinks will be sufficient for this year and that our Orders in regard to the Freedom of Trade shall be punctually obeyed.

N. 131 From Foss Westcott Esqr. Resident at Ingeram dated the 23d. of From September, acknowledging the Receipt of our Letter of the 8th. with the Papers Ingerana. That it is with real concern he observes our Remarks on the small quantity of Cloth he had on hand when he last addressed us, and that the Reasons he had assigned for it were not satisfactory, as we say the Factories of Vizagapatam and Madapollam lay under the same Disadvantages he complained of and yet made greater Progress tho' he had more Encouragement than Mr. Andrews in the Allowance of Fine Goods. In answer to all which he remarks that the severe Reprimands he had lately experienced from the Board made him very cautious in his sortments, which he beleives the Cloth he consign'd us the latter End of August will prove, and yet the Quantity (& he hopes the Quality) will be found to equal any of his Predecessors; As a Proof of which notwithstanding the Difference of the Times he encloses an Account of what was sent each year from that Settlement from 1736 to 1746, when Madapollam was again withdrawn, That it is with all submission he begs Leave to differ from us in Opinion regarding the situation of Vizagapatam as that Place has only the settlement of Bimlepatam to contend with; and that is now but of little Effect since the Dutch have carried on the greatest Part of their Cloth Business at Cokinana near Ingeram and the French have resolved to carry on their Investment at Yanam which is still nearer, and besides a great Part of the Vizagapatam Investment is supplied from Uppara a Settlement subordinate to it tho' but 30 miles from Ingeram, That he hopes all he has said on the subject will be looked on in a good light as it is only intended to vindicate himself from an Imputation of Neglect which he would by no Means be thought deserving of. Madrass Pagodas to be purchased.

Bengal to be wrote to. The Gentlemen at Vizagapatam being in Want of Pagodas for their Investment Agreed that Five thousand be sent them by Peons overland and a further supply as Occasions may offer and as there are but a few in the Cash chest Agreed that Twenty one thousand nine hundred and Fifty current Pagodas be advanced to Linga Chitty on contract (which he has offered to engage in) to deliver twenty thousand Madrass Pagodas Part immediately and the Remainder in Twenty Days being after the Rate of nine and three Quarters Cent.

A sett of Bengal Pattamars being now here, Order'd that they be returned and by that conveyance it is Agreed to write in answer to their Letters of the 12th. of July and 12th. No. 143 From the President and Council at Bombay dated the 24th. Septemr. From advising us that our Honble Master's Ship Dragon Capt. Michael Morgan Bombay. arrived there the 16th. of that Month from England having been only four months on his Passage. That at his departure from England the Treaty between the Company and the French was at a stand but not absolutely broke off as one of their Commissaries remained still in England that great Naval preparations were making both in England and France and two Fleets were actually put to sea one on our part and one from the French, that it was doubtfull whether Peace or war would be the consequence but under the 25th. 1st. TRICHINOPOLY.

At our first meeting on the 16th. August we had only time to point out several charges we thought necessary to be retrench'd when the President inform'd us that the best method should be taken to curtail those Expences as much as possible.

We must remark that the Batta to the Commandant of Trichinopoly is 15 Rupees P Day whereas the allowances to the Commanding Officers of Arcot & Chingleput are only 6 Rupees P Day, but as the distance of Trichinopoly makes the necessaries of life much dearer than at the aforementioned places, We are of opinion that the Commandant there should be allowed something Extraordinary, We therefore beg leave to recommend the same to the consideration of the President and Council.

We must likewise observe that all the Officers at Trichinopoly are allowed half Batta and are acquainted by those of our Members who are also Members of the Select Committee that this is a regulation made by the Committee in consideration of the abovementioned inconveniences and others which they are subject to. However we still recommend to the consideration of the President and Council whether a further reduction might not be made in the Batta of the Officers &ca. Subaltern to the Commandant.

These charges appear to us very Extraordinary and particularly the reward to Mr. Black as We are of opinion rewards of this nature should be left entirely to the consideration of the President & Council by a recommendation from the Commanding Officer.

The other Articles of Expence under the Head of charges Extraordinary for the months July Augst. & Septr. are for accidental services in the Camp as they arise; The Commissary in camp being first acquainted with the occasions of such service—We recommended that whatever materials and other things necessary on the occasions, should be provided by the Commissary, or agreed for by him.

The Batta to Officers & Seapoys are at stipulated Rates & check'd by

regular Musters.

On Examination of the Madrass Commissary's Accounts, we observe he has vouchers for all the sums he disburses except a trifling charge that is occasioned by Batta paid to Hircaras &c. sent to Out Garrisons—We must remark that he has ranged in so regular a manner the Accounts of the Out Garrisons & Camp Disbursements that his Books at once exhibit a full & clear view of all the Expences arising on Account the Nabob.

Having now laid before your Honour &c. Our observations on the monthly Accounts of Tritchinopoly Arcot and Chingleput Garrisons, Camp Disbursements & the Account of the Madrass Commissary for June, July, August & Sepr. we have nothing further to remark on those Heads at present, but these monthly Expences amount to considerable sums, those of the Out Garrisons are disbursed by the Commanding Officers without controul we therefore think it necessary to your Hon. &c. that Covenanted Servants should be sent thither with proper instructions to check them.

We now present you with Our remarks on the S^t. David Accounts for the ! 1st. Month of June.

CASH ACCOUNT.

We observe in the present method of keeping this Account, the Rupees and Pagodas are so blended, that we think two distinct Accounts should be kep'd of Rupees and Pagodas and that a Head be kep'd of Batta on Rupees.

STOREKEEPER'S ACCTS.

We do not find any Diary of the Stores Disbursed, which we think immediately necessary as no explanation is given of their Disbursement, and so soon as the Books of the present year are compleated, that they open their next upon the same model that the Storekeeper's are kep'd here. The Accounts for this month are not signed.

MILITARY STOREKEEPER'S ACCOT.

As the Disbursements under this Employ are considerably larger than those of the Storekeeper's a Diary becomes more necessary.

We cannot judge how far the Issues of Stores may be necessary.

The Disbursements of Cash amot. to Pags. 827-26-46.

Wax Cloth 140 Pieces at Pags. 3 piece Pags. 420.

We must remark the Quantity of Cloth and the high price of it appears to us extraordinary.

In general the Stores purchased are at higher Rates than at this place.

NABOB MAHOMED ALLY CAWN—Pags. 24. 11.

This charge is Chiefly for Artificers employed in Camp & at Trichinopoly, which We think shou'd be paid by the Commanding Officer of the latter and the former by the Commissary in Camp.

CHARGES GENERAL Pags. 264-14-46.

This is a large Amount, and the greatest part of disbursed in Fanams cast up at 36 to the Pagoda, at the same time We observe that the Military Store-keeper has had no advance in Fanams this Month.

IMPORT & WAREHOUSE & EXPORT.

We have nothing particular to remark.

SEA & LAND CUSTE: OF CUDDALORE & TEVENAPATAM CUSTE.

We observe the Ballances of these Accounts are express'd so much in Gold and so much in Fanams & Cash but as to the Receipts & Disbursements, what part is in Gold & what in Fans. is not specified.

PAYMASTERS ACCT:

CHARGES GARRISON

We observe a charge of Pag³. 5-18 for winding sheets to the Military, which we think should be defrayed by the Captains of the Companys to which they belong, as it is Ordered at this Place.

Paragraph 1 Having examined the Accounts of the Northern Subordinates for the Months of June, July, August and September we shall now report to you our observations on them under their respective heads.

- The Cash and Paymasters are the only Accts. transmitted from thence, we think that in future their Warehousekeeper, Storekeeper and Customer's Accounts or rather, their Journal Parcels should be sent us.
- In the Paymaster's Account under charges Garrison we find several charges of Wages and Allowances to Artificers &c. which should be brought under the Head of Charges General.
- The Books of this Factory We observe are kep'd in Star Pagodas but their Disbursements of Cash are all either in Madrass Pagodas or Arcot Rupees by the irregular exchange of which the real expences of the Settlement and cost of the Investment do not appear.
- Arcot Rupees received from Madrass are brought into the Cash Account as Cash at 350 \$\mathbb{H}\$ 100 Pags., and for Wares and Stores sold, at 315 \$\mathbb{H}\$ 100 Pagodas.

These are Disbursed as follows.

To the Paymaster at 300 \$\P\$ 100 Pags. by which the Charge of the Settlement is greatly over rated.

To the Merchants at 380 \$\mathbb{H}\$ 100 Pagodas.

To the Ware and Storekeeper at 315 \$\mathbb{H}\$ 100 Pagodas.

- The Books of this Settlement appear to us so very irregular that they ought to be new Modelled.
 - We have nothing particular to remark on thier Expences as they appear to us on the whole to be moderate.

The President acquaints the Board that the great cause of complaint in regard to the Boats and distress the Company's shipping as well as private for Traders are often put to by the bad management of them had induced him to think of some remedy and that finding the Boats in general extreemly out of repair he had directed the Company's Carpenter to refit them instead of making an Advance as has been usual to the Head Boat men for that purpose who generally squander away the greatest part leaving the Boats but barely fit for service some of these Boats are the property of the Head Boatmen and the rest belong to other private persons and altho' the President has always had the distribution of them for the service of the shipping in the Road yet it has never been practicable to restrain the managers by any Rules, persuations or Threats for as the usual hire has been six Fans. for every Trip to and from a vessell in the Road whether far or near those which venture nearest the shoar are always first served to the prejudice of those which are obliged to lye further out, so that large ships frequently meet with very prejudicial delays and detention to

the great hurt of the Trade of the Settlement. Out of these six Fanams # Trip the Owners allow the Boatmen Three fanams of which two only are paid them at the time and one reserved by the Head Men under pretence of laying in provision for the Boatmen in the Monsoon when they are unemployed, the other three Fanams are the gain of the owners, To remedy these inconveniencies the President proposes to the Board an entire new plan, to wit, that the Boats be valued and purchased on the Company's Account and the value of those which belong to the Head Boatmen be wrote to the Credit of their Account in part of what they owe the Company and that the rest be paid for. Some Black Inhabitants having given in the accompanying proposals for taking into their Hands the manufacture of Bricks of this Settlement by contract, and it Appearing to us Advantageous to the Company We presume to lay it before you for your Approbation.

Here annexed is An Abstract of what Bricks the Company and Inhabitants have been supplied by the Paymaster and are supplied at present by the Committee for a Pagoda, and what the Contractors offer them at, by which the Advantages of this Contract evidently appear, for notwithstanding the Inhabitants are to be supplied only with 750 Eleven Inch Wall Bricks for a Pagoda, the Cube of those large Bricks is above 20 standard & size Bricks more than they have had from the Paymaster or Committee, and above 137 undersiz'd Bricks more than they were formerly supplied for the same Money.

The high Price of all Paving Bricks is hereby reduced (for the most part) to above a Quarter of what they were sold for to the Company, the well and Tarrass Bricks of above one half and the Eighty Lacks of Wall Bricks (which is the principal Article) are offered at 100 Pagodas P Lack, whilst what has been made already stand to the Committee in 108 Pags. a Lack, the Cube of which 80

Lacks of Bricks the Board will be pleased to observe is equal to 119 Lacks of standard or to 153 Lacks of undersized Bricks, and is within five Lacks of standard Bricks, as much as have been received these four years past from the Brick Kilns.

We beg leave to observe that if the Contractors have not an exclusive Priviledge for this manufacture, they will not be able to fullfill their Contract, as they will have at least annually 25 Lacks of turned out Bricks which must be disposed of to the Inhabitants and is rather more than can be employed annually in the Settlement whilst the Company's Works are carried on.

That we the said Contractors are to have the sole Priviledge of supplying the Inhabitants with Bricks, and none to be made, burnt or brought in by any other Person within the Company's Bounds.

That we the said Contractors are to be Advanced Pagodas Twelve hundred for the first Month by the Committee as the cost of Twelve Lacks of Wall Bricks and six hundred Pagodas monthly afterwards, and if the monthly supplies of Bricks exceed that sum, the Ballance due shall be paid to the Contractors with the Advance for the ensuing month.

That we the said Contractors shall have liberty to sell the turned out Bricks to the Inhabitants by obtaining an Order for so doing from one of the Committee as soon as sorted.

That the Committee shall have the Liberty to inspect the Brick Kilns as often as they shall think proper.

That the Stocks of Bricks &c. now remaining at the Kilns be given to us the Contractors at Prime Cost.

That in case of any heavy rains should impede or retard the progress of the Manufacture of Bricks or that any Losses should be sustained and thereby we the Contractors Incapacitated from fullfilling Our Contract upon our representations to the Committee and due proof thereof, they (with the Governour and Council's Approbation) will render void the penalty incurred on condition that what Bricks We the Contractors may be deficient of in our supplies annually, shall be made good by us the year following but if the supplies exceed the Quantity of Bricks hereby stipulated in Our Contract within the year then the overplus so delivered will be accounted for in the supplies of the ensuing year.

That We the said Contractors are to have Ten Peons of the Companys to procure them Firewood, Artificers, and Cooleys and no People Employed on that service shall be pressed for any of the Company's works or any other service on any account Whatsoever.

That to enable us the Contractors to furnish the Bricks at the rate stipulated in the foregoing Articles we shall not be obliged to supply the Gentlemen and all other Inhabitants but at the Prices undermentioned Vizt.

That for the due execution of the Promises We Pitty Venkatachilum Naaytittah Pillah and Vellah Pillah the Contractors do bind ourselves annually to the Honble Company in the Penal sum of Five hundred Pagodas and further give Paupah Braminy as security for the performance of this agreement.
