PREFACE

Government servants have to be examined by the appropriate medical authorities for various purposes e.g. initial appointment, quasi-permanency, confirmation, leave, invalidation, etc. The orders on the subject are so scattered that difficulty is being experienced in the various Ministries etc. With a view to minimising this difficulty an attempt has been made in this Hand Book to incorporate all the relevant orders, decisions and interpretations. It is hoped that this compilation will be useful to the Ministries, Departments and Offices of the Government of India in the task of administering the rules and orders.

It is proposed to keep this Hand Book up-to-date by issuing correction slips as and when necessary. The errors and omissions that may be found in this Volume may kindly be brought to the notice of the Ministry of Health.

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APPENDIX I

Regulations as to the physical examination of candidates for admission into the technical and Non-technical services Class I and Class II (Gazetted) under the Government of India except posts of Assistant Aerodrome Officers in the Civil Aviation Department and Defence services personnel.

I. Technical (Gazetted)

- (a) Railway Engineering Services (Civil, Electrical, Mechanical and Signal), Transportation(Traffic) and Commercial Department and posts of the Marine Establishment.
- (b) Central Engineering Classes I & II, Telegraph Engineering Class I, Electrical Engineering Classes I and II, Survey of India Classes I & II and Class I and II posts in the Engineering branch of the Overseas Communication Services. Technical Officers, Class I & II of the Inspection wing of the Directorate General of Supplies and Disposals...
- (c) Similar other Services as may be declared technical for the purposes of these regulations.

II. Non-technical (Gazetted)

(a) I.A.S., I.F.S., I.A. & A.S., Indian Customs Service, Indian Railway Accounts Service, Indian Defence Accounts Service, Medical Stores and Establishment Department of the Superior Revenue Establishment of the Indian Railways and Railway Protection Force, Chemists and Metallurgists and any other posts not connected with the train working or use of trolley, Income Tax Officers Class I, (Grade II) and Class II Service, Indian Postal Service (Class I), Military Lands and Cantonments Service, Classes I & II, Geological Survey of India, Classes I and II and other Central Civil Services Classes I & II, Technical Officers of Wireless Planning and Co-ordination Organisation, Classes I & II.

(b) Indian Police Service.

(These regulations are published for the convenience of candidates and in order to enable them to ascertain the probability of their coming up to the required physical standard. But it must be clearly understood that the Government of India reserve to themselves an absolute discretion to reject as unfit any candidate whom they may consider, on the report of the Medical Board, to be physically disqualified and that their discretion is in no respect limited by these regulations. These regulations are intended merely for the guidance of Medical Examiners and are not meant to restrict their discretion in any way).

- 1. To be passed as fit for appointment a candidate must be in good mental and bodily health and free from any physical defect likely to interfere with the efficient performance of the duties of his appointment.
- 2. (a) In the matter of the correlation of age, height and chest of candidates of Indian (including Anglo-Indian) race, it is left to the Medical Board to use whatever correlation figures are considered most suitable as a guide in the examination of the candidates. If there be any disproportion with regard to height, weight and chest girth, the candidate should be hospitalised for investigation and X-ray of the chest taken before the candidate is declared fit or not fit by the Board.
- (b) However, for certain services the minimum standards for height and chest girth without which candidates cannot be accepted, are as follows:—

The minimum height prescribed is relaxable in case of candidates belonging to races such as Gorkhas, Garhwalis, Assamese Tribals, etc., whose average height is distinctly lower.

- 3. The Candidate's height will be measured as follows: He will remove his shoes and be placed against the standard with his feet together and the weight thrown on the heals and not on the toes or other sides of the feet. He will stand erect without rigidity and with the heels calves, buttocks and shoulders touching the standard; the chin will be depressed to bring the vertex of the head level under the horizontal bar, and the height will be recorded in inches and parts of an inch to quarters.
 - 4. The candidate's chest will be measured as follows:

He will be made to stand erect with his feet together, and to raise his arms over his head. The tape will be so adjusted round the chest that its upper edge touches the inferior angle of the shoulder blades behind and lies in the same horizontal plane when the tape is taken round the chest. The arms will then be lowered to hang loosely by the side, and care will be taken that the shoulders are not thrown upwards or backwards so as to displace the tape. The candidate will then be directed to take a deep inspiration several times and the maximum expansion of the chest will be carefully noted, and the minimum and maximum will then be recorded in inches, 33-35, 34-36½, etc. In recording the measurements, fractions of less than ¼ inch should not be noted.

- 5. The candidate will also be weighed and his weight recorded in pounds; fractions of a pound should not be noted.
- 6. The candidate's eye-sight will be tested in accordance with the following rules. The result of each test will be recorded:

There shall be no limit for minimum naked eye vision. The naked eye vision of the candidates shall, however, be recorded by the Medical Board or other medical authority in every case, as it will furnish the basic information in regard to the condition of the eye.

The standards for distant and near vision with or without glasses shall be as follows:—

3. Indian Police Service.

N.B.—When the age of the candidate at the time of first appointment is 35 years or more the corrected visual acuity will be reduced by one step i.e.

6/12 OR 6/12 6/9 OR 6/18

Note 1.—In respect of Services mentioned at 1 and 3 above, total amount of Myopia (including the cylinder) shall not exceed—4.00D. Total amount of Hypermetropia (including the cylinder) shall not exceed+4.00D.

Note 2.—In respect of services mentioned at 2 above, total amount of Myopia shall not exceed—8.00D and total Hypermetropia shall not exceed + 6.00D in the case of candidates above the age of 20 years and -6.00 D and + 6.00D in the case of those upto the age of 20 years.

Note 3.—Fundus Examination:

Wherever possible fundus examination should be carried out and results recorded. The necessity for carrying out such exmination is left to the discretion of the Medical Board.

Note 4.—Colour vision

- (i) The testing of colour vision shall be essential in respect of services mentioned at 1 and 3 above, as also for medical, Railway Protection Force and Chemist and Metallurgist under the Ministry of Railways.
- (ii) Colour perception should be graded into a higher and a lower Grade depending upon the size of the aperture in the lantern as described in the table below;

For the services concerned with the Safety of the Public higher grade of colour vision is essential but for others lower grade of colour vision should be considered sufficient. The same standards of colour vision should be applicable in respect of all engineering personnel in whose case colour perception is considered essential irrespective of the fact whether their duties involve field work or not.

(iii) Satisfactory colour vision constitutes recognition with ease and without hesitation of signal red, signal green and white colours. The use of Ishihara's plates, shown in good light and a suitable lantern like Edridge Green's shall be considered quite

dependable for testing colour vision. While either of the two tests may ordinarily be considered sufficient in respect of the services concerned with road, rail and air traffic, it is essential to carry out the lantern test. In doubtful cases where a candidate fails to qualify when tested by only one of the two tests, both the tests should be employed.

Note 5.—Field of Vision:

The field of vision shall be tested in respect of all services by the confrontation method. Where such test gives unsatisfactory or doubtful results the field of vision should be determined on the perimeter.

Note 6.—Night Blindness:

Night Blindness need not be tested as a routine, but only in special cases. No standard test for the testing of night-blindness or dark adaptation is prescribed. The medical Board should be given the discretion to improvise such rough tests e.g. recording of visual acuity with reduced illumination or by making the candidate recognize various objects in a darkened room after he/she has been there for 20 to 30 minutes. Candidates' own statements should not always be relied upon, but they should be given due consideration.

Note 7.—Ocular conditions other than visual acuity:

- (a) Any organic disease or a progressive refractive error which is likely to result in lowering the visual acuity should be considered as a disqualification.
- (b) Trachoma:

Trachoma, unless complicated shall not ordinarily be a cause for disqualification.

(c) Squint:

- For services mentioned at 1 and 3 above where the presence of binocular vision is essential, squint, even if the visual acuity is of the prescribed standard should be considered as a disqualification. For other services the presence of squint should not be considered as a disqualification if the visual acuity is of the prescribed standard.
- (d) For regular class I/II posts one-eyed persons are to be regarded as unfit. However, one-eyed individuals should not be altogether excluded from employment in Class I and Class II Services on a contract basis provided the visual activity in the functioning eye is 6/6 for distant vision and 0.6 for near vision and the refractive error is not more than + or—4.00D.

The above standards are not intended for the Defence Services personnel.

7. Blood Pressure.

The Board will use its discretion regarding Blood Pressure. A rough method of calculating normal maximum systolic pressure is as follows:—

- (i) With young subjects 15-25 years of age the average is about 100 plus the age.
- (ii) With subjects over 25 years of age the general rule of 110 plus half the age seems quite satisfactory.
- N. B.—As a general rule any systolic pressure over 140 and diastolic over 90 should be regarded as suspicious and the cardidate should be hospitalised by the Board before giving their final opinion regarding the candidate's fitness or otherwise. The hospitalization report should indicate whether the rise in blood pressure is of a transient nature due to excitement etc. or whether it is due to any organic disease. In all such cases X-ray and electrocardiographic examinations of heart and blood urea clearance test should also be done as a routine. The final decision as to the fitness or otherwise of a candidate will, however, rest with the Medical Board only.

Method of taking Blood Pressure

The mercury manometer type of instrument should be used as a rule. The measurmen t should not be taken within fifteen minutes of any exercise or excitement. Provided the patient and particularly his arm, is relaxed he may be either lying or sitting. The arm is

supported comfortably at the patient's side in a more or less horizontal position. The arm should be freed from clothes to the shoulder. The cuff completely deflated, should be applied with the middle of the rubber over the inner side of the arm, and its lower edge an inch or two above the bend of the elbow. The following turns of cloth bandage should spread evenly over the bag to avoid bulging inflation.

The brachial artery is located by palpitation at the bend of the elbow and the stethescope is then applied lightly and centrally over it below, but not in contact with the cuff. The cuff is inflated to about 200 mm. Hg. and then slowly deflated. The level at which the column stands when soft successive sounds are heard represents the Systolic Pressure when more air is allowed to escape the sounds will be heard to increase in intensity. The level at which the column well-heard clear sounds change to soft muffled fading sounds represents the diastolic pressure. The measurements should be taken in a fairly brief period of time as prolonged pressure of the cuff is irritating to the patient and will vitiate the readings. Re-checking, if necessary, should be done only a few minutes after complete deflation of the cuff. (Some-times as the cuff is deflated sounds are heard at a certain level; they may disappear as pressure falls and reappear at a still lower level. This 'Silent Gap' may cause error in reading).

- 8. The urine (passed in the presence of the examiner) should be examined and the result recorded. Where a Medical Board finds sugar present in a candidate's urine by the usual chemical tests, the Board will proceed with the examination with all its other aspects and will also specially note any signs or symptoms suggestive of diabetes. If, except for the glycosuria the Board finds the candidate conforms to the standard of medical fitness required they may pass the candidate "fit subject to the glycosuria being non-diabetic" and the Board will refer the case to a specified specialist in Medicine who has hospital and laboratory facilities at his disposal. The Medical Specialist will carry out whatever examinations, clinical and laboratory, he considers necessary including a standard blood sugar tolerance test, and will submit his opinion to the Medical Board, upon which the Medical Board will base its final opinion "fit or unfit". The candidate will not be required to appear in person before the Board on the second occasion. To exclude the effects of medication it may be necessary to retain a candidate for several days in hospital, under strict supervision.
 - 9. The following additional points should be observed:
 - (a) that the candidate's hearing in each ear is good and that there is no sign of disease of the ear. In case it is defective the candidate should be got examined by the ear specialist. Provided that if the defect in hearing is remediable by operation or by use of a hearing aid, a candidate cannot be declared unfit on that account provided he/she has no progressive disease in the ear. (This provision is not applicable in the case of Railway Services);
 - (b) that his/her speech is without impediment;
 - (c) that his/her teeth are in good order and that he/she is provided with dentures where necessary for effective mastication (well filled teeth will be considered as sound);
 - (d) that the chest is well formed and his chest expansion sufficient; and that his heart and lungs are sound;
 - (e) that there is no evidence of any abdominal disease;
 - (f) that he is not ruptured;
 - (g) that he does not suffer from hydrocele, a severe degree of varicocele, varicose vein or piles;
 - (h) that his limbs, hands and feet are well formed and developed and that there is free and perfect motion of all joints;
 - (i) that he does not suffer from any inveterate skin disease;
 - (j) that there is no congenital malformation or defect;
 - (k) that he does not bear traces of acute or chronic disease pointing to an impaired constitution;
 - (1) that he bears marks of efficient vaccination; and
 - (m) that he is free from communicable disease.

10. Screening of the chest should be done as a routine in all cases for detecting any abnormality of the heart and lungs, which may not be apparent by ordinary physical examination. Where it is considered necessary a skiagram should be taken.

When any defect is found it must be noted in the Certificate and the medical examiner should state his opinion whether or not it is likely to interfere with the efficient performance of the duties which will be required of the candidate.

Note.—Candidates are warned that there is no right of appeal from a Medical Board special or standing, appointed to determine their fitness for the above services. If, however, Government are satisfied on the evidence produced before them of the possibility of an error of judgement in the decision of the first Board, it is open to Government to allow an appeal to a second Board. Such evidence should be submitted within one month of the date of the communication in which the decision of the first Medical Board is communicated to the candidate otherwise no request for an appeal to a second Medical Board will be considered.

If any medical certificate is produced by a candidate as a piece of evidence about the possibility of an error of judgement in the decision of the first Board, the certificate will not be taken into consideration unless it contains a note by the medical practitioner concerned to the effect that it has been given in full knowledge of the fact that the candidate has already been rejected as unfit for service by the Medical Board.

MEDICAL BOARD'S REPORT

The following intimation is made for the guidance of the Medical Examiner:

The standard of physical fitness to be adopted should make due allowance for the age and length of service, if any, of the candidate concerned.

No person will be deemed qualified for admission to the Public Service who shall not satisfy Government, or the appointing authority, as the case may be, that he has no disease constitutional affection, or bodily infirmity unfitting him, or likely to unfit him for that service.

It should be understood that the question of fitness involves the future as well as the present and that one of the main objects of medical examination is to secure continuous effective service, and in the case of candidate for permanent appointment to prevent early pension or payments in case of premature death. It is at the same time to be noted that the question is one of the likelihood of continuous effective service, and the rejection of a candidate need not be advised on account of the presence of a defect which in only a small proportion of cases is found to interfere with continuous effective service.

The Board should normally consist of three members, (i) a Physician (ii) a Surgeon and (iii) an Ophthalmologist, all of whom should as far as practicable, be of equal status. A lady doctor will be co-opted as a member of the Medical Board whenever a woman candidate is to be examined.

Candidates appointed to the Indian Defence Accounts Service are liable for field service in or out of India. In the case of such a candidate, the medical board should specifically record their opinion as to his fitness or otherwise for field service.

The report of the medical board should be treated as confidential.

In cases where a medical board considers that a minor disability disqualifying a candidate for Government service can be cured by treatment (medical or surgical) a statement to that effect should be recorded by the medical board. There is no objection to a candidate being informed of the Board's opinion to this effect by the appointing authority and when a cure has been effected it will be open to the authority concerned to ask for another medical board.

APPENDIX II

Standard of medical fitness in regard to eyesight of Government servants in the Aerodrome Organisation of the Civil Aviation Department who have to deal with Aircraft Operations

Category of post	Minimum visual standards required
1. Aerodrome Operators, Grade I .	without glasses 6/60 each eye with glasses 6/6 each eye

- (a) Myopic correction requiring a lens of more than 6 dioptres in any meridian should cause rejection.
- (b) Hypermetropia of more than 4 Dioptres should not be allowed.
- (c) Colour test—Normal or defective safe.
- (d) Night Blindness should be a cause for rejection. No disease of the eyelids likely to become chronic or media or retina producing a visual impairment to constitute a cause for failure in the efficient performance of these duties should be present. Squint, a tendency to undue ocular fatigue or recurrent headaches should also be a cause for rejection.
- (e) The Aerodrome Operators, Grade I, will be examined with reference to these standards annually. Aerodrome Operators Grade II, Fire Foremen and Fire Operators will be examined after every two years.

APPENDIX IX

Duties of the Staff Surgeon, Fort William, Calcutta

The Staff Surgeon, Fort William, Calcutta, is responsible for the grant of medical certificates to the Central Government servants in Calcutta. Medical examination is mainly required for the following purposes:—

- (i) determination of physical fitness for Government service;
- (ii) Leave;
- (iii) invalidation from Government service and the grant of usual and other extraordinary pensions under the Chapter XXXVIII of the Civil Services (Extraordinary Pension) Rules or the Superior Civil Service (Extraordinary Pension) Rules, 1935, as the case may be; and
- (iv) Commutation of pensions.
- 2. As regards item (i), the Staff Surgeon shall furnish this certificate on the request of the Head of the Department employing the Government servant and the Staff Surgeon shall not charge any fees.
- 3. The certificate for purposes of leave falls into two categories, namely, (a) the initial certificate produced by the applicant; and (b) the countersignature of the initial certificate. Non-gazetted Government servants are to obtain this certificate from the medical practitioners who attend on them. The Staff Surgeon is not responsible for examining them free of charge for this pupose and is entitled to his fees. If the Head of a Department sends a non-gazetted employee to the Staff Surgeon for a second medical opinion, no charge is to be levied by the Staff Surgeon for such countersignatures. As regards the gazetted staff the Staff Surgeon is required to examine the officers requiring leave on medical grounds without any charge. The same applies to certificate required by Government servants, before returning from leave on medical grounds.
- 4. The Staff Surgeon may be allowed to charge a fee of Rs. 16/- when he is required to examine a non-gazetted Central Government servant at the latter's residence in Calcutta and that the fee paid in this connection should be reimbursed to the Government servant concerned. Before however the Staff Surgeon conducts such examination the Government servant should invariably produce a certificate from his attending doctor that he is unable to appear before the Staff Surgeon at Fort William even in an ambulance.
- 5. The Staff Surgeon is required to examine candidates for usual and extraordin ary pensions and Government servants to be invalided from service without any fee.
- 6. Fees for medical examination for purposes of commutation of pension are paid by the Government servants themselves.
- 7. In the matter of treatment of Government servants who go for treatment to the Staff Surgeon his position is like the other Presidency Surgeons in Calcutta and he may charge his fees.
- 8. It is clear that countersignature of an initial certificate after a patient has recovered has no meaning and if the Staff Surgeon feels that he cannot express an opinion at that stage he is free to say so.
