Speech of the Honourable Finance Member

INTRODUCING THE

BUDGET FOR 1917=18.

I rise to present the Budget of the Government of India for 1917-18. The preliminary estimates which I laid before the Council on the 1st March have been revised in the light of our latest information. The Financial Secretary's Explanatory Memorandum has also been checked and brought up to date.

2. The final figures of the Revised Estimate for 1916-17 and of the Budget Estimate for 1917-18 are given in the separate formal statements. The broad results of the revenue account are brought out in the table below in which I have also shown in brackets, for convenience of comparison, the figures (now superseded) which were given in the corresponding table appearing in paragraph 70 of my speech introducing the Financial Statement.

3. The effect of our corrections in the Revised Estimate for the current year is to raise the Imperial surplus previously announced by £171,000 and the Provincial surplus by £46,000. On the Imperial side we have reduced the estimate for Railway gross receipts by £100,000 with reference to recent returns, but expect a counterbalancing saving under working expenses. The principal variation, however, which accounts for the entire improvement in the surplus, is a reduction, expected at home, of £195,000 in the net expenditure under Military Services. The improvement in the Provincial surplus is due to some further saving in the anticipated expenditure under Civil Works.

4. As regards the Budget of the next year, the net effect of the changes made is negligible, the Imperial surplus being now estimated at £136,000 as compared with £130,000 taken in the Financial Statement, while the small Provincial deficit of £98,000 remains unchanged.

As I mentioned in paragraph 54 (7) of my speech on March 1st, we are allotting the profits on our wheat scheme, amounting to £158,000, to the Local Governments, apart from a small sum reserved for expenditure under the orders of the Government of India. At the time the Financial Statement was introduced the allocation had not been settled, and the whole amount was, therefore, provisionally exhibited as Imperial expenditure under the Miscellaneous head. The Secretary of State has now approved our proposals for distributing the amount between the different provinces as announced in the Council a few days ago by my Honourable Colleague Sir Claude Hill Accordingly the debit to the "Miscellaneous" head has been excised, and the grants proposed, excluding the small Imperial portion, now appear on the Imperial side as transfers from Imperial to Provincial, while on the Provincial side a corresponding receipt is shown under the transfer head and the equivalent expenditure under the head "Agriculture."

5. Turning to ways and means, we have made two important changes. In the first place, instead of providing for the whole of our war loan receipts—provisionally taken at £10 million—in 1917-18, we are taking £3 million as likely to be received in the current year and £7 million next year. This raises our closing balance in India for 1916-17, but will not affect our expected closing balance on the 31st March 1918. Secondly, we have assumed that, in addition to the silver purchases for which we have previously made specific provision, the Secretary of State will buy some £2 million more in 1917-18. As we shall get a corresponding credit on this side, this will not affect our total closing balances on the 31st March 1918, but will mean that we shall have £2 million more in India than would otherwise have been expected and the Secretary of State £2 million less at home. I will allude again presently to both these points, but mention them now in order to clear the ground.

6. Coming then to the Revised Estimate for the current year, we expect that, apart from the war loan receipts just referred to, our aggregate closing balances on the 31st of this month will be about £600,000 less than was assumed in the Financial Statement. This deterioration is distributed almost equally between India, where it is the net result of a number of minor variations, and England where the fluctuations are somewhat more important. Thus the Secretary of State now expects to recover $\pounds 1\frac{1}{2}$ million less of war expenditure in the current year, and a correspondingly larger amount in 1917-18. On the other hand, he puts the payments for his purchases of silver at about $\pounds \frac{3}{4}$ million less, providing for this amount in 1917-18 instead and as already stated, anticipates about £200,000 less of military expenditure as well as smaller outgoings under other heads.

7. As regards the coming year, we anticipate that our total closing balance on the 31st March 1918 will be $\pounds 17\frac{1}{2}$ million, or about $\pounds \frac{1}{2}$ million better than was assumed in the Financial Statement. But for the special purchases of silver already mentioned, this would have represented a deterioration of $\pounds 1\frac{1}{2}$ million in our Indian balances counterbalanced by an improvement of roundly $\pounds 2$ million in the home balances. The reduction in our resources here is due to an increase in the estimate of our remittances to East Africa. These form part of the heavy recoverable war expenditure with which I dealt so fully in introducing the Financial Statement. A correspondingly larger recovery in London, together with certain other improvements on the English side this year and next, account for the larger balances which the Secretary of State now expects to hold.

8. As the Council will remember, we provided in the Financial Statement for a closing balance in India on the 31st March next of $\pounds 11\frac{3}{4}$ million which is slightly below the standard at which we usually aim; and a further charge of $\pounds 1\frac{1}{3}$ million, owing to the increase in recoverable war expenditure, would reduce our balances to an inconvenient extent. For this reason we have now assumed that the Secretary of State will purchase at least $\pounds 2$ million worth of silver in 1917-18, in addition to the-item of $\pounds \frac{3}{4}$ million to which reference has already been made. Our closing balances as a whole are expected to be ample, and this arrangement effects a proper distribution as between England and India. It is closely parallel in fact to the normal arrangement by which the particular figure which we take in our Budget as the estimate for the Secretary of State's Council sales is determined not by our anticipations of the probable trade demand, but by the transfer required to effect a proper distribution of our balances. Our discretion, therefore, in regard to the actual amount of silver which we shall ultimately purchase is in no way limited, and as to this I need not repeat what I said in paragraph 75 of my speech introducing the Financial Statement. Also, as this entry for the purchase of silver is a mere adjusting figure, we have not complicated the estimates by making consequential provision at this stage in respect of profits on coinage or mint receipts.

9. As regards the Indian War Loan, the entire proceeds of this large financial operation really appertain to the coming financial year, and there would have been some convenience if they could have been so shown. As, however, the loan has been opened a fortnight before that year commences, and is meeting with an immediate and exceedingly gratifying response, so that not merely applications but actual cash payments have come in on a large scale, we must of course exhibit such payments as debt raised in the current year. On the opening day the loan payments amounted to as much as £900,000 out of about £1 million subscribed, and we are not, I hope, unduly sanguine in assuming as we have done that by the 31st March we shall already have obtained some £3 million out of the total of £10 million which the loan is assumed to yield. I need hardly say that in adhering for the time being to the latter figure I do not wish it to be taken as my personal opinion, or that of the Government of India, that we may not hope for considerably more. The favourable reception of our loan proposals, and the energy and enthusiasm with which they are being taken up by so many patriotic helpers all over the country, do much to encourage such a hope; and as the Council are well aware, we shall only be too gratified to be able to hand over a far larger sum to His Majesty's Government. Our ways and means estimates, however, are drawn up largely with the object of enabling us to see how far we can meet all demands upon us in a period of special difficulty, and the figure £10 million really represents the minimum amount which is required with reference to our war expenditure in India rather than any definite forecast (which it would be idle to attempt at present) of the full amount which we may hope for.

10. While referring to this question of the probable yield of the loan, I may mention one particular direction in which there is undoubtedly a clear possibility of our provisional estimate being exceeded. In our ways and means forecast we have assumed that the savings bank deposits of the period will accrue to much the same extent as if we had been floating an ordinary loan with the usual post office section but with no extraordinary attractions. In effect, therefore, our estimate of a £10 million yield is exclusive of any sum which we may nominally obtain by transfer from savings bank deposits to Post Office cash certificates. But the more widely the advantages of these certificates become appreciated, the more likely it will be that the savings bank investor will place his money in this new form rather than as a bank deposit earning only 3 per cent. It is quite possible, therefore, that there may be a large transfer to the cash certificate form. This will not affect our resources in India, though it will of course entail a larger payment to His Majesty's Government at home. On the whole, therefore, we have thought it better to estimate for savings bank deposits on normal lines, as above explained, rather than to make some purely speculative estimate of the extent to which this process of transfer will proceed.

MEMORANDUM EXPLAINING THE DETAILS OF THE ESTIMATES.

In this memorandum the variations between the Budget and the Revised Introductory. estimates of the current year, and between the latter and the Budget estimates of next year, are explained in detail for the major heads of account. Under of next year, are explained in detail for the major heads of account. Under most of the heads details by provinces have been given, and it may be explained that the figures shown against "India General." represent the transactions of the Central Government, including all expenditure directly controlled by it, of the minor administrations of Ajmer-Merwara and Coorg, and of the convict settlement in the Andamans. The Budget estimates of Provincial and "Divided" expenditure in 1917-18 generally represent the allotments proposed by the several Governments and Administrations with allotments proposed by the several Governments and Administrations with whom regular provincial settlements have been concluded. More detailed information regarding the figures will be found in the Financial Statements presented by the Local Governments to their respective Councils.

2. The figures for the Province of Delhi have been entered separately and explained under each major head of account. A pro formâ account of expenditure on Delhi and the Delhi province is also appended to this memorandum (Appendix I), together with a prefatory note explaining the scope of the pro forma account and the relation between it and the regular accounts.

3. A statement is added to the memorandum (Appendix II) bringing together for each province and for the Home treasury of the Government of India the actual revenue and expenditure under each major head during the last year, the Revised estimates of the current year and the Budget estimates of the next year. The statement takes the place of a return which has hitherto been presented separately to Parliament and will serve as an expansion of the totals of revenue and expenditure exhibited in the Budget Statements proper (Statements A to E) and as a summary of the figures shown for each province under the several heads in this memorandum.

4. The broad totals of revenue and expenditure for the last year, the General results. current year and the ensuing year, are as follows :---

5. The Accounts of 1915-16 are not discussed in this memorandum, but according to our usual practice in the past a brief explanation is given below of the principal divergences between the Revised estimates of revenue and expenditure as submitted to the Council twelve months ago, and the actual accounts of the year as closed, audited and compiled by the Comptroller and Auditor-General.

7. The Imperial revenue exceeded the Revised estimate by £745,800 and the Imperial expenditure by £140,300, with the result that the deficit was £605,500 smaller than was anticipated. The principal items contributing to this improvement are mentioned below. There was a saving of £164,600 in the grants for the working expenses of railways, mainly on the Great Indian Peninsula, Bombay, Baroda and Central India and North-Western lines, owing to their inability to spend up to expectations for want of imported materials; with a small excess of $\pounds73,000$ in gross traffic receipts, the rise in the net receipts of Railways amounted to £237,600. The Salt revenue improved by £157,000; owing to low stocks and high prices, traders were anxicus to secure the prior right of obtaining salt and continued to pay duty in March 1916 in advance of actual clearances. The Imperial share of Land Revenue including the portion due to Irrigation showed a rise of £130,500, owing mainly to the collection in Bombay in March 1916 of revenue which was expected to be realised in April and to larger recoveries of survey and settle-ment charges in Bengal. There was a lapse of £71,300 in the grant for the expenditure of the Postal and Telegraph Department. On the other hand, the net Military expenditure went up by £218,700 owing to a change in the method of adjustment of the cost of imported stores utilised for fitting up transports; the Revised estimate contemplated that the cost of the stores would be adjusted under a suspense head pending debit to the Home Government, while in the accounts it has been treated in the first instance as service expenditure, the recoveries from the Home Government being effected in subsequent years as the stores are utilised for particular works. The improvement of £696,000 in the. Provincial section, was, the result mainly of better collections of land, excise, and forest revenue and of savings in the grants for expenditure on police, education and land revenue establishments.

9. The Imperial expenditure shown against "Other Provinces" in the table at page 21 represents the cost of survey and record-of-right operations on a large scale in Bengal and in Bihar and Orissa, undertaken more for administrative than for fiscal purposes. The expenditure is of a temporary and varying character and was accordingly not considered suitable for inclusion in the financial settlements with the two provinces. Three-fourths of the charges are eventually recovered from landlords and tenants for the protection of whose rights the operations are primarily undertaken; and the recoveries are shown in the table as Imperial revenue against "Other Provinces."

10 The Revised estimate for 1916-17 does not differ materially from the Budget. There is a decrease of $\mathbb{R}4.52$ lakhs in the recoveries of survey and settlement charges in Bihar and Orissa, owing to excess realisations in 1915-16 and to postponement of collections in the current year; on the other hand, there is an increase of $\mathbb{R}4.22$ lakhs in the receipts on the same account in Bengal owing to recoveries of arrears. There is also a decline in the Land Revenue collections in the North-West Frontier Province owing to suspensions of revenue in consequence of unfavourable agricultural conditions in the early part of the year.

11. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at R3 99 lakhs more than the - Revised for 1916-17. Provision has been made for the collection of arrears in Bihar and Orissa and the North-West Frontier Province.

(b) Divided and wholly Provincial.

12. The total collections in 1916-17 are likely to exceed the Budget by R21.33 lakbs. A large rise of B34.82 lakhs is expected in the Punjab owing to an excellent *kharif* harvest and the extension of colonisation operations and new settlements. There will also be increases of R6 lakhs in Burma owing mainly to improved revenue from petroleum and wolfram, and of R2.48 lakhs in Bengal in consequence of higher collections from Government estates owing to the prosperous condition of the jute trade. On the other hand, decreases of revenue are expected to the extent of R9.45 lakhs in Bombay as the result of the advance collection in March 1916 of instalments due in the following month; of B5.55 lakhs in the United Provinces owing to suspensions and remissions necessitated by floods and the failure of winter rains in limited areas; and of R5.02 lakhs in Madras and R3.05 lakhs in Assam, mainly in consequence of the damage caused to crops in some districts by cyclone and floods.

13. The total Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at R42.60 lakhs more than the Revised estimate for 1916-17. The estimates have been framed as usual on the basis of normal monsoon conditions in the coming year; but allowance has been made for the failure of the winter rains in the Punjab. Provision has been made generally for normal growth in the revenue demand and for recoveries of arrears.

EXPENDITURE.

(a) Wholly Imperial (India and England).

Revised, 1916-17. 14. The saving of R2.43 lakhs on the Budget estimate for 1916-17 is chiefly due to lapses in the grants for survey and settlement expenditure in Budget, 1917-18. Bengal and Bihar and Orissa. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 has been taken at R4.70 lakhs more than the Revised of the current year. The increase is almost wholly due to a larger provision for the same item of expenditure.

(b) Provincial.

15. The total expenditure in the current year will fall short of the Budget by R18 76 lakhs. The reduction is distributed over almost all the provinces

and is generally due to a partial relaxation of the restrictions on the grant of leave out of India to members of the Indian Civil Service and the temporary transfer of several officers to military duty. A portion of the saving is also derived from—

(1) larger recoveries in Madras from private estates for surveys made on their behalf,

- their behalf,
 (2) the total or partial non-utilization of grants for the revision of certain establishments in Madras and the United Provinces,
- (3) the postponement of survey and settlement operations in the Punjab, the United Provinces and the Central Provinces, and
- (4) the discontinuance of grain compensation allowance in the Punjab from the 1st July 1916.

16. The total Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised for the Budget, 1917-18. current year by R14.55 lakhs. The increase is distributed over all the provinces with the exception of Assam. Provision has generally been made on the basis of existing sanctions and commitments. Special allotments have been made for grain compensation allowance throughout the year in the Punjab, for a larger programme of survey and settlement operations in that province and in the United Provinces, and for the revision of village establishments in Madras and land record establishments in the Central Provinces.

(i) Bengal opium.

17. The Budget estimate for 1916-17 provided for a revenue of R284.82 lakhs from the sale of 15,550 chests of Bengal opium, the bulk of which was to be disposed of at the monthly auctions held at Calcutta, while a certain number was to be supplied to the Governments of the Straits Settlements and Hongkong or sold in England for medicinal purposes. 9,129 chests have been sold by public auction during the year and have fetched a revenue of R271.02 lakhs, *i.e.*, an average of R2,969 a chest, the upset price having been raised from R1,800 to R2,500 a chest from the 1st July 1916, while a further enhancement to R3,200 a chest with effect from the 1st April 1917 was notified on the 24th January 1917. An arrangement has also been entered into for the direct supply of opium to the Governments of the Straits Settlements and Hongkong. Taking into account opium supplied to these Governments and sold in England for medicinal purposes, it is expected that about 16,100 chests will be disposed of in the current year, the proceeds amounting to R414.66 lakhs.

18. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 anticipates a revenue of R449.90 Budget, 1917-18. lakhs from the sale of about 16,900 chests of Bengal opium, of which 7,000 chests will be sold by public auction and the balance will be supplied to the Governments of Hongkong, the Straits Settlements and the Netherlands Indies, or sold in England for medicinal purposes.

(ii) Excise opium and other revenue.

19. The figures show little variation and call for_no remark. Only the amount charged to Local Governments on account of the cost of production of opium consumed in India is credited under this head, the difference between the actual price of issue and the cost of production forming an item of excise revenue.

EXPENDITURE.

20. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget provision by *Revised*, 1916-17. R8.61 lakhs. The rise is mainly due to additional purchases of Malwa opium undertaken towards the close of the current year. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for an expansion of the area cultivated with poppy in the *Budget*, 1917-18. United Provinces and for the increase recently sanctioned in the rate of payment to cultivators from $R7\frac{1}{2}$ to R9 a seer of crude opium. It also includes a special provision for purchases in Malwa to supplement the supply of Bengal opium.

21. Owing partly to a rise in prices which has resulted from a demand for Northern India salt for consumption in areas which formerly used the imported article and partly to the usual speculation in apprehension of a further increase in duty, there has been an anxiety on the part of traders in Northern India to secure the prior right of clearing salt, and with this object heavy payments of duty have been made in advance of clearances. At the same time the clearances have also been larger than usual owing to the increased demand just mentioned. These causes will bring in an additional revenue of R117:49 lakhs in Northern India.

There will also be increases of R21.70 lakhs in Bombay and R3.65 lakhs in Burma in the revenue from locally produced salt, but a nearly equivalent shortage is anticipated in the duty on imported salt in Bengal owing to a contraction of imports in consequence of freight difficulties.

22. The total issues of salt in 1917-18, imported as well as locally produced, are taken at a normal figure of 4,88 lakhs of maunds. Owing however to the advance payments of duty in Northern India in the current year, only 4,34 lakhs out of this quantity are expected to pay duty during the next year. Allowing for sale-proceeds of Government salt and other miscellaneous receipts, the Budget estimate of revenue for 1917-18 has accordingly been placed at R595 93 lakhs.

25. The total Revised for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by no less than R47.28 lakhs. The latter provided for a very moderate growth on the revenue of the preceding year, in view of the uncertainty as to the effects of continued war conditions on trade and litigation generally. There has, however, been a remarkable revival of internal trade and business during the current year, and the improvement in Stamp revenue is shared by all provinces with the exception of Assam and Burma. The largest increases occur in Bengal (R21.00 lakhs) and Bombay (R13.50 lakhs) where trade in particular directions has been stimulated by war conditions. Of the total rise of about **B47** lakhs, **B24** lakhs are expected in the revenue from court-fee stamps, and $\mathbf{H}22$ lakes in that derived from non-judicial stamps.

26. The Budget for 1917-18 provides for a further moderate growth in revenue in almost all the provinces and is taken at R22.50 lakhs higher than the Revised estimate for 1916-17.

EXPENDITURE.

27. The cost of all stamps and stamp paper supplied from England is charged under this head, and an adjustment is made in India transferring to Posts and Telegraphs the cost of stamps used for postal and telegraph purposes. Similarly the cost of revenue stamps supplied to Local Governments and Administrations is debited to them in the Provincial section of the accounts by per contra credit in the Imperial section under this head. The credits on both these accounts are shown against item I (ii) under expenditure in the table on page 27.

(a) Wholly Imperial (including outlay in England).

28. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by R3 18 lakhs; and the Budget for 1917-18 is R1 35 lakhs less than the Revised estimate for the current year. These variations occur mostly in the credits mentioned in paragraph 27 and in the outlay in England on the manufacture of stamps.

(b) Divided.

The Revised estimate for the current year is less than the Budget by R·61 lakh owing to a fall in Bengal and Bihar and Orissa in the consumption of plain paper used with court-fee stamps. 37. It has been decided to enhance, with effect from the 1st March 1917, the customs duties levied (a) on the imports of cotton manufactures from

 $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. ad valorem to the general import tariff rate of $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., and (b) on the exports of jute, raw and manufactured, by 100 per cent., *i.e.*, to double the rates of duties imposed last March. In the case of jute exports, all forward contracts entered into before the 1st March 1917 which do not contain a provision for enhancement of price with reference to any future increase of duties. Exports for the last occasion, be exempted from the enhanced rates of duties. Exports for these factors and for the prohibition recently announced of private imports of jute into the United Kingdom, the additional revenue in the current and next years from the changes proposed is estimated as follows :—

38. Apart from the yield of the additional duties, the Revised estimate of *Revised*, 1916-17. Customs revenue in 1916-17 amounts to R12,81.86 lakhs or R127.16 lakhs more than the Budget estimate. The latter assumed that the revenue in the current year would continue to be depressed by the scarcity of freight and other factors which have affected it since the commencement of the war, and allowed further for a contraction of imports consequent on the enhanced and new duties imposed in March 1916. Both the import and the export revenue have however proved to be much more favourable than was anticipated. Most of the tariff heads show substantial increases *viz*. manufactured articles (R71.50 lakhs), cotton manufactures (R38.00 lakhs), imetals and manufactures of metals other than silver (R33.50 lakhs), tobacco (R13.09 lakhs), chemicals, drugs, etc., (R12.00 lakhs), articles of food and drink (R10.40 lakhs), sugar (R8.00 lakhs), and the export duties on jute (R25.00 lakhs) and rice (R23.37 lakhs). On the other hand, there will be considerable shortages under silver bullion and coin (R75.50 lakhs) and petroleum (R12.50 lakhs). The high prices which have ruled for silver since May last and the heavy demands for coinage, both in India and in European countries, have reduced the private imports of that metal almost to a negligible quantity, while the imports of petroleum have been affected by freight difficulties in addition to high prices.

39. On the existing basis of taxation, the Budget estimate of Customs Budget, 1917-18. revenue in 1917-18 is taken at R11,84.22 lakhs, or R97.64 lakhs less than the Revised estimate for 1916-17 calculated on the same basis. The yield under most tariff heads has, as stated above, been specially high in the current year and it is not considered safe to count on a continuance of the same favourable conditions during 1917-18. It has to be assumed also that the difficulties in regard to freight will become more acute as the war is prolonged and that imports from the United Kingdom will diminish in quantity in consequence of the efforts to apply the available resources of the Empire as fully as possible to the prosecution of the war. Thus restrictions were recently placed on the exports of foodstuffs from the United Kingdom. In the case of silver again, the present price level and the diminished imports of the current year point to a very low revenue from this source. As regards the export trade, this is at present specially affected by difficulties in regard to finance and the revenue prospects have been impaired by the restrictions recently announced in regard to imports of jute and tea into the United Kingdom.

Important decreases are accordingly anticipated under most tariff heads, viz., cotton manufactures (R23.00 lakhs), petroleum (R17.50 lakhs), manufactured articles (R15.00 lakhs, duo mainly to the prohibition of the import of motor cars), articles of food and drink (R13.00 lakhs), metals and manufactures of metals other than silver (R10.00 lakhs), silver bullion and coin (R9.50 lakhs), sugar (R8.00 lakhs), and the export duties on rice (R8.37

lakhs), jute ($\mathbb{B}7\ 00\$ lakhs) and tea ($\mathbb{R}6\ 50\$ lakhs). Allowance has been made under the last two heads for the prohibition mentioned above, and under jute for the fact that we shall obtain in the next year, so far as the existing scale of duty is concerned, the revenue which has been lost in 1916-17 by the exemption of forward contracts.

• Oredit has been taken for a revenue of R22.50 lakhs from the excise duty on motor spirit which has been imposed as a war measure with effect from the 16th February.

EXPENDITURE.

Revised, 1916-17. Budget, 1917-18.

40. The expenditure in 1916-17 is not expected to differ materially from the Budget grant. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for normal charges of sanctioned establishments and includes a lump grant of £1.26 lakhs for the strengthening of the preventive service in Bombay and the purchase and upkeep of vessels for that service.

41. It has been decided to impose, from the 1st April next, a super-tax on large incomes on the following scale, in addition to the ordinary rates of income-tax now payable:—

- (i) The first R50,000 of income per year to be exempt from super-tax.
- (ii) The next $\mathbb{R}50,000$ of the excess, *i.e.* between $\mathbb{R}\frac{1}{2}$ and 1 lakh, to pay 1 anna in the rupee.
- (iii) The second $\mathbb{R}50,000$ of the excess, *i.e.* between $\mathbb{R}1$ lakh and $1\frac{1}{3}$ lakhs, to pay $1\frac{1}{3}$ annas in the rupee.
- (iv) The third $\mathbb{R}50,000$ of the excess, *i.e.* between $\mathbb{R}1\frac{1}{2}$ and 2 lakhs, to pay 2 annas in the rupee.
- (v) The fourth R50,000 of the excess, *i.e.* between R2 and $2\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs, to pay $2\frac{1}{2}$ annas in the rupee.
- (vi) The balance of the excess, *i.e.* everything over $\mathbb{R}2\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs, to pay 3 annas in the rupee.

42. The yield from the super-tax is estimated at £1,350,000 distributed as follows, and will be recorded in the accounts under a separate minor head which will be treated as wholly Imperial:—

43. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by R7 62 lakhs. An increase of R1.91 lakhs occurs in Delhi, owing to the collection of arrears and improved methods of assessment. The rest of the excess relates mainly to the yield from the enhanced income-tax rates introduced in connection with the last Budget. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 does not differ materially from the Revised for the current year. The recoveries of arrears included in the current year's revenue in Delhi are omitted and normal collections estimated for other administrations.

(b) Divided.

44. The Revised estimate for the current year exceeds the Budget by \$95.67 lakhs. The bulk of the increase is expected in Bengal (\$53.20 lakhs) and Bombay (\$27.70 lakhs) and is attributable to the abnormal profits which have been realised in certain trades in the year 1915-16 as the result of war conditions. Minor increases of revenue are expected in all the other provinces.

45. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised estimate for the current year by R27.08 lakhs. The trades which have been favoured by war conditions have been even more prosperous during the greater part of 1916-17 than in the preceding year, and it is expected that the level of receipts reached

in the current year will be more than maintained in 1917-18. Of the increase of R2708 lakhs, R2000 lakhs will accrue in Bengal and allowance has been made for normal growth in all the other provinces except Burma.

REVENUE.

(a) Imperial.

48. The increase of R3 67 lakhs in the revenue in the current year, as *Revised*, 1916-17. compared with the Budget estimate, is mainly due to larger sales of sandalwood in Coorg and of padouk in Port Blair. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 *Budget*, 1917-18. anticipates a reduction in the high receipts obtained in the current year.

(b) Provincial.

49. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 is more than the Budget by R36.30 *Revised*, 1916-17. lakhs. A large rise of R17.20 lakhs is anticipated in Burma owing to increased receipts from royalty on the extraction of teak, a revival in the demand for timber, partly from State Railways and the Royal Indian Marine, and the higher prices that have been realised. There will - also be smaller increases in all the other provinces due to a general recovery

also be smaller increases in all the other provinces due to a general recovery in the timber market and to an improvement in the demand for other forest produce.

50. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 anticipates a decline in Madras Budget, 1917-18. ($\mathbb{R}3.00$ lakhs), Burma ($\mathbb{R}2.70$ lakhs) and Assam ($\mathbb{R}1.44$ lakhs) where the receipts have been specially large in the current year, and falls short of the Revised by $\mathbb{R}6.53$ lakhs.

EXPENDITURE.

(a) Imperial (including outlay in England).

51. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 does not differ materially from the *Revised*, 1916-17. Budget. The Budget for 1917-18 provides for sanctioned charges and for special expenditure on the extension of departmental working in the Anda-*Budget*, 1917-18. mans forests.

(b) Provincial.

52. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 is less than the Budget by R3.20 Revised, 1916-17. lakhs. The saving is mainly due to the postponement of expenditure on works which are not of an urgent character. It is shared by all the provinces except Burma, but is largest in the Central Provinces (R1.57 lakhs), Bombay (R1.25 lakhs), and Madras (R1.12 lakhs). In Burma alone there will be an excess (R2.78 lakhs) over the Budget grant owing mainly to an increase in the outturn of teak extracted on behalf of Government and to a larger outlay on the purchase of elephants.

53. The total Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised for Budget, 1917-18. the current year by B14-18 lakhs. Owing to the improved revenue from forests in the current and next years, provision has been made in most provinces for special expenditure on their development which is either of an urgent character or will be immediately remunerative. In Bihar and Orissa and Assam alone, the grants for the next year are taken at about the same amounts as the probable expenditure in the current year.

Provincial.

55. The specially favourable agricultural and economic conditions of the *Revised*, 1916-17. current year have contributed to an increase in Registration revenue and the Revised estimate exceeds the Budget by **B3** 66 lakhs.

56. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at R1.87 lakhs more than the Budget, 1917-18. Revised for 1916-17. Provision has been made for normal growth in Madras and Bengal, and elsewhere the estimates are generally based on the revenue expected to be realised in 1916-17.

EXPENDITURE.

Imperial.

57. The figures show little variation.

Provincial.

58. The Revised estimate for the current year exceeds the Budget by Revised, 1916-17. R.70 lakh owing mainly to larger expenditure on temporary establishments in Madras and Bengal and an increase in the minimum pay of clerks in the former province.

59. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 includes provision for the revision of Budget, 1917-18. establishments in the Central Provinces and for a full year's cost of the increase in the minimum pay of clerks in Madras.

60. The revenue recorded under this head represents tributes received from the protected States, in several cases as a result of exchanges of territory and settlement of claims, and contributions made chiefly in lieu of former obligation to supply or maintain troops. The figures do not ordinarily show any important fluctuations from year to year except for advance payment of sums falling due in the ensuing year, or arrears and their recovery.

Revised, 1916-17.

Budget, 1917-18.

61. The Revised estimate for the current year is less than the Budget by R1.44 lakhs, the decrease being due mainly to the postponement of recoveries in Katbiawar in consequence of the unfavourable agricultural conditions in 1915-16 from which the States have not fully recovered. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for a small recovery of arrears in Kathiawar and for normal receipts elsewhere.

1.—REFUNDS AND DRAWBACKS.

(a) Imperial.

62. The wholly Imperial expenditure shown against "Other Provinces" represents refunds and drawbacks in respect of wholly Imperial revenue (e.g., Opium, Salt, Customs and Tributes). The increase of R16.62 lakhs in the Revised Revised, 1916-17. estimate over the Budget for 1916-17 occurs under Customs refunds and is due to larger re-exports necessitated by the present trade conditions and to the new and enhanced duties introduced from the 1st March 1916.

63. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for some decrease in the Budget, 1917-18. refunds of Customs revenue and is R5.61 lakhs less than the Revised for the current year.

(b) Divided and Provincial.

'64. The expenditure fluctuates considerably from year to year and is diffi-cult to estimate. In 1916-17, the Budget will be exceeded by $\mathbb{R}4.07$ lakhs, *Revised*, 1916-17. owing mainly to higher refunds of income tax revenue necessitated by the Income-tax (Amendment) Act of 1916, the tax on interest on securities and dividends or shows being larged in the first property of the function of the first property of dividends on shares being levied in the first instance at the full rate, subject to a refund on application with reference to the actual income of the assessee. There are also minor increases under land revenue and excise refunds in several provinces.

65. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for a further rise of R1:43 Budget, 1917-18. lakhs under income-tax refunds and for a normal expenditure on other items.

2.—ASSIGNMENTS AND COMPENSATIONS.

(a) Imperial.

66. The wholly Imperial expenditure shown against "Other Provinces" represents Opium, Salt and Customs compensations paid to Native States and Foreign Governments, as well as Miscellaneous compensations (*i.e.*, those of a general character and not intended to indemnify against loss of a particular kind of revenue) in provinces other than Bombay. The variations between the Budget and Revised estimates of the current year; and between the latter and the Budget of next year are due to the fact that the salt royalty payable to Jaipur and Jodhpur, and the customs compensation payable to Travancore and Cochin, fluctuate respectively with reference to the actual sales of salt and the actual realisations of customs revenue.

(b) Divided and Provincial.

Revised, 1916-17.

67. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 is less than the Budget by $\mathbb{R}^{1\cdot 19}$ lakhs. The decrease is mainly due to a lapse in Bombay in the provision for certain cash allowances payable for commutation of rights of service. The decrease of $\mathbb{R}^{\cdot 63}$ lakh in the Budget estimate for 1917-18 as compared with the Revised for the current year occurs in the excise compensations payable to certain chiefs in the same province.

63. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by \mathbb{R} ·49 lakh. There is an increase of \mathbb{R} ·72 lakh under Miscellaneous items due mainly to larger recoveries in respect of the unpaid balance of the sale price of Government lands in the Punjab. On the other hand, there will be a reduction of \mathbb{R} ·58 lakh in the interest on overdrafts of capital by the Burma Railways Company.

69. The total Budget for 1917-18 is taken at R20 86 lakhs more than the Revised for the current year.

In connection with a scheme for the improvement of the provident funds of railway companies, with reference particularly to the loss caused to subscribers by the depreciation of the securities in which their assets are invested, the companies have been allowed the option of transferring the funds along with their assets to Government, which will take over the investments at their cost price (or if preferred by the companies, the securities held on the 31st March 1914 at their market value on that date and those since purchased at cost price). Four companies have offered to transfer the funds to Government under this arrangement and the transfer will be effected on the 1st April 1917. A provision of H20 00 lakhs has been made under Interest receipts for the interest on the securities which will be taken over by Government from the management of the funds.

(b) India—Provincial.

The decrease is the result of unimportant variations in all the provinces.

72. The gross interest receipts in England in 1916-17 are likely to exceed the Budget estimate by £334,400 owing to increased investments on behalf of the Paper Currency Reserve and to a rise in the interest realised from investment of the cash balances of the Home treasury, which have proved to be larger and have earned a higher rate of interest than was anticipated. It has however been decided to apply the receipts in England from investments for the Paper Currency Reserve, amounting to £399,200, to the purchase of treasury bills on behalf of a depreciation fund which it is proposed to establish in respect of the present holding of consols in that Reserve. Allowing for this expenditure the net receipts in the current year will fall short of the Budget by £64,800.

(c) *England*.

Budget, 1917-18.

73. The gross interest receipts are taken in the Budget estimate for 1917-18 at $\pounds 1,331,200$, or $\pounds 670,600$ more than the Revised estimate for the current year, the rise being due to increased investments on behalf of the Paper Currency Reserve made in the latter part of 1916-17. It is proposed to purchase during the next year treasury bills to the value of $\pounds 200,000$ on behalf of the depreciation fund mentioned in the preceding paragraph. Allowing for this expenditure the net receipts in the next year will exceed the current year's Revised by $\pounds 869,800$.

Interest on ordinary debt.

Revised, 1916-17.

74. The expenditure in 1916-17 on account of interest payable on the public debt as a whole will fall short of the Budget estimate by R53.73 lakbs (£358,200). The latter contemplated the renewal of India bills for $£5\frac{1}{2}$ million which it has since been decided to discharge. The provision for discount on the India bills included in the Budget estimate is thus saved, and there is a decrease of £241,900 in the Revised estimate of expenditure in England as compared with the Budget. There is also a reduction of R1745 lakhs in the Indian expenditure, the main items contributing to it being (i) a saving of R8.66 lakhs in the provision for the discount on the rupee loan to be taised in the current year; and (ii) a postponement of payments to the extent of R4 lakhs as a result of the conversion of 3 and $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. securities into the 4 per cent. loan of 1916-17, the interest on the latter being payable on a later date than in the case of 3 and $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. paper.

Budget, 1917-18.

75. In the Budget for 1917-18 provision has been made in India for a full year's interest on the conversion loan of $\Re 6_4^3$ crores raised in the current year and £600,000 has been set aside for the service of the Indian war loan applications for which are being received from the 15th March. On the other hand, there will be a decrease of $\Re 18$ 80 lakhs as compared with the current year owing to the repayment in full of the temporary loan taken from the Gold Standard Reserve.

It has been decided that Indian revenues should undertake a contribution of £100 million to His Majesty's Government towards the cost of the European war The proceeds of the Indian war loan are to be made over to the Home Government, the interest and other charges in connection with it being borne by India. The rest of her contribution is to take the form of meeting interest charges (including payments into a sinking fund) in respect of a portion of the Home Government's war debt equal to the difference between the total contribution of £100 million and the sums raised by direct Indian borrowings. The recurring liability involved by this measure of assistance is estimated at £6 million, but as a full year's interest will not be due in the first year it is proposed to increase the portion of the total payment of £6 million which is to be set aside for the sinking fund. Thus, deducting £600,000 provided for charges connected with the Indian war loan the proceeds of which are provisionally estimated at £10 million, a sum of £5,400,000 is available in 1917-18 for the service of the war contribution in England, and it is estimated that this sum will be applied as follows :—

76. The amount of interest transferred to the Bailway and Irrigation sections of the accounts depends, firstly; on the capital expenditure; secondly, on the actual payment of interest on that portion of the debt which has been incurred specifically on account of the construction or purchase of railways or irrigation works; and, thirdly, on the rate at which interest is charged on that portion of the debt which has not been specifically raised for the above purpose. Our practice is to adopt, for this adjustment, the average rate of interest actually paid in respect of the whole of the non-specific debt in the latest year for which complete accounts are available. The result is that the rate adopted in calculating the Revised estimate for a year is generally somewhat different from that used for the Budget estimate: and this usually leads to a difference between the two estimates apart from that caused by a variation in the capital expenditure itself.

• • · · _

The decrease of R15 21 lakhs (£101,400) in the Revised estimate of total Revised, 1916-17. interest to be transferred in 1916-17, as compared with the Budget, is due to a reduction in the rate, as well as in the capital at charge at the end of 1916-17. The increase in the total amount of interest to be transferred in 1917-18, over the Revised estimate for 1916-17, is almost wholly due to the Budget, 1917-18. progress of capital expenditure.

77. A portion of the interest on Ordinary Debt appears in the Provincial Transfere to section of the accounts. Provincial Governments are authorised to grant ad- Provincial. vances to cultivators (as well as to certain other people in special cases) under various Acts, to Native States, to landholders and notabilities apart from the provisions of any law and to municipalities and local bodics (other than Presidency Corporations), out of amounts annually placed at their disposal by the Government of India. The interest actually levied on such advances is credited as Provincial revenue. But interest at a fixed rate is charged to the Local Governments on the mean between the outstanding balances of the Provincial Loan Accounts at the commencement of the year and at its close; and this is done by transferring the amount so calculated from the Imperial to the Provin-cial section under Interest on Ordinary Debt. This rate was formerly fixed at $3\frac{1}{3}$ per cent., but was raised during the current year to $4\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. with reference to the rate of interest which the Government of India have had to pay on their own borrowings since the outbreak of the war. The enhanced rate is, however, applicable only to loans sanctioned subsequent to the 1st October 1916. The differences between the Budget and the Revised estimates of the amount to be transferred to the Provincial Section in the current year, and between the latter and the Budget estimate of 1917-18, are explained by the variations in the outstanding balances of the Provincial Loan Account as shown in the table at page 45.

Interest on other obligations.

78. The total expenditure in 1916-17 is likely to exceed the Budget pro- Revised, 1918-17. vision by R5.64 lakhs (£37,600). There will be a rise of R6.17 lakhs in the interest payable on the Savings Bank balance, owing mainly to the present anticipation of a net deposit of R96 lakhs into post office savings banks during the year instead of a net withdrawal of H1,00 lakhs as contemplated in the Budget; but, on the other hand, a portion of the interest payable on certain special loans is not likely to be claimed during the current year. The Budget, 1917-18. Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for an increase of $\mathbf{R27}$ 73 lakhs (£184,800) — over the Revised for 1916-17. It is attributable (i) to an anticipated growth in the deposits in post office savings banks and in state provident funds and (ii) to interpret artitude to the savings banks and in state provident funds and (ii) to interest creditable to the accounts in railway companies' provident funds which are to be taken over by Government from the 1st April 1917, as explained in paragraph 69 above. Against the latter payment, however, there will be an equivalent receipt of interest on the securities transferred from the funds to Government-vide same paragraph.

(a) Indian Postal and Telegraph Department.

79. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by #32.20 lakhs Revised, 1916-17.

(£214,700). An improvement of R28.75 lakhs is expected in India owing to the more satisfactory conditions of internal trade, R4 lakhs of the increase being due to the enhanced charges levied for ordinary inland telegrams from the 1st December 1916. There is also an increase of R3.45 lakhs in England in the receipts from the Home Government under the Morley award in connection with the Eastern Mail Service.

80 The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for a further advance of budget, 1917-18. R3180 lakhs in the collections in India, inclusive of R10 lakhs from the enhanced rates for ordinary inland telegrams mentioned in the preceding paragraph. On the other hand, no receipt is expected in England during the next year in connection with the Eastern Mail Service.

(b) Indo-European Telegraph Department.

81. The rise of R12.76 lakhs (£85,100) in the revenue in the current year Berieved, 1918-17. as compared with the Budget estimate is due to the diversion of traffic from foreign lines to those of the Indo-European Telegraph Department in consequence of interruptions on the former, as well as to an increase in the traffic owing to the war. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for a small Budget, 1917-18. decrease of R3 00 lakhs (£20,000) from the high receipts of the current year.

EXPENDITURE.

(a) Indian Postal and Telegraph Department.

82. The expenditure in 1916-17 is likely to fall short of the Budget Revised, 1918-17. grant by R13.37 lakhs (£89,100). The reduction is mainly due to heavy credits for the value of stores supplied to the Indian Expeditionary forces, and lapses in the provision for payments to the Marconi Company and for the installation of radio-offices; partly counterbalanced by a larger outlay on stores, owing to a rise in prices and the transfer to the year 1916-17 of pay-ments which were expected to be made in 1915-16, and on account of the Eastern mail subsidy due to certain adjustments arising out of the discontinuance of mail sorting at sea.

83. The Budget grant for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised estimate for the Budget, 1917-18. current year by R26.74 lakhs (£178,300). The credits on account of the value of stores supplied to other departments will be less by R4.50_lakhs in consequence of smaller supplies to the Indian Expeditionary Forces and an increased provision of R3.00 lakhs is necessary with reference to additions to the telegraph establishment sanctioned recently to cope with the expansion of traffic. The outlay in England will also be higher by R5.67 lakhs owing to a rise in the cost of stores and the restoration of the provision for radiooffices which has lapsed in the current year, partly set off by a reduction in the payment on account of the Eastern Mail subsidy in consequence of the omission of the adjustment mentioned in the preceding paragraph. Apart from these special items, the Budget estimate provides for sanctioned establishments and normal working expenses, together with a margin for the development of the operations of the department which are generally remunerative in character.

(b) Indo-European Telegraph Department.

84. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by R21.18 lakhs Revised, 1916-17.

(£141,200), the rise being mainly due to the construction of certain telegraph lines not contemplated in the Budget, the increased cost of stores, and a reduction in the net receipts in England in connection with the Joint Purse arrangement etc. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at R19 80 lakhs (£132,000) less than the Revised estimate for the current year, the decrease occurring Budget, 1917-18. almost entirely in the capital outlay on the construction of telegraph lines. Allowance has been made for a normal growth of R1.30 lakhs (£8,700) in the working expenses, but this will be more than covered by an improvement inthe net receipts in England in connection with the Joint Purse arrangement, etc.

85. The Revised estimate for the current year exceeds the Budget by - $\mathbf{R82}$ 75 lakhs. Of this increase $\mathbf{R59}$ lakhs are contributed by the seigniorage on the coinage of rupees from purchased silver. An important' increase of R18 lakhs is also expected in the profit on the circulation of nickel coins the demand for which has been stimulated by the activity of trade. The resumption of the coinage of new rupees will also result in an increase in the operative gains included under "Other items" in the above table, but this will be counterbalanced by an increase in the debits on account of operative losses. A receipt of R2.95 lakhs is also anticipated in respect of coinage executed for Egypt and the Straits Settlements.

86. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at R72.82 lakhs less than the Revised estimate for 1916-17, the decrease being due to the omission from the estimates, following accepted practice, of provision for seigniorage on new coinage of rupees and to a moderate provision for profit on the circulation of nickel coins. 218 March

Of the excess of R12.34 lakhs in the expenditure in the current year over the Budget estimate, R1.25 lakhs represents the loss on the circulation of copper and bronze coins which are returning from circulation. 18.—GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

(a) India-Imperial.

89. The expenditure in 1916-17 is likely to exceed the Budget grant by B1.62 lakhs. The increase is due to (a) a rise in the charges of the secretariats (R:87 lakh) owing to a large number of leave vacancies in several departments, (b) a payment of R.50 lakh to the Bank of Bengal for work in connection with the conversion loan of 1916-17, and (c) an excess in the charges of the civil account and currency departments (R.91 lakh) owing to the cost of advertising the conversion loan and a larger employment of temporary establishments in currency offices. Minor savings are expected, on the other hand, in the grant for tour expenses of the Governor General and under some other items. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides generally for sanctioned establishments and normal charges and includes a lump grant of R 48 lakh for revision of currency establishments in Calcutta and Bombay owing to an expansion in the note circulation. The decrease of R1.14 lakhs as compared with the Revised estimate for the current year is mainly due to the omission of the special charges relating to the conversion loan, separate provision for the expenditure connected with the Indian war loan having been included under the head "Interest on Debt."

(b) Provincial.

89. The total Revised for 1916-17 will exceed the Budget grant by R1-18 lakhs. The increase occurs in all the provinces except Assam and Bombay and is due mainly to the employment of officers on special duty in the secretariats for work connected with the war. A small saving of R 20 lakh is expected in Assam owing to an anticipated recovery from the Home Government of the cost of river craft commandeered for service in Mesopotamia.

90. The total Budget estimate for 1917-18 is R 90 lakh more than the Revised for the current year. Increases of B1.17 lakhs and B.47 lakh respectively are expected in Bengal and Madras in connection with the impending change in the appointment of Governor and there will be a nominal excess of B·34 lakh in Bombay owing to a change in the classification of certain charges. On the other hand, the Budget estimate provides for a reduction of R 67 lakh in Burma and R 51 lakh in Bihar and Orissa due to smaller outlay on furniture and on officers on special duty and the omission in the latter province of a special arrear payment included in the Revised for the current year.

(c) England.

91. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by £51,800. There is an increase of £15,600 in the charges of the Home establishment due to the exigencies of the war and the cost of stores supplied to India will be exceeded by £36,200 owing to a larger demand for currency notes and a rise in the price of paper. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is less than the Revised for the current year by £22,900, owing mainly to a normal provision for outlay on stores.

93. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 fails short of the Budget by B1.77 lakhs. The saving occurs in all the provinces except Burma and Madras, a general factor which has contributed to it being the deputation of officers to military duty. Among other causes of the decrease in expenditure may be mentioned (1) the stoppage of grain compensation allowance in-the Punjab from the 1st July 1916 (\mathbb{R} -51 lakh), and (2) savings in the grants for pleaders' fees in criminal cases and other minor items in Bombay and Bengal (H-97 lakh and H1.84 lakhs); partly counterbalanced in the latter province by the payment of grain compensation allowance (R1.02 lakhs), provision for which was made in the estimates under the head "32 Miscellaneous". On the other hand, an excess of R.76 lakh is expected in Burma owing to charges connected with the Mandalay conspiracy case and leave arrangements, while there will be a petty increase in Madras due to unimportant causes. The total Budget for 1917-18 is RS 20 lakhs more than the Revised estimate for 1916-17. Provision has been generally made for the normal charges of sanctioned establishments. Lump allotments have, in addition, been included for the "introduction of a new judicial scheme and for reorganization of ministerial establishments in the Central Provinces (R1 35 lakhs), for an additional Legal Kemembrancer and his staff in Bengal (B.75 lakh), for additional temporary courts in Bombay (R1.02 lakhs) and for an additional Judge in the Chief Court in Burma (R·44 lakh). Provision has also been made for larger outlay on pleaders' fees and in connection with the Defence of India Act cases in Bengal and for the grant of grain compensation allowance during the whole year in the Punjab.

95. The total revenue in the current year is likely to exceed the Budget estimate by R1-52 lakhs. The improvement occurs in magisterial fines in several provinces but mainly in the Punjab and is partly counterbalance 1 by a decrease in Madras (R:54 lakh) owing to a reduction in the scale of printing fees levied for copies of judgments supplied to parties. The Budget for 1917-18 provides for normal receipts in all the provinces.

96. The expenditure in the current year will exceed the Budget grant by B2.19 lakhs. There will be an expenditure of B4.00 lakhs in conrection with the S S "Maharaja," an impressed vessel which has been placed under the management of the Superintendent, Port Blair. Part of the increase will, however, be met from a lapse in the grant for cutlay on commissariat supplies. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at B.93 lakh higher than the Revised for the current year, the increase being mainly due to provision for a full year's charges of the S. S. "Maharaja."

(b) Provincial.

97. The total expenditure in 1916-17 is likely to exceed the Budget grant by $\mathbb{R}2$ 94 lakhs. The bulk of the excess ($\mathbb{R}2$ ·08 lakhs) will occur in the purchase of raw materials, mainly in Bengal ($\mathbb{R}1$ ·74 lakhs) and Madras (\mathbb{H} ·66 lakh), for the execution of heavy orders from the Military and other departments for jail-made articles. There will also be a rise of \mathbb{R} ·86 lakh in the ordinary charges of jails, mainly in Bengal ($\mathbb{R}1$ ·36 lakhs) owing to an increase in the jail population, and in Bombay (\mathbb{H} ·70 lakh) · owing to the establishment of a criminal settlement and a jail for juvenile prisoners. On the other hand, a reduction of \mathbb{R} ·88 lakh is anticipated in the United Provinces due to a fall in prices and in the jail population, and there will be smaller variations in the other provinces.

98. The Budget for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised of the current year by - R2·89 lakhs. The grant is generally based on the sanctioned scales of establishment, the probable jail population and the probable outlay on raw materials with reference to supplies likely to be required by the Military and other departments.

EXPENDITURE.

(a) Imperial (including outlay in England).

Revised, 1916-17.

Budget, 1917-18.

101. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 is less than the Budget by \mathbb{R} -20 lakh. There is an excess of \mathbb{R} -40 lakh in the North-West Frontier Province owing to the entertainment of additional forces, but it will be more than set off by a saving in other provinces, due chiefly to temporary vacancies in the executive force.

102. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised for the current year by R5 16 lakhs. Provision has been made for the whole year for the additional forces in the North-West Frontier Province, as well as for the cost of certain concessions which it is proposed to grant to the frontier constabulary in the same province and for a contemplated reorganisation of the police in Bangalore.

(b) Provincial.

Revised, 1916-17.

103. The expenditure in the current year is expected to fall short of the Budget grant by B14.30 lakhs. A saving occurs in all the provinces except Bengal. One general cause of the decrease in almost all the provinces is the non-filling up of vacancies in the executive forces. A portion of the savings is also due to (1) the discontinuance of grain compensation allowance in the Punjab from the 1st July 1916, and the entertainment of a smaller temporary establishment than contemplated in the Budget owing to the improved political situation in the province (B4.80 lakhs); (2) the temporary closure of the police training school in Bombay (B.75 lakh); (3) lapses in the lump grants for reorganisation of the police forces in \cdot Madras (B1.70lakhs) and the Central Provinces (B.50 lakh), and (4) the gradual abolition of road chowkidars in the United Provinces. In Bengal alone, an increase of B1.15 lakhs is expected owing to the grant of grain compensation allowance, provision for which was included under the head "32—Miscellaneous" in the Budget estimate. There will also be a larger outlay of B1 lakh in the United Provinces on account of higher rates of pay sanctioned for constables and head constables, but there will be a nearly equivalent saving in the grants for clothing and other expenditure.

Budget, 1917-18.

104. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at R39.88 lakhs more than the Revised for the current year. Provision for the full cost of sanctioned establishments and of the various schemes already introduced has been made in all the provinces. A considerable increase of R22.11 lakhs is anticipated in Bengal owing to the inclusion of provision for various urgent schemes for the improvement of the police administration. Allotments for urgent improvements have also been made in the other provinces, including in the Punjab a scheme for the reclamation of criminal tribes (R1.80 lakhs). In Burma alone, the estimates provide for a decrease of expenditure, owing to a reduction in the strength of temporary establishments in certain districts and of the mounted force, and a smaller grant for petty construction.

REVENUE.

(a) Imperial.

105. The figures show little variation.

· (b) Provincial.

Revised, 1916-17.

Budget, 1917-18.

- 106. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by $\mathbb{H}1.05$ lakhs. The increase occurs mainly in Bombay ($\mathbb{R}.59$ lakh) owing to certain arrear recoveries from the Bombay Port Trust, and in Assam ($\mathbb{R}.61$ lakh) owing to the recovery from the Home Government of the cost of river craft commandeered for service in Mesopotamia. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 falls short of the Revised of the current year by $\mathbb{R}2.53$ lakhs. The decrease is due mainly to smaller recoveries for punitive police in Burma and the Punjab ($\mathbb{H}1.40$ lakhs) and the omission of the special credit in Assam included in the Revised.

EXPENDITURE.

107. The total Revised estimate for 1916-17 does not differ materially *Revised*, 1918 i7. from the Budget. A decrease of R1.62 lakhs in Bengal due mainly to a reduction in the charges of pilot establishments as a result of the present trade conditions is more than counterbalanced by an increase of R1.78 lakhs in Burma due to a larger outlay on stores owing to a rise in prices and to the higher cost of maintenance of light houses and light ships. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for normal expenditure and is taken at R1.05 lakhs less than the Boying for the amount room. lakhs less than the Revised for the current year.

REVENUE.

108. The falling off of R2 lakhs in the revenue in 1916-17 as compared Revised, 1916-17. with the Budget estimate is chiefly due to the unfavourable conditions of seaborne trade. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 does not differ materially from Budget, 1917-18. the Revised for the current year.

Expenditure.

(a) Imperial (India and England).

109. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 is less than the Budget by R2.08 Revised, 1916-17. lakhs. The latter included a reserve provision of R1.81 lakhs, from which, as stated below, R1 lakh has been allotted to the Government of the United Provinces as a contribution towards the cost of acquisition of land for the Hindu University, while R.25 lakh has been applied to expenditure on the Ajmer High School buildings which is recorded under "45-Civil Works." The bulk of the decrease in expenditure is thus nominal and the balance is due to petty lapses in ordinary grants.

110. The reserve of R1.81 lakhs provided in the Budget for 1916-17 out of the recurring appropriation of R124 lakhs made from Imperial revenues. up to the end of the current year for the improvement of education will be utilised as shown below:

(b) Provincial.

112. The total expenditure in 1916-17 is expected to be ±11.05 lakhs less *Revised*, 1916-17. than the Budget estimate. The latter included special allotments under this head, aggregating about £113 lakhs, from the recurring and non-recurring assignments made from Imperial revenues in recent years for the development and improvement of education. These allotments are expected to be utilised in full, £106 lakhs of the expenditure being recorded under Education, and the balance under Civil Works. Under the former head, there is thus a decrease of £7 lakhs, as compared with the Budget provision, in the outlay from special Imperial grants; and the expenditure from other Provincial resources will accordingly fall short of the corresponding Budget provision by about **B4** lakhs only. This decrease is chiefly due to lapses in ordinary grants in Bengal and the Central Provinces partly counterbalanced by increases in Madras and Bombay.

Budget, 1917-18.

113. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised for the current year by R62.07 lakhs, of which R28.60 lakhs represent expenditure from the fresh appropriation of R30 lakhs for the improvement of the pay and training of teachers. The expenditure in 1917-18 from the previous Imperial assignments will be about R3 lakhs more than in 1916-17, the provision made in the Budget under Education amounting to R109 lakhs against a probable outlay of R106 lakhs in the current year. The provision in the Budget for 1917-18 for expenditure from ordinary Provincial resources is thus about H30 lakhs more than in the Revised of the current year. The increase is distributed over all the provinces and provision has generally been made for an expansion of the expenditure on education in various directions, chiefly by grants to schools.

114. The following table shows the progress made by the Provincial Governments in utilising the various non-recurring grants given from Imperial revenues in recent years. To simplify the position, it has been assumed that the whole of the recurring grants for any year are fully utilised before any expenditure is debited against the non-recurring grants.

Owing to the need for economy, no material progress with the spending of these grants is likely to be made in the ensuing year. As stated above, however, a substantial provision is being made for further expenditure from ordinary Provincial resources during the next year. The minus figures against some of the provinces indicate that it will not be possible to utilise fully the recurring grants from Imperial revenues for educational expenditure.

117. A saving of R 87 lakh is expected in the total grant for the current Revised, 1916-17. year, chiefly in consequence of the absence of the Lord Bishop of Madras and of some of the chaplains on leave, and the deputation of others to military duty. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides generally for the sanctioned scale of expenditure; provision has also been included for additional chaplains sanctioned for war hospitals and hospital ships in Bombay (R:94 lakh) pending a decision as to the incidence of the expenditure.

.

118. The expenditure and receipt heads "Medical" have been split up into two heads designated "Medical" and "Sanitation". The receipts and charges of the X-Ray Institute and the Central Research Institute which were formerly recorded under the head "Scientific and Miscellaneous Departments" have also been transferred to the new heads "Medical" and "Sanitation" respectively. The figures of the Budget estimate for 1916-17 and of the actuals of previous years have been recast in accordance with this re-arrangement, and the new figures are shown in the above table.

EXPENDITURE.

(a) Imperial (India and England).

119. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 does not differ materially from the *Revised*, 1916-17. Budget. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for some increase in the *Budget*, 1917-18. expenditure on the X-Ray Institute and on medical establishments.

(b) Provincial.

120. The expenditure in 1916-17 is expected to be less than the Budget Revised, 1916-17. provision by R3 41 lakhs. The decrease cccurs chiefly in Madras, Burma, Bombay and the Punjab and is due to the deputation of officers to military duty and lapses in the grants for the maintenance of hospitals and dispensaries.

121. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at R15.12 lakhs more than *Budget*, 1917-18. the Revised for the current year. Provision has been made for the cost of sanctioned establishments and for normal charges generally; for larger grants to local bodies in Madras (R2.10 lakhs) of which R1.50 lakhs are for buildings for medical institutions; for a grant of R3.50 lakhs to the Belgatchia Medical College in Bengal; for non-recurring expenditure in connection with the King Edward Memorial Hospital scheme and certain additional establishment in the new Mayo and Albert Victor Hospitals in the Punjab (R1.93 lakhs); and for improvement of dispensary buildings and quarters for the subordinate medical staff in the Central Provinces (R1.40 lakhs).

Revenue.

(a) Imperial.

122. The figures show little variation.

(b) Provincial.

123. The increase in the Revised for the current year over the Budget is Revised, 1916-17. due mainly to a rise in hospital receipts in Bombay owing to the revised scale __________ of fees charged to paying patients. The Budget for 1917-18 does not differ Budget, 1917-18. materially from the current year's Revised._______

EXPENDITURE.

(a) Imperial (India and England.)

124. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 is less than the Budget by R2.58 Revised, 1916-17. lakhs. The decrease is nominal and is due to the assignment to Provincial Governments of R2.64 lakhs out of the reserve of R3.70 lakhs for sanitary expenditure, provision for which was included in the Imperial section in the Budget estimate. There is an increase of R1.42 lakhs in Delhi of which R.80 lakh is due to an allotment from the reserve provision for a drainage scheme. The balance relates to a grant to the Municipal Committee for relieving it from departmental charges on works executed by the Public Works Department, but a nearly equivalent saving arises from the resumption of the recurring grant of R.50 lakh from Imperial revenues made to Bangalore for expenditure on sanitation, in consequence of the decision that special expenditure in Bangalore should be met from the revenues of the Assigned Tract.

125. The reserve of R3 70 lakhs provided in the Budget for 1916-17 out of the recurring appropriation of R51 lakhs from Imperial revenues for the improvement of sanitation will be utilised as shown below :-

126. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised for the current Budget, 1917-18. year by R3 93 lakhs. Provision has been made for the cost of sanctioned establishments and normal charges generally; and for a reserve of R5 67 lakhs. The reduction of R1.42 lakhs in the expenditure in Delhi is due to the absence of the special outlay mentioned in paragraph 124.

127. Out of the special appropriation of R51 lakhs referred to in paragraph 125, R37.83 lakhs have been assigned permanently to Provincial Governments or allotted for recurring outlay in minor administrations. From the balance of B13·17 lakhs, R3 lakhs will be paid in 1917-18 to the Indian Research Fund and R1 lakh to the Peshawar municipality; and R5·67 lakhs will be held in reserve to meet pressing demands that may come forward during the ensuing year. The residue of R3 50 lakhs will be temporarily resumed in view of the financial situation, and will be made available for expenditure on sanitation later, on the return of normal conditions.

(b) Provincial.

128. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 is less than the Budget by R4 93 Revised, 1916-17. lakhs. The latter included special allotments aggregating about #34 lakhs for outlay from recurring and non-recurring grants made from Imperial revenues for the development of sanitation. The expenditure from these grants is now estimated at R38 lakhs inclusive of expenditure from the assignments made during the current year as stated in paragraph 125. Of this amount, R35 lakhs only are recorded under Sanitation, the balance being shown under Civil Works. There is thus a decrease of R6 lakhs in the provision for expenditure from ordinary Provincial resources, which is the result of variations in several provinces, mainly in the grants in aid of sanitary projects.

129. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised for the current Budget, 1917-18. year by R4 34 lakhs. The provision under Sanitation for expenditure from

special Imperial grants amounts to about $\mathbb{R}36$ lakhs against a probable expenditure of $\mathbb{R}35$ lakhs in the current year. Provision has generally been made for the full cost of sanctioned establishments as well as for an expansion of outlay in aid of sanitary schemes in several provinces, Madras and the Punjab being the only provinces which provide for a material decrease in the total expenditure.

130. The following table shows the progress made by the Provincial Governments in utilising the various non-recurring grants made from Imperial revenues in recent years (beginning from 1911-12) in aid of sanitation. To simplify the position, it has been assumed that the recurring grants are fully utilised before any expenditure is debited against the non-recurring grants; and the *minus* figure in 1916-17 and 1917-18 against some of the provinces indicates that the recurring grants will not be spent in full during the year.

133. The Imperial outlay shown against "Other Provinces" consists of the charges of the Political Residency at Aden and certain other expenditure mainly in connection with political refugees and State prisoners—in several provinces.

(a) Imperial—India and England.

134. The expenditure in 1916-17 is likely to exceed the Budget provision Revised, 1916-17. by R78:68 lakhs, owing mainly to special expenditure in Persia necessitated by the war. The total Budget for 1917-18 is more than the Revised estimate Budget, 1917-18. for 1916-17 by R22:57 lakhs. An increase is expected in the special expenditure in Persia, and in the cost of militia employed on the North-West Frontier.

(b) Provincial.

135. The total expenditure in 1916-17 is expected to fall short of the *Revised*, 1916-17. Budget by R7.51 lakhs. A saving of R9.67 lakhs is anticipated in the special expenditure in Burma and Assam in connection with the administration and proper control of the North-East Frontier; a portion of the saving will be utilised for increased expenditure in Bengal, mainly on account of allowances to *détenus* under the Defence of India and other Acts. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised for the current year by R7.47 lakhs owing to the inclusion of normal provision for special expenditure on the North-East Frontier.

EXPENDITURE.

(a) Imperial (India and England).

136. The Revised estimate for the current year does not differ materially Revised, 1916-17. from the Budget. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides generally for Budget, 1917-18. sanctioned establishments and includes grants of (i) H1 lakh for a committee to investigate the possibility of increasing the production of long staple cotton in India and (ii) H1-50 lakhs for Imperial expenditure on agricultural and allied objects from the profits of the wheat scheme of 1915, R-50 lakh out of the latter sum relating to expenditure in the North-West Frontier Province. It also includes allotments for special expenditure on apparatus, etc., in the Bacteriological laboratory at Mukteswar and for the creation of a separate Veterinary Department in the North-West Frontier Province, the provision for which was not utilised in the current year.

(b) Provincial.

137. The total Revised estimate for 1916-17 does not differ materially from *Revised*, 1916-17. the Budget, lapses in grants in some of the provinces being nearly counterbalanced by unimportant excesses in others. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 *Budget*, 1917-18. exceeds the Revised for 1916-17 by R33.26 lakhs. Grants aggregating R22.20 lakhs have been made for expenditure on agricultural and cognate objects from the profits of the wheat scheme of 1915, namely, in the Punjab (10.70 lakhs), the United Provinces (R7.75 lakhs), the Central Provinces (R2.25 lakhs) and Bombay (R1.50 lakhs). Special allotments have also been made in almost all the provinces from ordinary Provincial resources for the expansion of the operations of the agricultural and allied departments.

Revenue.

(a) Imperial.

138. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 does not differ materially from the Bevised, 1916-17. Budget. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for increased receipts from Budget, 1917-18. the manufacture of serum.

(b) Provincial.

139. The variations between the Budget and Revised estimates for the *Revised*, 1916-17. current year and between the latter and the Budget estimate for the next year are due to increased receipts in most of the provinces consequent on the opening $\frac{Budget}{D}$, 1917-18. of new farms, etc.

140. The figures of expenditure shown against "Other Provinces" in the table at page 74 represent outlay incurred in the several provinces in connection with ethnographical surveys and census operations, as well as the cost of the Archaeological Department in Burma. The receipts and charges connected with the X-Ray Institute at Dehra Dun and the Central Research Institute at Kasauli which were formerly shown under this head have now been transferred to the heads "Medical" and "Sanitation" respectively. The figures of the Budget estimate for 1916-17 and the actuals of the preceding years shown in the table at page 74 have been corrected so as to exclude these transactions.

EXPENDITURE.

(a) Imperial-India and England.

141. The total expenditure in 1916-17 will exceed the Budget estimate by Revised, 1916-17. B1 27 lakhs. An expenditure of B2 60 lakhs is anticipated on the Acetone factory in Bangalore, the provision for which was included in the Budget estimate under "46.—Army." On the other hand, there will be a lapse of B2 21 lakhs in the grant for the Survey of India owing to a larger programme of work undertaken for other Departments and a consequent curtailment in the operations chargeable to this head. There will also be minor excesses over the grants for other items of expenditure.

Budget, 1917-18.

142. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is higher than the Revised estimate for the current year by R1.73 lakhs. The increase is mainly due to a normal programme of survey operations and a higher provision for the purchase of stores in England, partly counterbalanced by the omission of the initial expenditure on the Acetone factory included in the Revised.

(b) Provincial.

143. The total Revised estimate for 1916-17 does not differ materially from the Budget. The lump provision of $\mathbb{R}1$ 30 lakhs for the development of industries in Bengal included in the Budget will lapse almost wholly. On the other hand, an excess of $\mathbb{R}1$ ·13 lakhs is expected in Madras mainly on account of larger purchases of cinchona bark. The Budget for 1917-18 is taken at $\mathbb{R}5$ ·17 lakhs more than the Revised estimate for the current year. The increases occur (i) in Madras ($\mathbb{R}2$ ·05 lakhs) due to a larger provision for the development of industries and cinchona plantations and in connection with soap and chank experiments, (ii) in Bombay ($\mathbb{R}1$ ·66 lakhs) owing to the provincialization of the receipts and charges of the steam boiler inspection establishment which have hitherto formed a local fund, and to a proposed grant to the Institute of Science in Bangalore, and (iii) in Bengal ($\mathbb{R}1$ ·20 lakhs) mainly due to the inclusion of a lump provision (\mathbb{R} ·80 lakh) for the development of industries.

145. The improvement in revenue in 1916-17 over the Budget estimate occurs mainly in the receipts from the cinchona plantations in Bengal and Madras owing to larger sales of quinine and higher prices. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 anticipates a further rise of R_2 66 lakhs in the revenue owing chiefly to higher receipts in Madras from fisheries and to the inclusion of provision for receipts from the steam boiler department in Bombay which will be provincialized from 1917-18.

154. The total Imperial expenditure in 1916-17, exclusive of the charges of the commercial departments, is likely to exceed the Budget provision by R12-19 lakhs, the increase being due to higher outlay. in the Government Presses and on the purchase of articles of stationery consequent on a rise in prices. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for a further increase in the cost of stationery.

(b) Provincial.

155. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 is less than the Budget by R4.46 lakhs as the result of unimportant lapses in most of the provinces. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for sanctioned establishments and for some increase in the outlay on stationery.

REVENUE.

156. The Imperial revenue shown against "Other Provinces" represents recovery of the value of stationery supplied to railways and to municipalities and other local bodies. The-decrease in the Budget estimate of Imperial revenue for 1917-18 as compared with the Revised estimate for the current year is due to the discontinuance of the supply of country made paper to State Railways through the Stationery department. The figures do not show any important variation in other respects.

157. This head normally records the comparatively small sums which have to be brought to account owing to the fact that the remittances from India to England by means of council bills and transfers, and the remittances in the opposite direction by sterling bills and transfers, are not effected exactly at the rate of 16 pence to the rupee. It may be mentioned that any gain derived from remittances on account of the Gold Standard Reserve is credited to the Reserve and not to general revenues.

158. In the current year, the average rate to be obtained on the net *Revised*, 1916-17. remittance of funds from India to England is estimated at $\pounds 1 = \Re 14.86$ and there is accordingly a gain of $\Re 40$ lakes on this account. There has however been a loss from exchange of R18 lakhs in the provision of funds for political and military expenditure in Persia owing to a large increase in the amount of the expenditure as the result of war conditions and the heavy depreciation of the rupee in relation to the local kran. The net gain from exchange in the current year will accordingly amount to R22 lakhs. In the Budget estimate *Revised*, 1916-17. for the next year, it is assumed, in accordance with the usual practice, that remittances will be effected at an average rate of par and that there will be neither a gain nor a loss from exchange, j g

159. Charges in connection with the remittance of Government treasure are Imperial in all provinces; so is the discount paid, or the premium levied, in connection with the sale of bills at treasuries and currency offices to facilitate trade remittances of funds. Extraordinary items of revenue realised, or of expenditure incurred, under this head in the various provinces are also treated _ as Imperial, if they exceed **B10,000** in amount.

EXPENDITURE.

(a) India—Imperial.

160. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by B3 19 lakhs. Revised, 1916-17. A sum of $\mathbb{R}10.02$ lakhs has been entered provisionally for payment to the Mysore Durbar in connection with certain re-calculations of the debits in respect of education and sanitation charges in Bangalore which are now under consideration. An expenditure of R3.61 lakhs is expected on account of special commissions of enquiry, viz., the Industrial Commission and the Criminal Procedure Code, Public Works Reorganisation and Law Officers' Committees. Outlay on the repatriation of hostile aliens and other miscellaneous items connected indirectly with the war will cause an excess of R4.01 lakhs over the Budget, while there will be a rise of R190 lakhs in the charges for remittance of treasure owing to heavy trade demands for rupees, and low stocks in India which necessitated larger movements of coin. On the other hand, the bulk of the reserve of $\Re 15.50$ lakhs (including $\Re .50$ lakh for Delhi) for unforeseen charges, which was provided in the Budget under Miscellaneous, has been appropriated to meet sanctioned outlay under other heads of account.

161. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides for normal charges; for miscellaneous expenditure connected with the war likely to be incurred in the Budget, 1917-18. ensuing year; and for the probable outlay on the commissions of enquiry mentioned in the preceding paragraph.

(b) India—Provincial.

162. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 is less than the Budget by R16.59 lakhs. The decrease is mainly due to the record under other heads of account *Revised*, 1916-17. of most of the expenditure incurred against the lump grants for grain compensation allowance and against the various other reserves which were included in the Budget estimates of several provinces under Miscellaneous; and to a lapse in the allotment for relief of distress in Bengal. On the other hand, a certain amount of excess expenditure has been incurred in the Punjab on account of grants to District Boards, the Budget provision for which was included under other heads of account, and in Assam for relief of distress caused by floods.

163. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides generally for normal charges and for the usual reserve for unforeseen expenditure in most provinces. In Budget, 1917-18. Bengal and the United Provinces, lump allotments have again been made for grain compensation charges.

(c) England.

164. The variations between the Budget and Revised estimates of the current year, and between the latter and the Budget estimate for the next year, occur in the miscellaneous expenditure connected with the supply of stores to India, • . Action States

REVENUE.

(a) India—Imperial.

165. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by B832 lakhs. The increase occurs mainly in the special receipts from the sale of town sites in the Punjab and from the lease of nazul sites in Delhi. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides generally for normal receipts.

(b) India—Provincial.

166. The total revenue in 1916-17 is likely to exceed the Budget estimate by $\mathbb{R}4.95$ lakhs. The increase is mainly due to the credit to revenue of unadjusted balances of accounts relating to certain advances in Bombay, refunds of temporary contributions given to local bodies in Madras and saleproceeds of manufactures by weavers in receipt of relief in Bengal. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides generally for normal receipts; and for a special refund in the Punjab of $\mathbb{R}1$ lakh from the Imperial Relief fund in respect of a grant made to it in 1914-15 for starting cheap grain shops, which was not actually utilised.

(c) England.

167. The increase in the Budget estimate for 1917-18 over the Revised for the current year is due to the appropriation as revenue of the profits from the wheat scheme of 1915. A corresponding provision for expenditure has been entered in India in the Budget estimate for the next year, *vide* paragraphs 136 and 137.

33 TO 36.-FAMINE RELIEF AND INSURANCE.

168. The expenditure in the current year under the head Famine Relief is Revised, 1916-17. now estimated at R28.90 lakhs, the principal items being an outlay of (1) R13 lakhs in the Punjab and R4 23 lakhs in Ajmer-Merwara in connection with fodder concessions, and (2) R7.15 lakhs in Bengal and R2.25 lakhs in Bihar and Orissa on relief operations in certain districts.

169. The amount available for famine insurance in 1916-17 accordingly amounts to B121.10 lakhs of which B51.74 lakhs will be spent on protective works and R69.36 lakhs will be appropriated for the reduction or avoidance of debt.

170. In the Budget estimate for 1917-18 provision has been made as usual Budget, 1917-18. for a total grant of R150 lakhs under this group head. Out of this amount, a sum of R8.44 lakhs will be required to meet expenditure debitable to the head Famine Relief in connection mainly with fodder concessions in the Punjab and relief operations in Bihar and Orissa, and R62.92 lakhs have been allotted for the construction of protective works. The remainder, viz., R78.64 lakhs, will be utilised for the avoidance of debt.

171. It has been decided, with effect from the 1st April 1917, to treat famine relief expenditure in all provinces as divisible between Imperial and Provincial revenues in the proportion of $\frac{3}{4}$ and $\frac{1}{4}$ respectively, the existing arrangements in regard to the maintenance of separate pro forma accounts for such expenditure with the consequential account adjustments being discontinued. The entire sum of $\mathbb{R}78.64$ lakhs stated above as available for the reduction or avoidance of debt in 1917-18 will therefore appear in the Imperial section of the estimates.

Construction of Protective Railways.

172. The small minus figures entered in the Revised estimate for 1916-17 and in the Budget for 1917-18 represent the value of surplus stores of the Dharmapuri-Hosur extension of the Morappur-Dharmapuri Railway. No outlay on the construction of Protective railways is contemplated in either of the two years.

Construction of Protective Irrigation Works.

Revised, 1916-17.

173. In the Budget estimate for 1916-17 an allotment of R65 lakhs was made for outlay on Protective Irrigation works, the whole amount being met from the Famine Insurance grant. The probable expenditure, according to the Revised estimate, will amount to R51.83 lakhs owing mainly to slower progress of work on the Nira Right Bank canal in Bombay and the Tandula canal and certain tank projects in the Central Provinces. The entire outlay will be recorded in the Famine Relief and Insurance section of the accounts.

Budget, 1917-18.

174. In the Budget estimate for 1917-18, the allotment for Protective Irrigation works is taken at R63 lakhs, the whole amount being met from the Famine Insurance grant. The distribution of the grant of R63 lakhs is given in the table below.

Gross Receipts.

176. The Budget estimate of Gross Receipts for 1916-17 was taken at B56·37 crores, or about R79 lakhs lower than the probable receipts of the previous year as then estimated. It was assumed that, with the continuance of the war in the current year, the record earnings of 1915-16 would not be fully maintained, though necessary allowance was made for development of traffic on new lines and extensions of recent construction. The results have, however, proved much more favourable than was anticipated, and the Revised estimate is now placed at R62·37 crores, or R6 crores higher than the Budget. This substantial increase is contributed by all the principal railways. It is partly, however, attributable to larger receipts from the carriage of troops and military stores, and to the diversion to rail routes, consequent on the shortage of steamers and the high freights ruling, of traffic which was formerly seaborne. The improvement would have been larger but for the restriction of bookings on certain railways, notably the Great Indian Peninsula and North-Western Railways; owing to a temporary stoppage in the supply of coal for locomotive purposes

177. The Revised estimate of Working Expenses for 1916-17 stands at R22.20 lakhs below the Budget estimate, a remarkable result considering that receipts are expected to exceed the Budget by R6 crores. The cause of the reduction is to be found in the increasing difficulty of obtaining railway material from England in consequence of which repairs and renewals of permanent-way and rolling-stock have been considerably restricted.

178. The increase of R2082 lakhs in the provision for payment of surplus profits to companies follows on the improvement in their net traffic receipts in the last quarter of the preceding year.

179. It has been decided to levy a surcharge on goods traffic carried by railways and inland steam vessels, with effect from the 1st April 1917, at the rate of 1 pie per maund on coal, coke and firewood and 2 pies per maund on other articles. The proceeds of the surcharge during 1917-18 are estimated at $\pounds500,000$ ($\pounds75$ lakhs).

180. Apart from the surcharge mentioned in the preceding paragraph, the Budget estimate of Gross Receipts for 1917-18 is taken at R62 01 crores, or about R36 lakhs below the Revised estimate of the current year. It is anticipated that the reductions recently effected in passenger train services will result in some diminution of earnings, and generally that the favourable circumstances of the current year may not be wholly repeated, but that this will be counterbalanced, to a certain extent, by normal development of goods traffic and additional earnings from new lines and extensions of recent construction.

181. The grant for Working Expenses in 1917-18 is more than the Revised for the current year by R144 lakhs, and provides for a larger programme of special repairs and renewals than in the current year.

182. Under Surplus Profits paid to companies there is an increase of R3.18 lakhs due to the profits earned in the second half of the current year, payment of which will be made next year, being larger than those of the second half of 1915-16.

Interest Charges, etc.

Revised, 1916-17.

183. The decrease under Interest on debt is explained in paragraph 76. The excess under sinking funds is due to the re-investment of the proceeds of the sale of securities the realisation of which was not contemplated in the Budget.

The increase in the total Interest charges in 1917-18 is a result of the Budget, 1917-18. continued growth of capital outlay on railways.

Other Receipts.

184 The receipts shown under this head represent recoveries from the Travancore Durbar of its share of the loss on the Travancore branch of the South Indian Railway; the Government share of the surplus profits of the Robilkund and Kumaon, Southern Punjab, Amritsar-Patti and Hardwar-Dehra Railways, payable under the terms of their respective contracts, and dividends on certain shares of the Ahmedabad-Dholka Railway allotted to Government in repayment of expenditure incurred by it on behalf of the railway. The Revised, 1916-17. improvement of £13,800 on the Budget estimate of receipts in the current year and the decrease of £5,100 provided for in the Budget of 1917-18 are mainly due to variations in the recovery from the Travancore Durbar and Budget, 1917-18, in the Government share of surplus profits of the Southern Punjab Railway Company.

- Other charges.

185. These consist of cost of land required by certain Companies, the contracts with which provide for the free supply of all land wanted for the purposes of the railways undertaken by them, and of miscellaneous items such as surveys and controlling establishments (including the Railway Board). A share of the cost of control is charged to the working expenses of each Railway Company and the recoveries thus made are adjusted by deduction from the miscellaneous expenditure. Land -A lapse of R5.39 lakhs is expected in the Imperial Budget grant for Revised, 1916-17. the current year, due chiefly to short outlay on the Ahmedpur-Katwa, Bankura-Damoodar River, Kalighat-Fulta and Nawashahr-Jaijon Extension Railways and to the postponement of acquisition of land for the Larkhana-Jacobabad, and to the postponement of acquisition of land for the Larknana-Jaconabad, Mardan-Charsadda-Swabi, Mayaveram-Tranquebar and Salem-Attur Railways, partly counterbalanced by increases on the Mymensingh-Bhairab Bazar, Sara-Serajgunj, Katakhal-Lalla Bazar, Futwa-Islampur, Chaparmukh-Silghat and Southern Punjab Railways. The principal allotments made in 1917-18 are *Budget*, 1917-18. for the Kalighat-Fulta, Mymensingh-Bhairab Bazar, Khulna-Bagirhat, Chapermukh-Silghat and Mayavaram-Tranquebar Railways.

Miscellaneous Expenditure.—The lapse in the Revised estimate for Revised, 1916-17. 1916-17, is due chiefly to survey operations being restricted in consequence of officers having been placed on military duty and to realisation of unantici- Budget, 1917-18. pated credits. Goneral Result.

186. Taking India as a whole, the net revenue derived from Major Irrigation works in 1916-17 will exceed the Budget forecast by £123,100 (£18:47 lakhs). Major Irrigation. There will be a rise of #8.49 lakhs in the Direct Receipts and of #7.29 lakhs in the share of Land Revenue. There will also be a saving of \mathbb{R}_2 69 lakhs in the expenditure, *viz.*, \mathbb{R} 08 lakh under Working Expenses and \mathbb{R}_2 61 lakhs in the interest charges. A further improvement of £109,100 (\mathbb{R}_16 36 lakhs) is expected in the net revenue in 1917-18. This allows for a rise of B25.14 lakhs in the gross revenue, made up of an increase of B7.75 lakhs in the Direct Receipts and of R17.39 lakhs in the share of Land Revenue. But a higher provision of R3.65 lakhs has been made for Working Expenses and there will also be a large growth of R5.13 lakhs in the interest charges, in consequence of the considerable outlay that has recently been incurred on new projects in the Punjab and elsewhere, the benefits of which will not be realised Minor Irrigation. for some time to come. The net result under Minor Irrigation works in 1916-17 is better than the Budget estimate by £97,900 (R14.69 lakhs), the result of an increase of R3.54 lakhs in revenue and a saving of R11.15 lakhs in expenditure. The estimate for next year provides for a fall of R1.28 lakhs in the receipts and for a rise of H14.55 lakhs in expenditure.

187. The figures for Land Revenue due to Irrigation have already been examined in paragraphs 12 and 13 along with those for Land Revenue proper, The details of the other heads are exhibited in the following tables.

DIRECT RECEIPTS.

(a) Imperial.

Revised, 1916-17. Budget, 1917-18.

188. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 does not differ materially from the Budget. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at B779 lakhs more than the current year's Revised, the increase being due to provision for receipts from the Twante Canal in Burma, which was recently completed, and to an anticipated development of irrigation on the Upper Swat River Canal in the North-West Frontier Province.

(b) Divided and wholly Provincial.

Revised, 1916-17.

Budget, 1917-18.

189. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 will exceed the Eudget by $\mathbb{R}8.75$ lakhs. A considerable increase of $\mathbb{R}10.56$ lakhs is anticipated in the Punjab owing to an abnormal demand for water from the Sirhind and the Upper Chenab Canals during both the *rabi* and *kharif* seasons, due in the former case to the unsatisfactory winter rains. On the other hand, there will be a decline in revenue in Bihar and Orissa ($\mathbb{R}1.72$ lakhs) in consequence of a smaller demand for irrigation following on a seasonable rainfall, and in Bombay ($\mathbb{R}1.22$ lakhs) due to a reduction in the supplies of water available for irrigation from some of the canals in the province.

190. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 does not differ materially from the Revised for 1916-17. It is based generally on the demand for *rabi* irrigation in the current year and on normal requirements in connection with next year's *kharif*. A further increase of $\mathbb{R}5.47$ lakhs is anticipated in the Punjab mainly owing to the development of irrigation from the projects recently completed, but there will be a fall of $\mathbb{R}6.35$ lakhs in the United Provinces, the exceptionally favourable south-west monsoon of 1916 having reduced the demand for canal water in connection with the *rabi* sowings.

WORKING EXPENSES.

(a) Imperial.

: Revised, 1916-17.

Budget, 1917-18.

191. The total expenditure in 1916-17 is likely to exceed the Budget provision by B1.61 lakhs, the increase being mainly due to larger outlay on repairs necessitated by floods on the Upper Swat River canal in the North-West Frontier Province. Small excesses over the Budget are also expected on the Imperial canals in other provinces.

192. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is \mathbb{R}^2 99 lakhs more than the Revised for the current year. It provides for outlay on extensions and improvements on the Twante canal in Burma, for the maintenance of the Tandula canal in the Central Provinces which is expected to come into operation during the next year, and for normal charges on other irrigation systems.

(b) Divided and wholly Provincial.

Revised, 1916-17.

193. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 will fall short of the Budget provision by $\mathbb{R}1$ -69 lakhs. A lapse of $\mathbb{R}2$ -50 lakhs is expected in Madras owing to the retardation of work by abnormal rains and to credits from the Military department on account of a steamer and barges taken over for military purposes; and of \mathbb{R} -91 lakh in the United Provinces due to a curtailment of the programme of work in view of the need for economy. On the other hand, the expenditure will exceed the Budget grant by $\mathbb{R}1$ -15 lakhs in the Punjab owing to repairs necessitafed by heavy rains and by \mathbb{R} -74 lakh in Bombay.

Budget, 1917-18.

194. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 provides generally for a normal scale of expenditure. An allotment has been made in Madras for the replacement of the barges transferred to the Military department in the current year.

REVENUE.

(a) Imperial.

196. The figures do not show any important variation.

(b) Divided and Provincial.

197. The total Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by R3.77 Bevised, 1916-17. lakhs. There will be an increase of R1.56 lakhs in the receipts from the Madaripur Bhil route in Bengal due to increased traffic in jute. There will also be minor improvements in Burma, the United Provinces and Madras due generally to a development in canal irrigation, while a special receipt of \mathbb{R} .72 lakh is anticipated in Assam from the recovery of the cost of river craft commandeered for service in Mesopotamia. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 Budget, 1917-18. generally repeats the Revised for the current year.

Expenditure.

(a) Imperial—India and England.

198. The Budget estimate of the current year included a grant of R2.89 Revised, 1916-17. lakhs in aid of special expenditure entailed by the recommendations of the Irrigation Commission. R1.53 lakhs out of this grant are being spent on the Surkhab River project in Baluchistan and R.30 lakh on urgent works on the Chenab and Muzaffargarh Inundation Canals, while R.84 lakh has been allotted to the Government of the United Próvinces for tank restoration works and placed at its credit by an assignment of Imperial revenue (vide paragraph 245). The balance of the special grant will lapse. With petty variations in the grants for Imperial expenditure in other provinces, the Revised estimate for the current year is expected to fall short of the Budget by R1.20, lakhs.

199. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the current year's Revised Budget, 1917-18. by R1.55 lakhs. Provision for new works has been curtailed as far as possible and no specific allotment has been made for the Surkhab River project in Baluchistan, but a reserve of R3.45 lakhs has been entered to meet pressing requirements which cannot be foreseen at present.

(b) Divided and Provincial.

200. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 falls short of the Budget grant by Revised, 1915 17. R995 lakhs. Lapses in grants are anticipated in Madras, Bombay, the Central Provinces and Bihar and Orissa owing either to the curtailment of programmes in view of the need for economy or the retardation of work by heavy rainfall. On the other hand, an excess of \mathbf{R} 98 lakh is anticipated in the United Provinces, due to expenditure on tank restoration works which is being financed largely by a special assignment from Imperial revenues (vide paragraph 198), and smaller excesses in the Punjab and Burma where it has been necessary to undertake some works which could not be foreseen.

201. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 is taken at R13 01 lakhs more than Budget, 1917-18. the Revised for the current year. Provision has generally been made for sanctioned establishments, for necessary repairs and for urgent works. An allotment of R2.50 lakhs has been made in Bengal for schemes of flood protection in the Burdwan Division which has in recent years suffered seriously from floods, and of R1 lakh in Madras for repairs to damages caused by the cyclone in the current year and for two new schemes of expenditure in Burma.

204. The total expenditure in 1916-17 is expected to fall short of the Budget provision by R3.86 lakhs. The reduction is due to the curtailment of the expenditure programme, chiefly in Bombay and the United Provinces. There will, however, be an excess over the Budget estimate of #4.79 lakhs in Delhi owing to some unforeseen items of expenditure, part of which will be met from the reserve of R6 lakhs included in the Budget; and of R1.87 lakhs in England mainly due to higher payments of leave allowances.

205. In 1917-18 the total Imperial grant has been fixed at R100 lakhs, exclusive of R5.24 lakhs allotted for expenditure in the Civil Department, mostly in the several minor administrations, and of sums aggregat-ing R34.85 lakhs to be spent by the administrations of the North-West Frontier Province (R26.70 lakhs) and Baluchistan (R8.15 lakhs). The total Budget for 1917-18 is more than the Revised estimate for 1916-17 by R28.25 lakhs and more than the Budget grant for the latter year by R24.40 lakhs; but of this excess R20 lakhs represents a special provision for the construction of an acetone factory. The grants for ordinary expenditure have been kept as low as possible in view of the present financial situation.

206. The purposes to which the grant of R100 lakhs mentioned in the preceding paragraph will be applied are shown below :---

208. The Budget grant for 1917-18 proposed for Baluchistan does not differ. materially from the Revised estimate for 1916-17. The grant for the North-West Frontier Province is taken at 14.43 lakhs more than the Revised owing to the urgent necessity for undertaking certain works, the low allotments made during the last two years having been inadequate for the needs of the Province.

(b) India—Provincial.

209. The total Revised estimate for 1916-17 is less than the Budget *Bevised*, 1916-17. by H5-40 lakhs. The Budget provided for an outlay of R9 lakhs on Civil Works from the special Imperial assignments made in recent years for Education, Sanitation and other beneficent services, but the total expenditure of this class in the current year, to be recorded under Civil Works is now estimated at about R13½ lakhs. Eliminating this special expenditure as well as the Budget provision made for it, the Revised estimate under Civil Works falls short of the corresponding Budget grant by about R10 lakhs. The real saving is larger, for a portion of the expenditure against some of the ordinary grants provided in the Budget under Education, Sanitation and other heads is recorded in the accounts under Civil Works. The only important decreases occur in Burma and Bihar and Orissa, in the latter case in the outlay on buildings for the New Capital. The lapse in grants, however, has been smaller than usual as the Budget grants for the current year were on a very restricted scale.

210. The table below compares the details of the grants for 1917-18 in the Budget, 1917-18. various provinces, so far as settled at present, with the probable expenditure

211. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 exceeds the Revised for the current year by ± 101.12 lakhs. The increase is distributed over all the provinces except the United Provinces. Allotments aggregating ± 12 lakhs have been made for outlay on civil works from the special Imperial assignments made in recent years.

212. The total provision for original works in 1917-18 has been taken at B81·38 lakhs more than the probable expenditure in the current year. Provision has been made in Bihar and Orissa for progress of work in connection with the Bankipore buildings and the Lunatic asylums at Ranchi; in Bengal for quarters for the subordinate police and for expenditure connected with the partition of the districts of Midnapore and Mymensingh; in Assam for the construction of Military police lines on the North-East frontier; in Burma for the construction of roads in the wolfram-producing area; and in Burma, the Central Provinces and the Punjab for a partial re-grant of lapses in the current year.

213. The total provision for grants to local boards and municipalities in 1917-18 is about R4 lakhs less than the similar expenditure in 1916-17, the decrease occurring mainly in Bihar and Orissa and Assam. Of the provision under "grants to other local bodies", R1 50 lakhs represent the grant from Imperial revenues to the Calcutta Improvement Trust.

214. The Budget grants for repairs and for establishment charges are generally based on normal requirements and sanctioned scales. The Budget under the head "other items" includes an allotment for the acquisition of land for the Rangoon University and a lump provision in Bihar and Orissa forsanitary improvements.

.

(a) Imperial.

Budget, 1910-17. 215. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 exceeds the Budget by B1·28 *Budget, 1917-18.* Calcutta to the Eastern Bengal State Railway. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 practically repeats the Revised for the current year.

(b) Provincial.

216. The Revised estimate for 1916-17 shows a rise of H5.28 lakhs over the Budget estimate. Special receipts are expected in Bengal and Bombay from the refund of unspent balances of grants made to certain local bodies in previous years and in the United Provinces from the sale of old school buildings. There will also be increases in most provinces in the sale-proceeds of old materials and miscellaneous items of revenue. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 - provides generally for normal receipts.

217. The net expenditure under the Army head during the current year is expected to exceed the Budget Estimate of £31,76.36 lakhs (£21,175,700) by £3,18.20 lakhs (£2,121,400). Of this, £908,100 (£1,36.21 lakhs) occurs in India and £1,213,300 in England.

218. The most important causes of the increase in India are :--

partly counterbalanced by the appropriation of a portion of the Budget "Reserve" of R78.45 lakhs (£525,000); and by the lapse of a provision in the Indian estimates for expenditure on Mechanical Transport Companies, which is actually being incurred at Home.

In connection with (1) above, Budget provision of R50 lakhs was made last year for the North-West Frontier operations. The cost of preparations and undertakings in connection with the situation on the North-West Frontier is now estimated at R105 lakhs. The Aden operations are now expected to cost R75 lakhs a moiety of which is chargeable to Indian revenues, involving an increase of $R20\frac{1}{3}$ lakhs over the budget provision of R17 lakhs.

As regards (2), practically all movements of troops, animals, stores, etc., other than to seaports for over-seas forces, are chargeable to Indian revenues. There were no means, when the Budget was prepared, of accurately gauging the extent of the possible railway charges. Frontier operations, internal defence, and the concentration of troops in the Rawalpindi Division have necessitated extensive railway movements.

About $\Re 22\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs of the increase in food charges represent the extra cost of the concession sanctioned on the 1st January 1917 to Indian combatants, under which they receive a ration allowance of $\Re 2$ each per mensem until arrangements can be made by the Supply and Transport Corps to supply rations in kind. It is hoped that the issue of rations will commence generally on the 1st of March; the cost of these rations for one month, together with one month's stock as a reserve, is included in the $\Re 22\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs. The balance of the excess, $\Re 11\frac{1}{4}$ lakhs roundly, is due to a rise in prices and to the fact that a larger number of men have been drawing the old money allowance in lieu of rations at Quetta and other places.

The increase at (4) is mainly due to revised rates' being adopted in calculating the normal cost of troops in India and in the Field, and takes into account the rise in prices of Ordnance, Medical and Clothing stores, and the anticipated adjustment in this year of R15 lakhs of last year's outstandings in the contribution to the Imperial Government. Of the increase of R35 90 lakhs at item (5), R24 lakhs occur under Clothing, mainly on account of rise in prices of clothing stores (including boots) which are supplied on payment to Indian troops and followers at pre-war recovery rates.

219. The main cause of the increase at Home of £1,213,300 over the Budget is in the stores head, where there is an increase of £1,284,200, including £936,000 on account of additional rifles and ammunition, £110,000 for mechanical transport stores (for which provision was made as explained above in the Indian Estimates), and £45,000 for machine guns.

220. For the coming year, the provision for net Army expenditure Budget, 1917-13, stands at R36,3143 lakhs (£24,229,600), which in the case of the Indian compared with allotment is R1,8004 lakhs (£1,200,300) more than the net expenditure anticipated in the current year, while the Home provision is £267,800

222. At Home the decrease is mainly accounted for by a lower provision of £210,800 for stores, made up chiefly of £386,000 less for rifles and £169,000 more for aviation stores; and by larger recoveries from the War Office for war pensions payable in India, amounting to £180,000: partly counterbalanced by recoveries from the War Office in 1916-17 in respect of non-effective war disbursements by the India Office during 1914-15 and 1915-16 (about £100,000).

223. The estimated gross \cdot Army expenditure for 1917-18 exceeds the Budget, 1917-18, current year's Budget of £22,079,100 by £3,136,800, while the receipts are compared with more by £82,900. The net expenditure is thus estimated to exceed the amount Budget, 1916-17. sanctioned last March by £3,053,900, made up of £2,108,400 in India and £945,500 in Englaud. The increase in India is mainly accounted for by a larger provision of R66'66 lakhs (£444,400) in connection with the North-West Frontier and Aden operations, etc.; an additional allotment of Rs. 59'29 lakhs (£395,300) for food charges, including R51'50 lakhs on account of the concession of free rations to Indian combatants; a higher provision for war pensions (recoverable from the Imperial Government), and increased rates of pensions for Indians sanctioned with effect from 4th August 1914, R27 lakhs (£180,600); heavier railway oharges, R58'96 lakhs (£39',000); a higher provision, including rise in prices, for Ordnance, Clothing and Medical stores, R29'09 lakhs (£193,900); revision of normal cost rates and war contributionto the Imperial Government, R24 lakhs (£160,000); and a larger "Reserve" of R26'95 lakhs (£179,600) to meet unforeseen demands, etc. The increase at Home occurs mainly under the head of Stores, which accounts for £1,073,400 (including £550,000 for rifles and ammunition); this increase is partly counterbalanced by smaller non-effective charges, since it is anticipated there will be larger recoveries (£120,000) from the War Office for war pensions and gratuities payable in India.

224. It is anticipated that the expenditure in India and at Home in 1916-17 will amount to £744,600, or £37,000 over the Budget provision; while the receipts are expected to exceed the Budget Estimate by a sum of £190,700. There is thus an improvement of £153,700 in the net expenditure.

The Indian expenditure has risen by £67,300. This is mainly due to larger outlay on stores and the grant of overtime pay to certain dockyard staff and establishments. At Home there is a decrease of £30,300, brought about by a lapse of £132,300 in the provision for the construction of three Royal Indian Marine vessels, though this is partly counterbalanced by larger expenditure on miscellaneous stores demanded from India to replace the stores used in fitting up transports. The increase in receipts is accounted for by larger recoveries for dockyard services and by a rise in the price of Home stores used in fitting up transports.

Budget, 1917-18, compared with Revised, 1916-17. 225. For the ensuing year a total provision of £838,500 has been made. This is £93,900 more than the expenditure anticipated in the present year. Allowance has been made for an increase of £105,300 at Home and a decrease of £11,400 in India; the former takes into account an increase of £126,900 towards completion of the three Marine vessels already referred to. The receipts are expected to be lower by £112,400, as the work done in the dockyards this year was exceptionally heavy and the receipts include arrear recoveries for the year 1915-16. The net expenditure is therefore expected to be £206,300 more than the corresponding figure in the current year.

XXXIV and 47-MILITARY WORKS.

226. Expenditure, Ordinary Demands.—These show a considerable Revised, 1916-17, increase—about R68 lakhs (£453,600)—which is entirely due to urgent measures compared with necessitated by the war, such as the improvement of the Nushki-Robat road, Budget, 1916-17. costing $R7\frac{1}{4}$ lakhs; the provision of accommodation for the Royal Flying Corps and Air Craft Park costing about $R10\frac{1}{4}$ lakhs; war hospitals (about R10 lakhs); construction of a general hospital at Deolali (R8 lakhs), etc. The "Reserve" of $R78\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs (£523,000) in the Army Estimates has been largely utilised in meeting this extra expenditure in the Military Works Services.

Special Demands.—An increase of $\mathbb{R}33\frac{1}{4}$ lakhs (£221,800) is expected on the budget allotment of $\mathbb{R}30\frac{3}{4}$ lakhs (£204,900). Improvements to frontier roads account for $\mathbb{R}13\frac{1}{4}$ lakhs of this; $\mathbb{R}7\frac{1}{3}$ lakhs are being spent on the provision of electric lights in barracks and hospitals for British troops; $\mathbb{R}5\frac{1}{4}$ lakhs have been spent on the construction of a cart road and metalling a portion of another road in the Shilman valley; additional sums of $\mathbb{R}2$ lakhs have been allotted

for Indian troops' lines and R1 lakh for electrification of the Royal Flying Corps buildings.

227. Expenditure—Ordinary Demands.—The allotment for 1917-18 has been fixed at $B109\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs (£730,000), as compared with R98 lakhs (£653,400) in the current year. This increase takes into account the abnormal requirements of the Boyal Flying Corps and Nos. 1 and 2 Mechanical Transport Companies —which will need R15 lakhs in India against R6 lakhs provided in 1916-17 and a provision of $B2\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs for works for the comfort of troops.

Special Demands.—In the aggregate, the allotment for 1917-18, viz. R64.31 lakhs (£428,700), approximates to the anticipated expenditure in 1916-17, *i.e.*, R64 lakhs, though it exceeds the allotment in the Budget, 1916-17, by R33.57 lakhs (£223,800): In the coming year, the most prominent measures provided for are :—

Revival of the normal grant for Indian troops' lines of B13 lakhs, which has been reduced in the last two years to about half that figure.

R15 lakhs have been allotted for frontier roads, against $R22\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs likely to be spent in the current year.

B10 lakhs have been set aside for electric installations in barracks and hospitals for British troops, which is about $\frac{R2\frac{1}{2}}{\frac{1}{2}}$ lakhs more than in the Revised estimate of the current year.

About R43 lakhs have been provided for new works, and the balance for works in progress.

228. These figures call for no special comment.

SCHEDULE.

Revised, 1916-17.

229. The total provision for Schedule in the Budget of 1916-17 was - R69.40 lakhs (£462,700). It is now anticipated that the expenditure will amount to R2,56.69 lakhs (£1,711,300), or an increase of R187.29 lakhs (£1,248,600). This is made up of an increase of over R67 lakhs (£448,000) in India and R120-lakhs (£800,600) at Home.

The increase at Home is mainly on account of the purchase of new rifles, on which, as explained in paragraph 219, £936,000 will be spent this year; on the other hand, work on the construction of Marine vessels has been retarded, with the result that there is a lapse of £132,300.

The Schedule system is largely in abeyance under the special circumstances of the war, and the principal increases are explained above under the appropriate Military heads, *e.g.*, free rations, improvements to frontier roads, etc.

Budget, 1917-18, compared with Budget, 1916-17.

230. The Schedule for 1917-18 has been fixed at **B285** 20 lakhs *Budget*, 1917-18. (£1,901,300) in view of the urgent need for rifles and ammunition. On this account a sum of £550,000 has been provided, as mentioned in paragraph 223. The concessions of free rations to Indian combatants and increased pay to higher ranks will cost R60 lakhs, and the increased scale of pensions for Indian combatants entails an extra provision of R9 lakhs. For the grant of pay of temporary rank to British officers of the Indian Army R12 lakhs have been provided, and R3 lakhs for improvement in the pay and prospects of sub-assistant surgeons.

For the completion of the three Marine vessels about $R21\frac{1}{3}$ lakhs (£143,500) have been allotted.

In the case of Military Works, provision has been made on a larger scale for works in progress, and special allotments have been made of R15 lakhs for frontier roads and B10 lakhs for electric installations in barracks and hospitals of British troops, as already stated in paragraph 227.

MILITARY SERVICES : SUMMARY.

231. The total net grant for Military expenditure in 1916-17 was £22¹/₃ Revised, 1916-17. million. It is now anticipated that this will be exceeded by £2,655,000. Broadly speaking, the excess is attributable to war conditions which, for instance, have necessitated considerable outlay on additional rifles and ammunition; on railway charges for internal movements of troops, stores, etc.; on the North-West Frontier and Aden operations; on larger requirements generally of stores-local and imported-including rise in prices; and on military works which the present situation has rendered absolutely necessary.

232 For the coming year, the net Military Budget has been fixed at Budget, 1917-18. £25,900,000, on the assumption that war conditions will continue throughout the year. This figure is £715,000 more than the expected expenditure in 1916-17. It includes a reserve of £703,000 to meet possible unforeseen demands.

As stated in paragraphs 44 and 45 above, the Income-tax revenue in the current and next years is expected to exceed largely the Budget estimate for the current year, which formed the basis of the calculation of the assignments to be recovered from local Governments in respect of their share of the revenue derived from the extra taxation imposed last year. The increase is due to the abnormal war profits realised in Bengal and Bombay, and as the taxation was imposed wholly for Imperial purposes, it is proposed to raise the assignments from these provinces by the Provincial share of the extra receipts attributable to the new taxation. The exact amounts of the assignments will be separately considered.

238. The petty increase in the Revised over the Budget for the current year is due to the allotment of a small sum for recurring outlay in Bihar and Orissa from the undistributed balance of the recurring appropriation of R51 lakhs made from Imperial revenues in recent years for the improvement of sanitation (see paragraph 125).

(e) Assignments in connection with the scheme for the incidence of Famine Belief expenditure.

239. The variation in the amount of assignments for the famine insurance of Provincial Governments provided in the Revised estimate for 1916-17 as compared with the Budget arises from the circumstances mentioned below. Under the scheme for the incidence of famine relief expenditure introduced in 1907, the details of which were explained in paragraphs 48 to 57 of the Financial Statement for 1907-08, certain annual assignments are made to Provincial Governments, and the latter use the funds so placed at their disposal to build up a reserve of credit with the Imperial Government which can be utilised when necessary to meet famine relief expenditure. To avoid the possible accumulation of an unnecessarily high credit, it was decided (1) to fix a maximum limit to the reserve of each province, and (2) when that limit was reached in any province, to discontinue the annual assignment until the credit had been reduced by expenditure on famine relief. The limit for Bombay was fixed at R80 lakhs; and it is estimated that this figure will be reached in 1916-17 with an assignment of **B3**.70 lakhs, which is **B10** lakhs less than the normal assignment for the province. The maximum limit has already been reached in the Central Provinces and no further assignment is now made to it in this connection.

Budget, 1917-18.

240. No assignments to Provincial' revenues are necessary on this account during the next year as it has been decided to discontinue the arrangements mentioned in the preceding paragraph from the 1st April 1917—*vide* paragraph 171.

241. The Budget estimate for the current year provided for a contribution to the Punjab to bring its net irrigation revenue up to the amount guaranteed in the provincial settlement. No contribution is required either in the Revised for the current year or the Budget for the next year.

BAILWAY CONSTRUCTION.

Revised, 1916-17.

246. In the Budget for 1916-17, a sum of R450 lakhs was allotted for expenditure on railway construction for which the Government of India undertake financial responsibility. The expenditure of the year is now-estimated at B22649 lakhs or R22351 lakhs less than the grant, the lapse being due partly to the difficulties attendant on the supply of material from England, and partly to special credits anticipated from the supply of railway stores, rolling stock, etc., for use in connection with expeditionary forces. For 1917-18 a grant of R540 lakhs has been provided, of which H162.23 lakhs is for rolling stock; allowing for a credit of R40 lakhs anticipated in the next year from the supply of stores for war purposes, the effective grant for capital outlay during the next year amounts to R580 lakhs.

251. The expenditure in 1916-17 is expected to fall short of the Budget Revised, 1916-17. grant by R46 45 lakhs. There will be a lapse of about R22 lakhs in the allotments for works in operation,* mainly on canals in the Punjab, on the Eastern Nara Works in Bombay, and the permanent head works of the Ganges • Caral in the United Provinces, due in the last case partly to a failure in the supply of materials. There will also be a saving of about R15 lakhs in the grant for works under construction, due to slower progress of work on the Toludur project in Madras owing to scarcity of labour and on the Mahanadi and Wain Ganga Canals in the Central Provinces. The whole of the reserve provision of H10 lakhs included in the Budget will lapse.

252. The Budget grant for 1917-18 has been fixed at H90 lakhs or slightly Budget, 1917-18. more than the probable expenditure in 1916-17, with reference to the financial situation and after due consideration of the requirements of the various canals under construction most of which are nearing completion. The following statement shows the distribution of the expenditure in 1916-17 and the grant for 1917-18:—

Of the total grant of $\mathbb{R}90$ lakhs, about $\mathbb{R}38\frac{1}{3}$ lakhs will be allotted to canals under construction; about $\mathbb{R}48$ lakhs will be devoted to the completion and development of canals in operation; and $\mathbb{R}3\frac{1}{3}$ lakhs will be held in reserve to meet unforeseen requirements.

Of the grant of R33.60 lakhs for works outlay, about R5 lakhs will be required for the preparation of sites and other preliminary work and for the further purchase of tools, plant and other stores. A sum of $R2\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs will be spent on sanitation and the balance will be applied mainly to the construction of buildings on which work has already been commenced.

WAYS AND MEANS. HOME TREASURY.

Introductory.

257. The bulk of the payments made in England on account of the Government of India consist of expenditure chargeable to the Indian revenues ; and if such payments represented the only transactions, the Ways and Means programme would be a simple arrangement, as the whole of the expenditure would ordinarily be met by remittance of funds from India. The capital outlay on the construction of railways and irrigation works, however, necessitates heavy borrowing, and when practicable, a large portion of the money required is raised in England, either direct or through the agency of Companies. A further complication is introduced by the practice under which all payments made in England to Railway Companies working purchased lines, for purchase of stores and other capital purposes, as well as all moneys raised by them, and paid into the Home treasury, are brought to account under the appropriate heads in this country and are treated in the Home accounts and estimates as remittances to or from India, respectively. Operations connected with the Gold Standard and Paper Currency Reserves, and with the replacement of one particular form or item of direct or indirect debt by another, also largely swell the receipts and charges of the Home treasury without affecting ordinarily the general Ways and Means programme.

258. The items mentioned in the preceding paragraph constitute the bulk of the transactions of the Home treasury in normal years. The conditions created by the war have led to certain abnormal transactions which have considerably affected the Ways and Means position in 1915-16 and 1916-17 and will continue to affect it in 1917-18. Large sums are being received in England from the Imperial Government and the Governments of Australia and East Africa in repayment of expenditure incurred on their behalf in These indirect remittances from India have largely increased the India resources of the Home treasury and reduced the need for direct remittances by Councils to finance its requirements.

259. The following are the details of the transactions appearing in the Budget and Revised estimates of the Home treasury for 1916-17 and in the Budget estimate of 1917-18.

260. The table in paragraph 259 shows that there will be a net disbursement of £11,052,700 from the Home treasury in 1916-17 and that its balances at the end of the year will amount to about £11 $\frac{1}{2}$ million. Of the former amount £9,669,000 will be financed from Council Bills drawn against treasury balances in India, and £1,383,700 will be met by a reduction of the cash balances of the Home treasury. Allowing for the fact that the net disbursement of £3,977,500 in the Budget estimate for 1916-17 included a net receipt of £1,257,500 from the Gold Standard Reserve against £207,400 now anticipated, the Revised estimate shows a deterioration of £6,025,100 as compared with the Budget, apart from the transactions connected with the Gold Standard Reserve. This deterioration is the net result of the following variations from Budget anticipations:—

261. The principal items working up to the increase of £1,286,600 in the net receipts from miscellaneous deposit and remittance transactions, shown in the table in the preceding paragraph, are: (i) increase of £417,600 in the receipts from enemy ships inclusive of sums received in England on account of vessels under the control of authorities in India; (ii) receipts amounting to £119,000, on account of the Burma War Fund which will remain temporarily in the Home treasury balances at the end of the current year; (iii) increase of £365,200 in net receipts on account of postal and money order transactions between India and foreign countries, (iv) recoveries amounting to £650,100 in respect of coinage executed in India for the Egyptian Government. and funds supplied to Ceylon, (v) recovery from the Home Government of £300,000 on account of a moiety of certain special expenditure in Persia which is provided in the first instance in full from Indian funds, (vi) payment to the Home Government of £370,000 on account of surplus revenues of the occupied territories in Mesopotamia in respect of the years 1915-16 and 1916-17 which have been brought to account in India, and (vii) increased payments of bills to the extent of about £300,000 drawn to meet expenditure on Indian account in Persia.

262. The total drawings of Council bills on India in 1916-17 are expected to amount to £33,015,700. Of this sum, £9,669,000 will be utilised, as already stated, to meet the disbursments of the Home treasury; while £4,347,000 will be appropriated as a remittance on behalf of the Gold Standard Reserve of the coinage profits and other receipts which have accrued to the Reserve in India, and £18,999,700 as a remittance of the Paper Currency Reserve.

The cash balance of the Home treasury at the end of 1916-17, exclusive of the sum held on account of the Gold Standard Reserve, is now estimated at about £5.4 million against a Budget forecast of £5.3 million.

265. The Budget estimate contemplated the replacement by fresh capital of £500,000 debentures of the South Indian Railway Company which would mature during the year. The debentures have been renewed.

266. In accordance with the Budget programme, £500,000 India bonds Loans, 1916-17. have been discharged in the current year. The Budget contemplated the discharge of $\pounds 1_{\frac{1}{2}}$ million of India bills and the renewal of the balance of bills for $\pounds b_{\frac{1}{2}}^{1}$ million issued at the commencement of the war. An improvement in the resources of the Government of India and the transfer of the surplus resources to London through the heavy indirect remittances and the strong demand for Council bills enabled the Secretary of State not only to discharge the India bills for $\pounds7$ million in full, but to make a payment of £4 million to the Gold Standard Reserve, thus completing the repayment of the temporary loan taken in India from the Reserve in the first year of the war.

267. The Budget estimate provides for a net disbursement of £64,800. Budget, 1917-18. The betterness of £10,987,900 as compared with the net disbursement of £11,052,700 in the current year's Revised is the net result of the following variations :---

269. The reduction in the net receipts on account of the Gold Standard Reserve in 1917-18, as compared with 1916-17, arises from variations in the amount of funds of the Reserve held in the balances of the Home treasury at the beginning and at the end of each of the two years. The amount so held stood at £5,792,600 on the 1st April 1916, and is expected to stand at £6 million at the end of the current and next years. Full details of the transactions of the Reserve in the two years are given in paragraph 273.

270. The deterioration of £1,110,100 under Deposits, Advances and Miscellaneous Remittance transactions mentioned in paragraph 267 is the net result of the following principal causes of variation: (1) a decrease in the net receipts in connection with enemy vessels and in the recoveries on account of coinage for Egypt; (2) absence of the special receipts in the current year in connection with the supply of funds to Ceylon and on account of the Burma War Fund, and (3) a special adjustment in 1917-18 in connection with the appropriation to revenue of the profits from the wheat scheme of 1915.

271. Provision has been made in the Budget for the discharge of £500,000 India Bonds.

272. The net disbursement of £64,800 in 1917-18, will be met by drawing on the cash balances of the Home treasury which are estimated to stand at the end of 1917-18 at £11,354,800 inclusive of £6,000,000 held on behalf of the Gold Standard Reserve.

1916-17. Main estimutes.

277. In the Budget estimate for 1916-17, the cash balance in the Indian festures of Budget treasuries on the 1st April 1916, was taken at #17,18 lakhs. It was estimated that (1) the net Imperial revenue in India would amount to B29,84 lakhs, (2) there would be a net receipt of R38 lakhs under Unfunded debt, (3) a sum of **B78** lakhs would be available from the Famine Insurance grant for the avoidance of debt, (4) a net receipt of R59 lakhs would accrue in connection with Imperial and Provincial loans, and (5) the remittance and capital transactions of railway companies, would result in a net credit of R1,95 lakhs.

On the other hand, provision was made for : (1) a net expenditure of B53lakhs from Provincial balances, (2) capital expenditure in India on railways

(inclusive of outlay by companies) and canals to the extent of R4,07 lakhs, (3) an outlay of P32 lakhs on the construction of the new capital at Delhi, (4) the discharge of R2 lakhs of permanent debt, (5) a recoverable outlay of R25,27 lakhs in connection with the war on behalf of the War Office and a further outlay of R2,63 lakhs on behalf of the Ministry of Munitions and the Commonwealth of Australia, (6) a net payment of R16 lakhs on account of miscellaneous deposit and remittance transactions inclusive of capital contributed by Native States for the construction of State Railways, and (7) the payment of Council bills to the extent of R5,83 lakhs.

The total payments mentioned above aggregate R38,83 lakhs, against a total receipt of R33,54 lakhs; and to meet the net disbursement of R5,29 lakhs it was proposed to raise a rupee loan of $R6\frac{1}{2}$ crores. The surplus of R1,21 lakhs would raise the Indian cash balance from R17,18 lakhs at the beginning of 1916-17, to R18,39 lakhs at the end of the year. \sim

278. The results, according to the Revised estimate, show considerable 1916-17 .- Main variations from this forecast. The year opened with a cash balance which features of Revised was R85 lakhs more than the Budget forecast, the increase being due to estimates. the improvement in the revenue account in 1915-16 over the Revised estimate (see paragraph 7), partly counterbalanced by a deterioration in other transactions. The proceeds of the conversion loan of 1916-17 inclusive of the Post Office section amounted to R6,73 lakhs, and it is expected that a sum of $\mathbf{R4}_{\frac{1}{2}}$ crores will be received in the current year in respect of the Indian war loan which is open for subscriptions from the 15th March 1917. The recoverable war expenditure has risen very heavily during the year and there has also been an acute demand for private remittance of funds to India by Council bills. On the other hand, there has been a very satisfactory growth in revenue as well as in Postal Savings Bank deposits, while substantial lapses are anticipated in the grants for railway and irrigation capital outlay. The Secretary of State has also purchased large quantities of silver, the purchase price of which forms an addition to the Indian treasury balances on arrival of the silver in India. With these improvements in resources, it will be possible to meet the recoverable war expenditure in full and in addition direct remittances to the Home treasury to the extent of R12,88 lakhs and to close the year with a balance of R22,71 lakhs. This balance will, however, have stood at R18,21 lakhs only but for the receipts anticipated in the last fortnight of the year in respect of the Indian war loan. 5. 4. 11

279. Taking the year as a whole, the net receipts into treasuries in India in 1916-17, after allowing for the receipts from the conversion loan, but excluding those from the war loan, will amount to R19 lakhs against the Budget estimate of R1,21 lakhs, the decrease being due to the following variations :----

280. The increase of R20 lakhs in the net payments in connection with miscellaneous deposit and remittance transactions shown in the above analysis, results from a number of variations, the more important of which are mentioned below. Coinage executed in India on behalf of the Egyptian Government and a remittance of funds to the Ceylon Government involve a net _ disbursement of R1,07 lakhs; special expenditure in Persia necessitated by the war is being met to the extent of R45 lakhs from Indian resources pending recovery from the Home Government by the Secretary of State; while payments on account of postal and money order transactions with foreign countries will be higher by R55 lakhs. On the other hand, a special receipt of R53 lakhs is anticipated from the liquidation of hostile firms; a sum of R38 lakhs will be brought to account in India on account of the surplus revenues of the occupied territories in Mesopotamia, pending payment to the Home Government in London; there will be a nominal receipt of R36 lakhs from the cancellation of debt by the issue of a smaller face value of 4 per cent. rupee paper in return for 3 and $3\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. securities in connection with the conversion scheme of 1916-17, the amount of debt so cancelled being treated as debt discharged by a *per contra* credit under miscellaneous deposits; a *pro* formâ credit of about #45 lakhs arises under the remittance head in connection with the adjustment of special expenditure in Persia on Indian account financed by bills drawn on London; and the deposits of local funds and other miscellaneous deposit transactions will also show a substantial improvement.

1916-17, Rupes loan.

1917-18.—Main features of Budget estimate. 281. It was announced last year that the rupee loan to be raised in 1916-17, would be accompanied by privileges for the conversion of 3 and $3\frac{1}{3}$ per cent rupee paper and that applications would be invited for R6 crores apart from the proceeds of the Post Office section, though Government would be ready to receive subscriptions up to a further sum of R6 crores, the extra receipts being devoted to the repayment of the temporary loan of £4 million which was still due to the Gold Standard Reserve. The terms of the loan were notified on the 8th June and applications received up to the 1st July. The proceeds of the main loan totalled R640 lakhs. A supplementary section of the loan was issued for receiving subscriptions from small investors through the Post Office, and about R33 lakhs were received from this section which remained open till the 25th September 1916

282. In 1917-18 the net Imperial revenue is estimated at R36,72 lakhs; a sum of R79 lakhs will be available from the Famine Insurance grant for the avoidance of debt; the remittance and capital transactions of railway companies are likely to result in a net credit of R2,08 lakhs; net receipts of R2,89 lakhs and R23 lakhs are anticipated respectively in connection with Unfunded debt and Imperial and Provincial loans; there will be a credit of R6,29 lakhs on account of silver paid for by the Secretary of State in 1916-17 which will be brought to account in India in 1917-18 and further purchase of silver to the value of £2.8 million which it is assumed for the purpose of the estimates that he will make in the latter year; and miscellaneous deposit and remittance transactions inclusive of capital contributed by Native States for the construction of State Railways will result in a net receipt of R67lakhs. On the other hand, provision has been made: (1) for an expenditure of R15 lakhs from Provincial balances; (2) for a payment of R63 lakhs in

128

connection with the discharge of debt, the main items being the annual instalment of $\mathbb{R}12$ lakhs in repayment of the Gwalior loan of 1887 and the repayment of the temporary loan of $\mathbb{R}50$ lakhs taken from the same State at the beginning of the war; (3) for capital expenditure of $\mathbb{R}3,91$ lakhs in India on railways and canals and of $\mathbb{R}38$ lakhs on Imperial Delhi; (4) for payment of Council bills which remain unpaid at the end of the current year to the extent of $\mathbb{R}70$ lakhs; and (5) for a recoverable outlay of $\mathbb{R}54,75$ lakhs to be incurred on behalf of the War Office and of $\mathbb{R}4,08$ lakhs on behalf of other authorities. The total amount of funds required by the Government of India next year therefore aggregates $\mathbb{R}64,60$ lakhs while the receipts at its disposal amount only to $\mathbb{R}49,67$ lakhs.

283 It has been decided to raise a war loan in India on attractive terms, the proceeds of which, provisionally estimated at £10 million, will be made over to the Home Government as a war contribution. The payment to the Home Government will be made by the Secretary of State, but the loan subscriptions are received in India and will be available for Ways and Means purposes here Out of the estimated receipts of R15 crores, it is expected that $R4\frac{1}{3}$ crores will be received in the current year and the balance of $R10\frac{1}{2}$ crores in 1917-18. Deducting the latter sum, the balance of the deficiency in resources viz. R4,43 lakhs will be found by drawing on the cash balances, which will stand on the 31st March 1918 at R18,28 lakhs.

285. The net deposits in Postal Savings Banks in the current year are now estimated at H96 lakhs. The Budget estimate for 1917-18 anticipates a further net deposit of R75 lakhs in these Banks and a growth of Rt6 lakhs in the deposits in the various Provident Funds for Government servants. There will also be a net receipt of R34 lakhs from the Provident Funds of railway companies which will be taken over by Government from the 1st April 1917 (vide paragraph 69), made up of net deposits of R12½ lakhs during the year and cash balances amounting to R21½ lakhs which will be handed to Government at the time of the transfer of the funds.

PRO FORMÀ ACCOUNT OF EXPENDITURE ON DELHI AND THE DELHI PROVINCE.

•

Prefatory Note.

I.—Scope of pro formâ account.

The following pro forma account, with its supporting statements, exhibits the expenditure, initial and annual, on Delhi and the Delhi Province and also any receipts and savings which form a direct set-off to that expenditure. The account has been prepared in consultation with the Comptroller General and carries his approval as regards both its form and its substantial completeness at the present date subject to the qualifications implied in the following prefatory remarks; it will be added to, or amplified later, if experience should show this to be necessary.

2. The main item of the account, as regards non-recurring expenditure, is the Delhi project proper, the figures for which appear against item 1 of Part I.—Initial Outlay. The principal recurring charge is that representing the expenditure in the new province, which appears as item 1 of Part II.—Annual Expenditure.

3. The account necessarily exhibits any expenditure occurring under the named heads, without qualification on account of contributory causes. It must, therefore, be clearly understood that the increase of expenditure, including that in the Delhi Province, is not wholly due to the change of Capital. Thus, an increase of the garrison at Delhi on strategic grounds had been already independently and strongly recommended to the Government of India by the Chief of the General Staff and endorsed by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in July 1911, before the transfer of the Capital had been officially proposed, and the reconstruction of the accommodation of the troops already there had long been recognised as pressing. Similarly, the recent advance in the policy relating to education and sanitation, particularly the latter, would, under any circumstances, have involved increased expenditure in this city. For practical purposes, these considerations must be ignored in the figured statements, as well as various similar points of minor pecuniary significance. The same principle will be applied to the Railway expenditure, *i.e.*, the cost of any remodelling of the railway system which is connected with the constitution of the new Capital will be exhibited in full in the *pro formá* account. A wholly independent railway requirement, such as the permanent marshalling yard which will eventually replace the temporary yard now in use, will not be shown.

II.—Relation between the pro formâ account and the regular accounts.

4. A brief explanation is added below connecting the various items in the *pro formâ* account with the entries in the published accounts and estimates. Some further explanations are also to be found in the account itself and in its supporting statements.

5 The capital expenditure directly incurred on the construction of the Item 1 of Part 1 new Imperial Capital at Delhi is shown in the regular accounts under the of pro format special head "51—Initial Expenditure on the new Capital at Delhi." The account only other item of expenditure which will be recorded in the capital section of the regular accounts is that arising from diversions or re-arrangements of the Item 8 (b), ibid. railway system, which will appear under the head "48—State Railways."

6. The initial expenditure incurred during the years 1911-12 and 1912-13 in connection with the provision of temporary accommodation for the Government of India at Delhi, pending the construction of the new Capital, has been treated, on the advice of the Comptroller General, as a revenue charge, under a special minor head styled "Temporary Delhi" subordinate to the major head Item 2, ibid. "45—Civil Works." Any non-recurring receipts which may eventually be obtained in connection with these temporary works, e.g., from the sale of lands and buildings when no longer required by the Government of Inlia, will be similarly credited under a special head subordinate to the major head Item II, ibid. "XXXI—Civil Works."

Items 1 and I of Part II of pro formd account.

7. The remaining expenditure is mainly brought to account in one of two ways: either, first, as expenditure of the new Province ; or, secondly, as departmental expenditure chargeable to the Department in which it is incurred.

8. The expenditure and receipts appertaining to the quasi-provincial administration of the Imperial area are brought to account in the same way as in the case of other minor administrations, and are eventually published separately, like the figures for Coorg and Baluchistan, in an appendix to the Civil Estimates. But as the Civil Estimates are not published till late in the year, a special arrangement has been made by which the figures for the Delhi province under each major head are separately shewn in the various sections of the Financial Secretary's memorandum (e.g., I and 3, Land Revenue, page 21). It will be noted that any grants which may be specially given from Imperial revenues in aid of the Delhi Municipality or other local funds will be brought into the regular accounts and, consequently, into the pro formá account also, since they will appear as charges of the Delhi administration.

9. Expenditure which does not appertain to provincial administration is recorded, as in the case of other provinces, under its appropriate departmental head in the regular accounts. Thus expenditure on the land and buildings required for the new Cantonment, and any corresponding receipts, appear under the Army and Military Works heads respectively, under both of which a special Delhi sub-head has been opened. Railway capital outlay has already been referred to. Railway revenue charges and receipts similarly come under the Railway account head. In these cases, the pro form \hat{a} account necessarily exhibits only initial expenditure and non-recurring receipts, as Military expenditure is not being permanently increased and the influence of the new Capital on the ordinary daily receipts and working expenses of the Bailways cannot evidently be satisfactorily isolated. This latter consideration also applies to the case of Postal and Telegraph expenditure, which moreover represents ordinary administrative expenditure of the department, and is relatively insignificant in amount. For these reasons, in the case of this department, neither the initial outlay nor the recurring receipts and expenditure have been included.

Items 4 to 7 and I 10. There are also a few items of expenditure and of actual receipt and IV of Part I, or of definite saving which are not recorded in the accounts of the Delhi Province and Items 2 and 3 or of definite saving which are not recorded in the accounts of the Delhi Province and II to V of Part or in the departmental accounts, but which it is necessary to take into consideration in calculating the expenditure in Delhi and the Delhi Province. Most of these are self-explanatory, but attention may be called to the intended treatment of the sale-proceeds of vacated lands and buildings at Calcutta (if any) and elsewhere. These will be credited under the major heads "XXV-Miscellaneous" and "XXXI—Civil Works", and the pro forma account will take credit only for actual Imperial receipts. No account will be taken, in the statements themselves, of book transactions, or of the considerable savings obtained from the vacation of rented accommodation, *i.e.*, of relief in respect of rental payments which the Local Government obtains by giving up private buildings previously leased for provincial establishments, and moving the latter into offices formerly occupied by the Government of India. Any reference made to such saving will, therefore, be found in an explanatory footnote. [See Part I, Note 5.]

> 11. Outlay on stores and all other expenditure incurred in England under a capital head or as a revenue charge, which can be distinguished as appertaining to the construction of Delhi or to the administration of the Delhi Province, have been included in the pro forma account.
