

## GENERAL SUMMARY OF ESTIMATES.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

The Army Department of the Government of India (in which is included the Marine Department), controls three heads of receipts and expenditure—

Head XXXVI .-- Army-except Military Accounts Offices which are under the control of the Finance Department. Head XXXVII .-- Marine.

Head  $\frac{49}{20}$  .—Military Engineer Services.

Army is sub-divided into parts A, B and C.

Part A pertains to the Regular Forces.

Part B to the Auxiliary and Territorial Forces.

Part C to the Royal Air Force.

Part A is sub-divided into eight account heads :---

Head I.-Maintenance of the Standing Army.

Head II.---Administrative services.

Head III.—Manufacturing establishments.

Head IV.-Army Headquarters, Staff of Commands, etc.

Head V.-Purchase and sale of stores, equipment and animals.

Head VI.-Special services.

Head VII.—Transportation, conservancy, anti-malarial measures, hot weather establishments and miscellaneous.

Hest VIII.-Non-effective charges and receipts.

2. The Budget Estimates are based on the normal cost of the authorised strength of the army, modified by anticipation of shortages in strengths likely to arise from causes known to the various administrative authorities. The actual compiled expenditure for previous years is also used as a guide and allowance made for all reorganisations, new measures and changes in policy or equipment.

The total of the authorised establishments of the Army in India proper and Burma, exclusive of reservists, on 1st April 1928 is 2,81,521 against 2,81,271 on 1st April 1927 and 3,11,975 on 1st April 1922. The increase of 250 in 1928 as compared with 1927 is nade up of (i) 28 in officers with King's Commission, (ii) 45 in Indian Officers with Viceroy's Commissions, (iii) 3 in Indian other ranks and (iv) 205 in civilians and followers, partly counterbalanced by a decrease of 31 under British other ranks,

#### SUB-HEAD A .--- FORCES IN INDIA PROPER AND BURMA.

## (I)—Fighting services.

General.—The expenditure under this head represents the pay and allowances and miscellaneous charges of the fighting units of the various arms of the service, which form the first line of the Army in India.

Item (1).—Pay of rank of regimental officers (including officers of the Army in India Reservefor the period they come up for training), command or additional pay, compensation for inferior quarters, syce and forage allowance for chargers, presidency town allowance at Calcutta, Rangoon and Dombay, local allowance at Chitral and Proch and marriage allowance are included underthis head. I.odging allowance is also included for officers who are not provided with free Government quarters.

In March 1925, orders were issued revising the rates of pay of all the regular King's commissioned officers of the Army in India. The principles adopted in the revision departed considerably from previous practice and the officers' pay was based on the rates current in England. The main departure has been to distinguish between the emoluments of married and unmarried officers by the grant to the former (who are over 30 years of age) of a marriage allowance and a higher rate of lodging allowance. The result is that the pay of British officers in India now consists of the following elements:---

- (1) A basic pay of rank.
- (2) An Indian allowance.
- (3) A servant's allowance.
- (4) Free quarters or a lodging allowance in lieu.
- (5) A marriage allowance for married officers of the age of 30 and over.

The pay of Indian Army officers contains the foregoing items  $f^{lus}$  an Indian army allowance. Officers holding staff and departmental appointments receive consolidated rates of pay which, while including the above items, have a further element as payment for their more onerous duties or as a compensation for the loss of prospects which departmental service entails. Officers of the Royal Engineers also receive engineer pay which is granted in all parts of the empire f or their special qualifications and similarly officers of the Indian Signal Corps receive an addition of signal pay.

In addition, separation allowance has been introduced for married officers serving in stations. where, under the orders of Government, their families may not accompany them. Officers who were liable to draw decreased emoluments in consequence of the pay revision, were allowed to retain their old rates of pay until promotion or change of appointment; consequently the estimates under all officers pay heads, are higher than will ultimately be the case when the full effects of the revision have materialised.

item (?).—Pay of British other ranks according to rank at normal rates (including proficiency pay at 6 annas per diem up to the rank of Sergeant) or tradesman's rates if employed in a technical arm of the service, messing allowance at 34 annas a day (6 annas in the case of those serving within the concessional area in Waziristan), extra duty pay, marriage and furniture allowances are included under this head. The recoveries in India of compulsory allotments paid in England as well as of deductions made in the pay of British soldiers under the Contributory Pensions rules are recorded here.

Reduced rates of pay for British soldiers enlisted or re-enlisted after 26th October 1925 have been introduced in England and have been applied to India. The savings on this account have been calculated to amount to over Rs. one crore after seven years.

Items (3) and (4).—Pay of Indian officers and other ranks according to rank to serving soldiers, and recruits undergoing training, reserve pay at Rs. 7 per mensem for class A and Rs. 4 per mensem for class B reservists for the period they do not come up for training, good conduct or good service pay according to the length of service, proficiency pay, extra doty pay, engineer pay, signal pay, pioneer pay, corps pay in the case of mechanical transport drivers, allowance to trained surveyors.

personal allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem to Indian officers, local allowance at Chitral and Drosh and allowance of annas 10 per mensem to supplement purchase of ration articles are included under this head. Rs. 4 per mensem during winter months and Rs. 3 per mensem during the summer is paid, in lieu of 10 annas per mensem, to Indian Officers and Indian other ranks employed in the concessional area in Waziristan.

Item (5).—Includes pay and tradesman's rates of pay to enrolled followers and nerrick or local rates to unenrolled followers (including victualling establishments) and a ration allowance of annas 4 per diem.

Items (6) and (7:.-When individuals entitled to free rations cannot be supplied with them money allowances in lieu are granted. They are mainly drawn when travelling by rail.

Item 181.—This allowance is granted monthly to British other ranks to meet the cost of upkeep and renewal of personal clothing and necessaries. The rates per capita are Rs. 112-8-0 and Rs. 111 per annum in the case of mounted and dismounted soldiers respectively. The per capita rate of clothing allowance in the case of armoured car units, motor cyclists, etc., is Rs. 108 per annum.

Item 19.—Besides the grant of clothing allowance for the upkeep, etc., of personal clothing and necessaries to Indian officers and Indian other ranks, compensation paid to Indian Army reservists on transfer to the reserve for the value of clothing taken over by Government is also included under this head. The rates for mounted and dismounted Indian officers are Rs. 45-6-0 per annum and Rs. 42-6-0 per annum respectively. In the case of Indian other ranks the rates for mounted and dismounted men are Rs. 43-8-0 and Rs. 40-8-0 per annum respectively. In the case of enrolled followers the rate is Rs. 24-12-0 per annum. A lump sum allotment to meet the cost of boots issued to British other ranks, Indian other ranks and followers at the discretion of G. O. C., Waziristan District is also included under this head.

. Item (10).—Includes allowance to officers' messes, band allowance, weapon training allowance (which includes musketry prize money, upkeep of butts and targets, upkeep of bayonet fighting equipment, upkeep of riding schools and jumps) stringing allowance for charpoys, outfit allowance to officers, stationery allowance at varying rates, horses and mules line contingent allowance and cost of maintenance and replacement of typewriters. Also includes prizes for lance and sword practice, skill in driving, etc.

*Item (11).*—This comprises among other items, cost of official postage, telegrams, rewards to recruiters, expenditure incurred regimentally on account of rail fares of reservists and subsistence allowance to recruits, dentistry charges such as the provision of artificial teeth, supply of water from other than military sources such as municipalities, etc.

Item (12).—Deferred pay to British non-commissioned officers and men enlisted before 1st April 1898 and gratuities to British non-commissioned officers and men enlisted after 31st March 1898 are included here.

Item (13).—A lump sum payment is made to Indian non-commissioned officers and men on discharge calculated at Rs. 2 for each month of service.

*Item (14).*—Cost of repairs to army signalling stores and purchase of petty articles, charges connected with the repair of kit bags, etc., and charges on account of the manufacture and repair of section boxes for small arms ammunition are charged to this head.

Item (15).—Cost of instructional stores of signal companies and equipment of engineer units consumed, repaired and replaced and of stores used in the sappers and miners park and for field practice, is compiled under this head.

#### · EXPLANATIONS—contd.

2. The following are the main changes in the organization of the army in India, which have been considered in Budget, 1928-29

- (a) The reorganisation of the Indian Signal Corps involving an increase of 4 British officers and 31 followers and a reduction of 3 British other ranks and 139 Indian ranks.
- (b) Abolition of the Rangoon Defence Light Section involving a reduction of 1 British officer, 5 British other ranks, 21 Indian officers and Indian other ranks and 7 followers.
- (c) Transfer of Surveyor Instructors to the King George's Own Sappers and Miners (1 Indian officer, 2 Indian other ranks and 7 followers.)
- (d) Increase in the establishment of the Bridging Train now added to the establishment of the King George's Own Sappers and Miners -- 11 Indian other ranks and 6 fol- . lowers.
- (e) Provision of a mechanical transport fitter for the King George's Own Sappers and Miners.
- (1) Reduction in the establishment of the Boys' depots by 14 British other ranks.
- (2) Replacement of British trumpeters by Indians in Medium, Pack and Heavy batteries - a reduction of 26 British other ranks and an increase of 26 Indian other ranks.
- (A) Increase in the establishment of the Survey section and the abolition of a park ser-geant at Jutogh-a reduction of 1 British other rank and an addition of 1 British Officer, 8 Indian other ranks and 3 followers.
- (i) Provision of additional personnel for the Royal Artillery Training Centre-an increase of 12 Indian other ranks.
- ()) Reduction of one training battalion headquarters involving a reduction of 5 British officers, 53 Indian ranks and 3 followers.

(k) Increase of 36 followers in the establishment of Field Troops, Sappers and Miners. (1) Redistribution of trade groups in the Indian Signal Corps.

(m) Provision of 8 Sergeant pipers in certain British Infantry Battalions. (n) Transfer to Part B of provision for 3 British officers.

(o) Readjustment in victualling establishments in certain Artillery units (increase of 6 followers).

Minor Head (b).—Officers with King's Commissions unemployed or under training for the Indian Army.—The pay of unemployed officers residing in India, and of unattached list Second Lieutenants from Sandhurst posted to British regiments in India for a year's duty prior to their appointment to the Indian Army, is taken to this minor head.

Minor Head (c)—Leave allowances paid by Non-Military Departments.—The provision against this head represents proportionate leave pay charges debited to the Military Department on account of civil officers and subordinates who have had military service and who take leave while employed in the Civil Department.



Its object is to train officers, warrant and non-commissioned officers as instructors in the technique and tactical employment of machine guns. The annual outturn of students is 160 British Officers, 48 British other ranks, 116 Indian Officers and 108 Indian other ranks.

 $Min \neq Head$  (g).-(1) The School of Artillery, India, corresponds to the School of Artillery, Larkhill (England). It instructs artillery officers and non-commissioned officers in practical gunnery, practical care of equipment and train them as instructors, carries out experiments connected with gunnery problems, equipment, annunition, etc., peculiar to India, and provides. gunnery staff for the various artillery practice camps held in India. The annual out-turn of the School is Eritish Officers 74, British other ranks 100, Indian Officers 20 and Indian other ranks 20.

Minor Head (h).—The Royal Tank Corps School is designed to train officers and non-commissioned officers as instructors in drill, machine gunnery and tactical handling of armoured cars, also to train officers and non-commissioned officers as instructors in driving and maintenance of armoured cars and tenders. The annual out-turn of the School is British officers 54, British other ranks 189.

The increase of Rs. 15 lakh in Budget, 1928-29 over Budget, 1927-28 is mainly due to seconding of one R. A. Instructor class C and one R. A. Sergeant Instructor and to the anticipated increase in the establishment of British Soldiers by one Company Quarter Master Sergeant.

Minor Head (i).—The Army Signal School, Poona, corresponds to the School of Signals, Catterick (England). Its object is to train officers and non-commissioned officers of British and Indian units as interfuctors and assistant instructors in signalling and to ensure that regimental signalling personnel throughout the Army are trained on a uniform system. The numbers trained annually are about 72 British officers, 84 British other ranks and 180 Indian other ranks.

The reduction of Rs. •07 lakh in Budget, 1928-29 as compared with Budget, 1927-28 is mainly due to provision having been made for Junior officers under pay and allowances, etc., of officers with Kings' Commissions.

The translation section has been transferred to the General Staff Branch from November 1927.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (a)—Supply Companies and Supply Depots.—The system for the provision and maintenance of articles of Indian Army Service Corps supply (viz., food stuffs of all kinds for men and animals, petrol and lubricants) differs slightly in the Cis-Indus and the Trans-Indus Areas.

In the Cis-Indus Area.—There is a District Supply Company or Independent Brigade Supply Company in each Military District or Independent Brigade. The functions of these Supply Companies are to maintain Supply Depots and Sub-Depots and to receive and check indents from units and carry out the necessary supply.

In the Trans-Indus Area.—There are also District Supply Companies which carry out the duties mentioned above except those of maintaining Supply Depots and Sub-depots. Owing to the necessity for maintaining large Depots in these areas and to provide for mobilisation requirements, it is necessary to maintain 4 Supply Depot Companies in addition to the District Supply Companies and these Supply Depot Companies carry out the duties connected with the Supply Depots which comprise the maintenance and issue of stocks including the turnover of mobilisation reserves. The Supply Depot Companies make their issues on receipt of indents from District Supply Companies.

2. In addition to their other duties, District Supply Companies maintain Bakeries and Butcheries at the various stations within their districts.

Government bakeries bake all bread required for the army, approximately 24 million loaves of bread annually.

3. There are only three Government butchery sections (at Razmak), where animals are slaughtered under departmental arrangements. At all other military stations, meat is supplied locally by contractors to the army butcheries.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (e)—Animal Transport.—The Animal Transport consists of 33 Mule units, 9 Camel units and 33 small units of bullocks. In addition, there are detachments in Gilgit, and three transport depots. The latter train remount mules required for the maintenance of transport units in peace and war and are also responsible for the training of reservists.

Of the 42 mule and camel transport units, 13 are in cadre capable of expansion on mobilisation.

2. The location of these transport units at various stations in India is designed to keep the expenditure on hired transport as low as possible. With this object in view, Army Transport carts have also been issued to such regimental units as have animals forming part of their peace establishments. These carts are used for regimental and station transport work.

Minor Head (f)-Mechanical Transport.-The Mechanical Transport Service at present comprises-

(i) 8 Light Mechanical Transport Companies,

(ii) 10 Motor Ambulance Convoys,

(iii) 4 Mobile Repair Units,

(iv) 1 Light M. T. Section in Waziristan,

(v) Mechanical Transport Depot,

(vi) Mechanical Transport Workshops,

(vii) Central Mechanical Transport Stores Depot, with necessary inspecting and administrative staff.

2. The Mobile Repair Units do minor repairs of all vehicles dependent on them including staff cars and motor vehicles belonging to Fighting Units, e.g., Signals and Sappers and Miners. There are Mechanical Transport Workshops for major repairs including complete overhauls, at Bombay, Chaklala, Peshawar, Quetta, and Bannu, each competent to deal with all the work arising in its sector in peace time. The workshops at Chaklala and Peshawar alsotrain Indian artificers by the employment of apprentices.

3. The training of Indian drivers is carried out at the Mechanical Transport Depot at Chaklala where about 400 drivers are trained every year.

4. The Mechanical Transport Units (three Mechanical transport companies, 1 Motor ambulance convoy and 1 Light M. T. Section) employed in Waziristan are in full use, owing to the abnormal conditions in that area. The use of the two Mechanical transport companies at Peshawar and Quetta is restricted. Other Mechanical transport companies are in cadre and arechicfly used for the training of driver reservists and are intended for use on mobilisation.

5. The issue of petrol and lubricating oils is regulated by fixed scales.

It is also responsible for the preparation of specification and compilation of drawings of spare parts, etc.

In the budget for 1927-28, a sump sum was provided for establishments to be employed in connection with the maintenance of mobilisation stores. Details of these establishments have since been settled and provision has been made accordingly under various detailed heads in Budget, 1928-29. #### EXPLANATIONS.

Sub-Head (C).—Remount depots and breeding operations.—The Army Remount Department is responsible for the supply of animals to the army. Animals other than horses and certain types of mules are purchased in India and supplied direct to units.

2. The Army Remount Department maintains 327 horses and 243 donkey stallions in order to encourage the breeding in India by private breeders of horses and mules suitable for the army. About 50 full grown horses and 1,000 mules are purchased yearly from private breeders in India. In addition, a large number of young stock is purchased and reared in the young stock depots at Mona and Sargodha (Punjab) for issue to the army when full grown. The authorised establishment of young stock in these depots is 3,987 horses and 2,700 mules and 400 full grown mules.

3. As the full requirements of the army (about 3,150 horses and 2,550 mules) cannot be main from the above source, about 2,500 horses, 150 Light Draught and 250 Ordnance mules imported from oversess and 300 mules are purchased at Kalimpong.

4. There are three remount depots (Ahmednagar, Saharanpur and Babugarh) at which imported horses are acclimatized before issue to the army. The present authorised complement of animals maintained in these remount depots, is 2,483 horses and 100 young stock mules.

5. Budget, 1928-29 shows a saving of Rs. 52 lakh as compared with Budget, 1927-28 which is mainly due to provision for leave reserve of British officers being excluded from the Indian estimates, as leave pay for officers on leave ex-India is adjusted in the Home accounts.

*Minor Head* (a)—Veterinary Hospitals.—The Indian Army Veterinary Corps is responsible for the walfare of the anima's of the Army, including those of the Remount Depots, about 76,000 m number. The organisation consists of 29 veterinary hospitals, class I, 26 veterinary hospitals, class II. 26 branch veterinary hospitals and 9 veterinary sick lines. All cases of sickness, with the exception of very minor ones, are treated in the veterinary hospitals. The percentage of auimals treated in veterinary hospitals is 2.5 in the case of horses, 1.5 in the case of ponies and mules, 3 in the case of camels and 1 in the case of bullocks.

2. A leave reserve of 20( privates has been provided for, the expenditure thereon being met by reduction of effective personnel serving with Veterinary hospitals.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

#### Minor Head (a)-Arsenals, Ordnance Depots & Clothing Depots.-

Arsenals and Ordnance Depots.—There are at present 7 arsenals at Rawalpindi, Ferozepore, Kirkee, Quetta, Madras, Rangoon and Allahabad and 6 ordnance depots at Fort William, Bombay, Agra, Karachi, Lahore and Cawnpore, under the executive control of the Chief Ordnance Officers or Ordnance Officers in Charge. They are administered by the Director of Equipment and Ordnance Stores, under the Quartermaster General. The functions of the organisation are the purchase, storage and issue to troops, in their respective areas, of all equipment and ordnance stores, including barrack, hospital and miscellaneous equipment, also the maintenance of war and mobilization reserves. Equipment and stores stocked at arsenals and ordnance depots are obtained from ordnance factories in India, by purchase in England, and by purchase in India, either through the agency of the Director of Contracts or the India Stores Department or by Chief Ordnance Officers locally, from allotments placed at the disposal of the Director of Equipment and Ordnance Stores for the purpose. The Ordnance Depot, Cawnpore, is principally charged with the duty of supplying articles of footgear, which are purchased by contract from local firms. To each arsenal is attached a workshop where minor repairs to stores and manufacture on a small scale are carried out.

2. Clothing depots.—There are 4 Clothing Depots at Rawalpindi, Quetta, Shahjahanpore and Madras. These depots are under the control of Chief Ordnance Officers acting under the Director of Equipment and Ordnance Stores, and the Quartermaster General. They are maintained for retailing clothing and footgear to British and Indian troops and for maintaining working stocks. They also hold war and mobilization reserves. Stores stocked in the clothing depots are obtained from the Army Clothing Factories in India, the Ordnance Depot, Cawnpore, and by purchase at home, through the Director General, India Stores Department, and in India, through the agency of the Director of Contracts, or the Indian Stores Department or by Chief Ordnance Officers locally.

In the budget estimates for 1927-28 a lump provision of Rs. 4.95 lakhs was made for carrying out recommendations of the Ordnance Supply Committee. These recommendations were considered by the Government of India and necessary increase in the cadre of officers and other ranks has been sanctioned. In the budget estimates for 1928-29 provision for the increased establishment has been made under the appropriate detailed heads. Certain, Indian Army Ordnance Corps establishment has also been transferred to the Master General of Supply in connection with the transfer of inspection work to his control which has resulted in a decrease under the detailed heads concerned but this decrease has been counterbalanced by increased provision under 'Temporary labour' and 'Incidental and miscellaneous expenses.'

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Sub-Head F.- The provision represents the cost of educating and training military pupils in the Medical Colleges at Calcutta and Madras, and in the Medical Schools at Royapuram (Madras), Agra and Amritear before appointment as Military Assistant Surgeons or Military Sub-Assistant Surgeons. Reduction of provision in Budget, 1928-29 as compared with Budget, 1927-28 is due to fall in the number of pupils who receive educatiotn throughout the year.

Sub-Head G.—Central Disposals Organisation.—The Central Disposals Organisation has been formed in July 1926 partly at Army Headquarters and partly at Dum Dum near Calcutta to control and arrange for the utilisation, where possible, and otherwise, the disposal of waste material such as expended ammunition, partworn or worn-out tools, arms and other equipment, manufacture waste, obsolete stores and material and those surplus to the requirements of the Army in India.

The Central Disposals Organisation consists of :-

- (1) Headquarters organisation and (2) a central dumping station temporarily located at Dum Dum and is controlled by the Director of Contracts under the Master General of Supply.
- 2. The Headquarters organisation is responsible for :---
  - (a) Collecting and correlating information relative to all excess stock and normal wastes and surplus available in Arsenals and Depots, Ordnance and Clothing Factories and other Army formations which accumulate large surpluses;
  - (b) investigating the possibility of such stores and materials being utilised by other Government Departments, civil or military ;
  - (c) advising or directing sales at the establishments concerned, or at other places, or by means of transfer to the central dumping station at Dum Dum as may be most advantageous.
- 3. The functions of the dump at Dum Dum are :---
  - (a) to receive and bring on charge all stores sent in from Arsenals and other establishments:

  - (b) to keep proper custody of these stocks ;
    (c) to sort by condition and keep Headquarters informed of the quantities received ;
  - (d) to arrange auction or other sales under directions from Headquarters ;
  - (e) to pack and despatch stores from stocks as directed by Headquarters.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

The Medical Services are organised mainly into (I) British Military Hospitals, (II) Indian Military Hospitals and (III) Indian Hospital Corps. The British Military Hospitals are entrusted with the medical and sanitary care of all British officers, British other ranks and their families (including children), while the Indian Military Hospitals are generally responsible for the treatment, etc., of Indian officers, Indian other ranks and all classes of followers whose pay and allowances are paid from the Military Estimates. In order to effect economy it has been arranged at certain stations that Indian Military hospitals should have small British Sections attached to them. and vice versa instead of having two complete hospitals at the same station. The Indian Hospital Corps is organised in connection with the maintenance, training and upkeep of the records of the Indian Hospital Corps personnel employed in hospitals for British and Indian troops and their families and in field medical units when mobilised. The Corps is at present divided into 10 companies, which are located at Peshawar, Rawalpindi, Lahore, Quetta, Mhow, Poona, Secunderabad, Meerut, Rangoon and Lucknow. The reorganization of this Corps on a 5-company basis is under consideration. The hospitals are classified according to the strength of the garrison at each station. At present there are 24 hospitals first class, 21 second class, 53 third class, 40 fourth class and 30 fifth class, which are open throughout the year except at certain hill stations, where they are only open for a portion of the year varying between 6 and 8 months. The percentages of sick treated in these hospitals are roughly 3.5 per cent. of months. the establishment in the case of British troops, 2 per cent. in the case of Indian troops and 1 per cent. in the case of followers. The staff and establishments maintained for this purpose including those employed at the headquarters of the I. H. C. Companies are 243 Royal Army Medical Corps officers, 352 Indian Medical Service officers, 24 dental officers, 414 R. A. M. C. other ranks, 48 dental mechanics, 276 nurses, 41 matrons, 335 assistant surgeons, 683 sub-assistant surgeons, 9,298 Indian Hospital Corps personnel and 1,400 reservists. In addition 117 M.T. drivers for running the motor ambulances and other miscellaneous establishments (e.g., ayahs, female sweepers, X-Ray mechanics, etc.) are also maintained.

For purposes of administrative convenience, the provision for all I. H. C. personnel has been made during 1928-29 under the minor head (e) irrespective of whether they are actually employed with the hospitals or not, and the provision for No. 31 Coy., R. A. M. C. has been made under minor head (a) as that Company caters for British military hospitals only.

Minor Head (d).—The military food laboratory advises the Director of Contracts whether the samples of foodstuffs tendered to him are of suitable quality, tests supplies by comparison with the samples and assists by expert advice in regulating the turnover of stocks and reserves.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

The Military Accounts Department in its superior personnel is at present composed of a cadre of 59 officers including Military Officers, borne on the supernumerary list, European Civilians. and Indian Civilians, latest and future recruitments being confined almost entirely to the last mentioned class.

2. The present organisation is as follows :---

- (1) At the head of the Department, there is a Military Accountant General whose functions are :---
  - (i) To administer the department, under the control of the Financial Adviser, Military Finance.
- (ii) To organise the arrangements for the disbursement of pay to officers and men of the Army.
- i) To maintain a record of military expenditure and receipts in such a form as will be of the greatest help to the military and financial authorities.
- (iv) To examine all general questions of accounting and audit.
- (v) To deal with all work connected with India's claims against His Majesty's Government in respect of Indian troops employed overseas (e.g., Iraq.) and of stores supplied to overseas garrisons; as well as all work connected with the claims of His-Majesty's Government arising out of the employment of British troops in India, etc.
- (vi) To deal with all questions connected with (including disbursement of) the pay and allowances of the staff employed at Army Headquarters.
- (vii) To control the work relating to the audit of the Army List and to conduct scaleaudit of the establishments of the various Departments of the Army.
- (2) At the Headquarters of each of the 4 Army Commands, there is a Command Controller. In accordance with the scheme for centralisation as far as possible of audit in Commands, which has been approved by the Government of India, the offices of certain Controllers of Districts and Independent Brigadeshave been amalgamated with their respective Command Controllers' offices. The Command Controllers in charge of the amalgamated offices are Financial Advisers to the General Officers Commanding-in-Chief of the Commands, as well as to the General Officers Commanding the Districts or Independent Brigades comprised in the amalgamation. The Command Controllers are, in addition, the chief authority for accounts and for internal audit in the respective commands and they also assist the General Officers Commanding-in-Chief and General Officers Commanding the Districts, the accounts offices of which are amalgamated with the command offices in the preparation of all estimates and furnish them regularly with such statistics relating to accounts as they may require for controlling expenditure against grants placed at their disposal. The following list shows the Command Controllers and the District and Brigade account officesamalgamated with their Commands under the amalgamation scheme referred to above :—
  - (a) Controller of Military Accounts, Southern Command and Poona, Bombay and Central Provinces Districts.
  - (b) Controller of Military Accounts, Eastern Command and Meerut and Lucknow Districts. (He also deals with the accounts of the Delhi Brigade.)
    (c) Controller of Military Accounts, Western Command and Baluchistan D istrict an
  - (c) Controller of Military Accounts, Western Command and Baluchistan D istrict an Sind Independent Brigade Area. (He deals also with the accounts of the Zhob Area.)
  - (d) Controller of Military Accounts, Northern Command and Rawalpindi, Kohat and Waziristan Districts.
- (3) There is a Controller of Military Accounts for each of the other Military Districts. (miz., Peshawar, Lahore, Presidency and Assam, Madras and Burma Districts). The Controller of the Presidency and Assam District also deals with railway charges and with the accounts of passage and service funds. The Controller of the Lahore-District has a Branch office at Simla for dealing with the purchases made by the Director of Contracts.

### MAIN HEAD II-

#### EXPLANATIONS.

- (4) Under the revised organisation there are two military pension accounts offices—one at Lahore and the other at Mhow. The Controller of Military Pension Accounts at Lahore deals with the payment, audit and adjustment of all claims to pensions in the Northern and Eastern Commands and the Controller of Military Pension Accounts at Mhow deals with the payment, audit and adjustment of the pension claims in the Southern and Western Commands. The pension claims arising in Burma District are dealt with by the Controller of Military Accounts of that District.
- . (5) There are separate Controllers for Army Factory Accounts, Royal Air Force Accounts and Marine Accounts. The first named officer deals with the accounts (including the cost accounts) of Army Ordnance Factories and of Clothing Factories and Depots, which also undertake the manufacture of clothing for troops, and is the financial adviser of the administrative authorities concerned. He has a central office at Calcutta with subordinate offices at each of the factories.
- 3. The cardinal principles of the existing system of accounts are :---
  - (a) The concentration of the issue of funds at certain central stations (viz., the offices of the various Controllers).
- (b) The preparation of pay accounts, and of priced store accounts of supplying formations, etc., by accountants and clerks of the Military Accounts Department attached to the units, formations, etc.
  - (c) The maintenance of proper accounts of manufacture at all manufacturing establishments by accountants and clerks of the Military Accounts Department.
- (d) The audit of store accounts by a system of local audit which includes a continuous verification of stock.

4. The centralization of audit in Commands referred to above and certain other changes in accounting procedure now under consideration when they materialize, will, it is hoped, reduce expenditure in the Military Accounts Department to some extent.

5. With the approval of the Secretary of State for India, it was decided that the expenditure relating to the audit and accounting for Army, R. A. F. and Marine which has hitherto been controlled by the M. A. G. and the Director R. I. M. (so far as the Marine Audit and accounts establishment is concerned) and budgetted and accounted for under 48 Army Part A—Head II—I(a) to (c), Head VII, Part C.-R. A. F. sub head C (b) and 49 Marine-Head I-B should, commencing with the Budget and accounts for the year 1928-29, be controlled solely by M. A. G. and budgetted for and booked under 48 Army Part A-Head II-I, so as to enable the M. A. G. to exercise greater control over the expenditure. The expenditure relating to the M. A. D. including Factory, R. A. F. and Marine accounts has accordingly been shown under Head II-I in the Estimate for 1928-29.

In addition to the above amount, a sum of Rs. 4.35 lakhs was provided under Head VII—Aon account of transportation charges relating to the Military Accounts Department. The total Budget provision for the Military Accounts Department for 1927.28 thus amounted to Rs. 99.2) lakhs and this amount was raised to Rs. 100.17 lakhs in the revised estimate for that year.

7. The Budget Estimate for 1928-29 (including transportation charges, etc. and after allowing for a lump cut of Rs. 3 lakhs) has been fixed at Rs. 103.11 lakhs against the origina Budget Estimate for 1927-28 (*riz.* Rs. 99.21 lakhs) and the revised Estimate for 1927-28 (*viz.* Rs. 100.17 lakhs) referred to above.

8. The causes for the variation between the figures shown in the original Budget Estimate for 1927-28 and the Budget Estimate for 1928-29 under the several minor heads of Head II-I are explained below :--

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Sub-Heat K.—Administration of Cantonments.—The municipal administration of Cantonments in Inlis is carried out unler the provisions of the Cantonments Act, 1924, by officers of the Cantonments Department who are paid from Army Estimates. In Cantonments of small municipal importance, military officers are appointed as Executive Officers, in addition to their ordinary military duties, and are paid an allowance from Cantonment Funds. The Inspectorial Stat included in the Cantonments Department consists of one Director of Military Lands and Cantonments at the Headquarters of Government and 4 Inspecting Officers, at the Headquarters of the Northern, Southern, Western and Eastern Commands. The functions of these officers are of an advisory character..

2. Contonments which cannot maintain the ordinary standard of municipal administration on the basis of the income derived from local sources receive a grant-in-aid from the Army Estimates.

3. The Executive Officers of certain Cantonnents have also been appointed as Military Estates Officers and been entrusted with the duty of managing Government lands in Cantonments iff accordance with the provisions of the Cantonnent Land Administration Rules, 1925.

Budget, 1923-29 is more than that for 1927-28 by Rs. •72 lakh, which is chiefly due to (a) increased provision for unforescen charges and (b) provision for upkeep of cantonment maps and work in connection with survey and re-survey of cantonments by the Survey of India Department.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (b).—Inspectors of lethal weapons and general stores.—There are 3 Inspection charges at Ishapore, Kirkee, and Jubbulpore, a Proof and Experimental Officer, Balasore, and a Chemical Inspector, Kirkee. The functions of these are to inspect lethal weapons, ammunition and connected equipment manufactured by the Ordnance factories, before their issue to the Arsenals. In addition there is a Chief Inspector of stores and clothing at Cawnpore. The functions of the latter officer are to deal with all non-lethal general stores, including bedding (blankets), barrack and hospital equipment, boots and clothing, before their acceptance by the arsenals, depots, etc. In addition, provision exists for the inspection of repairs to small arms carried out by arsenals through A. E. S. A. as stationed at the arsenals. The work of inspection of arms, etc., with units is done by Chief Civil Master Armourers. The whole organisation is administered by the Director of Artillery under the Master General of Supply.

2. Provision for the Inspector of Clothing Stores, Shahjahanpur, and for the Inspectorate of Clothing Stores, Madras, has been transferred to this head from Army Clothing Factories at Shahjahanpur and Madras, respectively, and provision has also been made for the transfer of other inspection work from Quartermaster General to Master General of Supply owing to which 3 new Ordnance and Clothing Inspection Depots have been created at Hastings (Calcutta), Bombay and Rawalpindi with effect from 1st June 1927.

3. The excess in Budget, 1928-29 as compared with Budget, 1927-28 is mainly due to the increased Inspecting Staff transferred from the control of the Quartermaster General to that of the Master General of Supply.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (a).—Governor General's Band.

The reduction in Budget, 1928-29 as compared with that for 1927-28 is chiefly due to elimination of provision under Incidental expenses on the basis of actuals.

Minor Head (b)—Recruiting Staff.—Provision for staff and establishments required to control the recruitment of enlisted and enrolled men (including followers) for all branches of the military service is made here. This organisation consists at present of 9 recruiting officers and 17 assistant recruiting officers (unseconded) for the whole year, 3 assistant recruiting officers (unseconded) for the recruiting season only, at the various recruiting centres (viz., Peshawar, Rawalpindi, Lahore, Jullundur, Delhi, Lucknow, Ajmer, Gorakhpur, Poona, Ghoom, and Burma) and 88 Indian recruiters. The clerical staff consists of 38 men.

2. As a certain number of recruits secured by the recruiting staff is required for oversea<sup>3</sup> garrisons, a proportionate share of the cost calculated at 1 per cent as against 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> per cent. adopted for the current year is recovered from His Majesty's Government.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (c).—Hill Sanitaria and Depóts.—This head represents the cost of sanitariaand hill depôts for British troops which are maintained for the accommodation of convalescents, families, etc. As a measure tending towards increased efficiency, and eventual economy, a bulk allotment of funds is placed annually at the disposal of the General Officers Commandingin-Chief to meet the expenditure connected with the administration of these depôts and such roadside camps, rest camps, etc., as are opened specially to meet the requirements of the sanitaria, with full powers to vary the establishments to suit local conditions to open sanitaria at places where they were not previously authorised and to extend or shorten the period for whichthey are normally open. The experiment has only been in vogue for two years, but it has: already shown that, by giving General Officers Commanding-in-Chief personal control over theirexpenditure, large savings may accrue.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

111-A.—Medical Store Depots and Workshops.—There are 5 medical store depots at Calcutta, Madras, Bombay, Rangoon and Lahore. They are responsible for the supply of all medical stores to medical and veterinary institutions of the army in India and the Royal Indian Marine, as well as for the equipment of field medical units. They are also responsible for the supply on payment of medical and veterinary stores to Government. Further, they undertake the repair of surgical instruments both for military and civil institutions; and the depots at Madras and Bombay manufacture pharmaceutical preparations on a large scale. They are administered, not by Army Headquarters, but by the Director General, L. M. S., who is under the Departments of Education, Health and Lands.

#### III. C.—Ordnance and Clothing Factories—

Ordnance Factories.—There are seven Ordnance Factories, with a Superintendent over each, controlled by the Director of Ordnance Factories and Manufacture under the Master General of Supply. They were formed with the object of supplying guns, rifles, ammunition and connected equipment to troops, and are organised in peace in such a way that they may be ready for expansion in war. The detailed functions of each Factory are given below :—

- Metal and Steel Factory, Ishapore—Production of steel for guns and shell, of metal for Q. F. and small arms ammunition, fuzes, etc., of steel bars and rods; of shell fuzings; and of Q. F. cartridge cases.
- (2) Gun and Shell Factory, Cossipore—Production of guns up to 18 pdr., howitzers, up to 4.5", and their components; and machinery of shells, fuzes, primers and miscellaneous stores.
- (3) Rifle Factory, Ishapore—Production of rifles and their components and repair of machine guns and manufacture of machine gun components required, for the purpose.
- (4) Ammunition Factory, Kirkee—Production of small arms and pistol ammunition and filling of shell, fuzes and primers.
- (5) Gun-carriage Factory, Jubbulpore-Manufacture of field artillery carriages and vehicles, general service wagons, transport carts and various miscellaneous articles.
- (6) Harness and Saddlery Factory, Cawnpore—Manufacture of harness, saddlery, accoutrements, and leather of various sorts.

(7) Cordite Factory, Aruvankadu—Production of cordite and gun cotton.

Clothing Factories.—There are 2 army clothing factories at Shahjahanpore and Madras with a chief ordnance officer and assistant works manager at the head respectively. They are administered by the Director of Ordnance Factories and Manufacture under the Master General of Supply. The functions of the army clothing factories are to manufacture garments required by British and Indian troops and followers. Materials for manufacture of garments are obtained from England or are purchased in India. Textiles are purchased in India mostly through the stores department under the department of industries. The Shahjahanpore factory was opened during the war and has been retained owing to the cheapness of labour at the station. The major portion of the manufacture of garments is done in this factory. Requirements in excess of the outturn of the 2 factories are obtained through contractors. The factories have recently been reorganized and brought into line with the ordnance factories. The budget heads for clothing and ordnance factories have also been amalgamated.

Heat 111.D.—Grass Farms.—There are 43 grass farms distributed among 10 administrative circles, all under the control of the Director of Farms attached to the Master General of Supply Branch at Army Headquarters. The functions of the grass farms are (i) to provide fodder for all Government animals in cantonments and elsewhere and (ii) to maintain war reserves of fodder according to sanctioned scales. The operations of these farms consist of growing or purchasing and stacking supplies for annual consumption, and also of stacking and baling the war reserves. The Farms Department have also started experimental vegetable gardens for producing vegetables for British troops.

#### Head III.E.-Dairy Farms.-There are 27 dairy farms at the following stations :---

Peshawar, Rawalpindi, Sargoda, Matsanabad, Sialkot, Camba, Lahore Cantonment, Jallo, Dalhousie, Jullundur, Ferozepore, Ambala, Kasauli, Dagshai, Sabathu, Jutogh, Quetta, Bannu (with temporary branches at Razmak, Manzai and Dera Ismail Khan), Allahabad, Cawnpore, Deolali, Agra, Lucknow, Jubbulpore, Mhow, Kirkee and Belgaum.

The dairy farms are distributed among 2 administrative circles, *viz.*, northern and southernwith headquarters at Lahore and Jubbulpore. They are administered at army headquarters by the Director of Farms, under the Master General of Supply. The object of the dairies is to provide pure dairy produce for hospitals and for officers and soldiers and their families in general. They were instituted with the idea of providing pure milk and butter for British troops in the interests of their health and the efficiency of the army. The dairies run on a commercial basis, recouping all their expenditure out of the proceeds of sale of produce.

#### MAIN HEAD IV.-ARMY HEADQUARTERS,

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Definition and Composition of "The Staff".—The staff is the establishment of officers employed at the headquarters of each higher military formation to assist the commander in carrying out his duties of command and administration.

2. The staff of the Commander-in-Chief in India is known as the Army Headquarters Staff.

3. The officers appointed to the staff are specially selected officers, taken normally from among those who have graduated at the Staff College at Camberley or Quetta. The Staff Colleges are institutions where officers, after passing a competitive entrance examination, undergo a course of instruction in advanced military science and where they study the work of each fighting arm and of each administrative service and department of the army. No officer is posted permanently to the Staff. After a period of staff employment, limited as a general rule to four years, an officer returns to his unit for tour of regimental duty, in order that he may keep in touch with regimental work, which it is essential that he should do. Moreover, no staff officer is trained solely for daty with one of the branches of the Staff : it is important that officers of each should be acquainted with the working of other branches, in order that they may know what assistance they '' can give and receive, and in order also to ensure the proper allocation of responsibility and to avoid overlapping of work. To obtain this result, arrangements are made for the periodical exchange of staff officers between the different branches of the staff.

4. Organisation, and the functions of the several branches.—The staff is organized in four principal branches :—

- (a) The General Staff Branch.
- (b) The Adjutant General's Branch.
- (c) The Quartermaster-General's Branch.
- (d) The Master General of Supply Branch.

**5.** The General Staff Branch.—The General Staff Branch deals with military policy, with plans of operations for the defence of India, with the organization and distribution of the army for internal security and external use, in accordance with the policy of Government, with the collection and distribution of intelligence, with the supervision of the training of the army with the use of the military forces in war, with war regulations, with the education of officers and other ranks, and with the inter-communication services.

6. The Adjutant General's Branch.—The Adjutant-General's Branch deals with all matters appertaining to the raising, organizing, and maintenance of the military forces, the peace distribution of the army, discipline, martial, military and international law, medical and sanitary measures relating to the troops, personal and ceremonial matters, prisoners of war, pay and pension questions, recruiting, mobilization and demobilization.

7. The Quartermaster-General's Branch.—The Quartermaster-General's Branch is concerned with the maintenance and issue of supplies, *i.e.*, foodstuffs, forage, fuel, clothing, armaments, ammunition, equipment, general stores and material, and reserves of these articles, with the services responsible for the transportation, movement and quartering of troops, with the supply and transport service, armaments, military works, equipment and ordnance stores, with the remount and veterinary services and with garrison and regimental institutes. Since the great war the responsibilities of the Quartermaster-General's Branch have increased to a far greater extent than those of any other branch of the staff. This is attributable specifically to the creation of new services, such as Mechanical Transport, and to the fundamental change of policy by which, since the war, Indian troops are fed, clothed and mounted directly by Government, instead of under regimental arrangements.

8. The Master-General of Supply Branch.—The branch consists of four Directorates with duties that are interdependent. These are—

- (i) Ordnance Factories and Manufacture.
- (ii) Artillery.
- (iii) Farms.
- (iv) Contracts.

(i) The Directorate of Ordnance Factories and Manufacture administers the army factories in India, and assists the development of manufacture in India by private manufacturers.

#### STAFF OF COMMANDS, ETC.—contd.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

(ii) The Directorate of Artillery deals with design, including questions of research and experiment, scales of equipment, initial provision and allotment of all armament and ammunition, equipment and technical stores of the various branches of the service; also with inspection, and maintenance of such stores.

(iii) The Directorate of Farms is responsible both in peace and war for organising the whole supply of fodder, other than that drawn by local requisitions in the field and for a part of the supply of dairy produce required.

(iv) The Directorate of Contracts deals with the central purchase of foodstuffs, coal, oil petrol, paints, varnishes, etc., machinery, engineering stores, etc., maintains statistics, reviews local purchases; investigates most economical sources of supply and possibilities of obtaining stores in India in consultation with Indian Stores Department.

9. The Military Secretary deals with the appointment, promotion and retirement of officers , holding the King's Commission and the selection of officers for staff appointments.

10. In addition to the above, the Army Headquarters staff includes certain technical advisers, of whom the most important is the Major General, Royal Artillery. The duties of the officer are to inspect and co-ordinate the training of the artillery arm and to render advice to the General Staff Branch on technical questions connected with the administration of the arm and its employment in war. The officer is attached to the General Staff Branch. The appointment of the Major General Cavalry shown in the Budget, 1927-28 has since been abolished.

11. Lower formations.—The staff in Commands and Districts is organised on the same lines as at Army Headquarters, and the allocation of duties is in exact correspondence. There are of course certain differences, one being that the lower the formation, the fewer in number are the appointments and the lower is their grading; further, the work of the Adjutant-General's and Quartermaster-General's Branches is usually combined in one administrative staff officer. The composition of the staff of Commands and Districts varies with the special requirements of each.

12. Provision is made under this Head for the charges of Commanders and their staffs including their personal staffs.



#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (a)—Embarkation Staff.—The embarkation staffs deal with the reception of troops (both British and Indian) at Indian ports and their despatch from India to oversea destinations. They also deal with the shipping of stores from the sea ports and receipt of stores from overseas and their onward despatch. The embarkation staffs at Bombay and Karachi have been reorganised in order to make extended use of the port of Karachi for the embarkation and disembarkation of troops proceeding to and from northern India and by bringing together under the embarkation commandants the supply establishments employed at both ports on embarkation duties.

Budget, 1928-29, exceeds Budget, 1927-28, by Rs. 28 lakh due chiefly to additional establishments authorised for Calcutta in connection with work taken over from the agent for government consignments.

Minor Head (b)—Railway Transport Staff.—The railway transport establishments which are employed at Bombay, work under the orders of the embarkation commandant and deal with the frequent and important rail movements which take place to and from that port.

The increase of Rs. 19 lakh in budget, 1928-29, as compared with the budget, 1927-28, is due to provision for staff sanctioned for additional kitchen cars required as a result of the scheme for direct embarkation and disembarkation of troops—a measure of economy. 1

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Non-effective charges mainly represent the discharge of liabilities in connection with individuals who no longer serve in the army and consist of payments of pensions and gratuities to them or their families. Rewards attached to certain military decorations and medals and for distinguished war service which frequently involve payments to officers and men still serving in the army are also taken to this head, those to individuals on the retired list being compiled under sub-head B as part of pension charges and those to serving officers and men to sub-head A. The charges for pensions are under three main categories, viz., (1) pensions to retired or disabled officers and men, (2) pensions to families of individuals and (3) payments to War Office of a proportionate share of retired pay, etc., of British service officers and troops serving in India. Against the liability und.r (2) contributions are recovered from officers in respect of pensions paid from family pension funds, which are credited as non-effective receipts. The other receipts are contributions received by the Indian Government in respect of ordinary pensions payable from army estimates to officers and men on foreign service in Iraq and elsewhere.

1. Sub-Heads  $A_r$ ,  $B \notin C$ .—Represent provision for staff and establishments maintained at the army headquarters, commands and districts to deal with all questions connected with the organisation and administration of the Auxiliary and Territorial Forces.

2. Sub Head D.—Auriliary Forre.—This force has taken the place of the old volunteer force. The units comprising it are liable to be called out, or embodied, for local service only, thus constituting a potential reinforcement to the regular army. The maximum enrollable strength of this force amounts to 36,635 all ranks, riz., 4,042 cavalry, 1,971 artillery, 510 engineers, 15,420 railway corps, 13,234 infantry, 1,351 machine gun corps and 107 army service corps. The personnel of this force comprise 3 categories, riz., (1) active class, (2) first (A) and (3) second (B) reserve. On completion of the prescribed period of training non-commissioned officers and men of the active class are paid pay at Rs. 4, 3 and 2 per diem for sergeant, corporal and private, respectively, and a bonus of an equivalent amount for 16 days in the case of the infantry branch and 20 days in the case of other branches, while the categories (2) and (3) are allowed pay and bonus for 6 and 10 days respectively.

The strength of the Auxiliary Force during 1928-29 will, it is anticipated; be maintained at a total strength of 31,600 all ranks, excluding cadets.

3. Sub-Heal E.—Territorial Force.—This Force comprises at present 18 battalions of infantry and 2 battalions of pioneers, of an aggregate strength of 14,760 other ranks and 6, battalions and 2 companies of university training corps of an aggregate strength of 4,314.

The personnel of the provincial battalions are liable for preliminary and periodical training of 56 and 28 days respectively in the year, during which they draw pay and such allowances as are admissible to the corresponding ranks of the regular army. The members of the university training corps are liable for training for a period not exceeding 15 days in the year.

The Budget estimate, 1928-29 provides an additional sum of Rs. 10 lakhs to meet the expenditure on new measures to be introduced in accordance with the recommendations of the Auxiliary and Territorial Force Committee which have been accepted by Government.

4. The increase of Rs. 7.72 lakhs in 1928-29 as compared with budget, 1927-28, is chiefly due to :---

MILITARY SERVICES ESTIMATES

#### EXPLANATIONS.

During the period from 1st April 1928 to 31st December 1928, the establishment of the Royal Air Force in India will be 224\* officers, 1,705 airmen, 181 Indian artificers, 79 Indian mechanical transport drivers, 141<sup>†</sup> clerks, 4 schoolmistresses, 8 regimental munshis and 730<sup>‡</sup> followers. From 1st January 1929 the Royal Air Force will be reorganised on station basis and its establish-ment will be 268\* officers, 1,861 british other ranks, 181 Indian artificers, 89 Indian mechanical transport drivers, 145 † clerks, 4 schoolmistresses, 8 regimental munshis and 806 ‡ followers. It will comprise the following units by the end of this financial year when the additions and reorganization set out in paragraph 6 have been effected. 1 Headquarters, Royal Air Force, at Simla and Delhi.

1 Group Headquarters, Royal Air Force at Peshawar with 2 stations each comprising 2 (Bombing) squadrons at Risalpur and Kohat, and I (Army Co-operation) squadron at Peshawar, under its administration. The Risalpur Station will also in addition to 2 (Bombing) squadrons have a Parachute Test Section.

1 Wing Headquarter, Royal Air Force, at Quetta, with 2 (Army Co-operation) squadrons under its administration.

1 (Army Co-operation) squadron at Ambala, which is directly under the administration of the Headquarters, Royal Air Force.

1 Aircraft Depot at Karachi.

1 Aircraft Park at Lahore.

Besides the above there is a Royal Air Force Hill Depot which is located at Lower Topa during the summer months only.

2. The duties of the Aircraft Depot are as follows :----

- The Aircraft Depot receives all stores from England, erects new aeroplanes, overhauls engines, carries out major repairs to aeroplanes, mechanical transport, etc. It is a supply base for Quetta direct, and for other stations through the Aircraft Park, Lahore.
- 3. The duties of the Aircraft Park are as follows :---

The Aircraft Park erects all new aeroplanes received from England, with the exception of those mentioned in paragraph 2, carries out plane repairing and mechanical transport body building work and is the supply base for all Royal Air Force stations other than Quetta.

4. Each squadron has 12§ aeroplanes and engines (together with a reserve).

5. In view of the fact that it is more economical to repair aircraft at the Aircraft Depot, Karachi, than to replace them with new machines and engines, etc., it has been decided to increase the strength of the Depot to cope with the increased amount of repair work and provision has been made in the budget on this account. A corresponding reduction has been made in the provision for English stores. Hitherto the Royal Air Force were entirely dependent on the Meteorological Department of the Government of India. Two officers have been appointed to the Royal Air Force whose duty will be to provide the special meteorological information required by the Force.

6. In his report on the reorganisation of the Royal Air Force in India, Air Vice Marshal Sir John Salmond recommended in August 1922, the addition of 2 new Royal Air Force squadrons in India. The proposal has since been under the careful consideration of the Government of India and as a result of the present Air Officer Commanding, Royal Air Force in India's proposed reorga nisation of personnel and stores of the Royal Air Force on station basis considerable economies have been effected in the cost (both initial and recurring) of the above 2 squadrons.

The proposal has been approved by the Secretary of State for India in principle and detailed workings of the scheme have been submitted to him. Included in these reorganisation proposals is one for the substitution of Indian drivers (petrol) for British drivers (petrol) for heavy motor vehicles only: this measure will enable considerable economies to be effected.

7. The figures provide for flying 273 hours per squadron per month plus consumption at the Aircraft Park, Lahore, and Aircraft Depot, Karachi.

8. Prior to October 1927 there was only one civilian educational officer (Grade II) at the Headquarters, Royal Air Force, who obtained some assistance from the Royal Air Force officers and airmen at units. Those arrangements were not adequate as educational training forms an integral part of the training of officers and airmen. With this end in view, 3 additional civilian educational officers Grade III have been sanctioned to assist at Karachi, Peshawar and Lahore.

9. To assist the crew to escape from an aeroplane which has got completely out of control or is on fire, the Air Ministry has adopted the policy of equipping all Royal Air Force Aircraft with parachutes. To ensure the safety of pilots serving in India it has been decided to bring the Air parachutes. To ensure the safety of pilots serving in India it has been decided to bring the Air Force in India into line with other Air Force commands. Provision has for the present been made for the supply and storage of parachutes for the 2 D.H.-9 As. squadrons only. No parachute equipment suitable for fitting to Bristol Fighter squadrons is at present available.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

10. Owing to the deterioration and difficulty of access of the present bomb reserve for the Royal Air Force now stored at Butcher's Island, a scheme has been put forward to construct storage for bombs in places which are more convenient and in which deterioration is likely to be small.

11. A scheme for adding to landing grounds in India is in progress. The object is to link up eantonments and in conjunction with expected civil aviation routes to cover all important areas in India with a sufficient net work of routes to enable machines to fly over the greater part of the country.





#### EXPLANATIONS.

Up to quite recently the main functions of the Royal Indian Marine were as follows :----

- (a) Conveyance of troops and stores for the Indian Government from port to port in India (including Burma and Aden) and from India to Colonial stations and vice versa in Indian waters.
- (b) Maintenance of station ships at Rangoon, Port Blair, Aden and the Persian Gulf. The duties of station ships were of a miscellaneous nature, such as the tending of lighthouses and light-vessels and the conveyance of troops, stores, etc.
- (c) Marine survey of the coast and harbours of India and Burma, and of the Indian Oceanwithin certain boundaries.

Trooping by Reyal Indian Marine ships has been discontinued, as also the tending of lighthouses. The station ships have also been withdrawn.

2. The Royal Indian Marine is, however, being converted into a combatant service and the functions of the reorganized service, in peace time, will be as follows :---

- (a) Training of personnel for service in war.
- (b) Organization of the naval defences of Indian coasts and harbours and the protection of trade in Indian waters.
- (c) Marine survey work as at present.
- (d) Marine transport work for the Government of India, *i.e.*, all arrangements afloat for the conveyance of troops, animals and stores for Government.

3. It is expected that the reorganisation of the Royal Indian Marine will be completed during 1928-29 and the Budget has been prepared on that basis. The grant for net expenditure for the year 1928-29 is Rs. 68 43 lakhs as against Rs. 68 00 lakhs in the year 1927-28. The reasons for the increase of Rs. 43 lakh are detailed below :---

#### Explanations—contd.

4. The sanctioned Budget for 1927-28 included under head 8, a lump sum provision of Rs. 483 lakhs on account of extra expenditure anticipated to come forward on the reorganisation of the Royal Indian Marine service. Details giving the distribution by heads of the lump sum provision were given in a statement appended to the Budget Estimate for 1927-28. The detailed figures have been added to the budget grants under the respective heads in explaining below the variations in the figures for the ensuing year as compared with those of Budget, 1927-28.

5. Head 1.—Decrease of Rs. 1.49 lakhs is due to the provision for the Controlle of Marine Accounts and his establishment having been transferred to the Army Estimates partly counterbalanced by minor increases.

6. Heads 2 and 3.—The differences under these heads are due to minor fluctuations.

• 7. Head 4.—Provision under this head is on account of the establishment of the Government Dockyard, Bombay. There is a decrease of Rs. 2.25 lakhs as compared with the Budget provision for 1927-28 which is due mainly to the abolition of certain appointments and less labour charges.

8. Head 5.—Under this head there is an increase of Rs. 1.28 lakhs principally due to the grant of outfit and upkeep allowances of ratings.

9. Head 6.—There is a decrease of Rs. ·41 lakh as compared with 1927-28. The reduction has been made with reference to past actuals and the revised estimates.

10. Head 7.—The decrease under the head is Rs. 2.30 lakhs which is based on past actuals and available information.

11. Head 3.—The gross provision for 1927-28 included a lump sum provision of Rs. 4.88 lakhs for anticipated extra expenditure on account of the reorganisation of the Royal Indian Marine. Of this amount Rs. 1.50 lakhs was to be financed from the Kidderpore Dockyard Suspense Account for expenditure on reconditioning of vessels. The provision for the year 1928-29 includes an amount of Rs. 10.67 lakhs for cost of the fourth sloop to be supplied by the Admiralty and the expenditure will be financed from the Kidderpore Dockyard Suspense Account.

12. Head 9.—The provision under this head is less than the provision for 1927-28 by Rs. 1.31 lakhs. The reduction has been made with regard to past actuals and the revised estimate.

13. Head 10.—This head represents the cost of pensions, etc., to retired officers and personnel. There is an increase of Rs. :46 lakh which is due to retrenchment.

14. Receipts.—Out of the total receipts of Rs. 16.76 lakhs, the ordinary receipts amount to Rs. 6.03 lakhs and the balance, viz., Rs. 10.73 lakhs, are the receipts to be transferred from the Kidderpore Dockyard Suspense Account in respect of certain measures in connection with the reorganisation of the Royal Indian Marine to be financed from that account. The ordinary receipts have been calculated with due regard to the revised estimates for 1927-28 which provide the nearest guide in the present circumstances.

15. Revised, compared with Budget, 1927-28.—The amount of total net expenditure likely to be incurred in 1927-28 has been estimated to amount to Rs.  $65 \cdot 91$  lakhs as against the Budget grant of Rs.  $68 \cdot 00$  lakhs. The main reasons for the decrease of Rs.  $2 \cdot 09$  lakhs are detailed below :—

#### EXPLANATIONS.

The Military Engineer Services are responsible for the execution of engineer services on behalf of the Army in India, the Royal Air Force and the Royal Indian Marine, and all duties connected therewith except in certain localities where these duties are under the control of the local Public Works Department.

2. The Military Engineer Services may undertake work on behalf of any department of the Government of India or local Government, of the Cantonment Authority, of regimental and other institutions and of private persons. In certain areas, under the orders of the Government of India, the military engineer services carry out all engineer services on behalf of the Civil administration. . . . . . . · ·. ,

- 3. Engineer Services comprise :---
  - (a) Buildings and Roads.-The design, construction, inspection and maintenance of buildings, engineering structures, and the sale or demolition of buildings, etc., when so ordered.
  - (b) Electrical and Mechanical.—The design, construction, maintenance and operation of installations for the supply of electrical energy, water, or ice, and such other duties in connection with the machinery as may be ordered and the disposal of surplus machinery, etc.
  - (c) Furniture and Stores.--The supply and maintenance of furniture to buildings and the supply of engineer stores, other than those supplied by other departments; also the disposal of surplus articles.
  - (d) Miscellaneous.-The payment of purchase money or rent for land, buildings and railway sidings and the payment, when so ordered, of rates, taxes and bills for electrical energy or water obtained from municipalities, companies, etc.

4. Ordinarily, all administrative authorities (military or civil) competent to accord approval to the execution of engineer services have an engineer adviser to assist them in this duty : usually the engineer adviser belongs to the engineer service charged with the execution of work. When the Military Engineer Services or the Public Works Department carry out engineer services on behalf of any authority (Military or Civil) administrative approval to the estimated expenditure is accorded and funds allotted by the authority concerned : the Military Engineer Services or Public Works Department are then responsible for technical sanction to estimates, execution, and accounting, in accordance with the rules of their respective services.

5. As there is no Branch of the Public Works Department in the North-West Frontier Province and Baluchistan, the Military Engineer Services undertake in those localities the work for which, the Public Works Department would ordinarily be responsible.

For the administration of Military and Civil Works in the North-West Frontier Province there is a Deputy Chief Engineer who is Secretary, Public Works Department, to the Chief Commissioner of North-West Frontier Province. Similarly, the Chief Engineer, Western Command, is Secretary, Public Works Department, to the Ågent to the Governor General for Baluchistan.

6. The grant for net expenditure on Military Engineer Services for 1928-29 is Rs. 3,59.61 lakhs against Rs. 3,79.65 lakhs in 1927-28.
