#### PREFACE

#### ATTORNEY GENERAL'S COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURE, DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE, Washington, D. C.

This monograph was one of a series of studies submitted to this Committee by the investigating staff working under the Director. The members of the staff are Walter Gellhorn, director; and Ralph S. Boyd, Kenneth C. Davis, Robert W. Ginnane, William W. Golub, Martin Norr, and Richard S. Salant.

These staff reports represent information and recommendations submitted to the Committee. They are not an expression of Committee findings or opinion. The Committee invited professional and lay criticism and discussion of the matter contained in these studies, both by written communications addressed to it at the Department of Justice, Washington, D. C., and by oral presentation at hearings which the Committee held in Washington on June 26, 27, and 28, and July 10, 11, and 12, 1940.
