## DIARY AND CONSULTATION BOOK, 1756.

### INTRODUCTION.

1756 was an eventful year in the history of the Company's possessions in India. During this year, Pigot and his Council at Madras were faced not only with the problem of re-establishing Nawab Muhammad 'Ali's authority in the Carnatic, but also with the task of equipping and despatching an expedition to Bengal in order to recover Fort William and other factories which were suddenly attacked and captured by Suraj-ud-dowlah. The Military Consultations volume of the year, which has already been published, describes a series of political events; Major Kilpatrick's unsuccessful attempts to reduce Vellore or to bring Murtaza 'Ali to terms<sup>1</sup>, the troubles with the French in the contested districts<sup>2</sup>, Yusuf Khan's operations in the Madura and Tinnevely countries<sup>3</sup> and the final stages of the Bengal Expedition, of the actual despatch of Clive with Watson and his squadron<sup>4</sup>. But the events leading to the project of the expedition, the news of the fall of Cossimbazar, of Fort William, of Dacca, and of the urgent deliberations made thereon, all these are recorded only in the two volumes of the Public Consultations<sup>5</sup>. This is explained by the fact that till the 22nd September the whole Council deliberated upon the Bengal affairs, whereas after that date it was the Select Committee for transacting Country affairs that deliberated upon them<sup>6</sup>.

The Public Consultations of the year, besides dealing with the Bengal affairs, describe as usual the measures taken to secure the Company's Investment, to regulate the finances and to rent out the Company's farms. They also contain some information about the Mayor's Court and throw some light on the conditions prevailing at Negrais.

Pigot and his Council never failed to make frequent remittances to the various subordinate factories, Fort St. David, Vizagapatam, Ingeram and Bandermalanka, to encourage the Investment<sup>7</sup>. But they carefully examined all the bales sent and insisted that, as far as possible, the cloth supplied should be of the right quality<sup>8</sup>. In Madras itself, they tried to encourage the Investment in fine goods by contracting with the old sets of Company's merchants, rather than with new merchants, knowing full well that the tender system which the Court of Directors had advocated, was bound to prove ineffectual as in 1755 and, what is more, "to lessen in the eyes of the public the character of a Company's merchant." They warned the merchants, however, that if they brought in inferior cloth, it would be bought only at an abatement on the muster price<sup>9</sup>. But, when the Directors pressed that sealed tenders should be invited from all merchants, they could not but obey this order. Sealed tenders were, therefore, invited for the provision of ordinary goods and the same system was ordered to be adopted in Fort St. David also<sup>10</sup>. In October, on the advice of the Directors, a Committee consisting of Pigot, Powney and Orme was appointed to consider the ways and means to improve the Investment<sup>11</sup>.

As in the previous years the Council had frequently to sell large amounts of rupees to obtain pagodas. Almost every time a remittance was to be made, rupees had to be sold either to Linga Chetti<sup>12</sup> or to the Company's servants<sup>13</sup>. We find that the exchange rate during the year stood at 368 rupees for 100

pagodas. Again, on the suggestion of the Committee of Accounts, the Council took many measures to check irregularities in the accounts<sup>1</sup>. Bribery and carelessness in financial matters were meted out with severe punishment. It was on the charge of bribery and financial irregularities that Henry Hopkins was removed from his post of Chief of Devicotta<sup>2</sup>. It was for his carelessness that Richard Starke, the Deputy Governor of Fort St. David, was required to make good a deficiency in cash in the treasury<sup>3</sup>.

The rents of the Company's farms, as they fell due, were collected with regularity and on the expiry of the lease period, the farms were generally auctioned at higher rents than those of last year. The farms of Devicotta and St. Thome, of Ruby brokerage, of Trivattur, Egmore and Perambur were let at higher rents than what they fetched in 1755<sup>4</sup>. The Poonamallee and Tiruvendipuram farms, however, fetched lower rents<sup>5</sup>. The farms of Chingleput, Covelong, Seven Maganams of the Tripassore Country and Manimangalam were let as ordered by the Select Committee<sup>6</sup>. And, as for the Fort St. David farms, though the Deputy Governor thought that they could be let at considerably higher rents in Fort St. David itself, Pigot and his Council refused to set aside the prevailing practice, and auctioned them in Madras<sup>7</sup>. The Council also resolved not to permit any European to bid for the Company's farms or be concerned in them in any manner. But, all the same, they represented to the Court of Directors both the advantages as well as the disadvantages of that system<sup>8</sup>. It may also be mentioned here that the assignment of eight lakhs from the Arcot revenues made by the Nawab was duly recovered during the year<sup>9</sup>.

An important question which Pigot and his Council wished to consider was, whether and if so, in what manner, Indians could be permitted to bring in suits regarding property in the Mayor's Court—a privilege which was denied them by the Charter. The Council consulted the Mayor, George Mackay, the Senior Alderman, John Walsh, as well as the Chiefs of the Castes and other prominent Indians upon this question. It had to be ascertained whether the measure would be agreeable to the majority of the people, whether they wished to have their own customs preserved to them in all or any cases or whether in any way they preferred the English laws. The Indian gentlemen, however, said that these were matters of too great consequence, "upon which they wished to consult the people of the several castes" and desired time. This was granted<sup>10</sup>, but subsequently nothing came out of the measure during the year. Meanwhile, the Mayor's Court had sent in a letter to be forwarded to the Directors, requesting orders on several points connected with the Charter. This was ordered to be sent Home<sup>11</sup>.

During the year, in the vacancies caused by the resignations of Edward Edwards<sup>12</sup> and Andrew Munro<sup>13</sup> and the death of John Browning<sup>14</sup>, James Alexander<sup>15</sup>, Capt. Burman<sup>16</sup> and Henry Brooke<sup>17</sup> were appointed as Aldermen. And in December at the annual elections for choosing a new Mayor and Sheriff for the ensuing year, Andrew Ross was chosen Mayor and George Stratton, Sheriff and Coroner<sup>18</sup>. About the same time, the Court of Requests informed the Council that they had met and balloted in twelve new Commissioners in the place of those who had to go out by rotation<sup>19</sup>.

Early in the year, letters came from Henry Brooke, Chief of Negrais, mentioning the hostile attitude of the country powers, the attempts made by him to erect godowns and magazines and the extreme sickness of the season which had taken a heavy toll among his men and affected his health also<sup>20</sup>. Upon his request the Council permitted him to return to the Coast and appointed

Captain John Howes in his place <sup>1</sup>. They also made arrangements for sending provisions and men to Negrais <sup>2</sup>. After handing over charge to Howes, Brooke returned to Madras in June <sup>3</sup>. Towards the end of the year we learn that John Howes and Thomas Newton prevailed upon the Prince of Persiam to grant permission to the Company to build a fort upon a high spot of ground in old Persiam, known as Pagoda Hill and that the English flag was hoisted there on the 5th August. But as ill-luck would have it, though the Prince of the Burmese permitted the Company to establish a settlement in Persiam, Newton, who was left in charge of it, had soon to quit the place on account of the hostile attitude of the people and the scarcity of provisions <sup>4</sup>.

Among other matters of interest in these Consultations may be mentioned the steps taken to regulate the boats in the Madras Harbour <sup>5</sup>, to ensure an adequate supply of gunpowder <sup>6</sup>, to enlarge the Silver Mint <sup>7</sup> and to erect two mills to grind mortar and cement in Madras <sup>8</sup>. The Council also, we learn, granted an additional allowance of 100 pagodas per month to Colonel Lawrence <sup>9</sup> and appointed Andrew Munro as the Company's Physician in Madras on his retirement from the post of Chief Surgeon of the Hospital <sup>10</sup>.

Some disputes having arisen among the Officers concerning their Rank, a Compleat List of all those belonging to the Company at present on the Coast is now produced and approv'd by a Majority of the Council, and enter'd, hereafter, and Brevets are order'd to be drawn out for such as have not had them, but Colonel Lawrence who is undoubtedly more conversant herein, being of Opinion that this method of settling the Rank may occasion Confusion at some time or other AGREED that it be recommended to the Company to order that hereafter all Officers in General shall Rank according to the Dates of the first Commission they are honour'd with, and that to put their Military upon the proper footing they ought to be, it is necessary that fresh Commissions should be given to all the Officers who have had Brevets and those Commissions to bear the same dates their Brevets did, but this the Council don't chuse to do without the Companys particular directions as it may disgust such of the Officers as would be prejudiced in their Rank thereby.

The Board taking into Consideration the Companys recommendation in their Commands of the 31<sup>st</sup>. January 1755 under the Head of Charter relating to the Method of determining matters of property among the Indian Natives who by the Charter are excluded from the Liberty of suing in the Mayors Court.

AGREED that the Mayor and the two Senior Aldermen and some of the Chief Men of each of the Casts be desired to meet the President and Council if possible before the next Europe dispatch, to Consider of a proper Method to be recommended to the Company that a Clause may be added to the Charter.

The Accountant lays before the Board the Accounts of the Honble Companys Sloops and Vessells as they are extracted from the General Books, and Remarks that all these Vessells now stand at an immense Charge, much exceeding their first Cost, as will appear by the following Statement.

May as did the Prince George from Europe the same day the latter sail'd for Canton the 4<sup>th</sup>. and the former the 12<sup>th</sup>. June. That the Store Ship imported the 12<sup>th</sup>. August and is to proceed in a few days to take in the Pepper at the Northern Settlements. That Mr. Pybus has receiv'd our Commission as Deputy Governour That Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Combes & Carter purpose retuning to England on the Storeship which will encrease their difficulties for want of proper servants, requesting to be supplied with the White Cloth and Rice they Indented for. That they had purchased Fifty (50) Chests of Ophium out of the Britannia for the supply of Natal (none having been sent there from Bengal) and also a Parcel of Iron of the proper sortment. That all the Plantations from Croe<sup>1</sup> to Moco Moco<sup>2</sup> had been survey'd except Croee which is not yet finished, and they have reason to think it will be attended with a large encrease in due time Advising of sundry Certificates for Money paid into Cash there.

That Mr. Brooke having made Indents for a large quantity of Stores of all kinds, they took the Liberty to open his Packet design'd for Us to see if he expected to be supplied with those Stores by them only or by Us, which they hope We will excuse, assuring us of their ready Compliance with the Indents the Amount of which they shall debit Us for. That the last time the Cuddalore Sloop left that place Captain Hammond was supplied with a spar for a Bowsprit, which having been omitted in the Account Disbursements before sent Us, They desire We will Credit them for the Amount of, being A. Rupees Two hundred (200).

That by this Conveyance to Bengal he Indents to the Gentlemen there for Coolies & People that he may be enabled to erect Brick Buildings for stores and to secure himself from the attempts of a Country Enemy. The other dated the 7 December acknowledging the Receipt of our Letter of the 21<sup>st</sup>. October with the Military for that Settlement by the Prince George which Ship arrived the 1<sup>st</sup>. Instant and acquainting us that the Arcot Snow being still at Syrian with the Treasure on board he imagines she must be forcibly detain'd as she has had sufficient time & fair Weather to have made her passage long since. That the Gentlemen at Bengal having wrote to him by the Boneta Sloop the 10<sup>th</sup>. November desiring him to return the Denham as soon as possible these Advices threw him into some difficultys, which were removed by the Arrival of the Prince George. That as soon as the Stores and Provisions are transported from the Denham to the Prince George, he proposes to dispatch the former to Bengal with the utmost Expedition. Letter from the Accountant read as enter'd hereafter, and is particularly referr'd to, the purport being to acquaint the Board of the state in which he found the General Books and the Adjustments that are now Compleated under the Heads of Vizagapatam, Ingeram, Ganjam, Maddapollam, Fort St. David and Fort Marlbro' which have never before been adjusted with the Books of those settlements since the loss of Madras. That in Order to render their adjustment the more clear he had been necessitated to open a regular Journal and Ledger of Adjustments for each Head the Concluding Ballance Entries of which Journals are the Entries of Adjustments on the General Books. These Journals and Ledgers are now laid before the Board. He also now lays before the Board the Accounts Current of the Companys Sloops and Vessells adjusted which have hitherto been neglected. By all which Adjustments a very large sum will be wrote off to the Loss of this Presidency in the Books Ending April 1755. He also represents to the Board that the Deve Cotah Books still remain to be settled as well as the Head of Materials under the care of John Brohier both which shall be done in the next Books and have necessarily been deferr'd on account of the time and attention given to the abovementioned Adjustments. The Secretary lays before the Board Account of the Duties by him Collected on Account of Chindadreepettah Pagoda for the year 1754 whereby it appears that the whole amount of the Duties of which he has been able to get any Account from the Inhabitants is Two hundred and sixty four (264) Pagodas and Thirty nine thousand Two hundred and two fanams and forty six Cash (39202.5 [*sic*]) and that after deducting thereout the Charge of the Pagoda and Servants Wages and writing off Twenty nine Pagodas Four thousand nine

hundred and sixty seven fanams and thirty five Cash <sup>P. F. C</sup> 29. 4967. 35 which (of these known Duties) the Persons absolutely refuse to pay, the nett Ballance paid and to be paid into Cash for the whole Year is no more than Seventy three Pagodas Eighteen thousand fanams and fifty one Cash (73.18005[*sic*].51) or at the rate of thirty six (36) fanams  $\frac{1}{2}$  Pagoda, Pagodas Five hundred and seventy three five fanams and fifty one Cash (573.5.51) whereas Jaggoo in his petition to the Court of Directors mentioned in their Commands of the 23<sup>d</sup>. August 1751 undertook to pay yearly into their Cash Pagodas Two thousand (2000) in discharge of the debt due to the Company by the Managers of that Pagoda & Pettah. The Secretary further acquaints the Board thot it is with the greatest difficulty he has been able to Collect even the sum as the people in General are greatly dissatisfied and Murmer at it, and that many persons (a List of whom he now lays before the Board) absolutely refuse to pay or to give any Account at all and there are no oher means of obtaining any but from their own private Accounts.

The Board having Considered the Original Intention of this Duty, the Companys directions and recommendations the representations made to them on the subject and weighing also the present state of the settlement and the general discontent of the Inhabitants that this Contribution Originally intended for religious purposes should be apply'd to other uses, and finding themselves without any legal power to compel such of the Inhabitants to pay who refuse it whereby they are daily exposed to have their Orders disregarded the bad Effects of which are obvious, upon all these Considerations the Board think it more for the General good of the settlement to abolish these Duties than attempt any rigorous Measures for obliging the Inhabitants to pay them. It is therefore AGREED that no further Duties be levied on the Inhabitants on Account of Chindadree Pettah and Pagodas but that if any Persons should be inclin'd to make any free Gift towards supporting the said Pagodas they may be at Liberty to do so provided no Articles for Trade be thereby burthen'd.

HON<sup>ble</sup> SIR & SIRs,

I did myself the Honour under the 28<sup>th</sup>. April 1755 to represent to you the state in which I found the General Books of this Presidency. I now beg leave to lay before you what has been done to them since that Time.

The Heads of Vizagapatam, Ingeram, Ganjam, Madapollam, Fort St. David and Fort Marlbro' had never since the Loss of Madras been adjusted with the Books kept at those Places.

The Complications of these Adjustments was such, that I was necessitated to open a regular Journal and Ledger of adjustments for every one of the above heads. The Concluding Ballance Entries of these Journals become with a little variation in the form, the Entries of Adjustment of these Heads on the General Books; And tho this Method may appear uncommonly prolix, it has certainly this one Advantage, that it leaves no possibility of forcing or Lumping the Adjustments, without leaving the Detection practicable to the Commonest Notion of Accounts.

In Consequence I now lay before you Journal Ledger and Account Current of Adjustments of the following Factories and Settlements, as far back and as low down as the Books and Accounts of those Places remaining in Madras afforded Materials to work on, or as far as Adjustments were found necessary.

I likewise lay before you the Accounts Current of the Honble Company's Sloops and Vessels adjusted which has hitherto been neglected.

A very large Sum will in consequence of these Adjustments be wrote off to the Loss of this Presidency in the Books ending April 1755 as all the above settlements appear by their own Books to be losing Accounts, and their Annual Loss, for want of Adjustments has not been regularly wrote off.

As for DeveCotah the Time given to other Attentions has not allowed the distracted Accounts of that settlement to be adjusted. Their Books must be entirely new modelled here, for tho they have sent what is called by them a Journal and Ledger. The Head of their Ballance in this Ledger differs from the Accounts which they have kept themselves in near Three Thousand Pagodas which they leave to others to find out and account for this shall be the first Work in the next Books.

To which likewise the above Attentions have obliged us to defer the Adjustment of the Head of Materials under the Care of John Brohier.

This done Nothing will then remain to perplex our General Books if the Annual Adjustments shall be hereafter regularly made.

Permit me Gentlemen to do Mr. Alexander the Justice to say, that by the share he has taken in this Labour, I have great reason to be satisfied with his Application and Ability and Mr. Pelling merits that I should recommend him to your Consideration. I am with the greatest Respect,

Jackson had privately found means to forward to the Negrais sundry stores and sixteen thousand Rupees & Copper Cash which he has receiv'd and That he hopes to dispatch the Cuddalore Sloop to us in the beginning of January. The other dated the 26<sup>th</sup>. January acquainting Us that he had receiv'd no Advices or Country Intelligence since the 23<sup>d</sup>. December when he wrote us by way of what sent by the Arcot Snow which he cannot account for, and therefore refers Bengal by the Denham. That there is a deficiency of 69256 Copper Cash in it to Us to make an Enquiry about it. That Mr. John Agey Adjutant having been guilty of a breach of Military Duty, a Court of Enquiry had been held upon him, in consequence of which he now sends him under Confinement with the Proceedings of the Court as also one John Drury a Centinal for Desertion. That he has permitted Mr. John Whitehill to come over for the recovery of his Health who proposes to return so soon as it is re-established. That Mr. William Anderson Surgeon having had many severe fits of sickness, requests our permission to return to the Coast as does Ensign John Dyer for the same Reason to whom he has granted the usual Allowances of an Adjutant till our Pleasure be known as that Gentlemen has diligently done the Duty of an Adjutant ever since Mr. Agey's Confinement. That his last years Indents to Bengal for Stores and Provisions having been only Calculated for twelve Months which time expired the 30 October, he is under great Apprehension that he will soon be reduced to short allowances unless he has a speedy supply especially as the Prince George's Crew and the Great Number of Refugees that have fled thither for protection make the Monthly Consumption much greater than what he expected. He therefore begs that We would take proper Measures for his speedy Relief. That his bad state of health has prevented his dispatching the Cuddalore Sloop to us in the beginning of the Month as he intended, having had a fourth Attack of a Fever. A Distemper that has swept of many of the Europeans on the Island & that his weakly Constitution make him very desirous of having our permission to return to the Coast. That should We think proper to send back the Cuddalore to him with some Bags of Salt which is much wanted there, she may return to the Coast in April with a Loading of Teak Timbers, which he has ready to send on board her. That he has drawn sundry Bills of Exchange on us which he hopes We will Honour enclosing the Cash Account & other Papers as <sup>is</sup> List of the Packet & referring Us to Mr. Whitehill and Capt<sup>n</sup>. George Baker to inform us more particularly of Circumstances relating to the Island as well as of the Customs and Genius of the Peguers & Burmahs.

Letter from Captain Robert Jackson of the Honble Company's Snow Arcot read dated the 24 Ultimo giving the following Account of his Voyage and transactions since his Arrival at Syrian Vizt. that he as well as all the other English Ships there had been obliged by the King of Pegue to go with him to attack the Burmurs at Dagoon promising on their return they should have liberty to depart, that not being able to avoid complying the event making together a Fleet of three English & one French Ship, the Kings Snow and three hundred of his Boats an Army of 10,000 Men march'd at the same time to attack them by Land that the Burmurs retired to their Fort and defended themselves resolutely and having set fire to a Jungodo of Boats, these driving down towards the Fleet obliged them to weigh and fall down the River by which means they avoided the danger, tho the French Ship narrowly escaped being burnt that sometime after his return to Syrian Vizt. 5 January he obtained the Kings leave to depart and accordingly set sail for the Negrais but meeting with a violent Gale of Wind he was drove so far to Leeward of the Island that finding it impossible to work back the Vessell being unable to carry sail he was under the necessity to make for Vizagapatam where he is arriv'd with the snow in so bad a Condition that it is absolutely necessary to have her hauld ashore and thoroughly repair'd before she can be fit for any service he further adds that at his departure from Syrian the King obliged him to leave five of his Guns promising to return them as soon as the Troubles should be over.

Letter from Capt Jackson of the Arcot Snow with an Account of his transactions at Ayrian & Arrival at Vizagapatam.

The snow is in want of Repair.

That upon Mr. Brooks putting him in the Command he took an Account of all the stores remaining which he has delivered in & is now laid before the Board together with an Indent for what is now requisite, also an Account of Arrears of pay, an Account of Impress and Provisions now wanted and Captain Baker's Note for Provisions supplied for the Sloops use, all which are order'd to be complied with.

That he had also been to a place called Pollaveram where he found the Inhabitants well disposd to undertake the making of Chunam for the Company and wanted no Advance of Money but only desired to be paid as they brought in Chunam.

It having been discover'd that large quantities of Chints and other painted Goods provided in these Bounds for the French and Dutch are carried out clandestinely without ever being brought to the Choultry to be chopp'd whereby the Company are defrauded of their Duty ORDER'd that the Land Customer employ such a number of Conicoplys Peons and other persons as he may find necessary to take an Account from time to time of the Goods painting at the several Villages in the Bounds. That Notice also be given by beat of Tom Tom throughout the Bounds that all Persons whatsoever are to bring in their Goods as soon as finished to be chopped and that if any Person shall be detected in endeavouring clandestinely to carry any painted Goods out of the Bounds which have not been so chopped such Goods shall be seized and Confiscated half to the Companys use and half to the Person who shall so detect the fraud and the Owner of such Goods shall be turn'd out of the Bounds.

The Nabob and his Attendants having had the use of some Houses and Gardens at Viparee during their stay here which have been very much damaged and misused AGREED that the Owners be allowed One hundred and fifty Pagodas for the Rent thereof & to repair them.

A Report from the Committee of Accounts dated this day read as enter'd hereafter containing their remarks on the Payment of the Detachment of Swiss under the Command of Captain Schaub made Prisoners at Pondicherry which Captain Schaub drew for. Containing likewise such Observations as they were enabled to make by the Materials laid before them on Mr. Thomas Eyre's Accounts as sea Customer & Paymaster in the year 1746.

In regard to Captain Schaub the President acquaints the Board that the Committee of Accounts in the course of their enquiry thinking it necessary Captain Schaub (who is now at St. David) should be sent for, to give an Account of his transactions at Pondicherry apply'd to the Select Committee that he might be sent for but he having been for sometime past under arrest for another Misdemeanor the Select Committee wrote to Colonel Adlercron desiring that Captain Schaub might be sent hither to settle some Accounts with the Company which Colonel Adlercron refused to comply with untill the Affair for which he is put under Arrest shall be determin'd AGREED that as soon as Colonel Adlercron will permit Captain Schaub to render an Account of his transactions in the Companys Affairs he be required to deliver in pay Rolls of his Detachment and of the English Prisoners he drew for all the time they were at Pondicherry.

In regard to Mr. Eyres Accounts Mr. Perceval acquaints the Board that besides the papers he laid before the Committee of Accounts he apprehends there may be others in a Chest of Mr. Eyre's Papers which has not yet been examined that he will look over them as soon as possible and lay before the Board such other papers as may be found relating to the Accounts in question.

The Board are therefore under a necessity of suspending their opinion untill this search be made.

Another report from the Committee of Accounts dated this day read as enter'd hereafter representing that they had examin'd the Accounts of this settlement for October November and December on which they have nothing to observe but that the Method before recommended of keeping the Accounts of some of the employs has not been strictly adhered to for want of being rightly understood but that it has now been more fully explain'd. That they have

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

The Difficulty We have in procuring Chunam for the Works through the unskillfull method the Inhabitants have in burning it, as well as the Craftiness of some of those people in hindering others from Interfering in that business, and the Loss the Company sustains by the mixture of a Quantity of the Earth the Lime Stone is found in, with it; Induced me to go the Lime Stone Ground at Madepauk, and to examine if proper Kilns could not be built there for the Company and supply Ourselves without being obliged (through necessity) to take what Lime Good or bad the Country people think proper to send Us in.

I find that the Lime Stone is plenty at Madepauk, and that with proper Management, Kilns may be Erected there to supply the Company with as much Lime as they want. The only difficulty attending it will be the fuel for burning it, which must be brought from about six Miles distance, and a Number of People constantly employ'd with Cutting and Carts to bring it That the Kilns may not stand still.

I am also persuaded We shall meet with all the Hinderance possible from the People at Madepauk, by depriving Us of their Cattle to bring the Lime to Town, Notwithstanding they dont employ a Quarter part of the Number they have and that the Erecting those Kilns will not hinder their supply being receiv'd as Usual, But they are so Jealous at any Persons Interfering in that business that I could observe great Marks of uneasiness and discontent at my going to see the Ground they dig the Lime Stone from the best of which they do not make use of but throw it away as too large for burning not giving themselves the trouble to break it.

I went also at a place called Pallaveram where the Ground has been open'd very lately and very good Lime Stone found there, on the Encouragement I gave to the person who set the Inhabitants about it, the Pollygar \* Jangamanaicke with forty or fifty Inhabitants came and told me they would Jangamanaicke with forty or fifty Inhabitants came and told me they would Chunam as they could that there was two other Quarries belonging to their District which they would open (but that the Madepauk Poligar and his People having hinder'd them all this time past) They would not do it as they were

afraid of Interfering with People who supplied the Company I told them that if the two Quarries they mentioned actually belonged to them, they had no occasion to mind the Pollygar of Madepauk and that they or any other Person in the Country had as much right to supply the Company with Chunam as he had, at which they appear'd extremely well pleas'd and added they wanted no money beforehand but would be satisfied to be paid for their supplies at the end of every month.

The Erecting Kilns, with proper encouragement given to the Country People, will I flatter myself not only procure Us what supplies We may want, but enable Us to lay in a sufficient stock to prevent any troubles in the Country from retarding the progress of the Works; all which I submit to your Consideration and am most Respectfully,

HONBLE SIR & SIRs,

In Consequence of the Extract of Consultation of 13 October deliver'd Us by Mr. Secretary Du Pre' relative to the Payment of the Detachment of Swiss under the Command of Captain Schaub made Prisoners at Pondicherry, We have endeavoured to get all the light into the matter that the absence of Captain Schaub would admit of, by calling upon Mr. Drake the Military Paymaster at that time, but all that We have been able to collect from him is that he never receiv'd any regular Rolls from Captain Schaub of the Command under him but only Abstracts. He then delivered Us Abstracts of their Pay from 1<sup>st</sup>. August 1752 to Ultimo Oct<sup>r</sup>. 1753 when Mr. Drake deliver'd over the employ to Mr. Norris.

This Account he has collected from lose Papers & Cadjans, and he declares that it is nearly if not exactly correspondent with those he deliver'd Mr. Starke, and which were transmitted to the late President & are now missing. By this Abstract it appears that Captain Schaub's Party at first consisted of 92 Persons, and in September 1752 the space of 14 Months it was only reduced to 89, but in October when Captain Schaub was requir'd to deliver in a regular Pay Roll, the Number at once diminish'd to 49 so that in one Month there is the difference of forty Men.

We think it necessary that Captain Schaub should be requir'd to deliver in monthly Rolls of the Swiss Prisoners at Pondicherry to Ultimo October 1753, or at least a list of Deaths & desertions during that time.

On inspecting the Abstract of Pay to the English Prisoners at Pondicherry, for whom as well as the Swiss, Pay was drawn by Captain Schaub, We observe that their Number in May 1753 being 127 is not lessen'd for six Months, except by two Officers who left Pondicherry on Parole but in the succeeding Month of November eighteen Men are reduced, and in the next Month twenty more. An explanation of which Circumstance seems likewise very necessary to be requir'd of Captain Schaub.

We have also examin'd the Papers your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. directed to be laid before Us relating to the Accounts of Mr. Thomas Eyre as Paymaster & Sea

Customer, likewise what further Accounts We could procure from his Executor Mr. William Perceval, but they are all so imperfect and obscure that We find it impossible for Us to draw up any Statement of Mr. Eyre's Account either with Our Honble Masters, or the former President Mr. Morse.

With respect to the Paymaster's Employ there are no Accounts to be found for the whole Year of 1746 excepting for the Months of September and October, which Mr. Perceval deliver'd in, but they are not sign'd by Mr. Eyre By them the Ballance due to Mr. Eyre is Pagodas 3562. 15. 78.

Thrõ the Decease both of Mr. Eyre & his Conicoply, We are prevented making the necessary enquiry into his Transactions; And for want of Original Consultations and Cash Accounts, the former reaching only to Ultimo April 1746 and the latter to Ultimo May, excepting some foul Consultations for June, We cannot determine what advances were made to him as Paymaster.

As Mr. Eyre had deliver'd over the Sea Customer's employ Ultimo April 1746 his transactions in that Branch seems sufficiently clear, and We have met with a Statement fo his Ballance with the Company as Sea Customer at the loss of the Place, which is in his own hand writing and appears very authentick, We therefore lay the same before Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>.

With regard to Mr. Jones's Remarks they are in great Measure unintelligible to us for want of the Papers he refers to; We are particularly at a loss to know what he means by the following Passage.

“ If upon a close examination of the Companys Books it shall be found  
“ the sum of Pagodas 4000 said to be receiv'd of Mr. Stratton in June, and  
“ Pagodas 1000 more in July 1746 be monies really issued by Mr. Eyre (Mr.  
“ Secretary Savage having noted it as such) then as the Gentlemen observe in  
“ their General Letter, Mr. Eyre has acquitted himself of the Sea Customer's  
“ employ & not only so, but over paid the Company Pagodas 359. 32.—”

For We can find no Entry or Minute of any such Sums paid in by either one or the other. In May Mr. Eyre as Sea Customer pays in Pagodas 8300 and it is particularly specifyed in the Cash Account which is in Mr. Secretary Savage's own hand writing, that, that Money was in part of the Sea Customer's Ballance for April, which likewise exactly corresponds with Mr. Eyre's Account now deliver'd in.

In the continuation of the Cash Account from that time which Mr. Morse delivered in to the Gentlemen at St. David no credit whatever is given for Sea Customs in the Months of June & July, so that it is probable Mr. Jones may allude to some Monies included in the 8300 Pagodas, which is incontestably on Mr. Eyre's Account, and does not at all respect Mr. Stratton. We have only to observe in general that many of the Offices have misapprehended the method We recommended for their Accounts of Cash to be kept in, but as it has now been fully explained to them, We hope We shall have no further Occasion to trouble Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. with a remark of this Nature; Excepting some few other mistakes in matter of Form only, with which the respective Offices were made acquainted in order to their being avoided in future: We have nothing particular to point out with Respect to these Accounts, and give it as our Opinions that they are proper to be pass'd.

We should have been glad to have presented at this time our Observations on the Accounts of the Subordinates & out Garrisons, but We have been prevented from assembling so often as We intended by the attendance which was necessary to be given to other Branches of the Company's Affairs by the Members of our Committee who are likewise of Council, of which Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. are well apprised.

As there is a Committee of Accounts appointed at St. David, We think they should begin their Scrutiny with the Month of June, and reform the Accounts of that as well as the succeeding Months and that the Supervisor of Deve Côtah should do the same by the Accounts of that Settlement.

On the receipt of the abovementioned Letter from Fort St. David the Company's Shroffs were immediately secur'd and orders sent to the Gentlemen at Fort St. David to send up the Bags which contain'd the Fanams that the seals on them may be compared with the shroffs and Mint seals. The Company's Cash Chest being now open and the several sealed Bags examin'd are all found to contain Pagodas.

The Copper Doods\* & Cash lately Coin'd for the use of this Settlement & St. David not being sufficient, AGREED that Ten Candies more of Copper be delivered to the Mint to be Coin'd in the same manner as the last.

The Export Warehousekeeper reports that the Rice consign'd by the Gentlemen at Bengal  $\frac{3}{4}$  Eastcourt being landed turns out about five  $\frac{3}{4}$  Cent short of the Invoice, which being less than the usual Wastage is order'd to be allow'd.

Para 1. . . Our last address to you was under date the 7<sup>th</sup>. January 1755 wherein We transmitted to you particular Accounts of the several proceedings in our Jurisdiction and pointed out such further Alterations Powers and Authorities as we then thought necessary to be remarked to you, since which your President & Council have sent us Copys of the 29. 35. 36. 37. 38 & 49 Paragraphs of your Letter to them of the 24<sup>th</sup>. January 1753 and likewise of the 100, 101, 102, 103, 104, 105, 106, 107, 108, 109, 110, 111, 113, 114 & 115 Paragraphs of your Letter to them of the 31<sup>st</sup>. January 1755 to both which we shall now reply.

2. . . The 29<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of your General Letter of the 24<sup>th</sup>. January 1753 seems to intimate that the Oath of a Native of India might sometimes be dispensed with and his simple Affirmation taken, We cannot help representing that We think the admitting Indulgences of this Nature to be very improper, as it would encourage the giving of Partial or false Evidence and induce every Native to expect the same favour.

3. . . Just before the receipt of this Paragraph from your President and Council Rawsum Vencatachilum a Braminy and late Dubash to the Company, summoned as a Witness in a Cause then depending in this Court, after having given his Deposition before the Examiner refused to attest the Truth thereof on Oath—Complaint being thereupon made by the Examiner to the Court, the said Rawsum Vencatachilum presented a Petition, Praying that the Ceremony of an Oath might be dispensed with, as it was contradictory to his Religion and Custom of his Cast, which Petition was set aside for reasons mentioned at large on the Minutes of the 24<sup>th</sup>. June last, Extract of which is hereunto annexed Paper N<sup>o</sup>. 1, And upon the said Paupa Braminy being order'd into the Custody of the Sheriff for Contempt, He consented to take the Oath. Nella Cundatokur and Gocul Terwaudy two Braminies of a high sect or Cast, as well as considerable Merchants of this Place, have complied with the form of this Court, in taking the Oath prescribed to them and many other Persons of reputation amongst the Natives have likewise done so. From whose compliance and Example We have great reason to imagine the taking of an Oath will seldom be refused by any of the Natives.

4. . . In Answer to the 35 Paragraph wherein you recommend “ with respect to the method of proceeding in all Actions and Suits & in the proving of Wills, Granting Letters of Administration to Intestates Estates, that the Rules and methods Prescribed by the Book of Instructions should be pursued ” We have only to assure you that the same has been strictly complied with and in regard to the 36, 37 & 38 Paragraphs containing Instructions relating to the Office of Attorneys, Copys thereof have been delivered to the several Attornies, and care taken that the same are duely observ'd.

5. . . Due observance will be paid to the Explanations contained in the 110 & 111 Paragraphs of your General Letter dated January 31<sup>st</sup>. 1755, to the former, concerning the Re-Electing the same Person for Mayor & to the latter so far as relates to the vacation of the seat of an Alderman by absence.

6. . . A Debate arising on the latter part of the 111 Paragraph, and on the 114 Paragraph of this Letter respecting the resignation of an Alderman whether the same should be look'd upon as containing an absolute Order or only deliver'd by You as a matter of Opinion. It was determined by a Majority to be matter of Opinion only. The reasons of the Majority as well as those of the dissenting Members are inserted at length in the Annexed Paper No. 2.

7. . . Having Answerd the several Paragraphs of your abovementioned General Letter We shall now point out to you such Cases, as have happen'd in the Course of our Proceedings concerning which We desire a particular information.

8. . . On the 15<sup>th</sup>. April last We receiv'd a Letter from Mr. Henry Vansittart One of the Aldermen and Judges of this Court, setting forth “ That you had been pleased to appoint him to a Post which took up so much of his time, that he found it impossible to give the necessary attendance to the business of this Court. He therefore thought himself obliged to beg leave to resign his seat.” The said Letter being duely Considered. it was determined that Mr. Vansittart should have Permission to resign for the several reasons mentioned in the annexed Paper No. 3 Page 3. The then Mayor dissenting to the said resolution, his reasons are likewise inserted in Paper N<sup>o</sup>. 2 Page 5. A Letter was wrote the 28<sup>th</sup>. April to your President and Council. advising them of our having granted Mr. Henry Vansittart permission to resign his Seat of Alderman and desiring that the Vacancy occasioned thereby. might be filled up. But they omitted to Answer this Letter till the 24<sup>th</sup>. July following. when we received a Letter from their Secretary by their Order. acknowledging the receipt of our Letter of the 28<sup>th</sup>. April and enclosing the several Paragraphs of your General Letter of the 31<sup>st</sup>. January 1755 abovementioned particularly referring to the 114 Paragraphs representing that the

method which Mr. Henry Vansittart must take should he be desirous of resigning his Seat as Alderman, was therein clearly pointed out, Notwithstanding which it was thought necessary by a Majority of the Members of this Court to confirm the resignation granted to Mr. Henry Vansittart for the reasons enter'd at large on the Minutes of the 11<sup>th</sup>. August 1755, Copy of which are hereunto annexed Paper No. 3. The then Mayor and One of the other Members dissenting to the above resolution their reasons are also enter'd in said Paper Page 46.

9. . . . As the neglecting to fill up the Vacancys occasioned by the Death Resignation &c<sup>a</sup>. of an Alderman for a considerable time, may possibly be attended with bad Consequences, We therefore imagine it to be highly proper, that there should be a time limited for filling them up, and that within a few days, Our several reasons for the same may be seen.

10. . . . We shall be glad to receive particular information with regard to Debts owing on Bond from one Native of India to another, how far the same may be transferr'd to Europeans or others capable of prosecuting in this Court without Eluding the Intent and meaning of the Charter. There has been only two suits of this kind decided yet in this Court Viz., Henry Vansittart Vers Obelapetty and Charles Bouchier Vers<sup>s</sup>. Cambay Narrain and it appearing to the Court that they were both transferrs made on a valuable consideration, Decrees were given for the Complainant. In the last suit the Defendant Demurr'd to the Bill of Complaint as an evasion of the Charter, which Demurrer was dismiss'd thō not without the Dissents of two of the Members Who alledged that this might be opening a Door for Europeans to lend their Names to the Natives to sue in this Court, contrary as they apprehended to the Intent of the Charter. Their dissents are enter'd in Paper No. 4 Page 1. Some restrictions perhaps may be necessary in this case but to prevent it in General might be a means of hindering Europeans and others from recovering their dues from Natives Who had money owing to them from other Natives, capable but not willing to pay. If the Natives of India should continue excluded from the Court Applications of this Nature will be more frequent. There has likewise been lately preferr'd a Bill of Complaint by Manoel Leal Vers<sup>s</sup>. Podiga Chittee Annuntyah upon a transfer of the like Nature, but as the Debt appears to have been brought by the Complainant considerably under value We have taken time to consider whether the said Bill shall be receiv'd or not.

11. . . . In our Letter to you of the 7 January 1755 we mentioned the case of Insolvent Debtors in these Parts since which an Instance has happen'd in Solomon Salomons, who Petition'd this Court to take Charge of his Estate and to appoint Trustees to manage the same for the use and benefit of his Creditors. The Proceedings are hereunto annexed N<sup>o</sup>. 5 for your Inspection and We are desirous of knowing the opinion of Council on this matter in order to be a guide for us in future cases of the like Nature.

12. . . . If either the Mayors Court at Bengal or Bombay have transmitted to you any doubtfull or intricate Cases upon which it has been necessary to have the Opinion of Council, We desire that such Cases and Opinions, may be sent Us as the same may be of particular service to us should difficulties of the like Nature occur here.

13. . . . As some doubt has arisen among us about those words of the Charter which excludes the Indian Natives of Madraspatnam only but makes no mention of those of the Subordinate Settlements, we should be glad to know whether the latter are meant as well as the former, We are of Opinion that they are and our practice hitherto has been conformable to the same; this We mention'd to Your President and Council in our Letter of the 4<sup>th</sup>. February 1754 but you sent no Answer to this particular.

14. . . . We have already in our Letter of the 4<sup>th</sup>. February 1754 given you our Opinion with regard to the Indian Natives being excluded from applying to this Court, and now beg leave to refer you to the Minutes of the 11<sup>th</sup>. of August Paper No. 3. Page 48 where that Subject is mention'd again. We do not hear that your President & Council have as yet taken any step in this Affair in Consequence of the 109 Paragraph of your Letter to them of the 31<sup>st</sup>. January 1755.

15. . . . As some of the Records & Wills of the former Mayors Court were lost at the taking of the Town, and as it is frequently necessary for Us to refer to them We here enclose you a List of such as are wanting and request you will be pleas'd to send us Copys of the same.

16. . . . We request that in future, in all matters relating to this Court, you will be pleased to correspond immediately with the Court expressly distinguishing what you would have us observe as orders from you in Consequence of that Clause of His Majesty's Charter, which authorizes to make such Rules and Orders for the better Administration of Justice as you shall from time to time think fit and necessary from any thing that may be deliver'd by you as matter of opinion only.

And that they may proceed herein with regularity as well as that the Board may be duely Certified of the General sense of the people, The Secretary is directed to deliver an Authentick Copy of the following Instructions to the Companys Interpreter that the same may be by him and Paupa Braminy another Interpreter, translated into the several Languages of the Casts & deliver'd to the Chiefs and the said two Interpreters are to see that the Method prescribed be duely observ'd Viz<sup>t</sup>.

ORDERS & INSTRUCTIONS.

THE INDIAN NATIVES being by a Clause in the New Charter excluded from the Privilege of having their disputes with one another in regard to matters of property determin'd in the Mayors Court, which exclusion the President and Council are inform'd is by some thought a Grievance, And being desirous that a certain Method should be fixed and settled whereby the Indian Natives not only may obtain strict Justice in such disputes, but also have that Justice distributed in such manner as may be most for the General Good of the settlement and agreeable to the Body of the Inhabitants, Therefore that they may

1<sup>ST</sup>. QUESTION.

Whether they Chuse their own Customs shall be preserv'd to them in all points whatsoever relating to Matters of Property amongst themselves.

2<sup>D</sup>. QUESTION.

Whether they Chuse the Heads of their Casts, or any others amongst them, should decide in matters of property agreeable to their Customs or whether they had rather that decision should be by Europeans they taking to their assistance a sufficient Number of Natives to inform them of the Nature of those Customs.

Which two Questions being deliver'd in Writing to the Chiefs of each Cast every particular Cast is then to be deliberate seperately on them and the Opinion of the Majority of the People of each Cast shall be reduced into Writing and read publickly to that Cast in presence of the Companys Interpreter, Moodee Kistnah, and Paupah Braminy, as another Interpreter, and being in their presence approved by the Majority of each Cast shall be sign'd by the said two Interpreters and delivered to the Chiefs of each Cast And the Opinion of each Cast being so taken as aforesaid all the Chiefs of each Cast shall then assemble themselves and produce in that Assembly the Opinion of their respective Casts on the said two Questions. And the Chiefs among themselves having deliberated thereon shall draw up a report in Writing to be laid before the President and Council on or before the 26<sup>th</sup>. day of April next in which report shall be set forth whether the Casts are unanimous, and if they should not be unanimous, how many are of one Opinion and how many of another and also whether the Chiefs agree in Opinion with the Casts, and if not how many of them Agree in Opinion and how many dissent and what are the reasons for such dissent, this being done the Chiefs of the Casts are to depute twelve Persons of their Body to present the said report to the President & Council at such time as they shall appoint.

Letter from the Supra Cargo of the Prussian Ship Henry Prince of Prussia desiring to know whether he may land her Cargo of Rice &c<sup>a</sup>. from Bengal.

The President lays before the Board a Letter to him from Mr. Thierion de Chanlay Supra Cargo of the ship Henry Prince of Prussia lately arriv'd from Bengal (Translation of which Letter is enter'd hereafter) representing that being obliged to stay this Season in India the ship is let out to Freight for a Voyage to this Coast only, that there are several Moor Merchants on board with their Merchandize which he desires they may be permitted to land and that the rest of his Cargo Consists of Rice, Wheat, Gram &c<sup>a</sup>. which he is Commission'd to dispose of in respect to which he desires to be inform'd what Conduct he shall observe that he may confirm himself thereto.

relating to the Prussian ship.

The abovementioned ship belongs to His Majesty the King of Prussia and touch'd here in June last in her Passage from Europe but the Supra Cargoes not being allow'd to Trade they proceeded to Metchlepatam where they sold all or the greatest part of their Cargo to the French at so low a rate that it is said the Chief of that Settlement who purchased it for his own Account has made a very large Gain on the Sales from thence they proceeded to Bengal where it is said the French have undertaken to invest the produce of their outward bound adventure in a returning Cargo for Europe but not being able to accomplish it this season the Supra Cargoes have let out the ship to Freight to Moormen and others for Voyage to the Coast. The Board considering that the Cargo on board that ship cannot come within the intent and meaning of the Companys prohibition as it does not in any degree affect the European Trade but on the contrary is an Advantage to the Settlement as well from the Customs which will arise on the Merchandize as that the Importation of Grain at this time is very acceptable a Quantity being now wanted for store AGREED that the Supra Cargos be permitted to land their Cargo and that the Grain be purchased for the Company's Account at the Market Price if the Supra Cargos consent to dispose of it at that rate. And it is also AGREED that the Supra Cargos be prohibited purchasing any kind of Goods proper for the Europe Market.

The Export Warehousekeeper lays before the Board as enter'd hereafter a List of Fine Goods to be provided for the ships returning in 1756 as extracted from the List of Investment dated 1754 and receiv'd 1755 he also lays before the Board the several Musters. The Board then having taken under Consideration in what manner to engage for the Provision of these Goods, whether by again giving Public Notice for Proposals to be laid before them or by offering the preference to the Merchants who last Year undertook this branch, or others but considering that when Notice was given last Year that the Board would receive Proposals none were offer'd for the Fine Goods except only by Sunca Ramah and that for such part only as are known to be the most profitable Articles and without which none of the Merchants would undertake the rest, the Board therefore are of Opinion that as such frequent ineffectual Publications only serve to lessen in the Eyes of the Publick the Character of a Companys Merchant which has hitherto been held in great repute, it is more for the Company's Interest to engage with the old Merchants if they will undertake it on satisfactory terms than to Give Notice for further proposals. It is thereupon Agreed that the Proposals be made to the last Years Merchants with the Addition of Nella Chitty who has particularly shewn a good disposition to exert himself in the branch wherein he has been hitherto employ'd and that it be divided in the following proportions Viz<sup>t</sup>. Tellisinga Chittee One quarter Linga Chittee One quarter Servanna Chitty One quarter, and Gundaveddy Vencata Ramah and Nella Chitty together, the remaining quarter. They being thereupon call'd in and the Musters produced to them with the prices they acquainted the Board that they did not doubt being able to keep up the several Manufactures to the quality of those Musters tho they could not undertake it at the prices offer'd, but the Board being of Opinion that one with another the several sortments might be provided at the rates mention'd in the List insisted peremptorily on their immediate Answer whether they would or would not undertake to provide them, they thereupon desired leave to withdraw to Consider of the Proposals, and after sometime return'd and acquainted the Board that they submit to the terms offer'd them. should take Charge of the Bullocks and Mill and that no more Work should be carried for the present, which he accordingly did, But the Powdermaker observing that the proof deliver'd in by Mr. Brohier the 23<sup>d</sup>. Ultimo was made only with a small quantity Viz. from 1 OZ to 5 OZ and it having been found upon repeated Tryals that in small quantitys the Europe Powder has much the superiority in strength to Country made Powder but that in large quantitys the strength of Country made Powder equals the Europe, procured a further Tryal to be made of the rejected Powder by which it was found to exceed the Europe Powder in a Tryal of 2 lb. and to be very fit for use as Cannon Powder on which the Military Storekeeper was the 20<sup>th</sup>. The working of the Mill being also stop'd for want of the receipt of the money the said Powder would have amounted to, As also the Powder made in Europe being mix'd with sundry other Compositions, such as Camphire, Vinegar Urine &c<sup>a</sup>. not used in this Place for those purposes Your Petitioner humbly conceives the strength of the Powder he by Agreement was to make cannot but occasion an unavoidable difference between the Europe and Country Powder, even Admitting the accustom'd Ingredients made use of here to be of the best sort.

And Your Petitioner further humbly tenders to the Hoñble Board that if on Trial by proper Persons conversant in the business of Powder making, the Powder made by him be not agreeable to the Ingredients sent him, he is ready to submit himself to the severest Penalties.

Your Petitioner therefore most humbly Prays that this Hoñble Board will be pleas'd to take the same into consideration and that Your Petitioner will Engage on his having the liberty of refusal (if sent) and receiving no part of the Composition but what is usually good and will stand the Proof of from 4 to 6 Degrees by the Proof, to enter into such farther Articles for his faithful behaviour therein as to this Hoñble Board shall seem Meet.

Pursuant to your Commands I herewith enclose the proof of the Rejected Gunpowder made in the common way by moistning the Composition with fair Water this return was made the 3<sup>d</sup>. April 1756; as also the proof of powder moistning the Composition with Batavia Arrack mix'd with Camphire this Return was made the 14<sup>th</sup>. of April 1756 by Copys from Lieutenant Jennings's Book.

You will be pleas'd to observe by the said Returns that even the Condemn'd Powder though not answering the strength of the Europe in small Quantitys yet the same was Compar'd with it when prov'd in a large quantity although the Brimstone was not good, as that which I made the last Powder which is on an Equality with the Europe, and that I might both satisfy and be satisfied in case of any Questions being ask'd and I find that the 12 Hours beating is preferable.

As it may be conjectur'd that the Powder made here is not equally good with that of Pondicherry, I hereby declare that the Ingredients of the Composition and the working are the same; Excepting the making of Powder moistning with Brandy Arrack & Camphire or Spirits of Wine, Spirits of Vinegar, Spirits of Nitre, Spirits of Salt Armanaick and Camphire incorporated together to moisten the Composition, there is also some times used Urine and fair Water, or fair Water & Spirits of Wine for that purpose of all which

several ways the different Spirits makes the strongest Powder, but is attended with the greatest Expences and as all the others are in proportion weaker, so are they attended with on adequate Expence.

I beg leave Sir to mention that in any of the above methods, I am ready to undertake the making the Powder but not for the Wages of 25 Pagodas that you was so good to offer me as formerly did but I did relate you already my intention that I cannot accept nor undertake by such Condition In regard of the Companys Conacoplys, whom shall give any occasion to a great troublesome and danger, as for the Powder mill likewise for my own Carecter [*sic*] which for their negligence would happen as formerly when the mill being in their description.

Humbly presuming that the Honble Board will be pleas'd to Consider the Extraordinary Charge I must necessarily be put too should any other method then [*sic*] the usual be chose which will at least with the Arrack and Camphire amount to Pagoda or two ☿ Candy and with the Spirits five Pagodas ☿ Candy.

And as Sir it may probably happen that some Articles will require an Explanation I would with Submission Pray leave to attend, that I may be able to answer any Question that may arise, when I doubt not but to set the whole in so clear a light, that his Honour and the rest of the Honble Board will be saisied of my Abilities & Integrity in making either Gun, Musquet, Pistol Glaz'd or any sort of Powder Generally used.

The President thereupon acquaints the Board that he apprehended the real matter of Complaint is not of the touch but the Alloy [*sic*] as he often experienced when Chief of Vizagapatam the Merchants there always giving the preference to that Gold which is alloy'd [*sic*] with silver before that which is alloy'd [*sic*] with Copper the latter being brittle is often crack'd at the edge in stamping (as most of the Musters now produced are) but the former being more Malleable is not so subject to this defect however the Assay Master is order'd to Assay the Pagoda sent from Ingeram and make his Report thereof to the Board.

The offer made by Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Westcott at Ingeram and Andrews at Bandarmalanka to Contract for Packing the Company's Bales being the same Viz<sup>t</sup>. 2 $\frac{1}{4}$  Pagodas  $\frac{3}{4}$  White and 18 fanams  $\frac{3}{4}$  Brown Bale the Board are of Opinion that two Pagodas for a White Bale, the price allowed here is sufficient as the Materials on an Average are generally as cheap there as at this place. The Proposals for packing the brown Bales is accepted which is to be signified to the Gentlemen at those Settlements, and further to Mr. Westcott that all Military Cloathing the first, as well as the subsequent, is to be paid for by the Captains of the Company who ought always to keep a sufficient quantity in readiness to answer extraordinary occasions. That there is no necessity for opening a head of Servants Wages but that all constant Charges are to be carried to the head of Charges General That Mr. Andrews be acquainted he may add the 10  $\frac{3}{4}$  Cent in the Payment of Washers, Servants Wages &c<sup>a</sup>. And in regard to the difference between the Prices now fixed on their Cloths and those formerly Charged The President undertakes to examine and Report.

That the Renter ſhall alſo have the Liberty of cutting Wood with the permiſſion of the Chief of DeveCotah but not otherwiſe, who is to be directed to grant ſuch Permiſſion in caſe he ſhall not think it prejudicial to the Settlement or Bounds.

That the Renter ſhall deliver at DeveCotah for the uſe of the Company at or before the end of the month of March Fifty Gaſe of the beſt Paddy of the January Crop at the rate of Forty Pagodas ꝑ Gaſe.

TO THE COWLE FOR ST. THOME.

That the Renter ſhall deliver at St. Thome for the uſe of the Company at or before the end of the Month of March Thirty Gaſe of the beſt Paddy of the January Crop at the rate of Thirty Pagodas ꝑ Gaſe.

Clause for the St. Thomas Cowle.

The queſtion being then put whether any Europeans ſhould be permitted to bid at the Outcry of Farms or be admitted as ſecurity for any perſons who take any of the Farms.

No Europeans to bid for Farms or be concern'd in them or be ſecurity for Farmers.

RESOLV'D that no Europeans be permitted to bid for any of the Company's Farms or be concern'd in them directly or indirectly or to be ſecurity for any of the Farmers.

Notwithſtanding the foregoing Reſolution the Board conceive that ſome Advantages might ariſe by leaving Europeans at liberty to bid for and take the Farms, and on the other hand that ſome ill conveniences and diſadvantages might alſo accrue in particular Caſes both which are here offer'd to the Conſideration of the Honble Court of Directors.

Advantages & Diſadvantages of letting the Farms to Europeans Conſider'd.

The Chief Advantages which it is thought might ariſe by permitting Europeans to take the Farms are that the Inhabitants will not be ſo liable to oppreſſion in the Collection of the Duties by the Renters, but principally that as the Faith and Honour of Europeans may be better relyed on than the Accounts of the Natives, by this means the real value of the Farms may be more juſtly aſcertained.

The Diſadvantages that occur are That if Europeans ſhould be permitted to bid for the Farms, the Natives may be thereby intimidated by which means the Farms may be cryed down for leſs than their value and another very weighty reaſon is that in ſome of the Farms diſputes do often ariſe between the Renters and the Polygars of the Adjacent diſtricts under the Country Government in which caſes many Conceſſions may be made and means concerted for accommodating ſuch differences without any real Injuſtice to the Renter or diſcredit to the Engliſh Nation but which might nevertheless occaſion many difficultys if Europeans were concern'd.

Messrs. Orme and Smith (the preſent Renters of DeveCotah) being deſired to acquaint the Board what they think may be the real value of that Farm, they give it as their opinion that it may be worth about Seven thouſand Pagodas ꝑ Annum on the terms of the Cowle as above ſettled whereupon the Secretary is order'd to bid for the Company in order to keep up the price as far as Pagodas ſix thouſand five hundred (6500). The Board then adjourn'd to the Sea Gate to put up the ſaid Farms at Outcry.

I am directed by the President and Council to acquaint you that a Report of your Transactions at DeveCotah during part of the time you held the Employ of Chief there having been laid before them by Mr. Smith as Supra Vizor of that Settlement your Conduct in many Instances appears unwarrantable and particularly in the following amongst many others of less Note which are therefore not taken Notice of at this time.

1. THAT in Order to prevent a discovery of sundry Overcharge in your Accounts you directed the Companys Conicopies to burn and destroy their Cadjans whereon were enter'd the real sums paid for Cooley hire, Batta, and various other Articles of the like kind which can have no other Vouchers, which Cadjans were accordingly destroyed.

2. THAT in the month of April last you have Charged under the head of Nabob Mahomed Ally Cawn Pagodas 244 for 12 days Batta or hire to 244 Cooleys carrying stores to Camp, and for Batta to Seapoys to Escort them Pagodas 33. 12.—. Whereas it appears the Cooleys were paid only Pagodas 131. 16. 60 for 10 days Batta and the Seapoys only Pagodas 22. The Overcharge on these two Articles is Viz<sup>t</sup>.

3. THAT in the Month of June last you have charged 6 days Batta to 1 Subedar, 2 Jemidars, 4 Havildars and 89 Seapoys escorting Colonel Heron to Fort St. David amounting to Pagodas 53.—36 Whereas the President & Council are informed that this Escort consisted only of 1 Subedar, 1 Jemedar,

That in the month of August you have charged 9 days hire to 315 Coolies carrying Stores to Camp amounting to Pagodas 236. 9 and 18 days Batta to 6 Havildars & Naiks and 30 Seapoys to escort them amounting to Pagodas 52. 9. whereas the President & Council are inform'd that only eight days hire was paid to 185 Coolies amounting to Pagodas 123. 12. and no more than 15 days Batta to 4 Havildars and 20 Seapoys amounting to Pagodas 27. 6.

5. THAT you have made a double Charge of Wages and Batta to 4 Peons being charged to the Company on the Peon Roll and again to the Nabob amounting to pagodas 6. 24  $\frac{3}{4}$  Month.

6. THAT in the month of May last you have charged 20 days Batta to 1 Subedar, 2 Jemidars, 15 Havildars and 45 Seapoys attending you into the Country Pagodas 112.8—Whereas the President & Council are inform'd that not more than 10 Seapoys attended you at that time.

7. THAT you have suffer'd the Seapoys in the Company's Pay and belonging to the Garrison of DeveCotah to be employ'd on private & improper Services, and amongst other Instances That in the month of February you suffer'd one Comrapah the Companys Conicoply to take with him as his Guards or Escort to Combeconnum Feast 2 Subedars 4 Jemedars 8 Havildars, 4 Colourmen 5 Trumpets and Tomtoms and 114 Seapoys in the Companys Pay and belonging to the said Garrison and that at other times you have suffer'd the said Comrapah to employ the Companys Seapoys in overawing the Country People to whom he had lent sums of Money on mortgage of their Districts; In these and other acts of oppression making the Companys Seapoys Subservient to Your private Purposes.

8. THAT you have constantly charged the Company monthly with two Cattamarans to carry Notes &c<sup>a</sup>. to Vessels in the Offing whereas the Cattamaran Men ran away from the Settlement in the Month of May and did not return or receive any Pay till the Month of December following so that the Company is overcharged in this Article 9 Months pay amounting to Pagodas 61. 18.—

9. THAT you have made a double monthly Charge of two Country Musick Pagodas 2. 24.—and two Tomtom Fellows crooked Horn fellows, all which Persons are again charged as Peons on the Peon Roll.

10. THAT you have suffer'd great abuses in the Payment of the Companys Seapoys and connived at false Musters not only in placing your own Baker Ironing Man & Washerman on the Seapoy Roll altho Your Washerman is again charged at one Pagoda  $\frac{3}{4}$  month under the head of Peons and Servants Wages. but also in suffering all or the greatest part of Captain Spears Servant (whilst Commandant at DeveCotah) to be also passed on those Rolls tho' never doing duty.

11. THAT you have connived at false Musters of Peons, the Number charged being deficient till within a few days of the Supravisors Arrival at DeveCotah by 9 Persons who were then enlisted to compleat the Roll.

12. THAT notwithstanding the President and Council in their General Letter of the 8 April 1754 acquainted you that they had directed the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort St. David " to furnish you with what fanams

“ you might want for discharging all small Articles not amounting to a Pagoda to avoid the Necessity there would otherwise be of erecting a head of Batta on the DeveCotah Books in order to credit the Company for the “ difference on Exchange ” Yet it does not appear that you have ever receiv’d from Fort St. David more than 500 Pagodas worth of fanams in the Month of April 1754 nor have you since then advised the Presidency of your wanting any, neither have you given the Company Credit in any one Instance for the difference of Exchange.

13. THAT notwithstanding a head of Batty is open’d on the DeveCotah Books for the difference between the real Exchange of Rupees at that Settlement and the price at which they are invoiced yet you have in some Instances credited yourself in Cash for Rupees paid away even at higher Rates than the Invoice Price altho’ in reality the Exchange was much less by which you have made a considerable Gain, for Example, In the Month of June 1754, 12000 Rupees are receiv’d at DeveCotah and invoiced at the usual rate of 350 Rupees for 100 Pagodas, the Current Exchange then being 388 Arcot Rupees for Pagodas 100, the difference between those two Exchanges is wrote off to Batta; but in the same Month Batta paid in Rupees to Seapoys carried to the Credit of Cash at the Rate of 320 Rupees for 100 Pagodas, so that a Gain is made here of 68 Rupees on every 100 Pagodas which is near 22  $\frac{2}{3}$  Cent.

14. THAT having been directed the latter end of the year 1753 and beginning of 1754 to assist the Phousdar of Pallam Cotah in recovering his Districts out of the hands of the Enemy and to receive from him the Charge of the Troops sent to his assistance, you did charge to & receive from the said Phousdar about one hundred Pagodas for Batta of Seapoys more than you have brought to Account or than the real Batta amounted to.

15. THAT Contrary to the Company’s known Rules (whereby a free Trade should be allowed to every one in all their Settlements) and to the great detriment and Oppression of the Inhabitants, you either did yourself or suffer’d your Dubash or Servant acting under the Sanction of your Authority to engross the whole Trade of the Buzar or Market publishing an Order throughout the Bounds by beat of Tom Tom, that no person should presume to bring in or vend any Beetle Beetle Nut Tobacco, Sugar, Tamarin and other Buzar Articles, confiscating such as were brought in contrary to this order and obliging the Inhabitants to purchase them of you or your Dubash at exorbitant Rates.

16. THAT altho’ by the Account Remains taken in April 1752 there should be 800 Pagodas worth of Grain in store on the Companys Account yet on the arrival of the Supravisor there in December there was not one Grain in store nor had any been then brought to Account as sold, altho’ the President & Council are inform’d the whole had been sold sometime before, and that the Profit thereon amounted to upwards of 105 Pagodas.

17. THAT you suffer’d the Companys Conicoply under the sanction of your Authority to dismiss and turn out at his Pleasure the Officers of the Seapoys belonging to the Garrison of DeveCotah, merely to create Vacancies, taking Bribes from others under the Name of Entrance Money for promoting them to the Superior Ranks become vacant by such Dismissions.

18. THAT notwithstanding Orders were sent to you by the Select Committee dated 10<sup>th</sup>. October 1755 that no Vacancies occasioned by the Death or Desertion of any Seapoys belonging to the Garrison of DeveCotah should be filled up till further orders, and that the particular day of any such Death or Desertion should be noted on the Pay Rolls yet sundry Vacancies so occasioned were after the Receipt of those Orders filled up and no Notice taken on the Rolls that any such Vacancies had happen’d.

The President acquaints the Board that Nine Chinese Men having been saved out of a Vessell that was cast away to the Eastward were carried to Bengal and being destitute of support were there subsisted at the Company's Expence and are now arrived here in the Success Galley, as mention'd in the General Letter from Bengal dated 26 March No. 65 and they having no means

The President acquaints the Board that Christnah Row the highest Bidder for the Deve Cotah farm the 25 Instant And Guntoor Vencatachilum the highest Bidder the same day for the S<sup>t</sup>. Thome' Farm, both propose Coomerjee Devay, a Guzzerat Merchant and Inhabitant of Madras to be their security. AGREED that the several Members of this Board do make enquiry whether he is a person of sufficient substance to be accepted as security in this case, and communicate the result of their enquiries at the next Consultation.



No. 73 From Richard Starke Esq<sup>r</sup>. Deputy Governour &ca. Council at Fort St. David dated the 30<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo acknowledging the Receipt of our Letters of the 12<sup>th</sup>. and 20<sup>th</sup>. with the Treasure <sup>of</sup> Bridgewater and Twenty Thousand Pagodas (20000) <sup>of</sup> Peons and acquainting us that they have communicated our Orders to Captain D'. Illins and shall regulate his Company according to our Instructions. That their Warehousekeeper is willing to undertake the Package of their Bales on the Terms We proposed, enclosing an Indent for stores they receiv'd from Captain Caillaud which they cannot comply with. That they shall follow our directions relating to any Europe ships that may touch there, but as the Squadron did not receive any Madeira Wine there last year they shall be at a Loss what Quantity to Land on their Account. That they have called on Captain Schaub's Officers for the Rolls We mentioned and their Answer is, that tho' it is customary in their Corps to keep a Journal of Occurrences they were prevented by Captain Schaub ordering the Serjeant Major not to make them any return but they suppose Captain Schaub has done it, that they never saw any Rolls he having always made them privately by Night and in every respect kept them in Ignorance of all transactions relating to his Company. That therefore they can say nothing positive as to the sudden reduction of the Detachment in October 1752 from 89 to 49 Men nor do they know of any remarkable sickness or Desertion except about 30 Men who ran away to Golcondah in August 1753 for which reason they think the sudden reduction in October 1752 impossible, that Serjeant Heim might probably give a better Account, but that two days before Captain Schaub set out for Madras he went away to Pondicherry where Captain Schaub was seen by his Dubash to give him 30 Pagodas. That Mr. Frishman further says neither he or Mr. Huibert ever received pay as Voluntiers tho' they often ask'd for it as they were inform'd they were charged in the Rolls at 5 Pagodas <sup>per</sup> month. That Captain Schaub's Dubash informs them his Master sent Serjeant Heim to Pondicherry under Charge of two Seapoys a few days before he went to Madras and that he saw his Master pay him 30 Pagodas at Pondicherry, and heard the Serjeant say he had his Masters leave to go to Bengal. That this is all the information they can get but shall endeavour to bring Serjeant Heim from Pondicherry in hopes of learning more. That they now forward Duplicate of their General Books ending Ultimo April 1755.

In regard to the Check recommended in this Paragraph the Board observe that the method which they think might most effectually check the employment of Materials, would be by an Overseer of sufficient skill and knowledge in Building to be able to Judge by a view of the Works what quantity of Materials are employed in them from time to time, and as the Board do not know of any person so qualified there is a necessity of relying on the Engineer, for as it would be impossible for the Paymaster, or any one else personally to attend and see every Material employ'd the Paymasters Check could be but of little service as it must be grounded on reports of black Servants. In regard to the Payment of Cooleys the Paymaster acquaints the Board that his People and the Engineers pay them together so that they are a Check on each other.

All the other observations and Recommendations in the said Report are approved and ORDER'D to be observed and carried into Execution by the several persons whom they Concern.

2. . . With regard to the Engineer's having compared them with the Paymaster's, We find several variations between them by their inserting the same Articles under different Heads and often bringing them to Account in different Months which might be easily remedied & should be for the more ready scrutinizing and comparing the two Accounts.

3. . . We must observe that the Engineer's Accounts are regular and exact, and We recommended that the Paymaster should carefully observe to make his correspondent [*sic*] with Y<sup>m</sup>.

4. . . The Pay and Salary to Mr. Brohier and Assistants should be brought under Charges General in both Accounts. The Engineer omits to insert the Pay of forty Peons employ'd on the Works, and brings the Pay of 12 Conicopies employ'd under him to account under several Heads As they are fixed Servants, they had better be charged at once under Charges General as the Paymaster has done.

5. . . In the Engineers Accounts, We find two Charges, One for making Military Stores and another for repairing Military Stores, which are taken no notice of by the Paymaster who proposes adjusting those Accounts with the Military Storekeeper at the end of the Year, and at present only keeps memorandums of the Disbursements on that Account. The most regular method We think would be for the Paymaster to Debt the two Heads made use of by the Engineer for all Money advanced on Account the Military Storekeeper, who must make a correspondent Entry in his Books. When the Engineer delivers any Stores to the Military Storekeeper, the Engineer should value them, and the Military Storekeeper credit those Heads accordingly.

6. . . We find no Materials of Buildings pulled down have been brought on the Company's Books, excepting those of the Portuguese Church. On discoursing with the Engineer on this Subject, he tells Us that all such Materials were worked up in the new Buildings and not charged for. As this is very irregular and leaves an opening for abuses, it should be remedied, and all old Materials be valued and put under the charge of the Storekeeper, or some other Officer appointed for the purpose.

7. . . The Books kept by the Engineer are a monthly general account of charge of Workmen & Materials on the several Buildings &c<sup>a</sup>. and an Account of Materials expended, exhibited in Collumn's with an Abstract of the whole at the Years end. We think there should be likewise an Annual abstract of Receipts of Materials in order to adjust with the Abstract of Issues, also a Monthly abstract of receipts of Materials is necessary to be collated with the Storekeeper's & Paymaster's Accounts.

8. . . We must observe that the Engineers People receive all Materials, and have the applying them on the several Works, in which they are sufficiently Checked; If it would be attended with no inconvenience to the dispatch of Business, the Paymaster might be a proper Person to dispose of the Materials in the manner pointed out by the Engineer and then the latter would be a proper and sufficient check on the former.

9. . . We have likewise examin'd the Commissary Generals Accounts to Ultimo November, no further being brought up for want of the Trichinopoly Accounts for December and January.

10. . . With respect to the other Accounts of this Settlement. We have nothing particular to remark & give it as our Opinion that the Home Accounts in general are fit to be passed.

Para 1. . . This Report contains our Observations on the Accounts of the Southern Settlements.

1<sup>st</sup>. FORT ST. DAVID

2<sup>d</sup>. . . We have looked over the several Accounts forwarded from thence for the months of July, August September October November December January and February, together with the Reports of the Fort St. David Committee of Accounts Dated 25<sup>th</sup>. January & 2<sup>d</sup>. 17<sup>th</sup>. & 22<sup>d</sup>. March. We will offer You our Remarks in the Order of the Accounts.

CASH ACCOUNT.

3. . . They still blend Rupees and Pagodas in the same Account. Two distinct Cash Accounts should be kept one of Rupees and the other of Pagodas, the latter to be exactly on the Madras Plan with double setts of Collumns a Form should be transmitted them for that purpose. The Rupee Account must likewise have double setts of Collumns, the inner expressing the number of Rupees, and the outer their value in Pagodas at the exchange the several Receipts and Payments shall be made.

4. . . The Issues of Rupees at St. David are principally to the Military Paymaster for paying the Seapoys in the Service of the Nabob, who is debted for these at the rate of 350  $\frac{1}{2}$  100 Pagodas, which is a great over Charge. The Military Paymaster might draw Monthly on the Cash keeper for the exact Sum of Rupees necessary for paying the Seapoys, and which may be carried to the Nabob's Debit at the exchange of the Day. This method will keep the Military Paymaster's Account clear, & at the same time do justice to the Nabob. Supplies to Rupees to the Commissary in Camp where Disbursement in that specie are entirely on Account of the Nabob must be likewise brought to Account at the Exchange of the Day, but supplies to DeveCotah may be still carried off at 350 as regular Books are kept at that Place, and the difference of Batta may be there taken notice of.

5. . . The small Errors discover'd by the Fort St. David Committee in their Cash Account, if not already rectified should be directed to be done.

EXPORT WAREHOUSE.

6. . . In a former Report We referr'd to Your Honour & ca. consideration, whether the Package of Bales should not be undertaken at a fixed rate as practised here, and the Retail of Packing Stuff discontinued.

7. . . In the Sale of Rice it is not expressed how much was received in Pagodas and how much in Fanams. It should be recommended to every Office to shew this particular in their Accounts in the clearest manner, and that the Monthly Abstract of Cash usually annexed to their Accounts be kept in doubts setts of Collumns as observed at Fort St. George, for which purpose the Form should be sent them.

IMPORT WAREHOUSE.

8. . . We have nothing particular to remark of this Employ.

STOREHOUSE CIVIL & MILITARY.

9. . . We have already represented that it is impossible for Us to Judge whether the several Disbursements made in these Offices are absolutely necessary or whether the Stores provided are at reasonable prices. The Deputy Governour & Council, or their Committee of Accounts must be the best and

only Judges by being on the Spot and therefore may be directed to make a constant Scrutiny into the matter and correct whatever they find a miss, Whether the List of Prices of Sores at Fort St. George mention'd by the Fort St. David Committee be necessary to be sent them your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will determine. We shall only observe that Stores purchased here are for the most part at variable prices, and the Gentlemen at St. David should always be carefull that theirs are provided at the lowest Rates their Market will admit.

10. . . . None of either the Military or Civil Storekeeper's Accounts are Sign'd before November, They have both open'd Diaries in November As it is proposed that their new Books shall be exactly on the Madras Plan one Month's Journal Parcels should be transmitted them from hence for their guidance.

11. . . . The Observations of the Fort St. David Committee with regard to the Drafts for Pay for the Train and Military Pickets, reduction of Artificers, extraordinary consumption of Stationary by the Military, extravagant Indents for Wax Cloth and the Adjutant's Monthly draught for Stores exceeding his expence, should be taken into particular consideration by the Deputy Governour & Council, and the necessary regulations made.

PAYMASTER CIVIL,

12. . . . The several Regulations in his Employ proposed by the St. David Committee seem highly proper to be put in force. The Points offer'd to the consideration of the Deputy Governour & Council should be dismissed by them and determined.

13. . . . It should be recommended to the St. David Council to inspect always these Accounts with great attention in order to prevent all immoderate & unnecessary Expence.

14. . . . With regard to the St. David Committee's enquiry concerning the Tappys, We find they are Stationed at 12 Stages, and that only one Stage is paid for at this Place.

PAYMASTER MILITARY.

15. . . . The Stewards charge for feeding 27 Bullocks in Camp, is order'd to be struck off. It's perhaps intended that it should appear in the Accounts of the Commissary at Camp, which is certainly the proper Place for it, but enquiry should have been made if the Stewards charge is just or extravagant.

ENGINEER.

16. . . . He has hitherto transmitted no Accounts but should be divided to keep the same as the Engineer of Fort St. George Viz<sup>t</sup>.

17. . . . A General Account of Charges both of Materials & Workmen on the several Works to be drawn up Monthly and transmitted.

18. . . . An Account of Materials expended exhibited in collumns, with an Abstract of the whole at the Year's end to be transmitted Annually.

19. . . . He should likewise be required, as well as the Engineer here. to deliver in a Monthly Abstract of Materials receiv'd with the general Annual one at the Years end.

20. . . . If the Engineer at St. David receives all Materials. and his People have the entire applying them without the necessary Checks, some regulations are necessary to prevent abuses.

SEA & LAND CUSTOMERS OF CUDDALORE & TEVENEPATAM.

21. . . . Nothing material occurs to Us in these Accounts.

22. . . . In October and November the Settlement was under the charge of the late Chief for which reason the Accounts of those Months are left to be consider'd at the time when that Gentleman's transactions in general shall be enquir'd into. We shall only observe that a considerable reform is begun in the last Month.

23. . . . We have examined the Accounts for December January and February during the Management of the Supravisor, & are glad to find the extravagancies We pointed out in former Accounts so well put a stop to The Expence now is clearly shewn whether it arose in Pagodas or Fanams, so as effectually to prevent all private appropriating of Battas, but there still required to be inserted in an outer Collumn the valuation of the Fanams at the rate of 36 to the Pagoda in order to the regular posting of the Journal Entries into the Ledger.

24. . . . A Cash Account in Rupees distinct from their Cash Account in Pagodas is necessary to be kept here in the manner recommended for St. David and Forms of both should be sent thither for that purpose. The Payment to Seapoys in the Nabob's Service, is here likewise made in Rupees cast up at 350  $\frac{3}{4}$  100 Pagodas and requires the same Regulation as at St. David. The Form of the Cash Account in Pagodas to be transmitted them, should particularly shew the manner of bringing to Account the Purchase of Fanams.

25. . . . These are all the remarks that occur to Us with respect to the Accounts of the Southern Settlements.

1. . . . We now lay before You our Remarks on the Accounts of the Northern Settlements for the Months of October November December January and February.

1<sup>st</sup>. VIZAGAPATAM.

2. . . . The irregularities with regard to the method of those Accounts which were represented in a former Report still subsist. No Journal Parcels are transmitted; Cash Accounts and Paymasters Accounts being the only Accounts they send up.

3. . . . In the Cash Account Rupees and Pagodas are blended together. They should keep their Rupee Account separate from their Pagoda Account, observing in the former to carry into an outer Collumn the value of the Rupees according to the Exchange they are receiv'd or Issued at.

4. . . . For want of a sufficiency of Pagodas Rupees have been constantly changed away for Pagodas at the rate of Four hundred Rupees  $\frac{3}{4}$  One hundred Pagodas with a remark in the account that the Rupees are to be replaced as soon as they get Pagodas. We find on Ballancing the Receipts & Payments

that have arose in this manner from 1<sup>st</sup>. May to Ultimo February that there is the sum of 46232 Arcot Rupees remaining to be replaced. For want of the Journal Parcels We are quite at a loss to know how their Cash Account is Journalized but by their blending both Pagodas & Rupees under one general Head of Cash, the above circumstances cannot appear on the Ballance of their Books, and should there be any advantage in the exchange, it may be appropriated by the Cashkeeper without discovery.

5. . . . The Military of Vizagapatam are paid in Rupees at the rate of 2 f 4 sh.  $\frac{2}{3}$  Rupee this compared with the Pay of the Military at Fort St. George Viz<sup>t</sup>. 8  $\frac{2}{3}$  Pagoda turns out at the rate of 343 Rupees  $\frac{2}{3}$  100 Current Pagodas. Your honour &ca. can best determine if the Military there are paid at a due Exchange.

6. . . . We have already represented the necessity of putting the Vizagapatam Books on a new Plan. As the currency of that Place is Rupees the readiest and best method that Occurs to Us for their Accounts to be all kept in that Specie, which will obviate the numberless perplexities occasion'd by the various exchanges now in use, the mention of which will be sufficient to convey the strongest Ideas of the confusion & uncertainty of their Accounts.

7. . . . The Paymasters Account which is the most considerable, is already kept in Rupees, and the chief use they have for Pagodas is for their Southern Investment which can give no impediment to the keeping their Accounts in Rupees. The Exchange may be fixed, perhaps 400 Rupees  $\frac{2}{3}$  100 Madras Pagodas may be found both a convenient and reasonable Exchange.

2<sup>d</sup>. INGERAM.

8. . . . The Pay of the Military here is reduced into Rupees in the same manner as at Vizagapatam @ 2. 4.  $\frac{2}{3}$  Rupee, but then the Rupees are brought into Madras Pagodas at the rate of 350  $\frac{2}{3}$  100 Pagodas, by which means £100 Sterling turns out to them Madras Pagodas 245 instead of Madras Pagodas 227 which it would only yield them at Fort St. George. As the Currency of Ingeram is Madras Pagodas, the Military Pay should of right be computed as at Fort St. George, deducting 10  $\frac{2}{3}$  Cent Batta to reduce the Madras Pagodas into Current.

9. . . . The Pay of Seapoys is likewise cast up in Rupees, and those brought into Madras Pagodas at 350. One hundred Madras Pagodas by a moderate estimation will produce 400 Rupees, the reason therefore of such an overcharge requires to be explain'd.

10. . . . Beside the above. We find a monthly charge of about 10 Pagodas. for loss in exchange by paying the Military & Seapoys in Dubs. This indulgence perhaps may be deem'd not improper, where small mney would otherwise be difficult for them to procure.

11. . . . In November and December Cloathing 3 Recruits is charged for, & in October cloathing a Seapoy, which wants an explanation.

12. . . . In February under the Head of Charges Merchandize there is an extraordinary Freight of 60 Pagodas charged for few Wares & Stores sent thither  $\frac{2}{3}$  Nancy & Don Carlos it turns out near 15  $\frac{2}{3}$  Cent on their Invoices.

3<sup>d</sup>. MADDAPOLLAM.

13. . . . The Pay of Military & Seapoys there is computed just in the same manner as at Ingeram and the Regulation may be the same as the Maddapollam Currency is also Madras Pagodas.

14 . . . Of the Accounts of this Settlement We must recommend in general that they be drawn out more circumstantially. In February Cash is Debted to Paddy Pagodas 120 and to General Stores Pagodas 19 without further particulars of any kind.

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

1. . . We have examined the Accounts of the Out Garrisons, Camp and Commissary from primo October to Ultimo February, excepting the Trichinopoly Accounts for December and January, which were transmitted hither, but by some accident have been mislaid and cannot be found. Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. will therefore please to direct the Commanding Officer of that place to send up second Copies of them.

2. . . With respect to the Disbursements at the Out Garrisons, We have already represented in a former Report that they are not duely check'd. From the Character of the present Commanding Officers We have no room to doubt the justness of their Accounts, but it is wholly on their integrity that We are to rely, for great abuses might be practised in their Circumstances without a possibility of our detecting them in the present method of their Accounts. We must therefore recommend to Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. to consider of the most effectual means of remedying this Defect.

3. . . Many Articles of expence are still brought to Account in an abridged manner, Orders should be given that the particulars of every charge be expressed.

4. . . At Chingleput several small Disbursements are made in Pagodas, which breeds confusion in those Accounts and often occasions a Ballance of Cash on each side of the Account Current. The Commanding Officer should be directed to make his Disbursements in the Rupees only excepting the pay of the Europeans Military, which is hardly necessary to appear in his Accounts as the exact sum is always drawn for on the Military Paymaster here, who brings it to Account with the necessary particulars.

5. . . The Commandant of Arcot has transmitted an Account of the expence of repairing and fortifying that Fort for which the Nabob furnishes Money. We would recommend to Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. consideration whether every Commandant should not send up in the same manner Monthly Accounts

of all his Disbursements on behalf of the Nabob in order to their being examined and every extraordinary charge corrected. We think it would not be improper to have them countersign'd by the Nabob's Killedar.

John Call and John Hume having been directed to Survey the Fort of Deve Cotah and to make their Report of its present condition as well as of the Repairs necessary to render it defensible, they have accordingly taken a survey and made a Report thereof to the Select Committee in a Letter which is now submitted to the consideration of the Board. The said Letter being read (as enter'd hereafter) it is the unanimous opinion that considering the importance of Deve Cotah in preserving the communication with the Southern Province it is of great consequence that it should be put in a State of Defence, and as the proposed Works appear well design'd for that purpose the whole Charge whereof is estimated at seven thousand Pagodas AGREED therefore that the Works proposed be carried on under the inspection of Mr. Hume as Engineer and that the Chief of Deve Cotah be directed to give all the Assistance he can in providing Materials and other necessaries, and that it be an instruction to the Engineer not to begin on the Ditch untill the other Works are well advanced.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

In Compliance with your Orders Communicated to us by the Deputy Governour of Fort St. David we proceeded as soon as possible to Deve Cotah, and immediately after our arrival apply'd to the Chief for a return of such stores as were then in the Garrison. While this return was preparing we took a survey of the Fort, and the Country adjacent, that we might in the meantime consider what could be done with the greatest Expedition, and least expence

for the immediate Defence of the place. During this consideration we were led to conclude that something might at the same time be added for its Security hereafter; by uniting the present with the future some advantages might ensue in point of Defence and *Æ*conomy, And tho' such a provident consideration was not particularly recommended to us, yet as we conceive it not foreign to the purport of our Commissions we hope Your Honour &c. will pardon the freedom with which we shall express our Sentiments during the course of this Letter, and believe that our Whole view is to promote the good of the service we have the Honour to be employ'd in.

As the Importance of a Place to be fortified, or secured has the greatest weight in determining the nature of the Works for that purpose, we will for a while beg leave to suppose that the Fort of Deve Cotah is of the utmost Service in preserving our Communication between Trichinopoly, and the Settlements on the Coast; and that consequently when an Enemy has in View the Conquest of the Southern Provinces he will first endeavour to possess himself of Deve Cotah, as a Key to the rest. For should the French (whom in this Case we will suppose our Enemys) once get possession thereof, and at the same time possess Karikal, Chellumbrum, Porto Novo, Bonaguery, Verdachelum & Syringham, we cannot but conclude that all communication with Trichinopoly, except under Convoy of a large force must be cut off especially as there is great probability that the King of Tanjore will in these Circumstances be our Enemy, or at least observe a neutrality.

This is the light in which we regard Deve Cotah; and from hence do conclude that its preservation is of the greatest Consequence; How to effect it with that *Æ*conomy which has been so strenuously recommended to us, we have Labour'd to determine, and for that purpose beg leave to lay before Your Honour &c. the Plan accompanying this Letter. For the better understanding of which it may not be unnecessary to promise that the Condition of the Fort is now nearly the same as described by Mr. Call in a Letter dated July the 21<sup>st</sup>. 1754. Its situation is naturally strong and the approach of an Enemy to a considerable Distance may be much impeded if not render'd impracticable by means of Breast Works thrown up at the most frequented passes, and a vigorous opposition made in Traversing the Woods & Rivers, which surround Deve Cotah on every side but that towards the Land and even there the approach is far from easy. The natural strength of its situation being once got the better of and Cannon brought to play on the Walls a large Breach may soon be made, and as there is no Ditch the beseiged must defend it almost on an equal footing with the Assailants. In this Case then, few would be so hardy or imprudent as to risque the sacrificing a Garrison to the fury of a victorious Enemy, when the most obstinate Resistance would scarce admit a probability of defending the place. It may perhaps be urged on the contrary, that tho' Deve Cotah in its present Condition is not capable of much Defence, yet if the Rampart was faced within; the exterior facing of the Curtains reduced to a proper height for Musquetry, the Towers cover'd with Parapets and Cannon mounted thereon; it might with a tolerable Garrison oblige an Enemy to lay some days before it, and thereby give time for Reinforcements to arrive which should oblige the beseigers to quit their enterprize. This we grant may be done at certain times of the Year, but as an Enemy will probably attempt the reduction of Deve Cotah when the Garrison is weak and our Troops otherwise employ'd, or when the southerly Monsoon will not admit of a Communication by Sea, we apprehend that little dependence can be had on the certainty of its being reliev'd, especially if the Enemy by possessing Chellumbrum, and Porto Novo, should cut off our Communication by Land. These and other Reflections of the same nature determin'd Us in favour of the Plan now laid before you in which we have at once endeavour'd to secure the place from a surprize and for an inconsiderable

expençe (when compared with the sums usually expended on these occasions) hope to construct such Works as will require no small force to attack them; and by the Defence they will be capable of making, will oblige the Enemy who expects success, to bring with him several pieces of battering Cannon, to open Trenches to cover the approaches; and proceed with all the Caution necessary in a formal Siege; and even then the Success will be precarious, provided Deve Cotah has a Garrison of Two hundred Europeans and five hundred Seapoys with Provision & such Ammunition and Stores as we shall represent necessary.

Your Honour &c. will please to observe that the particular Design of this Plan is to carry a Rampart of (12) feet broad all round the Fort which will be faced with a thin Wall; to take down the Battlements of the old Curtains and form a Parapet proper for Musquetry; to raise Parapets of ( $6\frac{1}{2}$ ) feet high round the Towers and peirce them with Embrasures; to surround the place with a Ditch of (6) feet deep which will communicate at each End with the River to fix Pallisadoes therein to prevent a surprize; to form a slight Glacis & Cover'd way; and lastly for the better Defence of the whole we have constructed two Counter Guards before the Towers G & L whose flanks will scour the three sides of the Fort most liable to be attacked, And to preserve these Counter guards from the violence of the Weather we propose to face them with a thin brick Wall laid in Chunam to the height of (7) feet above the Horizon, and thereon lay a stout Parapet of Earth which will be well faced and cover'd with Turf; Each of these Works will have Room for mounting ten Pieces of Cannon, but if they are furnished with six it will be sufficient. The rest of the Works will be well sloped of to avoid expence and nothing done in brick of the new Project but what is represented in the Plan & Profit by Yellow, At the south end of the Fort by the Rivers side will be made two Bridges over the Ditch and Barrier Gates fixed at the Ends thereof which being shut at night will close the Passage to the Fort on both sides, Sally Ports will be open'd under the Rampart at (a, b & c) and Ramps made at proper Distances for the Convenience of mounting Cannons. With these additions we conceive the place will be very defensible; but to remove every thing which may impede its Defence, as well as to make room for the intended Alterations it will be necessary to pull down the Huts which are built close under the Wall of the Fort towards the Land, and which by their Proximity are of Great Prejudice to the place, both by affording Cover to an Enemy or by being set on fire when the Wind blows from the Land, thereby favouring a surprize. These Huts it is highly necessary to remove and we imagine they might be rebuilt much more advantagiously within the Walls at least such part of them as are inhabited by Seapoys, Lascars, and Artificers employ'd by the Company, who by this means would be always at Hand when any sudden necessity required their Service. Two or three small Magazines will also be necessary in different parts of the Fort as marked in the Plan by the Letters (d, e & f) which by being thus distributed will be more convenient for furnishing the Works with ammunition and in Case of an Accident to either of them the place will not be left destitute. When three or four convenient Apartments for lodging Officers are added to what we have already mentioned, the place will then be render'd convenient in every Respect, and we cannot help remarking that had such Apartments been built at first the money which has been laid out at different times in patching up temporary Lodgings might have been saved & better employed on other occasions.

Thus Honble Sir & Sirs we have given you as concise an explanation as possible of what additions we think necessary for strengthening, and making convenient the Fort of Deve Cotah, but as we may probably have regarded it in a false light we submit the whole to your Judgment who best know the Importance of the place, & whether the Advantages from thence arising are adequate to an extraordinary expence of Pagodas seven thousand (7000) that is, exclusive of the Expence which will Monthly arise from Repairs and Jobbs of no great

Consequence. A Calculate we have subjoin'd hereto but cannot pretend to say the particulars are exact for want of a better knowledge of the ability of the Artificers, & price of the Materials, However upon the whole we are almost satisfied the Charge will not exceed the amount of the several Articles which follow:—

We have only to add on this Subject that should Your Honour &c. think proper to fortify Deve Cotah either in the manner we have laid down or any other, we imagine many Artificers & others will be thereby induced to settle in the Bounds and live under the Protection of the English Flag; at least such is the discourse among the Inhabitants at present who discover great satisfaction from the hopes they conceive that the place is to receive some additions of strength.

The Artillery, Military and other small stores which are at Deve Cotah being distributed in such a manner as to require much longer time for a thorough Survey than we had to spare, we can now only send a Return of such as are most material towards the Defence of the place, but as soon as the rest are sorted and properly disposed Mr. Hume will transmit a farther Account of what is in Garrison and of what will be wanting.

In this Return your Honour &c. will please to observe that there are in this Garrison many Stores which were intended for the use of the Army or Trichinopoly & which are of no service here, but occupy such Room as might be better employ'd in stowing the Stores of this Garrison. We therefore are humbly of opinion that it would not be improper if Your Honour &c. gave orders for the removal of all unnecessary Stores to Fort St. David or Trichinopoly where they may be most wanted. We have only to remark that the Lascars, Bullocks & Boats which are mention'd in the Return are very necessary Articles and will be of great service in fetching Turf, Bricks, Piles, &c. if any Works are to be carried on at this Place, but more particularly so, when occasion shall require a Party to be sent out to any part of the Bounds. HONBLE SIR & SIRS

The 30<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo at night I receiv'd a Letter from Mr. Secretary Du Pre' dated the 15<sup>th</sup>. advising that he had receivd Your directions to acquaint me, " that a Report of my Transactions at Deve Cotah during a part of the time I held the employ of Chief there having been laid before You by Mr. Smith as Supravisor of that Settlement, my Conduct in many instances appears unwarrantable and particularly in the following, amongst many others of less Note which are therefore not taken Notice of at this time "

These I find are ranged in Eighteen Articles which in obedience to Your Commands I shall now reply to as briefly as the Nature of the thing will admit of, and to the best of my present Abilities, making no doubt of every kind allowance for the imperfections which may be discover'd in the performance.

The first Article contains a charge of having directed the Companys Conicoplies to burn and destroy their Cadjans, Can there be the least probability that those very Men who have been my accusers would at my Command (even supposing I had order'd it) burn those Cajans which were not only their Justification but my Conviction, and their destroying also what were of a Prior date to my Appointment to that Settlement, which could have no connection with my Transactions, is a circumstance which no doubt will give Your Honour &c. no very favourable impression either of their Honesty or Integrity, but on the contrary, give You great cause to doubt their Veracity even in the remaining Articles.

As the 2<sup>d</sup>. 3<sup>d</sup>. 4<sup>th</sup>. 5<sup>th</sup>. 6<sup>th</sup>. 7<sup>th</sup>. 8<sup>th</sup>. 9<sup>th</sup>. 13<sup>th</sup>. & 14<sup>th</sup>. Articles contain Accusations of the same kind I hope it will not be disagreeable to your Honour &c. that I presume to make one Answer to serve for all; and that is, Whatever Article has been overcharged, was without any design or even my knowledge and whatever mistakes or Errors have happen'd, resulted chiefly from my being render'd incapable by a lingering bad state of health, of Inspecting into the Conduct of my Servants, who made every advantage they could from it, and who were the only people I had to depend upon; and as to the exchange of Rupees, it was a mistake of the Conicoplies, which I had given directions to be rectified, but what part of the 12000 Rupees spoken of was exchanged at the rate of 320  $\frac{3}{4}$  % Pagodas has escaped my memory but which when adjusted, as it proceeded entirely, through the neglect of the Conicoplies I shall be ready and willing to reimburse.

In Answer to the 7<sup>th</sup>. Article Comrapah the head Conicoply of the Companys, came to me desiring I would grant him the liberty of going to Combiconnam feast, informing me at the same time that it was always customary, not only to comply with such request, but for the Honour of the Company, that he should be attended with some Seapoys, I therefore consented, as it was at a time of profound tranquility, believing it to be an indulgence usually shewn them and not unreasonable [*sic*], as it gives the Country people a proper Opinion of a Chief servant of the Company.

The 10<sup>th</sup>. Article contains circumstances that have been usual before my time Seapoys when not upon service, being often employ'd in other Capacities. The Pay Rolls were always brought to me ready drawn out, and sign'd by the Commandant for the time being, and therefore with submission I cannot think myself to blame, more especially as whenever my ill state of Health would permit me to see them musterd they appeared compleat, and if a Seapoy at other times was made use of as a Baker. Washerman, or Ironman (which I am totally

ignorant of) it must have been an imposition put upon me by the Conicoply; though supposing it was so if as I have abovesaid they were compleat I cannot see the harm of their acting in a double Capacity.

The 11<sup>th</sup>. Article is amply answer'd in what I have said to the 7<sup>th</sup>. and 10<sup>th</sup>.

In Answer to the 12 Article relating to Fanams I did write to Mr. Starke of the great want thereof and had I been supply'd from thence, this never would have been an Article against me, but He assured me there were not enough at St. David for their own purposes and his letter can be produced if Your Honour &c. require it.

If there were any Prohibitions laid upon Trade, or any Inhabitant oppress'd either in their Person or Property as set forth in the 15<sup>th</sup>. Article, it was so industriously kept from my knowledge that I was an utter stranger to it, having several times by beat of Tom Tom, done all I could to encourage a freedom of Trade and the Inhabitants to complain upon any ones presuming to Aggrieve them in that, or any other point; and had they ever Complain'd no Man would have been more ready to do them Justice.

In Answer to the 16<sup>th</sup>. Article, my sole reason was to relieve the necessities of the Poor, and this with no detriment to the Company, as the Farmers about Chially promised to replace it, and they would have comply'd with their promise had not the great Freshes prevented them, When I found myself in this distress, I applied to St. David, but without success. I dare believe Mr. Smith will do me the Justice to acknowledge, that I always intended, and endeavour'd to replace it, and I hope it is already or will be done in a short time, and that Your Honour &c. will not Interpret this in any other light, than what it was intended.

In Answer to the 17<sup>th</sup>. Article, I knew nothing of such practices, as therein specified but this I know that it is too often in the power of the Subadars and Conicoplies to connive at such irregularities, when the whole Advantage accruing from thence is their own, and the whole management must go through their hands and not in the power of the Chief or Commandant to prevent them, till it is found out through a disagreement amongst themselves; and give me leave to add, that the Gentleman sent to enquire into my Conduct too easily believ'd the many Charges brought against me, without ever permitting me to be present at any of his Examinations which would have enabled me to have Confronted the Evidence and made this my answer to Your Charge more Compleat; nor would those Evidences then have dared to lay so many Falsities at my door, and I should have enjoy'd a liberty, which though deny'd to me, yet on all other occasions, has been granted even to the worst of Criminals.

In regard to the 18<sup>th</sup>. Article, upon receiving the new Regulations from Your Honour &c. I immediately Publish'd them, and till I found it an Article of my Charge, never knew, but they were as strictly executed; but to my great concern their Villainy has been all of a piece, who after they themselves have made every advantage of it, load me, with all the Infamy.

Having thus reply'd to the several Articles of the Charge exhibited against me, to the best of my Abilities and Memory, there only remains to solicit of Your Honour &c. Permission to recommend to Your serious consideration, the great ease, with which either White or Black people (particularly the latter who govern themselves by very slender Tyes to either Truth or Confidence) may be prevail'd upon to accuse even their nearest Relations much more their Masters, of those unwarrantable actions they themselves have been the Authors of whenever it comes in Competition with their own safety and from the dread their minds are seized with thereby pretend to have receiv'd orders for so doing in hopes to escape the Punishment they know ought to fall upon them only, the

Evil consequences springing from such practices (if they are once either permitted or Countenanced) I need not point out to this Honble Board, as nothing can be more evident than the dangerous lengths it may be extended to, in destroying the most unspotted Innocence.

Upon the whole I do with all humble submission entirely Resign myself to whatever Determination You come to on the subject, and I flatter myself it will be attended with the utmost Candour & Humanity, more especially when You come seriously to Reflect, who my Accusers are. In the meantime permit me to subject myself with the greatest Respect

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

Your Honour &c. having been pleased to direct me to lay before you the Proofs in support of the Charge against Mr. Hopkins, I beg leave to produce the most material of those on which I grounded my Report.

The first Charge against Mr. Hopkins is for Ordering the Cadjans to be burnt. To this Mr. Hopkins in answer only speaks of the improbability of such an Order from him, without denying it. The means by which it came to my knowledge, were by the Information of Comrapah and Narrain the Company's Conicopies, Mr. Hopkins's own Conicopy Mootiah and Manoel Soares his Portugueze Writer. The Last upon Oath, whose Declaration No. 1 is hereunto annex'd for your Information.

Mr. Hopkins replies in one Paragraph to the 2<sup>d</sup>. 3<sup>d</sup>. 4<sup>th</sup>. 5<sup>th</sup>. 6<sup>th</sup>. 8<sup>th</sup>. 9<sup>th</sup>. 13<sup>th</sup>. and 14<sup>th</sup>. Articles of the Charge, by saying whatever Overcharges have been made, were without his knowledge. That such Overcharges were made and by his Direction will appear by Comrapah's Declaration hereunto annex'd No. 2.

The 7<sup>th</sup>. Article being a Charge against Mr. Hopkins for allowing the Company's Conicopy a large Escort of seapoys to Combiconnum Feast, Mr. Hopkins does not deny, and therefore it is not necessary to produce any Proofs. How far his Conduct may be justified remains with your Honour &c. to determine.

On Mr. Hopkins's Answer to the 10<sup>th</sup>. Article of the Charge wherein he asserts that the Seapoy Rolls were compleat and that if any servants &c. were enter'd on them it was without his knowledge, and even in that case they acted in a double Capacity. I have only to observe to your Honour &c. That Captain Spear acknowledged to me he had Mr. Hopkins's permission to charge his own servants who were not Seapoys; And that Mr. Hopkins own Washerman &c. were also charged will be proved by the Testimony of Comrapah the Company's Conicopy if Your Honour &c. think proper to call him before you.

Mr. Hopkins answers the 11<sup>th</sup>. Article of the Charge by referring to his Answer to the 7<sup>th</sup>. & 10<sup>th</sup>. Articles. That the Peons Rolls were incompleat, as is mention'd in my Report, the Declaration of the then Chief Peon at Deve Cotah will prove No. 3.

How far Mr. Hopkins's Reasons in answer to the 12<sup>th</sup>. Article for not crediting the Company for Batta on Pagodas, may be deem'd satisfactory, is left to Your Honour &c. Judgment and require no Proofs from me.

Mr. Hopkins's Answer to the 15<sup>th</sup>. Article seems extraordinary, for in all my Enquiries I never had the least intimation that he ever beat the Tom Tom for the Encouragement of Trade, as he asserts, but on the contrary that he published an absolute Prohibition, in that manner as is set forth in my Report and the said 15<sup>th</sup>. Article of the Charge, the annexed Testimonies of the Mettoe Peons No. 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 & 9 afor'd an ample Proof, and therefore I beg leave to refer to them without farther Particulars.

In regard to the Company's Grain sold and not accounted for as charged in the 16<sup>th</sup>. Article Mr. Hopkins appeals to me for my opinion whether he did not mean to replace it On this I have only to observe to your Honour &c. that it is most natural to suppose he did intend it. Whether Mr. Hopkins would have done strict justice to the Company in only replacing the Grain instead of crediting them for it as sold, is a Point that your Honour &c. can best determine.

Th displacing of Seapoys by the Company's Conicopl ywith Corrupt Views is charged against Mr. Hopkins in the 17<sup>th</sup>. Article only as a neglect in suffering it and in not having sufficiently informed himself as the Chief of the Settlement of the Transaction relating to the Military. That Sepoys were displaced and Entrance money taken I have proofs ready to produce to your Honour &c. when required.

Mr. Hopkins's Answer to the 18<sup>th</sup>. Article being of the same kind with his Answer to the 17<sup>th</sup>. admits of the same Reply.

Mr. Hopkins's Complaint in Answer to the 17<sup>th</sup>. Article. That he was never permitted to be present at the Examination of the Witnesses, I must say in justification of my Conduct that I offer'd to call the Company's Conicoply and others before Mr. Hopkins that they might publicly declare what they knew relating to divers particulars of his Conduct, but he absolutely declin'd it. However, if Mr. Hopkins should now think it may be of service to him to have them re-examined in his presence, they are here ready to be produced if your Honour &c. should think fit.

These are the most material Proofs on which I grounded my Report, and I am with the greatest Respect

Paragraph 6. Relating to Redwood for China.

The Export Warehousekeeper acquaints the Board that there is a considerable quantity of Redwood brought in and ready to be sorted.

ORDER'D that the Export Warehousekeeper and Engineer examine the same and seperate that which is proper for the China Market and report the same to the Board.

ORDER'D that to avoid any delay in the dispatch of the China Ships The Redwood be sent on board them by the returning Boats as fast as they land their Consignments here, if the Ships can take it in.

2<sup>d</sup>. GOODS FROM EUROPE &c.

Paragraph 34. That thirty Men Coffrees be sent to St. Helena.

Altho the Coffrees here having been long train'd to Arms are now very good Soldiers and may be extreamly usefull as there is but too much cause to apprehend fresh troubles on this Coast Yet as the Company's Orders are positive.

AGREED That Fifteen of the Coffrees be sent to St. Helena by the Delawar and the remaining Fifteen by the Ship to be dispatch'd in January.

3<sup>d</sup>. INVESTMENTS.

Paragraph 43. Directions in what manner to Contract for the Investment.

Altho the Board have no grounds to imagine they shall meet with better success from Publick Notice than they had last Year for the reasons which have been fully represented to the Hoñble Court of Directors yet in Obedience to their Commands

51. That the Nabobs Debt be exactly ascertain'd to a certain Period and then be acknowledged by him or otherwise order'd valid, and that in future what may be further Contracted be secured at short Intervals.

The Transactions with the Nabob being under the Management of the Select Committee it is referr'd to them to pursue such measures at present and in future for obtaining the acknowledgment and Authentication of the Accounts between the Company and the Nabob as they shall think fit, And the Accountant is directed to lay before the said Committee a State of those Accounts, and that he may be the better enabled to draw out the same. The Board observe that at Vizagapatam and such other of the Subordinates where there are but few of the Company's Servants it is impossible that the same Method can be pursued as at the Presidency but with respect to St. David AGREED that the Deputy Governour and Council be directed to appoint a Committee for Conducting their Works, to consist of two of the Members of their Board and Mr. Call who are to consider of ways and means for providing Materials and carrying on the works to the best Advantage but that previous to their resorting on any method of providing Materials Publick Notice be given that all Persons who may be inclined to supply the Company with Bricks or other Materials may deliver in their proposals, and then upon the whole that they fix on such Method as may seem best in all Respects.

56. That nothing more than unavoidable Repairs be done at Deve Cotah. The Fort of Deve Cotah being to Us the Key to Tanjour Country and Trichinopoly from which our Communication might be easily cut off had the Enemy a Superior Force and that Place in their Possession the Board think it of the utmost Consequence that it should be preserv'd at least untill the Country be settled in Peace even tho' it may not answer for an Investment, and the Charges of repairing and maintaining the Settlement should at this time exceed the Revenues of it which however it is hoped will not be the case long, those bounds having been lately farm'd for upwards of Nine Thousand Pagodas (9000) and being capable of great improvement. 58. The Powder Mill to be put under the direction of the Committee of Works.

ORDER'D that the Powder Mill (a Model whereof was sent out by the Onslow) be erected under the Inspection and direction of the said Committee on some proper spot at a Convenient distance from the Powder Mill at Egmore.

59. To be mindfull of making an Assessment on the Inhabitants towards defraying the Charges of the Fortifications.

As such an Assessment cannot be made without very discouraging Circumstances which are fully stated in the 72<sup>d</sup>. Paragraph of the General Letter by the Hardwick dated 27<sup>th</sup>. That they think it advisable We should communicate this to Admiral Watson. That the Prince George has imported there & shall be return'd to the Negrais with Stores &c<sup>a</sup>. Artificers so soon as repair'd, should they in the mean time not receive any Instructions from Us to the contrary. That the Owners of the Fortune Ketch have relinquished the Freight for the Treasure sent them, & they doubt not but upon proper Application to the Commanders of the Vessells belonging to their Settlement. We may always forward the Supplys intended them freight free. I now take the Liberty of addressing Your Honour &ca. concerning an affair of the utmost consequence to me 'tis in regard to my keeping my Standing from the time I was appointed which was in December 1750, but being so unlucky to be taken ill, with the Small Pox about the time the ships were to sail for this Coast, by that I was detain'd, till 1752, I can't but think it extreamly hard, that I should be superceeded by those that were younger on the List than I was, which I am by nine Gentlemen, having so good a reason to plead for my being detain'd in Europe which I will submit to Your Honour &ca. Superior Judgment and consideration.

The enclosed is Copy of the Date of my Covenants, which I have now got, and may I hope be of some service to me.

If I could presume to take the liberty to entreat Your Honour &ca. to mention this in Your Letter to England in as favourable a light as possible, I then might have some hopes of being stated to my former rank, but without it all I can do will be nothing worth.

I hope Your Honour &ca. will Pardon the freedom I take in addressing You on an Affair so nearly concerns my welfare, and I beg leave to assure You that.

N<sup>o</sup>. 104 From Roger Drake Esqr. Presid<sup>t</sup>. & Governour &c<sup>a</sup>. Council of Fort William dated the 8<sup>th</sup>. June Enclosing Triplicate of what they wrote Us a few days before & Copies of the Letters from the Gentlemen at Cassimbuzar giving the Account of the surrender of that Place to the Nabob And acquainting Us that they had received authentick Advices that the Nabob with his Artillery and a considerable Body of his Forces are on their Way down to Calcutta. That they are making all preparations for a vigorous Defence, but as their Garrison is extreamly weak they will endeavour to amuse him and avoid proceeding to Hostilities as long as they can, in hopes of our sending them a Reinforcement sufficient not only to repel those Troops but recover the Factory at Cossimbuzar. That as their Safety is at stake and only depends on the Relief We shall send they earnestly request We will not on any Motive neglect supplying them with the Number of Men they demanded otherwise We must excuse them if they exculpate themselves by protesting against Us for the bad Consequences. That as they are very deficient in Musket Shott & most kinds of Military Stores they expect We will send them proportionate Quantity of all of them, and also as much Gunpowder as We can; as it will be impossible for them to make any should the Town be invested & the Quantity they have by them will probably be expended by the time We can send any.

The President reports to the Board from the Secret Committee that Salabad Jung having made pressing Sollicitations for a Detachment of our Forces to Join his Army the said Committee have had under Consideration whether his request could be complied with or not, and in the Course of their Deliberations have given it as their Opinion that Four hundred Men might be spared for that Service including the Train. The Board thereupon taking into Consideration the State of Affairs at Bengal and the pressing demand made by the President and Council there for Military are of Opinion that altho' Four hundred Men might be spared to Join Salabad Jing yet the same Number cannot prudently be detach'd for the Service in Bengal because in the first Instance it might reasonably be supposed that their Junction with Salabad Jing would draw off at least an equal Number of French Troops that way or if Occasion should require the party might be recalled but in case of sending such a Body of Men to Bengal it might be impossible to have them back here in time of Need nor would the French be under any necessity on that Account to lessen their Forces on the Coast. The Board are therefore of Opinion that not more than One hundred and Fifty Men can be spared from this Coast (besides those already sent by the Delawar) for the service of Bengal And it is AGREED to apply to Admiral Watson for the Twenty Gun Ship or Sloop belonging to His

The President & Council of Bengal having in a Letter of the 7<sup>th</sup>. June advised Us that the Nabob of those parts had made himself Master of the Companys Settlement of Cossimbuzar and that he was then in full March with a considerable Army towards the Town of Calcutta which is the Principal Settlement of our Company in Bengal the Gentlemen there having but a thin Garrison wrote Us in very pressing terms to send them immediate Assistance. We accordingly laid aside our Intentions of dispatching the Delawar to England and embarked with all the Expedition. We were able [*sic*] as many Men as that Ship could receive on board which were about Two hundred and Thirty. We have great hopes this Reinforcement would reach them in time to prevent their Nabobs making any further progress but as it may not be altogether sufficient to enable the Gentlemen there to oblige him to retire to a proper distance, and having received fresh Letters requesting that the Supply We send may be as large as possible We think it incumbent on Us to send an Additional Force but not having a proper Conveyance We are under the necessity of troubling you with a Request that you will if possible spare the Twenty Gun Ship or the Sloop belonging to your Squadron to embark about One hundred and Fifty Men with a few Military Stores a List of which We take the Liberty to trouble you with And We are further to Request that you will direct the Captain of the Ship to give all Assistance either by Land or on float he may Judge himself capable of doing, if requested by the President & Council there.

As I think it my Duty to Represent to you what I conceive necessary to be done for securing this place against any Attempts from an Enemy, I must beg leave to acquaint you that since I have begun to Raise the Works to the Westward I find that notwithstanding there has been Two thousand Twenty three Coolies employ'd since the 12<sup>th</sup>. Instant There hardly Appears any thing to have been done, and as We have no less than Forty thousand Rods of Works to be thrown up for the Immediate security of this Place, and that what People we have is not the Tenth part of what We want to do it, And as I conceive it is of the greatest Importance to the Company to Effectuate the Speedy Security of the Town with all possible diligence, I believe that Ten thousand Husbandmen may be procured with their Tools. Out of All the places dependant on this Settlement if a proper Abatement be made to the Renters, on their farms for the time those people will be so employed and I am persuaded I shall then be able to secure the Place.

I must further beg leave to Represent that it is absolutely Necessary that all Timber Plank & firewood be brought into town or Under the Walls along the Seaside, to prevent an Enemy from making use of it in filling up Ditches Raising Works &c<sup>a</sup>.

I must also beg leave to Acquaint you that the North front is in a Defenceless Condition & Except Works are Thrown up to Cover it the Parapets will only serve to destroy what People will be posted to defend that Part of the Town.

The President acquaints the Board that he had summon'd them to Communicate the Contents of a Letter receiv'd last Night from Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Watts & Collet advising of the loss of Fort William which Letter is now read as follows.

TO THE HONBLE GEORGE PIGOT ESQ<sup>r</sup>.  
 PRESIDENT & GOVERNOUR OF FORT ST. GEORGE  
 & C<sup>a</sup>. COUNCIL.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

It is with the utmost concern We now inform you that Fort William was taken by the Moors the 20<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo the rise of these troubles are as follows.

The Nabob under various pretence sent a Guard upon our Factory at Cosimbuzar to stop Our business as is Customary in this Country when they have any demand on the Europeans and daily increased the Force till the Factory was surrounded by His whole Army which by the most moderate Computation consisted of about 10,000 Horse 20,000 Rageput Gun Men and a large Train of Artillery and then demanded Mr. Watts to go out and see him the Nabob's Duan who commanded the Van of the Army writing Mr. Watts a Letter that He might go out with great safety that no Harm should happen and that He would introduce him to the Nabob upon this. We thought proper to send the Surgeon of the Factory to the Duan and he gave him the same assurances; and sent him back with a considerable Person & a present of Beetle (which is esteem'd a Pledge of Faith) to accompany the Chief to the Nabob accordingly agreeable to the Unanimous opinion of the Gentlemen of the Factory and Officer of the Garrison the Chief went and was introduced to the Nabob who immediately Order'd Him into Confinement and insisted on His giving an Obligation that in Fifteen Days time the Gentlemen of Calcutta should Level what new Works they had raised deliver up the Nabobs Tenants who had fled for Protection there and that if it could be proved that We had Falsified the Companys Dustucks by giving them to those that had no right to them. We should pay back what the Government had suffered by Loss of Duties the Chief being in their hands was obliged to sign this they then told Him that His signing was of no consequence without the rest of the Council accordingly upon the Surgeons returning to the Factory and acquainting Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Collet & Batson that it was necessary they should go to the Chief in order to make an End of the Affair they went and were detain'd Prisoners nothing more being said about the Obligation the Chief had signed (the Chief solemnly Asserts that He told the Surgeon to let Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Collet & Batson know He did not think it advisable for them to quit the Factory) the next Day We were order'd to deliver up Our Cannon & Ammunition which We complied with in hopes entirely to pacify the Nabob. the Army then drew off from the Factory. Mr. Batson was sent back to the Factory & Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Watts & Collet kept Prisoners in the Camp which

then bent its March towards Calcutta. We have since heard All the Godowns at Cossimbuzar were seal'd up with the Nabobs Seal and the Soldiers remaining in the Factory carried Prisoners to Muxadavad.

As the Chiefs going out of the Factory may perhaps appear extraordinary We think it necessary to give Our Reason for taking such a step it has been always Customary in Bengal for the Chiefs of the Subordinates to Visit the Nabobs of the Province and We had great reason to believe that on paying this Visit We should be able to accommodate matters and prevent His March to Calcutta. If We had refused Our Factory must inevitably have fallen into their hands with all the Companys Effects Outstanding in Bengall. Our Garrison being in no condition to make a defence against so large a Force Our Factory being surrounded on three sides by Houses which Overlooked our Bastians & some not Thirty Yards from the Bastian most of Our Guns were Honey Combed & carriages Rotten though We had repeatedly Indented to Calcutta for new Ones. Our Garrison consisted of about 50 Soldiers most of which were Black Portugueze We had about 80 Maunds of Powder but few or no shot or Granades. We might possibly with this Force have held out 3 or 4 Days which would not have prevented the consequence that have since happened and We undoubtedly should have been Blamed for having commenced a War with the Government and We are very sensible had the Gentlemen of Calcutta thought proper to Treat Affairs might have been accommodated even when the Nabob was on his March.

We can give no certain Account how Calcutta was taken. We being then Prisoners in the Camp but We have since heard the Governour Commandant and several other Gentlemen of the Council with part of the Garrison quitted the Fort and retired on Board their Ships which flung the rest into Panick and Confusion, which occasion'd the Fort to be Surrender'd to the Moors. We hear Mr. Holwell was taken Prisoner in the Fort and is in Irons. We have no certain News of the Fate of the other Subordinates but it is reported they are Plunder'd. Most of the Companys Servants that remain'd when the Governour &c<sup>a</sup>. went away were either killed or have since Died by ill Usage.

We shall address your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. again when We can do it with more certainty.

We were releas'd about four days ago & Agreeable to our desire were deliver'd to the care of the French who has the Nabobs Orders to send Us safe to Madras inclosed is a Copy of a Letter from the Nabob to the director of Chandanagore as also One to the Governour of Fort St. George. The Civilitys that We and all the English have receiv'd from this Settlement requires the greatest Acknowledgments lest any false reports should reach Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. We can assure you that to the best of Our Knowledge the French have given no Assistance to the Country Government but have suffer'd greatly themselves having been obliged to Pay 400,000 Rupees & the Dutch as much or more.

We beg the favour of your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to represent to Our Hoñble Masters Our distressed situation by the first conveyance and We hope from their Candour that the part We have acted will not be disapproved of As We are conscious to Ourselves that had the Governour & Council made any Proposals to the Government Affairs might have been accommodated. Fort William subsisted and their Effects at the Subordinates and the Arungo safe but by all Accounts they were as averse to any Terms of Peace as they were incapable of War.

DIRECTORE PIGOT, of high and great Rank and greatest of the Merchants, May you be Possessor of the Patcha's Favour.

It was not my intention to remove the mercantile business of the Company belonging to you from out of the Subah of Bengal. But Roger Drake your Gomastah was a very wicked and unruly man and began to give protection to Persons (who had accounts with the Patcha) in his Koatey. Notwithstanding all my admonitions, yet he did not disist from his shameless Actions. Why should these People who come to Transact the Mercantile Affairs of the Company be doers of such Actions? however that Shameless man has met with the desert of his actions and was expelled this Subah. I gave leave to Mr. Watts who is a helpless poor and innocent Man to go to you. As I esteem'd you to be a Substantial Person belonging to the Company I have wrote these Circumstances of his Shameless and wicked Proceedings. Dated the 1<sup>st</sup>. of Moon Shal in the 3<sup>d</sup>. Year of the Mogulls reign which is the 30<sup>th</sup>. of June 1756.

Great Merchant and Man of Friendship Mons<sup>r</sup>. Renaud Director General of the French Company, Be happy

I have sent Mr. Watts an Englishman and Gomasta at Cossimbuzar to you with a Letter to Mr. Pigot commanding in the Koatey (or Trading house) at Madras, a Copy of which Letter is enclosed. You must therefore send for the said Mr. Watt's Family who were committed to the charge of the Gomasta at Sydabad and send him away with his Family to Mr. Pigot at Madras, see them arrived and send for Mr. Watt's receipt with an answer to my Letter and forward them to me who am welwisher of the People Dated the 29<sup>th</sup>. of Moon Ramadan in the 3<sup>d</sup>. Year of the Mogulls Reign which is the 28<sup>th</sup>. of June 1756.

The Great Importance of the Settlement of Calcutta to the Company, appears in such a light to the Board that they are thoroughly satisfied the utmost Efforts should be made to recover it. It is AGREED therefore to Consult Mr. Watson on this Occasion as it is the Opinion of the Board the Squadron, or part may render great Services at this time, and in Consequence of this Resolution it is AGREED to suspend the Embarkation of the Troops as settled in Consultation the 14<sup>th</sup>. Inst. untill further Measures have been concerted with Mr. Watson.

Charles Watson Esq<sup>r</sup>. Rear Admiral of the Red and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Squadron in India And George Pocock Esq<sup>r</sup>. Rear Admiral of the White also Present at the request of the Board.

The Letter from Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Watts and Collet read and enter'd on the Minutes of yesterdays Consultation being again read, The Admirals are made acquainted with the great Importance of the Settlement of Calcutta lately lost, and that the Board are of Opinion should it not be recover'd it will be of the utmost ill consequence to the Companys Affairs if not their entire ruin. That the Board Judge the Appearance of the Squadron in the River of Bengal will be a great Inducement to the Nabob to come to terms and restore the Settlement. On the other hand should he refuse the offers that might be made him on to his Occasion that the fifty Gun Ship proceeding up the River might in a very few hours (from the description of the Factory) oblige the Moors to quit that and the Town. Mr. Watson, hereupon assured the Board that he is ready and willing at all time to do every thing in his Power for the Service of the Company but considering the State of Affairs in Europe it appear'd quite necessary his Squadron should not be divided, and yet from the Accounts he had had of Bengall River he saw great danger in attempting to carry the two if not the three largest Ships up to Town that he saw not what Service they could be of unless they proceeded so high, but that if the Board were to give it him as their Opinion that it would be necessary to employ the whole Squadron on this Occasion he would run all Risques to serve the Company. That the Board would further Consider of it, and that he would immediately give Orders for getting all the Ships in readiness whether the whole Squadron might be thought necessary to be employed or not; And then, with Mr. Pocock withdrew.

The Board taking into Consideration what had been urged as above by Mr. Watson, are of Opinion that when the fifty Gun Ship might be sufficient to drive the Moors out of Calcutta but as the possession of that place only, without being in a condition to carry on a Trade as usual would be of no use to the Company, and that the Appearance of the whole Squadron might induce the Nabob to enter into terms of Accommodation. It is the unanimous Opinion of the Board to apply to Admiral Watson for the whole Squadron to which it is resolved to add all the Land Forces that can be spared. The President on this occasion offering his Services to accompany the Squadron should they proceed, the Board express the highest Sentiments of His willingness to exert himself in this distinguished manner and hope it will appear in the same light to the Company. The Board are of Opinion that the presence of the President or that of Colonel Clive will be necessary as well to Advise with Mr. Watson as to Negotiate with the Nabob for resettling the Factory in a regular manner, and will in a future deliberation take into Consideration whom of Mr. Pigot or Mr. Clive. they shall request to undertake this Expedition, in the meantime. ORDER'D that Mr. Clive do repair to Fort St. George, and that the Admiral be address'd to send the whole Squadron in Conformity to the above Resolution. A Draught of a Letter is accordingly now settled and is as follows.

Instant and am much concern'd to find the Companys Affairs in so bad a situation at Bengal, I shall very readily give them all the assistance in my power and will proceed with the whole Squadron as far as Ballisore Road, where I shall be able to consult the Pilots on the Practability of carrying the Ships up to Calcutta, and if there is a possibility of my getting there, I shall with the utmost chearfulness put every thing in execution that can be proposed for their Service.

The time of my Sailing wholly depends on you, as the Ships can't proceed to Sea till their Provisions and Water is compleated, which will take up a considerable time, if some better method is not pursued in the management of the Boats, than is now followed.

As I propose sending a Frigate before me, in order to have the Pilots ready at Ballisore Road at my Arrival If you have any Troops or Stores, you would send by her I will give the Captain Orders accordingly.

As soon as day light appear'd discover'd ourselves to be on a barren Rock 2 Leagues from the Main, and as I found afterwards lies in the Latitude of  
o. m.

34<sup>o</sup>00 S<sup>o</sup>. by a good observation with Hadly's Quadrant, and to the E<sup>t</sup>.ward of Bay De. Alguna 8 or 9 Leagues.

The first day after our deliverance on this Rock I thought of nothing else but making a Raft to carry us to the main as soon as those that were cut by the Rocks would be able to Travel; which I judged would be a Month at least; Therefore went in search of Provisions to subsist on for that time.

In looking about the Wreck found a Chest of Treasure with the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys mark on it N<sup>o</sup>. 5  $\mp$  A which came on shore on part of the Ships Transome. The same day found the King & Hon<sup>ble</sup> Companys Packets which got up and open'd the Papers to dry immediately tho' at that time must own had no reason for doing so; however upon Consulting Mr. Collet what must be done with them it occurred to me that it would not be impossible to build a Boat out of the Wreck if Providence should direct us to find some Tools.

The next day found an Adez, also a Chisel & 3 Sword Blades, which the Carpenter made saws off with those we began our Boat, tho' not without hopes of making orders; one of the People promising great things in the Smiths way, and perform'd so well that he made every tool the Carpenter wanted.

On the 4<sup>th</sup>. day found a Box of wrought Plate which was no sooner got into safety than the People wanted to share it together with the Treasure. All seem'd to be resolved on it Excepting Mr. Collet, Webb, Yeats, & Mr. Dowell, which All refused and from that time were used excessively Ill, and at one time their Resentment carried 'em so far that they proposed murdering us, and would certainly have done it, had John King gave his consent, but his refusing, put a stop to their Villainous designs in that respect, tho' not in others; for about the same time the Chest of Treasure was broke open and 600 Pounds taken out by Richard Topping, Samuel Powell, Nathaniel Chisholm, John King, Robert Beazly & John Leaster.

I entreated them to return it again, but to no purpose & I saw nothing of it till 3 days before the Boat was Launched when it was produced and shared with the Plate.

February 18<sup>th</sup>. 1756 took leave of our Rock, and Sail'd to the Northward with an intention to touch at River St<sup>t</sup>. Lucia, but meeting with a very strong Current setting to the S<sup>o</sup>. ward was much longer getting there than I expected we should, and before we got that length we put into a Barr Harbour to the S<sup>o</sup>. ward of River St<sup>t</sup>. Lucia, where we were used excessively civil by the Natives, who supply'd us with every thing we wanted, for brass Buttons. As we were afterwards in River St<sup>t</sup>. Lucia, in coming out 9 of the People left us not willing to venture over the Bar, which I must own look'd very terrible; notwithstanding we that remain'd on board were obliged to go over the Bar or suffer the Boat to be lost; for those who went on shore let go the Grapnel close to the Breakers at high Water; so that by the Time it would have fallen a foot she would have grounded; therefore as soon as the small boat return'd from putting them on shore we weigh'd the Grapnel again and put for the Bar; we were in the Breakers half an hour; at length got safe over, and in two days got to Dellago, where We found riding the Rose Galley from Bombay Commanded by Edward

Chandler. I thought this a good opportunity to get the Treasure and Plate again; therefore apply'd to Captain Chandler to assist me, who comply'd with my request by sending his Boat & Mate with me on board the Sloop; We soon got what we went for and return'd on board the Rose Galley, where I continued till I arrived at Morandava two days after our arrival there Captain Hutchinson in the Caernarvon Join'd us, who favour'd me with a Passage to this Place.

The President lays before the Board a Letter from Admiral Watson addressed to him dated this day which is read and is as follows.

SIR

In my Letter to you and the Council of Yesterday's date, I acquainted you, I would so far comply with the request you had made me, as to go with the whole Squadron as far as Ballasore Road. and there consult with the Pilots of the

possibility of my getting to Calcutta. You must be assured my consent could not arise from any other motive than the desire I have of doing very thing in my Power for the Interest of the Company, and it's from that consideration, I beg leave to offer it as my opinion, You should call the Gentlemen of the Council together again and reconsider this matter.

In their debate, it is necessary they should observe, and pay some regard to the great probability of the news of a French War, by the arrival of the next Ship from Europe, and the intelligence of a French Squadron being expected here, which but a little time past was generally believ'd and I have heard nothing since to make it less probable now, than it was then. If it should be true, will not this Coast be left intirely defenceless all this season by the Squadron's attempting to go to Calcutta? and what more is to be feared from this step, and with great Reason to be expected, is that the Ships will be so late before they can proceed to Bombay (if at all) that they cannot be on this Coast again next Year till the middle or perhaps, later end of May, for it must be considered they have now been in India a considerable time, and want much repair particularly the Kent.

I would recommend this future Service which may be wanted from the Squadron, to your serious consideration, and then judge whether or no, a Parade only of the Squadron at Calcutta, can recompense for any misfortune that may happen to this Coast hereafter for want of the Ships being here in the proper Season. I mention a Parade only, because it is allow'd by every body, if hostilities are to be committed on the Nabob the Fifty and Twenty Gun Ship is as much force as is necessary to reduce and destroy every thing in the Nabob's Dominions they can come within reach of where then is the necessity of sending the whole Squadron? and thereby infallably depriving this Coast of all the assistance from them in the early months of next year, should there be ever so much occasion.

You may be assured SIR, I should be happy to have the Squadron employ'd where they could be of the most Service, and I have no other objection to going to Calcutta than this certain consequence attending it, which is, I shall not be able to bring the Squadron here at the time you may want them to assist you in opposing an Enemy, against whom it may be more necessary to guard, than to pursue the measures now proposed, as a less Force than requested, will certainly answer every purpose that can be expected from hostilities.

After all, if it should still be the opinion of the Council, that it is necessary for the whole Squadron to proceed to Calcutta. I'll use my utmost endeavours to carry them there but let it be remember'd, it is in my opinion an unnecessary step, and may be attended with the worst of Consequences.

The Board at all times pay a Regard to Admiral Watson's Advice and Opinion, and tho' the Subject he recommends to their Attention had been thoroughly weigh'd before they made their last Request, yet it is now reconsidered and after being long debated the Board are of Opinion as follows. Consideration thereof.

The Principal Points taken Notice of by Admiral Watson are, the probability of a War with France. The Intelligence receiv'd and not since Contradicted of a French Squadron coming out. the Danger in such Case of the

Squadron's leaving the Coast, and by their proceeding to the Bay render their return hither improbable before the month of May. The Board admit that on the Intelligence of a French Armament intended for these parts and the probability of a French War, they thought it adviseable to draw together all the Forces they could and to take every Measure that prudence suggested for the Security of the Settlements, even more perhaps than might be absolutely necessary and tho the Intelligence of a French Armament has not been Contradicted they consider that the Season is now so far advanced that it is scarcely probable the Seige of this Place or St. David would be attempted before the Monsoon. But should it happen otherwise the Board are of Opinion that Fort St. David has a sufficient Garrison and that the Forces they can draw together exclusive of those intended for the Bengal Expedition will be sufficient to defend this Settlement even should the Enemies Force be as formidable as is represented. The Squadrons not being able to return here till the Month of May in case of its proceeding on this Expedition the Board do also acknowledge to be of great Weight, but on the other hand they consider that if the whole Squadron should proceed to Ballasore Road and the large Ships not be able to get over the Braces they will be in as good time to proceed to Bombay from thence as they could be from hence, and it is not improbable but that should they be able to proceed up the River Affairs might be so far advanced by the end of October that the Capital Ships might proceed then to Bombay in which case the difference between the time of their Arrival there and what it would probably have been had they left this Coast at the usual time will not exceed three Weeks or a Month. But even should they not be able to return here till May the Board Judge that by the time an Enemy could take the Field in the Spring the Works now throwing up on the New Plan will be so far advanced as to be very tenable against an European Force. The Board do not mean by this to Place such Confidence in their Strength as to think lightly in any degree of the Protection of His Majesty's Squadron, but when they reflect on the immense Loss the Company has sustained in Bengal, the Danger of their total Ruin should their Commerce in that Province not be restored, The daring Insult offer'd to the English Nation in the Nabob's late violent Measures, and the despicable light they must even after be view'd in by the Natives should the National Honour not be retriev'd. Upon all these Considerations the Board are of Opinion that the most Exemplary Satisfaction should be taken which they judge will more than any thing contribute to restore the Company to their former Rights, and even put their Trade on a better footing perhaps than it has ever yet been, and tho' this might in some Measure be effected by one or two of the Ships yet the presence of the whole even tho' the Capital Ship should be inactive will its judged with the appearance of His Majesty's Flag strike a much deeper and more lasting Terror. It is therefore AGREED again to Address the Admiral to proceed with the whole Squadron provided he will suffer the Military now on Board the Ships to proceed up the River notwithstanding the Capital Ships should not be able to get up. A Draught of a Letter to Admiral Watson is accordingly now settled and is as follows.

Persuaded as We are from experience that Your Good Will is ever with Us in the support of the English India Company's Affairs We accept the Remonstrances made in that Letter as a farther proof of this your Disposition

What we should have done before your Departure We now anticipated in laying before You our full sense of the late Calamity at Bengal the fatal Consequences it may, we fear will, produce, and the Resolutions to be taken by Us will be nothing more than the result of these Reflections.

It is necessary to mount a little higher than the present Times, that you may be entirely a Master of this Subject.

An Embassy deputed by the East India Company to Delhi about Forty Years ago obtain'd from the Great Mogul at more than the Expence of One hundred thousand Pound (£ 100,000) the Rights and Priviledges which their Settlements have hitherto enjoy'd in Indostan they obtained for the Presidency of Bengall infinitely more than the Violence of the Subah of that Province permitted them to possess themselves of Regardless of the Kings Mandate, he prevented them from possessing Nine Tenths of the Lands which had been granted.

What remain'd was sufficient for that Establishment of a flourishing Colony. Calcutta by it's Investment has been hitherto, notwithstanding all the Interruptions of the Nabobs the most Beneficial part of the Company's Estate.

The Space of three years together has seldom pass'd without demands of Money made by the Nabob upon the English under groundless Pretences. The State of the Companys Investment laying in the reach of the Government and out of the Reach of the Presidency, has generally induced the English to submit to pay some Consideration in Money, in order to prevent greater detriment to the Companys Affairs. The late Nabob, Grand Father to the present, several times obliged the English to these Concessions.

Some such pretences groundless We believe the present Nabob, made use of in order to sanctify the Violence of his late Proceeding. He tells Our President Mr. Pigot in a Letter, that it was not his Intention to extirpate the English from his Subah. Intentions are best seen by Facts. The Wealth of Calcutta was his Aim and to the vast Misfortune of our Nation he has possess'd himself of it. We are advised just now by Private Letters that he has plunder'd all the Effects of the Colony to whomsoever belonging.

To this immense Loss and Detriment has been added Circumstances which will weigh equally in the Opinion of the Nation, Cruelties & Barbarities inflicted on the Subjects of great Britain, which have ended in the Death of many Gentlemen of Consideration there, the Survivors drove to their Vessells and interdicted by his Ban from receiving any kind of succour from his Subjects.

We refer to You Sir how much the Honour of the English Nation is concern'd in these most violent Breaches of Faith and of Humanity. We submit to You Sir to determine whether Exemplary Reparation is not necessary.

On these Sentiments we made our first Application to you, the taking Satisfaction in the most Exemplary manner will in our Opinion be the quickest means of re-establishing the English in the Province of Bengal and even on better terms than they have hitherto obtain'd.

The appearance of a Flag will add weight to the Terms that may at last be made and the greater our Force in Bengal, the more immediately will the Reparation of our Injuries be in our own hands.

On the contrary should nothing of this kind succeed We tremble for the Consequences which will befall the Company.

We are obliged for your representations of our Situation here. We have seriously reflected on the Subject. We shall leave ourselves with a Garrison sufficient for our Ground and with the Rise of our Fortifications cannot say, that We fear even an Enemy Powerfull as has been represented to us from Europe.

We cannot from the above find any Reasons for altering the Request which we did ourselves the Honour to present to You, for sending the whole Squadron to Bengall. We must add that as we shall send only Two hundred Rank and File of our Troops We depend on your suffering those on Board the Squadron to proceed up the River notwithstanding you should find it impracticable to carry up the largest of the Ships.

“ and therefore, if it regarded him only personally, would have been very  
“ indifferent about it but in Consideration of the Character which he bears in  
“ this part of the world from His Majesty, the Colonel thinks himself indis-  
“ pensably obliged to represent to Mr. Pigot, that he looks upon the present  
“ Conduct with respect to him as the highest indignity to the Commission he  
“ has the honor of holding here, and that he is convinced it must appear very

The President has Communicated to the Board a Message he receiv'd from you in writing yesterday complaining of Indignitys and Insults Offer'd to your Commission and of a great want of Complaisance in Us who are concern'd in the Administration of the Company's Affairs. This is an Accusation of such an extraordinary Nature that the General terms you have been pleas'd to represent it in, oblige Us to call upon you to explain yourself in every particular both under your own hand and such of your Officer's as think themselves aggriev'd by our Conduct.

The particular Instance you mention of an Indignity offer'd to your Commission the President has convinced Us is ill founded. No steps had been or could be taken with Respect to the Land Forces untill some points had been settled with Admiral Watson relating to the Squadron, And the hour the President receiv'd Mr. Watson's Letter acquainting him that the Squadron might proceed to Bengal on the Companys Service he himself waited on you with that Letter and acquainted you with all the Intelligence he had receiv'd even before he had communicated Mr. Watson's Resolution to any one of his Council, any application previous to this would have been premature.

It is surprising to Us that at a time, when, more than any, the utmost unanimity and good Will in every Subject of Great Britain is necessary to support the Interests of the East India Company, which we will venture to Call the Interests of the Nation We say We are surpris'd at such a time to see such Altercations set on foot.

As I am well convinced it will not be agreeable to His Majesty, that the Regiment under my Command, should be so much divided, as it is likely to be by the Expedition now in agitation for Bengal, I think it my duty to lay the same before you; and therefore to desire that as many as possible of His Majesty's Troops may be employ'd upon this Service, but in case instead of doing us that honour, you should prefer making use of the Company's Troops upon this occasion, I must then beg the favor, Gentlemen that you would join me in an application to the Admiral, that the Detachment of my Regiment now on board the Squadron, may be reliev'd by an equal number of your own forces.

We have been obliged to borrow Money of the French Company for Our Subsistence as We have Lost everything We had in Bengall Viz<sup>t</sup>. Mr. Watts 2000 for Him and His Family and Mr. Collet 500 Rupees for which We have given Receipts as these Notes will be Tender'd to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. from Pondicherry for Payment, We beg the Favor of your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to honour them and in case the Company do not think proper to make Us any Allowance. We shall with pleasure Repay the sum advanced. Enclosed is a List of what Gentlemen are on Board of the English Ships in the River.

Since our last We have receiv'd a Letter from the Gentlemen on Board of the Ships at Fulta Copy of which We enclose as also Copy of a Letter they desire to be translated into Persian and sent to the several Great Men about the Nabob for Permission to re-establish the Settlement.

We must beg leave to Observe to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. that We wrote to the Governour & Council of Calcutta when We were at Houghly (which was the first opportunity We had) that if they would send a proper Person or Empower Us We flatter'd ourselves that We should be able even to Accommodate Matters for a sum of Money. We are not certain but are informed that that Letter was receiv'd and an Answer wrote Importing that after the affront the Nabob had given of Sealing up the Company's Effects and confining their Servants at Cosimbuzar they could not think of coming to any Terms of Accommodation. We are inform'd likewise by Cossenaut One of the Companys Banyans that Omichund and some of the Principal Merchants offer'd to contribute considerably towards making Up Affairs. Coja Wazeed the greatest Merchant in Bengal who

resides at Houghly and has great influence with the Nabob His Duan told Us that He went Four times to Calcutta in Order to persuade the Gentlemen to make up matters with the Nabob but was Threatened to be Ill used if he came again on the same errand.

We shall do all in Power to get permission to re-establish the Settlement but are without any hopes of obtaining it during the Life of the present Nabob. We therefore know of no other method but that of a Military Force which We hope Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will be able to send sufficient to Attack the Nabob even in his Metropolis As We Hear a Peace is confirm'd with France.

There are 79 of our Sergeants Soldiers and others in the Hospital here who escaped from Calcutta and are provided with Provisions & Cloaths by the French Governour & Council Who have been extreamly Humane to Us All and now maintain by Charity near 3000 Poor Portugueze Men Women & Children who were Inhabitants of Calcutta.

If you think it would be proper to apply to any other Durbar Officers upon this occasion. We request you will point out the Persons, or (if you Judge it will Answer the end) We should be glad you would Address them yourselves in behalf of Our Honble Employers to interest them in Our Favours. In hopes of Opening a Correspondence with the Government, We have absolutely forbid any Hostilities being Committed on any Moors Ships or Vessells which may arrive in the River; or giving any Offence to the Country People round about Us, by which pacifick Measures on Our side, We hope for a favourable turn of Affairs.

GENTLEMEN

I receiv'd your Letter of yesterday's date, late last Evening, and from the facts therein mention'd I concur with you in opinion, that the Nabob has been guilty of the most violent Breaches of Faith and Humanity on the Subjects of Great Britain; I therefore agree with you, that Ample satisfaction ought to be demanded for the insults and Barbarities lately committed on the Gentlemen at Calcutta and am very ready as I acquainted you before, to go with the whole Squadron to that place, if there is a possibility of carrying them there, and doing every thing in my Power to re-establish the Settlement, and accommodate matters to the honour of our Nation, and the Interest of the East India Company. But before I proceeded, I thought it was my duty to represent to you, the situation you must be in on this Coast. in consequence of the Squadron's going to Bengal, however as you are of opinion the being left entirely destitute, in case of a French War, and without expectation of any assistance from the Squadron for a considerable time, is a circumstance now, not to be regarded, but that it should be entirely given up for the sake of the Squadron's attempting to go to Bengall, I shall immediately proceed to Ballasore Road as soon as the Ships are

completed with Provisions and Water, and as the dispatch of this entirely depends on you, I hope you will give directions for a sufficient number of Boats to be employ'd on this Service.

I shall give the necessary Orders to receive the number of Troops you propose sending, but I must beg leave to observe the request you have made, in case the large Ships cannot proceed up the River, is of such a nature, that I cannot by any means comply with it, for you must consider how very short of the proper number of Men the Squadron is already, by those left sick at St. Davids and must also be left here. This deficiency I am afraid will so far put it out of my power to part with any of the Troops now on board, that I shall be under a necessity of applying for a reinforcement of Men for the Service of the Squadron for you must imagine if the largest of the Ships can get no farther than Ballisore Road for their safety, the honour of His Majesty's Flag, and for the sake of my own reputation, I can never think of suffering the Men to be sent from them. Is it not very probable if the French Squadron should arrive here, which you have reason to expect that they having intelligence where I am gone to, will, under the presumption of the largest Ships not being able to get higher than Ballisore Road, come there in search of me? how then should I be able to defend His Majesty's Ships without Men? would they not become an easy capture to the French, and thereby contribute to heap Ruin on your Affairs instead of being of any Service?

I believe when you had this Article under your consideration, you was not acquainted that two hundred Men will be left at the two Hospitals, add to this one hundred and fifty Lascars sent ashore for the Service of the Garrison at Fort St. David, when I left that place, and the certainty of soon having a number of Men sick for want of Refreshments while in Ballasore Road. All these Considerable Reductions render the Squadron already unable to do the duty they ought, and what would be expected from them.

In this situation I leave you to judge whether the complying with your request, in sending the Troops from the largest of the Ships while in Ballisore Road, would not expose them too much, to have any dependance on them hereafter in case an Enemy should appear.

As I have already assur'd you my whole attention is employed to promote the interest of the Company, I need not repeat its' from that consideration. I think this would be a very imprudent step and risking the Principal Ships of the Squadron, when there is the greatest probability of your wanting their real assistance on another Service, as I have mention'd before.

GENTLEMEN

Both myself and every Officer under my Command have more than once thought themselves greatly aggriev'd by your Conduct towards them; however, to prevent altercations, (which at this unhappy conjuncture are indeed very unreasonable) we think it more adviseable to lay our grievances before His Majesty and submit to his determination, whether or no complaints are well founded. We have the more reason for taking such a step, as I have made frequent representations to the Committee of the nature of these grievances without ever having the good fortune to meet with any redress.

I cannot help observing, Gentlemen that you have greatly mistaken the occasion of the message in writing I sent to the Governor the 19<sup>th</sup>. Instant had you well consider'd it, you could never have been convinced, that the particular Instance I mention'd of an Indignity offer'd to my Commission was ill founded. It is matter of fact, that the taking of Calcutta tho a matter of great moment to the Company and such as was likely in its consequences to affect the King's Troops, was not communicated to me till the third day after the advice thereof was receiv'd: now whether such treatment were injurious, and an Indignity offer'd to His Majesty through me, I leave to the World to Judge.

I shall only further add Gentlemen that myself, and all His Majesty's Troops, will with the utmost chearfullness exert ourselves in support of the Interests of the East India Company however ill we may have been treated by their Servants and will forget all our grievances, whenever any occasion offers wherein we can be of Service to You.

I receiv'd yours of yesterdays date requesting me to permit the Tyger and Salisbury to proceed to Calcutta.

I have already acquainted you, if you were still of opinion, the whole Squadron should proceed on this Service. I was ready to go with them to Ballasore, and there enquire of the possibility of carrying them farther. But I offer'd it as my opinion (which was founded on the information I had learnt of the strength of the Place) that the fifty and Twenty Gun Ship would be as much force as there would be occasion for. If more is thought necessary I will send the Sloop with them, but I can never think of separating two Ships of the Line, from only four till some certain Advices arrive from Europe, And having further consider'd this expedition I am apt to think, if it is delay'd till the last week in next month there will be a much greater probability of Success attending it, than if the Ships were to proceed immediately as they will then escape the rainy Season which is allow'd by every body to be the most unhealthy part of the year, and in all appearance if the Ships were to go now, one third of their Men would fall Sick before there would be an opportunity to do any Service, however I take the liberty to mention, I think advices should be immediately dispatch'd to Mr. Drake to acquaint him he will soon receive all the Succour from hence that can be spared.

If from this consideration of the rainy Season, or any other that can be thought of, you think it necessary to assemble, and further debate on this Expedition I am ready to wait on you whenever you please.

The Board resumed the Consideration of the Measures to be taken in the present Crisis and having long debated thereon without being able to come to any determination Admiral Watson again assured the Board that if they desire him he will proceed with the whole Squadron as far as Ballasore Road and even up the River if the Pilots will take Charge of the large Ships; and then leaving the Board to determine what Request to make him on this occasion withdrew with Admiral Pocock.

After a long debate It is unanimously RESOLVED that Admiral Watson be desired to send the Fifty and Twenty Gun Ships down to Bengal with about two hundred and forty Military with the Intent to retake Calcutta only without attempting any thing more untill Join'd by further Succours, And that all necessary preparations be made as expeditiously as possible to send all the Forces that can be spared from hence with the remainder of the Squadron, if in the interim the expected Advices from Europe should not make it necessary to alter these Measures. Draught of a Letter to Admiral Watson is accordingly now settled and is as follows.

The above Gentlemen We depute to your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. on the United East India Company's behalf, & require from his Representation that You will support Us with the whole Force you can Obtain on Your Coast Military & Marine together with a sufficient Quantity of Ammunition Cannon and all other Warlike Stores Military and Marine which may enable us to Re-Establish Ourselves in these Provinces, which we Esteem of the most Essential consequence to the East India Company and trade of India in General. It is highly proper to Represent to Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. that the English here were Established by Patent from the Grand Mogull under whose orders all Subahs should be dependant. But as Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. are well Acquainted that this Province was overcome by Allywerde Cawn, who maintain'd his Conquest by force of Arms, so it was possess'd by his Grandson who Assumed the Title of Souragge Dowlat, wherefore further to favour our cause and just Complaints for Restitution & Right to the Priviledges granted us by the Royal Phirmaund, We are to Request you will without delay set forth to the Grand Mogul the Enormities committed by the present Nabob on a Nation that has always paid due Obedience to the Tenor of the Phirmaund nor Infringed on its Priviledges Requiring & entreating by his Authority to Re-establish us in all our Rights and that the loss sustain'd by the Company and Inhabitants of the Settlement may be made good. We are at present endeavouring to open a Correspondence with the Principal Men whom We are inform'd the Nabob Attends to in hopes to bring on a treaty untill we can obtain succour & that we may in some Measure be Reliev'd from our present Distress, being in the utmost want of all Necessaries of Life, & strict orders issued by the Government not to supply Us with any Provisions. The Dutch & French are also prohibited giving us any Assistance. Their Situation appears very precarious and we are told the French have wrote for a large Reinforcement from Pondicherry, Our determination is to keep the River untill we are inform'd of Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. Resolutions, and in case we are not able to procure any favour from the Government or should be persecuted by the Enemy so as to be obliged to stand out to Sea, we shall proceed to Vizagapatam this we think proper to mention as it may be necessary that the Ships in their way to the Bay call there for intelligence which we shall lodge there if we are able

to procure any Conveyance, for the Ingratitude of our immediate Servants has been such that we are drove to the necessity of doing every individual Office ourselves, nor have we been able to procure a Pattamar or a Persian writer, And it is with the utmost difficulty We have hitherto kept together a sufficient Number of Lascars to work our Ships and are daily apprehensive they will quit us on the first occasion. We have desired the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam to provide & hold in readiness what Provisions of every kind they are able to procure to be out on board the Vessels coming down hither, We request Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to represent a full state of all the Occurrences to Rear Admiral Watson the Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Squadron and entreat his aid and Assistance with the Fleet which we hope may be able to proceed hither.

Monsieur Le Bon (who had Command of one of our Advance Battaries & defended the same very Gallantly) Accompanys Mr. Manningham and will in case of Accident happening to Mr. Manningham deliver You these Advices, we Esteeming Mr. Le Bon Qualified to give you a Circumstantial Detail of our Military proceedings as also inform You of the various Stores we are in want of.

As we imagine the news of this Capture will produce very bad Consequences in England to the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company's Affairs if they receive it, without being inform'd at the same time of there being a prospect of Our Resettling in Bengall we are to Request Your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. will alter Your Resolution for sending the Delawar to Europe till you know the Success of the Forces you may be able to Assist us with.

The first point Debated is whether the Survivours of the late President and Council for the Companys Affairs in Bengall notwithstanding the Loss of all

the Company's Settlements which were under their Management, do still remain invested with the same Powers or Rights they had before to direct in all matters relating to the Company which may be transacted within the former Limits of that Presidency.

After a long Debate The Question being put is carried in the Affirmative by a Majority.

The President on the first News of the Capture of Calcutta and Colonel Clive on his Arrival here from St. David having offer'd their Services to proceed at the Head of the Intended Expedition to Bengall in case it should be thought that either the one or the other undertaking such an Expedition would be most for the Companys Advantage. It is now debated whether it be eligible to request either and which of the President or Colonel Clive to undertake the Expedition.

When it was first thought that such a Measure might be proper it was not known whether those of the President & Council of Calcutta who had escaped with Life were in any Situation to take upon them and discharge the Powers of a President & Council, and in case they were not, it would have been necessary that whcever went at the head of the Expedition on behalf of the Company should have been invested with full and General Powers not only to retake their lost Settlements to but to Negotiate and Conclud Treaties with the Country Powers for re-establishing the Company's Affairs and it was thought that none could be so properly entrusted with such unlimited Powers as one of those Gentlemen whom the Commpany have placed the one in the 1<sup>st</sup>. the other in the 2<sup>d</sup>. Station on this Coast. But it being above Resolved that the Survivors of the President & Council of Bengal do still retain their Powers as such, and consequently that whatever Expedition do proceed thither must fall under their Directions the Board are now of Opinion (in Consequence of that Resolution) that it is neither necessary nor proper for either the President or Colonel Clive to proceed.

RESOLV'D That the thanks of the Board be return'd to the President & Colonel Clive for their intended Services on this Occasion.

The next Point Consider'd is, Whether upon a re-examination of all Circumstances and Advices to this time, The Resolution already taken to send down Two hundred & forty " Men on the Fifty & Twenty Gun Ships to retake " Calcutta only without proceeding any further untill other Forces be sent down " AND that as large a Force as can be spared from the Coast be sent down with " the remainder of the Squadron as soon as the necessary Preparations can be " made in the interim the expected Advices from Europe should not make it " necessary to alter those Measures." Do still subsist Or whether any and what other Measures are proper to be now taken.

RESOLVED That Admiral Watson be desired to suspend any Orders he may have given for the departure of the Fifty & Twenty Gun Ships and that the Embarkation of the Men intended to be sent on them be also Countermand'd. That in case the expected Ships from England should not bring the News of a War with France Admiral Watson be then desired to proceed down to Bengal with the whole Squadron at once. That Colonel Adlcroron be desired to proceed on the Squadron with his whole Regiment and Train of Artillery AND THAT all preparations of Stores and Necessaries be made with all possible Expedition in the same manner they would be were it peremptorily RESOLVED such an Expedition should proceed at all Events.

The Reasons for the foregoing Resolutions are Viz<sup>t</sup>.

1. The Gentlemen of the Council of Bengal in their foregoing Letter desire the whole Force that can be obtain'd both Military & Marine with Stores Cannon &c<sup>a</sup>. may be sent them such a Force as they seem to expect and think necessary (which is more fully explain'd in some private Letters) would if sent away now leave this Coast exposed to great hazard should a War be declared with France.

2. There is all the reason in the World to imagine that before every preparation can be made for the whole Expedition to proceed at once Advices may be receiv'd from Europe to clear up the Doubts in regard to Peace or War.

3. The delaying for a Month or two the retaking of Calcutta can be of no other Consequence than that it will be impossible to advise the Company by the September Ship from hence of the Success of the Expedition and tho it is to be wish'd this could be done yet as the attempting it at this time might expose their Estate to greater detriment, it is postpon'd.

FOR SENDING THE KINGS TROOPS.

1. Almost every thing in this Expedition depends on a large and well served Field Train of Artillery.

2. There are not a sufficient Number of good and proper Field Pieces in the Company's Stores.

3. Colonel Adlercron in his Letter to the Board of the 20<sup>th</sup>. Instant intimates that His Majesty is unwilling his Forces should be separated.

SIR

The President having acquainted us that You think our last Address requesting the Regiment to go to Bengal was not sufficiently explicit & that You desired a Plan of Operations to be laid before you. We now give You our Sentiments on every thing relating to that Subject.

It is necessary to premise that whatever may be laid before you by us as a Plan of Operations is subject to the Approbation of the Companys Representatives in Bengal to whose Recommendations on all Occasions we request the same Attention from You, as You would have had to any Representations made by us to You while on the Coast.

We have already acquainted you that We purpose to request you will (in case the expected Advices from Europe should not induce Us to alter these Measures) proceed to Bengal with the whole Regiment & all the Train of Artillery, to which will be added as great a Number of Seapoys as can be embarked on Board His Majesty's Squadron.

The above Forces are intended to retake Calcutta and dispossess the Moors of Hughly, those two Places lying on the Banks of the River will be render'd an easy Capture with the Assistance of the Squadron after which it is to be hoped that the Nabob may come to such terms of Accommodation as the Gentlemen in the Management of the Company's Affairs may think proper to Accept.

But on the contrary should the Nabob not come to terms, it is more than probable he will move down from Muxadavad with his Army, which will make it necessary that as soon as possible the Nature of the Ground about Hughly & Calcutta be well reconoitred & the Spot chosen where it shall be judged best to engage the Nabob who flush'd with his late Success may venture a Battle.

Should this Battle (as We hope it will) be attended with a defeat of the Nabobs Troops & he notwithstanding remain unwilling to make terms If from

the Experience which will then be obtained of his force & from the Information which may be gain'd of the Country it is thought possible to proceed further We are of Opinion that this Expedition should not finish untill he either comes to terms, or that his Capital of Muxadabad be destroyed.

At the same time We must desire you will assure Us that on any future Representation from Us You will be ready to return to Us on the Coast should the Situation of Our Affairs make such a request necessary.

Our Sense of the immense loss which the Companys Estate has Sustained at Calcutta obliges Us to Stipulate that as soon as that place is retaken the whole property of it be delivered untouched to the Companys Representatives for the Companys benefit.

And as the Company will be at a vast Expencc by this Expedition It is necessary that one half of all the other Captures which may be made be appropriated to the Companys Benefit. We say the Companys benefit alone for

altho' the loss of private Persons by this Calamity may be reckon'd at 400,000 yet nothing of this one half is intended for their benefit & they must remain in their present Situation till they can find Relief from their Superiors.

As the utmost dispatch is necessary considering the lateness of the Season, We request the Stores may be immediately embarked, & as a Litterary Correspondence on the details of this Expedition will protract the dispatch We shall be glad to confer with you whenever you have any thing necessary to Communicate.

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

I had the honour to forward from Vizagapatam & Bandamalanka two Copies of the dispatches from Bengal advising your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. of the Governour & Council having deputed me with Mons<sup>r</sup>. Le Beaume to entreat the aid & Succours of your Presidency in order to effect the Re-establishment of our Settlement in Calcutta. I had flatter'd myself with hopes of a speedy Journey but the violent Rains in this part of the Country, together with a failure in our Pallankeen Bearers (from the difficulty and fatigue in travelling thro' a Country over flow'd) impedes our Passage to such a degree we greatly fear our arrival at Madras will be very late; considering therefore the pressing occasion of our being deputed to Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. the necessity of the Bengal Affairs which require our greatest diligence being exerted, we have been induced (in earnest hopes of obtaining the desired end) to pursue the remainder of the journey separately. Your Honour & c<sup>a</sup>. will therefore receive this by Mr. Le Beaume, a Gentleman fully capable of acquainting you with the nature of the Supplies needfull and operations necessary to be perform'd.

I have furnish'd Mr. Le Beaume with Bearers, & some Seapoys well acquainted with the Road and have great hopes by the favour of Mr. Moracin to obtain the assistance of Horses at the different Settlements under his command in this Province which may enable Mr. Le Beaume to proceed with greater expedition & prove a Resource in case the Palankeen Boys are incapable of pursuing the Journey.

The President acquaints the Board that by the Conversation he has had with Mr. Le Beaume he does not find he has any thing to offer that can give any New lights into the Bengal Affairs.

Agreed to wait Mr. Manningham's Arrival.

Monsieur Le Beaume being a Frenchman the Board do not think it advisable to give him any insight into their Affairs or Intentions and as he has nothing more to offer than has already been communicated it is Agreed to proceed no further until Mr. Manningham's Arrival.

100 Pag<sup>s</sup> to be given Mr. Le Beaume.

Monsieur Le Beaume having been sent up by the Gentlemen at Bengal on the Companys Account and being in want of all manner of necessarys having lost everything at Calcutta AGREED that One hundred Pagodas be given him to provide Apparell &c<sup>a</sup>.

Proposals concerning the Boats and a New Regulation.

Letter from the Committee appointed to prepare & Embark the Stores for the Expedition and to direct the Employment of the Boats, is now read as enter'd hereafter containing a Plan for New Regulating the management of the Boats Viz<sup>t</sup>.

That the Boats be given to the former Owners who are to be Answerable for the Crew and Service of every particular Boat.

That instead of the usual rate of six Fanams, seven fanams  $\frac{2}{3}$  Trip be now paid by those who employ the Boats.

That to reimburse the Company for the Charges they have been at in rebuilding and refitting the Boats two fanams  $\frac{2}{3}$  Trip be reserved for their use out of the above mentioned seven fanams  $\frac{2}{3}$  Trip. And that when the Boats are employed for the Company three instead of two fanams be reserved as above out of the seven.

All which the Board approve.

Agreed to, Order 5<sup>th</sup> April relating to Boats &c<sup>a</sup>. Suspended.

An Order having passed in Consultation the 5<sup>th</sup>. April last for Confiscating and selling for the Companys Use the Houses and Boats of such of the head Boatmen who absconded in January and did not return upon Notice, and for regulating the Boat Account, that Order not being yet carried into execution is now suspended that a tryal may be made of the Method proposed as above.

Copper & Lead to be put up at Outcry the 6 November [sic]

AGREED that the Honble Companys Copper & Lead be put up at Outcry on Wednesday the 6<sup>th</sup>. day of October [sic] next.

Advances to the Commissary.

AGREED that Fifteen thousand (15000) Arcot Rupees be advanced out of the Treasury to the Commissary for the Charges of the Troops abroad &c<sup>a</sup>.

AND that the following Advances be made out of Cash Viz<sup>t</sup>.

To the Military Paymaster Three thousand (3000) Pagodas for the Charges of that Employ. And

HONBLE SIR & SIRs

We do ourselves the Honour to lay before you and to request your Approbation of the Regulations which We think necessary to be made in the Management of the Boats of this Place which were last Consultation put under our Direction as a Committee for the Service of the present Embarkation to Bengal.

These Regulations are the Result of the Informations given to our Enquirys on this Subject, which we shall first lay before You and then submit to your Judgment the Propriety of the Orders to be made in Consequence.

It is well known, that the Men who Ply the Boats are of a Cast the most Ignorant and consequently the most forward of any on the Coast Extreemly addicted to Drunkenness and ever unwilling to work whilst they have any Thing to spend.

Every Boat is rowed with ten Men, who hire themselves to the Service of that particular Boat, and as it would be difficult amongst the whole set of Rowers to find one of sufficient Discretion & Æconomy to maintain a Boat for three days together a Person who does not work himself builds a Boat engages the Crew and plys it for his own Profit. These Owners of the Boats live in the same Quarter as the Rowers & find Employment sufficient to keep the Crew together. In so much that We do not find any one of these Owners has ever kept more than two Boats under his own Eye, so great is the Trouble of keeping the Boat Fellows in Order.

The Owner pays the Crew 30 Cash to each able Man for each Trip & 20 Cash to such as are not quite so perfect so that supposing half the Crew are paid at 30 & half at 20—10 Men at 25 Cash are paid for each Trip 250 Cash equal to 3-10 for each Trip.

The price now paid for a Trip is Six Fanams & if the Boat makes three Trips a day, the Owner gains 8 fanams 50 Cash a day

Out of this Profit he is to be at the Expençe of paying for the first Cost of the Boat for keeping it in constant Repair & scarce a day's Work passes without requiring some. And to rebuild the Boat if lost or when worn out. Add to these Expences at particular Times incurr'd by the Frowardness [*sic*] of the Boatmen who leave the Bounds and will not return without a Gratification and the People sent to look after them are a Charge Likewise.

The Owners of the Respective Boats had three or four Chiefs from whom they receiv'd Orders for the Disposition of the Service of the Boats and these Chiefs received their Orders from the Fort.

In this manner were the Boats conducted before the Time that the Chiefs ran away to Pulliacat and for a Time kept the Boatmen away.

Since when the Boats have been seized by the Company and put under the care of a single Person who formerly was an Owner of a Boat.

But experience has convinced us, that it is impossible for any single Person to keep together to their Duty all the Boat Fellows of this Place Scarcely can one Man suffice for the Crew of a single Boat.

We find 31 Persons who formerly were Owners of 33 Boats.

It is purposed to give up the Boats to these Owners who are to oblige themselves to work them constantly.

But as the Company have been at a large Expençe in making & refitting these Boats, it is necessary that this Charge be reimbursed if possible.

On Sundays never more than five or six Boats are allotted for Service. During the Monsoon scarce any Boats work at all. At other Seasons the Surf is often so high that no Boats can put off Reckoning all these to be Deductions of 140 Working days and Reckoning 30 Boats to ply at Work each Day and to make 3 Trips  $\frac{1}{2}$  day We shall have in 225 the Working days 19850 Trips made by the Boats of the Settlement.

If a Fanam in every Trip is appropriated to reimburse the Company, 19850 Fanams or Pagodas 472.26 fanams will be yearly receiv'd to reimburse 2000 Pagodas which is nearly the Sum that has been expended on the Boats which Reimbursement cannot be deem'd sufficient.

At the same time We are convinced that much more than a Fanam cannot be taken without the danger of having the Service of the Boats deserted.

It is therefore proposed that in future Every Trip made by the Boats be paid for by every Person at the rate of Seven fanams a Trip and that two Fanams of each Trip be reserv'd for the Company which on the above Calculations will make a Reimbursement in the Year of 945. 10 Fanams And

That moreover all the Boats employed for the Company be liable to a Deduction in each Trip of three Fanams that is that instead of 7 only 4 Fanams be paid for each Trip.

If this Measure is approved the Regulations in Consequence are easily made.

A Check will be appointed & a Report daily given of the Number of Trips made in the day.

At the end of the Month the Money reserv'd for the Company will be collected according to that Report.

A List of the Owners will be always ready to be applied to if any Disorders or Negligence arise in the Service of any particular Boats. And these Owners will be made responsible & as it will depend on them to furnish the Boats, or to be punished They will take Care to satisfy the Boat Fellows & prevent their Desertion by ill Usage.

These are Regulations the best that occur to our Judgment & therefore deem'd by us necessary to be immediately put in Execution.

We submit them to your Consideration & are with great Respect.

We are without any hopes that an application to the Great Men will have any Effect at present, though had your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. thought proper to Treat before the Nabob reached Calcutta We are pretty certain a Sum of Money would have made all easy prevented the Loss of the Settlement & the Ruin of many Thousands & We wrote to your Honour &c<sup>a</sup>. to that purpose when We were of Houghley the only Opportunity We had while in the Camp & are inform'd the Letter came to hand and a proof that the Nabobs intent was to accomodate matters, was that He touch'd none of the Companys Effects at Cossimbuzar except the Warlike Stores. Should the Nabob think fit to permit the English to return & resettle We are afraid it would not be only with the loss of all their Privileges but on such Shamefull Terms that Englishmen We hope will never consent to. And We likewise think that after your Honour & the Majority of you had quitted Fort William which still held our your Power as a Governour & Council from that Moment ceas'd & We are of Opinion that you have no Authority to indemnify Us for acting by your Orders in case Your future measures should not be approv'd of by Our Hoñble Masters for the above reasons We have declined delivering the Letters you sent us.

We have receiv'd your Letter or Protest dated the 13<sup>th</sup>. of July 1756 and are surprized you should Protest against Us for all Damages & wrongs which may ensue by the deprivation of Our Privileges as contain'd in the Royal Phirmaund when We think We can with more propriety say that the Majority of you Gentlemen deprived Our Hoñble Masters of their Privileges as contained in the Royal Phirmaund when you incensed the Nabob to come against Calcutta and then deserted the Place and fled on Board your Ships which in all probability & by all Accounts was the Occasion of the Loss of the Place which might have been defended if you had staid and by which Step We are of Opinion you abdicated your several Stations and are now no longer to be deem'd Servants of the Company but setting the above aside if We thought it had been for Our Hoñble Masters Interest We should not have hesitated a Moment getting the Letters Translated & deliver'd but if you at this Time look on yourselves as a Governour & Council you must of Course allow Us Our Stations, in consequence of which We are persuaded We have a right to dissent and make Our representations against any of your Measures which We think contrary to the Interest of Our Employers As an Application at Present We are of Opinion is and that it would be adviseable to wait to see what Steps the Governour & Council of Madras may be able to take to re-establish the Companys Affairs and Credit in Bengal. We having advised them of the taking of Calcutta the 3<sup>d</sup>. Instant by express \* Cossids therefore We think an application will be more Efficacious and made with a better Grace when any Force Arrives from thence than it can at present whereas should the Nabob now Permit you to return into a Ruined and defenceless Town it may be with an Intent to Re-Plunder the Place and Secure your Persons for We are of Opinios the Nabob is not to be Trusted after things have gone the Length they have and as a further reason to imagine that Your return may be attended with a risque, is, the harsh & inveterate manner in which the Nabob has express'd himself against Mr. Drake.

We are Credibly informed that when you wrote Us you made Application to those Who had more Interest and Power to Give Weight to your proposals than We who by great Intercession had but just obtained our Liberty. On Our coming to the knowledge of this Our intermedling We thought might have been rather hurtfull than any ways of Service however if after the reasons We have given you are still of Opinion that the Letters you sent Us ought to be Translated and delivered We shall agreeable to your desire get them done and send them to the respective Persons directed except Golam Hossein Cawn who is turned out of the Province. This is designed to inform you of a most melancholly & surprising Revolution in the Honble Companys Settlements here in Bengall having been all taken by the Nabob Seerajah Dowlat. As we have not received the least Advice from any of the Gentlemen of Calcutta of a later Date than the 9<sup>th</sup>. of June we are obliged to depend on the French for a particular Account of the taking of Fort William, we now enclose your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. the Account receiv'd by Monsieur Courtin the French Chief here from their Secretary at Chardanagore. We see no Reason to doubt the Authenticity of it more especially as every material Circumstance is confirm'd by the Moors who have from the beginning assured Us that the Cause of the Nabobs Anger against the English proceeded from the Governour & Council having given Protection to one Kissendoss who had been the Naib of this City, he retired to Calcutta in March last with great Riches part of which are said to belong to the Widow of Nowagies Mawmud Khan who died in November last & whose Riches Seer Rajah Dowlatt claim'd on his coming to the Subaship of Bengal when the Nabob sent a Perwannah to demand him Mr. Drake tore the Perwannah & threw it in the Face of his Messenger this Insult provoked Seer Rajah Dowlatt to such a Degree that they say he took an Oath to drive the English out of Bengal which he very soon put in Execution, as you'll observe Cossimbuzar was delivered without firing a Gun & Fort William only resisted him 3 Days. We take the Liberty to enclose your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. Copies of our Consultations of the 27<sup>th</sup>. & 28<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo when we were obliged to surrender our Factory & ourselves Prisoners to Seerajah Dowlatt from whom we are in hopes soon to obtain our Liberty as he has already releas'd Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Watts & Collet & c<sup>t</sup>. If we are so happy as to get our Liberty our present Design is to proceed to Madras when we shall depend on your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. Councils Protection & kind assistance having lost every Thing we had in the World except a few Cloaths. We would have sent you Copies of our Consultations & Letters from the beginning of the Dispute but as this goes by a Pattamar it would make too large a Packet. We design by a French Ship bound to Europe which is to leave Chardanagore next Month to address ourselves to the Honble Court of Directors & give them the best Account we are able of the miserable State of their Affairs in Bengal. As we flatter ourselves your Honor & c<sup>t</sup>. Council will not think us any way to blame in delivering up our Factory after the surrender of Fort William, we are to request your kind representation of our Case should you have an Opportunity of writing the Court of Directors before We have the Pleasure to see you. As by all Accounts the Riches Mr. Drake & c<sup>t</sup>. have carried off with them are immense We hope our Honble Employers will be in some Measure indemnified for the great loss they must have suffer'd by the taking their Settlements in Bengal.

Two Letters, the one dated the 30<sup>th</sup>. August, the other the 3<sup>d</sup>. September 1756, from the President & Gentlemen of the General Council to Colonel Adlercron, were read; as were also the Instructions which the Colonel receiv'd from His Majesty.

The Colonel then referr'd to the Council, whether consistent with those Instructions he can undertake to transport His Majesty's Troops under his Command from the Coast of Choromandel to any other part of India; and whether in the present distress'd situation of affairs at Bengal he ought to go thither.

The Council are of opinion that the Colonel may, and that in consequence of the application made to him by this Presidency, he ought so to do.

The Colonel then submitted to the consideration of the Council the three following requests made to him by the General Council in their Letter of the 3<sup>d</sup>. September.

1. That he will assure them that on any future representation from them, he will be ready to Return on the Coast should the situation of their Affairs make such a request necessary.

2<sup>d</sup>. That as soon as Calcutta is retaken the whole property of it be delivered untouch'd to the Company's Representative for the Company's Benefit.

3. That one half of all the other Captures, which may be made, be appropriated to the Companys benefit.

In regard to the first Request the Council are of Opinion, that (as the Presidency at Bengal are acknowledged by the Gentlemen here to be independent of them and as this Presidency have particularly recommended to the Colonel, to have the same attention to the recommendations of the Companys Representatives at Bengal as he would have to any representations made to him here) the Colonel cannot take upon him to give any such assurance: and that the two Presidencies must determine that point between themselves.

With respect to the two other requests The Council are of Opinion, that no answer can be given but in concurrence with the Fleet, as they will probably be concern'd in some if not all, of the intended operations.

The Board having had under Consideration the intended Expedition to Bengal and the Advices lately receiv'd from Europe and thereupon the Question being put. Debate of the Bengal Affairs.

Whether upon the News received from Europe it is proper to undertake the Expedition to Bengal.

It is unanimously the Opinion of the Board that the Expedition be undertaken as the approach of the ensuing Monsoon will oblige the Squadron to leave the Coast whether they go to Bengal or no, and the Rains of the same Monsoon will prevent any Operations in the Field untill the Month of January by which time it is hoped that the desired Success will be obtain'd at Bengal. Expedition to be undertaken.

It was then taken into Consideration What Resolution would be necessary in case during the Expedition to Bengal News of a War with France should arrive and the Coast become again the Seat of War. If at that time the Successes that We may have had at Bengal should not have proved sufficient to reduce the Nabob to a Compliance with such terms as will be necessary for the Secure and proper Re-establishment of the Companys Settlements in his Province. Further Consideration thereon.

In such case the Board are of Opinion that it would be imprudent to risque the certain Possession of the Companys Establishments on this Coast for the Chance of Advantages which if not obtained by that time will be attended with great doubt of success in Bengal where the Companys Loss cannot be greater than it is at present, And it is therefore determined that if the Situation of Affairs in future should require the recalling of the Troops We may now send, That the Troops shall be so recalled and if the Fort of Calcutta when retaken shall be deem'd with a proper Garrison tenable, that Garrison and a Guard Ship be left there after the recalling the Troops.

It was then taken into Consideration by the Board how far it is consistent with the Respect due from one Presidency to another to keep a Body of Troops sent to Bengal under our own Directions instead of putting them under that of the Presidency of Bengal as the Companys Establishment of the respective Presidencies makes them independant of each other.

The Board are of Opinion that too great a Respect cannot be paid to every Establishment made by Our Honble Masters but in the present Circumstances, if ever it appears to them that the great Law of necessity must over rule all others, and as the necessity of keeping what the Company have is evidently and infinitely the Superior Consideration the Board are unanimously of Opinion that the Troops now to be sent to Bengal be kept under their own Power. And as this is thought by the Board a Justification sufficient for their Conduct in the present Measures, they decline corroborating it with the Companys declaration at the loss of Madras, when they declared that none of the Gentlemen of this Presidency remain'd in their Service after the loss of the Place. This Consideration as equals only to the Gentlemen of Bengal the Board do not pretend to determine on.

The above reasons make it appear Conclusive to the Board that the present Expedition be put under the Command of an Officer in the Service of the Company and this is thought to be made more materially necessary as thereby the Steps which in case of the expected Success may be thought proper to be taken for the benefit of the Companys Interest will be indisputably placed in the Power of their Servants who will be Subject to our Orders.

Another Consideration that evinces the necessity of putting the Expedition under the Command of one of the Companys Officers is that in case the Nabob should not by Treaty make ample Reparation for the immense Damages the Company have Sustain'd by his Violences, it is the Intention of the Board to

reimburse the Company as far as possible by Reprisals. But as the Board are uncertain whether the Laws direct any and what distribution of things acquired by Arms, The Duty they owe the Company demands that a Matter of such Importance be not left in doubt and liable to Contest when they may have it in their Power to secure the property of such Acquisitions to the Company by employing their own Officers and Troops.

It is therefore thought from the foregoing Reasons absolutely necessary to employ the Companys Officers & Troops.

The Number of Troops necessary to be sent being now taken under Consideration.

AGREED that Six hundred Rank & File be sent and One hundred of the Train.

And as Colonel Clive has before offer'd his Services he is now desired on many Considerations to accept the Command which he very readily does.

AGREED that Mr. Smith (one of the Members of this Board) and Mr. John Walsh be join'd with Colonel Clive as Deputy from this Board for Conducting the Expedition, And that Mr. Maunsell accompany them to assist under their Directions.

Mr. Smith being present accepts the Charge with Alacrity.

The Board then having taken under Consideration the Instructions and Powers necessary to be given to Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Clive, Smith & Walsh, After much Debate, in which the retaining the Troops of the Expedition under our Command was the Basis of the Arguments. It is AGREED that the Powers and Instructions so to be given be as follows.

- FIRST** That the Gentlemen at Calcutta be desired by Us to form a Plan of a Treaty which the Deputys be directed to abide by the tenour of, and make the Basis of their Correspondence and transactions with the Nabob.
- SECONDLY** That Colonel Clive be directed to proceed to all such Hostilities as he thinks will most likely bring the Nabob to those terms untill he has had the Success to do so. Or untill he finds it utterly impracticable. Or untill he is recalled by Us.
- THIRDLY** That the Deputys be desired to receive and attend to the Advice of the Gentlemen at Bengal, to weigh the same maturely and if they think proper to deviate from it in any respect that they have the Power so to do but on Assigning reasons to Us to be transmitted to the Company.
- FOURTHLY** That the Deputys be directed to re-establish the Gentlemen of Bengal in Calcutta as soon as his Successes shall render it proper, and that they do when the Place is in a sufficient State of Security put those Gentlemen in Possession of all such part of the Company Effects as shall remain with them, and be of no further use to them. And that in case the Nabob should Agree to a reasonable Treaty with the English that they do put all the Possessions acquir'd by that Treaty under their management.

THIS being Agreed upon as the Basis of the Instructions and Powers to be given to the Deputys.

AGREED to write to Colonel Adlercron That we return him thanks for his readiness to move with his Regiment to Bengal but as the Power of recalling him at an Emergency seems to be attended with an uncertainty of which our own Situation will not admit of the least. And as we should run the risque of incurring the severest displeasure of our Masters should We put the property of the Acquisition that may be made in Bengal into any manner of doubt or Contest when we can keep it in our own Power to reimburse the Losses they have Sustain'd with such Acquisitions, by employing their own Officers &

Troops. We do therefore purpose sending a Body of the Companys own Troops to Bengal. But at the same time that it will give Us a particular Satisfaction if he will let any part of His Majesty's Regiment be join'd to them provided they are Commanded by an Officer who by his Rank can serve under the Command of Lieutenant Colonel Clive And that We request he will let His Majestys Artillery with the Officers and Train thereunto belonging to proceed down on the Service of the Expedition as by the Nature of the Nabob of Bengals Forces We think that the Success of the Expedition will greatly depend on the Service of the Field Pieces, acquainting him at the same time that We have Eight Six Pounders now in Garrison and expect several more by the first Ship from Bombay to replace His Majestys Train.

AGREED to write to the Gentlemen at Fort St. David to send up Five Companys of the Seapoys there who are to march overland under the Command of Kerjah Singh and that they also Draught from their Garrison Seventy of the Military and thirty of the Train and send them hither by Sea Conveyance with Captains Campbell & Callender of the Military and Lieutenant Brooke of the Train.

SIR

We have receiv'd the favour of your Letter dated the 20<sup>th</sup>. Instant enclosing Copy of the Deliberations of the Council of War of the same day, to which you have been pleas'd to refer us.

We have a very sincere Sense of Your readiness to assist the Companys Affairs express'd by your Consent to let the Regiment proceed to Bengal.

But as the Intention of warring with the Nabob of Bengal is by no means the only Object of our Considerations in sending our Troops there, So these other Considerations have determin'd us to think that there is now an absolute necessity of putting all the Troops which we may send under an Officer in the Service of the Company who we know will implicitly obey the Orders he may receive from Us.

The first Consideration that has lead us to this Determination, is, that the Situation of our Affairs and the future Circumstances with which they are threatened, make it absolutely necessary that Whatever Troops may now be sent to remain under our own Command, So as that we may be certain of their returning to us at the very first Warning without attention to any Representations by whomsoever made. The Companys Letters by the Ships just arriv'd convince Us of the necessity of this Resolution. Now Sir to You we can only make Requests, our own Officer we know we can certainly command. In Times of such critical Importance We beg you will permit Us, with all defence to determine to be at an absolute Certainty on the Power of recalling the Troops we may send.

The Second Consideration that evinces to Us the necessity of putting this Expedition under the Command of one of our own Officers is that our Intentions are in Case the Nabob will not by Treaty make ample Reparation for the immense Damages the Company have sustained by his Violences. We say it is our intention then to reimburse the Company as well as we can by whatever Reprisals we shall be able to make. We can in this Consideration likewise only make requests to You, but as we do not pretend to be competent Judges of the Laws in such Cases We may venture to say, that we believe there are no regular ones We shall run the risque of incurring the severest Displeasure of Our Masters, should we, when we can keep it in our own Power to reimburse the Losses they have sustained with the Acquisitions made by the Troops whom their Money is to maintain, Should we, We say put the Property of those Acquisitions into any manner of Doubt or Contests.

Permit Us Sir at the same time to acquaint You that it will give us a particular Satisfaction if You shall think proper to let any part of his Majesty's Regiment be joined to Our Troops on this Expedition provided they are Commanded by an Officer who by his Rank can serve under the Command of Lieutenant Colonel Clive, whom we have appointed to the Command of this Expedition.

We are necessitated in behalf of the Welfare of this Expedition & of the East India Companys Affairs to request of you to permit His Majesty's Train of Artillery with Captain Hislops Command, to proceed with Colonel Clive, as the Success of this Expedition will in the greatest measure depend on the Service of the Artillery of which our own Store is not sufficient by the Disappointment of those intended for Us by the Dodington & the whole of a large Train of Artillery sent to Bombay and detained hitherto by Mr. Bouchier.

We have the Honour to acquaint you that We have in the Garrison Eight 6 Pounders & expect several more from Mr. Bouchier by the first Conveyance which will be ready to replace those We now request of you and which are already embarked on the Marlbro'.

Permit Us to request as the lateness of the Season now makes every hour of Consequence to be favoured with an immediate Answer to this Address.

GENTLEMEN

By a report made me this morning of the defects of the Kent, I find she is in so bad a condition, that she cannot proceed to Sea, without dismounting several of her Guns from her extreme parts and clearing her of all her Stores; and I believe part of her Provisions and even then she will be a very improper Ship to encounter a Gale of Wind; however as you are desirous the whole Squadron should proceed on the Expedition to Bengal, and as its' a service of the utmost consequence to the Companys Affairs, I am willing to risque the Kent, But I must first desire you will not think of sending home the Chesterfield at this time, but order her Captain to receive such Stores and Provisions, as is necessary to be taken out of the Kent, and indeed most of the Ships must part with before they proceed up the River Bengal.

I make no doubt Gentlemen, as the safety of a number of His Majesty's Subjects depends on the detention of this Ship you will readily comply with my request and I beg leave to say I was sorry to hear you had any thoughts of sending home the Chesterfield before the Expedition was over, as the Number of Troops I hear, you intend to send could not have been carried without her Assistance.

The fourth dated the 28<sup>th</sup>. Acknowledging the Receipt of our Letters of the 21<sup>st</sup>. & 23<sup>d</sup>. That Application has been made to him by Mr. John Drake whom We lately promoted to the Rank of Ensign for the Difference of Pay due to him from the Date of his Commission, but he defers complying with it till he receives our directions. That their Cash Account which is now transmitted with the other Monthly Papers, will shew Us the necessity they were drove to for Money for carrying on the Investment & even defraying the Current Expences of the Garrison till Mr. Smith advanced for the Companys Account Twenty thousand Arcot Rupees (20,000) and Ten thousand Madras (10,000) Pagodas. A Deficiency of Military Stores for the Men of War from St. David.

The Military Storekeeper represents to the Board a Deficiency in the Military Stores received by the Kings Ships from Fort St. David which being at first very considerable he imagined might have arose from a Mistake in the Invoice but upon applying to the Military Storekeeper at Fort St. David the Invoice was found to be right he then acquainted the several Commanders of the Ships that brought the Stores with the Deficiency who gave immediate Orders to examine very strictly if any were remaining on board in Consequence of which some were found but not the whole whereupon repeated Orders being given for a further search the Officers declared there were no more. As there were several Articles still wanting the Military Storekeeper acquaints the Board he used all probable means to find them and had the success to discover several Carcasses buried in the Sand upon the Beach for the ships Boats being employed to bring the Stores to the Surf they were there delivered to Mussoolahs from which for dispatch they were thrown promiscuously upon the Beach and continued there some days before any of the people belonging to the Storehouse had any notice of it and thereby many were entirely cover'd by the sand which induced him to search the Strand all before the Town but to little effect. HONBLE SIR & SIRS

In our Report dated 20 February in regard to the State of Captain Schaub's Detachment whilst Prisoners at Pondicherry & of the Draughts he made for their Pay as well as that of the English Prisoners there we laid before you the Result of our Enquiries to that time which for want of materials and Captain Schaub's presence here amounted to nothing more than Surmise. Since then a State of his Detachment whilst Prisoners which he deliver'd to the Paymaster when he was before at the Presidency having been found upon comparing it with the Fort St. David Paymaster's Accounts we observe the differences mentioned in the accompanying Account.

Captain Schaub being call'd before the Committee & examined in regard to the above mention'd state of his Detachment could neither admit or deny them having no Copies of his Rolls or Abstracts but desired that the original Rolls & Abstracts which he sent to Fort St. David in 1753 as well as the List of Deaths and Desertions he sent to the Secretary of Fort St. David about the same time or that which he delivered to Mr. Saunders in December 1753 might be produced to him all which Original Papers as is set forth in our abovemention'd Report were deliver'd to the late President Mr. Saunders & are not to be found so that supposing the Abovemention'd Account to be a just one (and we have no Proof to the Contrary) the Question that arises according to Captain Schaub is whether the Paymasters Accounts be also just, if they are, it seems very plain that Captain Schaub on his own Detachment has overcharged £. 107-4-8.

Your Honour & c<sup>t</sup>. having wrote the Gentlemen at St. David to examine Captain Schaub's Officers by their Answer dated 30<sup>th</sup>. May it appears that Captain Schaub kept them entirely in the dark as well in Regard to his own Detachment as the English Prisoners and employed one Sergeant Heim to write all his Rolls and Abstracts, this Man therefore to be the only Person who could have given any further Lights into the Affair the Gentlemen at Fort St. David made immediate Enquiry after him but found he had been missing two days before Captain Schaub set out for Madras and upon examining Captain Schaub's Dubash he declared that this Serjeant Heim had been sent by Captain Schaub to Pondicherry under the Charge of two Seapoys that he saw his Master pay him there Pagodas 30 & that the Serjeant told him he had his Master's leave to go to Bengal, having therefore no Proofs against Captain Schaub with Respect to the English Prisoners we could do no more than desire he would give us some satisfactory account how it happen'd that the Number of Prisoners in May 1753 being 127 does not appear to be diminished in six months except by two Officers only who return'd on Parole but in the 7<sup>th</sup>. Month, being November about which time he was requir'd to send Pay Rolls they are suddenly reduced by 18 Men & the next month by 20. His reply was as before that he had no Copies of those Rolls or any Accounts relating to the Prisoners desiring that his original Rolls & c<sup>t</sup>. sent to St. David might be produced declaring at the same time that when he was called up by Mr. Saunders to the Presidency to justify himself in this Affair he shew'd in presence of Captain Brohier all the Papers he had relating to it but which are since lost, and that Mr. Saunders was well satisfied with his Conduct.

N<sup>o</sup>. 165 From Lieutenant Thomas Newton at the Negrais dated 15<sup>th</sup>. October Acquainting Us with the death of Captain John Howes the late Chief which happen'd while he himself was at Persaim with the Ship George with proper Ammunition & Stores for the use of a new Settlement to be fixed there according to Agreement between Captain Howes & the Prince of Persaim, that Gentlemen having gone up with the Ship to Persaim in July & during the short stay he made there prevailed on the Prince to give Liberty to the Company to build a Fort upon a high spot of Ground at old Persaim known by the Name of the Pagoda hill which is a place that by Art might be made almost impregnable. That accordingly the English Flag was hoisted there the 5<sup>th</sup>. August in presence of the Prince of Persaim & the Chiefs among the Burmahs and the place was called by Captain Howes Fort Augustus, immediately after which, Captain Howes return'd to the Negrais & left him (Lieutenant Newton) to command with some Soldiers & Lascars besides some Artificers to begin upon the new Settlement. That the Works at first were begun very briskly but immediately after the Prince went to Dagon, the Burmahs throw every Obstacle in their Way that they possibly could to prevent their settling on that Spot notwithstanding which he proceeded on the intended Work & in some Measure secured themselves. But their Soldiers falling Sickly & fresh Provisions not

being easily procured, Captain Howes order'd hm to quit the Place with the Ship & Stores but leave a Corporal & two or three Men to take charge of the Buildings. That he left the Place the 9<sup>th</sup>. Ultimo upon the News of Captain Howes death after leaving Order for the Ship George to take on board the Guns & Stores with the Military & immediately to repair to the Negrais. That upon his arrival there he found the Companys Accounts were brought up no further than July and that it was impossible for him to compleat them down to the date of his Letter to send by the Cuddalore Sloop as Captain Baker proposed only to stay till he could finish his Letters. That as he has reason to apprehend a Disappointment in the supplies from Bengal which Captain Howes had wrote for, he now encloses Copies of the Letters to that Settlement & of the Indent enclosed in them in hopes We will order supplies from hence accordingly.
