REPORT ON THE ACREAGE UNDER CROPS AND NUMBER OF LIVE STOCK IN ENGLAND AND WALES, 1925.

To the Secretary of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit Part I of the Agricultural Statistics for 1925, containing detailed figures of the acreage of crops and grass and of the number of live stock on agricultural holdings exceeding one acre in extent in England and Wales, as returned by occupiers on 4th June 1925. Figures are also included of the number of agricultural workers employed at the date of the returns.

A Preliminary Statement giving the total figures for the whole country, of the acreage of crops and number of live stock, was issued on 7th August, and the summarised returns of the number of agricultural workers were published in the Agricultural Market Report of 30th October.

In connection with the Census of Production, it was found necessary to include various additional questions in the Agricultural schedule used in 1925. This Census will not be repeated for five years and the Schedule in 1926 and subsequent years will consequently be limited to the returns authorised by the Agricultural Returns Act of 1925. It is hoped to include in the Report on the Agricultural Census of Production which will be issued next year, a review of the changes which have taken place in agriculture since 1867 when the collection of agricultural statistics was instituted. For this reason the present Report is confined, in the main, to the changes which have occurred during the past twelve months.

AGRICULTURAL RETURNS ACT, 1925.

Except for the few years when the Corn Production Act, 1917, was on the Statute book the making of the annual agricultural returns has not been obligatory, but during the present session an Act was passed giving the Minister power to require occupiers of agricultural land to make a return of the acreage of the various crops, the numbers of live stock and the persons employed. Hitherto the great bulk of occupiers have recognised the value of these returns and have supplied them voluntarily. The existence of the compulsory powers of the Act will not,

in practice, make any difference except in the relatively few cases where occupiers have failed to furnish the returns with the necessary promptitude. The Act will, however, be of great value in providing the Ministry and its local officers with the authority of Parliament to collect information from any persons who may be reluctant to supply it voluntarily.

CHANGES IN THE AREA OF AGRICULTURAL LAND.

(Tables 1, 2 and 10.)

The acreage returned in 1925 as under crops or permanent grass in England and Wales was 25,755,000 acres or 121,000 acres less than in 1924. This reduction was partly offset by an increased return of 58,000 acres under the heading of rough grazings. There seems to be a steady tendency to increase the area of land classed as rough grazings, but how far this is due to any deterioration in land formerly classed as permanent pasture is difficult to determine. The Ministry proposes during the ensuing year to make special local enquiries with a view to throwing some light on the question.

The following table shows the changes under the various headings in the last three years :—

* In addition to the area of rough grazings returned by occupiers given above there is an area of common land or mountain and heath land grazed in common which is now estimated at approximately 1,104,000 acres.

It is frequently asserted that a very considerable change is taking place in the proportion of land used as arable and that large areas, formerly arable, are being laid down to grass. This statement needs some qualification. During the war the arable land was much increased, but this increase was not maintained, and since 1918 there has been a substantial decline. Thus, in the eleven years, there was both an increase and a decrease with the result that the net decrease as between 1914 and 1925 is 316,000 acres or 3 per cent. The present area is not, therefore, very seriously different from what it was in 1914.

In the same period the area returned as permanent pasture has also decreased. There is, naturally, always some annual loss of agricultural land owing to building and other developments. During and since the war, the rate of loss has been much higher than in pre-war days, but the figures may also have been affected by a slight alteration in definition which has possibly led to some land formerly classed as permanent

pasture being returned as rough grazings. The result, however, of the decline in permanent pasture is that the *proportion* of arable in the total area of crops and grass is rather greater than it was in 1914.

If the permanent pasture and rough grazings returned by occupiers are combined, the proportion of arable still shows little variation as between the two years.

Broadly speaking, then, the position is that although there have been great changes during and since the war period, neither the total arable area nor the proportion of arable to pasture is materially different from what it was just before the war. On the other hand, if comparison is made with earlier years, the changes have been considerable.

SUGAR BEET.

Before proceeding to discuss the changes in the area of the ordinary crops, it may be of special interest to draw attention to the development which has taken place in the growing of sugar beet, a crop which is comparatively new to this country.

A few years before the war a Beet Sugar Factory was established at Cantley, Norfolk, and about 4,000 acres of sugar beet were grown in 1912 and 1913, mainly in Norfolk and Suffolk. In 1914 the acreage was reduced to 2,300 acres and during the war the factory was closed. It was re-opened in 1920, when 3,000 acres of beet were grown. In the following year a new factory was built at Kelham, Nottinghamshire, and the area under sugar beet was increased to 8,300 acres, this area being repeated in 1922. In 1923 the acreage under beet was

further increased to nearly 17,000 acres, and in 1924, when a new factory was built at Colwick, Nottingham, the area rose to 22,400 acres and in 1925, under the stimulus of the Sugar Beet subsidy, to nearly 55,000 acres.*

This season, in addition to the three older factories, there are factories working at Bury St. Edmunds, Ely, Ipswich, Kidderminster, Spalding and Wissington (Norfolk) and also one at Greenock in Scotland, while others are proposed, and it is estimated that the area of sugar beet required in 1926 will be at least double the area of 1925. The price to be paid by the factories to the growers has been fixed by agreement at not less than 54s. per net ton of beet delivered at the factory provided the grower has contracted for the two years 1926 and 1927.

Although for a new industry the addition of a further 60,000 acres under this crop may seem considerable, it has to be remembered that it is only a very small proportion of the arable acreage. In fact, in the Eastern and North-Eastern counties alone, if the same area were devoted to potatoes and root crops in 1926 as in 1914, a very appreciable proportion of the additional area required for sugar beet could be devoted to this crop without reducing the 1925 acreage of potatoes and fodder roots. The opportunities for obtaining this additional area without materially varying the area under the different crops may also be illustrated by mentioning that the area of bare fallow in these counties in 1925 was over 50,000 acres larger than it was in 1924. This will be seen from the following table :—

* The British Sugar (Subsidy) Act, 1925, was passed to encourage the building of beet sugar factories, and the establishment of the industry on a substantial scale by subsidising the manufacture of sugar and molasses from home-grown beet for a period of ten years. The Act provides that a subsidy shall be paid at the rate of 19s. 6d. per cwt. for the four years 1924-25 to 1927-28 inclusive, at the rate of 13s. per cwt. for the three following years, and at the rate of 6s. 6d. per cwt. for the three final years, on sugar manufactured of a polarisation exceeding 98%, manufacturers paying Excise Duty. It is a condition of payment of the subsidy that the sugar manufacturers shall pay during the first four years a minimum price of 44s. per ton for beet of 15½ per cent. sugar content, with an addition or deduction of 3d. per ton in respect of each one-tenth per cent. of sugar content above or below 15½ per cent.

The acreage under sugar beet in each county in England and Wales in the years since 1920 is shown in Table 3 in the appendix. The great bulk of the acreage was in the eastern counties, Norfolk with 15,500 acres accounting for nearly 30 per cent. of the total. The crop was grown in all parts of Norfolk, but was most dense in the south-west and only sparsely grown in the north-east of the county and to the south of Norwich. Suffolk grew nearly 12,000 acres, most of this area being in the east and south-east of the county, or in the north-west, while the Isle of Ely had nearly 5,800 acres, the great bulk being in the south of the county. The 2,400 acres in Cambridgeshire were largely on the eastern side, and the Essex area of 1,600 acres almost wholly in the north, in each case adjoining Suffolk. In the area covered by the counties mentioned above, there are five factories, Cantley, Bury St. Edmunds, Ely, Ipswich and Wisington. There were about 7,200 acres in Lincolnshire, mainly within about 20 miles of Spalding, where there is a factory. Nottingham had only 1,630 acres under beet, a comparatively small area seeing that there are two factories in the county, but the West Riding area of 840 acres was towards the Nottingham border.

The 650 acres in Worcestershire and the 554 acres in Salop were fairly widely spread throughout the two counties but the crop was most dense near the Kidderminster factory. The Somerset and Dorset areas were mostly fairly near Yeovil where the erection of a factory has been under consideration; arrangements have been made for transferring the beets grown in this area to existing factories.

Areas under Crops.

Most of the different crops shared, in varying degrees, in the reduction of the arable area, sugar beet and potatoes being outstanding exceptions. Larger areas would probably have been under some of the crops which showed decreases but for the unfavourable conditions for working heavy land which led to an increase of 108,000 acres, or 30 per cent. in the area of bare fallow.

Wheat.—In the autumn of 1924 the weather was very wet and, therefore, unfavourable for the sowing of wheat, but in spite of the adverse circumstances the acreage under this crop was only 45,000 acres less than in 1924. The better prices which were ruling for wheat in the summer and autumn of last year no doubt led farmers to sow as much as possible. The total acreage, 1,499,700 acres, was, however, the lowest since 1904. Some counties had more land under wheat than in 1924, notably Norfolk, Lincoln and the Isle of Ely, but on the other hand, reductions of more than 10 per cent. were recorded in several counties, amongst which were Bedford, Worcester, Hereford and the North Riding. The largest actual reduction was in Essex, where only 96,400 acres were grown against 105,900 acres in 1924.

Varieties of Wheat.—A limited enquiry was made this year in the eastern counties in order to obtain some information as to the extent to which the newer varieties of wheat are now being grown. Forms of enquiry were sent to all occupiers growing 25 or more acres of wheat in 1925 in Bedford, Huntingdon, Cambridge, Isle of Ely, Suffolk, Essex, Hertford, Norfolk, Lincoln (Holland and Kesteven), Rutland, Northampton and the Soke of Peterborough, these being the counties for which the School of Agriculture at Cambridge is responsible for agricultural education purposes. Returns showing the acreage of the different varieties of wheat were received in respect of practically 340,000 acres, or rather more than half the total acreage of wheat grown in the counties in question. The proportion of the total acreage under the different varieties varied considerably throughout the district, but, in the aggregate, more Yeoman (including Yeoman II) was grown than any other variety, some 30 per cent. or 102,500 acres being under this type. Little Joss accounted for nearly 16 per cent. and Squarehead Master for nearly 18 per cent., the acreages returned as under these being 53,500 acres and 60,200 acres respectively. Other varieties, therefore, covered only rather more than one-third of the total area on farms having 25 or more acres of wheat. Whether these proportions apply to holdings on which smaller areas are grown cannot be stated, but it is evident that an appreciable supply of Yeoman wheat is now available for millers in the east of the country.

Yeoman covered rather over 60 per cent. of the total area included in the returns in Lincoln (Holland), no other county showing anything like so large a proportion, Essex, the next county in this respect, having about 42 per cent., being followed by the Isle of Ely with 40 per cent. Norfolk with 15 per cent. of Yeoman and Cambridge with 17 per cent. showed the lowest proportions under this variety, these two counties having larger proportions than any others of Squarehead Master, viz., 30 and 32 per cent. respectively. The Isle of Ely grew Little Joss on 30 per cent. of the wheat area, Cambridge 24 per cent. and Lincoln (Kesteven) 23 per cent., while Northampton, Huntingdon, Lincoln (Holland) and Bedford had less than 10 per cent. of Little Joss, the two latter having less than 5 per cent.

Barley.—Barley was the only corn crop to be grown on as large an area as in 1924, the total of 1,318,000 acres, being 3,700 acres above the previous year's figure. Increases were general on the eastern seaboard, each county from Kent to Yorkshire growing additional areas, but few other counties showed increases. The East Riding of Yorkshire grew 70,600 acres, or nearly 5,000 acres more than in 1924, Lincoln (Lindsey) increased its area by 3,300 acres to 105,800 acres, and Norfolk added 2,400 acres, bringing its total to 199,000 acres.

Oats.—Every county shared in the reduction of 170,000 acres in the area of oats, which brought the total area to 1,868,000 acres, or the smallest recorded since 1888. The decreases in the

northern and north-western divisions were nearly 4 per cent. and about $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., respectively, but in every other division of England the reductions were approximately 10 per cent. Wales reduced its area under oats by about $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

Other Corn and Pulse.—The area of mixed corn was reduced by 10,000 acres to 124,000 acres, the decreases in many counties being relatively large. Rye covered only 50,000 acres against 58,600 acres in 1924, reductions being fairly general throughout the country. Pulse crops were grown on much smaller areas than in the previous year, the increases recorded in 1924 being much more than wiped out. Beans covered only 191,000 acres, a decline of 50,900 acres and the smallest area ever recorded, while peas were grown on 131,000 acres, or 40,000 acres less than in 1924. The reduction in the case of peas was almost equally divided between those for harvesting and those for picking green.

Potatoes.—The potato crops of 1923 and 1924 realised high prices and this was no doubt responsible for the much increased plantings in 1925. The total area returned as under potatoes on agricultural holdings in England and Wales was 493,000 acres, which exceeded the average of the ten years 1905–14 by nearly 60,000 acres. Additional areas were not planted in every county, but all the chief potato-growing counties increased their acreages. Lincolnshire had 104,000 acres, an increase of 14,600 acres on the year, while the Isle of Ely increased its area by 5,000 acres to 33,700 acres. Lancashire grew 41,600 acres against 39,200 acres in 1924. Cheshire increased its area by 2,200 acres to 22,250 acres, and the West Riding added 2,800 acres bringing its total to 29,700 acres. Reductions were mainly in the west midlands, Wales and counties south of the Thames, Kent being the outstanding exception, the increase in that county being 1,560 acres or over 9 per cent.

Roots.—The area under fodder roots was reduced considerably, the acreage of turnips and swedes being returned at 806,000 acres, or 26,000 acres less than in 1924, while mangolds covered 359,000 acres, a reduction of 30,600 acres. Every county except Lincoln (Holland) had a smaller area under mangolds than in 1924, and there were only eight counties which did not reduce their areas under turnips and swedes. Decreases in the areas of these root crops were not unnatural, in view of the increases in potatoes and sugar beet which take the same place in the rotation. The increase in the acreage of sugar beet alone more than accounted for the decline in the fodder root areas in the eastern and north-eastern counties, while in the north and north-west the increase in potatoes more than made up for the decline in roots. There was, however, a net decrease in the area under potatoes and roots in the midlands, the south and in Wales.

Fodder Crops.—Most of the other fodder crops were grown on increased areas in 1924, but this year all showed reductions. Vetches covered 88,500 acres, a decrease of nearly 24,000 acres,

practically every county sharing in the decline. The acreage of lucerne was 54,000 acres against 64,600 acres last year, Essex returning 13,800 acres, or nearly 3,000 acres less than in 1924, and Kent with 9,200 acres showed a decline of 2,250 acres. Kohl-rabi was planted on 10,800 acres, a drop of 3,700 acres, and fodder cabbage declined by 3,600 acres to 50,800 acres. Rape and fodder mustard showed relatively smaller reductions, the former covering 66,000 acres against 68,300 acres last year, and fodder mustard 15,700 acres against 16,200 acres.

Clover and Rotation Grasses.—The acreage under clover and rotation grasses was increased by 26,000 acres to 2,574,000 acres, which, however, was still 26,000 acres less than in 1923. The largest increases were in Suffolk and Essex, but the additions of 9,000 acres and 10,000 acres respectively did not quite make up the decreases recorded in 1924 in these two counties. Other counties showing relatively large additions were Cambridge, Berkshire, Northampton and Oxford, while increases were general in North Wales. On the other hand, there were appreciable reductions in some counties, notably the West Riding of Yorkshire and Derbyshire, where decreases took place of nearly 10 per cent. and 14 per cent., respectively.

Bare Fallow.—The autumn of 1924 was very wet and there was little frost during the winter. As a consequence heavy land worked very badly in the spring, and the area left as bare fallow was considerably larger than in 1924. The area so returned was 463,000 acres, an increase on the year of 108,000 acres. Increases were general throughout the country and in some counties they were very heavy. Essex returned 40,500 acres against 28,200 acres in 1924, Suffolk 38,500 acres against 27,600 acres, Bedford 15,700 acres against 10,800 acres, Gloucester 9,600 acres against 5,400 acres and Wiltshire 18,000 acres against 12,500 acres.

Hay.—In spite of the increase in the total area of clover and rotation grasses, the area reserved for hay was reduced by 30,000 acres. The meadow hay area was also reduced, the decrease in this case being practically 190,000 acres. In the eastern counties an increased area of seeds hay was returned, the addition more than balancing the decrease in meadow hay, but in every other part of the country there was a net decrease. The reduction in seeds hay was very largely confined to the north and west of England, but less permanent grass was cut in practically every county. The total acreage reserved for hay was 6,034,000 acres, of which 1,722,000 acres were seeds and 4,312,000 acres permanent grass.

Hops.—There was again in 1925 a small increase in the acreage of hops, the total of 26,250 acres comparing with 25,900 acres in 1924 and 24,900 acres in 1923. Kent increased its area by 300 acres to 16,260 acres, and Hereford added nearly 90 acres,

bringing its total to nearly 4,200 acres. Changes in other counties were immaterial.

Mustard for Seed (Table 4).—The growing of mustard for seed has been subject to sharp variations from year to year, and in 1925 there was a reduction of about 37 per cent., the area returned being only 22,800 acres against 36,200 acres in 1924. In 1922 there were only 19,800 acres under this crop and in 1920 as much as 51,300 acres.

Flax (Table 4).—The acreage of flax grown for fibre was returned at 695 acres, an increase of 140 acres on the year. Somerset returned 435 acres against only 180 acres in 1924, but West Suffolk grew none against 170 acres last year. The area of linseed was further reduced in 1925, the total of 3,700 acres comparing with nearly 5,200 acres in 1924, and 8,800 acres in 1923. The great bulk of this crop is grown in the east of the country.

Vegetables (Table 5).—In 1924 each vegetable crop which is separately distinguished in the agricultural returns was grown on a larger area than in 1923, but this year with the single exception of brussels sprouts all showed decreases. Cabbage for human consumption covered 22,200 acres, a decline of 3,600 acres, and rather less than in 1923. The 20,900 acres occupied by brussels sprouts were only 390 acres more than in 1924, but last year's area was much larger than in any previous year. Bedford and Worcester showed the largest increases. Cauliflower and broccoli declined by 650 acres to 11,700 acres. Practically every county reduced its area under carrots, and the total was only 8,130 acres against 10,750 acres in 1924, this year's area being the smallest ever recorded. Bedford reduced its acreage of onions from 760 acres in 1924 to 560 acres in 1925 and the total in the country declined from 2,620 acres to 2,200 acres, the smallest area recorded since 1904. Celery was returned at 4,800 acres against 5,950 acres last year, Norfolk, Lincoln (Holland), Huntingdon and the Isle of Ely all showing heavy reductions. Rhubarb at 6,250 acres showed a decline of 90 acres.

Orchards (Tables 1 and 2). The total acreage returned as orchards in 1925 was 238,000 acres, against 239,500 acres in 1924. Smaller areas were returned in the west midland and south western counties, but the south-eastern counties increased their orchards during the year. Kent had 53,850 acres under orchards or nearly 8 per cent. of its cultivated area.

Small Fruit (Table 6).—There was a reduction of 5,160 acres in the area of small fruit in 1925, most counties returning smaller areas. Strawberries did not maintain the record area of 29,500 acres returned last year, the acreage in 1925 being 27,670 acres. There was an increase of 130 acres in Essex, but all the most important counties for this crop reduced their acreages. The raspberry acreage was also reduced, the total being 6,950 acres, against 7,590 acres in 1924, but the acreage returned as currants

and gooseberries was 29,850 acres, an increase of 2,420 acres. Most counties recorded increases under these latter crops, Kent adding 840 acres and bringing its total to 9,060 acres, while Norfolk returned 3,820 acres, an addition of 430 acres.

NUMBER OF ALLOTMENTS.

Returns collected from Local Authorities at the end of 1924 showed that on balance the number and acreage of allotments were reduced during that year, and the total number of allotments in England and Wales was estimated at 1,170,000, covering an area of 168,500 acres. These figures compare with an estimated total of 1,190,000 allotment holders and 170,000 acres at the end of 1923.

No figures are included in the present Report in regard to the number of agricultural holdings. The whole question of the number, size and distribution of holdings is being investigated in connection with the Census of Production and will be dealt with in the Report which it is proposed to issue next year.

NUMBER OF LIVE STOCK.

(Tables 1, 2 and 9.)

Cattle.—The total number of cattle in England and Wales on 4th June, 1925, was little short of the highest figure recorded during the war and was 354,000 above the pre-war average. The number returned was 6,163,000, an increase of 269,000 as compared with 1924 and 646,000 more than in 1921. Bedford and Middlesex were the only counties in England to return smaller numbers than a year earlier, but Monmouth and Carmarthen also showed decreases. Relatively the largest increases were in some of the eastern counties, Norfolk, Lincoln, Suffolk and the East Riding of Yorkshire all showing additions of over 10 per cent.

The dairy herd was increased by 50,000 to 2,713,000, the largest number ever recorded and 370,000, or 16 per cent. above the average of the 10 years 1905-14. The number of heifers in calf was returned as 378,500, or 11,000 more than in 1924, and apart from 1918, the largest number ever recorded. This suggests that the dairy herd is likely to be fully maintained at its present level. Relatively the largest increases in the dairy herd were in the north-eastern and northern counties, the north-eastern division showing an increase of $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. and the northern division one of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. There was no increase in the south-west, and Somerset had 2,500 fewer cows in milk on 4th June than a year earlier, while its total of cows and heifers in milk or in calf was 1,550 less than in 1924. The dairy herds of Cheshire, after their serious depletion as a result of the wide-

spread outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in the winter of 1923-24, have been restored to their former numbers, the total of cows and heifers in milk or in calf in 1925 being 127,000 against 123,000 in 1923. Bulls being used for service were returned at a total in England and Wales of 86,000, an increase of 4,100 on the year.

The number of cattle two years old and above was increased by 70,000 to 975,000, and was larger than in any of the previous four years. Practically every county had increased numbers. The increase in calf rearing to which reference was made in last year's Report, is apparent this year in the figures for yearlings, the total of 1,178,000 cattle from one to two years old being 93,000 greater than in 1924 and larger than in any year since 1919. There was again in 1925 an addition to the number of calves, and the total of 1,212,000 cattle under one year was 52,000 greater than in 1924 and some 47,000 above the pre-war average. Relatively the largest increase was in the north-eastern division, Norfolk adding 12½ per cent., Lincoln 17 per cent., and the East Riding, 13 per cent. The eastern division added 9 per cent., Huntingdon, Suffolk and Essex having additions of from 13 to 15 per cent. Few counties returned reduced numbers, and only Lancashire, Cheshire and Carmarthen showed appreciable decreases.

Sheep.—The flocks of the country were again in 1925 increased—by over a million and the total number of sheep and lambs on 4th June, 15,975,000, was two and a half millions greater than in 1922. If a similar increase is shown next year, the flocks will be back at practically the same numbers as in 1914. The drop in sheep prices which has taken place this year may, however, check the rate of increase. Additions were general throughout the country, being relatively greatest in the midlands and east, where the increases were about 13 to 14 per cent. The northern and north-western divisions added over 3 per cent, and 7 per cent. respectively, and the increase in Wales was about 4 per cent.

The number of breeding ewes was 6,397,000 or 403,000 more than in 1924 and only 300,000 less than in 1913. All parts of the country returned larger breeding flocks. Lambs increased by 414,000 the proportionate increase being rather less than in the case of ewes. Rams and ram lambs intended to be used for breeding increased from 174,000 to 181,000.

Sheep one year old and above (other than breeding ewes and rams) showed an increase of 13 per cent., the total of 2,692,000 exceeding that of 1924 by 307,000. The eastern counties increased their feeding sheep by nearly 50 per cent. and the north-eastern counties returned additions of nearly 35 per cent. East Sussex was the only county in England to return a small reduction, but several Welsh counties showed decreases, and in Wales as a whole there was a decline of 5,000, or nearly 1 per cent.

Pigs.—The exceptionally large number of pigs recorded in 1924 was not maintained this year, but the total of 2,644,000, though 584,000 less than in 1924, was large as compared with previous years and 380,000 above the average of the ten years 1915–24. A sharp reduction this year was not unexpected, as prices had been very low, but the better prices now being received should tend to check the decline. Every county returned a smaller number of breeding sows, and the total was reduced by 133,000 to 316,000, a decrease of nearly 30 per cent. The number of breeding sows was, however, some 2,000 above the ten years' average.

Horses.—The returns of 1925 show that the decline in horse breeding still continues, the number of foals being only 45,000, or nearly 10,000 less than last year. Horse breeding has been reduced by 50 per cent. in the past four years, and it is clear that the number of foals now being bred is insufficient to maintain the working horses on farms at their present level, the number of horses used for agricultural purposes in 1925 being 773,000. The returns of the number of mares served in 1925 suggest that there will be a further reduction in the number of foals next year, but the decline in mares covered was only 8 per cent. against 20 per cent. last year. The total number of horses on agricultural holdings was returned at 1,164,000, or 68,000 less than in 1924, the greater part of the reduction being in unbroken horses.

Poultry.—No new statistics of the numbers of poultry are available for inclusion in this Report, and the figures for 1924 are repeated in Table 8. Questions as to the number of poultry were included, in the schedule used in 1925, amongst the special questions which were asked in connection with the Census of Production. It was found that a proportion of occupiers overlooked these additional questions, so that the returns of the number of the poultry obtained this year are incomplete. Next year poultry will be included in the ordinary schedule, and the returns will be compulsory.

NUMBER OF AGRICULTURAL WORKERS.

(Table 7.)

The number of workers returned as employed on agricultural holdings in England and Wales on 4th June, 1925, was 803,338. This is 3,125 less than in 1924, but 30,951 more than in 1923.

The returns do not include the occupier or his wife, but include members of the occupier's family (sons, daughters, &c.), working

on the holding. Domestic servants are not included. The following table gives the totals for each of the last three years.

The number of men returned as employed on 4th June, 1925, was rather larger than at the corresponding date in 1924, but there was a reduction in the number of boys and youths. The total of women and girls employed was practically the same as in 1924.

Increases in the number of regular men were returned from most of the eastern counties and the three counties, Norfolk, Lincoln and York, East Riding, had 63,837 regular men employed against 61,862 in 1924. Suffolk, Hertford, Isle of Ely and Middlesex also returned increased numbers. Reductions were the rule in most of the counties south of the Thames, where a total of 111,510 was returned against 113,051 last year. Most counties shared in the reduction in the number of regular boys and youths, but several northern counties returned increased numbers, Northumberland, Durham, Cumberland, Westmorland, York, N.R., York, E.R., and Lincoln all showing increases.

As regards casual male workers the total number returned was very much the same as in 1924, but the number of boys and youths was less by 2,583 or practically 10 per cent. More casual men were returned in most counties than a year earlier, such reductions as there were being in the eastern half of the country, where, however, there were often additions to the number of regular men employed.

The decrease in boys and youths employed as casual workers was spread throughout the country, comparatively few counties showing increases.

The reduction in the number of regular women and girls was balanced by the increase in the number employed as casual workers. The increase in the casual women workers was mainly in the eastern, north-eastern and south-eastern divisions, where the regular female workers were not reduced in number, whilst in other parts of the country the total

number of female workers, regular and casual, was smaller than in 1924.

CROPS AND LIVE STOCK IN GREAT BRITAIN.

The returns of the acreage under crops in Scotland showed very similar changes to those in England and Wales. The arable land was reduced and permanent grass increased, the arable area being 3,229,000 acres or 60,000 acres less than in 1915, the lowest acreage before the war increase. In the corn crops there were reductions in wheat and oats and a small increase in barley, among the fallow crops the acreage of potatoes was increased, that of fodder roots was decreased, and sugar beet showed a very sharp rise, while more land was bare fallowed. All these changes were in the same direction as those recorded in England and Wales. Clover and rotation grasses, however, showed a small reduction whilst in England and Wales there was an increase, but in the north of England reductions were fairly general.

Changes in the number of live stock were also in the same direction in the two countries. The increases in cattle and sheep were, however, relatively smaller in Scotland and the dairy herd showed only a very small increase north of the Tweed. The proportionate reduction in pigs was somewhat greater, but the decline in horses was rather less, in Scotland than in England and Wales.

The acreage of the chief crops and the number of live stock in Great Britain as a whole are given for a number of years in Tables 9 and 10. Complete figures for Ireland are not yet available, so that totals cannot yet be given for Great Britain and Ireland.
