### GENERAL SUMMARY OF ESTIMATES.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

The Army Department of the Government of India (in which is included the Marine Department), controls three heads of receipts and expenditure-

Head XXXVI -Army-except Military Accounts Offices which are under the contol Head XXXVII .- Marine. Head XXXVIII .- Military Engineer Services. Army is sub-divided into parts A, B and C.

Part A pertains to the Regular Forces.

Part B to the Auxiliary and Territorias Forces.

Part C to the Royal Air Force.

Part A is sub-divided into eight account heads :---

Head I.—Pay and allowances and Miscellancous Cash expenditure on the Fighting Services

Head II.--Administrative services.

Head III.---Manufacturing establishments.

Head IV .- Army Headquarters, Staff of Commands, etc.

Head V.-Purchase and sale of stores, equipment and animals.

Head VI.-Special services.

Head VII.—Transportation, conservancy, hot weather establishments and miscellaneous Head VIII.—Non-effective charges and receipts.

2. The Budget Estimates are based on the cost of the actual anticipated strength the army. The actual compiled expenditure for previous years is also used as a guide and allowance made for all reorganisations, new measures and changes in policy or equipment.

The decrease of 8,674 in 1929 as compared with 1928 is made up of (1) IO1 in Indian Officers with Viceroy's Commission 3,420 in Indian Other ranks, 892 in Civilians and followers and an increase of 33 under officers with King's Commissions and 206 under British other ranks.

#### - EXPLANATIONS.

### SUB-HEAD A .- FORCES IN INDIA PROPER AND BURMA.

#### (I)—Fighting services.

*Cleneral.*—The expenditure under this head represents the pay and allowances and miscellaneous charges of the fighting units of the various arms of the service, which form the first line of the Army in India. The number of such units is indicated on pages 28 and 29.

Item (1).---Pay of rank of regimental officers (including officers of the Army in India Reserve for the period they come up for training), command or additional pay, compensation for inferior quarters, syce and forage allowance for chargers, presidency town allowance at Calcutta, Rangoon and Bombay, local allowance at Chitral and Droch and marriage allowance are included under this head. Lodging allowance is also included for officers who are not provided with free Government quarters.

In March 1925, orders were issued revising the rates of pay of all the regular King's commissioned officers of the Army in India. The principles adopted in the revision departed considerably from previous practice and the officers' pay was based on the rates current in England. The main departure has been to distinguish between the emoluments of married and unmarried officers by the grant to the former (who are over 30 years of age) of a marriage allowance and a higher rate of lodging allowance. The result is that the pay of British officers in India now consists of the following elements:—

- (1) A basic pay of rank.
- (2) An Indian allowance.
- (3) A servant's allowance.
- (4) Free quarters or a lodging allowance in lieu."
- (5) A marriage allowance for married officers of the age of 30 and over.

The pay of Indian Army officers contains the foregoing items *plus* an Indian army allowance. Officers holding staff and departmental appointments receive consolidated rates of pay which, while including the above items, have a further element as payment for their more onerous dutics or as a compensation for the loss of prospects which departmental service entails. Officers of the Royal Engineers also receive engineer pay which is granted in all parts of the empire for their special qualifications and similarly officers of the Indian Signal Corps receive an addition of signal pay.

In addition, separation allowance has been introduced for married officers serving in stations where, under the orders of Government, their families may not accompany them. Officers who were liable to draw decreased emoluments in consequence of the pay revision, were allowed to retain their old rates of pay until promotion or change of appointment; consequently the estimates under all officers pay heads, are higher than will ultimately be the case when the full effects of the revision have materialised.

- Item (?).—Pay of British other ranks according to rank at normal rates (including proficiency pay at 6 annas per diem up to the rank of Sergeant) or tradesman's rates if employed in a technical arm of the service, messing allowance at 34 annas a day (6 annas during the winter nearths and 5 annas during the summer months in the case of those serving within the concessional area in Waziristan), extra duty pay, marriage and furniture allowances are included under this head. The recoveries in India of compulsory allotments paid in England as well as of deductions made in the pay of British soldiers under the Contributory Pensions rules are recorded here.

Reduced rates of pay for British soldiers enlisted or re-enlisted after 26th October 1925 have been introduced in England and have been applied to India. The savings on this account have been calculated to amount to over Rs. one crore after seven years.

to trained surveyors personal allowance of Rs. 50 per mensem to Indian officers, local allowance at Chitral and Drosh and allowance of annas 10 per mensem to supplement purchase of rationarticles are included under this head. Rs. 4 per mensem during winter months and Rs. 1-8-0 per mensem during the summer is paid, in lieu of 10 annas per mensem, to Indian officers, Indian other ranks, and religious teachers employed in the concessional area in Waziristan.

*Item (5).*—Includes pay and tradesman's rates of pay to enrolled followers and nerrick or local rates to unenrolled followers (including victualling establishments) and a ration allowance of annas 4 per diem.

Items (6) and (7'.--When individuals entitled to free rations cannot be supplied with them money allowances in lieu are granted. They are mainly drawn when travelling by rail.

*Item (8).*—This allowance is granted monthly to British other ranks to meet the cost of upkeep and renewal of personal clothing and necessaries. The rates *per capita* are Rs. 112.8-0 and Rs. 111 per annum in the case of mounted and dismounted soldiers respectively. The *per capita* rate of clothing allowance in the case of armoured car units, motor cyclists, etc., is Rs. 108 per annum.

Item (9).—Besides the grant of clothing allowance for the upkeep, etc., of personal clothing and necessaries to Indian officers and Indian other ranks, compensation paid to Indian Army reservists on transfer to the reserve for the value of clothing taken over by Government is also included under this head. The rates for mounted and dismounted Indian officers are Rs. 45-6-0 per annum and Rs. 42-5-0 per annum respectively. In the case of Indian other ranks the rates for mounted and dismounted men are Rs. 48-8-0 and Rs. 40-8-0 per annum respectively. In the case of enrolled followers the rate is Rs. 24-12-0 per annum.

Item (10).—Includes allowance to officers, messes, band allowance, weapon training allowance (which includes musketry prize money, upkeep of butts and targets, upkeep of bayonet fighting equipment, upkeep of riding schools and jumps) stringing allowance for charpoys, outfit allowance to officers, stationery allowance at varying rates, horses and mules line contingent allowance and cost of maintenance and replacement of typewriters. Also includes prizes for lance and sword practice, skill in driving, etc.

Item (11).—This comprises among other items, cost of official postage, telegrams, rewards to recruiters, expenditure incurred regimentally on account of rail fares of reservists and subsistence allowance to recruits, dentistry charges such as the provision of artificial teeth, supply of water from other than military sources such as municipalities, etc.

Item (12).—Deferred pay to British non-commissioned officers and men enlisted beforelst April 1898 and gratuities to British non-commissioned officers and men enlisted after 31st March 1898 are included here.

Item (13).—A lump sum payment is made to Indian non-commissioned officers and men on discharge calculated at Rs. 2 for each month of service. This is additional to pension of gratuity earned by total service.

Item (14).—Cost of repairs to army signalling stores and purchase of petty articles, charges connected with the repair of kit bags, etc., and charges on account of the manufacture and repair of section boxes for small arms ammunition are charged to this head.

Item (15).—Cost of instructional stores of signal companies and equipment of engineer units consumed, repaired and replaced and of stores used in the sappers and miners park and for field practice, is compiled under this head.

#### EXPLANATIONS -- conid.

2. The following changes in the organisation of the Army in India have been considered in Budget, 1929-30 :---

- Mechanisation of the 1st Field Brigade and the 2nd Divisional Ammunition Column resulting in an addition of 27 British other ranks and a reduction of 373 Indian officers and other ranks and 274 followers and 1,075 animals.
- Reorganisation of the Field Brigade Ammunition Column on a horsed basis involving a reduction of 18 British other ranks, 106 Indian officers and other ranks, 44 followers and 138 animals.
- Abolition of Royal Horse Artillery Brigade Headquarters involving a reduction of 3 British officers, 4 British other ranks, 1 follower and 2 animals.
- Reduction in the Honorary king's commissioned officers to a permanent strength of 10 Captains and 50 Lieutenants.
- Addition of 4 mechanical transport instructors in Medium Brigade, Royal Artillery.
- Increase in the establishment of the Indian Signal Corps by 447 Indian other ranks and 18 followers due to reorganisation.
- Abolition of victualling agents in British units.
- Reorganisation of Indian Pioneer battalions involving in a reduction of 32 British officers, 2,267 Indian officers and other ranks and 142 followers.
- Increase in the establishment of British officers employed with Sappers and Miners by 18.
- Reorganisation of Indian Infantry battalions (Active and Training) involving an addition of 100 Indian officers and a reduction of 2,488 other ranks and 400 followers.

Minor Head (a).—Inspector of Physical Training and Command Physical Training Staffs.— The Inspecting Staff consists of an Inspector, attached to Army Headquarters, and 3 Superin-tendents with Command Headquarters. Their duty is to organize and supervise the physical training of the Army. Budget, 1929-30 is less than Budget 1928-29 by Rs. •01 lakh due to reduction in pay and

allowances of British Soldiers due to fluctuations in rates.

Minor Head (b).—The Army School of Physical Training at Ambala (at Kasauli during summer) corresponds to the Army School of Physical Training, Aldershot (England). Its object is chiefly to maintain unity, continuity and progress in physical training, and to train instructors in physical training and its correlated subjects. The annual out-turn of students at present is British officers 59, British other ranks 155, Indian Officers 44 and Indian other ranks 378. - The Ahmednagar Wing, which corresponds to the Netheravon Wing, trains officers, warrant officers, and Non Commissioned Officers as instructors in the Vickers gun.
- The annual outturn of students is British Officers 150, British other ranks 74, Indian Officers and Non Commissioned Officers 218.
- The Small Arms School also conducts local courses in Commands and carries out such trials and tests with weapons and ammunition as may be required by Army Headquarters.

The reduction of Rs. 04 lakh in Budget, 1929-30 as compared with Budget, 1928-29 is due chiefly to less provision made under pay and allowances of officers, due to fluctuations in rates partly counterbalanced by increase on account of cost of new measures (11 lakh.)

The objects of the school are to disseminate and inculcate sound tactical principles as laid down in the official training manuals, to give senoir officers of all arms an opportunity of interchanging ideas as to the most approved and up to date methods in all matters connected with the training and administration of units, to give higher tactical training to senior regimental officers and to report on officers as regards their ability to conduct the training and administration of a battalion or equivalent unit. The annual outturn of the students is 72 British Officers.

Budget, 1929-30 compared with Budget, 1928-29. The decrease of Rs. •02 lakh occursmainly under pay and allowances of officers with King's Commission.

Minor Head (g).— The School of Artillery, India, corresponds to the School of Artillery Larkhill (England). It instructs artillery officers and non-commissioned officers in practical gunnery and practical care of equipment and trains them as instructors; carries out experimentsconnected with gunnery problems, equipment, ammunition, etc., peculiar to India, and provides gunnery staff for the various artillery practice camps held in India. The decrease in Budget, 1929-30 of Rs.  $\cdot$  36 lakh as compared with Budget, 1928-29 is due to exclusion of pay of Assistant Commandant, which appointment will remain vacant (Rs.  $\cdot$  16 lakh), cut on account of probable savings (Rs.  $\cdot$  11 lakh) and exclusion of pay charges of the Head Master who will proceed on leave (Rs.  $\cdot$  09 lakh).

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (a)-Supply Companies and Supply Depots.—The system for the provision -and maintenance of articles of Indian Army Service Corps supply (viz., food stuffs of all kinds for men and animals, petrol and lubricants) differs slightly in the Cis-Indus and the Trans-Indus Areas.

In the Cis-Indus Area.—There is a District Supply Company or Independent Brigade Supply Company in each Military District or Independent Brigade. The functions of these Sup-ply Companies are to maintain Supply Depots and Sub-Depots and to receive and check indents from units and carry out the necessary supply.

In the Trans-Indus Area.—There are also District Supply Companies which carry out the duties mentioned above except those of maintaining Supply Depots and Sub-depots. Owing to the necessity for maintaining large Depots in these areas and to provide for mobilisation reourse because of the because of the second s of indents from District Supply Companies.

2. In addition to their other duties, District Supply Companies maintain Bakeries and Butcheries at the various stations within their districts.

Government bakeries bake all bread required for the army, approximately 24 million loaves of bread annually.

3. There are only three Government butchery sections (at Razmak), where animals are slaughtered under departmental arrangements. At all other military stations, meat is supplied locally by contractors to the army butcheries.

Minor Head (c)—Animal Transport.—The Animal Transport consists of 32 Muleunits and 8 Camel units. In addition, there are detachments in Gilgit, and three transport depots. The latter train remount mules required for the maintenance of transport units in peace and war and are also responsible for the training of reservists.

Of the 40 mule and camel transport units, 13 are in cadre capable of expansion on mobilisation.

2. The location of these transport units at various stations in India is designed to keep theexpenditure on hired transport as low as possible. With this object in view, Army Transport, carts have also been issued to such regimental units as have animals forming part of their peaceestablishments. These carts are used for regimental and station transport work.

3. Budget, 1929-30 is less than Budget, 1928-29 by Rs. 6.28 lakhs, which is mainly due to :----

- (i) 8 Mechanical Transport Companies equipped with 3-ton six-wheeled, and 30-cwt. four-wheeled lorries (consisting of 8 headquarters, 13 higher establishment, 5 lower establishment and 10 cadre sections).
- (ii) 6 Mechanical Transport Companies for Motor Ambulance Convoys (consisting of 6 headquarters, 1 higher establishment and 11 lower establishment sections).
- (iii) 4 Mechanical Transport Companies (Mobile Repair Units).
- (iv) 1 Light Mechanical Transport Section in Waziristan equipped with 30-cwt.-sixwheeled lorries.
- (v) Mechanical Transport Depot.
- (vi) Mechanical Transport Workshops.
- (vii) Central Mechanical Transport Stores Depot, with necessary inspecting and administrative staff.

2. The Mobile Repair Units do minor repairs of all vehicles dependent on them including staff cars, and motor vehicles belonging to Fighting Units, e.g., Signals and Sappers and Miners. There are Mechanical Transport Workshops for major repairs, including complete overhauls, at Bombay, Chaklala, Peshawar and Quetta, each competent to deal with all the work arising in its sector in peace time. The workshops at Chaklala and Peshawar also train Indian artificers by the employment of apprentices. There is also a small workshop at Bannu.

the employment of apprentices. There is also a small workshop at Bannu. 3. The training of M. T. drivers is carried out at the Mechanical Transport Depot at Chaklala where about 1,000 drivers will be trained every year. The Mechanical Transport Depot also trains British officers and other ranks in "road" duties.

4. The Mechanical Transport units employed in Waziristan are fully employed owing to the abnormal conditions in that area. The use of other higher or lower establishment sections is restricted and cadre sections are chiefly used for the training of driver reservists and are intended for use on mobilization.

5. The issue of petrol and lubricants is regulated by fixed scales based on mileage.

6. Budget, 1929-30 is less than Budget, 1928-29 by Rs. 1.63 lakhs due mainly to omission of pay charges of the leave reserve of officers who will be paid in the United Kingdom, the reduction in the number of British other ranks and other measures of reorganization of the M. T. units in India. (3.00 lakhs) partly counterbalanced by increase on account of cost of new measures (1.37 lakhs).

#### EXPLANATIONS.

### Sub Head (c).-Remound Depots and Breeding Operations :--

The Army Remount Department is responsible for the supply of all classes of animals to the Army in India. Animals other than a very few horses and certain types of mules are purchased India and supplied direct to units.

2. The Army Remount Department maintains 351 horse and 236 donkey stallions in orde to encourage the breeding in India by private breeders of horses and mules suitable for the Army There are five breeding areas with Headquarters at Rawalpindi, Sargodha, Lyallpore and Mont comery (Punjab) and Meerut (U. P.), and two breeding studs, viz., one at Mora (Funjab) for the preduction of donkey stallions and one at Ahmednagar (Deccan) for the breeding of horse stallions

3. Mules, camels and bullocks according to requirements and about fifty full grown country bred horses and fifty arabs are purchased yearly in India. In addition, a large number of young stock horses and mules are purchased and reared in the young stock deopts at Mona and Sargodha (Punjab) for issue to the Army when full grown. The authorised establishment in animals of these depots is 3,335 young stock horses, 2,700 young stock mules and 400 full grown mules.

4. As the full requirements of the Army in India (about 3,000 horses and 2,500 mules) cannot be met from the above source, about 2,400 horses, 150 Light Draught and 300 Mountain Artillery mules are imported from overseas.

5. There are three Australian remount depots, viz., at Ahmednagar (Decran), Babugarh and Saharanpur (U. P.) where imported horses are acclimatised for about nine months before issue to the service. The authorised complement in animals of these depots is 2,361 Australian horses and 260 country-bred horses (of which about 300 horses are boarded out to private individuals and 142 horses are maintained at the Equitation School, Saugor-these 442 horses form part of the War Reserve) and 100 young stock mules.

6. In addition to horses and mules, the Army Remount Department also maintains 1,564 Bullooks for farming operations and hackery work.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (a)—Veterinary Hospitals.—The Indian Army Veterinary Corps is responsible for the welfare of the animals of the Army, including those of Remount Depots, about 80,000 in number, and for the promotion of efficiency by preventing and reducing wastage amongst them. The organisation consists of 30 veterinary hospitals, class I, 18 veterinary hospitals, class II, 24 Branch veterinary hospitals, 9 sick lines and 12 India Army Veterinary Corps Sections of personnel posted to veterinary hospitals during peace and forming o cadre for expansion on mobilization to provide technical personnel for all veterinary units. All cases of sickness, with the exception of very minor ones, are treated in the veterinary hospitals by trained veterinary personnel under the expert supervision of veterinary officers. The percentage of animals treated in veterinary hospitals is  $2\cdot 5$  in the case of horses,  $1\cdot 5$  in the case of ponies and mules, 3 in the case of camels and 1 in the case of bullocks.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

### Minor Head (a) - Arsenals, Ordnance Depots and Clothing Depots-

Arsenals and Ordnance Depots.—There are at present 7 arsenals at Rawalpindi, Ferozepore, Kirkee, Quetta, Madras, Mingaladon (Burma) and Allahabad and 6 ordnance depots at Fort William, Bombay, Agra, Drigh Road (Karachi), Lahore and Cawnpore, under the executive control of the Chief Ordnance Officers or Ordnance Officers in Charge. They are administered by the Director of Equipment and Ordnance Stores, under the Quartermaster General. The functions of the organisation are the receipt, storage, repair and issue to troops, in their respective areas, of all equipment and ordnance stores, including barrack, hospital and miscellaneous equipment, also the maintenance of war and mobilization reserves. The arsenals at Kirkee and Mingaladon and the ordnance depots at Drigh Road and Lahore also stock clothing storee for supply to troops in their respective areas. The arsenals at Rawalpindi also undertakes the receipt, washing, repair and issue of all extra issue winter clothing required by troops in the Northern Command. Equipment and stores stocked in arsenals and ordnance depots are obtained from ordnance factorics in India, by purchase in England and by purchase in India through the agency of the Master General of Supply. The Ordnance Depot, Cawnpore, is principally charged with the duty of supplying articles of footgear, which are purchased by the Master General of Supply by contract from local firms. Workshops are attached to arsenals and certain Ordnance Depots where minor repairs to stores and petty manufacture are carried out.

2. Clothing Depots.—There are 3 Clothing Depots at Quetta, Shahjahanpore and Madras. These depots are under the control of Chief Ordnance Officers acting under the Director of Equipment and Ordnance Stores, and the Quartermaster General. They are maintained for retailing clothing and footgear to troops in their respective areas and for maintaining working stocks. They also hold war and mobilization reserves. Stores stocked in the clothing depots are obtained from the Army Clothing Factories in India, the Ordnance Depot, Cawapore, and by purchase at home, through the agency of the Master General of Supply.

3. The provision under this head is exclusive of the cost of the I. A. O. C. establishment employed at Army Headquarters and at Command and District Headquarters which amounts to to Rs. 4,16,220 and Rs. 3,04,060 and is provided under Head IV A(f) Quartermaster General's Branch and Head IV B and C.—Command and District Headquarters respectively.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Sub-flead F. Medical Colleges and Schools.—The provision represents the cost of educating and training military medical students in the Medical Colleges at Calcutta and Madras and in the Medical Schools at Royapuram (Madras), Agra and Amritsar before appointment as Military Assistant Surgeons or Sub-Assistant Surgeons. They are primarily recruited for military duty, but a portion is employed in the Civil Department and is liable to be recalled to Military duty in case of emergency.

Sub-Head 11-G.—Central Disposals Organization.— The Central Disposals Organisation was formed in July 1926 partly at Army Headquarters and partly at Dum Dum near Calcutta to control and arrange for the utilization where possible, and otherwise, the disposal of waste material such as expended ammunition, part worn or worn tools, arms and other equipment, manufacture waste, obsolete stores and material and those surplus to the requirements of the Army in India. The experience of the past two years has shown that the Dump at Dum Dum was not a success and the Government of India, therefore, decided that the organisation should be relieved of the duties of storage and its activities should be confined to disposal. In pursuance of this decision the central dunping station located in the vacant buildings of the late Ammunition Factory, Dum Dum has been closed and an augmentation of staff for the Headquarters Organisation has been sanctioned.

The Central Disposals Organisation now consists of :---

(1) Headquarters Organisation (2) a dumping station at Megalpura for storage of surplus clothing and is controlled by the Director of Contracts under the Master General of Supply.

The Headquarters Organization is responsible for :---

- (a) Collecting and correlating information relative to all excess stock and normal wastes and surplus available in arsenals and depots, ordnance and clothing factories, and other army formations which accumulate large surpluses.
- (b) Investigating the possibility of such stores and materials being utilised by other Government Departments, civil or military.
- (\*) Advising or directing sales at the establishments concerned or at other places as may be most advantageous.

4. The functions of the Dump at Mughalpura are :---

- (a) to receive and bring on charge all clothing stores sent in from arsenals and other establishments :
- (b) to keep proper custody of these stocks ;
- (c) to sort by condition and keep Headquarters informed of the quantities received ;
- (4) to pack and despatch stores from stocks as directed by Headquarters.

5. The decrease of Rs. 2.08 lakhs in Budget, 1929-30 as compared with Budget, 1928-29 is chiefly due to the closing of Disposals Dump, at Dum Dum and transfer of certain staff to Headquarters organisation, provision for which has been made separately under Head IV. -

#### EXPLANATIONS.

The Medical Services are organised mainly into (I) British Military Hospitals, (II) Indian Military Hospitals and (III) Indian Hospital Corps. The British Military Hospitals are entrusted with the medical and sanitary care of all British officers, British other ranks and their families (including children), while the Indian Military Hospitals are generally responsible for the treat-ment, etc., of Indian officers, Indian other ranks and all classes of followers whose pay and allowances are paid from the Military Estimates. In order to effect economy it has been arranged at certain stations that Indian Military hospitals should have small British Sections attached to them and vice versa instead of having two complete hospitals at the same station. The Indian Hospital Corps is organised in connection with the maintenance, training and upkeep of the records of the Indian Hospital Corps personnel employed in hospitals for British and Indian troops and their families and in field medical units when mobilised. The Corps is at present divided "into 9 compa-nies, which are located at Peshawar, Rawalpindi, Lahore, Quetta, Poona, Secunderabad, Meerut, Rangoon and Lucknow. The reorganization of this Corps on a 5-company basis is under consideration. The hospitals are classified according to the strength of the garrison at each consideration. The nonspitals are classified according to the strength of the garmon at each station. At present there are 24 hospitals first class, 21 second class, 51 third class, 37 fourth class and 27 fifth class, which are open throughout the year except at certain hill stations, where they are only open for a portion of the year varying between 6 and 8 months. The percentages of sick treated in these hospitals are roughly 3.5 per cent. of the establishment in the case of British troops, 2 per cent. in the case of Indian troops and 1 per cent. in the case of followers. The staff and establishments maintained for this purpose including those employed at the headquarters of the J. H. C. Companies are 252 Royal Army Medical Corps officers, 344 Indian Medical Service officers, 23 Dental officers, 419 R. A. M. C. other ranks, 46 Army Dental Corps other ranks 278 nurses, 41 matrons, 336 assistant surgeons, 683 sub-assistant surgeons, 9,048 Indian Hospital Corps personnel and 3,100 reservists. In addition 203 M.T. drivers for running the motor ambulances and other miscelaneous establish-ments (e.g., ayahs, female sweepers, X-Ray mechanics, etc.) are also maintained.

For purposes of administrative convenience, the provision for all I. H. C. personnel has been made under the minor head (\*) irrespective of whether they are actually employed with the hospitals or not, and the provision for No. 31 Coy., R. A. M. C. has been made under minor head (a) as that Company caters for British military hospitals only.

Minor Head (d).—The military food laboratory advises the Director of Contracts whether the samples of foodstuffs tendered to him are of suitable quality, tests supplies by comparison with the samples and assists by expert advice in regulating the turnover of stocks and reserves

#### Explanations.

The Military Accounts Department in its superior personnel is at present composed of a eadre of 59 officers including Military Officers, borne on the supernumerary list, European Civilians and Indian Civilians, latest and future recruitments being confined almost entirely to the last mentioned class.

- 2. The present organisation is as follows :---
  - (1) At the head of the Department, there is a Military Accountant General whose functions are :--
    - (i) To administer the department, under the control of the Financial Adviser, Military Finance.
  - (ii) To organise the arrangements for the disbursement of pay to officers and men of the Army.
  - (iii) To maintain a record of military expenditure and receipts in such a form as will be of the greatest help to the military and financial authorities.
  - (iv) To examine all general questions of accounting and audit.
  - (v) To deal with all work connected with India's claims against His Majesty's Government in respect of Indian troops employed overseas and of Stores Supplied to overseas garrisons; as well as all work connected with claims from His Majesty's Government arising out of the employmet of British troops in India, etc.
  - (vi) To deal with all questions connected with (including disbursement of) the pay and allowances of the staff employed at Army Headquarters.
  - (vii) To control the work relating to the audit of the Army List and to conduct scale audit of the establishments of the various Departments of the Army.
- (viii) To inspect every year, either personally or by a Deputy, one or more of the Command and District Controllers' offices and of those of the Controllers of Army Factory, Royal Air Force and Royal Indian Marine Accounts.
- (2) At the Headquarters of each of the 4 Army Commanda, there is a Command Controller. In accordance with the scheme for centralisation as far as possible of audit in Commands, which has been approved by the Government of India, the offices of certain Controllers of Districts and Independent Brigades have been amalgamated with their respective Command Controllers' offices. The Command Controllers in charge of the amalgamated offices are Financial Advisers to the General Officers Commanding in-Chief of the Commands, as well as to the General Officers Commanding the Districts or Independent Brigades comprised in the amalgamation. The Command Controllers are, in addition, the chief authority for accounts and for internal audit in the respective commands and they also assist the General Officers Commanding offices of which are amalgamated with the command offices in the preparation of all estimates and furniah them regularly with such statistics relating to accounts as they may require for controlling expenditure against grants placed at their disposal. The following list shows the Command Controllers and the Districts and Brigades for the accounts of which they are responsible, under the amalgamation scheme referred to above :—

Command Controllers.

Districts and Brigades dealt with in each Command office.

Controller of Military Accounts, Northern Rawalpindi, Kohat and Waziristan Districts. Command.

Controller of Military Accounts, Southern Deccan, Bombay and Central Provinces Districts Command, And Poona Independent Brigade.

Controller of Military Accounts, Eastern Meerut and Lucknow Districts and Delhi Brigade.

Controller of Military Accounts, Western Baluchistan District, Sind Independent Brigade area Command. and Zhob Area.

(3) There is a Controller of Military Accounts for each of the other Military District (mit., Peshawar, Lahore, Presidency and Assam, Madras and Burma Districts) The Controller of the Presidency and Assam District also deals with railway charges and with the accounts of passage and service funds. The Controller of the Lahore-District has a Branch office at Simla for dealing with the purchases made by the Director of Contracta,

- (4) There are two military pension accounts offices—one at Lahore and the other at Mhow. The Controller of Military Pension Accounts at Lahore deals with the payment, audit and adjustment of all claims to pensions in the Northern and Eastern Commands and the Controller of Military Pension Accounts at Mhow deals with the payment, audit and adjustment of the pension claims in the Southern and Western Commands. The pension claims arising in Burma District are dealt with by the Controller of Military Accounts of that District.
- (5) There are separate Controllers for Army Factory Accounts, Royal Air Force Accounts and Marine Accounts. The first named officer deals with the accounts (including the cost accounts) of Army Ordnance Factories and of Clothing Factories and Depots, which also undertake the manufacture of clothing for troops, and is the financial adviser of the administrative authorities concerned. He has a central office at Calcutta with subordinate offices at each of the factories.

3. The cardinal principles of the existing system of accounts are :---

- (a) The concentration of the issue of funds at certain central stations (viz., the offices of the various Controllers).
- (b) The local preparation of pay accounts, and of priced store accounts of supplying formations, etc., by accountants and clerks of the Military Accounts Department attached to the units, formations, etc.
- (c) The maintenance of proper accounts of manufacture at all manufacturing establishments by accountants and clerks of the Military Accounts Department.
  - (d) The audit of store accounts by a system of local audit which includes a continuous verification of stock.

4. The sanctioned Budget for 1928-29 for Head II-I Military Accounts offices (after allowing for a lump cut of Rs. 3 lakhs) was fixed at Rs. 103°41 lakhs and the Revised Estimate for that year amounted to Rs. 105°41 lakhs.

5. The Budget Estimate for 1929-30 has been fixed at Rs. 105.55 lakhs against the original Budget Estimate for 1928-29 (viz., Rs. 103.41) lakhs and the Revised Estimate for 1928-29 (viz., Rs. 105.41 lakhs) referred to above.

6. The causes for the variations between the figures of the sanctioned Budget Estimate for 1928-29 and the Budget Estimate for 1929-30 under the Several minor heads of Head 11-1 are explained below:--

#### Explanations.

Sub-Head K.—Administration of Cantonments.—The municipal administration of cantonments in India is carried out under the provisions of the Cantonments Act, 1924, by officers of the Cantonments Department who are paid from Army Estimates. In cantonments of small municipal importance, military officers are appointed as Executive Officers, in addition to their ordinary military duties and are paid an allowance from Cantonment Funds. In a number of cantonments, however, arrangements have now been made for replacing these military officers by officers of the Cantonments Department, most of whom will in future have charge of more than one cantonment. The inspectorial staff included in the Cantonments Department consists of one Director of Military Lands and Cantonments at the Headquarters of Government and 3 Inspecting officers at the Headquarters of the Northern, Southern and Eastern Commands.

Cantonments which cannot maintain a suitable standard of municipal administration on the basis of income derived from local sources receive a grant-in-aid from the Army Estimates.

The Officers of the Cantonments Department have also been entrusted with the duty of managing Government lands in accordance with the provisions of the Land Administration Rules. No extra payment is made for this.

Budget, 1929-30 compared with Budget, 1928-29 Minor Head (a).—The increase is due to the temporary employment of 3 additional special Lands Officers for completion of the Military Lands Register in the Southern Command (31 lakh) and cost of new measures. (14 lakh).

Minor head (b).—The increase is due to the grouping of cantonments under whole-time Exeoutive officers necessitating the employment of Assistant Secretaries paid from cantonment funds and to the transfer of certain B. class lands to the management of the Military Estates Officers.

Minor head (c).—The increase of Rs. '14 lakh in Budget, 1929-30 as compared with Budget, 1928-29 is chiefly due to cost of new measures ('11 lakh) and other minor variations (net) ('03 lakh).

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head—(b) Inspectors of lethal weapons and General Stores.—There are three Inspection charges at Ishapore, Kirkee and Jubbulpore, a Proof and Experimental Establishment at Balasore and a Chemical Inspectorate at Kirkee. The functions of these, except the last, are to inspect lethal weapons, ammunition and connected equipment manufactured by the Ordnance Factories, before their issue to the Arsenals. The Chemical Inspector maintains such records as are required in connection with the history of the explosives stored in Arsenals or in the hands of troops, scrutinises reports of Inspecting Ordnance Officers engaged in the inspection of such explosives and when necessary carries out tests of samples of cordite and other explosives stored at various places. He also analyses such samples of oil, paints, chemical, etc., purchased for the Army as may be sent to him for examination, and acts as adviser to the Director of Artillery on all questions relating to chemical and physical subjects. In addition there is a Chief Inspecting of Stores and Clothing at Cawnpore. The functions of this officer are to inspect all non-lethal general stores, including bedding (blankets), barrack and hospital equipment, boots and clothing before they are accepted by the arsenals, depots, etc. Inspection of "General Stores" and "Clothing" has been concentrated at the six centres, four for the former, viz, Cawnpore, Rawalpindi, Calcutta and Bombay and 2 for the latter, Shahjahanpore and Madras. In addition provision also exists for the inspection of repairs to small arms carried out by arsenals through Assistant Examiner of Small Arms stationed at arsenals. The work of inspection of machine guns, etc., in the hands of regular troops and Indian State Force units is done by Chief Civil Master Armour ers. The whole organisation is administered by the Director of Artillery under the Master General of Supply.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

(a) Governor General's Band.—Governor General's Band is maintained for Viceregal functions and entertainments and consists of 1 Director of Music, I Regimental sergeant major and 25 sergeants.

The reduction in Budget, 1929-30 of Rs. 02 lakh, as compared with Budget, 1928-29 is due to shortage of establishments.

(b) Recruiting Staff.—Provision for staff and establishments required to control the recruitment of enlisted and enrolled men (including followers) for all branches of the military service is made here. The organisation consists at present of 9 recruiting officers and 14 Assistant Recruiting officers (unseconded) for the whole year and 3 Assistant Recruiting Officers for a period of approximately 6 months only at the various recruiting centres, (viz., Peshawar, Rawalpindi-Lahore, Jullundur, Delhi, Ajmere Gorakpur, Poona, Ghoom and Burma) and 103 Indian permanent recruiters. The clerical staff consists of 37 men.

2. As the overseas garrisons have been withdrawn no percentage of total cost is recoverable from His Majesty's Government. The share of the Imperial Government's liability during 1928-29 was 1 per cent.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Minor Head (c).—Hill Sanitaria and Depóts.—This head represents the cost of sanitaria and hill depôts for British troops which are maintained for the accommodation of convalescents, families, etc. As a measure tending towards increased efficiency, and eventual economy, a bulk allotment of funds is placed annually at the disposal of the General Officers Commanding in-Chief to meet the expenditure connected with the administration of these depôts and such roadside camps, rest camps, etc., as are opened specially to meet the requirements of the sanitaria, with full powers to vary the establishments to suit local conditions to open sanitaria at places where they were not previously authorised and to extend or shorten the period for which they are normally open. The experiment has only been in vogue for three years, but it has already shown that, by giving General Officers Commanding-in-Chief personal control over their expenditure, large savings may accrue.

The reduction of Rs. 34 lakh in Budget, 1929-30 as compared with Budget, 1928-29 is due partly to the transfer of one appointment of Q. M. S. to J. A. S. C. (03 lakh) and partly to economy exercised as a result of decentralisation (31 lakh).

Minor head—(d)— Military Prisons and Detention Barracks.—Detention Barracks have been cstablished at Lucknow, Sialkot, Trimulgherry and Quetta for the reception of British soldiers who have been sentenced to detention either by Courts Martial, or in some cases, by their commanding officers. The Barracks at Lucknow include a military prison for the reception of soldiers convicted of serious offences. These establishments are administered by the Director who is directly under the control of the Adjutant General in India. The present permanent establishments employed in these barracks is I officer and 36 British warrant and non-commissioned officers.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Sub-Head M.--(f)-Anti-malarial Measures.--Under this minor head is included recurring expenditure on account of mosquito traps, maintenance of permanent drainage and other miscellancous charges (.g., cooly hire). The provision for new works (drainage) has been made under M. E. S. The provision for the expenditure during 1928-29 was made under head VII.

Sub Head M.—(g)—Vocational Training is intended for training of selected men about to return to civil life as craftsmen in the less highly specialised trades.

Sub-Head  $M_{--}(h)$ —Miscellaneous.—Under this item is included inter alia, fixed annual grante made to various institutions such as, Central Library at Anny Headquarters, Pasteur Institutes at Kasauli, Ootacamund and Burma, Walker Hospital, Simla, United Service Institution of India, etc.

The reduction of Rs. 05 lakh in Budget, 1929-30 as compared with Budget, 1928-29 is due to smaller payments on account of subsistence and charitable allowances.

Fub Head N.—Miscellaneous services under control of the Chief of the General Staff.—The provision against item (b) represents the estimated cost payable by the Army Department for the special Military frontier survey section. Telegraphic and telephonic communications on the North-West Frontier previously controlled by the Army have been transferred to the Posts and Telegraphs Department, and a proportion of the calculated recurring cost is paid from Army Estimates. This was provided against item (c), in 1927-28 and from 1928-29 under Head VII C.

Budget, 1929-30 is less than Budget, 1928-29 by Rs. 2.99 lakhs which is due to smaller provision on account of special emergency grant as the increased provision in 1928-29 was made to meet certain abnormal expenditure (Rs. 18:00 Takhs) part/y counterbalanced by increase on account of provision for Special measures (15:00 Takhs) and other minor causes (--01 Takh).

#### EXPLANATIONS.

111. A.—Medical Store Depots and Workshops.—The authority at Headquarters responsible for control of expenditure under this Sub-Head is the Director-General, Indian Medical Service, The Director-General, Indian Medical Service, in conjunction with the Director, Medical Services in India and the Quartermaster General in India, is responsible to the Government of India in the Army Department for the supply of Medical equipment and stores to the Army in India both im peace and war time. The equipment and stores required are obtained :—

- (i) by importation through the High Commissioner for India.
- (ii) from other Government Departments.
- (iii) by purchase from private firms and contractors in India, and
- (iv) by manufacture at the Medical Store Depots, Madras and Bombay.

2. For storage and supply of this equipment and stores there are five Government Medical-Store Depots in India and Burma. They are located at Madras, Bombay, Lahore Cantonment, Calcutta and Rangoon. The Medical Store Depots, Madras and Bombay have workshops attached to them and manufacture pharmaceutical preparations on a large scale. The Medical Store Depot, Bombay stocks also dental equipment for supply to Army dentists throughout India and Burma.

3. The supply on payment of medical stores to Government (including Royal Air Force, Royal Indian Marine and Military Engineer Services) and Covernment aided Civil institutions (both medical and veterinary) is also arranged for by these five Medical Store Depots. They further undertake the repair of surgical instruments both for military and civil Government institutions.

4. Budget 1929-30 is less than the Budget, 1928-29 by Rs. 95 lakh. The following are the chief causes of variation :---

#### Explanations.

#### III. C.—Ordnance and Clothing Factories.—

1. Ordnance Factories.—There are seven Ordnance Factories, with a Superintendent over each, controlled by the Director of Ordnance Factories and Manufacture under the Master General of Supply. They were formed with the object of supplying guns, rifles and connected equipment to troops, and are organised in peace in such a way that they may be ready for expansion in war. The detailed functions of each Factory are given below :—

- Metal and Steel Factory, Ishapore.—Production of steel for guns and shell, of metal for Q. F. and small arms ammunition, fuzes, etc., of steel bars and rods; of shell forgings; and of Q. F. cartridge cases.
- (2) Gun and Shell Factory, Cossipore.—Production of guns up to 18 pdr., howitzers up to 4.5", and their components; and machining of shells, fuzes, primers and miscellaneous stores.
- (3) Rifle Factory, Ishapore.—Production of rifles and their components and of sword bayonets, and repair of machine guns and manufacture of machine gun components required for the purpose.
- required for the purpose. (4) Ammunition Factory, Kirkee.—Production of small arms and pistol ammunition and filling of shell, fuzes and primers.
- (5) Gun Carriage Factory, Jubbulpore.—Manufacture of artillery carriages and vehicles, general service wagons, transport carts and various miscellaneous articles; also supplies seasoned hard wood timber requirements of the Army except the Milltary Engineer Services.
- (6) Harness and Saidlery Factory, Campore.—Manufacture of harness, saddlery, accoutrements and leather of various sorts.
  - (7) Cordite Factory, Aruvankadu.-Production of cordite and gun cotton.

2. Clothing Factories.—There are two Army Clothing Factories at Shahjahanpur and Madras with a Chief Ordnance Officer and Assistant Works Manager at the head, respectively. They are a iministere 1 by the Director of Ordnance Factories and Manufacture under the Master General of Supply. The functions of the Army Clothing Factories are to manufacture garments required by British and I a lian troops and followers. Materials for manufacture of garments are obtained from England or are purchased in India. Textiles are purchased in India mostly through the Indian Stores Department under the Department of Industries and Labour. The major portion of the manufacture of garments is done at Shahjahanpur. The Madras Factory is essentially a contract tailoring factory. Requirements in excess of the outturn of the 2 factories are obtained through contractors. The factories have recently been reorganized and brought into line with the Ordnance Factories. The budget heads for clothing and ordnance factories are amalgamated.

3. All the factories mentioned above are run and cost-accounted on commercial lines, *i.e.*, the cost of any store produced is arrived at by allocating to it the actual cost of labour and materials used in its production *plus* an appropriate share of all indirect expenditure. The value of services rendered, and stores supplied, by other formations and departments to the factories, free of cost, is also taken into account in the production cost. When the total value of orders placed on factories at production rates which are standardised into P. V. S. rates exceeds the normal economic load of factories, the cost accounts indicate a certain amount of profit. The cash provision is, however, made in the factories budget on the basis of the cash actually required to meet the standing charges and the cost of labour and material required for production. Thus the whole of the expenditure incurred by the factories under "Revenue" is spread over the total output of factories.

4. The factories employ labour to the extent normally of over 20.000 souls.

111. C.—Ordnance and Clothing Factories.—

Oapital.—The amount provided under this head is utilised for the purpose of expansion of buildings and plant in the Ordnance and Clothing Factories and also to keep them efficient and up-to-date.

2. The provision under this head is made under two sub-heads, viz., New grants and Depreciation :---

(a) Financed from new grants.—This grant is found from the lump sum provision for the Army as a whole and is intended—

- (i) to finance expansion of Factory buildings or machinery due to (a) growth of Army requirements, and (b) introduction of new methods of warfare or new measures or new or additional equipment;
- (ii) to finance expansion of housing due to increase of staff or labour or long outstanding needs.

(b) Financed from Depreciation.—Funds under this grant are found entirely from Factories' Depreciation grant to which is credited a certain portion of the cost of all goods supplied. A fixed sum dependent on the amount of depreciation of buildings and machinery in the year, together with the book value of redundant machinery and buildings sold or broken up during the year is credited to the Depreciation Fund. The cash in the Fund is drawn on as needed and shown under the entries "Financed from Depreciation". This expenditure is limited to making good "obsolescence" and to replacements.

3. Budget, 1929-30 of Capital expenditure in Ordnance and Clothing Factories is less than Budget, 1928-29 by •92 lakhs which is due to smaller expenditure anticipated.

Head III. D.—Grass Farms.—There are 44 Grass Farms under 9 administrative circles, i.e. Peshawar, Bannu, Quetta, Rawalpindi, Lahore, Meerut, Lucknow, Jubbulpore and Poona, al under the control of the Director of Farms, and under the higher administration of the Master General of Supply.

2. The policy is (i) to provide fodder for all Government animals in cantonments, both camping and marching, (ii) to supply and maintain baled fodder for war reserves according to sanctioned complements and (iii) to accumulate gradually in good years when todder is cheap and abundant, a reserve of hay up to the limit approved by Government.

3. The fodder requirements of the Army for 1927-28 were 217,174 tons. Fodder is obtained partly by production and partly by purchase. During 1927-28 the quantities actually dealt with were 1,91,936 tons, of this 96,368 tons were produced at a cost of Rs. 28°2 per ton and 95,568 tons were purchased at a cost of Rs. 43°73 per ton. These rates include all overhead and general charges and all direct charges including stacking, thatching, protection and retail issues to units.

4. Fodder is issued both dry and green. Dry fodder comprises chiefly hay and white bhoosa. Green fodder comprises green grass, green khasil (wheat, barley and oats), lucerne, berseem, gram, sugarcane and monsoon crops (Juar and maize).

5, Fodder is classified as "Working stocks ", "Farm reserves " and " Mobilization reserves ",

Head 111. E.—Dairy Farms.—There are 23 main Dairies (Bannu, Quetta, Peshawar, Rawalpindi, Sialkote, Lahore Cantonment, Jullundur, Ferozepore, Ambala, Dalhousie, Kasauli, Dagshai, Sabathu, Jutogh, Agra, Cawnpore, Lucknow, Allahabad, Kirkee, Belgaum, Deolali, Mhow and Juboulpore), 11 branch Dairies (Manzai, Dera-Ismail-Khan, Razmak, Cherat, Nowshera, Ghora Dhaka, Barian, Murree, Solon, Bombay and Pachmarhi), 6 Young Stock Farms (Jallo, Matsonabad, Sargodha, Gambar, Bagarji and Sitapur) and 1 Cream collecting station at Mardan.

2. These farms are worked as quasi commercial concerns and distributed under two administrative circles, *i.e.*, Northern and Southern with headquarters at Lahore Cantonment and Jubbulpore, both under the control of the Director of Farms and under the higher administration of the Master General of Supply.

3. The policy of the Dairies is to provide a safe and reliable supply of pure milk, butter and oream to hospitals and the issue thereof on payment to officers, troops and their families, messes and institutions at reasonable rates without loss to Government.

4. The quantities of milk sold during 1926-27 were 3,835 tons at an average sale rate of Re. 0.2.7.6 per lb., and 356 tons of butter at an average sale rate of Re. 1.7.7 per lb. These quantities represent in the case of milk 23 per cent. sales to Government hospitals and institutions and 77 per cent. to other customers and in the case of butter 6.7 per cent. to Government hospitals and institutions and 93.3 per cent. to others (officers, troops, and their families, messes and institutions.)

### MAIN HEAD IV.—ARMY HEADQUARTERS

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Definition and Composition of "The Staff".—The staff is the establishment of officers employed at the headquarters of each higher military formation to assist the commander in carrying out his duties of command and administration.

2. The staff of the Commander-in-Chief in India is known as the Army Headquarters Staff,

3. The officers appointed to the staff are specially selected officers, taken normally from among those who have graduated at the Staff College at Camberley or Quetta. The Staff Colleges are institutions where officers, after passing a competitive entrance examination, undergo a course of function in advanced military science and where they study the work of each fighting arm and of each administrative service and department of the army. No officer is posted permanently to the Staff. After a period of staff employment, limited as a general rule to four years, an officer seturns to his unit for tour of regimental duty, in order that he may keep in touch with regimental work, which it is essential that he should do. Moreover, no staff officer is trained solely for duty with one of the branches of the Staff: it is important that officers of each branch should be acquainted with the working of other branches, in order that they may know what assistance they targive and receive, and in order also to ensure the proper allocation of responsibility and to avoid overlapping of work. To obtain this result, arrangements are made for the periodical exchance of staff.

4. Organisation, and the functions of the several branches.—The staff is organized in four principal branches :--

- (a) The General Staff Branch.
- (b) The Adjutant General's Branch.
- (c) The Quartermaster-General's Branch.
- (d) The Master General of Supply Branch.

5. The General Staff Branch.—The General Staff Branch deals with military policy, with plans of operations for the defence of India, with the organization and distribution of the army for internal security and external use, in accordance with the policy of Government, with the collection and distribution of intelligence, with the supervision of the training of the army with the use of the military forces in war, with war regulations, with the education of officers and other ranks, and with the inter-communication services.

6. The Adjutant General's Branch.—The Adjutant-General's Branch deals with all matters sppertaining to the raising, organizing, and maintenance of the military forces, the peace distribution of the army, discipline, martial, military and international law, medical and sanitary measures relating to the troops, personal and ceremonial matters, prisoners of war, pay and pension questions, recruiting, mobilization and demobilization.

7. The Quartermaster-General's Branch.—The Quartermaster-General's Branch is concerned with the maintenance and issue of supplies, i.e., foodstuffs, forage, fuel, clothing, armaments, ammunition, equipment, general stores and material, and reserves of these articles, with the services responsible for the transportation, movement and quartering of troops, with the supply and transport service, armaments, military works, equipment and ordnance stores, with the remount and veterinary services and with garrison and regimental institutes. Since the great war the responsibilities of the Quartermaster-General's Branch have increased to a far greater extent than those of any other branch of the staff. This is attributable specifically to the creation of new services, such as Mechanical Transport, and to the fundamental change of policy by which, since the war, Indian troops are fed, clothed and mounted directly by Government, instead of under regimental arrangements.

8. The Master-General of Supply Branch.—The branch consists of four Directorates with duties that are interdependent. These are—

- (i) Ordnance Factories and Manufacture.
  - (ii) Artillery.
  - (iii) Farms.
  - (iv) Contracts.

(1) The Directorate of Ordnance Factories and Manufacture againsters the army factories in India, and assists the development of manufactures in India by private manufactures.

#### STAFF OF COMMANDS, ETC.—contd.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

(ii) The Directorate of Artillery deals with design, including questions of research and experivment, scales of equipment, initial provision and allotment of all armament and ammunition, equipment and technical stores of the various branches of the service; also with inspection, and maintenance of such stores.

(iii) The Directorate of Farms is responsible both in peace and war for organising the whole supply of fodder, other than that drawn by local requisitions in the field and for a part of the supply of dairy produce required.

(iv) The Directorate of Contracts deals with the central purchase of foodstuffs, coal. oil petrol, paints, varnishes, etc., machinery, engineering stores, etc., maintains statistics, reviews local purchases; investigates most economical sources of supply and possibilities of obtaining stores in India in consultation with Indian Stores Department.

9. The Military Sec. etary deals with the appointment, promotion and retirement of officers, holding the King's Commission and the selection of officers for staff appointments.

10. In addition to the above, the Army Headquarters staff includes certain technical advisers of whom the most important is the Major General, Royal Artillery. The duties of the officer are to inspect and co-ordinate the training of the artillery arm and to render advice to the General Staff Branch on technical questions connected with the administration of the arm and its employment in war. The officer is attached to the General Staff Branch.

11. Lower formations.—The staff in Commands and Districts is organised on the same lines as at Army Headquarters, and the allocation of duties is in exact correspondence. There are of course certain differences, one being that the lower the formation, the fewer in number are the appointments and the lower is their grading; further, the work of the Adjutant-General's and Quartermaster-General's Branches is usually combined in one administrative staff officer. The composition of the staff of Commands and Districts varies with the special requirements of each.

12. Provision is made under this Head for the charges of Commanders and their staffs inoluding their personal staffs.

2. Certain stores are purchased locally under the financial powers of ordnance officers. Funds are provided under Head V-E. (a), (1) and (2) for ordnance stores and (b), (1) and (2) for clothing.

3. The total provision shown in these estimates for all sources of supply includes ordinary requirements as well as new demands. The provision for ordinary requirements represents what is generally known as the Maintenance Grant.

4. Under the provision system, the stock position of practically every item is reviewed every six months. Demands on suppliers are framed with reference to the latest reviews and the budget provision is made on the basis of the value of the demands thus framed.

Head V.E. (a) Ordnance Stores.—Budget, 1929-30 is more than Budget, 1928-29 by Rs. 28-14 lakhs. Minor Head (a)—Embarkation Staff.—The embarkation staffs deal with the reception of troops (both British and Indian) at Indian ports and their despatch from India to oversea destinations. They also deal with the shipping of stores from the sea ports and receipt of stores from overseas and their onward despatch. The embarkation staffs at Bombay and Karachihave been recoganised in order to make extended use of the port of Karachi for the embarkation and disembarkation of troops proceeding to and from northern India and by bringing together under the embarkation commandants the supply establishments employed at both ports onembarkation duties.

Budget, 1929-30 is more than budget, 1928-29 by Rs. •06 lakhs due to increase under payand allowances of officers and others (<sup>16</sup>) partly counterbalanced by a decrease under incidental and miscellaneous expenses (<sup>10</sup>).

Minor Head (b)—Railway Transport Staff.—The railway transport establishments which are employed at Bombay, work under the orders of the embarkation commandant and deal with the frequent and important rail movements which take place to and from that port.

The decrease of Rs. •01 lakh in budget, 1929-30, as compared with the budget, 1928-29 is due to proposed reduction in kitchen car staff. ('06) partly counterbalanced by increase of provision made for a new measure ('05).

#### EXPLANATIONS.

### Minor Head (a)-Conservancy-

(1) Military areas are not subject to taxation. In lieu thereof, the removal and disposal of conservancy is paid for by arrangement with the Cantonment Authority.

(2) In the military area itself, the military authority is responsible for its own conservancy arrangements.

(3) In non-cantonment military stations the military authorities are responsible for the conservancy of their own areas and for the removal and disposal system.

The decrease of Rs. 26 lakh in Budget, 1929-30 as compared with the budget, 1928-29 is based on past actuals.

#### Minor Head (b)—Hot weather establishments—

Hand-pulled punkhas are only provided in very hot stations at the expense of 50-M. E. S., and in cases where such are sanctioned, the necessary establishment is provided urder this head. As electrification proceeds and electric fans are provided from 50-M. E. S., this head automatically decreases.

The decrease of Rs. 52 lakh in budget, 1929-30 as compared with Budget, 1928-29 is due to electrification of British troops barracks and hospitals.

### Minor Head (c)-Administration of Non-Cantonment stations .--

The administration of the Military Station of Attock only is at present provided for under this head.

Minor Head (d)—Administration of Telephones (excepting those at Army Headquarters)— The increase of Rs. '11 lakh in budget, 1929-30, as compared with Budget, 1928-29, is due mainly to the renewal of the guarantee for the Quetta-Chaman telephone trunk line.

#### EXPLANATIONS.

Non-effective charges mainly represent the discharge of liabilities in connection with individuals who no longer serve in the army and consist of payments of pensions and gratuities to them or their families. Rewards attached to certain military decorations and medals and for distinguished war service which frequently involve payments to officers and men still serving in the army are also taken to this head, those to individuals on the retired list being compiled under sub-head B as part of pension charges and those to serving officers and men to sub head A. The charges for pensions are under three main categories, viz., (1) pensions to retired or disabled officers and men, (2) pensions to families of individuals and (3) payments to War Office of a proportionate share of retired pay, etc., of British service officers and troops serving in India. Against the liability under (2) contributions are recovered from officers in respect of pensions paid from family pension funds, which are credited as non-effective receipts. The other receipts are contributions received by the Indian Government in respect of ordinary pensions payable from army estimates to officers and men on foreign service in Iray and elsewhere.

SUMMARY OF ESTIMATES.

N.-B.—Amount provided in Budget for 1920-30 for Auxiliary and Territorial Forces is Bs. 60,69,000 and Rs. 29,55,000 respectively. In addition errisin sums are expended by Army and Milltary Engineer Services for stores and works expenditure which amount to Bs. 17,74,000 and Bs. 27,75,000 thus bringing the total provision for Auxiliary and Territorial Forces to Ba. 78,43,000 and Bs. 37,30,000 respectively. The provision of Rs. 37,30,000 for Territorial Force is inclusive of the provision for carrying out the recommendations of the Some Committee.

### Explanations.

1. Sub-Heads A. B. & C.--Represent provision for staff and establishments maintained at the army headquarters, commands and districts to deal with all questions connected with the organization and administration of Auxiliary and Territorial Forces.

2. Sub-Head D.-Auriliary Force.—This force has taken the place of the old volunteer force. The units comprising it are liable to be called out, or embodied for local service only thus constituting a potential reinforcement to the regular army. The maximum enrollable strength of this force amounts to 35,649 all ranks, viz. 3,520 cavalry, 1,841 artillery, 510 engineers, 15,185 railway corps, 13,599 infantry, 922 machine gun corps and 72 army service corps. The personnel of this force includes 3 categories, viz. (1) active class (2) first (A) and (3) second (B) reserve. On completion of the prescribed period of training non-commissioned officers and men of the active class are paid pay at Rs. 5, 2 and 2 per diem for sergeant, corporal and private respectively, and a bonus of an equivalent amount for 16 days in the case of the Infantry branch and 20 days i the case of other branches, while the men of category (2) are allowed pay and bonus for 6 and 10 glays respectively. Members of the 'B' Reserve fire a musketry course only.

The strength of the Auxiliary Force during 1929-30 will, it is anticipated, be maintained. at a total strength of 32,000 all ranks including cadets.

3. Sub-Head ' E '-Indian Territorial Force.—This force came into being on the 1st October 1920, and is in reality the successor of the Indian Branch of the Indian Defence Force. It consists at present 18 provincial units, 4 urban units and 11 University training Corps Units with an aggregate strength of 15,400 all ranks.

This force, as stated above is divided into 3 categories :---

- (i) Provincial units—2nd line to the Indian Army.—These units may be required to serve anywhere in India and even beyond in an emergency.
- (ii) Urban units.—These units have a limited liability for service similar to the Auxiliary Force India.
- (iii) University Training Corps units.—These units are mainly educational and have no liability for service.

The force generally is subject to the India Army Act.

. . . .

The organisation of the force follows the lines of the regular Indian Army, but without specialists, s.g. machine gunners, etc. The personnel of provincial battalions are liable for preliminary and periodical training not exceeding 28 days and 56 days respectively in the year. In the case of certain selected units the period of training has been increased to 3 and 2 months respectively. During this period they draw such pay and allowances as are admissible to corresponding ranks of the regular India army. Members of urban units carry out training for a period not exceeding 16 days in the year on the lines of the Auxiliary Force, India, i.e. daily parades followed by a short period in camp. Members draw pay and allowances for the number of days spent in training at rates admissible to corresponding ranks in the regular Indian Army with an additional messing allowance in camp. Bounties for the completion of periodical and preliminary training and a musketry course are admissible under certain prescribed conditions to junior officers, non-commissioned officers and mcn of urban units. Urban units are also entitled to a Capitation Grant earned by individuals who are "efficient" or who have passed certain examinations. Members of the University Training Corps are required to carry out parades during the University term and to be embodied in Camp for a period not exceeding 15 days. With the exception of officers, they do not receive pay but an amount equivalent to pay and allowances for 15 days is included in a camp allotment to meet expenses on account of messing etc. for the period of the camp. Senior officers of this force draw British rates of pay with certain additional allowances for periods spent in camp.

MILITARY SERVICES ESTIMATES

#### EXPLANATIONS.

The establishment of the Royal Air Force in India is 260\* officers, 1,912† airmen, 48 Indian other ranks, 189 Indian artificers, 95 Indian mechanical transport drivers, 143‡ clerks, 4 schoolmistresses, 8 regimental munshis, 820\$ followers and 8 civil armed guards.

It comprises the following units-

- 1 Headquarters, Royal Air Force, Simla and Delhi.
- 1 Group Headquarters, Royal Air Force at Peshawar with 2 stations each comprising 2 (Bombing) squadrons at Risalpur and Kohat, and
- 1 (Army Co-operation) squadron at Peshawar under its administration. The Risalpur station has also in addition to 2 (Bombing) squadrons a Parachute Test Section.
- 1 Wing Headquarters, Royal Air Force at Quetta with 2 (Army Co-operation) squadrons under its administration.
- 1 (Army Co-operation) squadron at Ambala, which is directly under the administration of the Headquarters, Royal Air Force.—
- I Airgraft Depot at Karachi.
- 'I Aircraft Park at Lahore.

Besides the above there is a Royal Air Force Hill Depot which is located at Lower Topa during the summer months only.

- - The Aircraft Depot receives all stores from England, erects new aeroplanes, overhauls engines, carries out major repairs to aeroplanes, mechanical transports, etc. It is a supply base for Quetta direct and for other stations through the Aircraft Park, Lahore.

3. The duties of the Aircraft Park are as follows :---

- The Aircraft Park erects all new aeroplanes received from England, with the exception of those mentioned in paragraph 2, carries out plane repairing and mechanical transport body building work and is the supply base for all Royal Air Force stations other than Quetta.
- 4. The establishment of the Royal Air Force in India includes 2 meteorological officers whose duty is to provide special meteorological information required by the Force.
- 5. The principal changes which have been made in the establishments of the previous year are -
  - (a) The appointments of the Commanding Royal Engineer, Royal Air Force (designated as a Chief Engineer in future), his personal assistant and clerical staff, have been made permanent with the approval of the Secretary of State for India.
  - (<sup>1</sup>) The permanent appointment of an officer of the rank of Flight Lieutenant as personal assistant to the Air Officer Commanding has been sanctioned with the approval of the Sucretary of State for India.
  - (c) With the approval of the Secretary of State for India the wiele clerical establishment of the Headquarters, Royal Air Force has been placed on a civilian basis in the same manner as adopted for the Army Headquarters offices.
  - (d) Owing to the great advances which have recently taken place in the developments of wireless equipment and the consequent extension of its use for communication an increase of 3 aircraftmen wireless operator mechanics and 4 corporals and 14 aircraftmen wireless operators in the wireless operator establishment of the 4 Army Co operation Squadrons has been approved.
  - (c) Owing to the increase of the Royal Air Force in India by two new squadrons, two additional civilian education officers have been added to the strength of the Educational Staff.
  - (f) Substitution of S<sup>5</sup> aircraftmen Mechanical Transport Drivers by an equivalent number of Indians has been approved by the Secretary of State for India.
  - Including Chief Engineer, Royal Air Force, and his Personal Assistant.
  - † Including one nursing orderly in lieu of a second division clerk at Headquarters, Royal Air Force.
  - 1 Includes 2 clerks and one draftsman authorised for Chief Engineer's Office, Royal Air Force,
  - Includes 1 peon authorized for Chief Engineer's Office, Royal Air Force.
  - + Decluding Dual Control Machine.

### EXPLANATIONS.

- (g) Increase of the office establishment of Aircraft Depot by 3 Flying Officers for actministration, armament and technical duties has been approved by the Secretary of State.
- (h) With the approval of the Secretary of State, Indian Technical and Followers Corps has been formed. This Corps includes Tradesmen, Mechanical Transport Driver and menials.
- (i) With the approval of the Secretary of State, an increase of Sairmen pilots per Single Engine Bombing Squadron and an equivalent decrease of Flying Officers have been sanctioned.

6. The suitability of Trojan Vans for service duties was tested in India and proved satisfactory and economical. It was, therefore, decided that 25 Trojan Vans and 27 Solo motor cysles shall be substituted for the 47 motor cycles and 37 side-cars at present authorised for use by the various Royal Air Force units in India.

7. The recent technical developments in mechanical transports have resulted in a radical revision of the transport establishments in units of the Royal Air Force, the principal feature of which is the introduction of a system whereby trailers are largely employed in place of self propelled vehicles thereby securing economy both in prime movers and personnel. Most of the present vehicles in India are of war time origin and are heavily worn out and their repair is no longer economical. A scheme for the re-organisation of the Mechanical Transport of the Royal Air Force in India on the new basis has been approved by the Secretary of State. The provision of the proposed Mechanical Transport vehicles will be carried out progressively.

8. The increase of Rs. 11-50 lakhs (net) in the Budget estimate, 1929-30, over th budget estimate, 1928-29, is made up as follows :---



#### EXPLANATIONS.

The Royal Indian Marine has been converted into a combatant service and the functions of the reorganized service, in peace time, are as follows :--

- (a) Training of personnel for service in war.
- (b) Organization of the naval defences of Indian coasts and harbours and the protection of trade in Indian waters.
- (c) Marine survey work.
- (d) Marine transport work for the Government of India, i.e., all arrangements afloat for the conveyance of troops, animals and stores for Government.

2. The grant for net expenditure for the year 1929-30 is Rs. 68.60 lakhs as against Rs. 68.43 lakhs in the year 1928-29. The variation is small and is explained in detail below.

3. Head 1.—Decrease of Rs. 49 lakh is due to the abolition of the appointment of Chief Staff Officer and Adviser to the Flag Officer Commanding and Director, Royal Indian Marine, and I Naval Expert and transfer of provision for travelling allowances to Head 9, partly counterbalanced by provision for the appointment of Flag Lieutenant to Flag Officer Commanding and Director, Royal Indian Marine, and other minor fluctuations.

4. Heads 2, 3 and 4. - Differences are small and due to minor fluctuations.

5. Head 3.—Under this head there is a decrease of Rs. 2\*50 lakhs. The service is not yet at full strength. The provision is made on the basis of past actuals and revised estimates.

6. Head 6.—There is a decrease of Rs. 32 lakh as compared with 1928-29. The reduction has been made on the basis of past actuals and revised estimates.

7. Head 7.—The increase of Rs. 2.58 lakhs is chiefly due to more stores, ammunition and mine sweeping gear, etc., and machinery to be obtained from England and also other fluctuations based on revised estimates and past actuals.

8. Head 8.—The provision under this head mainly includes part provision in respect of the fourth sloop (Rs. 8.07 lakhs) to be obtained from the Admiralty. This expenditure is financed from the Kidderpore Dockyard Suspense Account.

9. Heads 9 and 10 .- Differences are due to minor fluctuations.

10. Receipts.—Out of the total receipts of Rs. 13.62 lakhs, the ordinary receipts amount to Rs. 5.08 lakhs and the balance, viz., Rs. 8.54 lakhs, represents the receipts to be transferred from the Kidderpore Dockyard Suspense Account, in respect of measures to be financed from that Account. The reduction in ordinary receipts is chiefly due to the conversion of the Marine into a combatant service leading to a reduction in the amount of services and supplies to other parties.

11. Revised compared with Budget, 1928-29.—The amount of total net expenditure likely to be incurred in 1928-29 has been estimated to amount to Rs. 68 60 lakhs as against the Budget grant of Rs. 68 43 lakhs. The main reasons for the increase of Rs. 17 lakh are detailed below :----
