AT FORT ST GEORGE

Honble Sir & Sirs

We have been favored, since writing to you under date the 22^d October Duplicate whereof is enclosed, with your Letters of the 5th and 12th October & shall duely honor the bills mentioned

We have ordered the several articles to be provided for the West Coast as specified by you & intend freighting a proper Vessel for their Conveyance

The Death of M^r Henry Butler having caused a vacancy in the Chaplaincy of this Presidency We must request [you] will permit the Reverend M^r Samuel Stavely to accept of the same till the Company's Pleasure is known, to whom we have wrote to request their approba[tion]

Enclosed We send Copy of a Paragraph in the Company's General Letter of the 13th March 1761, relative to the Reverend Mr John More, which you will please to communicate to him, We send also a Copy of what we have wrote to our Honble Masters in answer

In your Letter of the 12th October you inform us you shall have Three hundred Bales ready in February, We request you [will] let us know as soon as possible whether you would have one of the ships from [hence to] call for them, or if you purpose to dispatch home the Admiral Watson or [the Royal] George from your Presidency that we may take proper [measures accordingly]

The Hawke [was despatched the 21st Novr] being the first day stipulated by the Charter [party] We purpose dispatching the Plassey home [the 14th Decr with a full cargo] The Holdernesse is imported and [] the Fox and Warren

Being in great want of stationary and observing that the Company have not sent us any this season We request you to forward to us as much as you can spare from your own occasions

We observe your Receipt of Pagodas from the Agent of Louis da Costa and shall accordingly debit your Presidency for that amount as we have also for the sum of sixty thousand Arcot Rupees paid to Col Coote for his Field Expences for fifteen months in consequence of our Honble Masters directions to you, and of the Colonel's Letter on that subject whereof we send you a Copy

We appointed Mr More one of our Chaplains at your Presidency and we have repeated our Orders that Mr Butler should [go to] Fort Marlborough for which Place we originally appointed him Chaplain [surprize ratified upon the we find an Exchange has been made, our Orders [Rediculous Pretence that he can live [When the Contrary is with their several Allowances notorious, he and all others in his and if they do not reach their Expectations they must find their way home again but With respect to Mr More We are not unacquainted with the true Motives that influenced him to the removal, this Behaviour in disobedience to our Directions with other Reasons that might be assigned have induced us to dismiss Mr More from our Service and give orders to the President & Council of Fort Marlbro [to] send him home by the way of China or any other Conveyance that may offer If our orders are to be treated in this manner there will soon be an End to all subordination and good Government, our late Governor and Council took too many liberty's of this kind & they ought not to have Suffered [or colunived at this Instance in particular, Which as it cannot but be displeasing to us We hope from what has been said you will not tread in the like steps

We communicated to Mr Butler your Displeasure at the Exchange which was made between him and Mr More & have transmitted to the President & Council of Fort St George (where We understand Mr More is at present) Copy of your Paragraph signifying your Dismission of that Gentleman from your Service As you are pleased to consent to Mr Butlers remaining upon this Establishment we have continued his appointment, and in Justice and Compassion to Mr [More we cannot] help mentioning to your Honours that from [which has laid him under your Disspleasure that might be urged in I an Entire Stranger to this and every other part excuse for him of India, and that he was perswaded not without Difficulty by the Advice of others to engage in the imprudent step which has brought upon him and his Family so great Misforture He is a Gentleman of a general good Character and if this apology should induce you to admit him again into your service We are perswaded he will be very careful to give you no cause of Complaint in Future

Copy of a Letter from Colonel Coote to the President & Council of Fort William

To the Honble Henry Vansittart Esq^b

President & Governour &c. Council of Fort William

GENTLEMEN

I had the honor of vour Letter of the 12th Inst with an enclosed extract of a Letter from the President and Council of Fort St George relative to the allowances from the Honble Company for my field Expences I am much obliged to the Gentlemen at home for taking this affair into their consideration for as I am not allowed Contingent Money by the Government, so great an Figure 6 falling on my private Fortune would be more than I possibly could bear Being at a much greater expence upon the Coast, than any Officer before

me, or # haps may be hereafter As I had the [most pait] of the time under my Command six Corps of Officers, exclusive of the [French] Prisoners, I was constantly obliged to entertain and [] on the Road

As I cannot be particular in regard to the Accts of the Monthly Expences (which I ordered to be kept) on Account of the Death of Capt Ingram at which time they were either lost or mislaid, I therefore am obliged to throw them into one Charge of four thousand Rupees & Month which You Gentlemen who are certainly well acquainted with the nature of the service must be sensible is much less than has been laid out According to which Calculation my Change is ARs Sixty thousand, being in the field fifteen months Vizt from the 12th of Novr 1759 to the 12th Febry 1761 for the Payment of which you will be pleased to give your Orders, I have the honour to be with great Esteem

Copy of a Letter from Captain Symmonds to the President and Council of Fort William concerning the Loss of the Fattee Salam

Honble Sir & Sirs

Agreable to your Orders received from M^r Williamson your Secretary, the following is the most perfect account I can give of the loss of the Fattee Salam

Having received the Orders of the President and Council of Madrass on the 26th of August I proceeded to Sea with the ship, at this time the Water the Ship made amounted to the use of [one] pump every two hours or thereabours, but as the ship got to Sea to the [] Gale and a very confused Sea that made her labour [] the Water to the use of one Pump entirely that made her labour [] the water to the use of one 1 and some [] the ship make this Water, I ordered every thing about the Evening of the 27th the Masts and Rigging down to ease the ship and in the Evening of the 27th I got Major Gordon to order a few soldiers to relieve the Lascars at the pumps, they had not done it long before the ship was cleared and the second pump laid by, and I then ordered the officers not to let the ship gain, but if she increased to set the Pump to work again these were the orders of the Night, during the Night the Ship laboured greatly and in the morning on my coming on Deck and asking the Officer what Water was in the ship, he told me 18 Inches, which surprized me as I beleive she must have been neglected, about this time the sea was very confused, and the Yaul which hung on the Quarter as high as the Mizen Chains was washed away and the People at the same time called from the Main top, the Main topmast was sprung, the Main Topsail was immediately taken in to save the Mast, the ship increasing her Water all the Pumps were set to work and as she had increased to three feet, I ordered all the Anchors except one or two to be cut away and as many of the Guns as could be got at to be thrown overboard, likewise the Forehold to be opened and the Goods to be thrown overboard as I was apprehensive the Leak was forward about the Finding we did not gain with all the Pumps going I ordered to bale at the Main Hatchway, while the Pumps worked We held our own but as they frequently Choaked the ship gained, and the third officer who had been placed in the Well came frequently to acquaint me the ship gained fast, and that there was a great deal of Water in the Ship I asked the Chief Mates opinion as to the Ship, he declared he looked upon her gone, which I have heared the second Mate should also say, but this I did not hear myself, [] for the Land with the Advice of the Chief Mate, but the more we haul'd [.] it was we tryed her on the other Tact but all the same The after [] thing that came to hand to be thrown overboard, but it had very little or no Effect, as the People became confused As the ship appeared to be inevitably [sic] gone I ordered the Pinnace off the Booms, but they did not get her out, the Long Boat being almost full of People and everything in this situation I was apprehensive the Boat would be cut away, and was the Reason I took to the Boat sooner than I otherwise should have done

After quitting the ship (which I was desirous of laying by but the whole in the Boat opposed it least they should fire from the Ship) We drove some Distance, the ship thin [sic] appeared to me ungovernable, the Boat being put before the Wind by the Voice of every Body in her, we soon after saw the Foremast and Main topmast of the ship gone her Head then laying in shore

The Lattitude as well as I can judge by reckoning was 15° 10'' or 20 N° and about 2 Degrees to the Eastward of Madrass

I have viewed the Washing Godowns & Choultrys at Bandipollam, and have made an Estimate thereof, they may be repaired and put in as good a Condition as they were formerly for about four hundred (400) Pagodas, which if you approve of, shall be glad to have your Orders as soon as possible as they will take some Months to finish

There are many Articles remaining at Pondicherry which will be of great service to this Place, beg you will give me permission to take from thence what I may want

The Enclosed Indents are much wanted at this Place, which I hope you will order to be complied with

PRESIDENT & GOVERNOR &C* COUNCIL OF FORT ST GEORGE HONBLE SIR & SIRS

I have received your Favor of the 28th November with the Inclosed Extract from the Minutes of Consultation, and shall as far as in me lies regulate the transactions at this Settlement agreeable thereto, at the same time I hope your Honor &c* will pardon me if induced by the necessity I am sensible there is for a further Allowance to the Gun Peons (to enable them to maintain their Familys I take the Liberty to request the favor you will permit me to Increase the Pay of each [Half or] at least [a Quarter] of a Rupee Monthly—I am likewise to hope you will [permit] me to retain the Packers in pay, because if I discharge [them they will go] elsewhere to seek for a livelihood, and perhaps not have the Inclination to return when their assistance cannot be dispensed with in carrying on an Investment

In obedience to the Minutes of Consultⁿ respecting the sending up the Serjeants Corporals, Drummers and Matrosses, I have shipp'd as many of them as I could on the Ann snow as # List Inclosed, one of the Serjeants who is sickly and a private Matross go likewise on the Seahorse Schooner, the remainder which I likewise inclose a List of are all English and Germans, men well behaved & whom I put the greatest Confidence in, as they have most of them Wives brought up in this Place, and have quitted the Country Service with disgust, whereas the Men you may think proper to send me from Madrass, not being acquainted with the nature of the Country service, and hearing the Extraordinary Pay the Rajah allowes, part of them may be gained upon by his Emissarvs (which are always ready upon these Occasions) to desert, for these reasons and because they took service in Condition of not being sent elsewhere, I hope your Honor &ca will be pleased to let them remain here either as Train or Military, and be incorporated with such as you may judge proper to send me to make up my Compliment, to Command which I hope you will think it expedient to end a Commission'd Officer who will be of the greatest Service on any emergency which I know not how soon may happen as the Country is already so much alarmed (on account of the Rajahs having received advice that a Body of Marattas is preparing to March into the Country) that it has nearly put an entire stop to the Inland Trade

Ten of the Military which were landed from [the Leopard] Snow come likewise by this Conveyance, the other two have deserted, as have likewise Five belonging to this Place

Having very Ill Health I should be obliged to your Honour &ca for an Assistant, and should esteem it as a particular favor it you would permit Mr Calland to be the Person

The Wares and Stores which I indented for last Year at least such part of them as you shall judge necessary for the service of this Settlement, I hope you'll be pleased to send me as early as possible, particularly some stationary of which I have scarce any to use

I enclose your Honor &ca the Journal Parcels & Cash Account for last Month, and am with the greatest Esteem

PRESIDENT & GOVERNOR &CA COUNCIL AT FORT ST GEORGE

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

In our last dated the 7th December We acquainted you of the arrival of the Holdernesse, We have now the pleasure to advise you that the Fox and Warren have likewise safely imported as well as our Honble Masters Snow Syren

By these conveyanc[s] We have [received] your several favors of the 23, 25, 26 & 27 October [] likewise the several Consignments of Red Wood

The Plassey was dispatched from Ingellee for Europe the 28th Ultimo and We hope the Holdernesse will be fully laden by the end of this Month The Warren shall also have her full lading but shall be directed to call at Madras & as we shall furnish you with one hundred Tons of Saltpetre over & above the Warrens Cargo it will be in your power either to unlade from the Warren so many Tons of Salt Petre as will enable her to take in the Bales you may have ready, or to dispatch her immediately for Europe without making any alteration in her Cargo and to send your bales with the other hundred Tons of Salt Petre by the Admiral Watson or Royal George

In consequence of your proposal to our Select Committee We have destined the Fox for a Voyage to the French Islands, but as she will be early enough in the Season to admit of her Calling at Madras & Bencoolen We purpose to dispatch her first to You We shall lade on her a quantity of Rice and Pease with the Gunnies and other Articles necessary for the supply of the West Coast & the Artificers We have entertained for their Service We shall send on her We shall lade on her likewise the Provisions for His Majestys Squadron, the Cloathing for the Companies of Royal Artillery the Chest of Gold for Coll Drapers Regiment & the Coral Consignments which came on the Plassey with such articles of your Indent of the 5th Octr as are in our Warehouse

We received into our Warehouse last year twenty seven Cases of Cloathing consigned by the Agent for cloathing at Madras for the use of the Military here, but upon examination We find [that they] are all suited to the Uniform of your Troops, and will not answer for ours, for which reason, We shall return them on the Fox & as all these are Articles that may be kept at hand, that ship need not meet with any detention at Madras, but may be forwarded immediately to Bencoolen where the Gentlemen may take out what part of the Provisions may be necessary & dispatch her with the rest to the French Islands

The Broad Cloth consigned to You on the Plassey We intend to dispose of here as We have received but a small quantity and believe it will meet with an advantageous sale. The Copper & Lead We shall send you on freight as well as the hundred Tons of Salt Petre beforementioned and the three hundred Candies of Jaggree you wrote for, as the putting them on board the Fox would occasion too long a detention at Madras, & to lade them on the Warren would break in upon her Europe Cargo.

We mentioned in our last the Death of Mr Butler & We have since had the misfortune to lose our other Chaplain Mr Cape If Mr More is yet at Fort St George & is inclined to come down to Bengal We will venture to restore him to his station here till the Company's Pleasure shall be signified to Us in answer to what we wrote in his favor by the Hawke

The Workmen are now employed pulling down the French Factory which I hope will be compleated by the end of the Month when the Materials shall be transported to Devee

The Boats agreeable to Your Orders shall be put up to publick sale, tho' I believe they will fetch but little as they are very Old and out of Repair, and in future the Company shall be furnished with Boats at the cheapest Rate procurable

Conformable to your directions I have visited the several Guards and Barracks, and the different parts in the Factory House where Lamps are absolutely Necessary for the Publick officers and Servants and I find seven seers are required for one Night Expence which at 43 Seer P Rupee will amount to Forty five Rupees. The Redwood \$\mathbb{P}\$ those ships is not yet sold being loath to lower the Price of it here but We hope to dispose of it soon and You will Please to continue to supply Us as usual Conformable to the Companys Instructions and with any other Commodity You imagine may sell for Proffit here and for Your Information We enclose You a Price Current

It has been a Great disappointment Your not being able to supply our Treasury with any Money Neither have We had the hoped for supply from Bombay which makes the stock to be left with the Residents here too small to answer in full the Companys intentions of buying Teas &c^a Goods at a cheaper rate during the absence of the European shipping However as the Glorious success You have had on Your Coast & elsewhere has in a manner finished the War in India We hope the Call for Money will be much lessned and You enabled to send large suplys [sic] to Canton

We have divided the Eighty French Prisoners You sent us on Our several ships bound to Europe and here We are to remark that when Capt Jackson had got out to sea clear of Madras He found two French Prisoners Namely Toutemou a surgeon and [a serjeant] who had gott on board clandestinely without any Order from You, however he carries them forward for England

Inclosed you have an account of what Your Presidency stands Indebted In our Books amounting to Tales 3999-600- Which we desire You will remitt hither ## the first opportunity

We are now dispatching Our first Division of Ships for Europe consisting of the Norfolk, Duke of Richmond, Triton, Neptune, Prince Henry & Pitt and the Worcester and Prince George will be dispatched as soon as possible after them

The Princess Augusta Caernarvon and Warwick were dispatched hence for England the 2^d July But the two former having for twelve Weeks in vain attempted to proceed by the Pitts Passage returned hither and stay to Join our first Division of ships

Our Honble Masters are pleased to allow Us a Commission of 5 \$\mathbb{P}\$ Cent on the Produce of that Cargoe at Fort St George and inform us that they have given You Directions to transmit to them by the first Conveyance after the Sale of the said Cargo an account of the sales that they may settle our accounts thereof according thereto We make no doubt but you will comply with this their Order

There are at this Port of [Canton bound] for Europe 2 Dutch I Sweed & 1 Dane and the [] Ormston for Calcutta, there were designed for this Port One other Danish Ship not arrived & One Sweed which has been Wrecked to the Eastward of this Port all the People saved with forty Nine Chests of Silver, part of what she had on board all the Rest of her Silver & Her Cargo entirely lost

The affairs here with the Government and Combination of the Merchants remain in the same situation as they were in the last Year, However We are Happy in having bought our Cargoes at considerable cheaper rates than any of the other Europeans

GENTLEMEN

At Malacca I was under the Necessity of borrowing [money] for the Use of my Ship and the Governor who was the only person who could lend me chose to be paid at Madrass, I therefore took the Liberty of Drawing Bill on the Governor & Council of Madrass on my owners account to the Value of One thousand Spanish Dollars which Bills I beg Gentlemen you will honour by furmshing that sum on my Owners Account as Agents to the Honble Company on the Respondentia Terms Mentioned in the Charter Party and of which I shall the first Opportunity give the Honble Court of Directors Advice At Malacca We heard of three French Men of War being at Batavia the beginning of last October and by a Vessel that was at Bencoolen the 8th of October, we learnt the Place at that time was quiet in our possession The Cuddalore Schooner from Manilha passed Malacca the 1st or 2d of this Instant The Admiral Watson was to sail a few days after the schooner but when We left Malacca which was the 20th Instant she had not arrived there The Augusta Warwick and Caernarvon left Macao for Europe July the 12th 1761, we did all in our Power to go back through the Pitts Passage but being too late could not gain our point. All the ships were very near being lost Sept 4th 1761 on one of the Islands in the So Seas in the Lattitude of 4 30 N° and Longitude from the Island Botet Tobago Xema which lies off the southend of Formosa 9° 26" E^t Sep^t the 5th lost Company with the Warwick, Sept the 14th on Consulting with Capt Baddison we resolved to go back for China Judging it neither safe or proffitable to either Company or Owners longer to attempt that Rout We arrived safe at Macao October 14th 1761, the Augusta got there the day before us In this Fruitless and Dangerous attempt the Augusta lost her Head and the Rails thereof Damaged her Rigging greatly and both ships were so much strained that we were obliged to have them new Caulked in Canton River We sprung our Foremast and Bowsprit and greatly Damaged our sails and Rigging and put our owners to upwards of Two thousand Pounds Expence

We sailed now from Canton Decr 21st 1761 (in my Letter from Malacca I say the 19th but that is an Error [] there the Worcester Capt Hall and the Prince George Capt Ross and one Sweed one Dane and One Dutch ship all which ships were to sail about a Month after us, the Sweed lost a ship on the Pratoes last year they had on board sixty five thousand Pounds in Spanish Dollars of which they Fished up Forty nine and had an Expedition on foot to try for more Messrs Blount Garland Smith and Rous Stay Residents for the Honble Company in China, The Muxadabad Country ship sailed from Malacca for Bengal the 16th of January 1762 The following ships are in Company bound for England Vizt The Neptune Capt Purling, the Norfolk, Bonham, the Duke of Richmond Godfrey, the Princess Augusta Baddison, the Prince Henry Haggis, the Pitt Jackson & the Triton Barkley The French ships that were at Batavia were as follows the Comte Dortois Monsr Joanni of 64 Guns, the Comte Durgeirson Monsr Morison a Frigate and Le Fortune a Frigate

Batavia, and the West Coast both which you will please to forward by the first Opportunity

We have advanced Cap^t Hart at several times for the use of the Company of His Majestys 96th Regiment under his Command the sum of five Thousand Four hundred Arcot Rupees, His bill on Colonel Monson for Eight hundred Arcots We sent you in our Letter of the 3^d October, and the receipts for the other Sums We now enclose that you may recover the Amount

We received a Representation from Mr Senior of the Losses he sustained in a Voyage to Queda in the Helen Snow Capt Miller, the King having detained Debts and Effects to the amount of Thirty thousand Rupees, alledging for reason that one of his Vessels had been seized and Confiscated with her Cargoe on the Coast. The Owners of the Charlotte Schooner have also demands upon the King, which he refuses to pay for the same reason, the Accounts of which are in the Hands of Dawsonne Drake Esqr. We are apprized your honor &catook this step at the Instance of Capt. Mackmath towards satisfying his Losses in the Snow Northumberland, but as these Disputes now affect all. Traders to those parts, We think it necessary that some general Resolution should be taken either to accomodate affairs, between you and the King of Queda, if you think there is a possibility of obtaining satisfaction by that means, or else to endeavor to make Reprisals in good earnest and apply to the Commander in Chief of His Majesty's squadron for his Assistance. The Merchants belonging to this Place being at length all arrived, I acquainted them with the particular Orders received from your Honour &c^a respecting the carrying on an Investment, after taking time to consider of them they acquainted me, that as it had always been customary for the best of Cloths provided at this Settlement to consist for the Ordinary of no more than Thirteen and One half Punjums, of One hundred and twenty Threads each the Midling of Seventeen and Seventeen & One half Punjums and the Fine of Twenty and Iwenty & one half Punjums they could not engage to bring Cloths of so superiour a Quality as those demanded (Vizthe Sixteen Punjum [sic] for the Ordinary, Eighteen Punjum for the Midling and Twenty four Punjum for the fine) to serve the purpose of an Investment upon any terms, neither could they furnish the necessary supplys of Cloth without the money being first advanced them, for that Purpose as usual, but that admitting the Money was to be advanced, and the same Quality of Cloth taken as usual, they were ready to let me know their proposals, to which I replyed that I had ready acquainted them I was not authorised to come to any conclusion with them in this Affair, but only to receive their sealed Proposals and transmit them to your Honour

&c^a in doing which I recommended it to them to act in the most candid manner, in order that no time mght be lost, they accordingly delivered me the Inclosed which I hope will prove to your Honor &c^a Satisfaction

I also transmit an account of all the stores at Devee, and in this Garrison, which were found when the Place was taken, and have not yet been brought to Account, which I request may be Returned with the Prices affixed to each Article, that the Book commenting 1st May 1762 may be regularly Opened

Mr Andrews was directed to continue the Customs here upon the same footing they were in the time of the French, I beg leave to remark were very Irregular for they followed the Methods practised by the Moors when they were Masters of the Government, which they took care should be particularly favorable to themselves, as they paid only six Rupees Bale of Raw Silk & Piece Goods from Bengal, and three Cent on all other Goods, when Europeans and Gentoos were obliged to pay 5 Cent on every kind of Goods, this is calculated to throw all the Trade of the Port into the Moors hands, and naturally must produce discontent 6 Rupees Bale on Bengal Goods is not more 1½ Cent, it is true those Goods are not sold here but sent up to Hidrobad, and as the Juncans on the Road are considerable they may require some Indulgence I have talked to several Merchants on this subject, and I have reason to believe if the Customs on Raw Silk and Piece Goods was raised to three Madrass Pagodas Bale of 2½ Maund, they would be contented, the Customs on all other Goods I think might be the same as to Europeans & Gentoos, if your Honor &coapprove of this, I will give Publick Notice that it will be always so in future

When Colonel Forde Lett out this Country he gave to the Renters of Nizampatam, six Islands of Devee & Tondurro Bondurra, each a Horse and Cloaths value six hundred Rupees, & to all the other Renters a Shaul value about Fifty Rupees, this was a Custom with the French as the Renters will no doubt expect the same Favor now, I must beg your Orders on this head

Honble Sir & Sirs

Both the private Vessells which sailed hence for your Port left behind (and I have reason to think on purpose) the Letters which I adressed [sic] Your Honor &c2 Council and intended to go by them, I find since that the advices which they contained have been anticipated to you by Captain Vincent, who dispatched the Boneta Ketch from Fort Marlborough, which I hope arrived safe, I conclude also that the Osterly has been sent to the Malabar Coast, on the surmise of a French 64 Gun Ship, dismasted, being near the Road of Bencoolen I am at a Loss what to think of that unfortunate Settlement, having received no Recent Advices the I dispatched two Vessells thither in October, the miserable Condition it was in, joined to a sickness which reigned there as if it was the Plague, make me dread that a Fatality still attends that Place I beg leave to refer Your Honor &ca Council to the Copies of the Letters here inclosed for Particulars of the French Ships from the Islands which have been here, and Having received none of your Commands # the departed the 7th Ultimo Policat, nor Negapatam ships which imported here lately, I have not to add, but that I am with due Respect

To the Honble the Governor & Council at Fort Marlborough
Honble Sir & Sirs

By the accompanying Packet dated 8th Instant you will see that I had that day dispatched unto you the Honble Companys Ketch Nancy, she had no sooner weighed to proceed on her Voyage when I reced Intelligence of there being three French Men of War in the Streights of Sunda, I therefore sent a Boat immediately after her (which had the Good Fortune to come up with her) with orders to return into this Road, the 15th present in the Evening the said Fiench Ships came to an Anchor here, One of them is a Man of War carrying 64 Guns, and the other two are Companys Ships of which one is pierced for fifty Guns, the second is a Frigate and mounting 16 Guns They have many Military and Coffrees on board, seem to be deeply loaded with Merchandize, thiefly consisting of Coffee and Iron for sale at this place, from what I can learn of their Motions here, there is an appearance of their staying some time, tho, its probable and I am afraid of their intentions to cruize for our Shipping, Inclosed is Copy of a Letter wrote to any English Commander, that may be met with in entering the Streights of Sunda, which I hope will happily fall into the hands of some one, that may have been dispatched hither, by Your Honoi &c Council I have sanguine hopes that this advice will reach you soon enough, to take the necessary measures, for the securing the Honble Companys Effects, and vourselves against any design of the Enemy, should they be projecting an Expedition to the West Coast, which it is more than likely they will do, if our situation there is communicated to them Your Honor &ca Council are the best Judges what steps are proper to be taken at this Juncture and I am unacquainted with Our Honble Masters affairs there at this time, I can only observe to you in general, with respect to keeping possession of the Country, there is no doubt several contiguous places to Marlbro, were capable to be defended by a handfull of Men, against the Enemy that is now here, provided the Chiefs of the Country will only afford you their assistance and supply provisions, which I imagine can hardly be doubted at present, from the late experience they have had of the oppressions by the French, against whom I am informed they are highly exasperated, If the Malays seem heartly to espouse the Continuance of the English, they will easily point out to you many places of secure retirement

In the late unfortunate expedition for us against the West Coast, Moco Moro was found to be a place of the greatest difficulty to be taken of any of our Honble Masters Settlements, by reason of the great risques that are unavoidably run in landing the Men, at that time many were drowned, and the Count very narrowly escaped the like fate notwithstanding the Weather was as favorable, as it had ever been known, and as it is now, about the time, for the North West Winds to blow, any further attempt against that Place, will render it much more hazardous and precarious, The Count d'Estaing himself declared, he would dety any one to succeed was he to oppose their landing with only 150 Men, & had we done so, with the small force we had of but thirty men, the Count himself would have been made Prisoner The French ships have no Guns run out at their lower ports, which are open and from their usual Parade, if they had any one would imagine, they would shew them, The reason may be, that they are deep loaded and from reconnoitring them in the Road, in smooth Water, it is striking that in any thing of a Sea they could not in their present situation use their lower Tier in acton, they have no heavy metal, Nine Pounders are the heaviest unless they should have Guns on board for their Lower Deck, which I apprehend would be twelves, they have omitted nothing to make them selves appear formidable by figures of Grenadiers &ca on their Quarters the nearness of one Porthole to another, it seems impossible that they could engage, with as many Guns as there are Portholes, which have I believe been The Number of Men in the three ships I verily believe pierced to intimidate cannot exceed Twelve hundred, I am equally of opinion that one of our Ships with her Compliment of Men in health and clear for action, would be a match to lay alongside either of them, notwithstanding the superiority of Numbers, for the more Men they had, the greater havock would be made amongst them The largest ship is the L'Argenson which has been in almost all the Engagemen s with Admiral Pocock, on the Coast except the last, and was condemned at the Islands, above eighteen months ago, In observing all their actions I think they are come to load provisions for the Mauritius, where they are in great want, but their destination [sic] may be altered They have taken Houses & tomorrow request at Council Permission to sell their Iron &c2 which cannot be landed in a hurry, I hope the North West Monsoon will break in before they can effect it, In a few days I hope to dispatch to Your Honor &ca Council In the interim it will be necessary that you station Buggasses further advices and Coffrees at Manna and Salooma, to come express to give you notice of any sail being in sight standing your way, It is unlucky my first dispatch should be on so disagreeable subject wishing for more agreable Topicks to address you I remain with great respect

SIR

This my third endeavour to convey you advices, and I wish it may be more successfull than the two preceeding ones, The return of the Panchellong with Thomas Lines when she had made Saloomah Hills, gave me the greatest uneasiness, a violent Gale of Wind which carried away her Masts, drove her from Anchor, together with contrary Currents, rendered her fetching Fort Marlbro impossible, no remedy but patience, This was not the only mortifying News which arrived at the same hour as she did, I was also informed that your Boat and twelve people, were made Prisoners on board a French Ship, which lay dismasted and well in Shore, a few leagues to the southward of Buffalo point. It is a pity that one should suffer by doing humane acts, in the present case it must be submitted to, for I fear the Chevalier de Johannes, will not deliver them to me here, not even on the paying a considerable Ransom, it being inconsistent with his order to do so, however I shall use my Efforts, and Interest to procure their enlargement, which if not obtainable, they will be sent from hence to the Islands, and thence to Europe

The dismasted French Ship abovementioned was the Mamoody formerly taken out of the Road of Muscat by the Count D'Estaing She parted from the Mauritius in Company with the three Ships which are here. She herself is now near Onrust, one of the officers is come on shore and assistance gone out to her, she was in a very sickly condition [only twelve Guns, and if your Boats Crew had been armed they might easily have carried her It appears to me that the French ships that are in this Road from all their Measures and Circumstances are really destined to the Islands to throw in Provisions, which they were greatly in want of and full of assurance, that they should be attacked there by the English, I imagine they will leave this Place in twenty days at From what I can learn they have plenty of ships as well as Men at the Mauritius, so that is very probable some of them will be dispatched on cruizing stations to intercept our Trade, it must be my particular study to carry necessary intelligence to our China Ships if possible, for which reason, I could on no consideration think of leaving this place at present, Cap[‡] Balneaves arrived here last Night, as did the Success Snow a few days before By the former I received the Councils Letter dated the 22^d August which demands no Reply I am very sorry that sickness reigns among you, of which Our Enemies have notice by examining your Boats crew If no reinforcement is arrived I would for many reasons recommend Moco Moco, it is a healthy plentyfull Country, defensible by a handfull & in this Monsoon impossible to land at The Correspondence with & application you have received from the Sultan, will furnish you with another reason, I am very much affraid, there will be some tricks played in that quarter

It is with much satisfaction we observe the Gentlemen at Bengal have sent you a supply of Money for compleating the Stocks of any of our Honble Masters China Ships, in consequence of which We have directed the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry, after putting on Board as much Pepper as they may be able, to dispatch this ship the True Briton, to your Honor &ca to receive as much Treasure as with what Goods she has taken in here and the above Pepper will make her stock equal to Forty Thousand Pounds agreable to our Honble Masters Commands, The Chief and Factors will accordingly transmit you [a calculate] of her stock which we hope your Honour &ca will be able to compleat, and dispatch her with all possible Expedition to China

Your Honour &c* have been already apprized of our Intentions to send the Royal Captain to Bengal with a Cargo of Cotton but as the above supply of Money may probably enable you, to add such a Sum in Treasure, as with the Cotton, will make up the stock recommended by our Honble Masters for such ships as may be dispatched for China under the denomination of casual ships We shall order her to touch at your Port for that purpose, as we imagine this Method of employing her will prove much more agreable to the Honble Company than sending her to Bengal, which however your Honour &c* will be pleased to do, should it be out of your power to make her up a stock for China

The Gunpowder received from the Stretham in 1759 more than invoiced must have belonged to the ship as none was laden on her for Bengal We shall on the return of the America & Falmouth (which we have not yet heard of) send you a supply of this Article

Immediately upon the receipt of your Orders concerning the Investment I forwarded a Copy of them and the Minutes of Council to Mr Dolben at Bandarmalanka, & desired he would call all the Merchants before him [& acq[uaint them that you agreed to the several Prices in their sealed proposals and would make them an advance of 25 | Cent on the contract To this last I thought they would Object but to my very great surprise I yesterday received the inclosed Letter from Mr Dolben, by which it appears they will not

undertake the Investment at the Prices they themselves proposed plea of your new Orders to have Cloth 16, 18 & 24 Punjums it can have no weight as they well know that in all their [contracts with] the Company those were the Number of Punjums [tho' they] they used to deliver 12, 16 & 20 Punjums tho' they] freely confess that instead of it And when they came here to make their Proposals, I assured them not one peice of such stuff as they have brought of late Years would be accepted, nor any O Chop allowed I must own myself utterly at a Loss what to say to this extraordinary Behaviour, as I can Mr Dolben seems to believe it may be occasioned in no shape Account for it by the Dutch at Policote & Jaggernautporem having raised the Prices of Cloth but I know this to be an old pretence, they offer to make new Musters of real 16, 18 & 24 Punjums that your Honor &ca may be sensible of the great difference between that & what they hitherto furnished altho this will be attended with the inconvenience of delaying the Investment I now see no other Measure to be taken with them, you will observe they have omitted telling what Price they will make the 16, 18 & 24 Penguim I have wrote to Mr Dolben to know & shall forward the Answer to you the Moment I receive it

The Flagstaff at Bandarmalanka was Blown down a few days past & it is too rotten to be of any further service, it will cost about about 70 Pagodas to set a new one which shall be done if it meets with your Approbation, it is of great use in guiding the Vessells into the River

Inclosed you will receive the Monthly Accounts for May

I am obliged by your Favor of the 21st past with Copy of the President & Councils Letter & Extract of Minutes of Consultation, upon receipt of which I immediately wrote to [] the Merchants those of Munda Pettah having been gone [] arrived but yesterday which is the reason I have not replyed to it sooner

In Obedience to the Orders & Directions contained therein I have laid before the Merchants every thing relating to the Investment, acquainting them of the great complaints made of the Cloths & more particularly the Ordinary, that the Company were resolved to have none without they could have it of a much better sortment than what has been delivered in latterly & that no O chop or short Measure of any kind would be accepted, but that the Cloths must be made in such a manner as that they must Measure when washed two & one quarter Covids Broad & seventy two Covids Long (as the Merchants have had an Ill Custom of stretching there Cloths brown in those Parts which come to the Measuring Pole which must have given rise to the Complaint of the Cloth being barely vard wide as the Cloth after being washed must return to its natural Breadth), that all due Encouragement wou'd be given them and their Cloth sorted to good Numbers if it deserved it, but that they must reduce the Number 2 which was too high in Proportion to the other Numbers & that their Cloths must consist of 16, 18 & 24 Punjums which is the Number of threads mentioned in the President & Councils Letter & finally that they were under a great Obligation to the Pre-

sident & Council for complying with their Proposals as also of the advance which they were pleased to allow of one quarter of the Value, both which were done only in Consideration of the improvement of the Manufacture and that they might have no excuse whatever for bringing in bad Cloth, the Merchants desired leave to withdraw & presently returned & gave me the following Answer

That as the President & Council were pleased to acqua[int] them of being under an obligation so they shou'd acknowledge [it] on all occasions and that the advance of one Quarter of the value of the Cloth was very reasonable and as much as they desired, but that they must beg leave to lay before the President and Council their incapacity to bring in Cloths of [supe]rior a quality to what they brought in formerly that [] under no Expectation of an order for 16, 18 & 24 [] the proposals they [.] the same sorts as they have been accustomed to deliver only that it shou'd be good of those Sorts and full Measure that the Cloths provided before were called 15, 19 & 23 Punjums, but that in reality the Cloth never counted in threads more than 12, 16 & 20 Punjums, that Cloths of 16, 18 & 24 Punjums right tale will cost considerably more from the Weavers Hands than the Prices delivered in their Proposals which was for Cloth of the old Manufacture, & that therefore they cannot help declining to make any Contract with the Company on these Terms which shou'd they accept they must inevitably lose so much that it wou'd render them incapable ever to pay in their Ballance, that the Prices in the Proposals were the same they formerly received & that the same sort of Cloths that they used to deliver for those Prices, they can deliver now, but that as the President & Council have been pleased since they have given in their Proposals to send a new Order for a new Sortment of Cloth which was impossible for them to foresee, they are thereby made unable to make a contract with the Company except on such terms as they gave in their Proposals for, that if the President & Council will please to give them leave they will make new Musters of the three different sorts of 16, 18 & 24 Punjms at which time they say the President & Council will be sensible from the great difference in the Cloth of their Inability to deliver it at the Prices given in those Proposals

Lackum Chitty gave in his Answer exactly to the same Purport as the other Merchants

It is a Matter of much concern to me that my utmost endeavors on this occasion to persuade the Merchants to Contract on the above terms were with [] with them, they one & all declaring that it was impossible for the [m] to undertake it

I acquainted you in my Letter of the 5th Inst^t [] Merchants had refused to stand to their [] under Pretence of new orders for 1762—8-A

wou'd contract to furnish Cloth of those Punjums Mr Dolben in reply writes, that he called upon the Merchants to propose their Terms when Lachim Chittee Mulloo, Shanah Antravidee, Merah Mulloo & Cauma Chittee Paupiah assured him they could not undertake to make Cloth of 16, 18 & 24 Penjums, as they cannot induce the Weavers to undertake it and that should they give in proposals, for what they think such cloth worth they should only gain displeasure as was even the Company to agree thereto, that no Quantity of such Cloth could be procured, for as the Dutch buy Cloth of the old Manufacture the Weavers will never be persuaded to set about a New one

Lackim Chittee Erapah & Gundah Ommiah say notwithstanding the Punjums Cloth may be good or bad, according to the Goodness or badness of the Woof or cross threads, & that therefore without they see a Muster for a standard they cannot give any proposals, that if there is no Muster they will make one themselves

As it seems impossible to bring the Merchants to undertake to make Cloth with the Number of Threads prescribed by our Honble Masters List of Investment, I humbly offer it to your consideration whether as the Cloth chiefly complained of is the Ordinary it would not be most advisable to let that Article be entirely provided at Vizagapatam where it has always been cheaper & better than at Ingeram or Bandarmalanka & Contract on the Old Terms for the fine & Middling which I heard is esteemed better than what has been provided at Vizagapatam, notwithstanding the Merchants Confession that it is only 16 & 20 Punjums

Honble Sir & Sirs

1st The Plassie being to proceed to Batavia to carry thither Mr Marriot, get some repair and return hither with the necessary Articles we are in Want of, since no opportunity has offered before, that I cou'd address your Honour &ca I am willing to trust the Chance of a Conveyance from Thence, though as that is precarious & perhaps may bring you these Advices later than those I shall send in the Osterly, which I hope to dispatch by the Time you have stipulated, I shall be less full in this Letter abstracting only the Minutes of what has passed with me since I left Madras, Indeed I wrote a few Lines to go by a Vessel we met at Sea bound to Bengal, but through an Accident she left us without my Letter, it was of no Consequence but to acquaint of our being obliged to cut out of Tranquebar Road, where we saw nothing of the Vessel we went in Quest of, and the Weather was too bad to stay on the Coast to search further, I presume your Honour &ca heard of us from thence, as I wrote a short Letter on Shore for Information about the Sloop as soon as we came to Anchor

2ND We got clear of the Land, I cannot say without Damage from the Gale, for besides the Loss of a great Part of our live stock, the Injury done to most of the Cargo by Water that was shipped is indeed considerable

Winds, which were frequent obstacles to us the whole way to Padang, & it was still the more disagreeable by Reason of the Want of sufficient Provisions for the Seapoys as well as Ships Company, the Quantity that was laid in being far from equal to the purpose, it was to serve, the consequence was that we were obliged to break in upon our Marlbro Consignment, which indeed contributes to so many Calls that I fear We shall be in Distress long before we have fresh Supplys Rice, Doll & Ghee (material Articles for our Principal People) are near expended already, the two last of which we can only expect from the Coast or Bay, & I have besides three ship [sic] two snows & Sloop craviny them Our Money is likewise subject also to the like Consumption The Earl Temple, Diligent Snow, the Plassie a Ketch and a Sloop have each their demand upon me for Cash, the two former are very large, since the one claims a great Part of the Crews Wages, & the other the whole which I am obliged to pay as will appear to your Honour &ca more at large, when I address you fully by the Osterly

enough as to Entertainment, having that of the Governors House while we staid which was longer than I wished for, but the delay through want of Boats, made it unavoidable, I delivered your Honour &ca Letter & explained our wants to the Governor & Council which they would not engage to supply, before they were assured We had no hostile Intentions with which Captain Vincent had threatened them Your Honour &ca's Precaution by the Reference to Batavia enabled me to say I had no such Commission (the Letters that passed shall wait on you from hence) This procured us Liberty to purchase sixty Head of Cattle & other usefull Articles, & the service of the Cattle in clearing of the Ground is of most material benefit, though we have now only two Thirds of the Number, Boats we could not obtain at Padang & the Want of them We are severely sensible of, as will be seen when I speak of the Shipping I had the good Fortune to meet with a small Sloop three Days before our Departure which we find of Use

- The 21st January we went on Board for Moco Moco but were six Days in getting there, where I found two Gentlemen placed by Captain Vincent had the young Sultan & others of the Family on Board the Day after my Arrival, & purposed going on shore, but the Loss of one Boat out of two, & the high surf of the Qualloe preventing a Communication with the Shore another Day, made it too dangerous to risque the want of Water, by staying any Time so that I sent Mr Fivery with twenty five Seapoys to take Charge of the Settlement & Mr Idell having Business of his own to transact there, accompanied him with the Presents for the Old Sultan (the young one receiving his on Board) To this Gentleman, I gave Directions to procure me an Exact Account of the State of the Place, of which I shall speak hereafter, Having done all I could at Moco Moco, We sailed and arrived here the 4th Ultimo, where appeared such a scene, as cannot be conceived from description A Guard of about twelve emaciated Men in red Coast, that seemed to come to salute us from those who where [sic] in their Graves, shewed near half the Garrison including eleven Coffrees & the small remains of the Covenant Servants bore equal Testimony in their Countenances of what they had undergone The two I bought with me from Moco Moco made the Number five, the whole of whom to this Day have only Intervals The Habitations (barely coverings from of Health, & two of them scarce any the Weather) are very unsuitable Commodations for those who dwell in them, yet such as they are they greatly exceed what they found on the Landing first from the China ships, when every one was exposed to the Inclemency of the Weather, the Destruction of above one hundred & fifty People
- Vincent, I desired he would by writing afford me some insight to the Condition of the Place & of the steps he had taken towards forming it into Order, accordingly when his Health permitted him he drew up a Recital of his transactions which prove his having taken much pains, although the Difficulties he laboured under obstructed in a great Measure his Design. I likewise directed Captherazer, the Eldest Officer of the Military to lay before me what came under his Cognisance which he has done, as will be seen by your Honour &ca in the Copy of his Letter, which I purpose transmitting by the Osterly as well as Captain Vincent's Report & some others which the Assistance I have is not sufficient for ye Transcribeing in Time, neither would it be so secure to send them by the Channel this goes
- 7th The Day after our arrival came in here the Bonita Ketch Captain Forrest from Bengall & sailed in a few days on a Coasting Voyage
- 8th On the 20th of February the Diligent Snow arrived from Madagascar with fifty Slaves bought for the Company, she left that Island the 22nd November had not seen the Prince Henry Packet, nor any other Vessel than one with French Colours which chased her for some Time till Night favoured an escape
- 9th. The Osterly appeared the 25th Ultimo a very wellcome sight as she contained such stores that we began to feel the want of, by her I had the Pleasure to receive your Honour's &cas Favor of the 1st & 3rd of January, the Contents of which shall be obeyed, & I am glad you thereby concur in the step, I had ventured to take concerning Mr Moor, that Gentleman assists me likewise in the Office of Secretary, which none of the new Servants can be supposed equal to, Messrs Nairne & Donstone are also both extreamly serviceable to me
- 10th Some days before the Osterly arrived a complaint being lodged against Mr John Smith late Chief Mate of the Earl Temple of his having been guilty of Sodomy & the Ships Company being most furiously enraged against him I was under the Necessity to set him aside from the Charge of that Ship which Captⁿ Vincent was so kind to undertake till we should hear of Captⁿ Foster,

the Death of that Gentleman left the Ship destitute of a Commander & as Captain Vincent had his own Ship to engage his Attention I judged Captain Macleshin (whom the Company once recommended to have their Ship the Duke) to be the only proper Person I could employ as Captain of the Temple, the Mates who were in Succession being generaly thought unfit for such a Trust & Mr Call the third Mate could not be put above them with so much Propriety as Captain Macleshin He was no sooner aboard the Ship than the whole Crew clamoured for their Wages & Discharge both which they insisted on as conformable to their Agreement with Captain Foster when they left England if they were out a Twelvemonth, it was to little purpose to Argue against this with a Copy of the contract which (the original being either at Madrass or Bombay) they denied being true, however at Length by engaging to pay them two Months Wages in Six, as that Agreement specifys & also promising they should after fetching our stores from Malacca, be dispatched to China to go from thence to Europe, they seemed appeased, though how Long the calm will last is uncertain among a set of the most desperate Fellows I hope now ever if the Letter I write to Captain Tinker meets him he will be able to relieve us with some of his People, the whole that has passed on the foregoing subjects will attend you with Captain Vincent in whose ship, I purpose sending Smith to take his Tryal The wants of the Earl of Temple are inconceivable, she requires stores of every sort, & should she ever leach England, I fear the Company will find her Service very inadequate to the Expence of Maintaing her, Joseph Tarn the Purser is also dead & the Accounts of the ship so ill kept up, that there will be scarce the satisfaction of knowing how her Charges have arose, or her Materials been used, on the Death of this Man I ordered his papers to be searched for what might be relative to the Company & what have been found are under Examination Captain Macleshin being Commander of the Ship has taken Charge of Mr Tarn's affairs as Mr Edwards the late Surgeon of the Temple has done in respect to Captain Forsters by Virtue of a joint Agreement

11th The Diligent Snow being to be employed in India I have allowed Captain Woodcoock to whom the Command has devolved to exchange such of his Europeans as he can spare for an equal Number of Lascars out of the Temple, & as it agreed by Contract that these people should receive their Wages here unless the Snow soon returns to Europe, I have been applied to for the same which I cannot refuse This Vessel being near the Burthen of one hundred Tons I am about sending her to Moco Moco for the pepper in those Parts & I am in hopes to have her return in Time to load it on the Osterly, whom I shall nevertheless order to Manna to collect there the Tonnage designed for her, & which If my Information is true is only half what those districts can furnish

12th The Nancy Ketch purchased by Mr Herbert at Batavia for the Company & loaded with Arrack Sugar &c* when her whole Cargo is taken out shall go to Croee to receive the pepper in that Neighbourhood, the scarcity of Boats & want of Warehouse Room has been the Cause of her being not yet cleared, though she arrived so long ago as November, she brought Intelligence that three French Men of War had been at Batavia besides the Mamoodie who was taken at Gomboroon & is the same Ship from which the Osterley run away, two of these were about their departure for the Mauritius with Stores & the two strongest tarryed as it was thought to wait for our China Ships, I hope however they have been disappointed

13th The Plassie being in Need of repair is proceeding for that place with Mr Marriot, whom I have instructed to send me what Plank and other Necessary's she Can bring, the particulars of which I have pointed to him. I have also by the same Conveyance addressed the General & Council, & the Commander of any Detachment from our Squadron that may be there inclosing your Letter concerning the seamen

'14th I have already mentioned to Your Honour &ca Reports to be sent you directly from hence, among which in those relating to the Company's Stores, I am too sensible you will have little cause to be satisfied, the Condition of the Place, that of the Gentlemen who had the Charge thereof, & the demands from all Quarters will I apprehend, when the whole comes to be compared, appear to have caused such a Consumption without a clear description, as nothing but unavoidable Circumstances can be an excuse for, & the Misconduct of People of the Earl Temple who are now no more has been the Destruction of many Goods for which we shall hardly to obtain recompence

15th From a Representation of Captain Macleshin that the Ballast he would want in the room of the Salt on Board the Temple would detain him a long Time to take in so that there would be no prospect of his being here in good Season to proceed to China & as We have some Salt agreed to be brought by Captain Vincent, I shall only take from the Temple Twenty Coyan & order the rest to be sold at Malacca for the Company's Account, which will occasion a Supply of that Article being necessary for us by the first Opportunity Rice likewise I fear will be scarce, therefore would request twenty Garse at least, the small remains of Doll & Ghee recovered from the Temple will be out in a very little Time & till we are recruited therewith, the poor Seapoys & Lascars will be sorely distressed

16th The Hospital Cloathing is mostly damaged but Death has provided against our feeling much want of those Things

17th What other Articles are requisite I shall recollect against my next Address

18th The People of the Country in General profess a satisfaction at our Resettlement among them & have most entered into fresh Contracts with the Company promising to attend thereto by cleansing their Gardens & setting about new Plantations, for few remain undestroyed through Neglect or Roguery, the dry Pepper in the Country being the last Harvest that seems to have been sought after or wished for by many, it is pretty considerable if the Accounts I have may be depended upon, being altogether to the Amount of six hundred Tons the most of which lyes to the Southward & the price of it, if all gathered will cut deep in our Treasure

19th Though the most considerable of the Pangaran's or Heads of the several Countrys have shewn no disgust at our coming here, on the contrary have pretended to be well pleased, the usual Artifice of the Malayas has been apparent in some to try what Scope they could take by which they might establish Precedents to their Advantage in which Tryal the Pangaran of Sillebar went a fatal Length, he was here at a general Assembly, when a Person whom Captain Vincent had sent for from Salooma where he had beeen plundering & distressing the Country, was brought to examination, & proved by his own acknowledgement guilty in part, though as the Persons were not arrived who complained of being. immediately injured, he was ordered to remain in Custody, but this Pangaran to whom the Man was related requesting that he might be permitted to go to Sillebar promising he should be forth coming when called for, I (willing to oblige the Pangaran whom I thought I might trust) committed my Prisoner to his charge but when I demanded him to return a few days after, on the Accusers coming, the people I sent the Messuage [sic] by were not suffered to take Hold I then wrote to the Pangaran requiring him to bring his Man or at least send him to me, but to as little effect, yet as he promised to come up himself I waited many Days 'till finding by preparations that I was informed were making, his Design was to resist my Power in defence of his relation, I thought it necessary by shewing at once that we were not to be trifled with to let others perceive the Conduct they had to depend upon, therefore ordered what

I judged a secure party to proceed by Night to the Village, where the Pangaran dwelt & if possible by suprize [sic] to bring away him and his Relation, but being obliged to employ Sailors in transporting the people up the River, the unruliness of them as well as our own Seapoys alarmed the Pangaran, who with his sons assaulting our People met their deaths notwithstanding all my Precautions against Acts of Violence, unless in self defence, the principal we sought made his Flight, as did another son of the Pangaran, which last I am inviting down to settle the Commotion, this Accident has at present created & I hope to make every Thing quiet in a short Time, unless the Person who was the first Cause should be able to dissuade the son from Reconciliation, & even then we may have less trouble than in the Fathers siding with this Man, & one thing makes it not so material, that is the Country thereabouts never was of Consequence in producing pepper

20th Pangoolo one of the late Pangarans of some districts about Manna though heretofore thought a very usefull Man to the Company was deposed by Captain Vincent on the complaint of his people that he was addicted to every Vice that tended to spoil the Country Captain Vincent seems clear in what he has done, but the Pangaran says he is abused, however as I have not yet seen the Manna People, I have my opinion suspended thereon, in the mean time he is allowed seven Dollars pr month to support him

21st The want of proper Persons to entrust with the Care of the Out Settlements, is as in every Branch a most sensible impediment to their Prosperity, the little help I have here is to [sic] small to execute the Business of this Place with any degree of Regularity, & without that I know not how it could be transacted at all Mr James Stevenson the Surgeon has however offered his service (as We have Mr Edwards of the Temple) to go to Croee to collect in the Pepper, & adjust the Company affairs there, in which he will be of Material use, & I must be deprived of Mr Donston's Assistance in Accounts a few Weeks while he goes to Manna to Ship the Pepper there, yet at both these places Residents will be wanting when these Gentlemen return as they must do

22nd The Condition of the Fort is such, that it must come entirely down, though it was to be fixed again on the same spot, the Bastions are not only destroyed but the Curtains undermined a considerable Length & the whole a perce of Ruins, the Apartments therein are run up with Bomboes & [Allops] for present Service but must be also removed, for substantial Work to be erected if it should be hereafter judged proper to continue the Settlement at this Place, the Godowns are of the same Materials except some whose Brick Walls are left standing, the Habitations I am about for the shelter of the Gentlemen & others are also Temporary, as the Time spent in Brick Works are too tedious considering our great want of Houses, three or four Gentlemen being now obliged to Lodge together, when sometimes two of them are down with sickness in the same Room, & if any more were to come just at this Juncture there is not a place to lodge them in, the like Necessity requires Temporary Hospitals, the Expence of all which must be repeated again must be borne, if we expect to preserve a Man alive

23d The Godowns & Houses at Out settlements are mostly ruined but I have ordered such as can be repaired to receive the pepper out of the Country, to be refitted for that purpose & temporary ones built were there were $\lceil sic \rceil$ no remains of the old Buildings

24th Your Honour &c* have already been acquainted of the Reduction among the covenanted servants, as well as the Military, the Commandant of whom Captain Lawrence died in October last, our Corps of Artillery is going the same Way, the Serjeant & one Man are dead, the rest are such debauched unruly Wretches as Capth Wells should have been more carefull in picking for this service where the greatest Care is not enough to preserve Life, which is a sure Forfeit to any Excess

25th The French Artificers like others of that Rank fall off through the same Cause as the Soldiers which the want of proper makes them the more subject to & as it is too probable, that the Dimunition of their Numbers will not stop. I have been induced to entertain two Carpenters & some other usefull People from the ships, who if not absolutely in Request now most likely will be so, when they may not be found

26th The Service Mr Stevenson may be of at the Out Settlements has led me to take into pay Mr Patrick Edwards, late Surgeon of the Earl Temple, & the Surgeons Mate of the Osterly, the French Man brought from Madras being of so little use that I shall return him by that ship

27th I have received so many Applications for Money which so many Accounts must be digested before the whole will be paid, that I defer the speaking thereof, till I can lay the same altogether before your Honour &c²

28th All the Accounts of Disbursements before I arrived are so unsettled as you will perceive in reading Captain Vincent's Letter, that it would engross the whole Time of one Person to examine & adjust the same, which there is yet no one who can give that sole Attention to, but it shall not be neglected the Moment we can set about that work

29th The Commissions granted by Captain Vincent to the Military Officers they still act under, as I think it better to be guided by your Honor &c^a in that Matter, before I confirm or alter them, on which subject I shall write by the Osterly more fully

30th I have thus run my Letter to a greater Length than I expected at setting out, but as I could not touch on every Head I thought it proper to speak something of, without some Prolixity, I must beg your patience, which will by this Means be less tryed in my next—I now conclude with my sincere congratulations on your success before Veloor & am with great Respect

It is a satisfaction to me than I can add to my Letter the Account of having pacifyed the People of Sillebar whom both fear or resentment, might have kept Longer back from coming to settle the Affairs of their Country, on the contrary they arrived here, & though concerned for the loss of their Chief, shew only an Indignation against the Man who by sheltering himself with the old Pangaran, was the real cause of his Death & has now made off, the Pangaran's Son I have invested with his Fathers Title by the Approbation of all the Head Men, & they every one promise to exert themselves in the Improvement of the Country but as their Village was notwithstanding my Injunction against Plunder stripped by the Sailors &ca they represent their Condition to be such that Humanity as well as Policy has led me to give the Pangaran one hundred dollars, & the Inhabitants of the Village whose Effects were lost sixty Dollars, with some presents of Chints an Expence very inadequate to what the Company must have sustained had these people made Head in the Country & obliged us to follow them before they were reduced, I hope therefore my Conduct herein will meet vour Honour &cas Approbation, as I am already convinced of the good Effect this stroke has produced, where might have soon found more detrimental opposition had not we shewn some such Instance of Resolution

Just as I was about sealing my Packet Mr Jas Stevenson has applyed to me to grant him Bills on your Honour &ca payable to Mr John Calland or Order, for the sum of six hundred Pagodas in Exchange for nine hundred & sixty Spanish Dollars which I have accordingly received here into the Honble Company's Cash

The Fox Captain Alexander Hume having fallen to Leeward & lain in sight to the Southward of Poolo Bay thro' an opposite Wind from the 7th instant arrived the 13th in this Road with your Honour &cas Advices under date of the 7th of March and delivered in good condition the sundry Articles consigned from the Presidency of Fort William for the use of this Settlement A supply which could not fail of proving very acceptable, and the more so as the Stores & provisions, which were shipped on the Earl Temple at Madrass, unfortunately suffered considerable Damage & Dimunition in our passage hither the Artificers are no less welcome since few of the French Men who came with me are good for any Thing

This Attention given by the Gentlemen of Bengal to our welfare, as well as the readiness with which they are pleased to offer what future Assistance may be required, I have taken particular Care to notice and acknowledge in my Letter addressed to that Presidency by this Conveyance which I leave open for your Honors &c^a perusal

The 14 Chests of Treasure your Honor &ca consigned hither were indeed a very seasonable Recruit, for the Expences I have been obliged to defray had exhausted the Stock I brought very low The particulars of my disbursement, I will endeavour to get ready by the Time the Osterly Sails

As the Fox has had such an Expeditious Passage to this Coast and now proceeds on her Voyage to Batavia I entertain great hopes of her being able to reach Madrass in Time to answer your intentions of sending her to China.

The Plassie Captⁿ Tho^s Hague sailed from hence for Batavia the 31th of last Month having on Board M¹ Marriot by whom I had the pleasure of forwarding to your Honor &c^a some Account of the Company's Affairs on this Coast I was in expectation of having it in my Power soon after the departure of that Vessel to send away the Earl Temple for Malacca, but the scarcity of Boats & other unforeseen Accidents already related have proved such impediment to the unlivering her Cargo, & supplying her with Ballast, as I have not hitherto been able to execute my Design, The detention of the Osterly has been owing to the same Cause, which Ship is now at Manna, receiving on Board pepper at that Place & M^r Stevenson who took that settlement in his Way to Croe has orders to return the ship to Malborough before the expiration of this Month as I hope to dispatch her to Madrass at all Events the beginning of May, even tho she should be sent away without the full Quantity of Pepper intended, so that you design may not be frustrated [sic] of dispatching her early this Season for Canton, By the Osterly I purpose transmitting to your Honour &c^a a farther Account of my transactions, together with Copys of such Papers relative thereto as may be necessary for your Information, a transcript of Captain Vincents Report now waits on you and another shall go by him

The Prince Henry Captain Reynolds is [not] yet arrived, we are however in hourly expectation of her [She parted] from the Fox the 14th March, but was thought to be seen again the 29th I know not if I shall be able to give her the Loading your Honour &c^a requires if I put into the Osterly & Earl Temple what was limited for them, the whole that I have account of (and even that may fall short of the representation) being not above 600 Tons, unless I may be induced to put into the Prince Henry what she will take if I find I can dispatch her in Time to answer your purpose of sending it to China this Season, and leave for the Earl Temple to receive what remains as her unavoidable detainer here may make her passage more precarious and what she may want of pepper there will be doubtless Tea sufficient to make up, I heartly wish I had authority to sell this Ship for I see plainly she will prove a much greater Expence to the Company than her Service can be equivalent to Since I wrote to your Honour &c^a last the Crew have been paid their demands, notwithstanding which Captⁿ Macleshin has been obliged to send out of the ship six of the most desperate of the sailors whom as he says were on the point of destroying him, three of them I have put into the Fox & the other three shall go off in the Osterly

Smith late Chief Mate of the Temple whom I had under arrest, in order to send to Fort St George to take his Tryal has made his Escape I believe to Batavia, his loss of commanding the Ship however is a punishment, tho not adequate to the heinousness of his Crime, inclosed your Honour &c² will receive the affidavit of his guilt, & his conduct evinces too plainly the truth of it

1st I was in great hopes of being able to have dispatched the Osterly agreable to your Honour &ca Instructions by the end of last Month, but the disappointment of my Wishes has been so unavoidable, that I persuade myself of being acquitted from Blame, there was no delay in unloading the Stores, but what the want of proper Boats and some days of bad weather occasioned, & at length when I perceived the Southwardly Winds were about to set in, I thought it prudent to order the Ship to go to Manna, where I had reason to think she would get the full Quantity of Pepper she was to take, though I directed Mr Stevenson who offered his Service on the occasion not to detain her beyond the 25th he kept her however till the 30th in consequence of a latter Permission, when he dispatched her back with only 51 6 2 12 owing to the badness of the Qualloe which was such as affor dela

6th The Plassie sailed for Batavia as has been already related

7th By advices from Moco Moco I am told the Diligent Snow arrived there the 20th of last Month, which I had hopes would have been back in time to have shifted her Pepper on board the Osterley

8th I had intended long ago to send the Nancy Ketch to Croee, but Mr Stevenson's presence at Manna being first necessary, I made use of her in clearing the Fox, whose departure was thereby expedited, that done she would have proceeded immediately to take in Mr Stevenson, had not her want of Wood obliged her to go into Poolo to cut it, and also bring from thence 20 Gun Carriages landed there from the Earl Temple, she will now sail the first fair Wind

Godown at that place, & was supplied with Wood and Water, which I know not how long it would have taken up to have compleated here, She is now ready to sail for Malacca, and I have ordered Mr Philip Manington one of the Gentlemen before there, and who understands the Dutch Language jointly with Captain Macleshin to adjust the Accounts, and bring away the Stores with all the expedition possible, having wrote to the Government [sic] there to thank them for their Care and desire their further Assistance towards the Shipping them off, I have also directed Mr Mannington again to make an Offer of one Hundred Dollars each to Messrs Koeck & de Vintz & to receive payment for the Beef & Pork mentioned in Mr Frazer's Letter

12th An unexpected Event has a good deal disconcerted me which is that of the Prince Henry Packet having touched at Natal the 13th Ultimo where Mr Russel has taken upon himself to turn out the Dutch and hoist the English Colours, the particulars of this extraordinary proceeding, your Honor &ca will see described in his own Letter of the 16th April, The Prince Henry's Detainer on this occasion must be wholly imputed to her touching at Natal, and the inconveniency it is to our present Affairs, which must be broke upon by sending thither people wanted elsewhere to keep Possession (since it is taken) proves too much the rashness of this Step and for which I think Mr Russel deserves to be dismissed the Service, which he so extravagantly abuses, I am now under necessity to order thither the Earl Temple in her Way to Malacca to carry twenty Seapoys and as many Buggueses, just to maintain our footing till we have it in our power to establish the Settlement properly Mr James Stevenson who is well acquainted with the Country and therefore the fitter person to entrust, has shewed great readiness on my desiring him to go on the Expedition as indeed he has done wherever he could be of the most Service to the Company, whom I am persuaded will duely reflect upon his particular Merit

I must acquaint your Honour &ca of my having ordered the carriages of the lower Decks Guns to be taken out, the Guns being stowed in the hold to stiffen the ship in which they will be of use, whereas on the Deck they only took up room without answering any purpose, since twice the Complement of the Earl Temples would be at least necessary was she to Fight a lower Tier, and even the Ports are so near the Water, that it must be quite a smooth Sea to venture them open, Pity it is a good ship should be thus spoilt for a purpose she will never Answer!

14th Though the Earl Temple's Complement is short of a fifty Gun Ship, it is more than sufficient

for her present state, I have therefore entertained besides the surgeon six of her Common people whom I had employs for wherein they were much wanted

15th John Smith late Chief Mate of the Ship I informed your Honour &ca escaped from his Arrest, and I have reason to think got away to Batavia the Method of my Proceeding with him will be seen in my Diary & I am certain the ship is more secure by his being out of her, the Damage of her Cargo, owing I believe a good deal to his indifference about it, is convincing to me that he had no regard to his Duty by which I think he has forfeited all Title to his Wages, which will scarce defray the loss occasioned by his Negligence, of which more will be observed hereafter

The demand made by the Crew of the Earl Temple of two Months Wages in six and what has been paid to those who were discharged from her has consumed more than a Chest of Treasure, the Account thereof as well as of other Charges attending the Ship on this Coast, I shall transmitt on her when she sails for China or to your Coast, should your orders concerning her be countermanded, for I fear she will hardly be back here from Malacca to attempt the China

17th Herewith your Honour &ca will receive the Journals Diarys, and Accounts of the Diligent Snow in order that the same may be forwarded to England

18th The Osterley has in her three of the six sailors I mentioned in my last to be dismissed from the Earl Temple as dangerous Men whom as well as the three that were put on Board the Fox are rather suffered to be thus discharged the ship they were troublesome in, than sent as Prisoners which would be attended with many inconveniences, since that time there has been no disorder in the ship, and the Captain has great expectation of the spirit that prevailed being quite repressed But this Ship seems destined to some Calamity or other, she came from Pooloo the 4th instant from which time her people have fallen sick in great Numbers, Mr Call the third Mate died the 14th the loss of whom as he was a good Officer is more sensibly felt, where there are so few, and I have been obliged to procure the Company's Sloop Union a Master by taking the 4th Mate of the Temple, who is now too ill to return to his Ship, the Chief Mate and Doctor were likewise diseased with the rest, however I have been informed they begin to recover

19th I have ordered the Captain to purchase at Malacca two Boats to supply the place of his long Boat lost at Madrass and Yawl which was carried away by two of his Men on our first arrival here, and has never since been heard of, He has orders likewise to buy a Boat for this place, where we are making for present use a punt or flat Bottom Boat, which may be very

25th Captain Hague having applied for two Months pay due to his People, it was accordingly advanced him here, He was likewise lent a Boat belonging to the Diligent his own being damaged by oversetting among the Rocks

all the principal Places betwixt Manna and Moco Moco bounds I have had the Heads of the several Doosons who all profess a great satisfaction, at our coming among them and promise to set heartily about the improvement of their Gardens and to shew their willingness they have each renewed their Contracts with the Company (except the people of Bencoolen who tho' I believe not the most sincere wait only the settling some Points too tedious to discuss while the dispatch of Ships so much ingresses Time) they all acknowledge the rum of the Plantations thro the Neglect, which fear and confusion has been the cause of, and as I have said heretofore the pepper now on hand is only the remains of a Former Growth, The Pangaran of single D Mowe or Laye his Country indeed has been the least neglected, there are some Inhabitants thereof who have yet got Gardens in being, But that is the only district where the People have not wholly given themselves up to Despondence or Vice, Manna that was productive of large Crops seems quite in disorder and the Man who was reputed the greatest promoter of Industry is now represented as the most vile wretch in the whole Country insomuch that any apprehension had of his being replaced in the Gover[n]ment Captain Vincent set him aside from inflames [sic] the Manna people to the highest degree, those in the present Management perhaps are no more worthy, but it is not the Juncture to make a change among them till we are better settled, in the mean time this Man Pangooloo receives a pension of $7 - \$ Month in consideration of his Wants and former Services, he has also been paid one hundred Dollars in part of a much larger sum due to him on Custom on pepper received before the French were here There are considerable sums claimed by others on the like Account not yet settled, Mr Stevenson who went down to Manna to Ship off Pepper to the Osterley, has with great Judgment examined into the Affairs of those Quarters & represented them at large in his Letters on the subject We must now lose the benefit of his Assistance to the Southward by the necessity there is for his going to Natal, Mr Steuart will supply his Place and as he has both capacity and a knowledge of the Country I doubt not will be of great Utility, He will go likewise to Croee to gather the pepper and reform that place as The Pepper in the southern parts by well as Cowar the Reports I have is as follows

Honour &c^a which I have translated for your reading they wrote me at the same time hinting some uneasiness at Mr Idell's behaviour to them, the discretion of that Gentleman I think is such as would not suffer him to do any Thing wrong but he is too well acquainted with Mallay Artifice to be agreable where so much is practised, tho the more proper to be a check to it, By my Letters to him and the Sultans your Honour &c^a may perceive where the disgust lies & how I have expressed my Opinion thereon

At Moco Moco I met with Sultan Ooloo Dean who has been a long Pensioner of the Company in consideration of his Title to the Anack Soongy Government from the succession to which he was excluded many years ago thro some political Maxim, and who has always been deemed a quiet and well disposed Man, Being now very old and infirm, and uneasy with his situation with the Sultans he seem'd desirous to reside at Marlbró, which as I look'd upon for many Reasons to be better than his staying at Moco Moco I have encouraged him to move and I expect him daily here in the Diligent Snow, He may be usefull in many respects and there is no room to think he can be hurtfull, his Pension will be continued as the company in some former Letter intimate their desire he should never lose it, I know not whether I should pay him what has been suspended since the place was taken which I guess he will ask, but I shall defer determining till I hear from Madras

45th Some days since a Man came from the other side the hills, who is the head of a Doosoon or Village containing sixteen Families, whom he says are desirous to come down to settle here and plant pepper, He was encouraged to prosecute his Intention and is accordingly gone back under promise to return hither with his People

46th Dion Maiupa the son of Dion Macoolah deceased enjoys his Fathers post of the Captain of our Buggueses, his manners appear very different from those of his Father and if he does not deviate gives some expectation of being a good servant

47th The Buggueses have been reduced in their Number from 120 to 80 and less may possibly be hereafter sufficient, their officers besides Dion two Lieutenants and three Ensigns I found necessary to keep in pay somewhat longer whose service shews them not useless, one Ensign is gone to Natal, and another Rådin Tomongon is of service at this pressent in collecting the pepper at Laye and Polley, to which places I had no one to send without being destitute of Help here, Mr Donston did go down for a Day or two, but the adjustment of Accounts for the Osterley obliged me to call him back and Mr Nairne has been at the Desk or about the works ever since his arrival which has also been the case with Mr Steuart

The above points out the inconvenience I must suffer by parting with a usefull Person to go to Natal, a difficulty so well foreseen when I left the Coast that your Honour &ca did not think it expedient, We should be burthened with a Charge we were not in a condition to maintain, tho' we might have easily removed the Dutch, and set up our own colours, it was certainly better to wait a convenient time to resume our Possession there, and it was if I mistake not for such reasons that the General and Council of Batavia alone were addressed on the subject of Natal and Tappanooley instead of my being embarrassed by making a demand or forcing those places when I touched at Padang, Upon this principle it was that I waved any discussion with the Government of Padang when I was there, as will been seen by the copys of Letters that passed between us, which now attend your honor &ca accompanying one from those Gentlemen to yourselves

49th I have wrote Letters to the General and Council at Batavia both by the Plassie and Fox, such as I judged beccoming me, which are entered in the Books that now go in the Packet and I have addressed Captain Tinker to request he would send one of his ships on this Coast, which would be of more effect by its appearance only, than any negotiation, I wish the Admiral's late orders may not have been a Bar to that Benefit

50th The Letters received and sent which wait on your Honour &c³ are so full upon all subjects on this Head that I must beg leave to refer thereto, lest I may not have been sufficiently explicit, and hope vou will pardon my requesting that they may be transcribed at Madras to be sent to the Court of Directors, as the hands I have are hardly sufficiently to keep up the Originals and Copy

OF FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS & REVENUES

51st The constant employ of our Slaves and Artificers at the Water side, and works most immediately necessary such as the making Godowns, & two or three Houses for present use, has prevented the pursueing any Project concerning the Fort, which is indeed so totally ruined, that what could be done to it in its present situation would be of no material service, some kind of defence will however be set about and the Person who has the inspection [sic] over it may be depended on to execute it in the best Manner possible, as well as every other improvement requisite for the settlement, tho' the Progress is unavoidably Slow, the several Buildings wanted to be erected or repaired are particularly mentiond in a Report delivered me & entered under No (26) in Letters received besides what are mentioned therein & what is requisite to secure the Fort, Houses are in the greatest Request, That I live in, and four more ordinary ones are all now in the place, except the Lodgings in the Fort where two or three Gentlemen inhabit the same Apartment, others being obliged to lodge in the China Row, and the scarcity of Materials retards what we could wish to be soon raised

52 I have directed the Houses and Godowns of the Out Settlements which are not destroyed to be repaired, But no considerable brick work (as I have before signified) can yet be undertaken through the want of Chinam and Bricks, however such are not the most essential now

53 The Revenues of the Coast besides a few Customs collected on peice Goods &c^a are only the Arrack Farm at Marlbro, and those of Ophium here, and at Moco Moco, The first was sold at Out Cry to commence from the first of March for one hundred and seventy Dollars per Mensem, which as I found going low I let for six Months only, the stay of the ships has made it so beneficial, that I am sorry I suffered it to be cryed down tho there were no competitors, for I learnt afterwards that Dion and Noqueda Banjar who bid against each other for shew had determined before hand to take it jointly at that Price but to go no higher

It will require the Judgement of an experienced Engineer to fix upon the spot as well as the plan for such Works as ought to be constructed for the Head settlement on this Coast if the Company have still in view that the advantages that were proposed to be accrued from this establishment before the French destroyed it, and I make no doubt of your Honor &ca being ready to afford the most effectual Assistance when the Companys pleasure is known

OF COVENANT SERVANTS MILITARY AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

59th Captain Vincent has given an Account of the Gentlemen who landed with him here & of the employs he allotted them, but which they soon quitted either by Death or removal, so that Mr Holloway at last was the only material Assistant in the Settlement in the civil Branch, this Gentleman has lately requested some little gratuity for his extraordinary service, & I have thought him well deserving one hundred Dollars

60th When I came I brought with me from Moco Moco Mess^{rs} Smith & Flockhart the former a Factor the other a Writer, Mr Flockhart assists now under the Accomptant and Warekeeper and Mr Smyth holds the Office of Storekeeper and pepper Godown keeper, The Military Stores I had intended to be under the charge of a Covenant Servant, but thro want of a person to spare who was equal to that employ I did for present time entrust them to Lieut^t Ridout whose skill and industry proves him fitter than any I could chose from the Gentlemen newly come out of England, I

had designed afterwards when Mr King a Factor returned from Manna to have put him into that Post but his sickness ever since has rendered him too weak for Business, Mr Ridoubt therefore remains in charge and has the allowance of ten Dollars pr Month for his extraordinary Trouble, in speaking of this Gentleman I must remark your Honour &ca the difference that appears in the Companys allowance of Pay mentioned in the General Letter pr Osterley from that which a Lieutt Fireworker receives at the Coast vizt 8 pr Day

I have however paid Mr Ridout 3 8 as agreable to account delivered me by your Honor &ca at my departure, concerning which I beg to be instructed for future guidance, applications is sometimes made me for Fees or Piquet Money, on account of laboratory work and drying Powder &ca the right to which as I am a stranger to I should be very glad to be informed about

61 Mr John Francis a Writer dved the 27th of last Month without a Will the Secretary therefore took charge & disposed of his Effects at Outcry, the produce thereof is deposited in order to the remitting the same to his relations, Bills on the Honble Company are therefore sent in this packet payable to the Secretary at the India House to whom Mr More writes that he may render the amount of the Estate to the relations or Friends of the deceased who likewise are apprized of this proceeding

62^d The Estate of Messrs Holmes & Herbert are in like manner secured by the Secretary & that of Mr Dallowe who died at Cawoor I have given orders to the Mallay Serjeant these to send up by the first opportunity, others have been taken care of as will be seen in Captain Vincent's Letter

63rd There now remains besides Mr Holloway and Mr Flockhart also one other Writer namely Mr Desmarck of those who came in the China Ships, but that Gentleman is so very sickly that his services are often interrupted by his Indispositon

64th The Reciuit we had by the servants who were in the Norfolk & Duke of Richmond was greatly acceptable those arrived here being very ready and capable in the Business they have to do, the disorder of their Health has sometimes interrupted their attention Mr Coles is Sub-Secretary, Mr Albertson assists the Storekeeper, as Mr Broff does the Paymaster and Mr Manningtons designation I have already spoken of

65th These Gentlemen have all delivered me in Bills for their pay and House Rent from the time they arrived first on this Coast Vizt the 24th July according to the allowance on this Establishment, deducting what sums they received at Madras or elsewhere, as the demand was not extravagant I complied in discharging the Bills

were not issued them by Captⁿ Vincent have since applied to me, and have been paid according to the rates allowed by the Company, M^r Smyth who resided some time at Moco Moco requested me to make him some allowance in consideration of the great Expence he was at that place I added ten Dollars ₩ Month to his pay &c^a while he was there, and I think that sum at least should be allowed to every Out Resident to defray the charge he must be at in entertaining the Mallays who come to him on the Companys Business

67th The Captains of the Fox & Plassie have both been paid for the diet of the Gentlemen Military &ca on Board each ship as has likewise the representative of Capta Foster for the Passengers in the Earl Temple, The Surgeons of the Fox & Temple have desired a gratification of a Rupee pr Head for their attendance on the sepoys &ca when sick on the Voyage which I have judged reasonable to be allowed as well as the person who look'd after them in the Osterley

In the Book of Letters received your Honour &c^a will see a Memorial from George Dempster the Surgeon of the Osterley who was left on shore when that ship went to Madrass, he represented his administring to the sick and loss of Health himself thereby as arguments why he should be recompensed which I looked upon as so reasonable that I ordered him to be paid the allowances of a Surgeon on this establishment from the time he landed untill Mr Stevenson arrived, but while he was considering whether he should receive what I had granted him a complaint was made by some Gentlemen from whom he had exacted Money for his Attendance, which they entreated might be refunded as they understood he was to be paid by the Company his answer to which was so rude that I took the refusal he made of my Appointment intending to refer him to your Honour &cais conclusion, He is since dead and perhaps his representative may apply on his behalf, tho if Judgment is to be formed from the memorial against him, from his manner of writing and from his general character he was very unworthy of reward

69th Mr Bagnal the Mate of the above Man has been represented by every one in a quite different light and having requested some consideration for the real attendance he gave during two Months he was here before the Osterley carried him from the Place I have paid him accordingly, Captain Vincent having entertained the Surgeon of the Diligent Snow and being willing to leave Mr Bagnal here I have taken him into pay as Surgeons Mate

70th The French Surgeon that came over in the Osterley I have given up to Captain Macleshin to be Mate in his Ship

71st Mr Thomas Blair who was nominated by the Court of Directors to be employed as Lieutenant Fireworker here, being upon his arrival incorporated with the Infantry by Captain Vincent who made him Lieutenant thereof, He did his Duty as such at the same time that he performed to the utmost of his power everything relative to the charge of the Artillery, for which extraordinary duty he petitioned for the pay of Lieut^t Fireworker besides that of Lieutenant of Foot, the truth of what he urged being vouched by Captr Vincent, & his Health being greatly impaired by his having been too much exposed to the Weather, I allowed him what he applyed for till the arrival of Mr Ridout

Another Memorial was presented me by Captn Frazer setting forth that he had received Captain Vincents Commission as eldest Captain of the Military which de desired me to confirm, and allow him the Perquisites annexed to that station representing also that only fiftythree Men of his Company had received cloathing (vizt a coat Breeches, Cap & Shoes) from the stores, Whereas he cloathed ninetytwo, that is he means ninetytwo ought to have been cloathed, and what he seems to want is to have as a perquisite, the cloathing of thirty nine Men who are dead, as he had those of most of the fiftythree who also died, upon this supposition that the Honble Company gave the first cloathing, therefore that he ought to have the advantage of the dead Men's Coats &ca the absurdity is plain, but this Gentleman is very difficult to be made think so, and it is as hard to satisfy him of the Plan on which the Military are cloathed by their Captains if I am right the Honble Company do give the first half mounting that is, Coat Breeches and cap to the Men who first land at any of their settlements, to ease the Captain of advancing so much before hand, who compleats the Soldier with stockings shoes shirts & a Roller at his (the Captains) own expence which compleated cloathing continues to the January twelve Months after the Man arrives when he is fresh mounted by his Captain altogether, who has then stoppages sufficient to defray it upon this presumption it is that I have charged the respective Captains of those Men who came over with me for the Cloathing they received here last January as I understand the Stoppages for the foregoing Year to entitle them thereto In these points I intreat your Honour &ca particular information for discussing these kind of Arguments are as irksome as tedious

73rd Captain Fazer likewise claims the difference of pay of the Soldiery from the 20th to the 24th July, also for the odd Days in the Months of thirty one, For the they arrived on the Coast the 20th Captain Vincent only paid them from the Day they landed vizt the 24 July, and so from the same day of one Month to another

not allowing for the thirty first day in some of them, this was no unreasonable demand so that I granted the Arrears to those of the Men who were yet alive

74th Some person being necessary to write the Regimental Business, as we have no adjutant I permitted Captain Frazer to employ Mr Baldwin a Cadet, for which he has an allowance of eight Dollars pr Month, if I am not mistaken the Volunteers on the Coast have five Pagodas & Month besides their pay, if it is so should be glad to know as this young Gentleman can barely live on his present stipend

The Rank of the Officers in respect to Mr Ridout becoming a Matter of dispute as your Honour &c² had thought fit to fix M^r Eyres below the youngest Officers on our arrival, I judged it proper that Mr Ridout whose Commission is Junior should take place after Mr Eyres, tho I must take leave to remark to your Honour &c2 that these two Gentlemen are much injured by being below people who came here Cadets and have not seen the least service but thro' the particular circumstances of the place attaind the Ranks of Lieutenant & Ensign, for which the hardships they have gone thro certainly makes them deserving their commissions confirmed, I am of opinion they will be very well off tho they take date after all others of older standing, it is therefore to wait your Honour &casentiments on this Head, that I have deferred issuing my commissions to these Gentlemen who still act under those of Captain Vincent Captain Frazer does so likewise whose Service in raising recruits for the Company and most severe duty on landing here I am persuaded will make him thought worthy of your Honour &cas sanction, here is however an Officer who has had his Thigh broke in the service Mr Pilmor yet only a young Lieutenant and after whom Mr Frazer must have come into Rank, had the settlement It is therefore to be substood in its former state mitted whether this Gentleman would not be injured much by Captain Frazers rising above him or whether he should not have a Captains commission of prior date, the objection is that We should have three Captains & not one Company, unless some of them could be provided for on the Coromandel Coast, where there 18 I understand another Lieutenant (Mr Grant of this Establishment)

76th The Company having sent out in the Osterley's Packet a Majors Commission for Mr Frith & to command their Forces on the West Coast & as Military appointments are said not to fail by the loss of any Place, I have delivered the same to that Gentleman, in consequence of which he has received the allowances annexed to that post since his arrival but lest there should be any objection to the present validity of this Commission (copy of which goes now with the

General Letter), The arrears due from the time of the Packets being opened are suspended untill I hear from your Honour &ca on this Subject

77th A General return of our Military goes by this packet by which will be seen the indifferent state The Europeans of our Garrison in every respect count a few but they can scarce be called Men, being poor immaciated creatures, even those we brought are perfect refuse, & the sepoys are many such as Dormond changed for better Men first raised, their Serjeant is expected to die the Serjeant of the Train is already deceased, and Horton the drill Serjeant is the only Man we have fit for a Halberd Our Corporals are as few for there are but two [sic] good for any thing, and they often sick, I therefore most earnestly entreat your Honour &ca to consider our situation in this respect & to give us some relief 50 good Men with Serjeants and Corporals would put us on a secure footing supposing we had 100 more sepoys, whom I imagine might be procured

78th Mr Eyres being a kind of supernumary here I have given to him ye charge of the Sepoys & stoppages for cloathing I propose to be his perquisite, for taking care of them, your Honour &ca will therefore I presume not be unwilling to send over two or three hundd Jackets faced with blue or Yellow for their cloathing to be issued to him at prime cost

79th The Artificers who have both from Fort St George & Bengal, I am sorry to say fall greatly short of our expectations the French Men are scarce worth their hire except La Heure the Joiner, he is a good Man, and the Bengal People turn out a parcel of lazy ignorant fellows owing I conceive from the roquery of the People who have been employed in collecting them who have defeated the good Intention of Mr Vansittart & the Gentlemen of that Gover[n]ment

80th We have been under the Necessity of engageing a Carpenter and Cooper out of the Diligent Snow the one at \$ 25 and the other at \$ 20 pr Month the former now is the more essential, as one who was left out of the Worcester & entertained on Captr Vincents recommendation is lately dead

81st The Accounts of the several offices are not vet properly digested, nor can be till we are clear of Shipping the Paymasters with close application are brought up to the last of March My Cash Account accompanys them wherein I have made no charge of any thing for my own support, if the allowance fixed by the Company will defray it I shall be satisfied, but should the unavoidable disbursements attending the Maintenance of a Table which is indispensable exceed that sum I make no doubt of being reimbursed the difference, gain I seek none but should be unwilling to sustain a Loss

82nd Mr More whom your Honour &ca have been pleased to continue Chaplain of this Place desires he may with Thanks express the sense he has of your goodness which his behaviour and the kind representation that has been made concerning him to the Company, he hopes will induce them also to approve

SUPPLEMENT

Temple sailed to the Northward the 17th Instant in the Morning as I was apprehensive the staying for Mr Stevenson coming from Manna might be too great a delay of the succour to Natal, besides that the sickness of the ships crew made the Captain desirous to get out to Sea with all Expedition, I therefore sent with him fifteen sepoys and as many Buggueses under the Charge of Lieut^t Blair to whom I have entrusted the care of them (exclusive from Mr Russels interfering therein whom I have ordered hither) until Mr Stevenson goes there

84th The Temple was scarce out of the Road when Captain Reynolds of the Prince Henry Packet, which anchored with us over Night came a shore and delivered a Letter from Mr Russel, inclosing account of Goods he had thought fit to buy on the Companys behalf from Captain Reynolds and his Mates and from Mr Lester Supracargo of the Adrianna Snow which arrived here a few hours after the Prince Henry in favour of whom he drew a Bill on me to the amount of \$7319 1 4 as by the copy of his Letter you will perceive the Bills I have rejected except one for \$255 3 21 being Money advanced him for his subsistance, and which can be stopped out of his growing pay but as to the rest since he has no Authority to use the Companys Credit much less thus to abuse it, I The Gentlemen thought they ought to be refused however propose to make application to your Honour &ca for payment alledging that it was from a Motive of assisting the Companys affairs they trusted their Goods, you will be able best to judge of this plea, for my Part I cannot venture the Companys risk of such a sum in a manner wholly uncertain, and have accordingly wrote Mr Russell that he must take on himself the Goods he has purchased, the produce of which I shall nevertheless demand of him by way of securing the Debt to his Creditors who have requested me to do so lest your Honour &ca should return their Bills concerning which I beg to be informed that I may know whether to carry the Money I may recover from Mr Russell to the Company or his Creditors Account

85th Captⁿ Reynolds landed here 26 Coffree Men 13 Women & 6 Children of those he brought from Madagascar & 14 French Coffrees, 9 Slaves having Diary Ceived Letters

died in their Passage, and the day after he wrote me that his ship had lost part of her false keel by touching a shoal as she was going into Natal, and that he judged it necessary to inspect further into the damage by heaving down, I have ordered him to try if this can be effected in Poolo Bay, but if it cannot he must go over to the Coast in that condition but then I shall be unwilling to trust him with a full loading of Pepper the ridding the Vessel of Rice and Paddy he bought at Natal will take up a few days before he can move out of the Road

86th A Tombongon that was going off from Ippoe to carry some pepper on Board the Diligent lying there was drove past the Vessel by a strong Northerly Gale down to Marlborough and I have put the Pepper she had viz* 50 1 10 on board the Osterley

87th The Attorney for the owners of the Success Snow that was commanded by Captⁿ Austin has presented me with a Bill for \$ 3145 -- One thousand three hundred and forty five of which was received on the Companys Account at Croee for Pepper that was to have been sold to Austin other five hundred Dollars being money deposited by his representative at Manna in the Company's Cash & one thousand three hundred Dollars thereof being laid out by Capta Austin at Manna in the purchase of Pepper which the Company have received except 50 Bahars of the Quantity said to be bought which being defficient, five hundred Dollars of the above one thousand three hundred remain to be paid for, till the cause of the deficiency is cleared up, to decide who must bear the loss, the said Bill is therfore ordered to be discharged except the said five hundred Dollars

88th The Storekeeper having tendred a Bill to Capth Vincent a Bill [sil] for a 150 Bars of Iron deficient of the Osterleys Cargo since she came from Fort St George, and the Captn refusing to pay it as each party insists on being right which your Honour &ca will perceive by the Copys of their Letters which are enclosed and I beg leave to refer to your Honour &ca whether the Loss should be sustained by the Company the Storekeeper or the ship by whose accounts Captain Vincent proves the numbers were delivered Mr Smith says they might be just into the Boats secreted coming on Shore as several Boats leaving the ship at different times might give the opportunity of taking a few from each or rather themselves at landing as the Person employed to keep the Account at the water side the one of the best of his sort we could get is not the most vigilant, my orders have been repeated from the Head to this Man but have not been much regarded, I believe however I have made a fresh order, and published it again that I hope will answer the end

of defeating every cavil & shew where the Error lves 89th Since the Osterley has been under dispatch many incidental occurrences have daily offered to interrupt it, and just at a time when I flattered myself

that nothing else could happen to retard her departure arrived here the 25th Ultimo, their Honors ship the Revenge Commodore John Watson, last from Batavia she brings advice of the Plassey's arrival there, & Dispatches from Captⁿ Tinker of his Majestys ship the Medway, by whose orders he proceeded on this Service, and touched at all the southern settlements from hence, Mr Watson purposes to sail to Padang to demand restoration from the Gentlemen there of Natal and Tappanooley, which the General and Council of Batavia have promised should be ceded and in consequence of some late order of that sort I fancy Mr Russel was so easily admitted, Mr Tinker has behaved very handsome in the applications he has made for satisfaction of the Injuries the Dutch have done our People which your Honour &ca will perceive by his Letter he has brought them to engage to make The presence of this ship and that of the Panther which I expect daily on the Coast must have a good effect in striking awe, where our Nation has been lately held in small esteem, and I fancy will secure our trade from any more insults. I shall advise the Captains to declare wherever they go that we shall maintain our Commerce in all places that are free and disengaged, & whoever molests us therein must expect the severest resentment

I have been so ill that I could scarce raise my Head from the Pillow to dictate the conclusion of the Letter, & yet I am obliged to enter into discussions every hour, the unlucky circumstance of the Revenge's coming in before the Osterley was gone has involv'd me in new difficulties as you will observe by the Letters, subjoin'd to the minutes, I have taken the best steps I am capable of in the melancholy situation I am in to facilitate this dispatch, and to assist Captⁿ Vincent in the present exigency, I have sent on board the Osterley twelve Lascars from this Settlement to supply the place of those taken out by Com^{mre} Watson belonging to the Squadron a list of their Names come a Number in the Packet & they have been paid to primo June

Your Honour &ca will see I have omitted by accident to specify in its proper place the discharging a Bill of Capth Foster's representative for the dieting myself and passengers, sepoys & Lascars, on board the Earl Temple, as likewise I had retained my allowance from primo November last to Ultimo May both which appear in the Cash Account Current, The confusion my spirits have been in for many Days through my being obliged notwithstanding sickness to force my attention I hope will plead for this inadvertency, as well as many others I am too sensible of in this dispatch

The Prince Henry Packet I will use my best endeavours to send to you as desired, but the disappointments of my best attempts makes me fearfull of giving hopes

Your Honours &ca will observe the paymasters Accounts as well as the Indents some of them signed by the Deputy in the employ the reasons for which will appear to you in the beginning of the Diary tho I think of changing that Method

Having received by the Fox an Invoice of the Norfolk Mr Cohonie in the packett of the Norfolk (Bonham) it is now returned and your Honour &ca will please to send the proper one in its place

Captⁿ Vincent having excepted to the Bills of Lading against wastage "as the Cargo is very foul & has damaged Pepper amongst it 'I must observe to your Honour &ca it ought not to be understood so to any degree as may appear on examination, that it is not so clear of dust as when properly garbled which we had not materials for in every place where it was shipped off to do is true, & perhaps in passing the Qualloes some little might get wet, but as much time would be lost in sending off to the Captain who is now on Board his ship and there being littles [sic] hopes of bringing him to alter an Opinion he has once adopted rather than detain the ship for fruitless Altercation, if not so regular, thinking it more the Company's Interest I am inclined to accept the Bills of Lading signed by his Purser in the manner I have mentioned

Copy of a Letter from Captain Frederick Vincent of the Ship Osterley to Mr Ardley relating to the affairs of the West Coast

SIR

In answer to your tavour of the 4th which my Indisposition has prevented till now, as soon as I had determined to stay here I laid before the Factors the necessary dutys such as Secretary Accomptant &ca and that each might be employed in what best suited his capacity, left the choice to themselves, leaving every office save that of Treasurer open to their Election, accordingly they were appointed as follows

Mr Edward Weston Accomptant Mr John Smyth Sub treasurer & Military Paymaster William Thong Secretary Elid Blackwell $\mathbf{M}^{\mathbf{r}}$ Warehousekeeper and General Storekeeper Peter Herbert $\mathbf{M}^{\mathbf{r}}$ Military Storekeeper Mr Walter King General Paymaster Mr Edward Dallowe Sub accomptant Mr Edward Holme Marine Storekeeper Mr Giles Holloway Under the Storekeeper Mr John Francis Under the Secretary Mr Anthony Desmaretz Mr John Hughes On all occasions $\mathbf{M}^{\mathtt{R}}$ WM FLOCKHARD M^R DANIEL GORDAN

The 10th August I was seized with a violent Fever, & from that time had not ability to inspect their Accounts till the latter end of September, when I found every thing very far from what I hope and expected

The Secretary & Marine Storekeeper soon after me were taken ill from which they never recovered, the Storekeeper General Paymaster, Sub-Accomptant & Military Storekeeper very often with the Ague and Fever, rendered incapable of attending to any Business the Accomptant and Sub-accomptant had undertaken what they were unequal to To the several Storekeepers & Warehousekeeper, my orders were to take copies of their several departments from the Invoices, & in a small narrow Waste Book to raise heads for every particular specie by each Ship the Invoice Account on one Side & what came ashore at different times on the other, weighable goods to be weighed and others

by tale to be counted, this I did for the readier examining of the Bill of Lading, & for the disposal of their stores, to keep a Waste Book, a receipt Book, a Leidger & Cash Book, the General paymaster I directed to keep a very carefull Account of his Cash, and monthly to ballance it, to take receipts for every thing, and to have another Book wherein every different Head should be dailey posted, by way of knowing what was monthly expended for the greater facility to the Accomptant, the Sub-treasurer and Military Paymaster to ballance his Accounts monthly and to keep his Military receipts separate from all others, The Accomptant to keep an Invoice Book Waste Book Journal and Leidger to require all the Accounts from the different Officers every Month, & to post whem immediately when he received them as

The General Storekeeper Dr to Sundries

Dr to the General Storekeeper-Sundries and in like manner through the rest, therefore when I came ashore after repeated writing to have this done it gave me no small concern to find it was not so, I was likewise incapable to obtain from the General paymaster, his Account till just as he was going to Manna and then no way digested as I had directed, and some things that wanted explaining, sometimes I found all Offices had been obliged to be conducted by three or four, and often by less, that excepting the Accomptant, I am very well assured all their Deviations from my Instructions proceeded from their frequent nay almost constant Indispositions in this situation were things when I came on shore, and had attained health sufficient to enquire into them my first step was to forbid more money being advanced to the General Paymaster, and the 30th September receiving a Letter from the Accomptant of his inequality to that Office, I called a consultation the next Day, and acquainted of what I had observed deficient in those two particular offices requiring an Examination into the Expences during my Illness and that in future I should do my endeavour to discharge them myself

Mr Blackwell the General Warehouse and Storekeeper, did all that his Health would permit him to do and I am sure as he was very exact in What he did nothing would have been wanting in his Account had he kept his Health and the Omissions that happened in his Illness were the Effect of want of a sufficient acquaintance in the Office rather than through Indolence or designed Neglect On Examination into these things being deprived of every Assistance but Mr Holloway one of the Writers I found it a task, I could not accomplish to bring up the Books, therefore directed Mr Holloway to take care of the Stores, & every thing else, centered in the Cash to pay the Military, Tradesmen, Slaves & Necessaries for Building, which and my correspondencys as well as Bichars, taking up often more time than I had health to attend to I confined myself to take that since these Gentlemen are yet living and will be able better to explain their Accounts than I can

As to the Cash Accounts I have no other than that I delivered the day of your arrival, which contains the full of what I have had With respect to the Affairs on this Coast, I apprehend you mean the situation of them at present they are extreamly quiet in every place and seem pleased at the Companys return, but to preserve it I think it necessary to give you this caution, that whatever plunder they made either on the Companys effects or their servants should not be demanded in terms or acts of severity, for as all the great Men are more or less concerned, and it is now so much divided, that it is impossible to recover one third that is lost, you may and certainly will raise to yourself trouble distress the Companys affairs and benefit nothing by it, my Method to obtain the Slaves I have got has been (when I have heard where they were) to write and desire they might be sent me—I have had several Bichars on complaints of many of the Natives against the Pangaran Etam and some Datoos, but experience in them convinced me to be peremptory would have destroyed, what I thought it my duty to promote, the culture of the Land, for insisting on

Restitution would have made a War inevitable I am sensible how much every Gentleman would be glad to recover his Losses, but if I may be permitted to put it in the Light I see it, I hope my Judgement will neither be condemned by you or them, & will shew that I consult the welfare of every one, I will suppose the Malays had not these, who would then have had them? why the French, would they not have been totally lost, then where is the difference, but the Slaves they say could run away, who was to maintain their Slaves? for though they kept them to work, it is no plea that, that should be their payment and if a guard is ordered to publish round the Bounds of all the Factorys that any who have Slaves belonging to the Company or Gentlemen bring them in, they shall be satisfied for such Expence I am of Opinion there are few but what will I am of a different opinion from some Gentlemen that if an be recovered Example of one of the Principal is made it will strike awe into the rest, no there is none now can restore what they took, therefore such a step would reduce them to desperate Measures, what then will all this be doing? the Grounds will be destroyed, trade cease and all succour from Land stopped, the Company must be sufferers for years & these very Gentlemen more so than they now are in the end, indeed could I by any means or method come at those who cutt of Mr Gunn and the other Europeans I would make them a publick Example setting forth to the Country the baseness of the act, by murdering those who flew to them as Friends for Protection but as to any effects using violent Measures I know its consequences, therefore must advise against it, was your force and security greater? I am persuaded you will think with me, it would be wrong, besides there are things amidst all this Tranquility, which will find you employment without this, which would never have an End, for they are all ready to charge each other with Robberys and Murder that the least opening you make towards an Enquiry will produce

I seized a parcell of old Iron from a China Man threatened him with imprisonment, & if I could find the the [sic] Plunderer banish him the Country, all this before the Dion, whose Mother had sold it, being what the Father took, I thought they wou'd on this be silent, but they opposed the Caffres removing it till I ordered a Guard to be sent for, but going myself on my Morning walk made it afterwards unnecessary. The China Man several times after this teized me for the redelivery and at last at a great Assembly of the Dion and his Friends at the Salop house asked again and pressed the Dion to claim it, as I knew the whole, to stop the Dion, I told him if I discovered the Principal be whom he would, I would confine both him and the receiver that as I knew it was the Companys Property, it should lay till a Governor arrived to whom I would represent it, accordingly the Dion ordered him to wait. This Iron now lays in the Fort to be detained or delivered as you approve

I neither would farm the Ophium to any nor Rat Island, Mrs Pell's Lease (who was in possession of that Island when the French came) not being expired at that time and she on her passage here to request a renewal, nor have I licensed any Punch or Publick Gaming house though offered for the last 70 Dollars pr Month I received customs for one large Prow but as I found Account vary in what had been formerly taken on different species least I should err in receiving less and it should be claimed hereafter, as a Precedence as well to induce all China Prows to stop here I dropped it and all Prows large as well as small that sailed hence I received nothing from, for such permission [] whatever other Reason that had been levied when the Settlement was established

As to the Country Affairs with respect to the Natives at Croi betwixt Noqueda Samboua (who has ever been in Credit with the English and Mr Herbert Letter deservedly so) Pangaran Segin & Bencoonet and the great Men thereabouts, the Differences have been very high, nor could the Noqueda have held up against them, had he not under the Companys Authority & on their

ciedit entertained Buggueses in Fact I believe both are wrong, but I have caused a seeming reconciliation, at present promising that you will soon enquire into every thing, and both parties be satisfied, yet neither knows it a general promise but imagines it to himself The Noqueda is accused by Pats the Drummer now here and Job Daniel a Soldier, who I expect by the Punchallong, as well by Mr Molloy with being a very dishonest Man he writes to ask Wages for himself and Buggueses guarding the Pepper the French did not destroy, the by his own account the Warehouse was broke open, and the Pepper stole by the Caffres whose Names he gives & by Patts, Job Daniel, & one of these people, Noqueda is charged with encouraging the Caffrees to the Act buying the pepper by another hand, at 5 Dollars \$\mathbb{B}\$ Bahar and selling it the Javans I must own it is but lately this Charge has come against him, and E'er Credited requires a Person of discernment, and one well knowing in the Language to go there, Betwixt him and the Pangaran of Segin the Massacre of four Europeans in a Boat and a Dutch Young Man a Writer of Norris's on shore lays each charges the other, but at this distance it is impossible to form a Judgment, I have received a Letter from the Noqueda for payment of two drafts, to the Amount 1745 Spanish Dollars Vizt one to Andrew Cowan on Captain Austin's Account for 1345 for Goods left by Captⁿ Austin & sold for the purchase of Pepper & one for 400 to Mr Elid Blackwell on the same Credit which he assures me is all purchased and will+soon be brought in

At Manna since the Admission of Gunta Raja in the Room of Pangoolo. to be Pangaran of the Dusan of Dulook they are all quite reconciled, and by the Residents as well as Noqueda Inchekio's Account, Things will there improve daily At this place Captⁿ Austin paid Noqueda Inchekio 1000 Dollars on Account of Pepper and I have since advanced the Pangaran 1000 Dollars more, and paid Noqueda 200 Dollars on Account of Disbursements he has been at since the French invaded it, according to their Accounts, there will be collected in all the districts dependent on Manna about 600 Bahars of Pepper, one half or more of which was already in warehouses The Godowns being bad I ordered the Pepper to be aired the damaged to be seperated and all to be removed into another House at the Companys Expence The Pangarans claim Dutys to the Amount of some Thousand Dollars for Pepper the French destroyed, for which they sav they had Mr Carters promissory Letter I renewed their Certificates as Pangarans, as well as many of the subordinate Officers, but they having no Contracts their papers they say being burnt or lost when the French came there, as I found great Differences betwixt the contracts of Places left that till a Governor should arrive there is a small Place called Padong Gochee, it is I apprehend a little to the So ward of Manna, where they grow a great deal of Peppr, but there is some difficulty of Access I find both by Sea and Land, that no benefit has been raised from it as yet, I gave these People Certificates likewise of the Company's Protection and recommended their falling on some Measures by improving their Boatmens Experience in the Aquala or thinking on some way by Land to get it to the nearest of our other Settlements in this You see Sir the Occasion there is that the Gentleman who now goes Presidency should be a discreet, judicious Man, and perfectly conversant in the Language for I am of opinion there is great knavery in their demand and if this last Place produces the Pepper it is reported the enquiring into and reconciling matters here speedily is of Importance, and one thing I must observe that you will find it most acceptable to the Country, not only in Manna, but all other places, that some Principal Person there should be Ensign, or Chief Officer of the Buggeses & not the Dion should supply them, Noqueda Inchekio has often applied for this whose Character appears to me at present without blemish yet I chose to refer it to you

The Pangarans or rather Caliphas of Cowar say they have a good deal of Pepper of the Companys which the French left unhurt, on which there has been constantly a guard of Buggueses, whose Wages I believe will be more than the value of the Pepper, the Serjeant has been to claim their pay, but I only told him to take care of it and when you arrived I would speak of it, The Caliphas claimed a large sum for Pepper burnt by Mr Gibs on the Resident's order when the French came here which they was not paid for The Country thereabouts is a good deal gone to ruin and the People of very bad Dispositions, nowever I find it a sensible Man is sent there that can speak the Language well and preserve his Authority, it is a Place capable of producing much Pepper, but the Head Men write for want of an European, to enforce an Observance of their Oiders they have not been able to do any thing

The Pangaran of Konkai, son to the old Pangaran brought his Father's Certificate, and the Proateens of his Districts, who being unanimous in his Election I renewn'd [sic] it in his Name but gave no new Contract, as I had not then time but he has promised to be here again soon or send his Deputys

The Troubles at Salooma I hope by seizing Raja Moodo is put a compleat stop to & that no further ill consequences can arise from his conduct

The Pangaran at Sillebai very readily ienewed his Contract, but besides Indolence I am persuaded he has a very bad heart, as he played several little low tricks with me, however all is quiet there

The Chief Dispute on this Coast and greatest difficulty you will meet is here at Marlbro, Pangaran Etam expects to recover several Priviledges (as he terms them) that Mr Henlock and the Chiefs since his time have taken from him, The Dion again who has been at War with him ever since the French landed, has attempted several further innovations on his priviledges and Endeavours to strip him not only of some Emoluments, but the Power of naming his Datoos and some officers, this was lately grown so high, that E'er I know there was more than their old resentments about division of the Plunder, each was preparing to act either offensively or defensively as time and circumstances permitted. As soon as I had advice of it I called the Pangaran and Dion to seperate Bichars and by this means obtained a true knowledge of their differences, when I declared whoever drew the Sword first I would assist the other and bid the Pangaran remain quiet, promising that whatever was his right, and allowed in Mr Carter's time should be continued and that neither Dion nor any else should infringe his property the least, which has past my Expectations been strictly observed

The determining whose right it is to name & recommend Datoos is of no small importance, as the several competitors for that Office, have each power and can be very troublesome

I increased the Buggeses to one hundred and twenty when I expected a visit from the French, not choosing to accept the aid of any but those dependent on the Company, from the Example the Pangaran gave Ee'r Mr Carter had retieated, and I have continued them since on Account of the daily decrease in the Garrison, to be in a Condition to repel him, it he stirred yet both these People have that Subtilty, stubborness and Villany in their Dispositions and from their long War great attachments in the Country, that inclining the Scale in favour of those, that either now or hereafter can least disturb you in any situation is the point to be considered

Lye the Person who stiles himself Pangaran the only the Head Man of that Dusan, which is part of the Dominions of the Pangaran of Singo D'Mou was competitor for the Pangaranship in which he was supported by the Pangaran of Etam, who thereby could he have succeeded, would have became too formidable for the Dion and his conduct since the French came before this place has been too suspicious to put so much power into his hands. The present young Pangaran was elected by a Majority of Voices of all the principal Men and Proateens, that were present at which Bichar this Calipha of Live & one Raja

Moodo, another Orankio was present and it was then agreed that during his minority, he should be under the Tuition of Raja Moodo, this last person is a spirited keen active Man but greatly addicted to Gaming, he left this place as he informed me to go and visit the Gardens, but my Intelligence is that he spends his whole time in Wantonness, on which I sent him a Letter some time since, that as I doubted not he had finished his survey of the Gardens, I should be glad to receive an Account of their forwardness from his own Mouth at Marlbrô where he had been so long a stranger, but he is not yet returned

At Poly they have endeavoured to persuade me there is a large Quantity of Pepper and have more than these two Months past terzed me to advance them some Money, to order Warehouses to be built to receive it, serves & Caffres to sift and clean it, Bags to bring it to the Aquala and some vessel or other to take it in, but I have withstood all their Application, as having the greatest Reason to believe the Quantity was far short of what they told me At this place which ends all the Dominions subject to Pangarans Coliphas or otherwise, from Croi I believe all care with regard to reestablishing yourselves, if once settled will end your difficultys, for beyond Moco Moco you are sensible the Dutch have taken upon themselves to save you that trouble and as the Sultanage of Moco Moco includes all our settlements to the Northward, as you have been there so lately and will undoubtedly have Accounts very soon from Mr Idell, it will be unnecessary for me to say any thing relating to those places, except that I sent two Thousand Dollars by Mr Smyth to pay the Sultan on Account of Pepper &ca I must not forget to observe that the Pangaran Etam and some Datoos have often hinted a claim he had to Anchorage from all Vessels, my reply was I took none nor would I suffer any one to do it, till a Chief arrived who knew those customs, for as Rat Island formerly was possessed by the Pangarans of Singo D'Mou, who exacted Anchorage of the Companys ships and being found troublesome was purchased by the Company to be their right for ever his claim if under that for the small Craft, was a doubt to me if not one of those, he complained being stripped of before M1 Horlock's time He is a dangerous Man and is aiming at great Power & wanted but to attack Singo D'Mou to him, by setting aside the Legal Heir and raising a Pretender (One Ratoo) who was to second all his attempts, the Country round were, very jealous of this when I came here, & I plainly saw acting otherways than I did would have created a War wherem the Dion would have thrown up his dependance and the Factory have become the first object of Resentment

The Pangaran had betrayed E'er the French landed how far he was to be trusted when he had dared to break open Mr Carters House and plundered it almost under his Eye, while his son with his Myrmidons were rifling Mr Hay's house and with unparallelled Insolence and Cruelty murdering with his own hand his Servant, it was the Ally of this Man who killed Mr Gunn some of which Men he brought to one of his Bichars with me and was such as I suppose he designed to introduce at a Grand Bichar, he wanted to make a little before your Arrival, but prevented by the Intelligence I had obtained, he has sixty two Musquets belonging to the Company and several Horses the property of the Gentlemen but he has never mentioned a syllable of them nor have I have [sic] been able to demand them the Jerelutis of Lye, has also twelve Musquets of the Companys and told me of many more that he could recover if he had my certificate, I gave him it but have never since seen him though I have of [sic] often applied to this Ratoo (who stiles himself Pangaran of Lye) to bring him to me I know not the Jerelutis Name but he is blind with one Eye, your Jerelutis knows him well The Dion has also three Artificers Slaves of the Company who tho I have often asked and sent for he has had the Insolence to retain Pangaran of Konkai has two more Slaves, I don't apprehend you will have much trouble to get them, it is but late I heard of them. The Dion Raddon & Noqueda Bangar I am persuaded know of many other Things if they can be

wrought on to inform you The Dion has had a considerable hand in the Plunder of this Place and I am well informed has still in his Possession a great Quantity of Iron as well small Arms E'er I conclude this relative to the Natives and Country it is my duty to tell you, for want of Residents, the Gardens are going to ruin, the People disregarding their Chiefs will pay no obedience to any instrument of yours given them are in some places murdering each other daily, and that if not speedily relieved, you will hear of many such insurrections like that of Raja Moodo I have given no Commission to Dion, or any of his Officers, and it is of some Importance that all the Subalterns in his Company should be of your Appointment, or Approbation as you will thereby gain intelligence, should he attempt with his Buggeses as he lately did at Lye, in raising disturbances, I think I have omitted nothing necessary for your Information, respecting this Coast, but should any thing hereafter occur I will not fail to communicate it.

The Effects of the Military deceased Captain Frazer has accounted for Lieut^t Bathurst's, whose Inventory & Sales I have delivered to you, Captⁿ Lawrence's & all other the Military has according to the Company's Instructions been under the two principal Officers Directions which has at last centered in Captⁿ Fraser

The Military have only been paid from the 24th of one Month to the 24th of the next, but no stoppages have been made from the Commanders though several dyed a few days after the Muster

Mr Thongs Effects his Widow took care of, Mr Holme's another of the Factors, Mr Blackwell took the Account of, which I delivered to Mr Smith to be given to you, Mr Herberts & Mr Dallowes two other Factors who died lately, the first here the last at Lenou, I have given no further direction about than to order Mr Herberts to be locked up, & Mr King at Manna & Noqueda Inchekio to go to Lenou & recover Mr Dallowes

Mr Hughes one of the Writers who died at my House, I propose as I know his Friends to dispose of them myself, unless you think proper to order otherways the rest I hope you will as soon as convenient, give the necessary Instructions about as they must suffer by lying by

Some time before your arrival the Sultan of Moco Moco sent over one hundred Head of Buffaloe as there was then some appearance of Troubles here I did not care to purchase them for the Company First as I could not well think of sparing so much Money, & secondly as I was apprehendsive[sic], if I took them wholly for the Company, I should have some villany played with them by the Country, to take them from the Sultan was I thought highly necessary, & that it might have the face of my doing caused Mr Dempster my Surgeon with the Raddon to buy them, in this I thought not only to secure the Company from a Loss, but oblige the Sultan & have a stock when you arrived, for these Reasons if you think them just I recommend them to a Preference of any others, as I know they have lost out of the eighty three they purchased twenty two by Mortality

My Surgeon being mentioned here, leads me now to acquaint you that I brought him on Shore with a design to attend the sick, but he was soon rendered incapable from his own indisposition to afford them any Assistance and is still too low as you may perceive to attend an Hospital, he had the Misfortune likewise to loose in the Panchallong that sunk alongside a valuable Box of Instruments & some other Things in all to the Value of forty Pounds (as he informed me) designed for the use of the Hospital, there was some Linnen he also expended in Dressings, for all which he applied to me, for some Compensation as I could be no judge, what the Company might think he merited, who had been able to give no Attendance in the Hospital except just at first Landing and being my Surgeon though his Reasons were just, that the Loss of his Health &

Effects were with a view to the Companys service and his private concerns suffered by his not going to Madras, yet I chose to refer him to you, who could weigh these considerations with more justice than I can, as knowing the Companys Indulgence

The Gentlemen sent as Residents to the different Settlements and indeed all that have been employed here in the various offices have received no allowance either ordinary or extraordinary except the three Writers Mr Holloway, Mr Desmaretz & Mr Francis, & they only their pay & Table, if they have not discharged their duty as could be wished, know Sir that they none have had health, after the first Month to be able to do as I am persuaded they would have done, & I hope I may without being thought to take from other Gentlemen, as no partiality but justice is my Guide, recommend Mr Blackwell Factor & Mr Holloway Writer as two who have laboured most in their several dutys & whose Merit will confirm my praise

Captain Frazer has done the duty of a Soldier, and all the Discipline & order you found the Garrison in being entirely effected by him, since the death of Captⁿ Lawrence, and I must say from our Landing to your Arrival there has been the greatest Regularity & Quiet, without one single Complaint that proves the Vigilance & Conduct of the Officers

I had almost forgot to mention, there is one Bajele a Slave of the Company, a very ingenious clever Fellow at cleaning Arms, who some People have put into the Head to deny being a slave, & last Muster had the Assurance to demand four Dollars & a half instead of two, telling me Mr Carter told him he was free, but must work for the Company at that Wages, though before I only paid him two & he was content, he is an excessive handy fellow, but must be taken care of or I am afraid he will desert

I have been abused by Browne the white Guardan [sic] who was formerly a soldier here, & was lately sent back by M¹ Herbert whom he said promised him pay from the time the Place was lost & accordingly from Mr Herbert & Captain Lawrence, received eighty five Dollars, I have since found the whole a fraud & that he entered into the French service—My discovery was from Pats the Drummer who by his Instructions claimed the same, but in detecting the first to be an imposition, to engage Pats for five years longer I had advanced him ten Dollars, intending to give him no more than twenty but he chooses to repay the ten Dollars & quit the service in April next when he says his five Years are expired

There are three Prisoners in the ships all whose crimes are of that Stamp that my design was had I an Opportunity to have sent them to the Coast, for the President & Council to have further disposed of them as they thought their Crimes deserved

The first is John Lynes who was Coachman to Mr Carter sent from Batavia by Mr Herbert his behaviour, when the French landed being so contrary to the Laws of his Country, as to fall little short of Treason, and the Country People threatening his Assassination, he being a fellow of dangerous Principles, to prevent his going to the Dutch he has been confined ever since the 19th November on board the Nancy Ketch

The second is one Jacob Delizine a Portuguese, who was Interpreter to Mr Smith at Moco Moco & defrauded the Company of one hundred and twenty Dollars by his Interpretation for wch he reced 20 Dolls, the whole being detected by the Old Sultan, he was by him sent under a Guard here, with strict request, not to be suffered to return, as he was capable to raise a civil War in the Family

The third is Paul Peter a Caffrey, who broke into the Companys Godowns at Croi, stole their Pepper & sold it at 4 Dollars & Bahar, this fellow can if he will discover the share Noqueda Samboua is said to have had in it, he is a very

dangerous fellow, having with one Stephen (now on Board the Osterley) caused all the Caffres to Mutiny & deny working, declaring they were made free by Mr Carter and would be so unless I gave them ten Dollars each I was informed by two of the Caffrees, that this Man and Stephen were the two Ring leaders, but when sent for, his awe over them was such they durst not own what they told me, besides there has been several Robberies & houses broke open from whence some of the Companys Peice Goods were lost, in which I am persuaded this fellow was concerned, as he always came up and had the Audacity to speak without being asked when any suspected Person was brought to me, I sent him likewise on Board the Nancy

I don't know any thing has escaped me informing you of, therefore shall finish this Long Letter with only two remarks more one respecting my own charges the other a small recapitulation of the Reason for delivering the Accounts as I received them from those, who kept them

At my first landing every Necessary for the Table & otherways at which all were entertained was entirely my own stock, nor have I from first to last, charged any Wines Liquors or other Stores though my whole Sea Stock has been exhausted either at the Publick Table or in entertaining the Pangarans I have neither charged any thing for ware, tare, or loss of Furniture fifteen yards of fine Broad cloth, presented the Pangarans, nor for a Sword and Brace of Pistols sent to the Sultan of Moco Moco These Sir as I doubt not receiving a proper Compensation for, from the Honble Court at my return, I desire you will particularly examine into and Notice my Expences latterly may have been very large but if the house book is looked into, it will be found to arise from the Provision, I was making to get all the Poultry I could against your arrival, and as to my present Expenses I shall submit them likewise to the Company without makeing any particular charge

As to the Accounts I have already informed you after the regulation I had made and given from my Indisposition I was incapable to inspect into them, till the latter end of September, when the General Paymaster and accomptants offices fell into my hands, it could not be conceived I could become General Paymaster and Accomptant with the Multitude of other Affairs I must have to transact without some Assistance, to accomplish this I made Mr Weston Sub Accomptant and directed the Manner of his entering the Invoices in a Journal, but he had scarce done that before he fell into such a way that he was incapable of every thing I had then no Assistance, Mr Blackwell, Mr King, Mr Dallow, and Mr Herbert Factors Mr Desmaretz and Francis Writers being all ill, in this situation, therefore all I could do was to direct Mr Holloways care of the Stores and to make the Cash my chief Care

The beginning of November when Mr King and Dallowe had recovered a little, the General Paymasters which I found they had at Intervals Managed engaged their attention so much that I could never obtain their Accounts and of Course no help from them, and since they could be of no service to me The People at Lenou declaring they would not go without a Resident, & Manna teizing me constantly for one, the Country having great regard & the Chiefs receiving Power from his Presence I therefore sent Mr King to Manna and Mr Dallowe to Lenou

Moco Moco having from my arrival and being now in particular from a dread of the Dutch pressing for a Resident there likewise I sent Mr Smyth down, so that you must observe the Military Payments fell to my Lot also, which obliged me to blend every Cash, under one Head of the Honble United Companys Cash

At this time there was a Ballance due from Mr Smyth as Sub treasurer which by his Books you will find still open I doubt not but he will now pay it to you

For want of means therefore which has attended me from the beginning, I am obliged Sir to deliver you every thing as they have been handed to me, and I believe it never was expected that any Person in my Situation should be accountable for all offices under the Dilemmas I have been not only ill myself but every body round me under the like unfortunate Circumstances I confess myself happy delivering them up as I have, if not regular and fully kept up, yet distinct enough to leave my Character unsullied

The Captain Vincent of the Osterley had already received his dispatches, yet I thought I could not well omit communicating to you in this seperate address, the arrival of his Majestys Ship the Panther from Batavia, which is just now come to an Anchor in this Road The destination of that ship as I have already acquainted your Honor &ca is in consequence of Captain Tinker's orders, to visit the Settlements on this Coast, Dutch as well as English where it might appear necessary to support the English Interest, to take cognizance of the Incroachments of the Dutch and to endeavour to procure redress, Commodore Watson is dangerously ill of a Fever is still here on the Honble Companys Ship Revenge and their orders being similar, they will have an Opportunity of proceeding together to Padang and acting in concert if found necessary in recovering our Settlements of Nattal and Tappanooly which there is Reason by Advices from Batavia to think the Dutch will attempt the recovery of For Mr Herbert, who together with Mr Blackwell is arrived on the Panther, acquaints me that after Mr Tinkers departure, there appeared a considerable Change in the behaviour of the Dutch who while he was there had not only agreed to withdraw their Garrisons at Nattal & Tappanooly, but likewise to give satisfaction for the depredations they had been making for a course of many Years on the Vessels of Europeans and others under the Companys protection on this Coast, but on later Application being made to the General on these subjects by Messrs Herbert and Marriot he told them that if the Shabander, who had served him as an Interpreter in his negociation with Captain Tinger had explained the Matter so to Captain Tinker, that it was not his Intentions, for that he would maintain Nattal & Tappanooly unless forced from the English, and as for the Accounts which had been presented to him of the unlawful seizures the Dutch had made of English property, that these were Matters he has no knowledge of In consequence of these seemingly real declarations they dispatched before the Panthei sailed, a ship for Padang with 60

Europeans & 100 Buggueses soldiers, Mr Herbert also acquaints me that Mr Marriot whom your Honour &ca had sent to Batavia with you [sic] Credentials as Resident for transacting the Honble Companys Affairs, was not admitted of in a Publick Character and was told to withdraw for that no British subject would be suffered to reside there even in a private character, after some importunity however he was told he might remain till he could have orders in consequence of what he intended writing to you on that subject

Mr Marriot in a short Letter wherein he only refers me to Mr Herbert for Intelligence of what is related above informs me of the Fox's being arrived at Batavia and that he hoped both she and the Plassey would be ready to sail by the end of May

Translate of a Letter from the Sultans of Moco Moco to the President and Council of Madras

Carry this friendly Letter with many Compliments from his Excellence the Sultan Seeree Sooltan Khalipa Toohla Gundom Sah Moallam Sah and his Excellence the Sultan Seeree Sooltan Passesseer Barral Sah from their place of Residence at Moco Moco, hoping by Gods Assistance it will come safe to the Governor Mr Pigot and the Gentlemen of the Council at Madrass This is to let the Governor and Council know that the Letter and Present sent us under the care of the Governor Mr Ardley have come to our hands very safely We have a just sense of the Esteem you express for us, and we return our grateful acknowledgements The Governor has thought fit to inform us of the destruction of Pondicherry and the Capture of all the French Settlements on the Choromandel Coast, this news gives every one here the greatest satisfaction. We rejoice that you have thought proper to send Mr. Ardley from Madrass as Governor to settle the affairs of these Countries and to quiet the Minds of the people Further the Governors orders are that the 14 Mantrees, the Limocoto's the Proateens and in General all the Natives here should be directed to renew their Pepper Gardens We cannot yet answer for the success of our endeavors in promoting the pepper Investment, for the Gardens are in a Manner entirely ruined by the troubles of our destructive enemies the French have brought on We mention this circumstance lest the Governor should be this Country induced to think that we were negligent in making our People plant Pepper, but we purpose joining our endeavors to those of Mr Ardley to promote that Business in the most effectual Manner We had the Pleasure of seeing him on board his Ship when at Anchor off Moco Moco and had a friendly Conference We have nothing to present you at this Time worthy of your with him May your lives be long and happy Dated the 21st day of the acceptance Month of Saban 1762

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

By the Pocock Snow Captain Edwards I addressed you from the streights of Sunda where I met that Vessel, & enclosed you Mr Ardleys Letter from Marlbro The following day which was the 7th Instant, The Plassey got into Batavia Road Commodore Tinker who was at Onroost in the Medway (with the Bellaine Frigate & Revenge Company Ship) sent his Barge for me as he purposed sailing the next Day, in order to hear if I had particular news, to regulate his Measures for the West Coast, whither the Revenge had been ordered by him, & was designing to sail the same time, the Commodore I know not if he has wrote you, but I think it proper to inform your Honor & Council that he has assured me, that the General has given his word that Nattal & Tappanooly shall be delivered into our Hands, whenever they are applied for, & Mr Watson is ordered down the Coast, to see they perform the same immediately, He also tells me, the General had assured him, the sufferers on the West Coast should receive satisfaction for the seizures formerly made by their Vessels &ca

I have had the Honour to deliver your Letter to his Excellency & as it was Translated & read in Council I understand the 12th I hope soon to have the pleasure of confirming this peice of Intelligence by a Vessell which will sail about the latter end of this Month

I am permitted to repair & load the Plassey according to Mr Ardleys Indent excepting the Arrack & sugar which Articles I must purchase I find from the Dutch Companys Godowns at a higher price though not so good

The Panther King's ship is still under repair at Onroost, she will be finished in about two Weeks she is ordered by the Commodore to follow the Revenge down the Sumatra Shore & inform the Gentlemen at Padong, that if they offer to molest the Companys People at Nattal or Tappanooly or their trading Vessels they may depend on being called to a severe Account as soon as the Admiral or Commander in Chief of his Majestys Fleet are informed of such their proceedings. On this ship Mr Herbert will take his Passage for Marlbro the Commodore having given particular directions to the Captain to land him there

The latest Advices from Europe was by a ship which sailed from Holland in September last. They bring Accounts of two Actions in Germany between the Prussians and Austrians and the Allies and French. The Prussian gained some advantages & are entrenched now strongly & so advantageously as to cut off all supplies to the Enemy, The Allies have also been Victorious, but it is not said if the Affair was decissive or General Admiral Cornish has been at Mauritius & the Rendevous, He has received some dispatches from Europe by the Terpsichore Frigate, who advise that the Commodore Kepple was not coming out. The York Kings ship & Companys ship Revenge got foul of each other the York lost her Head Bowsprit & foremast & Maintop Mast, the Revenge was so much hurt as to be very near foundering. The York got into the Cape (where is also the Chatham, Alderney Sloop, & above Frigate) and the Revenge hither

The Governor of Zeylon arrived here about a Week ago, Commodore Mole also came in from the same place two Days After—He met with Mr Tinker in the Streights who finding the Dutch Commodore did not strike his Pennant ordered the Revenge & Bellaine to run alongside of him & oblige him to it which was accordingly performed—For this day or two past there are reports in Town that a Fleet of 15 sail of Ships were arrived from France at the Mauritius and have sunk seven of our Men of War, Again that a Storm happened there in which the same Number of Ships was lost, But they gain no Credit & are supposed to be raised in revenge for the discipline they receive, as Mr Mole ship it is said brings this news & 'tis pretended it came from the Coast of Coromandel to Zeylon

Mr Tinker is still cruizing in the streights

Agreable to what we then advised, we now dispatch the Royal Captain to your Place, having first ordered her to Trinconemalee to Land some stores & Provisions for the use of the Squadron, the quantity of which has rendered it impossible for us to put on board more, than three hundred Bales in part of her Cargoe amounting to Rupees 15281–1–90 as \mathbb{P} accompanying Invoice and Bill of Lading but which we hope will be no disappointment as the Gentlemen at Bengal advise us, that they purposed sending a further supply of five Lacks of Rupees, in all the Month of March which will we imagine, enable your Honour &ca to compleat this ships stock to China & render it unnecessary to send her to Bengal as was at first intended

On the True Briton we embarked two French Officers to proceed to Europe and now send four on this ship, having paid the Commanders at the rate of 40£ each for their Passage A List shewing their Names and Rank is now enclosed in order for its being forwarded to the Supracargoes of Council at Canton

Honble Sir & Sirs

I had the Honour of your Letter by the Fox Captain Hume who Imported here the 9th of last Month, she now returns with what I have procured as \$\mathbb{H}\$ the enclosed Invoice & Bill of Lading

I am sorry as well that I am not able to give her so quiet a dispatch as I could wish, but that I have not been fully capable of sending all the Indent, the Vessels with plank & Timber not being come in from Java which make them scarce—I am told I can send the large plank on freight by Dutch Ships to Negapatam if so and their terms are easy I shall take the first Opportunity if I can purchase them soon

I waited on the General for his pleasure after delivering the Letters which I brought, He told me he would reply to them the first Opportunity, directed me to send to him particulars relating to the Vessels seized on the West Coast which he would immediately enquire into — That in respect to what Commodore Tinker informed me concerning Nattall & Tappanooly being promised to be relinquish'd his Excellency absolutely denied ever to have made any such promise, That he had referr'd it home to the states & must wait their decission

I accordingly addressed him on the subject of the Vessels seized Copy of my Letter goes a Number in this Packet A few days after I received an order to attend His Excellency which having obeyed he told me there was a Paragraph in the Letter I had delivered which he thought highly affronting as I seemed to threaten on non compliance I told his Excellency it gave me much Chagrin to find that what I meant as a sincere desire that things should amicably should [sic] be mistaken, That you Honour &c^a Council had told me you insisted on satisfaction & that I thought my duty to represent it to him & the Council that you were firmly resolved to be put off no longer as had been done for many years & that therefore I took the Liberty of recommending it to their serious consideration that those consequences might not attend so trifling an Affair That I was

conscious I intended nothing but respect, if my meaning was misconstrued, I had nothing but the Integrity of my heart to console me under the Misfortune, but I thought my duty obliged me to say what I did and flattered myself my Superiors would not judge in the Manner his Excellency had done

To my apoligy he replied it was very well but he must return me my Letter (which he accordingly did) as they could not receive it in that stile. He however told me the enquiry should be made notwithstanding on which I took my leave. The Shabander told me that Copys were taken of every thing & I hope an end will be put to this Affair soon.

Give me leave Gentlemen just to add on this Head that if I was wrong not only to write but to persist in the same Thoughts its an Error in Judgement & not a design to disgust, as I've observed your Orders on that Head scrupulously & believe no one can complain of my conduct since here

In reply to my repeated desire of staying here till I had your Commands His Excellency told me the Council persisted in their Resolution of my going now I shall proceed therefore when the Plassey is repaired I know not but a Vessel will soon sail from hence for Madrass by her I shall either embark or inform your Honour &c² what steps I have taken

Captain Affleck in the Belleine having taken out some Provision from a Dutch ship wrote Mr Herbert to pay the amount as he was going away I discharged it, enclosed is a Bill on Captain Affleck for the Amount which is 5064 Rix Dollars

SUPPLEMENT

Since writing the above I have had Intelligence that two English ships supposed bound for China were seen off this place the 20th Ultimo had I known sooner would have tryed to get some Intelligence from them Two Dutch Indiamen are likewise arrived which bring no other advice but that Prince Ferdinand had raised a seige which the French had undertaken and entirely routed them that there was no prospect of Peace but that the French had made overtures for a seperate one which was not accepted, these ships sailed from Holland the 12th December last Being entirely a stranger to the Methods of procuring the Goods your Honour and Council directed me to purchase, the Shabandar directed me to a person who He assured me would get them as cheap good & expeditiously as I could desire I am ashamed to tell you I am greatly deceived in his recommendation for the tedious Manner he has acted & the exorbitant prices he demands makes it appear to me he designs it as a Jobb for he never would deliver his Bill till Yesterday in which comparing it with one Account Mr Herbert left me I find too much difference in the Value that I cannot in Prudence pay till I have the Generals Directions which I am resolved to apply for, so that I cannot fill up the Invoice, accompanying is a List of the different prices that your Honour &ca may judge how much they endeavour to extort

From the Shabander I've this Instant learned the Resolutions concerning the West Coast seizure are that they are again applying to Padong for further insight into the affair by which your Honor &ca Council will judge how far We are from the hopes of receiving Restitution

Enclosed is an Acct Current of my disbursements to this date

To the Right Honble Petrus Albertus Vanderparra Governor General for the Netherlands East India Company & President of the Council at Batavia & to the rest of the Members of the said Council

RIGHT HONBLE SIR & HONBLE SIRS

The seizures of the several Vessells belonging to the Gentlemen in the service of the Honble English East India Company on the West Coast of Sumatra and for which they have not had the least satisfaction have been often represented and is again ordered to be repeated to this Government

I flatter myself your Excellency & your Honors will determine to do us justice as the Papers I have to deliver & what I have to address on that Head must make it appear that from fault or Misdemeanor have We been injured that what [was] done is contrary to the Laws of Nations & common justice, In short that these Acts of Oppression were pursued merely because we were unable to redress ourselves

The Vessels I am to demand reparation for are the Expedition Praw taken in Padong Road in the year 1755 the Vessel & Master were sent to Batavia and the latter was banished to Pooloo Dammei. The Praw Sinkil was seized at Teekoo & sold at Padong. The Random Sloop going over to Pooloo. Nias, the Crew murdered the Master & was making for some of the Islands near Padong when she was descried by one of the cruizing Panchallongs from that place & chased on shore. In respect to the Expedition Praw you will please to observe by the Narrative No. 1 which I enclose for your Excellency's & Your Honour's perusal together with the Copy's of the Letters to & from Hirzeet & the Gentlemen of Council at Padong that the Master to show his designs just & obviate all jealousy when he arrived instantly waited on the Governor with his Pass

The false and frivolous pretences made use off for the seizure of the Vessell & Cargoe fully evince the Evil Mind of that Gentleman (& I must judge be made use of more specious Arguments than he did to our Government of Fort Marlbro) to induce his late Excellency & the Gentlement [sic] of Council here to gain their Approbation, of his unwarrantable & unjust proceedings & get a confirmation of what deserves a severe Punishment The attested copy of the Stock & Block of this Vessel is Mislaid but as a prop[r]ietor & who had all the management of this concern I am willing to make Affidavit to the Acct No 3 as being the true Value

The case of the Praw Sinkil is much the same as the above, therefore nothing need be said further about her than that a like issue must happen to both

The Random Sloop's detention confiscation & sale is more particular, the Master was murdered but before the Villains could make any advantage of their Prize a Dutch Cruizer obliged them to quit their Vessel in order to escape from their hands, where otherwise they would have received the reward their Crime deserved here, Mr Hurzeete shewed his different Notions of Justice from his late Excellency & Council For in a similar case which was that of a small Vessel belonging to Mr Carter late Governor of Bencoolen bound for Madrass from Nattall the Crew Murdered the Master The Vessel afterwards drove on the Java Shore where it was taken in like manner with the former & delivered back to Mr Carter when it was demanded as his property, Mr Huzeete indeed

promised me to write in my Behalf to his late Excellency & the Council as knowing she was my Property, how far he performed his promise I cannot pretend to judge, a further Proof of the Validity of my claim being acknowledged, is one of the Murderers was sent from Padong on my demanding him, & the others promised to be seized & sent likewise if they appeared as they were known to be in those Parts.

In the year 1758 I had the Misfortune to loose a sloop on the Island of Noosee The Master having missed the straights Mouth through Ignorance & got to the Place by Chance His late Excellency had made Enquiry after the People who plundered and burnt her and in a Letter I had the Honour to receive from him on that subject he assured me if there was a possibility of getting me redress I might depend on his procuring it, how his Excellency proceeded in it I must beg may be made an Enquiry, the Extracts marked No 7 will fully explain to your Excellency & your Honors the nature of my Request as the utmost of my hopes must be from the Resident of Gumbong, He having from this Account Possession of the Gold which was near five hundred Spanish Dollars

I have represented nothing but facts concerning the several Vessels if they appear well founded Your Excellency & your Honours will I hope order immediate Restitution

I might further observe that various Pretexts have been used by the Gentlemen at Padong in order to defend their proceedings, such as the illegality of the Passes, though made in the name of the Honble English East India Company & sealed with their seal, the deficiency of our Companys claim to a Trade in those parts—But as these will plainly Occur to your Excellency & your Honors I shall say nothing on those Heads

His late Excellency offered Mr Herbert one half of the Vessells in question; if we had a right to one half why not to the whole—But I have now more sanguine Expectations that your Excellency, by the so ready compliance shewed & resolving without hesitation to rehear this Affair will put a final decission on it & that my superiors of Madrass & Bengal will have no occasion to apply to the Commander of his Britannick Majestys Fleet in India on this subject as they are resolved to do, if they meet not on this Application suitable satisfaction

Your Excellency has told me you cannot consent to the request of the Honble President & Council of Madrass for my continuing here in quality of Resident for the English Company. For me to presume to enquire into the Motives of this Refusal is impertinent but I must beg leave to say that as ever since the year 1747 when Mr Combes first came that peice of service has been deemed necessary & as it may be more essentially needfull for their Honours affairs at present as well as for the Nation in General for thó we are not in his Majestv's Service immediately yet as it is in a great measure for that purpose I am sent, so I judge it is with the Knowledge & consent of the Admiral if not by his desire that one is fix'd here in these troublesome times, however your Excellency's Commands must not be disputed and I hope I shall be pardoned if I request leave to continue till I have orders to dispose of myself, as I know not what part I shall be destined & my returning either to Madrass or going to Bencoolen may disconcert my Superiors Intention

HONBLE SIR & SIRS

We had the Honour to Receive your Letters dated the 16th of November & 7th of March, by Mr Marriotte and Captain Hume & must commence our Answer by returning our sincere Thanks for your compliment of Condolance on the Loss we have sustained by the Death of General Mosel, & likewise your kindly congratulating his successor who will follow his Example in neglecting no opportunity to cultivate in these Parts, that Harmony which subsists between the Crown of Great Britan & our Republic, We are also obliged to you for acquainting us of Mr Ardley's appointment to the Gover[n]ment of Fort Marlbro, be assured it will give us great satisfaction to contribute to his Assistance in every respect that does not interfere in our own Interest, we have already given one Instance thereof in permitting Mr Marriot to dispose of all the Merchandize he brought & purchase Provisions &ca for the settlement of Bencoolen

The greatest Part of your Letter dated Novr 16th concurs exactly with a Memorial delivered to us by Mr Marriot the 20th of April we shall therefore take this opportunity of answering both and commence with the first of Mr. Marriot's Memorial which requires us to evacuate Nattall & Tappanooiy assuring us that Point had been already settled between Captⁿ Tinker & the General, We cannot imagine what reason Mr Tinker had for thinking so, as there was no direct conversation between the General & himself relating to either of those Settlements, Mr Hunter who was always present acknowledges the same but confessed Captain Tinker had some Assurance given him thereof, by Secretary Van Noringrfeb (who is since dead) but was convinced he had no Authority to promise any thing of consequence & that he must apply for the Restitution of those places in a publick Manner, which he never did nor even mentioned a word concerning them till his departure when he informed the Governor he had particular Orders to protect & assist the British subjects on the West Coast and was entirely satisfied with our good Intentions towards them which they should be advised of, We have engaged your Attention but too long in relating a Circumstance of no Material Consequence and shall therefore descend to the Point in Dispute, It was only in the year 1751 that your People established a Factory at Nattall which will plainly appear by Letters we wrote concerning it to the Council at Madras bearing date Octr 20 1752 & September 30th 1754 Our Right to Tappanooly & Nattal is founded on an undisturbed Possession of them almost one hundred Years as we asserted in our Letter to Bencoolen dated the 13th April 1756

If Right to Possession is founded either on the prior or the latter Date of Treaties we are equally satisfied, for our claim in regard to the first case rests upon a Grant given to our Company by the Emperor of Manincabo who had sole Possession of the Coast from Indraporum to Singo, in the year 1666 and under whose Gover[n]ment those disputed Places were at that time. In respect to the second case, our right is justly founded for when you was dispossessed of both Nattall & Tappanooly by the French the Inhabitants immediately entered into an Agreement with us and of their own accord renewed their former treaty, we may also add that the People of Nattal assured us, that is was[eic] absolute necessity only that made them rely on the Protection of the English. But notwthstanding our Right is so justly founded on a prior claim we shall avoid all disputing about it, & only remark that Begindo Mahazadia Lello who was acknowledged both by the English & Dutch to be their principal Chief never

consented to the Agreement made with the others by your Gover[n]ment at Bencoolen, you seemed likewise to be doubtful in 1753 whether your prentences[sic] were Legall or not, for your Letters only express a desire to possess what might be your right & not to injure others, The Council of Bencoolen also wrote in 1751 to ours at Padang that they had entered into such an Agreement at Nattall who they said were independent altho we knew to the contrary as they acknowledged themselves in 1693 by a treaty made with us to be Subjects to the King of Baros & Maningabo and resigned themselves as such under our Protection excluding all other Nations from having any connection with them It is for these reasons Gentlemen & many others equally as strong that we cannot regard our resettling at Nattall & Tappanooly as an infringement of the treaty subsisting between the two Nations as you are pleased to term it, but rather as renewing an old contract that is rendered now more effectual, by the voluntary submission of the People with whom it was made, which renders us incapable of giving you the satisfaction you demand as it is not in our Power to decide an Affair of such Importance, We must therefore refer you to a determinate Answer that is daily expected, from our Superiors who where [sic] long since acquainted with the whole Affair by the ship Schoonzigt We have no reason to imagine you will disapprove the delay as you sent us the very same answer to our complaints concerning Nattall by your Letter dated March 27th 1757 namely that you had deferred the decission of the Affair to your Superiors, but we have never had the satisfaction to be acquainted with their determination

The second part of Mr Marriot's Letter accuses us of seizing several English Vessells on the Coast of Sumatra in an illegall Manner for which he demands satisfaction & likewise for our banishing a person named Nrachojee Amboon who was Master to one on the Isle of Edam

We declare we know of no English Vessels that were ever seized by us in an unlawful Manner nor that there ever was a Master of one named Anchova to our knowledge at this place much less that such a Person was banished to the Isle of Edam, if any Circumstances of the kind can be proved even by a private person we will immediately convince you how desirous we are to render justice and that there was no occasion for either Captⁿ Tinker or M^r Marriot to apply publickly for redress on that Account

We cannot avoid expressing our great suprise[sic] at the Threatening terms wherewith you [demand] satisfaction, and think it ill agrees with the desire you express to live in Friendship and Harmony with us. The fatal consequences of your application to his Majestys Land & Sea Officers we shall wait for with indifference, being certain his Britannic Majesty's directions can be only just & reasonable & will never warrant any violent proceedings to inforce satisfaction, which we have only refused to a complaint unaccompanied with sufficient & convincing Proofs, we could enumerate many Instances of our readiness to comply with your Requests when the Cases have been different, & are certain you cannot be unacquainted with them, We are willing to believe an unbounded Zeal only could have induced your Honour &ca to use such severe terms at the conclusion of your Letter dated Novr 16th

Notwithstanding we are willing to give you all the satisfaction you can desire in regard to the second part of Mr Marriotte's Memorial, we find it is impossible for us to do it, Nor can we by any means comply with your request in permitting Mr Marriotte to reside at this place. Our reasons for refusing it are explained in a Letter we wrote in Answer to one received from Fort Marlbrō concerning Mr Herberts appointment, who was only permitted to continue here for a short Time, altho at your request he was afterwards permitted to remain and we promised to afford him all necessary assistance, We were likewise desirous to shew Mr Marriott some Indulgence but he has prevented us by explaining so publickly the purport of his Commission, which being executed he will return, however you may depend upon our yielding all

assistance in our Power to any English Vessel that may stand in need of it, we have aiready given an Instance of it in supplying Captⁿ Tinker with the Money he desired, and as much provission as we could possibly spare, but are sorry to assure you those civilyties made no impression on him, as appears by his unfriendly conduct to some of our Vessells which he met in the straights of Sunda, we have complained to Admiral Coinish about it, and don't doubt but his Britannic Majesty will see that we have reasonable satisfaction

We have however convinced you that we are above being prejudiced against a Nation by the Misconduct of a single Man, having permitted Captain Hume to purchase all the sugar he wanted althout the Quantity exported from hence by Captain Tinker has caused a great scarcity, Captain Hume himself will confirm our Assertion & we hope you will be equally as well satisfied with our proceedings here as with the Assistance your People received at Mallacca, which treatment they shall always meet with from us where they conduct themselves in a reasonable Manner

To His Excellency the Right Honble Petrus Albertus Vander Parra Governor General & the Honble Council for the Affairs of the Netherlands India Company

RIGHT HONBLE SIR & HONBLE SIRS

July 1st 1762

As I have already had the Honor of delivering your Excellency & your Honour's the predisent [sic] & Council of Madrass's address of the 16th November, and also another from the Deputy Governor of Fort Marlbro under date the 26th March 1762, in obedience to his Excellency's commands I am now to explain the nature of those Commissions which my orders from those places have given me in charge. The first particular regards the delivery of Natall & Tappanooly to the Honble English Company, but in this I think I have great reason to rejoice to find from Commodore Tinker that he has obviated my application by having already amicably settled that Point with your Excellency & your Honours as he has informed me they [are] immediately to be restored

The second Article consists in a particular request from my Superiors that your Excellency & your Honours will please to reconsider the Injurys which the English Companys Servants on the West Coast of Sumatra has received by the seizure & confiscation of several Vessels with their Cargoes & the banishment of one of the Masters of them (by Name Noqueda Inchio Amboon alias Lee Mohinee) to Pooloo Dammer In this too the Commodore Tinker has assured me his Excellency promised him the enquiry requested shall be made, of which in my presence the Commodore directed Mr Hunter Commissary to his Britannic Majesty's Fleet to remind his Excellency I have therefore nothing more to add on this Head, than that I have no doubt but I shall meet suitable redress as I have the highest Opinion of your Excellency & your Honours justice & Equity

In regard to the Account of the different disbursements at Madrass for my Regiment which you were pleased to send me in your Letter of the 16th April those relative to the Hospital Charges I have certified, & now enclose to you the others which are for the ammunition expended, by my Regiment either for their discipline or on the actual service of the Company are of such a nature that I am very certain were I to throw an Expence of that kind on the Government, I should very justly deserve their censure, for if the Gentlemen at Madrass will but consider that 27 Officers & 717 Men of my Regiment have been lost upon the Companys Service on the Coast & in the Fata Salam, and that each Man cost at the least charge for recruiting five Pounds, they will find that

there will then be a very considerable Ballance in favor of the Gover[n]ment (not to mention the Regiment Colours & Stores which were my own private Loss)

What makes this charge seem the [moie] extraordinary to me is the immense Quantity of Military stores taken in the different Forts on the Coast of Choromandel during the time I had the Honour to Command there which have been appropriated by the Company for their use, and to my certain knowledge greatly exceeds the Stores expended in taking those Places

These Considerations puts it out of my Power to comply with their Request

The Sea Nymph after having been from Batavia two Months returned thither the 29th June having met very bad Weather, and nothing but North & Westerly Winds & currents all the time of her being out she was very Leaky & had broke her main Boom & wanted many other repairs which were compleated the Day I left that place & she was going out of the River that Evening I have given orders to the Master & Captain Hague to keep Company if possible to Marlbro, the above Vessel met the Panther the 21st of May of Fortune Island and the 26th June the Fox with several Dutch ships & the Elizabeth Snow for Madrass off Bantam, they not being able to get out of the straights the Winds & Current still running strong from the West

There being a large Quantity of Salt & Plank remaining & the Plassey not been able to take twenty Canisters of Sugar Candy which I had bought for Marlbro all which occasions warehouse Room and people to take care of them I left with Mr James Burnet 500 R Ds to pay those Charges The General had given me permission to procure Praws to transport those Articles to Marlbro As I had not time to get any I left it to the Charge of this Gentlemen [sic] to do it, if He can it will lessen the Expences & likewise hinder the loss laying there any time may occasion, if not of the whole should any accident happen to those with whom they are entrusted

The Boneta Ketch Captⁿ Thos Forrest which belonged to Henry Vansittart Esq^r Governor of Bengal was lost off Salayar the 27th Febry of which he sent me Notice in a Letter to M^r Vincent a Burgher of Batavia dated the 23d March The Morning I embarked (about an hour before) 1 received a Note from him and his Chief Officer acquainting me they were confined on board a Dutch ship then in Batavia road, & desired my interposition. As the Captain was gone on Board & the ship might probably sail immediately I could not attend his Excellency to enquire into this Affair as he lived some Miles from the Town. I therefore went to the Shabandar & demanded to know why they were Prisoners but he would only tell me that an order had been made in Council and that they were to be released & sent on shore, so that they must have been arrived some days, For fear however of any collusion I wrote to Captain Hague a Letter directing him to wait on the General as soon as possible to get some Information concerning them & their Freedom if he could

The 19th Instant I arrived here & purposing to proceed soon to your Honour &c² Council at Madrass I conclude myself

REAR ADMIRAL OF THE WHITE AND COMMANDER IN CHIEF OF HIS MAJESTY'S FLEET IN INDIA

In the directions I received from my superiors at the Coast, they particularly recommended the recovery of the Honble English Companys Settlements of Nattall & Tappanooley on the West Coast of Sumatra to my Notice Had I been so happy as to succeed I am convinced it wou'd be a mutual good for both Companys But as his Excellency has told me it was referred Home to the States I can have no hopes any thing I can advance will induce your Excellency & your Honours to alter these Resolutions
