FOREWORD

(1) In 1942 His Majesty's Government appointed an Expert Committee to investigate and appraise the work of psychologists and psychiatrists in the Services and to consider its application to other purposes. The Report of this Expert Committee is now published, since it is felt that it may be of general interest.

(2) The Government is not necessarily committed to all the conclusions or recommendations of the Report ; but they have been fully studied and have been implemented in considerable measure.

(3) Since the Report was written, a great deal of psychological and psychiatric work has been done in all Services, and surveys are now being undertaken to decide whether further material, including much of the evidence on which the Report was based, could usefully be published.
